REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1925

- 1. This report and the Statements appended to it relate to the Presidency proper and do not include the figures for Sind.
- 2. Judicial Staff—Statement No. 1.—The permanent Civil Judicial Staff employed in the Presidency on 31st December 1925 consisted of 10 High Court Judges (including two temporary Additional Judges); 16 District Judges; 2 Joint Judges; 9 Assistant Judges (including one under training); a Chief Judge and five Judges (including one Additional Judge from 9th February 1925) of the Presidency Small Cause Court; 2 Provincial Small Cause Court Judges; 22 First Class Subordinate Judges and 103 Second Class Subordinate Judges. In addition, the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Ahmedabad and Poona exercised the powers of a Small Cause Court Judge. There were also three Inamdars and Jahagirdars exercising powers of a Subordinate Judge under Regulation XIII of 1830.

THE CHIEF JUSTICE

The Honourable Sir Norman Cranstoun Macleod, Knight, presided over the High Court from 1st January to 31st December 1925.

The Honourable Mr. Justice N. W. Kemp from 1st January to 14th June 1925. His Lordship was on leave from 15th June to 31st December 1925 and onwards.

The Honourable Mr. Justice C. A. Kincaid acted as a Judge of the High Court from 1st January to 13th April 1925.

The Honourable Mr. Justice H. C. Coyajee acted as a Judge of the High Court from 10th January to 18th April 1925 and from 15th June to 31st December 1925.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Mirza Ali Akbar Khan acted as an Additional Judge from 1st January to 31st December 1925.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION

- 3. Original Suits Instituted—Statement No. 3.—The number of Civil Suits pending on the Original Side of the High Court at the end of the year 1924 was 3,777 including 57 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number instituted during the year 1925 was 3,798 including 24 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes and 321 (including 3 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes) restored during the year. The abo e totals 3,777, 3,798 and 321 make an aggregate of 7,896 suits for disposal in 1925 as against 9,887 in 1924.
- 4. Original Suits disposed of—Statement No. 5.—The number of suits decided was 4,864 including 36 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number left undisposed of at the end of the year was 3,032 including 48 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. This number is 745 less than the corresponding number at the end of the previous year. There were 1,274 suits whose hearing had been pending for over one year. This is a decrease of 575 suits on the figures of the previous year.

Of the suits decided,

- 1,384 were dismissed for default or want of prosecution including
 18 Small Cause Court transferred suits,
- 2,757 were determined without contest including 13 Small Cause Court transferred suits,
 - 558 were decreed after contest including 3 Small Cause Court transferred suits,
 - 165 were dismissed after contest including 2 Small Cause Court transferred suits.

6. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Testamentary and Intestate Jurisdiction.—The number of suits pending at the end of the year 1924 was 23. The number instituted during the year 1925 was 33 and 7 were restored during the year. Thus the total for disposal in 1925 was 63. Of these 54 were decided and 9 remained pending at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided,

- 7 were dismissed for default or want of prosecution,
- 11 were determined without contest,
- 24 were decreed for plaintiff after contest,
- 12 were decreed for defendant after contest.

There were 2 suits pending over one year at the close of the year.

- 7. Suits Instituted and disposed of under the Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty Jurisdiction.—No suits were pending at the end of the year 1924. One was instituted in 1925. It was dismissed for default or want of prosecution during the year.
- 8. Suits Instituted and disposed of under the Parsi Chief Matrimonial Jurisdiction.—The number of suits pending at the end of the year 1924 was 8 and the number instituted during 1925 was 4, making a total of 12 for disposal in 1925. Of these 4 were decided and 8 remained pending at the close of the year 1925. There were 6 suits pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided,

- 3 were determined without contest.
- 1 was decreed for plaintiff after contest.

9. Insolvency Petitions.—The number of petitions at the end of the year 1924 was 3,104 and the number instituted during the year 1925 was

1,792, making a total of 4,896 for disposal in 1925. Of these 1,212 were decided and 3,684 remained pending at the close of the year 1925. There were 1,953 petitions pending over one year at the close of the year 1925.

Of the cases decided,

- 1,172 were determined without contest,
 - 16 were disposed of by suspending the discharge after contest
 - 24 were dismissed after contest.

- 10. References from the Bombay Court of Small Causes.—There was one reference made in 1925 which was decided in the same year.
- 11. Appeals to the Privy Council.—Ten appeals were pending from the previous year and 4 were admitted during the year, making a total of 14 for disposal in the year 1925.

Of these,

- 5 were decided by the Privy Council who confirmed the decrees of the High Court,
- was decided by the Privy Council who set aside the decree of the Appeal Court and restored that of the lower Court,
- 5 were pending before the Privy Council in England (including 2 despatched during the year),
- 3 were pending in the Bombay High Court.

- 12. References to take accounts, etc.—The number of references to take accounts, to make inquiries as to estates to be administered or partitioued as to debts and incumbrances, as to allowances to be made for maintenance, on questions of title, on questions affecting minors in proposed terms of settlement, to settle conveyances, and in like matters, pending at the commencement of the year 1925 was 315. 317 references were filed in 1925 in the office of the Commissioner for taking accounts and 291 references were disposed of by him during the year 1925.
- 13. Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, etc.—During the year 728 Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, 14 Pauper Petitions for leave to sue or defend in forma pumperis, 51 Petitions under the Indian Companies Act, 36 Petitions under the Indian Trust Act, 22 References under the Land Acquisition Act, and 453 Petitions under the Guardian and Ward, Lunacy and Arbitration Acts, etc., making in all 1,304, were filed for disposal.
- 14. Applications for execution of Decrees, etc.—Statement No. 13.— The number of applications pending at the commencement of the year was 1,533 and the number of applications filed during the year was 2,868 making a total of 4,401 for disposal. Of these 482 were disposed of by transfer to other Courts, in 382 satisfaction was obtained in full, in

52 satisfaction was obtained in part and 2,451 were wholly infructuous making a total of 3,367, and 1,034 remained at the close of the year 1925.

Number of Darkhasts (Decrees or Orders) disposed of during the year in which immoveable property was sold was 53. Number of Decrees received from other Courts for execution during the year 1925 was 99.

Of the total 56, 37 were decided and 19 remained pending at the close of the year of which 1 was pending for more than a year. The number of appeals disposed of was less by 4 than in 1924. The disposals of the appeals were as under:—

Nos. 7 and 8.—The Statement in the margin shows the numbers of first and second appeals from decrees, and appeals from orders, of the Provincial Courts of Original and Appellate Jurisdiction, which came before the High Court and were decided during the year. The insti-

tutions of first appeals and second appeals were more by 55 and 72 respectively than in 1924 while there was no variation in the number of appeals from orders.

- 22. Appeals decided—Statements Nos. 7 and 8.—The disposals of first and second appeals and of appeals from orders show an increase of 204, 503 and 26 respectively on the figures of the previous year.
- 23. Appeals pending—Statements Nos. 7 and 8.—At the close of the year, 660 first appeals, 547 second appeals and 44 appeals from orders were pending. The aggregate total of the pending appeals is less by 389 than in 1924.

25. Results of Appeals—Statement No. 7.—Of the 562 appeals from Original Decrees decided, 43 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 519, decrees of lower Courts were confirmed in 324, reversed in 138, modified in 42, and remanded in 15.

Of the 1,254 appeals from Appeliate Decrees decided, 537 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 717, decrees of the lower Courts were affirmed in 478, reversed in 185, modified in 40, and remanded in 14.

Statement No. 8.—Of the 106 appeals from Orders decided, 34 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 72, orders of the lower Courts were affirmed in 45, reversed in 23, modified in 3, and remanded in 1.

No appeals or references under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, were filed during the year.

- 26. Appeals to the Privy Council.—At the opening of the year, 6 appeals were under preparation for despatch to England and 11 applications for leave were pending for orders. Nineteen new applications were filed during the year. Of the total number of applications for leave, 2 applications were withdrawn, 4 were rejected, in 7 Rule was discharged and in 9 Rule was made absolute. Eight applications for leave remained pending at the close of the year. During the year 5 appeals were despatched to England, and 6 appeals were under preparation.
- . 27. Results of appeals to the Privy Council.—During the year, 4 appeals from this Court were decided by the Privy Council with the result that 2 were dismissed with costs, 1 was dismissed under Rule 35 of the Judicial Committee Rules, 1908, for want of prosecution and 1 was allowed and the judgments and decrees under appeal were set aside. Seven appeals were pending before the Privy Council at the end of the year.

29. Appeals instituted—Statement No. 7.—4,632 appeals were instituted in 1925, showing an increase of 93, as compared with the previous year.

The number of appeals instituted was larger than in the previous year in nine and smaller in six districts. There was no variation in the number of institution in the Satara District.

There were noticeable increases in Broach and Panch Mahals (129), Ratnagiri (79), Nasik (63), Belgaum (61), Thana (59) and Sholapur (26); while there were noticeable decreases in Ahmedabad (178), Panch Mahals having been included in the Broach District, Poona (110), Khandesh (42) and Surat (35). In the remaining districts, the variations were less than 25.

30. Appeals disposed of—Statements Nos. 7 and 14.—4,594 appeals were disposed of during the year, of which 579 were disposed of by First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate powers. These figures are less by 318 and 111 respectively than the corresponding figures of the previous year.

Contingencies*

There was an increase in disposals in four districts and was the greatest in Khandesh (250), followed by Nasik (188) and Broach and Panch Mahals (39). On the other hand, there was a noticeable decrease in Satara (208), Sholapur (122), Ahmedabad (96), Dharwar (94), Kolaba (57), Kanara (54), Surat (53), Thana (46) and Poona (38).

31. Appeals pending—Statement No. 7.—There were 4,448 appeals pending at the close of the year, the number being more by 38 than at the end of 1924.

Statement No. 14.—The number of appeals pending for more than a year fell from 1,228 to 1,025.

32. Results of Appeals—Statement No. 7.—The results on the decision of the lower Courts of the appeals decided during the year were as follows:—

In 2,363 cases, or 51.4 per cent. of the whole, the judgment of the lower Court was affirmed; in 470 cases or 10.2 per cent. it was modified; and in 696 cases or 15.2 per cent. it was reversed. 265 or 5.8 per cent. appeals were remanded and 800 or 17.4 per cent. were either dismissed or not prosecuted.

33. Miscellaneous Appeals—Statement No. 8.—377 miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year and 120 were pending at its commencement. Of the total 497, 365 were disposed of during the year and 132 remained pending at its close. The number pending was more by 12 than in the previous year.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION

- I. Civil Courts in the Mofussil Subordinate to the High Court
- 34. Changes in Jurisdiction.—During the year under report, changes were effected in the jurisdiction of some of the Civil Courts in the Presidency as under:—
 - (1) With effect from 1st January 1925, the village of Vethne here-tofore included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Court of the Subordinate Judge of Dahiwadi in the Satara District was excluded therefrom and included in the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Koregaon in the said district.
 - (2) With effect from 15th June 1925, 74 villages of the Prantij Taluka and 5 of the Modasa Mahal hitherto in the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Kapadvanj were excluded therefrom and included in the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the First Class Subordinate Judge of Ahmedabad.
 - (3) With effect from 1st August 1925, the Revenue District of the Panch Mahals was excluded from the Ahmedabad Judicial District and included in the Broach Judicial District, and the District Court of Broach was styled the District Court of Broach and Panch Mahals with head-quarters at Broach; and the Additional First Class Subordinate Judge in the Judicial District of Ahmedabad, stationed at Nadiad,

was also made an Additional First Class Subordinate Judge in the Judicial District of Broach and Panch Mahals and he was directed to hold his Court at Nadiad for the disposal of such of the work of the Judicial District of Broach and Panch Mahals as the District Judge of Broach and Mahals may assign to him.

- (4) With effect from 12th October 1925, the Judicial District of Khandesh was abolished and in its stead two new districts were created namely:—
- (i) The Judicial District of East Khandesh, comprising the Talukas of Jalgaon, Jamner, Bhusawal with the Peta of Edalabad, Raver, Amalner, Parola, Erandol, Chopda and Yawal in the Revenue District of East Khandesh, having Jalgaon for its Sadar Station; and
 - (ii) The Judicial District of West Khandesh, comprising the Talukas of Dhulia, Sindkheda, Sakri, Nandurbar, Navapur, Taloda, Shahada and Shirpur of the Revenue District of West Khandesh and the Talukas of Chalisgaon, Pachora with the Peta of Bhadgaon of the Revenue District of East Khandesh, having Dhulia for its Sadar Station.
- 35. Original Suits instituted—Statement No. 3.—The number of suits instituted in 1925, was 124,170, showing an increase of 6,468 on the figures of the previous year.

The increase occurred in money and title suits to the extent of 6.2 and 3 per cent. respectively, the number of money suits instituted being 98,626 against 92,893 in 1924 and that of title suits being 25,544 against 24,809 in 1924.

Statement No. 4.—The total value of suits instituted in 1925 amounted to Rs. 4,25,60,757 showing an increase of Rs. 8,81,718 on the total for 1924.

36. Local Distribution—Statement No. 3.—The number of suits instituted in 1925 was larger than in the previous year in 14 and smaller in two districts.

The increase was most marked in the Districts of Broach and Panch Mahals (3,518), Thana (696), Poona (664), Satara (650), Nasik (582), Ratnagiri (520) and Belgaum (507) and occurred chiefly in money suits. There was marked decrease only in the district of Ahmedabad (2,192) owing to the separation of the Panch Mahals District.

Statement No. 3.—The largest number of suits was instituted in Ahmedabad (18,028), where the number of money suits (15,353), was the heaviest in the Presidency. In no other district except East Khandesh and Poona did institutions exceed, 10,000. Institutions were between 9,000 and 10,000 in the District of Nasik, between 7,000 and 8,000 in West Khandesh, between 6,000 and 7,000 in Ahmednagar, Broach and Panch Mahals, Dharwar, Satara, Sholapur and Thana, between 5,000 and 6,000 in Surat, between 4,000 and 5,000 in Belgaum, Bijapur and Ratnagiri, between 3,000 and 4,000 in Kolaba and 2,998 in Kanara which is the lowest figure of institutions.

37. Number of suits disposed of—Statement No. 5.—In addition to the 124,170 suits instituted during the year, and the 53,364 suits (including 345 Land Acquisition References in the districts of Thana and Kolaba) pending trial from the previous year, 1,475 suits were revived or received on remand or review, making a total of 179,009 for disposal.

The number of suits disposed of was 120,029 an increase of 2,850 on the figure of 1924.

Of the total number disposed of, 108,485 were disposed of by Paid Sub-Divisional Tribunals, that is, Courts of Subordinate Judges; 10,641 by Small Cause Courts; 846 by District Courts and 57 by Unpaid Tribunals, that is, by Inamdars and Jahagirdars.

38. Results of Suits decided—Statement No. 5.—Out of the suits disposed of during the year, 12,428 or 10.3 per cent. were disposed of without trial; 48,415 or 40.3 per cent. without contest; 58,520 or 48.8 per cent. with contest and in 666 or 6 per cent. a compromise was effected.

Of the 58,520 suits decided on contest, 50,921 or 87.1 per cent. resulted in favour of plaintiffs and 7,599 or 12.9 per cent. in favour of defendants.

- 39. Suits disposed of by Inamdars and Jahagirdars—Statement No. 5.— The Unpaid Tribunals disposed of 57 original suits of which 10 were contested. In 1924 the figures were 29 and 8 respectively.
- 40. Suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges—Statement No. 5.—The number of original suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges was 108,485 an increase of 2,091 on the figures of the previous year. The increase was in the number of cases decided under the ordinary procedure and was in contested suits only. The number of contested suits decided under the Small Cause Court procedure shows an increase (1,285) and that of uncontested suits a decrease (1,989), showing on the whole a decrease (704) in the number of suits decided under the Small Cause procedure. The number of suits decided under the ordinary procedure was 60,649 and under the Small Cause procedure 47,836. Of these 54.8 per cent. and 43.3 per cent. respectively were contested. The percentage of suits decided after contest both under the ordinary and Small Cause Court procedure shows an increase as compared with the previous year.
- 41. Suits disposed of by Small Cause Court Judges—Statement No. 5.— The Provincial Small Cause Courts disposed of 10,641 original suits of which 4,641 were contested. The latter shows an increase of 10 as compared with the previous year.
- 42. Suits disposed of by District and Assistant Judges—Statement No. 5.—The District Courts disposed of 846 original suits of which 551 were contested. The latter shows an increase of 163 as compared with the previous year.
- 43. Pending suits—Statement No. 5.—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 58,980 as against 53,019 in the previous year.

Statement No. 14.—Of the pending cases, 6,404 had been pending for more than a year, which shows an increase of 1,376 on the figures of the previous year. Of the suits pending for over one year, 392 were in the Courts of the District Judges, 5,998 in the Courts of Subordinate Judges, 12 in the Small Cause Courts and 2 in the Courts of Inamdars and Jahagirdars, the figures showing an increase of 250 and 1,159 respectively in the Courts of District Judges and Subordinate Judges, and a decrease of 31 and 2 respectively in the Small Cause Courts and in the Courts of Inamdars and Jahagirdars as compared with 1924.

The number of suits pending over a year was the largest in Poona (791) followed by Ahmedabad (738), Dharwar (632) and Belgaum (612). As compared with the figures of the previous year the number of year-old suits shows an increase from 440 to 632 in Dharwar, from 305 to 491 in Sholapur, from 613 to 791 in Poona, from 166 to 315 in Thana, from 205 to 350 in Nasik, from 615 to 738 in Ahmedabad, from 147 to 255 in Kanara, from 149 to 253 in Surat and from 469 to 561 in Satara. In other Districts the increase was less than 50. Only the districts of Ratnagiri and Belgaum show a decrease of 49 and 12 respectively as compared with the previous year.

44. Execution proceedings—Statement No. 13.—There were 53,400 applications for execution of decrees pending from the previous year and 1,20,370 were made during the year. Realization was complete in 29,063 cases and partial in 35,205. In 54,876 cases proceedings were returned as infructuous and 54,218 remained pending at the close of the year while 408 were disposed of by transfer. The total amount realized in Courts other than Small Cause Courts was Rs. 67,05,796-6-11\frac{1}{2}.

Debtors were imprisoned in 316 cases, moveable property was sold in 734 and immoveable property was sold in 2,585 cases.

45. Miscellaneous cases—Statement No. 6.—The number of miscellaneous cases instituted rose from 10,796 to 10,996. The number disposed of rose from 10,090 to 10,778 and that of pending cases also rose from 4,003 to 4,221. Of the cases disposed of, 1,239 were disposed of without trial, 3,282 without contest, 8 on reference to Arbitration, and 6,249 were contested. Of these 6,249 contested cases, 4,020 or 64.3 per cent. were decided in favour of plaintiffs.

II. Bombay Small Cause Court

46. Statements Nos. 3 and 5.—The number of suits instituted and decided in the Presidency Court of Small Causes during 1925 and the number pending at its close were 34,723, 34,525 and 5,654 respectively. The institutions show an increase of 863 while the disposals show a decrease of 617. The number of suits pending at the end of the year was more by 193 than in 1924.

Statement No. 4.—The increase in institutions occurred in suits not exceeding Rs. 10, Rs. 50, Rs. 100, and Rs. 500, while there was a decrease in suits exceeding Rs. 500 in value.

The total value of the litigation was Rs. 93,33,998 as against 1,00,30,605 in the preceding year.

- 47. Mode of disposal—Statement No. 5.—Of the 34,525 suits disposed of 786 were disposed of without trial, 30,819 were disposed of without contest, 2,850 were decided after contest and 70 upon reference to Arbitration.
- 48. Execution of decrees—Statement No. 13.—Of the 19,633 applications for the execution of decrees before the Court for disposal during the year, including 2,291 pending from the previous year, 17,760 were disposed of, and 1,973 remained pending at the close of the year, Of the latter, 387 were more than 3 months old. Of the applications disposed of 6,319 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted, 10,498 were returned as wholly infructuous and 843 were transferred to other Courts.

The total amount realized was Rs. 16,58,682 as compared with 16,51,803 in the previous year.

49. Coercive Processes—Statement No. 13.—In order to enforce the execution of decrees, imprisonment was resorted to in 228 cases and sale of moveables in 486. These figures are less by 6 and 341 respectively than those of 1924.

GENERAL

50. As compared with the figures of 1924, the number of suits instituted and disposed of in Subordinate Judge's Courts in 1925 increased by 5,249 and 2,091 respectively, the number of regular suits disposed of being more by 2,795 and those under Small Cause Court Jurisdiction being less by 704. The total number of suits pending and the number of suits pending over a year increased from 48,928 to 53,916 and 4,839 to 5,998 respectively.

The number of appeals disposed of by the District Courts was less by 318, the First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate powers having disposed of 579 appeals as against 690 in 1924. The total number of appeals pending in the District Court increased from 4,410 to 4,448.

The number of suits instituted and disposed of on the Original Side of the High Court in 1925 was less by 386 and 1,103 respectively. The number of pending suits decreased from 6,912 to 6,733.

On the Appellate Side of the High Court the total number of institutions of appeals increased from 1,454 to 1,592 and the total number of disposals increased from 1,237 to 1,982. The total arrears of appeals on the Appellate Side were reduced from 1,658 to 1,268.

51. Inspection.—In the course of the Inspection tour, which commenced on 1st November 1924 and ended on 28th February 1925, the Administrative High Court Judge, the Honourable Mr. Justice Kincaid inspected between 1st January and 28th February 1925 the District Courts, the First Class Subordinate Courts and also the Magisterial Courts at the Sadar Stations in the Districts of Belgaum, Dharwar, Ahmednagar, Nasik, Dhulia and Ahmedabad.

The Honourable the Chief Justice also visited during the year the Courts at Jalgaon, Godhra and Nadiad.

During the year the District and Assistant Judges inspected the following Courts of Subordinate Judges:—

Kaira and Nadiad in the Ahmedabad District; Parner and Newasa in the Ahmedagar District; Bail Hongal in the Belgaum District; Bagalkot in the Bijapur District; Godhra and Dohad in the Broach and Panch Mahals District; all the Subordinate Judge's Courts in the Dharwar District; Shirpur and Chalisgaon in the Khandesh District; Pimpalgaon and Yeola in the Nasik District; Small Cause Court, Poona, and the Subordinate Judge's Court at Junnar in the Poona District; Dapoli, Chiplun, Devrukh, Rajapur, Devgad, Vengurla and the First Class Subordinate Judge's Court at Ratnagiri in the Ratnagiri District; Dahiwadi, Wai, Vita, Patan and Tasgaon in the Satara District; all the Subordinate Judges' Courts except the First Class Subordinate Judge's Court in the Sholapur District; Bulsar in the Surat District; and Bhiwandi and Pen in the Thana District.

- 52. Receipts and Charges of the Civil and Criminal Courts.—The total receipts of all the Courts (Civil and Criminal) have fallen from 86,16,188 to 85,30,958 and the total charges have risen from 45,97,937 to 51,72,773. These figures are supplied by the Accountant General, Bombay, in accordance with the Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 5042, dated 11th August 1893.
- 53. The District Judges of Belgaum, Bijapur, Broach and Panch Mahals, Nasik, Ratnagiri and Sholapur assembled Judicial Conferences of the Judges subordinate to them, where points touching on the practice and procedure of Civil Courts were discussed.

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1925

1. Judicial Staff—Statement No. 1.—The Criminal Judicial Staff, employed in the Presidency on 31st December 1925, consisted of 10 High Court Judges; 16 Sessions Judges; 8 Additional Sessions Judges; 2 Assistant Sessions Judges; 329 First Class Magistrates; 375 Second Class Magistrates; 263 Third Class Magistrates; 158 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889 and 306 Village Panchayats under Bombay Act IX of 1920.

In addition to the above, the number of Police Patils in the Presidency exercising powers under section 14 of the Village Police Act, VIII of 1867, was 19,713. Out of these, 561 have also been invested with powers under section 15 of the said Act.

There were 52 Benches of Magistrates inclusive of those in the City of Bombay, constituted from among 463 Honorary Magistrates.

- 2. Offences reported—Statement No. 11.—There were 213,203 criminal offences reported during the year, showing an increase of 7,121 on the figures of 1924. In the Districts of Poona, Nasik, Bombay Suburban, West Khandesh, East Khandesh and in the City of Bombay, there was noticeable increase in the number of offences reported during the year, while on the other hand, there was a noticeable decrease in the Districts of Ahmedabad, Sholapur and Dharwar. Of the total number of offences reported, 48,731 were under the Indian Penal Code and 164,472 under the Special and Local Laws.
- 3. Complaints dismissed (Section 203, Criminal Procedure Code) and Complainants fined (Section 250, Criminal Procedure Code)—Statement No. 11.—The number of complaints dismissed under section 203 was 7,050, and the number of complainants fined under section 250 was 263.
- 4. Cases found to be true.—Of the total number of cases under inquiry 205,636 were found to be true. The number of cases brought to trial including those pending from the previous year was 209,472. Compared with 1924, the number of cases found to be true and the number of cases brought to trial show an increase of 6,635 and 11,544 respectively.
- 5. Murders reported as true.—Out of 627 cases affecting human life brought to trial during the year, 214 were murders. The corresponding numbers in the previous year were 695 and 216.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION

I-PRESIDENCY MAGISTRATES COURTS

6. Cases in Presidency Magistrates' Courts-Statement No. 11.-The total number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of Presidency Magistrates, before the Benches of Honorary Presidency Magistrates and before the Honorary Presidency Magistrates sitting singly was 124,592. This number is more by 8,593 than that of 1924. The number of cases under Special and Local Laws was 114,034 or 9.367 more than in 1924, while cases under the Penal Code fell from 11,332 to 10.558. The increase under the former head was most marked in offences under the City of Bombay Municipal Act which rose from 12.614 to 20,517 and under the City of Bombay Police Act from 60,790 to 65,456. The number of offences under the Motor Vehicles Act rose from 911 to 1.296; under the Indian Railways Act from 908 to 1,273; under the Bombay Rent Act from 135 to 394; under the Criminal Tribes Act from 7 to 154 and under the Arms Act from 27 to 41. There was a noticeable decrease in the offences under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act from 18,529 to 15,071; under the Prevention of Gambling Act from 1.454 to 874; under the Public Conveyances Act from 8,272 to 7.996: under the Indian Lepers Act from 106 to 30; under the European Vagrancy Act from 80 to 44 and under the Explosives Act from 8 to 1. As regards the offences under the Penal Code, there was an increase in the offences of criminal intimidation, insult and annoyance from 2.078 to 2,219; of criminal misappropriation of property from 78 to 100: of defamation from 68 to 90; of kidnapping from 33 to 44; and of unnatural offences from 4 to 12. On the other hand there was a noticeable decrease in offences of theft, of hurt, of criminal force and assault, of robbery and dacoity, and of public tranquility which fell from 3,200. 1.516, 1.242, 117 and 36 to 2,851, 1,289, 969, 69 and 15 respectively.

Statements Nos. 2 and 9.—During the year, 123,967 regular and 626 miscellaneous cases were disposed of and only 625 regular cases were pending at the close of the year. Of the cases disposed of the cases

of 152 persons were committed to the High Court.

7. Results of trials—Statement No. 9.—The aggregate number of persons under trial before the Magistrates was 133,330. Of the persons tried, 18,899 were acquitted or discharged; 113,371 were convicted; 18 were transferred; 152 were committed to the High Court; 9 were sent to Military Authorities; 2 died during their trials; 1 escaped and 878 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried for offences under the Penal Code, 4,849 were convicted and 10,762 were acquitted. The results of the trials before each of the three classes of Magistrates during the year are shown below:—

8. Punishments—Statement No. 12.—Of the persons convicted, 9,045 were punished with imprisonment, 87,670 with fine and 366 with whipping, 13,893 convicted persons were warned and discharged, 30 persons were sent to Leper Asylum at Matunga and 1,304 were released on probation of good conduct under section 562, Criminal Procedure Code.

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 4,69,923. Rs. 3,89,990 were realised of which Rs. 21,646 were paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to these sentences 5 complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code, the accusations having been found to be frivolous or vexatious.

II—Magistrates including Village Officers and Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards

79. Results of trials—Statement No. 9.—The aggregate number of persons under trial before these tribunals was 1,29,567. Of these, the cases of 750 persons were committed or referred to the Sessions and the cases of the remainder, that is of 128,817 persons, were finally disposed of by the various tribunals. 60,617 or 47 per cent. out of the total 128,817 were convicted and 67,763 or 52.6 per cent. were acquitted or discharged. 187 persons died and 250 escaped during their trials.

The total number of persons awaiting trial before Magistrates and Village officers at the close of the year 1925 was 9,065 as compared with 6,970 in 1924.

Of the sentences of imprisonment imposed, 1,750 were for terms not exceeding 15 days; 4,591 for terms not exceeding six months; and 1,049 for terms not exceeding 2 years.

Sentences of whipping were passed on 196 persons as against 148 in the preceding year.

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 7,18,601. Rs. 6,16,146 were realised out of which Rs. 37,568 were paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to the above, 258 complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code, the accusations having been found to be frivolous or vexatious. The figure for the last year was 254.

III—COURTS OF SESSION

- 11. Results of trials—Statement No. 9.—There were 1,729 persons, or 252 less than in 1924, under trial. The cases of 1,538 persons were decided, while those of 191 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the 1,538 persons tried 796 or 51·7 per cent. were convicted and 681 or 44·3 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, and the cases of 60 persons were referred to the High Court under sections 307 and 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, while one person died during trial.
- 12. Punishments—Statement No. 12.—The following sentences were passed by the Court of Sessions:—

Fines to the amount of Rs. 42,131 were imposed by the Courts of Session, as compared with Rs. 43,677 in the preceding year. The total realization amounted to Rs. 21,097 as compared with Rs. 8,045 in 1924. The amount of fines realised and paid as compensation rose from Rs. 600 to Rs. 3,300.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION

APPELLATE COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT

I. Appeals

- 13. Statement No. 2.—The number of appeals decided during the year was 2,448 as against 2,320 in the preceding year.
- 14. Magistrates' Courts—Statement No. 10.—The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 2,051. Of these appeals of 277 were summarily dismissed, and sentences on 999, whose appeals were admitted, were confirmed making a total of 1,276 wholly unsuccessful appellants or 62·2 per cent. Of the remainder, 206 appellants, or 10 per cent. obtained a modification of the sentences passed on them, and 496 or 24·2 per cent. their total annulment. The cases of 73 appellants were otherwise disposed of. As compared with 1924, the results were less favourable to appellants.
- 15. Sessions Courts—Statement No. 10.—During the year, the number of persons whose appeals were decided by the Courts of Sessions was 2,191. The appeals of 613 persons (or 28 per cent.) were summarily dismissed; 652 appellants, whose appeals were admitted were altogether unsuccessful; 359 obtained an alteration of sentence; 517 were acquitted and the cases of 50 appellants were otherwise disposed of.

The proportions of persons whose appeals were wholly unsuccessful, successful in obtaining a modification of the original orders and successful in obtaining their reversal, were 57·7, 16·4 and 23·6 per cent. respectively. Of those concerned in admitted appeals only, the proportions were 41·3, 22·7 and 32·8 per cent. If admitted appeals only are considered these results were on the whole more favourable to appellants than in the previous year, the percentage of successful appellants in 1925 being 55·5 against 51·2 in 1924.

II. Superintendence, Reference and Revision

- 16. Magistrates' Courts—Statement No. 10.—The cases of 230 accused persons who applied for revision, or against whom applications were made by complainants, came before District Magistrates for revision. The number was less by 23 than in 1924. Of the total, applications of 173 persons were rejected, those of 53 were otherwise disposed of, and the cases of 4 persons remained pending at the close of the year.
- 17. Sessions Courts—Statement No. 10.—Including the cases of accused persons, who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed on them in the Courts of Magistrates, and of those against whom such applications were made by complainants, the cases of 802 persons were decided on revision by Courts of Session during the year. The number was more by 80 than in 1924. Applications of 655 persons were rejected and those of 147 were otherwise disposed of.

HIGH COURT

I. Original Jurisdiction

18. Commitments to the High Court.—Three cases were pending at the opening of the year and 117 cases were brought to trial during the year. All the 120 cases were decided during the year and no case remained pending at its close.

Altogether 159 persons were tried, of whom 114 were convicted and .45 acquitted.

19. Punishments—Statement.No. 12.—The following sentences were passed:—

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 6,200 and Rs. 902-13-9 were realized during the year. Rs. 100 were paid as compensation to complainants.

II. Appellate Jurisdiction

20. Statement No. 10.—At the opening of the year 60 appeals were pending before the High Court from sentences or orders of Criminal Courts. During the year, 542 appeals were preferred and 541 decided leaving 61 pending at its close. The numbers preferred and decided were both less by 108 than in the preceding year. The number of pending appeals was more by one than in the preceding year.

Of the appeals preferred against sentences 375 were from Courts of Session and 149 from Courts of Presidency Magistrates, while 18 were preferred by the Local Government against orders of acquittal.

21. Results of Appeals.—380 appeals against sentences passed by the Courts of Session were decided. The sentences of the lower Courts were upheld in 327 cases, reversed in 15 and modified in 25. 6 appeals were returned for presentation to proper Courts, 5 related to questions of sanction and 2 related to questions of property.

147 appeals against sentences by Presidency Magistrates were decided. The sentences were upheld in 141 cases, reversed in 5 and modified in one.

The results of appeals decided as affecting individuals, were as follows:—

Appeals of 442 persons were summarily dismissed under section 421 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. In admitted appeals, sentences of

112 appellants were confirmed, of 37 altered, of 22 reversed and of 2 otherwise disposed of.

In appeals against acquittal orders sentences were passed by the High Court on 36 persons while 17 persons were acquitted and in the case of one person a retrial was ordered.

Fourteen appeals by the Local Government against acquittal orders involving 54 accused persons were disposed of by the High Court during the year. In 9 cases involving in all 17 accused persons, the High Court allowed the appeals, set aside the orders of acquittal in respect of all the accused, and convicted them. In one case involving 5 accused persons, the High Court upheld the order of acquittal and dismissed the appeal. In 3 cases involving in all 31 accused persons the High Court upheld the orders of acquittal in respect of 12 accused, but set aside the order of acquittal and passed an order of conviction in respect of 19 accused. In the remaining one case involving one accused person, the High Court directed a retrial.

III. Superintendence, Reference and Revision

- 22. References under section 307, Code of Criminal Procedure.—No reference was pending in the High Court at the opening of the year; 15 were submitted to it during the year out of which 13 were decided during the year and 2 remained pending at its close. The result of the 13 cases disposed of was that the verdict of the jury was accepted in 3 cases and set aside in 7. In one case the High Court set aside the verdict of the jury and acquitted the accused. In two other cases each involving 3 accused persons, the verdict of the jury was accepted in respect of 2 accused and set aside in respect of the third in each case.
- 23. References under section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.—
 Twenty-two references under this section were submitted to the High
 Court during the year for confirmation of death sentences, and 11 were
 pending at its opening. 29 references involving 32 persons were decided
 during the year and 4 remained pending at its close. The death sentences
 were confirmed in the case of 20 persons and commuted to that of
 transportation for life in the case of 8. The remaining 4 persons were
 acquitted, their sentences being reversed.

During the year under report twenty-seven persons were executed in the Presidency.

24. Revision.—During the year, 86 cases were reported for the orders of the High Court by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates under section 438 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and 16 were pending at its opening. Of these 83 were decided during the year and 19 remained pending at its close. The number reported was less by 34 than in 1924. In 17 cases the orders sent up for revision were reversed, in one the proceedings were quashed, and in 10 new trials were ordered. Sentences were reduced or altered in 18, enhanced in 8 and in 29 cases the High Court declined to interfere.

Under section 435 of the Code of Criminal Procedure orders were passed in 279 cases, an increase of 31 on the figures of the previous year.

Of these 250 came before the High Court on application and 29 were taken up by the High Court on review of Criminal Returns or otherwise of its own motion.

Of the 250 applications for the issue of Rule, 168 were rejected. Of the 82 rules issued 30 were finally discharged, 30 were made absolute in their entirety, in 20 the orders complained of were modified and 2 were withdrawn.

In 22 out of the 29 cases taken up by the High Court suo motu, the orders passed by the lower Courts were not disturbed, in 5 the sentences were enhanced and in 2 reduced.

- 25. Applications for transfer.—62 applications under section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of cases (32 original and 30 appeals) from one Court or District to another were received during the year and 11 were pending at its opening. Of these 73, 62 cases were decided during the year, while 11 remained pending at its close. 36 were summarily rejected and in 3 transfer were granted without the issue of a rule. In 23 applications rules were issued, with the result that transfers were granted in 12 and refused in 8, while 3 applications were withdrawn.
- 26.
