# REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY FOR THE YEAR 1916.

#### PRELIMINARY REMARKS.

The area and population of the territories to which the Report relates are shown in the following table:—

- 2. During the year under report there were few variations in the constitution and jurisdiction of the Civil Courts in the Presidency. The Subordinate Courts of Kaira and Kapadvanj were dislinked from the 1st October 1916 and the Subordinate Courts of Kaira and Dohad were linked together from the same date. The Subordinate Court of Vagra which was linked with that of Ankleshvar with effect from the 1st October 1913 was dislinked from the 7th February 1916. Sixteen villages which had been heretofore included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Chiplun in the Ratnagiri District, were excluded therefrom and included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Devrukh in the same district with effect from 1st April 1916. The Subordinate Court at Khatav in the Satara district was abolished from the 10th June 1916 and the villages of the Khatav taluka were redistributed between the Subordinate Courts at Rahimatpur and Dahiwadi in the same district.
- 3. The High Court was presided over by the Honourable Sir Basil Scott, Knight, from 1st January to 31st July and from 17th September to 31st December 1916. His Lordship was on deputation from 1st August to 16th September 1916. During this period the Honourable Sir Stanley L. Batchelor, Knight, acted as Chief Justice.

#### Puisne Judges.

The Honourable Sir Stanley L. Batchelor, Knight, from 1st January to 31st July and from 17th September to 31st December 1916. His Lordship acted as Chief Justice from 1st August to 16th September 1916.

The Honourable Sir Dinshah D. Davar, Knight, from 1st January to 5th January and from 6th February to 11th June 1916. His Lordship was on privilege leave from 6th January to 5th February 1916, and on furlough from 12th June to 29th July 1916, the date of his demise.

The Honourable Sir Frank Clement Offley Beaman, Knight, from 1st January to 16th March and from 17th April to 31st December 1916. His Lordship was on privilege leave from 17th March to 16th April 1916.

The Honourable Sir Joseph John Heaton, Knight, from 1st January to 31st December 1916.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Macleod from 1st January to 11th June and from 12th July to 31st December 1916. His Lordship was on privilege leave from 12th June to 11th July 1916.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Shah from 1st January to 31st December 1916.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Kemp officiated as a Judge of the High Court from 12th June to 3rd December 1916.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Kajiji officiated as a Judge of the High Court from 1st August to 16th September 1916.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Marten was a Judge of the High Court from 4th to 31st December 1916.

- 4. In the Presidency proper there were on the 31st December 1916-
  - 15 District Judges,
    - 2 Joint Judges,
    - 9 Assistant Judges,
    - 8 Small Cause Court Judges (including those at the Presidency Town), besides the Cantonment Magistrates at Belgaum, Ahmednagar and Ahmedabad and the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Bombay, Poona and Nadiad, who are also invested will Small Cause Court powers,
  - 21 First Class Subordinate Judges (excluding two Inspecting First Class Subordinate Judges, who do not exercise judicial powers),
  - 101 Second Class Subordinate Judges (excluding two Inspecting Second Class Subordinate Judges, who do not exercise judicial powers).
- 5. Besides the above Judicial Officers, there were during the year under report 5 Inamdars and Jahagirdars exercising powers of Subordinate Judges under Regulation XIII of 1830.
- 6. In the Province of Sind, there were, on the 31st December 1916, besides the Judicial Commissioner,—
  - 2 Additional Judicial Commissioners,
  - 3 District Judges,
  - 1 Joint Judge,
  - 2 Assistant Judges,
  - 2 Small Cause Court Judges (besides the Cantonment Magistrate at Karachi exercising civil powers, and the Registrar of the Small Cause Court, Karachi),
  - 3 First Class Subordinate Judges,
  - 12 Second Class Subordinate Judges.
- 7. As regards the working of the Dekkhan Agriculturists' Relief Act, the District Judge of Kanara observes that he has no special remarks to make on the working of the Act. He however agrees with his predecessor's view expressed in the last year's report that the Act is not really required in the District, that agriculturists are mostly astute Brahmins well able to look after themselves and that the provisions of the Act regarding instalments are made use of to avoid prompt payments of just debts.

The District Judge of Poona reports that he has nothing to add to the remarks on the Dekkhan Agriculturists' Relief Act contained in his last year's report. He agrees with the opinion of the Subordinate Judge of Haveli and Vadgaon that section 10A of the Act should be amended, if not repealed, at an early date. The Subordinate Judge thinks that the practice of taking sale deeds in lieu of mortgage deeds has become a notorious one and the section serves the purpose for which it was enacted. He is however of opinion that the introduction of the section tends to create uncertainty of title, which is a greater evil and should be eradicated as soon as possible and the section effaced from the Statute book after giving sufficient notice to the people concerned.

The District Judge of Nasik observes that the provisions of the Dekkhan Agriculturists' Relief Act are widely known to, and fully utilized by, the agriculturists generally and that there are no Village Munsiffs appointed in the District.

The District Judges of Broach and Surat report that the working of the Act appears to be satisfactory.

The District Judges of Ahmedabad, Ahmednagar, Belgaum, Bijapur, Dharwar, Khandesh, Ratnagiri, Satara, Sholapur and Thana have made no special remarks on the working of the Act.

#### THE ANNUAL STATEMENTS.

- 8. In accordance with letter No. 1446-1448, dated the 18th September 1905, from the Government of India to the Government of Bombay this statement is filled up in duplicate—one form for Civil and the other for Criminal work—and the statistics for Revenue Courts are excluded from it, as also from the other judicial statements.
- 9. The total number of civil cases decided during the year under report was 340,351 as against 337,569 in the last year, showing an increase of 2,782. The decrease is to be noticed in appeal cases. On the other hand there is an increase in the number of regular and miscellaneous original suits.
- 10. Of the total number of decided cases 48.6 per cent. were regular suits, 49.4 per cent. miscellaneous cases, and 2 per cent. appeals, as against 48.9, 48.8 and 2.3 per cent. respectively during the year 1915.
- 11. The total receipts of all the Courts (Civil and Criminal) have risen from Rs. 53,83,924 to Rs. 53,61,703 and the total charges have fallen from Rs. 54,04,312 to Rs. 52,06,187. These figures are supplied by the Accountant General, Bombay, in accordance with Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 5042, dated the 11th August 1893.
  - 12. The total number of suits instituted in all the Courts was 165,377 as against 162,417 in the preceding year, showing an increase of 2,960. Last year there was an increase of 473.
- 13. There was an increase of 2,174 in the number of suits for money as compared with the increase of 2,173 last year. There was also an increase in all other kinds of suits except testamentary suits, which showed a slight decrease.
- 14. The percentage of suits for money or moveable property fell slightly from 83.9 to 83.7 and that of suits relating to immoveable property (including mortgage and pre-emption suits) remained the same as last year, viz. 11.6; the percentage of all other kinds of suits was 4.7 as compared with 4.5 last year.
- 15. The aggregate value of suits rose from Rs. 5,40,58,877 to Rs. 6,41,90,856. There was a decrease of 493, 379, and 19 respectively in the number of suits not exceeding Rs. 10 and 50 and those exceeding Rs. 10,000; while all other kinds of suits, i. e., those not exceeding in value Rs. 100, 500, 1,000, 5,000 and 10,000, as also those the value of which could not be estimated in money showed an increase.
- 16. The Unpaid Tribunals, the District Courts and the Superior Courts showed a decrease in the value of suits instituted during the year, while all the rest showed an increase. The increase is most marked in the paid Sub-Divisional Tribunals and the Presidency Small Cause Courts, where the value of suits instituted rose from Rs. 2,87,68,025 and Rs. 55,66,444 to Rs. 4,17,63,239 and Rs. 57,93,237 respectively.
- 17. There were 222,021 suits for disposal before all the Courts, out of which 165,553 were disposed of, leaving a balance of 56,468 pending at the close of the year. The corresponding figures for the last year were 220,163, 165,255 and 54,908.

19. Of the total number of suits disposed of after contest and on reference to Arbitration, judgment was given for plaintiff in whole or in part in 85.8 per cent. and for the defendant in 14.2 per cent. of cases.

20. The average duration of contested suits fell from 213 to 194 days in the year under report and of uncontested suits from 89 to 88 days. The corresponding figures for 1913 and 1914, respectively, were 210 and 191 for contested and 95 and 101 for uncontested suits. In the District Courts the average duration was 394 days for contested and 196 for uncontested suits as against 395 and 229 respectively in the preceding year. In the Mofussil Subordinate Courts the average duration was 212 days for contested and 99 for uncontested suits as against 240 and 105 respectively in the previous year. In the Superior Courts the average duration was 327 days for contested and 365 for uncontested suits as against 336 and 369 respectively in the preceding year.

22. In addition to the regular suits mentioned above, the Courts disposed of 19,215 miscellaneous cases as against 17,172 during the previous year. The percentage of contested miscellaneous cases to the total of cases of all kinds was 26.3 and the average duration of such cases was 82 days as against 78 days in the preceding year.

24. The First Class Subordinate Judges and Small Cause Court Judges invested with Appellate powers disposed of 285 appeals as against 855 last year. They were for the most part engaged in trying original suits.

25. Of the total number of appeals decided, 1,510 were dismissed under Order XLI, rule 11, Civil Procedure Code, or for default or were otherwise not prosecuted. Excluding the 2 transferred to another Presidency, the disposal of the remaining 5,018 may be classified as under:—

- 26. The average duration of appeals was 353 days as against 364 last year.
- 27. There was a decrease in the institutions and the disposals of miscelstatement No. x, Part II. laneous appeals, the figures being 312 and 318 as against 366 and 341 respectively last year. The average duration of these appeals was 175 days as against 154 in the previous year.
  - 28. As regards applications for execution the following table shows the figures for the year under report as compared with those in 1915:—

- 29. Out of the total number of applications for execution disposed of, 517 were disposed of by transfer. In 33,275 satisfaction was obtained in full and in 35,767 in part, while 78,542 proved wholly infructuous. The percentages of the last three heads of disposal remain the same as last year, viz., 23, 24 and 53.
- 30. The total amount realized in execution came to Rs. 89,05,504 as against Rs. 80,69,631 last year.
- 31. The number of cases in which the judgment-debtor was imprisoned was 775 as against 1,090 last year, and of those in which immoveable property was sold was 3,102 as against 3,262 in the preceding year.
- 32. As against 7.75 persons imprisoned in execution of decrees, the number of persons arrested but released without imprisonment was 3,617.
  - 33. The number of applications for declaration of insolvency was 1,090 out of which 631 were disposed of. Of these 77 were withdrawn, 433 were granted and 121 rejected.

#### General Remarks.

- 34. The congestion of the civil files was partially dealt with by the appointment of Additional First Class Subordinate Judges at Ahmedabad, Dhulia, Poona, Satara, Sholapur and Surat and by the deputation or appointment of Joint or Additional Second Class Subordinate Judges to the following places during the whole or part of the year under report, viz., Ahmedabad, Godhra, Nadiad, Ahmednagar, Sangamner, Rahuri and Kopargaon, Shevgaon, Belgaum, Gokak, Bijapur, Bagalkot, Muddebihal, Broach, Dharwar, Haveri, Hubli, Karwar, Dhulia, Jalgaon, Yawal, Nasik, Pimpalgaon, Yeola, Poona, Haveli, Chiplun, Devgad, Malvan, Rajapur, Satara, Islampur, Karad, Patan Sholapur, Barsi, Sangola, Surat, Bulsar, Thana and Mahad.
- 35. The District or Assistant Judges or Inspecting ubordinate Judges of Ahmedabad, Ahmedagar, Belgaum, Bijapur, Broach, Dharwar, Kanara, Khandesh, Nasik, Poona, Ratnagiri, Satara, Sholapur, Surat and Thana inspected in all 54 Subordinate Judges' Courts during the year under report.
- 36. The District Judges of Ahmedabad, Ahmedagar, Bijapur, Broach, Kanara, Nasik and Thana assembled judicial conferences of the Judges subordinate to them, where points touching the practice and procedure of Civil Courts were discussed.
- 37. The record rooms and libraries are reported by all District Judges to be in good order. The destruction of useless records is carried out periodically in accordance with the rules framed by the High Court.

#### PRELIMINARY REMARKS.

- 1. The Report relates to the Administration of Criminal Justice in all the Courts (including the Courts of the Presidency Magistrates) in the Bombay Presidency proper and in the Province of Sind.
- 2. The area and population of the above territories are the same as those given at page 1.
- In the Presidency proper there were on the 31st December 1916, besides the Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges of the High Court,-

15 Sessions Judges,

- 6 Additional Sessions Judges,
- 5 Assistant Sessions Judges,

- 19 District Magistrates,4 Presidency Magistrates,
- 280 First Class Magistrates,
- 311 Second Class Magistrates,
- 264 Third Class Magistrates,
- 219 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889.

In addition to the above, the number of Police Patels in the Presidency exercising powers under section 14 of the Village Police Act, VIII of 1867, was 21,483. Out of these, 361 have also been invested with powers under section 15 of the said Act.

#### THE ANNUAL STATEMENTS.

- 6. The total number of Criminal cases disposed of during the year under report was 170,444 as compared with 156,805 in the last year, showing an increase of 13,639. Of the total number of decided cases, 96.7 per cent. were original cases and 3.3 per cent. were cases in appeal and revision. The percentages for the previous year were 96 and 4.
- 7. The total number of offences reported during the year was 173,149 as statement No. II. compared with 161,053 in the last year showing an increase of 12,096. The number of cases returned as true was 166,072 or 95 9 per cent. of the total number of offences reported, the rest being cases dismissed under section 203, Criminal Procedure Code, or cases in which the charge was declared to be false.
- 8. Of the total number of cases returned as true about 29.9 per cent. were under the Indian Penal Code and the rest under Special and Local Laws. Cases under the Indian Penal Code related chiefly to offences of hurt, criminal force and assault, theft, criminal breach of trust, mischief, criminal trespass, criminal intimidation, insult and annoyance, and offences relating to marriage. The principal cases under Special and Local Laws related to offences under the Breaches of Contract Act, Cantonment Act, Cattle Trespass. Act, Criminal Procedure Code, Forest Act, Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, Abkari Act, City of Bombay Police Act, District Police Acts, Bombay and District Municipal Acts, Public Conveyance Act and Village Police Act.
- 9. Among the offences returned as true, there was 1 offence against the State. There was no offence either against the Army and Navy or under the Official Secrets Act.

- 20. The total number of European British Subjects whose cases were disposed of during the year under report fell from 572 to 564. Of these 201 or 35.6 per cent. were charged with offences under the Indian Penal Code and 363 or 64.4 per cent. under Special and Local Laws. The charges under the Indian Penal Code related chiefly to hurt, criminal force and assault, theft, cheating and criminal intimidation, insult and annoyance.
- 21. Out of the 564 persons whose cases were disposed of, 339 were convicted and 225 acquitted or discharged. The cases of 561 were disposed of by Magistrates and of 3 by the Courts of Session. In the case of 80 persons the deciding Magistrate was a European British Subject and in the case of 481 persons he was other than a European British Subject. In the case of 3 persons whose cases were disposed of by the Courts of Session, the Sessions Judge was a European British Subject. No accused person claimed to be tried by a mixed jury under sections 450 or 451 of the Criminal Procedure Code.
  - 22. There were 4,275 miscellaneous cases before the Courts involving 7,809 persons, of whom 26 per cent. were discharged, 69.4 per cent. were convicted and the cases of 4.6 per cent. were pending.
- 23. There was a material increase in the number of persons involved in proceedings under Chapter VIII, requiring security for good behaviour, under Chapter XII for possession, under Chapter XX for frivolous and vexatious accusations and under Chapter XXIII for non-attendance of jurors or assessors; and a marked decrease in the number of persons involved in proceedings under Chapter VIII for preventing breach of the peace, under Chapter X, against local nuisances and under Chapter XLII for forfeiture of bail or recognizance.
- 24. The number of original regular cases disposed of during the year was 162,108 as against 147,515 in the last year. Of these 158,546 were disposed of by Magistrates, 2,504 by Village Officers and Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards, and 1,058 by Courts of Session and Superior Courts.
- 25. Of the total number of persons convicted, 34·1 per cent. were convicted on regular and 65·9 per cent. on summary trial. The percentages of the last year were 37·9 and 62·1 respectively.
- 26. The number of youthful offenders dealt with under section 31 of Act VIII of 1897 was 234 as against 160 in the previous year. The number of persons released on probation under section 562 of the Criminal Procedure Code was 1,346 as against 1,376 in the preceding year.

- 29. The total amount of fines imposed rose from Rs. 6,61,480 to Rs. 7,22,418 and that of fines realized rose from Rs. 5,59,339 to Rs. 6,55,752.
- 30. Out of 1,069 the total number of whoppings inflicted, 804 were in lieu of other punishments (735 being on first conviction and 69 on re-conviction), 10 were in addition to other punishments and 255 were inflicted on juveniles for offences other than those specified in Parts I and II of Statement No. V-A.
- 31. The percentage of whippings on the total number of all punishments was 12.7 as compared with 10.96 in the preceding year. In the majority of cases whipping was inflicted for offences of theft, the number of stripes being most commonly 5 to 10.

# REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL AND CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PROVINCE OF SIND FOR THE YEAR 1916.

#### PRELIMINARY REMARKS.

- 1. The Court of the Judicial Commissioner was presided over by Mr. E. M. Pratt, I. C. S., from 1st January to 25th May 1916 and again from 23rd October to 31st December 1916 and by Mr. M. H. W. Hayward, LL.B. (Cantab.), Bar.-at-Law, I. C. S., from 26th May to 22nd October 1916.

The Judicial Commissioner deputed Mr. Hayward, Additional Judicial Commissioner, for two months to make the annual tour of inspection of the Courts in Sind, and he inspected the 3 District and Sessions Courts and the 3 First Class Subordinate Civil Courts at Hyderabad, Larkana and Sukkur, 1 Second Class Subordinate Civil Court in the Hyderabad District, 3 Second Class Subordinate Courts in the Sukkur District, and 1 in the Karachi District, as also the Small Cause Court and the Cantonment Small Cause Court, Karachi, besides 41 Magisterial Courts in the different parts of the Province.

The District Judge, Hyderabad, inspected 2 Subordinate Courts in his district, the District Judge, Larkana, inspected 3 Subordinate Courts in his district, and the District Judge, Sukkur, inspected all the Subordinate Courts in his district.

6. A temporary appointment of an Additional Judge, Small Cause Court, Karachi, was created for 6 months from 30th October 1916 on a salary of Rs. 500.

7. A Judicial conference was held by the District Judge, Hyderabad, in the year under report.

8. The Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act is reported to be working satisfactorily in the Province.

9. The total receipts of all the Courts are, according to the figures supplied by the Accountant General, Rs. 5,88,168 and the total charges Rs. 7,52,475 during the year under report, disclosing an excess of Rs. 1,64,307 in the expenditure over receipts.

- 19. Applications for orders for maintenance fell from 125 in 1915 to 118 in the year under report. The orders granted numbered 11.
- 20. The number of individual appeals disposed of in the year under report was 2,091, that is 251 less than in the preceding year. Out of these the sentences were left unaltered in 1,641 cases and were reversed or varied in 440. The sentences were maintained intact in 78.48 per cent. of appeals.

The Criminal Appeals in the Sessions Courts and in the Magistrates' Courts show a decrease of 135 and 117 respectively while those in the Court of the Judicial Commissioner show an increase of 1.

21. During the year under report the cases of 233 persons were examined in revision by the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind (High Court Jurisdiction). The Sessions Courts examined the cases of, 281 and the District Magistrates of 70 persons. The principal results of this revision were that 35 sentences were reversed. In the case of 10 persons, proceedings were quashed and in the case of 45 persons new trials or further inquiries were ordered.

The cases of 38 persons were referred to the Court of the Judicial Commissioner of Sind for confirmation of the sentence of death. In the case of 15 the sentence of death was confirmed, in the case of 12 it was commuted to transportation for life, and in the case of 6 the convictions and sentences were reversed and the accused acquitted and the cases of 5 persons were pending at the close of the year. Also the cases of 8 persons were referred to the Court of the Judicial Commissioner under section 307, Criminal Procedure Code; of whom 1 person was sentenced to transportation for life, 5 persons were convicted and sentenced to various terms of imprisonment and 2 persons were acquitted and discharged.

The results of the trials in these cases should be shown by the Ocurts to which the passes are committed or referred. If the total of column 3 of Statement No. 4 be deducted from the total of column 3 of that Statement, the difference should correspond with the total of column 5 of this statement.
