Preface

This is something more than a Report of the work of a Socialist Organisation. The excuse for writing this pamphlet is that the five years' life of the Bureau has happened to coincide with perhaps the most formative and interesting period in the history of British colonial policy. The story of our own problems and struggles reflects the problems and struggles in the whole field of colonial policy during these past years. Not only that—the Bureau is the main organisation within the Labour Party devoting itself at this time to the regular and detailed study of colonial affairs. Working within the tradition of the Party, and drawing on the inspiration of a long history of socialist thought on questions of imperialism, it has itself contributed powerfully in the formulation of the Party's attitude towards the problems of the new era opening up in colonial policy. With the Labour Government now in office, the policies worked out by the Bureau become of much more than parochial interest—they are, indeed, the policies to which we hope the Government's action will approximate.

This pamphlet is an attempt to put the work of the Bureau in its historical setting, to discuss with frankness the difficulties which this work has posed to us as Socialists, and to make clear the basic attitudes which determine our approach to the complex issues bound up in "the colonial problem" today.

NOTE This pamphlet, like all publications of the Fabian Society, represents not the collective view of the Society but only the view of the individuals who prepared it. The responsibility of the Fabian Society is limited to approving the publications which it issues as embodying facts and opinions worthy of consideration within the Labour Movement. It is the aim of the Society to encourage among socialists a high standard of free and independent research.
