HONBLE SIR & SIRs

We have receiv'd your Letter of the 17<sup>th</sup>. Sept<sup>r</sup>. ¶ Don Carlos & have only reced from Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George Seventy Pipes of Madeira Wine ¶ Ships Duke of Dorset & Wager, Captn. Hindman not being able to take on board more than Twenty Pipes as he had not disembark'd at Madrass any of his Europe Cargoe.

We have Station'd the Wager for Bombay & Still remain in hopes of being able to dispatch the Remainder of our Honble Master's Ships home this Season.

As the Batta on Arcot Rupees is lower'd at the Mint at Muxadavad and our Merchants here complain of their great loss in receiving Arcot Rupees being oblig'd to purchase Siccas with them to send to several of the Aurungs. We are to desire your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>a</sup>. Council will send Us the Supplies design'd Us in future one Quarter in Bullion, one quarter in Arcot Rupees & a half in Madrass Rupees & that you will give directions for a Particular Star or Mark being put on the Arcot Rupees you send Us in order to distinguish them from the Pitan Rupees which have been Imported here under the denomination of good Arcot and which We Esteem has Depreciated the Latter in the Value being

Spekes orders Viz<sup>t</sup>. the 31<sup>st</sup>. Inst. and there being a Vessel to Sail from hence for Nagore thought it proper to advise you thereof. I am

My last to your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. was the 3<sup>d</sup>. Instant, in which I acquainted you what had [passed] at Madepollam with Rega[rd to the Factory, and that] the French had hoisted their Colours in the Bazar, since w<sup>ch</sup>. they have also hoisted them in three Towns on this Side the River belonging to Vizaram Rauze, contrary to his Consent but as he is now gone to Vizanagram on account of some Troubles that way I doubt, whether any notice will be taken of them

at present, I have acquainted him that your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. intends to send a Supply of Men this way in January, with which he is mightly Pleas'd, my Vakeel is gone to him & I am in hopes I shall get this Town & River from him, as the Nabob has nothing to do with it, this being a part of the Country which formely belong'd to Timrauze, & which is now come into the Rajah's Hands again but without a speedy Assistance I am afraid We shall not be able to keep, either this, or any other place this way long; for the French elated with their Success in these parts, and finding none to Oppose them, will doubtless proceed further, Whereas if We have any force sent Us suitable to the Occasion the Rajahs will Immediately Join Us, As they are greatly afraid of losing a Considerable part of their Country.

I live in a most uncomfortable manner here, for want of proper places, either to dwell in or Carry on my business in, but as I presume you will Chuse to have the Investment carried on here in future, I doubt not but you will give the necessary Orders on that head: I have wrote for Mr. Knapton to come here for a few days that I may be able to give Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. a Plan of the place which is so situated by Nature, that a little Art, would make it very difficult for any Enemy to Attack; how necessary it is for all our Factory's to be fortified, Experience has thought Us, and what Additional Power, and Interest it wou'd give us this way I need not tell You.

Herewith comes an Indent for this Place, for the Ensuing Year which I hope Yo<sup>r</sup>. Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will be pleas'd to Comply with; Military Stores I have [omitted] as you will be the best Judge, what may be necessary.

Enclos'd comes also the Copy of the Phirmaund which the French Pretend to have receiv'd from Sallibat Jing for the Thirteen Towns they have taken Possession of, and w<sup>ch</sup>. they Stuck to the Flag Staff when they hoisted their Colours at Maddepl<sup>m</sup>. which seems to me to be Counterfeit, and what makes me the more ready to believe so, is, that neither Vizaramrauze nor Venkatram Rauze. in whose Country these Towns are have any Notice of it, if Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. think proper, We may make such Phirmaunds for the whole Country of Rajahmundrum and backed with a little force execute them too.

Commands in investing all my Money, besides running in Debt, with my Merchants, and could you have supply'd me with more Money I may venture to say that instead of 300 I should have sent 500, though if a Stop is not soon put to the French the Manufacture will be entirely ruin'd, I have made bold by this conveyance to send you two Pieces as a Muster of their Ordinary Cloth which they take in at P<sup>s</sup>. 39  $\frac{3}{4}$  Corge, as to Fine Cloth's there is none hardly to be got for the Weavers find they can get so extravagantly by the Ordinary they will not turn their hands to the other, in short every Petty Weaver now is turn'd Merchant, As soon as I embale my Cloth I transport the same to Tellacolltippah, where I intend (if it meets your approbation) after the Dispatch of my Bales to Erect a Brick Godown for the Reception of them which will also serve for many other Uses & your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. may rest assur'd of my Utmost circumspection in regard to my Employers concerns instructed to my Care.

Currents Vizagapatam shall be drawn out & sent You.

I now return you on this Boat the 12 Lascars belonging to Fort St. David which Mr. Hopkins bro<sup>t</sup>. with him as they were Desirous of returning & I had not your Orders to detain [the]m they have rec<sup>d</sup> their Batta to the 15 of this mo[n]th, and as those to the S<sup>o</sup>.ward are extreamly usefull in managing great Guns which those of these parts are not all adopted too I shall be Oblig'd to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. if you would send 20 to be on the Establishment of this Place as they may be extreamly useful not only in this Branch but many others of the Company's business at this Settlement.

Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. will observe their severall Ballances are considerably reduc'd in  
Comparison to the Year preceding.

Instant, Also to acquaint you that having receiv'd Advice sometime Since of several Stragling parties of Horse & Fort belonging to Chunda Sahib being resorted to the near Villages round the Mount, And as We could not but Judge they had some ill Intent, It was thought Necessary for the Security of the Pettah, Triplicane & St. Thome which lay so much expos'd to draw the Forces at Poonamalee (excepting just a Sufficiency for that Garrison) nearer to Us, & accordingly they were order'd to Encamp on the Plain by Egmore, from whence it is Equally Convenient for them to March to the Assistance of either Place, and there they have been posted for some days which as yet has prevented the Enemy from committing any Hostilities in those Towns, but as it is impossible to be Guarded every where & they not being Content in doing of nothing a Party of about One Hundred Horse, and some Foot came to the Mount the 22<sup>d</sup>. past & Plunder'd every House, destroying all that they could not carry off About two days before We heard they cut of three Labourer's that were at Work in the Paddy Fields about Poonamalee, this Confirms Us in an Opinion that they are in Watch of an opportunity for a greater Undertaking which We thought necessary to apprize You off, as likewise of the Station of Our Camp, hoping the same will meet with your Approbation, Their being guilty of this Action has given Us, a thought upon the Cloth, at the Washer's & as the Places they have for curing it are dispers'd at great distances, We have Judg'd proper to call good part of it in, As it is Unsafe to have a Quantity in their hand's while the Enemy is so near, which We are sorry to observe will be a means of lessening the Number of Bales We were in hopes to have got in readiness there being upwards of 80 Bales now Uncur'd, so that We apprehend We shall be something short of Five hundred (500) Bales.

In answer to Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. remark regardg. the High Cooley paid on the Brick's Us'd at St. Thomê Redoubt, We can only say as that Work was at the beginng. represented to Us to be very Confin'd & only intended for present defence, the making a Kiln there on purpose for so small a Work was thought Immaterial & would have been attended with great loss of time; We cannot but allow We are equally surpris'd at the great Expence of this Building & could wish when Mr. Vareille the first Projector was call'd away that some One in the Charecter of an Engineer had been appointed in his Stead, as the want of such a Person oblig'd us to take up with the best European We could meet with among the Military & how far these Sort of People are to be trusted Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. are thoroughly Sensible.

In Obedience to your Commands the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. has wrote to Captain Kilpatrick for a particular Account of Disbursements for all the Money he has drawn on Us which shall be sent You as soon as receiv'd. I have rented two Godowns here belongg. to some Metchlepatam Merchants for six Pagodas Pr. Month so long as the Company shall please to keep them these I have fitted up, and they now serve Us for Houses, but as it will be necessary to have a Wall round them, a Guard Room for the Soldiers, a Choultry for the Peons, a Sorting Place, a Cloth Godown, a Cookroom and other necessary Offices, I have begun to make them and have Calculated the expence at about Three Hundred Pagodas (300) and when finish'd will serve till your Honr. &ca. shall think Proper to order some more secure, and Commodious Buildings, or if occasion be these Ten Years to come.

It is reported that Jeffar Allie Cawn is arriv'd at Elure, in his way to Rajahmundrum, of w<sup>ch</sup>. Country he is reinstated Nabob, & We have reason to believe from His Conduct before he went away and his great Friendship with Vizaramarauze that he will be favourable to our Affairs.

I am in daily hopes of hearing from Your Honr. &ca. and receiving a supply of Money that I may be enabl'd to make my Contracts and prosecute my Investment.

I have hitherto omitted no Opportunity of advising your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. with the occurrences this way and the bad Situation We shou'd soon be in without Assistance. I wish I cou'd now present you with a more agreeable Scene, but I am afraid without the speedy arrival of the Troops We have long expected and are still willing to hope for our Case will yet be worse.

Bulwal Cawn, a Moorman at Golcondah, has obtain'd a Grant from Salibat Jing for this Town and River, and his people are now with the Nabob Jeffar Allie Cawn, soliciting him to sign it, and his Assistance to get the possession; I wrote the Rajah that I hope'd he wou'd not suffer such people to take away his Country, who reply'd that he had long since deliver'd this place into the Company's hands, that We had all along hoisted our Colours here, & that sure it became Us to defend them, upon this I wrote Mr. Westcott to spare me half of his Troops, but had the Mortification to hear for Answer, that He had receiv'd Letters from the Rajah and others to be upon his guard that the Nabob was coming to attack him. Though I am of opinion neither of these Storys will affect either Mr. Westcott or me much, yet something may happen that will, when our Enemy's see We are not protected.

I am very Sensible the affairs of your Province require both your Troops & your Attention yet as Vizagapatam has no Enemys, Ingerams Troops enough to defend them from the Country Governmt. I am in great hopes you will be able to spare so many as will protect me; I am also to acquaint your Honr. &c<sup>a</sup>. that I am under Contract with Indisputable Men, for a more Considerable number of Bales this Year than I care to mention but unless I am drove out hence you may be assur'd of 5 or 600 Bales. I have likewise got a few Washermen from the French & Dutch whom 'till I have business for them, I must either Maintain or discharge, in the latter Case, it may be hard to get them again, therefore I perswade myself, you will have a regard both to my Situation & Investment and send me a speedy supply of Men & Money.

The black Town being Quite open not having any Fortification Round it & the time so troublesome We believe the Honble Company are not Acquainted of the late Transactions & of the Enemies Approaching Us, of late so near as they did: But as Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. are Sensible of all this, We cannot help telling You, that We are Scrupelous to venture ourselves & Estate in the Black Town (Not only this) We can get no House that is Convenient & fit for people of our business to dwell in: therefore We most humbly pray that Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will take into Consideration so far as to allow Us time to live in the White Town 'till the black Town is Fortified; and We obtain a proper place for our Habitation.

On Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>a</sup>. granting me Liberty in your favour of the 4<sup>th</sup>. November to secure myself and the Company's Effects in the best manner I thought proper, I pitch'd upon the Island of Yellacolltipah for that purpose as before advis'd your Honour & C<sup>a</sup>. But the Merchants starting many difficulties in bringing the Cloth there, saying it would be attended with great Expences, besides the unhealthfulness of that Place during the Heats with the scarcity of Water, made my Servants & every one else unwilling to stay with me, alledging they run the risque of their Lives by continuing on it and at the same time well knowing there was not the least probability of curing any Cloth, & the Washers being about to leave me on that Acco<sup>t</sup>. I thought it most conducive for my Employers Interest to secure myself at this place in the best manner I could therefore I flung up (without your previous Notice, no time being to be lost) such Works as was held necessary to render any attempts that might be made against Us fruitless, and by that means kept the Washers together as the Cloth is now cur'd under the protection of our Guns: The Works are now almost compleated which with a small Magazine and Barracks for the Men & few other necessary things to be done will make the Expence turn out to about (5000) Five thousand Rupees. The Godown We live in as the Cloth as soon as it is Embal'd is Sent to Tellacolltippah at which place there is a Guard kept that at a Moment's warning may be reinforce'd by Boats & C<sup>a</sup>. which are always ready for that purpose. The Plan of the Place will be sent you by the next conveyance when you will be able to judge of the situation I have chosen.

The Nabob arriv'd at Rajahmendum 10 days ago Immediately sent my Vackeel to him with a Present in order to sound him, being advis'd by the Rajah express that he was come with full orders, and Instructions to destroy the Factory & distress us to the utmost of his power, but being inform'd of our Situat<sup>n</sup>. & the Force We had, he seems unwilling to come this Way & has march'd to Peddipore whether or not it may not be a feint I cannot as yet conjecture, It is reported in his Camp that he intends for Chickakull but by Advices from some of their Chief in Power about him I am given to Understand they would be extreamly glad if I would move off, for sometime & permit him to put in Execution his Orders, but I have told them in answer that my Orders are positive & I cannot disobey them & Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. may rest assur'd that every thing in my power shall be done to prevent them from doing any further damage to the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Comp<sup>y</sup>. thô at the same time must inform you that with the small Force I have, cannot think of hinders. them from doing any further mischief to the Factory as by that means I may put the whole at stake. In a few days more I may be able to form some certain Judgement of their Intentions Thus much I can at present say, that the whole Country is for Us & in case Badulla Cawn should come as is reported to preside in this Province, if your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will but send a small reinforcem<sup>t</sup>. I may be enabl'd in conjunction with the Rajah's who are all determin'd to oppose him to render all his schemes laid in conjunction with his friends, the French abortive, & make him glad to Quit this Province.

Notwithstanding all these troubles if I am but supply'd with Money I am in hopes of making no despicable Investment I am

Since my last bearing Date the 10<sup>th</sup>. Instant (Duplicate of which you have enclos'd) two Letters have Pass'd between the Nabob, Hussain Ally Beg & myself, The Vackeel of the latter has been with me for some days past with whom I have held several Conferences, the Purport of which as also of the Letters was an earnest desire, for me to retreat to Tellacolltipah for (2) two days (but I might leave some Peons to see that no Damage was done to any thing I left behind) In the meantime the Nabob would dispatch some chosen Men to take possession of this place and the Factory, burn a few Cadjan Hutts & then retire, when I might return again and carry on my business as usual, on my saying in Case such Proceedings did not appear to his Master and the French satisfactory, and fresh Orders might be sent him to act against Us, and put his former instructions in full execution, but then it was not worth the Company's while to continue the Factory, under such perpetual alarms & exorbitant demands to w<sup>ch</sup>. the Vackeel replied on such Objection being started by my Vackeel (when in discourse with the Nabob on the same subject) The Nabob reply'd that if there was truth in Man in Case such an Order should come he would immediately joyn with Us, Having duly weigh'd his request in order to gain time, I sent him the following Answer, that being subservient as he was & put in a post which I must maintain I could not without my Superiours permission leave it, therefore I would write to them setting forth his request & act agreeable to the answer they should send which I expected would be in about 13 Days time, In the mean time I should resist any force that might be sent to Compel me to leave this place which would be matter of great regret to me as it would Oblige me to act in a Hostile manner against those who had giving convincing Proofs of their sincere friendship to my Employers, & whom I held still in the same light, being well assur'd he acted with as great Reluctance in the offensive as I in the Defensive Enclos'd comes Copy of the Nabob & Hussainally beg's Letter's which came to hand last night they being the most material: From the proceedings of the Nabob & Hussainally beg as also some words the Vackeel let drop I am inclinable to imagine that could your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &ca. spare a small reinforcement they would immediately joyn Us, add to this what the Rajah wrote me some time since, of which I acquainted the President to whom I beg leave to refer You, all which in my Opinion are too inviting Circumstances to let slip and may be [the means of] fixing the Investment of not only this Place but the rest of the No<sup>r</sup>thern Settlements on a more fix'd settled Basis than they have hitherto been, having always laid open to the rapacious Demands of the Country Government who were continually exactg. something or other from the Residents which if not immediately complied with a stop, was put to the Investment not to mention the many Insults the Gentlemen residing here were liable to in their Persons & Effects from the Horsemen & Daluits put on them whenever the Nabob or his Creatures took it in their heads to make their unjustifiable demands; the Time present now offers itself to put a stop to all their Grievances as We have unavoidably come to rupture with the Country Government by exerting ourselves to the utmost to bring them to Reason, I entreat Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &ca. will not from what I have said imagine I have taken upon me to dictate to You, far from it, having only endeavour'd to lay before you the unsettled state these Settlements are in from the Covetous disposition of the Government, Being fully Convinc'd you will take such measures as are most conducive to redress such Grievances.

It is currently reported here that Narsingrow the Brother of Ramadoss Punt has obtain'd the Subarship of Golcondah & that Badulla having married one of his Daughters to Salabat Jing has obtain'd the Grants of the Rajamendrum & Chicakull Countrys.

I shall once in Ten Days during these unsettled Times advise your Honr. &c<sup>a</sup>. of what Occurrences may happen & am

“ Since Writing the foregoing the Eliz<sup>th</sup>. arriv'd in the Downs from Fort St. David the 7<sup>th</sup>. Inst. (May) she was dispatch'd from thence so long ago as the 13 February 1749 & as We had heard nothing of her from that time Until this, We had almost given her over for lost, she Winter'd at Dela Goa having in the Course of Her Voyage met with very Severe Weather & many Accidents, We apprehend all, or the greatest Part of her Salt Petre is Wash'd out, & the rest of her Cargoe is much damag'd.

“ The Boscawen arriv'd at Plymouth the 8<sup>th</sup>. Instant from Bombay & Mocha as did at the same time the Fort St. George from the Choromandel Coast, these three Ships sail'd together from St. Helena.

“ Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Morse, Floyer, Laurence & Belsches are arriv'd in the Fort St. George, but Mr. Wake who was coming home in the Boscawen died at the Cape.

The Prince Henry & Eastcourt sail'd hence the 22<sup>d</sup>. Instant to fill up on the Coast w<sup>th</sup>. pepper for great Britain.

The Court of Directors are Building a Ship for the Service of this Island, after the best Model, for Rowing & Sailing Burthen 550 Tons to Carry 20 Guns 12 lb.

The Eastcourt & Prince Henry arriv'd us Yesterday, the former is to be fill'd up at Anjengo, and will sail in about ten Days, the latters Tonnage is to be Completed by Us, but are apprehensive she must wait for some time, The Shaftsbury left this Coast for Europe the 7<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo.

We have no prospect of Adjusting the Differences with the Prince of Cherrivika, & the French still continue the same Conduct. They with the Prince are now battering our Honble Masters Fort of Maddacarra, which being built only for a Country Enemy, We are much Apprehensive for its Safety as We can only act upon the Defensive.

Para. 1. On the 14<sup>th</sup>. of January imported with Us the Brilliant Snow, with Your favours under date of October 4<sup>th</sup>. & 28<sup>th</sup>. and agreeable to Orders therein she should have been immediately return'd; but Captn. Burman on his Arrival here represented to Us, that His Vessel's Bottom was so foul as not to be a bale to proceed back again without going to Pooloo, and giving her a large Heel; as well as some other necessary repairs He accordingly sail'd for that Harbour January 22<sup>d</sup>. and returned hither February 5<sup>th</sup>.

2. The Slaves and Transports all imported safe except one of the latter who died on the Voyage, the Stores & c<sup>a</sup>. & the Brilliant also turn'd out right except the following Viz<sup>t</sup>.

Oyl several Jarrs not full.

Cap. One.

Salempores Brown 5 Pieces.

Rice 330 Cam<sup>s</sup>. damag'd with Ovl.

and the Gunny Bags most of them rotten & Useless; the Wax Cloth and wrappers for the Bales likewise We cannot avoid representing to Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. to have been for some time past so rotten & Old that the least wet would penetrate thro. them.

3. We shall in future punctually acquaint You with the Quantity of Surplus Pepper on hand; and not put on Board the Store ship Pursuant to Our Honble Masters Orders.

4. We shall impatiently wait for the Arrival of the Vessel Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. propos'd dispatching to Us, in December or January, as We are greatly in want of several Stores We expect to receive by her.

5. Agreeable to Your Permission, to return Unmerchantable Goods; We have not put on board the Brilliant a Parcel of Coir Cordage receiv'd some time since from the Coast.

6. It is a great disappointment to Us that Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. were not able to furnish Us with a supply of Treasure having receiv'd only Fifteen Chests from Europe this season, which will not by far suffice to defray Our Expences 'till the Arrival of the next Store ship, therefore to alleviate as much as possible

the hardships We might put to havg. now on hand only \$44868-78 We are necessitated to accept of some sums of Money that were offer'd to be paid into the Hoñble Company's Cash here and grant Certificates for the Amot. on Your Honr. &c<sup>a</sup>. which We respectfully request may be Discharg'd.

7. The reason of Captn. Burmans being not advanc'd more Money than He was the last time He went to Batavia, as that He on being ask'd how much would be sufficient, declar'd \$3000 thousand Span: Dollars would do.

8. We are glad to find Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. approve of our contracting with the Undertakers for makg. Sugar & Arrack And We flatter Ourselves that Work will not meet with any Checks to frustrate it, as We at prest. have the greatest hopes to see it shortly bro<sup>t</sup>. to Perfection.

9. As to our sending a Covenant Servant to Natal Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. may be assur'd. We should not have taken such a step did we not think it would fully Compensate for all Expences, Our Hoñble Masters would be at, in establishing a Settlem<sup>t</sup>. there.

10. In our last, We inform'd You of Our Intention to take Possession of that Port, and accordingly on August 6<sup>th</sup>. Sloop Swallow was sent thither with Mr. John Saul who arriv'd September 7<sup>th</sup>. and after having made the strictest Enquiries. He could not find the Inhabitants had ever enter'd into Contracts with any Nation; wherefore consonant to Our Direct<sup>ns</sup>. He hoisted English Colours & Sign'd Agreements with them in the name of Our Hoñble Masters We have since receiv'd Letters from the Head Men of that Place and the Sultan of Manang Cabou signifying their Satisfaction at Our complying with their Invitat<sup>ns</sup>. and giving the strongest Assurances of their not being engag'd under Articles with whatsoever Powers & expressing their willingness to Cultivate the Growth of Pepper.

11. We have likewise receiv'd Letters from the Dutch at Padang, wherein they haughtily advise Us to quit Natal & say, they have inform'd their Superiours at Batavia of Our Conduct in regard to that Place.

12. We reply'd to them in a genteel civil Manner, but at the same time intimated We should not be induc'd to disregard Our Hoñble Employers Interest for their Threats; & only wait for a Proper Opportunity to advise the General & Council of Batavia with Our sentiments hereon.

13. January the 26<sup>th</sup>. Sloop Swallow return'd from Natal, & brought advice of everything being in a peaceable situation there and Mr. Saul having by private Letters solicited to be recall'd from thence, & Application for that purpose made in his behalf on account of his being sickly. We have assented thereto and appointed Mr. Randolph Marriott to succeed him, that Gentleman proceed thither the 19<sup>th</sup>. Instant on Sloop Mary with a Force of twelve Europeans under the Command of a Serjeant. Mr. Saul together with the Raja having strongly requested some Milv. might be sent there to secure the Place from the insidious Practices of the Dutch.

14. Mr. Saul inform'd Us of Sultan Ooloodean's being at Natal, & that He had assur'd him of his Attachment to the Hoñble Company, could he be ascertain'd of their Protection, We have therefore after mature Deliberation come to a resolution of allowing him the same Pay as he enjoy'd at Madrass Viz<sup>t</sup>. \$15 (Fifteen Spanish Dollars) mensem on Condition of his remaining there; & hope your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will not disapprove of the same, for was he to come within the Hoñble Comp<sup>ys</sup>. Territories hereabouts, where He has no small Interest He might in all probability raise disturbances to the great Prejudice of their Pepper Investment, for which reason, esteem this the most eligible manner to prevent any Confusion, that would very likely otherwise ensure.

15. The reason of many Commanders Standing in our Books as Debtors to or Creditors of the Hoñble Company is owing to their having deliver'd short of their Invoices, or Having some of the Ships Stores that We had occasion for, but We have already apply'd to their Honours to settle this Head.

16. All other Directions in Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. Letter, shall be strictly observ'd.

17. As to what Transactions have happen'd on this Coast since Ours under Date of July 22<sup>d</sup>. We beg leave to refer Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. to the Copy of two Letters sent to the Honble Court of Directors by Onslow; that are under Cover, As also another Address to them all which We request Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will forward by the first Opportunity & shall only in this Place recite some of the most material.

18. August the 16<sup>th</sup>. the Onslow Stores ship Captain Thomas Hinde arriv'd here, & September 5<sup>th</sup>. She Sail'd for the Northern Settlements, and having taken in their Produce return'd hither October 22<sup>d</sup>. and we dispatched her for Manna December 8<sup>th</sup>. from whence she departed for Europe the 29<sup>th</sup>. of the said Month w<sup>ch</sup>. One hundred & thirty four Tons of Surplus Pepper on board.

19. On Her took Passage for England Joseph Hurlock Esq<sup>r</sup>. Our late Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. & is succeeded by the next in standing Robert Hindley Esq<sup>r</sup>. who arriv'd here from Moco Moco January 14<sup>th</sup>. on the Brillant that touched there in her way hither.

20. The several Alterations occasion'd by the above, You will please to observe are inserted in Our General Letter home.

21. Inclos'd is an Indent for Stores &c<sup>a</sup>. which We beg your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. Compliance with and particularly desire You will forward the small Cordage for Sloops that was intended for this place from Europe.

22. We remark also that several Masts & Booms, were design'd for Our Use but as We have already a good stock on hand, We desire none may be sent.

23. Our Sea Customer hath represented to Us, that only one Bale of Goods came here out of what was mentioned in Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. Additional Manifest.

24. Captain Burman having stop'd at Natal in his way from Fort St. David, We on his import<sup>g</sup>. hither Question'd him concerning the Cause of this Deviation. He reply'd it was for want of water he was forced to put in there, having been Forty Seven Days on His Passage, & thirty three People more on board than his Vessells Complement But as We imputed his calling at that Port to be only with a view of Private Interest We therefore call'd his Chief Mate before Us, & ask'd Him, the reason of their long Passage. He said, it was owing to the light Winds they met with all the way Captain Burman assign'd the same reason but differ'd from Mr. Harrison three days in the length of their run to Baroos, & from thence to Natal the Captain affirm'd they were fourteen Days the other said only Seven. On their being ask'd how they came to want Water Capt<sup>n</sup>. Burman reply'd they could not stay to take in enough at Fort St. David on Account of the Season's being far advanc'd, Mr. Harrison ascertained, they took in Sufficient, but all the Casks, afterwards prov'd leaky.

25. Such palpable Contradictions, the more confirms Us in Our Suspicion that Captain Burman's reason for putting in at Natal was not to supply his Vessel with water, but to meet with a good Market for his own Traffic especially as We have been inform'd He sold Goods at that place to a very large Amount; tho' He denies selling any more than to the Value of \$2400 (two thousand four Hundred Spanish Dollars) However, We shall say no further than beging Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will please to take proper Cognizance of the Affair otherwise, it may too often be the Case for a Commander to neglect the Honble Comp<sup>y</sup>s Business to promote his Own.

26. Captain Burman hath deliver'd in a Bill for \$687 (Six Hundred & Eighty Seven) Spanish Dollars for Provision for the Slaves & Transports while on board: But as We think it very extravagant have therefore referr'd it to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>.

27. One of Our Arab Serjeants takes Passage on the Brillant in order to endeavour procuring a Supply of Arabs: which if He should succeed in, request Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will order a proper Conveyance for them hither.

28. The following Sums of Money have been receiv'd into the Honble Company's Cash here, & Certificates deliver'd for the Amount as before mention'd in (Par. 6) which We beg Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will discharge Viz<sup>t</sup>.

SUPPLEMENT

We were just ready to Dispatch the Brillant, when We receiv'd a report from Captain Burman (Copy whereof is enclos'd) advising that so many of his People were Sick, he could not possibly proceed to sea, without Our letting him have Eight or ten Men, or to stay 'till his own were well.'

We have accordingly assisted him with as many as We can; but this Accident has consequently retarded the Brillant some days longer than would otherwise have been.

As We may not have an Opportunity to inform Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. in due season of the quantity of the Surplus Pepper We shall have this Year therefore now advise You, that We compute it will be upwards of One Hundred Ton thô at such a Distance of Time as Nine Month's there cannot be any Certainty except we were to trust to the Mallays reports give Us Assurances of a good Crop; but we have so often found the Fallacy of them, as not to give much Credit to their Assertions. Our chief reason for thinking there will be so much, is, that the Suffolk had One Hundred & Seventy Nine Tons, and the Onslow One Hundred thirty four Tons, wherefore conclude, we may reasonably expect to collect the above Quantity at least, if no material Accident intervenes.

We observe in the Invoices 4900 Four thousand nine Hundred (Gunnies are charg'd, but by the Bills of Lading there appears only 4000 Four thousand) neither have Us receivd any more.

Mr. Thomas Paget Factor on this Establishment Having Petition'd (Copy whereof comes under Cover) for leave to take passage on the Brillant for Fort St. David, in order to try if a Change, of Air would not be Serviceable to His Health which has been in a languishing State for some Months past, & little probability of recovering here, We have therefore granted his request as We presume it is not repugnant to the Honble Companys Orders like Instances of Indulgence being on Record.

Mr. Charles Smith Resident of Moco Moco having waited sometime for a proper Conveyance to conduct him thither & very little likelihood of any offering for sometime; the Mary Sloop being so crouded with the Force for Natal that He could not possibly take Passage on her, & it's absolutely requisite the Swallow should be sent to Croee so soon as she is refitted, to bring up the Pepper of that Place We have therefore determin'd to Order the Brillant to touch at Moco Moco for that purpose & as the Deviation occasion'd thereby will not be more than two or three days, We hope Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will approve thereof, on her We have sent some Treasure & a few Stores for the Use of that Settlement.

Mr. Paget hath been advanc'd his diet Money for February & Salary to the 25<sup>th</sup>. of March.

Agreeable to your Order's I now acquaint You with my Reason of my putting into Natall, which was Occasion'd by my great want of Water, having been then 47 days from Fort St. Davids & 33 People on board more than my Vessel's Company & the quantity so many Persons necessarily consume, in such a long time when We expected a much Shorter run Your Worship & c<sup>a</sup>. will please to consider, must consequently be very great, so that it was meer necessity obligated me to go in there.

The Brillant's Bottom not having been clean'd for these 8 Months past is so foul that I cannot possibly proceed the Voyage back again without giving her a large Heel first, for which purpose, by your Worship's & c<sup>as</sup>. Permission to carry her to Poolo & that Workmen may be sent to do as well as some other necessary Repairs.

Understanding since my Arrival here, that the General & Council of Batavia have Publickly complain'd of me for taking away 9 of their Men, the last time I was there, hope your Worship & c<sup>a</sup>. will not take amiss my Endeavouring to Vendicate myself in this Respect I acknowledge the bringing away 7 of their People & no more but was far from seducing them, on the contrary I was continually teiz'd [*sic*] with several who wanted to come with me & of which I told the Shabender to whom I had promis'd not to take any of their people, but on many of my own Running away & for which I cou'd get no Redress, I then took those 7 since it was impossible for me to leave the place without Hands & after their above Usage of me, I did not see any Reason why I should observe my Promise which I imagine naturally implied their using me as much Honour as I should otherwise have done them.

Ultimo and landed safe here with their Honour's Treasure & c<sup>a</sup>. the 3<sup>d</sup>. Instant, I found the Country in a State of Peace & their Highnesses the Sultans in good Health.

The Ballance of the Honble Company's Cash being \$ 164-3-20 One Hundred Sixty four Spanish Dollars three toocas & twenty Cash I have receiv'd from Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Gunu & Tottie who were left in trust by Robert Hindley Esq<sup>r</sup>. & shall proceed with all dispatch to take a Regular charge of all other their Honours Effects here.

By my late arrival I am incapable to give your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. a just Account of the condition of the Plantations &c<sup>a</sup>. tho it's with Concern I understand by the Surveyors Report who are return'd a few days ago that the Prospect of the ensuing Seasons Crop of Pepper is not so favourable as We might expect. As yet I have not had Opportunity to discourse the Sultan on their Honours Investment, but shall not fail to do it shortly & to continually remind him of His Contract & Cemented Interest With the Honble Companys.

Under Cover I inclose to Your Honours Copy of Captn. Burmans Report to me of the condition of His Crew & I flatter myself you will not disapprove of my complying with His request, nor of my Supplying Him with 220, two hundred, twenty Bamboes Rice value \$ 18-1-32 Eighteen Spanish Dollars, One toooa & thirty two Cash, as He is apprehensive of a long Passage.

I beg leave to Conclude with my faithful assurances of a Hedy [*Sic*] adherance to our Honble Master's Concerns on all Occasions ; & wishing the Snow a Safe & Speedy Voyage.

Instant, We have receiv'd since which Mr. Peter St. Paul is arriv'd here We should be glad to hear of Mr. Cookes coming away as soon as possible agreeable to his appointment, since the Gentlemen of Council who are at present remaining at this Place, belonging to the Presidency, having finish'd their several Acco<sup>ts</sup>. they were left behind for, on the President's removal to Madrass, are now ready to take their leave in order to accept of their respective Employ<sup>ts</sup>. with You, which the absence of Mr. Cooke will be some detention to them, from attending their proper duty where it is requir'd.

The Honble Company's Sloop Mermaid arriv'd here the 23<sup>d</sup>. Instant and having brought 108 Barrells of Gunpowder, from Bengall, We have thought proper to Land it, which We hope Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &<sup>c</sup>a. will not be offended at, as the greatest Use for it is in places more Contiguous to Us than to your Presidency, & Mr. Call the Sub Engineer being ask'd what he thought of it assur'd Us that he not only imagin'd it so himself but that Mr. Brohier had mention'd it to him when here, which made Us the less scrupulous, of acting thus of ourselves without waiting your Orders, to this purpose, the Inv<sup>o</sup>. & Bill of Lading for the Gunpowder We suppose to be enclos'd in the General Letter from Bengall, which We now send your Honour &<sup>c</sup>a. unopen'd, as soon as You are pleas'd to let Us know the Cost of the Gunpowder We shall immediately give your Presidency Credit for it.

Upon the Honble Company's Snow Brillant who imported the 22<sup>d</sup>. Inst. We send Your Honour &<sup>c</sup>a. Sixteen thousand (16000) Pag<sup>s</sup>. which is four thousand (4000) more than you were pleas'd to Order Us in your favour of the 10<sup>th</sup>. to forward by the first Conveyance this Surplus is in some measure to make up for the Twenty five thousand (25000) Rupees You gave Us directions also to furnish you with, the Remainder of that Sum Linga Chittee's People will be answerable for, out of the Silver which remains in the Mint dirt, The Invoice & Bill of Lading for the Bales We send Your Honour &<sup>c</sup>a. by the Brillant & Mermaid We now Enclose.

As the Account Current of the Presidency will cease here at the Close of this Month, We desire to know what Garrison Your Honour &<sup>c</sup>a. are pleas'd We should keep up, that this Settlement may be debted for the expence of that only & all other Military Expences shall be charg'd to the Account current of Madrass.

I have acquainted Mr. Hopkin's with your allowance to him for his Extra Expences.

I have already acquainted your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. of Jaffer alley Cawn being come again into this Province with the Orders he receiv'd from Salabat Jing relating to Us Affairs continuing in the same state have nothing further to add on this Head, than to request the Stores I have Indented for may be sent as soon as possible as the Arms we have at present here, are not to be depended on.

What your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. remark on the Muster of Cloth (sent up) which the French take in is very just in regard to former times, but the major part of the Cloth purchas'd by them now being on private Account and with money the Officers & c<sup>a</sup>. at Golcondah send from thence which being got in an easy manner, they pay no regard to the prices they give for the Cloth provided they can make the least advantage of it at Pondicherry.

I have wrote to the Rajah for a Phirmaund for those places your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. have permitted me to Rent and expect shortly to receive it.

Since my being here I have been very punctual in sending up my Accounts by the 4<sup>th</sup>. of the succeeding Month & shall continue to do so.

Instant you will before this have been inform'd both from Mr. Westcott and myself; of the return of Jeffar Allie Cawn into this Country & the orders he brought with him, he yet remains at Peddipore dubious how to act; his friendship for the English inclines him to assist Us, but the danger of incurring his Masters displeasure (whose orders are Positive) forbid him in short, he waits to see what force will arrive this way if he thinks it sufficient I really believe he and Vizaramrauze, would join Us to make a revolt, if not, he (the Nabob) will be oblig'd to act against us, and the French will be daily Soliciting the Moors to Strengthen his hands, for that purpose from this view of Affairs, Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will be the best Judges how to Act.

Your orders in regard to the Books and Accounts, shall be duly observ'd, and when you send the Military (which I hope will be soon) you will be pleas'd to Comply with the Indent I formerly sent you for this place as also such Military Stores, as may be sufficient & I persuade myself your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will not think it unnecessary, to throw up some small Fortification which may not only secure to Us the right of the River, but protect our persons, and trade from the Insults of the Moors to which We must be greatly expos'd with only a Small number of men, without any.

I sincerely wish your honour &c<sup>a</sup>. a Compleat Victory at Tritchenopoly, and a happy Issue of the present troubles on which I think our all this way seems to depend.

I am now to acknowledge the receipt of your favour of the 22<sup>d</sup>. instant and reply as well thereto as to such parts of your Instructions of the 1<sup>st</sup>. which in my former address I gave my reasons for not doing.

Judging it would be satisfactory to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. receiving the accounts of this Settlement as soon as possible, I immediately set about compleating them as nearly as the materials I was furnished with would admit which having finish'd I now inclose as by List of the Packet.

In the General account Current N<sup>o</sup>. 8 There appears remaining to be accounted for P<sup>s</sup>. 2647 20 22 being I imagine the amount of Disbursements here from June to December 1749 and as those months Accounts were regularly forwarded to St. David, conclude the adjustments may be made from them.

N<sup>o</sup>. 3 contains a List of Sundries remaining more than appear to have been receiv'd amo<sup>tg</sup>. to P<sup>s</sup>. 3224 4 9 This difference I judge to arise from the followg. causes that of the number of Stores, sent to this place at different times to be forwarded for the expedition to Tritchanopoly no regular Accounts of which being kept, many design'd for that Service have probably been detained here and which as no one can give me any Information relating to it is not possible for me to particularize, others as specified in the account Remains, were weigh'd from the wreck of His Majestys Ship Pembroke others sent a shore from the King's Ships when the Place was taken and others Part of those receiv'd from His Majesty's Commissary at Fort St. David, which, not being brought upon the Company's Books, no charge has been made of them: The amount as I have valued them Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will observe by the General Account Current is carried to the credit of Fort St. David, at the Foot of the above account is a List of Stores sent here some months past, part of what furnish'd from Fort St. David, account the Expedition to Tritchenopoly which are not inserted in my Account Remains, waiting your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. directions concerning them. By the Cash Account N<sup>o</sup>. 1 The Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company appear indebted to Capt<sup>n</sup> Clarke Pagodes 500. . . being so much more disburs'd than remitted him from Fort St. David and to Cap<sup>t</sup>. Maskelyne Pagodas 177 13 66 for the balance of his March account which with the amount of this month's Disbursements, I shall debt this Settlement for in the Sett of Books I purpose opening from this day, agreeable to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. Order.

I have insertd nothing in the Acct. Remains but what are now in Garrison, and you will please to observe I credit this place in the General account Current. The amount of Arms I found short of what received from St. David; Particulars of which are in N<sup>o</sup>. 4: They have been issued at so many different times for Service, that I can't possibly be at any certainty concerning them. I shall nevertheless put them on my Books, debting Expedition to Tritchanopoly and giving that Head credit for them as they are returned, If it meets your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>as</sup>. approbation.

I have debted this Settlement for all Remittances of Cash, Stores sent, Disbursements by the Paymaster and all such sums as I found it charged with, on examining the Books of the several Offices at Fort St. David, and have given Credit, for the amount of, Cash disbursed on the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Comp<sup>y</sup>s and other accounts, Stores sent to Tritchanopoly, Expended and Remaining and of charges Merchandize, being what disbursed by the Paymaster and part, of that head arising on the supplies of Stores sent here at different times, which I do not in full, as many Petty Stores there charged are in the Remains, and that being the Sum wanting to close the General Account Current. The amount of three Garce of Paddy sold, and the twenty remaining on account the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Comp<sup>y</sup> is I imagine to be carried to the Debit of this Settlement in its Acct. Curr<sup>t</sup>. with the Presidency. These being the Remarks which occurred to me, on the several statements I have taken the liberty to particularize them, and hope my Endeavours for settling the accounts will afford me the satisfaction of your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>as</sup>. approbation.

N<sup>o</sup>: 9 In the Packet is a state of the Produce of the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Comp<sup>y</sup>s Bounds last year wherein is specified, the customs and Paddy received by the Renters, and what appropriated to other services, by which it appears, The Grain produced is upwards of 519 Garce yearly 271 of which your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will observe become the property of the Farmers, Who at the time of Harvest collect the whole, and distribute the several allowances, being what are established by Custom This, when about 50 Garce for the next year's seed and as much more, exported by the Renters, is deducted, will be barely sufficient for supplying the Inhabitants of the Bounds, so that it must appear evident to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. that without distressing the Poor, no considerable Quantity of Grain can be furnished from hence: Of other kinds of Merchandize produced in the Bounds I find none, but a very few Pieces of Ordinary cloth sold in the Buzar,

The Inhabitants in general being *Husbandmen and Bramins who seem happy in their Poverty*: This I impute to the general dislike the Blacks of any credit have to settle here from a notion prevailing among them of its being an unhealthy Place and so surrounded with Marshy Grounds Rivers and Woods as to Subject them to Agues and Fevers, and to its having been esteemed when under the Tanjore Government as a Situation valuable only for it's strength, nor any kind of Commerce transacted here: All These disadvantages they find removed at a Settlement about ten miles to the Southward of this called Trimlewash, being a Town situated within five or six hundred yards of the Sea, having the convenience of a River running close to it, navigable throughout the year for Vessells of small Burthen; and is even now a Place of considerable Trade and the Residence of many wealthy Merchants. It has also the advantage of being very near, Sheally & Mayavaram the two most famous Towns in this part of the Country for the Cloth Business: The Merchants dealing in that Branch who have been with me express the strongest desire to live under the English Protection, but start the Objections before recited to settling here setting forth at the same time the many advantages that would attend a Commerce carried on from Trimlewash, Superiour to one from hence, promising if only an English Factory was establish'd immediately to remove their Families there, and furnish as much Cloth as money could be advanced for providing: And as I have been informed a Negociation was formerly on foot, and far advanced towards obtaining a Grant from the King of Tanjore for that Place and the Villages belonging to it; I thought it a Duty incumbent on me to make this representation of the advantages that might be expected to accrue to the Honble Compy from having a Resident there.

I shall now proceed to give as perfect an account as I am able of this Place, situated as I Judge, about two miles from the Sea; It is a small Irregular Fortification on the Point of an Island, having a branch of the Coldroon River running to the Southward of it within twenty yards of the Walls, navigable about a mile from the Bar for Vessells of a hundred Tons it is surrounded entirely with water within fifty or sixty yards of the Fort, during the time of the Freshes in the Coldroon River, (which generally begin to come down about the middle of July) and so continues till after the Rainy Season, about five months in the whole which indeed adds greatly to the natural strength (though much to the Unhealthiness) of it's situation, by rendering all access to it almost impracticable; Otherwise the Fort itself by having been a long time built and much neglected, is exceedingly decayed; The Outer (and indeed only) Wall, being in many Places much moulder'd away, and the Rampart within so much out of Repair by the frequent heavy Rains, as not to be at present of sufficient breadth to transport a Gun (in case of necessity) from one Bastion on Tower to another: The Bastions are contrived without any Parapets to them, that in case of an Enemy being against the Place, it would not be possible to work the Guns with any tolerable Security, and I much doubt could they be properly attended, whether a brisk fire from them might not endanger the whole Curtain: And fear the expected Monsoon will render the Rampart almost Irreparable. The Fort was it in the best condition is so small as not to admit of a sufficient number of Inhabitants for a Place of any considerable Trade, nor is there any convenient spot for their Building on within at least a mile of it, Every dry place being at present fully occupied by the People necessary to attend the Paddy Grounds: There is as I before remarked, all round the Fort except to the Southward, about fifty or sixty yards from the Walls rising Ground which is not overflowed during the Rains, and if taken in would add greatly to the Convenience of the Place and be doubtless a considerable Inducement for Merchants to settle here but that could not be done but a very great expence, and even then the disadvantages of not being able to stir without the gates during the Rains, the difficulty of bringing in the Hon'ble Compy's Cloth, from the many Rivers there is a necessity of passing and badness of the Roads would still be unremoved:

These are in some measure such Observations as I have made myself, and partly Information from those who have resided here, which though however imperfect I judged proper to communicate I shall punctually observe your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &cas. commands with regard to not laying out any money on the Fortifications, but hope from the preceeding Representations it will appear to you necessary that a regular survey of them should be taken by some more skilful Person.

That no Encouragement in my Power to give might be wanting towards inducing Weavers and Painters to settle within our Bounds, I order'd the Renters immediately to discontinue collecting any Customs from such People, which on perusing their Cowle I found to be expressly forbid, but had been practiced by them ever since the first grant of it: This though very trifling, from the small quantity of Cloth made in the Bounds, I considered not only as an Infringement on the Terms stipulated by the President and Council to be observed by them, but attended with the bad Consequence such Restriction was design'd to prevent and therefore thought it necessary to give their agents a Reprimand on the little Regard paid to the Tenour of their Cowle, enjoining a stricter Observance of it in Future.

The Inhabitants representing that the Bound Renter in Retailing the Paddy, do not make use of proper measures for want of their being regulated, I purpose writing agreeable to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &cas. orders, to the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort St. David for a set of standard ones with the Compys Chop, by which I may make others and effectually prevent the Poor from being imposed on in that Particular: I have now addressed them & inclosed agreeable to the directions contained in your favour of the 22<sup>d</sup>. my Indent for what Stores are immediately wanted here, And represented my extreme necessity for stationary, which is at present such that till I am furnished from thence it will not be in my power to draw out my monthly accounts not having any Paper proper for that Business and I must here request your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &ca. would be pleased to have regard to my Indent for that Article forwarded in my last, when the arrival of the expected Ships may put it in your Power to comply with it.

The Military Stores requiring a seperate sett of Books to be kept, I purpose giving the charge of that employ to Mr. George Dawson, If it meets your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &cas. approbation.

I should be glad to be informed whether the Board Renters are to be exempt from paying the Hon'ble Compys Customs on what Grain they may export from hence to Fort St. David or Madrass, as it is not so specified in their Cowle.

I must request your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &cas. directions whether the Pay of the Military, Train seapoys and Lascars is to be drawn for from the Presidency as has been customary or paid here, and inserted in the Accounts of this Settlement, which last method I shall take for the ensuing month with Regard to the Military and Train and for this regarding the Seapoys and Lascars But I cannot help repeating my extreme distress for Cash & requesting you will be pleased to favour me with a supply as soon as possible.

I now forward to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &ca. the several musters of Cloth to be procured from the adjacent Countries with their Prices, Viz<sup>t</sup>.

The Boneta Sloop arrived here the 29<sup>th</sup>. and brought us your favour of the 11<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo on her came Mr. Pigot, who recd the Ballance of Cash from Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Banks and Crompton the last of the month being Mad<sup>ss</sup>. Pag<sup>s</sup>. 7072-18-26 and Rupees 2089-10- which together with the supply received by the Sloop makes M<sup>s</sup>. Pag<sup>s</sup>. 17072-18-26 and A Rup<sup>s</sup>. 27089-10-. The monthly Papers accompanys this.

It is with the greatest concern We are to acquaint You of a Violent Tempest two days past, a ship in the Road belonging to Metchlepatam fully laden was drove on the Rocks and entirely lost with her whole cargo and crew except four men, some of the Vessels in the River were also lost and the rest greatly damaged, the Villages of Cassimcota and Ancapelly have little left of them, and Norway is entirely washed away, our People have been employed ever since in Burying the Dead Bodies both of Men and Cattle which were left in the Town as the waters went off. The Place in general is in ruin scarce a House with its roofing and few with the walls standing. The next day we Visited the whole Town and made use of this Opportunity to forbid the Inhabitants in the gentlest terms the nature of the thing would admit. rebuilding such of the houses as were too near the Fort; and to give as much Satisfaction as possible we first directed the Company's Choultry to the Eastward and the Garden House to the Westward, to be immediately levelled with the Ground. as they would both. and more particularly the last, cost as much to repair them as might build others in more commodious Places. The President who is well acquainted with the situation of these parts. will make known to you

Gentlemen the inconveniencies the Fort lay under from the nearness of the inhabitants houses & these Buildings. The former being only 105 yards to the North, 25 to the East and 40 to the South, and the Garden house is only 55 to the Westward, the Wals & outhouses to which are but 9 yards, and directly opposite to the Back Gate which is larger than it should be, is only two Inches through, very old, and the frame so struck in the Wall, that should there be the least likelihood of any disturbance, it will be necessary to brick it entirely up. We have lined out proper Streets and at a Convenient distance for the inhabitants, to the N. and N.E. & ordered a quantity of straw, Cadjan leaves and small sticks at the Compy's Expence to be laid there for the rebuilding their Houses. We have the pleasure to acquaint you that many have set very cheerfully about them and that there are few except such as are possessed of those built of brick, that complain at all. We cannot finish this Paragraph without apologising to Your Honr. &ca. for taking this step before we had first obtained your permission. But, there was a Necessity for its being done immediately as these people are very alert in getting damages of this kind repair'd, which once done, the same reasons would have subsisted as has for these forty years for letting them stand.

You will please to give us Directions in regard to making some Compensation to such of our Inhabitants as may suffer most by the removal of their Houses, as we propose till we receive Your Orders, only giving a few Materials to the Poor which will put the Company to little expence. We shall for the Ground allotted the Inhabitants at this time, give them grants with a Clause inserted therein that the Company shall at pleasure demand the same on paying for the Buildings thereon as we find every one who has possessions here at present, claim an entire right to them These people often are or are said to be indebted to the Government, and in their Death the houses and Ground are Seized by them. An instance of this kind has lately happened and in a part of the Town it would have been worth while to have paid some money for the Building, Your Honr. &ca. must be sensible of the bad consequences this may be attended with hereafter though it may no [*sic*] affect us at present: should you therefore think proper to send us an Order to be put up in all publick places directing that the Company shall have the refusal of all houses after the Death of the present possessors, or that are at any time to be disposed of, we think the same will be of great use; and till we receive Your directions on this head we shall act in such manner as may appear to us for the Company's Interest and the advantage of the Settlement.

Both the Flagstaffs are blown down, and the Fort house though it is standing has received great damage not only the Doors and Windows, but the frames of many have been intirely forced out of the wall, the Ballustrade on the top of the House to the East and West is down and the Terrass struck to such a degree that there is not a dry Room in the House, The Master Carpenter who has survey'd it says there will be a Necessity to take the Terrass intirely off, that the Beams may be examin'd as the House has been leaky for many Years, and no other method used to repair it than pouring hot dammer over such parts as were cracked. This is the greater Misfortune to us as we have no other place in the Fort to deposite any one thing, the small Buildings against the Walls being entirely destroyed and the Room where we kept a few Barrels of Powder has one side of it burst quite open and the Door down, this, as well as the Fort is built in Mud, to rebuild it in the same manner will be doing nothing, and were the Walls compleat we have no joices: [*sic*] It shoud indeed be Bomb proof, as likewise many other parts of the Fort, but We are convinced from the manner the Powder house under the Blackrock is built, that the Bricklayers are unequal to any thing of that kind; the Foundation of it being laid in Mud, In the Arch are two loop holes to give it air, and instead being turned quite to the edge of the Walls there is a flat left of two feet all round it on which was a small shell to lodge, it would destroy the whole immediately;

The Foundation will not allow of its being mended by laying a greater weight on it, and indeed its Situation is so bad, that the swelling of the River in the Storm, filled it a foot and half with water, and its distance is so great as would render it very difficult to bring the Powder from it was the Place besieged. We trouble Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. with these particulars to show the necessity of a capable Person to erect the necessary Works here.

One of the Bales of Broad Cloth per Boneta N<sup>o</sup>. 1510, is said to be Yellow, but on opening it, was found to be Blue, of which Colour we have now 26 peices which are not Vendable though the Cloth is good, We shall therefore take the Liberty to send them up in August next.

There is so great a scarcity of Copper money as to cause the Rupees to exchange for no more at present than 39 Dubbs which used formerly to be worth 50 The Merchants as well as the Military complain greatly of this, and it has been found necessary for these four months to purchase some at the market price and pay them to the latter at a greater exchange This will occasion a loss monthly of near 70 Rupees, and We are therefore to beg your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will cause a sufficient quantity of Arcott Dubbs to be coin'd and sent us by the earliest Conveyance. We take the Liberty to send herewith one of those peices of money that they may be struck as near as possible the same.

Inclosed is our Surgeon's Indent for some necessaries wanting in the Hospital.

Lieutenant Seaton returns Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. thanks for his Commission.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

My last to your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. was the 8<sup>th</sup>. past in which I acquainted you with our Situation this way, and what I thought of the Nabobs Intentions; a few nights past Letters came to the Soukars, advising of the Murder of Ramadoss Puntaloo, and the Nabob who received Letters at the same time gives it out that he has Orders not to molest our Factorys but assist us in our business, whether this last is true or not, I cannot say, but I believe the former is, and it gives me the greatest pleasure, as I flatter myself, this fatal Blow to the French Interest, joind to your Success at Tritchanapolly, (which I am hourly in hopes of hearing of) will shortly put our affairs in a flourishing condition.

I must request your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &<sup>ca</sup>. will be pleas'd to send me Forty or Fifty Stores, some Course, some fine, for the washing of Cloth upon, the French have taken possession of the Company's Tank at Maddapollam, and what stores there were there belonging to the Company their Washermen have taken, I know it signifies nothing entering into a Paper war with them, as they will not own it; I cou'd procure Stores at Rajahmundrum, but the time it wou'd take up, and the Interruption I might meet with from the Government wou'd be a very great hindrance; and as I can give no Cloth to the Wash till I have them, I hope you will be so good to send them to me by some Conveyance or other, soon.

This disappointment the Japan Ships have met with and the want of Copper at the Dutch Settlements has rais'd the Price of Dubbs so much that instead of Fifty w<sup>ch</sup>. was usual, we now get only Thirty five, and as Thread in all the Markets is chiefly bought with Dubbs this falls heavy upon the Weavers, & Consequently must greatly affect our Investment if therefore as you intend some Military for this place, you wou'd be pleas'd to send them soon, and Fifteen Candy of Copper, I have People ready to coin it here, and the Governmt. will not open their Mouths; if you do not approve of this be pleas'd to send me the Copper, and an Order from Negapatam to the Dutch at Palicot to Coin them for me; but as the coining them ourselves will be of great service to the Settlement I believe you will think that the best way. Herewith comes the accounts of this place for last month, and I am with the greatest Esteem.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Accompanying this is Copy of our Letter of the 17<sup>th</sup>. Instant as also an Account of the Powder Mortars, Ordnance & Ordnance Stores in this Garrison shewing which are Serviceable and which not, These Papers we believe will enable Your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. to judge what will be necessary to furnish us with more and what do direct us to send from hence in August; Agreeable to your Orders we have examin'd into the state of the Garrison, and now transmit

you the return thereof the 21<sup>st</sup>. Instant, when we saw the Men under Arms, we have likewise taken a Survey of the Fortifications and are concern'd that we are not able to give you a more pleasing Account of them, we have tried the Foundation of one of the Bastions to the Fort and find it no more than Five foot and a half, so that no Ditch either Wet or dry can be made round it, we did not think it safe to open the Ground to try the others or what bottom the Curtains had, but have no reason to believe them better the South Side of the Fort is only three Bricks thick laid in Clay, and must formerly have been part of a House as we can trace the marks of Doors & Windows which are but ill filled up, the new work not being let into the Old. The East Side is much the same, as there has been late instances of the Prisoners working their way through the Wall, without any Tools in a Nights time. The Curtains to the North and West are of more substance but having bad foundations and being ill built are craked in many Places, all the Bastions but the N.W. are craked and that to the N.E. is so bad that it would fall with the shock of a few Guns from it, The Parapet round the Fort is only two Bricks through and there are Embrasures at every Nine or ten foot most of which are upward of Four foot wide and in each Merton is a large loop hole, that was an Enemy in Possession of the Houses about the Fort their Musquetry would prevent any Man Showing himself on the Curtain and more particularly on some parts where the Parapet is only breast high & in others it is again higher than it should be as there is no Banquett.

The Out Works are more Modern but have many faults, the worst of which is, that they require a Number of men to maintain them, and the consequences may be bad should we be obliged at any time to abandon them for you will please to observe by the Report of the Ordnance that all the Guns but Five are Mounted on these out Works and they are a great distance from the Fort, however we will order some of them in when we can get the Platforms on the Bastions a little better laid, they being at present only Rough Store; We are a good deal Strangers to things of this Nature but Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. may be assured of our utmost deligence in pulling the Garrison in the best Order we are able till you see convenient to send us a little assistance.

We have been favour'd with a Visit from Vizeram Rauze the Rajah, and presented him with y<sup>s</sup>. present designed for him, He was Several Days in Town and gave us many assurance of his Friendship, We took this opportunity to Represent to him the inconveniencies which might arise from any other Europeans possessing themselves of Pondemarka & have the pleasure to Acquaint you that he readily gave us a Grant for any part thereof we might chuse to build a Factory on and has therein denied all other Europeans the liberty of Trade there but by our permission. We doubted not but it would be agreeable to Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. that we should accept this Offer, and therefore Order'd a Detachment under the Command of Lieutenant Seaton, to be in readiness to march immediately, This Gentleman arrived the next morning, and having produced his Letters to the Principal Officers for the Rajah's affairs there, They caused with great Joy the Cowle to be publickly read, which done the Flag of His Majesty was accordingly hoisted, and now flies there. Mr. Pigot has received several Letters of Congratulation from the Chief Inhabitants, and We hope many advantages will arise from our being in possession of this Place It is productive of large quantities of Grain and some Cloth is contiguous to our present Limits, and all our Investment to the Southward is brought through this Country; We shall defer fixing on any particular spot till We hear from Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. as we flatter ourselves with the hopes of your sending down a person capable of judging which situation may be most proper should it be thought Necessary hereafter to erect any Buildings there.

At the foot of this is an Account of Cloth on hand, being about Two hundred and Five Bales, Our Merchants Promise if the Country round us continues as peaceable as it now is. that they will make a very considerable

addition to this Number by the end of August; We think we can depend upon having Five hundred Bales by that time, and are provided with good Conveyances for them, but must request Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will supply us with about 10,000 Pagodas and 100,000 Rupees as our Investment and Expences between this and December will require full that Sum.

Ultimo will no doubt Contribute greatly to it, He being a firm friend to the French and in Course an inveterate Enemy of Ours, The Nabob a few days past directed Hussain Ally Beg to Advise me that in the present Situation of Affairs it would be Extreme proper that I should send my Vackeel to Golconda to Salabat Jing with a present to him and some of the Great men about him acquainting them with Our Present situation and the Losses We have sustained, requesting He would give the proper Orders that We may return to Our Factory carry on our Business as Usual and Satisfaction be made us for the damage We have sustained by being drove from Our Factory, to which I reply'd that I should lay the same before Your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. and wait for Your Orders.

Your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. may rest assured everything I proposed to you in Regard to Nellepillee shall be Carried on with the Utmost Frugality.

By My Cash Account and Journal Parcels now inclos'd You will perceive how much I am enabled to carry on my Investment, the greatest part of the Ballance due from the Company to Me, was on Account Cloth sent up in December and without a large and speedy supply I shall not be able to make any Investment.

Merchants & as Such delivered over by him to M<sup>r</sup>. Saunders upon his Arrival there as Chief & debted the Merchants as the Goods were not brought in, but I believe it was a Debt not upon Contract, and that M<sup>r</sup>. Saunders was not able to recover it, & as it remains to M<sup>r</sup>. Goodere to be answerable for it to the Honble Company.

Ultimo he inform'd us he was bound for Fort St. David and Bengal, had been upwards of Five Months from England, and was necessitated to touch here, on account of the Sickness of his People, and for want of Water, with which he has been supplied, and his Hands being pretty well recover'd, he now pursues his Voyage.

Captain Brown advising Us that he had a Consignment on board for the Coast, We have taken out the following Particulars, Viz<sup>t</sup>.

Our reason for taking this liberty, is the grave Necessity We have for those Articles, more especially the two former Supplies of Cash from Europe, hath of late been no more than Fourteen or Fifteen Chests Yearly, which being not near sufficient to answer Our Disbursements, We are thereby involv'd above 20,000 Twenty Thousand Spanish Dollars in Debt, at the Rate of Ten per Cent Interest; and though We applied to the Hoñbe Company of Suffolk and Onslow, for a larger Annual Remittance, yet lest We should be disappointed, and to prevent the Inconveniencies that would consequently proceed the ensuing Year, from receiving only Fifteen Chests, and to Discharge the above said Debt, Principal and Interest, out of the same, We judg'd it more for the Company's Interest to act in this manner, and flatter Ourselves this proceeding will meet with Your Honour &<sup>cas</sup>. approval.

Receiving last Year no Cordage from Europe, and what the Hoñble Company Consign'd us of Via Fort St. David, not being forwarded from thence, hath put us to the greatest Difficulties for that Article (as well as other Stores) We have now three Sloops here, and neither of them rigg'd in a proper manner, nor can we remedy it, We have been oblig'd to order the Mary Sloop to Batavia, in order to endeavour purchasing a small quantity, but We are uncertain of obtaining it, & to put her in a Capacity of proceeding thither, We were forc'd to give her a Rattan Cable, the same as the Mallays use for their small Boats, and on which little dependance can be plac'd. As their Honours order'd Us such a large Supply last year, We therefore dont expect to have any by the Storeship this; for the above reasons, and to conduce to the Preservation of Our Hoñble Masters Sloops, We found Ourselves oblig'd to Direct Cap<sup>t</sup>. Browne, to deliver Us the whole quantity he had on board.

As Captain Browne was fearful of disobliging Our Hoñble Masters, by delivering any Part of his Cargo at this Place, to which he was not Consign'd, We for his further Satisfaction, inserted in Our Order to him, an Indemnification from their Displeasure, which We think can in no wise draw any Demorage on the Hoñble Company such being far from Our Intention and Meaning.

Some of the Military having desir'd to exchange with ours, We have granted their Request; the former are to serve Five Years here, and the latter the same Term at the Coast: List whereof is inclosed.

When Mr. Dunckley return'd from Batavia, on examining into his Conduct, both during his stay there, and while he was Resident of Croee, We found it so bad, as to be deserving his being Suspended from all Places of Trust, but to keep his Standing and Pay as Third, till the Hoñble Company's Pleasure is known; a further Account of his Transactions, We shall present Your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. with by the next Conveyance.

On the 12<sup>th</sup>. of May last died Mr. Charles Smith, Fourth of Council, and Resident of Moco Moco in which he is succeeded by Mr. Combes, who will shortly take passage for that place; The Employ of Storekeeper was given to Mr. John Beach; and Mr. William Smith who was the next in Standing, was appointed to fill up the Vacancy at the Board.

Some time ago a Dispute happen'd between the Inhabitants of two Doosoons at Laye, to quell which, We sent thither Dattoo Bugguess with a Party of Bugguesses, who brought them up hither, where the Affair was decided, but one of the Parties disapproving of the Decision return'd unknown to Us to his own Doosoon, which upon Our having Advice of, and that he was fortifying it, We order'd the Captain of our Bugguesses with a Command of Men down there, and We have since had Intelligence that he is fled to the Hills.

We cannot in this Place, avoid acquainting your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. with an Affair that hath lately happen'd between Us and Captain Hood, who succeeded to a Company, agreeable to Your Orders, that was vacant by the Death of Cap<sup>t</sup>. John Williams on the 31<sup>st</sup>. of March last. Having received some Complaints against his Conduct, We on the 24<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo summon'd him before Us to enquire into the same; among other Questions it was ask'd him, ' If an Officer could confine a Man, who had received his Discharge, without informing the Deputy Governour, especially in such an unprecedented manner as had been done, by ordering that no Person should be [allowed] to go near him, by which means, the poor Fellow was in Confinement two Days, without any Subsistence he haughtily and arrogantly replied, at the same time turning himself round, in a very contemptuous manner as if going away, or giving a Defiance saying, " I tell you I am a Soldier." As We look'd upon this, as derogating from Our Authority, and an Affront to the whole Board, he seeming to intimate a sort of Challenge to us, We immediately order'd him under Arrest at his own House, where he still remains, not having made the least Concession: We therefore intend, so soon as this Ship is gone, to bring him to an impartial Examination, agreeable to the Regulations: his Behaviour, not only in this Instance, but ever since he hath been on the Coast, having been very turbulent & insolent.

Now We are on this Head, We must beg leave to trouble Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. with another Affair relating to our Military. In November 1750, Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. were pleas'd to send over hither by the Swallow Cap<sup>t</sup>. Bell, New Regulations for our Military; from which time, the Captains begun to stop One Dollar  $\text{₹}$  Mensem from each Private Man, in both Companys, for Cloathing, though none came over at that time, nor till the latter end of April 1751, and then only Fifty Suits; notwithstanding which, they have kept stopping, as well from those who had no cloaths, as from the Men those Fifty Suits were deliver'd to; and Cloathing for the whole, arrived but in January last; so that most of Our Military have paid fourteen Dollars, for what they never did receive, nor ever will; upon Our taking Notice of this to the Officers, they insisted upon it's being just, particularly Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hood, who affirm'd the same was practis'd at the Presidency. Our Opinion is, that the Cloathing should be deliver'd, before any stoppages are made; however We shall refer it to Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. Determination, which We beg may be sent Us as soon as possible the Discontents created among Our Military hereby, being innumerable and may prove of very dangerous consequence.

Captain Browne having desir'd to Deposite the Sum of  $\text{₹}$  2800 into the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company's Cash here, We have Comply'd with his request, and granted him Certificates on Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. for the Amount, Payable to himself or Order, being Pag<sup>s</sup>. 1866. 24. which We beg Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will please to Discharge.

Joseph Hurlock & C<sup>a</sup>. Council & the Honble East India Company's Pass to Trade there. And when near the place (Contrary to the Laws of Nations) was most Inhumanly attacked by the Commander of the Dutch Punchalls, laying there. First had the unparalelled impudence in Tear in Peices the Honble Company's Pass, with their Seal affixed thereunto, Secondly without paying the Least regard to Laws Humane or Devine most Savogely Murdered all Except one which Escaped their Notice, Jumped over board & had the good fortune to Swim ashore & escape falling a Sacrffice to their B[leed]ing hands, by whom this fatal story was known, after this bloody scene was parpertrated, retired to Padang & their [*sic*] sold the Prows & some of the Cargo.

Being informed the Dutch is Willing to Deliver back the remains of the Goods in their Godowns at Batavia which they unjustly seized & laying there for the space of three years by your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>a</sup>. will be pleas'd to Consider what Condition they must be in by reason of remaining there so long.

And at Governour Hurlock's going to England acquainted that the Dutch Company his [*sic*] willing pay to your Petitioner and the Gov<sup>r</sup>. asked if he was willing to accept half Payment your Petitioner being not willing of that Exceptance made so for which reason the Puntch & Arrack Licence was taken from your Petitioner Governour Hurlock & then gon [*sic*] home to England.

The Deputy Governour having presented Us with a Letter he has received from Mr. Dupleix in answer to the General One we had wrote him & his Council the 12<sup>th</sup>. Instant, We now Enclose the Copy of the same for Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. Inspection, which we take leave to refer to you to reply to, as We have given no answer to it from Us in general, or does the Deputy Governor intend to do it in particular but barely to acknowledge the receipt to Mr. Dupleix & to let him know that the Copy of his has been transmitted to You.

Captain Clark having wrote to the Deputy Governour under date the 13<sup>th</sup>. Instant that whatever Success he may hope for in future will be owing Entirely to his being Reinforced by Us & having consulted with Major Kinneer thereupon, he concurs with Us in opinion that as the Enemy are so near Trivady, no Time should be lost in sending out whatever Men We can possibly spare

from this Garrison & Cudalore, We have therefore sent out a party of Fifty (50) Europeans, Twenty (20) Topasses & One Company of Seapoys under the Command of Ensign Harrison to strengthen Captain Clarkes Force: it is with great Concern that We are obliged to acquaint Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. that Captain Campbell has informed Us that there was a general Murmuring among these Men for want of the Arrears of their Pay they are gone out Seemingly with great discontent & Six of them whose Time is Expired absolutely laid down their Arms & will not March until the Commandant was obliged to make them do it as Prisoners until they were out of the Fort, & this Spirit of Mutiny is not only very rife here but also at Camp as appears by a Paragraph in the abovemention'd Letter from Captain Clark to the Deputy Governour. We humbly recommend these Circumstances to Your Honour &c<sup>as</sup>. most Serious consideration, as We have but too much reason to dread the Consequences unless Some Method is taken to Supply Us Speedily with Cash to discharge those Accounts: For Our parts Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. may be assured that We have done all that lay in our power to prevent these Murmurings, having as Yet only receivd 50,000 Rupees out of the 100,000 You were pleas'd to send Us & we have left Ourselves only Two thousand & Ninty Eight Pagodas, Six fanams & Seventy four Cash in Stock at this day which We found absolutely necessary to keep to answer the immediate occasions of the Garrison before the striking of the ballance this day, We just a Supply [*sic*] to Camp of Eighteen thousand (18000) Rupees & Three thousand (3000) Pagodas.

In Our last Letter We acquainted Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. that We should Strictly Comply with Your Orders in not purchasing or Supplying any Stores but what were immediately wanted in Garrison, but We are now to Acquaint You that Major Kinneer has Address'd the Board by Letter, wherein he gives us his opinion (of a request of Captain Clarkes for Twenty Barrells of the best Europe Gunpowder we have) that it is absolutely necessary for the good of the Service to supply him immediately with it, whereupon we have taken upon us to send it to him & beg to know if for the future We may be permitted to do the Same on Emergencies of the like Nature.

The Military Paymaster's Accounts fully drawn out for May & June We now forward to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. his Account's to Ultimo July will be finish'd in a Couple of days when that Account Current shall be likewise transmitted.

Ultimo We likewise Enclose the Account of King's Stores, which from time to time have been Issued out since the Year 1749. also the list of such as now remain under the Care of the Quarter Master, The Account of those which have been sent up to Fort St. George belonging to the Honble Company (and for which No Invoice have been made out) we also forward, & both to these and those left by Mr. Boscawen the prices have been affix'd to such as we have already had the like of; the reason that some are not charged is owing to our never having had any such before and that we know not how to rate them at their true Value, but we hope they can be charged properly at your Presidency & so soon as We receive the Accounts, We shall give due Credit for them.

We are in want of such Stores as we now Enclose Indents for, and beg your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. Compliance therewith.

In our Letter to Your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. of the 10<sup>th</sup>. Inst. we then informd you of the several appointments we had made, we are now to acquaint You that Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Greenslate & Smith being return'd from the Field, and requesting to be Employ'd again in the Civil Branch of our Honble Masters Business We have Station'd them this Day, the former under the Accountant, and the latter under the Military Storekeeper and as Mr. Calland by your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. permission has left this place, We have thought proper to put Mr. Mansel in his Room in the Secretary's Office. & the Accountant's Business being very extensive We have nam'd Mr. John Carey to be likewise an Assistant to Mr. Cooke continuing him clerk of the Market. Mr. Charles Saunders remains in the Secretary's Office & we have appointed him Steward of the Garrison, Mr. Browning is under the Storekeeper & Register of the Choultry. Mr. John Starke we have station'd under the Paymaster & Mr. Newton to Assist the Warehousekeeper, We hope these several Appointments will meet with your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. approbation.

We are sorry it is not in our power to supply Your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. with the Things you desir'd us to send You, in your favour of the 17<sup>th</sup>. Inst; We have only two Sett of Weights and two Beams, there are no Scales in Store, or have we any Wooden Horses that can be spar'd & as for Desk's the Number of Assistants Your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. have been so kind as to send us, are more than we can Employ untill we have Desks made for them as there are very few here, If you think the two large ones, that are in the Accountant's & Secretary's Office can be of any Service We shall send them to Madrass so soon as Opportunity Offers, & we rec<sup>e</sup>. Your Honour &<sup>ca</sup>. Directions to that Purpose.

The Deputy Governour acquaints us that he has been out at Camp to pay a Visit to the Nabob, & that when there in Conference with him & Major

Lawrence, the Scheme was laid for attacking the Enemy on the 26<sup>th</sup>. in the Morning, which with the utmost Satisfaction we now inform Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. has succeeded almost to surpass our Hopes, We beg leave to congratulate You there upon & to assure You that no care of ours shall be wanting for the good of the Service, during the Camps remaining so near us as it yet is.

The Nabob has come in here this Day in order to communicate something of consequence he had to acquaint the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. with. We thought upon this Occasion it was proper to make him a present, which accordingly was done to the Amount of 360 Pagodas & which we hope Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will not be displeas'd at.

Our Ballance of Cash this Day being only 8996 Pags<sup>s</sup>. we beg leave to represent to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. the great Want We are in of a large Supply the more especially as at this Place, we cannot have any Dependence in getting Money on Bills, Our Investment will at least require a Sum of thirty thousand Pagodas to carry it on agreeable to what we have reason to expect from the Merchants if we encourage them by a large advance, Irshapa Chitty & Cawn Moodely have represented to Us this Day, that if we did not give them some small Sum to help their Weavers, they were very Apprehensive they would run away. We therefore advanc'd them four thousand Rupees each; A ready Compliance from your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. with this our request, we believe will be of great Service, We are likewise to represent to You the large Demands we have from the Paymaster for the Camp & Garrison Expences. Mr. Pybus Chief of Deve Cotah has also apply'd strongly to us for Money sufficient to pay off all the Arrears of his Factory, We lately sent him two thousand Pagodas, but that he says was immediately paid away; These Several Calls for Money together with the Apprehension we have on the Approach of the Monsoon that it will be difficult to send us any from Fort St. George, oblige us to entreat Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. to think of these our Necessity, and as far as lyes in your Power to assist us speedily with Money, and on our parts we shall endeavour all we can to lay it out only where absolute Necessity requires we should and as much as possible for the Service of our Hon<sup>ble</sup> Masters. WORSHIPFUL, SIR & SIRS

In Pursuance of an Order from the Governour & Council we have made a Survey on the Condition of the House which at present serves for an Hospital at Cuddalore, & find it such that unless it is repaired before the approaching Monsoon setts in, or some other more convenient place appointed for such an use; the people who are there must suffer greatly if not perish thereby: For as this place is entirely built in Clay the Walls are Crack'd in many places & that towards the Street in great Danger of falling, which has occasioned the Roof of Single Tiles to Open and let in the rain at Many Places or rather all over. The floowing [*sic*] or pavement is also very bad, and the Drains which should convey off the nastiness are for the most part stopt up.

Now as it is not improbable but that a Convenient place will hereafter be built for an Hospital We humbly conceive nothing very expensive either in repairs or Additions ought to be added to the present one, as it cannot be allowed fit to receive the one or capable to admit the other not to mention its improper Situation both with respect to Water (a very material Article) and the benefit of breathing a fresh Air.

We therefore humbly conceive that if six Buttresses are Added to Support the outside Wall, the Cracks which are now in it stopt up, the pavement new laid, the Tiles shifted, the Drains clear'd and the Rooms cleaned and white washed, it may perhaps hold the Monsoon out if not two severe [*sic*]. This is

what is most necessary to be done, the sick people being at present exposed to every little shower the Expense of which as nearly as it can be estimated will not exceed One hundred and fifty Pagodas. All which is humbly submitted to your Determination by

The Five thousand Pagodas sent by the Admiral Vernon I have receiv'd, and advanced; and an [*sic*] Concern'd I do not yet hear of the other Ten thousand you was so kind to promise me shortly and in dependance upon which, I encouraged the Merchants to proceed in the Investment, which they chearfully do, so that I shall soon be considerably in debt.

I should be very sorry, should any difference arise in your Province, to occasion any uneasiness to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. or Interrupt that Success your Affairs have so deservedly met with, and which I was in hopes would ere this have enabled you to have fulfilled your former Resolutions of sending some Men to the Northward, and I cannot help thinking my Situation greatly requires some Assistance of that kind. Our Colours have been for a long time past (and now are) hoisted at this Barr, which should denote that the River belongs to us; instead of which the Vessels of all Nations go in, and out without any examination from us, besides that the French have lately thought proper to land some Goods here; (I suppose to see what notice would be taken of it) and If I am not mistaken will hoist their Colours here very soon, which a small number of Men would prevent, and secure to the Company a place w<sup>ch</sup>: with due encouragement would prove as advantageous to them, as any they have this way.

I hope your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. will excuse the freedom with which I have addressed myself, as I think it my Duty to acquaint you with what occurs to my notice in Affairs that so nearly concern our Interest.

I am obliged to your Honour &ca. for the Stores sent by the Admiral Vernon; but I observe there is no Stationary without a Speedy Supply of which I shall be quite destitute. The Brilliant shall not be detained here any longer, than is necessary to load off the Bales.

HIS MAJESTYS GOVERNOUR OF FORT DANSBORG & THE DANISH ETABLISSEMENTS IN INDIA AND HIS COUNCIL FOR AFFAIRS OF THE ROYAL DEENISH ASEATISK COMPANY. AND THOMAS SAUNDERS ESQ<sup>R</sup>. PRESIDENT & GOVERNOUR OF FORT S<sup>T</sup>. GEORGE & ITS DEPENDENCIES ON THE COAST OF CORMANDEL, AND HIS COUNCIL FOR AFFAIRS OF THE HONBLE UNITED ENGLISH EAST INDIA COMPANY.

All Deserters of both Nations whether Soldiers or Sailors shall be reciprocally delivered up on Condition that Pardon be granted them, so that the said Deserters "may meet with no Trouble or Molestation of any" Kind soever on Account of their said Desertion.

Whatever Danish or English Deserters may "be at Fort Dansborg or its Dependencies or at Fort S<sup>T</sup>. George or Place Sub-ordinate thereto the day" that the present Agreement is signed shall faithfully delivered up on both Sides on the Condition Specified in foregoing Article, except those that Deserted before the present Year.

As soon as any Deserters come into Fort Dansborg or its Dependencies, or into Fort S<sup>T</sup>. George or places Subordinate thereto the Governour shall immediately give Notice to the other that he may send after them.

Ultimo for Money, will we hope be of great Service to us & we beg leave to Assure You that we shall Endeavour to dispose of it in such a manner as will be most for the Benefit of our Honble Masters & to your Satisfaction. We shall be frugal as possible of the Stationary Ware in General, & so soon as we have landed the Treasure and Paper from the De La Warr we shall begin to load her with the Bales and Military Stores, and dispatch her to Your Honour & ca. with the utmost Expedition.

In relation to the Kings Stores, Our Military Storekeeper Assures Us, he will Endeavour to compleat that Account, as near as possible to the Directions Your Honour & ca. are pleas'd to give him however he begs leave to acquaint You, that as he is but lately come into this Employ, he is entirely a Stranger to what was left here by Mr. Boscawen, not having any General List of them, but a confused Memorandum Acct. We are now to acknowledge the Receipt of Your Honour &cas. Favours under the following Dates Viz<sup>t</sup>. the 26<sup>th</sup>. June ⌘ Godolphin, the 12<sup>th</sup>. of July ⌘ Colchester, and the 15<sup>th</sup>. Ditto ⌘ Brilliant.

The Supplies of Bullian forwarded by those Ships, on weighing off were Deficient as follows, 2 Ounces of Bullian ⌘ Godolphin, 1 Ounce of Bullian, 5 Madrass Rupees & 1 Arcot Rupee ⌘ Colchester.

By the Alterations the Honble the Court of Directors have thought proper to order here, the Government, has devolved to the Honble William Fytche Esq<sup>r</sup>.

Under Date the 30<sup>th</sup>. April, We wrote you that we intended to send a Ship to your Presidency in August, with what Saltpetre you might indent for, but We are sorry to observe your Honour &ca. that We are apprehensive it will be impracticable for us to Comply therewith, The Wager not being arrived from Bombay, and the Commanders of the other ships that are here, having reported their Conditions as follows.

Captain Drake acquainted us that the Durrington is now on her fourth and last Voyage; that she has been 13 Months off the Ground, and he thinks it unsafe for her to return to Europe without seeing her Bottom.

Captain Hutchinson informed us that there is a Deal of Work to be done to his Ship the Godolphin, for he imagines his false Keel is knocked Athwart from the Cables Sweeping the Ships Bottom forward; so that he could not have his Anchors up and he apprehends that some of his Floor Timbers, are broke, from the Violence of her thumping on Ingellee Sand.

Captain Manwairing told us his Ship the Colchester is tight, makes no Water, and he does not Imagine she is Damaged, but as she has been ashore it is the Opinion of our Master Attendant that she ought not to return to Europe untill she is hove down, to see her Bottom.

We have delivered Captain Drake a Protest & shall likewise Protest against Captains Hutchinson, and Mainwairing if they do not get their Ships ready in time which they have both promised they will indeavour to do but are affraid it will be impracticable, on which Account. We are of Opinion, that your Honour &ca. had better detain either the Chesterfield, Oxford, or Bombay Castle, to be Dispatched Home from your Presidency in September, should any of those Ships arrive with you in time for that Purpose.

We shall direct our Master Attendant to give the Brilliant, all necessary Repairs, as soon as the Red Wood by her is Landed and then Dispatch her agreeable to your Honour &c<sup>as</sup>. Request.

Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will please to take Notice We have thought proper to lower the Batta on Arcot Rupees to 8 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> Cent.

We Congratulate your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. on the Success of your Arms, and are to acquaint you that this Province, is now in Peace, and that we are not at Present free from Troubles with the Country Government.

WORSHIPFULL SIR

According to Your Desire, I came here last Night, and this Morning have inspected the Condition of the Fort of Trivity, where I find several Doors & Locks are wanting, especially Cross Barrs and Bolts for the Gates, which are now without either, and liable to be Opened by every Person in the Garrison, not only to make their own Escape, but even to let in an Enemy. The Magazine where all the Ammunition is lodged has nothing to secure it which deserves the name of Door or Lock, nor is there a place to confine the Prisoners, should any Attempt be made to release them, Proper remedies for these, I humbly conceive must, at least ought immediately to be taken.

The round Towers instead of Bastions have a second solid Tower or Cava-tier within them, which being elevated at a great Height, is much expos'd to an Enemy, nor is there any Cover for the people, who should work the Guns, but they must fight on equal Terms, with those who may attack them, nay rather at a greater disadvantage being more conspicuous & at a greater height. These Cavatiers by your Approbation, I propose levelling, whose Earth will raise a good parapet to the Towers, make them more spacious by being remov'd. and secure the people who are to defend them. The Rampart too or Bank of Earth



within is in many places very weak & tumbled down, & will render a Breach very practicable if not repair'd, & to the French sooner than others; who I dont doubt are well acquainted with its Weakest part, having had possession of this place so long. The Expence of all this will not I conceive if properly manag'd exceed 800 Pagodas, a Sum so inconsiderable when compared with the necessity of having it done, as ought not in my Opinion to be regarded.

If Sir, You are pleas'd to consent that the whole or any part of this should be undertaken, please to let a Meestry & 10 Bricklayers be sent here, together with 10 Tank diggers, That I may give the necessary Orders to proceed before I return. Cooleys can be procur'd here & I have wrote to the Head Bricklayer what Tools will be necessary to send. All which is humbly submitted to your Determination by

We now dispatch Our Honble Masters Ship De La Warr to Your presidency, having compleated Loading her, She has taken in Five hundred Bales of Calicoes, & the Military Stores Your Honour & C<sup>A</sup>. were pleas'd to send us a List of; The Rains & Gloomy Weather together with the small Number of Boats we have here, has occasion'd the ships remaining so long with Us. Nevertheless as we found great delays in the Boats returning from the Ship, and upon an Enquiry being made into the reason of it, the Boat fellows pleading that many of them, had been detain'd on board so late at Night as to prevent their being of any Use the succeeding Day, we judg'd it necessary in Consultation on Monday last, to send the Captain an Order by the Secretary, requiring him to give his Officers directions to make greater Dispatch; In Consequence of which we rec<sup>d</sup>. the Enclosed Answer, which being wrote not only in a very Extraord<sup>ry</sup>. Stile, but also taking upon him to Affirm, That the Bales he was to receive were put packing up that Morning, We must beg leave to refer the truth thereof to Your Honour & C<sup>A</sup>. who cannot but be well Acquainted, by the List of Cloth on hand for so long past, That tho' we had been a Sorting white Cloth, It was not from any want we were in of Bales to load her, but for the Carrying on of our Current Business, Nutwithstanding [sic] Cap<sup>t</sup>. Dominicus had been so ready, to make a handle of it to screen the Neglect of his own Officers: Upon the whole we cannot but express our Resentment at the disrespectfull behaviour he has shown us; We enclose Invoice and Bill of Lading for what we have sent on Her.

Agreeable to Your Honour & C<sup>as</sup>. Directions, we likewise send the Coffree Women, & the Two large Desks, The Ship could not take in the Wooden Horses, The Number of Coffree Women are Thirteen. There were Twenty in all, but seven of them being Married to Men of their own Country, That are in the Military here, and behav'd very well. but who absolutely refused to serve any Longer, were they deprived of their Wives, we have thought proper to detain them, but at the same time should not this meet with Your Approbation, we are ready to obey Your Orders in sending them to Madrass. One Coffree Man

having behaved exceedingly Ill here & being a long time Confin'd in Irons, without any Appearance of Amendment, we now send him with the rest for Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. to dispose of him as You think proper & are with Respect.

In pursuance of the Governour's Desire we have examined the present condition of the Mettoos or Peons Guard Houses round the Bound Hedge. and find them for the most part either entirely ruined or abandoned by reason of the bad repair they are in, we have also examin'd the place, where partys of Seapoys are posted, and find they have nothing at many of their posts, to protect them from the inclemency of the weather excepts Tents, which are not only insufficient to keep their arms dry, but are constantly blown down and torn to pieces by the Wind, which may reasonably be expected still more severe in the Approaching Monsoon, and therefore we humbly conceive, that in order to remedy these inconveniencys, and more effectually prevent any persons escape in future, proper Guard Houses should be built at severall places on the Peniar River, where it is most likely to be fordable, Such as at the Bar, at a Small Village call'd Applywady, and near the rows of Trees leading to Horsetail point, almost opposite an old out Guard called Condapah Guard, which being very ill situated on the wrong side of the River and at present in a ruinous Condition, will by being taken down, afford Bricks for Erecting the new places now propos'd, There is also a place for a Guard of Seapoys wanting at the powder House there, these at present having only a Tent to Cover them & their Arms, which must inevitably be render'd unfit for immediat Service after a very hard Shower of rain, Not to mention how ready these people are to quit their post, and seek for shelter, even when it has but the Appearance of rain, and as any accident happening to this place may prove of Mischievous Consequence, it deserves to be particularly attended to. The Expense of Erecting these new Guards repairing the old ones, and Mettoos, may we conceive amount to 500 Pagodas, if done in such a manner as shall last some Years all which is humbly Submitted to your determination by

As the Powder lately sent to Camp for the use of the Artillery has been return'd as unfit for Service I have been desired by Major Lawrence to examine & prove the different sorts of Powder now in the Garrison of Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David but thinking it my Duty to Represent the same to You I have taken the liberty to acquaint You with my Observations thereon & to send inclosed a Copy of the Tryals I have made.

The method of proving this Powder is with a Royal Mortar & 5½ Inch shell, filled with a Composition equal in Weight to the quantity of Powder sufficient to burst it, & Plug drove instead of a Fuse. Now by a Medium taken of Severall Ranges formerly made both in Europe & here, I find that 3 Oz. of Powder, if good ought throw a 5½ Inch shell from a Royall Mortar about 410 Yards, but I believe the Powder then used was first dryed so that I conceive an allowance of 20 or 30 Yards should at least be made for that Advantage. When that allowance is made you will please to Observe that the French Powder falls very little short of this proportion whilst very little of ours either Country or otherwise exceeds the half thereof. You will also please to Observe that 1 oz ½ half of the French Powder throws 123 Yards & 2 oz 210 Yards a Range which little or none of Ours exceeds w<sup>ch</sup>. 3 Oz and consequently in an expense of 600 Barrels of Powder on our side the French need used but 400 to keep an equal Fire.

Of the French Powder we have only 33 Barrels which I have opened, find dry & in good Condition of the other Sorts, all which I have also open'd & Examined there is as follows:—

PORTFIELD 19 Barrels & Pistol 6 Barrels, This was first mostly in Cags ½ & ½ Barrels caked very hard together by having been a long time unmoved; 30 Cags more wet as mud & entirely ruined which I have laid aside for condemnation.

GRIFFINS 8 Barrels very dry & Seemingly good.

PRINCESS MARY 43 Barrels dry but the Grains are Cover'd with Salt Petre on the outside from which I imagine it is extracted & has left the inside of the Grains little else but Sulphur & Charcoal.

AUGUSTUS 9 Barrels in the Same Manner.

I shall Continue to examine the rest when the weather permits till all is finished, & shall from time to time acquaint You with the result, taking strict care to Observe all such directions as You shall think proper to give on this head to.

We beg leave to Assure You, that there was no Neglect of our Military Storekeeper in not making the Prices of the several Articles left Unvalued. As he used all his Endeavours to come at the knowledge of their true worth but could [not get]

any Information, that could be satisfactory to Your [Honour] The Sum of 24500 Pags. which he makes the 4900 Turnpickesticks amount to, is only in proportion to 30 of the like charg'd at 150 Pags. in the List of Stores sent us & De La Warr. Yet in obedience to your Commands, a Committee is Appointed for Inspecting the whole Amount, & it shall be settled as much as possible to your Satisfaction.

It is a Great Satisfaction to us to Observe that our determination in regard to the Cloth which has been return'd to the Merchants meets with your Approbation We were then very Sensible it would have been more agreeable to you, could it have been Executed with greater Mildness, and for that reason Indulg'd them many days to take it away, but finding they shew'd no Sign of regard to our Orders in all the time, and then persisting at a Second Consultation in an obstinate refusal, We thought Ourselves Constrain'd to be Quite Peremptory with them and more Especially as there was Immediate Occasion for setting their Accounts for the drawing out our Account of Quick Stock which has been since sent You.

By the Sloop George who imported here the 5<sup>th</sup>. I was favour'd with Yours of the 16<sup>th</sup>. Ult<sup>o</sup>. enclosing Invoice of Packing Stuff Laden on Her, which turns out right, I shall take particular care and Dispatch my Bales to You as soon as Possible in December.

Some time since a Vessell that was Attachd by Mr. Hallyburton in the Year 1746 for a Debt, was Consignd me, with Directions not to deliver Her till the Owner had Satisfied the Executors of Mr. Hallyburton and other persons Concernd which He being Unable to perform, I sent Her to Yanam belonging to the French in this River as being much the properest place to Secure her in, Declaring Her at the same time to be English Property, but to my great Surprise on the 16<sup>th</sup>. August being Sunday I Perceiv'd French Colours hoisted on board Her, I immediately applyd to the Person who has the Charge of that place (being a Braminy) to know His reason for His Acting in so illegal manner in hoisting His Colours on board a Vessell He and every one knew was English Property & Demanded him immediately to haul them down, Which He refus'd to do, alledging, He had receivd Orders from the Chief & Council of Mazuliapatam for what He had done and could not therefore comply with my Demand, Being Sensible that the Striking the Colours of another Nation was as Unwarrantable Act. I stayd till the next day, when I sent Lieutenant Grant and some Men and brought Her from thence at which time there was no Colours flying on board her, and a few Days ago I receivd a Lre from the Chief and Council of Mazuliapatam regarding it, Copy of which with my Answer thereto You have Enclosd.

I should 'ere this have replyd to Your Letter of the 13<sup>th</sup>. October that You did me the Honour to write Me had I not been Obliged to send the same to Vizagapatam for a Translation.

I am greatly Surprized at what You say the Braminy (whom You interro- gated in the Affair) Alledges of my having Seized a Vessell in Your Port of Yanam, for had he been a Person that paid the least regard to Truth, He would not have said I Seized the Vessell (unless taking care of my Property, may be termd such) or struck the Colours of Your Nation, which were not flying when I sent some of my People to secure her against the Lawless Attempts of Your Substitutes, who were Endeavouring to rest her from me. My Property I call her as it is well known to every one, that She has been in the Possession of the English ever since the Year 1746 when She was Attachd for a Debt due to Mr. Hallyburton (sometime since Resident for the English Company at Maddapollam) from Cunshum Connah Her Owner who is dead, & when She had Worked out the same was to be returned, but that not being Accomplishd, she was Consignd to me last April, at which time not having so proper a Port as Yours at Yanam I sent her thither declaring Her to belong to the English, to which the aforesaid Braminy paid no regard, for without my Previous knowledge He hoisted the Colours of your Nation on board, And when I demanded the reason of his acting in so illegal a manner in Seizing a Vessell He was sensible belonged to the English, and required him to haul them down He replyed He acted According to Your Instructions, and could not in the least deviate from them, All which being Maturely Consider'd I cannot conceive Gentlemen how You can in any Shape pretend to say You are any way Aggrieved or Alledge, I have Acted in an Unwarrantable Manner or infringed the Treaty at present Subsisting between Our Respective Monarchs, And give me leave to say that if any one had reason to Complain it was Myself which I imagine You are Conscious of by Your having Discharged the aforesaid Person from Your Service, I am with truth

before Charged to the heads of Charges Garrison and Charges Extraordinary relating to him since the 1<sup>st</sup>. of May was then properly adjusted as Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will observe in his Acco<sup>t</sup>. Curr<sup>t</sup>. lately sent You.

TRANSLATED FROM THE DUTCH.

A Narrative made and respectfully declared before the Worshipfull Commandant Casparus de Jeng, by the Second Mate of the English Companys Ship Dela War, by name John Canham Underwod. That the Relator being with the said Ship at Anchor in Madras Road a Violent Storm happen'd there the 1<sup>st</sup>. Instant about Eight o'Clock at Night whereby (as the Tempest encreased) he lost his Foremast about half an hour after one, and the Main and Mizen Masts at two o'Clock in the Morning at which time he was drove from his Anchors out to Sea nor was it possible for the Relator to fetch Madrass again by reason of a Contrary Wind and Current and therefore found himself obliged to stand away for this place, altho his Captain, Chief mate, & [ . . . ] Surgeon

were ashore at the said place, and he further declares that at the time the said Accident happen'd, there were then Riding at Anchor in Madrass Road Five or Six private Ships and one of the English Company's Ships which last was fully laden to be dispatch'd to Europe but that he cannot say whether any Accident happen'd to the said Ship or not.
