We have to acknowledge the Receipt of your Favour of the 26<sup>th</sup>. August and to return you thanks for the forwarding our Packets to Bombay which have been duly received there.

Our Honourable Masters Ship Tavistock imported here the 5<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo from your Coast and on the 8<sup>th</sup>. Instant imported here Ships Hawke, Latham, Lord Anson and York which are all sailed for Bombay, they left England the 5<sup>th</sup>. June last.

We have had the Honour to receive your Letter of the 21<sup>st</sup>. October last. The Gentlemen of the Council at Fort St. David, have wrote to us and demanded payment of the two Bills of Exchange which the Gentlemen of Chandernagore have drawn on Us, but we have apprised them that We have to deduct from the Amount of those two drafts the sum of 8414. 12. 10 for Sundry Advances made and Assistance given to several of your Gentlemen, Soldiers and others to whom We gave protection in our Colony after the Moores had taken Calcutta. We herewith send you the particular[s] which were transmitted to Us at the time by the Council at Chandanagore wh[ich] who [*sic*] apprised us that there would be some further Charges, however, We only desire to be reimbursed the Amount of the Accounts which have come to our hands, and

Accordingly We are ready to pay the Sum of Rup<sup>s</sup>. 26585—<sup>as.</sup>3—<sup>p.</sup>30 for the Ballance of the two Bills of Exchange.

We have received your favours of the 16<sup>th</sup>. and 20<sup>th</sup>. October <sup>of</sup> Boscawen which ship imported here the 9<sup>th</sup>. of this month. We are sensible of the want your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. are in of Salt Petre and the disappointment of your not receiving the quantity consign'd you on the Mer[m]aid Sloop gave us great uneasiness; It was not in our Power afterwards to send you any, as the Arrival of a French Fleet on the Coast put a stop to our sending the Marlbro to your Presidency and deter[red] any Country ships from making the September Trip to your Coast. We are now taking all oppertunities to supply you very amply with that material Article, To which end We have freighted on the Darling Snow four hundred Bags (400) that Vessel being on her departure immediately. We have likewise Laden three thousand Bags (3000) on the Drake a Ship We have taken up to bring us Timbers from the Negrais, and 300 Bags on a small Vessel Mr. Perceval purchased Acc<sup>t</sup>. the Company, We shall send likewise by the Company's Ships stationed to be filld up and dispatched from your Presidency a further quantity of three or four thousand bags, Intending in the whole to Lodge about Ten thousand bags (10000) at your Settlement. As the Coast and Bay Ships are not yet arrived and have not been heard of, We have Ordered Captain Braund to get the Boscawen in readiness to proceed to Europe from hence, purposing to dispatch her with a compleat Lading in February if the Coast and Bay Ships do not Arrive in time to be returned home this Season. In which case one of those Ships must be employed to China in lieu of the Boscawen. The Warwick will be dispatched to your Presidency in January to be fill'd up for Europe unless the Arrival of the Coast and Bay Ships obliges us to alter that appointment, She will have about 500 Bales and as much Salt Peter as She can take in with Seventy Pipes of the Maderra Wine designd for your Coast. We have been Obliged to detain the other Eighty Pipes on And of the great demand there was for Wine, for the Officers of the Navy and Army and for the Consumption of the Inhabitants of this

Place, who are greatly encreased. Should the Coast and Bay Ships arrive here any time next Month, We shall comply with your Request for sending three of them to your Coast, and in that Case We shall return the Boscawen likewise to the Coast to prosecute her Voyage to Canton. The Marborough will leave the River in a few days with a full lading from hence for Europe. By this vessel we forward a Packet under your Address received from Captain Nicholas Webb Commander of the Warwick, which We were obliged to open for the necessary Papers. We have drawn the following Setts of Bills upon your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. in favour of the underwritten Persons and Request you will Honour them. One sett in favour of Mr. Dawson Drake for Arcot Rupees 3286—3— being for that amount received here of Mr. Richard Court. One Sett in favour of Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Peter Merriot and Andrew Ross for Arcot Rupees Twenty thousand (2000) [*sic*] being for that value received here of Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Manningham and Frankland. One sett in favour of John Lewin Smith Esqr. for Arcot Rupees seven thousand Eight hundred and forty two (7842) for that value received here of Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Manningham and Frankland. Enclosed we transmit your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. Invoice and first Bill of Lading for the 400 bags of Petre laden on the Darling Snow amounting to C.R<sup>s</sup>. 6480.

We have already Acknowledged the receipt of your Letters of the 16<sup>th</sup>. and 20<sup>th</sup>. October to which we reply'd fully under date the 24<sup>th</sup>. December duplicate of which Letter we now Enclose. It only Remains for Us to advise of your favour ¶ Queenborough being come to hand.

Just after Closing our dispatches for Europe ¶ Marlbro' We had the satisfaction to hear of the Arrival of the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Companys Ships Grantham and Elizabeth at Ingelee, they put in at the Brajeles in Company with the Ilchester, Wenester and Fox from which Ships they separated on the 2<sup>d</sup>. October off the Cape in a Gale of Wind, we suppose they have proceeded to your Presidency first.

The Elizabeth we have Stationed for our Latter ship to Europe, and shall send the Grantham to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. with the Bullion and Gold Received by that Ship as we Imagine it will be acceptable to you and we are in no want of it here.

The Invoices and Other Papers for this Settlement being Enclosed in the Packets for your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. We have been Obliged to Open them and have taken out such Papers as we were in want of which we have marked off in the Lists of Packet, the Grantham's Packet you will receive by this Ship, the Elizabeth's shall be forwarded on the Protector with the consignment of Bullion and Gold Imported on her.

HONOURABLE SIR & SIRS

By the Ship George Captain Thomas Cooper who sailed from this Place the 30<sup>th</sup>. of March last bound directly for Vizagapatam I addressed myself to your Honours, a Duplicate of the General Letter with such other Papers

as were sent at that time are herewith Inclosed. I have now the satisfaction to inform your honours that a Treaty of Friendship and alliance between the Honourable United East India Company and his Majesty the King of Ava and Pegue is at last fully compleated, and to all appearance at this time will terminate greatly to the Advantage and satisfaction of both Parties, a Copy of the Treaty together with a Copy of the whole Proceedings in that affair are now inclosed for your Honours Perusal, and I hope that my Conduct therein will meet with your Approbation. Three Europe Ships Captain Tedd in the Ilchester, Captain Hume in the Fox, and Captain Teddeman in the Worcester arrived here the 27<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo in their way to Bengal having Recruits on board them for the Honourable Companys Settlements, and as several of the Military and Train had served out their times, and have been very urgent and sollicitous to be relieved and sent to the Coast or Bengal I have judged it to be for the Interest of the Settlement for to comply with their Requests if it was possible, I have therefore represented the affair to the Captains of the Europe Ships who have unanimously consented to make an Exchange by leaving the same Number of Recruits in lieu of those men now sent on board, which are to be delivered at either of the Presidencys of Fort St. George or Bengal, a list of those men received here with their different occupations, and likewise a List of those now sent on board with the time of their service are herewith inclosed together with a General Return of the Military and Train to this time.

I have taken the opportunity by these ships for to supply the Settlement with some Stores which we were entirely without, an exact Account of which is now inclosed and I hope my Proceedings therein will be approved of by your Honours. By the very next Conveyance shall transmit the publick Accounts of this Settlement from 1<sup>st</sup>. January 1757 to 31<sup>st</sup>. December inclusive with the whole Transactions and Occurrences to the same time, wherein everything that has happened here for this twelve month past will then be fully mentioned. I think myself obliged in Duty to Advise your Honours that the Honble Companys Cash is now reduced to a low Ebb, the Ballance remaining the 30<sup>th</sup>. November last being only 18,000 and some Odd Rupees, the Monthly Expencc is generally about 4000, and it must of Consequence increase as we go forward with the new Factory at Persaim, so that I hope you will please to take into your Consideration and to send such Supplies by the first Conveyance as shall be judged meet and best. I have received in October last Ten thousand Arcot Rupees into the Honourable Companys Cash for which I have given Bills of Exchange in favour of George Mackay Esquire at Fort St. George, and I hope the same will meet with your Honour's Acceptance. I have received Advice from the Presidency at Bengal that the Hunter Schooner and Syrian Sloop were dispatched for this Island with Stores in September last, neither of which are yet arrived or have been heard of. I humbly hope that your Honours will please to take the State and condition of this Settlement into your Serious consideration, and to Order proper Supplies of Men and Stores to be sent here by the first Conveyances, otherwise I doubt the Country People will imagine that the English have no Designs of Settling in this Kingdom. I have done all that lays in my Power towards cherishing their Friendship and to keep on good terms with the Burmahs, we have lately began to settle a new Factory at Persaim upon the spot of Ground which is given to the Honble Company by the late Treaty, but am very sorry to say that our Improvements as yet go on, but very slowly for want of Artificers and Workmen of all kinds, the few that are remaining here are but of little Service and are very desirous of returning to their Families, I have applied to the Presidency of Bengal for Relief who have promised to send them as soon as they can be procured. I must Request of your Honours if you think it proper I should be continued in this Settlement that you will be pleased to send me some Instructions relating to the manner I should proceed in for the further Improvement of the Island of



Negrais and the Intended Factory at Persaim, having as yet received no Guide nor met with any Rules laid down for my conduct in that Point, you may depend upon it that I shall spare no Pains in endeavouring to forward the Honble Companys Interest, and I hope your Honours will look upon my actions in the most favourable Light accordingly thereto. I am to acquaint your Honours with the Misfortune we have met with in loosing our Long Boat with one European and 13 Black People on board her the very best Lascars we had upon the Island, they were sent out with a Pilot to assist his Majestys Ship Bridgewater Captain Henry Smith Commander who touched here the 25<sup>th</sup>. of November last in his way to the Eastward, in attempting to go thro' the Channel between the Diamond Island and the La Guard as he struck upon a Reef of Rocks in Sig[ht] of this Island and made a Signal of Distress, as soon as it was perceived here the L[ong] Boat well manned was order'd out to their Assistance, and after they had put the Pilot on board the Ship they were sent to lye at a Grapnel upon the outermo[st] Edge of the Reef as a Guide for the Man of War to proceed with safety thro' the Channel, but Captain Smith afterwards imagining it might be runing too great a Risque with the King's Ship, determined not to venture thro' that passage, and on the 29<sup>th</sup>. following he stood out of Sight to the Westward intending to go thro' the Channel to the Southward of the La Guard as, the Pilot got safe to the Island, about two days after in a small Boat belonging to the Fort William Guard Ship, but the Long Boat has never since been seen or heard of by us.

I hope therefore your Honours will please to consider the necessity we lay under at this time for either a good Long Boat or some small Vessell to be employed in fetching Turcle for the Military or upon any other Occasion which may be judged necessary for the Interest of the Settlement. As the soldiers here have not received their Cloathing for two years past they are very much out of repair, and as we have now got 2 or 3 Taylors among the new Recruits I propose to sett them to work in making Cloathing for themselves as fast as they possibly can out of some of the Honourable Companys Coarse Broad Cloath and shall deduct the Expencc thereof out of the Off Reckonings. Conformable to the Annual Practice We now Address you under the Established Heads.

FIRST OF INVESTMENT.

Had our Success in this Material Branch of our honble Masters Affairs been equal to our Endeavours, or the Expectations We had reason to form at the beginning of the Year, from the promises of the Merchants, We should not have the concern to be obliged to repeat our Disappointments, as well for Increasing the Quantity, as Improving the Quality, of the Cloth though we can with great truth assure You, our attention to both those Points has been adequate to their Importance.

The whole of our Investment this year may amount to about six hundred Fifty (650) Bales, an Inconsiderable Quantity in comparison with what We had reason to flatter ourselves at the commencement of the Season, but the low state of our Cash for the greatest part of the Year, would not admit of

our making the Merchants any Advance after the month of July, and indeed had We been more plentifully supplied with Money, We have great Reason to believe that the Arrival of the French Fleet the 8<sup>th</sup>. September would have rendered it of no Effect, as the Inhabitants in General were Struck with so great a Panick, that great Numbers particularly Weavers, removed with their Effects nor was it in our power considering the state of Cuddalore to prevent them. As Bowania Shencariah in the three first Months of the Year brought in near fourteen hundred (1400) Pieces of Salam Cloth We were in hopes to have had a very considerable Quantity within the Year, but the continual Disturbances at Salam since that time, has put an entire stop to the only part of the Investment that in any shape kept up to the antient Manufacture. Our Endeavours to improve the Fabrick of the Cloth has been equally unsuccessful the Merchants having paid very little regard to the many Representations made them on that Head Pleading as usual the great price of Cotton, however to Remedy this as much as lay in our Power, in the Month of March upon Complaint being made by the Gentlemen Sorters of the badness of the Sallampores Midling We came to a Resolution to reduce all of an Inferior Sortment to the Price of Ordinary which has been put in practice ever since that time, & We think has been attended with some good Consequences, as it has partly prevented their bringing in such trash as before, and saves our Honourable Masters two Pagodas  $\frac{2}{3}$  Corge upon all that is of an Inferior Sort. Persheram Pillah has paid in the Course of the Year, One thousand forty (1040) Pag<sup>s</sup>. which has reduced his Ballance to thirteen hundred seventy nine Pagodas, Thirty three fanams, Seven eight Cash (1379—33—78) of which there may be in the Ware House between three and four hundred Pagodas in Turned out Cloth, as he has been now two years under Confinement, And We believe there is but little probability of his paying the remainder, We refer it to your Honour &c<sup>as</sup>. Consideration what further measures are to be taken with him. Govindah Chitty and Tonneveroy Pillah have done nothing the whole year towards discharging their Ballance, We have frequently called upon Govindah Chitty but can get no other answer from him, but that he waits for his Partner Tonneveroy Pillah's coming down to settle Accounts, We were in hopes there would have been an end put to this excuse by the Arrival of the latter, as your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. in your Favour of the 10<sup>th</sup>. April acquainted us You had Ordered him immediately to proceed to Fort St. David, but he is not yet arrived, and till he does come nothing can be done, either in this Affair or the Collecting in the Debts, of which he delivered You in a List. We therefore hope you will take measures to make him proceed hither to settle his Accounts, and do his part towards discharging the large Ballance outstanding against him and Govindah Chitty. Cawn Moodelairs Ballance remains as in our last Annual Address, We acquainted your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. in our Letters of the 15<sup>th</sup>. April and 30<sup>th</sup>. June with the measure We had taken to recover [his] Debts, and the many difficulties that impeaded it, also that we had con[fin]ed Shitumbella Chitty who was Awarded to pay him One thousand sixty (1060) Pag<sup>s</sup>. but positively refused Payment but as in your favour of the 9<sup>th</sup>. July You referred giving your Sentiments on the Affair 'till another Opportunity the whole has rested there, nor could We have gon [sic] on with it, as Cawn Modellaire has been almost ever since in so bad a state of Health as to be incapable of Business. Our Merchants Accounts and List of Investment Accompany this Packet, by which you will observe the Amount of the several Ballances Outstanding the 31<sup>st</sup>. December 1757 was thirty thousand forty Pagodas, twenty five fanams thirty nine Cash (3040—25—39) of which two thousand five hundred Sixty four Pagodas eight fanams eight cash (2564—8—8) lays with Linga Chitty, three hundred fifty one Pagodas seven fanams Sixty six Cash (351—7—66) with Irshappah Chitty, three thousand one hundred sixty two Pagodas twenty three fanams fifty Cash (3162—23—50) with Nella Chitty, thirteen hundred seventy nine Pagodas thirty three fanams, seventy eight Cash (1379—33—78) with Persheram Pillah, fifteen thousand five hundred thirty

five Pagodas ten fanams Seventy Cash (15535—10—70) with Cawn Moodelaire and seven thousand forty seven Pagodas thirteen fanams Seven Cash (7047—13—7) with Govinda Chitty and Tonneveroy Pillah.

Cootah is still Indebted Eleven hundred Sixty six Pagodas twenty four fanams (1166—24—) on Account the Arrack Farm, three hundred seventy five (375) Pagodas on the Old Weighing and Measuring farm and an Addition of Five hundred sixty six Pagodas twenty four fanams (566—24) on Account of his new Cowle for the Weighing and Measuring Duty, he has been Confined most part of the year, but to no purpose, as We believe he has neither money or Credit so that there can be but little hopes of ever Recovering his Ballance however that it may not Increase We humbly Offer it as our Opinion that the measuring Farm may be left to some more Creditable Person. Agreeable to your Commands for the Speedy Recovery of the three thousand (3000) Pagodas due from Irshapah Chittee and Cawn Modellaire on Account of Deve Cotta Bound Rent, We Called upon them the 13<sup>th</sup>. May last and acquainted them they were jointly and seperately Bound for each other, and that if they Cawn Modellaire did not pay his half in four months, We should call upon Irshapah Chitty for the whole, which accordingly happened, the Involved Condition of the Farmers Affairs rendering it Impracticable to get any thing from him, We have frequently since demanded the Money of Irshapah Chitty, but he being resolute not to P[ay more] than his half, We have been obliged to put him under Confinement, but he still stily refuses to have any thing to do with the other half, pleading there was no such clause in the Cowle for the Deve Cotah Bounds, as that of being jointly and Separately Bound, We therefore wait your Orders how to proceed with him, and here We must observe to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. that in the many Instances of confining Irshapa Chitty, Caun Modellaire, Cootah, Persheram Pillah and Shitumbella Chitty We cannot find they regard it in the least, so that We imagine if some other method is not found out, the Recovery of their several Debts will be very precarious. Sadashawarou is Indebted on Account the Bound Rent two thousand two hundred fifty (2250) Pagodas being Six Months Rent, but he promises to pay in three Months in a few days, and the Remainder within the time limited by his Cowle. Linga Chitty owes six Months Rent of the Trevendaparum and Deve Cotah Bound Rent being Four thousand seven hundred five Pagodas (4705) on the former, and three thousand five hundred Sixty (3560) Pagodas on the Latter, they have been often demanded, but his Agents have given for answer till within a few days, that they had no orders from him to pay in the Rent here, but We suppose as they have received Orders they will discharge the whole in a Short time. All the Other farms have been duely Collected a List of which comes Inclosed.

#### FOURTHLY OF EXPENCES.

A Calculate of them now waits on you, and We have only to observe that the Considerable Decrease is chiefly Occasioned by the departure of the Regiment to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George.

## FIFTHLY OF BUILDINGS AND REPAIRS.

Mr. John Call who had the direction of this Business to the Month of June last and Captain Hume since that time, have been constantly Employed in forwarding the following Works.

The Foundation of the new South Curtain being Settled, all the Arches for the Officers Apartments Guard Rooms Powder magazines and Gateway have been Turned, and the Outer and Inner Revetments having been carried up to their proper height, the Earth has been filled in; that in case of necessity they may be as serviceable as possible. The South East Demicounter Guard has been raised from its former level of ten feet to its due height, where its Cordon being laid on, a Parapet of Sod work has been raised; but in such a manner that with little trouble and small Expence it may at leisure be faced with Brick. There being one basement of the South West Counter Guard (Commonly called Patches Battery) wanting to compleat that Work, it has been Turned and by carrying up [the] Revetment, laying on the Cordon and making the Parapets of Sod Work, with the same Precautions as those of the South East Demicounterguard and tarassing what had not been finished, has rendered it of Service till further Opportunity. The East side of the Fort having the foundation of a Revelin laid, it has been carried up in a Parsimonious manner, yet with as much strength as its Original Construction would admit and by turning two Arches, One for a Guard Room the other for a small Magazine, has rendered it as usefull as possible, and considerably Augmented the strength of that Front.

The Parapets of the North East & North West Bastions, being very old and Built of Bad Materials, were to have been rebuilt but as new Work could not long resist the Efforts of an Enemy, and being Opposite to a Place from whence We may chiefly expect to be Annoyed they have been Thickned thirteen feet by a Lining of Earth sodded and their Platforms lengthened so as to Answer.

The rising Ground distant three hundred feet from the North Front having been cut down, so as to form a good advanced Covered Way extending from about fifty yards of the North West Salient Angle of the Glacis of the Place, quite round to the East side of the Fort within thirty yards of the River the Platforms, Pallisades, Arrows, Banquetts, Terrassed Guard Rooms and Barriers proper for [such] a Work have been compleated. The Traverses in the covered way of the Body of the Place being in a Ruinous Condition by the Counterscarps giving away, have either been repaired or taken down, and Sodwork ones put in their Room in them care has been particularly taken to preserve the Communications, and to have as many and as safe Communications, as possible Stairs are cut from the Salient Angles of the Counterscarps to within 18 Inches of the Water of the Ditch, and the same has been done in a Couple of Places of the Fause Bray in such parts as are most out of the View of an Enemy. The Repairs in the Body of the Place the West Ravelin, Patches Battery, North East & North West Redoubts, Covered Way, Fausebray, Gallerys and Horn Work, have been considerable. Military Barrack, Gentlemen's Lodgings and other Buildings have had the necessary Repairs. Cuddalore Factory House being in so Ruinous a Condition as to be in danger of falling down, has had a proper Repair. The Expectation of his Majestys Fleet made it necessary to Repair Cuddalore Hospital in a Compleat manner. The Cooleys and Lascars have been sufficiently employed in pulling down the Dutch Factory and House Adjoining and carrying away the Materials. The Smiths and Carpenters besides their necessary connection with other works have been Employed in giving a thorough Repair to the Artillery for Garrison and Field, in Shoring up the Horn Works Barracks & many Godowns making mines and Ammunition Boxes, Doors and Windows for the new Officers Apartments, and many other Works. The whole has been conducted with all possible Dispatch and Oeconomy [*sic*].

SIXTHLY OF COVENANTED SERVANTS.

Agreeable to your Honour &c<sup>as</sup>. permission Mr. Charles Turner proceeded to Madras the 27<sup>th</sup>. June and Mr. Andrew Newton succeeded him at this Board, and in his employs, but the 8<sup>th</sup>. September when the French Fleet appeared in sight, and were taken for Commadore Steevens' Squadron, he being sent off, was made Prisoner, but return'd the 11<sup>th</sup>. on his Parole, which the Governour of Pondicherry interpreting as a total Prohibition of acting in any capacity, there was a necessity of disposing of his employs of Military Paymaster and Sea and Land Customer of Tevenapatam untill his Exchange, which was done by appointing Mr. Norris to the former and Mr. Fairfield to the Latter.

Mr. Newtons coming into council making a Vacancy in the Stewardship, Mr. George Dawson was appointed, Mr. Richard Cooke to succeed him as Under Warehousekeeper and Mr. Thomas Kellsell was put under the Secretary in the Room of Mr. Cooke. The Departure of Mr. Turner and Mr. Call in the Month of June making two Vacancies at the Board of Works, they were filled up by Mr. Fairfield and Captain Hume; Mr. Richard Fitzpatrick having had an Ensigns Commission given him in the Month of December has acted in that Station since that time, In consequence of your giving Mr. Norris permission to proceed to the Presidency for the Recovery of his Health, he departed from hence the 11<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo. Mr. Richard Brickenden arrived here from Deve Cotah the 6<sup>th</sup>. Instant and shall be stationed as soon as his Health will permitt. Agreeable to your Orders of the 22<sup>d</sup>. December Mr. George Dawson will take his Seat at this Board on the Departure of Mr. Robert Sloper to Fort St. George.

We have received your Favour of the 27<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo, and now transmit you a Duplicate of our Annual Address, our General Books and Accounts and Calculate of Quick Stock to the 31<sup>st</sup>. January last.

It is with concern We are obliged to acquaint You, that We cannot possibly comply with our Honourable Masters directions for sending them a regular Account. Sales of the Damaged Calicoes Landed at this Settlement

from Ship Colchester, as upon the strictest enquiry in the Warehouse We cannot find that any particular Account was kept of them, nor do We find from Mr Cookes Report of the 28<sup>th</sup>. April 1753 when he was ordered to sell the Damaged Wrappers in the Warehouse, but to keep the Colchester's 'till further Orders, that any further notice was taken of them, in January 1755 the Warehousekeeper made a Report of a Large Quantity of Damaged Wrappers remaining in the Godowns (but mentioned nothing of any belonging to that Ship) which he was Ordered to Sell at Publick Outcry and in this Quantity We have great Reason to believe they were included, as upon Enquiry We find they had been promiscuously mix'd with the other Wrappers, which was certainly a great piece of Negligence, but as Mr. Cooke sold off the greatest part of the Old Wrappers in June 1753, there could remain but little more than had been received from [the] Ship. But notwithstanding the Reason there is to imagine they [were] Included in the sale of April 1755, yet as they were mixed [with] the other Wrappers of which a Quantity had been received as well as Issued for Packing and Sale from June 1753 to that time, renders it impossible to draw out a just and regular Account Sale of them, nor can We pretend to assign any Reasons for the then Deputy Governour and Councils Neglect in this Affair but if We might presume to give our Openion, there is no way left to adjust this Matter, but by taking the medium of the Outcry made in April 1755, which stands thus.

Ultimo, They left England on the 5<sup>th</sup>. June and touched no where, 'till they reached Galle, but We have no Accounts of the Prince Edward, tho' our last Advices from Gombroon are dated the 29<sup>th</sup>. November, We however hope, she may have gained the inner Passage and in case of her not succeeding, have lodged Orders at our Coast Settlements, for the Commanders repairing directly hither, as its now too late for her to proceed from thence to Gombroon and arrive here in time to be returned home, with the York and Lord Anson, agreeable to our Honble Masters Orders, The Tavistock having been docked within these few days, the Commander has tendered her to Us, which we have declined, on considering how much her Demorrhage would be encreased by admitting her into the Service here; That the Hawke is distined for China and that your Honour &c<sup>A</sup>. will in all Probability, receive an Account of what Articles are most in demand at that Market, by the time she may arrive with you, whereas We never gain any Advice of it, till late in the Season, and your Honour &c<sup>A</sup>. having returned the Norfolk and Princess Augusta home, likewise induces Us to decline Captain Jenkins's Tender lest you should be disappointed in sending some of the Coast and Bay Ships to China in their Head though should We hear nothing of the Prince Edward before the Tavistock's Departure, We shall consider, whether it may not be most adviseable to dispatch her home with the York and Lord Anson and in such case, shall give your Honour &c<sup>A</sup>. immediate Advices of it, and wish on that Account, that you had transmitted Us Copy of her Charter Party, as well as an Account of the Lead and Red Wood on board her, which was omitted. We now forward you a List of Debts which he says are due to him at Madrass, but which We suppose you will turn out to the same Account as those he said were due to him here, as to the debts said to be due to him by several Merchants in the Country, We cannot see how We can be any way Instrumental in the Recovery of them, as the People are out of our Power, and to prove how far it was from his Intention to Settle his affairs, he has left all his Accounts behind him at Madrass, upon the whole therefore We apprehend there can be little or no hopes of Recovering his Ballance. As to the Ballance due from him and Govindah Chitty which is about Seven thousand Pagodas the latter says that he owes Three thousand which he is willing to Pay at the Rate of two hundred Pagodas  $\text{₹}$  Month and for the remaining Four thousand Pagodas which he says is due from Tonneveroy Pillah, he has as Security of four Houses and a Garden made over to him which may go towards discharging that sum, this is the state of the Affair at present, and We wait your Directions how we are to proceed with them, but We must take the liberty to observe to your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. that confining them will have no effect, as We have found by those we have hitherto taken that method with, who have paid no Regard to it in the least.

HONOURABLE SIR AND SIRS

As we are under Apprehensions that we shall meet with great difficulties in procuring Provisions for our Subsistence on this Coast, or be able to defend ourselves for any length of time against the Country People, who we long since Suspected to be much disaffected and are now accordingly at open variance with, We find ourselves under a necessity of addressing your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. on the subject of our distresses, and to request your speedy Assistance. The two Pangarans of single demoon and Soongey Etam and Rajah de Bander, a Relation of the former are the Secret Authors of the present disturbances their designs in which seems to be to procure to themselves some advantages, and to abolish some of the Supravisors Regulations. The former Pangaran We understand is desirous of being Restored to his Authority at Laye, and both of the Pangarans think themselves entitled to a Duty on all ships and Vessels that come into Marlbro Road; We have confined Raja de Bander to the Fort upon an information of his having fomented the disturbances at Polley, by Instigating the People up that River to refuse to comply with their repeated promises to the Boad [*sic*] of removing Lower down the River, and to fortifie their doosoons. This step as we have reason to believe deterred the two Pangarans, and many others who Covertly acted in this Affair, in concert with Rajah de Bander, from declaring openly, but they have privately obliged several of their Proattens &<sup>ca</sup>. to appear, in an Hostile manner, and we are well Assured that the greatest part of the Country are Combined together and wait only for a favourable Opportunity of Declaring themselves, and as we have but a small Quantity of Gun Powder, and but two months subsistence, we shall soon have them all declare against us, the consequences of which we need not mention but we hope to meet with relief from your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. as speedily as possible. On the 3<sup>d</sup>. Instant arrived the Sloop Tryall, and the master of her informs us that you have dispatched the Marlbro Sloop back to us; he parted with her the [*Lacuna*] Instant but as she is not yet arrived we fear she is lost; the master further acquaints us that the ship your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. intended to send hither with the supplys we so pressingly requested by the Marlbro Sloop, is dispatched to Bengal from whence she will not probably return in time to bring us those supplys which we are now so greatly in need of. We are sorry to advise you that the Sloop Neptune overset in her passage at Sea and 17 of the Crew unfortunately perished, but the master and 2 others saved themselves with great difficulty, and got on board the Long Boats which are all safe Arrived, we think it proper to acquaint you that Mr. Forrest the Master of her informs us, that this unhappy accident was occasioned by the great disproportion of her mast to a Vessel of so small a Burthen, Enclosed are Copys the Affidavits of the Master &<sup>ca</sup>. belonging to her and the long Boats on occasion her Loss. We cannot but Express our great concern at these disappointments of our hopes of receiving supplys the want of which has for some years past put us into a wretched and very precarious Situation, which must in the end prove destructive to the whole Coast, if not Remedied; We therefor most earnestly Request that your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. will be pleased to send us Immediate relief, and that our several Indents may be fully comply'd with except Salt, of which we have purchased a sufficiency for a Years Consumption. Our Stock of Rice is at present very low, and the troubles in the Country deprives us of all prospect of receiving any from thence for sometime to come as there will be a great Scarcity of Grain, and if we are not very spedily [*sic*] supplied, the Consequences of it in this Exigency will prove fatal to the Settlement. The exchange of Salt for Rice will never at any time procure us more than a few

Months subsistance four [sic] our Garrison and Slaves, Our dependance therefore is on your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. for a Competancy of this Essential Article, and we request you will send us sixty or Seventy Garce of it, as there is no occasion to load the Vessell with any Salt. We are greatly in want of Gun Powder and Arms, of the latter we have not enough to send out against the Enemy, and the present troubles will soon exhaust the Powder we we [sic] have now hear [sic], which fortunately we lately purchased out of a Dutch ship and without it we must have fallen a sacrafice to the Country or have left the Settlement. We therefore request that we may be supply'd with two hundred Barrels of Gun Powder and 400 Musquets.

We cannot but request that your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will be pleas'd to send us some Military Recruits our present Garrison being very Insufficient for the defence of the Settlement, and also about 150 One hundred and fifty Arabs or Seapoys (but these we desire may be picked Men) in whom we can better confide than in the Bugguesses whom we are obliged to employ on the occasion of these disturbances in the Country nor can we procure a competant number even of those to oppose the Enemy who are very numerous, and encamped in several parts about the Country. These Seapoys may be distributed, to the out Settlements after the disturbances are over in the Room of the Bug[g]uesses so that the Expence will be but very inconsiderably augmen[t]ed by them, and the Settlements on this Coast will be on a more strong foundation, than they are at present. We have drove the Rebels from many of their Fortified Places but they make new ones almost as [fast as] we demolish the Old ones, We have lost some of our Europeans in Expeditions besides several wounded as well as Mallays and Bugguess. We have not Coffres sufficient to do the Current Business, and must be obliged to hire many Cooleys to do it, but as this will augment the Expences very considerably we request that you will send us some as soon as possible. We compute that we have occasion at least for 100 Men 20 of them Bricklayers; Women we have no occasion for. We hope that we shall soon receive a further Supply of Long Cloth White, the Want of which will be attended with very prejudicial Consequences to the Investment in Arrack Soongey, and it may probably be productive of some troubles in that Kingdom. We have now upwards of 160 Tons of Pepper at this Place and manna, ready for the Bengal Ship (exclusive) of 200 Tons surplus which we purpose to load on board the Falmouth agreeable to Orders which we have received from our Honou[r]able Masters by that Ship and shall probably have about 250 Tons to ship off by her. The Grampus Tender lyes now in a Sinking condition at Pooloo, and we have advanced Captain Jackson for the Service of that ship \$ 2500 as hereafter specified. We request you will send us by the first Opportunity 10,000 Gunny Bags being in great want of this Article, and that you'll Fully comply with our Indent by the Hartop and enclosed is duplicate of our Letter by that Ship. We have received \$ 260-80 on account of the Estate of Mr. John Gray Deceased and as we are informed that there are some demands on that Estate at Madras and that you have granted the Administration thereof to Mr. Thomas Forrest, we shall write that Sum of to Account Current Fort Saint George.

Since closing the above the Ships Norfolk and Princess Augusta arrived here, and we have received your Packets to us we shall have on hand at this Place and Manna after their dispatch exclusive of the storeships Charter party Tonnage upwards of 150 Tons and conformable to your orders, shall reserve the same for the Bengal Ship and by the time she arrives we shall probably have about 200 Tons ready for her. The Supply of Rice which your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. have sent us by these ships arrived very seasonably but we must still request further supplies of this Article, We are of Opinion that both the Sloop which our Honourable Masters have ordered to be built at Bombay will be very necessary for the Service of this Coast, and the usual Construction of the Bengal Vessells we apprehend will be the properest, and therefore request that your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will give your directions thereon accordingly. We have granted Certificates on your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. for the following Sums paid into Cash here the 17<sup>th</sup>. Instant Viz<sup>t</sup>.

HONOURABLE SIR & SIRS

We Address'd you under date of the 23<sup>d</sup>. Ultimo by the Sloop Tryal and inclosed is Duplicate thereof. On reperusing your Letter by the Norfolk we find that we have had the misfortune to overlook a few words of it in your Computation of the Ships Lading which led us into a Mistake that the Kint-lade and Officers priviledge were not included in your Computation.

We therefore take this opportunity to advise you that we shall not have a sufficiency of Pepper in readiness for the Bengal ship, unless all the Pepper on hand at Cawoor & Croee is brought up hither, which we shall endeavour to do if possible tho' we fear we cannot effect it as we are in want of Sloops for that purpose. The Quantity of Pepper which you have Order'd us to lade on the Norfolk & Princess Augusta at this Place being very considerable, amounting to near Four hundred Tons which is by 120 Tons short of what we have in Our Godowns here and more than we have ever at any one time had at this place, we have been much embarrassed about the means of complying with your Orders, and have been obliged to send for the Storeship up from Manna, from whence she would Otherwise have been nearly on the dispatch by this time, in Order to compleat their Loading out of her Cargoe. We therefore request it of your Honor & c<sup>a</sup>. that we may always have the Liberty hereafter of dispatching such ships as are sent hither to fill up either to Manna or elsewhere, if we have not enough in Our Godowns at this place to compleat their Charter Party Tonnage, and that you will be pleas'd to favour us with your directions how to act in such Critical Cases as the present should such happen in future. We need not remark to your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. that we cou'd not consistently with your Orders send the Norfolk & Princess Augusta to Manna; especially as both the Commanders were absolutely resolved not to go thither on any account whatever, we shall therefore only observe to You, that unless the Commanders of ships are in some measure subject to our Orders we shall find them of so very uncompliant & troublesome a disposition that we shall not be able to act in the manner we apprehend to be most Conducive to the Interest of Our Honble Masters.

We address'd you last under date the 8<sup>th</sup>. February by the Sloop Mary since when we have received your advices by the Ship Duke Captain Powney, who arrived here the 3<sup>d</sup>. Instant; The flattering hopes we entertained of being



supplied with a good stock of Gun Powder by this Ship are entirely frustrated as the Gentlemen at Bengal have taken out all of this Article that your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. put on board for this Place; our great distress for this very essential Article the want whereof subjects the Settlement to the Insults of all Enimies as well as the Natives who are too well apprised of our wants, and will probably take the advantage of our weak and almost defenceless Situation have reduced us to the necessity of sending Mr. John Goodwin as Agent to Batavia to procure a supply of this Article in particular as well as Timber & Plank & other necessary Stores which are immediately required for the use of the Settlement as we are also greatly in need of a Sloop having frequent occasions for her services and no probability of being supplied with any from your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. for some time to come. Mr. Goodwin is therefore directed to purchase one of about 80 or 100 Tons Burthen. He is directed also to procure all the Intelligence he possibly can and advise your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. of every Material occurrence by all opportunities, recommending to him at the same time to be as expeditious in accomplishing these matters so soon as possibly [can] which our present forlorn situation so urgently and pressing[ly] call for.

We have only further to request of your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. [to] comply fully with our late Indents and to send us a good supply of Gunpowder by the first Opportunity it being very preca[rious] whether our Agent will be able to procure any at Batavia should the Mallays be again inclined to create new Disturbances before we are supplied with Gunpowder our Honble Masters Affairs on this Coast will stand but upon a tottering foundation and the loss of the Settlement may probably be the Consequences of it. This goes by Mr. Goodwin via Batavia having nothing more to observe but that our best endeavours shall be exerted for preserving the Peace and Tranquility of the Settlement, we are respectfully

HONBLE SIR & SIRs

I have the honour to transmit you inclosed a Letter from the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort Marlbro by which you will be pleased to observe the Reasons of my proceeding to this City, the very short time I have yet been arrived here join'd to the Generals being much engrossed in Affairs, have naturally put it hitherto out of my Power to have gone any great lengths towards the accomplishing of my Orders; however I flatter myself I shall in a short time succeed in obtaining most of the required Necessaries. The Article of Gunpowder indeed, I am afraid will be the most difficult to come at As People here are too well acquainted what a Situation Affairs have been in on the West Coast and indulge themselves with the Thoughts, that cutting off a supply of that sort may be hurting the Honble Company in the most tender Point your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. may be assured I shall use all deligence in getting a Quantity of that very essential Article and hope, through some Channel or

other, that my endeavours will be accompanied with Success. There is no news here worth communicating what there is, concerning Transactions in Europe, your honour &c<sup>t</sup>. must have been acquainted with long e'er this. The Honble Company's Ships for Limpo and Canton have not yet imported here but must come in very soon unless some accident has befallen them, or they have been order'd a different Rout. There are positive Commands lodged here that no Ship whatever will be permitted to trade again at the former Place, so she must be necessitated to proceed to Canton direct. Your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. are but too well acquainted of the Deportment of the Dutch to the Northward of Moco Moco and of the many Injuries that have been sustain'd by their unwarrantable Behaviour; there has been also to the southward a very recent Instance of great Insolence in the Master of one of their Cruizers, who between Manna & Marlbro' took out and brought hither the Jureemoody of a Tombongow that was loaded with Pepper; he also fired several times at her as well as took with him, the Boat note, and private Letters that were on board I shall remonstrate very strenuously to the General & Council concerning such a Preceeding, & of our other repeated Grievances, but I cannot flatter myself that such Remonstrances will meet with the desired Effect for their Jealousies in Point of trade are so sanguine that I believe no reasoning can induce them to act impartially, where there [*sic*] Commerce is in the least affected. During my stay here (which will be as short as possible) I shall be carefull to address your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. Council by every opportunity that offers & if there is any thing of Moment presents demanding your immediate knowledge & attention, I shall dispatch advices express for that purpose. HONOURABLE SIR AND SIRS

1. Since our last General dispatch by the Hartop Snow under date of the 15<sup>th</sup>. September 1757 we wrote by the Tryal Sloop the 23<sup>d</sup>. of January following to acquaint you particularly of the great distress this Settlement was then in Duplicate of the former, was forwarded on the Sloop Tryal and Duplicate of the latter by the Sloop Mary together with a short address by her dated the 8<sup>th</sup>. February. We likewise paid our Respects to you  $\text{¶}$  Ship Grehound [*sic*] the 29<sup>th</sup>. April and the Ganges Tender the 19<sup>th</sup>. May both via Batavia. The former served to inform your Honour & C<sup>t</sup>. of our appointing Mr. John Goodwin our Agent at Batavia, the latter advising the arrival of Roger Carter Esq<sup>r</sup>. and of our Intentions to dispatch our Hon<sup>ble</sup> Masters Ship Duke with all possible expedition to the Cost Agreeable to which you will now please to receive this address by her, together with Duplicates of the beforementioned advices sent  $\text{¶}$  Mary, Greyhound and Ganges and Triplicate of that  $\text{¶}$  Tryal, which we concluded necessary, as the former Conveyances are not greatly to be depended on.

2. Your several favours of the 24<sup>th</sup>. August & 5 September enclosing Duplicate of that sent up  $\text{¶}$  Neptune Sloop were brought us by the Duke Captain Powney, which Ship imported here the 3<sup>d</sup>. of April having first touch'd at our Northern Settlements to deliver such stores they were in need of in conformity to your directions. The Ganges Tender also arrived with us on the 15<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo when we received your Commands by her.

3. As a Copy of our Letter to the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Court of Directors by the Falmouth comes a Number in this Paquet We beg leave to referr Your Honour & C<sup>t</sup>. Council thereto, for a particular detail of all transactions that has happen'd on this Coast from the Hartops dispatch to that time from which Period only, we shall continue a Relation of Affairs under our Management & reply to your favours  $\text{¶}$  Duke under the established Heads.

## FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING.

4<sup>th</sup>. Our Hon<sup>ble</sup> Masters Ship Falmouth was dispatched from Manna for England the 10<sup>th</sup>. of March last She had on board her Tons 422. 10. 2. 3 lb. of Pepper which is 1. 8. 2. 25 short of her Charter Party Tonnage including the usual Allowance of 5  $\text{¶}$  Cent for Wastage. By the Residents Letter to the

Honble Court Copy of which is now forwarded, you will please to observe the reasons why he was not able wholly to compleat her Cargo which being unavoidable, we flatter ourselves will not meet with either their or your displeasure.

5. The Ship Greyhound a private Trader from Bengal imported at Moco Moco the 27<sup>th</sup>. February last from whence she arrived here the 13<sup>th</sup>. March and Sailed hence for Batavia the 29<sup>th</sup>. of April following.

6. A Boat lately coming from Manna with a Consignment of Pepper from the Resident there, was met within her Passage hither by a Dutch Sloop off Saloomah, the Master of which after taking out the Jooreemoody & Papers he carried, and detaining them on board his Vessell attempted to seize the Boat but the Crew perceiving their intentions set their Sail and escaped, notwithstanding the Sloop gave them Chace, and fired several Shott at them. We address'd the General and Council of Batavia on this Subject by the Greyhound, demanding immediate restitution of our Joreemoody & Papers and that they would inflict suitable punishment on the Master of their Sloop for the indignity shewn us. It is needless for us to expatiate on this occasion here. Your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. having of late been so frequently troubled from hence with Complaints of a similar nature with this difference only, that till now no open attempts were ever before made on any Vessels in the Service of the Honble Company; we shall therefore only add at present that, as this insult was committed openly upon our Coasts, and in sight of the British Flag, we do not at all doubt but that you will perceive the absolute, and real necessity there is for taking speedy measures to put an effectual stop in future to such depredations, without which, we apprehend that even the effects of Our Honble Masters will be as unsafe, in transporting from one Settlement to another as private Property has long since been, to the unspeakable prejudice to the Inhabitants of this Coast, to which may be added that we shall soon find it difficult to procure any of the Natives to Navigate our Vessels either publick or private.

7. Your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. will observe in our Consultations, that at first we intended sending the Duke to Manna to transport the Pepper of that Settlement hither, but on our receiving advices from Natall that 200 Atchenees had actually invested Tappanooly, we came to a Resolution of sending her to the Assistance of that Place, she accordingly sailed the 20 April and in her Passage thither was met at Padang by Roger Carter Esq<sup>r</sup>. on his Way here, who directed her return to us again, the disturbances being over at Tappanooly, from whence he had just before departed. The pressing necessity that our Settlements at present labours under for want of Gunpowder and other Stores has induced us to alter our former resolution of sending her

to Manna, and dispatch her to your Honour for an immediate supply thereof. We very earnestly desire that she may be returned to us with as much expedition as possible, not only to furnish us with those necessaries, but to assist in getting ready our investment for Europe for the next Years Shipping.

8. We have frequently laid before you our extreme want of Vessels which is even at present more so than formerly occasioned thro' the Capture of the Sloop Marlbró by the French and the oversetting of the Neptune at Sea, by which measure we are left destitute of any other excepting the Long Boats you sent us sometime since which are calculated only for the use of loading & unloading Ships in this Road. Our labouring under these difficulties induced us among other considerations to order Mr. John Goodwin to proceed to Batavia and purchase us a Sloop to carry about 80 Tons as from your Letter of Sloop Marbro', we cannot expect to be supplied soon, with any from your Coast. The Deputy Governor acquainting us on his arrival of his having purchased a Snow on our Honorable Masters account to convey him hither which be left at Fort St. George to take in such Stores as are wanted for our Service, and which we are in daily expectation of seeing here, we took the opportunity by the Ganges, to countermand our abovementioned orders to Mr. Goodwin directing him not to purchase a Vessel especially as those at Batavia are generally but indifferent. We therefore again request that you will please to write to the Presidency of Bombay, to get Us built with all expedition, two Vessels of One hundred or One hundred & Twenty Tons burthen each which size we esteem to be most useful for the Service of this Coast, as they will in one Trip supply any of our Settlements with all the Necessaries they may want for a whole Year, and at the same time bring up their Seasons Crop of Pepper, which will obviate a difficulty which we now sensibly feel in regard to the want of Godowns at our Southern Settlements, a Circumstance that has and still obliges us to trust our Honorable Masters property on very precarious bottoms, which are likewise very expensive. Another advantage that will arise from having Vessels of the above burthen is that in case of our ever being under an urgent necessity, for supplies of any sort; or even whenever their services are not immediately wanted on this Coast, we can dispatch them to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. for that purpose with respect to the construction of those Vessels, we beg leave to recommend it to you that they be planked after the European manner, by reason that we have no artificers sufficiently expert, and able to repair Rabbit work the method generally made use of in building at Bombay, We must likewise request that they be rigged as Schooners they being not only by far the easiest worked as [*sic*] Sea, but more convenient for repairing

here; And that they be compleatly furnished with proper Artillery for their defence, when they will be able to afford occasional succours to any of our out settlements. As to the expence of sailing Vessels of this Bulk we apprehend that the difference between them and those of fifty Tons, which you seem to think of a proper size cannot be any thing very considerable or in the least adequate to the services betwixt one and the other, as the latter, when they have Waters & provisions on board, carry but a very trifling burthen, We nevertheless submit the whole to your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. Councils Consideration.

9. There being in our Godowns no more Arrack & Sugar than will answer our own Consuption [*sic*] and Capt. Jackson making application to us, for lading on board the Duke such part of his Ships Cargo as she could take in, his own being utterly unfit for proceeding to Sea, & promising to Pay whatever Freight your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. may conclude equitable, we complied with his request. An exact account of the several Articles he has put on board the Duke is inserted in our Manifest. We choose rather to refer setting the Terms of the Freight to you, both as it is a gruff Cargo, and as we are uncertain whether the Companys indulgence of 3  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent is intended to all Feighters, [*sic*] or confined only to the Servants on this establishment. Enclosed comes an Obligation signed by Captain Jackson for Payment to your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. Council of such freight as you may think proper to demand on delivery of his Cargo.

SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE OR ONE PART OF INDIA TO BE DISPOSED OF AT ANOTHER.

10. The supplies of Rice sent on the Norfolk, Princess Augusta and Duke proved very acceptable to us, and sufficient for the Consuption [*sic*] of the Current Year. We hope that your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. Council in future will continue to supply us fully with this necessary Article. In our advices to Bengal we have requested of the Gentlemen there, to send us provided a Europe Ship should be ordered from thence to fill up as formerly 1500 or Two thousand Bags, which will answer our demands for the year 1759. The several other particulars wanted from that place we have signified to them in our Indent by this Conveyance, which with our address, is left open for your perusal and we beg the favor that you will please to recommend it to their attention. Should the disposition of our Hoüble Master's Shipping for the next Season not permit an annual Ship, to be order'd from thence to us as usual we must desire that your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. Council will take such measures as you may conclude expedient for our being furnished with our indent.

11. The fortunate and seasonable supply of Salt which we purchased from the Dutch Ship has freed us from a very disagreeable dilemma, which we should

have been in for want of that commodity so materially requisite for the Inhabitants of these parts. We have now on hand enough for about eight or nine Months expence; It therefore remains for your Honor &c<sup>t</sup>. to furnish us with a sufficiency for the next years consumption [*sic*]. The Quantity annually requisite for that purpose you have been in former advices acquainted of.

12. From the several disputes that have arose between us & Europe Commanders the last year concerning the badness of Gunny bags made use of in Shipping off Pepper, it evidently appears of what Consequence it is of to Our Honble Masters that we should be largely furnished with that Article, and that particular Care should be taken that those sent us in future, be the very best sort, which we are concerned to say, the Gentlemen at Bengal have not duely attended to no more than in Rice and most other things received from them, they being generally the very refuse of their Godowns. We beg your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. Council will please to represent this Matter to them, that we may have no further Cause for Complaint therein. MAY 23

13. The long Cloth white sent Us on the Duke will prove enough for our Occasions for sometime, we shall be carefull to give timely Notice whenever we are in want of any further supply. The Long blue & Blue Cambays now indented for are particularly wanted for the Cloathing of Our Slaves & the other Wares inserted therein being for the use of the Servants on this Establishment we beg your Compliance therewith.

14. In this Packet we transmit you our several Indents for Civil & Military Stores which we esteem immediatly necessary. The General want we have long been in for Gunpowder, small Arms and other Garrison Stores have been fully and frequently represented, you will before the receipt of this Letter in all probability be apprized of what Our Honble Masters may have already sent us on our Storeship, we have only to desire that you wou'd be pleased to make up to us, whatever may be difficient in the several Articles of their Consignment hither. JUNE 5.

15. In obedience to your directions to send such Cash as we have not occasion for here, we now consign you on the Duke Ten Chests containing Forty thousand Dollars (\$40000) likewise 1 Box (q<sup>ts</sup>. 335). 1/8 Tails of Gold being what has been receiv'd at Moco Moco for Sales of Ophium there. We also send by this Conveyance all our useless Military Stores, and such Powder as is totally unfit for Service. Invoice & Bill of Lading for these several particulars come Numbers in the Paquet all our unserviceable Ordnance shall be forwarded to Europe the first conveyance agreeable to your direction. MAY 15

16. The supply of fanams received <sup>of</sup> Hartop came very seasonably, and as both they and Copper Cash JUNE 5

are at all times wanted in exchange & for payment of the Pepper Customs at the several Subordinates, we request some of each may be forwarded agreeable to our Indent.

17. We must beg your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. Council will FEB<sup>RY</sup>. 10 please to excuse our not sending by this conveyance a report of the Condition of the Arrack & Sugar Works from that taken a little before the Falmouths departure which is enter'd on Consultation, you will observe that they were in a flourishing condition. We now transmit our Account Current with the Undertakers, by which you will perceive they have lessened Considerably their Debt to the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company. Our most serious attention to this Branch shall not be wanting, to render it of that Utility which we are in hopes it will soon arrive to.

18. We have experienced many inconveniences for want of a proper Number of Slaves to do the needfull business of the Settlement especially of that important Article of taking the remains, on the frequent removes of Persons from one employ to another Observing that we are not to expect any more Slaves from your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. and imagining that the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Court at these times will not chuse to order a Ship to touch at Madagascar for this purpose we thought it expedient to enter into an Agreement with the Resident of Natall to furnish us with fifty Nias men, for whom we have engaged to pay at the rate of \$70 ₤ head on delivery here. Tho' this is a large price, yet as we shall receive none but stout able Men, we are of opinion they will answer our intentions tho' not quite so well as Madagascar Slaves would have done. Hitherto we have receiv'd only five of the above Number, and we are apprehensive that the Contractors will not be able to supply us with the whole; We therefore beg that should it be in your Power to procure us about One hundred or One hundred and fifty Men that you will please to favour us therein, as they will be vastly acceptable. JUN<sup>E</sup> 5

19. In your Commands by the Hartop Snow, You were pleased to direct our sending to Fort St. George the garblings of the Croee and Cawoor pepper. We beg leave to observe to you, that the quantity is but inconsiderable, and not worth the hazard of disgusting the Natives, which we are apprehensive a thing of this nature would do were it ever to come to their knowledge and therefore be attended with no good Consequences to the Investment. The late Supravisors were so sensible hereof, that they gave positive Injunctions both here, and at the several subordinates for its being all thrown publickly away; We shall on this account wait your further directions before we send any. do.

20. The Lascars lately brought us by our Syrang from your Coast having represented to us, that they

were promised the same allowance of Doll & Ghee given on board of Trading Vessels, we thought it necessary to comply therewith, and have accordingly Indented to the Presidency of Bengal for supplies of those Articles.

21. During the late troubles here we had occasion to borrow from Captain Jackson Eight Pieces of Cannon Four Pounders which are now mounted on the Bastions in our Fort. These Guns being very usefull, and of a proper size for our Service we directed the Captains Edward Frith & Will. Tobison to examine their Condition, whose report of them comes a Number in this Pacquet, We shall be glad your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. will let those which are good remain here and account with Captain Jackson for their value.

22. We directed Mr. Goodwin among other Commissions given him to Batavia, to purchase a large quantity of Plank & Timber to be forwarded hither on the next Storeship, they being Articles we are much in want of; for which purpose & procuring the Sloop already mention'd we advanc'd him Eight Thousand Dollars (\$ 8000) and gave him permission likewise to draw on us, for any further sums he might stand in need of on this Account, but apprehending since that he will have a large Ballance remaining in his hands from our Countermanding his purchase of the Sloop and Iron inserted in our Indent by him, we advised him in our Letter by the Ganges, to remit the same by Bills to your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. if procurable otherwise to consign it you, on any good and safe Conveyance.

23. The Board taking into Consideration the great charge there is in maintaining the Settlement of Natal thought it adviseable to make a purchase from Captain Powney of 54 Chests Ophium at \$ 260 <sup>per</sup> Chest to send thither for Sale, on our Honble Masters Account, when the ship Duke was dispatched for that Place Forty Chests of it were accordingly put on Board her but as she was prevented from proceeding on her Voyage by the Deputy Governour there being no further occasion for her service there, as already mention'd the same has been since relanded. The Deputy Governour not thinking the purchase of this Ophium for the advantage of Our Honble Masters but on the Contrary apprehending from the large imports lately made of this Commodity, the great probability there is of their being Considerable losers by it thought it necessary in his own justification, as well as to prevent in that case, any censure hereafter falling on himself to make a publick declaration in Council of his sentiments thereon, to which Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Marriott, Gun & Hay the only Members of the Board remaining here concerned in the said purchase have given in their particular reasons that induced them to make it; the same being enter'd in Consultation, we beg leave to refer your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. thereto for further information.

THIRDLY TOUCHING INVESTMENT.

24. How far the troubles that have arose in the districts of Laye and Marlbro' may affect this Article in those places, we cannot as yet pretend to premise; but imagine it will not prove of any very material consequence, the produce of them for many years having been but trifling; Our Southern Settlements afford us a very agreeable prospect, and we are not without hopes of a considerable increase in each of those districts. That of Manna in particular has the last Year ex[c]eeded our most Sanguine expectations; Its produce from Primo May 1757 to Ultimo April last, full Three hundred seventy five Tons And the Resident who is now at Marlbro' gives us room to hope that the ensuing season will still ex[c]eed the former provided no unforeseen accident intervenes. We are sorry that the Kingdom of Anack Soongy is not in that flourishing state, we could wish it to be, there having been last Year a decrease of Pepper. Mr. Jack the Resident of Moco Moco has given us some faint expectations of an Increase in this Seasons Crop; but we imagine that it will not be any thing very considerable what the reasons may be why this Kingdom does not yield so much as formerly, we are at a loss to account for, there appearing by our Survey Books to be annually a considerable increase of bearing Vines. We shall be careful to be well inform'd to what, Causes this difference is owing, and when known use the most proper methods to remedy the defect. No Surveys have been taken yet for this Year, but the Residents have already our directions to proceed on them, after the departure of the Duke we shall see this Service duely perform'd.

25. The Residents of our several Settlements having not given us estimates of what Pepper may be expected this Season occasions us to be something at a Loss to inform you precisely with the quantity of surplus, we shall have on hand by the latter end of the Year, for loading any extra Ships that you may find expedient to send thither. We have now in our Godown at this Place, and at our Southern Settlements upwards of Four hundred Tons, and therefore imagine, that we may with safety assure your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. Council, that we shall have over and above sufficient for our annual Storeship seven hundred Tons which we beg that you MAY 23 will endeavor to get taken away otherwise we shall be in the greatest distress for room to contain it.

FOURTHLY OF COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

26. In our advices by the Tryal Sloop we acquainted you of the insurections that have happened in the Districts of Laye and Marlbro'; A particular detail of their rise, progress, and conclusion, you will find amply related under this head, in our General Letter to the Honble Court transmitted them by Ship Fal-mouth to wh<sup>ch</sup>. we beg leave to refer you, since when we

<p>have agreable to the said Letter had before us the Proatteens of Laye, Polly &amp; Bencoolen, to enquire more circumstantially into the original cause of their discontents. In our Consultation held for that purpose, you will observe that they had little to offer in their defence, but entirely laid the Blame on those who have absconded to the Hills, neither could they make any material objection against the Conduct of the several People they had accused. On a serious consideration of this whole affair, we conclude it the most eligible method not to proceed to any great severities, but to pardon their past behaviour, on their giving most solemn assurances of future amendment. This step we were the rather inclined to take from being perfectly sensible, that they had already suffered sufficiently for their rashness in the course of the late troubles; And we are in hopes that the remembrance thereof will intimidate them from ever raising disturbances again, and on our parts, we shall be particularly careful not to give them any just reason for further complaint. They earnestly requested the release of the four Prisoners taken at Doosoon Raja, and we thought proper to comply with their desire therein, at the same time the Board concluded it expedient to propose to them, the renewal of their Contracts with the Honble Company which they without hesitation consented to and accordingly signed soon after, which opportunity we embraced to promote those whose Behaviour had deserved consideration from us.</p>

Raja De Bandar who had been confined on suspicion of being under hand concerned in these disturbances was brought to his Tryal; but no positive evidence appearing against him and all the Chiefs of Bencoolen strongly soliciting his discharge we complied therewith upon their giving Bond for his future good Behaviour and his taking an Oath to be true and faithful to the Honble Company.</p>			APRIL 12

In March las[<i>sic</i>] we had private intimation of a likelihood of some disturbances breaking out at Natal, and receiving advice from the Resident of Moco Moco, of the three Men being arrived there, who had been dispatched express by Mr. Wyatt in a small boat to acquaint us of Tappanooleys being invested by 200 Atchenuse, but that they had lost their Boat &amp; Letters, and with great hazard saved themselves by swimming on shore; We immediately held a Consultation to consider of this matter, when we came to a Resolution of sending the ship Duke thither, as above related. The Deputy Governour on his arrival at Tappanooley found that with the assistance afforded from Natal, the Resident there Mr. Alexander Hall had drove the Enemy from the intrenchments they had thrown up in that bay and after destroying many of them, had taken all their Vessels and Arms, which it is hoped will</p>			APRIL 11

prevent their giving any troubles again of a long time, and that he had left those Settlements in Peace and Tranquility.

29. The Resident of Manna representing to us that Pangaran Natta Jagarl of Bang Kannan was in much distress by reason of his Age, Infirmities and Indigency, and that his services merit some mark of favour from the Honble Company; we being sensible of the same, directed him a present of Fifty Dollars to purchase him some Debtors for the management of his Pepper and Paddy Plantations.

30. We were alarm'd sometime ago of the small Pox being near Poogoon in the Districts of Croee. As from the fatal consequences of that distemper formerly, we were perfectly sensible how necessary it was to take early measures, to prevent if possible its reaching our own Territories, we enjoined the Resident there to guard well all the Avenues to the infected places, notwithstanding which he has informed us, that some of the Natives from the Hills had found means to get to Poogoong, but that they had been drove back again by the Guard. The Southern Residents having been ordered to keep a strict watch, we hope we shall be able to prevent that fatal Malady from spreading further.

31. The Chiefs of the several Tribes Inhabiting the Town of Bencoolen who were formerly allowed a Stipend of \$ 5 ʒ Mensem each, which was taken of by the Supravisors in the reduction of expences as an unnecessary charge, having behaved well in the late troubles, we have return'd it them again, in consideration of their fidelity hoping it will not be disproved [*sic*] of by your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>

32. Before we conclude this head, we beg leave to represent to your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. Council, that it is our Opinion the disturbances that have lately happend here, would never have taken place, had not our forlorn circumstances, with respect to our want of Men, and Military Stores given them some hopes of succeeding in their attempts. The Character of the Malays in General is well known to be such, that for immediate profit, they will run the hazard of the Worst of Consequences to obtain it. We apprehend that the Honble Company will not be displeas'd at any expences needfull for the preservation and safety of the Settlement, provided they have an Investment adequate thereto. Pepper is the only commodity they at present require & it is well known that the Cultivation of it will very poorly answer the great pains & Labor taken to raise it. To this reason, and the constitutional Indolence inherent in these People, arises the great trouble we are at, in obliging them to fullfill their contracts, and it will be impossible for us to use compulsive means, without a force sufficient to awe

them into a compliance, more especially at this juncture as from the Time of Mr. Lennox's quitting the Chair, the Reins of Government have seldom been held in an equal ballance, occasioned by the too great condescension of the generality of those who have been in trust here, by which means the Malays have been accustomed so much to their own will, that it will be with much difficulty to bring them under due subjection. This will take up a length of time and be almost impossible to compass without a proper force. To attempt it without will probably involve us in troubles, as some necessary severity must be always used at this place to curb the licentious disposition so prevalent among the Natives, who are not to be persuaded by fair means only, to Industry. Admitting these Arguments to be just, which in our opinion they are the necessity of having a large Country force than our present establishment, will clearly appear by your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. and as we flatter ourselves that your sentiments here will coincide with ours, we make not the least doubt of a compliance with our request, for the Seapoys we wrote for by the Tryal Sloop for tho' at present we have the appearance of Peace and Tranquility among us, yet we are afraid the Spirit of Rebellion may not be entirely eradicated. Should it again break out, which is far from being improbable, as no doubt the minds of the Inhabitants are still much irritated, from the losses they have suffered, we may depend, that it will be more general than formerly the consequences of which we need not expatiate upon here. We are the more particular in this request from the apprehensions that Our Honble Masters will not be able, in the present posture of Affairs in India to furnish us with any considerable Recruit of Europeans. And indeed, were it left to our choice, We should rather give the preference to Seapoys; for in this Country which abounds with Wood and Morasses, Europeans are not so well Calculated to be sent on expeditions as well by reason of their Inability to bear with the fatigue of Marching in so hot a Climate. as to their not being able to make use of that Discipline which they have been always train'd to. The expence of such an Addition will, no doubt, be striking to your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. It is so to us but upon mature deliberation, we judged it most advantageous for the Interest of Our Honble Master's that they should be put for the present to this expence, rather than run the least hazard of suffering in the Investment. Nothing would afford us higher satisfaction, than reducing the expences to the least bounds they will bear, which is what we shall in particular attend to in every Circumstance; But there are some Cases, in which we esteem the present one wherein a too near frugality is productive of much heavier Charges. We are in hopes this expence will not be of any very long continuance as we shall be carefull to diminish the

same whenever we think the situation of Affairs in the Country will admit. It is our Duty to represent every thing we conclude has any tendency towards promoting the Interests of Our Honble Masters, Your's to judge and determine whether they are really so; We have therefore only to desire, your excuse for our Prolixity on this Subject, and in case you may think it expedient to comply with our request, that you will be pleased to give orders that the People to be sent us for our Service may be Stout young Men and if possible, such as are expert and have been already train'd on your Coast.

33. We shall only add further under this Head our assurances to your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. Council of our utmost endeavours to preserve the future Peace of the Country in general.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS BUILDINGS  
REPAIRS & REVENUES.

34. It is unnecessary to enlarge upon the ex[c]eeding bad condition of the Buildings on this Coast in general, they having been fully represented in our former advices, We are thoroughly convinced that Our Honble Masters have suffered extremely by a too great frugality in this Branch, both in regard to the real expences of temporary Buildings that have been made use of for several years past, and in the loss of many Stores, which tho' it does not publickly appear, is beyond dispute very considerable. We shall therefore make use of the permission given us by the Honble Court in their letter by the Falmouth, to erect at this place, such Buildings as we may judge absolutely needful for the preservation of their property which we shall do with all convenient expedition, due care shall be taken to pitch upon the most frugal plan for erecting a Work of this nature consistent with what our necessities require. We cannot forward you an estimate of the expence by this conveyance but we shall be mindfull to transmit one the first opportunity that offers after we have fixed in our Resolutions.

35. Our Honble Masters have been at heavy Charge JUNE 5<sup>TH</sup>. in erecting a Fort at Moco Moco, which has been long since compleatly finished within this Fort, there is likewise built a Range of Arched Godowns, in Length 130 Feet, and in breadth 34 feet. Over these Godowns Lodgings for the Resident and servants there were intended to be made, but have hitherto been neglected to be finished, for want of orders for that purpose and a proper number of Workmen to carry them on. There are now on hand at that place Bricks and Chunam fully sufficient to answer all the purposes required for compleating these Lodgings, building Barracks for the Military and other necessary storehouses, with Window and Door Frames nearly if not quite enough, for the whole work; so that the expence of finishing

these several buildings in this Fort will be really trifling & not in the least comparable to the present heavy annual Charge there is, in repairing the old Houses and Paggar now inhabited, and which must be shortly renewed. Another consideration of great moment and which alone ought to induce a removal to the new Fort, is, the precarious state Affairs are likely to be in on the Demise of the Old Sultan, there being great probability of disputes arising between his two Sons. We therefore take the liberty to give it as our opinion that it will be both the safest & Cheapest method that our Honble Masters can take, to compleat the buildings in the new fort, and we hope that your Honour &c <sup>t</sup> . Council will concur with our sentiments herein.			
36. It being heretofore agreed that it was necessary to build a Godown at Sablat to receive the Pepper of that Country, and the Resident having lately inform'd us that the materials for it were already provided, we gave him directions to finish it with all possible expedition.	APRIL 21	109	69
37. The large encrease of Pepper at Manna has obliged us to direct the Resident to erect a Godown, seperate from the House to contain Two hundred Tons. The Old House and Godown being also much decayed we have rebuilt the Godown of Brick and are repairing the House in a substantial manner, which is now nearly finished and will by the Residents report last many years. 38. The buildings at Croxe in general have been long represented to us to be in a very decayed condition. As yet we have only given the Resident directions to repair them in the best manner possible, we have also advised him to endeavour at procuring Bricks to be made there at the rate of \$ 4½ <sup>7</sup> / <sub>8</sub> Thousand, the price given here. 39. Our want of Slaves in the more needfull business of erecting Godowns will prevent our making use of the Honble Courts permission of adding the necessary Works to our present Fortifications for some time to come, so that we hope before we are in a capacity to undertake a Work of this nature, that your Honour &c <sup>t</sup> . will be able to send us over a proper person to conduct the management there[of].			
40. We are concern'd to observe that in the Sale of the Several Licences for the Current year many of them are considerably decreas'd as you will find by our Consultations; we shall use our best endeavours the next year to raise them to their former value.	APRIL 21 <sup>ST</sup> .		
41. Cumberland House being in such a bad condition as not to be habitable which has been heretofore represented to your Honour &c <sup>t</sup> . and Salop House considerably too Small for the Deputy Governour to

transact the business of the Settlement in, we have hired a House for that purpose at \$ 15 <sup>⁹</sup>/<sub>10</sub> Mensum. Being of Opinion that there is great danger of Cumberland House falling should we be again visited with MAY 23 a severe Earthquake, the Consequence whereof may probably be attended not only with the loss of some lives, but the ruin of one of the Curtains, and part of the Barracks, we take the Liberty to advise its being taken down to the first Floor and the Godowns when Terrassed, will be extreamly serviceable for the reception of Wares and other Stores needfull to be kept within the Fort.

42. We hardly need acquaint your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. Council how very necessary it is, that there should be apartments in the Fort for the Deputy Governours residence therein. We request your permission to erect one, when our other Works are compleated. The materials that will be saved from the old House will considerably lessen the Expence of a new one. In our next advices we shall transmit a plan of what we judge the most convenient for this purpose, together with a Calculate of the expence, as nearly as we are able to compute it.

SIXTHLY OF COVENANT SERVANTS MILITARY  
OFFICERS &c<sup>t</sup>.

43. We are to acquaint your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. that the 15<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo arrived here, Roger Carter Esquire who brought with him a Paquet from the Honble Court of Directors, containing a Commission appointing him Deputy Governour of their Affairs upon this Coast MAY 15 conformable thereto, he accordingly took the Chair, and his Commission was publickly read in the Fort, to which all due Obedience is paid.

44. On the appointment of Mr. John Goodwin to be our Agent at Batavia with Mr. John Harbet his assistant Mr. Stewart was directed to take Charge of the Accountants employ and Mr. Blaquier succeeded as Sub Secretary during the absence of those Gentle- APRIL 21 men.

45. Being in want of Servants qualified to take MAY 23<sup>d</sup> Charge of the employs at this Place, and Mr. Prestons suspension being owing to any misconduct of his in the Companys Affairs, but only to a private misunder- MAY 23 standing betwixt the late Supravisor and him, we have therefore nominated him to be Warekeeper and Sea Customer.

46. Some disagreements happening between the MARCH 15 Resident of Saye and Mr. Henry Russell his assistant, the latter was recalled and Mr. John Guild sent No. 78 thither in his stead.

47. Mr. John Williams was dismissed their APRIL 18 Honours service for reasons which will appear on our 21 Consultations to which We beg leave to refer you. MAY 6

We cannot but observe, that the sending the Paymasters, Civil & Military Storekeeper's & Warehousekeeper's Monthly Accounts in Broken Setts, is not only of no service to you but occasions much Trouble & perplexity, We therefore hope you will not take it amiss if in future we transmit Copys only of those Books when Ballanced. In regard to the employs that keep no regular Setts, such as the Military Paymaster, Pepper Godownkeeper and Sea. Customer we shall send them you as drawn out Annually from Primo May & ending Ultimo April, which Method we hardly doubt but will meet your approbation. JUNE 5<sup>th</sup>.
53. In future due attention shall be given to your Orders for putting marginal notes to our Consultations and direct that our Letters be properly referenced. And when we transmit Consultations for a whole year we shall be carefull to forward an Index with them.
54. You will please to observe in our Letter to the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Court which went <sup>by</sup> Ship Oxford that we therein advised them of there being formerly a Balance upon the Books here T of \$ 1616. 2. 53 due to the Estate of John Savage deceased which was wrote off them to Account Current Fort St. George long since. We have extracted from the Books a particular Account with the Estate, Copy thereof comes enclosed in this Pacquet for your perusal which is all the Information we can give in this matter.
55. TO THE HONBLE GEORGE PIGOT ESQ<sup>r</sup>.  
 PRESIDENT & TO THE COMMITTEE OF THE  
 WEST COAST AFFAIRS AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

1. I take the Liberty to address to your Honor &<sup>t</sup>. a particular Letter concerning the West Coast Affairs, there being through hurry in dispatching

the Duke some few matters omitted in the General Letter by her others that, to particularize so fully as they are ought to be, would swell it to too great a length, as also some that I did not think it prudent to insert therein, all which you will permit me to write on under the usual Heads.

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING.

2. Not thinking it prudent to depend entirely on the Vessel I bought, to transport me hither for a supply of Powder &c<sup>t</sup>. induced me to dispatch the Duke so soon as she could be got ready. We have in our General Letter request-ed she may be immediately returnd us, and I now again repeat the same; for without her, we shall scarcely be able to get up our Southern Pepper, and consequently be at a loss to make up the Tonnage of Pepper, which we have given you expectation of. Should the Duke leave your Coast in September or October, I beg leave to recommend, that the first Port she touches at be Moco Moco and that the Commander be enjoined to land what Salt & Stores the Resident there may require. This step will be a great saving to our Hon<sup>ble</sup> Masters in the Charges, as well as Wastage, incurr'd on the former Article, by its being landed here, and there reloaded on board the Storeship for that Settlement; it will likewise enable us to give our annual Ship a quicker Dispatch from hence to our Norther[n] Settlements, which will not only free us from the Hazard of keeping her on Demorage, but if she meets with a Quick Return, enable us to land all the Pepper she brings at Pooloo, to be in readiness for the Extra Ships sent here, and allow us Time to send her to Manna for the whole years Investment at that Place. The Captain of the Duke ought likewise to be directed to follow such Orders as the Resident of Moco Moco shall give him, as we may perhaps find it necessary that she touch at Ippoo, Cattown & Laye to deliver Salt for the yearly Consuption [*sic*] of those Places and to take in what Rice or Boards they may have collected for the use of this Settlement.

3. We have been very particular in representing the ill Consequences of permitting the Dutch to go in the manner they do at present. You will see that not content with exercising a Cruel and dispotic Power, in that they call their own Territories, they have extended it even to ours. Their Intention herein plainly indicates, that they aim at intimidating the Natives under our Government. from either engaging in Trade themselves, or navigating our Vessels. They have too well succeeded in these Points, for now it is morally impossible to prevail on any of them to sail in our Service. Is it not striking that they do not medle with, or even molest any other Vessells, but what sails from Fort Marlbró? What can be the reason of it? Is it more unlawful for us to Trade than for others? And does it not from hence appear, that they think we have not Interest sufficient to procure Redress? else, why these Outrages to us only? I am very sorry to say, that they have had hitherto, too much Room to make this conclusion. Matters are now come to such a Crises that if proper methods are not taken to put a stop to their Incroachments, it will be impossible for us to send a Boat from one Out Settlement to another, suffering these Insolencies of theirs at Sea. may be attended with bad Consequences to our Land Interest the Inhabitants here being fully sensible of them, there being few Families at Bencoolen, who have not been sufferers more or less, besides the cruel & long Confinement of many, who have unhappily fallen into their hands, so that they already begin to despise us, and give Credit to the insolent Declaration the Dutch have frequently made, that the English are unable to stand before their Company and that whoever depends on so precarious a Protection, shall be sure to feel their severest Vengeance. I hope Gentlemen, that you will be pleas'd to recommend very particularly this affair to the serious attention of the Hon<sup>ble</sup> the President & Council who I make no doubt will clearly perceive the necessity there is concerting and pursuing such measures, as to them will appear most expedient to put a stop to such injurious & insolent Treatment, which we have fatally Experienced for so many Years past.

4. Our great want of proper Vessells is fully set forth in our Letter to the Board, I shall therefore here only Offer a few more Arguments, why those we now write for are the most fit for our service, Croee Residency produces upwards of one hundred Tons of Pepper, a considerable Increase is expected next Year, and I make no doubt, that with a proper Management of the Resident there, it will amount soon to a very large Quantity. The Residency of Cawoor is also growing very advantageous; the Pepper received there last year was sixty four Tons, & there still remains a great quantity of the last Seasons Crop not yet deliver'd in, I may venture to assure you that the Investment there will be shortly One hundred if not One hundred & fifty Tons. In your Report to the Honble the President & Council, under date of the 13<sup>th</sup>. April 1757 You justly observe that our Honble Masters have been very unfortunate in this Branch of their concerns; What is the reason of it, and the most proper Methods to pursue hereafter to remedy it, require Consideration. In my opinion, it is evidently owing to such Vessells as we have hitherto had, being, by reason of their small Burthen, not at all fitted to our purposes. If they were too small formerly, they must consequently be more so now that our Pepper Investment is so considerably increas'd, We were obliged to let them run so long together without having them ashore, and giving them proper and timely repairs that they were soon worn out, and so bad when they came to be repaired, that it could seldom or never be done effectually. Having them of Dimensions we request, will obviate this Difficulty, and free us from many other Inconveniencies. In regard to the expence, I don't imagine the Difference would be great, The same Officers would serve for one as the other, there would only be an addition of some Lascars. You will also please to observe, that when our seasons are once set in, they generally blow so fresh, that it is with the greatest difficulty Vessells beat up against them. The properest time for sending either to the Southward or Northward, is in March, April & September in these Months they are almost sure of quick Passages, both in going and returning, the Winds being very variable. When we are able to bring up a whole seasons Pepper at once, we can always time it so and thereby prevent the many heavy Losses the Company have suffered by sending at improper seasons for the Pepper, such as the Loss of the Sloop Louisa & her Cargoe, with others since. In the intervening Time, we shall be able to repair them, or send them over to your Coast for what supplies we may be in want of, as Circumstances may direct us Under this Article, you will permit me to request You will please to represent to the Honble the President & Council how acceptable it would be to us could any Carpenters & Caulkers be sent us from Bombay.

SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE &C<sup>A</sup>.

5. The Rice receiv'd from Bengal, and what we have been able to get from our Out Settlements has been so large, that we reckon upon nearly eighteen Months Stock in our Godowns, so that the 1500 Bags we have wrote from Bengal will be fully sufficient for the year 1759. Salt we shall soon want, & it is very necessary, that we should be largely supply'd with it. The Ship Duke is not, I believe, more than 200 Tons Burthen, and therefore unable to bring us a sufficiency. In what a Condition we should have been in for want of this Article, if Providence had not favour'd us by sending in a Dutch Ship loaded with it. As we are now able to provide for so large a Tonnage, I hope that the ships sent hither on that Business, will always bring as much as will answer our Demands.

6. Hitherto I have not been able to make very particular Enquiry into the Condition of the Arrack and Sugar Plantation. On examining into their Debt, by the Account which Mr. Stuart the Accountant presented me, it appeared that they owed not much above three thousand Dollars. I was a good deal surprized to find afterwards, that they were likewise indebted four thousand two hundred Dollars more for fourteen Months Rent of the Arrack Farm. This Neglect of not receiving it Monthly, was first begun in Mr. Pybus's

Administration & was continued in the succeeding one. The Money due them for their two Thirds of the Arrack & Sugar delivered into the Companys Godown, has been stopt in part Payment of it; There still remains due two thousand Dollars, which I shall endeavor to get paid as soon as possible after the Dukes Dispatch, but am much afraid that I shall meet with some difficulty therein. In future I shall be particularly carefull that it is paid Monthly, as well as all the other Farms.

7. I must again repeat our great want of Slaves though we have desired only 100 or 150 Men in the General Letter, yet I think that we could very well dispense with 200 Men & 100 Women, more than our present Number. At these times, I fancy we are not to flatter ourselves with the hopes of a supply; but I hope that when the present Warr is over, You will be so good as to strengthen our Remonstrances to the Honble Court, for a ship being sent to Madagascar for that Purpose. When we are supply'd with a large Number, we shall then be able to station them under the several artificers, and by that Means, soon be enabled to carry on most of the Business of the Place, without employing the Malays, which will not only be cheaper & better done. but also add greatly to the security of the Settlement.

8. The Purchase of Captain Powneys Ophium appeared to me a very extraordinary Proceeding. In Justice to the Company, and to free my Character from any future Aspersion, I could not omit taking publick notice of it in our Consultation of the 5<sup>th</sup>. of June. Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Marriott, Gunn & Hay have also given in an Answer thereto, There appears to me scarce any probability of its setting so much being in private hands. I am at the greatest Loss what to do with it or which way to Manage so as to get it off, with no disadvantage to the Company, the Price it was purchas'd at, being so very extravagant.

9. By the Several Disappointments we have met with, in not receiving the Gunpowder and other stores you intended us, it appears how necessary it is, that we should always have a large stock of every Article in our Godowns, that we may not hereafter be almost at the Mercy of the Malays which in reality has been the Case for some Time past.

10. I must beg the favor that you will please to stop out of this Years Madeira Ship, ten Pipes of Wine for the use of the Servants on this Coast.

#### THIRDLY OF INVESTMENT.

11. It was fortunate that the late Warr happen'd in part of the Country where this Article could not be much prejudic'd. As our troubles have ended favorably on our Parts, it is probable that we may hereafter find the People mor [*sic*] tractable in obeying our Injunctions for the Cultivation of Pepper. This will however depend a good deal on our Condition here, if they find us able to compel them, they will give us no trouble; if not, they will still remain dilatory in this Point. Surveys shall be regularly taken at the proper Seasons, and due care observed in comparing them, & giving proper directions to the Residents in consequence thereof. After all it very much, if not altogether depends on the Residents taking proper care in the Interrim, that those Gardens found foul are immediatly cleaned. The Malays know the time of our taking the Surveys, when they are careful to have their Gardens clean, afterwards neglect them till the next season returns. It is now nearly five Years since the Custom of taking Surveys by Europeans has taken Place. Is it not amazing, that, tho' by our survey Books the number Nines are very considerably Increased, yet the produce falls in many Places short of what it was formerly. Manna is the only Place where the Vigilence & Care of the Resident if all have been equal in their assiduity, Appears, & from whence our Honble Masters has receiv'd any advantage, in this Point I will not say that the other Residencies are equally capable of so great an Improvement; but it is very



certain they might be made to produce a much larger Investment, than they do at present. I shall endeavour to find out the real Cause of this and hope in my next advices to give some Light how it has happen'd.

12. You will observe that under this Head, we have given you expectations of 700 Tons of Pepper, over & above our annual Ships Loading. This Calculation has been made by the Board here. I believe we are rather under than above the Mark, but we are not the proper Judges; the several Residents ought to give us an account of what may be expected at their respective Residencies. This I shall take care to have done hereafter.

#### FOURTHLY OF COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

13. I am sorry to find that the Country is not perfectly reconcil'd to us. Their Losses in the late Troubles sit heavy on them, and I strongly suspect, that the fear of worse consequences, is the sole Reason of their being now quiet. Should they be able to form any great Addition of strength, they may possibly again break out. The best & surest Method, joined to a proper Management to prevent any thing of this sort is strengthening our hands here, with a force we can rely on. Buggases are usefull in many Cases, but not entirely to be depended on in such Circumstances. Those we employ in this Capacity in troublesome times are generally the very Refuse of the Malays, & many of them perhaps connected with the Enemy, should they revolt after being supply'd by us with arms & Ammunition, which we are obliged to give them on these occasions, it would perhaps be with difficulty we should be able to keep the Fort, & the Country must inevitably be destroy'd. This Circumstances may not possibly happen; but it is far from being impracticable, and I think ought to be guarded against. The expence of the proposed addition to our Country Guard will no doubt be a subject of your Consideration; but, I flatter myself, that when the present circumstances of this Country is weigh'd together with the large Investment now got, & the fine prospect there is of its being still greater, if we are in a capacity to keep the Country in Peace, & the inhabitants to their duty of making Pepper Gardens, agreeable to their Contracts, You will concur in our Opinion, that it is much more eligible for the Company to be put to this certain Charge for sometime, than run the least Risque of hurting their Investment.

14. I enclose to your Honour &c<sup>t</sup>. a Copy of a Letter I left with Mr. Richard Wyatt, Resident of Natal, relating to the Methods I would have him pursue for the withdrawing that Settlement and Tappanooley. The Honble Court were pleas'd on representing the Necessity there was to keep this Resolution secret, to direct their Orders concerning it to me, and the two Senior Council. On my arrival at Natal, I found that the Private Traders had been at some Pains to instil into the Inhabitants that the Company had given Orders about it, and they pressed me much to know whether it was really so. I evaded giving them a positive answers, and in general assured them That the Company never withdrew their protection, from those who were worthy of it; that they were sensible they had given us solemn assurances of planting Pepper, of which there was not the least prospect; That the Company had been at very heavy charges in maintaining their Freedom and Independency, and that there was great probability, that when the company found that they had been deceiv'd by them in their part of the Contract, they would think themselves disengaged from their Promises therein; For it would be unreasonable in them to expect, that so many People should be kept at Natal, solely for their Protection at the Companys expence, without any present advantage, or future Prospects of any. I enjoined Mr. Wyatt to make the same observation, and at all times to insinuate that they must not expect the continuance of the Companys Favor, which was granted them on no other Condition, but that of procuring them Pepper, which they had never yet once attempted to cultivate.

---

In regard to withdrawing this Settlement, I shall agreeable to the Orders from the Honble Court, punctually execute their Commands whenever I have means in my Power to make a step of this Nature practicable, without running too great hazard of our Honble Masters Effects and the Lives & Fortunes of their Servants there, and such Inhabitants as have since settled under our Protection. This you must be sensible cannot be done, with the vessels we have here; on which consideration it will be necessary to wait the return of the ship Duke, when we shall probably with her Assistance, and such small vessels we may have beside, be able to make up sufficient Tonnage for that Service. Whatever Directions it may be thought proper to give further in this affair, I beg that they may be directed to me solely, it being necessary to keep it secret, till ready to put in Execution, as the divulging of it may hazard the Lives of the Gentlemen & Garrison there.

#### FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS BUILDINGS &c<sup>r</sup>.

15. There is nothing particular for me to say under this Head, excepting taking the liberty of recommending to your serious consideration what is wrote in the General Letter to the President and Council. That relating to Moco Moco Fort ought I think to be the next work set about, after the Godowns at Marlbro' are finished. The Sultan begins to grow old, and the sooner we are firmly settled in it the better. If it be possible to procure any artificers, either on your Coast, Bombay or Bengal, they would be of the greatest service to us. The Company have been very unfortunate in the Choice of Bricklayers; the one they sent out hither sometime since was so very bad, that we were obliged to send him home again, and the Man sent on the Falmouth is full as worthless, and knows nothing of his Business. Should it lay in our Power to entertain any, we shall make use of the Liberty given us for the purpose; but it is very seldom People of that profession come this way.

16. The Moco Moco & Croee Licences were disposed of this Year at a much cheaper Rate than has been customary for some Years past. The Gentlemen here were in the wrong to let them go as they did. I hope the next Year to bring them to their stated value, as settled by the supervisors.

#### SIXTHLY OF COMPANY'S SERVANTS &c<sup>r</sup>.

17. Mr. Marriott and the Council have taken a very extraordinary Step in making four Captains, expressly against the Regulations of our Coast, and not at all wanted. If it was not for the consideration of Captain Nelson being stopped here from his Voyage, on the promise of a Commission & a Company, I should not hesitate a Moment to reduce them to the stated Number. He is since Married & has put himself to great Expences it would therefore be using him not a little hardly to deprive him of the Terms he was promised, especially as he is a Man that bears a good Character as an Officer. When Natal is withdrawer, we shall be able in all probability, & provided our Request for Seapoys is Compl'y'd with to send over to your Coast, a Party of forty or fifty Europeans; so that if he were permitted to command them thither, we could be pretty well able to reduce the other Company, now commanded by Captain Stodart, who I believe would be contented with a Promise of succeeding to the first Vacancy.

#### SEVENTHLY TOUCHING ACCOUNTS.

18. Should there be any Mistakes or Omissions in our dispatch by the Duke, I must beg that You will please to consider my late arrival, and my not being concern'd in any Transactions before that time which consequently renders me not so well able to give an exact and particular Detail of them, nor in so explicite a Manner, as they perhaps require.

19. It would be vastly agreeable, if your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will be pleased to forward us an exact Account of Adjustments between your General Books & Ours, as likewise an Annual Account of what this settlement is charged for the ship

Duke, & any other vessels employ'd by You for the service of this Coast. This I earnestly desire, as it will be very acceptable to me to be Inform'd of the Total Charges Our Honble Masters are at, in maintaining their Settlements on this Coast.

SIR

As there is the greatest Probability that the Honble Company will be induced, from the great Expences of this Settlement, and the small Prospect there is of the Inhabitants being ever brought to the Cultivation of Pepper, or any other Commodity that will Answer the Europe Market, to withdraw their servants & Effects entirely away, I think it necessary to caution you against running into any heavy Expences in their account, or involving yourself in particular in any Branches of Trade, that may not be collected in at a very short Warning; and till their Pleasure shall be known, to make use of every Opportunity of sending up to Marlbro' such useless cumbersome stores, as you think you may not be in immediate Want of, that when Orders may arrive for quitting you may not be too much lumbered, but in doing this, I particularly recommend it to You, to make use of all the Caution possible, that the Inhabitants may not have the least Suspicion any such Step is intended as they might in such a Case, meditate Revenge. I leave it to You to hint to the other Gentlemen, how necessary it is in these times, when the Fate of the Place is Yet in Suspence, to trade in the most wary Manner, and not on any Account contract Debts, or enter into concerns in the Shipping Way. Your own and the Safety of the People under you in my Opinion depends acting in this affair with the utmost Secrecy and Caution. In your next advices to Mr. Hall, you will likewise give him such orders and directions as you may judge requisite to answer these Intentions.

As you have been present in the several Bechars I have had with Dattoo Besar & the Head Men it is therefore not Necessary for me to point out to you that you must, as soon as convenient, after I am gone, send to know their Resolution about planting Pepper; If they tell you that they will do it, in your Answer you must acquaint them that the Company is no longer to be put off with words, but they expect immediate Proofs of what they are able and willing to do, and on no Account give them any respite, but press them to a present Performance, at the same time you must plainly tell them, as I have done that it was owing solely to their promise of planting Pepper that the Place was settled, and that if the Company found, no heed is given by them to their part of the Contract, they should think themselves absolutely free from theirs, and consequently soon ease themselves of the heavy charges the Settlement is to them. If they, on the other hand, declare that they cant make their People undertake such a thing, without Money being advanced, all you have then to do is, to tell them that you will acquaint me with their Resolution, and wait for Orders. I recommend it also to you, to take every Opportunity in your private Talk, with the Merchants and others of hinting how much the Company is disappointed in their promises of Pepper, which was their sole Inducement to settle here, and that it is your Opinion they will not long bear such heavy Expence, without any Prospect of Advantage, as has been, and still is the case. But this must be done with address so that they may not surmise any such Resolution is already taken.

Sultan Awal Laddeen seems very desirous of going to Marlbro', You must encourage him in this Resolution and by all Means get him to put it in Execution, may, [*sic*] should he retract, Force must be used to bring him away, in Case the Settlement is withdrawn, as it may be of bad Consequence to the Kingdom of Arrack Soongey, should the Dutch get Possession of his Person.

Try by all Means to introduce the Achenese again both here and Tappa nooley. Should the Company keep the Settlement, they are the only People that can bring any very considerable Trade to this Place, and if the Company gives it up, they are able, if once admitted, to keep our Rivals the Dutch out, & consequently not lose us entirely the Trade of this Part of the Coast.

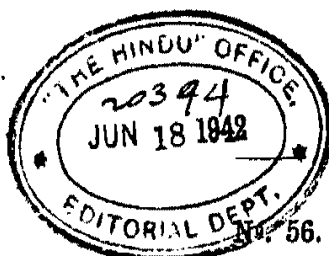
This Letter you must not permit any one to see, and you are to direct any advices you may have to send in Consequence of it to me & the Secret Committee of Fort Marlbro', taking care to enclose it in the Publick Letter, and not in a separate Packet, till you may receive Orders for that purpose

I suppose the Gentlemen of Marlbro' will on your last Advices to them, send up the Duke, if not sailed for Madras to your Assistance. If by their Letter they should not very much press her return to that Place, I think it will be more for the Companys Interest to order her directly to the Coast, as she may then bring us Supplies of what Stores are wanted this Year, whereas, by ordering her again to Marlbro', there is the greatest Probability of her not being able to make another Trip this year. Council under date the 26 May last, by the late Mr. John Goodwin, who was soon afterwards swept off by a malignant Fever. By advices received since from the Worshipfull Roger Carter Esq<sup>r</sup>. Deputy Governour & C<sup>t</sup>. Council of Fort Marlbro', they are pleased to countermand the purchase of a Vessell, as well as Iron, on the Honble Company's Account, and also direct, that as large a sum as possible be remitted to your honour & C<sup>t</sup>. of the Ganges, Cap<sup>t</sup>. Peter Duncan, the same has been duely complied with, for the particulars of which I beg leave to refer you to a joint Address of this Date signed by Mr. Peter Garden, & myself; Mr. Goodwin having likewise appointed that Gentleman to transact the Honble Company's as well as his private Affairs, How far an Appointment with Respect to the former is regular, & Consonant with the Standing Orders will for the present fall more immediately under the Consideration of the Board at Fort Marlbro'. Since the last dispatch, we have had Intelligence that One of Our China Ships was seen going through the Streights of Bally the Beginning of last Month. None of the Netherlands Company's ships from Amsterdam are yet arrived, tho Six were expected from thence early in June. People here are under no small Apprehensions that the turn Affairs have taken in Europe may be the Cause of their not appearing. By a Vessell which left the Cape the beginning of April, no

Europe Ship was there at that time. The obtaining of Gunpowder here for the Service of the Settlements on the West Coast is absolutely impracticable, your honour &c<sup>t</sup>. will I therefore make no doubt embrace as early an Opportunity as Possible of furnishing them with a Supply of that very Essential Article. We have received your favours of the 26<sup>th</sup>. March 21<sup>st</sup>. April and 10<sup>th</sup>. July. As the two first did not arrive with us till long after the season proper for dispatching any Vessels to your Coast, We could not comply with your Request of sending up a fourth ship to your Presidency.

We are extremely pleas'd by your last Letter to hear of the safe arrival of the Boscawen, Grantham, and Fox at your Place.

Such Salt Petre as we can furnish shall be sent you as opportunities offer, the quantity we cannot ascertain.

Your omitting to mention whether you could assist in loading home a ship in September has prevented our sending up one of those we have herewith 200 Tons of Petre & Red Wood, should your advices upon that subject arrive in time for a ship to proceed to your settlement early next Month and the Tonnage on hand require such a disposition, a Ship shall be sent you half Laden from hence, We hope the first Letter We receive from you will bring us Advice of the annual Shipping being arrived and inform us exactly what Bales will be furnished by your Settlement and at what time.

As We are in hopes you will have receiv'd some Advices from the West Coast by the Company's Ship Duke, We request you will inform Us by the earliest opportunity what quantity of Surplus Pepper there is likely to be at Fort Marlbro' this season and whether your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. intend sending a ship thither.

Sometime in the Month of April the Tryall Sloop imported here from Bencoolen with a Packet for your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. which we transmit You by this vessel and shall forward a Copy of her Letter by that sloop who will leave this Place in a few days for your Coast. We have advanced the Master [*Lacuna*] at two different times for which he has given us Bills on his Owners; the first Bill of each Sett is forwarded in this Packet which we request you will give us credit for, Enclos'd comes likewise an Account of Moneys advanc'd the Master for the Wages of the Crew and the Amount of Provisions supplied him conformable to his Contract with the Gentlemen at Fort Marlbro' which you will please likewise to give us Credit for.

Herewith you will receive Invoice of Horse furniture [*sic*] ¶ Fox.

We have deliver'd Mr. Zeigenbalg Chief of the Danish Factory the Chest of Treasure marked E.M.F. at the Request of the Danish Missionarys.

On the 19<sup>th</sup>. June imported here the Honble Companys Ship Hardwick Captain John Samson Commander. She left great Britain the 13<sup>th</sup>. December and having put in at Trincumala for Intelligence the Dutch Governour gave Captain Samson so unfavourable an Account of the Engagement between the two Squadrons that he thought it most prudent to make the best of his Way to the Bay.

We think it necessary to advice you that by the Honble Companys Comands of the 13<sup>th</sup>. November 1757 rec<sup>d</sup>. the Ship Hardwick William Watts Charles Manningham, Richard Becher and John Z<sup>a</sup>. Holwell Esq<sup>rs</sup>. were appointed to preside in the Council of Fort William by Rotation each for the space of four Months, but this Plan of Government being judged inconvenient and prejudicial to the Companys affairs at this Juncture, the board have requested the Honble Robert Clive Esq<sup>r</sup>. to preside in the Companys Affairs at Bengal till a Person is appointed from Europe in the usual Method.

By that Ship We receiv'd a Packet for your Presidency which we now forward by this Conveyance, she was laden chiefly with Military and naval Stores for the use

The Ship Fort William is still remaining here as a Guard ship and I have been long in expectation of receiving advice from your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. concerning her Destination, they have buried a considerable Number of their People during the time they have lain here and the Commander has frequently complained to me of her wanting Repairs which it would be impossible for her to receive at this place. I therefore most humbly take the Liberty of giving my Oppinion to your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. that I think a much smaller Vessell well manned and Armed might answer the purpose full as well upon this Station and might save a considerable Expence to the Honble Company as she might upon many Occasions be made more serviceable in going up the Rivers and in bringing us such Necessaries as we may want from time to time for the use of this Settlement.

I had the honour to address you on the Ilchester Capt<sup>n</sup>. John Tedd under Date the 6<sup>th</sup>. of January last by the way of Bengal. Duplicates of such papers as were then sent by that Conveyance are herewith inclosed as also a Gen<sup>l</sup>. Return of the Military and Train to this time.

I must humbly beg leave to remind your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. of our present State of Cash which is now reduced very low, the Ballance remaining the 31<sup>st</sup>. of March

Rs. As. Pcs.

last being only 16178-3-11 the greatest part of which is in Spanish Dollars and is Money that has been of no manner of Service to the Settlement, nobody caring to take them at the Exchange they are rated at in the Honble Companys Accounts, which is 254 Arcot Rupees equal to 100 Ounces or 115 Dollars. there is likewise a Quantity of Copper Cash that is intirely useless and is only Lumber in the Settlement. I hope therefore that your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. will please to give such Orders and directions relating thereto as shall appear to your Judgments meet and best.

Our Military Men have received no cloathing for two years past, that they are now obliged to appear in a very ragged Condition excepting those Recruits which were received here in January last, having had Cloathing made for them out of the Honble Companys Coarse Broad Cloth for which I have taken their Receipts and have entered them in the publick Accounts of this Settlement.



The Off Reckonings of the Military and Train are remaining in my hands ever since the Month of October 1756 and there is likewise the Effects of Mr. Edward Waldo who died here the 2<sup>d</sup>. of February 1757 and whose Effects were sold at Publick Outcry the 25 of April following the whole amounting to Rs. Rs. C.

538-4-40 as may be perceived in the Occurrences, there is likewise an Elephant here belonging to the Estate of Capt<sup>n</sup>. John Howes deceased mention of which was before Omitted by Mistake. I should therefore be very glad to receive advice from your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. concerning all these Matters as I know not how to proceed with them, having received no answer to any of my Letters or any advice in what manner to act ever since I had the h[onour to] command at this [ . . . ]

Mr. Christopher Roffe Storekeeper and Monthly Writer upon this Establishment having made Application to me for Permission to go to Bengal by this Conveyance I have judged it to be improper to comply with his Request until such times as your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. are made acquainted therewith, that there may be some Gentlemen first sent here to supply his Places. I hope therefore your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. will please to send some proper person to take charge of those Effects by the first conveyance. A Master or Overseer of the Works is likewise very much wanted here, the Person who officiates at Present in that Office not having sufficient Experience for managing so troublesome an Employment.

In my last General Letter to your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. under Date the 5<sup>th</sup>. of January last I then mentioned the misfortune we had met with in losing our Long Boat one European and 13 Black People in endeavouring to assist his Majestys Ship Bridgewater in Distress since which two of those Black People were brought to the Island by the Syrian Sloop from the Coco Islands, where they were met with all well and the Long boat safe a particular Account of which will appear in the Occurrences of the 31<sup>st</sup>. of January last. As the Long boat and People are not yet arrived here and as we have not since received the least Intelligence concerning them I believe we may now give the mover for Lost unless therefore they should arrive here any time this Month I purpose to strike them off the list of which I judge it necessary yours Hon<sup>rs</sup>. should be acquainted.

Mr. George Norris who came here as a Mate of the Syrian Sloop before-mentioned immediately upon his arrival made Application that I would take him into the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Companys Service as a Master Carpenter, assuring me that he came here intirely with that View and that he had engaged himself with Mr. Roberts (who we heard was coming over to be chief) for to serve the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company in this Settlement as we were greatly in want of a Capable Person in that Branch I agreed to take him into the Service and have allowed him 40 Rupees  $\text{₹}$  Month Wages, he went immediately to work without Delay and sett up a Stout Long Boat of about 12 Tons burthen which has been forwarded as fast as our Circumstances would admit of, and will be now ready for launching in a very few Days; we have besides several fine Large Boats which have been lying here useless for these two years past for want of some proper Person to repair them. I do therefore purpose for to sett him about that work as soon as the Long Boat is fini[shed and] as my Proceedings in that Affair and all others have been solely to promote the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Companys Interest I humbly hope that they will meet with your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. Approbation.

With a General Letter which I received from the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Presidency of Bengal under Date the 6<sup>th</sup>. of October last, I also received a very large Indent for Teak Timbers and Planks for the use of the Fortifications going to be erected at Calcutta, Copies of which will appear in the Publick Accounts of this Settlement in December Last, since which time I have been using my utmost endeavours to procure a sufficient quantity for that purpose, but I have not been able to get any more than 151 Teak Timbers this Last Season out of

a Thousand which had been faithfully promised me by the Burmahs; those indeed are very fine but the Prices are very extravagant to what they have been formerly bought for.

In the Occurrences for January 1757 your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. will there perceive the Misfortune we met with in losing one Hundred Teak Timbers which in bringing down the River wear [*sic*] carried out to Sea by Accident thro' the Porean Channel and were intirely lost. The Misfortune was chiefly owing I believe to the carelessness of some of the Lascars who immediately made their Escape at that time two of which perished by famine as we were some time after informed by those which returned back of their own Accord almost famished to Death; as I am Conscious of not being any ways in fault in regard to that unforeseen Accident so I humbly hope that your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. will in no wise lay the Charge thereof at my Door as the most probable means had been made use of for the bringing them safely to the Negrais.

On the 31<sup>st</sup>. January last imported here the Sloop Syrian Charles Price Master from Bengal and Madrass having some provisions Stores on board which were sent from Bengal for the Use of this Settlement, great part of which Stores were much damaged and unfit for Service partly thro' Age, there was besides a considerable deficiency in each Article particular mention of which your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. will perceive in last February Accounts.

If your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. will please to observe minutely the Occurrences of the aforesaid Month of February last, You will then be best Judges of my Conduct whether I have acted right or not in ordering the Syrians Sloop to be brought back into the Harbour of Negrais after being carried away in the Night time from under the Guns of the Fort into the Offing without the Masters first having giving [*sic*] previous Notice thereof to the Commanding Officer of the Settlement. Mr. Price the Master of the said Sloop being guilty as I have therein mentioned of giving the greatest affront and of shewing the highest disrespect imaginable to the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Companys Fort and Settlement. I thereupon gave orders to the Pilot for to bring the Vessel back again into the Harbour intending no more by it than to give him a Check and to make him sencible that he had acted very wrong in taking such imprudent Steps. The Sloop was accordingly brought back into the Harbour and safely moored under the Guns of the Fort. The Syrang Tindal and Lascars left the Sloop (as I was afterwards informed) the same Evening and the next morning they came to the Fort and declared that they belonged to the Hunter Schooner and had Received Impress Money at Bengall for to remain with her at the Negrais, that Mr. Nicholson who had then Charge of the Hunter Schooner bound to this Island had put them on board the Syrian Sloop for to come here by the way of Madrass at the same time assuring them on their arrival at the Negrais, they were to proceed no farther in the said Sloop but were to be returned on board the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Companys Schooner Hunter to which they of right belonged. The said Syrang Tindal and 5 Lascars have therefore remained ever since upon the Island in expectation of the Hunter Schooner (which we have great reason to believe would soon arrive here as <sup>by</sup> advice from the Hon<sup>ble</sup> the Presidency of Bengal under Date the 6<sup>th</sup>. of October 1757 as will appear to your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. in the Publick Accounts of this Settlement) the Master of the said Sloop has never yet from that time made any application to me for those People which behaviour of his I take to be a tacit acknowledgment of their belonging to the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company, however least I might have erred by being too sanguine in this Affairs they have never yet been entered into the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Companys Books or received any Pay since the time they have landed here. The Sloop is now lying at an Anchor in the place were [*sic*] she was moored after being brought back into the Harbour by my Order; but the Master has had constant Possession of her ever since and has been on board of her several times and taken goods out of her from time to time, of which I have sufficient Evidence.

I am very sorry that I am obliged to take up so much of your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. time with this Trifling but troublesome Affair, as I have some reason to believe the Master of the said Sloop is endeavouring to lay the whole Charge of the said Vessel at my Door. I hope therefore your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. will on weighing the whole Affair both justify and protect me in my Proceedings herein as my sole motive for acting as above has been to vindicate the Honour of this Settlement and not to suffer the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Companys Property to be invaded or the Fort to be treated in a Conte[mptuous] manner.

I have herewith enclosed a Copy of the Protest which Mr. Charles Price has drawn up against me of which I have never been acquainted till within these two days past as also a Copy or [*sic*] Mr. Norris Certificate underneath, which proves the falsity of Mr. Prices Assertion, there is likewise a Copy of Mr. Norris Letter to me requesting to be entertained as a Carpenter in the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Companys Service to remain on this Settlement.

As I find myself unequal to the Task of bearing alone the whole Burthen of the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Companys Affairs in this Settlement I do therefore with all humility request that your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. would be pleased to appoint some other Person to take the Charge thereof and as I find my health and Eyesight considerable impaired by the badness of the Climate having now been upwards of two Years upon the Island, I must therefore likewise intreat your Hon<sup>rs</sup>. Permission for Liberty to return to Fort St. George by the first proper Conveyance and I am with the most profound respect

The Captain is urgent for a Quick dispatch and as he will be shortly out, We must content ourselves with giving you an account of our Management since the departure of the Oxford referring your honours &c. to our advices to our Hon<sup>ble</sup> Master (copy of which is Inclosed) for transactions till then. The Accounts &c<sup>a</sup>. for the aforementioned reason do not go, and from the Oxfords departure We therefore go on with the Occurrences under the proper heads.

The training up Coffrees as Artificers we should be very ready to do had we proper Masters to learn them and others to do the Current Business, the former is never likely to be procured here as it is very seldom any come among our Military fit for those Employs and at present those who do the Cooley Work, are only Women and Boys. We shall take care to follow your directions in encouraging those as well as Seamen should any offer.

Our sending the ship Exeter to Nattall was in consequence of an order made by our Honble Masters in th[e]ir Letter ¶ [Lacuna] We must beg leave to refer you to the Letter wrote them on the Exeters return to Europe for more particular on this head, and shall only say farther that it was not merely in Order to look Formadable that she was sent but the Settlement and the lives of all in it were in great and imminent danger.

SECONDLY GOODS &CA.

On the Resident of Nattalls representing the great want of Merchandize and murmurs of the People on that head, and there being only about thirteen Chests of Opium left and little likelihood of any from the Coast it was agreed to purchase the Thirty Six Chests imported by the Oxford Storeship at \$ 260 ¶ Chest and as a Sloop was going to Nattall it was sent on her together with some Iron and Treasure for which they No. 21 were to be paid \$ 300.

your Honour &ca. that we then thought what was wrote for absolutely necessary. You will please to consider how much our wants are augmented on this Head of Powder particularly. We cannot close the subject till We have once more recommended to your mature Deliberation our furlorn situation which we hope will induce you to be expeditious in succouring us.

We shall direct our Pepper Godown Keeper to preserve the Garblings of the Pepper from Croee & Cawoor and send as Opportunity offers. The reason of its being received by Measure at those two places was because on first purchasing it from those places Mal-lays instead of Europeans were employed who could not understand our Weights, and as this Method is more advantagious to our Honble Masters that the other the [*sic*] practice is still continued. Our request for the Slaves wrote for, We beg may be comply'd with as soon as possible. The last advices on this Head are so full that we shall only repeat that there is not near sufficient for the Current Business of the Place, the shipping particularly will be greatly retarded for the above reason.

COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

Mr. Hunter at Croe on paying the Pepper Customs apply'd to the Pangarrans and Proateens of Poogoong for the Reason of a Decrease in that District; they give him to understand it was not owing to negligence or misconduct but to a Difference in the Seasons Crop which they say is common every two or three years, the Juretooliss and People who went that survey agree that the Gardens are clean and in good order. He also advises that a Number of Families from the Hills had apply'd to Pangaran Saoee Negano for assistance in clearing some debts which amounted to about seventy Dollars amongst them to their Head People promising to come down and plant Pepper at Poogoong, if their desire was comply'd with, He request our Orders if he shall advance that Sum and it is agreed that the new Resident when he goes down do advance it them, as such an Increase of People will be advantagious to the Investment.

The Jurretoolis of Cattown having finished the survey of that place and Salbat the Resident reports the Gardens in those parts are in good condition, the resident of Cawoor likewise delivers in a report of the state of the Gardens in his districts by which we have the pleasure to perceive that many improvements are made since the last survey, a Copy of his letter is intered in our Consultation and as a Godown at Kenal by the representation in his Letter is judged necessary, We have agreed that one be erected as soon as possible.

Mr. Preston in a Address to the Board says that he received his Salary without Consideration as Fifth in Council setting forth that he thinks himself intitled tho' under suspension to that of Fourth on Mr. Pybus departure, but the Board being of Oppinion He cannot commence such or any ways rise till such time as they hear from our Superiours. He is not paid any otherwise and refuses receiving any further Pay.

HONBLE SIR &amp; SIRs

I addressed you by the Mermaid Sloop September 21 & by Patamar in Cypher Oct<sup>r</sup>. 1<sup>st</sup>. I take this Opportunity of Informing you of the present Situation of Affairs here. The Companys Merchants have been with me were willing to carry on the Investment as formerly, Said they could furnish 200 Bales by January to begin now. They would have taken Money in advance now but waited to see our forces before they would chuse to contract for any large Quantity. Two of the Head Merchants have already agreed to furnish 1000 Bales to the Dutch. The Collecting in an Investment this year will in my oppinion entirely depend upon the success of our Expedition, we may look for the Embarkation every day. It is to be wish'd they may arrive very soon for Mr. Conflans with his Army are come over to this side of Rajabindry River & advance upon the Rajah in hopes undoubtedly of Engaging him before he be joined. They reckon it only 8 or 9 Days March from Rajabindry to Cassimeor. By the best intelligence I have had by Hircaras & from one who was some time in their Camp selling Liquors They have not above 300 soldiers Including about 60 of the Train 80 Officers about 3000 Seapoys and as many Lancemen & c<sup>a</sup>. Country forces 200 Country Horse 40 Pieces of Cannon some of them Battering Peices 60 odd Large shells & a good many small ones a number of Tumbrils. The Rajah has 30 Europeans good Men 60 Topasses 26 Millays betwixt 2 & 3000 Telingers & 300 Arabs all with Firelocks many of them good Arms Lancmen when all joined 8 or 10000, 500 Good Horse 12 p<sup>s</sup>. of Cannon but of Different Calibers and badly Regulated, he is a very young Lad, but extream brave & I believe hates heartily French faith & French Politicks. I don't think him strong enough as his Men are badly disciplined to

engage Conflans, he is also ill provided with Ammunition. He wrote me today that he was Informed Nezam Ali & Ibrahim Khan &ca. had left Aurungabad & were coming this way against the French that they were by this time at or near Heiderabad were Sullabut Jung now is. I dispatched Letters to Nezam Ali from the Honble the Governour of Fort William, but as yet the Peons are not returned. Conflans may retreat safely when he thinks us too strong for him & repass the River under Cover of Rajabindram Fort, they possess that & all the Boats Dunies & Juggaputraje and Nilloderow whose Lands lye on this side the River are with Mr. Conf[ans] and he has been very busy in receiving the Revenues of this Country, Perhaps Juggaputraje may have him, when he sees our Party strong about a month ago. the same Dutch Lad who was in their Camp was at Mussulipatam for several Days, they had then he says only 20 Soldiers & 20 Officers sick Invaled &ca. They had no reinforcement of 40 Men Landed from the French Europe Ship that touched their at that time. I had been told by a black Serang who came lately from that place that they had Landed 40 Men & Ammunition before they sailed for Pondicherry, the Dutch Ship from Batavia which she took of Sadrass & brought up their was since lost of Monuppatam. They have long heard of our Expedition and have been laying in Provision Water &ca. & Inlisting Seapoys, we have Collected all the Boats we could for the landing the Troops here and the rajah assures me we shall be furnished with Oxen Coolies &ca. Necessaries for our Army. Naraindoo is kept in Check at present by the Rajahs people upon the Gaijan River were he hoists French Colours he has hitherto made Little progress, he impedes our lepid [sic] greatly.

Instant Imported at Anjengo our Honble Masters Ship Pitt late Pondicherry French Indiaman with Lieutenant Colonel Draper and part of a Battalion of his Majesty's Troops on Board and sailed again the next day, the Remainder of which are on the Grafton & Sunderland as also Rhoda, Winchelsea Prince of Wales Tilbury Shaftesbury & Brittania which left England together in March for your Presidency. The Warren and London which left England the 22 April arrived at Madagascar the 2<sup>d</sup>. August, the Egmont left England in Company of the Pitt &ca. Ships, the Hardwick sailed from England in December and the Prince Henry and another Ship Vincent Commander in January, The Bombay Castles and Prince George were not sailed when the Warren left England nor any of our Ships.

The War still continues between England and France as does that between the King of Prusia and the other Powers of Germany, Rusia & Swedon but neither the Spaniards nor Dutch are engaged.

We have not received any advices from your Honour &ca. since those noticed in our last.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

[Permit me] to embrace this first Opportunity to inform you of my Arri- val here the 21<sup>st</sup>. last Month, Colonel Forde and the Rajah were then on their March towards Rajahmundrum, and had got so far as Satteram before they



receiv'd the news of my being here, upon which the Colonel stopped the Camp, and desir'd me to join them, I did, and was happy enough to adjust Matters between them to the satisfaction of both Parties, and I hope will prove so to your Honour &ca. Viz<sup>t</sup>.

That all Plunder should be equally divided.

That all Conquered Countrys should be deliver'd to the Rajah and that he should Collect the Revenues.

The Sea Ports, Rivers, with the Towns upon them, and their dependances, should be in the Possession of the Company, and the Revenues arising thence received by them.

That no Treaty, for the disposal or Redelivery of the said Countrys be entered into without Consent of both Parties.

That the Rajah is to allow Colonel Forde fifty Thousand Rupees ₨ Month for the Expence of the Camp, Commencing from the time they Anchorred at this Barr. The first Payment to be made, upon our Putting him in possession of Rajahmundrum and Monthly afterwards.

That he also Pay the Officers six Thousand Rupees ₨ Month, in consideration of the great Expence they are at, the Payments to be made as before.

The above Preliminarys Settled I addressed him for the Grants of some Countrys round about this Place in favour of the Company, he at first agreed to Norway and [as] many Village, as would have brought in about fifty Thousand Rupees ₨ Annum. But upon Recollection, desired to know what Number of Troops the Company would keep [here] That whatever the Number was, from One to five hundred if I would Assure him of their Continuance [sic] & assistance, he would Allot me such Revenues, as should be sufficient to Answer all their Charges. The Consideration of the large Sum he had just before Agreed to Pay [the Company] for the Camp Charges. The reasonableness of [ . . . ] sent question joind to my own incapacity to answer [ . . . ] pressing him any further upon that head [ . . . ] would mention it to your Honour &ca. and acquaint [ . . . ] your Resolutions.

On the 7<sup>th</sup>. in the morning [ . . . ] French at Chumboole, about Twelve [ . . . ] The [ . . . ] was Close [ . . . ] Possession of their Tents, Baggage and Twenty five Pieces of Cannon took six Officers and fifty Men Prisoners for further Particulars I refer your Honour &ca. to Mr. Forde's Letter to me, Copy of which I now inclose the President.

The 11<sup>th</sup>. Instant I dispatch'd the Hardwick Captain Samon, and the two Sloops, Clive and Forde to block up Yanam River. The French having three Vessells lying there ready loaded for the Islands, and which they will doubtless upon this Change of Affairs endeavour to dispatch.

I have also wrote the whole of these Occurrences, to the President at Fort William ₨ the Mermaid Sloop who was dispatch'd last Night.

The Tedious Passage I mett with hither, the time I lost in going to the Camp; The confusion of the Country occasioned by some of the Hill Jemmedars Plundering in the absence of the Rajah added to the uncertainty of our success, has hitherto prevented me from doing anything Considerable in the Investment. The People who have to this time been hiding themselves and Effects, begin now to appear, but I find most of the Ready made Cloth, is the Refuse of the Dutch, and would greatly Prejudice our future Trade, should I consent to take it and the remaining time is too short to make much New Cloth. Yet no endeavours of mine shall be wanting.

I found this Place in much worse Condition than I [expected] every House has been stripped of its Doors & Windows, s[ . . . ] covered, Out Houses

destroy'd for the sake of the Wood &c<sup>a</sup>. [ . . . ] I believe in general has suffered more from the Rajahs [ . . . ] and the Inhabitants that remained here, than by any [depre]dations of the French.

In blowing up the Fort Walls, the Explosion has [ . . . ] the wall of the back Terrass; I found it supported with [ . . . ] running up a Wall within the Old one, to prevent [ . . . ] The Fort [ . . . ] House inconvenient as well as a great Eyesore both to that and the Garden House, which with your Honours &c<sup>a</sup>. Permission I shall remove.

I shall as occasion offers, send you the Needfull Advices and at present only add, that I am with the greatest Esteem

DEAR SIR

I have the Pleasure to inform you that I engaged the French this Morning at Ten of the Clock, and that I have gained a Compleat Victory. I cannot inform you of the Particulars exactly of the slain, As I persued them three miles over the Field of Battle to their Tents, which I am now in Possession of. We have Six Officers Prisoners, and fifty Men; And at least twenty five Pieces of Cannon, and hope in three or four days more to give a better Account of them, as I intend to pursue them with all diligence to Rajahmundry or wherever they go. If the Rajah and his People had not behaved so dastardly as they did, there would not have a single Man escaped. Please to send Copys of this to Madras and Bengal, as [I] am so much fatigued that I cannot possibly write any more at present. In a few days time I shall write more full[y].

As the Country will now be open to Us, and our Trade I believe flourish, I hope you will send a further supply of Cash by the first Opportunity. I am with the greatest Respect

This moment I received your favour of the 6<sup>th</sup>. and am much obliged to you for the care you have taken in my affairs, for which I shall always retain a Greatfull remembrance.

The Action of the 7<sup>th</sup>. has been attended with as much success, as our most sanguine friends could have excepted, Yesterday at break of day my Seapoys got to the River side, just time enough to seize all their bullocks, fifteen Europeans, and a great quantity of Publick as well as Private Stores. A boat load of Men had just put off, and our People fired at them for half an hour, and must certainly have killed Numbers of them, upon our firing they abandon'd four Guns & a 13 Inch Mortar they had got at the other side of the River, So that they have not saved either Gun, Mortar or Ammunition belonging to their whole Army, by all Accounts there have not more than a hundred and fifty French Passed the River, their army consisted of five hundred Europeans, the day of the Battle, and five thousand Seapoys with Europe Arms, besides Horse and Country Troops, And Ours about four hundred and thirty Europeans, Officers included, and Eighteen hundred Seapoys besides the Rajahs People; The Rajah himself is the Greatest Paltroon I ever saw, and the Greatest Fool also, neither he nor one of his People; (except Bristow alone) stood above five Minutes after the Cannonading began; they got into a large Tank in our Rear, but when they saw us pursuing the French and that we had beat them away from their Guns, they began to venture out, but all I could say or do, not one [ . . . ] Horse or foot, wou'd Pursue the Enemy one foot [ . . . ] We advanced, if they had not been worse [ . . . ] must have taken every Man of the Fren[ch . . . ] not even March with Us the next day [ . . . ] Dead and I have not seen him or an [ . . . ] is near Peddapore and writes me [ . . . ] there till Naradar Row comes to Pay him homage, otherwise he must fight him.

If Samson is not yet gone order him away immediately with or without the Sloops, and turn M<sup>r</sup>. Hilliard out of his Sloop and put in the person you mention in your Letter.

The Thames being yet detain'd by Captain Wedderburns illness, I have the Pleasure to inclose you some account of the Killed and Wounded, and the several Captures made by Us, Which is the best I can collect, from what Letters I have received.

A great Quantity of Powder, Gun & Musket Ammunition with about one thousand Draught bullocks Besides The Camp Equipage, and a Great deal of Good French Furniture found at Rajahmundrum; all destroy'd by the Seapoys.
