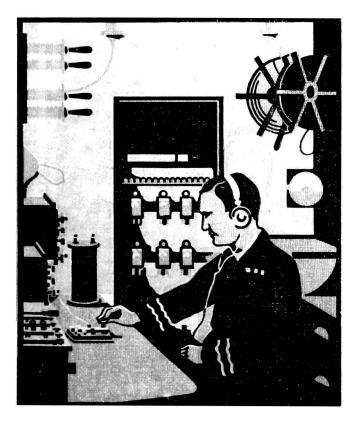
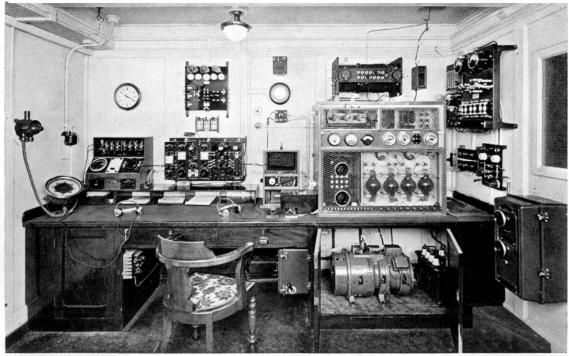

PREFACE

It is improbable that this preface will be read by the young people for whom the book has been written, but it explains the occasion of writing the book, and also tells what the book is about.

It is the author's forty-third book, and was written in connexion with the Christmas Lectures which he delivered to young people in Glasgow, at the request and under the auspices of the Royal Philosophical Society of Glasgow.

The Society desired to follow the lead, in a humble way, of the world-famous Christmas Lectures which have been delivered in the Royal Institution of London since the days of Faraday, and the author has followed the practice of some of the distinguished lecturers in writing the subject in book form, and then speaking from notes taken from the book. Of course, it was impossible to give all the details of the book in the lectures, but both cover the same ground,

The title—*Electricity as a Wizard*—was suggested to the author by his brother-in-law, Rev. W. J. Finlay Maguire, of Belfast, and it was

intended to indicate that the lectures were not ordinary school lectures.

Thinking it would be helpful to realize what the children think about electricity, the author asked the headmasters of four large schools to set an essay on the subject of electricity, and to give no time for preparation. The results showed the author where the difficulties lie; the essays are dealt with in two of the following chapters.

The lecturer dealt with electricity as a worker of wonders, and the idea of the wizard permeated the whole subject. As will be seen from the book, the lectures covered a very wide field, and dealt with Discovery, Invention, and Theory. It was explained that every existing thing was composed of electricity, and the inner meaning of things was explained in simple language; among the many marvels it was suggested that the most "wizardous" thing was making an iron plate speak in the telephone receiver.

The whole subject is kept well within the easy grasp of all boys and girls of school age.
