HONBLE SIR & SIRS

I have received your favour of the 27<sup>th</sup>. past. As to the Rents they were many of them Farmed Out by Colonel Forde, and I assure you the whole have been lett out to the Utmost Advantage, few People being willing to Engage in the Present Unsettled Situation of the Country, no diligence shall be wanting duely and faithfully to Collect them.

The Grain in these Parts comes in late and near half of our Revenues being in Salt it will yet be two or three Months before any thing considerable can be collected when it can, what can be spared from the Expence of the Place shall be applied to the Investment and your remarks thereon duely Observed. No goods have been Exported from hence since Colonel Forde quitted

the place; when any are the Owners shall have proper Certificates.

December, but We propose Dispatching the Oxford to you very soon with [*lacuna*] Bags of Petre and if possible a further Supply of Treasure.

# HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We have to reply to your Favours of the 20<sup>th</sup>. Sept<sup>r</sup>, and 15<sup>th</sup>. October.

We remark what you mention of having advised the President & Council at Fort William of the Remains of Pepper on the West Coast & your Honor &c<sup>a</sup>. will perceive, by our Letter of the  $12^{\text{th}}$ . October, our Desire to assist in the Dispatch of the Tonnage, from that Presidency We have lately learnt the disagreeable News of our Honble Masters Ship Stretham, being lost in Bengal River, & that the Duke of Dorset was design'd for this Coast in her Room. The Clinton is now Loading for Great Britain, and will be finally dispatch'd from this Place, and as we have been advised, within these few days, from the Gentlemen in Bengal that they shall supply you with Money we hope your Honor &c<sup>a</sup>. will likewise be able to assist in returning home the Ships of this Season.

A proper Regard shall be paid to the Information you give us respecting the Kings of Siam and Cuddah.

In reply to what your Honor &c<sup>a</sup>. write, about the Charges of Ship Protector, that you have not a Head of that Vessell on your Books, and therefore must Continue to carry them to the debit of this Presidency, We beg leave to represent, that We are very sensible, its quite immaterial with respect to our Honble Masters, whether the Charges appear on your Books, or ours, but We are at the same time of opinion, that it will be far more regular that they should be brought to Account on yours, under the Head of former years Charges or any other you may judge Proper, as she has for some years past, being so much employed, on your side, that We have had no service from her at this Presidency & from considering of which we hope you will Concur with Us. Our Honble Masters Ship Pocock imported here the 18<sup>th</sup>. instant, and

Nesbitt in the Command of that Vessell but he is returned, without your mentioning any thing Concerning him. The other Schooner design'd for the service of y<sup>e</sup>. West Coast (which We have named the London) is now rigging.

On Admiral Pococks Application we shall replace the Stores you have been supplied with from His Majestys Squadron, & forward your Honor &c<sup>a</sup>. an Account of their Cost.

We enclose Copy of a Report from the Committee of Accounts, relative to the Account received from you, shewing the Difference between the Pay issued to the Kings & Companys Troops, and the Gratuity said to be made the former, which We desire your Honor &c<sup>a</sup>. will write us Explicitly, about, agreeable to the abovementioned Report & our Request of the 12<sup>th</sup>. October Last.

At a Meeting of the Committee, for Examining Accounts It is Observed, that the Statement of Pay to his Majesty & the Honble Companys Troops (rec'd from Madrass Presidency the 9<sup>th</sup>. Instant) is neither Dated nor Signed. The Abstracts drawn to point out the difference (or Gratuity) vary in several parts thereof, & no mention made therein of any other Allowances what Ever Taking which into Consideration & as an Objection was formerly made by the Kings Officers, to the Validity of an Account Transmitted from thence, of the same Nature, for want of its being Properly authenticated; and the Honble Company seeming to Expect by the 173<sup>d</sup>. & 174<sup>th</sup>. 175<sup>th</sup>. Paragraphs of their Commands lately received by Ship Godolphin under date of the 25th. April 1759, That some regulations have been made by their President & Council of Fort St. George, Concerning the Allowance of Batta to those Forces, directing such regulated Accounts, as they have Ordered them to transmit hither in Consequence thereof, should be the Establish'd Rules to be Observed, in respect thereto in future; AGREED therefore, it be reported to the Board. at their next Meeting that in Order to shew due Obedience to Our Honble Masters said Commands it appears necessary to request the Gentlemen at Madrass, will Order an Abstract of the Gratuity or difference given to the Kings Troops, to be transmitted by the first Conveyance properly attested, together with an Account of all other Allowances whatever incurr'd by that Corps, either in the Field or Garrison, many Articles (besides Batta) being Monthly included in the Military Paymasters disbursements here, for Oil, Arrack (given as daily drams) Firewood, difference in the Prices of Provisions, Charged by the Barrack Master, & what the People pay him, Sundries on Account the Hospital &ca. which is Absolutely requisite, as their Officers declared in a Remonstrance delivered the 13th. Janry. 1756, That the difference between the Honble Company's Pay to their Own Troops, & what allowed by his Majesty was so trifling, that they Could not think of Accepting what was tendered them; the same being inconsistent with their Characters, as Gentlemen bearing the King's Commission.

HONBLE SIR & ESTEEMED FRIENDS

With Great Astonishment We are Informed by a Letter from Our late Resident at Masulipatam John Andries Dietloff that Colo: Forde had Caused two large Anchors, belonging to the Dutch Company and which were found there, to be embarked on board a Ship in Order to be sent to Madrass under pretence that they had belonged to the French, but upon the representation of our said President that the same belonged to our Company he Concluded that

the said Anchors would have been Ashore, but they were not, in the meantime the said Anchors being sent to Madrass, he Obliged our Resident to take 480 Rupees for them, which Certainly is a Publick Violence and Contrary to the Friendship and Alliance between his Majesty the King of Great Britain and their High Mightynesses the States General of the free United Netherlands We therefore desire that the Value of the said Anchors amounting to Rs. 1800 after deducting thereout the said Rs. 480 may be paid to our Chief of Pulicat, and that you will give the Necessary Orders that the like may not happen again between your Nation and the Effects of our Company.

# HONBLE SIR & SIRS

I have Received your favor of the 3<sup>d</sup>. And am equally Surprised, as Concerned at the Account of the Prince Henrys Cargoe which way so extraordinary a deficiency should arise I am at a Loss to imagine—had We indeed Acted in the Manner Cap<sup>t</sup>. Reynolds, has meanly and falsely Asserted, such a Thing might have been, and We merited the severest Censure but so far from that, his second Mate M<sup>r</sup>. Hodges saw Every Bagg of it Weighed at the River side, where it was Piled up Ready to ship off, with Tarpaulins over it, and a Seapoy Guard with proper Sentrys to watch it, and when loaded in the boats, Peons were sent in Every boat to take care of it on board—Mess<sup>18</sup>. Alexander, Dolben, and the River Conicoplys assure me and are ready to take their Oaths, that to their knowledge there was not one bagg, turned in, in the manner you mention, it is very true they were weighed with Dutch Weights, but that must have been an Advantage As their Weights are nine # Cent better than Ours, though only Eight and a half was Deducted; therefore I think, either the scarcity of Grain at your Port, must have induced the Boat fellows Peons &c<sup>a</sup> to Pilfer, or the fraud must have been Committed on board the ship, be it as it may it gives Every One here a sensible Concern.

Captain Fischer insisting upon having his Doctor, I sent for Mr. Maule from Vizagapatam to attend the Hospital, which I hope you will Approve.

I have good hopes that before the End of this Month I shall be able to begin an Investment, and that We may at least spare two Lack of Rupees out of the Revenues for that Purpose.

I must request you will be pleased to send a Sett of Weights & Scales by the first Opportunity; An Indent of what other Stores are necessary shall be sent with my Next.

This is Chiefly to acquaint you with the Difficulties I lie under with regard to the Investment the Merchants Agreements are for Madrass Pagodas, Our Revenues are in Rupees, if I purchase Pagodas, they are at Present So Scarce, that I cannot Get them Under four Rupees and a Quarter, and if I Advance the Merchants in Rupees at that rate it will make a Difference of at Least 5 Rupees, 12 anas  $\mathcal{P}$  Corge, in the Ordinary Cloth and fine in Proportion, as  $\mathcal{P}$  the Statement at foot hereof, supposing the Exchange at 370, the Price with you, whereas our Exchange is Imaginary at 350. I cannot therefore think of any Way to remove this Obstacle but Either by your sending Pagodas here and taking our Rupees in Return, Or Allowing Me to charge the Money Advanced for Cloth at Rupees 386. 8.  $\mathcal{P}$  % Curr<sup>t</sup>. Pagodas which will be much the same thing in the End for If there is 5  $\mathcal{P}$  Cent Saved by sending Pagodas, it will be Lost By receiving our Rupees, which are 5  $\mathcal{P}$  Cent worse than Arcot or Pondicherry.

As Every thing is Settled here Upon a Proper footing, and No appearance of any Disturbance at Present, I should be greatly Obliged to you if you will permit me to come up to Madras for a few days as well on the Account of my Health as to settle some Affairs.

Mr. Bonjeur complains greatly of his Health and desires leave also to come up, I beg your speedy Answer as the Season is far Advanced.

[lacuna] depending on your being able to compleat her Tonnage & Finally to dispatch her to Europe—By her we likewise send you an additional supply of twenty Chests of Treasure which with the large consignments made you by the Duke will We hope be fully sufficient for the Expences of your Garrison as We are Apprehensive it will not be in our Power to give you any further Assistance in this Article—indeed We were tempted to find you a greater supply by the Duke than was Altogether consistent with prudence, from an apprehension of the Dispatch of the Oxford being considerably retarded by our having the Ships lately arrived to unload at the time great part of our Craft was employ'd in loading the several other Ships then on their Departure—and when the number of our boats was greatly reduced by many being gone up the Country with the Detachment under Major Caillaud the Quickness of the Passage the Duke would probably have & her being thereby expos'd to less danger from the Enemy with a view of the advantages arising from your being early and amply supply'd were likewise further inducements to Us to run an extraordinary risk.

The Leopard's Snow will be dispatch'd to you in a few days with some Provisions for His Majesty's Squadron and a further supply of Rice.

Your Indent for packing Stuff has been fully comply'd with by the Oxford Captain Webber who sailed from Ingellee the 6<sup>th</sup>. Instant.

We enclose Copies of two Letters receiv'd from Mess<sup>18</sup>. Thomas Hobbes at Ragoon and James Roberston at Dagoon assigning some Cause for their unhappy Sufferings. We request you will unload the Victoria as soon as possible as We have ordered the Commander to proceed from Madrass to Negraise with proper Credentials & a present to the King of the Burmahs in hopes of Obtaining the Liberty of those Gentlemen and other English who are detained there.

Enclosed is likewise Copy of a Letter lately reced from the Companys Supracargoes at China with Duplicate of our Address to you 'P Leopard Snow.

The Royal George sailed from Ingellee the 12<sup>th</sup>. Instant directly for Europe—the Duke of Dorset will follow her with a full Cargoe about the End of this month, & the Ajax is now under dispatch for Bencoolen with some Salt Petre and about 600 Bales in order to be filled up with pepper & finally dispatch'd from thence and the Houghton to Bombay for the same purpose.

Colonel Clive having relinquish'd the Chair and Embarked for Europe in the Royal George the Government of this Presidency has devolv'd on the Honble John Zephaniah Hollwell Esqr.

We countermanded our Directions for the Provision of Rice for the Shaftesbury, on learning that your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. had detained her; but have again ordered the Gentlemen at Tellicherry to proceed therein, and agreeable to your Desire, shall endeavour to return her to your Presidency in proper Time for repairing to China, but have not yet any Account, of her being arrived on the Coast, nor the Duke of Dorset or Houghton from Bengall, which will make it very late, before We can dispatch those Ships for Great Britain.

The Clinton sailed the 28<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo, with a considerable Surplus Tonnage, and M<sup>r</sup>. Bourchier having embarked on her, has been succeeded in this Government by M<sup>r</sup>. Crommelin, conformable to our Honble Masters Commands.

The Commander of the Drake from Bengal, having been detected in purchasing Pepper at Coletchee, which is within the Companys Limits of Trade, We have obliged him to deliver it here at the Anjengo Price, with reasonable Charges thereon, and the better to prevent their being injured in this important Point. We have desired the President & Council at Fort William, possitively to forbid any Country Ships from thence, touching on the Coast, below Anjengo and must request, that your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will likewise prevent any Vessels, doing it belonging to your Presidency.

In consequence of your representation as well as that of Admiral Cornish of the want of Provisions He is in, for his Squadron, We have order'd one of the Company's Sloops to be immediately prepar'd to proceed to you & if another or more can possibly be spar'd they shall be dispatch'd with the several supplies you have desir'd—If the Service will not admit of our sending away more Sloops, We shall use our utmost endeavours to furnish you with the remaining Articles on freight but the present Price of Grain on your Coast will We apprehend make the Freight turn out very exorbitant. We are glad We embrac'd the opportunity of the Leopard Snow of sending a supply of salt Provisions and of Pease by the Victoria.

We shall render all the service in our Power to the Gentlemen who corresponds with the Agent of his Majesty's Squadron with respect to the purchase as well as transporting any Arrack he may be able to procure for his Majesty's Service.

We have made inquiry of the Gentlemen lately arriv'd from Masulapatam concerning the Demand of the Governor and Council of Negapatam and find the affair thus circumstanc'd—The Anchors being found in Masulapatam and no Claim being made for them four or five Months they were judg'd to be French Property and in consequence sold to the Captain of one of our Europe Ships for the sum set forth in that Letter, but on a demand being subsequently made by the Dutch Resident there, the sum was refunded to him and he executed a receipt for the same (without any force as is represented in their Negapatam Letter) a Copy of which We now transmit to you.

A Chest of Treasure mark'd IB No. 5 having been landed here last year from the Prince George which We are inform'd by our Secretary was design'd for the pay of the King's Artillery at Madrass We have shipp'd it on the Duke on account and risque of his Majesty a 'P separate Bill of Lading enclos'd to Mr. Charles Milton Commissary of Stores.

Enclos'd you will receive Duplicates of our Address to your Honor &c<sup>a</sup>. under date the 21<sup>st</sup>. Ultimo p<sup>r</sup>. Victoria Snow, and our Account Current with your Presidency made up to January last which We are sensible is not quite compleat for want of some Invoices of Stores received from you, which in our first hurry and Confusion have been mislaid—but conclude you will be able to supply the Defect.

The Ships Winchelsea & Prince of Wales arrived here the 18<sup>th</sup>. of June, the Britannia & Tilbury the 1<sup>st</sup>. of Sep<sup>r</sup>. the Rhoda the 3<sup>rd</sup>. D<sup>o</sup>. and the Essex the 2<sup>d</sup>. of October, By these Ships we receiv'd the several Packets and the Letters you wrote Us, the Contents of which we duely note. We were in great Hopes of having at least some of the five Ships (arrived on the Coast) dispatch'd to Us, and are very sorry to find M<sup>r</sup>. Pocock had thought proper to detain them, as we have made a considerable Provision for them which will prove a Disadvantage to the Company, We hope however you Gentlemen will be so good to give them an early Dispatch the next Season, which will undoubtedly be of very great Consequence to Us in the Management of the Honble Companys affairs here.

We are sorry the Shaftesbury lost her Passage from Batavia to Madrass, and hope we shall have her or One in her Stead the next year.

By the Honble Companys Instructions to Us, they expected you to add considerably to the Stocks of each of the Ships to be consign'd to Us from your Settlement, We observe by your Letters the Necessity you had for Money would prevent it. We hope Affairs will take a better Turn before the next Season, and that you will be enabled to Comply with the Company's Orders as it is undoubtedly for their Advantage to have a considerable Fund here.

We wrote you by way of Bencoolen of the Pitts Arrival here the 6<sup>th</sup>. of April and that she was dispatch'd home the 28<sup>th</sup>. of May, but did not get clear of the Land until the 15<sup>th</sup>. of June.

We have acquainted M<sup>r</sup>. Talcot of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Companys Orders, In consequence of which he intends taking his Passage home on one of our early Ships,

Redwood is a very good Article here, & in Demand and Tin will always do here at a reasonable Price.

Passengers coming by way of China are a great Embarrassment to us, and as it is the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Companys Intentions that none should pass this way, we could wish the Presidencies would prevent it.

The Price of Raw Silk annualy increasing, has occasiond the Emperors forbiding the Exportation of Raw and wrought Silks. We are in Hopes to get it off for this Season, but we fear it will not be possible to do it the Next. The Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Companys Schooner Cuddalore arrived off Macao the 6<sup>th</sup>. of

Honble Sir & Sirs

The Ajax Captain George Lindsay put in here the 24 Instant and informed me, by one of his officers that he had not ten days water on board, it not being in power to supply him here unless he made a very long stay, which I think attended with some risque at this Juncture & having no Pepper on hand, I gave him all the Intelligence I could & left it entirely to himself to act as he judged best in Consequence of this he has come to a Resolution of going to Madrass to fill up there, which gives me an opportunity of informing Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. Council that a French Ship of seventy four Guns and a Frigate with five hundred land Forces aboard took the Settlement of Nattal the 7<sup>th</sup>. of February last, without any opposition & that of Tappannooly the 15<sup>th</sup>. after a Seige of three days, they passed thro' this road the 25<sup>th</sup>. of March and the 1<sup>st</sup>. Instant were in possession of Marlbrö after a few hours resistance, since I have had no Intelligence from thence that can be depended on.

The Mallays report that the Deputy Governour and  $M^r$ . Hay are made prisoners, & the other Gentlemen with some part of the Garrison who were stationed at Sillebar are gone to the S<sup>o</sup>.ward and add about ten days ago the french having advices there was some English ships off Croce, immediately sailed from Marlbrö leaving behind them one hundred and Fifty Men some of which are since gone to reduce Salomah & Manna.

M<sup>r</sup>. Scott Resident of Laye and his Assistant M<sup>r</sup>. Hutton who resided at Polley were both obliged to flye to Cattown a few days after Marlbro was taken; The Natives having seized on every thing belonging to them & the Company. Should any accident happen to this place, Cattown & Jappoo, will I am apprehensive share the same Fate.

The Denham Captain Tryon put in here the 23<sup>d</sup>. of March whom I advised of the French Ships being then only six Leagues to the N<sup>o</sup>. ward on which he immediately sett sail for Marlbrö & the Gentlemen there having thought proper to detain him and his people for the Defence of the place, the Ship was afterwards blown up to prevent her falling into the French hands. A few Arabs belonging to the late Garrison of Tappannooly arrived here

A few Arabs belonging to the late Garrison of Tappannooly arrived here some time ago from whom I learn, that the French have put Pangtimo Lout the King of Atcheens Deputy in possession of Tappannooly and the Dutch of Nattal Mr. Wyatt & the other Gentlemen of Nattall and Tappannooly are all left at Padang except. Mr. Nairne whom it is said the French have treated very ill on account of his burning the Honble Companys Snow Pigot, and a private Vessell, after they attacked the place, I can't help observing to your Honour & Council that the Dutch have been very Assiduous in supplying the French with Pilots, Provisions and every thing else they stood in need of. Severall of their Vessells have attended them constantly since their arrival on this Coast.

As the Garrison here Consist only of Thirty Europeans, and no assistance to be expected from the Natives, the Old Sultan Gandom Shaw having absconded three weeks ago, I have thought proper to ship on board the Ajax on Account of the Honble Company, Treasure and piece Goods amounting as P Invoice and bill of loading enclosed to P 8005—1—40 [sic] Eight thousand five hundred and five Spanish Dollars, one Sooco, and forty Cash which was all it was in my power to send off without detaining the Ship.

Thomas Wintle in their Honours Service, to the Master of which have advanc'd Three Thousand Rixdollars on Account of Wages, Victualing, and hire. Annexed Your honour &c<sup>a</sup>. Council will be pleased to receive a Copy of the Contract entered into, for your Government indisposing of said Vessell. I have had none more recent, Advice from their honours Settlements on the West Coast, than what must be contained in the above Packet. But from Padang intelligence has been receiv'd here, that Nattall has certainly fallen into the hands of the Enemy. Under Cover comes Captain Wintles Sailing Instructions, by which you will observe I have directed him if possible to speak with our Fleet, and have given him a Ten Lines Addressed to the Admiral, acquainting him of two French Ships being on the West Coast of Sumatra for certain, Thinking the Communication to him, thereof, expedient, As it may be some sort of Government, and Inference that the Enemy's Fleet did not Return to the Islands to Careen, Refit and put themselves in a Situation again for Action, with Ours, on the Coast of Coromandel.

They arriv'd on this Coast the 6<sup>th</sup>. Feb<sup>ry</sup>. last & after taking Nattal and Tappannoolay, proceeded down the Coast after a party of French was dispatch'd to Moco Moco overland, as likewise another to Saloomah & the other Southern Residencies, & when We left Croce, were then in possession of Manna & on their March forward, the 'Natives have stript Us of every thing We have & had not the Fort Marlbro Snow been luckily at Croce in all probability every Soul of Us would have been massacred, at present We are come off with the Loss of only M<sup>r</sup>. Overbeck, our Pepper Surveyor & three Europeans. I have secur'd the Honble Companys Treasure, & as soon as I can get a few necessaries and some fresh Water shall make the best of my Way to Madrass.

Under cover is a narrative of the proceeding of the French from their first arrival the incorrectness of which you will please Excuse having been much out of order both in body and mind.

# On Board Fort Mārlbro Snow Off the Straits of Sunda 25<sup>TH</sup>. APRIL 1760.

The 6<sup>th</sup>. February last two french Ships appear'd before Nattal, upon which M<sup>r</sup>. Wyatt, the Resident thereof, dispatch'd Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Hall and Hunter, with a Flag of Truce to Offer to Capitulate & to deliver himself & Garrison, as Prisoners of War, which was accepted—having had a Days Intelligence before the French came to Nattal, every thing of value that belong'd either to the Company or Gentlemen on the Place, was sent on board the Resolution. Sloop, the Military were confin'd to the Fort and the Gentlemen on board the Ships—after Nattal had surrender'd, they dispatch'd the smallest Ship to Tappanooly, where they attempted to land, but M<sup>r</sup>. Nairne, having made up matters with the Balla People they joined them & beat the French off with great resolution, after this they made a second attack, & Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Nairne, Dunn, Southerland, McTagget & Elliott were taken Prisoners, thirteen Europeans that fled from Tappanoolay to Barroos, got safe to Marlbro, the Pigott Snow & Hawke Sloop M<sup>r</sup>. Nairne burnt just before the Attack. The French Ship, Dunns

Snow and Southerlands Sloop lay within Musquet shott of the Fort, cannonaded it three days & three Nights & afterwards took it by Surprize, by landing one hundred Men unseen at three o Clock in the morning who came on the back of them, at the same time 150 made an Attack on the Front. The Arab Ensign behav'd most valuantly would take no quarter after the French enter'd & it is said he killed 6 or 7 People with his own hand, his loss is consequently much lamented. Nairne with 30 or 40 Europeans and some Arabs at first retreated into the Country, but being apprehensive the Natives would cut them off, went & surrender'd themselves At Marlbro The necessary works of Defence are finish'd Mr. Hay commands a party of Military & Bugguesses, at the Camp & Intrenchments of Sillebar, River & the Pangaran is occasionally to give his Assistance with the Country People, Mr. Freeth commands a Company of Coffrees beyong [sic] Kings Cliff, the Governour with the main body of Military & Bugguesses, is ready at Marlbro to march where ever his assistance is wanted, Mr. Darval has charge of the Fort & the five Dattoes & two Pangarans with their People guard a Breast work which runs from the Bridge to Bencoolin, with small redoubts which run along at such Distances from one another, that the Party which defends any one can soon come to the relief of the others, & five new Companies of Bugguesses are rais'd consisting of 60 Men each.

The 28<sup>th</sup>. March the Denham Cap<sup>n</sup>. Tryon anchord in Marlbro road which at first was mistaken for a french Ship, but by a Letter from the Board dated the 30 March, they acquaint me that two Ships & a Sloop was then coming into the Road, which they made no doubt were French & that they were prepar'd as much as Circumstances would admit to make a good Defence.

And this day being the 16<sup>th</sup>. April, Serjant Chambers who is just now arriv'd from Saloomah, acquaints me that Fort Marlbro surrender'd to the French the 1<sup>st</sup>. or 2<sup>d</sup>. April & that when he left that place the French were then in view of the House.

Fort Marlbro Snow arriv'd here the  $3^d$ . Instant but Cap<sup>n</sup>. Howell who came ashore the  $6^{th}$ . & went off the same day in Company with M<sup>r</sup>. Lys, has never been heard of since so Imagine they are either lost or cutt off by the Crew or the Boat, no Orders from Marlbro relating to the Snow, or how we are to Act in case Fort Marlbro falls, & having the melancholly prospect before us of being cut off by the Natives, or taken by the French, We are unanimously come to a resolution to Embark on board her & make the best of our way to Madrass.

The Siege did not last more than three Hours after Marlbro was taken, the Governour and Gentlemen retir'd to Sooco Rammee, but the French detach'd a Party after them and brought them all Prisoners to the Fort the Natives behav'd in a most villanous manner.

With respect to the difference in the Invoice of Rice P Duke & the bills of lading signed by Cap<sup>t</sup>. Thomas Powney, We have inquir'd into it & find it proceeded from the Invoice's being made out for the fifteen hundred bags intended to be shipp'd on her, whereas she could take in only 1400 conformable to his bill of Lading.

In our letter to you by the above Ship We advis'd you that We had sent up Ali Verdi Mustapha in her to stand his tryal at Madrass. He was accordingly put on board a boat in order to proceed on board the Duke but arrived too late—We shall therefore now detain him in hopes the papers left with M<sup>r</sup>. Andrews may be sent down & We may be enabled to try him here.

The present commotions in the Country having put a total Stop to the Collection of the Juncans, our Treasury is so much reduc'd & our unavoidable expences so high that We are very apprehensive it will not be in our power duly to honor the bill of Exchange you may possibly draw on us & therefore must desire you will give notice to the Proprietors that it must be in our option either discharge the Drafts you may make on us in ready Cash or to give the Records of Fort St. George

Am-yatt, Cailaud, Sumner Holwell & M<sup>cc</sup>Gwire being appointed for the management of all concerns relative to Military Operations and transactions with the Country Government. #### HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We have to acknowledge your two favors of the 31st. July & 11th. August

with the Honble Company's packets, and other papers mentioned therein. Since our last the Honble Company's ship Triton Captain Barklay, for China, has imported from the Straits of Sunda, where Captain Barkley was inform'd by some Dutch Ships that two French Men of War one of 64, the other a Frigate of 36 Guns, were crusing about the Straits, and that two more of 74 Guns had been some time before at Princes Island, from thence they had gone away, it was conjectured either to the Straits of Malacca, or into the China Seas. In Consequence of this Advice he thought it proper to put

back from the Straits, & make the best of his way to Fort S<sup>±</sup>. George; but being drove to Leeward, (after touching at Vizagapatam where he dispatched a letter with the Intelligence to your presidency) he came into our River, as the only resource left him. We had intended to dispatch the Triton to you immediately with her entire Cargo, but upon Captin Barkly's representing she had met with some Strain in her passage from England, whereby it was necessary she should be survey'd and she might stand in need of Repairs, which would require some Time and in Consideration of your pressing Want of Money, we determined to take out her Treasure amounting to forty Chests, one half of which we have now the pleasure to forward to you on the Boneta Sloop, Captain Thomas Prise, of which are enclosed Invoice & first Bill of Lading the other half we will send on the palty Tender, which will leave this Port in about ten Days more, We hope this Supply will relieve you from an immediate Want, and again repeat that we shall omit no Opportunity of assisting you, and to the utmost of our power enabling you to carry on whatever Opperations may tend to the Reduction of our Enemies.

The Triton we intend to dispatch with some Salt Petre to Bombay where she will have what repairs she may want, and we shall recommend to the Gentlemen there, to provide her a Cargoe of Cotton and pepper for China, which may in some Measure compensate for the Want of Treasure, should your Honour &<sup>c</sup>. think it necessary to apply what came upon her to your present urgent Occasions, And we shall desire they will direct her to call at your presidency, that if any Money can be spared, she may receive it on Board.

As we expect Nine Ships, including the Triton and Godolphin, a number greater than we can possibly provide for, we have resolved to dispose of them in the following Manner.

We shall dispatch three immediately for Europe One shall be sent half laden to your presidency, so as to arive by the first of January next, there to be filled up & dispatch'd for Europe. Two to be employ'd betwixt Bengal and Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George, to carry Supplies of Rice & Treasure if possible One (The Triton) to Bombay & China One to Bombay with Salt petre, and to be dispatch'd from thence to Europe One (the Godolphin) with Freight to the Gulph of Arabia, & to be the early Ship next season from henec to Europe. All which Ships will be dispatched according to the Times of their Arrival, or as suits our Convenience.

We have received Information that the pattamars, we dispatched to your honor &c<sup>a</sup>. Overland, have been stop'd and detained by Narrandeo the Imhapore Rajah, we therefore enclose you Duplicates & Triplicates of the Letters sent by them.

The Usage they have received, and severe Distresses, will be painted to you in their true Colours by M<sup>T</sup>. Carter, and the rest of the Gentlemen from whom likewise you will be informed of Occurrences here; Embarrisments & pressing hurry chige me at present to be dormant in that Respect.

Yesterday morning I received a Letter from Captain Savage, who is in the Streights, & having heard of two French Ships being in this Road, wrote me to know what he was to do; by his omitting to send me the Packet, I was quite in the Dark what Directions to give him—Roger Carter Esq<sup>r</sup>. and M<sup>r</sup>. Plowman sat out immediately incog in a flying Praw, the former, will open the Packet, the Contents of which, & the Circumstances of Things before his Eyes, will indicate the Steps necessary to be taken.
