HONBLE SIR & SIRS

The Occasion of this Letter is to enclose to you our Account Current with His Majestys 89 Regiment which we request you will tender to Colonel Morrisor the Commanding Officer for the time being and receive from him the Ballance due to the Company being nine thousand Pagodas or Bombay Rupees twenty eight thousand eight hundred giving us Credit for the same.

Enclosed is a Bill of Exchange on Major Munro for Bombay Rupees sixteen hundred payable to your Honor &c^a. being the amount of five hundred Pagodas advanced here to Lieutenant Bailie on account of His Majestys 89 Regiment, as mention'd in the Account Current.

We expect the Deptford from Bengal to fill up here for Europe, and hope we may be able to dispatch her in the course of next Month with a full Lading.

SIR

We have received your Letter dated the 15th. Instant enclosing the Accounts of your Settlement for last Month.

On looking over your Accounts We observe you charge 5 Pagodas a Month for House Rent. You are to have the same Allowances as Mr. Turner the late Chief from the end of September from which time therefore the said Charge of House Rent is to be deducted.

You must in future have a seperate Head of Hospital Charges and not bring them to account under Charges General as we observed you have heretofore done, at the End of the Year they may be carried to Charges General.

In your Hospital Accounts there is one Andrew Pilot a French Prisoner charged which should have been placed under the Head of French Prisoners, but you will acquaint us how he came to be at Cuddalore.

We remark likewise that a Charge is made for digging a Grave for an European Soldier—this ought to have been and must in future be defrayed out of his own pay, and for that purpose, if a non Commissioned Officer or private Man dies on or before the 15th. of the Month he is to be struck off the Roll at the end of the Month, but if he dies after the 15th. he is to be continued on the Roll for the next Month in order to provide for the funeral Charges.

When the Neptune Schooner arrives at Cuddalore you will send by her such Bales as you may have in readiness and the rest are to be forwarded to us by the Pitt which will be ordered to call at Cuddalore for that purpose on her return from Tondy whether she will shortly be dispatched with Stores.

In regard to the Turned out Cloth remaining in your Godowns such as you think may be taken at the abated Price you will receive and return the rest to the Merchants charging them with a double custum of ten # Centagreably to the established practice. We are

· GENTLEMEN

We have received your Letter dated the 3d. Instant.

As you represent the Necessity of repairing the Guard Houses to shelter the Men from the Inclemencies of the Weather you have our permission to make such and such only as may be absolutely necessary for that purpose in which you are to observe the utmost frugality and here we must remark that when the Seapoys in this Garrison are not upon Guard they contrive to provide themselves with Hutts to live in, so that the Guard Houses are only intended to be made use of when they are on Duty.

We had better put up with the Loss of the Cloth than be at the Expence of keeping a Vessel to bring it away in case your Settlement should be attacked. We only meant that you should take every precaution in your power to secure the Companys effects in case there should be a prospect of such an Event which we hope will not be the case.

We shall send you in a few days a List of the Investment to be provided this year at your settlement with the necessary Directions on that subject for your guidance.

With respect to servants if at anytime more packers are necessary whilst your Cloth is embaling you may hire so many and no more and discharge them immediately after but for your present Investment We fear the two Packers allowed will be quite sufficient to serve for Cooleys in sorting the Cloth.

The Establishment for the Expences of your Settlement was made when Mr. Pigot was at the Board who thought it fully sufficient and of which he must have been a Competent Judge from his long Residence at Vizagapatam. You are not therefore to expect any further allowance of servants except when you shall make it appear to be indispensibly necessary for conducting the business of your Settlement which at present is reduced to a very narrow compass and with respect to your particular application for Coneycoplys in your Letter of the 9th. October last We are of opinion that the Company's Business would always be much better carried on without them where the Services can be dispensed with.

A Surgeon shall be appointed to your Settlement as you desire.

In answer to the application made in your Letter of the 23d. September concerning Mr. Smith's Allowances, as Mr. Heath continued in the Chiefship of Vizagapatam some time after Mr. Smith's arrival there, he can only be entitled to his usual Allowances during that Period.

Mr. John Smith has already had Notice from our Secretary of his being appointed of Council in consequence of the Vacancy occasioned by the Departure of Mr. Pigot the late President for England and the Death of Mr. Heath which happened on the 18th. Instant having made another Vacancy Mr. Stratton was appointed a Member of the Board and he is therefore to take the first convenient opportunity of coming to Madras. We are

The President and Council of Fort William having dispatched the Lord Clive to Us with the Supplies you requested from them for your Settlement we have put on Board her the several Articles of Your Annual Indent as \$\mathbb{P}\$ Invoice & Bill of Lading enclosed, the former amounting to Pags. 6426-19-64.

As you requested a supply of Black Cattle in your Letter of the 18th. Octor. 1762 We have Directed Capt. Webber to call at Cuddalore, and there to take in as many as he can conveniently carry, Mr. Calland will Advise you of the Number.

The several certificates mentioned in your Letter of the 4th. of June shall be duely paid when tender'd.

We have the pleasure to acquaint you that since our Advises of the 31st. July all the Ships of last Season destin'd to this side of India not then arriv'd are safely imported.

Twelve Bells sent out on the Pitt for Your Presidency are now forwarded and included in the General Invoice.

Inclosed is Extract of our Honble Master's Letter concerning the Lord Clive, we wish we had been able to supply her with a Stock for China, which the great scarcity of silver on this coast and Bengal puts out of our power, but if by any means your Honor &ca. can provide her, it will be a very acceptable service the the [sic] Troubles in Bengal having depriv'd the Company this season of two Ship's cargoes. If it shou'd be in your Powers to take up any Silver for China We will answer any Bills you may draw on Us.

The Ships dispatch'd for Europe from Bengal this Season, are the Boscawen. Osterly, Royal George & Pigot, We have a full Lading for the Deptford daily Expected from thence; The Ships remaining in hand will then be five in Number viz^t. The British King, Earl of Midlesex, Lord Mansfield.

Winchelsea, and the Admiral Pocock Expected from Manilha. The Earl of Middlesex will perhaps be Dispatch'd to Tellicherry to fill up there, but we cannot yet say how the others will be Disposed of.

The Pitt did not arrive with us 'till the 7th. January and having sprung her Mainmast in her passage which in case a New one cannot be found to the Southward must be properly secured before she can go to Sea. She cannot therefore at present prosicute the Voyage pointed out for her by our Honble Masters with a Design of Improving the Discoveries made of the New passage to China by Captⁿ. Wilson in the Pitts former Voyage.

If you should have occasion this season for any further supplies We hope your advices will be in time for us to forward them by the Bute, which We are informed by a Letter from Mr. Van Sittart to our President is intended to call here in her way to Batavia, for a supply of Timber & Plank.

We have received by a Macao Ship, arrived in the Mallabar Coast, a Letter from the SupraCargoes at Canton dated the 8th. of November, wherein they acquaint Us that they expected at the Departure of their last years shipping to Contract a debt of 6,0000 Tales & that they should want £ 400,000 for the ships they Expect the ensuing year. As the supply's which can be raised here, & at Bengal, this season will be very inconsiderable, We fear

that our Honble Masters will be greatly disappointed in their China Investment, unless they send out Treasure with yo. ships from Europe, which We very strongly recommended to them foreseeing that India cou'd not long be depended on, to furnish the necessary supplies for that Purpose.

It is with great concern We hear that the Earl Temple, is supposed to have been lost on the Coast of Manilha after her Departure from Batavia in May last.

Mr. Tierney who was a Hostage for the Gentlemen made Prisoners at the Capture of Fort Marlborough being lately arriv'd from the French Islands, has applied to us for an advance of a Thousand Pagodas, which We have Complied with & debted your Presidency for the same. Copy of Mr. Tierney's Letter to us on this Occasion comes enclosed, also his receipt for the Money.

GENTLEMEN

We take this opportunity by the ship Bon Voyage to acknowledge the Receipt of your Letter dated the 8th. November 1762 which came to hand the 7th. of February. It is with much concern we observe you will require so large a stock for the occasions of your Investments the Ensuing season, as the great scarcety of Silver puts it so much out of our power, that all we have been able to procure to this time does not exceed 25000 Rupees, We are therefore Making purchases of Merchandize for your Markett and have acquainted the Presidencys of Bengal and Bombay with your situation that they may contribute all the Assistance in there power. The Gentlemen at Bengal acquaint us they shall dispatch the British King to you with a Cargo of Cotten, Lead and Fifty Thousand Rupees which they hope will turn out a sufficient stock to provide her with a Cargo for Europe.

The Pitt did not arrive with us till the 7th. January and as she had sprung her Mainmast & was too late to prosecute the voyage pointed out for her by our Honble Masters, We thought it best to employ her on the Coast untill the favourable season offerd for sending her to China by the Common Track, We shall dispatch her in a few Days for Manilha from whence she is to proceed to Canton with a Consignment of Tin. We had intended 80 Tons of Pepper, some Cotton, and the Silver abovementioned, but as she may be wanted to bring the Troops back from Manilha We have detained all but the aforesaid Quantity of Tin which shall be forwarded by the First ship.

The Lord Clive was Dispatch'd to Fort Marlborough the beginning of February with Stores for the use of that settlement and we were in hopes that the Gentlemen there might be able to provide her with a stock for China but we were in hopes that the Gentlemen there might be able to provide her with a stock for China [sic], but we fear that may not be the Case, as by a Letter since receiv'd from them We find they were greatly distress'd for Cash, to answer the occasions of there Pepper Investment.

We represented to the Company in our Letter by the Clinton in June last that it wou'd be impossible to continue from India the supplies required for the China Trade and we hope those Advices will reach them in Time to Assist you with Treasure from Europe by the Ships of this season and early in September we dispatch'd home the Lapwing on purpose to repeat the same Advises.

His Majestys Ship the Panther arrived here from Batavia the Third Instant having lost her passage last season to Manilha, for which Place she sail'd hence the 23^d. August, The same Misfortune happened to the Revenge which saild for Manilha at the same Time, and both bore away for Batavia from whence Capt. Watson in the Revenge sail'd the 13th. Decembr. for Manilha by the Pitts Passage, from Batavia we also learn that the Glatton & Pocock not being able to gain there passage put in there in November and intended prosecuting their Voyage by the Pitts Track.

If we shou'd receive no further advices from Mr. Dalrymple before the time of the Departure of the Ships for China, We shall consider of the Expediency of ordering one of them to call at Sooloo for the Goods Mr. Dalrymple may have left there to be dispos'd of at Canton.

SIR

The Bales of your Investment receiv'd by the Pitt having been Examined as well as your Merchants turn'd out and Brown Cloth lately sent up hither, we now enclose to you the Remarks which have been made thereon.

From hence it appears that the Merchts. have by no means had Justice done them in Regard to the Rejected Cloth, as besides that a part of it seems to be of a proper Quality to be taken in at the abatement of 10 pr. Cent, the Companys Chop has been stampt'd in the Middle of many of the Peices which must evidently be detrimental to the sale of it, and being also Contrary to the usual custom it coul'd hardly have been Done through Inadvertency. In this Instance therefore they have had reason to complain and to make them amends for such Treatment, which we cannot but highly disapprove, We think it but reasonable to exact from them only 5 pr. Ct. on the whole of the Turn'd out Cloth instead of 10 pr. Ct. which you are to attend to and settle with them accordingly.

We send you enclosed a List of the Investment to be provided at your settlement this season, also the Particulars of the New Contracts we have made & the Persons we have engaged with, You must draw out the Contracts to be executed by them agreable thereto, and after the Form enclosed which is the same our merchants have signed. They are to be advanced one fourth part of the amount of the Investment upon their Executing them. You must also be mindfull to have all their accounts of the Last Years Investment adjusted & to receive of them any Ballances they may be indebted on that Account.

As we understand that two of the Coneycoplies in your Export Warehouse named Padmanabeyah & Parvadah Rajah are nearly related to Streeshelle putte with whom we have contracted for a part of this years Investment we think that such a Connection may be attended with many ill consequences and therefore direct that the said two Coneycoplys be no longer Employ'd in the Export Warehouse. We are come to a Resolution also, that any person employ'd as a Companys Merchant, shall not serve in Character as Dubash or Broker, as we understand they have done during the Term of their Contract with the Honble Company. And you must be attentive to see this is strictly complied with. We do not by any means approve of the proposal made in your Letter of the 16th. of March for the Dyers of the Blue Cloth to be under the Management of the Warehousekeeper which you will observe by the contract made with the Merchants for the present Investment is to be on the same Footing it was last year.

We have not rec'd from your Settlement as ordered in the Last Years List of Investment an Account drawn in Columns The First Specifying the Quantity ordered the second the Quantity sent and the Third the Reasons consicely drawn why the orders coud not be complied with. Our Honble Masters Expect this from us annually & you must send us such an Account of your Last Years Investment as soon as possible.

In the mean time you have our permission to take such Cloth as he may tender to you agreable to the Musters you have sent us at the prizes given for the Salem Cloth.

Since our last of the 4th. Instant we have receiv'd your favor dated the 10th. Last month.

We have already advised your Honor &c*. of the Northumberlands arrival the 2^d. Last Month and have now the pleasure to add that the Worcester came in the 14th. & the Lord Holland the 15th. Instant. The Latter called at the Mauritius the 4th. June where she found the Middlesex from Bengal, the purpose of whose Destination thither you have no doubt been informed of from that Presidency. The Pigot also put in there the 8th. June the length of her Passage from Bengal having made the Touching at the Islands necessary for recruiting her store of water. On the Ships comeing in the Governor sent off a Letter excusing himself from giving the permission of the Port under Pretence of the Islands having been entirely exhausted during the Late War and his dailey expectation of a Large Squadron from Europe at the same time recommended their going to Bourbon.

But being already at Anchor Captain Richardson went ashore to make a point of being supplied with water which was all he wanted so far he succeeded and probably wou'd procure some little Refreshment.

They seem'd very Jealous permitting no one to go ashore except the commanders, and even they were obliged to return at night. The Lord Holland left the Islands the 9th. June.

By the Worcester came a Packet for your Honor &ca. which we now forward.

Honble Sir & Sirs

We have receiv'd your Letter Dated the 18th. of Last Month acquainting us with the arrival of the Plassey from Fort Marlborough and of your Intention to send the Diligent Snow thither with a supply of provisions.

By a Letter we have receiv'd from hence [sic] by the Leopard Snow dated the 3d. May the Presidt. &ca. Council there acquaint us that by the purport of there Advices from Canton they had reason to expect a much more considerable number of Chinese than had been sent them which amounted to in the whole to only two Hundred and Fifty Five, and therefore they were no longer under the Apprehension of want of Grain for their support as they Imagined the supplies sent them by the Lord Clive and what they should be able to Collect on the Coast would be sufficient to Answer their Demands for the Current year since that time we have sent them a further supply of 1279 Bags of Rice by the Bute.

In the Packett by the Snow Leopard were transmitted to us some Authenticated Papers relating to an Error in the Accounts of the Ship Plassey, by which Captain Clews appears to be indebted to the Company 1236 Dollars, and the Gentlemen at Fort Marlborough further acquaint us that he must also refund 96. 2 on account of his Chief Mate Mr. Alenton, We now forward the said Papers to your Honor &ca. with Extract of the Letter from Fort Marlborough relating to this Matter that you may receive the amount of Captain Claws

The Leopard Snow put in at Bandarmalanka the 5th. Instant, Captain Panton alledges that he was obliged to bear away for want of Water & provisions and as he has reported the Vessell to be very Leaky We have ordered her to be repaired at Bandarmalanka and then to proceed to the Bay, as we have not at present any occasion for her service at the Coast.

We have already advised your Honor &c^a. of the arrival of the Northumberland the 2^d. Instant and the Worcester on the 14th. We have had the pleasure of seeing the Lord Holland the 15th. Instant, she called at the Mauritius the 4th. June and found the Middlesex there which had had the misfortune of springing her Mainmast. The Pigot also put in at the Islands the 8th. June, The Lenght [sic] of her Passage from Bengal having made the Touching there necessary for Recruiting her Store of Water, The Lord Holland Sail'd thence the 9th. June at which time they had receiv'd no late advices from France.

Our Milatary Storekeeper being made acquainted with the Deficiency of the Flints pr. Sallamatty Snow mentioned in your Letter of the 31st May we enclose Copy of a Report he has made to us in consequence.

As our consignments to China will we fear fall considerably short of the stock requir'd for the several ships of this season the Company not having sent out any Treasure from Europe, We have taken up the sums here undermentioned for that service and granted Bills for the same on your Honor &c². which we hope it will not be inconvenient as it is the only means by which we cou'd obtain this supply.

We have receiv'd your Letters dated the 10th. October 1763 and 23d. February last acquainting us of the situation in which you found the Companys affairs on your Arrival at Sooloo last year, and of your Attention to

remain there another season in order to recover the large Ballances due from the Sooloo's and to take Measures for Maintaining the Company's Influence in the Country. As the Gentlemen at Canton Inform'd us they coud not send a ship to Sooloo as you had desired, We intended dispatching one early from hence this season to take in the Goods that might have been Collected for China, but as the First ship must proceed directly to Canton & the other two are to call at Manilha as by the Advices lately receiv'd from England, We find the Company do not approve of having there large ships employed on that Voyage untill it has been more frequented. We laid aside that Intention & have not been able to engage any other Vessell to send thither. The season is now so far advanced that if we could, there woud be little probability of gaining her passage at least, this is the opinion of those who are best acquainted with it.

We are sorry so many untoward circumstances have concurr'd to disappointed [sic] you of getting in the outstanding Debts at Sooloo & finally adjusting the Accounts but as you are so solicitous to return to England the next season, you have our permission provided you concert with the Gentlemen at Canton the necessary means for drawing the Company's Concerns from Sooloo pointing out to us in what manner this intricate Business may be best conducted & every particular relating to the outstanding Ballances.

- In our Letters abovementioned we acquaintd. you of the little prospect We had of being able to obtain any considerrable supply of Treasure for you this Season, We have lost no opportunity of purchasing & collecting all we cou'd procure, thoug[h] at a Dear rate, which to this time amounts to about three Lacks & nine thousand Rupees and as we Imagined an Early supply may be of the utmost consequence to your Investment we now consign the whole to you on our Honbe. Masters. Ship Northumberland which arrived here the 2d. Instant also several articles of Merchandize amounting together as Pr. Invoice

The Worcester arrived with us the 15th. & the enclosed to Pags. 157409 22. Lord Holland the 16th. Instant.

3d. We are sorry to Find notwithstanding our representation to the Honble Court by the Lapwing Snow which arrived before the Departure of the Northumberland that it does suit there Convenience [sic] at present to send out any Treasure from Europe, The Consignments to you from thence this season amount to £. 82700 of which about 64000 is in Woolens. This with what you may expect from the Different Presidencys may be about three Hundred Thousand Pounds Serling [sic] by an Estimate we have made which comes a Number in the Packet, which unless the Woolens meet with a ready sale will we fear be insufficient to provide a Cargoes for the ships expected in China this Year probably no less than thirteen, if the Pitt should not be employed in bringing the Troops from Manilha vizt. Princess Augusta, Duke of Richmond Earl of Holderness, Norfolk Duke of Glocester, Vorcester, Lord Holland, Earl of Lincoln, Northumberland, British King, Lord Clive, Latham & Pitt.

The whole amount of what we have hitherto been able to Provide here in Treasure amount to about £. 107500 to which by the Worcester and Lord Holland we may add a further sum of 12000 £ in Gold, and Rupees and although we have little hopes of it at present you may rest assured that we shall Lose no opportunity of Augmenting our Consignments being convinced of the Necessity of your being enabled if possible to reserve a stock in your hands to make purchase for the Ensuing year.
- 5th. Application having been made to us for the Loan of some Money to run at respondentia on Goods to China, We have sent to Mr. Anthony Sadleir Ps. 4200 and to Shamir Sultan Ps. 5000, at the Exchange of 312 Rups. pr. 100 Pags. on their Bonds which are made payable to you in Tales at the rate of 307 A. Rs. pr. 100 Tales with 10 pr. Cent Freight & premium, Enclosed is a Manifest of the Goods now laden on this acct. which you will be pleased to deliver to the persons to whom they are respectively consigned, and from whom you are to receive the amount of the Bonds which are also enclosed at the Expiration of Thirty Days after the arrival of the Ship.
- 6th. Agreable to the request made in your Letter of the 17th. Febry, We send you the assays made in our Mint on each sort of Rupee now consigned to you which shall be our Constant practice in future.
- 7th. The Different exchange of Rupees mentioned in the Invoice by this Ship is according to the Prizes at the Time when each sum was purchased the last sum is sett down at 350 that being the Exchange established between the three Presidencys and therefore at that rate the Companys Rupees are always brought to acc^t. when recvd. for Bills Granted on Bengal or Bombay, there real value here ought to be estimated much higher.
- 8. As the cotton consigned to you by the Northumberland to save time & the Exchange of Landing was shipp'd from a Country Vessell in the road and only a few Bales of it coud be weighed from which the rest were calculated upon an Average, We hope Captⁿ. Mitford will be no sufferer on this acc^t. as from his diligence & Attention here We are persuaded there will not be any Deficiency that his care can prevent.

- 3d. We observe there are six ships appointed this Season to bring out the Consignments for your Presidency of which the Honble Court of Directors acquaint us they have good reason to believe only two or three at most can be laden home from your side and they propose that the supernumary ships (except the York which is to be the Annual ship to China) be employed in Carrying home the Investments from this Place & Bengal.
- 4. January intimating that the Secret Committee receiv'd Information upon the point of the Caernarvons Departure from the Downs that sundry Goods had been Clandestinely laden on board that ship and as it was then too late to make an Effectual search by taking out her Cargo, directing that Measures might be taken for that purpose on her arrival here in Consequence of which the upper searcher of the Sea Gate and master attendant of this Place by Private orders from the President repaired on board the Caernarvon and examined the ship as far as they cou'd but without being able to make any discovery.

We have rec'd your several Letters dated the 4th. & 12th. of Febry. and 3d. May.

The Plassey having fallen to Leeward put in at Vizagapatam from thence proceeded to Bengal where the President & Council acquaint us they shall sell as you have recommended, We have left it to them to dispose of the Wares & Military Cloathing as you have directed and they acquaint us they will demand of Captain Clews the amount of what you represent him to be indebted to the Company.

We are advised this season by our Honble Masters of their having made Choise of an Engineer for your Presidency otherwise we should have endeavor'd to have sent you Mr. Call whenever he could have been spared.

An Account of the Deficiency of the Ophium mentioned in your 5 Paragraph of the 4th. Febry, was settled with Captain Smith of the Clinton on which ship it was receiv'd here, who was to account for it with the Company in England, the Deficiency here appear'd to be 12 Maund 18 lbs. ½sr. Valued at Pagodas 201–16–18. We shall in future have the Consignments we may receive for you lodged in seperate Godowns to prevent the Inconveniencies pointed out in your Letter and never open the Packages but in Cases of necessity.

An account of stores supplied and Cash advanced to Captain Foster at this Place for the use of the Honble Companys Ship Earl Temple was Transmitted to Europe by the Fox in November 1762.

We have ordered our Account Current with your Presidency to be made out in a more explicit manner than the last sent you as you have desired, and it shall be forwarded by the first opportunity.

The Debt contracted by Mr. Henry Russell at Malacca was not deducted out of the salary and Diet that Gentlemen receiv'd when at Madras.

The Annual Indent recd. with your Letter of the 4th. Febry. shall be duely complied with. As the Number of Chinese sent you from Manilha have fallen so short of your expectations, We hope the supplies of Grain already sent you this season has been sufficient.

The Bond entered into by Mess¹⁸. Wyatt and Hall for Pagodas 1550-24 was deliver'd up to M¹. Hall in March last in Consequence of the orders we had receiv'd from the Company.

Mr. Ardley has paid into Cash the sum of Pags. 125 being the Difference pointed out by your Honor &ca. on his having brought to acct. the Dollars advanced him here on his Departure to Fort Marlbro at the rate of 15 instead of 16 for 10 Pags. for which we shall credit your Presidency enclosed is a Copy of the Minute of Consultation on this occasion explaining the Manner by which this Mistake arose.

Our Consignments to China this season have been so much larger than we could have expected that We hope there will be sufficient for compleating the stock of the Lord Clive with the several other ships they may have to provide for.

The Leopard Snow having arrived at Bandarmalanka in a Leaky condition We ordered the necessary Repairs to be given her there and then to proceed to Bengal.

The Bill Mr. Burnett drew upon us for Rix Dollars 2500 advanced by him to Captain Watson on account of the Honble Company's Ship Revenge has been duely accepted & paid as well as all those which your Honor &ca. have drawn upon us. In future we beg leave to recommend that some time may be given for the payment of Bills as we observe all those you have lately drawn upon us were made payable at sight which we had it not in our power so immediately to comply with.

We have had under Consideration your Letter Dated the 14th. September, on the subject of the Outstanding Debts at Mazulipatam and are much concern'd to observe so considerable a Ballance due from Meer Bauker as Rups. 193094 on Account of the Nizampatam Farm & of which only Rupees 43315-6-2 is thought to be recoverable.

A considerable part of this as well as the other Ballances were advised of and deemed irrecoverable in Mr. Fairfield time except that of Mowa Comrauze which he was thought to be in Circumstances to pay though unwilling, If therefore upon enquiry this should appear to be the Case at present you must endeavor to recover it, and be attentive to do the same with respect to the other Ballances as opportunities may offer and to this end they must constantly be carried forwards on your Books although it is manifest the Salt-Farms have not of late years produced the Rent they were lett for.

Notwithstanding any private agreement that might have been made between Meer Seid Hussein and Timmagee regarding the Management of the Mazulipatam and Ponracca Salt, we regard them by the Tenor of their Cowleto be equally responsible for the Ballance incurred when they had the joint management of that Farm.
