Letters from Ganjam. the arrival there of the Princess Augusta in her way to the Bay, and of a Sloop from Junk Ceyloan, who had spoke with our three China Ships in the Streights of Malacca, enclosing his monthly Accounts for Sep: Oct: & Nov: and acquainting us that as the Country was pretty quiet he should immediately set about his Investment.

N^o. 2 From Mr. Rob^t. Goodere at Vizagapatam of the 8: Ult^o. acknowledg- from Vizagapatam. ing the receipt of ours of the 22^d. Oct^r. with the second Bill of Exchange inclosed, forwarding to us a Packet from Ganjam & inclosing Duplicate of his last with Diaries and Monthly Accounts for October.

N^o. 3 From Mr. John Andrews Resid^t. at Ganjam of the 29: Ult^o. acquaint- from Ganjam. ing us the Country was now pretty easy which occasioned a considerable demand for Europe Goods in those parts, inclosing an Indent for Sundries wanted there, that the quantity of Cloth he had on hand was so small, He did not think it worth the sending but had it been more considerable, a Report Current at that place of the Enemies Ships being off Ceyloan would have prevented his risquing it, without orders from Us.

N^o. 4 From the President & Council of Bombay of the 28 : Nov : inclosing Duplicate of theirs of the 15th. Oct^r. and acknowledging the receipt of ours of the 9 : & 21 : Sep^r. and 4 : Oct; the former of which Mr. Wake had before advised the President with having received under the 28 : Oct : and at the same time of the arrival of the Stretham and Durrington at that place; Acquainting us that the Essex sailed the 6th. Nov : for Great Britain as did the Orford the 23^d. to fill up on the Malabar Coast; With relation to Coja Sultan's affair, that although we may be well assured of his not contesting the Attachment of the money in the President's hands yet they wish such a declaration had been signed by him, Nevertheless as six months (the usual time allowed for the Defendant to make Exceptions) expired that day, they should petition the Mayor's Court for a decree in the Compy's favour, That the City of Surat was still in Confusion, occasioned by a Contest between Meah Atchund and Suffdar Cann for the Governm^t. Desiring us, that as our People were returned from the Camp we would transmit a List of such Persons belonging to that Presidency as chose their half pay to be made good to their Families as likewise an account of what is due to the detachment sent thither on His Majesty's Ship Winchester, as for want thereof they could not make any Payments on either of those accounts and Advising us that they had given directions to their Subordinates to fill up any of our Hon^{ble} Masters Ships we might send round, lest they should be disappointed.

A Letter from Mr. Croke read requesting permission to build again upon the same spot His House stood on before being distant from the Fort 1600 Yards and pulled down on account of Dead Man's Battery being erected, which is now demolished, the same is AGREED to be referred to Major Lawrence & Cap^t. De La Vaux and that there be Pillars placed at what distance the Inhabitants may be allowed to build. A Lt^re from M. Croke. his req^t. refer'd to Maj. Lawrence & Captain Delavaux.

The Warehousekeeper reports a Deficiency in the Pepper by the Hawke Sloop from Tellicherry of three thousand five hundred and Eleven Pounds 3511 which the Captain having been asked the reason of answered that as it was shot loose in the hold amongst the ballast it must have intermixed therewith, AGREED that when she sails for the Bay we acquaint the Gentlemen there with such deficiency that they may demand the same, and the Master having requested an advance of Three hundred 300 Rupees for the use of the Vessel the Storekeeper is ordered to pay it him; And this Vessel with the Fort William being to sail in two or three days, AGREED to send on them the detachment we received from Bengal and that fifteen Chests of Treasure go on the former and the same quantity by the latter as by the Pelham's arrival we are well supplied with Cash, and also Fifteen more by the Griffin who will sail in four or five days. Linga Chitty Shroff acquainting the Board that the 30 Thirty Chests of Silver he has received to be coined into Rupees, imported by the Tartar are called New Pillar Doll^s. and 4dw^b: worse than standard in fineness, agreed that out of Ten Chests we take Ten 10 Dollars each as Musters, half of which to be sent for England by the Ships now under dispatches and part of the remainder to Bombay as there is an Assay Master at that place And Linga Chitty offering to sign an Obligation to abide by the fineness it shall be proved to be of in England AGREED that we let him receive the same at that rate. Linga Chittee reports the Silver by Tartar to be worse than Standd. Musters of it to be sent for Tryal to England & Bombay.

The Cloth reported by the Wareh^o.kr. to be damaged by the White Ants & Rats having been surveyed by the Board and there being found 603 pieces of Long Cloth which may be torn into Salampores & 57 P^s: Long Cloth & 506 Salampores only fit for Wrappers AGREED that they be put to that use and 19 p^s. A Letter from Mr. Hyde Parker reflecting on the Proceedings of the Court of Enquiry, & desiring to be sent to Europe.

A Letter from Mr. Hyde Parker read settg. forth his having been sent for by Mr. Cope, by Major Lawrence^s. Directions, who acquainted him with the Sentiments of a Court of Enquiry which was lately held upon him, by which he found the Case had been very Concisely handled, and he thinks several material Circumstances omitted, which gave a very different turn to the matter than what would appear from the Proceedings in the Court, which induc'd him to Request the Minutes to which he was Answered, that could not be allow'd him. Wherefore as he did not observe therein mention'd, two material Evidency's, He intimated the same to Mr. Cope, who then desir'd him to let alone the Papers, & proceeded to acquaint him, that he would have a Monthly Allowance made him for his Subsistence till the Hoñble Company's pleasure should be known regarding him. But as he should not be only Self Condemn'd, but by his Friends & all impartial Judges, to Submit to a Precarious Allowance here when so hard a Charge is Exhibited home against him without being Personal to Vindicate himself. He therefore Requests he may be permitted to take a Copy of the Original Minutes, and to be sent Home by the first Ship. As the Court of Enquiry upon Mr. Parker was held before the Receipt of the Regulations lately arrived from England, when he was judged Unworthy of bearing a Commission, The Board therefore don't think proper to take any further Cognizance of this Affair, and only agree that he be sent to Europe by the first Ship agreeable to his Request.

The Military Regulations lately received from Our Hoñble Masters by the Pelham, being now Seriously Considered, 'Its AGREED & ORDERED that they be immediately put in Execution, and that the Infantry be formd into Seven Company's, that the Command of the Grenadier Company be given to Lieutenant John Dalton late of the Independants, who promises to engage the Company of Grenadiers to which he belong'd to enter into the Company's Service as soon as General Boscawen shall grant them Liberty for so doing, and Major Lawrence Recommending Cap^t. Lieut^t. James Cope and Ensign John Clarke for Captain's, and to have the other two Company's Lieut^t. Peter Love to be Captain at Vizagapatam, Ensign Daniel Murray to be Captain Lieutenant. Ensigns John Turnbull, William Keene, Robert Clive, Edmund Maskelyne, Phillip Bulkley, Benjamin Pigou, Thomas Greenville and John Grant for to be Lieutenants; the same is Agreed to and Commission's accordingly Ordered to be drawn out immediately and Dated the 1st. of next Month. The Major likewise being of Opinion that it is absolutely necessary to continue some Topasses in the Service (notwithstanding it is our Hoñble Masters Orders to dismiss them) to do the Garrison Duty in the Day time, which in the hot Season is too much for the Europeans to undergo; the Board entirely concurs with him therein; and as the Deduction from their Pay for their Cloathing will be equal to that of the Europeans, the Major therefore Recommends it to the Board to have their Pay rais'd Also in proportion to that of the Europeans, which is also Agreed to, and He is desired to keep as many as he judges proper, and it is ORDERED that the aforesaid Resolutions be put in Practice the 1st. of next Month.

A Letter from the Reverend Mr. Fordyce. read as Enter'd hereafter, setting forth that it was never his Intention to trouble the Board with the Affair between Mr. Clive and him, and that he only mention'd it to the Governour and Major Lawrence, as he thinks their knowing it, may be Conducive to favour a further Prosecution of Mr. Clive and his Accomplices apprehending there is no proper Court of Judicature in these Parts to try it, however as it is their Order's, he shall attend at the appointed Time. The Gentlemen on hearing the Contents of this Letter, are a good deal surpriz'd that Mr. Fordyce should now say, he never intended to trouble them with the Affair, as all his Conduct hitherto, so Evidently Evince the Falsity of such an Assertion, For on the 16 or 17th. Ultimo, he waited on the President, and Strenuously desired that the Affair might be heard before him and the Gentlemen of Council, saying y^t. that if such Things were taken no notice of, it might be of Pernicious Consequence, to which the Governour return'd h[...] for Answer that he was then very busy in Dispatching the Porto Bello for Europe, and had not time to examine his Complaint, but that when she was Sail'd there should be a Consultation held on purpose (Major Lawrence & Mr. Bouch[er] were present at the greatest part of this discourse). On the [...] following being Sunday the Governour sent for him between the hours of 8 & 10. in the Forenoon, and spoke to him in words to this Effect. You have made a Complaint to me concerning your being Assaulted by Ensign Clive, set forth t[he] same in writing, addressing it to me and the Council, and it shall be examin'd into; to which Mr. Fordyce replied he would, and ask'd if it must be ready against next day, but the Governour told him there was no occasion for that, as they were still busy in dispatching the Porto Bello. From these Circumstances it appears pretty plain that Mr. Fordyce (notwithstanding what he says in his Letter.) did fully intend to bring this Affair before the Board, and that he had altered his mind; But what were his reasons for so doing are but imperfectly known; however the Board have been Credibly inform'd that the Gentlemen he design'd for his Evidency's, desir'd him to excuse their appearance, telling him that what they could say upon the Occasion, would not be much to his advantage; as to their knowledge he had not been wanting to asperse the Characters of most of the Hoñble Board, as also of several other Persons, and had made use of many Expressions very unbecoming a Man of his Function, and as Mr. Fordyce might possibly be conscious of the truth of this, and of the bad light he must consequently appear in if the Affair was examin'd to the bottom; 'tis no wonder he should chuse to decline it, and to refer the Prosecution of [...] to Europe, where he would not Labour under the Disadvantage of having his Character so thoroughly known. But Mr. Clive being aware of the great Advantage Mr. Fordyce would have in accusing him in his absence, Requests the Board would be pleas'd to bring the matter to a hearing before them, in order that the same may appear upon our Records for his Justification. In Compliance with which Request 'Its AGREED to make the best enquiry we can into this Affair, and to that end Mr. Fordyce is now call'd before the Board, and desir'd to acquaint them with the particulars of the Assault he says Mr. Clive made upon him, whereupon he delivers into the Secretary's hand a Protest with a Pagoda, desiring the same may be enter'd after this Consultation, and that he may have an Attested Copy of it. which Protest being read sets forth That as Mr. Clive has desir'd that the Violence and Riot should be heard an[d] try'd here before the Hoñble the Governour & Council, in & with a Sinister vein of eluding the just sentence of the Law usually Inflicted in such Criminal Cases, by alledging that he has already been try'd here, or such Subterfuge & Evasion and that therefore he cannot be try'd a second time any w[here] else; He (Mr. Francis Fordyce) therefore Protests against and forbids this Cause to be heard or try'd, directly or indirectly before the Hoñble Board, for special reasons he need not mention, they being well known. The Board having directed it to be enter'd and an Attested Copy to be delivered to Mr. Fordyce, then ask'd him if he disputed their Authority, to which he gave them no direct answer, but being ask'd the same a second time, he Rudely replied he would answer no Question's, and so left the Room abruptly, which so extraordinary Behaviour being taken into Consideration the Gentlemen are Unanimously of Opinion, that as it is Evident he disputes their Authority, and for his Insolent Behaviour, he is no longer worthy to be entertain'd in the Service of the Hoñble Company,

from which 'Tis AGREED he be dismiss'd and the Secretary is ORDERED to acquaint him therewith, & that his allowances will cease from this day. Then the Gentlemen directed Mr. Clive to be call'd in, as also Mess^{rs}. Dalton & Worth, whom Mr. Fordyce in his Protest accuses of being his Accomplices, and the said Protest being read to them, Mr. Clive is desired to acquaint the Board with the particulars of the Affair, when he replied as follows.

THAT being at Dinner with Mess^{rs}. Dalton & Worth on or about the 16th. day of February at Bandipollam, they told him Mr. Fordyce had said to a Gentleman in Public Compy that he was a Scoundrel and a Coward, and that he had shook his Cane over him in the presence of Mr. Levy Moses, Mr. Clive further says that some time before this, he had been inform'd by Cap^t. Cope that Mr. Fordyce did in Conversation with him threaten to break every Bone in his Skin, and he says that these repeated abuses so irritated him that he could not forbear on meeting Mr. Fordyce in Cuddalore, to reproach him with his Behaviour, which he told him was so injurious he could bear it no longer, and thereupon struck him two or three times with his Cane, which at last Mr. Fordyce return'd and then clos'd in with him, but that they were presently parted by Captain Lucas who happen'd to be by. Mr. Clive further Observes that he is not the only Person who has been abus'd and Calumniated by Mr. Fordyce, who had also aspers'd the Character of Mr. Joseph Fowke, by saying he was a dark designing Villain, that he would Slit his Nose the first time he met him, and that he had knock'd him under the Table at the Govern^{rs}. He further says Mr. Fordyce had told Cap^t. Dalton at Mr. Belsches's that if every body would discourse the Governour in the manner he had done, it would alter Affairs greatly, and that he had talk'd to him till he made him quake or shake in his Shoes, or words to that effect. Mr. Clive also says Mr. Lindsay told him he had heard Mr. Fordyce say that Mr. Bulkley was a Scoundrel and a Coward, and that he had shook his Cane at him as he had done at Mr. Clive. Mr. Clive further says he threatend to thrash Mr. Bouchier, and that he had declar'd to several People, he had taken away Gentlemen's Swords before now, and would pull of his Canonicals at any time to do himself Justice, and lastly Mr. Clive says Mr. Lennox told him that Mr. Fordyce was generally shunn'd & detested both at St. Helena and the West Coast on Account of his meddling Disposition, w^{ch}. rendered him disagreeable and Obnoxious to every One.

ROBERT CLIVE.

CAPTAIN DALTON being ask'd what he has to say in Answer to Mr. Fordyces Allegation's against him in his Protest, reply's. That Mr. Rait came to dine with him at Bandipollam the day the Affair happend, and then told him that he had heard Mr. Fordyce say, he had call'd Mr. Clive a Scoundrel and Rascall and had shook a Cane over him; which Report he esteeming very injurious to the Character of an Officer, he thought he could do no less (as a Friendship Subsisted betwe[en] Mr. Clive and him.) than acquaint him of it, in Order to give [him] an Opportunity to Vindicate his Reputation. That accordingly he did tell Mr. Clive having first let Mr. Rait know the use [he] intended to make of his Information. Captain Dalton further says that Mr. Worth and he going that Evening to Cuddalore [in] a Chaise saw Mr. Fordyce, and Mr. Clive Cudgelling each other, [in] the Street, whereupon they both jump'd out in Order to part the[m] but that it was done before they came up by Cap^t. Lucas, who was in Company with Mr. Fordyce all the time; and this is all he knows of the matter.

BEFORE Cap^t. Dalton withdrew it being ask'd of him if he had ever heard Mr. Fordyce mention he had spoke to y^e. Governour in the manner as related by Mr. Clive, he replied he had, and would give it upon his Oath, whereupon being Sworn he spoke as Follows. That being one day at Mr. Belsches's, though he does not particularly recollect what day; he heard Mr. Fordyce say That if every body

would talk to Mr. Floyer in the manner he had done, it would alter the face of Affairs greatly, for he had done it till he had made him Quake or shake in his Shoes, or something to that Effect.

Dalton the day the Affair happen'd, where was also Mr. Thomas Rait, who told them what he had heard Mr. Fordyce say in regard to Mr. Clive Viz^t. that he was a Scoundrel & a Rascall, and that he had shook a Cane over him, upon which Cap^t. Dalton replied that as such Reports were very prejudicial to the Character of an Officer, he thought Mr. Clive should be acquainted thereof that he might [...] tell him of it, which he accordingly did, and in the Evening tak[ing] a turn out in the Chaise with Captain Dalton, which he frequently did, in passing through one of the Streets in Cuddalore they saw Mr. Clive and Mr. Fordyce engaging each other with Can[e] whereupon they immediately jump'd out with an Intention to sepearate them, but before they reached them Cap^t. Lucas had done [it] who was in Mr. Fordyce's Company all the time, and this is all he can tell of the matter.

Mr. Thomas Rait being call'd upon by Lieutenant Clive and being regularly Sworn to declare whatever he knew of [the] Difference between him and the Rev^d. Mr. Francis Fordyce; deposeth that himself was the Person who acquainted Mess^{rs}. Dalton & Worth that Mr. Fordyce had aspersed Mr. Clive's Character and that he (Mr. Rait) being in Company with Mr. Fordyce sometime ago, Mr. Fordyce had told him, that being informd Mr. Clive had reported something of him to his prejudice, he (Mr. Fordyce) went to Bandipollam in search of Mr. Clive, where having met and taxd him with what he had said of him, and Mr. Clive making him some frivolous Answer, he had shook his Rattan at him, and call'd him a Scoundrel, a Villain, and a Rascall. & Mr. Rait further saith that upon his asking Mr. Fordyce whether he had said all this to Mr. Clive's Face, he told him he had, & that Mr. Levy Moses was present at the same time.

Mr. Fordyce [and] Lieutenant Clive, Deposeth, That a short time after his [re]turning from the Expedition against Pondicherry, he met [Rev^d.] Mr. Fordyce going out of the Gate of the Fort leading to the [...]ter side, who ask'd him in a short manner whether he h[ad] heard any thing of his, the Reverend Mr. Fordyce's speaking [...] Scandalous thing concerning the Behaviour of the Compa[ny] Troops before Pondicherry, who answer'd he had heard [...] thing from several People, but all Scandals of that kin[d] so small an Effect with him, that he never thought it [...] Memory. That then the Rev^d. Mr. Fordyce ask'd him whether he (Cap^t. Cope) had ever heard him speak disrespectfully of the Company's Troops, who replied he never did whereupon Mr. Fordyce said he knew Clive had been one of them that were very busy in spreading this Report abroad, and did he not think him beneath his notice, he would break every Bone in his Skin and of half a Dozen more of them. That Mr. Fordyce had but just finish'd performing Divine Service when this Conversation happen'd, whose Ire seeming so ill tim'd, Captain Cope

Major Lawrence acquaints the Board that at the Request of Mess^{rs}. Dalton & Worth, (whom the Rev^d. Mr. Fordyce accuses of being Accomplices in the Assault made on him by Mr. Clive.) he had desired the Favour of Captain Lucas, who happen'd to be a Spectator of that Encounter, to appear here this day in order to relate what he knew concerning it, But that Capt. Lucas being too much Indispos'd to come abroad had wrote him a Letter (as enter'd hereafter) which he now lays before the Board and it being read sets forth, That to his knowledge Mess^{rs}. Dalton & Worth were noways concern'd in the Assault, they being at some distance in a Chaise at the time of its Commencement, and that as soon as they came up they endeavour'd to part them as he had done before, nor does he remember there was a blow struck on either side after their Arrival.

a Letter from Capt. Lucas to Majr. Lawrence concerning the Affair between Mr. Clive and Mr. Fordyce.

The President thinking it proper to shew how little regard Mr. Fordyce had to Veracity in the Several Impertinent Speeches he has utter'd concerning him, (as mention'd in the Deposition's of Mess^{rs}. Dalton and Clive &c^a.) now delivers in a Declaration, which is Ordered to be enter'd hereafter, and the several Circumstances of Mr. Fordyces behaviour therein Recited, seem to Corroborate the Character he has generally bore, of being a meddling, Mischevious Person.

The Presidents delivers in Declaration (sic) concerning Mr. Fordyce.

The Investment for the ensuing Year being now under Consideration, it is observed that the Merchants who engagd therein last year, had performd their Agreements very ill; for although at the time of Contracting they had readily promis'd to provide very good Cloth for the Price agreed upon yet what they brought in was by no means answerable thereto, and notwithstanding towards the latter end of the year they obligd us to raise the prices, the Improvement they have made in the Manufacture [*sic*] is still very trifling, therefore to encourage them to exert themselves, and that we may this year meet with no disappointment in the Investment (w^{ch}. is almost unavoidable if we press the Merchants to engage upon low Terms) 'tis AGREED to allow them the same Prices as were given in the year 1743/4 as the Cloth then was very good Viz^t.

and though these Prices are somewhat higher than have been given within this year or two, yet for less we cannot expect they will supply us with what is good, especially as there is now a prospect of Peace, and of having the French for Competitors [*sic*], who have already spread a Report that they expect large Supply's of Money this year from Europe, & intend to enter upon a large Investment, whereupon the President acquainting the Board that he had Ordered the several Merchants to attend here today, they are now call'd in, and told that as they had Urg'd the lowness of the Prices for the Disappointments we had suffer'd last year, by their bringing in, bad Cloth, we had now thought proper to allow them as the above for the different Sorts, provided they would Engage it should be as good as the Musters upon the Table, and for what did not come up thereto, proportionable Abatements should be made, to which they immediately Consented, and being ask'd what number of Bales they should be able to provide by September, they said that as they had been so much out in their Calculation last year, they would not pretend to name any particular number, but we might be assured they would endeavour to get as many as possible, and so withdrew.

THE DECLARATION OF CHARLES FLOYER ESQ^R. GOVERNOUR OF FORT ST. DAVID.

As to what is represented by Mr. Clive that Mess^{rs}. Dalton & Worth should tell him that Mr. Fordyce should say he had knock'd Mr. Fowke under the Table at my House, I declare I know nothing of the matter, & I cannot recollect that those two Gentlemen had ever any high words in my presence at the Fort House, and further as to Mr. Dalton's Declaration that Mr. Fordyce should say at Mr. Belsches as set forth in these words. "That if every Person would talk to the Governour as he had done, it would alter Affairs greatly, and that he had talk'd to him, till he had made him quake or shake in his Shoes, or something to that Effect." In answer thereto I must reply that I gave Mr. Fordyce a General Invitation to my Table, but he often behav'd himself so rudely at it, that I was oblig'd more than once to reprimand him for it which he not regarding, but on returning from the Camp from before Pondicherry in the Month of August or Sept where he had been for some days, being at my Table in Company with several Gentlemen at Supper, his discourse was chiefly on the Cowardice and bad Behaviour of some of the Military in the Company's pay. I think he said it of the Topasses, upon which I desired him to forbear such discourse, that it did not concern him, but he still continued the same, upon which I soon after rose from Table & the Company going away, I called Mr. Fordyce & forbid him in future coming to my Table as I found he could not behave with Decency at it. I beleive I might talk to him with some warmth, but not so far as he impertinently mention's as to make me quake or shake in my Shoes.

The President acquaints the Board that about two Months past he was Solicited by Messages from Sahajee MahaRajah the Right and Lawfull King of Tanjour, who had been deprived of such his Right about Seven years ago by an Illegitimate Brother, he likewise made Application to General Boscawen in the same manner, acquainting him He had Affairs of great Consequence to Impart to Us, Whereupon it was Agreed between Gen^l. Boscawen, himself, and Mr. Prince to Admit him into our Bounds, and further to hear what he had to propose to us. His Request being granted he came to the Garden House in Company with his Uncle, when after speaking much on the Occasion by way of setting forth the Injustice that had been done him by his Illegitimate Brother taking Possession of the Kingdom of Tanjour, of which he as true & Lawfull Heir had an indisputable Right to, and then requested we would assist him in regaining his Kingdom, which he assur'd Us was then to be effected with little Difficulty, he having received such assurances both by Letters and Messages from the Principle Men & Officers at Tanjour, that in case he could by any means raise a Body of Forces, and March that way they would certainly Join with him, and put him in Possession of his just Right, without the Effusion of Blood. These Circumstances being duely Considered by General Boscawen the President and Mr. Richard Prince, it appeared to them that great Advantages might be made in behalf of the Hoñble Company, by granting to him the Assistance he desired, which the easier might be done at this time, having so large a Body of His Majesty's Forces now in Garrison, and the risque but small in Comparison to the Benefits that might be gain'd on the Occasion. But to come to particulars with him relating thereto, it was ask'd of the dethron'd King what Retaliation he would make to the Hoñble Company if such Assistance was given him, as might enable him to regain his Right, upon which he made the offer of giving up, and making sure to them the Fort of Deva Cota about Eleven Leagues from this Place Southward, and Thirty from Tanjour, with as much Land round it as would at least bring in yearly to the Honble Company, Ten or Twelve thousand Pagodas; Having thus talkd on the Subject for some time, he was told this Affair would be taken into further Consideration, upon which y^e. Conference broke up: But before the King withdrew he further requested the Loan of a Sum of Money from the Hoñble Company, to enable him to raise Forces in the Country, to which it was likewise Answer'd it should be Consider'd on.

The President lays before the Board his Inducements to the Tanjour Expedition in favour of Sahajee Maha Raja, and his proceedings in that Affair.

The President also acquaints the Board that he with Mr. Prince frequently held Conferences with General Boscawen on this Affair, and it appearing to them that the [sic] being put in Possession of the Fort of Deva Cota with the Lands adjoining thereto annually producing to the Hoñ Company, the amount of Ten or Twelve thousand Pagodas the Greatest part of the Country thereabouts being very fruitfull in Grain, and some with Wood in abundance, an Article much wanted here, and therefore very Advantageous to the Hoñble Company, besides which there is a River

from the Sea running round the Fort, at present Capable of receiveing only small Vessells, but might be made fit to receive larger; this alone would be of great Service to the Company, there being much want of such a Conveniency on this Coast. The Affair being taken into Consideration, and due Weight given to the beforemention'd Circumstances, It was Agreed on by General Boscawen, the President and Mr. Prince to grant the Dethron'd King the Assistance he desired, provided he entered into an Obligation to deliver up as before mention'd to the Hon^{ble}. Company for ever the Fort of Deva Cota, and the Lands adjoining thereto as abovemention'd, in Case he was put in Possession of the Kingdom of Tanjour, and further to pay the whole Charge of the Expedition if he Succeeded therein.

Major Lawrence being made acquainted with what had pass'd in this Affair, approved thereof, he was likewise desired by the President to meet in a private Conference with General Boscawen and Mr. Prince, in Order to a final Determination on the Subject in hand, When it was Agreed upon to assist the Dethroned King (it appearing so much to the Hon^{ble} Companys Advantage), and to send by Land two Companys of Foot. Fifty European Horse, all the Black Horse, and about Six hundred Seapoys, & General Boscawen to send Assistance by Sea. The Hon^{ble} Company's Forces were Ordered to be got ready with the utmost despatch. The Agreement or Obligation to the Hon^{ble} Company being Sign'd by the Dethron'd King and approved of. It was thereupon Agreed to advance him on the Honourable Compys Account, Five thousand, five hundred (5500) Pagodas in Order to enable him to raise Forces in the Country.

As the greater the Secrecy the more to Advantage is the design of Expeditions of this nature brought to perfection, of which the President does not in the least doubt but the rest of the Gentlemen of the Board will join with him in the same Opinion, and approve of the methods taken therein, and now acquaints them that the Forces abovemention'd began their March yesterday morning early, & that the King's Forces will prepare to Embark on board such Ships as General Boscawen may please to appoint tomorrow or the next day at farthest.

Upon reading the above, the President Observing that the Gentlemen of Council, that had not been till this time acquainted of the above Expedition disapprovd of the Proceedings, He put the Question to them, & further Ask'd their Opinion about carrying it on, as our Troops were Ten Miles on their way, and our Credit somewhat at Stake, as well as the certain Loss of the Money already Advanc'd in Case the Troops were recall'd. Mess^{rs}. Croke & Westcott dissented from the whole Proceedings, but Mess^{rs}. Holt and Wynch agreed as the Expedition had been already sett on foot, it was better to proceed on it; and the President promis'd the Board, the same should be conducted with as small an Expence to the Company as possible, and that he would from time to time acquaint them with every thing material that happened.

I dissent from this Enterprize as I fear it may prove of bad consequence.

February, before he received which he took upon him to send us the Bales left by the Winchelsea, and had it arrived sooner, he cou'd have sent us but very few of his Cloth, as what the Merch^{ts}. have brought in since his arrival, has been so bad that the greatest part of it he has return'd upon their hands; that they promise to behave better, and bring in a large Quantity by December; of which as soon as he can have any hopes, he will not fail to advise us Inclosing Duplicate Letters, Invoices, & Second Bills of Lading for the Goods sent us by Winchelsea and Phoenix, as also an additional Indent for such Things as were Omitted in his last, and which he hopes we will Comply with.

A Letter from Mr. Hyde Parker read dated the 9th. Inst^t. which sets forth, his having been upwards of two Months without any Subsistence, and the necessity he has been reduc'd to for want of it. Referring to the Boards consideration If he was represented above a year past unworthy of Command. If it would not have been necessary to have enquir'd into the truth of the Report, and if found deserving then Suspended, and not had since committed to his Charge several Posts of Trust, which Convinces that there was no Veracity in what was Alledged against him, particularly of his Behaviour on board the Bombay Castle. That the Occasion of his troubling the Board at present was only to acquaint them with his present necessitous State, and to request they will please to Grant him a Copy of the Charge against him before he is sent to Europe. The same being Considered, as to what he Alledges of having had the Command of some Posts of Consequence, Maj^r. Lawrence says is very true, but only as it came to his tour of Duty, and not on Account of any particular merit in him as he seems to imagine, which the Board are well convinc'd. he is not the least Endow'd with, but on the Contrary is a very worthless Person, whose Behaviour almost ever since he has been here, has been extremely bad, as he is much given to Drunkenness, and had he been treated according to his Deserts, would long since have been rendered incapable of serving the Honble Company in Capacity of an Officer. But the Recommendation of the Honble Court of Directors for him to be advanced to the first vacant Company, has been the Reason why he has had more favour shewn him than he was worthy of, which by his late Flagrant Behaviour he has entirely Forfeited, and the Steps taken concerning him by the Court of Enquiry; the Board agree are very just, and leave it to Major Lawrence to let him have a Copy of the Charge against him or not, as he thinks most proper, being unacquainted whether it is usual in such Cases.

The President lays before the Board two Letters from Cap^t. James Cope to Major Lawrence dated Yesterday, in which he acquaints him that about 5, o Clock in the Morning, he pass'd Caldron River, and after having March'd about two Miles came to Action with the Enemy in which he had one of his Feildpeices disabled & expended much Ammunition, and finding upon every Cessation that the Enemy made a fresh Shew of Attack, it prevented his first Design of giving them a Fire, by which he was in hopes to have been enabled to have proceeded on his March, and having frequent Complaints from the Train of the danger of wanting Ammunition, fresh Demands from all sorts of Peons, who would expend a Magazine of Ammunition without doing any good. A second Cannon being also rendered unservicable, from their being on a peice of Ground they could in no manner cover or Secure a Communication, so as to receive fresh Supplys of Stores; from the knowledge of their loose Shott being of mix'd Sizes, which they had then no time to Sort, nor Timber to make new Trains, One being broke short off, and the other Split through by Firing. He therefore ask'd the Opinion of his Officers, who Concurr'd with him that it would be highly prudent to repass the River, and Secure themselves, till they received fresh Ammunition, as otherwise they would be continually harrass'd by the Horse, upon which they immediately Retreated, and Encamp'd between the old & new Caldron Rivers; but upon Observing the Enemy were moveing & seem'd to endeavour to Gain the Passage between us & them, They fir'd two peices of Cannon at them Several times, in doing which another Carraige [sic] broke, so that he is now Reduc'd to only one Cannon and Howit, And upon receiveing Intelligence that they were gone further back, and bent their old Course to gain their Passage, As He run a great Risque of being perpetually Alarm'd by them, and of having his Supplys intercepted, he had resolv'd to move three Miles backward and take Possession of a good Tope, where he designs Fortifying himself and waiting for further Orders, That he is of Opinion they should be Strengthen'd with Two hundred Europeans & have but few Peons who are of no manner of Service, That they should have more Expert Fellows to work the Guns, and a large Stock of Artillery Ammunition. Which Letters the President acquaints the Board he has shew'd to Gen^l. Boscawen, who gave it as his Opinion that we should by no means recall Captain Cope, but order him to proceed on the Expedition, and he would furnish us with Men and Feild peices to send him; and therefore the President now asks the Sentiments of the Board thereupon. When the several Members who Consented to its first being Carried on, now likewise Approve of what General Boscawen has said, concerning 'its being Prosecuted, upon which 'Its therefore ORDERED that the necessary Supplys to be sent Cap^t. Cope, be got ready with all Expedition.

The President acqts. the Board with the further Proceeding's of the Troops on ye. Tanjour Expedition.

Supplys to be got ready to send them with all Expedition.

The President acquaints the Board, that some Days past having sent a Note to Mr. Holt to release a Black Fellow, that was Confind in the Choultry Prison at Cuddalore, he had paid no regard thereto, but wrote him an Impertinent Answer, which is now produc'd to the Board wherein he says " He positively will not Release him till he had a hearing from the Gentlemen Justices." and which the President esteeming as a very great Indignity offered to his Station. He therefore desires Mr. Holt may be remov'd from his present Employment of Sea and Land Customor of Cuddalore, & appointed to some Post on this side. The same being taken into Consideration, as the Board are of Opinion, the President has a Priveledge of releasing any Persons that have been guilty of Petty Offences, they therefore think Mr. Holt has treated him in a manner very unbecoming his Station, and thereupon

The President lays before the Board several Letters he has lately received from one Hodjee Addee an Emminent Moorman at Arcot, which being read, sett forth, that he has been along while reñdring the English all the good Services in his power, for which hitherto they have never made him the least Acknowledgement, & being now reduc'd to very Indigent Circumstances, he therefore hopes they will think of his past Services, & grant him something to assist him. N^o. 34 From the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort Marlborough dated the 30th. Jañry Acknowledges [sic] the Receipt of our Letter to them of the 13th. December, and acquaints us with the Mortality, that has been Occasion'd on the Island of Sumatra by the small Pox amongst all sorts of People, the Consequences of which has proved very prejudicial to our Hoñble Masters Investm^{ts}. of Pepper, which decreased greatly last Season, and as the Disease still spreads both to the Northward & Southward they are very apprehensive they shall not be able to get a Sufficient Quantity only to comply with the next Store Ship's Charter Party Tonnage; further Advising us of a most cruell & inhuman Massacre committed by the Dutch at Senkell, on the Crews of two Proes belonging to their Place to the number of Thirty Seven Persons the Cargoes of which with the Vessells they seiz'd on without having the least regard to the Passes given by Them: w^{ch}. upon being produc'd they immediately with the utmost Disdain tore to peices. That they had sued for Satisfaction but found no Probability of gaining it; And a little after the above Incident, a private Vessell, namd the Brigantine Fanny, was bound on a Trading Voyage to several Ports to the Northward of them, entirely Independant of any European Nation, of which the Gentlemen at Padang getting Intelligence, sent a Vessell to pursue her in Order to deliver the Master of her a Protest, which no sooner performd than the Brigantine was obligd by its most unjust & most haughty Threats to return back to their Port, before any part of her Cargo was offered to Sale, which has been a great prejudice to the Owners. That the said Procedures of the Dutch were fully sett forth in their Protest, and the Letters they had wrote to Padang & Batavia on those Occasions, of which they enclose Us Copys, & beg leave to refer us thereto and that they had wrote a Letter to General Boscawen on the aforesaid Heads, and Requested his Protection from the Insults of that Nation. That having put on board the Godolphin two hundred & Sixty nine Tons of Pepper they sent her to Manna to be fill'd up, where having been much bad weather, impeded the Loading of her So that she would be detaind a weak longer than the Time specified in the Charter Party. That the Sloop Louisa that had been sent with the Mary to Poloo Pesang was missing & requesting a Quantity of Rice by the first Opportunity, as the scarcity of that Article is very great there & is likely to continue so. What is mentiond in the said Letter by the Gentlemen at Marlbro, concerning the Insolence & Crueltys of the Dutch, being taken into serious Consideration, although they acquaint us with having wrote a Letter to General Boscawen on this Subject. 'ITS AGREED That We address him likewise thereon and request of him to exert his Authority in Curbing the growing Insolencies of the Dutch, which are now become so Flagrant, that Our Hoñble Masters have been obligd to send Us Directions to Order the Commanders of their Ships, to suffer themselves to be no way's Molested by them in their Commerce which if they should offer at to Repell Force by Force in defence of themselves, and that the said Letter be entered hereafter.

N^o. 35. From the Deputy Governour & Council of St. Helena dated the 11th. June 1748, advising of the arrival there of Captain David Hunter, whom the Hoñble Company had appointed to be Lieutenant Governour of that Place; Requesting We will send them fore the use of the Island, Some Wax Candles Fine Long Cloth, Mens Shirts, Rice, Arrack & Paddy, and inclosing an Annual List of the Arrival & Departure of Ships to & from that Place.

Barton we received a Letter from the Deputy Governour & Council of Bencoolen Advising Us of a most cruel Massacre committed by the Master of a Dutch Vessell, call'd a Panchalong, on the Crews of two Vessells at Sinkell on the West Coast of Sumatra, under English Passes, and belonging to a Chinaman an Inhabitant of Bencoolen, only one Man whereof escaped their Barbarity and him with the greatest Difficulty, as you will please to observe by the Relation of that Affair transmitted you by Our said Deputy Governour & Council. As you are His Majestys Representative, We request Sir, you will take this Affair into your most Serious Consideration, and do not doubt you will take proper measures to Curb the Insolence of the Growing Power of the Dutch in India, who take all Opportunitys to Insult Our Nation & Inhabitants residing under Our Protection, in our just Right of Trade in many parts of India, and particularly some Months past pretended to an exclusive Right of Trade in Ophium, in the Streights of Malacca, and the Eastward, which the Honble Court of Directors in a Letter we have lately received from them utterly Deny, and have given us Directions to Empower the Commanders of their Ships in Case of being Molested in Carrying on their Commerce to make Reprizals, not only in Defence of themselves, but also of English Country Ships, with Our Passes & British Commanders, as you will please to observe by an Extract of their said Letter, which we now enclose for your Perusal. there, amounting to Rup^s. Twelve thousand four hundred & Seventy Nine, three quarters, eighty seven Raes. That our President having likewise acquainted Gov^r. I duely received your Favour of the 9th. Instant concerning the Massacre committed by the Master of a Dutch Vessell upon the Coast of Sumatra, upon the Crews of two Prows fitted out at Bencoolen, and desiring I would exert my Authority to prevent the growing Insolence of the Dutch in India. In Consequence whereof I have wrote the Govern^r. General & Council of Batavia, a Letter by the Royal George which I hope will answer the end desired, and here enclose a Copy of the said Letter for your Information, & am

HONBLE SIR & GENTLEMEN

The President & Council of this Place have Transmitted me an Account they lately received from the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort Marlborough of a most shocking Act of Violence Committed by some of your People in an Arm'd Panchalong belonging to Padang in seizeing two Proes at Sinkel, a Port on the West Coast of Sumatra, that were the Property of Merchants at Bencoolen, & sent out by them on a Trading Voyage, furnish'd with the necessary Passports, which the Panchalong was so far from showing a due regard to, that they tore and destroy'd them immediately on their being produc'd, & then fell on the Prows Crews, and in a most Cruell manner put them to Death, being to the number of thirty Seven Persons, as is made appear by the Declaration of the only surviving

One, who though wounded had the good Fortune to escape their Murtherous hands, & to get to Bencoolen to relate the most Tragical Story of his Companions notwithstanding the Perpetrators of this Barbarous Action had done all in their power to prevent it.

By Copies of Letters which have been sent me on this Occasion I find the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort Marlborough had applied to the Governour and Council of Padang upon this Matter without receiveing any Answer, and that they had also Address'd you Gentlemen under the 30th. Jañry, which you had acknowledged the Receipt of by yours to them of the 15th. March, acquainting that you had got no Advice from Padary, concerning this Affair, either before or since the notice of it from them, but as soon as you should receive any, you woud make a thorough Enquiry into it.

You'l please to excuse my observing that the Complaint from our Settlement, seems to me to have been sufficient Grounds, for the enquiry to have been immediately entered upon without waiting for Advices from Padang and as the President & Council of this Settlement have desired my Interfering in the behalf of His Majesty's Injured Subjects. I cannot fail to desire, if this Affair has not already been examind into, it may be done without further Delay, and to Insist that full Satisfaction be made, not only for the Insult offered the British Nation in General herein, but to the Proprietors of the Vessells for the Losses they have Sustain'd by it; As also that the Persons any ways Concern'd, whether as Directors or Actors in this bloody Scene be punish'd suitably to their Crime, and in the manner which the Law of all Nations in Amity with each other justly Demands, upon so Manifest a Violation of Treaties.

The injuries offered to the Ships of Our Company and the British Subjects in India by your Cruizers, upon various Pretences, have of late become so Flagrant, as to drive the Company to the Necessity of giving Orders to their Several Governours to empower all English Commanders to Repel Force by Force in Defence of their Rights, as will appear more fully by the Copy of their said Resolution enclosed; which I think it proper to apprise You of; and that I have received Orders from the King my Master not only to Support them herein, with the Ships under my Command, but to leave like Directions on my return with the Commanding Officer of his Majesty's Ships that are to remain in India.

It is with great Concern that I see Things brought to this Length, but still flatter myself all Disputes will be Amicably adjusted, by your redressing the past abuses, and issuing such Orders as will restrain your Cruizers, of what kind soever they be, from presuming to offend in this way again.

I shall with great Impatience wait the favour of your Answer to this, & am with Great Esteem & Respect

THAT your Petitioner was Ship'd at London by the Honble Company as Cheif Mate [of the] Lincoln Cap^t. John Nanfan, & Acted in that Station for a considerable time to the [satisfact]ion of all Officers on board.

That at the Shipping of the Troops on board at Spithead, he behav'd to the [off]icers as becoming one in his Station, but by his not admitting a Woman who [...]inion to One of the Officers, and a Serjeants Wife then on board to his Table, he owed [the pe]tioner on that account a private Enmity, and in the passage to Madeira, on his [...] Petitioner was grossly abused, Insulted, & struck by another Officer to whom he had [Spo]ke, at least not given any Provocation.

That at the Island of Madeira yo^r. Petitioner made his Complaint to yo^e. Hoñble [Admiral] Boscawen in hopes to be redress'd, but was deceived, for by the Malicious & false Informa[tion] made. Your Petitioner was Suspended from his Duty to yo^e. no small Concern of the Officers & people on board, belonging to the said Ship.

That upon this Suspension, your Petitioner was greatly Surprizd at Cap^t. Nan[an for] bidding him his Table, and keeping him upon the Ships Provisions to the Island of [...] and there going on Shore on Liberty to provide himself with Provision's the Ship [sailed] out of the Harbour without his having the least Intimation of it, tho he was ready & [willing]ng at any time to have come on board on the least notice; This obligd him to go on board of [...] Stevens in Order to get on board his own Ship again, but the next day he could see noth[ing] at all of her, nor till three Weeks after we arrived at the Cape of Good Hope, at which Place [Your] Petitioner demanded the Liberty of his own Ship from the Admiral, (but was prevented & by what [Your] Petitioner can learn thro Cap^t. Nanfan's means) & was afterwards Ordered on board the Vigilant [a Man]n of War, where he endured great hardships till his arrival of Fort St. David.

That Your Petitioner was at the Action of Pondicherry, and had not his discharge [till] the latter end of October, when his Honour Admiral Boscawen was pleased to send your Petiti^r. [wo]rd by Comm Lisle that he might go on board of his own Ship, or where else he thought proper [& that] he had no more to say to him, upon which he immediately inform'd Cap^t. Nanfan by Letter, & [re]ceived for answer that he would not receive your Petitioner on board on duty without an Order from the Admiral; nor did he give him the least hopes therein, that he would receive him on board at [...] and while yo^r. Petito^r. was making Application to the Admiral, the Ship sail'd for Trincamala [le]aving him on shore.

That the Attendance yo^r. Petiti^r. made at the Garden House in yo^e. time of the Monsoon gave him a Fitt of the Gout, with which he has been grievously afflicted, & still continues to labour under the same Disorder.

That at his Ships return from Trincamala, yo^r. Pet^r. by Letter again applyd to his Captain desiring to know whether he had any Objection against his going on board, either on or off Duty and also requested a Supply of Money whereby to pay his Doctor's bill, & to defray such other expences, a person under your Petitioner's Affliction, necessarily required, but received for answer by his Dubash who carried his Letter, that he would send him no answer nor supply him with any Money, & that he might seek Releif wherever he thought necessary.

This is the true Representation of your Petitioner's Case, and therefore he most humbly requests such Releif therein as to your Honour &c^a. shall seem meet & agreeable; for he is at present quite destitute of Money as well as necessary apparel to furnish him towards his return home.

And Your Petitioner shall ever Pray &c^a.

The President acquaints the Board that the season of his Calling them together to Day is on account of an Assault that was made upon him yesterday by Mr. William Holt, who has very often of late carried himself with Indecency towards him, which as he has appear'd to be somewhat disordered in his Senses he has been unwilling hitherto to take notice of. But yesterday his behaviour at Table was so unbecoming, that he sent for him after the Company was broke up with an Intent to speak to him about it, but had scarce began to utter what he was going to say when Mr. Holt flew into the greatest Madness of Passion that could be, and Struck him twice or thrice before the Servants who were in the same Room could take hold of him;

upon which the President immediately sent for Captain Crompton, who with several other Gentlemen that were going down from Dinner, [c]am[e] up and Secured him at which time he appeared to be in the height [sic] of Madness, calling out most vehemently for a Sword, the which could he have got, or any other Weapon, he certainly would have done a great deal of Mischief; wherefore he Ordered him to be confin'd immediately, and all his Arms to be taken from him, and now desires the Board will take the same into Consideration, and what is proper to be done in this Case, as in the Condition he appears to be, the setting him at Liberty may prove of bad Consequence; and likewise Requests, as Captain Crompton was the Person that secured him, and Captain Gingins, Mr. Baggs & Mr. Bouchier came along with him, that they may be call'd in & declare what they know of this Affair. Whereupon they being call'd in severally, and ask'd Concerning Mr. Holts behaviour yesterday at Table & what followed: they all Agree that he was guilty of very ill manners, and talk'd extremely rudely and upon their breaking up from Table, he was one of the first that went out of the Room, but was immediately sent for by the President. That they were going down Stairs when they heard a great noise in the Hall above, which appeared to be made by Mr. Holt, and as a Servant came to call Cap^t. Crompton, they all went with him, and on Enting the Hall found Mr. Holt in the Arms of some Plankeen Boys who being scarce strong enough to hold him, they with some other Gentlemen that were standing upon the Stairs took hold of him & carried him down during which he call'd out Ravingly for a Sword several times, being in the greatest Fury of Passion; after which they withdrew, and it was taken into Serious Consideration how to Act in this Case, & at length AGREED that what We have long Suspected of Mr. Holt's being Disordered in his Senses, is now past all doubt, by which certainly all impartial Judges must allow he is incapable of setting any longer as a Member of this Board, or of being entrusted with any Post of Consequence, therefore that he be Suspended the Honourable Companys Service, and sent to England by the first Ship dispatch'd thither from hence, as it is the Opinion of the Doctors that his continueing in this Climate may greatly encrease his Disorder, the Heat of which they imagine has been the Occasion of it, and that his being sent to a Cold one may be very Conducive to the effecting a cure. I before acquainted you with the Condition of the Rice Imported from Bengal

 Rhoda. That by the Porto Bello arriving much about the time with the True Bri-
 ton, proved the like in all Respects, black, coarse Rice, very much intermix'd with
 Sand and Dust, and deficient in Quantity, and I must here beg leave to observe that
 the first Boats from these two Ships coming ashore at the same time and late at
 Night, the Bags were promiscuously thrown together without Distinction, the Rice
 of the Winchelsea was likewise of the Coarse sort, but something better Grain, and
 more free from Dust; if the Deficiency on this Cargo appears larger than Ordinary,
 it may partly be assign'd to some Pilferage it might probably have Suffered in lay-
 ing out a Considerable time in an open Banksall for want of Godown Room. The
 two last mention'd Ships brought good Rice, excepting Fifty nine Bags Damaged

By what Major Lawrence writes the President he has hopes of coming to a speedy Accommodation with the Morattas, they having sent Ambassadors to Deve Cota to know on what Terms they could obtain Peace, which being duely Considered on by Admiral Boscawen, the President & Mr. Prince, the following Conditions were sent to Major Lawrence to lay before the Ambassador's.

To give a Grant under the Kings hand & Seal for the Quiet Possession of the Fort of Deve Cota to the Company for ever, wth. as much Land about it as will bring them in the Annual Rent of Ten thousand Pagodas or thereabouts.

To endeavour as much as possible to put off the paying a Quit Rent for that Place, but should the Ambassadors strongly insist on it, in case they will finish the Treaty immediately to Submit to it, and Agree to the paying Annually a small Sum of about One hundred Rupees or thereabouts, as it is supposed any acknowledgment will be sufficient, let it be ever so small.

To pay the whole Charges the Company have been at in both Expedition's, and to allow Sahajee Rajah now in Trepopilore a handsome Annual Allowance.

Stores taken at Deve Cota, delivered to y^e. Mil^y. Storek^r.

Major Lawrence having sent hither on the Sloop Porto Bello Sundry Stores found in Deve Cota (a List of which is entered hereafter) the Governour has Ordered them to be delivered the Mil^y. Storekeeper. He also acquaints the Board that a Quantity of Paddy was taken in it, which Major Lawrence had promised to the Military & Seapoys that were in the Action as a Reward for their Bravery. AGREED that the Warehousekeeper therefore be Ordered to send proper Persons to see it measured and to pay for the same at the Rate of forty Pagodas $\frac{1}{2}$ Garse, and that it remain there as a Store for the Garrison.

General Letter N^o. 54 From the Deputy Governour &c^a. Council of Fort Marlbro of the 11th. Ultimo with a Postscrip [*sic*] of the 12th. read, acquainting Us that Our Honble Masters Ship Duke of Newcastle bound to that Place from England, having touch'd in her way at Batavia, they received by her from the General & C^o. there, a Reply to their Letters concerning the Massacre, and the Arbitrary Department of the Dutch in opposing Our Right of Traffick, which seems somewhat inclinable to make Restitution of the Loss sustain'd in the Seizure of the two Praws at Padang by strictly examining into the Merits of the Case, for which they had requested the Person who escaped the Massacre might be sent to them as an Evidence; but being of Opinion it is an Affair of too much Consequence to be decided in the Dutch Courts, they don't think proper to comply therewith. Advising us that the Duke of Newcastle brought them out a Supply of Five Chests of Treasure and 606 Peices of Lead, which they have Consign'd us on her; and by her they received Directions from the Honble Company to load her with Pepper to England directly, which they found it impracticable to Comply with, unless they had detain'd her till the Season was far advanced; and then there would have been but a Small Quantity to have loaded on board the Annual Storeship. the last Harvest having been put on board the Benjamin & Godol[phin] the latter of which Ships wanted a good deal to Compleat her Charterparty Tonnage, Occasion'd by the Surprizing Rage of th[e] Smallpox & the Inclemency of the Weather. That they had re[ced] no Advice in regard to the Sloop Louisa, which they apprehend must be Lost as they before wrote Us, whereby having no other Vessell but the Mary for the use of their Coast, they therefore desire we will furnish them with another. That from the small Pox's still Rageing on the Island Sumatra, they are apprehensive of not having a Sufficient Loading for the next Store Ship, though as yet the Settlements of Moco Moco & Croe have not felt the Effects of that Disorder and that by the Duke of Newcastle having reced from Batavia a Quantity of Rice, they are not in immediate want

AN ACCOUNT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE FORCES UNDER THE COMMAND OF MAJ^R. STRINGER LAWRENCE FROM THEIR LEAVEING FORT ST. DAVID TO THE TAKEING OF DEVE COTAH; AND OF SOME TRANSACTIONS AFTER THEIR BEING IN POSSESSION OF THAT PLACE.

Embark'd the Company's Troops at 5 o Clock this morning.

MAY YE,
27TH.

Anchor'd off Deve Cotah at half an hour P.M. past 5. I ordered my Own, Captain's Scrimsour's & Captain Dalton's Companies with all the Lascars that were in the Ships Exeter & Harwich to Embark in the Boats that Captain Pawlet appointed for them, in order to Land as soon as the Signal was made with two Field pieces, which were to follow the Boats that Landed the Soldier's.

29TH.

At 1 P.M. we put off from the Ships in four Armd Long Boats & several Mussulas, landed on the Northern Shore at 5 o Clock, and drew up about Seventy Yards from the River with our Front to the Westward, our left Flank secured by the River, and one Field Peice. the Right by some Bushes & the other Field Peice We lay upon Our Arms all Night, & sent out small Party's of Rangapa's Seapoys which came by Land in Front & on our Right Flank advanc'd between One & two Hundred Yards before the Main Body to give timely notice of the approach of the Enemy.

30TH.

The Remaining part of Our Soldiers with some of the Seapoys Landed on the opposite Shore at 8 o Clock A.M. and then sent their Boats to carry over the Men, I Landed before to join them, which we did about 12 o Clock the same Day. I ordered Capt. Dalton with his Company to attack a Redoubt of the Enemy's, but finding a deep River between it & him and it not appearing to be of any great Advantage I ordered him back again, but at the same time sent two Field peices to dislodge the Enemy from thence, that they might not disturb us on the Ground we proposed Encamping on. We removed some distance from the River Side & Encamp'd with Our Front to the Southward, our Flanks secured. The Right by a thick Wood & a River unpassable. The Left by some high sand Hills with Parties of Seapoy's Lodged behind them.

31ST

Began to make Fascines.

JUNE 2^D.

Begun to open Ground with all Our Officers & Men off Duty, and a Covering Party of One Captain, two Subalterns, 4 Serjeants, 4 Corporals, 2 Drums & 60 private Men, who were all Ordered to observe the greatest Silence for fear of Drawing the Enemy's Fire upon them, Upon hearing Our Men at Work, the Enemy gave a General Discharge round the whole Garrison without doing the least Execution. The Work going Slowly on, the Covering Party & Lascars Voluntarily offered to Work in the day time, which I ordered them to do, and had only three Men Wounded.

5TH.

At day break opened the Battery & gave the Enemy three Rounds. I then Ordered the Fire to Cease, and beat the Chamad[...] upon the Battery, at the same time waved a white Cloth (which is the Custom of this Country) to engage them to stop the Fire & receive the following Summons.

8TH.

SAHAJEE RAJAH Lawfull King of Tanjour having applied to the King of Englands General, and the Hoñble East India Company to put him in Possession of his Kingdom. They have Ordered me to lay Seige to the Fort of Deve Cotah. As my Batteries are now ready to open, I send this to let you know that if you will open your Gates & receive the Troops under my Command into the Fort, and acknowledge your Lawfull Sovereign, Your Person's & Effects shall be safe and you Yourselves well treated. But if on the Contrary you Obstinately hold out the Place, I will beat down your

Wall, enter your Town, and then no Man is to expect Quarter. Dated at the Camp before Deve Cotah June the 8th. 1749.

I got the Letter Convey'd by two Braminees at 12 o Clock, but receiveing no Answer, and the Enemy continueing their Fire, I sent Orders to Our Battery to renew theirs with their Guns and Mortars as warmly as they could without over heating the Metal, by which we Dismounted most of their Guns, and Shattered the Wall a good deal with that days Fire.

9TH.

Received the Governour of Deve Cotah's Answer, which was, That He was upwards of Forty years of Age, and had Lived hitherto without Reproach; and as he had Five thousand Men in the Place Resolutely Determined to Defend it to the last, he never would Sully the small Remains of Life, by Surrendring a Place which he thought Impregnable. The same day We made a Considerable breach but found repaired by the Enemy the next Morning.

11TH.

I applied to Capt. Powlett to Land a Body of Marines for the Security of Our Camp while We attack'd the Place, accordingly He Landed three Officers & 100 Marines, and We March'd at Sun set from Our Camp to the Battery, and lay upon Our Arms expect^g. to pass the River that Night, but was prevented by a heavy Shower of Rain which wetted all our Ammunition, & rendered it Impracticable. Mr. Moore the Carpenter of the Train past the River the same Night, and made fast the Rope on the other Side, to pass our Float. As Our Battery was upon Marshy Ground I was apprehensive that another Day's Rain would have made it impossible to Attempt any thing. I therefore determined to Attack the Place in the Day, which We did on the 12th. at One o Clock P.M. & perform'd it in the following Order. As soon as We had all pass'd the River to the number of 700 Seapoys & 400 Military upon the Float made by Mr. Moore for that purpose, I first Ordered Lieutenant Clive with a Volunteer Platoon of 30 Men at the head of 400 Seapoys to drive the Enemy from an Entrenchment which must Flank Our Left on Storming the Breach; and 300 more Seapoys [o]n the Right, to secure our Right Flank from a large Body of Horse that were posted there for that purpose. Lieutenant Clive accordingly sett out for the Attack, and met with a deep Slough which we knew nothing of, however pass'd it with the Major part of his Platoon, and Attack'd the Entrenchment, but not being Seconded by the Seapoy's, and being Charged in the Rear by the Horse at the same time that he was Attacking the Entrenchment in Front was Obliged to Retreat to the Slough again. Upon which I ordered Serjeant Browne with the Forlorn Hope to Attack the Entrenchment, and in Case of need Captain Dalton at the Head of the Grenadier Company to Support him. But there being no Occasion I immediately Ordered Cap^t. Dalton and his Company followed by the Main Body to Attack the Breach, which he did, and being join'd by Lieutenant Clive and the remainder of his Platoon, was in full Posession by 5 o Clock, And I at the head of the Main body wheel'd one Platoon to the Right & faced the Horse in Order to prevent them from Flanking Daltons Compy, and gave them a Fire, which was so Successfull that it Kill'd some, & put the rest in such Disorder, that they went off immediately. We all of us lay that Night on our Arms.

20TH.

I Ordered Captain Cope with his Company & two Field peices, [...] some Seapoys to take Posession of Atchavaram, which he did without any Opposition. But on the same Night was Attack'd by the Enemy's whole Force, and Repulsed them with only the Loss of 4 Men kill'd and 5 wounded. I March'd next morning with another Field Peice 120 Soldiers and some

Seapoys to throw in Provisions, which I did without seeing or meeting with any Disturbance from the Enemy.

The next morning Arrived an Ambassador from Camp who made an Apology, and said it was a Mistake, Requesting at the same time that I would Restore them Atchavaram. Upon Consideration finding it would not Answer our purpose in opening a Communication by Land, and that it was by much too Distant to be relieved from Deve Cotah, & that in short, that it would not in any shape answer our expectation. They at the same time very Genteely offering not to Molest or Disturb any of Our People, and to Supply Us with any thing their Camp afforded; After such Concessions made on their side, I thought I could with a very good Grace deliver them up a Place, which they with their whole Force were not able to Take.

Mr. Peter St. Paul appointed Secretary to the Commissary's.

General Boscawen lays before the Board a Letter wrote him by Mr. Dupliex concerning the Directions he has received from France, for the Delivering up Madras to us; in Consequence of which he desires that the Persons appointed Commissarys to receive it may go to Pondicherry to Settle the Articles of Evacuation; whereupon 'Tis AGREED as Major Lawrence is expected here tomorrow that He with Mess^{rs}. Wynch & Westcott set out for Pondicherry on Sunday Morning; and as Mess^{rs}. Wynch & Westcott desire some Instructions in regard to the manner in which they must proceed should the Town not be in the same State it was the 30th. October, as Specified in the 9th. Article of the Treaty of Peace (which we are inform'd is not) It is likewise AGREED that let the Condition of it be never so bad they make no Scruple on that Account to receive it, lest the French should fix upon that as a Plea for keeping Possession of it till the same should be Settled in Europe, which as it will in all Probability be two years from this time before Answers can be received from thence in regard thereto, their being Masters of it during that Interval may be very Detrimental to the Honble Companys Interest therefore We think it most proper to get Possession of it as soon as possible, which when once effected, we may then if necessary enter into Disputes with them concerning its not being in a proper State. The Commissary's are also Ordered to Demand immediate Restitution of all the Madras Papers and Records, and General Boscawen acquaints them that as it will be necessary they should carry with them some Papers and Directions he has received from England concerning the taking Possession of the said Place, he will therefore before they sett out take Care they shall be furnish'd with them.

As it is necessary that a Person well Versed in the Fr Language should attend the Commissary's, Mess^{rs}. Wynch and Westcott being entirely unacquainted with it; Mr. St. Paul, as he speaks and writes it very Fluently is appointed to proceed with them and Act in the Station of their Secretary both at Pondicherry and Madras.

General Letter N^o. 60 From Mess^{rs}. Fabricius and Brethaupt, Missionaries for Propogating the Protestant Religion at Madras dated the 17th. May, read; Setting forth the pernicious Consequences that may arise if we suffer the Roman Catholicks openly to exercise their Religion in Madras when it is again Resettled, and Requesting that they may have the Romish Churches delivered over to their Care, by which if they are Assisted by Us, they will be able within a little time to furnish as many Protestant Topasses as may be required, & keep them under a good Divine Instruction.

a Letter from the Protestant Missionaries.

The President acquaints the Board that Sunda Saib Roxa Ally Cawn (formerly Governour of Trechenopoly when that Place was taken by the Morattas,) had some time before, wrote to his Son Residing in Pondicherry, that he was upon the Point of Entering the Province with a large Army, Accompanied with and Protected by Hadayee Mahayadey Cawn alias Saudella Cawn Bahauder, Muzepher Jung a Grand-son of Nizam's deceased Directing him to apply to the French Governour in his Name, and if possible to obtain from him a Body of their Troops to assist him in the Reduction of the Province; which if he Succeeded in, He promised to make over to the French Company a certain number of Villages as might be afterwards agreed on. That the French had accordingly Closed in with the Proposal, and Agreeable thereto had sent to the Assistance of Sunda Saib, the begining of this Month, 700 Europeans, with a Train of Artillery & about 2000 Seapoys, who join'd the Moors Army the 17th. then lying to the Westward of Arcot. That on the 21st. they Attack'd the Camp of Anawardeen Cawn (Nabob of Arcot) and after a very smart Engagement gain'd a Compleat Victory; the Nabob himself being kill'd, his Army totally Routed, and his Camp a Prey to the Conquerors. IN THE NAME of the most Holy and Undivided Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Ghost. So be it.

1749-19-A
IN CONSEQUENCE of the Respective Orders of His Britannick Majesty and of the most Christian King and of the Companies of England and France, We the Subscribers, Stringer Lawrence Major of Fort St. David, Alexander Wynch and Foss Westcott Counsellors of Fort St. David, and appointed Commissaries by the English Company, and Confirmed by Rear Admiral Boscawen Commander in Chief of His Britannick Majesty's Forces by Sea and Land in India. We are met together in Council with Mr. Joseph Francis Duplex, Knight of the Order of St. Michael Commander in Chief of the French Nation in India, the Kings Governour of the Town and Fort of Pondicherry, President of the Superior Council & Deputy Councils, together with Mr. Nicholas Lewis de St. Paul Second, Noel Michael Guillard, Francis Augustin Le Maire, James Friell Andrew Boyelleau, Councillors of the Upper Council to proceed on the Evacuation of the Town of Madras, and after Our having Communicated to each other reciprocally our Respective Powers as well from the Kings Our Masters as from Our two Company's of which Copies shall be Transcribed at the end of this said Treaty; the following is Agreed upon.

THAT the Gentlemen the abovenamed Commissaries on the part of the English Company shall go to Madras as soon as they think possibly convenient in Order to take the Inventory of the Effects Artillery, Ammunition and Provisions &c^a. which shall be Actually found in the Town; the which Effects, Ammunition &c^a: shall be put into their Possession by Mr. Barthelemy Commandant of the said Town of Madras, and Moreau second, who are appointed Commissaries for this purpose, in presence of whom the said Inventory shall be made & Signed by the Respective Commissaries,

Whereas a Definitive Treaty of Peace has been Signed at Aix La Chapelle on the 18th. day of October last N.S. by Our Ministers Plenipotentiaries, and those of Our good Brother the most Christian King, and Our good Friends & Allies the States General of the United Provinces, To which all the Powers Concerned in the War have since Acceded, and Whereas it is Stipulated by the Fifth Article of the said Treaty, that all the Conquests which have been made or shall be made since the Conclusion of the Preliminary Articles of the 30th. of April last, either in Europe or in the East and West Indies, or in any other part of the World whatsoever are to be restored without exception, agreeably to what was Stipulated by the said Preliminary Articles; and by the Declaration since Signed the Contracting Parties did engage to proceed immediately to such Restitution; And it having been Stipulated by the Ninth Article of the said Definitive Treaty that the Restitutions in the East or West Indies shall be made agreeably to the Sense of the 2^d. Before His Majestys return to England I had wrote (by Recommendation from the Lords Justices) to the Secret Committee of the East India Company to Name two or three Persons whom they should think proper to be appointed Commissaries to receive Madras, and enclosed is their ansyer to my Letter which I send you

As the General Peace is Establish^d. between His Majesty of the one part and the King of Great Britain and States General of the United Provinces of the other, that it may have its Effect throughout their Kingdoms Countries, Lands, and Lordships under their Subjection's, as well in Europe as in the East & West Indies, in Consequence of which and of the Exchange which has been made the [lacuna] of this present Month of the Ratifications of the Treaty which has been Sign'd between the Embassadors Plenipotentiaries at Aix La Chapelle 18th. All the conquests made on either Side in the East Indies are to be delivered up, and that in the same Condition they were in on the 30th. of this present Month of October, of the present Year 1748. For which REASONS it is expressly Ordered to M^r. Dupleix Governour General of the French Establishments in the East Indies, to the Superiour Council establish'd at Pondicherry, to M^r. David Governour of the Isles of France and Bourbon, and to all other Governours and Commanders proposed & Commissioned, and to all Captains Lieutenants and other Officers of Ships belonging to the Company to conform themselves in every thing which may concern their District & Functions to the full Effect of the said Treaty of Peace.

AND WHEREAS it is known to Us that the Town of Madras taken from the English the 21st. of the Month of September 1746 was in Possession of the Company in the Month of January last, it is absolutely Ordered to the said M^r. Dupleix as well as to the Superiour

DONE and Concluded at Paris at the House of the East India Company the 31st. of October 1748.

As the Commissarys will go this afternoon on board the Tartar to proceed to Madras agreeable to the Resolution of last Consultation, and desiring some Directions in regard to settling the Customs at that place where we have got possession of it. After some Consideration on the matter it was Agreed to encourage the Inhabitants to returⁿ. to their old Habitations, who have ever since the Loss of that Place been Scattered in the Country, and to bring with them their Effects. That Customs on all Goods except from Europe, be taken off, but the Villages to be let to Farm as soon as possible. And as the Honble Company's Ship Augusta's not being yet arrived here make us inclinable to imagine she may be fallen into Leeward The Commissaries are therefore now Ordered in case she should fetch in wth. Madras to immediately Land her Treasure, and what else she may have on board for this Presidency or Bengal and Dispatch her for China with all possible Expedition, as likewise any others of Our Honble Masters Ships that may happen to arrive there.

Custom on all Goods except from Europe to be taken off at Madras to encourage the Inhabitants to return thither.

General Letter N^o. 62 From the Cheif & Council of Vizagapatam dated the 12th. July read, advises that Our Honble Master's Ship Tavistock having met with hard Gales of Wind off Zeloan was blown off and put in there the 8th. of that Month, the Pacquet from the Honble Company by which Ship they had opened, and took a Copy of the General Letter, as likewise Mr. Secretary James's Lt^re, and of which they send us Copies, and delivered it again to the Commander, which they hope We will approve of, and request We will give them full Directions how to Act in case of the like Accidents happening.

General Letter from Vizagapatam.

Major Lawrence represents to the Board that upon perusing the Regulations for the Company of Artillery He finds the pay to be allowed to Gunners is but equal to what is received by Persons who bear that Rank in his Majesty's Service, by which as there is no Encouragement to any belonging the Royal Train to enter with Us, who are sure of never being Discarded, and will enjoy the same in England, therefore it is not to be imagined they will quit that Service to remain here. On which Account he thinks it highly necessary to induce them to inlist with us, to have only Forty Gunners in the Room of the One hundred mention'd in the said Regulations, and to raise their pay four pence ^{per} Day more than the Honble Company have Stipulated, and the remaining Sixty nominated Matrosses at one Shilling ^{per} day. Which being duely consider'd the Board entirely Concur in Opinion with the Major; Wherefore it is ORDERED that the same be Notified to the People of the Royal Train, when General Boscawen shall think proper to issue out his Orders of permission for such of them to enlist in Our Honble Master's Service as are inclinable thereto.

Major Lawrence proposes in Order to encourage the People of the Royal Train to enlist, to have only 40 Gunners & to raise their pay 4 ^{per} day, and the remaining 60 to be nominated Matrosses at 1 Shill ^{per} Day w^{ch}. [is ag]reed to.

The Major likewise acquaints the Board that as the Men belonging to the Independant Companys are very much in want of Cloathing having received none since they left England, and the off reckonings that will be collected from their Pay on that Account, between the Time of their entring and Christmas, when Our

That as the Occurrences of those Times are sufficien[tly] known to your Honour & c^a. he humbly supposes he has no need to mention the share he had in the Defence of this Garrison against the Enemy. What he did he acknowledges to have been his Duty; but he begs leave to assure Your Honour & c^a. it was no less the Effect of his Inclination, & Esteem for the English, whom he has served from his Infancy, and has all possible reason to Value.

It pleased God to secure this Place against the several Attempts of the French, and to Crown your Arms with Success at Deve Cotah, for the obtaining whereof your Petitioner spared no pains and trouble, and now that there is a General Peace your Petitioner humbly Conceives that He cannot be accused of Vain Glory if he requests your Honour &c^a: to bestow upon him some Publick Mark of your Favour and Approbation of his Behaviour. What he prays for is the use of a Palanquin, Roundel & Dammer, and to be appointed Chief Dubash to the Hoñble Company in their principle Settlement on this Coast, with the Honour of Seven Guns to be Fired as Usual on that Occasion.

These Dignities by bestowing greater Authority on your Petitioner amongst the Blacks will enable him to serve more effectually his Hoñble Masters as occasion shall offer; and will raise a Spirit of Emulation in others to perform their Duty in the best manner, by convincing them that the least Degree of Merit, shall not go unrewarded.

Instant, read, advising their having sent Us on Our Hoñble Master's Ship Prince William, Fifty Barrels of Gun Powder, which was all she could take in. That the Hoñble Company's Ship Boscawen was arrived there in four Months and Six days from the Downs, by whom they reced the News of a General Peace being Concluded at Aix La Chapelle on the 7th. October last O.S. to which Germany, Spain and the other Powers engaged in the late War have acceded; Enclosing Sundry Paragraphs of the Hoñble Company's Commands to that Presidency by the said Ship, relating to those at War, Freight & Demorage; likewise a List of Ships arrived from, and taken up for India Anno 1748: and a Packet from the Admiralty to be deliver'd to the

Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships in the Indies. As the Pattamar We Agreed last Consultation to send to Bombay is not yet Dispatch'd, ORDERED that a Letter be wrote by it to the President & Council to advise of the Prince William's arrival here, and of Our having forwarded to the Admiral the Packet from y^e. Admiralty.

The President having received Private Letters from the Gentlemen at the Northern Settlements dated the 9th. Instant which make no mention of the Tryals arrival there; and Advise that for want of Cash they have been obliged in some measure to put a stop to their Investment. As there is not the least hopes left for us to imagine that they will receive the Supply We sent on her, before the middle or latter end of next Month, as she must certainly be gone directly to the Bay, if no Accident has happen'd to her. 'Tis therefore AGREED that Our Honble Master's Ship Dragon be immediately Dispatch'd to Vizagapatam, with a Supply of Sixty four thousand (64000) Rupees, and Seven thousand Madras Pagodas (7000) for the use of that Place: and Fifteen thousand (15000) Madras Pagodas for Ingeram. Likewise as the Gentlemen there have wrote pressingly lately for Redwood; That She call at Dourassapatam, and if there is a probability of procuring a Considerable Quantity within the Space of five or six days, to stay to take it in; otherwise as the Season is now advanced to proceed Directly to Vizagapatam; And General Letters to that Place and Ingeram to go by her, are Ordered to be drawn out; also One to the Presid^t. & Council of Fort William, and that a Copy of a Paragraph of the Honble Compys Commands by her, regarding their own Ships, be enclosed therein.

A Letter from Mr. John Pybus Military Storekeeper read, as entered hereafter, Setting forth the Constant Attendance & trouble required in the Execution of his Employ, therefore as the Allowance to a Person in the Station in His Majesty's Service is ten Shillings p day, hopes We will take the same into Consideration, and grant him what we may think suitable thereto. As the Board are well Convinc'd of the justness of Mr. Pybus Representation. 'Tis therefore AGREED in Consideration of the Trouble and Attendance required in that Office, That he be allowed Twenty Pagodas p Month. And as the Honble Co[m]pany have been pleased to Direct that none but Europea[ns] be permitted to assist in the Business of that Employ; 'Tis likewise AGREED, that the two Persons namely, Will^m. General Letter to Mr. Boscawen.

Two Ltres. from Capt Mortimore & his Officers. Export Warehokr. ordered to Supply Gunny for repack. the Pepper, on the Fort St. George.

THE President acquaints the Board that at the desire of General Boscawen he had some time before Transmitted him to Madras. Copy of the Companys Orders relating to Roman Catho and in Answer thereto had received a Letter from him dated the 29th. August, Communicating his Sentiments on that Subject, and enclosing Copy of a Letter address'd to him on that Occasion by the Commissaries at Madras; Both which being laid before the Board, are now read. The Purport of the Letter from Mr. Boscawen is as follows. That in Consideration Coja Petrus and Mr^s. Madeiros are both very old and consequently cannot live long: that they have been great Sufferers, and that the latter has a Considerable Debt owing to her from the Company; He thinks that they, ought to be Excepted. That he is for sending to Europe all those who have been Traitors to the Company's Interest, particularly the four Priests of the Great Church in the White Town, Monsieur La Metrie and Mr. Barneval; as it is Evident the Company have no where had greater Enemies. That as to the Priests no Man doubts of their Affection and Good Will to the French, and their having had Liberty to build two large Churches in the Bounds is a proof of the good Understanding between them, That two of them are actually French by Nation. That as to Mr. La Metrie, his Residing so long amongst the French both at Madras and Pondicherry at a time when we were in actual War, declares him a Traitor; and Mr. Barneval's acting as Quarter Master, together with the Behaviour of his Wife, is more than sufficient to Condemn him. That His Reasons for what he proposes concerning the Priests are; their Influence over the Boatmen, which, if they are Suffered to continue near the Settlement, will certainly prevent those People from being of any use to us; And that their Knowledge of Our Trade will Assist the French, who are undoubtedly doing what is in their power to destroy it, by Reestablishing the Settlement of St. Thomé: That he has certain Proof Mr. Dup liex has wrote to Goa, desiring the Portuguese Vice Roy to send the Padre Antonio a Commission as Governour of St. Thome & its Dependancies, and a Supply of Men and Money. That for the same Reasons it will be dangerous to the Company's Interest to let the other Gentlemen who have behaved ill remain in this Country, and particularly Mr. La Metrie, who is said to understand Trade, and cannot live at Pondicherry. That Mess^{rs}. Lawrence, Wynch and Westcott are of Opinion that what he proposes is for the Company's Interest, but doubt whether they have Sufficient Authority for doing it (as ~~of~~ their Lt^re to him, which is entered hereafter.) That He desires to have Our Opinion upon this Subject, as whatever is done in it, should be the Act of the whole, and Maturely Considered before put in Execution; which when Agreed upon, he will readily do. The Board having accordingly Deliberated on the above Important matters, AGREE to write a Letter to Mr. Boscawen Containing their Sentiments thereon, which is now done, & the same ORDERED to be entered hereafter.

Two Letters from Captain Mortimore & his Officers read, as entered hereafter, the first dated the 1st. Instant, sets forth as they are badly provided with Anchors, and have only One they can depend upon, They therefore think it necessary to provide themselves therewith at the first Port they can for the Safety of the Ship and Cargo. The second dated to day, representing the Robingo in which the Pepper is Pack'd to be very bad: They therefore request some new Gunny Bags to put it in, that there may be no waste of that Article. Upon which the Export Warehouse-keeper is ORDERED to Supply him with as many as they may have occasion for.

Our President having this day laid before us Your Letter to him of the 29th. Ultimo, containing your Sentiments in regard to the Properties of such Roman Catholicks who formerly Resided at Fort St. George; which having maturely Considered on, We are of the following Opinion.

That the Houses &c^a. belonging to those who rem^d. under the French Protection, shall be Confiscated to the Company, and that as there are others of that persuasion who have Houses &c^a. in the said Town and did not put themselves under the French Protection, that they shall be paid the Value of their Properties, but not be permitted to reside within the White Town, with an Exception to Mrs. Antonia De Madeiros, who We consent shall Enjoy during her Life (or till the Company's Pleasure is known,) her House in the White Town, in Consideration of her having been, not only an old Inhabitant, but also very assisting to the Company, by lending them a large Sum of Money, when they were in much want of it, and which with the Interest thereon, remains yet Unpaid, but that on her Decease, her Heirs be obliged to dispose of the said House.

That no Armenian be Suffered to Live in the White Town, nor be ever permitted to make any purchases of Houses or Godowns therein, and although there are several, that have at this time Possessions therein that did not live under the Fr. Protection, and Consequently are not liable to Censure on that Account, yet that they be obliged forthwith to dispose of their said properties, excepting Coja Petrus Uskan, to whose enjoying his present house in the White Town, We Consent as he has been so great a Sufferer already, by having upwards of Forty Houses destroyed by the French that were Situated to the Northward of the White Town, and he has always appeared greatly Attach'd to the Company's Interest: But that at his decease the said House be immediately disposed of.

That no Foreigner of any Nation whatever be permitted to make any Purchases of Houses in the White Town, or to Live in it.

That a proper Place be appointed for the Armenians to Live in, and such others as may be thought Servicable to remain Under Our Protection &

That in regard to the Four Priests, as We have no Directions from the Honble Company further than to Dismiss them from Our Limits, We look upon the sending them to Europe to be a Point of too much Consequence for Us to take upon Ourselves. But as Your Power may be, and We hope is, more Extensive than Ours; We should be heartily glad to see it put in Execution: Though are of Opinion that notwithstanding these should be sent to Europe, there would never be wanting a Sufficient number of that Profession to Supply that Settlement at St. Thomé should

WE THE COMMISSARIES on the part of His Majesty the King of Great Britain, and of the United the East India Company do hereby make Our PROTEST, against the Town of Madras being given up to Us for His Britannick Majesty, it not being in the Condition it should be agreeable to the said 9th. Article of the Definitive Treaty. It appearing by incontestable Proofs that between the 31st. of October 1748 NS. and the 21st. day of August 1749 O.S. Article of the Definitive Treaty.

The President lays before the Board a Letter from General Boscawen, which being read, acknowledges the Receipt of their Letter to him of the 3^d. September; He is sorry they should disagree with him in Opinion about the Priests. That it is not the Priesthood in General he has such a desire to remove but those very Priests, Father Severini & Father René; for if they are sent out of the Limits they Carry all of their Profession wth. them, and particularly the Boatmen, which will greatly distress Us, and then they will make their own Terms. That as to any new Supply of Priests that may be Settled at St. Thomé, he is of Opinion they will not have the Influence the old ones have nor be able to give us any Disturbance for some time. That another reason for removing the two Padres above named, is their being Suspected of giving the French (before the Attack of Madras) Intelligence of the Strength and Condition of the Garrison, besides their Continual raising Money for them at Respondentia. That as to Mess^{rs}. La Metrie & Burneval, He desires to have a Letter from Us, requesting him to carry them to Europe; and that he will then Concert the properest methods for putting the Determinations Concerning the Roman Catholicks and Armenians into Execution. That there has been a Church Built to the Northward of the Town since the French were in Possession of it, which he proposes should be given to the Danish Missionaries; & that the Church at the Luce (which has been much enlarged & Repaired) should be left to the present Possessors; first because Our Boatmen are all Settled near it, and lastly because it is so very close to the Edge of our Bounds, that it is barely within them. He also proposes that an Order of Council be Establish'd, that no Person under Protection of the Company permit their Slaves to be perverted to the Romish Religion, and that all who are so perverted be Forfieted to the Company whether Male or Female immediately upon the first Information, till they can be removed from the Settlement either to Bencoolen or St. Helena, where there is no Danger of their being further Instructed in the Romish Faith. That all Slaves be Registered in the Secretarys Office, and the Secretary to give the Owner of the Slave at the Time of Entring, Copy of the aforesaid Order of Council. THE Board having duely Considered the Contents of Mr. Boscawen's Letter, AGREE that as the sending Home the two Priests and Mess^{rs}. LeMatrie & Burneval appears to be so highly necessary and agreeable to the Company's Interest, that a Letter be wrote him, Communicating Our desires on that head as also to inform him that We entirely approve what he proposes concerning the disposal of the Churches, and the Method to be observed with the Slaves which Letter is ORDERED to be entered hereafter.

Lametrie & Barneval; Though you seem to think that for sending Home the latter you have Sufficient Power; Now we humbly Conceive that there may more damage accrue to Us from sending home Mess^{rs}. Lametrie & Burneval, than there Possibly can from the Priests; and that if you think you are sufficiently empowered to send to Europe the One, We are of Opinion that you may extend it to the other, as they are as much if not more under you, and are Capable of being more Detrimental to the Company.

We have received your Letter of the 8th. Instant, wherein we take notice of what you say Concerning the sending to Europe Mess^{RS}. Lametrie & Barneval upon which we must observe to you that the motives that Induce us to imagine we have sufficient Authority for so doing, are because it is very Evident that they have both Acted a Traiterously by us. And although we do not think Our Power Extensive enough to do the like by the Priests, having no Proof of any such thing against them, yet for the reasons mentiond by Mr. Boscawē in a Letter he wrote the President under the 6th. Instant which was this day laid before Us, and upon the Suspicion we have of their behaveing Treacherously by Us at Madras when it was Besieged, We have come to a Resolution to Request of Mr. Boscawen to carry with him to Europe, not only Mess^{RS}. Lametrie & Barneval, but likewise the Fathers Severini & René, in which we doubt not Our Hoñble Masters will bear Us harmless & take upon themselves any Damage that may accrue from this Proceeding, as it is apparently for their Interest they should be removed further than just without Our Limits; where they would be almost as Capable of doing Us Prejudice, as if within Our Walls.

By the Severn that Imported here the 8th. Instant, and We now dispatch to Fort St. George to deliver to the Admiral the Stores She has brought out For his Majesty's Squadron, We send you Thirty four Coffree Slaves that came by the Chesterfield a few days past, whom you must land and put into some secure Place, which not being furnish'd with here, is the reason of Our sending them to you. There must proper Persons be appointed to look after them, and the Steward Diet them, who must draw out a Calculate of what they will stand the Company in for Provisions Monthly, which we would have Transmitted to Us. Cap^t Dorrill after having delivered all His Majesty's Stores has Our Orders to proceed directly to the Bay.

The President having laid before us a Letter from Capt Peter Eckman requesting he may receive the Hoñble Company's Gratuity at Madras, You have therefore Our Directions for paying it him there, and We Enclosed send you a Copy of the Honble Companys Commands in regard thereto for your Guidance.

That by other Advices he is acquainted it is expected that it will not be long before Nazir Jing comes into these parts with a large Army that he is now Collecting together; when it is not to be doubted He will render Invalid all the Grants the French ma[y] obtain for the Villages they have been promised by these Usurpe[rs] and to be hoped as we have not given them the least Assistanc[e] (although it has been several times requested of Us by Sunda Sai[b] when the Country is Resettled again, and the Nabobship in the Right Branch, that We may then reap some Advantages on that Account.

apprehend Our Subordinate Factory's will be greatly distress'd for want of the Supplies design'd thither; to send the same on the Fort St. George Sloop, and the Madeira Wine they shall forward to us by the first conveyance. That the Treasure by the Britannia turn'd out right, and desire we will lose no Opportunitys of sending them as much of that Article as we can by any means spare. The latter dated the 29th. Ultimo acquaints Us with their having drawn on Us Bills of Exchange in favour of Charles Brett Esq^r. amounting to Fifty thousand Arcot Rupees, which they request we will discharge.

No. 87. From the Commissaries at Fort St. George dated the 29th. Ultimo, the Commissaries. advising that they have purchased Eighty Garce more of Rice at Eighty Pagodas ~~of~~ Garse, which they apprehend will be sufficient. That in Consequence of a Letter from the President to Major Lawrence they had given Orders for the Boat People who had deserted from hence thither to be taken into Custody, but upon the Head people's acquainting them that if they were Forc'd, all the rest would leave the place, they therefore thought proper to release them having first advised with the General thereon. That in Consequence of the Request of the paymaster of His Majesty's Train to be supplied wth. One thousand & fifty Rupees (1050) on Account of the Ordnance Stores we have received from Mr. Boscawen, they had accordingly Complied therewith, for which they shall Debt this presidency & Inclosing the Madras Consultations till the 16th. June 1746.

No. 88. From the Chief and Council of Vizagapatam dated the 9th. Ultimo [VIZAGAP] ATAM. acquainting Us that by the William, they have Advice the Tryal Snow was design'd hither with the Madeira Wine, which Vessell they hope may be Ordered to call on them with the Treasure, as their Cash is very low, which we may observe by the Account thereof they enclose us. That they have sent us by the Ship Success three hundred Bales, amounting to Twenty three thous^d. three hundred & thirty five pagodas, twenty three fan^s. & sixty Cash (23355. 23. 60) which they hope will prove agreeable: & that the Tryall's passing them with the Treasure has proved a very Considerable Detriment to their Investment. That Capt. Peter Love takes passage upon the Success, and that the Chicacul Nabob and Viziramrauze are come to an Amicable Agreement; Enclosing Diarys and Cash Accounts to Ult^o. August, but their paymasters Accounts are still open till the Military's pay is Regulated.

No. 89. From Mr. John Andrews Resident at Ganjam dated the 14th. August, General Letter from Ganjam. enclosing the Accounts of that place for the last four Months, and acquainting Us that as we are pleased to promise him a Supply of Money upon the Arrival of the Ships from Europe, he is in daily hopes of receiveing it that he may be doing something towards defraying the Charges of that Factory.

As it will take up much time having so few Boats to Land the Bales the Success Bales brought from Vizagap on the success, to be transported from her to Ye. Dasamokey's, Dasapondey's, Mokedems, Inhabitants belonging to the said Town, are hereby Required to pay due Allegiance [*sic*] to the English, on whom the Affairs of the said Town depend, and they are likewise required to look upon them as Persons of such Authority, as what may be said by them concerning them, whether they be good or bad, will be Deem'd by Us Authentick, and they are Strictly enjoind to Act agreeable to this Writing.

(G) MILAPORE belonging to the Pain Gaut Country under the Government of Golcondah was delivered up to the English at Madras and Fort St. David according to their Request which was Granted by the Head Man as will appear hereunder, on Condition they assist and join the Circar.

A MANIFEST of the Request of the English (endorsed on the back of the Original) according to the Custom of the Durbar is as follows.

General Letter N^o. 95 From the Commissarys at Fort St^t. George dated the 8th.
Instant read, advising the Necessity they have been under to Agree to raise three
more Companys of Soldiers to be given to such of the Officers of the Independant

Companys as had most Influence over the Men belonging to them to engage them to enter Our Hoñble Masters Service as they shew'd a Reluctancy to serve under Strangers, and only Eighty had chose to enlist, when the General had granted his Permission for that purpose; Therefore they desire we would please to Order Commissions to be drawn out accordingly for the Persons they have entertain'd, Viz^t. Captains, William Richards, Donald Campbell Macdonald, Lieutenants Daniel Pepper, Ch^s. Campbell and [John] Hood. Ensigns Joseph Smith, Peter Campbell and [Edward] Stubbs [...] [ac]quainting Us that in Consequence of a private Letter from Capt Hollond they have entertaind Mr. Alexander Grant as an Adjutant, who proceed to Bengal on the William, with which they shall acquaint the Governour & Council of Fort William, & that the thirty peices of Blue Cloth we sent them on the Duke of Newcastle was through mistake Omitted to be Landed there. The same being Considered, as we find it was a Case of absolute Necessity that obliged the Gentlemen at Madras to act in the manner they have done, Commissions are therefore now ORDERED to be drawn out, likewise a Letter to the Commissaries to acquaint them therewith; and as the Commander of the Duke of Newcastle has carried the Blue Cloth with him to the Malabar Coast, that We desire in Our next Letter to Tellicherry, that the same may be demanded of him there.

Commissions for the new Officers at Madras Ordered to be drawn out, & a Letter to the commissaries.

The Secretary acquaints the Board that pursuant to Order of Consultation of the 23^d. Ultimo, he has demanded of Villapah Captain Hereford's Dubash, the Amount of the Debt due to Dencker, who thereupon delivered to him an Account Current between Captain Hereford & himself, which he now lays before the Board, and by which it appears that the Estate is Indebted to Villapah four Pagodas, thirteen fanams & Seventy nine Cash (4. 13. 79) instead of his being a Debtor thereto two hundred Pagodas (200), with which 'Its AGREED that the Gentlemen in Bengal be acquainted, and desired to Demand again the amount of Dencker's Debt, and not to suffer the Payment of it to be delayed any longer.

The Secretary lays before the Board an Accot. Curr^t. between Villapah & Capt Hereford by which it appears that the Estate is Indebted to the said Villapah.

Captain John Nanfan requesting to pay into the Hoñble Company's Cash for Certificates the Sum of Six Hundred Pagodas (600) the same is AGREED to be Complied with, and the Certificates ORDERED to be drawn out accordingly; likewise two Setts for Captain William Mortimore agreeable to his Request Viz^t.

Certificates Granted Captains Nanfan & Mortimore for Money paid into Cash.

One Sett for Nineteen hundred & Sixty Pagodas, twenty Fanams (1960. 20)

on Account the Estate of Capt William Bressey deceased, who came out Commander of the Fort St^t. George.

One Sett for Fifty two Pagodas (52) on Account the Estate of Captain Robert Browne deceased, late Comm of the said Ship.

The Secretary now pays into Cash the Sum of Twelve thousand, nine hundred & thirty five Pagodas, three fanams and Sixty eight Cash (12935. 3. 68); being the Amount of Charles Brett Esq^r. Agent Victualler to His Majesty's Squadron, his Proportion of the Bombay Bills of Exchange, excepting the Sum of Bombay Rupees 310. 2. 25, which the Admiral thinks it unreasonable His Majesty should be charged with, as it was for Export Customs on the provisions for the Squadron, which 'Its ORDERED that the Gentlemen at Bombay be acquainted with, and a Receipt is now given Mr. Brett for what is paid in.

Secretary pays in the amount of His Majesty's Agent Victualler's Proportion of the Bombay Bills.

The Bills of Exchange drawn on us by the President & Council of Fort William in favour of Charles Brett Esq^r. for Arcot Rupees Fifty thousand (50,000) being now Tendered for Payment they are ORDERED to be discharged; and 'its AGREED as the Ship Success will proceed to the Bay in a few Days; that by her We desire the Gentlemen in Bengall not to draw on us any more to so large an Amount, as it may put us to great inconveniencies, having already Transmitted them all that can possibly be spared from our own Occasions.

General Boscawen lays before the Board Sundry papers that were found in the House of Father De La Purification at St. Thomé, from which it will evidently appear that we have sufficient motives for sending that Priest to Europe, whom we can look upon in no other Light, than that of a Secret Enemy and a Stimulator of the Animosity's already too notorious between the French & Us.

— OCTOBER 1749 —

A Letter from Monsieur Dupliex & the Council of Pondicherry dated the 26th. October NS: read as entered hereafter, Protesting against Us for making Prisoner Father René late of the Great Church at Madras on Account of his being a Subject of the King of France, and that such a Proceedure is directly Contrary to the Treaty of Aix La Chapelle as well as that Agreed on for the Evacuation of the Town; wherefore they Demand he may be released. In Answer to which 'Its AGREED to acknowledge the Receipt of Theirs, & to acquaint them that as the Reverend Father René resided so long under the English Protection, We can't but esteem him a Subject of the King of Great Britain; that as such We have made him Prisoner, and so he must continue till released by Our Superiours in Europe, which Letter is ORDERED to be wrote and a Copy to be Inserted hereafter.

A Letter from the Govern^r. & Council of Pondicherry.

Our Answer thereto.

Mr. Boscawen represents to the Board that while he was in Madras, Complaints were made to him from several of the Black People, who had Contracted Debts before, & by the Loss of that place, that their Creditors were extremely Rigorous in extorting their Demands from them; and w^{ch}. it was impossible for them to Comply with immediately by reason of their late Misfortunes, and that all their Effects were dispersed in different parts of the Country, but that as soon as they could gather them in, they should be very ready and willing to give their Creditors all the Satisfaction in their Power. This Mr. Boscawen observes may be attended with the utmost ill Consequence, as no doubt if they are suffered to be Oppress'd in so sensible a manner, they will be induced to Quit the Settlement and seek Refuge, in the Country or from the Protection of some other European Nation; which is a Circumstance that will greatly affect the Interest of the Hon^{ble} Company in the Loss of several wealthy Inhabitants. Wherefore He proposes that an Order of Council should be Issued out importing, that no Person shall be obliged to the Payment of any Debts Contracted before the Loss of Madras within the Space of a Twelvemonth from the Date thereof, except in that Interval the Mayor's Court should be Reestablish'd. But notwithstanding they are by this Order Exempted from y^e. Payments of their Debts within that Term, yet if their Creditors require them to make up their Accounts they shall be obliged to Comply therewith. The Board being sensible of the reasonableness, and Utility of what Mr. Boscawen proposes, Agree that it be put in Execution, and that an Order to the above Effect be Transmitted to Madras to be affixed to the several Gates of that place.

Mr. Boscawen Represents the ill Consequence attending a too rigorous treatment of those who had contracted Debts by the Loss of Madras & proposes someth^g. for their Relief w^{ch}. is Agreed to.

A Letter from Nicholas Morse Esq^r. and Mr. Andrew Munro dated the 5th. Instant, read, as entered hereafter, Requesting that We will represent to Commodore Lisle (who they understand may probably go into the Streights of Malacca) the unhappy Accident that befell Captain Munro in the Peyton Galley in the year 1747 who was cutt off by the Malays at Reo, and all the Europeans with him Murdered & the Ship and Cargo Seized upon. In Order that a proper Resentment may be shewn for so shocking an Act of Villainy, and if possible some Satisfaction obtain'd for the Owners and Adventurers of said Ship. In Consequence of which Letter 'Its AGREED to Address Commodore Lisle and enclose him a Copy of the same, which is accordingly done, and the Letter Ordered to be Entered hereafter.

A Letter as entered hereafter from the Committee appointed to inspect the Church Books, and to Collect what Money was due to that Stock, acquainting the Board that the Debtors in general are of Opinion that the Hon^{ble} Court of Directors cannot Invest the President & Council with proper Powers to Grant Acquittances for the Payment of any Sum of Money owing to the Church Stock without a Regular Commission from the Court of Chancery; and that the same Objections have been Started with Respect to the Charity Stock. The President produces to the Board a Letter he has received from several Gentlemen Residing at Madras which being read enclose Copy of a Petition they delivered to Admiral Boscawen upon observeing so few of the Military belonging to the Independant Companies chose to enlist; desiring he would take proper measures to provide for the Safety of themselves and Effects by rendering that Garrison Tenable against the Attempts they have at present too much reason to Dread from the Situation of Affairs now in the Country, as the Place has been rendered so incapable of Defence by the French; the which as the time was likely to be very short that Mr. Boscawen was to stay there, they had not an Opportunity of Communicat^g. to him for his Sentiments thereon before they presented it. But as Major Lawrence had concurred therein, they hope the same will meet with his Approbation. The said Ltre and Petition are ORDERED to be entered hereafter.

As it is probable it may be some months before we may receive a supply of Treasure from Europe, and the Draft lately made on us of the Gentlemen in Bengal being to so great an Amount, may before a Ship arrives from thence occasion a want of Cash here, which We have no hopes of procureing either at Interest or in any other manner. 'Tis therefore AGREED that the President[s] Request be Complied with, and the Bills are now Ordered to be drawn likewise a Letter of Advice to accompany them.

The Humble Petition of Thomas Eyre, Edward Harris, Cornelius Goodwin, Henry Powney, Samuel Greenhaugh and George Jones, On behalf of themselves as Inhabitants & Merchants of Madras, and Consignees of Merchandize for whom they are in Trust.

SHEWETH

That Your Petitioners for themselves beg leave to represent that they have for many Years been Inhabitants & Merchants in Madras. that at this time they stand Possessed of Houses & Lands with Goods and Merchandize to a very large amount. That they are Possessed of also to a very large amount of Goods, Moneys and Merchandize, of and belonging unto Sundry Merchants in England and several parts in India. Subjects to His Britannick Majesty as We ourselves are.

Now for as much as we are given to understand from the present Condition of this Garrison in Respect to its Fences, Defences, Walls and Bastions, all of which we are assured are Undermined, and Consequently incapable of resisting the Force of Battery or such like Attack by an Enemy provided with Cannon. And for asmuch y^t. admitting the said Walls & Bastions were in good Order, and in a Condition to make even a Vigorous Defence, yet so it is that the Military Force now in Garrison is in number far unequal to Defend even the Suburbs of the Town from the Insults & Devastations which may be committed by any Considerable Body of a Country Enemy. And We beg leave also to Remonstrate to you, that it is a General Opinion now prevailing in Town, that this Province from the late Invasion of the Moratty may become the Seat of much War & Bloodshed, perhaps very soon. Under such Circumstances as we are in at present, we shall be left wholly Destitute of Force to Resist an Enemy of any Importance, and perhaps at last fall a Sacrifice to a Barbarous Power, Supported and Influenced by French Politics to promote Our Destruction.

To whom can We apply, or from whom can we hope for succour or Assistance? This place will be a Windward Port till January, that no Releif from the Presidency by Sea can be expected, nor can we any more expect such Overland; for the Enemy will have it in their power to intercept all that can be spared or may Attempt to come that way; and should this, As it often happens prove a dry Monsoon, We cannot conceive how any thing can ward off the Inevitable, the Total Ruin & Destruction of this place, unless your Honour shall please to be the Protector thereof.

And therefore your Petitioners humbly pray that your Honour will please to take Our Case into your wise Consideration; That you would please to provide for Our Safety by Rendering this Garrison Tenable against all those Attempts which we have too much reason to Dread: and finally that you will be pleased also speedily to give such Orders as may tend thereunto, for the Wellfare of the Town & 'its Districts, and Satisfaction of its native Merchants; whose Minds are at this time greatly Disturb'd, of whom a Multitude would gladly join in Our Request were we to make Our Fears Publick But having an entire Confidence that your Honour will need no Prompter to take such measures as will be most conducive towards the Safety and Protection of His Majesty's Subjects in their Persons & Trade; the Security of this Once valuable Settlement to the East India Company, and to both the Glory & Honour of the British Nation in General.

Thus shall the English have just Cause to bless the Wisdom of your Conduct abroad, and the Posterity of the Natives bless you hereafter; and we your Petitioners as in Duty bound shall ever Pray.

HONBLE SIR

The Day before yesterday when His Majesty's Troops were Ordered to Embarque, so few were left behind as to cause not only Us, but indeed the whole Place to be vastly uneasy; and imagining the Generals departure would be equally precipitate, We waited upon Major Lawrence for his Council and Advice, relating to Us, Our Effects, and those of Our Constituents; He was pleased to declare with all the Honour & Honesty of a Disinterested Officer, that he did not deem the Town tenable in the Condition it was then, and freely Granted Us leave to lay any Request we had to make, before the General, which we did that very afternoon, a Copy of which we have the Honour to enclose.

The Disposition of Affairs at that time, and the appearance of all further Succours forsakeing Us very soon, would not admit of time to Address your Honour upon this Occasion, and therefore it was that we took this Step upon Major Lawrence's Approbation. We nevertheless think think [sic] it Our Duty, as well as in point of Complaisance, to inform your Honour of it; and We flatter Ourselves that you will receive it so favourably as to believe our Forwardness, as it really was, proceeded from no other motive whatever, than that of having the Place preserved to the Company, Our Persons & Trade to Ourselves, and the Effects wth. which we are Charged belonging to Our Constituents, secured to them.

We are fully persuaded your Honour cannot approve of any thing but what is Right, and that this may be so in your Estimation is Our greatest hope; and that your Hon^r. will also beleive Us to be with the Greatest Respect.

I take the Liberty to acquaint You that on last Wednesday Night about 11 O Clock an Officer of this Garrison came to my House and took me with him to the Fort as he said by Order from Major Lawrence who now Commands at this Place; at my Coming to the Guard Room, it was Signified to me to make what Preparations possible before day light, for by that time I should be sent on Board of One of His Majesty's Ships under Admiral Boscawen's Command then lying ready to Sail for Europe: I accordingly Submitted and was going aboard provided only with Necessaries as so few Hours would permit, till Major Lawrence produced a Letter from the Hon^R M^r. Boscawen wherein he permits him to accept of a Bail of Twenty thousand Pounds Sterling for my appearance, & to hold myself in readiness to Embark on any Ship you may please to appoint for it in January next.

I applied myself to Major Lawrence desiring He would inform me wherein I had offended so as to Occasion so surprizing an Imprisonment; his Answer was that the Arrest was in Obedience to Orders he had from Your Honour & c^a. and that he could not Satisfy me in any further Particular's.

As I am really at a Loss to Guess at any thing I can have done to deserve an Arrest, I therefore entreat Your Honour & c^a: would be pleased to Order what You have to lay in Charge against me, may be heard before such Gentlemen as you may please to appoint at this Place, where I may have Opportunity to Settle my Affairs as well as so few Months will allow; and as here also I apprehend I shall have better Opportunity to clear up any Imputations that I Suffer by, and with the highest degree of Concern.

On my arrival at Batavia, finding I was Streighten'd for time to execute your Business with the Care and Inspection I could have done it with in a larger Space; I enquired for a Person of known & approved Integrity in Dealing and one that had served the Honourable Company aforetime; Upon which I was recommended by Mr. Combes to Mr. Garden who had procured the Arrack for Capt Barton & Capt Stevens; accordingly I applied to him, requesting him to Use his utmost Vigilance in purchasing the best Leagues he could possibly Select out of abundance of bad Ones: but after my Repeated Precautions to him, many of the Leaguers that were sent off were so bad, as obliged my Officers to return them; this I informd him of, but there being a Scarcity in the Place after Our most Scrutinous Search, could not procure so good as I could wish; yet they were such as upon survey of them appeared tolerably good; and that they should not be liable to Damage in their Passage, I sent express Orders to my Officers to be peculiarly Carefull in their Stowage of them, not to let but One Leaguer ride Upon another, whereas it is Customary to Stow three or four upon one another. This Order & their Compliance with it, my Officers are all ready to Attest; therefore I can attribute the great Defeciency of Arrack to be oweing to nothing else but the Leaguers being much worse than they Upon the nicest Examination appeared to be. A LETTER from Capt Edward Wills read as Enter'd hereafter, wherein he represents that his Chief Mate (Mr. Meleod) whom the Ships Company complain'd against has during the Time he has been an Officer with him, shew'd rather too much Mildness than been Guilty of Inhumanity to the People, and he imagines was there time to enquire into the Affair, it would be found that not above Five or Six were concern'd therein; therefore is of Opinion a few Lines from Us to the Ships Company in General would make every thing very easy; and as he is at present so extreemly ill, once more desires we will Comply with the Request he before made to us to stay behind. The same being Maturely Deliberated on, as the obliging him to proceed on this Voyage may probably prove fatal to him in the bad State of Health he is at present Afflicted with, when the Command would naturally Devolve to the Chief Mate, 'Tis therefore AGREED as Captain Wills has recommended him to be so Capable an Officer, that the Charge of the Ship be Committed to him, and to prevent any Disorders arising in the present Voyage, as Capt Wills is of Opinion not above five or six were Concern'd in the Affair, that he be Directed to send them ashore that they may remain here till the said Ships return, and that a paper be wrote to be Read to the whole Crew, Directing and Enjoining them to Obey Mr. Meleod as their Commander, otherwise We shall take proper measures to compel them thereto, a Copy of which with the Letter to Captain Wills are ORDERED to be Enter'd hereafter.

A Letter from the Committee appointed to examine Mr. Edmund Massey, dated the 28th. read as entered hereafter Setting forth, that in Obedience to Our Commands they Assembled in Order to make enquiry into the said Gentleman's Capacity as a Seaman; but being prevented in their Proceedings by a Resolution which is Sett forth in a Letter they now enclose, they beg leave to Recommend to Our notice. Whereupon Mr. Massey's Letter to the said Committee being read (as enter'd hereafter) Represents, That as he is inform'd they are appointed to Examine into his Capacity as a Seaman; he presumes the Consequence will Prove his being Superseeded; Therefore Requests as there has been some Difference between Capt Mortimore and himself that they will recommend to Us that he may go home in any other Ship, and in what Station we may think proper; In Consequence of which as the Fifth Mate of the Royal George is willing to Resign that Station to him, and to take his on board the Fort St. Geo: 'Tis therefore AGREED to grant them Permission to make that Exchange.

The Paymaster & Mr. Thomas Savage Lieutenant of the Train, having been on board the Royal George to Survey her Men and Warlike Stores, now deliver in their Report to Us, which is ORDERED to be enter'd hereafter.

The General Letter to the Hon^{ble} Court of Directors to go by the Royal George, being read in its Foul Copy and approved, the same is now ORDERED to be Copied fair with all possible Expedition.

The President acquaints the Board that the Rupees he received from the King of Tanjour being of Different sorts he delivered them to the Assaymaster to be Assay'd & Valued, who having accordingly done the same, he now delivers in an Acco^b. thereof, by which it appears they have produced, thirteen thousand two hundred & Ninety Seven Pagodas, thirty fanams (13297. 30) which is now paid in and ORDERED to be brought to Account under the Head of Expedition to Tanjour.

The President lays before the Bd. the Assay Masters Valuation of the Rupees reced from the King of Tanjour; the Amot. of which is paid into Cash, & Ordered to be brought to Account.

Your's I received last Night accompanying a General Ltre of Complaint from the Ship Elizabeth, where if time would permit that we could bring this Affair to a Tryal, I am almost Satisfied, should not find above Six or Eight Concern'd in this Complaint, and those were always Obliged to carry a strict hand over. If they could make their Assertion good, (which I greatly doubt) it is highly necessary they should be Righted. But on the other hand for such Insolent Behaviour in troubling Yo^r. Honours before they made any Regular Complaint to me; the Cause of which was their being served Fish by my Order, Fifteen Mulletts to five Men with Rice & Ghee, which I thought a Sufficient Allowance, Likewise further, Their acquainting Your Honours that they would not heave up the Anchor, is too great an Insolence to be Suffered; and if such growing Evils are left Unpunish'd, may in process of Time turn to bad Consequence. I have belonged to the Ship Elizabeth upwards of two Years, during which time to the best of my Knowledge, I never saw Mr. Mcleod so much as Strike a Man, or ever give any of them bad or uncommon Language; Captain Lawrence alway's thinking him too Mild with the People; But it was now high time for him to exert himself, when without a Regular Complaint they Refused their Duty, and Came aft in a Tumultious Manner and what they Call Inhuman Treatment was only a few Stripes with a Rattan, which was Acting like an Officer in His Station, but I think rather too Mild, for if such Things are left unpunish'd amongst Seamen the Companys Interest would frequently suffer, as it would have done at this time, there being several Boats and a great deal of Redwood along Side. I am Satisfied that a few Lines from Your Honour's would immediately put this Affair to Rights, and make every thing on board Easy. I really should be at a Loss where to find a Man more Capable to proceed on this Voyage than Mr. Macleod, and as I have got a Return of my Distemper, going on board might be Attended with bad Consequences; therefore if Your Honours could Indulge me with my Request in Staying ashore, would Once more beg it. A Letter from Mr. William Belsches Surgeon dated the 3^d. Instant, acquainting Us that towards the end of the Month of July in the year 1748, a Representation was made to him by the Mates of the Hospital of the great hardships the Sick & Wounded Labour'd under for want of the Common necessaries of Life; occasion'd, as he found upon Enquiry by the absence of the Steward Isaac Merigeot, who was Sick and had not furnish'd his Conicoply with Money to make the Accustomary Provision for the People. That upon finding this Story to be true he had made the Conicoply a small Advance to enable him to go on with the Business, and had afterwards taken the first Opportunity of Representing this Affair to the Governour, who approved of what he had done, and ORDERED him to see that the Sick & Wounded were taken Care of; which he Continued to do till the matter was otherwise regulated; and in that Intrim to the best of his Remembrance advanc'd the Conicoply at several times, One hundred Ninety eight Pagodas, some Fanams, which he made application to be Reimbursed upon the return of the Troops from Pondicherry, but before he could obtain it was told that the Conicoply's Accounts must be examin'd by the Gentlemen of the Choultry, which was accordingly done and no Objection made to them as far as he was Concern'd, wherefore he imagin'd he should have no further trouble about it, especially as he thinks Mr. Prince promised he should be paid in a few days; but when he applied for the Money was greatly Surpriz'd to receive for Answer that he must wait till the Steward had adjusted Accounts with his Conicoply; But as that he apprehends can have no Connection with this Affair, he desires We will give an Order for his being Reimbursed. In regard to this matter Mr. Prince acquaints the Board, that the Accounts that were delivered in & examined at the Choultry were for only part of the Sum he mentions to have laid out; Whereupon 'Its AGREED & ORDERED that the Secretary do acquaint Mr. Belsches by Letter, that the Money which has been Collected by the Rolliers of the several Companys on account of the Sick and Wounded in the Hospital during the Siege of Pondicherry shall be paid him, but what further may be due on that Account they don't think proper to discharge till they receive a particular Account how the same was laid out.

MAJOR LAWRENCE at Fort St. George.

The President lays before the Board a Letter he has received from Mahomud Ally Cawn, wherein he writes in the most pressing Terms for Assistance, and Claims it in Consequence of a Promise made him to that purpose by the President, which though only Verbal he professes to look on as Inviolable. That he has wrote several times in Our favour to Nauzer Jing, representing the readiness with which we espoused his Interest and that Our Complying with what he now requests, will be a further means of Engaging his Affection. That agreeable to Our desire he had lately sent Us a Sinned (or Grant) for St. Thomé. and in Compliance with Our further Request, will (when he receives the desired Assistance) send Us one for the Trevendeparum Country. That he cannot but Admire the Behaviour of the French in Adhering to the Cause of Chunda Saib purely on Account of their Friendship to him; though such a Proceedure must certainly produce bad Effects in the end by drawing on them the Resentment of Nauzer Jing; That as y^e. English in matters of Friendship have always the Reputation of exceeding the French, He hopes we will Support that Character by sending him the Assistance he desires. In Consequence of this Letter it being Considered that Chunda Saib with the help of the French may be enabled to Subdue every thing before Nauzer Jing arrives, unless We Assist Mahomud Ally, 'Tis therefore AGREED to send him under the Command of Captain Cope, as many Men as we can Conveniently spare, which 'tis thought will be about One Hundred, as also to Comply with any Reasonable Request he may make for Warlike Stores, he promising to be accountable for the same, and to maintain the People entirely at his own Charge. And as Our Conduct in this Affair, must be highly pleaseing to Nauzer Jing, We hope when he arrives of reaping some Considerable Advantages to the Honble Company from the Attachment we have shewn to his Interest. And as he is shortly expected, AGREED that a Present be got ready for him to the amount of about Ten thousand Pagodas, one Article of which to be a Tent made according to the Directions he gave Mootal when he was with him as Our Vakeel.

The President lays before the Bd. a Letter from Mahomud Ally Cawn requesting Assistance.

Agreed to send him Capt Cope with abt. 100 Men & to Supply him with some Warlike Stores.

A Present Ordered to be prepared for Nazar Jing.

General Letter No. 108 from Major Lawrence at Fort St. George dated the 14th. read, Acknowledgeing the Receipt of Ours of the 6th. and acquainting Us that Mess^{rs}. Starke & Walsh arrived there the 13th. whom he had Employ'd to put in Execution Our Orders relating to Roman Catholicks & Confiscations desiring to know whether the Armenians in General are to be excluded the White Town, as also that We will send Our Directions concerning the Houses of those who are Ordered to quit the Place, and to whom the Proprietors may dispose of them. That on the Seizure of the Portugueze Church, the Fath^{rs}. Capuchins had presented a Petition, desiring a Prolongation of the time Allotted them to remove, which Petition he encloses (and it is entered hereafter). That Mr. Lametrie had inform'd him, both his Houses were Mortgaged to the deceas'd Mr. Madeiras, and therefore the Honble Company must be accountable for them to that Estate. That the Fathers Capuchins, and most of the others whose Possessions had been Seiz'd, having desired an Attested Copy of Our Orders to him on that head, he thought himself Obliged to Gratify them therein. He further desires Our Directions concerning a House adjoining and belonging to the Portugueze Church not mention'd in the List of Confiscations, and acquaints Us that Mr. Jones had applied to him for the Terms on which he might Rent Mr. Lametries House in St. Tomas's Street, having before Entered into Engagements with that Gentleman to Inhabit the same Rent free till January for putting it into Repair, towards which he had already laid out thirty

Article of the Definitive Treaty, & which they know not how We can oppose in so glaring a mann^r. being persuaded that we are not furnishd with any Orders for these Proceedings. That they shall prevent as much as lays in their Power the deep Slur we are laying upon a Treaty which Our Sovereigns have judged proper to make for the Benefit of their People, and they Protest against Us, and against All others who may have given Us an Order for Acting in such a manner; Also very Impertinently tell Us, as the Padrees Contributed not a little to the former Splendor of Madras, that might have been sufficient to have Occasion'd Our using less Rigour towards them. In Answer to which, as Our Sentiments differs so much from theirs wth. It is now more than a Month since I had the Honour to send you a Letter for the Gentlemen of Council at Fort St. David; they have not yet done me the favour to Answer it; I had nevertheless all reason to hope that the Terms I was on with them and my being a Stranger merited some Regard with them. You (Sir) have executed the Arrest of my Imprisonment, by Order of the said Council, It appears to me by that Declaration you have given me an opening to Address myself to those Gentlemen to know the motive for such a Violence, to know the Accusation against me, & to know by what Authority I have been taken by Violence from my House & committed to Prison. Is it by Order of the King? Is it by Order of the Company? or by the private Authority of the said Council. Every Law founded on the Principles of Nature and Equity, permit me & even oblige me to this Request, to proceed to my Defence, and clear myself by Witnesses by Attestations or by Writing what may be favourable to my Cause. The Silence of these Gentlemen is a Denial of Justice, which obliges me to Protest against whom it may Concern, and to make it in due form, I take the Liberty to request you will notify me the ORDER by w^{ch}. you was Authoriz'd to Imprison me, and at the same time to inform me whether you sent my Letter to the Council. TO M^r. FLOYER & THE GENTLEMEN
OF COUNCIL AT CUDDALORE.

SIR & SIR'S

We understand that on the 24th. of last Month, two of your Servants, by name Strake & Walsh, signified by your Order to the Capuchin Padrees, that their Church Houses, Habitations and Chappel at Vipary were to be Confiscated to the use of your Company, and that you had given the Benefit of that Dwelling to the Danish Missionaries, with an Order at the same time to the Padres & other Catholicks to leave the Town of Madras in Eight days, This proceeding will appear the more extraordinary, as it is entirely Contrary to the General and Definitive Treaty of Peace Sign'd at Aix La Chapelle the 18th. October 1748, & ratified by the Contracting Powers, We cannot persuade Ourselves that you have received any Order to oppose in so Glaring a manner as You do, the second Article of the said Treaty, wherein it is said.

“ There shall be a total Forgettfulness of every thing that has happen'd during
“ the War, and every one upon the Exchange of the Ratifications shall be put in
“ Possession of all their Effects Dignities, Ecclesiastical Benifices & Honours, which
“ they Enjoy'd at the begining of the War, notwithstanding all Depossessions,
“ Seizures or Confiscations, occasion'd by the said War.”

We are moreover inclin'd to beleive that your Superiours can never have given such an Order, as when it was ask'd concerning these same Capuchins in the Treaty of the Evacuation, M^r. Boscawen not only ratified the Article which relates to them, but has added in his Letter that it lay with him to Demand the Execution of the 2^d. Article, if these Padrees were Included in the Case of Seizure or Confiscation M^r. Floyer, whose Ltré is very short refers to the Decission [*sic*] of M^r. Boscawen, We enclose to you copy's of both, and We shall Transcribe hereunder the Article of the Treaty of Evacuation, which repeals the second Article of the Treaty of Aix La Chapelle in favour of the Capuchins of the Province of Tourrain.

“ In Consequence of the Second Article of the said Treaty, and upon Account
“ of some Reports maliciously Invented and Ill founded, The Capuchins of the Pro-
“ vince of Touraine shall fully enjoy the Effect of the said Article in whatever it
“ Concerns them in the said Town of Madras.”

We know not how you can oppose Treaties so Authentick, nor can We think that your Conduct can be justified by the Court of England, nor ought you to persuade yourselves, but that Ours will make all the Demands it has a Right to make

by Virtue of the said Treaty. On Our part We have the Honour to lay before You the most just representations, and if you will not acquiesce therein until Answers from Our Respective Superiours, You oblige Us to tell You that we prevent as much as lyes in Our Power, the deep Slur you are laying upon a Treaty which Our Sovereigns have judged proper to make for the Benefit of their People; And that We Protest against You Gentlemen who compose the Council of Fort St. David, and against all others who may have given you an Order so contrary to the Tranquility w^{ch}. the whole Christian World ought to enjoy by so Authentick a Treaty, making you answerable for all Losses, Damages & Expençe; which may be Occasioned by this Order.

We shall make no Reflections Gentlemen on the short times you have given these Padres to remove: Their Possession of 125 Years standing & more might have required a little less Rigour on your part, supposing you had a Right to drive them away; since they Contributed no small matter to the former Splendour of your City of Madras, We shall likewise leave it to them to Represent in Europe the Lawfull Possession of their houses, Churches &c^a. at Madras; and [thô] these cannot add Force to the Second Article of the Treaty of Aix La Chapelle, nor to that of the Evacuation of the Place, They will always be able to prove their Cause the best in the World.

SIR & SIR'S

I cannot help acquainting your Honour &c^a. of my great Surprize to find that there is an Order of Council sent here some Days ago to deliver up the Chappel & other Buildings at Viparie to the Danish Missionaries, notwithstanding the Remonstrances I have made by my Letters to the Honourable Governour Floyer to the Contrary; and to which (by the by) his Honour has not vouchsafed me An answer hitherto. It will be a great Satisfaction to me if Your Honour &c^a. will please to let me know by what Law or Authority you give away my Property at Pleasure. It may perhaps be imagin'd that I have made over Viparee Chappel &c^a. to the Romish Priests, and of Consequence that it is their Property, but I declare I have done no such thing. It was Originally intended for the use of the poor Beggars of Madss and how your Honour &c^a. can alienate [*sic*] it to other purposes I must own I cannot conceive, as it cost me upwards of four thousand Pagodas; which if you will please Order to be paid me here I'am ready to deliver it up to the Danish Missionaries, or whom else your Honour &c^a. thinks fit, but should your Honour &c^a. not think proper to do this, nor yet let it remain appropriated to the first use I intended it, I in that Case desire the favour I may have the Liberty to give it to the Priests of my own Nation, who have had their Church raised to the Ground by the French in Our late Calamity's. I have no ill Will to the Danish Missionaries nor to any Christian Missionaries, and have already wrote the Governour I am willing to Contribute something towards building a Church for them, but to let them have Viparee Church is what I can never Consent to, and therefore I humbly desire your Honour &c^a. will not Insist on it, upon Consideration that the many troubles I undergone was with hopes of reaping advantages with yo^r. Nation, and not to be wronged from my Right. Your doing me Justice herein will greatly Oblige.

To STRINGER LWRENCE Esq^r.

SIR

You was pleased to inform me on the 12th. of October last, the Day after I had been made Prisoner; that it was done in Consequence of, and in Obedience to the Orders of the Governour & Council of Fort St. David, to whom I had the Honour to Address myself on the 17th. of that Month, and then did Request of them the favour to give me their reasons for their having Commanded me to be Confin'd in the manner I had been; But I am as yet so unfortunate as not to be thought deserveing of any Reply, at least I have not yet received any from them, which Treatment naturally has led me to beg Sir, of you to interceed with those Gentlemen to grant me what I have so unsuccessfully solicited for myself; and at th[e] same time I do not think that I am asking for more than I am entitled to by, Birthright, by the know[sic] Laws of my Country, and the Rights and Preveledges of all English Men who 'tis notorious cannot be abridged of their Liberty as I have been, without having offended some Law, and even then the nature of the Crime is to be Signified to him, be it ever so trifling or ever so enormous, whereby he is to reap all Benefit of Exception, and have all manner of Advantages to prepare for his Defence; all which Benefits and Advantages you are Sensible Sir I am likely to be deprived of totally unless I am acquainted with the Misdemenour, which has brought on me not only the Disgrace of an Arrest, but an Eternal Stain to my Credit as a Merchant, and utter Ruin of my Fortune; and as these Damages are irreparable, I conclude from thence that it may be thought my Offence (for I am Conscious of none) is unpardonable, and the World will naturally enough Conclude it to be so, if it is kept from them as it is from me; Therefore it is Sir for my own Vindication that I do most earnestly request that you would inform those Gentlemⁿ. that I do Demand from them an Exhibition of their Charge agst. me; for I stand upon a high Bail to answer every thing which they may have to accuse me of; and if I cannot acquit myself Lawfully & Honourably, then may not only the whole weight of the Laws, but their Resentment fall heavy on my head; & I should be wanting in many Duty's were I patiently to suffer such Rigorous Proceedings to pass over Silently, since they are of a nature for which I know no Precedent, therefore I shall think myself highly to blame, were I to submit to its becoming a Precedent in me.

The time for my Departure Out of India in Consequence of the Security I have given for my so doing, draws on apace, the Ship destin'd for me to take my Passage for England upon, may go early in January, in such Case no time is to be lost, for my Supposed Crime if I am Guilty of any must I think have been Committed in these parts; then Sir you will surely grant that all I can have to have produce, and all Testimonys and Proofs for my Justification, must be in India also, and to be deprived of all these I cannot as yet imagine will be my Case, for I am persuaded that Gentlemen of your Honour & Integrity Pay too great a Regard to Laws to let such a Manifest Infringement thereof take Place. Perhaps I may have the Mortification (notwithstanding all the kind Offices you may be so good to make use of) to meet a Denial to my Request, In such Case I must beseech of you to grant me an Attested Copy of such Orders you have received of the Governour & Council of Fort St. David for my Arrest and Imprisonment, and also another Copy of that part of their Ltr̄e to you wherein they seem to deny me a Reply to my aforementioned Ltr̄e of the 17th. October.

I am next to inform You that on the 21st. Instant Mess^{rs}. Starke & Welsh served me with a Precept from you Signifying to me that my House in Choultry Gate Street was by the Order of the Governor & Council of Fort St. David Confiscated for the Use of the Honourable Company, this has added but very little to my Astonishment, because I yet flatter myself it will not be Carried into Actual Execution, that is I hope so; But should they be pleased to confirm that Order, then I beg they will be also so Generous as to give me at least one good Reason for their Seizing & Confiscating my Property to the Amount of Two thousand Pounds Sterling.

In what I have already said if there is any Word capable of giving Offence; I sincerely beg your Forgiveness because I should be Concern'd, and very much so to misbehave in the least Circumstance to you or any other Gentleman; But as all I Solicit for, is I beleive within the bounds of Reason and Justice, and what you would Sir I am certain not withhold from the Lowest of Mankind; therefore it is that I have taken the Freedom to make my Application to you for through your means and by your Representation of my Case I hope to obtain what I have ask'd for; and that whic[h] will infinitely serve me in my present unhappy Condition.

Five thousand seven hundred & twenty Pagodas, twenty one fanams, and forty eight Cash, since his Confinement we have Tendered the Accounts to him, but reced for Answer that the little Time you have granted him to Settle his Affairs, has put it out of his Power to collect that Sum. Be this Reason just or not, it is certain that Our Company are likely to have no Account of this Money by your very Act, as it is by your Order that he is Confined, which puts it in Our Power to make you Answerable for the Said Sum to Our Company, as well as for the Interest till the whole is paid, and to Protest again, against You Gentlemen for thi[s] Action, and its Consequences, of which you can no longer pl[ead] Ignorance.

LaMettrie and Barnewall out of Our Limits will Cancell Mr^s. Madeiras's Bond for their Appearance in January, they have thought proper to defer the Execution, till they have Our Sentiments in that particular, & shall Comply with Our Commands in relation to the letting the Confiscated Houses, the enquiry to be made into those Reported to be Mortgaged, and Affixing at their Gates the Orders We transmitted them. The Second dated the 4th. Inst^t. Advises that in Consequence of what they wrote Us in the foregoing they

sent for Mess^{rs}. Lamettrie & Barnewall before them to prove the Mortgage of their Houses, who promised to do it in three days, but at the same time Absolutely refused to take the Oath of their Incapacity to discharge the same; Alledgeing they were Trading Men, and as such could not possibly affix their Circumstances; therefore they request Our Orders on that head and further acquaint Us that they have Ordered the Accounts ever since the first arrival of the Commissarys there to be laid before them in Order to be Regulated under the proper heads, which they shall forward to Us as soon as finish'd with their Monthly Papers. The same being deliberated on, As the Papers found in the House of Padre Antonio of Purification at St. Thomé were Evident Proofs of their having a firmer Regard for Our Interest than that of the French, for which reason and as our Boat People, who are of that Communion, may probably be induced to leave Us, should We expell them Our Limits, 'Tis AGREED to Comply with their Request, and that the Romish Church Situated at Milend be delivered over to them; and a Letter to the Deputy Gov^r. & Council of Fort St. George, to put them in Possession thereof is ORDERED to be wrote, likewise to direct them to deliver up to M^{rs}. Madeiras her Bond for the appearance of Mess^{rs}. We have the Honour to Answer the Article of your L^{tr}e of the 30th. Novem-
ber O:S: regarding M^r. LaMettrie.

It is true that M^r. Lamettrie remaind in Madras after the takeing of that Place. We have also during his Residence there received such Sums from him, as to reduce what he owed to the Sum of Pag^s. 5720. 17. 48, which is due to this day; and for which he obliged Us to wait the Answer from Our Company upon his Representations that he might either obtain a delay of Payment or a Clearance, to which they have not thought Proper to Consent, but on the Contrary have Ordered Us to insist upon Payment. It is in Conformity to these Orders that We have been so pressing with M^r. LaMettrie, and the more so since We heard of his Imprisonment, which we could not foresee, It is therefore with Reason We take notice y^t. Our Company are likely to be kept out of this Money for a long time, and even in Risque of loseing it entirely, since you have thought proper to Confiscate his Houses at Madras, as well as those of many others, the same Reason Authorises Us to make you responsible for this Sum, as it is by your means Our Company stand the Risque of loseing it, Without mak^s. Use of any further Argument, We declare to you that We Protest against You Gentlemen, and against all who may have join'd in the Order for Arresting him, and that we persist in Charging you with the Sum due to Us on Account of the Company from M^r. La Mettrie, with the Interest that may become due from the day of the date of Our first Letter.

General Letter N^o. 123, From the Deputy Govern^r. & Council of Fort St. George, dated the 13th. Decem^r. read, enclosing a Letter Address'd to Us by Mr. LaMettrie, and acquainting Us that Mr. Barnewall was gone to Pondicherry, having first requested their leave and Passport for that purpose; to which they had return'd for answer, that they could not conceive the Reason for such an Application, as the Security already given, left him at full Liberty to go where he thought fit till the time appointed for his appearance. That finding the Bengal Rice did not Agree with their People, they had Ordered their WarehouseK^r. to purchase Paddy for their present Use, and wait Our Directions for their future Provision, as well as the disposal of the Rice now on hand. That the Accomptant had applied to them for the Valuation of the Town under the head of the Compys Stock, as likewise that of the Confiscated Houses &c^a: concerning which they desire Our Instructions, as well as the bringing to Account the Sundry Garrison Stores receiv'd from His Majesty's Ships without Invoice of their Prices.

The Letter from Mr. LaMettrie is dated the 22^d. of December NS: and the purport of it, to Demand Our Reasons for Arresting him, as also to desire We will appoint. some certain time and place, where & when he must appear to Disengage his Security. a Copy of the Letter, & 'its Translate are Ordered to be entered hereafter.

A Letter from Mr. Barnewall (as entered hereafter) dated the 12th. December, read. Wherein he Demands Our Reasons for Arresting him, and desires to know of what Offence he stands accused to require a Bail of Twenty thous^d. Pounds. He further Demands by what Authority We have Confiscated his House, and that his Crime whatever it is, may be immediately laid to his Charge, that he may Collect together such Testimonys, as are necessary for his Defence; and lastly he desires we will appoint some Day in the Month of January for his appearance, in Order to release his Bail.

As Mess^{rs}. LaMattrie & Barnewall are so desirous to be acquainted with our Motives for Arresting them 'Its AGREED to Gratify them therein, by assigning those Reasons that Mr. Boscawen makes use of, when he Urges the Necessity of their being sent to Europe. (Consult of the 2^d. Sep^r.) which are. First with regard to Mr. LaMettrie That he not only Resided under Protection of the French after the Capture of Madras, but proceeded to Pondicherry at a time when we were in Actual War with that Nation. And in Respect to Mr. Barnewall, His acting as Quarter Master to the French Troops under the Command of Monsieur Dela Bourdonnais, of which we have Sufficient Proof. And a Letter is Ordered to be wrote

Translate of the Foregoing.

GENTLEMEN

I had the Honour to write to you on the 28th. October last, and have since sent a Duplicate. I write the 29th. Ultimo to Major Lawrence then Commandant of this Place, Although I have been inform'd by the Major that my Letter came to your hands, as well as the Copy of what I wrote him, nevertheless I think myself obliged to enclose to you a Triplicate of my said Letter of the 28th. October last, with a Copy of what I wrote the Major the 29th. Ultimo. Perhaps Gentlemen this Repetition may make you sensible how desirous, I am to know the motive for your Arresting me, and I may thereby move yo^r. Attention a little more in regard to me. If you think that your Presidence and Title of Counsellors causes so great a difference between You and me, as to dispense with your answering so just a Request, permit me to represent to you that at the same time You ought to persuade yourselves, that this very Presidence, and these same Titles, Require You to administer Justice according to the Tenour of the Law.

Major Lawrence has Remitted me the Order for my Arrest. It is in Consequence of a Council of the 11th. Sep^r. last OS: it is therefore from you I am to request the Cause of my Imprisonment. I have not Gentlemen desired my Liberty from You. I have given Security in a Considerable Sum for my appearance in January, I have beg'd of you to confirm your Right over my Person, and to inform me of my Crime. You know Gentlemen there are Courts Superiour to Yours, to which I can appeal, I ought to know my Accusers. My affair is my Resort from India, and my present State will not permit me to lay Idle in Europe, waiting the necessary Papers & Witnesses, which the Declaration of my Crime now would enable me to procure before my Departure, & moreover Gentlemen it is now two Months since I was taken from my Family in the Night by Force, and Conducted by two Officers to Prison in Order to be embark'd on board a Ship for my Voyage to Europe. In the morning, agreeable to your Orders, and by my giving Security, I prevented the Execution of that Arrest. Do you pretend then to make me suffer by keeping me in Ignorance of my Crime for a Twelve month to come. Is it not enough Gentlemen, the Risk you make me run in my advanced time of Life from so long & Dangerous a Voyage, and do you reckon for nothing the irreperable Blemish you have laid upon my Character the Ruin of my Fortune, & my Seperation from my Wife & Children & Family. If I apply to your Constituents at Madras, they reply they have no Authority for declaring to me my Crime; If I address myself to you Gentlemen, You do not think proper to Honour me with an Answer. I must confess I never thought of suffering so severe Treatment, & am extreemly sorry. I find myself under a necessity of speaking my Sentiments so plain to oblige you to break that affected Silence, which you have observed towards me, & to obtain at last of you what the Laws and Justice dictate to You in favour of my Request.

HONBLE SIR & SIR'S

I had the Honour the 17th. October to address myself to you, and again on the 25th. Ultimo to Major Lawrence upon the Subject of my Grievances, and the exceeding hard Usage & treatment which I suffered in Consequence of your Orders, and as Major Lawrence has been so kind as to transmit my last Letter to your Board presently after the Delivery of it, I have from day to day waited in great expectation of your Replis thereto. Fifteen days are Elapsed since my last Letter, and I have not yet had the Honour to receive one word in Answer to it, and I am sincerely Sorry to find myself held by you in so much Contempt, and were I in the least Conscious of having deserved it, I must assure you Gentlemen no Person alive would be more ready to make all manner of Submission, nor beg harder for Forgiveness than myself; and as an Instance of my great Regard and Respect, unless you shall please to think me and my Cause worthy of some notice, I promise you most Faithfully not to be troublesome to You in Representations of this kind any more.

However Gentlemen as you have the Administration of the Laws of Our Country Delagated to you, I cannot conceive that you will deny me whatever Advantages they Entitle me to, and as Ministers of those Laws I hope to be pardon'd for changeing what I have heretofore call'd my Request into positive Demands, and the first of them is to demand of you Gentlemen, why and for what Crime I was laid under an Arrest, and Confined under the Charge of three or four Centinels from the Hours of between Ten and Eleven at night, the Eleventh day of October last, untill the hours of between seven and eight the next Morning?

Secondly I demand to know what Crime I have committed and for what Offence I stand accused, so as to require a Bail of no less than Twenty thousand Pounds Sterling, & upon the Penalty thereof to take Passage for Europe in Jañy next.

Thirdly I demand by what Authority or upon what Law you have proceeded in Confiscating and Seizeing my house in the White Town of Madras for the use of the Company, and also what Crime or Offence I have been guilty of which can support you in such Proceedings.

Lastly as it is impossible for me or any one to imagine that such Punishments and Hardships, are to be inflicted upon Innocent and Guiltless Men, therefore 'tis to be presum'd you have taken these measures with me either upon a Supposed Crime, or else upon the certainty of some Actual Offence committed by me. Be the Case as it will I now Demand, as I have done in my two abovemention'd Letters that the same Crime or Offence be forthwith laid to my Charge that I may from that Collect together all such necessary Testimonys, as may tend towards my Defence & Justification and as a Subject to the King of England I do the more earnestly enforce this last Demand.

I have now nothing to Request or Demand more than that you will with your Replis to the Foregoing please to Name a day in the Month of January next for me

to appear before you Personally, in Order to release my Bond and Bail, & to receive your Orders to take Passage for Europe in Conformity to the Nature and Intent of the said Bail or Security given to you for my so doing.

General Letters read viz^t.

N^o. 125 From the Deputy Gov^r. & Council of Fort St. George of the 18th. Instant, acknowledges the Receipt of Ours of the 15th. with M^{rs}. Madeiras's Bond, which with the Duplicate they advise they should return her, and execute Our Orders relating to the Capuchine Missionaries & Mr. LaMettrie, but Mr. Barnewall (as they before acquainted Us was gone to Pondicherry. That Mr. LaMettrie should have been applied to for his Mortgage Covenants but he had been out of Town for some days, and encloses a translate of those delivered them by Mr. Barnewall; also Copy of a Letter to them from Mr. Jones, and acquaints Us with their Proceedings in regard thereto. That Mr. Jones had applied to them for their Orders to any Commander of the Companys Ships bound to England that he might apply to for a Passage Home, to receive him and his necessaries on board, and had inform'd them he had requested the same of Us in a Letter to Our Secretary dated the 22^d. July, whereupon they directed him to receive his answer from Us and request We will acquaint them what further Steps it is necessary should be taken in that Affair; Further advises that several Persons Indebted to St. Mary's Church Stock were willing to pay in their Respective Sums to such Church Wardens as a Vestry should Elect, and as the two late ones were there ready to give in an Account of all Transactions, whilst they had that Office, nothing Retarded their Summoning a Vestry Composed of the Body of the Inhabitants of the Town and many of the former Principle Members, but our Approbation, which upon the Receipt of they should immediately set about, That upon Application being made to them for Registering of Sales and Mortgages of Houses as formerly practiced, they had opened a Register for that purpose in the Secretary's Office, which they wait Our Confirmation of.

That a Theft has been Committed in the Rice Godowns, and they have a Person in Custody supposed to be Concern'd in it, but not having Our Directions for holding a Choultry, they have desired Mr. Starke to enquire into the Affair, And that they have daily Complaints of Robberies Committed by Maulrauzes People, who are Stragling about & have received no Pay for some Time.

Letter from Mr. Jones to the Deputy Govr. & Coun. of Ft. St. George. the Board's Opinion thereon, deferr'd. General Letter to Fort St. George.

The Letter from Mr. Jones read, Contains Sundry Allegations against Mr. Moses, but as it is out of Our Power to form any Judgment of the Justness thereof till We have heard what Mr. Moses has to say, Agreed that he be Directed to deliver in his Answer thereto as expeditiously as he can, and that till then We defer giving Our Opinion on this matter. It is likewise Resolved that a Letter be wrote to the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort St. George containing Our Directions to furnish Mr. Moses with a Copy of Mr. Jones's Letter, and for the Members of their Board to Act as Justices of the Choultry, as was the Method formerly practiced here; likewise to acquaint them that their Proposition for Summoning a Vestry meets with Our Approbation, as does also the Register they have Open'd for Entering the Sales and Mortgages of Houses.

Letter from Mr. Moses. the Board's Answer. deferred.

A Letter from Mr. Levy Moses read as Entered hereafter, sets forth that having Information Mr. Jones intends to apply for Permission to proceed to Europe, he requests we will not Gratify him therein, till Accounts between them are Adjusted, as the Consequences thay may happen therefrom may be Attended with very ill Effects; in regard to which its resolv'd to defer coming to any Determination, till We have seen his Answer to Mr. Jones's Letter.

General Letter from Vizagap.

N^o. 126. From the Chief & Council of Vizagapatam dated the 21st. Ultimo, acknowledging [*sic*] the Receipt of Our Letter of the 28th. September, with the Account Sortments of Cloth & Acco^t[...] with that Factory, and enclosing Duplicate of their last.

General Letter from Pondichy.

A Letter of Mr. Dupliex & the Council of Pondicherry, dated the 30th. December NS: read. Complains of an Insult done to the Flag of their Sovereign, within the Limits of their Company by Our People, in takeing two Deserters that Ought to have been secure from Pursuit, by being under the said Flagg, but who were Carried away notwithstanding (all that their Peons could say to stop the Violence) without the least Respect to their Monarch, Therefore in his name they Demand the two Deserters to be delivered up, and require of Us Ample Satisfaction for the affront offered by Our People to His Majestys Flag. They likewise enclose a Declaration of three of their People at Bahour relating thereto, which being also read: The President then Address'd himself to the Board, who were all Strangers to this Affair except Major Lawrence, and related to them as follows. That having Information, that two Seamen Deserters from the Hospital in Cuddalore, were taken near & Carried into Bahour, by some French Peons being Arm'd, notwithstanding some belonging to Us were come up with them, and Conducting them back (being unacquainted the French had any Pretensions to that Village) and Esteeming this a great Piece of Presumption in them, He sent a Party of Soldiers to bring back the said Deserters; which was accordingly Executed, and without the least Violence; and tho' in the Declaration Transmitted Us from Pondicherry, it is mention'd the Gate of what they call their Fort there was Forc'd on the Contrary it was flung open as soon as Our People appeared, and the Deserters delivered up to them, which is Corroborated by the Depositions of two of Our Peons now laid before the Board & Perus'd, who were Eye Witnesses of the whole Affair. The same being maturely Considered, as the Relation of Our said Peons is in many Circumstances Contradictory to the Declaration of their People, and Major Lawrence acquainting the Board that it is the Custom of all Nations to pursue their Deserters into any Territories, and to take them without its being ever Complain'd of as an Insult, of which he knows some Instances himself; supposing they must be no Strangers to it likewise, We cannot therefore imagine their Motive for this Complaint, unless it is from a view to deter Us from Acting in like manner again, and that they may thereby have an Opportunity of Protecting Our Deserters in every Village just without

Our Bounds, in which they have thought proper to hoist a Flag & call their own, before we can intercept them. This We apprehend is too much the Case from (Mr. Dupleix's Directions to his Nephew Padre Antonio to encourage Our People to Desert, which was found among his papers at St. Thomé) and as there is now so good an Occasion for letting them know it, a Letter in Answer to theirs is Agreed ^{The Board's Answer thereto.} to be wrote, to acquaint them with the foregoing Circumstance, and that We thought it so extraordinary a One after the News of the Conclusion of the Peace, that We referr'd it to Europe, and if they should esteem Our Proceedings of which they now Complain, any Grievance, to desire they will do the same by them. ORDERED also as AGR^d. on in Consultation of the 14th. that they be acquainted with Our Resolution relating to Mr. LaMettrie's Debt; And that y^e. Letter from Pondicherry with its Translate and the Declaration of their People, And Our Answer with the Depositions of Our Peons & Deserters, be entered hereafter.

Companys Limits, by takeing away by Force two Deserters, who being under the Protection of His Majestys Flag ought to have been secure from the pursuit of your People. All that the two Peons who were then at Bahour could say was not sufficient to stop this Violence; The two Deserters were taken away without the least Respect to Our Monarch. It is therefore in his Name We demand the two Deserters to be deliver'd up, and require of You ample Satisfaction for the Aff[ront] offered by your People to his Majesty's Flag.

IN THE YEAR 1749 on the 30th. day of December at Eleven O'Clo[ck] in the Morning were examin'd at the Secretary's Office of [the] Superiour Council of Pondicherry before Us Andre Boyellea[u] Counsellor and Secretary, and in the presence of Messieur[...] Bertrand & Langrene Servants to the Company, the follow[ing] Witnesses, Mouton Virapoullé Chief for the French Compan[y] of the Village of Bahour; Anichen, & Dechapen, Peons on Du[ty] at the said Village, who not understanding the French Language, nor the Portugueze usually talk'd in India, have Dec[la]red to Us by the Mouth of Rangapapoullé. Interpreter to th[e] Company that yesterday about 4 O Clock in the Afternoon, bei[ng] about the Limits of Bahour, they saw two White Soldiers c[om]ing from towards Cuddalore pursued by 10 Talliar Peons, [who] having overtaken the former, had knock'd them down [wth.] Sticks, had Seiz'd them and were carrying them away with their hands tied behind them, which the said Anichen we[re] to prevent it in the Name of the King of France, representi[ng] to the Ten Peons that these two Men being within the Territories of the French Company, they had no Right to Stop them or use any Violence with them; upon which they ask'd the[m] what they intended to do with these two Europeans, to w^{ch}. they were Answered they should Carry them to the Fort in the said Village of Bahour, to which the Talliar Peons Consented telling them we will Carry them where you please, but We shall go and acquaint the Governour of Fort St. David of it, do you on your part go and advise the Governour of Pondicherry upon which two of the Ten Peons were sent away & sent towards Cuddalore & about half past Five there arrived an Officer from Cuddalore with a Detachment of 30 or 35 White Soldiers 30 Seapoys & as many Peons, all Armed with Firelocks & Bayonets fixed with two Cooleys loaded with Ammunition, whom they Ordered to call out to the said Anichen, & Dechapen, who were in the Fort to open the Gate, to which they were Answer'd they could not & would not without an Order fro[m] the Governour of Pondicherry; upon which the Officer drew his Sword, and threaten'd if they did not open it he would Kill them, to which they answer'd he might do as he pleas'd but that they would not open it. Upon this Officer forced the Gate, and the Detachment entered and took away the said two Soldiers, who were retired thither, and Carried them away to Cuddalore; When they went out Dechapen represented to the officer that he could not answer Committing such a Violence, upon which he Threaten'd him with his Fuzil, and they went away. which is all they have declared to Us & have Signed to the same. The abovemention'd Witnesses & Rangapapoullé interpreter at Pondicherry the Day & year abovewritten, SIGN'D by four Malabars, and by Bertrand, Langrene & Boyelleau.

It is in Consequence of having received your two Letters bearing date the 22^d. & 30th. Instant NS: that We now Address you. In Reply to the first of which regarding the Debt due to your Company from Mr. LaMettrie, We have to acquaint you that, that Gentleman will in a few days be at full Liberty to Proceed whither he thinks proper, whereby the Reasons you have been pleased to Alledge for making Our Company accountable to yours for the said Debt, will be Extinct therefore the Protest you have thought proper to send Us in that regard, We shall Esteem Invalid.

As to the latter We now enclose you a Copy of the Depositions of Our Peons taken upon Oath this day, as also the Declaration of the two Sailors, that were [ta]ken Prisoners by your Peons, being Arm'd, and Carried [to] what you call your Fort at Bahour. Mr. Dupleix sure[ly] cannot think Us Ignorant of the Instructions he gave h[is] Nephew Padre Antonio de Purification to spare no Cost [or] Pains in tempting Our People to Desert; We were not al[1] Surpriz'd to find such Directions given after We had notice of a Peace being Concluded between both Nations, and We cannot Suppose You Gentlemen unacquainted with the common Custom of all Nations pursueing their Deserters into any Territories, and if they have Force enough, taking them without 'Its being ever Complain'd of as an Insult. Were [we] to give Credit to the Sailors Depositions, We should have gre[at] Reason to Complain of their being made Prisoners for only [Com]ing into your Limits, as you call them. As We have referr[ed] to Europe Mons^r. Dupleix's extraordinary Behaviour in his Directions to Padre Antonio, We desire you will do the same by this if you think it any Grievance. We are

Vencatapetty & Tremaliah Peons depose [that] being at their Mettoe contiguous to Horsetail point, the[y] discover'd two Europeans on the Banks of Penniar River, w[hich] they pursued as far as Parcla Pettah, where they call'd in [for] their Assistance one Narran an Inhabitant of that place whom they met on his way towards Our bounds, who red[ily] join'd them [and] then all three follow'd them into [the] Limits of Bahour, and having Overtaken they did not offer to stir any further, upon which the tallest sailor of the two with a stick as thick as ones Arm made a blow at Narran, which he received on his left hand, he then fell'd Tremaliah with a stroke on his Head, while the little Fellow kept on his Course towards Pondicherry, throwing stones as he went on. Oppiah a Corporal Peon watching at Bahour to lay hold of Deserters, join'd the party when they had got that Length, & struck at the tall Man's hands in Order to Disarm him, with such Force that he tumbled over a little Emminence behind him, upon which the Seaman took up his Stick; & threw his own, being shorter, away, he then struck him four Blows, whereupon Narran made up to the Sailor and Levell'd a Blow at him, which was return'd immediately, the Seaman then ran farther, and the Peons finding they were not able to Manage them without greater Force got Janganiah and Vera two Inhabitants of Bahour to assist them, the latter of which brought down with his Bamboo the little Sailor who was still pelting them with Stones and bound them with his Sash, the other Sailor having Cross'd a little Gut threw Stones likewise, but being very much Fatigu'd with some little Persuasion from his Pursuers, toss'd his Stick away, & having Surrendered himself was bound also. The Peons then led them back to Parcla Pettah, where three French Peons Arm'd with a Jemidar at the head of them untied the Prisoners telling the English Peons they should send to Mons^r. Dupleix their Governour for his Instructions how to behave, and Our Peons said on their part they should make Mr. Floyer acquainted with what had happend, and obey such Orders as they should receive from him; both parties dispatch'd Couriers to their Respective Governours, but soon after the French having the Advantage of Ours by being Arm'd, Carried the Deserters into Bahour Fort and Closed the Gate, throwing out white Colours, upon which Our Peons, divided themselves round the outside of the Fort, that the Fugit[ives] might not be Carried to any other Place without their Knowledge; about an hour afterwards, upon their discover^e. within

an Officers Guard Marching to Sieze the Deserters they open'd the Gate, and gave them up to them.

George Martin and Thomas Lear Seamen declare that on Monday morning the 18th. Instant, they had Travell'd to get Palmeira leaves to make Hatts of about three Miles further than the Company's Limits, not knowing the Extent thereof, when they were Overtaken by three or four English Peons, who by Signs desired them to turn back, which they immediately did, and after they were brought half a mile distance from Parcla Pettah, four Peons belonging to the French wth. Bayonets fix'd, and two with Cutlasses, took them forcibly from the English Peons, and Carried them into Bahour Fort, shutting the Gates immediately after them. The tallest of the two beleives he might have Struck two or three of the Peons at different times, not knowing whether to take them for English or French, but that this did not happen till after the French Peons had come up with them, and they further say, that upon sight of the Guard they were the first People that open'd the Fort Gate to release themself's. The little Sailor likewise Depos, that so far from looking upon the French as his Friends, or having any Intention [...] to Desert to them, that upon the Coming up of their Peons, he was immediately Knocked down by one of them.
