— AUGUST 1749 —

Diary and Consultations of the Chief and Factors at Tellicherry containing their transactions in the service of the Honble United English East India Company commencing August the 1st, 1749 and ending July the 31st, 1750.

THE FRENCH having by report reduced their Military and others in Monthly pay at Mahie. The Chief (agreeable to a Resolution of Council) made a Regulation amongst our Militia and finding Two hundred and forty Men would be full sufficient for Duty (including One hundred and twenty five of Narrangports Nairs) discharged all others, taking due Notice of the Seepoys who were insolent upon the Commencement of our late troubles (as is fully mentioned in Consultation the 6th. of October 1746) by dismissing the Ringleaders at that time and putting the others upon a much lower footing in the service than formerly.

TUESDAY
1ST.

WROTE a Letter to the Chief and Factors of Anjengo acknowledging receipt of theirs of the 18th. of May received the 27th. following by the return of the Sergeant who carried down the 30000 Rupees, the safe arrival of which being a particular satisfaction to us. That we are sorry to find the several reasons was assigned for the loss of Weight in the Rice did not appear so plain to them as it had done to us, but that we could not help repeating we think it owing to Pilferage after the same was shipt from hence as our Warehousekeeper and his Assistants by a written Report affirm it was sent off in good Condition neither did the Chief remember the Master of the sloops having made any objection to the Package as we are informed he acquainted them he did, however care has been taken to notice this Affair in our Advices to the Presidency to avoid Censure to either of our Factorys. That we are greatly surprized to find the Fire Arms sent from hence did not turn out as we expected as we Agreed to send down the Number required of Us and such as were fit for Service though not all new ones (as our occasions would not permit of) but being advised their intention of returning sixty nine of them again which were unserviceable we called on our Storekeeper to report the condition the same was in, (& enclosed them a Copy thereof) assuring them that after the strictest examination we found One hundred of the Number sent, were new Arms reced from the Presidency, and that rest had passed Muster of our Smiths as fit for Services therefore could only say we are sorry to find they do not answer their purpose though we could not help observing that their Officers had condemned a part which were sent us from Bombay as New Arms which had never been used at this Place. That we are using our utmost endeavours to recover the loss of the Sloop from the Samorine and though Circumstances makes the same appear

to have happened through the treachery of his subjects yet we cannot prevail with him to give us the least hopes of granting satisfaction or even refunding what was saved out of her, pleading his right to all Wrecks which he esteems this to be, however we are endeavouring by persuasive means to recover the whole or a part of what is lost and have requested Orders from Bombay for using more rigid ones in case he cannot be brought to reason and when any recovery is made we shall bring the same to the Credit of their Factory and not before as they seem to expect as we cannot esteem ourselves justly chargeable for any Goods untill received more especially as these were not designed for our service but for the Europe Market therefore presume this Affair relates entirely to their Factory. Enclosed an Account Cost and Charges of the Eighteen hundred Bales of Rice at the medium of what this Article had been purchased for—acknowledged receipt of their PayMasters Account sundries supplied the Detachment sent by us on the Cudalore sloop for the security of their Rice which expence we should debt their Factory for as a pallel Occurrence seemed to them reasonable the last Year, and likewise sent them our PayMasters Expences incurred by remitting them the Thirty thousand Rupees, And in a Postscript advised of our having opened their Letter to Mr. Baldwin imagining we might get some further insight concerning the unfortunate loss of their sloop.

Ola from the Prince desiring a Person to back his solicitation with Boyanore.

RECEIVED an Ola from Prince Cunhi Raman at Cartenaddu desiring Narrangport-Unichy Nair may be sent thither having something of Consequence to consult with him about which his Writer (who was [the] Bearer of this Ola) would inform the Chief. In discoursing with [whom] it evidently appears the Prince only wants a Person to back the Solici[tations] he is making with Boyanore in behalf of the Honble Company of obtai[ning] a Clearance of his Debt and cultivating a Friendship with them (agree[able] to what the Chief requested at their last interview) therefore Unichy Nair is directed to repair thither on the 8th. Instant which is the day fixed by the Prince conformable to the message he sent by his Writer.

The Fort St. David Advices received the 31st. Ultimo being taken into Consideration, it is observed, that the New Castle & Dragon are absolutely designed to come early upon this Coast and that by a List of ships Governour Floyer has transmitted to the Chief four are destined for Bombay this Season and that the Hon^{ble} Company have directed them to send home all those that came out with admiral Boscawen (being six in number) dead freighted from One hundred to One hundred & fifty Tons two of which they say they are able to dispatch themselves but the others they entertain hopes of being provided for on this Coast.

SUCH AN unexpected large Tonnage makes it absolutely necessary for us seriously to consider what methods are most eligible to be taken to answer these demands or at least to secure the Two thousand Candies Ordered to be provided in the 11th. Paragraph of our Hon^{ble} Masters Commands by the ship Severn the 10th. January 1745 and confirmed in their Letter the 10th. of May 1746 ⁷ Ilchester, which Quantity the Presidency have likewise directed us to provide and no more in their Commands of the 14th. of April 1749 (notwithstanding what was mentioned in the Companys Paragraphs by the Oxford) and the French having by their underhand proceedings last Year greatly raised the price of this Article (as

have been fully set forth in several parts of the Consultations) And our Merchants declaring to us they shall not be able to deliver more than One thousand Candies out of the Fifteen hundred they have contracted for and even then be totally ruined unless an Allowance is made them, as from the large demands that has been made for this Article this Season by the Danes and Maccoa shipping all risques have been run by the Inland Merchants to transport it to Callicut (which has drained the Southern part of of the Country very considerably) There is as we hear at present no more than four hundred Candies procurable in the several Provinces, and as we have found by the most strict enquiry that this representation is real matter of Fact the consequence of endeavouring to purchase what we can thereof (which

at most will not be above two hundred Candies we are very certain will prove greatly prejudicial by raising the Price of the Next Years Crop and our seeming desirous to buy this small Quantity at present will undoubtedly raise this Article still higher; therefore the purchasing elsewhere is now taken into Consideration especially as we are certain no further Quantity can be carried out of the Country untill February next so as to influence the price of the ensuing Years Crop by which time we may have our Purpose answered. It is AGREED therefore to apply to Callicut as the properest Port, as was done on a Parellel case by the Hon^{ble} President the 16th. of August 1742 when he was Chief here which proceeding being not disapproved of by our Hon^{ble} Masters and the like methods Ordered to be used in his Instructions upon leaving the Place in Nov^r. 1742 when there was a scarcity of this Article it the more readily induces us to take this Step, but as Suamy Putterah is since dead who used to be applied to on such Occasions and his Sons carrying on no Trade but exchanging of Money Mr. Douglas is asked what Persons are in his Opinion the most proper to contract with who says Mutty Chitty, and Surchund are the only substantial Merchants and by being Brokers to the Northern vessels buy up this Commodity at the proper season of the Year with their own Money thereby making their Advantages and apprehends likewise a small Quantity may be got at Penany. The Chief is therefore desired to make the most private enquiry what Quantity is to be procured at those Places, not only to prevent a disappointment in the Tonnage but to frustrate the schemes of the Danes who are inclined to carry on an Annual trade to this port and have been practising with the Samorine to obtain his Liberty for building a Factory which may in the End prove of the utmost disadvantage to our Hon^{ble} Employers, and it is likewise AGREED (if the Chief receives proper Answers) to purchase such a Quantity as will make up the Two thousand Candies Ordered by Our Superiours and wait their Directions for entering into any further Contracts there or elsewhere if this Article is procurable.

THE CHIEF received a Letter from the Prince of Cota Cuna advising him that when the Princes of Travancore & Baddacacolutu quitted their Palaces the 5 King of Anjangore & one or two Queens went with them, but that the latter has sent Messengers two or three times declaring it was against his inclination that the Travancore Princes committed acts of Hostility in the Country, promising that he would not in future intermeddle in their Affairs, but adhere to everything the House of Cherrika might propose & that being unable to support himself in the Woods any longer if his request was not granted he would at all Events come to Cherrika That in reply to his earnest solicitations he had acquainted him that He should come to no determination untill the Chief of Tellicherry was acquainted therewith though it was his Opinion that [all] those who subjected themselves after this manner should not be denied but as the Rebel Princes are distressed at present he fancies they will not suffer him to come however desires the Chiefs Opinion how to act in this Affair.

Ola from the Prince of Cotacunna.

The 5th. King of Anjengo desires an Accommodation.

The Chiefs Opinion desired.

THE CHIEF in reply to the foregoing advised his Highness he had notice before receipt of his Ola of the 5 King of Anjangores intentions and that it was his Opinion His Highness should hearken thereto, first sending for written Proposals which when done His Brother and self would consider of such means as would put him under Restrictions & tend to the good of their Palace in future. That it was his earnest desire to see all disputes at an End having Notice that the Canarees are gathering together a Body of Men at Mangalore and what their designs are is at present unknown.

The Chief for adjusting Differences.

THE CHIEF dispatched Unichy Nair to Cartenaddu with proper Instructions concerning Boyanores Debt &c^a., and wrote Prince Cunhi Raman an Ola by him as follows.

A Messenger dispatch'd to Cartenaddu.

I received your Highnesses Letter by Amboo Writer and agreeable to your request I now send Narrangport Unichi Nair with a Letter to Boyanore demanding his Debt to the Honble Company therefore I hope you'll do what lays in your Power to bring this Affair (with which you are well acquainted) to a Conclusion; Your Brother has advised me of the Condesensions the 5th. King of Anjangore is willing to make which I advised him to hearken too first dispatching his People to receive written Proposals and when this is done Your Highness & I will consider of such means as may prove advantageous to your Palace by this Alliance in future.

Ola to the Prince desiring him to Conclude Boyanores affairs.

I am the more earnest to see all these disputes ended as I have certain information that the Canarees are gathering together a body of Men at Mangalore but what their designs is [sic] unknown therefore I desire Your Highness will not stay at Cartenaddu longer than is absolutely necessary.

THAT Boyanore might be convinced Unichy Nair was sent with Powers from hence to treat with him the Chief wrote the following Ola Viz^{ts}.

As the Prince of Cherrika has desired me to send Narrangport Unichi Nair I take this Opportunity of giving him my Orders to talk to Your Lordship concerning your Debt to the Honble Company which having been outstanding for a long time it does not become you to deferr payment thereof any longer therefore hope you'll immediately made good the same.

Ola to the Byanore.

KING BADENCALAMCUR wrote the Chief an Ola putting him in mind of their Conference in May last at Billiapatam, when he placed his dependance entirely on him, and that being in great distress at present for want of necessaries and his Children now in the Woods in dismall Circumstances And as the fair season draws near desires to know how Affairs will be settled relying on the Honble Company for the safety of Himself and Heirs & shall adhere to whatever they may propose to Him.

King Badencalamcur desires to know how the affairs of his Family will be adjusted.

IN reply to the above the Chief reminded His Majesty of the great trouble he had taken with the Princes of Cherrika for the good & quiet of Himself & Heirs by sending & writing to the latter to send their Ministers hither in Order to consult & settle measures between the two Palaces of Pally Quilote and Oden Quilote for the

Ola to the Bademolamcur. He is advised to induce his nephews to make concessions to the Prince.

good of the Country in General, notwithstanding which His Heirs made no Account thereof but continued committing acts of Hostility till at last He was obliged to send the Hoñble Companys People in conjunction with the Prince of Cherrikas to take the Hill Puture which had traiterously been given up to them; However to show his good inclination to serve both Parties if his Majesty would write his Heirs to come hither they should be treated in the same kind manner as formerly and his utmost endeavour used to establish a harmony between them & the Princes of Cherrika (wherein the Ease and safety of his Majesty & them should be firmly settled, but till this is done he cannot say anything to the Prince of Cherrika in their behalf to ease their present Necessities, having given his Word that His Majestys would bring them to a just way of thinking which was what he gave under his Hand at Billapatam & is not yet complied with.

THURSDAY 10TH. Mr. Richard Secker ordered to make Enquiry in respect to Pepper.

AGREEABLE to our last resolution of Council the Chief wrote Mr. Richard Secker at Callicutt to make the most private enquiry possible what Quantity of Pepper may be got there and at Penany before the end of December and the Price it may be contracted for at both Places, seeming rather to make it more out of curiosity than with an inclination to purchase directing him to advise constantly of any material information that may be got so as no time may be lost in making use of the necessary Advantages that may offer, recommending Surchand, & Mutty Chitty as the properest Merchants to make an Agreement with, and if possible to obtain their promise for delivering all the Pepper they can procure (if a Price is Agreed upon) for the Season, as it will be the means of securing the whole or the greatest part of what may offer to sale and possibly get the Quantity required which will be about One thousand Candies, though it must not be made known upon any Account.

SATURDAY 12TH. Objections raised to the accounts with Boyanore.

NARRANGPORT UNICHY NAIR returns from Cartenaddu and acquaints the Chief that he was received by Boyanore in a very friendly manner. That his Mother made many Objections to the depending Accounts alledging that to the Amount of about seventeen thousand Fanams charged therein was for Sundries expended without her knowledge and Consent when invested with the Administrations of her Sons Affairs during their Minority therefore could by no means be allowed of, but two Rajahdores named Chandu and Chandoppa (in our Interest) representing in very strong terms to the second Boyanore as what supplied by the Hoñble Company was for the real advantage of the whole Country and done with no other intent or View than to serve Boyanore such objections being made would appear very mean in the Eyes of all considerate People by which and his perswasions she was at last prevailed upon to give up the Point when Boyanore came to a resolution of sending his Rajahdores hither to conferr with the Chief in six days time.

But given up and Rajahdores to be sent for adjusting the payment.

By Unichy Nair the Chief received an Ola from Boyanore Translate of which is as follows Viz^t.

I have received your Letter and discoursed with Unichi Nair on its Contents. I hope I shall have your Friendship, and in Order to finish my accounts on the 16th. Instant two of my Rajahdores will wait on you & for other Particulars I refer you to Unichi Nair.

And another from the Prince acquainting him that he had talked with Boyanore concerning his accounts who had promised to send two of his Rajahdores to Tellicherry for that purpose and concludes with giving his Opinion that this subject ought to be hearkned to for the reasons Unichi Nair would deliver to Him.

SUNDAY 13TH. Complaint from the Prince against a Nombiaz.

THE CHIEF received an Ola from the Prince complaining against One Quequedattu Nombier who had forcibly taken a Tivey out of the Compounds of one Nela-peri Addioddy who is annually obliged to pay him some Batty & Fanams & having acquainted him with the Nombiers proceeding he promised to take the necessary Notice, however the Addioddy (by means of the Tiveys Heir) promised the Nombier three hundred Fanams who not being satisfied beat the Tivey in such a manner that he died, all which being done in the Province Irreavanaddu against his subject desires the Chief will keep this transaction in his remembrance.

In Answer to the above the Chief acknowledged receipt of His Highness's Ola & promised to acquaint Him with what he had heard concerning this affair on their first meeting.

THERE having by report been a large quantity of Pepper, Cardamoms and Sandall Wood carried through Pallariens Country for this two Years past, And our Principal Inland Merchant (Ballapil Cuttiassem) being now on Departure towards that Country) who is much esteemed in those Parts the Chief wrote a Complimentary Letter by to Palliarein and gave such necessary Instructions as seems necessary for effectually putting a stop to such Practises in future which if not done in time may prove very prejudicial to the Hoñble Companys Trade at this Settlement. The Letter was as follows Viz^t.

THE Prince likewise sent his Rajahdore Amboo Conna Capula in Company with those of Boyanore and by him wrote the Chief that the Old Boyanore and the rest of the Family was sensible that in times past the English Company carried on a Trade in Cartenaddu, and that in future they might do the same, it being their intentions to keep up the like Correspondence their Uncles did, nor should so trifling a matter as their outstanding. Accounts make a disunion between them and the Hoñble Company, therefore they had sent to settle the same that an Open Trade might be carried on, advising the Chief to receive and dispatch them in a friendly manner and for other particulars referred him to Ambu Writer.

A MERCHANT belonging to Mangalore being now on departure from this Place, the Chief discoursed with him concerning the procuring of Pepper in those Parts who declared he could give no certain Accounts if any was there or not but would enquire upon his Arrival and advise of everything that was necessary.

THE CHIEF received an Ola from Quello Nombier & His Heirs advising they had fixed on the 23rd. Instant to come hither in Order to have a Conference with him on some Affairs of Importance desiring to be advised if the time is proper & suits his Conveniency. To which the Chief answered that he would willingly meet them did he not expect the Prince of Cherrika about that time but after his departure he would inform them when to come in order to consider of the best ways and means to settle affairs for the quiet of the Country and in the interim desired they would advise him if any thing material happened.

THE CHIEF has had several meetings with Boyanores Rajahdore since their arrival who at last insist that only the amount of Forty five thousand Fanams was expended in Cartenaddu on their Masters account proposing to pay the same if no interest is charged thereon, time allowed for that purpose and a general discharge given when the last payment is made. To which the Chief replied that he was much surprized such disputes should be made, when they could not but be sensible the Assistance afforded was upon a very Urgent occasion, and the supplies granted agreeable to the request of such Ministers that were sent to solicit for the same and it was reasonable to imagine ample Powers were given them to negotiate such an Affair, which at that time for many reasons, was absolutely necessary to be carried on with the greatest Secrecy. As for the Interest being given up it was what could by no means be thought of by us as the Company would in such case

bear the whole burthen of their Expences the Principal having been so long due; However as they say no more is owing actually, than Forty five thousand Fanams. The Chief proposed, either to accept thereof with Interest (which will in such Case much exceed the Totall sum due if Boyanore will deliver up such Rajahdore as he thinks ought to pay the remainder and give a full discharge or else of sixty two thousand six hundred sixty two fanams eight Vis. (62662. 8) the full Amount of what he stands charged with and leave the Interest to be decided by our superiours. To neither of which a definitive answer could be given till their Masters Sentiments were known, for obtaining which they would this day set out for Carteanaddu and upon taking leave strenuously requested in his Name that the Toney seized last Year might be delivered to them which the Chief promised should be considered of before their return and that such a trifle should occasion no difference between us upon coming to a Conclusion nor retard the Business in hand.

By These Messengers the Chief wrote Boyanore as follows.—

I received Your Lordships Letter by your Rajahdore with whom I compared the accounts the Balance of which being sixty two thousand six hundred sixty two Fanams and a half I hope you will send me immediately with the Interests which you must be sensible is justly due.

AND the Princes Rajahdore having heard everything that passed at the several meetings he was referred to for particulars in the following Ola sent.

THE Collectors Report (as entered hereafter) being taken into Consideration It is AGREED that a House be hired for keeping the Honble Companys Nelly in, and that at the reaping thereof he send proper People to measure the produce of each Renters Land that an equitable part may be recovered and the Honble Company find the benefit of a plentiful season as well as the Farmers who on its happening otherwise have always had an Indulgence shown them, either by allowing a considerable time to discharge their Debts or relinquishing Interest on the Neally lent them.

THE Callicut Accounts having been Examined the Accomptant reports the Errors arise from several small Additions being made in March and bringing over a wrong Balance of Nineteen Rupees two Quarters Ninety eight Reas (Rs. 19-2-98) instead of a Credit which is Directed to be rectified accordingly; and as we find by the Last Months Cash Account now before us that the Honble Company owe Mr. Richard Secker Four hundred thirty two Rupees, two quarters fifty three Reas (Rs. 432-2-53). It is AGREED to send him a supply of Fifteen hundred Rupees (Rs. 1500. - .) by a Toney as the sea is pretty smooth at present Ordering him to discharge the Callicut Soldiers at the end of this Month as some will be sent him from hence in their Room in order to lessen our Charges as we may expect to hear of a Peace being proclaimed every day.

THE CHIEF informs the Board of his having received an Answer from Mr. Secker in respect to our purchasing Pepper, who informs him there is not a Maund of the last Years Crop procurable for the present at Callicut, neither does he hear of their being any at Penany but will make the most strict and private enquiry possible agreeable to the Directions he has received and send us the needful information.

Advice from Mr. Secker of no Pepper at Callicut.

A MERCHANT of Penany having offered to Contract for Three hundred Candies of Pepper at One hundred & five Rupees the Candy, The Chief acquaints the Board he enquired into his Circumstances and finds he is indebted to many People who are pushing him for a Clearance, and is not able to give security to the amount of such a sum of Money as must be advanced him for this Purpose if his Proposal was accepted, It is therefore AGREED to offer him One hundred Rupees the Candy on his delivering the same here or Ninety five Rupees at Penany.

An Offer of 300 Cads made but rejected and why.

THE large Quantity of Cardamoms, Sandall Wood & Pepper which is carried in land through the Palliareins Country has, and will prove of very bad Consequence to our Honble Masters Trade, therefore the Board are of opinion that some method ought to be thought on to prevent this practise in future if possible, And as Ballapil Cutussa our Merchant for the two former Articles is going with the Chiefs Letter to Him as mentioned under the 15th. Instant, He is desired likewise to give him some private Instructions in regard to this Affair, And if a Present is thought necessary on the Occasion that One be made to Palliarein in the Honble Companys Name.

The Cardamoms &c. Trade Considered and a proper Remonstrance to be made a Palliarim a Present agreed to.

THE CHIEF acquaints the Board with the result of the several Conferences he has had with Boyanores Ministers as is set forth in the Diary under Yesterdays date which being duly considered the Board Agree to give him a General discharge in case he will immediately pay off the Forty five thousand Fanams he acknowledges to owe the Honble Company with the Interest there on and give up such Rajahdores as took the remainder of his Debt without his knowledge, otherwise to pay of his Principal of Sixty two thousand Six hundred sixty two Fanams eight Tar (Fas. 62662. 8) and leave the Interest to the decision of our Superiours at Bombay, And if the Chief thinks the giving up the Toney seized last Year will have any influence on him, that his request for the same be acquiesced with.

Conference with the Boyanore Rajadores Considered. The Debt to be relinquished on paying 45000 Fams with Interest but in other Terms.

THE Paymaster reporting there is a decay of several Stores which was laid in on Account the French War Messrs. Douglas, Robinson, and Himself are ORDERED to inspect the same and make a report there of to the Board.

A Committee to inspect decayed Stores in the Pay Office.

The Callicutt and Paymasters Accounts for last Month being Presented are ORDERED to lay on the Board till next Council day for Inspection.

I now deliver in the Yearly account of the Rents & Revenues of Durmapatam wherein you will observe that the Pagodas of Meylure Andalure and Mapalingatta has paid the same low Rent ever since the Honble Company has had Possession of the Island to this time, while other Renters Grounds have been valued and a considerable encrease accrued to our Honble Masters therefrom which leads me to observe that by refering to the Remarks made by the Honble President in the Year 1741 concerning this Island you will find that the Rent may be raised on these Lands as well as on others which paying now so trifling a matter I request you will come to some resolution concerning them in Order for which I now lay down to you the following Statement as taken in July 1746 Viz^t.—

so that by this Account the Honble Company loose upwards of ten thousand Dungoys of what is the real value of the Grounds besides which I cant help remarking that the Vereadores in my Opinion undervalued the Pagoda Lands much to what they did these cultivated by the Renters, therefore if you think proper to send trusty People over now to Survey them while the Paddy is growing I imagine they will yield a larger Quantity than above mentioned.

In the last Years Account you find a considerable difference in the price of the Nelly which having been disposed of at an improper time may have occasioned this Decrease I therefore desire your Liberty to hire a House to deposit this Article in when I can take the advantage of the Market to sell the same.

This Year by all Accounts there will be a very plentiful Crop of Neally so that the Renters and Pagoda Lands will reap considerable Advantages. On the contrary the Honble Company may possibly be considerable sufferers as they will only receive the stipulated Rent and be obliged to sell the same perhaps at ten Dungoys for a Fanam which will decrease the Revenues the ensuing Year so that I presume it is but reasonable that when such a plentiful Year happens they should receive proportionably therefrom more espécially as when any hardships are suffered by the Renters from a bad Season or other Calamity they have always been relieved and I now request Your Orders how to act in this particular.

I shall shortly deliver in an exact State of the Island in regard to the Trees, Verges, and Salt Pans with observations thereon for your Notice that such Directions may be given as are thought most likely to benefit the Lands and encrease the Revenues.

Ola from Ally Rajah and referred to the Prince.

IN reply to which the Chief acquainted him of his having formerly referred Him to the Prince of Cherrika on this Affair, as by the Royal Writings that Palace had given the Honble Company the Island was now their Property therefore he could say no more to him on this subject.

THIS day the Prince held a Conference with the Chief acquainting him of every thing that had passed in Cartenaddu; by which he found Boyanore much inclined not only to renew and preserve the Antient Friendship subsisting between the Honble Company and his Ancestors but to put his Debt into a Course of payment concerning which he heard there was some difference and therefore had brought the necessary People to settle the depending Accounts, which was again examined and debated upon in his presence, when he declares there appeared to him no just reason for evading payment of the whole Debt, but that Interest he thought might be given up considering on what Account it arose and done with no other View than to serve a Family that was then distressed. When he was told in direct terms by the Chief that no other proposals than what made to his Rajahdores the 21st. Instant could be thought of by us at present, and till they were adhered to, little reliance or confidence could be placed in any promises that might be made by Boyanore, therefore it was needless for his Highness to give Himself any further trouble, our Superiours being determined (if Compelled) to take more rigid measures than had hitherto been experienced for securing the Honble Companys Property which in such case might possibly occasion a breach between them assuring him, they should have a true State of everything that had passed by the first conveyance and such an answer as they were pleased to give he should be acquainted with. Upon which he called for the Rajahdores and dismissed them with a suitable Message to their Master promising to write him what was necessary in a day or two, telling the Chief he should have frequent Opportunitys of conversing with him on this subject before he left Tellicherry which would not be for some days and then returned to the Pagoda.

THE CHIEF acknowledged receipt of the above & told them as they evaded coming hither to settle their disputes with the Prince as desired, if any bad consequence should hereafter happen to them from this disobedience not to complain to Him for redress.

They say that Pattaly, Changarah Putterah and Chevacheri Carriamparanour with others went to the Fort in Order to settle the Princes Account and upon adjusting it there appeared a difference between their Accounts and the Honble Companys of Four thousand and odd Fanams in favour of said Company which they would not allow off and so left the Fort and immediately went to Domingos Rodriguez and gave him their reasons for so doing who acquainted the Chief thereof and he Ordered the said difference to be struck out of the Account and adjusted the same the Balance of which was Fanams 183717. 9 and for which the Prince gave his Ola.

They say the Prince wrote the Chief desiring he would supply him with some Powder and Ball [...] who refused complying therewith unless he the Prince would pay ready Money for it, whereupon the Prince wrote to Domingos Rodriguez who gave Changarah Putterah Money to pay for it and he says he delivered the same in the Fort but to whom he does not remember.

They say when the French Fleet were expected on this Coast the Chief wrote the Prince desiring he would send his People to Tellicherry whereupon he sent all he then had with Arms, and said he had more Men but had no more Arms to give them, and as on this occasion the Honble Company gave Arms to [several] of the Country Powers he desired the Chief would give him One hundred Musquets and then he would let him have One hundred Men more with those Arms for the Honble Companys Service whereupon the Chief gave him Fifty Musquets with Bayonets and Pouches and after the Honble Company had no further calling for his People he carried them away from Tellicherry by leave of the Chief having occasion for them to the Northward, about two or three Months after this the Chief wrote him to return the Fifty Musquets and he gave for answer that all the Musquets he had were at the Honble Companys Service and that separately he would not give up these Fifty Arms as they were made him a present off.

They say the Prince was supplied with Rice for himself and People when he came to Telly, not on his own business but by the desire of the Chief and at the same time he asked whether he should be obliged to pay for it and whether it was supplied on the Hoñble Companys Acco^t. when Chitilin Conna and Chrisna Cutty Putterah made answer it was on the Hoñble Companys account agreeable to the Antient Custom in his uncle Unmentrys time, who used to bring few People and for which two Bales were enough but that he was always allowed Five Bales $\frac{1}{2}$ day, since which as his Heirs brought more Men, the Linguist to do the Company a service supplied him with what Rice he wanted for his People and charged him for it, but that now the Chief wanted things to go according to the Antient Custom and that his Highness should always be supplied with Rice on the Hoñble Companys Account when he came to Tellicherry.

They say the Prince wrote the Chief to send him two hundred Bales of Rice for the payment of which and some Timber he had been supplied with the said Chitilin Conna was to pay for as he the said Chitilin Conna had deducted 3500 Fanams out of the Princes Revenues of Randoterra which was [to] be paid to the Chief as may be seen by the Princes Account thereof apart.

They say his Highness desired the Chief to lend him Two thousand Rupees which he complied with, delivering the same into the hands of his Putterah and that Chingoran Chandu took it from him in Order to Exchange and gave him only in return Ten thousand Fanams at the time the Exchange was from $5\frac{1}{2}$ to $5\frac{3}{4}$ Vis. Ψ Rupee, upon which the said Putterah refused to receive the same desiring they would return him the Two thousand Rupees he received from the Chief whereupon they gave him for Answer, they would not return the Money in Rupees only in Fanams. The Rajahdores now say that as the Chief lent the Prince the Money they make no dispute in allowing the same in Account only think the two People prementioned ought to give the Prince the difference of Exchange. They say they find no Credit for the Customs of this.

They say they find no Customs on 200 Candies of Sandall shipt on board a Europe ship the 12th. Dec^r. 1747. 8TH.

They say that according to the Account Customs settled when Stephen Law Esq^r. was Chief that every thing imported for the use of this Settlement such as Iron Lead &c^a. ought to pay Customs but on things landed and exported again unsold on the Hoñble Companys Account there is no Customs. 9TH.

UPON coming to a conclusion they say they dont find the Prince is Debted for five Teak Timbers he was supplied with in February 1748 nor is any Credit given him for the 3500 Fanams which Chitilin Conna discounted out of his Revenues of Rhandoterra and which was to be paid to the Chief on Account of the aforementioned five Timbers and the two hundred Bales of Rice he received in March 1748. ARTICLE 10TH.

ALL which being Interpreted by the Linguist to the Prince he makes the following Declarations before the Chief concerning each Article Viz^t.

AS this Difference appears he is willing to have it adjusted in an equitable manner and therefore Orders his Rajahdores Changarah Putterah and Pattaley to examine the Old Accounts again. To THE 1ST.

THAT he hears the Money was actually received of Domingo Rodriguez and paid by Changarah Patterah but desires the deceased his Accounts may be examined into. 2ND.

He imagines those Arms were given to Him, but says that shall make no difference between Him and the Hoñble Company and therefore allows the charge to be just, declaring those and all others belonging to him are at their service when required. 3RD.

HE acknowledges to be Indebted only ten Bales of Rice received in May 1748 and confirms everything else set forth by his Rajahdores. 4TH.

EVERY thing mentioned in this Article is confirmed by Him in General. 5.

HE says the Putterahs Name was either Benguiddagalen or Sami and that he will send for them if required to prove everything set forth by his Rajahdores which he likewise affirms to be true. 6.

HE Agrees to take no Customs as the Cotton was exchanged for Pepper. 7.

HE Agrees that this absolutely is an Error. 8.

HE desires the Grant may be examined into. 9.

AGREEABLE to what wrote the Achamars they waited upon the Chief when he represented their late Misbehaviour and told them if ever such were experienced hereafter no Countenance or favour must be expected from the Honble Company who had something else to do with their Military than to employ them upon such trivial occasions neither was that the intent of our taking their Country under Protection: which proceedings gave occasion for us to imagine they had likewise offended the Prince; however as an Amendment of Conduct was sincerely promised on their part assurance was given that all friendly Offices should be done them at present and then they were dismissed with Orders to attend when the Prince was at leisure.

THE REMARKS taken from the Princes Rajahdores relating to his Debt by our Accomptant with what passed likewise between him and the Chief are now laid before the Board on which the following Observations and Resolutions are made and taken in consequence thereof.

OBSERVATIONS.

- ARTICLE 1ST THE PRINCE Ordering his Old Accounts to be compared with ours.
- 2ND IT appears by Domingo Rodriguez his Accounts and the Storekeepers Bill produced by his Heirs that the Money said to be paid was for Ammunition supplied him with the 28th. June and 12 August 1746 amounting to Rupees 369 whereas this Ammunition was Issued the 28th. following as appears by the Storekeepers Receipt and Issue Books.
- 3RD. ALLOWED to be a just Charge by the Prince.
- 4TH. CHITILIN CONNA being called upon denys all points as to himself and says he does not remember Chrisna Cutty Putterah ever told the Prince or his Rajahdores what they assent. The Paymasters Assistant Francisco D' Soaz at that time as well as the present declares that he mentioned the large Quantities of Rice then issued to the Prince at that time to Mr. Symmons then Paymaster in the Presence of Mr. De la Garde who went with him to Mr. West to know what Account it must be carried to and was told by him the Princes and that Chrisna Cutty Putterah upon receiving the said Rice asked what such a stir was made about a thing which the Prince was to pay for.
- CONNA declares the 3500 fanams he was directed to pay Robert Adams by the Prince for 5 Teak Timbers and Two hundred Bales of Rice he had been supplied with from hence.
- ROBERT ADAMAS being called upon saith that One Hundred fifty Bales of Rice the Prince wrote for to Mr. West the then Chief was provided by his Order, that Checaru Chandu Nair purchased the same to whom he advanced One thousand five Hundred Fanams by his Directions for paying the Cost thereof and that Fifty Bales was Issued from the Warehouse to make up the Quantity Two hundred Bales which he verily believes is part of the Two hundred twenty five Bales the Prince stands charged with in that Month. And that the remainder of this Money was towards paying for Five Teak Timbers and Charges transporting Rice by

RESOLUTIONS.

- ORDERED that the Accomptant adjust the same when applied to for that purpose.
- THE Board are of Opinion this is a separate Account and not paid for more especially as it appears by a Consultation under that date, that the Ammunition was to be got from him, And the Ols likewise wrote by the Chief the 29th August and 22nd. September pressing the discharge thereof so that it is Agreed to insist upon Payment.
- FROM all which Circumstances the Board are of Opinion the Prince has been deceived by his Rajahdore Chrisna Cutty Putterah and the Chief is desired to acq^t. him the Amount must be discharged as it appears a fraud of his own People by the Examination and if occasion be to send for the Witnesses before him, whose declaration we have taken.
- AGREED that the Paymaster receive from Robert Adams what Money is in his hands on this account and a statement of the whole Transaction made that the Balance may be carried to the Princes account in a regular manner.

being due and the Prince promising to pay the same to him has been the occasion of this Timbers not being brought in the General Account sales before now.

CHECARA CHANDU NAIB being called upon affirms that he bought the 150 Bales of Rice from One Abdullah at the following Prices viz. 70 of Mulky and 80 of Cumbia paying for the same Fan^s. 1499-6 and which he sent by Mr. Wests Orders to the Prince at Eddicaut.

6. ROBERT ADAMS declares that being at the Chiefs House when the Money was brought in and desiring him to excha. that sum in Fanams, he readily consented thereto.

7. Is given up by the Prince.

8. ALLOWED by the Prince to be an Error.

9. THE GRANT having been examined by the Princes Rajahdores in presence of the Chief and what they assert not being particularized therein nor any Customs paid on such Articles Since the Honble Company have been settled in these Parts.

RESOLUTIONS—*cont.*

THIS appearing no fraudulent Act and which is daily done amongst the Inhabitants who want to send Rupees to Mangalore when Fanams will not pass. The Board are of Opinion no Allowance ought to be made especially as it does not appear any Complaint was made thereof at that time, And that the Prince therefore be charged the full Amount as it now stands.

AGREED that the Chief peremptorily tell the Prince it cannot be submitted to.

A CONFERENCE was this day held from Morning till the close of the Evening between the Prince and the Chief when the former was acquainted with the Examination made concerning what was advanced in respect his depending Accounts and the several Resolutions taken in consequence thereof, which after debating upon some considerable time was at last acceded to by him, except what relates to the difference of Fanams Four thousand Ninety three five Vis and a half (Fan^s. 4093. 5½) when the last Adjustment was made and seeming positively determined not to allow of the same till his Brother was consulted with, it was judged necessary to admit of that exceptions being made at present that an Ola might be got for what remains, and the following being drawn up was accordingly executed & delivered by him in the Mallabars Language Translate of which is as follows.

UPON perusing my Accounts with the Honble English Company it appears I am indebted to them One hundred Fifteen thousand One hundred thirty four Fanams twelve Vis and a half (115134. 12½) including a difference of Four thousand Ninety three Fanams five Vis and a half (Fan^s. 4093. 5½) which is in their Books but not in the Bond given by my Brother the 28th. Sept^r. 1744 which difference for want of former accounts is not yet settled but so soon as I see my Brother and we have considered of this Affair will advise the Chief there of.

AND at the Princes request the Chief passed a Declaration under his hand in Portuguese as ^{is} the following Translate thereof.

I, THOMAS BYFIELD CHIEF for affairs of the Honble United English East India Company at Tellicherry Do Declare that this day have adjusted all Accounts that are between the Prince of Cherrika Cuni Ramaru Unitri and the said Honble East India Company and that the said Prince is indebted Rupees Twenty three thousand twenty six three Quarters Eighty three Reas (R^s. 23026. 3. 83) including a difference of Four thousand Ninety three Fanams Five Vis and a half (Fan^s. 4093. 5½) which appears between the said Companys Books and a Writing given by his Brother deceased the 28th. September 1744 which for want of the Princes Old Accounts cannot be adjusted at present. But He promises so soon as he sees his Brother and has examined into the same he will advise me thereof Agreeable to a Writing given me this 5th. day of September 1749.

AFTER which he was reminded that the Principal of his Debt annually lessened only the Amount of Customs on Goods exported by the Honble Company, which he declared was what he constantly thought of, and that all suitable measures should be taken for bringing it to a speedy conclusion, in part of which, he was now ready to make over, such Verge Lands as belonged to the Pagodas of Mapalingatta and Andalure upon the Island of Durmapatam if the same would be accepted of at Four thousand five hundred Fanams for every thousand Dungoys of Nelly produced after the Charges and present Annual Tax paid the Honble Company was deducted; by which means the Balance would then be considerably lessened, and might possibly enable him to clear the same in a short space of time agreeable to his inclination which the Chief promised should be considered of as an Answer given there to at their next Meeting.

THE PRINCE then expressed an earnest desire to have Boyanores depending Account settled that no further Discords nor Divisions might subsist but on the Contrary a firm and lasting Friendship cultivated between him and the Honble Company which the former was very anxious to accomplish, But their having been very little appearance of such an inclination in him during the late Troubles. The Chief replied, everything necessary concerning this Debt had been Debated upon and mentioned to His Highness, therefore till a final Period was put thereto

no further engagements of any kind with that Family could be thought of. However after frequent solicitations and positive Assurances no further Obstacle would arise on the part of Boyanore who was ready to conclude this affair immediately, The Chief drew up the following Article of Agreement and delivered it for the Princes Perusal which he declared was agreeable to his Sentiment and he did not in the least doubt but Boyanore would be of the same Opinion, to whom he Promised Ambu Conna Copula should be sent in two or three days with a proper Ola from him on the occasion. And night drawing nigh he took his leave promising to return again the 7th. Instant.

WHEREAS several Resolutions have happened in this Kingdom since the Royal Writings have been given to the Hoñble United English East India Company by the Kings and Regent Princes of Pally Quilote GRANTING therein to said Company several Priveledges, and the sole Trade in the Dominions of Colastria BOYANORE hereby promises that the said Writings and Grants shall from this Day forward not only be deemed Sacred, but preserved, defended, and maintained inviolably by Himself and Heirs in the Province of Cartenaddu without the least impediment, hindrance or Molestation of what kind soever. The said Chief engaging in behalf of his Employers, that the Dutys on whatever Trade is so carried on shall be punctually made good agreeable to the Custom already established in that part of the Country. And in case the said Company shall appoint or Direct any Merchant or Merchants in their Name to purchase any sort of Commodity produced in the Province of Cartenaddu or the parts adjacent thereto, Boyanore hereby engages not only Protection to them but all manner of Assistance that is in his Power to afford, for transporting such Goods on Merchandize to the Extent of his District.

THE CHIEF having at last adjusted the Princes Account and brought him to acknowledge the disputed Sum of Fanams Four thousand Ninety three Five Vis and a half (Fan^s. 4093. 5½) the difference expressed in a former Ola and what he stands indebted on the Hoñble Companys Books lays before the Board his acknowledgement for Fanams One hundred fifteen thousand One hundred thirty four twelve Vis and a half being the Net Balance of his Account this day including the prementioned Sum of Fanams Four thousand Ninety three five Vis and a half which Ola the Secretary is Directed to deposit in the Box kept for this Purpose, He likewise acquaints them that the Prince offers to make over to the Hoñble Company the Lands belonging at present to Andalure and Mapalingatt Pagodas at the rate of Four thousand five hundred Fanams for every thousand Dungoys of Nelly towards clearing of a part of his Debt which proposal being taken into Consideration. It is Observed that the Hoñble Company at present receive no Interest upon this large Debt which is about Two thousand Rupees Annually And that by our accepting this Offer they will not only have the Ground security for their Principal Money but also reap an Advantage of Four ¾ Cent even allowing the Produce to be no more than what the Pagodas now pay which is not near their Value; and being informed by proper Judges that Verge Lands are worth from Five to Six thousand Fanams for every thousand Dungoys, This Proposal its thought ought not to be rejected, for should we, as the Prince now seems desirous of clearing as

much of this Debt as possible of which we have had little or no hopes for these many Years, a denial might prove a further Obstacle thereto. The Board therefore Unanimously embrace the Offer especially as we can at any time sell this Transferr for the same Money we have purchased it at from the Prince and even have had the Amount already offered to be paid into the Treasury Agreeable to which the Committee of Council for inspecting the Revenues are directed to settle this Transfer in conjunction with such People as the Prince may appoint; It is likewise AGREED to press his Highness to prevail on the Heads of the Pagoda of Meylure to accept of these Terms likewise for what Grounds they have upon the Island, when the Honble Company will become absolute Proprietors and by it prevent the many Disputes which annually happen in Collecting the Rents of the Pagodas as also reap many other Advantages; And as the Chief seems to imagine the Prince will be willing also to relinquish his Title to Maddacarra on the same Terms. It is AGREED for the prementioned reasons that he endeavour to obtain the same when this as also the prementioned Transfer will be carried to the Credit of his Account. The Prince in his Discourse with the Chief seem to hint that the largeness of his Debt will in all probability prevent his clearing it so soon as he could wish. It is Judged from thence our giving up two or three thousand Rupees may greatly induce him to discharge the same immediately, And if so we should esteem ourselves deserving of Censure, should we not acquiesce to relinquish so trifling a Sum (it being no more than the Interest for One Year and possibly we may never have so fair an Opportunity of recovering a Debt which may hereafter become dubious) IT IS THEREFORE AGREED to give the Chief a latitude for coming to a composition if to be done within that Compass in Order to secure thereby Our Honble Masters Property which has been so long outstanding more especially as the Prince will be receiving the Customs yearly on the Trade carried on by them and private Merchants be truly sensible of the great Advantages accruing to Him from their being settled in his Country and which may possibly attach him more firmly to their Interest the same having hitherto been carried to the Credit of his Account.

A Sum to be relinquished if the Prince will Come to an immediate Clearance.

The Article of Agreement in Respect to Boyanore Approved of.

THE PRINCE in his Conference with the Chief expressing a desire that Boyanores Accounts with the Honble Company might be adjusted a Friendship between Him and them Cultivated and offering his Service on the occasion the Chief immediately drew up an Article of Agreement to be previously entered into with Boyanore and presented it to the Prince for his Perusal which he approving and giving hopes the same may be complied with. It is accordingly laid before the Board for their further Inspection, who Unanimously Agree that the same be entered into if possible And as giving a small Present to the Prince and his Rajahdores may also induce them to act more hearty in this Affair. It is therefore esteemed necessary to present him at taking leave with sundry Articles to the Amount of Two hundred or Two hundred & fifty Rupees.

Proper Presses to be made for the Stores.

THE Storekeeper representing to the Board that for want of proper Conveniences several Articles are spoilt, and as most of the Members are sensible that the Honble Company have saved a considerable sum of money at Bombay from the Alterations made in the stores at that Place. It is judged therefore absolutely necessary that a small Room be cased for this Purpose And the PayMaster is accordingly Directed to make a Calculate of the Expence and lay the same before the Board for their Perusal.

Store Books Passed.

THE Stores Books ending July 1748 as presented last Council day having been since examined are accordingly Passed.

MESS^{rs}. ROBINSON & WATERS having duly examined the Treasury agreeable to an Order of last Council report the same to agree with the Balance of the Cash Account for last Month.

THE PRINCE and Chief met this Morning when the Discourse that passed between them Yesterday was renewed and the former being willing the Verge Lands belonging to Mapalingatta and Andalure Pagodas should be transferred agreeable to what they have hitherto been valued at which by the Collectors report delivered into Council is at an under Rate. THE CHIEF therefore to expedite this Business accepted of these Terms especially as he found no Arguments could prevail with him to make over those belonging to Meylure at present, out of fear that an Idol by whose dictates it is governed would be displeased at such a proceeding; and at the same time inclinable to allow of the difference that appeared in his former Balance and agreeable thereto the following Olas were drawn up and executed accordingly Viz^t.

Prince promises to make over Maddacarra Island.

UPON coming to a Conclusion the Chief reminded him of what was before intimated concerning Maddacarra Island which he declared should be made over without further hesitation; but being apprehensive if it was done so soon after the Grant was given that some of the Country Powers would imagine the same was sold which is [sic] such Cases would lessen his Character amongst them, He excused himself from complying at present promising it should be done hereafter and a sum shortly paid into the Treasury on Account his Principal Debt.

Achamars wait on the Chief.

THE ACHAMARS attending at the Fort Gate were called for by the Prince and interrogated by him concerning many Irregularities he was informed had in his absence been committed by them, but none appearing of a very heinous Nature they were dismissed with a reprimand at the Chiefs instigation who then reminded them of the frequent Promises made to pay off the Money lent at Interest which not having been complied with hitherto and the Princes late Brother being in a manner bound for the performance thereof. He absolutely told them if methods was not immediately thought of to prevent any further delay therein, that the whole of their Patrimonial Estates should be confiscated for that purpose. When they observed that all suitable methods was thought of by them this Year to pay a part of the Principal when the Tax was settled and Agreed upon to be levied in February last without oppressing the Poor; but to this time five Pagodas under his Highnesses Protection having refused complying therewith nothing near the sum proposed had been collected, which appearing to be founded upon no shadow of Reason whatever, the Chief represented the same to him and at last brought Him to accede to the following Conditions.

Payment of their Debt to the Compy. settled.

That Fanams Fifteen thousand should be paid by them on account the Achamars Debt in all February next and for the security thereof all Goods and Chattels should be Mortgaged to the Hon^{ble} Company belonging to said Pagodas and the Heads thereof who are to pass an Ola accordingly when they are to be absolutely free of all Taxes and incumbrances whatever on this Account

which being Unanimously Agreed to by all the Partys concerned each Pagoda was allotted by the Prince to pay as follows Viz^t.

AND the Chief being desired to give a Declaration under his hand concerning the conclusion of this Transaction the same was drawn up in the Portuguese Language (as the following Translate thereof) and one of the same Tenour given to the Heads of each Pagoda Viz^t.

THE HEAD of the Pagoda of Teriangattu in the presence of Prince Ramaru Unitri of his own free will having Agreed to pay in all the Month of Feby 1749/50 Five hundred Fanams in part of the Achamars Principal Debt to the Hoñble English Company for the performance of which he has mortgaged all his Goods moveable and immoveable. I declare that if the Pagoda of Teriumgattu pays in the limited time the said sum of 500 in part of Fifteen thousand Fanams settled in the Obligation made by the Achamars, the said Pagoda shall in future be freed from any further Assessment on the Acco^t.

THIS transfer being settled the Achamars were again pressed to clear off what still remains due from them but the utmost that could be obtained was to give a Mortgage Bond for Fanams Thirty thousand payable in all May next, in which they Agreed everything appertaining to themselves and Heirs should be made over as security. And it being very apparent that part of the Country in which they reside has not flourished ever since it was plundered and ravaged by Ockoos Gang, the insisting on a further Sum would only serve to distress the Inhabitants and Impoverish the Country as they must each pay their full Proportion, therefore it was judged necessary to drop all further solicitations for the Present, and take an Ola from them for the due performance of what is before related which being drawn up executed and signed was delivered the Chief and its Translate is as follows viz^t.

We the four Heads of Poyanattucarra promise to see made good to the Chief of Tellicherry Fifteen thousand Fanams in the Month of February next to be gathered out of the Rents of the Pagods of Eddecaunt, Pallacherri, Teriungattu, Mappalingattu, Cunil and the Grounds belonging to the Braminees of those Districts which being complied with its AGREED that the Company gather no Rents from those Pagodas in future, and for the remaining Thirty thousand Fanams which we the Four Heads are obliged to pay the Hoñble Company in the Month of May next, We Mortgage to them besides the Effects of the Pagodas already mentioned the Effects of the Pagodas of the Maccarin & Urepechi with all our own Effects both moveable and immoveable. In Testimony whereof, We have wrote this the 7th. day of September 1749.

The Bond.

THESE Affairs being all finished the Prince took his leave of the Chief presenting him at parting with a Sword and Target mounted with Gold. And after dispatching Amboo Conna Copula to Boyanore agreeable to promise He then set out for Cherrika.

No regular Inventory having been taken of Stores remaining at the several Out Forts since the Year 1744 Mr. Alexander Douglas with the Gunner set out early this Morning to perform the same that some exactness may be observed in the Books of that Office and an exact Account of what is remaining delivered into Council upon close of the Books for the last Year.

DISPATCHED a Letter to Fort St. David & Pattamar to the Hoñble President and Council acknowledging Receipt of their Letter under the 11th. July, and that we are sorry we shall not be able to answer their Expectations the Product of Pepper in these Parts this Season appearing to be very small from the excessive Rains which has fell in Country, it being with much difficulty we could prevail on our Merch^{ts}. to Contract with us for One thousand five hundred Candies, and allowing them to comply therewith in all December (which there is much doubt of) we shall then have only in Warehouse of the Old and New Crop One thousand Eight hundred seventy Nine Candies sixteen Maunds nine Pounds which with ten thousand Pounds weight of Cardamoms (we expect Orders to provide) will be the whole Tonnage we can expect this Season. That our Hoñble Masters Commands to this Place were for Us to provide only Two thousand Candies unless procurable at or under Seventy Rupees the Candy but on receiving advice of their extraordinary Demands we have had recourse to Call^t. Pennany & other Ports but without effect hitherto. That having undercharged his Majesty's ships Three hundred twelve Rupees two Quarters twenty five Reas in a supply of Gunpowder we desire they would receive the same from the Hoñble Rear Admiral should he offer to pay it into their Cash.

Ultimo and that Sondag Soib being assisted by the French at Pondicherry with Five hundred Europeans and One thousand five hundred Natives, had attacked the Nabob of Arcott who with his Son was killed in the Action and that the former was in Possession of the Province.

THE Mangalore Merchant taken Notice of under the 18th. Ultimo returning No Pepper at Mangalore. from thence this day acquaints the Chief not a Candy of Pepper is procurable there or in the parts adjacent that he could hear of.

THE CHIEF received an Ola from the Prince Translate of which is as follows. WEDNES-
DAY
13TH.

I received your Letter by which I observe that you desire to be informed of [Letter] from the Prince. everything that passes between me and the seriums before we come to a conculsion, and that it would be better to have these Affairs settled before you, all which I readily consent to, and on wednesday the 12/13 of this Month some of their People are to come to Cherrika whose propositions I will advise you of, referring you now to Pattaly my Messenger for other particulars.

PATTALY One of His Highnesses Rajahdores and the Bearer of this Ola being The Seriums their Disputes with the Prince not adjusted. referred to for other particulars acquaints the Chief that he was sent to the seriums and did all in his Power to prevail upon them to make a proper submission but without effect their being several factions and therefore imagines till they are properly chastized the disputes subsisting will not subside but that the Prince is determined to commit no act of Hostility whatever till he consults the Chief and whose Council he is determined shall be the guide of his Actions.

THE CHIEF dispatched Pattaly with an Ola to the Prince acquainting him he Ola to the Prince in Respect to the Seriums. imagined his presence would be necessary at the meeting he was to have with the Seriums People and heartily wished they might bring the differences to an accomodation and doubts not of being informed with what passes between them.

BADENCALAMCUR acquaints the Chief in an Ola that the Princes of Oden Qui- THURS-

14TH. lote have had a meeting with Him and absolutely declare that if Affairs are not put upon the same footing again, and what their Predecessours enjoyed restored to them they would not submit; But as to Himself & Heir they were both willing to adhere to the Agreement entered into at Billiapatam and therefore relied on the Hoñble Company to help him out of his present Anxieties. Ola from Baden-calancure. Resolution of the Oden Quilote Family in respect to affairs.

THE CHIEF in Answer to the above acquainted His Majesty that he was sorry Ola to Baden-calamcur. to find the Princes of Oden Quilote would not adhere to the Articles of Agreement he had made in their favour at Billiapatam, but that no difference should arise therefrom between his Majesty and the Hoñble Company whose Friendship he might depend on.

AMBOO NAMBY sent by the Prince to Cartenaddu returned this day, and waiting upon the Chief acquaints him, that Boyanore seems at last determined to put his Debt into a Course of Payment and adhering to the Princes Council in respect to cultivating a Friendship with the Honble Company which will be settled when the Prince either goes to Cartenaddu or comes hear, as proper Rajahdore will then be Ordered to attend him for that purpose. He likewise observes that Narrangport Comport Nair (formerly turned out of our District) now in that Province was a great stickler against this affairs being brought to a Conclusion by endeavouring to insinuate that the Company Service was so unsettled, that their Friendship was not to be desired, everything seeming to be conducted agreeable to the Caprice of their Chiefs therefore it could not be of any long duration as might be observed lately by the variety of successions and the different Conduct each has observed.

By this Rajahdore the Chief sent a Complimentary Message to the Prince desiring him to come hither when at leisure that this material business may be concluded without delay.

THE CHIEF received an Ola from the Prince advising that from the differences subsisting between the Seriums themselves they have put off coming to meet him as he had formerly been advised; And that Pallarein had sent Mullapally to demand the Pagodas on to deliver up the Fort, and desires to know in what manner the Chief would have him act. **Ola from the Prince. Seriums refuse a meeting. Pallarein demands Payment of his security to the Bednure.**

IN reply to the above the Chief wrote him he was concerned to hear that the differences between the Seriums and him were not likely to be made up; and that he could not advise him at present how to act with Pallarein to whom he had wrote but received no Answer & that a European having deserted from hence yesterday desired if he came that way he would give Orders for seizing and returning him hither, And that hoping shortly to see his Highness matters should then be considered of with regard to Pallarein. **Ola to the Prince.**

NARRANNA CUTTY Putterah returned an Answer to what wrote him yesterday by advising the Chief that three of the Achamars were imprisoned by the Cannanore Moors which obliged them to put off the Ceremony they intended to make in the Pagodas of Chalamolottu after which they were to have come here, however they have appointed a meeting at the house Ponartucherry in Order to consider of their Accounts when they will come hither, that agreeable to Orders he had sent People to look for the Deserter but could get no Notice of Him. **SATURDAY 23RD.** Ola from Cutty Putterah in Respect to the Achamars.

THE Honble President and Councils Letter is dated the 12th. Instant and acknowledges Receipt of our several Advices to them under the 6th. & 24 April likewise those of the 6th. of June with the several Papers & Accounts enclosed which they deferr replying to fully untill the Dispatch of a ship down the Coast. Enclose us such Paragraphs of the Honble Companys Commands as relates to this Settlement by their Ship Boscawen who arrived them the 2nd. August, And that in the 6th. Paragraph they are acquainted their Servants at Bengall and Fort St. David have Directions to send their own ships Lapwing, Dolphin Newcastle and Dragon immediately to Tellicherry Anjengo or Bencoolen for Pepper with which they were to proceed home without loss of time although not fully loaded and in the subsequent Paragraph we are to observe they have Directed that those ships which have been longest out and are on the War Freight and Demorage should be first dispatched home (in Order to lighten the heavy Burthen of Demorage) with even One hundred or One hundred and Fifty Tons dead freighted in case their Tonnage cannot be compleated & which at all Events is not to be exceeded. That on the 7th. Instant they were advised from Fort St. David the Newcastle would be sent on the Mallabar Coast for a loading as soon as the Season would permit, & the Dragon was to go to the Bay with some Stores and Broadcloth from whence she would proceed hither; That the Prince William One of the ships on the War Freight and Demorage was dispatched to Bengall the beginning of August when it was left to the President and council there either to dispatch her Home from thence or send her speedily to the Mallabar Coast to take in a loading of Pepper as should be most suitable with their own circumstances, and it is reasonable to apprehend from the Troubles in

that Country and the large Tonnage they will have to provide for that they will send the Prince William to Us, And calculating that we shall have about Eighteen hundred Candies of Pepper for these ships they would have us reserve Four hundred Tons for the Prince William and dispatch home One of the other two if possible although One hundred and fifty Tons short of Charter Party and the third must be detained untill we can find means to give her a Dispatch, though in case we should not have more Pepper than is sufficient for the Prince William in the manner above mentioned neither of those ships must be dispatched till after her arrival or we receive Advices from Bengall that she will proceed to Great Britain, in which case we may send home the other two ships with about three hundred Tons each if we have Pepper sufficient, or if a larger Quantity, that Tonnage is not to be exceeded. Direct us to return this Boat to them with the utmost Expedition advising what Quantity of Pepper we judge we may have in Warehouse by the end of December and how much by the 20th. Febr'y. remembring to transmit a Calculate for Cash as should have been sent under the 6th. June. That the Honble Company having been pleased to direct that Mr. Richard Bouchier succeed the President in the Government on his going hence and Mr. Thomas Dorrill (at present chief of Surate) being appointed to the Chiefship of Tellicherry they will appoint a Conveyance for Him to proceed at the proper season. Enclosed us His Majestys Royal Proclamation of Peace which they direct us to publish in a proper manner & to forward a Packet now sent us to Anjengo with the greatest expedition. Advise us of the Regulations for the Military at the Presidency sent out by the Doddington also for forming a train of Artillery and have encreased the Officers and Soldiers pay in the following manner.

IN the Evening Mess^{rs}. Douglas and Robinson returned from Mahie were [sic] they were received in a very Courtious and handsome manner and brought a Message from Monsieur Louet to the Chief, that he would in the Morning send hither two of his Council to attend at the Publication of his Majestys Royal Proclamation expressing a very great satisfaction that a General Peace was at last concluded.

WROTE a Letter to the Chief and Factors of Anjengo advising them of the Boscauens Arrival at Bombay and of Mr. Bourchiers being appointed to succeed Mr. Wake congratulating him thereon & that Mr. Dorrill was appointed Chief of this Place. Enclosed them their Packet and informed them of the Orders we had received in regard to the dispatch of the shipping we might expect would be sent hither from Fort St. Davids and the Bay and advised them of our having received his Majestys Royal Proclamation of a Peace which was signed at Aix la Chapelle the 7th. of October O.S. referring them for other Particulars to the Advices from the Presidency.

WROTE a Letter likewise to the Hoñble President & Council of Fort St. David advising them the Orders we had reced in regard to the dispatch of the Prince William & other ships expected from their Coast which we should comply with if possible though we have little hopes of being able to provide for so large a Tonnage our Remains of Pepper in Warehouse being only One thousand One hundred twenty two Candies, Eleven Maunds eight Pounds and a half & have no view of being able to Contract for a further Quantity.

THE MILITARY and Train of Artillery being drawn up without the Limit Gates in proper Order The Chief accompanied by the French Gentlemen, the Hoñble Companys Covenanted Servants and Inhabitants of this Place proceeded thither, when his Majestys Royal Proclamation for a General Peace was read by the Secry after which Twenty One Guns was fired from the Fort, and the remainder of the day was spent in other proper demonstrations of Joy on the occasion.

RECED a Letter from the Chief and Factors of Anjengo dated the 14th. Instant advising receipt of our Letter under the 2nd. Ultimo the 15th. following and in reply thereto shall only say that they neither have nor will say anything to the Presidency about the deficiency in the Rice not thinking it an Affair of Consequence sufficient to trouble them about and that they hoped we should have obtained satisfaction from our Contractor, but as the same appears to us to have been embezzled on board the Sloop they shall say no more about it. But that when a Conveyance offers they will return us the unserviceable Arms that we may see whether they are such as their Officers represent them to be. It is with Concern they hear there is so little probability of recovering the Anjengo sloop and her Cargo which no doubt was lost through the villainy of the Moors at Penany. That they expected nothing but what they thought reasonable about her Invoice nor was the same done with a view of loading our Factory with the Loss which is Our Hoñble Masters wherever it is wrote off. They have reced the Account Cost of the Rice sent for the use of their Garrison & agree that the Charges incurred on sending them the same down with the Treasure likewise should be charged to their Factory. That their Cash running very low & their Cloth Merchants drawing very quick on them desire that we will supply them with Thirty thousand Rupees as soon as possible and to procure them six Candies of Wax for packing Bales sending them likewise One hundred and fifty Yards of Blue Perpets and Ninety Yards of Ordinary Red Broad Cloth to compleat the cloathing their Military. In their Invoices of the 1st. Febry last there was an Error. Two Chests of Arms containing Twenty five each charged Twenty five only whereas it should be Fifty the difference being Rupees Two hundred thirty two, two Quarters and fifty Reas they desire may be brought to the Credit of their Factory.

THE Pepper Merchants attending agreeable to the Resolution of last Council are called on for their Reasons why they have not complied with their several Contracts as yet, having only delivered in seven hundred fifty Candies Nineteen Maunds fourteen Pounds and a third out of the thousand Candies they received Money for, who alledge that the extravagant high Price Pepper has rose to, by the French their advancing Money for this Article (of which we have been already acquainted) and its continuing at this extraordinary rate being from twenty five, Thirty, and Thirty two Rupees in every Candy dearer now than when they Contracted, has occasioned their not having hitherto so punctually complied with their Engagements; They assuring Us that all the means in their Power have been used, even to pawning their Joys and selling such Goods as they had by them to procure the thousand Candies they have received Money for on which Account they have been obliged to launch out part of their own Capitals, the Quantity of Pepper already delivered having stood them in very nigh the sum advanced out of the Hoñble Companys Treasury. From this therefore they beg an Allowance will be made them for otherwise utter Ruin must infalliably ensue, declaring further that all the Methods they can think off to fulfill their several Engagements will be ineffectual no Pepper being procurable in the country even at any Price.

The Board taking the above into Consideration, Observe, by a Statement made of the Quantities each Merchant has delivered in, allowing it to cost upwards of One hundred Rupees the Candy, still the same does not Amount to near the sum advanced them out of the Hoñble Companys Treasury, this therefore effectually sets aside their Assertions of having been obliged to advance their own Capitals; and as its judged from hence that severe Measures may probably induce them to be more alert and bring them to a speedier conclusion in their Accounts, It is AGREED to make an Example of two who have been the most Negligent in Order to deter the rest. Batila Paqui and Baunibelti Cunhipy appearing therefore to be the most deficient the former not having delivered in near half and the latter falling short Fifty Candies and a Quarter for which they have been advanced, their Persons are ORDERED to be confined and Estates attached as security for Our Hoñble Masters Property being agreeable to the Mallabar Laws and Customs observed in like cases.

THE other Merchants being asked what Quantity of the New Pepper they may be able to deliver in all the Month of February, agreeable to the Orders received from our Superiours, Declare, they are at present unable to judge there being an appearance of a very small Crop, however, by the 25th. December they shall acquaint us what they can then Contract for as also of the Money necessary for purchasing of the same.

THE General advices last received from the Presidency as also the several Paragraphs of the Hoñble Companys Letter # Boscawen (as entered hereafter) relating to this settlement being reperused the Secretary is Directed to prepare the necessary reply, and such Papers and Accounts as are to be transmitted that no time may be lost in dispatching the Boat with all Expedition. The Accompt^t. is also particularly Ordered to draw out an Account Current of what Money has been advanced and paid the seamen belonging to ships Severn, Warwick and Ilchester during their stay here agreeable to the 46th. Paragraph of the Hoñble Companys Commands.

1TH. A Treaty of General Peace is happily concluded between Great Britain, France and Holland to which Germany Spain and the other Powers engaged in the late War have acceded.

5TH. IN Order to lighten the heavy Burthen of Demorage that lyes upon our Estate by the great Number of Ships now abroad, We recommend and direct that you exert yourselves in using all the means you can think of for the speedy sending home as many as possible and in Order thereto, dispatch those first which have been longest out, Send all our Ships home Fifty, One hundred, or even One hundred and fifty Tons dead freighted, in case you cannot give them their Charter Party Tonnage, But in all Events we positively Order that no Ship have more than her bare Charter Party Tonnage till further Directions.

6TH. WE have given Directions to Bengall and Fort St. David that our own Ships the Lapwing, Dolphin, Newcastle and Dragon be sent immediately to Tellicherry Anjengo, or Bencoolen, You must therefore give notice to the Factories under Your Care to put on board them what Pepper they have to spare, although not sufficient fully to load them, and dispatch them home without Loss of time.

AS we have a large Quantity of Salt Petre in our Warehouses and more expected, We positively Order that you load no more on each ship than the Charter Party Kintlage only and rather than you should send home more. 31. JAMES WILSON has our leave to go to any of our Settlements in India and succeed as a Surgeon to any Vacancy, wherever he is wanted & approved of.

37. MR. WEST must likewise forthwith return to Bombay and We Direct that Mr. Thomas Dorrill be appointed Chief of Tellicherry.

40. WE find there are several of our Servants on the Bombay Establishm^t. who are under no legal Obligations for the faithfull discharge of their Duty to the Company, We here acquaint you that we will have no Persons employed in our Service

who are not under Covenants, and have given, or are ready to give the usual Security in England for the faithful discharge of their Duty, We mean in such Stations where Security is always required, and that our Orders on this Head may be immediately complied with We have enclosed a List of the Names of the Person for whom Security is required as well as the Names of such who are to execute Covenants.

41. You must observe it as a standing Rule that as any of our Junior Servants come of Age they are to enter into fresh Covenants, which you must get executed accordingly and transmit to us

42. It must be likewise a Standing Rule that as our Servants respectively advance in Station they write to their Friends in England to give the usual security for such advanced Stations.

43. AT several times we did from the high Encomiums given us of the good Services, Abilities and Integrity of Domingos Rodriguez, Our Linguist of Tellicherry, recommend him to Bombay, and gave him some Tokens of our Favour, But now by a Representation from him we are informed he is so far from having the benefit of it, that he is even apprehensive of being consigned over to the Violence and Injustice of the Country Government, which would in consequence revert the highest hardship to Him and Dishonour to Us, We therefore Order and Direct that although he may be out of our Service he (be permitted with all his Family and Effects to remain at Tellicherry in perfect Security under our Protection, and continue so in all time to come, and should he be removed thence Notice must be given him that he may return thither in intire safety and freedom; Yet if his Conduct may have been lately such as to give real cause to alter the good Opinion we have been induced to entertain of Him, let the same be clearly and fairly noticed to us and we will from hence give our Directions concerning him in the manner we find to be just and necessary.

46. THE CHIEF received an Ola from Cacart Nombier informing him of Chandoratte Nombiars having destroyed some of his Trees, and on his taking satisfaction in like manner the latters People set on some of his & wounded four of them, three of whom are since dead, upon which Hostilities commenced, but the French having sent to him to desist lest Enemies more powerfull might put in Execution their design, which advice coming to him from different hands likewise he left of firing Yesterday Since when Chandorattees People have destroyed more of his Trees and finding himself pursued on all Quarters desires the Chief will take the same into Consideration and prevent his Enemies designs. That he is informed some of His Highnesses People are with Chandarotte Nombier and Boyanores likewise, therefore as the Chief must be sensible what terms the Prince is on with him he relies on his Friendship to extricate him out of this Trouble.

IN reply to the above the Chief acquainted him he was sorry to hear of these differences, And when the Prince of Cherrika was here he had enquired of him the reasons of the same who had informed him it arose from his having ruined the

Plants of Queloti Chandu Nombiar who paid tribute to Him for his Protection, But as the Prince was obliged to go immediately to Cherrika upon important Business he had not time to enquire further but will do it when he returns and do his utmost Endeavours to make up matters between them in such a manner as may tend to the good and tranquility of the Country.

AMBOO NAMBY returns from Cartenaddu and informs the Chief that Boyanore seems very inclinable to come hither but is desirous of seeing the Prince first or for his Rajahdores to have a meeting with him here and intending to set out this Evening for Cherrika the following Ola was wrote by him in answer to those reced from his Highness the 25th. Ultimo, and what was necessary to be said concerning the present Negotiations with Boyanore of which the following is a Translate Viz^t.

Boyanore desirous to see the Prince.

By Amboo Writer I received two of Your Highnesses Letters but as I expected him back from Cartenaddu soon I deferred answering them till now. He has given me a full Account of his Transactions there and I am glad to find Boyanore adheres to your Advice as I am willing to please Your Highness in this particular, and as you informed me you would come hither directly I wait to communicate in Person, my Sentiments to You on this Subject.

Ola to the the Prince.

I am concerned at the Robbery which the Moors have committed on the Pagoda and have a Watch out to detect them.

I had a Letter Yesterday from Cacart Nombier advising me that owing to the Injuries done him by Chandoratee Nombiar obliged him to begin Hostilities, His Letter with my Answer I have showed to Ambu Writer and suppose you'll be contented therewith.

A General Letter being prepared for the Presidency in reply to their last Command and giving an Account of all General Transactions that have happened at this settlement since the 26th. July It is now signed and Ordered to be dispatched immediately by the Express Boat with sundry other necessary Papers as ^{is} List of the Packet following Viz^t.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Chief and Factors of Anjengo dated the 2nd. Instant acknowledging receipt of our Advices under the 25th. And that it was with great Concern they were Obliged to tell us they could contribute little to ease the heavy Tonnage; the King of Travancore having prevented their purchasing Pepper unless they will give Eighty three Rupees One Quarter fifty Reas the Dutch Candy which is a price they cannot presume to think of though the Dutch buy it at that rate. That they are Ordered to send to our Factory what Cloth they have ready when the ships arrive which will be punctually complied with they have very little Cloth in Warehouse at present but hope to have a large Quantity shortly having contracted with their Merchants for Thirty thousand Pieces to be delivered by the last of December and though they are not to be entirely depended upon they think there is no Room to doubt of having Two hundred and fifty Bales ready in all Jañry but shall not be able to pack it untill we can send them Wax none being procurable in the Country. Enclosed us a Packet for the Presidency which they desire may be forwarded by the first Opportunity.

AMBO CONNA CAPULA was sent by the Prince to acquaint the Chief that Boyanores Privy Counsellour was arrived, with whom we had discoursed very fully concerning all affairs now in Agitation and had brought him to Agree. That at least, one third of the Principal Debt due should be paid immediately, the remainder in two equal payments for which, four of the Principal Merch^{ts}. in his Country is to become security, either to discharge it in Money or Pepper) and that his Master should have a meeting with the Chief in a short time to settle everything else necessary towards cultivating a Friendship with the Hoñble Company to pave away for which he would return in two or three days with other Rajahdore and consider thereof with the Prince who till then, excuses himself coming to the Fort being still very much Indisposed.

A SHYBAR arrives from Bombay with private Letters from Governour Wake to the Chief enclosing a Packet for the President of Fort St. David which he mentioning to be of importance the same was immediately dispatched by a Pair of Pattamars. By this Conveyance a Letter was likewise received from the Governour to the Prince Copy of which he enclosed the Chief in Portugueze the Translate of which is as follows viz^t.

TO THE PRINCE.

One of Your Highnesses Pattamars being sick requested leave to return on this Gallivat which I have Granted; But Your Highnesses Letter being amongst my Papers at Parell I cannot answer it untill another occasion offers when the same shall be done to your entire Satisfaction; In the mean time I doubt not your continuing a just Harmony with the Honble Company.

THIS EVENING Boyanores Rajahdores came hither and waited upon our Prince at the Brass Pagoda.

THE PRINCE having had a meeting with Boyanores Rajahdores came to the Fort and in discourse with the Chief observed to him, that after maturely considering on what had lately passed between them He really thought requesting from Boyanore a Confirmation of the Grants given to us by himself and Ancestors as mentioned in the Article formerly proposed would be derogating too much from his Dignity, besides he was very certain, objections would be made thereto and endless disputes arise for though in reality Boyanore is Subject to Him still he imagines himself an absolute Monarach and under no Controul whatever. To which the Chief replied, that no Confirmation was required from Boyanore, nor even so much as aimed at in the Article which is drawn up with no other View than to make him confess and acknowledge, the Hoñble Company have such Grants and Priviledges in the Kingdom of Colastria and that he will not only preserve the same inviolably but permit and allow them to carry on an uninterrupted and free Trade in the Province of Cartenaddu, therefore was truly sorry to hear that Family had got to such a pitch of Pride as to make the least objection whatever, and which, if not curbed in time would certainly prove the overthrow of this Governments Antient Constitution. However no Expostulations were sufficient to convince him thereof, and continuing the Argument seeming to give Disgust, it was judged necessary to give up the Point and amend the former Article proposed (on which the necessary improvements may be made hereafter) rather than without some acknowledgment for the security of our Masters Trade, therefore the following was drawn up accordingly Viz^t.

AN ARTICLE proposed by Thomas Byfeld Esq^r. Chief of Tellicherry for cultivating a firm and lasting Friendship between the Hoñble United English East India Comp^y. and Boyanore of Burgorah.

WHEREAS several Revolutions have happened in these parts since the Hoñble United English East India Company, have obtained the Royal Writings of the Kings and Regent Princes of the Pallyquilote Palace giving therein to said Company sundry Priviledges I Boyanore do now declare that in case the Hoñble United English East India Company shall send or Direct in their Name any Merchant or Merch^{ts}. to purchase Goods of what kind soever produced in the Province of Cartenaddu or the parts adjacent thereto, not only to give protection to them before all others whatever, but all manner of assistance and favour to transport such Goods or Merchandize to the extent of my District. The said Chief promising in behalf of his Employers that the Dutys on whatever Trade is so carried on in the Province aforesaid shall be punctually made good agreeable to the Custom already established in that part of the Country, And whereas the said Company have many times afforded me and my Ancestors assistance when our occasions required it I do likewise declare that from this day forward not

only to keep up a good Correspondence but to preserve inviolably a firm Friendship with the said Company, and to assist them in all things whatever to the utmost of my Power.

The affairs of Irreavaddunnadu opened by the Prince.

Who is determined to Pursue it

After which it was Translated into Mallabars by our Linguist and at the Princes request delivered to him, who then proposed setting out for Cartenaddu, telling the Chief, that so many repeated indignitys had been committed by the Nombiers and such acts of Violence and Oppression shown to those who were under his Protection and reside in that part of the Country, that when the business in hand was concluded He must take proper measures for obtaining satisfaction, more especially as they had publicly declared if any attempts were made to place his Son in the Palace allotted for him in Erreavanaddu by Himself and Brothers the same should be prevented whilst the Power of opposition remained in their Hands, and as the King of Cotiote would certainly in such case espouse their cause He intended applying to Boyanore for Assistance and hoped the Honble Companys would be afforded him likewise on the present occasion. There being too great an Appearance from this sudden declaration that he has some intentions of putting his former projects in execution. The Chief therefore told him it was an Affair that ought well to be considered of as many Evils might ensue from such a Resolution more especially, that of Boyanores becoming absolute Lord of Erreavanaddu which he might possibly claim by right of Conquest if his Forces once entered the Field and reduced the Nombiers in Conjunction with those of his Highness's; therefore it was much better, to execute the present design without his Assistance declaring withall that if Boyanore had an Intent to usurp any Prerogative in this Province the same would be vigorously opposed by us to prevent the least subversion in the present Constitution thereof, as formerly had been hinted to him, for though it was absolutely necessary the Nombiers should be reduced to an humble and submissive State still upon no Account permission could be given to effect the same in any manner that had the least tendency to Establish Boyanore in Erreavanaddu especially as we enjoyed our Priviledges of late without the least Molestation from the Nombiers and had no security whatever from him as yet for preserving or maintaining the same in any part of the Country, Proposing at last to settle the depending Controversys upon the following Conditions that are (by good information obtained) consistent with the Maxims of this Government Viz^t.

Agreed that his Highness permit the Nombiers but only Conditionally.

- 1ST. That the Nombiers should be advised by the Chief, his Highness was determined to chastize them, if the following points was not Agreed to immediately, by way of satisfaction for the unwarrantable acts committed by them Viz^t.

which if not complied with, the Prince is to be assisted in a proper manner by the Honble Company for compelling them so to do he paying the whole expence that may be incurred.

- 2^{NDLY}. THAT in case it should be thought necessary to take Boyanore for an Allie a written Agreement must be first entered into by all Partys that no Conquests obtained in the Province of Erreavanaddu by Virtue of such Alliance shall be claimed by either Party.
- 3^{RDLY}. THE Prince to break down the Palace erected in the Nombiers District upon Condition that they pay him an Annual Tribute for the same.
- 4^{THLY}. THAT an Ola be passed by the Nombiers for the Principal sum of Fanams sixty thousand to run at Interest which is annually to be made good and no more.

To these Proposals many frivolous Objections were made by which it plainly appeared he was determined at all Risques and Events to settle his Son in the Palace before mentioned in which he might possibly be vigorously supported by Boyanore, Therefore the Chief desired him to consider well the Consequence thereof and advise with his Brother Gogo, on so material an Affair before any further determinations were come to thereon which being Agreed to the Barge at his request was immediately dispatched with a Serjeants Command and to whom the Chief wrote a Letter desiring he would come hither to consider of a particular Affair His Brother now wrote him about in which his Advice was wanted.

The Prince objects to the Articles.

Prince Gogo to be consulted.

THIS days Conference being ended the Regent returned to the Brass Pagoda.

PRINCE GOGO arrived this day and immediately came to the Fort when the Chief acquainted him of his Brothers intentions, observing that it did in general appear quite inconsistent to the Honible Companys Interest and that of his Palace To which he replied that his Brother long since had received the best of Council from him concerning this Particular, and was as often advised not to exalt Boyanores Family in the manner he did nor exhaust so much Treasure annually in that part of the Country but little regard was paid thereto, which by being infirm and far advanced in Years he was quietly obliged to bear with rather than displease One on whom all good or bad acts must devolve after his Death, by becoming in such case sole Heir to the Palliquilote Palace. This way of arguing the Chief told him must infallibly prove the ruin of his palace, therefore most earnestly requested he would back all Arguments that might be made use of by him to bring his Brother into such a way of thinking as would prove conducive to the Tranquility and Welfare of the Country in General; which he said should be duly observed, but intimated at the same time, that no disgust could be given him, least by being displeased, he should take a Resolution of leaving the Country.

Prince Gogo arrives & acquainted with the Regents intentions.

Who dislikes the Expedition but Can't oppose the Regent.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. Richard Secker dated the 10th. Instant sending up some Dungaree and six Maunds of Wax which is all he has been able to procure but has sent to Penany where he hopes to get two or three Candies; Transmitted the Callicut Books for 1749 and will send the Matts wrote for as conveyances offer.

Letter from Callicut.

EARLY this Morning the Chief received a Message from the Prince, acquainting him that he had consulted with his Brother, on what had passed between them to which no other objection would be made, but what related to accommodating the Differences with the Nombiers on such terms as were proposed; which would not be complied with till a Warr was actually commenced that they might know he had force and Power sufficient to reduce them.

SATURDAY
14TH.

The Prince will not come to an accommodation with the Nombiers.

THIS appearing to be his real intentions and the Chief finding by the Messengers discourse that Boyanores Rajahdores have promised succours in behalf of their Masters. He dispatched them with a Complimentary Message to both Princes desiring a meeting with them to consult further with them on this business, as opposing this Scheme any longer may possibly bring on innumerable inconveniencys; to prevent which and such other Mischiefs as may be dreaded therefrom; He drew up the following Articles of Alliance, to be mutually entered into (which if not complied with will soon discover the real intent of all Parties) and Ordered a Council to be summoned immediately for the Consideration thereof before the Princes Arrival Viz^t.

To necessity of a Compliance on our parts.

WHEREAS the four Nombiers in Erreavanaddu have committed many unwarrantable Acts contrary to the established Laws and Rules of this Kingdom. The Prince of Cherrika has applied to Thomas Byfeld Esq^r. Chief of Tellicherry, and Boyanore of Burgorah for their Assistance to suppress the same and bring the said Nombiers to a proper State of Obedience to him as their Sovereign; which is Agreed to under the Limitations and Restrictions as are mentioned in the subsequent Articles of Alliance Viz^t.

Articles of agreements to be entered into by the Prince and Boyanore, in respect to the Boyanore.

1ST. If the Nombiers after one days Battle will return to their Obedience a Cessation of Arms shall be immediately declared, and a General Peace ensue

if they will conform to the following Articles proposed agreeable to the Laws of their Country Viz.

Give $\left\{ \begin{array}{l} 4 \text{ Oarts} \\ \quad \& \\ 4 \text{ Houses} \end{array} \right\}$ to be destroyed as the Prince of Cherrica thinks fit.

Fanams 6000 to be given the Prince of Cherrika for their disobedience to Him.

The Palace which the Prince of Cherrika has given to his Son in Erreavanadu, with the Consent of his Brother he is to remain with One hundred Men, but to raise no other fortification neither is he to interfere in any Affairs that is contrary to the Priviledges and Customs formerly established in that part of the Country.

- 2ND. EXCLUSIVE of this Palace which the Prince has given his Son agreeable to what mentioned above no other Fort nor Fortification is to be built in Erreavanadu.
- 3RD. ALL Charges of this War is punctually to be made good by the Prince of Cherrica.
- 4TH. THE Chief of Tellicherry promises in behalf of the Hoñble United English East India Company to assist the said Prince of Cherrika as their own Circumstances will admit of till the Nombiers pay a due Obedience to him as their Sovereign, agreeable to what mentioned in the 1st. Article, or such others, as they may propose which are reasonable and just.
- 5TH. If in this War Conquests are made the Chief of Tellicherry promises to resign all pretensions thereto.
- 6TH. BOYANORE engages to assemble of the Forces as are necessary for the Princes Assistance in this Warr and proceed in Conjunction with his Allie the Hoñble United English East India Company against the Nombiers untill they show a proper Obedience to their Prince as mentioned in the first Article, or such other as the Chief of Tellicherry may (as Mediator) judge proper.
- 7TH. BOYANORE promises and declares that if there should be any Conquests obtained in this War he will relinquish all manner of Pretensions thereto and that he neither will fortify nor take any Place that belonged to the Nombiers before the Commencement of this War.
- 8TH. ALL Priviledges which the Hoñble Company now have in the Province of Erreavanaddu is to be preserved, defended and maintained inviolably by all the Allies against any Power or Powers whatever.
- 9TH. THE CHIEF of Tellicherry is to be mediator in case any differences should arise of what kind soever which he is to determine without showing favour or affection, either to One or the other Party concerned.
- 10TH. WHEN the Warr is at an End in the Province of Erreavanaddu every One is to be put in quiet Possession of the Priviledges they enjoyed before the Commencement thereof without the least Molestation whatever.
11. If any other Power or Powers interferes or assists the Nombiers, Boyanore obliges himself to declare War and proceed against them with his whole Force.

Debating upon which It is Observed that both the Prince and Boyanore seem absolutely determined to chastize the Nombiers for their Insolence and fix our Regents son in the Province of Erreavanaddu, and should we therefore be averse to assist therein, we were given to understand that the French would in all probability interfere which will be of very bad Consequence, The Board therefore Unanimously approve and Agree to that now delivered by the Chief for cultivating a Friendship with Boyanore, who by the Princes Discourse seems to be in a state of Indepency [*sic*] and which may possibly be the occasion of his not caring to acknowledge the Grants as given by the House of Colastria and mentioned in a former Article proposed to Him. From the present situation of Boyanores Affairs it is reasonable to imagine, he can have no occasion for entering into an Alliance with us for carrying on such a Scheme, and even should the Prince under the Cloak of bringing in his Son, fix him in the Province we are certain he has Force full sufficient to oppose any that may be brought against him, should we therefore refuse him, The French will in all probability gladly offer their Service as by Report they have been a long time endeavouring to obtain Limits which Boyanore no doubt will now readily Grant in Order to induce them to enter more heartily in his Interest, and should he by their Assistance make a Conquest of this Province it is natural to imagine he may then further indulge them with such Grants as cannot but be very Detrimental to Our Hoñble Masters to prevent which it is judged most prudent and accordingly Agreed to enter into the prementioned Articles of Alliance and thereby preserve to the Hoñble Company those Rights and Priviledges they at present hold in this Province rather than join the Nombiers by which the Hoñble Company may be brought into an expensive and lasting War, and perhaps at last be obliged to act as Principals, as neither they or the King of Cotiote (on whom they rely for Assistance) can be depended on, whereas by our siding with the Boyanore it may be a means of attaching him more firmly to the Companys Interest when once his Heir (our Princes Son) is fixed in the Palace given him by his Father, and the Rights and Priveledges they at present enjoy in this Province preserved to them at little or no Expence. This being the State of the Case we hope our Conduct will be approved of by Our Hoñble Masters.

ABOUT Noon the two Princes came to the Fort, with whom the Chief expostulated some considerable time on what has been so frequently and fully sett forth in our Diary when at last they consented to the foregoing Articles proposed which the Regent desired might be translated into the Mallabar Language in order to consult Boyanore, thereon, and the same being complied with, the latters Rajadores were at his request sent for, and acquainted that the Prince would fully inform their Master of everything that had passed tending to Cultivate and Establish a Friendship with the Hoñble Company which it was hoped they would not only endeavour to accomplish but afford all the dispatch possible that was in their Power; and after the usual Presents were made they all set out directly for Cartenaddu except Prince Gogo, who went in the Barge to Cannanore and from thence proceeds overland to Cherrika.

JUST as the Prince was proceeding to Cartenaddu he requested a supply of Two hundred Musquet Cartridges for his Guard which the Commandant was Ordered to deliver to the Nairs sent for them.

THE CHIEF received an Ola from the four Nombiers advising that from a difference subsisting between them, the Prince of Cherrika & Boyanore, the two latter had acted against them but having been favoured with the Hoñble Companys Countenance they did not go those lengths they otherwise would have done; but now they are informed they intend putting their scheme in Execution therefore desire to have a meeting with the Chief to consider of this Affair desiring he will appoint a-day that will be convenient for them to come.

IN reply to the above the Chief acquainted them the Prince was gone to Cartenaddu to endeavour to settle Boyanores Debt to the Hoñble both of whom he expected to see shortly when he would enquire into their Disputes & advise them accordingly.

CACART NOMBIER wrote the Chief an Ola likewise to the same purport adding his Party could not oppose the Prince and Boyanore without the Hoñble Companys Countenance even for two days and desired a meeting with the Chief on the Morrow in Answer to which the Chief referred him to the Letter wrote his Adherents.

THE TAX being collected in Randoterra conformable to the Agreement made with the Achamars in February last, They came to the Fort in Order to settle Accounts with the Hoñble Company, upon inspecting which, it appears Rupees Two thousand Five hundred six, two Quarters fifty six Reas (Rs. 2506. 2. 56) has been received into the Treasury on this Account and is Rupees Five hundred and six, two Quarters fifty six Reas (Rs. 506. 2. 56) more than the Interest arising on their Principal Debt this Year and what due on a former Balance but not quite so much as was expected, Owing they say to what levied on the Heads of Five Pagodas who having entered into security Bonds for paying Fanams Fifteen thousand in part of the whole Debt in Febry next (as is fully set forth in the Diary under the 7th Ultimo) are exempted this Season, so that nothing more is now to be collected on Account of the last Assessment. The Balance due from this day is Rupees Fifteen thousand two hundred twenty, two Quarters Ninety four Reas (15220. 2. 94) in part of which by their Ola dated the 8th of September 1749 Fanams Thirty thousand (Fan^s. 30,000) is to be paid in all May next (exclusive of what is transferred to the Pagodas) however that the Debt might be reduced as much as possible and a further sum recovered, they were pressed to have the Adjustment made quite up the day, and agreeing thereto Interest was charged accordingly amounting to Rupees One thousand One hundred thirty eight, two Quarters fifty two Reas (Rs. 1138. 2. 52) which brought them indebted Rupees Sixteen thousand three hundred twenty Nine, One quarter forty six Reas (Rs. 16329. 1. 46) and paying the odd Money due passed a New Ola for the exact Sum of Rupees sixteen thousand to run at Interest when the following Old Ones were delivered up Viz^t.

After adjusting our Accounts with the Hon^{ble} English Company before Thomas Byfeld Esq^r. Chief of Tellicherry we find ourselves indebted Eighty thousand and Fanams, of which the Pagodas of Eddecaut, Perallachery Mapalingatta Tinumgatty (and the Pagoda of Cunitalla in the district of Eddecaut) are to discharge out of the sum 15000 Fanams and the remainder of the Debt being then 65000 Fanams we promise to make good 30000 thereof in the Month of May next for security of which and the Interest thereon at the rate of ten $\frac{1}{2}$ Cent we Mortgage the Oarts Verges &c^a. in the District of Randoterra excepting what may belong to the aforementioned Pagodas Dated the 16 October 1749.

THEY were then called upon to settle the Assessment for the ensuing Year but not having brought the necessary People with them for that purpose desired a further time to consider thereof, which appearing to be a reasonable request was complied with and having nothing further to negotiate at present, they took leave and set out directly for Randoterra.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Chief and Factors of Anjengo dated the 9th. Instant acknowledging receipt of the Treasure, Broadcloth and Perpets which will be brought to the Credit of our Factory. That having received Orders to load what Pepper and Cloth they have ready on the Hon^{ble} Companys Ships as they pass from the other Coast to us the same will be punctually complied with. Under Care of the Detachment they now return one of our Deserters named Haviel Mendis. Enclosed us an Account Sundries supplied the Detachment amounting to Rupees Nineteen three Quarters Eighty five Reas which they desire their Factory may have Credit for.

THIS EVENING a Letter was received from the Directors and Council of Mahie Translate of which is as follows Viz^t.

GENTLEMEN OF THE COUNCIL
AT TELLICHERRY.

SIRS

We Now acquaint you that Boyanore for a long time past has been forming to himself the project of reducing the Province of Irreavanaddu to his Obedience; till now we have strongly opposed it, but assisted with the Prince of Cherrika he is determined to pursue and put his design in Execution.

It appearing to us that such an Invasion from the Boyanore or any other Prince of the Country cannot but occasion the destruction of Trade which is the sole and only object of our two Companys and that from thence can only result a disunion between our two Settlements a thing prejudicial to our Respective Masters We have always denied Boyanore the Assistance that was in our Power. We hope you will lend all your attention to turn the Prince of Cherrika from aiding Boyanore in the Execution of his Project, and that you will refuse these Lords all such succours which depend on you.

You ought to be sensible that one of Us consenting to such a Scheme, is giving the Mallabars the Means of putting the whole Country in flame and ruining both our Establishments however all we desire of you is to act up to the spirit of all the Agreements made between the two Settlements of Tellicherry and Mahie and our Conduct on this occasion ought to convince you that we prefer the common Interest of the Two Companys to that particular One of Ours.

As to his Debt he is willing to pay now Twenty five thousand Fanams without fail in regard to your Trade to be had in Cartenaddu, the Mother of Boyanore objects to one Point which is, to their passing it to the extent of their Limits, giving for reason that in such case that the French will go against them with their whole Force but that if the English Company will oblige themselves to assist and Succour them should such troubles arise she is then willing to agree to the same. In Order to settle and come to some Determination we shall all meet and consider the several Points to morrow and the Mother of Boyanore promises to lend her Assistance to accommodate those that in Dispute. I wait for your Directions on this Occasion.

Instant ^{Letter to Mahie.} O.S. advising us of Boyanores intentions to reduce the Province of Irreavanaddu to his Obedience by which we observe, our Sentiments and Yours exactly corroborate, having long since been informed of this Affairs being in Agitation and as strenuously opposed every thing that had the least tendency thereto, which be assured Gentlemen we shall continue to do in future well knowing the ill effects such an Usurpation must have upon the Trade in these parts.

AGREEABLE to what mentioned in Consultation this day The Chief answered the Princes Ola as follows.

I received your Royal Writing and observe the trouble Your Highness has taken to effect the Business in hand, but it appears to me that the Mother of Boyanore is not well inclined as otherwise she would not have made Objections to such a trifling Article and should she still continue in the same sentiments let the Negotiation drop, for to oblige ourselves to afford succours against the French is a thing impracticable, but be assured that the Company think themselves as much obliged to Your Highness as if the Affair had been finished. ^{Ola to the Prince.}

Should Boyanore chuse to come here and have a meeting with me, I am ready to receive him as a Friend, if he will then pay the Twenty five thousand Fanams and adjust his Account; however I must acquaint Your Highness that I cannot permit of his bringing more than Five or six hundred Men for his Body Guard, which are the most that ever attend you on any occasion. Yesterday I received a Letter from the Chief and Council of Mahie acquainting me that Boyanore has for a long time had thoughts of reducing the Province of Irreavanaddu to his Obedience which scheme they had hitherto opposed, but that they now heard Your Highness in Conjunction with Boyanore is determined to put this Scheme in Execution, what Grounds they may have for this I cant say but as your Highness has declared to me in the most sacred manner, your having no such Intentions, I took upon me to declare the same to them, and hope Your Highness wont in the least deviate from your Word, as a contrary Behaviour will be greatly displeasing to the Hoñble Company and perhaps be the means of breaking that Friendship which I have taken so much Trouble to renew, Cement, and preserve.

GENTLEMEN OF THE COUNCIL
AT TELlichERRY.

SIRS

We have received the Honour of your Letter yesterday dated the 20th. October O.S.

We observe with pleasure that you approve the opposition we have made against Boyanores making a Conquest of the Province of Irreavanaddu, which he is now undertaking; but we are very sorry that you have said nothing in respect to the denial we were in hopes you would have made to the Prince of Cherrika (now linked with the said Boyanore) the succours which depend on You however in spite of the Resolution we have taken in respect of Boyanore if this last by the means of the Prince of Cherrika should have the least encouragement from you, its in vain that we oppose ourselves to this his Project.

Letter from
Mahie.

To make you sensible of what consequence it is to the Welfare of our two Companies, that we each should be Unanimous in denying in any shape assistance to Our two Princes in the project they have undertaken, its necessary to inform you, of what we have been advised by them, as also that they are glorying and animating each other in the pursuit of this their Undertaking.

It has been reported to us from different hands that Boyanore together with the Prince of Cherrika has had a meeting with you, under pretence to settle some Accounts between Him and your Company and to require the Assistance which depends on you in order to punish jointly with the Prince the Insult which they pretend the Nombiers have offered to the latter.

THEY have assured us at different times that you have Agreed to lend all the succours which may depend on you for effecting this scheme. We are willing however to believe all this to be false knowing your Sentiments in respect to the frivolous pretensions of these Mallabars; but in Order to procure to Us Peace and Tranquility on which yours likewise depends, We require of you with reason, that you will declare to Us without any Equivocation whether what has been reported to Us is true or false.

WE require that you would perswade the Prince of Cherrika to desist from this Enterprize and that you would absolutely refuse him all succours whatever by which he may facilitate the pursuit of this scheme to Boyanore. We promise and declare to you that we likewise will endeavour on our part with Boyanore to engage him abandon such an absurd undertaking and that we will not lend him any Assistance whatever, to assist him in carrying on his intended Conquest.

You ought to be sensible that if either of us differ in our Conduct by refusing all succours; its the means to encourage the Mallabars and render them insolent.

NOTWITHSTANDING what we have had the Honour to represent to You, we cannot say whither what they have told us is true in respect to You, nor make mention of other reports, which if true we make known to You, that by them you seek only the destruction of a Province which is beneficial to Our two Companys.

Instant, acquainting him that he put out from thence with the Restoration Grab on the 6th. of Sept^r. but meeting with a hard Gale of Wind off Gheriah at N.W., and a great Sea he lost all his Topsails Piece by Piece therefore was obliged to return the 20th. into Port, where being supplied with Duck, he got others made, and was getting under way at the time his Letter is dated.

Mr. Bourchier having requested the Chief to provide six Reams of Goa Paper the same had been purchased and was now sent them Amounting to Rupees twenty five and a half which we desired this Factory might have Credit for.

THE PRINCE returning this day from Cartenaddu came to the Fort and related to the Chief what had passed between him and Boyanore concerning the Articles proposed under the 12th. & 14th. Ultimo, by which it appeared the following must be Agreed to by us before a decisive Answer would be given thereto viz^t.—

The Prince returns from Cartenaddu.

1st. THE Article concerning the Pepper Trade, positively to Express, that it is exclusive of all other European Nations except the French, nor must anything be mentioned therein of Boyanore protecting our Merchandize to the extent of his District.

Articles proposed by Boyanore to be entered into.

THE Interest now due on Boyanores Debt absolutely to be given up, Fanams Twenty five thousand taken directly in part of the Principal, and the remainder accepted of, in two equal Annual Payments, the first to be made in all the Month of February 1751 and the last in February 1752, which limited time if exceeded, Interest is then to be charged.

THEREFORE the Chief told him everything in our Power had been done already to settle these Affairs upon a proper footing, and as a deviation was expected to be made in the Articles, the same must be referred to our Superiors, who should soon be informed of everything very fully and till their Answer arrived, he was desired to let every thing remain quiet in the Country.

To be referred to our Superiors.

THE CREDITORS of Pulambelly Conna (turned out of the Country for several unwarrantable Acts as noticed in last Years Diary under the 10th. of Jañry) having requested Liberty of the Prince to sell his Estate towards satisfying their demands, and some part being within the Hon^{ble} Companys District, He acquainted the Chief there of. Upon which the following Resolution was taken by them, and the Linguist being Directed to draw the same up in Mallabars, it was reciprocally signed to prevent any disputes in future viz^t.

Creditors to Pullambelly Conna apply for his Estate.

WHEREAS Palambelly Conna has been expelled this Country in January last for his evil practises by the mutual Consent of Us the Prince of Cherrika Ramarutini of the Palace of Pally and Thomas Byfeld Esq^r. Chief of Tellicherry several of his Creditors have applied for relief especially those who have Mortgage Bonds, We have therefore Agreed that whatever is so Mortgaged shall be put up to publick sale for the immediate payment thereof, And in Order no One may plead Ignorance hereof It is further Agreed the same be made publick and the day of Sale fixed to the 14th. Instant, that the said Pattambally Conna or his Heirs may within the time limited settle Accounts if they are so inclined and all Persons give in their claims least they should be excluded the benefit of a Dividend. In WITNESS whereof we have signed two Declarations both of this Tenour and Date exchanging the same with each other in Tellicherry Fort this 4th. day of November 1749.

THE CHIEF then sent a Complimentary Message to the Prince at the Brass Pagoda, desiring to speak with Him, who coming to the Fort directly, He has acquainted with what had hapned at Mangalore and told that Angria might probably attempt making a descent somewhere in his Country therefore it behoved him to keep a Vigilant and carefull watch towards his Frontiers, as this Enemys getting the least footing on shore would prove the entire ruin of the Country very shortly, Upon which he came to a resolution of putting all his Forts in a proper posture of Defence, more especially that of Ayconna, situated at the entrance of Randilly River, requesting a supply of Powder and Lead Ball with an Ensigns Command from hence, promising to pay duly for the same, and all Charges incurred, Therefore the Storekeeper was directed to Issue the Stores, and Ensign George Harris to march with the Men required who had the following Order delivered him by the Chief on the occasion Viz^t.

TO ENSIGN GEORGE HARRIS

SIR

You are hereby Ordered to take under your Command twenty five Men (including their proper Officers) with a Drummer and proceed in the Princes Company Cherrika, from whence he will dispatch You to Ayconna, with such a Number of Military and Militia as may be judged necessary for the defence of that Fortress (of whom you are to have the Command) and in case of being attacked by Angria vigorously oppose his Efforts using all suitable methods to burn, sink or destroy any of his Vessells, that may be brought into that River keeping me constantly advised of all Occurrences that happen.

YESTERDAY Evening when Mr. Douglas returned I received the Honour of your Letter and therein observe what passed between You and Him concerning the Pyrate Angria, My inclination is for us to fit out some Vessels with a sufficient Number of Men (not with a design to attack his Grabs) but to prevent any Vessels belonging to either of Our Factors becoming Prizes to the Gallivats he may possibly leave cruizing off our Ports when the rest of his Fleet is gone to the southward which he practised last Year.

I received Advice Yesterday from Callicut that they descryed from our Flag staff nine or ten Vessels in the Offing, at a great distance standing to the southward but whether they are those of this Pyrate or not I cannot affirm.

I do not imagine that this Pyrate will ever be so bold as to attempt attacking our Fortifications but should it so happen, you may be assured I will oppose him with all the Forces that is requisite agreeable to what proposed in your Letter.

To prevent Your missing of the Ship I would have you keep in nine Fathom Water which the Commander has been acquainted with by Boat Express. WHEN abreast of Cochin send One of your Toneyes in there to gain intelligence, and if the ship has been in at that Port return directly, otherwise continue cruizing for her in the Offing unless you hear of Angrias Fleet being more to the Southward, when in such Case keep on your Course but not otherwise taking especial care not to be surprized by any Gallivats or Boats that may be in shore.

THE Paymaster will put on board Twenty days Provisions and deliver you a List thereof in the expence of which let there be the utmost frugality shown, keeping an exact account thereof to be delivered upon your return.

BE very carefull to prevent any Contests or disputes happening between your People and the Ships Company leaving all manner of Grievances (if such should happen) to be redressed by

Ultimo acquaints him that his Majestys Ship Syren Ruby, & Tartar are bound to this Coast, That Admiral Boscawen left Fort St. David for England the 19th. with Eight Ships, And that Commodore Lisle was going into the Streights of Malacca. He likewise adds that our Hoñble Masters Ship Chesterfield was dispatched to England the 12th. to which place the Royal George would follow her in a few days.

IN Answer to what wrote Our Rice Contractors Agent (Antonio Pires) at Mangalore he acquaints the Chief, that several People from Muscat, Cutch, and other Northern Ports have been endeavouring to make Contracts for Pepper at any

Price but without effect, except in very trifling Quantities and that he much doubts if any will be obtained the ensuing season as the New Crop by Report is extremely bad, and the Merchants greatly intimidated with the invasion Angria has made in that Place.

By a Munchua bound to Callicut sent Mr. Secker Ninety One Lances to be repaired & directed him to send what Matts were in readiness by the return of this Conveyance.

By a Shybar that arrived this day from Bombay we received a Letter from our Superiours dated the 27th. Ultimo acknowledging receipt of our Advices under the 23rd. June & 26th. July which they now fully reply to likewise to such part of former Letters as may require an Answer. In respect to what we wrote them concerning the Pepper Merchants not complying with their Contracts by reason of the French keeping up the Price it is observed that notwithstanding the Merchants may get a reasonable Profit by their Contracts with the Honble Company yet if they can dispose of it to greater advantage to the inland or French Merchants they will always be endeavouring to fly off from their Contracts, and in case of their Non Compliance with their present Agreement you must Mulet them as is customary making fresh Contracts with other Merchants if possible. They observe to us our having wrote them of our having taken into consideration the method most eligible to make up the two thousand Candies of Pepper stipulated by the Honble Company under the 10th. Jañry 1745 & 10th. of May 1746, but by the 43rd. Paragraph of their Commands the 25th. Febr̄y 1747 ¶ Orford Copy of which was sent us on the 15th. October 1748 and acknowledged to be reced under the 1st. November following We shall find they limit the Quantity to three thousand Candies, unless to be had at or under seventy Rupees ¶ Candy, and in case there should be a large Tonnage on hand to provide for they permit of a sufficiency being purchased at an unlimited Price. They approve of the enquiry made for what Pepper was to be had at Callicut or Penany, and would have us procure at Cochin (exclusive of what may be got at those Places) as far as One thousand Candies if to be had at any reasonable rates and advise them if any further Quantity is procurable at Cochin, and by what time. The Merchants we confined for their tardiness in settling their Accounts they permit us to release as we have attached their Effects and direct us to have no dealings with them in future. They acquiesce in the Proposal made Boyanore to pay his Debt of ^{Fans. vis.} 62662. 8. without Interest if we can bring him to an immediate Clearance and in regard to the Article of Agreement proposed to be entered into with him they have only to recommend our seeing the same duly performed when concluded. They approve of our accepting the Verge Lands of Andalure and Mapalingatta Pagodas in part of the Princes Debt on the Terms mentioned, but think there was no necessity for having the Companys Old Grants renewed as they are esteemed to be of sufficient Validity and every succeeding Prince may think he has a right to give fresh Grants, which would be attended with Expence and other bad consequences, therefore we should have taken a Grant for the Lands of Andalure and Mapalingatta only and not for the Island of Durmapatam, for should any disputes arise with the Braminee concerning the Revenues of those Lands our agreement with the Prince for them must become void and not esteemed as a part of his Debt. That as it is reasonable to believe the Prince will be more firmly attached to the Honble Companys Interest when he receives the benefit of his Customs annually, than by their being applied to the paying off by degrees an Old Debt contracted by his Ancestors, they give us liberty to make an abatement in his Debt of two or three thousand Rupees if he is ready to clear the remainder on those Terms. They observe the Progress made in securing part of the Achamars Debt to the Honble Company and doubt not our Prudence in keeping the Heads of the several Pagodas as well as those of the Achamars to their engagements for the performance thereof. Enclosed us the necessary instructions in regard to the Military of this Place as established by the Honble Company which must be duly observed in respect to discipline and Pay, and as to the Number of the Military direct that they be reduced

to what they were before the Commencement of the late War. Approve for the reasons given of our renting the Arrack Farm on the terms mentioned. And of our appointing a Committee of Council to take an Account of the Remains of Pepper in Warehouse in Order to adjust the loss in Weight, and although the same is very considerable the [sic] acquiesce in our writing it off the Books as they hope there is no Embezzlement. As the Person we contracted with for Sandal Wood could not possibly deliver the Quantity Agreed for they approve of our receiving the Amount short delivered into the Treasury. That we did well in supplying Anjengo with Treasure as the Gentlemen there wrote so pressingly for it under the 2nd. May & order us to continue the same in future on their application and we shall very shortly have a suitable supply. As they [sic] Anjengo Sloop actually belonged to that Factory it would be irregular for us to Credit them for either the Goods or it which they have mentioned in their Advices to the Gentlemen there. They approve of our obtaining a Grant for the Honble Companys holding the Island of Maddacarra with all the Advantages and profits belonging to it and that we may rent it out but not launch out any Money for planting Coconut Trees or otherwise. They likewise approve our obtaining for the Honble Company all pretensions in future to Vessels Goods &c^a. drove ashore in the Dominions of Colastria belonging to them or those trading under their Protection. That we should have sent the Writing Captain Mason gave in behalf of his Owners to maintain when in Europe the People he took from hence, and direct us to have due regard to the 46th. Paragraph of the Honble Companys Commands ¶ Boscawen concerning the Money given and advanced the Seamen taken out of the Ships Severn, Warwick, and Ilchester at this place in Anno 1747. Are glad to find we are on such good Terms with the Prince and acquiesce in our assisting him from time to time as the situation of his Affairs may require relying on our Care that the Honble Company are no sufferers thereby and that no Debts are contracted on that Account. That we must preserve our Ols in the best manner we can, and if they are so Old as to be unintelligible must get them fresh copied as they have nobody that engraves Mallabars. Enclosed us an Account of what Old Arms were received by the Bombay Grab anno 1747/8 but in regard to the deficiency in the Locks ¶ Stretham the Storekeepers Assistants are positive they were packed up agreeable to Invoice, remitted us an Indent for the use of the Marine which they direct may be complied with as soon as possible, And have directed the Chief and Factors of Anjengo to acquaint us what Quantity of Cloth and Pepper they judge they shall have in Warehouse in all the Month of December, advising the Tonnage thereof, when one of the Honble Companys Ships may be sent to take the same in. Enclosed five Blank Covenants which are to be executed by each Servant agreeable to a Copy of the Honble Companys Commands enclosed us, giving security in England as required therein And when the Covenants are duly executed to be returned to Bombay. That they will write to Fort St. David concerning the pay Ensign Harris says is due to him and his Detachment and if we are satisfied that Richard Stanton Corporal has not reced his way for the time to allow it him but to deduct Twenty One Rupees three Quarters & Eighty reas paid his Captain on Account Cloaths and Debts he owed on the Island. Advise the Arrival of the Stafford the 27 September and the Salisburys on the 17. October and that they shall very shortly write us again and comply as near as possible with the several Indents.

FRIDAY DISPATCHED a Toney Express to Anjengo with their Packet reced from the
10TH. Presidency and acknowledged receipt of their Advices concerning the Duke of
 Letter to Newcastle acquainting them of Angrias having taken the Restoration Grab & since
 Anjengo. burnt & plundered Mangulore and that for fear of his being to the Southward we
 had sent a Lieutenants Command & some Gunners to join Captain Fowler.

SATURDAY THE CHIEF received Advice from Ensign Harris by the way of Maddacarra
11TH. that since his Arrival at Ayconna he was informed by Travellers from the North-
 Advice of ward that Angria passed to the Southward about six days past, since when the
 Angrias Prince has withdrew his Nairs and sent them to Mount Dhilly to prevent his landing

THE Prince in an Ola advised the Chief he heard Angria was gone to the Northward in reply to which he was informed it was thought otherwise as Boats were daily coming in from the Northward who had not seen or heard of them but when any certain Notice was received he should be acquainted with it And desired One of his Rajahdores might be sent hither as he had something of Consequence to communicate.

THERE being a Rumour that the French have thoughts of settling a Factory at Coletchy and of a Detachments being lately dispatched from Myhie for that purpose, the Chief sent a proper Person thither to gain intelligence thereof.

THE Person sent to Mahie yesterday returned and acquainted the Chief for certain, that Sixty five Military and ten Gunners were gone from thence, Forty of the former Orderd to the Assistance of a ship daily expected upon the Coast and the remainder with an Officer and Domingo Quintal (second Linguist at Callicut) were designed to land at Quilethy.

THIS day returned the Munchua and four Toney's that carried our Detachment on board the Duke of Newcastle, by which the Chief received two Letters from Captain Francis Fowler dated at Cochin the 11th. Instant as follows Viz^t.

THE Commodore received intelligence yesterday Morning of Angrias taking Mangalore and the unhappy Catastrophe of Poor Captain Leeke and at the same time offered us all the Assistance and necessarys he was capable of, expecting them here every hour, for seeing five or six sail to the Northward imagined them to be Angrias Fleet which put us all upon our Guard; Two Dutch ships and Mr. Bourchiers ship lying here we determined to oppose them but how agreeably were we deceived on the Arrival of your Packet and Detachment with which I hope to baffle his utmost Efforts. THAT all the enquiry possible be made in Order to secure the Amount of One thousand Candies of Pepper at Cochin.

WHAT the Honble President & Council observe in respect to the three thousand Candies of Pepper Ordered to be provided in the 43rd. Par^{as}. of the Honble Companys Commands ^{the} Ship Orford was attended to in making our Contracts under the 18th. Febry. last, but upon their positively saying they expected us to purchase no more than two thousand Candies afterwards in their Commands [*lacuna*] occasioned us not to make any further enquiry than for that Amount, and as the same is now explained to us to be for three thousand Candies, and the former being as we imagine an Error therefore if it is attainable, AGREED to purchase to that Amount including what we have in Warehouse.

THAT the necessary enquiry be made about the difference in the Locks and Musquets and the Letter Books be examined as an Overplus of the former Articles was lately received at Anjengo.

THAT the several Articles indented for from the Presidency be provided at Callicut excepting what may be had here.

THAT the Paymaster makes good the Balance due to Richard Stanton Corporal and that the necessary enquiry be made from Fort St. David concerning the pay due to the Detachment sent on Captain Powlett with Ensign Harris.

ORDERED that the Blank Covenants be executed out of hand and returned to the Presidency by the first Conveyance that offers.

PERUSED likewise the Honble Companys Regulation for forming Discipline and Government in the Military. And Agreed that what relates to the respective Officers and Soldiers be drawn out and affixed in the Guard Room, being first Read at the Head of the Battalion.

AND that the Secry acquaint Mr. Charles Waters (who is now Ordered to be Military Paym^r.) with the several Commissioned Officers pay at this Settlement agreeable to the List enclosed us, as we are certain they are upon the Bombay Establishment and included in the 10 Companys but as our Serjeants Corporals and European Centinels may not be esteemed as such it is AGREED that we continue their pay on the same footing as now it being less than what stipulated in the Companys Orders till we can advise our superiours and receive their Answer concerning the same transmitting an Abstract of the Companys they will be divided into with their pay annexed that they may regulate the same as they see necessary.

REDUCING our Garrison to the Number it was before the War commenced comes next under our Consideration and by a Statement made (as entered after this Consultation) of the Number of Men sufficient for Duty. at this Factory and

its Dependencies we find Seven hundred and ten Men will be required and by comparing the Number with those in pay in 1744 which was before the commencement of the late War we observe there will be an encrease of fifteen Men, notwithstanding which the pay of the Country Topasses &c^a. will be less, Our Charges having been reduced lately amongst the Militia to what it was formerly and as ten of these Men are for securing the Farmers Effects at the Island Maddacarra (lately made the Companys Property) It is AGREED to entertain this Number and signify the same to our Superiours transmitting them the foregoing Statement.

WHEN the Military is thus reduced we find there will be Two hundred Ninety Nine Men to be discharged and reduced the service and as letting so great a Number go at once may possibly induce some of the Country Powers to take them into pay, and by their being disciplined and brought up amongst us may be of the worst of Consequence should we have any disputes hereafter. The Board are of Opinion it would be more prudent to discharge them by Degrees than running a risque of this kind, especially as we shall by that means in a few days see whether their inclinations lead them to enter into foreign service or not And as our Superiours have not fixed any certain time to us for discharging them, It is Agreed that Seventy be dismissed immediately, a further Number at the End of the Month and so continued at proper Opportunitys untill the whole is compleated, and that an Offer be made to transport them to their Native Countries to prevent their Stragling about.

Honble Masters Ship Severn Captain Richard Dorrill imported them from England which Place she left the 6th. April, & by her they had received News of the Swift Snows being arrived Home with the News of the bad success met with in the Expédition against Pondicherry And that Peace was proclaimed before the Severn sailed.

THE CHIEF & Factors of Anjengo in their Letter of the 5th. Instant advise us of having laden on the Duke of Newcastle forty eight Bales of Cloth amounting as Invoice enclosed us to Rupees Fourteen thousand five hundred seventy two, two Quarters and sixty Reas. Enclosed Calculate of Tonnage of the said Goods & desire we will send them the Wax as soon as possible as they cannot pack up any more Bales for want of it.

AFTER we had settled the Accounts of Randoterra and had Agreed to take from the Pagodas of Marracherri and Uripechi ten thousand Fanams, I with Naranna Cutty Putterah in the Presence of Ambilliatoo Cherrumanacarrem, Ananda Croop & Pelly Tupy examined the Rents of the aforementioned Pagodas, and Agreed that the Pagoda of Maccracherri should pay six thousand two hundred thirty four Fanams and that Uripechi Three thousand seven hundred sixty six and I now desire youl give the Heads of the latter a Writing signifying they have adjusted their Account and then you need be at no further trouble of sending for the Achamars or the Heads of the Pagodas of Marracherri as I have settled this Affair.

"You are the Man that went to the Chief of Tellicherry and occasioned Chrisna Cutty Putterahs being banished the Country?" The Nairs, that killed him are by Name Murriquem Cherri Conna, Mullapally Quellapen, & Teyatorem Ramarru, and this Action was done in the presence of a Nair Boy who went in Company with Chatoo Nombier; And if People who bring you information are to be used in this Manner you must not expect any further Notice. I put my Confidence in the English Company, And therefore I look on this Action to occasion as much shame to them as to me, especially as by my information of Chrisna Cutty Putterahs base behaviour it has occasioned this Mans Death.

THE Bearer of this Ola was likewise Directed to acquaint the Chief that a Brother of Chrisna Cutty Putterahs was lurking about Manure though expelled the Country for his Vile proceedings amongst other Rajahdores in May last HOWEVER as the Prince has not of late given any reason to suspect he would be guilty of such base Actions, and as the Nombier may have been put to Death, for some Capital Crime, it is necessary to make further enquiry about this Affair before Publick Notice is taken of it, therefore the Chief gave Orders that the proper People should be dispatched immediately for gaining Intelligence thereof.

THE People sent to enquire if a Brother of Chrisna Cutty Putterahs was in the Country, and what occasioned the Prince to cut off Chatoo Nombier returned this day; by whose Report there seems no reason to doubt the former has been at Manure and is now at the Pagoda of Talliparamboo, where he will stay twelve days, to perform some Religious Ceremonys, But whether the Nombier was killed by the Princes Order is not certainly known as yet; so that at present no Publick Complaint can be made, as He possibly may be unacquainted with the Putterahs being in the Country, therefore seizing of him agreeable to the Articles of Agreement made with the Prince in May last, seems the most properest Method to be taken for bringing these things to light, and as Codolley Quelloo Nombier can by his Situation more readily assist us therein than any other of the Country Powers the Chief wrote him on the Occasion as follows Viz^t.

— DECEMBER 1749 —

I have received your Ola and with great Concern have observed its Contents and assure You, I will take due Notice of the same in proper time.

Ola to the Prince on the Occasion.

FOR the good of the Country in General and to put an End to the various disputes between the Honble Company and the Palace of Cherrika occasioned by the villainous proceedings of Chrisna Cutty Putterah I prevailed with the Prince to banish him the Country with some others of his Rajahdores, since when you might have observed the Government of the Country has gone on much better.

In June I wrote you to come hither and have a meeting with me as I have several things of importance to communicate to You, And notwithstanding you have not as yet returned me an Answer my inclination leads me to try all methods for the good of the Country and the Companys Friends by endeavouring to remove all discords occasioned from base Peoples running from One Party to another making of Mischief and occasioning endless Confusion, and I expect in return you will take care to seize and send hither such People whom you suspect and can lay hold off, for I have a good foundation to believe there is such with You and have therefore sent this Advice. And you may give the same Notice likewise to those of the Palace of Oden Quilote and assure them in my behalf that they shall find that Protection and favour I promised at our Meeting, And when they are willing to send two of their Rajahdores I have some material Business to Communicate to them, and will verbally declare what has passed since our last Meeting to this present time.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Chief and Factors of Anjengo dated the 8th. Instant advising that they have in readiness One hundred ten Bales of Cloth and hope by the end of the Month to have twenty more Bales which they intend should the Dragon call there to send us by her unless they receive timely Notice that we shall send a ship to take them in. Enclosed us a Calculate of the Tonnage of the One hundred and ten Bales which is Twenty seven Tons and a half.

Letter from Anjengo.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. Richard Secker at Callicut dated the 13th. Instant advising he had received of Thomas Byfeld Esq^r. Four hundred fifty seven Rupees, two Quarters, fifty six Reas, and had drawn a Bill on us in his favour at sight, having Credited this Factory for that Amount. And enclosed an Ola to the Chief from the Samorine Translate of which is as follows.

I have received your Letter wherein you acquaint me of my not having discharged my first Ola agreeable to the writing given, which I am willing to do, and desire you will send a Person to Callicut, where I will send a Rajahdore to consider of a Method for discharging the same, and doubt not of your keeping up the good Correspondence between me and the Honble Company.

I have received your Ola and take a particular pleasure in the Contents as when I have the favour of the Hoñble Company I believe I can effect the Business, and be assured whenever their Occasions require my Service I will do all as lays in my Power, therefore as soon as I received your Letter I wrote the King of Oden Quilotè to come to dinner with me and when he arrived, we considered if we could effect this Affair in Talliparamboo; And before to morrow Night we will send two Rajahdores in Company with Marcan Corem, And when they arrive you must return them without the knowledge of those of Cherrika for if they get Notice of this Affair it cannot be accomplished.

If the Prince comes to know what I have undertaken he will be greatly enraged, but its enough to me to have the Companys favour and good Will to support me and hope always of having your Friendship.

If you think well of it I will place Twenty five Men in a particular Place, which Marcan Corem & the Bearers of this will Verbally inform you.

THE CHIEF Dispatched a Pattamar with an Ola to the Samorine acquainting Him that Mr. Douglas would proceeed to Callicut on Wednesday who with Mr. Secker would agreeable to his desire have a meeting with his Rajahdores in Order to settle his Debt with the Hoñble Company therefore on receipt of this Advice he desired his Rajahdores might be sent to Callicut to finish this Business.

AGREEABLE to our last Resolution of Council Mr. Alexander Douglas set out in the Barge for Callicut when the following Instructions were drawn up and signed accordingly.

THE Samorine Rajah having wrote the Chief that he is willing to settle his Accounts and discharge his Debt to Our Hoñble Masters and Mr. Alexander Douglas being thoroughly well acquainted with those Affairs, He is now Ordered to Callicut where you are both to settle the same with such Ministers as may be appointed for that purpose.

— DECEMBER 1749 —

As we are apprehensive that the Samorine will want to have Customs paid him on Timber Cordage &c^a. you are positively directed not to allow the same but acquaint his Ministers that it must be referred to our Superiours at Bombay, whose Answer we must receive on that head And though they may plead that the Portugueze have complied therewith and that its but reasonable the other European Nations should do the same yet as it is a thing quite New, and ever since Our Hoñble Masters have had a Factory in his Country no such thing was ever demanded, We deem the Portugueze doing it to be no Example to us As from the Assistance his Predecessours have had from our Hoñble Masters, we look upon them to be upon a different footing from the other, which we make no doubt you'l represent to his Ministers in the strongest manner, referring them to the difference there is between the Portugueze and us in the Customs of Pepper.

You are well acquainted that our Hoñble Masters Sloop was lost through the treachery of the Samorine's subjects at Penany and notwithstanding the Chief has frequently by Letter pressed him for Redress yet hitherto he has not given any, You are therefore to represent this Affair to his Ministers informing him that such a proceeding as this is very inconsistent with the Friendship that has subsisted between Him and Our Hoñble Masters and a very ungratefull retaliation for the services they have formerly done his Predecessours and Country, and that if he the Samorine does not restore the Sloop and Cargoe that we must then endeavour to get Satisfaction, in the best manner we can and that if any ill consequences should ensue therefrom either to him or his subjects, that he must look upon himself as the cause thereof.

When the Samorines Ministers come to You to settle their Master's Account the first thing you are to do is to insist upon the payment of the three first Ols telling them that after they are discharged you will then settle the remaining Account, as their view may possibly be only to settle Accounts without any design of discharging part thereof and as therefrom Our Hoñble Masters would only incur an Expencc by making Presents to his Ministers as is usual on such occasions you are therefore to avoid the same, and insist upon immediate payment of the three first annual Ols or otherwise you'l not come to any Account with them.

Our Hoñble Masters having permitted us in the 7th. Par^a. of their Commands in the Year 1739 to relinquish part of the Interest on the Samorines Debt in case the same will induce him to clear it, you are therefore to see if that will have any effect, but be very cautious of the manner of opening this Affair to his Ministers for should they find we are inclinable for making abatements, they may then insist upon our allowing a much larger sum than we choose to do, nay even if you find abatements will have a good Effect, you must defer giving a final Answer till you acquaint us with their proposals and receive our Directions.

Should you find that a present made to the Samorines Ministers will likely tend to bring the Debt to a Clearance immediately advise us thereof and with the Terms that we may give you directions.

We have delivered Mr. Alexander Douglas Seven of the Samorines Ols each for Fifty thousand Fanams which with two that is with Mr. Secker are the whole Amount of his Bond Debt and when you have finished your Business, Mr. Douglas is to bring all the Ols with Him here, or such of them as remain unpaid.

THE Puniture Rajah being indebted to Our Hoñble Masters Seventy thousand Callicut Fanams no part of which is yet discharged therefore should you come to a Conclusion with the Samorine renew the Subject of the Puniture's Debt endeavouring if possible to get the Samorine to press him for the same.

Should it appear that the Samorine has no intention of paying his Debt, and that sending his Ministers to Callicut is only with a view of settling Accounts and getting a Present Mr. Douglas is then immediately to return hither, and his stay at Callicut is to be no longer than he judges absolutely necessary.

THE Secretary is Directed to give proper Orders to Captain Kent for landing the Bengall Rice Gunny Bags and the Detachment sent on him from Anjengo.

THE Secretary wrote to Captain Fowler and Kent acquainting them with the Ho. Companys standing Orders not to sell any Fire arms or other Warlike Stores to the Country people as also not to Countenance or receive on Board any persons belonging to this Garrison without Leave being first obtained from the Chief. By a Shybar belonging to Bombay and bound thither this day we addressed the Hoñble President and Council acquainting them of the Resolutions taken in Respect to the Dispatch of Ships Dragon and Newcastle with all other needfull Occurrences relating to this Settlement.

As its necessary the Chief and Factors should be acquainted with what was Agreed upon in Council yesterday a Toney was dispatched with a General Letter setting forth that we are now loading the Dragon and Newcastle the latter of which we intend sending to receive what Bale goods they may have in Readiness, hoping also to receive the agreeable Advices of their being likely to secure some Pepper by the Return of the Express Boat as thereby they will be able to fill up Captain Fowler who we beleive will want about fifty Tons provided we give the Dragon as much as she Can take in with the forty Eight Bales formerly sent us but that should we find they have no prospect of getting this Article we shall then divide what we have in Warehouse between them agreeable to our Hoñble Masters Commands. That their Detachment should be returned them agreeable to their Request.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mess^s. Douglas and Secker advising that they have had a Conference with three of the Samorines Ministers and agreeable to our Directions insisted on the Discharge of the three first Olas which they seemed Surprised at from whence they judge that their Intentions were only to settle Accounts without any view of Discharging part of the Debt they giving no Direct Answer thereto but only said they must first Advise the Samorine thereof and wait his Answer before Coming to any Resolution to which they Consented as from thence they will be able to discover his Intentions whether they are real or not which at present appear to them very Equivocating. That they have also demanded Restitution of Our Hoñble Masters Sloop but Could get no Satisfactory Answer the Rajadores alledging that they must first Receive the Samorines Order in this as well as in all other points. That M^r. Douglas now waits our Directions whether we would have him leave Callicut directly or wait till the Return of the Rajahdores who are gone to the Samorine.

WROTE a Letter to Mess^s. Douglas and Secker in Answer to theirs of the 26th. & 27th. Ult^o. That the Relation therein given us of Condoty Paquis purchasing pepper at Callicut appeared to us somewhat surprising having been frequently advised none was procurable and Consequently must imagine it to be Light Pepper Contracted for with Penany Merchants, for which Reason therefore desired they would be very particular in receiving Information thereof a Person having been sent privately from hence on this Business who brought an Ola from May Modeliar the Principal Merchant setting forth that he could not Contract for more than One hundred Candies of Pepper to be delivered half in January and the Remainder in February next at One hundred and twenty Rupees the Candy Clear of Customs if Money was immediately advanced him which offer has been Rejected. To prevent the Pepper being diverted from us we again repeated our Orders to make the most private Enquiry possible Concerning this Article what may be Contracted for at any of the Adjacent parts to be delivered in all February next with whom and at what price keeping us Constantly advised of their Transactions Concerning the same. We acquainted them with our Resolution of Council under the 30th. Ultimo and to desist purchasing any teak timbers and advise us of their Transactions Concerning the same. We acquainted them with our Resolution of Council under the 30th. Ultimo and to desist purchasing any Teak Timbers for the Presidency and to advise us before Contracting the Price of the Poon Masts. That should the Samorine's Rajadores not be returned we directed Mr. Alexander Douglas to proceed hither as to morrow giving the Samorine to understand that by his Ola to the Chief it was expected he had a real Intention to adjust his Accounts and render Satisfaction for the Treachery used by his Subjects in respect to the Anjengo Sloop however we left it to his Discretion when to return should he have any hopes by staying of settling these Affairs.

Letter to Calicut.

MR. ALEXANDER DOUGLAS returns from Callicut and brings a Letter signed by himself and Mr. Richard Secker acknowledging Receipt of the above and advise that before its Receipt as likewise since all possible Enquiry had been made concerning the Pepper purchased by Condoty Paqui which they assure us was heavy Pepper bought of Tannore and Penany Merchants and that since their last they are informed he has purchased at Seventy Candies and at Penany twenty five in the whole One hundred and fifty Candies from Rupees One hundred and five to one hundred and Eleven That on the 30th. Ultimo the said Condoty Paqui went to Mahie leaving behind him his Nephew Hossein Cutty for providing more who as they hear buys all he Can get even by one and two Candies at a time as it Comes to Market but what quantity he is ordered to provide they Cant say. That agreeable to our Directions they have sent a proper Person to the Southward to see what quantity of Pepper may be Contracted for to be delivered in February on whose Return they shall duely advise us but observe that as this Years Crop is nothing near so large as the last they imagine no large quantity Can be Contracted for from the many Purchasers there may possibly be therefore judge in order to secure what they Can to buy as it comes to Market in small quantities. In Respect to the Samorine they have since had a Meeting with his Rajadores who seem as before to have no Intentions to discharge any part of the Debt and in an Ola from the Samorine He appears to be full as prevaricating.

THE Chief dispatched Ensign John Rolofstall with the following Letter to Palliareem.

Ballapil Cutiassem our Principal Inland Merchant having assured me of your ready Inclination to assist the Honble Company in Carrying on their Trade of Sandall Wood & Cardamoms I take this Opportunity of Returning my thanks for the same and to testify my Gratitude for the same in a stronger Light I now send one of their Officers to pay the usual Compliments upon the approach of your Deceased Fathers Anniversary. He has my Orders to introduce the said Ballapil Cutiassem to whom I request Protection and favour may be shown that whatsoever Merchandise purchased by him on our Account in future may meet with no impediment but on the Contrary transported hither in the utmost Safety and I beg at the same time Youll be assure'd all Merchants trading from your Country to this Place shall meet with Reciprocal treatment. It is some time past since I have seen the Prince of Cherrika therefore am obliged to be silent in Respect to his Affairs.

ENSIGN PAUL BEUTHER in Command at Maddacarra having attained the Chiefs Permission to Come hither upon some private Business arrived the day and Related to him that two days past he sent his Servant to buy a few Necessaries such as Fowls Butter &c^a. about Cherrica Cuna who was stoped by a Nair named Pallaca Chatoo and not only by him very grossly insulted and beat but told he might acquaint his Father therewith meaning the Chief that Satisfaction might be taken if judged proper and least this should give Occasion for other Subjects of the Princes to Commit further Outrages as were Experienced last Year the following Letter was wrote him by the Chief, Viz^t.

I am informed by the Officer at Maddacarra that upon his sending his Servant in the parts adjacent to Cherria Cuna with money to buy some Necessaries a Nair named Pallaca Chatoo not only beat and abused him but broke several Necessaries belonging to his Servant and was so insolent in his Reflections as to tell him he might Complain to his Father who might take Satisfaction. Upon Relating this to the Officer Complaint was made to the Conna Copula who instead of taking Notice thereof has secreted the Nair and what your Highness has wrote upon the Occasion I have been advised of Therefore as such proceedings are very unwarrantable I now apply to your Highness for immediate Satisfaction to prevent any Disputes or Controversies arising in future.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. Richard Secker dated yesterday advising that agreeable to our Directions he had sent a proper Person to the Parts adjacent to enquire with the greatest Secrecy what Pepper was to be Contracted for and delivered in all the Month of February who acquaints him that May Modeliar will deliver ten Candies by the 25th. Instant at One hundred and twenty Rupees the Candy in Callicut if Ready Money is advanced immediately That Maqui will also deliver by the 15th. the same quantity in Penany at One hundred and ten Rupees and Modin Cutty ten Candies more on the same Conditions in all Thirty Candies. That Condati Paqui has a servant at Penany who with his Nephew is still purchasing small quantities. Enclosed Came his Accounts for last Month.

The Chief received the following Ola from the Prince to that wrote him under the 6th

I have received your Letter and Observe what mentioned to me therein concerning the Affair of the Officer of Maddacarra's Servant being sent to buy Necessaries near Cherria Cuna who was insulted and abused there with very indecent Language by Pallaca Chatoo and told by him to let his Father know thereof that he might Come and take Satisfaction. This Story I have enquired into and find your Officer sent Seven or Eight Calliquilone Moors to Cherria Cuna and advised a Person I posted there to seize and send Palliareem Chatoo to Maddacarra upon hearing of which the Conna Copula went in Person to him w^a. he again demanded that Pallaca Chatoo should be produced of which he Acquainted me it was in Consequence thereof I wrote the Officer that whenever any Thing of this kind happened he should write me when the Necessary Enquiry should be made and the Offender

punished agreeable to what has been Observed formerly but that he should not send to seize or Order to be Seized any people that Transgress. This is what I wrote your Officer who in his Answer desired I would Examine and punish the Offender. I Thereupon sent for Pallaca Chatoo and Confined him writing your Officer again to send his Servant that I might proceed in the Examination and agreeable thereto Chastize Pallaca Chatoo but before my Writing arrived he had set out for Tellicherry and as I still keep him a Prisoner if youll send or Order hither the Servant to prove what is alledged by him to be Truth all which Pallaca Chatoo desires he shall be punished in what manner you Desire.

TUESDAY THE Chief also received another Ola from the Prince Translate of which is as follows Viz^t.

Ola from
the Prince.

I have begun to Celebrate a Feast that will soon be Over at which I request you'll attend as it will afford great Satisfaction to us and what has been practised formerly. On the 8th. Instant our Nephew likewise is to Receive a Title at which its Necessary you should be present but if Business will not permit I hope you'll send your Second and Linguist which will give us as much Content.

THE Chief answered the two preceding Olas from the Prince as follows.

Both your Royal Writings, I have received and in Answer to the latter I am to acquaint your Highness that at present two of the Honible Companys Ships are under Dispatches for Europe therefore till they sail I Cannot leave the Factory and the like must be said of the other Gentlemen who are all closely employed in tneir Respective Offices on this Occasion your First is in Answer to what I wrote concerning the Tréatment of Pallaca Chatoo to a Servant of the Officers at Maddacarra It is Certain he should not have sent out people to look for him and for doing which I have shown a proper Resentment though at the same time fully persuaded it arose by his being lately sent thither and not acquainted with the Customs of the Country rather than done Designedly to offend your Highness. He has received my Orders to send his Tivey Servant agreeable to your Request that what alledged by him may be proved and the Guilty punished.

OUR Toney Dispatched to Anjengo the 31st. Ultimo returned this day and brought us two Letters from the Chief and Factors the one dated the 2^d. and the other 4th. the former of which acknowledges Receipt of ours under the 27th. with the Packet from the Presidency. That as there is no probability of a Conveyance offering for sending the Bales hither which they have in Readiness they desire us to leave Room in one or part of both ships to take in one hundred and thirty Eight Bales being thirty four and an half Tons which they have in Warehouse. The Latter Advices that as they have not as yet received an answer from the King of Travancore or his Ministers about Pepper they Can only say that so soon as they are at a Certainty they shall dispatch the Express Boat which is Returned for that purpose.

The Warehousekeeper is therefore Directed to make all the Dispatch possible and when the Quantity of Pepper limited for the former is shipped off then to send what Remains in Warehouse on board the latter.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. Richard Secker dated the 14th. Instant advising the Appah Putterah and his Brother have been some days at Penany enquiring the Price of Pepper and as he is informed are in want of a large quantity though hither to they have made no purchase. That he has made all the private enquiry possible to know who they are employed by and fears they are Commissioned by the French. That since his last Condoty Paquis Nephew has purchased fifty five Candies of Southern heavy Pepper in small quantities at a Time from One hundred and Nine to One hundred and Twelve Rupees the Candy which with forty Candies bought by his Servant at Penany is shipped off for Mahie, and adds that there is remaining at Callicutt Twenty five Candies to be purchased at one hundred and ten Rupees the Candy. That the 11th. Instant he received an Answer to the joint Letter wrote by himself and Mr. Douglas to the Samorine setting forth that it was unnecessary replying thereto as by Mr. Douglas his returning so soon to Tellicherry plainly Convinced him the Hoñble Company had little or no Inclination of settling Acco^{ts}. however Mr. Secker gives it as his Opinion that this is no more than a pretence and that he had no thoughts of discharging his Olas or putting them into a Course of payment, his Equivocating being a plain Conviction. He adds that though the Samorines Rajadores promised to discharged [sic] the Storekeeper's Bill for the Powder and Ball as the 5th. yet they have not made good the same nor does he believe they will.

Douglas and Robinson are on board attending upon Mr. Dorrill the same is opened by the Chief and Mr. Charles Waters who finding a Packet contained therein for the Hoñble Court of Directors with Orders that it may be dispatched by the first ship and as sending a Toney immediately to Anjengo may possibly reach the Duke of Newcastle before she sails from that settlement the same is immediately ordered with a Packet received likewise for the Chief and Factors to whom a short Letter was wrote which gave Cover to the above. We advised them of Mr. Dorrills being on board the Stafford, and that Mr. Byfeld intended to proceed to Anjengo very shortly in order to relieve Mr. Bouchier.

THE Letter from the Honble President and Council of Bombay is dated the 6th. November by w^{ch}. they learn that the Prince William was to be dispatched from thence to Great Britain and that the Dragon would be the only Ship sent to this Coast therefore as the Prince William is provided for they have Come to a Resolution to

send home the Salisbury from the Mallabar Coast and she is shortly to come here with the Boscawen. They sent us on the Stafford and Bombay Grab three hundred Thousand Rupees (Rupees 300,000 — —) Advise of Mr. Dorrills proceeding hither to take charge of the Chiefship that his Salary is paid to the 24th. of December and Diet Money to the last of the said Month. They would have us dispatch the Stafford and Bombay Grab with all Convenient Expedition to Anjengo on whom Mr. Byfeld is to take his passage he being appointed Chief of that Settlement and Mr. Bouchier to go to Bombay. We are Ordered to send Mr. Robinson to the Assistance of Anjengo Factory Either on the Stafford or Bombay Grab. YESTERDAY I arrived here from Bombay to the Chiefship of this Place and you shall always find me ready to keep up the Friendship subsisting between your Majesty and my Predecessors hoping that you have the same favourable inclination I am now to acquaint your Majesty that some Moors your Vassalls have sheltered themselves at Balangatta a place under your Jurisdiction who with their Vessells take and plunder all the small Craft belonging to Merchants under the Hoñble Companys protection and as an Instance they lately took out of a Toney bound hence to Anjengo the sum of five hundred Rupees, this I hope your Majesty will take proper Notice of by punishing the thieves.

Instant N.S. was that I judged the Price would be little more or less at about one hundred Rupees the Candy but that we ought for some time let it appear that we would give only Ninety Rupees the Candy and this with a view to let the Country People understand that unless they would dispose of their Pepper at a reasonable Price and in proportion to the quantity produced we would not purchase. Your Erronious way of thinking that I would give no more than Ninety Rupees the Candy for Pepper as likewise that we were resolved not to purchase this season you would have been Convinced to the Contrary had you answered my Letter of the 5th. by which you may plainly see our Design were to buy and therefore it was Convenient for both of us to fix on a Price that ought to be given.

Notwithstanding I wrote you that the new Crop of Pepper might rise to one hundred Rupees yet it did not hinder you from Clearly Communicating to me your thoughts and whether it was better to give more less I am ready to observe what may be agreed on between us in this Affair.

As I do not Choose without Grounds to give Ear to what these Country Fellows tell me, desire you will declare to me whether you have given or ordered to be given directly or indirectly any sum of money on Acco^t. Pepper.

You did well in Confining the Mucquas for going into Codoley River without first obtaining yor liberty as no one ought to go into any of our Rivers without first having permission from the Person to whom they are dependant, but if there is a fault in doing it the Mucquas ought not to suffer as they had a Chit which they thought warrantable the blame lays on them who gave it which so soon as I find out shall punish the Offender and desire therefore you'll release the Mucquas and Toney.

THIS Morning the two Princes arrived in the Barge when the younger visited the Chief who desired the Nombeirs might be sent for to adjust their Differences. His Highness Complained greatly of Boyanores Assuming to himself the Title of King which step disgusted likewise the rest of the Country Powers adding that he was determined to show his Resentment for the same as likewise against Omuttadattu Nombier who assisted at his Coronation for which purpose hoped as the Nombiers and his Family were on such Terms as the General Good required that the Chief would endeavour to prevail with them to pay the fine laid on them for their late disobedience that when those differences were accommodated they might jointly act against the Boyanore. His Highness was assured that on the arrival of the Nombiers suitable means will be taken to bring them to a proper Obedience to the House of Cherrika but it was doubted whether they might be induced to pay the Fine especially at a time when their Assistance was required. He then took his leave being promised that a Letter would be wrote to the King of Colastria concerning these Affairs.

This subject being dropt that of Boyanores late Proceedings was renewed at which the Nombiers expressed their dislike in the warmest Terms his Highness thereupon took the opportunity and acquainted them that if they would join heartily with him to oppose such who might be Adherents to Boyanore he should forget what was passed otherwise they might depend of feeling his utmost Resentment to which the Nombiers made him all the Promises of Assistance they could Urge; The Chief to Ciment this Accommodation made them both sensible it was for the Common Good they should be Friends as a disunion would Certainly give Boyanore time to make Alliances and be prepared against all Attacks whereas if his Highness should now proceed against him it might be attended with success, this the Prince greatly approved as also the Nombiers but the Feast of Biou being at hand the former was obliged to go to Cherrika for keeping it where, as the first step he would in the Presence of the other Country Powers Seize immediately The Effects of Callamadatti Nombier and degrade him from all Titles and Priviledges he before enjoyed for Crowning Boyanore and not only so but declare his Resentment against such who should acknowledge Boyanores assumed Title. After this his Highness promised the Chief to return to Tellicherry as on the 8th. and that on the 10th. he should proceed to Mennaporratu to make the same declaration summoning Cuny Nair to attend as also the Nombiers and that so soon as these Ceremonies were over he should take the necessary steps for showing Boyanore how much his late Proceedings had disgusted him. The Palliarems Ministers were also Present to whom the Prince offered to pay now ten thousand Rupees in part of his Obligation to the Bednure Rajah and to make further Payments at Different times as his Circumstances would permit at which they were not satisfied but said they would relate it to their Master they not being empowered to accept of such an Offer. His Highness Complained greatly of the want of money and seemed to expect that the Honble Company would assist him at their own Cost which he was given to understand must not be expected. February a Duplicate of the 7th. Ultimo also an original of the 20th. Ship Mamoody with our General Books and Papers enclosed they observe our writing the Honble Company Duke of Newcastle that we had rec^d. no Directions for purchasing Cardamoms which they acknowledge to be an omission in them but that we ought to have Contracted as it is an Annual Provision and say that our taking no notice thereof in any of our advices was also an Omission in us and that the least Consideration would have induced us to act in the manner done by the Chief and Factors in the year 1746. ordering us to Contract at the proper time for twelve thousand Pounds for the next year that the quantity of Sandall Wood they intended for the Stafford was two hundred Candies therefore their mentioning three hundred Candies is a Mistake of the Secretarys. That Attacking the Merchants Effects was always esteem'd a great hardship it being prejudicial to their credit but suppose all other means had been first taken the usual ones being formerly mulcting which method they order us to pursue they express a Concern at there being so little reason to expect a Clearance of the Samorine Debt to the Honble Company but that Force must be the last step taken. That they cannot yet say what quantity of Cloth will be provided this season the Weavers being very exorbitant in their demands that their remains of Pepper in Warehouse were only ninety two Candies, nineteen Maunds and three Pounds with nine thousand four hundred ninety three pieces of Cloth.

AGREEABLE to the Resolution of Council under the 1st. Instant the Bengall Rice was this day put up to Publick Outcry but the Price given being very Low the Board agree to deferr the sale to another opportunity.

THIS morning early dispatched the Anjengo Baloon with thirty thousand Rupees the Serjeant of their Command having Directions to proceed by way of Cochin and act in every other shape during his passage agreeable to the orders he may have rec^d. from the Chief and Factors to whom we wrote a short letter advising of the above supply, We acknowledged to be but too sensible of the French their Intentions to have a settlement at Coletchy but what we mentioned to be only Malla-bar reports was in respect to their employing three ships on such Occasion and at this time of the year. I DISPATCH this Putterah purposely to acquaint you that the Governour of Callicut jointly with the Samorines Ministers insists upon our paying Customs on Wax Candles which was never heard of before in this part and what neither French or Portuguese are desired to do on representing to them the unjustness of such demand they had the impudence to tell me that if I would not comply therewith they would endeavour to make me by sending Nairs to the Factory which should they do before I receive your directions I will do all in my Power to turn them back again which I have intimated to them that should an Accident happen they Blame themselves.

I am now to inform you that the Custommasters are got to such a Hight of Impertinence and Vilany that unless they are fed they will not absolutely weigh our Goods and by that means will detain our Vessells which may be of great diservice to the Hon^{ble} Company's Affairs I was obliged this season to keep a Grab twenty four hours on this very Account as also two Munchuas.

In my humble Opinion the best way to proceed will be to send some Gentⁿ. to the Samorine to lay before him the Affronts we have received from his Ministers and Custom Masters as also the impositions lately imposed on us by which means I doubt not but we shall be relived it having been many times intimated to me by his Rajahdores that he should be glad of a Conference with us.

I must beg leave to acquaint you that if some methods are not taken we shall not only be impeded doing Business with the same dispatch as other Nations but be daily leable [sic] to further Affronts which I flatter myself you will find some method to put a stop to.

For these reasons the Board agree not to comply with his request for an Encrease of Force.

To direct Mr. Secker to acquaint us what Grab he means to have been detained twenty four hours and whether this Behaviour proceeds from a change of Custom Masters.

To answer likewise the following Quarics that from thence we may judge whether a Conference is Necessary.

WHETHER the French or Portuguze have ever had a Conference if ever its Expencc and the advantages which might have accrued to either from the same.

Instant advising us of the Samorines Ministers insisting on our paying Customs for all Wax Candles and the means they intend taking in Case you refuse it, should they before this arrives we hope you have had more Prudence than to take the Step you mention which must infallibly involve the Hoñble Company into a long and Expensive Warr which if not attended with success will only render us Contemptable in the Eyes of the other Country Powers besides how absurd it is to imagine that such a handfull of Men you have could withstand the Force of a whole Country if not an opposition, must only and in the destruction of our People. These reasons therefore with what the Hoñble President and Council have been pleased to write us in respect to the Samorine (Copy of which goes enclosed) induce us to direct you will Palliatte this Difference or at least stave off a Rupture if possible which we think may be done by a temperate behaviour, The Chief now writes the samorine on this head which we hope will be attended with success at least so farr as to get time till we may have directions from the Presidency, you mention that the French or Portuguese have not as yet

been called on this appears somewhat extraordinary and must say is but a bad return for the many favours done the present Samorine and his Predecessors, we would have you by no means pay this new Duty neither repell Force by Force but put up with such little Affronts you may receive till we write you further. Pray advise us whether the French or Portuguese have ever had an Interview with the present Samorine and what might have been the expence as its strange they should meet with more indulgence than us.

Pray acquaint us that Grab you was obliged to detain twenty four hour longer than necessary as you represent by the remisness of the Custom Masters formerly they were obliging and why they should be otherwise now is what we cannot judge of these people are won by courtesy but a contrary Behaviour is frequently of ill Consequences especially in a Place where there are no sett Priviledges.

We have now gone thô the several parts of your Letter but cannot conclude without taking notice of its stile which we think may be amended the Expression ill suiting Publick Letters to wit those of Impudence and Vilainy.

To which replied that he was induced to listen to such a proposal as the English with the Prince of Cherrica had frequently distressed him notwithstanding the assistance given by him for preventing the Canarees getting Possession of the Country but being asked whether it was not his own fault from his Adhering to the Interest of the Oden Quilote Family he evaded giving any direct answer, He was then desired to declare whether he would permit the French to settle as intended or not? he denied his having yet given them any Grant for that Purpose and said so long as the English would continue his Friends the French should have no footing in his Country, on which he was promised the Honble Company's Friendship provided he went hand in hand with them and the Prince of Cherrika one of whose Ministers was present, The King of Nelleaserroon then moved for the Chief to stand Mediator in the Cause, between the Bedaure Rajah his Highness and Palliarim to which It was replied that there had been some Injuries done the Honble Company during the late Chiefs time for which satisfaction had been promised before the end of May which being Elapsed and things in the same state there could be no thoughts of entering into the Mediation desired till Redress was obtained which the Princes Ministers said we should in a few days hear of.

that when the French and Boyanore were at War, they at the Solicitation of the then Chief of Tellicherry sided with the latter, That the Fire Arms were as they understood given as Presents but however should act as the Chief might think proper.

RECEIVED this day two Letters from the Hon^{ble} President and Council of Bombay in the one which is duplicate of a Letter dated the 15th. May last (the Original not rec^d. they acknowledge receipt of our advices of the 2^d. April and that they shall reimburse the Cha^s. of the Evidences and Prisoners sent to the President on the Severn, They permitt us to Pay M^r. Hornby the amount Plundered from him on his return from Cochin being Rupees four hundred thirty three and a half but direct this be not esteemed as a proceedent [*sic*] on such like Occasions. They advise they shall want for dispatching of the ships next season 2700 Ca^s. of Pepper in the Purchasing thereof we must have regard to the Hon^{ble} Company's orders. They take notice of the unheard of Prices given for Pepper but as it was an extraordinary Occasion they acquiesce therewith. They advise of their having examined the Books of this Settlement and their making the following Remarks thereon Viz^t. " They observe " that thro^u the store Books ending July 1748 not being closed in time it occasioned " great irregularitys on opening the General ones and direct that the Storekeeper " in future be carefull to Ballance in time that our Accounts thereby may not be " kept back, that for want of his taking the necessary Care in Said Books several " heads were opened in the General ones for very small sums several of which might " have been recovered e'er close of the General ones and what were not should have

“ been wrote off to Proffit and Loss. They observe the sum of Rupees 633. was
 “ wrote off for Biscuit and Fish damaged and spoiled this they hope was not for
 “ want of due care and to which suitable regard must be had on such Occasions.
 “ They take notice of the irregular way of our introducing the Warehousekeepers
 “ and PayM^{rs}. Sales on our Books and that they find their produce were not paid
 “ into the Treasury till more than a year after they were made therefore they direct
 “ they be brought to Account every three Months and the money accordingly to be
 “ paid in and instead of opening the Heads of the several Persons who have charge
 “ of the office to substitute those of Warehousek^r. and PayMaster They observe our

They direct we enquire of Ally Rajah whether he is willing to have his Ambergrease disposed off at one Rupee for four Tolas weight.

Order us to forward the Anjengo and Fort St. David Packets with Expedition and that we return the Express Boat as early as the season will admitt off. In their Original Letter under June without date they acknowledge receipt of the Duplicate of our advices of the 7th. of April and Originals of the 21st. That as Pepper was at such an exorbitant price as 140 Rup^s. P^r. Candy and only 50 Ca^s. procurable we acted write [*sic*] in not contracting for it and direct us to advise them what quantity may be procurable the ensuing season to the southward that they are sensible Pepper at the above Prices can answer at any Markets on India nor indeed in Europe expect [*sic*] on an Emergency as the dispatch of a ship but as we have the Companys orders they need note give us further directions. That as the Prince was unreasonable in his demands we acted right in refusing him assistance on those terms, that they have frequently and particularly under the 6th. of January given their sentiments in regard to our acting as principals in any disputes with the Country Powers. They disapprove of our setting apart One thousand Rupees as a fund for the Familys of deceased soldiers but permit us once for all to give something to the famillies of deceased soldiers who have behaved gallantly and likewise if Covenant or other European servants Widows who are left real objects of Charity are willing to go to England in such Case to allow each of them Forty pounds sterling to pay for their passage and provide necessarys for their Voyage. They permit us to allow such Invalids worn out by long service disabled in Battle or otherwise in doing their Duty half pay or something more according to their merit or Circumstance's

That by the Honble Company's regulations the Military's Captains were to have the payment of their own Companies but the same giving them to large Latitude to make what stopages they please they have diviated therefrom at the Presidency directing us to do the same and that the Military PayM^r. pay each Company taking care the soldiers be not oppressed. They advise of having Credited us a hundred Rupees advanced to the new recruits sent on the Stafford and Bombay Grab but at the same time take notice of Captain Mostyn having wrote to Bombay of his having likewise advanced them a hundred Rupees they likewise mention their having credited us Rupees six hundred Ninety and seventy seven reas for provisions supplied them and the Detachments. They inform us that our rectified Invoice of Arms & by Syren and Louisa is still erroneous. They enclose us an Account of Provisions supplied Seepoys belonging to this settlement directing us to give them due Credit for the amount. They take notice that the Account of Provisions supplied the Detachments sent to Syren and Louisa is very difficient only specifying the quantities without the Price therefore direct us to send a rectified one, They enjoin us in a very particular manner to send them by the first Conveyance and by every conveyance a Calculate of Quick Stock drawn out conformable to the Honble Company commands of the 30th. of August last as likewise that we must transmit one by every Conveyance to the Honble Company They write that in their advices of the 24th. April they took notice of our great neglect in not transmitting them our Diary for last year and thô two ships have arrived them since they sent these advices yet we still have omitted sending them however they hope we shall send them by the Britannia. They advise of the arrival of the Walpole Cap^t. Benjamin Lowe Mess^{rs}. Holmes Griffith and Lowe supracargoes having lost their Passage to Juddah. They enclose duplicate Paragraphs of the Honble Companys Commands to Lapwing.

Waters (the Present and then PayM^r.) desires the General Books for last year may be produced which being accordingly done the Board perceive his sales were paid in at the end of the year as formerly practised therefore the Complaints made can only relate to the Warehousek^r. of which its agreed to advise the Presidency by the first Conveyance and the Warehousek^r. and PayM^r. are directed to pay their sales every three Months and dispose of nothing but for ready money.

Remarks being made by our superiors of the Interest allowed on the late M^r. Rawdons Cardamum Contract the Warehouse Accounts were called for where by its observed the Cardamums were delivered into Warehouse in January and that Interest was allowed till March and on referrence had to Consultation under 31st.
