REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1923.

1. This report and the statements appended to it relate to the Presidency Proper and do not include the figures for Sind.

2. Judicial Staff (Statement No. 1).—The permanent Civil Judicial Staff employed in the Presidency on 31st December 1923 consisted of 9 High Court Judges (including the Additional Judge); 15 District Judges; 2 Joint Judges; 7 Assistant Judges (including one under training); a Chief Judge and four Judges of the Presidency Small Cause Court; 2 Provincial Small Cause Court Judges; 21 First Class Subordinate Judges and 105 Second Class Subordinate Judges. In addition, the Cantonment Magistrates of Belgaum, Ahmednagar and Ahmedabad and the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Ahmedabad and Poona exercised the powers of a Small Cause Court Judge. There were also 4 Inamdars and Jahagirdars exercising powers of Subordinate Judges under Regulation XIII of 1830.

THE CHIEF JUSTICE.

The Honourable Sir Norman Cranstoun Macleod, Knight, presided over the High Court from 1st January to 10th June and from 24th October to 31st December 1923. His Lordship was on leave from 11th June to 23rd October 1923. During this period the Honourable Sir Lallubhai Asharam Shah, Knight, officiated as Chief Justice.

PUISNE JUDGES.

The Honourable Sir Lallubhai Asharam Shah, Knight, from 1st to 14th January, from 15th February to 10th June and from 24th October to 31st December 1923. His Lordship was on leave from 15th January to 14th February and officiated as Chief Justice from 11th June to 23rd October 1923.

The Honourable Sir Amberson B. Marten, Knight, from 1st January to 10th June and from 10th August to 31st December 1923. His Lordship was on leave from 11th June to 9th August 1923.

The Honourable Mr. Justice E. M. Pratt from 1st January to 31st December 1923.

The Honourable Mr. Justice A. M. Kajiji from 1st January to 31st December 1923.

The Honourable Mr. Justice C. G. H. Fawcett from 1st January to 6th April and from 16th April to 31st December 1923. His Lordship was on leave from 7th to 15th April 1923.

The Honourable Mr. Justice L. C. Crump from 1st January to 31st December 1923.

The Honourable Mr. Justice N. W. Kemp from 27th June to 31st December 1923. His Lordship acted as a Judge from 27th June to 20th July and was appointed to be a Puisne Judge with effect from 21st July.

The Honourable Mr. Justice D. F. Mulla acted as an Additional Judge from 1st January to 31st December 1923.

The Honourable Mr. Justice H. C. Coyajee acted as an Additional Judge from 11th June to 20th July 1923 and as a Puisne Judge from 21st July to 23rd October 1923.

HIGH COURT.

Original Jurisdiction.

- 3. Original Suits instituted (Statement No. 3).—The number of civil suits pending on the Original Side of the High Court at the end of 1922 was 4,956, including 103 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes, and the number instituted during 1923 was 5,256, including 39 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes and 346 (including 2 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes) restored during the year, making a total of 10,558 for disposal in 1923 as against 10,426 in 1922.
- 4. Original Suits disposed of (Statement No. 5).—The number of suits decided was 5,759, including 58 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes, and the number left undisposed of at the end of the year was 4,799, including 86 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number pending at the close of the year was less than the number pending at the close of the previous year by 157. There were 2,349 suits pending over one year, showing an increase of 201 on the figures of the previous year.

Of the suits decided,

- 1,712 were dismissed for default or want of prosecution, including 32 Small Cause Court transferred suits,
- 3,270 were determined without contest, including 19 Small Cause Court transferred suits,
 - 624 were decreed after contest, including 4 Small Cause Court transferred suits,
 - 153 were dismissed after contest, including 3 Small Cause Court transferred suits.

^{5.} Suits instituted and disposed of under the Testamentary and Intestate Jurisdiction.—The number of suits pending at the end of 1922 was 24, and the number instituted during 1923 was 24, making a total of 48 for disposal in 1923. Of these 32 were decided and 16 remained pending at the close of the year.

- 6. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty Jurisdiction.—No suits were pending at the end of 1922. Only one was instituted in 1923. It was dismissed for default or want of prosecution.
- 7. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Parsi Chief Matrimonial Jurisdiction.—The number of suits pending at the end of 1922 was 9 and the number instituted during 1923 was 9, making a total of 18 for disposal in 1923. Of these, 7 were decided and 11 remained pending at the close of the year. There were 7 suits pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided.

- 1 was dismissed for default or want of prosecution,
- 4 were determined without contest,
- 2 were dismissed after contest.

8. Insolvency Petitions.—The number of petitions at the end of 1922 was 2,412 and the number instituted during 1923 was 1,284, making a total of 3,696 for disposal in 1923. Of these, 1,015 were decided and 2,681 remained pending at the close of the year. There were 1,451 petitions pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the cases decided.

- 981 were determined without contest,
- 26 were decreed after contest,
- 8 were dismissed after contest.

- 9. References from the Bombay Court of Small Causes.—One reference was made during the year, which has not been disposed of.
- 10. Appeals to the Privy Council.—Twenty-seven appeals were pending from the previous year and 6 were admitted during the year, making a total of 33 for disposal during the year. Of these,
 - 3 were dismissed for default by the Bombay High Court,
 - 2 were dismissed for default by order of the Privy Council,
 - 7 were decided by the Privy Council who confirmed the decrees of the High Court,
 - 7 were decided by the Privy Council who set aside the decrees of the High Court,
 - 6 were pending before the Privy Council in England (including 4 despatched during the year),
 - 8 were pending in the Bombay High Court.

11. References to take Accounts, etc.—The number of references to take accounts, to make enquiries as to estates to be administered or partitioned, as to debts and incumbrances, as to allowances to be made for maintenance, on questions of title, on questions affecting minors

in proposed terms of settlement, to settle conveyances and in like matters pending at the commencement of the year 1923 was 228. 273 references were filed in 1923 in the Office of the Commissioner for taking accounts and 220 references were disposed of by him during the year.

12. Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, etc.—During the year 748 petitions for probate and letters of administration, 10 pauper petitions for leave to sue or defend in forma pauperis, 47 petitions under the Indian Companies Act, 41 petitions under the Indian Trusts Act, 49 references under the Land Acquisition Act, and 386 petitions under the Guardian and Wards, Lunacy and Arbitration Acts, etc., making in

all 1,281, were filed for disposal.

13. Applications for the Execution of Decrees, etc. (Statement No. 13).—
The number of applications pending at the commencement of the year was 849 and the number of applications filed during the year was 2,801, making a total of 3,650 for disposal. Of these, 517 were disposed of by transfer to other courts, in 419 satisfaction was obtained in full, in 36 satisfaction was obtained in part, and 1,879 were wholly infructuous, making a total of 2,851, and 799 remained at the close of the year 1923.

Number of Darkhasts (decrees or orders) disposed of during the year, in which immoveable property was sold, was 26. Number of decrees received from other courts for execution during the year 1923 was 88.

I. Appeals under Section 15 of the Letters Patent.

- 17. (Statement No. 7).— Sixty-seven appeals from decrees on the Original Side were filed during the year and 41 were pending at its commencement. Of the total 108, 81 were decided and 27 remained pending at the close of the year, of which 3 were pending for more than a year. The number of appeals disposed of was less by 13 than in 1922. These 81 appeals were disposed of as under:—
 - 15 Dismissed for default or not prosecuted,
 - 42 Decrees of the Courts of first instance confirmed,
 - 6 Decrees of the Courts of first instance modified,
 - 14 Decrees of the Courts of first instance reversed,
 - 4 Cases remanded to the Courts of first instance.

18. (Statement No. 8).— Twenty-eight appeals from orders on the Original Side were filed during the year and 7 were pending at its commencement. Of the total 35, 21 were decided and 14 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of

Courts (Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—The statement in the margin shows the numbers of first and second appeals from decrees, and appeals from orders, of the provincial Courts of Original and Appellate Jurisdiction, which came before the High Court and were decided during

the year. The institution of second appeals was more by 100 than in 1922, and the institutions of first appeals and appeals from orders were less by 6 and 13, respectively, than in that year.

21. Appeals decided (Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—The disposals of first and second appeals show an increase of 46 and 59, respectively, and that of appeals from orders shows a decrease of 25, on the figures of the previous year.

22. Appeals pending (Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—At the close of the year, 671 first appeals, 680 second appeals and 72 appeals from orders were pending. The aggregate total of the pending appeals is more by 254 than in 1922.

24. Results of Appeals (Statement No. 7).—Of the 265 appeals from original decrees decided, 46 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 219, decrees of lower Courts were confirmed in 163, reversed in 28, modified in 26 and remanded in 2.

Of the 671 appeals from appellate decrees decided, 369 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 302, decrees of the lower Courts were affirmed in 227, reversed in 54, modified in 19 and remanded in 2.

(Statement No. 8).—Of the 60 appeals from orders decided, 23 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 37, orders of the lower Courts were affirmed in 26, reversed in 9 and modified in 2.

- 25. Appeals to the Privy Council.—At the opening of the year, 7 appeals to the Privy Council were under preparation for despatch to England and 3 applications for leave were pending for orders. 15 new applications were filed during the year. Of the total number of applications for leave, 4 were rejected, withdrawn or compromised, in 3 leave was granted, and 11 applications for leave remained pending at the close of the year. During the year 6 appeals were despatched to England, and 4 appeals were under preparation.
- 26. Results of Appeals to the Privy Council.—During the year, 4 appeals from this Court were decided by the Privy Council with the result that all of them were dismissed with costs. 11 appeals were pending before the Privy Council at the end of the year.

Appellate Courts subordinate to the High Court.

28. Appeals instituted (Statement No. 7).—4,071 appeals were instituted in 1923, showing a decrease of 137, as compared with the previous year. The number of appeals instituted was larger than in the previous year in 8, and smaller in 8, districts.

There were noticeable increases in Poona (93), Belgaum (68), Kolaba (39), and Sholapur (30), while there were noticeable decreases in Satara (186), Dharwar (67), Khandesh (45), Ahmednagar (33), Kanara (33) and Broach (25). In the remaining districts the variations were less than 25.

29. Appeals disposed of (Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—4,293 appeals were disposed of during the year, of which 775 were disposed of by First Class Subordinate Judges exercising appellate powers. These figures are more by 6 and 144 than the corresponding figures of the previous year.

There was an increase in disposals in 7 districts and was the greatest in Satara (409), followed by Dharwar (140), Thana (123), Poona (100) and Kolaba (30). On the other hand there was a noticeable decrease in

Bijapur (279), Khandesh (183), Ahmedabad (138), Sholapur (57) and Ratnagiri (51).

30. Appeals pending (Statement No. 7).—There were 4,783 appeals pending at the close of the year, the number being less by 222 than at the end of 1922.

(Statement No. 14).—The number of appeals pending for more than a year fell from 1,704 to 1,689.

- 31. Results of Appeals (Statement No.7).—The results on the decision of the lower Courts of the appeals decided during the year were as follows:—in 2,265 cases, or 52.8 per cent. of the whole, the judgment of the lower Court was affirmed; in 440 cases, or 10.2 per cent., it was modified; and in 521 cases or 12.1 per cent. it was reversed; 256, or 6 per cent., appeals were remanded and 811, or 18.9 per cent., were either dismissed or not prosecuted.
- 32. Miscellaneous Appeals (Statement No. 8).—228 miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year and 119 were pending at its commencement. Of the total 347, 248 were disposed of during the year and 99 remained pending at its close. The number pending was less by 20 than in the previous year.

Original Jurisdiction.

- 1. Civil Courts in the Mofussil Subordinate to the High Court.
- 33. Changes in Jurisdiction.—During the year under report, the Amalner and Parola talukas in the Khandesh District were excluded from the special jurisdiction of the First Class Subordinate Court at Dhulia and included within the special jurisdiction of the First Class Subordinate Court at Jalgaon.
- 34. Original Suits instituted (Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1923 was 1,14,425, showing a decrease of 7,119 on the figures of the previous year.

The decrease occurred in money and title suits to the extent of 6.5 and 3.2 per cent. respectively, the number of money suits instituted being 92,517 against 98,916 in 1922 and that of title suits being 21,908 against 22,628 in 1922.

(Statement No. 4).—The total value of suits instituted in 1923 amounted to Rs. 4,61,33,848, showing an increase of Rs. 87,26,118 on the total for 1922.

35. Local Distribution (Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1923 was smaller than in the previous year in 11, and larger in 5 districts.

The decrease was most marked in the Districts of Khandesh (3, 942), Nasik (896), Thana (874) and Kolaba (656) and occurred chiefly in money suits. There was marked increase in the Districts of Ahmednagar (708) and Poona (346).

The largest number of suits was instituted in Khandesh (20,080), where the number of money suits (17,648) was the heaviest in the Presidency. In no other district except Ahmedabad and Poona did

institutions exceed 10, 000. Institutions were between 8,000 and 9,000 in the District of Nasik, between 6,000 and 7,000 in Ahmednagar and Sholapur, between 5,000 and 6,000 in Dharwar, Thana and Satara, between 4,000 and 5,000 in Surat, Ratnagiri and Belgaum, between 3,000 and 4,000 in Bijapur and between 2,000 and 3,000 in Broach, Kolaba and Kanara, the lowest figure, 2, 275, being in Kanara.

36. Number of suits disposed of (Statement No. 5).—In addition to the 114,425 suits instituted during the year, and the 53,235 suits pending trial from the previous year, 1,574 suits were revived, or received on remand or review, making a total of 1,69,234 for disposal.

The number of suits disposed of was 118,299, a decrease of 3,086 on the figure of 1922.

Of the total number disposed of, 108,545 were disposed of by Paid Sub-Divisional Tribunals, that is, Courts of Subordinate Judges, 8,756 by Small Caues Courts. 973 by District Courts and 25 by Unpaid Tribunals, that is, by Inamdars and Jahagirdars.

37. Results of Suits decided (Statement No. 5).—Out of the suits disposed of during the year, 11,569 or 9.8 per cent. were disposed of without trial, 52,453 or 44.3 per cent. without contest, 53,675 or 45.4 per cent. with contest, and in 602 or 5 per cent. a compromise was effected.

Of the 53,675 suits decided on contest, 47,190 or 87.9 per cent. resulted in favour of plaintiffs and 6,485 or 12.1 in favour of defendants.

- 38. Suits disposed of by Inamdars and Jahagirdars (Statement No. 5).—The Unpaid Tribunals disposed of 25 original suits, of which 4 were contested. In 1922 the figures were 39 and 8 respectively.
- 39. Suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges (Statement No. 5).—
 The number of original suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges was 108,545, a decrease of 2,485 on the figures of the previous year. The decrease was chiefly in the number of cases decided under the ordinary procedure and was in the uncontested suits, the contested suits showing a slight increase on the figures of the previous year. The number of contested suits decided in exercise of Small Cause Court powers shows a marked increase (1,789) and that of uncontested suits a marked decrease (2,173). The number of suits decided under the ordinary procedure was 57,473 and under the Small Cause Court procedure, 51,072. Of these, 51 per cent. and 40.9 per cent. respectively, were contested. The percentage of suits decided after contest both under the ordinary and Small Cause Court prodecures shows an increase, as compared with the previous year.
- 40. Suits disposed of by Small Cause Court Judges (Statement No. 5).—The Provincial Small Cause Courts disposed of 8,756 original suits, of which 3,670 were contested. The latter shows a decrease of 971 as compared with the previous year.

41. Suits disposed of by District, Joint and Assistant Judges (Statement No. 5).—The District Courts disposed of 973 original suits, of which 417 were contested. The latter shows a decrease of 17 as compared with the previous year.

42. Pending Suits (Statement No. 5).—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 50, 935, as against 53, 235 in the previous

vear.

(Statement No. 14).—Of the pending cases, 6,170 had been pending for more than a year, which shows an increase of 106 on the figures of the previous year. Of the suits pending for over one year, 247 were in the Courts of District Judges, 5,852 in the Courts of Subordinate Judges, 61 in the Small Cause Courts and 10 in the Courts of Inamdars and Jahagirdars, the figures showing a decrease of 128, and an increase of 170, 55 and 9 respectively, as compared with 1922.

The number of suits pending over a year was the largest in Khandesh (1,071), followed by Poona (813), Ahmedabad (662), Belgaum (621) and Dharwar (614). As compared with the figures of the previous year, the number of year-old suits shows a marked increase from 799 to 1,071 in Khandesh, from 426 to 614 in Dharwar, from 280 to 401 in Sholapur and from 57 to 134 in Kanara, while a noticeable decrease from 844 to 662 in Ahmedabad, from 418 to 300 in Ratnagiri and from 252 to 149 in Surat.

43. Execution proceedings (Statement No. 13).—There were 49,901 applications for execution of decrees pending from the previous year, and 108,733 applications were made during the year. Realization was complete in 27,722 cases and partial in 30,265. In 51,168 cases proceedings were returned as infructuous, and 49,457 remained pending at the close of the year, while 22 were disposed of by transfer. The total amount realized in Courts other than Small Cause Courts was Rs. 72,11,089-13-5.

Debtors were imprisoned in 167 cases, movable property was sold in 692 and immoveable property in 2,657 cases.

44. Miscellaneous Cases (Statement No. 6).—The number of miscellaneous cases instituted fell from 9,492 to 9,461. The number disposed of rose from 9,329 to 9,380 and that of pending rose from 3,216 to 3,297. Of the cases disposed of, 1,015 were disposed of without trial, 3,168 without contest, 88 on reference to arbitration, and 5,109 were contested. Of these 5,109 contested cases, 3,310 or 64.7 per cent. were decided in favour of plaintiffs.

II. Bombay Small Cause Court.

45. (Statements Nos. 3 & 5).—The number of suits instituted and decided in the Presidency Court of Small Causes during 1923, and the number pending at its close were 33,966, 32,746 and 6,738, respectively. Institutions and disposals show an increase of 5,515 and 5,193, respectively. The number of suits pending at the end of the year was more by 1,220 than in 1922.

(Statement No. 4).—The increase in institutions occurred in suits not exceeding Rs. 50, Rs. 100, Rs. 500 and Rs. 1,000, while there was a slight decrease—t—in suits not exceeding Rs. 10 and a decrease of 244 in suits exceeding Rs. 1,000.

The total value of the litigation was Rs. 1,10,92,631 as against Rs. 99,07,514 in the preceding year.

- 46. Mode of disposal (Statement No. 5).—Of the 32,746 suits disposed of, 992 were disposed of without trial, 28,140 were decided without contest, and 3,566 were decided after contest, and 48 upon reference to arbitration.
- 47. Execution of Decrees (Statement No. 13).—Of the 14,479 applications for the execution of decrees dealt with during the year, including 1,219 pending from the previous year, 12,903 were disposed of, and 1,576 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the latter, 211 were more than three months old. Of the applications disposed of, 4,958 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted, 7,302 were returned as wholly infructuous and 643 were transferred to other Courts.

The total amount realized was Rs. 16,44,478 as compared with Rs. 17,29,947 in the previous year.

48. Coercive Processes (Statement No. 13).—In order to enforce the execution of decrees imprisonment was resorted to in 70 cases, and sale of moveables in 436. These figures are less by 57 and more by 12 respectively, than those of 1922.

GENERAL.

49. Compared with the figures of 1922, when there was an increase of more than 6,500 in the number of institutions of suits and more than 2,800 in the number disposed of, the number of suits instituted in the Subordinate Judges Courts in 1923 decreased by more than 7,000 and the number disposed of by nearly 2,500. As the result of increasing the limit of Small Cause Court powers of Subordinate Judges, 9,166 more Small Cause suits were disposed of by them than in the year 1920. The number of pending suits in those Courts has decreased from 49,800 in 1920 to 47,000 in 1923.

The number of appeals disposed of by District Courts was only 6 more than in the previous year, the First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate powers having disposed of 775 appeals as against 631 in 1922 and 159 only in 1921.

The number of suits instituted on the Original Side of the High Court in 1923 was less by 530, and 632 more suits were disposed of than in the preceding year. The Judges ordinarily constituting the Second Division Bench of the Appellate Side were, as in the previous year, engaged for the most part of the year in clearing off arrears of suits on the Original Side. In spite of the decrease in the total institutions and the increase in the total disposals, the arrears of suits on the Original Side increased from 7,401 to 7,507.

On the Appellate Side of the High Court the total number of institutions of appleals increased from 1,205 to 1,301 and the total number of disposals from 969 to 1,040. In consequence of the employment of two of the Appellate Side Judges on the Original Side for the most part of the year, the total arrears of appeals on the Appellate Side further increased from 1,180 to 1,441.

50. Inspection.—During the year 1923 no Inspection tour was undertaken by the Administrative High Court Judge. The Honourable the Chief Justice, however, visited the Courts at Sholapur, Bijapur, Nasik and Dhulia. The proposed visit to the Courts at Dharwar and Karwar had to be abandoned owing to His Lordship's illness.

During the year the District and Assistant Judges inspected the Courts of 29 Subordinate Judges.

- 51. Receipts and Charges of the Civil and Criminal Courts.—The total receipts of all the Courts (Civil and Criminal) have risen from Rs. 85,55,523 to 93,79,564 and the total charges from Rs. 44,16,168 to 45,67,685. These figures are supplied by the Accountant General, Bombay, in accordance with Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 5042 dated 11th August 1893.
- 52. The District Judge of Sholapur assembled a Judicial Conference of the Judges subordinate to him, where points touching on the practice and procedure of Civil Courts were discussed.

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1923.

1. Judicial Staff (Statement No. 1).—The Criminal Judicial Staff, employed in the Presidency on 31st December 1923, consisted of 9 High Court Judges; 15 Sessions Judges; 5 Additional Sessions Judges; 2 Assistant Sessions Judges; 354 First Class Magistrates; 344 Second Class Magistrates; 239 Third Class Magistrates; 240 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889 and 97 Village Panchayats under Bombay Act IX of 1920.

In addition to the above, the number of Police Patels in the Presidency exercising powers under Section 14 of the Village Police Act, VIII of 1867, was 21,298. Out of these, 505 have also been invested with powers under Section 15 of the said Act.

There were 51 Benches of Magistrates inclusive of those in the City of Bombay, constituted from among 414 Honorary Magistrates.

- 2. Offences reported (Statement No. 11).—There were 1,83,916 criminal offences reported during the year, showing an increase of 14,862 on the figures of 1922. In the Districts of Surat, Nasik, and East Khandesh, and in the City of Bombay there was a noticeable increase in the number of offences reported during the year, while on the other hand there was a decrease in the Districts of Kanara, Kaira and Ahmednagar. Of the total number of offences reported, 45,608 were under the Indian Penal Code and 1,38,308 under the Special and Local Laws.
- 3. Complaints dismissed (Section 203, Criminal Procedure Code) and complainants fined (Section 250, Criminal Procedure Code). (Statement No. 11).—The number of complaints dismissed under Section 203 was 6,122 and the number of complainants fined under Section 250 was 271.
- 4. Cases found to be true.—Of the total number of cases under inquiry, 1,77,318 were found to be true and the number of cases brought to trial, including those found to be true and pending from the previous year, was 1,79,947. Compared with 1922 the number of cases found to be true and the number of cases brought to trial show an increase of 15,065 and 13,933, respectively.
- 5. Murders reported as true.—Out of 640 cases affecting human life brought to trial during the year, 189 were murders. The corresponding numbers in the previous year were 640 and 223.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

I. Presidnecy Magistrates' Courts.

6. Cases in Presidency Magistrates' Courts (Statement No. 11).—The total number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of Presidency Magistrates and before the Benches of Honorary Presidency Magistrates was 105,567. This number is more by 9,045 than that of 1922. The number of cases under Special and Local Laws was 93,904 or 9,178 more than in 1922, while cases under the Penal Code fell from 11,796 to 11,663. The increase under the former head was most marked in offences under the City of Bombay Police Act which rose from 45,489 to 53,307. The number of offences under the City of Bombay Municipal Act rose from 12,940 to 14,734; under the Bombay Public Conveyances Act from 5,718 to 6,744; under the Motor Vehicles Act from 1,299 to 1,365, and under the Prevention of Gambling Act from 949 to 1,036. There was a noticeable decrease in offences under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act from 16,384 to 15,038; under the Railways Act from 699 to 567; under the Bombay Rent Act from 215 to 151, and under the Merchant Shipping Act from 114 to 4. As regards the offences under the Penal Code there was an increase in offences of theft, of criminal intimidation, insult and annoyance, of criminal trespass, and of offences relating to marriage which rose from 3,215, 1,558, 613 and 80 to 3,376, 1.653, 709 and 125 respectively. On the other hand there was a noticeable decrease in offence, of hurt, of criminal force and assault, of offences against the public tranquility and of offences relating to documents and to trade or property marks, which fell from 1,728, 1,491, 99 and 82 to 1,529, 1,289, 28 and 36, respectively.

(Statements Nos. 2 and 9).—During the year 1,04,619 regular and 1,529 miscellaneous cases were disposed of and only 948 regular cases were pending at the close of the year. Of the cases disposed of, cases of 220 persons were committed to the High Court.

7. Results of Trials (Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before the Magistrates was 1,13,762. Of the persons tried 14,902 were acquitted or discharged, 97,493 were convicted, 44 were transferred, 220 were committed to the High Court, 22 were sent to Military Authorities and 1,081 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried for offences under the Penal Code, 6,337 were convicted and 9,982 acquitted or discharged. The results of the trials before each of the two classes of Magistrates during the year are shown below:—

8. Punishments (Statement No. 12).—Of the persons convicted, 6,490 were punished with imprisonment, 78,741 with fine, and 547 with whipping. 17,507 convicted persons were warned and discharged, 68 were sent to the Leper Asylum at Matunga and 826 were released on probation of good conduct under Section 562, Criminal Procedure Code.

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 5,04,008. Rs. 4,14,610 were realized, of which Rs. 18,969 were paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to these sentences, 16 complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under Section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code, the accusations having been found to be frivolous or vexations.

II. Magistrates including Village Officers and Sanitary • Committees and Sanitary Boards.

9. Results of Trials (Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before these tribunals was 1,15,508. Of these, the cases of 1,063 persons were committed or referred to the Sessions and the cases of the remainder, that is, of 1,14,445 persons were finally disposed of by the various tribunals. 54,134 or 47.3 per cent. out of the total 1,14,445, were convicted and 59,051 or 51.6 per cent. were acquitted or discharged. The cases of 244 persons were transferred, while 329 persons died, and 687 escaped during their trials.

The total number of persons awaiting trial before Magistrates and Village Officers at the close of the year 1923 was 7,444 as compared with 6,297 in 1922.

Of the sentences of imprisonment imposed, 2,280 were for terms not exceeding 15 days, 5,365 for terms not exceeding 6 months; 1,165 for terms not exceeding 2 years and 10 for terms exceeding 2 years.

Sentences of whipping were passed on 280 persons, as against 362 in the preceding year.

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 6,15,356. Rs. 5,05,814 were realized, out of which Rs. 35,321 were paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to the above, 255 complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under Section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code, the accusations having been found to be frivolous or vexatious. The figure for the last year was 462.

III. Courts of Session.

- 11. Results of Trials (Statement No. 9).—There were 2,118 persons or 479 less than in 1922, under trial. The cases of 1,855 persons were decided, while those of 263 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the 1,855 persons tried, 973 or 52.5 per cent. were convicted and 822 or 44.3 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, and the cases of 57 persons were referred to the High Court under Sections 307 and 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, while 2 persons died and 1 escaped during trial.

Fines to the amount of Rs. 31,738 were imposed by Courts of Session, as compared with Rs. 27,665 in the preceding year. The total realizations amounted to Rs. 10,249 as compared with Rs. 14,608 in 1922. The amount of fines realized and paid as compensation fell from Rs. 2,451 to Rs. 1,754.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

APPELLATE COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

I. Appeals.

- 13. The number of appeals decided during the year was 1,887, as against 2,094 in the preceding year.
- 14. Magistrates' Courts (Statement No. 10).—The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 1,501. Of these, appeals of 233 were summarily dismissed, and sentences on 750, whose appeals were admitted, were confirmed, making a total of 983 wholly unsuccessful appellants, or 65.5 per cent. Of the remainder, 166 appellants or 11.1 per cent., obtained a modification of the sentences passed on them, and 319, or 21.3 per cent., their total annulment. The cases of 32 appellants were otherwise disposed of, and the case of 1 appellant abated owing to his death. As compared with 1922, the results were less favourable to appellants.
- 15. Sessions Courts (Statement No. 10).—During the year, the number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Session was 1,738. The appeals of 468 persons (or 26.9 per cent.), were summarily dismissed; 638 appellants, whose appeals were admitted, were altogether unsuccessful; 259 obtained an alteration of sentence; 363 were acquitted, and the cases of 10 appellants were otherwise disposed of.

The proportions of persons whose appeals were wholly unsuccessful, successful in obtaining a modification of the original orders and successful in obtaining their reversal, were 63.6, 14.9 and 20.9 per cent., respectively. Of those concerned in admitted appeals only, the proportions were 50.2, 20.4 and 28.6 per cent. If admitted appeals only are considered, these results were, on the whole, less favourable to appellants than in the previous year, the percentage of successful appellants in 1923 being 49 against 52.1 in 1922.

II. Superintendence, Reference and Revision.

- 16. Magistrates' Courts (Statement No. 10).—The cases of 140 accused persons who applied for revision, or against whom applications were made by complainants, came before District Magistrates for revision. The number was less by 27 than in 1922. Of the total, applications of 97 persons were rejected, those of 5 were otherwise disposed of, and the cases of 38 persons remained pending at the close of the year.
- 17. Sessions Courts (Statement No. 10).—Including the cases of accused persons, who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed on them in the Courts of Magistrates, and of those against whom such applications were made by complainants, the cases of 606 persons were decided on revision by Courts of Session during the year. The number was less by 79 than in 1922. Applications of 490 persons were rejected, and those of 114 persons were otherwise disposed of. In two cases the proceedings abated owing to the death of the accused.

HIGH COURT.

I. Original Jurisdiction.

- 18. Commitments to the High Court (Statement No. 9).—One case was pending at the opening of the year and 170 cases were brought to trial during the year. Of these, 168 were decided during the year, and 3 remained pending at its close. Altogether 223 persons were tried, of whom 189 were convicted and 34 acquitted.
- 19. Punishments (Statement No. 12).—The following sentences were passed:—

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 11,050 and Rs. 5,050 were realized during the year.

II. Appellate Jurisdiction.

20. (Statement No. 10).—At the opening of the year, 59 appeals were pending before the High Court from sentences or orders of Criminal Courts, including 3 by the Local Government against acquittal orders. During the year 683 appeals were preferred and 683 were decided, leaving 59 pending at its close. The numbers preferred and decided were less by 82 and 121, respectively, than in the preceding year. The number of pending appeals shows no variation.

Of the appeals preferred against sentences, 534 were from Courts of Session and 142 from Courts of Presidency Magistrates, while 7 were preferred by the Local Government against orders of acquittal.

- 21. Results of Appeals.—525 appeals against sentences passed by Courts of Session were decided. The sentences of the lower Courts were upheld in 466 cases, reversed in 19 and modified in 31. Seven appeals were returned for presentation to proper Courts, I related to sanction matter, and I abated owing to the appellant's death.
- 148 appeals against sentences by Presidency Magistrates were decided. The sentences were upheld in 138 cases, reversed in 4 and modified in 4. One appeal related to sanction matter and 1 to property matter.

The results of appeals decided, as affecting individuals, were as follows:—Appeals of 519 persons were summarily dismissed under

Section 421 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. In admitted appeals, sentences of 168 appellants were confirmed, of 48 altered, of 32 reversed, and of 7 otherwise disposed of. The case of 1 person abated owing to his death.

In appeals against acquittal orders, sentences were passed by the High Court on 13 persons, while 70 persons were acquitted.

Ten appeals by the Local Government against orders of acquittal were disposed of during the year. In one case 17 accused persons were acquitted, 15 of offences under Sections 148 and 326, Indian Penal Code, and 2 under Sections 148, 326 and 302, Indian Penal Code, by a Sessions Judge. The High Court upheld the order of the Sessions Judge and dismissed the appeal. In the second case, the accused was acquitted of an offence under Section 202, Indian Penal Code, by a First Class Magistrate. The High Court set aside the order of acquittal, convicted the accused under that section and sentenced him to pay a fine of Rs. 25. In the third case, 2 accused persons were acquitted of offences under Sections 395 and 393, Indian Penal Code, by a Sessions Judge. The High Court upheld the order of the Sessions Judge and dismissed the appeal. In the fourth case, 4 accused persons were, on appeal, acquitted of an offence under Section 332, Indian Penal Code, by a Sessions Judge. The High Court upheld the order of the Sessions Judge and dismissed the appeal. In the fifth case, 22 accused persons were acquitted of an offence under Section 5 of the Prevention of Gambling Act, IV of 1887, by a Presidency Magistrate. The High Court upheld the order of the Presidency Magistrate, and dismissed the appeal. In the sixth case, 10 accused persons were acquitted of an offence under Section 5 of the Prevention of Gambling Act, by a Presidency Magistrate. The High Court upheld the order of the Presidency Magistrate and dismissed the appeal. In the seventh case, the accused was acquitted of offences under Sections 302 and 392, Indian Penal Code, by a Sessions Judge. The High Court set aside the order of acquittal, convicted the accused and sentenced him to transportation for life under Section 302. and for 10 years' transportation under Section 392, Indian Penal Code. In the eighth case, a Sub-Divisional Magistrate, First Class, acquitted the accused in appeal preferred against the order of a Second Class Magistrate, convicting him of an offence under Section 411, Indian Penal Code. The High Court set aside the order of acquittal, convicted the accused under that section and sentenced him to imprisonment to the period already undergone and retained the order of fine. In the ninth case, the accused was acquitted of an offence under Section 304, Indian Penal Code, by a Sessions Judge. The High Court set aside the order of acquittal, convicted the accused under that section and sentenced him to 7 years' rigorous imprisonment. In the tenth case, 24 accused persons were acquitted of offences under Sections 302, 325, 149 and 114, Indian Penal Code, by a Sessions Judge. The High Court upheld the order of acquittal of the Sessions Judge in respect of 15 accused, but set it aside as regards 9, convicted them under Sections 147, 328 and 342, Indian Penal Code, and sentenced two of them to two

years and six months rigorous imprisonment each, and seven to one year's rigorous imprisonment each.

III. Superintendence, Reference and Revision.

- 22. References under Section 307, Code of Criminal Procedure.—Two references were pending in the High Court at the opening of the year, and 7 were submitted to it during the year. Nine references were decided during the year and none remained pending at its close. The result of the 9 cases disposed of was that the verdict of the jury was accepted in one case and set aside in 8.
- 23. References under Section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.—
 Thirty-four references under this Section were submitted to the High
 Court during the year for confirmation of death sentences, and 6 were
 pending at its opening. Thirty-four references, involving 43 persons,
 were decided during the year and 6 remained pending at its close. The
 death sentences were confirmed in the case of 28 persons, commuted to
 that of transportation for life in the case of 10 and to that of rigorous
 imprisonment for 10 years in the case of 1. The remaining 4 persons
 were acquitted, their sentences having been reversed.
- 24. Revision.—During the year, 63 cases were reported for the orders of the High Court by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates under Section 438 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, and 9 were pending at its opening. Of these, 62 were decided during the year, and 10 remained pending at its close. The number reported was less by 12 than in 1922. In 20 cases the orders sent up for revision were set aside, in 1 the proceedings were quashed and in 7 new trials were ordered. Sentences were reduced or altered in 8 and enhanced in 10. In 14 cases the High Court declined to interfere, 1 case was a transfer matter and 1 was placed on dormant file.

Under Section 435 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, orders were passed in 237 cases, an increase of 12 on the figures of the previous year. Of these, 212 came before the High Court on application and 25 were taken up by the Court on review of Criminal Returns or otherwise of its own motion.

Of the 212 applications for the issue of rule, 128 were rejected. Of 84 rules issued, 38 were finally discharged, 30 were made absolute in their entirety, in 14 the orders complained of were modified and 2 were withdrawn.

In 11, out of the 25 cases taken up by the High Court suo motu, the orders passed by the lower courts were not disturbed, in 10 the sentences were enhanced, and in 4 reduced.

25. Applications for transfer.—Fifty-seven applications under Section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of cases (56 original cases and 1 appeal) from one Court or District to another were received during the year, and 4 were pending at its opening. Of these 61, 57 cases were decided during the year, while 4 remained pending at its close. Twenty-one were summarily rejected and in 5 transfers were

granted without the issue of a rule. In 31 applications rules were issued, with the result that transfers were granted in 11 and refused in 19. One application was allowed to be withdrawn.

26. Miscellaneous Applications.—Six applications for bail, 4 for stay of proceedings, 10 for disposal of property, 14 for sanction, 5 for compensation, 7 for maintenance and 5 for miscellaneous purposes were disposed of by the High Court during the year.
