Road is metalled and runs northerly ; is bridged, but the Ry. bridge over the Nāri river though prepared for wheeled traffic is not opened. Between Bindli and Kōlpur it lies in Bōlān pass tahsil (under P. A. Kalāt) ; Sariāb is in Quetta tahsil (under P. A. Quetta). There are shops at Bindli, Mach station and Kōlpur, where ordinary native provisions in a limited quantity are available. There is also a refreshment room at Mach Ry. station. For large supplies as also for milk, fowls, eggs, fael and fodder at all stages notice should be given to the Tahsildārs through the P. A. Good water from irrigation channels at Bindli ; from the river at Kundalāni and Bibi Nāni ; from springs at Kirta and Mach ; piped water at Kōlpur ; from well and kārēz at Sariāb. For large parties visiting Kōlpur 24 hours' notice should be given to the Ry. intimating the number of men and animals for which water is required.

XVIII.—TRAVELLERS' BUNGALOWS

There are two kinds of travellers' bungalows in the district—
(i) rest house, and (ii) Political and Military Works inspection bungalows.

Officials drawing Rs. 100 per mensem and over, N.-C. O.'s and private gentlemen, are entitled to accommodation in a rest house on payment of eight annas a head for every 24 hours, with half fees for short stays not exceeding five hours. Officials in superior service drawing less than Rs. 100 per mensem and European soldiers are entitled to shelter in a special room set apart in the compound on payment of one anna a head for every 24 hours, with half fees for less than five hours. Six pies a day are charged for every horse tethered in the compound. Servants are housed in outhouses, and sepoys, police, etc., in the adjoining shelters free of charge. Travellers must make their own arrangements for supplies and cooking, but where possible the man in charge provides wood, etc., on payment.

Political and Military Works inspection bungalows are specially reserved for departmental officers on tour. The gazetted officers of the department owning the bungalow have prior claims to accommodation in order of seniority; subject to this rule, the officer in charge of a bungalow may lend it, without payment, to any gazetted officer of any other department travelling on duty, and may also permit others to occupy it, when available, for a period not exceeding seven days.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The total length of the Nushki trade route from Quetta to Nasratābād, the capital of Sistān, is roughly 562 m. As far as Killa Rōbāt (462½ m.) the road lies in British territory, thence onward through Persia.

From Quetta the road proceeds in a south-westerly direction, along the Quetta plateau as far as Kishingi (3,930') and then descends abruptly to the Nushki plain (3,000'); from Nushki, the Ry. terminus to Dālbāndīn it runs over a level plain or *paṭ*; the going is good, there is good water at the stages and excellent grazing for camels along the whole length; from Dālbāndīn to Merūi (3 stages) it is partly along the level plain and partly along the skirt of the low mud hills known as the Chakul range; the going is good and there is sufficient camel grazing. The last portion from Merūi to Killa Rōbāt is more difficult; the greater part of the track lies over corrugated ground covered with sharp pieces of broken shale and slate and is very trying for transport animals; the marches are long and the water at several stages indifferent.

The road lies in Quetta-Pishīn as far as Girdī Talāo; Kānak and Murād Khān Killa are in Kalāt; the rest as far as Killa Rōbāt is in Chāgai and beyond in Persian territory.

The last two stages are without water. This route is much used by the caravans bringing grain from the Helmand. There is also an alternative route from Gurgarōk *via* Sardār Guan (13 m.), Kuchēn (13½ m.) and Mamū (10¼ m.) The direct route from Mamū to Khwāja Ali being devoid of water is rarely used, most caravans going from Mamū *via* Rōbāt as described above. XX.—TRAVELLERS' BUNGALOWS

There are two kinds of travellers' bungalows in the district :
(i) rest-houses, and (ii) Political inspection bungalows.

Officials drawing Rs. 100 per mensem and over, N.-C. O.'s and private gentlemen, are entitled to Rest-houses accommodation in a rest-house on payment of eight annas a head for every 24 hours, with half fees for short stays not exceeding five hours. Officials in superior service drawing less than Rs. 100 per mensem and European soldiers are entitled to shelter in a special room set apart in the compound on payment of one anna a head for every 24 hours, with half fees for less than five hours. Six pies a day are charged for every horse tethered in the compound. Servants are housed in out-houses, and sepoy, police, etc., in the adjoining shelters free of charge. Travellers must make their own arrangements for supplies and cooking, but where possible the man in charge provides wood, etc., on payment.

Political inspection bungalows are specially reserved for departmental officers on tour. The Political inspection bungalows gazetted officers of the department owning the bungalow have prior claims to accommodation in order of seniority; subject to this rule, the officer in charge of a bungalow may lend it, without payment, to any gazetted officer of any department travelling on duty, and may also permit others to occupy it, when available, for a period not exceeding seven days.
