With respect to supplying Usoff Cawn with Military Stores and the intended Communication to be opened for that purpose, Your Honour &ca. must certainly be the best Judges, whether this scheem [sic] can be carried into-proper effect or not, that point should therefore more properly remain to be settled by you above.

WORSHIPFULL SIR

Being about to dispatch the Leopard Snow to your Settlement to bring away such of the People and Stores left there out of the ships Norfolk and Duke of Richmond as she can take on board, I have the pleasure of returning you in the Name of our Honble Company Thanks for the friendly assistance which the Supracargoes and Captains of those ships have informed me you have afforded in securing what was landed by them of the Fort Marlbro's Cargo and I am now to request you will be pleased to continue the good Office you have undertaken by giving such Orders as may be necessary for the shiping on board the Leopard Snow so much of our Stores under your care as she can stow and such as may remains behind since they will doubtless be what can be in no danger of spoiling I hope you will not think too much trouble still to keep under your care till we can fetch them away also, should the Military designed for Fort Marlbro' be with you I make no question of your readiness to send them on board the snow on which We have directed our Companys three convenanted Servants to embark; the Expence incurred by your Honble Company throughout the Transacting of this Business, or any other of the same kind for our Honble Company shall be duely paid if you will think proper to draw upon this Presidency, to which disbursements I must desire you to add any sums that the three Gentlemen of ours with you may stand in want of to discharge the incidental debts they may have been under a necessity of incurring for their maintenance at Malacca, provided the same does not exceed 1000 \$\Pi\$.

The Supracargoes of the Norfolk and Duke of Richmond having represented to me the Assiduity of Mess¹⁵. Cook and D'Vint (in your service) by being very diligent in keeping the accounts of what was landed from those ships I am well assured that our Company will be highly satisfied they shou'd be rewarded you will therefore be good enough to pay them in the Name of our Company each 100 Spanish Dollars and add the same to your Bill on this Place.

One favour more I have to entreat of you which is that if the shipping of this season destined for Fort Marlbro' should pursue the same Course as those of the last have done; you will repeat the kindness you have already shewn to our Honble Company by granting the same Indulgence to them likewise if they are in want of it.

Your Letter of the 2^d. January last was brought to us sometime ago but till now we have had no opportunity to acknowledge the same, It would have been very agreable to us if the Norfolk and Duke of Richmond (when the passage to China was found not attainable) had proceeded with their Bencoolen Cargoe to this Coast, from whence they might have gone in time for this season, however since it has been otherwise We dispatch the Leopard Snow to Malacca to fetch away all she can bring belonging to Fort Marlbro' and have wrote expressly to Captains Bonham and Godfrey to send us all the Treasure intended for the West Coast when they have defrayed the necessary Charges attending the Lodging of the Stores and supporting our People at Malacca should you be still there we doubt not your assistance in forwarding the Business the Money you have advanced to the Factors and Writers when returned to us will be carried to the Head of Fort Marlbro' Consignment We have addressed the Governour of Malacca to thank him for the Help you tell us he has given and have desired him to gratify the two Dutch Gentlemen

you recommend with \$\Bar{P}\$ 100 each for which as well as other expences the-Government may be at on our Companys Account We have authorized them to-draw Bills on this Presidency, on supposition only that you may be gone without leaving sufficient Cash to defray those Charges.

Pondicherry surrendered to us the 15th. January and We are now inpossession of every French Settlement on this Side India.

To the Commander or Commanders of any Ship or Ships bound this season for Fort Marlbro' that may call at Malacca.

You are hereby ordered that in case of two ships being Consigned this year to Fort Marlbro' in the same manner the Norfolk and Duke of Richmond' were the last to remove into one ship the whole China Consignment and into the other all that was sent out for Fort Marlbro' not excepting the Treasure on any Account and that ship so loaded with the Fort Marlbro' Stores must immediately proceed for this Coast together with the Military intended for the West Coast. But if there is only one ship bound for Brown intended for

the West Coast, But if there is only one ship bound for Bencoolen and China, you must disembark all that belongs to the West Coast, and put the same under the care of the Government of Malacca unless you are able to provide a safe conveyance to send them over to us provided you can pursue your Voyage to China this Season, but if you happen to be too late to gain your Passage you must without fail make the best of your way to this Port.

We have not had any Intelligence this year of the situation of the French-Squadron, you must therefore make yourself the best acquainted you can where you may be in danger of meeting with them in order to avoid it;

You are ordered to repair on board your Vessell when (Wind and Weather permitting) you are to go directly to Malacca where you are to dispose of the salt you have on board belonging to the Honble Company and pay the produce thereof in part of discharging any demand the Government there may have on our Company taking a receipt for the same, you are to deliver the several Letters now given you according to their Address leaving that directed to the Commanders of this Years shipping outward bound for Fort Marlbro' in charge of the Governour of Malacca, if you should not meet with them at that Port or before you reach it, you are to receive on board your snow at Malacca all such Treasure, Stores, and Military as you are able to put in her belonging to the Honble Company allowing some reasonable Room for the Consignments from Europe to the late Servants of the Company on the West Coast. All which will be shiped off to you by those who have Charge thereof and you are to give receipt for what you shall so receive, three of the Honble Companys Servants will embark on your Vessell at Malacca whom you are to accommodate with a Passage to this place, you may make enquiry (not deviating from your Voyage) for all the intelligence you can obtain concerning the present situation of the Companys Settlements on the West Coast of Sumatra, and of what you can learn about the French Ships, and so soon as the Loading of your Snow (which you must use all diligence in forwarding) is compleated, you are to return immediately back to Madras, We wish you a Good Voyage and are

We have received your Letters dated the 2d. 9th. and 20th. February.

The Leopard Snow has been hitherto employed in bringing up Stores from Pondicherry, and having reason to conclude from the large Quantity of Ophium we are informed has been carried to the West Coast that her intended Voyage thither would not Answer. We shall dispatch her to Malacca to bring away the stores left there last Year by the Norfolk and Duke of Richmond, and carry Intelligence for the Commanders of the Shipping from England that may be bound for Fort Marlbro' this season.

The Ophium having been landed here has been sold to some advantage.

The Oxford carried to China no less a sum than One hundred and Ninety two thousand (192,000) Dollars for which Bills were drawn by the Supra Cargoes on us, our want of Cash has obliged us to desire the Freighters and Concerned in the Manilha Voyage to take our Bonds for the Same. We have been obliged also to give Bonds for other sums of Money to enable us to defray the Expences we were at in Investing and Besieging Pondicherry so that we have now standing out against us Bonds to the amount of three Lacks of Pagodas. We are bare of Money in our Treasury, and the Nabob having paid us before hand great part of the Revenues of the Country, very little is coming from thence, and as our Expences are large We shall find our selves obliged to draw upon your Honour &ca. for such sums of Money as we are able to take up.

By this ship We draw on your Honour &ca. Bills to the following amount payable at one months sight.

We are to acknowledge your Letters under date the 18th. January and 11th. March the former received by the Earl Temple and Fattee Salam which ships Imported at Pondichery the 1st. Ultimo.

The Prisoners of War which We have had on the Coast were dieted by the French when We could get them to advance Money, but upon failure of that we have found ourselves obliged to defray the Expence out of the Companys Cash and since the Reduction of Pondicherry such Prisoners as are not permitted to depart from the Coast We think We are obliged to maintain Officers as well as Men. The Expence is very large at present but We believe the French Nation must repay it, Inclosed you have an Account of the Several allowances we make to the officers and men here.

When they are Embarked for Europe We allow the Captain £30 - for the Passage of the Officers the servants and Private Soldiers are sent on board as Charter party Passengers.

We enclose Copy of His Majesty's Letters Patent regarding the Distribution of the Plunder and Booty taken in the East Indies which have been our principal Guide in the Captures made on the Coast however many difficulties have arose in our conferences on this subject with the Commanders of his Majestys Forces which can only be finally adjusted in Europe.

Since the departure of the Lord Mansfield & Sandwich for your Coast We have received from the President and Council at Fort William two Protests of the Pilots of those ships against the Commanders Captain Macleod and Captain Quick, which we enclose and beg you will be pleased to make the necessary enquiry into their conduct and acquaint our Honble Masters what they have to alledge in their defence as Copies of the Protests will be transmitted to Europe from Bengal.

We have received your Letters dated the 30th. April and 8 May. The advices contained in the latter We have received by the Honble Companys ship Hawke which imported here the 24th. Ultimo. We now transmit to your Honor &c. the Packets received by that ship for your Presidency and Admiral Steevens.

Enclosed is a full statement of all allowances granted to the Military on the Coast both in Garrison and in the field, with an Extract from the Minutes of our Consultation on the Occasion of the Gratuity allowed to the Kings Troops which We hope will perfectly satisfy your Enquiries on this Head.

With regard to the Rank of the Swiss Officers since that Crops has been incorporated with the English Troops as the Swiss Companys had their particular priviledges by virtue of an Agreement or Capitulation with the Company afterwards set aside by another Agreement by which they were thenceforward to be upon the English Establishment all advantages and disadvantages which accrued to them by virtue of the Capitulation were to remain in the Condition they were at the time that Capitulation was revoked therefore all preferments made to that time were certainly valid and the Swiss Officers had a Right to be incorporated on the English Establishment according to the Ranks they bore at the time of their Incorporation. The same difficulties you point out arose here with us but We were in general guided by the above Rule.

The Commanders of the Salisbury Patty and Britannia were duly paid here for bringing round last Year the Detachment of His Majestys Artillery from your side India The Officer at the rate of three Rupees ? day each, the Private Men at 6 fanams.

When the French Officers Prisoners were embarked on board the Sandwich and Lord Mansfield at Pondichery in February last List of them were transmitted to the Chief and Council of Tellicherry as they were not forwarded to your honour &c^a. from thence We enclose other Copies.

Since writing the foregoing We have received your Letters of the 13th. and 20th. April by the Triton which imported here the 8th. Instant.

In your Letter of the 20th. April you acquaint us of your having sent the Neptune to Tellicherry to take on board a quantity of Pepper and sandal in part of her Cargo for China and recommend to us to send thither a sum sufficient to compleat her Stock to £30,000 The Gentlemen at Tellicherry write us that she proceeded on her Voyage the 15th. May Rupees (52723 1 82) short of her stock We are concerned to acquaint you that it is utterly out of our Power to add any Money to the stock of the Neptune or Triton as the immense Expences We have unavoidably incurred during and since the siege of Pondichery have left our Treasury entirely bare We shall therefore be obliged to dispatch the Triton on her Voyage to China with a small Quantity of Redwood which is all We can do in our present circumstances.

The Voyage of Our Honble Masters ships the Triton to China the last Year having been defeated by the report that prevali'd of the Enemy's ships in the streights of Sundah at the time of her Arrival there in June the Captain was induced to bear away for the Bay as We advised in the Postcript [sic] of our Letter to the Supracargoes at Canton dated the 28th. August she was sent from thence to Bombay and having there received on board four

hundred Bales of Cotton for the China Market was dispatched to Tellicherry to take in Pepper and Sandal and then proceed hithr, She arrived here the 8th. Instant and now receives her final Dispatches agreeable to her Original Destination.

The Honble Companys ship Neptune having been dispatched from Bombay to Tellicherry. The Chief and Council there advise us that she sailed from thence for China the 15th. May Rupees 152 723 1 82 short of her stock, which was proposed to have been compleated to the amount of £ 40,000. The Gentlemen at Bombay had hopes that We should make up the deficiency from hence we regret very much that the means are not in our Power and so far are We from being able to spare any Treasure that We have been reduced to the greatest necessities for our own Occasions The utmost We can at present contribute to the stock of the Neptune or the Triton is a small Quantity of Redwood which comes now consign'd to you together with the abovementioned Cotton agreeable to Invoice and Bill of Lading enclosed.

Our Honble Masters ship Hawke from England for Coast and Bay imported here the 24th. May We enclose Extract of their General Advices shewing the Consignments intended for the China Market by the Ships of this Season also a List of the ships taken up for the present Year.

Besides the ships named in the abovementioned List our Honble Masters acquaint us that their own ship the Royal George Captain Nicholas Skottower proceeds to China directly on a particular service and is then design'd for Fort St. George with a Cargo to be sold here We therefore transmit a Price Current of China Goods at Madras for your Guidance but We must at the same time remark that the prices are very liable to fluctuation.

In order to disburthen ourselves as fast as possible of the great number of French Prisoners who have fallen into our hands by the Reduction of Pondichery, we have determin'd as a Point that nearly concerns the Interest of the Company to send them to Europe by every means in our power. In pursuance of this Plan forty French Officers now embark on board the Triton according to a List enclosed and we learn to you to divide them on the ships to Europe in such proportions as you shall see proper. The Captain has received £ 10 for each to furnish them with Fresh Provisions in their passage to China where they must be subsisted at the Companys expence untill they proceed for England when we presume you will satisfie the Captains of the ships for their accommodation thither.

We are concern'd to learn by advices from Batavia dated in December that the Warwick & Carnaervon which had been dispatched from hence in August in company with the Princess Augusta had in vain endeavour'd to gain the Streights of Bally and were obliged to put into Batavia. The Warwick having lost her main Top mast and Top Gallant mast by Lightning Those Damages being repair'd they expected to leave the Place the 28th. December. The Princess Augusta parted from them the 8th. of October and not having heard of her since We have saved her Passage.

Agreeable to your desire we have caused several Printed Copys to be made of your Proclamation of His present Majesty King George the Third and now enclose three Dozen of them.

We also send to you by this Opportunity three Pair of Stamps for Arcot Rupees which We hope will answer your Occasions. Our Endeavours have not been wanting to furnish you at the same time with some Coiners. But we have not been able to prevail on any to go to the Bay.

Whenever we may have it in our Power to take Measures for Resettling the West Coast We shall not fail to advise you. In the meantime we desire you will send hither the Artificers who are arrived with you from thence.

Our Honble Masters ship Plassey having passed this Port arrived at Vizagapatam the 6th. Instant. She left England the 1st. of April in company with the Fox, Earl of Holdernesse and Warren and parted from them the 15th. of May to the Westward of the Cape. As the Chief of Vizagapatam has advised us he should dispatch the Plassey to the Bay from thence she will probably arrive with you before this. It is with the highest concern we learn that the Ajax was taken in the Channel and carried into Brest towards the End of March.

October 1760 concerning your Accounts arose chiefly from our not receiving by the Success Snow those which related to her Outset for which you have since given us sufficient Reason. The Receipt of your other Accounts wh. had been laid aside by Accident not then occurring to our memory are however we find compleat and have been laid up before Mr. Carter and some Gentlemen of the West Coast for their Examination.

On receiving advices from Captain Vincent of arrival of the Osterly Worchester and Prince George at Bencoolen and the Measures he is taking to endeavour the resettling of the Company Affairs.

We have appointed One of the Members of our Council to superintend the management of them for the present, he will accordingly embark on the Earl Temple which will proceed in a short time.

As you are not in the Situation of those Gentlemen who where [sic] taken Prisoners at Fort Marlborough and may be assisting in restoreing the Companys Affairs on the West Coast. We recommend to you to proceed thither as soon as possible after the Receipt of this and a Person may be appointed from Fort Marlborough to supply your Station as Resident at Batavia in your absence from among the Young Gentlemen lately arrived who may be qualified to hold a correspondence and furnish such Assistance from Batavia as may be necessary.

of so great use in laying a foundation for the reestablishment of the Companys Settlements we are much concernd'd to find those, from whose Assistance and Attention something might be expected, were in so sickly a condition, and in particular yourself to whose prudence and care the Company must esteem themselves much obliged, We hope this will meet recovered from your Ilness, We send it express on the Sea Nymph Sloop by the same young Gentleman who conveyed to us your Letter, to apprise you of our Intention to dispatch the Honble Companys ship Earl Temple so soon as she can load all the supplies we can at present send to assist the Place, and on her will embark Mr. Ardley one of the Council here with some of the Council here, with some of the Gentlemen lately Inhabitants of the West Coast. You will immediately make known this our design which we wish may contribute to recover the Spirits of those who may have been dejected through sickness or otherwise, as well as improve what pains may have been already taken to incite the Malays to be careful of their Pepper and assisting in procuring Materials for Building which please to prompt them to very earnestly You may likewise inform the Sultan of Moco Moco and other Chiefs at the Out Settlements of the Assistance you expect to whom We shall write by the Earl Temple.

We doubt not your Assiduity in erecting the most Commodious Buildings you can for securing the Health of the People on shore to which will likewise much conduce, the Care that is observed in burning the Grass and shrubs and clearing away all filth.

We recommend to you to dispatch this sloop immediately after her Arrival at Bencoolen or any other small Vessel to Padong to convey any Intelligence that may be necessary for the Earl Temple which is to call them for advice as well as to endeavour to collect any Cattle or Provision that may be procurable for your Refreshment.

We wish it were in our power to provide for the remaining one, but we fear three hundred Bales will be the most we shall be able to contribute towards it by February.

We now dispatch to you the Holderness, and have put on board her some Redwood, Cannon & Shot as ₩ Invoice and Bill of Lading enclosed. The Fox and Warren shall follow as soon as their Consignments can be delivered.

The Boxes of Wrough Iron and Hand Vices brought out in the Sandwich for your Presidency which we received by the Triton from Bombay are now forwarded in the Holderness.

Lewis da Costa, the Clerke of Mr. Brohier who was sent to Bengal some time since in consequence of your Letter of the 18th. August, has paid into Cash here by his Attorney, Sixteen hundred & twelve Pagodas (1612 — --) in part of what he may be found to be indebted to the Company.

In our Letter by the Boneta Ketch We acquainted you of the Advices we had rec'd from Captain Vincent of the Ossterly at Fort Marlborough, and desired you would contribute your Assistance in sending over the Articles the Gentlemen there are in need of. You will be pleased also to order Mr. Brinley to return thither by the first opportunity, as he is not a Prisoner, and we think that all others of the Gentlemen of that Establishment should proceed who are desirous to reside there, untill the Company make [sic] think proper to employ them.

In our last of the 5th. Ultimo we acquainted you of the Arrival of our Honble Masters ship Plassey at Vizagapatam and have now the pleasure to add that the rest of the ships of this season for the coast and Bay are safe arrived The Holdernesse imported the 7th. of September. The Warier the 1st. Instant and the Fox the third General Lawrence M^r. Palk and M^r. Pybus came in the latter.

By a Cuntry [sic] Vessel from Bencoolen We have received a Letter from Captain Vincent of the Ossterly who arrived at that Place. ye. 21st. of July, where he found the ships Worchester and Prince George, which had Anchor'd there the day before. The Osterly is detained at Bencoolen untill the Gentlemen who are arrived there can hear from us.

Upon these Advices from Captain Vincent we have resolved to take measures for resettling the Company's Affairs on the West Coast. For this purpose Mr. Ardley one of the members of our Council will in a few days proceed thither in the Earl Temple and have in the meantime sent the Sloop. Sea Nymph to apprize Captain Vincent of our Intentions. Mr. Elphenston having informed us that the Admiral had no further Occasion for the service of that Vessel and we judged your Honour &ca. might be able to supply yourselves easily with another.

Sir

In consequence of the Letter you addressed to us the 8th. Instant and the Indent you at the same time delivered in for several necessaries which you received would be most useful, on the Coast of Sumatra, We have done our endeavours to comply with your Representation as you will perceive by a List hereto annexed of such stores Provisions Military and Artificers as we have been able to procure & can spare.

We have destin'd our Honble Masters ship the Earl Temple to carry you, The gentlemen who shall be allowed from your choice to go with you, The Military Artificers, and Stores to Marlborough, and Captain Foster has our orders after leaving this Port to obey such Directions as he shall receive from you, The Several Books and Papers which you have desired and such others as we thought might be useful are delivered to you as pr. List enclosed. You will also receive herewith a Letter to the Dutch Chief and Council at Padong requesting such Assistance as they may be able to give you or you are entitled by treaties to ask you have likewise a Copy of our Letter to Batavia for your Guidance.

We also Committ to your care the Present which was intended to have been sent by the Leopard Snow from Bengal for the Sultan of Mocho Mocho, together with a Letter from us to him, and another present to accompany it, of both which you have a List and you will deliver them in such a manner as you think will conduce most to obtain his Friendship & Assistance but nevertheless should you find his Conduct has been such as not to merit this Token of our regard you will act as Circumstances shall guide you.

We much approve of the sums you propose to allow Captain Foster for your own, and the other Gentlemen's Passage to Marlborough, and we would have you pay all such late Companys Servants as may be with you on the Coast of Sumatra the same allowances received by each according to his respective Rank, before the French took Possession of those Settlements, and to such as do fill the Employs of Paymaster, Accountant, Warehousekeeper, Storekeeper & such additional Allowances as were formerly made to the servants in like Employs.

As the Company were not perfectly acquainted with the Loss of their Settlements on the Island of Sumatra when the Last ships sailed for this Coast they could not send us any particular directions concerning the Reestablishment thereof, but as we imagine they may do so by the Norfolk or Chesterfield and perhaps resolve on some Alteration in the situation of the Principal Settlement we therefore recommend that you do not begin any new piece of Fortification at Marlborough, or lay out any considerable sum in repairing the Old Fort, all we think necessary at present is to put the Fort in a Condition of Defence against the Natives of the Country and to repair the Lodgings for the servants and Officers & Barracks for the soldiers in such a manner as may for a time secure them from the Weather, You must also repair or build Warehouses for the stores and Pepper both at Marlborough, and the other, Settlements, and these if you have time and Workmen may be furnish'd in the most durable manner, as they will always be useful whatever may be the situation of the Presidency To enable you to execute such repairs or additions with the greater dispatch we have ordered a number of Doors and Window Shutters which came from Pondicherry to be sent with

It will not be necessary we think at this Juncture to send with you any Engineer, particularly Mr. Call, because nothing new or expensive can be undertaken till we hear from the Company on that subject, and have Artificers and money to execute it.

The Ship Plassey shall be ordered to sail with you, and take on board such Articles as the Earl Temple cannot receive and you are to employ her at the West Coast or elsewhere on such services as shall appear most useful.

As soon as the stores from the Earl Temple are landed we recommend that you dispatch her to Malacca for the Stores and whatever else was left there by the Duke of Richmond and Norfolk, with Orders to return immediately to your Port, unless she can fetch any thing, material from Batavia, she may afterwards be employed in bringing the Pepper from the Out Settlements to Marlborough.

The Ossterly is to be dispatched to us when you have supply'd her with all the Pepper you can procure not exceeding two hundred and fifty Tons, but you are on no Account to detain her longer than the last of April that she may be in time here to receive on board French Prisoners, Red Wood &ca. for China. You must also send hither on her all the Officers and Soldiers which you think more than necessary for the Security of the West Coast, untill it may be more fully reestablished.

You will receive the Ballance of Cash from Captain Vincent and his Account of the Disbursements during his management there to whom we now write to thank him for his Conduct at Marlborough.

The Company having now fixed the Exchange of Pagodas at 8 shillings, and as the Dollars have always been received and paid at 5 shillings, we think that the Exchange in future between this Settlement and Marlborough should be in that proportion that is to say 16 Dollars for 10 Pagodas instead of 16½ as was before We also have determined that the Dollar shall be valued at 2 Rupees and the Rupee at fanams so that each European Soldier or Artificer dieted on board is to be paid for at the rate of half a Rupee or 6 Fanams and every seapoy Lascar or Black at 4 Fanams pr. Day or three to a Rupee.

Should any Cannon of a larger Bore than those you may find at Marlborough be thought necessary for the defence of that or any other Settlement You are empower'd to take such as you may judge proper out of the Earl Temple and you may also take out of the same ship fifty Barrels of Bombay Powder from what she has on board, which with the Powder arrived from Europe on the several ships consigned to that Place will We think be a sufficient stock.

Captain Foster having been permitted to take on board some Salt on his own Account when intended for Malacca it remains now in his ship as little is at persent to be procur'd here and that with difficulty and it being an Article you may be in want of there we have agreed with him since it would be a hardship to take it now from him, on the Company's Account that he should deliver it to you free of all Charges at the rate of 30 Spanish Dollars pr. Coyan when he arrives at Bencoolen.

Mr. Herbert being ordered from Batavia to Marlborough to assist you in the management of the Companys Affairs We have fixed Mr. Randolph Marriette to reside at Batavia in quality of Company's Agent who will be instructed to correspond with you and obey such Orders as you may find necessary to give him for the Companys Interest; his appointments are to be the same as those allowed to Mr. Herbert which you are to pay to him and he will have orders to transmit all his Accounts to you.

We have recommended to the Gentlemen at Bengal to send one of the Companys ships to the French Islands where we please ourselves with hopes she will be able to procure a pretty large number of slaves, and will also be able to collect the Artificers Chinese and Malays which the French transported able to collect the Artificers Chinese and Malays which the French transported thither. This done she is to bring them back to you at Marlborough. and we imagine may be with you by the end of April, at which time if you have more imagine may be with you by the end of April, at which time if you have more Pepper than will be loaded on the Ossterly, laying at Marlborough or any of the Out Settlements to which she can conveniently go we would have it put on board and the vessel dispatch'd to us with all possible Expedition.

As we are unable to supply you from hence either with long Boats or any used in the Country we fear it may take a considerable time to unload the Earl Temple's Cargo from hence, as well as that she may bring to you from Malaca, and can therefore form no Judgement of the Time in which you may be able to dispatch her from Marlborough, but should you by the beginning of August have three or four hundred Tons of Pepper on hand we would have you dispatch her to China to the Supracargoes of Council there, and to remedy the want of Boards which we perceive will occasion many other difficulties and delays, we recommend that you send Directions to the Resident at Batavia to purchase such as you may want, and we think you should omit no Opportunity to procure as many as you can from other places as well as encourage the Buildings of proper Boats by the Malays, you have herewith a copy of the Companys Instructions relating to the disposition of the Earl Temple if shegoes to China to forward to the Supra Cargoes there.

Mr. Moore who went from Bengal in the Ajax last here in order to act as Chaplain on the West Coast Establishment but came hither in that ship upon hearing of the Loss of those Settlements now returns to his station there and is to receive the appointments annexed thereto.

We depend on your Prudence and Good Conduct in the fulfilling of these Instructions towards the Reestablishment of the Companys Settlements on the West Coast If however you should by sickness be under a necessity of leaving the Place before it is accomplished you are to deliver over the Chargethere to Mr. Herbert unless Orders from the Company or other sufficient Reason should occur for your entrusting any of the other Company's Servants in preference.

Mr. Ridout Lieutenant fireworker who goes with you has received six months Pay in advance. His Rank is equal to that of an Ensign of Foot. The advance of pay made to the Seapoys & others that embarque with you will be delivered with the muster Roll of them.

Having engaged for the service of ye. West Coast several French People who are Artificers whose names and respective Professions the accompanying List will shew you are to pay them the same allowances at Marlborough as persons of the like Occupations did receive there, and to provide them with necessarys for their Voyage We have exclusively ordered the Paymaster to issue them a Month's Allowance agreeable to the Rules of this place.

For the better maintaining a proper Order and Discipline at Fort Marlborough, you are furnished with a Power from General Lawrence to appoint & approve Courts Martial which in case of an Accident to you is to devolve on the Deputy Governour for the time being.

Enclosed is a Statement of the Advances made to the People of every Denomination who proceed with you to the West Coast.

Governour and the rest of the Council of Fort St. George unto the Sultans Gondam Shaw and Rajah Passaseer Barat Shaw who govern with great Moderation and Equity in the Kingdom of Arak-Soongey.

The Distresses Losses and Calamities which your Highnesses, and your Subjects, must have suffered from the disturbances occasioned in your parts by our Enemies the French we are truly sensible of and much concerned at, as there has ever subsisted a Strict Friendship and regard between your Highnesses and the Company which you may be assured will always continue. have now the Pleasure to acquaint you that we have very severely punished the French for their behaviour on the West Coast, by taken [sic] from them and by destroying that great Opulent and strong City of Pondicherry, and all their other Settlements in India, and have sent all their Officers and great Men to England Prisoners, so that you need not be under any apprehensions of being any more disturbed by them, and as we are determined to reestablish ourselves at all the Companys Settlements on the West Coast, we now send Samuel Ardley Esqr. Governour to Fort Marlbro with the necessary Instructions for putting that place all ye. other Settlements on their ancient footing and we doubt not from the Readiness your Highnesses have always shewn to promote the Company's Interest [sic] in your Kingdom that you will give the proper Directions to your subjects at the several Qualtoes to be assisting to whomsoever the Governor may send from Marlbro with Materials or whatever else may be necessary for putting yo. Companys Buildings into proper repair issuing out your Orders for their bringing down their Pepper to the scale when Residents shall be appointed to receive it, and giving them the same attention to the Pepper Plantations throughout your Districts as formerly, whereby you so acquired a great Reputation to yourself and the Company's favour and Esteem, and to your subjects Riches and plenty, We recommend to you in General a due regard to the Directions you shall receive from the Governour Mr. Ardley and to maintain a constant Correspondence with him that he may be well acquainted with the situation of Affairs in your Districts. We have had the Honor to receive your Letter dated the 24th. April—Since the date of that Letter we are informed of the Death of the Right Honble Jacob Mossell y. late General on which Occasion we very sincerely condole with you at the same time we beg leave to congratulate you on the Accession of the Right Honble Petrus Albertus Van der Parra to the Government and hope the same Harmony will be maintained between the Representatives of the two Nations in India as existed during Mr. Mossell's Administration.

As the Advices we have lately rec'd from the West Coast, have induced us to undertake the Reestablishment of Honble Masters Possessions there, in as full and ample a manner as before the unfortunate Capture of them by the French under the Command of the Count D Estaing we think it necessary to acquaint you Gentlemen with such our Design and to inform you that we have now sent Samuel Ardley Esqr. one of the Members of our Council with our Commission as Governor for the Management and Direction of and for all affairs in behalf of the Honble English East India Company on the West Coast of Sumatra, and we are well persuaded that he will easily obtain from your Excellency &ca. at all times whatever help and assistance he may have occasion to request from you and which may be expected from your Friendship and Alliance.

The Experience of Mr. Herbert has induced us to order him to remove from Batavia to Marlbro to be assisting to Mr. Ardley and we have appointed Mr. Randolph Marriott who will have the Honor to be the Bearer of this our Letter to supply his Place, for whom we request the same Countenance & Assistance, as well as that you will pay due attention to every Representation which he is ordered to make on behalf of the English East India Company, or those who live under their Protection.

It is with Concern We acquaint you of some very extraordinary Proceedings of your Agents on the West Coast of Sumatra in possessing themselves of our Settlements of Nattal and Tappanouly. We are not yet indeed furnished with all the Particulars of this Enterprize. As such a Conduct would be a direct violation of the Peace subsisting between the two Nations, we can scarce believe the Report has any Foundation.

Mr. Marriott has also Orders to demand satisfaction for the Violence committed in seizing our Vessels wth. their Cargoes and Crews on various Pretences We are convinced you will pay due attention to all that he shall have the Honor to represent to you, that the fatal Consequences may be avoided which would necessarily result from our laying, as we are in Duty bound.

STR

We have received your Letters of the 5th and 8th. Instant with the Accounts of your Settlement enclosed in the former.

You will shortly be furnished with Directions concerning an Investment at Mazulipatam, in the meantime the Ballance you mention of Pagodas 10,000 may remain with you.

Four Pagodas is the established monthly allowance to seapoy Serjeants, those at Mazulipatam are therefore to be paid at that rate, but you will observe that only three Serjeants are allowed by the Establishment to one Battalion or nine Companies of Seapoys.

We approve of the method you have taken for the recovery of Tellagapah's Ballance and to guard as much as possible against the like Accidents in future it will be proper that you recommend to the several Renters to avoid launching out into expences beyond their Circumstances—on the contrary to live in a frugal manner that they may be enabled to make good their Rents.

We permit the two Braminies you recommend to be continued until more Companys servants can be spared you from hence as you represent their Assistance to be absolutely necessary. It is on this consideration only that we yield our Consent as it is our Intention that every Companys Covenant Servant do attend diligently to the execution of the Business that falls under his Departments, as the Introduction of Black Servants except in cases where it is indespensably necessary cannot but have an ill tendency.

The Company are not in future to be put to the expence of keeping Boats at Masulipatam. Wenever [sic] Boats are wanted for the service they must be hired for that purpose at the rate paid by private Merchants. Those now employed belonging to the Company must be disposed of at Publick sale and the above method observed.

With regard to the allowance of Oil It is our intention to allow what may be really necessary for the use of the Settlement and no more, you will therefore on receipt hereof visit the different Posts and Places where Lights are used, report such as may appear to you necessary with an estimate of the expence and a proper allowance shall be made.
