BILL No. X OF 1924.

*A Bill further to amend the Bombay
District Municipal Act, 1901.*

(As amended by the Select
Committee.)

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Bombay District Municipal Act, 1901, in manner hereinafter appearing; It is hereby enacted as follows :—

Bom. III of
1901.

1. This Act may be called the
Short title. Bombay District
Municipal
(Amendment) Act, 192 .

2. In clause (c) of sub-section (1) of section 15 of the Bombay District Municipal Act, 1901, hereinafter referred to as the said Act, the words "or who is of the female sex" shall be repealed.

Bom. III of
1901.

3. To section 23 of the said Act, the following sub-sections shall be added, namely :—

Amendment of section
23 of Bom. III of 1901.

~~"(9) Where the president and vice president are unable or for any reason fail to call a meeting for the purpose of an election under clause (e) of sub-section (2) or under sub-section (8) of section 23, the Collector may exercise the powers of the president for the purpose of calling such meeting."~~

"(9) On the dissolution of a municipality by lapse of time or otherwise and after a general election the Collector shall call a meeting

20 for the purpose of an election under clause (c) of sub-section (2) of section 23.

25 “(10) In the event of a vacancy occurring under sub-section (8) of section 23 the Collector shall call a meeting for the election of a new president if the vice-president fails to do so within 15 days of the occurrence of the vacancy.”

4. In section 31 of the said Act, the words “save as regards the disqualification on the ground of sex” shall be repealed.

Amendment of section 31 of Bom. III of 1901.

5. In sub-section (1) of section 91A of the said Act for the word “Municipality”

Amendment of section 91A of Bom. III of 1901.

5 where it occurs for the first time the words “city municipality and of such other municipality as may be notified by Government in this behalf” shall be substituted.

6. In sub-section (2) of section 107 of the said Act after the word “notice” the words “require the owner to” shall be inserted.

Amendment of section 107 (2) of Bom. III of 1901.

7. In section 179 of the said Act—

Amendment of section 179 of Bom. III of 1901.

5 (1) In sub-section (1) after the word “and” in line 11 the words “may dissolve such municipality or” shall be inserted;

10 (2) after sub-section (1) the following shall be inserted as sub-section (2), namely:—

“(2) On the dissolution of a municipality under sub-section (1)

the term of office of the councillors of such municipality shall ~~cease and determine~~ terminate and elections of councillors shall be held under the provisions of this Act or rules made thereunder applicable thereto, on or before a date to be specified by Government in this behalf in the aforesaid order";

(3) in sub-section (2),

(a) for the words "so superseded" the words "superseded under sub-section (1)" shall be substituted;

(b) for the words "exercise of such power" occurring in the margin the word "supersession" shall be substituted.

(4) (a) sub-sections (2), (3) and (4) shall be renumbered (3), (4) and (5) respectively, and

(b) in clauses (a) and (b) of sub-section (4) for the figure '(3)' the figure '(4)' shall be substituted.

BILL No. X OF 1924.

A Bill further to amend the Bombay District Municipal Act, 1901.

REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE.

We, the undersigned members of the Select Committee appointed to consider Bill No. X of 1924 (a Bill further to amend the Bombay District Municipal Act, 1901), have the honour to report as follows :—

2. The main question we had to consider was whether the new sub-section (9) proposed to be added to section 23 of the Bombay District Municipal Act by clause 3 of the Bill was adequate to the object in view ; and our conclusion,

after some discussion, was that provision was necessary for the following contingencies :—

(1) The case when after a dissolution, either by lapse of time or under the new sub-section to section 179, and a general election, there was no president to call a meeting ; and

(2) The case of a vacancy under section 23 (8) in the event of the vice-president failing to call a meeting to elect a new president.

We decided that in each of these cases the Collector should exercise the power of calling a meeting for the election of a new president, and have made the necessary provision in the proposed sub-sections (9) and (10) to section 23.

3. Two verbal amendments have been made in clause 7 in the proposed sub-section (2) to section 179.

4. We recommend that the Bill as amended should be translated into Marathi, Gujarati, Sindhi and Kanarese and should be published with the translations in the *Bombay Government Gazette*.

I would agree to the amending section No. 7 of the new bill, provided the following words from section 179 of the District Municipal Act, which is under amendment, are repealed: "supersede them for a period to be specified in the order" and the necessary changes are made in the clauses 1, 2, 3 and 4 of the amending section 7.

'BILL No. VIII OF 1924.

*A Bill further to amend the Deccan
Agriculturists' Relief Act, 1879.*

(As published in the "Bombay
Government Gazette" of the
21st January 1924.)

XVII of 1879.

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, 1879, in its application to the Presidency of Bombay in the manner hereinafter appearing; And Whereas the previous sanction of the Governor General required by clause (e) of sub-section (3) of section 80A of the Government of India Act has been obtained for the passing of this Act: It is hereby enacted as follows:—

5 & 6 Geo. 5,
c. 61.

1. (1) This Act may be called the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1924.

(2) It extends to the whole of the Presidency of Bombay.

XVII of 1879.

2. In section 2 of the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, 1879, hereinafter called the said Act, the figure "II" shall be omitted.

3. The following new section shall be substituted for section 3 of the said Act, namely:—

"3. The provisions of this Act shall apply to—

(w) suits for the recovery of money alleged to be due to the

- plaintiff—on account of money lent or advanced to, or paid for, the defendant, or as the price of goods sold, or on an account stated between the plaintiff and defendant, or, on a written or unwritten engagement for the payment of money not hereinbefore provided for when the defendant or any one of the defendants is an agriculturist; 10 15 20
- (x) suits for recovery of money due on contracts other than the above and suits for rent or for moveable property, or for the value of such property or for damages, when one of the parties to the suit is an agriculturist; 25
- (y) suits for foreclosure or for the possession of mortgaged property, or for sale of such property or for foreclosure and sale, when the defendant or any one of the defendants is an agriculturist; and 30
- (z) suits for the redemption of mortgaged property when the plaintiff, or, where there are several plaintiffs, any one of the plaintiffs, is an agriculturist.” 35
4. In section 24 of the said Act Amendment of section 24. the words “except as provided in Chapter VII of this Act” are hereby repealed. 5
5. Sections 4, 5, 6, 7 and 10 and Repeal of sections 4, 5, 6, 7 and 10 and Chapter VII. the whole of Chapter VII of the said Act are hereby repealed: 5
- Provided that such repeal shall not affect any proceedings before or after decree in any suit instituted before the commencement of this Act.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

In the year 1912 Government appointed a Commission to inquire into and to report on the working of the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, 1879. In paragraphs 25 and 44 of their report this Commission recommended that Chapters II and VII of the Act should be repealed in order to secure uniformity of procedure in the Presidency, and that Chapter II should be replaced by a new section, enumerating the classes of suits to which the amended Act should apply. This Bill is intended to give effect to the Commission's recommendations on these points. Its principal object is to simplify the Act and to make the procedure in suits to which it applies similar throughout the Presidency.

APPENDIX 4.

BILL No. XII OF 1924.

A Bill to provide for the collection of statistical information for public purposes.

(As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the 30th April 1924.)

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the collection of statistical information for public purposes; AND WHEREAS the previous sanction of the Governor General required by clause (e) of sub-section (3) of section 80A of the Government of India Act has been obtained for the passing of this Act; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

S. & C. Geo.
V. s. 61.

1. (1) This Act may be called
Short title. "The Bombay Statistics Act, 1924."

Extent and commencement.

2. (1) It extends to the whole of the Bombay Presidency.

(2) It shall come into operation on such date as may be fixed by the Governor in Council by notification in the *Bombay Government Gazette*. 5

3. In this Act, unless there is anything repugnant in the subject or context—
Definitions.

(1) "Director" means the Director of the Labour Office of the Government of Bombay, and includes any person for the time being acting in that capacity. 5

(2) "Factory" means any building or place used for the purpose of manufacturing, treating, repairing or preparing any article. 10

(3) "Employer" includes

(a) any employer in any industry; 15

(b) the manager, overseer or other person for the time being acting for and on behalf of any employer. 20

(4) "Industry" includes

(a) any business, trade, undertaking or calling of employers;

(b) any calling, service, employment, handicraft or industrial occupation or avocation of employees; and 25

(c) a branch of an industry or a group of industries.

(5) "Dwelling" means a building, tent or vessel whether permanent or temporary, which is wholly or partly used for the purpose of human habitation, and includes a vessel in any port of the Bombay Presidency. 30 35

(6) "Occupier" or "Person in Charge" includes every master, keeper, chief officer, or other person

40 in actual charge of any jail, prison,
hospital, or other public or charitable
institution.

45 (7) "Shop" includes any store or
place in or from which any articles
are sold.

(8) "Owner" includes the man-
ager or other person for the time
being in charge of any factory,
shop, or place of business.

4. Subject to the provisions of
this Act and the
Scope of the statis-
tics. rules made there-
under statistics shall

5 be collected for public purposes from
time to time by the Director relat-
ing to all or any of the following
matters :—

10 (1) prices of commodities and the
cost of living ;

(2) rents of dwellings ;

(3) rates of wages and hours of
labour ;

•
15 (4) employment and unemploy-
ment ;

(5) industrial disputes ; and

20 (6) any other matter which the
Governor in Council may by noti-
fication in the *Bombay Government
Gazette* prescribe.

5. Subject to the general or special
orders of Govern-
Publication of sta-
tistics. ment, the Director
shall compile and

5 tabulate the statistics so collected
and may publish them or abstracts
thereof with any observations he may
deem proper to make thereon.

6. For the purposes of sections 4 and
5 the Director may
Preparing and filling
up of forms. deliver to any person,
employer, owner,

5 occupier or person in charge a notice in

such form as he considers necessary for obtaining any information required. Every person, employer, owner, occupier or person in charge to whom any such notice is delivered shall fill up the forms required by such notice to be filled up, or cause the same to be filled up, with the information required in the forms to the best of his knowledge, information and belief and shall, within the time prescribed in the notice, supply the information required to the Director.

7. Every person or local authority who has the custody or charge of any provincial, municipal or other public records or documents, or of any records or documents of any corporation from which information sought in respect of the objects of this Act can be obtained, or which would aid in the completion or correction thereof, shall grant to the Director or any other person deputed by the Director for that purpose in writing, access thereto for the obtaining of such information therefrom.

8. Every form delivered or issued by the Director under this Act shall be sufficiently authenticated if the name of the Director by whom it is delivered or issued has been printed or stamped thereon.

9. For the purposes of this Act a notice shall be deemed to have been delivered to any person, employer, owner, occupier, or person in charge, if such notice shall have been personally delivered to such person, employer, owner, occupier, or person in charge by the Director

10 or by his agent, or shall have been
left at the usual or last known place
of business or the usual or last known
place of abode of such person, employ-
er, owner, occupier, or person in
15 charge, or if the same shall have been
forwarded by post addressed to such
person, employer, owner, occupier, or
person in charge at his usual or last
known place of business or at his
20 usual or last known place of abode.

10. For the purpose of making any
enquiries or observa-
Power to enter fac-
tories, etc. tions necessary for
the proper carrying
5 out of this Act the Director or any
person authorised in this behalf by the
Director in writing, may, at any
reasonable hour between sunrise and
sunset enter any factory, mine, building

(5) wilfully refuses to answer to the best of his knowledge and belief any question asked by the Director or by any officer deputed by the Director for that purpose which he may lawfully be required to answer, or makes a false answer to such question, knowing the answer to be false,

shall be punished for each such offence with simple imprisonment which may extend to six months or with fine which may extend to Rs. 1,000 or with both.

12. No individual return or part of an individual return, made, and no answer to any question put, for the purposes of this Act shall, without the previous consent in writing of the person, employer, owner, occupier, or person in charge for the time being of the undertaking or dwelling in relation to which the return or answer was made or given, be published, nor, shall any person not engaged in an enquiry instituted by the Director as prescribed under this Act be permitted to see any such individual return or any part of an individual return ; and no report, summary, statistics or publication issued by the Director shall contain any of the particulars comprised in any individual return, so arranged as to enable any person to identify any particulars so published as being particulars

13. Any person engaged in the collection, tabulation, compilation or publication of returns or information required under this Act who

- (1) puts an offensive or improper question to any person; or
- (2) divulges any information obtained by him in the performance of his duties

shall be punished for each such offence with simple imprisonment which may extend to six months or with fine which may extend to Rs. 1,000 or with both.

14. Save in the case of a prosecution under this Act no return made in pursuance of any of the requirements or provisions of this Act shall be admissible in evidence in any civil Revenue or criminal court.

Inadmissibility in legal proceedings.

15. (1) No prosecution shall be instituted under this Act except with the previous sanction of Government.

Procedure.

(2) All offences against this Act shall be triable by the Court of a Presidency Magistrate or of a Magistrate of the first class.

16. (1) The Governor in Council may make rules for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of this Act.

Power to make rules.

(2) In particular, and without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing power, such rules may provide for

- (a) prescribing the particulars and information to be furnished in relation to any matter in respect of which statistics may be collected under this Act;

(b) prescribing the manner and form in which, the times and places at which, and the persons by whom and to whom such particulars and information shall be furnished. 15

17. Rules made under section 16 shall be published in Commencement of the *Bombay Govern-ment Gazette* and shall thereupon have effect as if enacted in this Act. 5

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The general principles of statistical acts are almost universally accepted, and India is now almost alone among the chief industrial countries in being without legislation for the collection of statistics.

The Imperial Statistical Conference which met in London in 1920 definitely supported the principle of collecting statistics under statutory powers and Resolution No. 13 of that Conference reads as follows:—

“The Conference affirms its opinion that the accuracy of statistical information secured by means of voluntary or optional returns is open to serious doubt. The Conference therefore recommend that whenever a Government calls for statistics on any subject or series of subjects it should confer the necessary statutory authority upon its officers for their collection.”

Since the Labour Office was founded in April 1921 statistics have been collected in Bombay without compulsion. In a few exceptional cases, notably in the engineering trades, the smaller concerns have been unwilling to furnish statistics although they were given assurances that no individual returns would be published. The recent industrial strikes in the Presidency, especially in Ahmedabad, have proved the necessity for complete and accurate information. At the last wage census, 39 mills only, out of 64, gave the information required. In order, therefore, to obtain full and accurate statistics of labour, as is customary in other industrial countries, it has been deemed necessary to follow the example of those countries and to adopt the Resolution of the Imperial Statistical Conference. A bill has, therefore, been drawn up on the lines of the legislation of those countries.

Detailed explanations of the provisions of the Bill are given in the subjoined notes on clauses.

Notes on Clauses.

Clause 3 (2).—"Factory". The definition of "factory" is wider than that in section 2 (3) of Act XII of 1911 as amended by Act II of 1922. The definition given in section 10 of the Victorian Statistics Act, 1915, has been adopted.

Clause 3 (5).—"Vessel" has been included in view of the labour employed at the Docks including lascars, etc., on ships.

Clause 4.—It will be seen that the statistics are to be collected subject to the provisions of the Act and subject to the direction of the Governor in Council. The statistics have also been clearly defined. The scope of the statistics is considerably less than that in vogue in the Dominions. Dominion legislation generally covers all statistics.

Clause 5.—This clause has been adopted from section 14 of the Western Australia "Statistics Act, 1907" with the word "Statistician" changed to "Director". It gives statutory powers to publish the statistics to be compiled under the Act.

Clause 6.—This clause is similar to section 2 of "The Statistical Returns Act, 1877" of Tasmania and section 4 of "The Statistical Returns Act, 1896" of Queensland and section 30 in the New Zealand "Census and Statistics Act" No. 64 of 1910. This clause provides for the preparation and issue of forms on which the returns are to be called for.

Clause 7.—This clause deals with the access to records. It follows section 10 of Canadian Statistics Act of 1918 which is, in many respects, a model Act and it is based on the working of all other statistical Acts. This Act is also one of the most recent pieces of legislation on the subject.

Clause 8.—It is necessary to have a clause for the authentication of all forms and this closely follows section 2 of the South African Act.

Clause 9.—This clause follows in the main the last paragraph of section 3 of the Tasmanian Act No. 15 of 1877. It makes clear when a notice shall be deemed to have been delivered.

Clause 10.—This clause is to be found in all Acts of this nature as it is *prima facie* necessary for the purposes of the Act. Attention is particularly invited to section 14 of the Victorian Act of 1915; to section 19 (1) of the Commonwealth of Australia Act No. 15 of 1905; to section 24 (1) of the New Zealand Act No. 64 of 1910; to section 11 (1) of the Western Australia Act No. 3 of 1907; and to section 5 (1) of the Union of South Africa Act No. 38 of 1914.

All these Acts confer this power on the Director, Statistician, Commissioner or Registrar General as the case may be.

Clause 11.—All statistical Acts contain penalties for refusing or neglecting to supply information. Clause 11 is necessary in view of clause 10. In addition to the penalties for failing to supply information there are also penalties provided for those engaged in the compilation of the statistics who divulge information. This will be seen in clause 13 below. The penalties in some of the Acts are very severe. In the Census of Production Act of the United Kingdom, 1906, section 12, the penalty for not giving information is a fine not exceeding ten pounds and in the case of a continuing offence a further fine not exceeding five pounds for each day during which the offence continues. Under section 6 (5) of the same Act the penalty for divulging information is “imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding two years, or a fine, or both imprisonment and a fine.” Section 13 of the South African Act No. 2 of 1910 prescribes “a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or in default of payment to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding three months, or to such imprisonment without the option of a fine.” The Commonwealth of Australia, and the Western Australia Acts prescribe penalties of fifty pounds. Section 36 of the Canadian Act of 1918 lays down a liability to “a penalty not exceeding three hundred dollars and not less than fifty dollars, or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months and not less than one month, or to both fine and imprisonment.” Section 16 of the Victorian Act of 1915 prescribes “a penalty of not more than fifty pounds.”

Clause 12.—This is a safeguard common to all such Acts to prevent the publication of any individual returns and is meant to safeguard employers and persons furnishing returns.

Clause 13.—Similar provisions are common to all such Acts but sub-clause (a) is to be found in the South African “Census Act” No. 2 of 1910 and is meant to protect the public from offensive or improper questions.

Clause 14.—This is intended to be an additional safeguard for employers. It is similar to section 17 (2) of the Victorian Statistics Act of 1915.

Clause 15.—This clause requires no explanation. In the Western Australia Act No. 3 of 1907, section 23, it is provided that “Any person authorised in writing by the Statistician in that behalf may prosecute for offences against this Act.” Sub-section (2) of this clause follows the usual Indian legislation.

Clause 16.—Almost all the Acts give power to the Government in each country to make regulations. Section 35 of the New Zealand Act No. 64 of 1910, for example reads as follows:—

“The Governor may make regulations, not inconsistent with this Act, prescribing all matters and things which by this Act are required to be prescribed or which are necessary or convenient for carrying out or giving effect to this Act.”

APPENDIX 5.

BILL No. V OF 1924.

A Bill further to amend the Karachi Port Trust Act, 1886.

REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE.

We, the undersigned members* of the Select Committee appointed to consider Bill No. V of 1924 (A Bill further to amend the Karachi Port Trust Act, 1886), have the honour to report as follows:—

We have met four times and have considered the provisions of the Bill relating to (1) the number of trustees which should constitute the new Board, (2) the adequacy of the representation of Indian interests thereon, (3) the propriety of naming the Indian mercantile bodies to be given representation, and (4) the probability of some of the now existing mercantile bodies continuing to do so in the future.

We think that the Board should consist of 14 members, and that Indian interests are sufficiently represented by the provisions made to that end in the Bill. We have therefore made no fresh proposals on these two points. It was suggested that one of the trustees to be nominated by Government should be a representative of labour, but we have thought it best not to incorporate such a provision in the Bill.

We believe it is better to leave the selection of the Indian mercantile bodies which are to be given representation on the Board to Government: for the number and importance

of these bodies has varied from time to time. Government will then be in a position to give such representation as may be necessary to the most important of them.

It has further been represented to us that these mercantile bodies are voluntary associations with no definite legal status, although facilities for registering such associations, at a nominal cost, already exist. We feel that it is fair to require that registration as a company or association should be a necessary precedent to such bodies being given the right to elect a trustee or trustees to the Board, and have made provision to this effect in the new sub-section (2) to section 7 in clause 4 of the Bill.

The Act makes no definite provision for the following contingencies :—

- (1) a trustee ceasing to be a member of the body by which he has been elected ; and
- (2) the vacation of the seat of a trustee, in the event of the dissolution of the body which has elected him, during his term of office.

We think that both these cases should be provided for, and have proposed amendments to section 15A of the Act to this effect, in a new clause 7.

We recommend that the Bill, as amended, should be translated into Marathi, Gujarati, Urdu and Sindhi, and should be published with the translations in the *Bombay Government Gazette*.

We cannot consent to the retention of the total number at 14. The Chairman of the Select Committee rightly

decided that the Select Committee could increase the number. We reiterate our dissent as we placed before the Select Committee.

We are of opinion that the Act should make it clear that two at least of the trustees to be nominated by the Government should be Indians, one of them being a representative of labour, so far as possible.

Usually a representative of the Military and of the Customs Department are on the Port Trust—and we believe shall continue to be placed on the Trust: in the section, one seat will be reserved for the nomination by Government for the representative of the N. W. Railway. Therefore the purpose could be served by changing “four into five”, allotting three, one to the Railway and two (by implication and by power of nomination) to the Military and Customs Departments.

By this method of changing four into five in line 18 and making it clear that ‘2 at least shall be Indians,’ the object would be served.

I am of opinion that it is possible to make it clear in the Act that out of the three trustees to be nominated by Government one should be a “non-official Indian who shall be so far as possible a representative of labour.” Such a provision will be a suitable recognition of the growing importance of labour in the industrial and shipping development of this Presidency. I quite appreciate, however, the point of view urged in the select committee that as labour in Karachi has not been properly organised and there is at present no accredited association which can speak in the name of labour, it would not be advisable to incorporate in the Act labour representation on the Board. But still I think the change suggested leaves fair latitude to Government to give representation to labour as and when labour is properly organised and till then to nominate any other non-official Indian.

R. D. SHINDE,

(Minute of dissent by Dr. K. E. Dadachanji, M.L.C.).

I agree with the report and still suggest that one of the trustees to be nominated by Government should be a representative of labour.

K. E. DADACHANJI.

(Minute of dissent by Mr. Haji Abdoola Haroon, M.L.C.)

1. As regards the adequacy of the representation of Indian interests and the propriety of naming the Indian mercantile bodies, to be given representation on the Board of Trustees for the Port of Karachi, I do not agree with my colleagues.

2. "To secure adequate representation of Indian Commercial interests" which is the object of the bill, majority of the members of the board of trustees should be of Indian non-officials.

3. I therefore suggest that in section 5 the number should be raised from 14 to 15, so that there should be eight Indian non-officials and seven other members on the board of Karachi Port Trust, as shown by me in paragraph 5.

4. I agree that registration as a company or association should be a necessary precedent to any mercantile body being given the right to elect a trustee or trustees to the board and therefore I accept provision made to this effect in the new sub-section 2 to section 7 in clause 4 of the bill. And exactly because such a condition has been explicitly mentioned thereby, I am of opinion that in sub-section 1 of section 7, those important Indian mercantile bodies must be clearly named which deserve to be given the right of representation which right of course will be exercised only when requirements of sub-section 2 of section 7 are fulfilled.

5. Therefore I am of opinion that section 7:(1) in clause 4 of the bill should read as follows :—

"7. (1) Of the remaining trustees, 4 shall be elected by the Karachi Chamber of Commerce, 2 shall be elected by the Karachi Indian Merchants Association, 2 shall be elected by the Karachi Buyers and Shippers Chamber, 1 shall be elected alternately by the Karachi Satnarain Piece Goods Association

and the Karachi Indian Sundry Merchants Association, 2 shall be elected by the Municipality of Karachi, and 3, of whom one shall be a non-official Indian, shall be appointed by Government."

And further that in new sub-section 2 of section 7 for the words "notified in this behalf" read the words "named in sub-section 1 above."

" I am of opinion that the object of the bill, viz., 'to secure adequate representation of Indian commercial interests on the Board of Trustees for the Port of Karachi' will be completely met by retaining the present number of members, viz., 11, and allotting seats to Indians in proportion to their commercial interest in the Port.

I therefore suggest that in section 5 the word 'fourteen' should be replaced by 'eleven'. That section 7 (1) in clause 4 of the bill should read:—

'Of the remaining trustees, three shall be elected by the Karachi Chamber of Commerce, two shall be elected by the members for the time being of such Indian mercantile bodies as the Governor in

Council shall from time to time notify in this behalf, one shall be elected by the Municipality of Karachi and four, of whom one shall be representative of the North-Western Railway, shall be appointed by Government. Any trustee elected or appointed under this section may be a public officer or not.'

Should the number of trustees be maintained at 14 proposed in the bill, then I agree with the majority report."

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The objects of this Bill are (1) to extend the period of operation of the Bombay Rent (War Restrictions) Act, 1918,

and the Bombay Rent (War Restrictions, No. 2) Act, 1918, as regards dwelling-houses in the Municipal district and Cantonment of Karachi up to the 31st December 1925 and (2) to amend the provisions of the said Acts in regard to sub-letting with a view to preventing sub-letting of premises without the written permission of the landlord by monthly tenants or tenants holding under a lease for an indefinite period.

The period of operation of the said Acts was extended as regards Karachi up to the 31st August 1924 by Bombay Act III of 1923 on the recommendation of the Select Committee appointed to consider Bill No. XV of 1922 (which subsequently became Bombay Act III of 1923) which reported that the extension of the Acts up to the 31st August 1924 was quite sufficient for Karachi as the conditions in Karachi were different from those of Bombay. Experience has, however, shown that this is not the case, and that there is not sufficient reason to make a distinction between Karachi and Bombay. It is proposed, however, to extend the period of the Act as regards dwelling-houses only, as the Act will, as regards other premises, cease to be in operation in the whole of the Presidency on the 31st August 1924.

Section 5 of Bombay Act III of 1923 was intended to stop the practice of sub-letting by tenants, by forbidding it beyond the period of the original lease, and prohibiting it in the cases of tenants holding over under section 9 (1) of Bom. II of 1918. In the case of *Madhavji Virji vs. Lakshmidas Mulji & Co.* (25 Bom. L. R. 1178) it was, however, decided that the first part of section 9 (3) of Bombay Act II of 1918 only refers to the case of a tenant whose lease has terminated, and therefore to bring him under the section the sub-letting must have occurred after the expiry of his lease. It was also held in the same case that under the second part of the sub-section the term of the lease must have been fixed before the sub-letting. A monthly tenant or a tenant holding under a lease for an indefinite period cannot therefore be brought under the section.

The amendment proposed in clause 3 of the Bill is intended to prevent monthly tenants or tenants holding under a lease for an indefinite period from sub-letting their premises without the written permission of the landlord.

WHEREAS it is expedient further to facilitate the formation and working of co-operative societies for the promotion of thrift, self-help, and mutual aid among agriculturists and other persons with common economic needs and for that purpose to consolidate and amend the law relating to co-operative societies in the Presidency of Bombay; and whereas the previous sanction of the Governor General required by sub-section (3) of section 80-A of the Government of India Act has been obtained for the passing of this Act: It is hereby enacted as follows:—

1. This Act may be called the
Bombay Co-operative Societies Act,
Short title. 192 .
2. This Act extends to the whole of
the Presidency of
Extent. Bombay.
3. In this Act, unless there is any-
thing repugnant in

- 5 (a) "by-laws" means by-laws
registered under this Act and for the
time being in force and includes a
registered amendment of such
by-laws:
- 10 (b) "Committee" means the Com-
mittee of Management or other

directing body to whom the management of the affairs of a registered society is entrusted :

(c) " Member " includes a person joining in the application for the registration of a society or a person admitted to membership after registration in accordance with the rules and by-laws applicable to such society : 15 20

(d) " Officer " includes a chairman, secretary, treasurer, member of committee or other person empowered under the rules or under the by-laws of a registered society to give directions in regard to the business of such society : 25

(e) " Registered society " means a society registered or deemed to be registered under this Act : 30

(f) " Registrar " means a person appointed to perform the duties of a Registrar of Co-operative Societies under this Act : 35

(g) " Rules " means rules made under this Act :

(h) (1) a " Resource society " means a registered society formed with the object of obtaining for its members the credit, goods or services required by them in the prosecution of their trade or business or with the object of facilitating the operations of such societies ; 40 45

(2) a " producers' society " means a registered society formed with the object of producing and disposing of goods as the collective property of its members and includes a registered society formed with the object of the 50

55 collective disposal of the labour
of the members of such
society ;

(3) a "consumers' society"
60 means a registered society
formed with the object of
obtaining and distributing
goods to its members, as
well as to other consumers
65 and of dividing among its mem-
bers and customers in a pro-
portion prescribed by the rules
or by the by-laws of such society
the profits accruing from such
supply and distribution ;

70 (4) a "Housing Society" means a
registered society formed with
the object of providing its mem-
bers with dwelling houses on

The Registrar shall classify all
registered societies under one
or other of the above heads
and his decision shall be final.

80 A list of all such societies so classi-

(i) A "special resolution" means
85 a resolution,

(1) of which due notice has been
given as required by the by-
laws,

(2) which has been passed by a
90 three-fourth majority of the
members entitled to vote either
in person or by proxy at a
special general meeting of a
registered society, and

95 (3) which has been confirmed by
a majority of the members

entitled to vote at a subsequent special general meeting of which due notice has been given and which has been held not less than 15 days nor more than one month from the date on which the resolution was passed. 100

The Chairman's declaration that a resolution has been passed shall be deemed conclusive evidence of the fact. 105

Registration.

4. Government may appoint a person to be Registrar of Co-operative Societies for the presidency or any portion of it, and may appoint a person or persons to assist such Registrar, and may, by general or special order, confer on any such person or persons all or any of the powers of a Registrar under this Act. 5 10

5. Subject to the provisions hereinafter contained, a society which has as its object the promotion of the economic interests of its members in accordance with co-operative principles, or a society established with the object of facilitating the operations of such a society may be registered under this Act with or without limited liability: 5 10

Provided that, unless Government by general or special order otherwise directs—

(1) the liability of a society of which a member is a registered society shall be limited: 15

(2) the liability of a society of which the primary object is the

- 20 creation of funds to be lent to its members, and of which the majority of the members are agriculturists, and of which no member is a registered society, shall be unlimited
- 25 and the members of such a society shall be jointly and severally liable for and in respect of all obligations of such a society.

6. Where the liability of the members of a society is limited by shares, no member other than a registered society shall

Restrictions on interest of member of society with limited liability and a share capital.

- 5 (a) hold more than such portion of the share capital of the society, subject to a maximum of one-fifth,
- 10 as may be prescribed by the rules : or
- (b) have or claim any interest in the shares of the society exceeding three thousand rupees : provided that if the society is a housing
- 15 society a member may have or claim an interest in the shares of the society not exceeding Rs. 10,000.

7. (1) No society, other than a society of which a
- Conditions of member is a registered society, shall
- 5 be registered under this Act, which does not consist of at least ten persons above the age of eighteen years and where the object of the society is the creation of funds to be lent to
- 10 its members unless such persons—

(a) reside in the same town or village or in the same group of villages ; or

- (b) save where the Registrar otherwise directs, are members of the same tribe, class, caste or
- 15 occupation.

(2) The word "limited" shall be the last word in the name of every society with limited liability registered under this Act. 20

8. When any question arises whether for the purpose of this Act a person is an agriculturist or a non agriculturist, or whether any person is a resident in a town or village or group of villages, or whether two or more villages shall be considered to form a group, or whether any person belongs to any particular tribe, class, caste or occupation, the question shall be decided by the Registrar, whose decision shall be final. 5 10

Power of Registrar to decide certain questions.

9. (1) For purposes of registration an application to register shall be made to the Registrar. 5

Application for registration.

(2) The application shall be signed (a) in the case of a society of which no member is a registered society, by at least ten persons qualified in accordance with the requirements of section 7, sub-section (1); and 10

(b) in the case of a society of which a member is a registered society, by a duly authorised person on behalf of every such registered society and where all the members of the society are not registered societies, by ten other members or, when there are less than ten other members by all of them. 15 20

(3) The application shall be accompanied by a copy of the proposed by-laws of the society, and the persons by whom or on whose behalf such 25

30 application is made shall furnish such information in regard to the society as the Registrar may require.

10. If the Registrar is satisfied,
Registration. that a society has complied with the provisions of this Act and the rules and that its proposed by-laws are not contrary to this Act or to the rules, he may, if he thinks fit, register the society and its by-laws.

11. A certificate of registration signed by the Registrar shall be
Evidence of registration. conclusive evidence that the society therein mentioned is duly registered unless it is proved that the registration of the society has been cancelled.

12. Every registered society shall
Annual meeting. general within a period of two months after the date on which its accounts for the year are made up under the rules for the time being in force call a general meeting of its members.

10 The committee shall at such meeting submit a report of the previous year's working of the society. The general meeting shall elect a committee for the ensuing year and shall perform such other duties as it is required by the
 15 rules or by its by-laws to perform. The business of the general meeting shall be conducted by resolution and the decision shall go by a majority of votes.

13. Every registered society shall
Half-yearly meetings. also hold a special general meeting annually within six months of the
 5 date of the annual general meeting

to consider the half-yearly accounts and to perform such other duties as may be imposed upon it by the rules or by the by-laws of the society. 10

A special general meeting may be called at any time by a majority of the committee and shall be called— 15

(1) on the requisition of one-fifth of the members of the society, or,

(2) at the orders of the Registrar.

14. A registered society may, with the approval in writing of the Registrar and by special resolution, change its name: but such change shall not affect any right or obligation of the society, or of any of its members, or past members and any legal proceedings pending may be continued by or against the society under its new name. 5 10

15. (1) Any two or more registered societies may by special resolution of both or all such societies amalgamate as a single registered society. Such an amalgamation may be effected without a dissolution, or a division of the funds, of the amalgamating societies. The special resolution of the societies concerned shall be a sufficient conveyance to vest the property of the amalgamating societies in the amalgamated society on such an amalgamation. 5 10 15

(2) Any registered society may by special resolution transfer its assets and liabilities to any other registered

20 society which is prepared to accept them.

(3) A registered society may by special resolution by which its members subscribe their names to a memorandum of association and otherwise comply with the requirements of the Indian Companies Act, 1913, convert itself into a company under the said Act; or may amalgamate with or transfer its assets and liabilities to any such company.

VII of 1913;

(4) If a registered society is registered as or amalgamates with or transfers all its assets and liabilities to any such company the registration of such society under this Act shall thereupon become void, and the same shall be cancelled by the Registrar, but the registration of a society as a company shall not affect any right or claim for the time being subsisting against such society or any penalty for the time being incurred by such society, and for the purposes of enforcing any such right, claim or penalty the society may be sued and proceeded against in the same manner as if it had not become registered as a company; and every such right, claim or liability to such penalty shall have priority as against the property of any such company over all other rights, claims or liabilities of any such company.

16. (1) No amendment of the by-laws of a registered society shall be valid until approved by the resolution of an annual or a special general meeting, and registered under this Act, for which purpose a copy of the amendment shall be forwarded to the Registrar.

Amendment of the by-laws of a registered society.

(2) If the Registrar is satisfied that any amendment of the by-laws is not contrary to this Act or to the rules, he may, if he thinks fit, register the amendment. 15

(3) When the Registrar registers an amendment of the by-laws of a registered society, he shall issue to the society a copy of the amendment certified by him, which shall be conclusive evidence that the same is duly registered. 20

Rights and liabilities of members.

17. No person shall exercise the rights of a member of a registered society unless or until he has made such payment to the society in respect of membership, or acquired such interest in the society as may be prescribed by the rules or the by-laws of such society. 5
10

No rights of membership to be exercised till due payments are made.

18. (1) No member of any registered society shall have more than one vote in its affairs. 5

Votes of members.

(2) A registered society which has invested any part of its funds in the shares of another registered society may appoint one of its members or a member of some other registered society having a similar interest to vote by proxy in the affairs of such a registered society. 5
10

19. (1) The transfer or charge of the share or interest of a member in the capital of a registered society shall be subject to such conditions as to maximum 5

Restrictions on transfer of share or interest.

holding as may be prescribed by this Act or by the rules.

10 (2) A member shall not transfer any share held by him or his interest in the capital or property of any registered society or any part thereof unless

15 (a) he has held such share or interest for not less than one year; and

(b) the transfer or charge is made to the registered society or to a member of the registered society.

Duties of registered societies.

20. Every registered society shall have an address registered in accordance with the rules, to which all notices and communications may be sent, and shall send notice in writing to the Registrar of any change in the said address within 30 days of such change.

21. Every registered society shall keep open to inspection at all reasonable times at the registered address of the society—

Copy of Act, rules and by-laws to be open to inspection.

- 5 (a) a copy of this Act,
 (b) a copy of the rules governing such society,
 10 (c) a copy of the by-laws of such society, and
 (d) a register of its members.

22. (1) The Registrar shall by himself or by some person authorized by him in writing by general or special order in this behalf audit the

Audit.

accounts of any registered society once at least in every year.

(2) The audit under sub-section (1) shall include an examination of overdue debts, if any, the verification of cash balance and securities, and a valuation of the assets and liabilities of the society. 10.

(3) The Registrar or other person auditing the accounts of any registered society shall at all times have free access to the books, accounts and vouchers of such society and shall be allowed to verify its cash balances. 15.

The Directors, Managers, and other officers of the society shall furnish to the Registrar or other person appointed to audit or inspect the accounts of a registered society all such information as to its transactions and working as the Registrar or such person may require. 20.
25.

(4) The Registrar and every other person appointed to audit or inspect the accounts of a registered society shall have power 30.

(i) to summon and enforce the attendance at the time of his audit or inspection of any officer, agent, servant or member of the registered society who he has reason to believe can give valuable information in regard to any transaction of the society or the management of its affairs, or 35.
40.

(ii) to require the production of any book or document relating to the affairs of, or any cash belonging to, the society by the officer, agent, servant or member in possession of such book, document or cash. 45.

Privileges of registered societies.

23. The registration of a society shall render it a
Societies to be bodies corporate. bod. corporate by
 the name under
 5 which it is registered, with perpetual
 succession and a common seal, and
 with power to hold property, to enter
 into contracts, to institute and defend
 10 suits and other legal proceedings and
 to do all things necessary for the
 purposes of its constitution.

24. Subject to any prior claim
Prior claim of society. of Government in
 respect of land
 revenue or any money recoverable as
 5 land revenue or of a landlord in respect
 of rent or any money recoverable as
 rent,

(a) any debt or outstanding
 demand owing to a registered society
 10 by any member or past member
 shall be a first charge upon crops or
 other agricultural produce of such
 member or past member and upon
 any cattle, fodder for cattle, agri-
 15 cultural or industrial implements
 or machinery, or raw materials for
 manufacture or workshops, godown
 or place of business supplied
 to or purchased by such member
 20 or past member in whole or in
 past from any loan whether in
 money or goods given him by the
 society; and

(b) any outstanding demands or
 25 dues payable to a registered society
 by any member or past member in
 respect of rent, shares, loans, or
 purchase money or any other rights
 or amounts payable to a housing
 30 society shall be a first charge upon the

property, moveable or immoveable,
of such member or past member.

25. A registered society shall have
a charge upon the
share or interest
in the capital
and on the deposits 5
of a member or past member and
upon any dividend, bonus or
profits payable to a member or
past member in respect of any
debt due from such member or past 10
member to the society, and may set
off any sum credited or payable to a
member or past member in or towards
payment of any such debt.

26. Subject to the provisions of
section 25, the
share or inter-

ber in the capital of a registered
society shall not be liable to attach-
ment or sale under any decree or order
of a court of justice in respect of any
debt or liability incurred by such
member, and neither the Official 10

under the Provincial Insolvency Act,
1920, shall be entitled to or have any
claim on such share or interest. 15

29. The estate of a deceased member
 shall be liable for
 a period of one
 year from the date
 Liability of the estates

30. Any register or list of members or shares kept by any registered society shall be *prima facie* evidence of any of the following particulars entered therein :— 5

(a) the date at which the name of any person was entered in such register or list as a member ; 10

(b) the date at which any such person ceased to be a member.

31. A copy of any receipt, application, plan, notice, order or other document or of any entry in a register or list in the possession of a registered society shall, it duly certified in such manner as may be prescribed by the rules, be admissible in evidence of the existence of the document or entry and shall be admitted as evidence of the matters and transactions therein recorded in every case where, and to the same extent to which, the original document or entry would, if produced, have been admissible to prove such matters. 5

32. Nothing in section 17, subsection (1), clauses (b) and (c), of the Indian Registration Act, 1908, shall apply to— 5

(a) remit the stamp-duty with which,

force, instruments executed by or on behalf of a registered society or by an officer or member and relating to the business of such society, or any class of such instruments or awards of arbitrators under this Act are respectively chargeable; and 25

(b) any fee payable under the law of registration for the time being in force. 30

Property and funds of registered societies.

34. (1) A registered society shall not make a loan
Restrictions on loans. to any person other than a member : 5

Provided that, with the general or special sanction of the Registrar, a registered society may make loans to another registered society.

(2) Save with the sanction of the Registrar, a registered society with unlimited liability shall not lend money on the security of moveable property. 10

(3) Government may, by general or special order, prohibit or restrict the lending of money on mortgage of immoveable property by any registered society or class of registered societies. 15 20

35. A registered society shall receive deposits and
Restrictions on Borrowing. loans from persons who are not members only to such extent and under such conditions as may be prescribed 5

by the rules or by the by-laws of such society.

36. (1) Consumers', Producers' and Housing Societies may to the extent permitted by their by-laws trade with persons who are not members but the transactions of a Resource society with persons other than members except as provided under section 34 or 35 shall be subject to such prohibitions and restrictions, if any, as Government may by rules prescribe.

Restrictions on other transactions with non-members.

(2) Except as otherwise provided in its by-laws a Consumers' society may sell to customers who are not members as well as to its members such goods as it stocks for sale provided that the purchase is made for the consumption of the customer and not for purposes of re-sale.

37. A registered society may invest or deposit its funds

Investment of funds.

(a) in the Government Savings, Bank, or

(b) in any of the securities specified in section 20 of the Indian Trusts Act, 1882; or

(c) in the shares or on the security of any other registered society, provided that no such investment shall be made in the shares of any society other than one with limited liability; or

(d) with any bank or person carrying on the business of banking

approved for this purpose by the Registrar ; or

(e) in any other mode permitted by the rules. 20

38. (1) No registered society shall pay a dividend to its members at a rate exceeding 10 per cent. 5

Restrictions on dividend:
Reserve Fund.

(2) Every registered society which does or can lawfully derive a profit from its transactions shall maintain a reserve fund.

39. In the case of a Resource or Producers' society Contribution to reserve fund. to at least $\frac{1}{4}$ th of the net profits of the society each year shall be carried to the reserve fund and in the case of a Consumers' or Housing society at least $\frac{1}{10}$ th of the net profits of the society each year shall be carried to the reserve fund, and such reserve fund may be used in the business of the society or may be invested, subject to the provisions of section 37, as Government may by general or special order direct, or may, with the previous sanction of Government, be donated in whole or in part to some public purpose likely to promote the objects of this Act. 5 10 15

40. Subject to the provisions of section 38 (1) the balance of the profits of a registered society after making the prescribed provision for the reserve fund may together with any available profits of past years be distributed among its members, and 5

Restrictions on distribution of profits.

10 in the case of Consumers' and Producers' societies, also among persons who are not members, to the extent and under the conditions prescribed by the rules or by the by-laws of such societies provided that :—

15 (a) in the case of a Resource society on a basis of unlimited liability in which the members do not hold shares no distribution of profits shall be made ; and

20 (b) in the case of a Resource society on a basis of unlimited liability in which the members do hold shares no such distribution of profits shall be made until 10 years
25 from the date of registration of the society have elapsed.

41. Any registered society may
Provident Fund. establish a provident fund for its

• members out of contributions from
5 such members in accordance with by-laws made by the society in this behalf and may contribute to such provident fund from its net profits, after the prescribed payments have
10 been made to the reserve fund, provided that such provident fund shall not be used in the business of the society but shall be invested under the provisions of sections 37 ; and provided
15 further, that no part of such provident fund shall be considered as an asset of the society.

42. With the sanction of the Registrar and
Contribution to charitable purpose. after the payments prescribed

5 by section 39 have been made to the

reserve fund any registered society may—

(a) set aside a sum not exceeding 20 per cent. of its net profits, and 10

(b) utilize from time to time the whole of such sum in contributing to any public, co-operative, or charitable purpose.

Inspection of affairs.

43. (1) The Registrar may of his own motion by Inquiry by Registrar, himself or by a person duly authorised by him in writing in this behalf hold an inquiry into the constitution, working and financial condition of a registered society. 5

(2) The Registrar shall hold such an inquiry as is contemplated in subsection (1) of this section :— 10

(a) on the requisition of a registered society, duly authorised by rules made in this behalf to make such requisition, in respect of one of its members, such member being itself a registered society, 15

(b) on the application of a majority of the Committee of a registered society, 20

(c) on the application of $\frac{1}{3}$ rd of the members of a registered society.

(3) All officers and members of the society whose affairs are investigated shall furnish such information in regard to the affairs of the society as the 25

Registrar or the person authorised by the Registrar may require.

- 30 (4) The result of any inquiry under this section shall be communicated to the society whose affairs have been investigated.

44. (1) The Registrar may, on the application of a creditor of a registered society, inspect or direct some person authorized by him by order in writing in this behalf to inspect the books of the society:—

Inspection of books of indebted society.

Provided that—

- 10 (a) the applicant satisfies the Registrar that the debt is a sum then due, and that he has demanded payment thereof and has not received satisfaction within a reasonable time; and
- (b) the applicant deposits with the Registrar such sum as security for the costs of the proposed inspection as the Registrar may require.
- 20 (2) The Registrar shall communicate the result of any such inspection to the creditor.

45. Where an inquiry is held under section 43 or an inspection is made under section 44 the Registrar or person authorised by him to hold the inquiry or make the inspection may apportion the costs, or such part of the costs, as he may think right, between the society, the members or creditor demanding the inquiry or inspection, and the officers or former officers of the society.

Costs of inquiry.

46. Any sum awarded by way of costs under section 45 may be recovered, on application by the Registrar or person holding an inquiry to a Magistrate having jurisdiction in the place where the person from whom the money is claimable actually and voluntarily resides, or carries on business, by the distress and sale of any moveable property within the limits of the jurisdiction of such Magistrate belonging to such person, and such Magistrate shall proceed to recover the same in the same manner as if it were a fine imposed by himself.

Winding up and dissolution of a society.

47. If the Registrar, after an inquiry has been held under section 43 or after an inspection has been made under section 44 or on receipt of an application made by $\frac{3}{4}$ ths of the members of a registered society present at a general meeting, or of his own motion, in the case of societies that have not commenced working, or have ceased working, or possess shares or members' deposits not exceeding Rs. 500, is of opinion that the society ought to be wound up, he may issue an order directing it to be wound up, and when necessary, may appoint a liquidator for the purpose.

48. (1) Any member of a society may within two months of the date of an order under section 47 appeal from such order to Government.

(2) If such an appeal is made the society shall not be dissolved until such order has been confirmed by Government.

49. Where it is a condition of the registration of a Society may be wound up if membership is reduced. is society that it shall consist of at least ten members who are majors the Registrar may by order in writing direct the society to be wound up, if at any time it is proved to his satisfaction that the membership has been reduced to less than 10.

50. When the affairs of a society for which a liquidator has been appointed under section 47 have been wound up, or, where no liquidator has been appointed, after two months from the date of an order under section 47, or after the confirmation of such order under section 45, the Registrar shall make an order cancelling the registration of the society, and the society shall be deemed to be dissolved from the date of such order.

51. A liquidator appointed under section 47 shall have power with the sanction of the Registrar to do all or any of the following things:—

(a) pay any class or classes of creditors in full ;

(b) make any compromise or arrangement with creditors or persons claiming to be creditors or having or alleging themselves to have any claim, present or future, whereby the society may be rendered liable ;

(c) to compromise all calls or liabilities to calls and debts, and liabilities capable of resulting in debts and all claims, present or future, certain or contingent, subsisting or

supposed to subsist between the society and a contributory or alleged contributory or other debtor or person apprehending liability to the society and all questions in any way relating to or affecting the assets or the winding up of the society on such terms as may be agreed and take any security for the discharge of any such call, liability, debt, or claim and give a complete discharge in respect thereof ;

The progress and development, the expenses of the movement since 1912 when the existing Act was passed, has made it necessary to revise the law under which co-operative societies work. Several points for amendment have been brought to notice by various co-operative conferences and by the Central Co-operative Institute and other co-operative bodies and non-official gentlemen interested in the movement. Co-operation is now a transferred subject and as such falls within the scope of the provincial legislature.

2. The bill in particular makes provision for the following matters :—

(1) A distinct classification of the various societies whose objects, finance, and methods of working are different.

(2) Introduction of a clear cut system of winding up, liquidation and dissolution of societies on the analogy of the Indian Companies' Act, 1913.

(3) Provisions desired by a majority of co-operators in this Presidency for the summary recovery of dues in arbitration cases through the revenue authorities.

3. Opportunity has been taken of carefully revising and re-arranging the sections in the existing Act.

4. The details of the Bill are more particularly discussed in the attached Notes on Clauses.

Notes on Clauses.

Clause 3.—Definitions of societies according to the classification approved by co-operators in this Presidency have been added in order to simplify subsequent reference in other sections of the Act and in rules made under the Act. The classification is in accordance with authoritative books on co-operative jurisprudence. The definition of a "special resolution" has also been added, as subsequent provisions of the Act apply to such special resolutions.

Clause 6.—The limit of interest has been raised in accordance with a recommendation from the Central Co-operative Institute and the needs of housing societies after taking into consideration the altered value of money.

Clauses 12 to 16.—These clauses make provision in regard to amendment of by-laws, meetings, and resolutions, which was lacking in the old Act and which it is necessary to have in the Act. Clause 15 in particular is required to meet the case of a society which may be perfectly businesslike but ceases to be co-operative in spirit. There is no reason why such a society should not choose to work under the Indian Companies' Act, 1913. Under the Act of 1912 this was impossible. The new clause provides the means for such a transfer.

Clause 18.—Extends the principle which in all countries is accepted as the basis of co-operation to all classes of societies instead of restricting it as before to unlimited liability societies.

Clause 19.—Brings the law into line with the principles generally accepted as essential to a co-operative society.

Clause 22.—The changes introduced by this clause are in accordance with the general opinion of co-operators and in particular with a resolution of the Provincial Co-operative Conference, 1916.

Clause 24.—In accordance with the general opinion of co-operators this clause defines more clearly a prior charge already given to co-operative societies under section 19 of the existing Act.

Clause 33.—The changes are merely formal.

Clause 36.—This clause is new and it introduces principles which are accepted in the co-operative movement in general and are necessary for practical purposes but have so far been dealt with by rules framed by Government.

Clause 37.—The proviso to sub-clause (c) is added to provide against investment in the so-called shares of unlimited liability societies such as exist in Sind.

Clause 38.—Introduces a limitation on dividend which is generally acceptable to co-operators and makes formal provision for a reserve fund which has been implied but not expressed in the existing Act.

Clauses 39 to 42.—Codify existing principles, practice, and provisions under the Act and rules in a clearer form.

Clause 43.—Extends the powers given under section 35 of the existing Act in the case of an enquiry but omits the intervention of the Collector which is no longer necessary.

Clause 44.—Has been made permissive and not imperative as is required by practical considerations.

Clauses 47 to 54.—These clauses follow the Indian Companies' Act, 1913, and amend the existing provisions for liquidation of a society. These changes are shown to be necessary by difficulties experienced in practice and make the procedure clearer.

Clause 55.—This provision is required in order to ensure that public concessions given to a housing society shall not be abused for private profiteering and to secure the tenant members of the society against any possible injury to their claims following upon mismanagement by a Committee or in other ways. The provision is in accordance with the general principle of co-operative jurisprudence.

Clauses 56 to 60.—These clauses make provision for a matter that has so far been dealt with by rules only.

Clause 61.—Makes the necessary provision which is applicable to cases of enquiry, arbitration, liquidation, or audit.

Clause 62.—Unifies the provision in regard to the recovery of moneys due and extends to the awards of arbitrators the provision for recovery under the Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879, in accordance with the wishes of the co-operators in this Presidency.

Clause 67.—This alteration is intended to make clear that the liability attaches to past members also.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of the legislature in requiring by section 24 of the Bombay Port Trust Act, 1879, the previous sanction of Government to every order or regulation made by the Board under any of the sections 21 to 23 of the Act, so far as it relates to the officers specified in the said section, was to ensure that Government should retain some control over the appointment and conditions of service of the principal heads of departments of the Port Trust. Since the Act was passed, however, some new appointments of this nature have been created while the post of Traffic Manager has been abolished. It is, therefore, proposed to amend section 24 of the Act by bringing under its operation the four new appointments of Railway Manager, Docks Manager, Manager, Land and Bunders Department, and Controller of Stores. In amending the Act opportunity has been taken to recast the wording of the section so as to omit reference to Traffic Manager in the first paragraph of the section, to arrange the appointments in their appropriate order, and to make it clear that the section also applies to any person or firm from time to time employed in the capacity of Consulting Engineer to the Board. The second paragraph of the section has been omitted as being unnecessary in consequence of the amendment made in paragraph 1.

The Board desire to possess this power which is enjoyed by the Municipal Corporation of the City of Bombay, the Bombay City Improvement Trust, the Bombay Port Trust and other public bodies. The Bill confers on the Board the necessary power. The Board have further proposed that they should be empowered to extend the benefit of the fund with retrospective effect from such date as may be appointed by them in this behalf. Clause 2 (2) of the Bill gives effect to this proposal.

As announced by the Honourable the Finance Member to the Legislative Council on the 26th February 1924 a cut of 15 lakhs in the original budget was decided upon by Government in view of the rejection of the Court Fees Stamps Bill by the Council and this cut was distributed *pro rata* among the various demands. The combined demand for the heads "30-Scientific Departments", "31-Education", "32-Medical", "33-Public Health" and "35-Industries" made by the Honourable Mr. Jadhav had to bear a cut of Rs. 3,40,000 and the original total demand of Rs. 2,46,31,000 under these heads was reduced to Rs. 2,42,91,000, on the understanding that the Departments concerned would subsequently carry out the cut by effecting the necessary reductions under the various heads concerned. In connection with this cut it was found necessary to make a reduction of Rs. 73,456 from the provision of Rs. 4,50,000 made in the current year's budget for the introduction of the scheme formulated by the Compulsory Primary Education Committee. This reduction was decided upon provisionally in view of the urgency of the matter on the understanding that the amount would be restored by re-appropriation from other heads as it was not a desirable reduction in the opinion of Government. It is therefore proposed that the amount of Rs. 73,456 in question should now be restored by transfer from other heads as shown below :—

The appointment of one Chief Inspector on Rs. 400—20—500 involving a saving of Rs. 5,600 has accordingly been discontinued. In view of the importance of the town and island of Bombay from the point of view of Excise revenue and preventive work further reduction of this establishment is not considered desirable. It is therefore proposed to effect the remaining saving by effecting the reduction in the mofussil establishment. The provision for the Bombay establishment is accordingly proposed to be increased by Rs. 11,332 (Rs. 16,932 — 5,600) a corresponding amount being left unspent out of the grant of Rs. 3,11,484 under the sub-head 6, C—Pay of Establishment—114—Chief Inspectors and Inspectors.

APPENDIX 13.

Statement of demand for a supplementary grant covered by re-appropriation.

RESERVED 6.—Honourable Sir M. H. W. Hayward.

Increase in the Police strength in the Bombay Suburban District.

Owing to the recent increase in crime and population in the Bombay Suburban District it has been found necessary to increase the present Police strength in that District. The whole scheme submitted by the Inspector General of Police for increasing the strength, for providing a head quarters police force at Andheri, and for housing all these men, etc., is under the consideration of Government but owing to the recent outbreak of serious crime in that District it has been decided to increase immediately the existing strength at Kurla and Bandra Police Stations and to open new out-posts at Bhandup, Versowa, Anik and Ambernath.

2. The circumstances necessitating the increase in the above two police stations and the opening of the above four out-posts are as follows :— The present sanctioned strength of Kurla Police Station is 1 Sub-Inspector, 10 Head Constables and 14 Constables, unarmed. Kurla contains a number of mills and a mixed population which requires close supervision. An increase of 2 head constables and 8 constables unarmed is immediately required in order to deal adequately with the prevalence of crime in this area. An increase of 2 head constables and 6 constables (armed) is also necessary for guarding the newly opened sub-jail of the Kurla Resident Magistrate. An out-post consisting of 1 head constable and 4 constables (armed) is necessary at Bhandup for patrolling the road between Thana and Bombay along which traffic is heavy and for checking, crimes of violence which are prevalent in this area. An out-post consisting of 1 head constable and 8 constables (armed) is also required at the south end of Versowa to check criminals from Bombay who exploit the limits of Andheri. The opening of the new out-post with the strength of 1 head constable and 2 constables (unarmed) at Anik in the Trombay Island is also an immediate necessity in order to watch the Port Trust Railway over the Mahul creek which provides a convenient entry for criminals from Bombay. Ambernath has been developed of late as an industrial area under the Bombay Development Department and has a population of over 2,200 souls. There is no permanent strength at this place but only a temporary force of 1 head constable and 2 constables which have been lent for the time being from the Thana District and are to be returned to that District. It is therefore essential to open an out-post at this place with 1 head constable and 2 constables (unarmed).

3. Although it will appear from paragraph 1 above that an additional force consisting of 1 Sub-Inspector, 4 head constables and 13 constables armed and 4 head constables and 12 constables unarmed is required for

the Bombay Suburban District, yet the net strength required is only 4 head constables and 14 constables as shown below:—

4. The annual cost of this net additional force is Rs. 10,380 but in the current year an amount of Rs. 5,195 only is required in order to put the scheme into operation as soon as possible. No provision has been made for this expenditure in the current year's budget, as the proposals from the Local Officers were not received in time. No savings are also anticipated in any of the grants under the head "26-Police". In these circumstances it has been proposed to meet the charge from the Reserve at the disposal of the Finance Department.

APPENDIX 14.

STATEMENT OF DEMAND FOR SUPPLEMENTARY GRANT.

No. 7.

The Honourable Sir Maurice Hayward.

The Governor in Council has closely considered the important question of publicity in view of the motion to omit the establishment of the Director of Information passed on the 11th of March 1924 by the Legislative Council.

2. The Governor in Council has noticed several letters in the press since that motion emphasizing the necessity of publicity and resolutions requesting steps to be taken notwithstanding that motion to supply official news regularly to the press have been passed both by the Gujarathi Journalists' Association and the Journalists' Association of India. The Governor in Council has also been reminded that the necessity of providing means for publicity of official intentions and policy has been recognised on previous occasions by the Legislative Council. The peculiar necessity of publicity under the reforms has indeed been stressed in paragraph 14 of the Report of the Joint Select Committee on the Government of India Bill. They noted there the earnest representations made to them that Provincial Governments should become more vocal and put forth their views with more courage and more persistence than they have in the past and that it would be of the utmost importance in the future that the Provincial Governments should have means of explaining to the people the reason why things are done, the reasons which underlie decisions and the arguments against proposals which they consider would be detrimental to the welfare of the country. The Joint Select Committee remarked that it had been represented to them that the case against the policy of Provincial Governments was becoming every day more widely disseminated by means of the vernacular press, while the case for the policy of the Provincial Governments was unknown to the masses of Indians. They were glad to think that these opinions were shared by the Viceroy and the Secretary of State for India.

3. The Governor in Council has come to the conclusion therefore that it is his duty in the public interests, while making every endeavour to secure due economy, to press for the minimum provision necessary for the performance of the publicity work of the Director of Information. He has decided therefore to discard the distribution of leaflets through Honorary Correspondents, to which special exception has been taken, and to rely more particularly for publicity upon local officials and the Public Press and to make material reductions in the establishment of the Director of Information. The statement appended will indicate that a reduction has already been made of one Senior and one Junior Translator, of one Junior Stenographer and of one Junior Despatcher. It will also be noticed that it has been possible to reduce two menials and to make large reductions in respect of postage, telegrams and office expenses. The net result has been to reduce the total expenses from roughly Rs. 40,000 to Rs. 20,000 a year. The Governor in Council

has satisfied himself that the latter sum is the minimum which would enable him to provide during the present year for the necessary publicity work of the Director of Information and he proposes therefore to move a resolution for the modification of the motion of the 11th of March 1924 to the extent of substituting for the reduction of Rs. 40,000 a reduction of Rs. 20,000 only in the present year in the establishment of the Director of Information. He has however under examination proposals for further economy by the reorganisation of the office of the Oriental Translator to which the translation work has already been transferred with a view to its providing the remainder of the staff required for the Director of Information. If these proposals prove practicable, further economy would be possible next year. Meanwhile the scope of the utility of the latter officer has materially been increased by the transference to him of the responsibility of the Library and the Record Office of the Secretariat. The present supplementary grant asked for is for Rs. 20,000 being the salary of the present reduced staff as shown in the accompanying statement plus the funds necessary to pay the members of the staff to whom notice was given immediately after the vote of the Legislative Council.

BILL No. XX OF 1924.

A BILL for settling certain properties and securities, late the property of Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal, Baronet, deceased, so as to accompany and support the title and dignity of a Baronet lately conferred on him by His Majesty King George V to hold to him and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten and to be begotten and for other purposes connected therewith.

WHEREAS by Letters Patent of His Majesty King George V by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, dated at Westminster on or about the sixth day of February 1913 in the third year of his Reign and by warrant under the King's Sign manual, His said Majesty made known that He of his special grace, certain knowledge and mere motion had erected appointed and created His trusty and well beloved Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal of Ahmedabad Knight a Companion of the Most Eminent Order of the Indian Empire to the dignity state and degree of a Baronet and him the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal, for His Majesty, his heirs and successors He did erect appoint and create a Baronet of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland by the said Letters Patent, to hold to him and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten and to be begotten.

AND WHEREAS the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal was desirous of settling in perpetuity the said properties and securities on himself and the heirs male of his body who may

succeed to the said Baronetcy so as to support the dignity of the title conferred on him and them as aforesaid upon the trusts and for the purposes hereinafter limited and declared concerning the same.

AND WHEREAS the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal was seized of and otherwise well and sufficiently entitled to the hereditaments described in the first and second schedules hereunder written and situate in the city and district of Ahmedabad the hereditaments described in the first schedule producing an annual income of rupees six thousand.

AND WHEREAS the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal was desirous of settling the said properties and the securities hereinafter mentioned of the nominal value of twenty-eight lacs of rupees and producing an annual income of Rs. 1,21,500 to the uses upon the trusts and for the purposes hereinafter declared concerning the same.

AND WHEREAS the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal was desirous that the heirs male of his body to whom the said title and dignity of Baronet should descend should at the time of such descent upon them respectively take and bear the name of "Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal" in lieu of any other name or names whatever which they respectively might bear at the time of such descent on them respectively And was also desirous that the Accountant General of Bombay, the Commissioner of the Northern Division in the presidency of Bombay and the District Judge of Ahmedabad all for the time being and the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal during his lifetime and every succeeding

Baronet being a major and in case of and during his minority his legally appointed guardian should be trustees of the aforesaid properties and securities and be likewise the trustees for carrying into execution all the general purposes and powers of this Act with relation to the said properties and securities.

AND WHEREAS the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal departed this life on the third day of March 1916 and by his will dated the first day of March 1916 duly executed and signed by him gave and devised his estate to his son Girjaprasad and appointed his wife Dowager Lady Chinubhai sole executrix thereof and also appointed her guardian of the property of the said Girjaprasad and she has also by an order of the District Court of Ahmedabad dated the 19th day of April 1916, been appointed guardian of the property of the said Girjaprasad and she is managing the said estate and the said will has since been duly proved by her and probate therefore obtained by her from the High Court of Judicature at Bombay.

AND WHEREAS on the death of Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal the said title or dignity of Baronet created by His Majesty's Letters Patent devolved on and became and is now vested in the said Girjaprasad Chinubhai the only son and heir male of the body of the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal deceased.

AND WHEREAS the said Dowager Lady Chinubhai as executrix of the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal deceased and the guardian of the said Girjaprasad Chinubhai is

desirous of settling the said properties and securities for the purpose of supporting the dignity of the said Baronetcy to the uses upon the trusts and for the purposes hereinafter limited and declared concerning the same respectively.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient that the aforesaid purposes should be effected by an Act of the Bombay Legislative Council.

AND WHEREAS the previous sanction of the Governor General required by clause (e) of sub-section (3) of Section 80A of the Government of India Act has been obtained for the passing of this Act. IT IS HEREBY ENACTED AS FOLLOWS :—

1. This Act may be called the
 Short title. Sir Chinubhai
 Madhavlal Ran-
 chhodlal Baronetcy Act, 192 .

2. The Accountant General of
 Incorporation of Bombay, the Com-
 Trustees. missioner of the
 Northern Division in the presidency
 of Bombay, the District Judge of
 Ahmedabad, all for the time being and
 the holders for the time being of those
 offices respectively, and likewise the
 holder or holders for the time being
 of any one or more office or offices
 which may hereafter be substituted by
 the Governor in Council of Bombay for
 any one more of the first mentioned
 offices and Lady Chinubhai Madhavlal
 during the minority of the present
 Baronet as his duly appointed guardian
 and the present Baronet as from the
 date of his attaining majority and after
 his death the person for the time being
 holding the said Baronetcy being a
 major or in case of and during his

minority his legally appointed guardian shall be and they are hereby created a corporation with perpetual succession and a common Seal under the style and title of "the Trustees of the Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal Baronetcy"; and the said Corporation so hereby created (hereinafter styled "the Corporation") shall be and they are hereby constituted as such Corporation the Trustees for executing the powers and purposes of this Act.

3. The heirs male of the body of the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal to whom the said title and dignity of Baronet shall descend pursuant to the limitations of the Letters Patent whereby the said dignity has been granted shall take upon themselves respectively the names of "Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal" in lieu and in the place of any other name or names whatsoever and such heirs male severally and successively shall be called by the names of "Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal" and by those names shall name style and write themselves, respectively, upon all occasions whatsoever.

4. Immediately from and after the passing of this Act the said hereditaments and premises particularly described in the first schedule hereunder written shall be vested by the force and virtue of this Act in the Corporation and the said securities being debentures of the Municipal Corporation of the City of Bombay of the nominal value of rupees one lac and Government of India Promissory

Present and all future Baronets to take the name of Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal.

Vesting and application of income of settled property.

Notes of the nominal value of rupees twenty-seven lacs such debentures and Government of India Promissory Notes being of the aggregate nominal value of rupees twenty-eight lacs and producing an annual income of about rupees one lac twenty-one thousand and five hundred shall be assigned and transferred into the name of the Corporation who shall hold the same upon the trusts and for the purposes hereinafter expressed concerning the same, that is to say, **Upon Trust** to continue to hold the said securities till such time as the same shall be discharged by the Secretary of State for India in Council or the Municipal Corporation of the City of Bombay, as the case may be, or shall be sold by the Corporation with the previous consent in writing of the person who shall for the time being be in the enjoyment of the income of the said securities and on such discharge or sale, to invest the sum to be received on such occasion with the like consent of the person for the time being in the enjoyment of the said income with all convenient despatch in or on any stocks funds or securities of or the principal and interest of which is guaranteed by the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland or the Government of India or the Government of Bombay and in like manner as often as the same shall become necessary to alter vary and change with the like consent such stocks, funds and securities, for others of the same or like nature and which stocks, funds, securities, moneys and investments for the time being subject to the trusts of this act are hereinafter called "the Trust Funds" **And Upon Further Trust** from time to time out of the income of the Trust

Funds and the said hereditaments and premises to pay all the rates, taxes, assessments, dues and duties in respect of the said hereditaments and premises and all the buildings and erections standing thereon respectively and defray the costs of all ordinary repairs required for the purposes of maintaining such buildings in a habitable condition and of insuring the same from fire or any other accident whatsoever **And Upon Further Trust** to pay the balance of the annual income of the Trust Funds and the said hereditaments and premises to the present Baronet and the person who as heir male of his body shall for the time being have succeeded to and be in the enjoyment of the title of Baronet conferred by the said Letters Patent as aforesaid and shall be of full age or during his minority to his duly appointed guardian for his own absolute use and benefit notwithstanding any rule of law or equity to the contrary, such payment to be made to the Baronet for the time being at the place where he may be residing at the time of such payment.

5. The said duly appointed guardian during the minority of the present Baronet and of any heir male of his body for the time being entitled to and in enjoyment of the said title and dignity of Baronet under the limitations of the said Letters Patent shall be paid for the maintenance education and benefit of such Baronet in each and every year during his minority as aforesaid so much only of the annual income of the Trust Funds and the said hereditaments and premises as the Corporation shall in their discretion think proper and the

Application of income during minority of Baronet.

Corporation shall from time to time invest the residue of the said annual income in and upon stocks, funds and securities hereinbefore authorized and shall upon such Baronet attaining his majority pay over, transfer and assign to him or as he shall direct and for his absolute benefit the said investments and all accumulations thereof and in the event of the death of such Baronet before attaining his age of majority the Corporation shall stand possessed of such investments and the accumulations thereof in trust for the heirs of such Baronet absolutely.

6. In case any person to whom the time being the said title of Baronet shall have descended shall for the space of one whole year thereafter or being then under age shall for the space of one whole year after he shall attain the age of majority, refuse or neglect to use the names of "Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal" as hereinbefore enacted or in case any such person having so used those names shall for the space of six calendar months consecutively during his natural life discontinue so to use such names then in any or either of the said cases the estate or interest in the Trust Funds and the said hereditaments and premises hereby settled as also in the securities and hereditaments which shall hereafter become vested in the Corporation by virtue of this Act upon the trusts and for the purposes herein declared and contained of the person who shall so refuse or neglect to use or having used shall so discontinue to use the said names shall during the remainder of his natural life be suspended.

Provision in case of refusal or neglect to use or discontinuance of name of Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal.

and during any and every such suspension the benefits and trusts hereby created for the heir male of the body of the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal who shall use these names shall devolve on and belong to the heir male of the body of the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal who would have succeeded to the said title of Baronet conferred by the said Letters Patent on the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal in case the heir male of the body of the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal so refusing or neglecting to use or discontinuing to use the said names had departed this life and if there shall not be at such time any such male heir of the body of the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal then the income of the Trust Funds and the said hereditaments and premises as also of the hereditaments and securities which shall hereafter become vested in the Corporation by virtue of this Act shall be retained by the Corporation and accumulated for the benefit of the male issue of the said Baronet that may subsequently be born and succeed to the said title and in default of any such male issue the whole of the said property and income shall devolve upon such person as would be entitled to the same if there had been a total failure of issue male of the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal.

7. The buildings hereditaments and premises described in the second schedule hereunder written situate in the city of Ahmedabad with their rights members and appurtenances of which the said Sir Chinubhai

Madhavlal Ranchhodlal was absolutely seized shall by the force and virtue of this Act from and immediately after the passing thereof be vested in the Corporation upon the trusts and for the purposes and with and subject to the powers provisions and declarations hereinafter declared and expressed, that is to say, **Upon Trust** to permit the present Baronet for and during the term of his natural life and from and immediately after his decease to permit during the respective terms of their natural lives the successive male heirs of his body who shall succeed to the title of Baronet conferred by the said Letters Patent if he or they shall so desire to use and occupy free of rent as their residence the hereditaments and premises particularly described in the second schedule hereto and to demise the said hereditaments and premises if not occupied as a residence for any term of years not exceeding seven years to take effect in possession within three months from the date of the lease.

9. The Corporation shall be at liberty to sell or exchange for other lands hereditaments and premises

es in the presidency of Bombay all the said hereditaments and premises or any of them and also any such other hereditaments as aforesaid for the time being vested in them by virtue of this Act with the consent of the person entitled to and in the actual enjoyment of the title of Baronet conferred by the said Letters Patent and during his minority with the consent of his duly appointed guardian and with the consent of the Governor of Bombay in Council to be notified by a resolution of the Government of Bombay published in the *Bombay Government Gazette*, and upon any such exchange to give or receive any money for equality of exchange.

10. Any such sale as aforesaid may be made either by public auction or private contract and the Corporation may make any stipulations as to title or evidence or commencement of title or otherwise in any conditions of sale or contract for sale or exchange of the said hereditaments or any part thereof and may buy in or rescind or vary any contract for sale or exchange and re-sell or re-exchange the same without being answerable for any loss occasioned thereby.

The Corporation shall receive all moneys which may become payable upon any such sale or exchange as aforesaid and with all convenient speed invest the same either in the purchase of stocks funds or securities hereinbefore authorized or in the purchase of other lands and hereditaments of a freehold

or leasehold tenure situate in the presidency of Bombay and suitable for the support and dignity of the said title. **Provided** that every such purchase of lands or hereditaments shall be made with the consent in writing of the person then entitled to and in the actual enjoyment of the said title, **Provided** also that in the event of the purchase of premises of a leasehold tenure, every lease in respect of such premises is renewable in perpetuity or is for an unexpired term of at least 800 years reserving a moderate rent without any onerous conditions or covenants on the part of the lessee.

12. The stocks funds and securities and the lands and hereditaments so to be purchased as directed by section 11 and the lands and hereditaments which may be taken in exchange under the liberty in that behalf reserved to the Corporation by section 9 shall from and immediately after the completion of the purchase or exchange vest in the Corporation upon the trusts and for the purposes by and in this Act declared and contained of and concerning the said hereditaments and premises particularly described in the first and second schedules hereunder written or such of them as may then be subsisting and capable of taking effect and subject to the powers provisions and declarations in this Act contained concerning the same in the same manner and to the same extent as if such hereditaments had been expressly vested by this Act in the Corporation upon the trusts and for the purposes in this Act declared and contained.

Vesting of lands and investments in Corporation.

13. In case any of the tenements or hereditaments which shall at any time be vested in the Corporation or any part thereof shall be destroyed or damaged by fire, the moneys received in respect of the insurance thereof shall either be laid out under the directions of the Corporation in rebuilding or reinstating the tenements and hereditaments so destroyed or damaged by fire or upon the application of the person for the time being entitled to and in the enjoyment of the title and dignity of Baronet and with the consent of the Governor of Bombay in Council to be notified as aforesaid be laid out in the purchase of other hereditaments and premises in the presidency of Bombay of a freehold or of a leasehold tenure suitable for the support of the dignity of the said title **Provided that every lease in respect of such premises is renewable in perpetuity or for an unexpired term of at least 800 years reserving a moderate rent without any onerous conditions or covenants on the part of the lessee.** In the event of such purchase the hereditaments so purchased shall immediately from and after the completion of such purchase be and become subject to the uses and purposes of this Act or such of them as shall then be subsisting and capable of taking effect in the same manner and to the same extent as if such last mentioned hereditaments had expressly been vested by this Act in the Corporation upon the trusts and for the purposes in this Act declared and contained. Until such insurance moneys shall be so laid out the Corporation may invest the same in any of

the securities specified in section 11 and the income thereof shall be applied in the same manner as the income of the premises so destroyed or damaged is hereinbefore directed to be applied.

14. If at any time or times here-
 after the present

 persons shall be
 desirous of augmenting the Trust
 Funds and for that purpose and with
 that intent shall at his or her own
 expense transfer and deliver to the
 Corporation any stocks funds or securi-

 same shall happen the Corporation
 may with the previous consent of the
 Governor of Bombay in Council
 accept such stock funds or securities
 and the same shall thenceforth be
 held by the Corporation upon the same

 and premises hereby settled or upon
 such of them as shall then be subsist-
 ing and capable of taking effect
Provided Always that the total value
 of the corpus of the Trust Funds for the

aforesaid (and if more than one in equal shares) during her or their life or lives or until her or their remarriage or remarriages whichever event happens first for her or their maintenance or jointure in lieu of dower or any legal or customary right to maintenance an annuity of rupees twelve thousand clear of all deductions whatsoever to commence and take effect immediately after the decease of such Baronet and to be issuing and payable out of the said annual income of the Trust Funds and the hereditaments and premises payable under this Act to the person for the time being in the enjoyment of the title of Baronet and to be paid and payable by equal half yearly payments the first of such half yearly payments to be made on the first half yearly day after the decease of such Baronet **Provided Always** that the payment of the said annuity to any widow or widows of any such Baronet shall be subject to the obligation on her or their part of maintaining and educating each and every child of his (except the Baronet for the time being) until such child shall attain the age of 21 years, each such child being entitled to have spent for such purposes Rs. 100 per mensem.

16. PROVIDED ALWAYS that the annual income of the Trust Funds and the hereditaments and premises payable under this Act to the person for the time being in the enjoyment of the title of Baronet shall not at any one and the same time be subject to the payment there out of more than Rs. 12,000 per annum for and in respect of any annuity or annuities payable in pursuance of sec-

tion 15, so that in the event of there being in existence at any one time the widows of two or more deceased Baronets, the said annuity of Rs. 12,000 per annum shall be divided into as many parts as there may be Baronets who have died leaving widows and one such part shall be paid to the widow or in equal shares to the widows of each deceased Baronet.

17. So long as the said title and dignity of Baronet shall endure and until there shall be a failure of heirs male of the body of the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal to whom the said title and dignity of Baronet might descend pursuant to the limitations of the Letters Patent whereby the said dignity was granted neither the present Baronet nor any of the heirs male of his body in whose favour the trusts hereinbefore mentioned are declared of the Trust Funds and the said hereditaments and premises and the annual income thereof shall transfer dispose of alienate convey charge or incumber any of the properties and funds subject to the provisions of this Act or any part thereof or the interest dividends or annual income thereof or any part thereof for any greater or larger estate interest or time than during his natural life and for such portion thereof only as he shall continue to use the names of "Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal" nor shall any such person as aforesaid either alone or jointly with any other person or persons whomsoever have any power to discontinue or bar the estate or interest hereinbefore limited in trust for the heirs male of the body

of the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal or any estate or interest hereby or herein created or declared in trust or for the benefit of any person or persons for whose benefit the trusts are declared by this Act in the properties and funds subject to the provisions of this Act or any of them and the income interest and dividend thereof or to prevent any such person or persons from succeeding to holding enjoying receiving or taking the same premises according to the true intent and meaning of the provisions hereinbefore contained nor shall the same premises or any of them be held by any court of law or equity to have vested in any such person as aforesaid for any greater estate or interests than during his natural life and for such portion thereof only as he shall continue to use the name of Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal and every conveyance mortgage assignment or assurance contrary to the intention of this Act shall be and is hereby declared and enacted to be void.

18. Upon failure and in default of heirs male of the body of the said Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal to whom the title of Baronet may descend the Corporation shall stand possessed of a moiety of the Trust Funds hereditaments and premises then subject to the provisions of this Act upon trust to pay the income thereof to the widow if any of the last Baronet during her life or until her remarriage whichever event happens first and if more than one in equal shares and shall hold the remaining moiety of the said Trust Funds hereditaments and premises and the

Ultimate trust in favour of heirs on extinction of Baronetcy.

income thereof and also the first mentioned moiety of the said Trust Funds hereditaments and premises from and after the death or remarriage of the widow of the last Baronet whichever event happens first in trust for the next of kin of the last Baronet in such shares and proportions as he may by will appoint and in default of such appointment for the next of kin (except the widow) of the last Baronet for their absolute benefit according to the law of intestate succession for the time being applicable to them.

19. The actual management of the hereditaments for the time being vested in the Corporation including the collection of rents and carrying out repairs shall be in the hands of the person in the actual enjoyment for the time being of the said title of Baronet conferred by the said Letters Patent being of full age and during his minority in the hands of his duly appointed guardian subject nevertheless to the control and supervision of the Corporation.

20. If at any time hereafter the said offices of the Commissioner for the Northern Division of the presidency of Bombay the Accountant General of Bombay and the District Judge of Ahmedabad or any of them shall be abolished or cease to exist, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council of Bombay for the time being with the consent and approbation of the person for the time being in the actual enjoyment of the said title of Baronet and using the said names of "Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal" and having attained

the age of 21 years and if there shall not be any such person, then without the consent or approbation of any person or persons whomsoever to nominate and appoint any other person or persons holding any other public Government office or offices at Bombay or Ahmedabad to be and to act as a trustee or trustees in the execution of the trusts created by this Act, and upon such nomination and appointment, the Trust Funds hereditaments and premises which may then be subject to such trusts shall, by force of this Act, forthwith vest in the person or persons so nominated and appointed trustee or trustees as lastly mentioned, together with the then continuing trustees or trustee but if there shall be no such continuing trustee or trustees then in the new trustees only upon and for the trusts and purposes hereby created and declared; and when and so often as any such nomination and appointment shall be made such new trustee or trustees jointly with such continuing trustees or trustee, or such new trustees only as the case may be, shall be and they are hereby constituted a Corporation for executing the powers and purposes of this Act.

All those pieces or parcels of land or ground together with the messuage tenement or bungalow with outhouses and structures standing thereon with a garden and called "Shanti Kunja" and situate at Mauza Dariapur Kajipur now called "Shahi Baug" in the North Daskroi taluka and in the registration sub-district of Ahmedabad in the said district in the presidency of Bombay and admeasuring 6 acres and 39 gunthas and bearing survey Nos. 259 and 260 (of which land bearing survey No. 259 admeasures 2 acres and 7 gunthas and the land bearing survey No. 260 admeasures 4 acres and 32 gunthas or thereabouts) and bounded as follows that is to say, on or towards the East by a small passage beyond which is the B. B. & C. I. Railway line, on or towards the South by an open plot of ground beyond which are the Police Lines known as Bhil Paltan lines, on or towards the West by a narrow passage leading to the Sabarmati River and on or towards the North partly by a bungalow known as Kaji Saheb's bungalow and partly by the Police Superintendent's bungalow.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of this Bill is to settle the endowment of the Baronetcy conferred on the late Sir Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal. It has been framed generally on the lines of Act II of 1915 and has been settled in consultation with the Solicitors of the Dowager Lady Sulochananabai Chinubhai Madhavlal Ranchhodlal.

The property to be settled includes certain lands hereditaments and guaranteed securities, and the Bill takes power to enable the holder of the title or any other person or persons to increase the income accruing therefrom by the addition, from time to time, of further securities, subject to a limit.

The practice has so far been to introduce Bills of this nature in the Indian Legislature, but as this Bill contains no provisions with a territorial application outside the presidency of Bombay, it has been decided that in this case it would be more appropriate to introduce the measure in the Bombay Legislative Council.

MEMORANDUM.

Cases have been reported in which temporary hotels and shops erected in Government lands on the occasion of car and other festivals pay no assessment to Government. Though there are valid reasons to allow free use of such lands by pilgrims, there is no reason why shop-keepers and others who use the land for making a profit on such occasions should be exempted from paying the assessment.

It is therefore ordered that Mamlatdars and Mahalkaries should see that in all such places and on all such occasions Non-Agricultural Assessment for the use of Government lands is recovered in future. Similarly where occupied agricultural lands are used for a Non-Agricultural purpose, *e.g.*, a temporary theatre or shop.—Non-Agricultural assessment should as a rule be recovered, from the occupants concerned.

2. Much correspondence will be saved by recovering the assessment at the fixed rates laid down in the following table:—

The rates should be reduced to $\frac{1}{4}$ th in the cases of petty stalls such as those of peddlers, etc., the rates in column 2 represent the difference between agricultural and non-agricultural assessment.

3. Mamlatdars should make a note in their Miscellaneous Land Record note book as to the village in which such revenue ought to be recovered annually or at other periodical intervals in order to watch the recovery and credit of the amounts by the village officers concerned.

4. Prants are requested to see at their next inspection that the orders in paragraph 3 have been carried out.

SUBJECT.—*Levy of rent for Government waste lands occupied by peddlers and temporary shop-keepers at fairs, etc.*

MEMORANDUM.

Persons who wish to occupy portions of Government waste land at fairs for the purpose of peddling goods or erecting temporary shops or holding shows, etc., should only be allowed to do so on payment of rent.

2. The Mamlatdars should at once ascertain and report the places at which Government waste lands are so occupied and the dates on which the fairs are held. Standard rents will be prescribed for peddlers, shop-keepers, etc., by the Collector. Mamlatdars will see that these rents are paid on the first day of occupation, and that receipts are immediately given. Any shop-keeper, peddler or show-keeper who fails to pay will be instantly evicted.

3. Whenever possible the land should be marked out in small plots, by means of lines scratched or marked with chunam on the ground.

4. Where the land occupied belongs to private persons no attempt should be made to recover anything from the peddlers or shop-keepers. The occupants are liable, if they have previously obtained permission for Non-agricultural use of the land, the difference between the Agricultural and Non-agricultural assessment, *if any*, should be levied. If permission had not been obtained the maximum fine should be levied.

5. Prants are requested to see that the Mamlatdars report promptly and to submit their recommendation for rates of rent. Village Officers should be warned that it is their duty to warn persons who intend to use the land as peddlers, shop-keepers or show-keepers that they will not be allowed to do so unless they pay the rent fixed.

MEMORANDUM.

In any village in which there is much uncultivated land the Collector is prepared to give out revenue waste numbers on the following special terms to persons certified by the Mamlatdars to be *bona fide* cultivators:—

- (i) The tenure to be restricted tenure.
- (ii) No assessment will be charged for the first two years.
- (iii) At the end of two years if the Collector is satisfied that the land has been cultivated, the assessment will be fixed at half the survey assessment for a further period of three years. If it has not been cultivated, full assessment will be levied.
- (iv) No price will be charged for revenue trees.

(v) Forest trees will be valued by the Mamlatdar or Mahalkari and the occupant may either

- (1) purchase them,
- (2) leave them standing, or
- (3) cut and stack them for removal by the Forest Department.

In case he leaves them standing the Forest Department may if they wish cut and remove them.

To avoid delay, Mamlatdars may act on these orders at once; but they must report each case in which land is given out, to the Prant: giving full details. The Prant will send each case to the Collector for perusal. Mamlatdars and Mahalkaris must take care that only *bona fide self cultivators* are granted lands in this way, and each recipient must be warned that if he sub-lets his land it will be taken and given to some one else.

2. These orders are not intended to discourage persons belonging to non-cultivating castes from taking up decent sized areas of waste land and getting them cultivated by tenants or by servants if they are prepared to put capital into the land and really develop it. Land will be given on very easy terms to such persons. But it is useless to give out odd survey numbers to shop-keepers, etc., who do not live in the villages in which the land is situated. The Mahalkari of Bhatkal should be especially careful of this.

3. Mamlatdars will see that this offer of land to *bona fide* cultivators is made known in every Majra of every village in the jungle tracts. Shanbhogs will be held responsible that the offer is known throughout the whole of their *firkas*: and especially in the wild and less accessible portions. The Collector will make personal enquiries as to how far this offer is made known and will punish severely any Shanbhog who is found to have been negligent. The forthcoming revenue collections will give an excellent opportunity for wide publication. Firka Committees should also be informed and asked to co-operate.

On May 1st and June 1st every Mamlatdar will submit to the Collector through the Prant a statement of lands given out on these terms, showing the total number of persons to whom granted and the survey assessment. Statements showing each case separately are not required.

CIRCULAR.

Under the old rules passing the Higher Standard was essential for any clerk who aspired to a Mamlat. The result was that all who passed expected a Mamlat and considerable disappointment was created as the number that passed far exceeded any possible posts and, moreover, depended on the strictness or otherwise of Collectors. In some districts large numbers were allowed to go up, while in others Collectors exercised more discrimination.

2. The Higher Standard for karkuns as a step to Mamlat is abolished. Higher posts are now scheduled and are filled by selection. A clerk appointed to such a post has after his appointment and not before, to pass an examination to qualify him to *retain* the post. The Qualifying Examination is therefore a confirmatory examination.

3. As however the restriction of the Upper Branch to the scheduled posts was not introduced until 1918, the Qualifying Examination was in force for some years as a confirmatory test to the Upper Branch; *viz.*, appointments of Rs. 50 and over.

Now that scheduled posts have been introduced the fact that under an old order of things a clerk has passed a Qualifying Examination should not be considered as conferring any special qualification for a scheduled post.

4. Collectors are therefore reminded that clerks should be selected for scheduled posts from a point of view of fitness, without any regard whatever to their having been allowed to go up for the Qualifying Examination in the past. Due consideration to a proper admixture of caste must of course be borne in mind and preponderance by any one caste avoided as far as possible.

Rate of royalty on teak, sandal and shisam trees growing :—

- (i) on private lands.
- (ii) on private compounds of houses.
- (iii) on assigned lands.

NORTHERN DIVISION.

Kaira and Broach Districts.

There are no teak, sandal and shisam trees.

Thana District.

No royalty is levied on trees growing within the compounds of private bungalows; elsewhere these trees are reserved to Government.

Ahmedabad District.

There are no cases in which royalty is levied on teak, sandal and shisam trees growing on private lands and compounds of private houses and assigned lands.

Surat District.

No royalty is levied on teak, sandal and shisam trees growing on non-agricultural lands or compounds of private houses. Royalty is levied on teak, sandal and shisam growing on assigned lands which are uncommuted and without proprietary rights. Royalty for teak and shisam is Re. 1 per tree. Sandal trees are sold standing or cut and sold departmentally instead of being given to the occupants at uniform price of Re. 1 per tree.

Panch Mahals District.

There are very few teak and shisam trees on lands or compounds of private houses and assigned land and no royalty is levied by Government on any of such trees. No sandal trees are grown in this District on any scale.

BOMBAY SUBURBAN DIVISION.

Bombay Suburban District.

In the case of the varkas lands used for compounds of private houses and the assigned lands in which the right of Government on trees is not expressly conceded, royalty on these trees is fixed in consultation with the Forest Department according to the size and life of the trees. Royalty is not levied on trees in ordinary compounds of bungalows. An all round rate of royalty per tree is Re. 1.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

Poona, Satara, Sholapur, Nasik, Ahmednagar, East and West Khandesh Districts.

No royalty is levied on teak, sandal or shisam trees growing on private lands, as they belong to the owners. Royalty at rates varying from Re. 1 to Rs. 1-8 per tree is levied on trees on Government lands assigned for special purposes under section 38, Land Revenue Code. In most cases trees growing in lands of either description are cleared or sold to the purchaser of the land before it is sold or assigned for public purposes.

APPENDIX OO—contd.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

Kolaba District.

No royalty is levied on teak, sandal and shisam trees growing on lands or compounds of private houses. In the case of assigned lands royalty is levied at rates fixed according to girth unless Government has waived its right to such trees.

Kanara District.

Where the right over such trees has not been conceded to the occupant, the Forest Department levy a royalty of Re. 1 per tree for teak and blackwood. Sandalwood trees are not sold at this rate but are exploited to the best advantage by the Forest Department. No case in which royalty has been levied on trees situated in compounds of bungalows has come to notice.

Ratnagiri District.

Government have reserved their right over teak, blackwood and sandalwood trees wherever growing except on alienated land. The holders of land on which the trees grow are allowed to cut them after full growth on payment of the full price calculated at the sanctioned scale, viz., Rs. 5 for 12½ cubic feet of wood in the case of teak trees and at a Panch valuation in the case of other trees. No fixed rate per tree has been sanctioned.

Belgaum District.

No royalty is levied on teak, shisam and sandal trees growing in the compounds of bungalows and on those standing in the building sites held rent-free under the provisions of section 128 of the Land Revenue Code. In the case of trees grow-

ing in unalienated lands, royalty is levied at Re. 1 per tree for teak and shisam, provided the trees have been reserved by, or otherwise belong to Government. As regards sandalwood trees reserved by or belonging to Government in such lands, no royalty is levied but the trees are grubbed up and sold departmentally. In the case of trees growing in private compounds of houses which are not held rent-free, the reservation of the trees provided for by section 40 of the Land Revenue Code applies unless the compounds are used for non-agricultural purposes.

Dharwar District.

No royalty is levied on teak, shisam and sandal trees standing on lands or compounds of private houses except when the right over such trees vests in Government, in which case teak and shisam trees are sold to the owners of the land on recovery of royalty at an uniform rate of rupee one per tree, and sandal trees are exploited departmentally. The disposal of teak, shisam and sandalwood in inam lands is regulated by orders contained in Article 237 of Joglekar's Alienation Manual. Rights over teak, shisam and sandal trees growing on lands assigned for special or public purposes are not generally conceded and teak and shisam in such lands are generally sold by public auction and sandalwood is exploited departmentally.

Bijapur District.

There are no cases in which royalty is levied on teak, sandal and shisam trees growing on private lands and compounds of private houses and assigned lands.

APPENDIX PP.

APPENDIX QQ.

STATEMENT.

Sind.

No cases of children having been rendered destitute by the Influenza Epidemic were brought to the notice of Government.

Northern Division.

Thirty-five orphans were received and maintained by the Methodist Episcopal Church Mission, Godhra, for which a grant of Rs. 2,500 was sanctioned by Government. The orphans were apparently maintained and brought up as their ordinary inmates by the institutions that received them. Other orphans that were rendered destitute were received in the Hindoo Orphanages in Surat, Ahmedabad, Kaira and Broach.

Central Division.

Ahmednagar.—In all 128 children were rendered destitute and were handed over to missions. The children are now learning in the mission schools.

East Khandesh.—Boys and girls that were rendered destitute were sent to the Victoria Orphanage, Dhulia. They attend the Municipal schools at Dhulia. At present there are seven children from East Khandesh at the Orphanage.

West Khandesh.—Four orphans were rendered destitute and were maintained at the Mission House at Mandalwar in Akranj Mahal. Out of those four children, two died and the remaining two are learning in the mission school.

Nasik.—Two Bhil orphans who were rendered destitute received assistance for about a year. They were eventually handed over to their relatives on an undertaking to look after them.

Satara.—There were 45 orphans rendered destitute. These remained in the custody of their relatives but were given gratuitous relief as famine was also co-existent. The distribution of dole was stopped after the disappearance of famine conditions and there were no demands for its continuance.

Sholapur.—Over 30 orphans were rendered destitute and were received and maintained by the local branch of the Zenana Bible and Medical Mission. A grant of Rs. 1,000 was sanctioned to the Institution for the purpose. The majority are still with this mission, while some have been sent to the Nasik branch and some given to other missions, which take boys.

Southern Division.

Bijapur.—Thirty-nine orphans which were rendered destitute were received in the Bijapur Orphanage. Five of these died and three were returned to the relatives of the children.

Dharwar.—Ten orphans were rendered destitute and were taken care of by the missionaries at Gadag but it is not known what has become of them now as they are not under the care of the missionaries.

Kanara.—Four children were rendered destitute. One of these is maintained by a private individual and it is not known what became of the other three.

Kolaba.—There were in all 131 orphans maintained by dole from the poor fund; of these 111 were taken away by their relations and three obtained employment. Ten died while receiving dole or after going to relatives. One has not been traced and six in Pen maintained themselves by begging.

Ratnagiri.—One orphan was rendered destitute. It is being brought up at Government expense under the care of a woman named Sita Shinde.

Belgaum.—Five orphans were rendered destitute. These were maintained by the villagers. The whereabouts of these children are not known.

APPENDIX SS.

Memorandum regarding Physical Culture at Girls' and Boys' Schools.

In Government schools for boys a Drill or Gymnastic teacher is employed to teach physical drill to classes by turns during school hours. These teachers also teach gymnastics out of school hours to those boys who wish to learn. Games, both English and Indian, cricket, football, Atya-Patya and Khokho, are organized after school hours, boys taking part in them on a voluntary basis being divided into suitable batches according to the extent of the playground and the amount of the games fund available. Scouting has also been introduced recently for boys in secondary schools. In some schools Wren's exercises in physical culture are taught for 5—10 minutes every day.

2. In Government girls' schools physical drill and games suitable for girls are taught by mistresses.

3. As the success of instruction in physical culture in schools depends largely on the training received and the keenness shown by the teachers, special attention is paid to this subject in the Secondary Training College and the Primary Training Colleges for men and women.

4. Non-Government schools attend to the physical culture of boys and girls in the same way according to their means, and Government Inspecting Officers exercise an indirect check and supervision on this activity by paying special attention to it at the time of inspection, mention being made of it in the Inspection Report.

5. About half an hour on two or three days a week is spent on drill for each class during school hours.

6. To put physical culture on a more systematic and organized basis in boys' schools, it has been proposed to appoint a Physical Director as soon as funds permit. The question of appointing a Physical Directress for girls' schools is also under consideration.

APPENDIX TT.

Memorandum regarding Mr. Wren's Physical Culture Drill.

The course of physical culture drill organized by Mr. Wren is reported to have been fairly successful, especially in removing the tedium caused by continuous mental work and infusing into boys freshness and zeal for their class work. This drill, though still taught in some Government High Schools, has been discontinued in others owing to various reasons ; *e.g.*, many of the teachers that were trained by Mr. Wren in his class in 1913 are no longer available and no more teachers have since been trained ; the book which Mr. Wren intended to publish on the subject has also not been published.

2. It is agreed generally that some course in Physical Culture Drill should be taught in all Government schools. If and when a Physical Director is appointed as has been proposed, it will be possible to train teachers in the requisite course and to teach it in Government schools under the supervision of the Physical Director. In the meanwhile arrangements have been made for a Y. M. C. A. man to teach the students of the Training College for Men, Poona, a special three-months course in Physical Culture. If this experiment proves successful, it is proposed to arrange for similar courses for other Training Colleges for Vernacular teachers and also for teachers in Government Secondary Schools. Theories of Physical Culture change so rapidly that Mr. Wren's Course may now require revision.

3. The Educational Department of Government can bring to the notice of recognized primary and secondary schools the Physical Culture Course that may be introduced in Government schools, but it can hardly force it on them.

APPENDIX UU.

Punishment by whipping.

The number increased from 36 in 1922 to 98 in 1923, and is accounted for as under. Of these Yeravda Central Prison heads the list with 54. This was due partly to the mutinous conduct of the Mulshi Peta Prisoners, in continuing to refuse to work, and the consequent necessity of inflicting corporal punishment on many of them.

APPENDIX XX.

The annual general meeting of the Nira Left Bank Canal Irrigators' Association was held under the presidentship of Dr. H. H. Mann, the Director of Agriculture, on the 18th of October at 5 o'clock in the evening at the Baramati Club building. About 500 irrigators were present. Messrs. C. C. Inglis, Executive Engineer, Special Irrigation, M. P. Mathrani, G. N. Sahasrabudhe, P. C. Patil were present.

Mr. Nanasaheb Date proposed that Dr. Mann should take the chair, it was seconded by Pandurang Patil, then Dr. Mann occupied the chair.

Then the President called upon Mr. Jadhav, the Secretary, to read the report of the work done so far, then Mr. Jadhav read the detailed report of the work from the very formation of the Association, he also explained the accounts and informed the audience that the balance in hand to that date was Rs. 1,055-4-0, then the report was passed unanimously.

Resolution No. I.—The managing committee consisting of 9 members was elected. The resolution was passed unanimously.

Resolution No. II.-A.—To ensure sugarcane plantation in the month of January, the irrigators should be able to get over-lapping adsali passes like the Rabi passes before the 15th of October. The applications for the same should be received by the irrigation department before the 15th of September.

B.—It is extremely necessary that sugarcane crop should get watering every week in the hot weather from 15th March to 15th June.

C.—It is necessary to improve cultivation of cane hence the experiments found out successful by certain cultivators through experience should be undertaken by all. Therefore this Association is of opinion that the following improvements should be undertaken:—

1. Deep ploughing.
2. Green manuring of san.
3. Plantation in broad ridges.
4. To plant good and selected seedling.
5. Interculture with bullock power.
6. To use Sulphate of Amonia.

This resolution was passed unanimously.

Resolution No. III.—It is essential to plant other profitable crops such as turmeric, ground-nut, cotton and chillies in addition to cane, but to get the highest outturn from these it is necessary that these crops should be planted in the month of May. The Irrigation Department therefore should give the first watering from the 1st of May and charge the reasonable hot weather rate for a month and a half.

Resolution No. IV.—At present the irrigators are not allowed to use wells in the block limits for hot weather crops, this rule should be cancelled and they should be allowed to use them.

Resolution No. V.—Maps with all particulars concerning the blocks on the Nira Right Bank Canal should be published at least six months prior to the enforcement of the blocks.

Resolution No. VI.—The present method of giving perennial blocks on the Nira Left Bank Canal is very disadvantageous and liable to bring heavy losses to the irrigators. A committee therefore should be appointed consisting of 2 officers from the Irrigation Department, 2 from Agriculture Department and 5 representative of the Irrigators to reconsider the block rules, till then the present work of giving blocks should be postponed. The following are some of the disadvantageous rules :—

1. The minimum unit of an acre and half.
2. Compulsion to leave 16½ feet open space on both sides of a trench and a road.
3. Compulsion of leaving 6 feet space on either side of a water channel.

There was a proposal to drop the appointment of a Committee but it was not supported, and the original proposal was passed unanimously.

Resolution No. VII.—It is essential for the Association to have its own building, but it is for want of money that the whole question is delayed ; this meeting is of opinion that the balance in hand of the Bhimthadi Taluka Agricultural Association should be utilised for the building purposes and a committee consisting of 5 persons should be appointed to investigate where and how much the balance is. It should submit report before the end of December 1923.

The resolution was passed unanimously.

Resolution No. VIII.—A request should be made to the Agricultural Department to grant Rs. 500 for the building of the Association. Passed unanimously.

Then the president explained in a few words that the prospects to the irrigators are not encouraging for the rates of Jaggery are going down and down. Therefore the cane-growers must stick to improved and economic planting and diversified farming.

The meeting was then closed after garlanding the President and the guests.

Copy of Letter No. D-101, dated 6th March 1924, from the Superintending Engineer, Deccan Irrigation Division, to the Honorary Secretary, Nira Canal Irrigators' Association, Baramati.

Subject.—Resolution passed by the Nira Canal Irrigators' Association.

Dear Sir,

With reference to your letter dated the 20th November 1923, most of the points dealt with have already been replied to by me personally when

full hot-weather rate and monsoon rate will have to be charged ; but the question of the levy of rates on such crops is yet to be decided.

Resolution No. IV.—If it is intended to refer to the use of well water in the block area, it is an agricultural question, as it will mean more intensive irrigation in the block unless the well is used to supplement the canal supply. If it is intended to mean that the use of wells in block areas should be allowed for irrigating outside areas, experience has proved that theoretically separate channels will be used while practically there may be large thefts of water which cannot be detected. This rule had to be introduced because when well irrigation was sanctioned it was used as a cloak for unauthorised canal irrigation. Under these circumstances your request cannot be entertained unless you agree to pay full flow rates, and each case will need consideration on its merits so as to avoid complications.

Resolution No. V.—The request that maps with all particulars concerning blocks on the Nira Right Bank Canal should be published at least six months prior to the enforcement of blocks is a reasonable one and orders are being issued accordingly.

Resolution No. VI.—The Irrigation Department have already obtained the area required for perennial blocks on the Nira Left Bank Canal. This work has been done with great care and forethought and the majority have certainly benefited ; if there are any individual cases of hardship they will receive careful consideration. The areas now obtained will certainly affect consolidation which will result in more timely and better distribution. The interests of the irrigators and the canal are identical and the Irrigation Department is steadily improving methods of distribution which can be perfected only by persons who thoroughly understand their subject. It is only persons who own inferior lands that have suffered by the redistribution and it is contrary to the interests of the majority of irrigators to allow water in block to bad lands especially as the owners of such land have merely pocketed their profits and have done nothing to improve the lands and render them fit for perennial cultivation. In the case of owners whose lands are less than a unit or are not multiples of units, the remedy is largely in their own hands.

1. *The minimum unit of an acre and half.*—This is in accordance with the revised Bombay Canal Rules which were under consideration for nearly five years. The pros and cons of these rules have been thoroughly discussed by experts at successive irrigation conferences and were sanctioned only after agreement by all departments, while the irrigators were also consulted on most of the points now complained of.

2. *Compulsion to leave 16½' open space on both sides of a trench and a road.*—Leaving 16½ feet along roads is to prevent water wasting on to and rendering the roads impassable. Insisting on a space of 16½ feet along nalas and trenches has been rendered necessary to prevent waste ; because cultivators have started a practice of over-irrigating and then preventing damage to their land by allowing the water to surplus into open drains. I admit that there are some cases where this rule cannot

be rigidly enforced and such cases will be considered on their merits, but the principle is entirely sound.

3. *Compulsion of leaving 6' space on either side of a water channel.*—Leaving 6 feet along a water-course is necessary to enable the staff to inspect.

All these are old canal rules and are quite necessary, the complaint appears to be that the administration is now more efficient and so they are more rigidly enforced than hitherto.

Resolutions Nos. VII and VIII.—The Irrigation Department will give any advice and assistance within their power if so requested.

Grant of additional—at the Agricultural College, Poona, to boys of the cultivating classes.

No. 4713.

FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 23rd December 1909.

Letter from the Director of Agriculture, No. A-7302, dated 30th October 1909 :—

“ With reference to paragraph 2 of Government Resolution No. 11564, dated 13th November 1908, Revenue Department, I have the honour to state that in the course of the last year I have visited a number of the High Schools in the Presidency and seen the boys in the Matriculation Class, with a view to finding suitable students of the cultivating classes who would be likely to do well at the Agricultural College ; and I have no hesitation in saying that by offering additional scholarships at the Agricultural College to boys of the cultivating classes who may pass their Matriculation Examination, it will be possible to increase materially the number of genuine cultivators entering the College and passing on to the B. Ag. I would however point out that the second condition mentioned in paragraph 1 of the Government Resolution under reference is not obtained as the wording of the condition runs, *viz.*, ‘and that, in order to obtain annually eight candidates to fill the scholarships, it is necessary to make use of the concession now sanctioned’ ; since it would always be easy to obtain eight candidates for scholarships if it is immaterial from what class they come. I presume therefore that the wording should run ‘ eight such candidates ’, meaning eight candidates of the agricultural classes.

“ 2. Judging by my experience in the High Schools, I think that I should have little difficulty each year in selecting twenty suitable boys of the cultivating classes each year for scholarships ranging in duration from three to four years, according as the boys have passed the P.E., or only the Matriculation. It will, I think, be desirable to reserve some scholarships each year for boys who pass the P.E. without the assistance of a scholarship.

“ 3. For the present, however, I would propose only fifteen scholarships each year. Eight such scholarships were granted last year by the Government Resolution under reference and by Government Resolution No. 3402, dated 5th April 1909, I was permitted to extend the number to twelve, *viz.*, six four years’ scholarships and six three years’ scholarships.

“ 4. Each scholarship is worth Rs. 15 per mensem and carries with it a free studentship worth Rs. 50 per annum. Thus assuming that ten

of the proposed scholarships were of four years' duration and five of three years' duration, the annual cost would be :—

Rs. $15 \times 12 \times 40 =$ Rs. 7,200 for the ten scholarships of four years' duration given annually,
 + Rs. $15 \times 12 \times 15 =$ „ 2,700 for the five scholarships of three years' duration given annually.

Total cost .. Rs. 9,900 a year.

while the fees remitted would be :—

Rs. $50 \times 40 =$ Rs. 2,000 in the case of the four years' scholarships,
 + Rs. $50 \times 15 =$ „ 750 in the case of the three years' scholarships.

Total remission Rs. 2,750 a year.

If the number of scholarships were maintained at the level of the current year, *viz.*, six four years' scholarships and six three years' scholarships the total cost would be Rs. 7,560, and the total remission Rs. 2,100; so these proposals involve an additional expenditure of Rs. 2,340, and an additional remission of fees amounting to Rs. 650 in excess of the standard in force this year.

“5. As the scholastic year at Arts Colleges commences at the beginning of January, it is requested that early orders may be issued.”

Memorandum from the Revenue Department of the Secretariat, No. 12290, dated 20th December 1909.

RESOLUTION.—The Director of Agriculture should be informed that the presumption made by him in the last sentence of paragraph 1 of his letter is correct.

2. The proposal made by the Director in paragraph 3 of his letter to increase the number of scholarships to fifteen is sanctioned. It is understood that the intention is to give four-year scholarships to a certain number of boys who have passed only the Matriculation Examination, and who, to get into the College, must pass the Previous Examination, but have not the means to take the necessary year's course at an Arts College for that purpose.

3. The Director should be requested to submit through the Accountant General a re-appropriation statement in duplicate, if the additional expenditure that will be incurred during the current year cannot be met out of the grant for scholarships at his disposal.

Copy of Rule 1 of the General Rules of Discipline for Government Schools published in Government Notification, Educational Department, no. 1570-A, dated the 4th August 1909.

1. Parents or guardians who send their boys to Government schools must understand that by so doing they agree to delegate to the Head Master and the Educational Authorities the control which they are entitled to exercise over such boys in all matters connected with such schools, and that in all questions of school discipline both inside and outside the schools the decision of those authorities is final.

APPENDIX HHH.

*Extract paragraphs 7 (2) and 8 of the Commissioner in Sind's
Special Circular No. 9.*

7 (2) In the case of fallow assessed survey numbers, remission of fallow assessment should be refused, unless there were circumstances which rendered it impossible for the occupant to cultivate the survey number during the kharif and the rabi (including adhawa) seasons in the fifth year.

8. In addition to the remission of the fallow assessment under No. 26 of the remission rules, the Commissioner is prepared to authorise the suspension of the fallow rules in any well defined tracts where it can be shown that there is a chronic deficiency in the water supply. Before submitting proposals for the suspension district officers should ordinarily consult the Public Works Department officers even though it is proposed to suspend the rules for one year only.

*Extract paragraph 6 of the Commissioner in Sind's
Special Circular No. 23-I.*

6. Although the ordinary practice hitherto followed has been to restore fallow-forfeited survey numbers to the occupants from whose *khata* they were forfeited, it should be distinctly understood that such restoration is merely an act of grace, the ex-occupants having no indefeasible legal right to it. Where there are special reasons against re-grant of such survey numbers, e.g., vicinity to a village, the requirements of the Forest or any other Department, or when the numbers have been left on the list of forfeitures so long that they may practically be said to have been abandoned, the Collector is at liberty to refuse the application of the former occupants.

It should be borne in mind that fallow-forfeited numbers being the property of Government, Civil Court decrees in respect of them are not binding on the Collectors.

The Taluka officers and the Sub-Divisional officers, P.W.D., are therefore requested to see that toll bars are established at proper places as shown above.

3. The amounts of the final bids are to be paid in four equal instalments as under :—

The Taluka officers are requested to recover the instalments on or before the due dates and to report to the Collector the dates of credit of each instalment paid by the contractors in the local sub-treasuries.

The Taluka officers are authorised to accord their approval to the contractor's staff. The Collector retains the power of instant dismissal.
