#### BILL No. II OF 1925.

A Bill further to amend the Indian Stamp Act, 1899, in its application to the Presidency of Bombay.

### As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the 27th January 1925.

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Indian Stamp Act, 1899, in its application to the Presidency of II of 1899. Bombay, to provide for the levy of a duty on the transfer of land in the City of Bombay and in other municipal areas; AND WHEREAS the previous sanction of the Governor General required by section 80A of the Government of India Act, has been obtained for the passing of this Act; It is hereby 5 & 6 Geo. enacted as follows :---V, c. 61.

1. (1) This Act may be called the Indian Stamp (Bom-Short title and extent. bay Amendment) Act, 192

(2) It extends to the whole of the Presidency of Bombay.

2. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Indian

### Subject : Financial Relations-Revision of Meston Settlement.

Sir,

With reference to the financial proposals contained in the Budget of the Government of India, I am directed to communicate to the Government of India a representation of the Legislative Council of Bombay suggesting that the just claims of this Presidency require further consideration.

2. His Excellency the Governor in Council entirely associates himself with this representation, and with the speech of the Finance Member of this Government in the course of the debate in Council on March 2nd.

3. I am to invite attention to the protests against the Meston Settlement which this Government have made to the Government of India from time to time, protests based on evidence and arguments which have been fully set out in the faccompanying representation. I am to recall to the Government of India the advice tendered in 1917-18 by Sir W. Meyer, then Finance Member, Sir J. Brunyate, Member of the Council of India and Sir H. F. Howard, subsequently Financial Adviser to the Secretary of State, to the effect that a complete separation of sources of revenue was not adopted in any Federal system and was not practicable.

4. The break down of this system is admitted by the acceptance, upon the protest of the Bombay Government, by the Secretary of State of Devolution Rules 14 (c) and 15. But while the claim of this Presidency to a share in the income tax was admitted, the Rule was so framed as to withhold any substantial relief. The sums collected by the Government of India in the period 1921-22 to 1924-25 and the share received by this Government are shown below :—

6. The Province of Bombay has reached a stage when the revenue obtained from the rural population will no longer meet the needs of future progress, and the Legislative Council have declared with no uncertain voice that they are adverse to any additional taxation which may fall to any extent on the rural population. It is on this ground that they refused a year ago to extend the enhanced Court Fees which had been introduced in 1922 as a temporary measure. Apart from the tax on betting which the Government of Bombay intend to introduce during the year, the possibilities of new taxation are limited to enhancements under the Stamp Acts, and until some form of death duties can be evolved and extended to the whole of India, Stamp Duties can produce little additional revenue.

7. I am directed further to lay particular stress on that part of the representation which deals with the comparative incidence of taxation in the various Provinces. The per capita taxation (including the land revenue) in this Presidency is considerably higher than in any other part of India; and this fact has made it peculiarly difficult for this Government to carry even the small measures of taxation left open to local Governments. At the same time the standard of living and the long accepted standards of administration, as evidenced by the comparative tables of expenditure on the various public services, make it impossible for this Presidency to retrench down to the standard of other Provinces, though rigid economy has long been the guiding spirit in all departments.

8. Figures of the retrenchments effected have already been supplied by telegram to the Government of India, but these perforce omit all reference to economies constantly being effected, which though the results are not calculable, have definitely affected the standard of administrative efficiency. The time has now come when the difficulties arising out of the failure to obtain a share of the revenues derived from the great industries of the Province can no longer be concealed by retrenchment

The business of the Council be adjourned to call attention to the financial proposals of the Finance Member of the Government of India as they affect this Presidency and to urge upon the Government the necessity of urgently communicating to the Government of India by a proper representation of the Honourable Members of this House the just claims of Bombay to further consideration, having regard to the financial position of this Presidency.

2. The financial proposals in this Budget of the Government of India make no reference to the Bombay Presidency but, in accordance with the Meston Settlement, allot 2 5 crores to grant relief to four Provinces of a portion of their contribution to the Central Exchequer. Moreover, in regard to Bengal, they go outside the Meston Settlement, and grant a total remission of the contribution of 63 lakhs to that Presidency for another three years.

3. We claim that a grave injustice has been done to the Presidency of Bombay through the Meston Settlement. Our case against that settlement is based on two distinct grounds : firstly, that the distribution of surplus revenues assigned to the provinces of India over and above the provincial revenue existing at the time of the reforms was determined in a haphazard manner and bore no relation to the needs of the provinces, to the total taxation derived from those provinces and to the resources then available in those provinces : and secondly, that this haphazard distribution was founded upon the application of federal principles of finance which have not been adopted in any other federal Government in the world.

4. We recognise our responsibility in putting forward so vigorous a criticism of a system of finance which was first suggested in the Montagu-Uhelmsford Report, accepted by the Meston Committee and endorsed by the Joint Committee of the House of Lords and Commons. We are supported in our present representation by the continuous protests which the Government of Bombay have made from the first consideration of this question in 1918. We feel that these protests have been overruled chiefly on the ground of the grave complexity of the problems raised and the expendiency of accepting a definite decision supported by authority. We urge that this decision should now be reconsidered for the reasons:

Firstly, that the decision has already broken down as is admitted by the variations already accepted in rules 15 and 18 (2) of the Devolution Rules.

Secondly, that the premises on which the decision was founded can be demonstrated to be erroneous.

6. Now how does the Meston Report justify this variation in treatment? Paragraph 15 of their Report discusses this question and should be considered in full:

"It is of importance to realise the nature of this transaction. In the first place it implies no judgment on the merits of previous financial settlements with any province. The increase in revenue comes to the provinces as a windfall, or as a bye-product of a constitutional change. It is not due, as financial settlements have been in the past, to the consideration of the financial needs of individual provinces. It cannot properly be quoted as an admission of financial inequalities or as an act of

"Secondly, on this basis the system of contributions appears in a less invidious light. The central government in the course of a political reconstruction gives to each of the local governments some, and to some local governments a very considerable, increase of spending power. Finding itself in a deficit as the result of this reconstruction, it withholds from each province a certain proportion of the increased resources which it is intended that the provinces should eventually obtain. The central government does not come in as raiding the hard won surplus of a province; por ought the central government to be represented, if our proposal be accepted, as the pensioner of the provinces. It can hardly be contended that a province, which has at all events decidedly improved its finances as a result of the change, has valid ground of complaint, if it does not obtain immediately the full increment which it may subsequently realise. In the case of the provinces that gain most, it would hardly be possible for any such province to spend in the first year the whole of its suddenly increased resources; and if it were possible, it would be financially We think therefore that this basis affords less scope for undesirable. controversy and may be accepted as both logical and more equitable than the plan of the Montagu-Chelmsford Report."

7. It is remarkable that the Committee did not consider themselves called upon to justify so violent a change in the existing revenues on any reasoned grounds. They accepted without qualification the fact that this increase given to certain provinces arose out of political and not primarily financial motives, and then they proceeded to argue in some detail on the justification of withholding from certain provinces a proportion of the increased resources.

8. We are unable to view this question from the same standpoint. The position taken by the Meston Committee has largely governed the direction of subsequent criticisms by provincial governments. Attention has been concentrated, and in our judgment wrongly concentrated, on the amount of provincial resources withheld out of the windfalls; and the great agricultural provinces of Madras, the United Provinces and the Punjab have complained that they have been paying 3.5, 2.4 and 1.75 crores of provincial contributions and have lost sight of the fact that they received windfalls of 66 per cent., 51 per cent. and 50 per cent. over and above their former revenues. The argument has in fact been turned upside down, and the public have been led to believe that Bombay and Bengal with contributions of 56 and 63 lakhs have been favourably treated in comparison with the provinces that pay two or three crores.

that they based their conclusion that Bombay in particular may "look for reasonable elasticity in their revenues apart from income-tax".

10. We append a Note showing how completely the contention of the Committee regarding the elasticity of our revenues has been falsified in fact. We have had the figures of revenue carefully examined, and compared the actual realisations with the expectations of the Meston Committee. We find that the realisations in the four years of the reformed government fell short of the calculations of the Committee by over 9 crores.

The selection of two single years as the bais of important conclusions has vitiated the whole argument. The datum line selected was a year of famine when the land revenue had fallen by a crore and a half. Hence the erroneous conclusion that the land revenue would go on expanding at the rate of about 4 per cent. per annum. An analysis of our land revenue figures for the last twenty-one years shows that it has expanded by 14 per cent. in that period, or less than 1 per cent. per annum. Its capacity for expansion in the future is clearly limited : while it is admitted that this Presidency is more liable to famine than any other part of India.

In the case of Excise the period considered by the Committee included an important change of system from fixed fees to auctions which led to a sudden large increase of revenues which could not possibly be repeated.

The Committee's expectations regarding Stamps were equally erroneous as they were based upon the boom years following the war.

11. Again, the Meston Committee in paragraph 20 state that Bombay "has attained a scale of expenditure far above the Indian average, and the pace of expansion of its revenues is distinctly higher than in any other province. We believe that it could without inconvenience forego the greater part of its new resources at the outset, and help the less fortunate provinces from its own abundant balances. But we hesitate to differentiate it prejudically from the other richer provinces".

We admit that we have a scale of expenditure far above the Indian average; but if the State in Bombay has conferred greater benefits on the people in the matter of Education, Medical Relief, Roads, Buildings, and such other beneficent activities, it has derived the revenues for this expenditure from its own people. Is it right that we should be penalised on this ground? Is it disputed that an industrial province must necessarily maintain a higher standard of administration than a purely agricultural province ?

12. The question of the heavy expenditure of the Government on great commercial and industrial cities is mentioned by the Moston Committee, but with little recognition of its importance. Bombay has two of the principal ports of India on its coast line. But the mercantile and trading population who contribute so handsomely to the revenues of the India Government in Income tax, Super tax, Customs duties and Cotton Excise, and who are the main prop of the Government of India in its loan operations, contribute little to the provincial revenues. The local government has to provide for the education of a large industrial population and to grapple with problems of development and sanitation, medical relief and housing, as well as to maintain law and order in cities and large industrial towns. As an illustration, it may be noted that the expenditure on Police in Bombay City is Rs. 3 per head as against Re. 1 per head in the districts or an increased expenditure of 20 lakhs on Bombay City police alone. This is not a small matter when it is remembered that of the 11 chief towns of India with a population of over 200,000 four are situated in this Presidency.

13. This Presidency is engaged in vast enterprises in the development of the City of Bombay and the development of irrigation in Sind : enterprises which conceived and put in train before the crushing blow of this Award fell upon us, require the provision of some 50 crores of capital. When these works are completed we anticipate that the material progress of the people will be greatly enhanced, trade and industry will flourish and the income-tax revenue will be greatly increased. Is it just that this Presidency should bear the whole risk and responsibility of those enterprises and that the proceeds of the wealth so gained should be diverted to the Central Exchequer ? In the City of Bombay we borrow money wherewith to reclaim large areas, to construct buildings and to lay out roads. The industries that flourish therefrom pay their whole contribution to the central government. We remain responsible for the loans and receive no benefit from the industries that we have financed. We submit that this is an anomalous and inequitable arrangement which would not be tolerated in any other Federal system in the world.

14. We now proceed to set forth some detailed figures regarding our income tax payments.

At the time of the Meston Award the income tax in the different provinces was as follows :---

For the years 1920-23 (for which alone figures of all provinces are available) this province with a population of less than 8 per cent. of the total population of British India has contributed not less than 36 per cent. of the income tax and allied taxes of all India.

We fully admit that the companies operatinthe . having their headquarters in Bombay pay inconsionar an allowance must be made for this fact. But no such deductions alter the essential fact that a far larger proportion of our popular live by industry than in any other province or that this presidency several times as much per head in the shape of taxes on income a other province in India.

15. In response to the continuous protests of the Bombay Govern ment, the Secretary of State overruled the Meston Committee's proposal that no share of the income tax should be allotted to any province, and sanctioned a special rule No. 14-C in the Devolution Rules, thereby granting a share "in the growth of revenue derived from income tax collected in the provinces so far as the growth is attributable to an increase in the amount of income assesses ". This was a fundamental breach in the system of separate revenues on which the whole Meston Settlement is founded. It is indeed true that Bombay, the protagonist of the struggle for a share in the income tax, gets less under the Devolution Rule 15 than most other provinces, because the datum year 1920-21 was one of exceptional trade and prosperity in Bombay; and as the machinery for the collection of the tax had also been brought to a higher pitch of efficiency in Bombay than in other provinces, the result is that Bombay can never hope to secure any substantial revenue under the existing rule. The share of this province was 13 lakhs for the year 1921-22 and 16<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> lakhs for 1922-23, nothing for the last or the current year, and probably nothing next year. But however disappointing the result from the Bombay point of view, the fact remains that this rule represents a complete departure from the theory of the clean cut.

16. The sanctity of the Settlement has thus already been violated. It can no longer be pleaded that its principles are fixed for good or ill.

A further breach was effected when, in August 1923, the Secretary of State sanctioned rule 18 (2) granting a remission to the Government of Bengal of the provincial contribution in the financial years 1922-23; and again in the proposals of the present budget of the Government of India to continue the special remission to the province of Bengal for another three years.

Since the province of Bengal has, like that of Bombay, contributed a very large amount to the central revenues in the shape of income tax, super tax, and excess profit duty in the four years 1921—25, we regard this remission of 2 crores in the past and 2 crores in the coming three years as a partial recognition of the injustice of the Meston Settlement, and we endorse and support this remission. But we fail to recognise any grounds for a differentiation adverse to Bombay and we claim that pending the settlement of our appeal for a revision of the allocation of the sources of revenue, the same relief as has been applied to the Presidency of Bengal may be applied to the Presidency of Bombay by the remission of the existing contribution of Rs. 56 lakhs a year. Such remission can however only be regarded as a provisional remedy and <sup>28</sup> a small proportion only of our total claim.

Without claiming perfect accuracy for these figures, we maintain that they are sufficient to demonstrate the fact that Bombay contributes several times as much per head to the imperial exchequer as other provinces in India. For what it contributes to the provincial revenues it gets a return in the shape of greater amenities of civilized life than the other provinces. But what extra benefits does it enjoy as compared with the other provinces for the disproportionate share of its contributions to the Imperial Government?

18. Since the Meston Committee were dealing with an increase of provincial resources from 54 crores to 72 crores, or 33 per cent., we claim that each province should have had an equal share in this increase. Bengal, the Central Provinces, Bihar and Orissa and Assam suffer also from this unequal distribution; but our case is aggravated both by the smaller share that we received and by the heavy toll on our income tax revenues.

The normal revenue of Bombay was then assumed to be ten crores, and our proportionate share would have been 3.34 crores.

The Committee allotted us 92 lakhs only, and we urge that we have been unjustly deprived of 242 lakhs.

Of the sums so alloted forty per cent. only have so far been granted to the Provinces, and on this proportion Bombay should have received 96 lakhs per annum in these four years 1921-25.

We claim therefore that sum of four crores has been wrongly withheld from us; and that in the future we are entitled on the basis of the just distribution of the surplus revenues dealt with by the Meston Award to additional revenues not less than 242 lakhs per annum.

The Government of India have drain from the in the four years 1921-25 in Income Tax and Supe 25 crores of rupees.

Are we not justified in asking that a portion of these 25 crores be restored to us? We ask that these two claims be submitted for the adjudication of an impartial tribunal.

19. So far we have dealt with the practical side of the Meston Settlement. We now turn to the theoretical basis. Immediately after the memorable declaration of August 1917, enquiries began as to the best method of financial provision for the autonomous governments then foreshadowed. The principle of entirely separate financial sources of revenue was laid by Sir James Meston (as he then was) and accepted on behalf of the Government of India.

The Local Governments accepted the principle in theory; but even at this early stage the Bombay Government claimed a share in the income tax. In June 1918 appeared the Montagu-Chelmsford Report, and in Chapter VIII we find this principle again enunciated:

"Our first aim has therefore been to find out some means of entirely separating the resources of the central and provincial governments" and again

"If provincial autonomy is to mean anything real, clearly the provinces must not be dependent on the Indian Government for the means of provincial development."

We desire to draw special attention to these extracts, since the origin of all subsequent trouble is the academic insistence, by the framers of the Montagu-Chelmsford Report, on the theory of complete separation.

20. In no country in the world in the history of federal and provincial finance has it been found possible to achieve a clean cut between provincial and central revenues. There is a larger measure of provincial autonomy in the Commonwealth of Australia than in any other British federation. Yet there is no such complete separation of Commonwealth and State finance as is aimed at in Iudia. In Canada, and the United States also there are common sources of State Revenue. The war tax on profits and income in Switzerland was levied on the cantons who retained a share of the proceeds and paid the balance into the Federal treasury. Wherever complete separation has been aimed at, as in India, it is found that subsidies or contributions are required.

21. In conclusion, we desire to lay stress on the fact that Bombay is more highly taxed than any other province in India. Its greater liability to famine demands the maintenance of a balance and a famine fund greater than any other province. We are making every effort to effect retrenchment, balance our budget and maintain necessary reserves. We trust that the Government of India are able to appreciate the necessities of our financial position and will not be misled into the belief that Bombay is in no need of relief.

we have fulfin. I the conditions laid down by the Finance Member when he spoke on March 1st, 1923, words:

"The provincial governments think, it is said, that they will get more sympathy from the central government and get rid of their provincial contributions quickly if they can show a handsome deficit and appeal to the charity of the central government. I should like to say for my part that the strongest appeal that the provincial governments can make in the matter of provincial contributions is to show themselves worthy of assistance from the central government by strenuous and successful endeavours to make both ends meet for themselves."

We have constantly insisted on the necessity for economy and retrenchment. We demanded of Government in 1922 a cut of 60 lakhs, which was actually converted into a saving of 70 lakhs; and the permanent savings effected on the advice of our Retrenchment Committee amount annually to over 33 lakhs. We agreed to temporary bills to enhance the Stamp Duties and the Court Fees, and to a permanent Act to tax Entertainments, with the result that we have built up and maintained a balance suitable to our situation. But our future progress is now impeded and we are faced next year with a definit of nearly half a crore.

The case, therefore, for reference to another Committee of the revision of the Mestor Settlement, seems to us to be unanswerable. In this we are supported by the conclusions both of the majority and the minority reports of the Reforms Enquiry Committee which give additional reasons for early reconsideration.

The Meston Committee estimated that during the period of four years there would be an increase of 234 lakhs; as a matter of fact there has been a decrease of  $60\frac{1}{2}$  lakhs. ### APPENDIX D.

### BILL No. III OF 1925.

### A Bill further to amend the Court-fees Act, 1870.

### (As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the 27th January 1925.)

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Court-VII of 1870. fees Act, 1870, in its application to the Presidency of Bombay in manner hereinafter appearing; It is hereby enacted as follows :---

Short title, extent, 1. (1) This Act may be called the commencement and Court-fees (Bombay Amendment) Act, duration. 192.

(2) It extends to the whole of the Presidency of Bombay.

(3) It shall come into force on the 1st day of April 1925.

Amendment of section 2. In section 7 of the Court-fees Act, of 1870. 7 of VII of 1870. 1870, hereinafter called the said Act,

(a) to clause (d) of paragraph iv the words "or other consequential relief" shall be added;

### STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of this Bill is to enhance the Court fees in certain cases for the purpose of increasing the revenue of Government. In enhancing the Court fees the general principle followed is that where fixed fees are prescribed as in Schedule II of the Court Fees Act, 1870, the fees should be raised in consequence of the decreased value of money. In the case of ad valorem fees prescribed in Schedule I of the Court Fees Act. an enhancement is made only where experience has shown that the present fees levied are so inadequate that they lead to the abuse of judicial facilities or do not cover the actual cost to Government of the services rendered. The enhancement is effected by clauses 3 and 4 of the Bill which alter the fees in the case of those articles in Schedules I and II of the Court Fees Act in respect of which an enhancement of fee is considered necessary. A few applications have been added to Article 18 of Schedule II of that Act which, it is believed, should properly be brought under that Article as they are on the same footing as applications under paragraph 17 of the Second Schedule to the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908. The table of ad valorem fees is amended where the fee is altered.

2. Clause 2 of the Bill makes certain amendments in section 7 of the Court Fees Act which are based on the recommendation of the High Court and other judicial officers. The amendment in sub-clause (a) calls for no comment. The amendment in sub-clause (b) is intended to provide against under-valuation of the suits mentioned in clause (iv) of section 7 of the Act which exists at present with consequent loss of revenue. Sub-clause (c) amends the proviso to section 7 (v) so that the amounts payable may bear a better approximation to present day values of land.

### STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The Bombay Rent (War Restrictions) Acts of 1918 (Bombay Acts II and VII of 1918) were passed with the object of restricting the raising of rent in Bombay and certain other places as, owing to the war, the supply of accommodation had not kept pace with the demand. Bombay Act II of 1918 was the main Act, while Bombay Act VII of 1918 was a subsidiary one dealing with small premises of which the standard rent, without the additional percentage allowed to landlords, did not exceed Rs. 20 a month. The operation of these Acts was subsequently extended by Bombay Act III of 1923 up to the 31st August 1924 in the municipal district and cantonment of Karachi, and in other places in which the Act was in operation up to the 31st December 1925 as regards dwellinghouses, and up to the 31st August 1924 as regards other premises. The Acts ceased to be in operation as regards other premises both in Karachi and elsewhere on the 31st August 1924; but by Bombay Act III of 1924 they were extended in respect of premises used as dwelling-houses in the municipal district and cantonment of Karachi also up to the 31st Decem-Thus the operation of both Acts will expire in Karachi and ber 1925. elsewhere on the 31st December 1925.

It has, however, been ascertained after careful inquiry that, though there has been a fall in the rent of residential premises with a higher rental, there has been little or no fall in the rent of residential premises

(Bom III of 1888)

h a lower rental, and that the want of accommodation in the case of the latter class of premises is still very keenly felt. It is, therefore, considered necessary to extend the protection of the Acts for three years in the case of residential premises of which the standard rent without additional percentage allowed to landlords does not exceed Rs. 50 in the case of Karachi, and does not exceed Rs. 85 in the case of any other area in which the Act is in operation. At the same time it is equitable that the landlords should receive an adequate return for their capital, taking into consideration the changes that have taken place in the economic conditions since the Acts were passed; and provision has therefore been made for a sliding scale of increases which will enable the landlords to secure a total increase of rent, ranging from 20 per cent. to 60 per cent. beyond the above mentioned standard rent. As indicated above, the operation of the Acts has already expired in the case of non-residential premises, and no change is proposed in respect of such premises. The Bill deals with both the original Acts of 1918.

Notes on specific clauses of the Bill requiring explanation are given below :---

### Notes on clauses.

Clauses 2 and 6.—Difficulty has arisen in connection with the words "used as a dwelling-house"; the words "used wholly or principally as a dwelling-house" have therefore been inserted in the Bill.

Clause 3.—As the Act is being extended for a further period of three years, it is equitable that landlords should be allowed a somewhat higher percentage of increase than that allowed by the existing Act. Schedule A is therefore substituted for the present schedule to Bombay Act II of 1918, allowing a percentage up to a maximum of 50 as compared with 33<sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> in the present Act. It is also equitable to allow landlords a percentage of increase in respect of premises coming under sub-clauses (*ii*) and (*iii*) of section 2 (1) (a) of Bombay Act II of 1918 similar to that allowed in respect of premises coming under sub-clause (*i*) of the said section.

Clause 4 (1).—This clause extends the provisions of section 9 (3) to subleases which took place before 21st August 1922. There is no reason to make an exception in favour of tenants who sublet their premises before 21st August 1922. The words "or any part thereof" have been inserted to deal with an evasion of the provisions of the Act.

Clauses 4 (2).—New section 9 (4) provides that when a tenant obtains accommodation by reason of his being in the employment of his landlord he shall not continue to occupy the premises without the consent of his landlord if his employment terminates. There are cases in which housing accommodation is provided by the employers for their employees and the employee refuses to vacate the premises even after his employment has terminated.

Clause 4 (2) and 8.—Provision has also been made excluding from the protection of the Acts those tenants who occupy premises which are in a ruinous condition or are likely to fall and are a source of danger. Cases

have occurred in Bombay City in which tenants in occupation of such premises have refused to vacate them when called upon to do so, and unnecessary delay occurred before they could be ejected by resort to the courts. In the interest of the tenants themselves and of their neighbours it is desirable that in such cases the tenants should be made to vacate the premises immediately, in order to enable the premises to be demolished or put in order, as the case may be.

Clause 7.—Certain petty premises are left by the tenants unoccupied tor long periods, no rent being paid. It is desirable that the landlord should have power to open and take possession of such premises.

### STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The Bill is intended to meet the growing public demand to alter the constitution of the Municipalities within the Presidency including the Province of Sind in such a way as to enhance their usefulness and to widen their powers, and by making them more self-reliant and free of official control, to contribute to the growth and advancement of representative institutions in the Presidency including Sind.

### Notes on Clauses.

Clause 2.—Under the present Law only 14 Municipalities (as mentioned in Schedule E) throughout the Presidency are denominated as City

. Mauses 4 and 5.—These Clauses propose to make all City Municipalities olly elected, and to confine the nomination on the other Municipalities iy to one-fifth of the whole number of Councillors.

5. Clause 6.—Under the present Act persons coming within the descripgiven in section 15, sub-section (1) are debarred for ever from being Councillors of a Municipal Board. The Clause seeks to confine the bar only to a period of five years, after the lapse whereof, the bar will cease to exist, and such persons will be fully competent to be Councillors.

Clauses 7 to 13.—These clauses relate to the amendment of section 23 of the present Act. Clause 7 proposes to amend the Act in a way whereby all the Muncipalities will be presided over by elected Presidents. Clause 9 proposes to debar any salaried servant of the Government to be either the President or Vice-President of any Municipality. Clauses 8, 10, 11 and 12 are more or less consequential amendments. Clause 13 makes non-acceptance of office as one more ground for filling up the post of either the President or Vice-President.

Clauses 14 and 17.—These Clauses propose to make it obligatory upon the Government to satisfy themselves about any Municipality having complied with the provisions of section 160, before applying the Land Acquisition Act. Clause 17 is aimed at discouraging the growing tendency on the part of the Municipalities to move the Government in the first instance to acquire land together with its appurtenances under the Land Acquisition Act without first endeavouring to exhaust the special procedure provided for by section 160 for this purpose. It makes it incumbent upon a Municipality to move by application the District Court for the purposes of acquisition.

Clause 15.—This Clause is intended to do away with the necessity of securing the previous concurrence of the Collector for the discharge of functions mentioned in sub-section (m) of section 56 of the Act.

Clause 16.—This Clause, by proposing to delete the proviso, intends to make municipalities independent of all official control and supervision in matters educational, when they have decided to maintain all Municipal Educational Institutions exclusively out of Municipal funds.

We, the undersigned members of the Select Committee appointed to consider Motions Nos. III to VIII to amend the Standing Orders, have the honour to report as follows :--

Motion No. III: amendments moved by Mr. M. R. Jayakar.

We have considered the amendments proposed by Mr. M. R. Jayakar in Standing Orders-

> IV, 7 (3) IV, 7 (3) (ii) V, 3 VI, 10 VIII, 11 (2) (a) VIII, 11 (2) (b) X, 12 (First amendment) XI, 3

and are of opinion that they are unnecessary and should not be accepted.

We have decided by a majority that the amendment proposed by Mr. Jayakar in Standing Order IV, 1 is necessary and should be made

We think that the amendments proposed in Standing Order IV, 4 (1) may be accepted with the addition of the words "moved Council" after the words "or of any resolution".

The amendment proposed in Standing Order IV, 6 is in our opinion necessary and should be accepted.

We consider that some amendment is necessary in Standing Order VIII, 1 (1) but that instead of the amendments proposed by Mr. M. R. Jayakar, the following be substituted for Standing Order VIII, 1 (1):

"1 (1) On the motion for leave to introduce a Bill the mover may make a brief explanatory statement. If the motion is opposed, the President may permit a brief explanatory statement from the member who opposes and a brief reply from the mover; he may then without further debate put the question thereon; if leave to introduce the Bill is granted, the member who gave notice of the motion shall forthwith introduce the Bill."

We are of opinion that instead of amending Standing Order X, 5 (2) in the manner suggested by Mr. M. R. Jayakar, it should be deleted and the following Standing Order, which is based on Standing Order 61 (2) of the Standing Orders of the Indian Legislative Assembly, should be substituted for it:

X, 5 (2) "If the member when called on is absent, any other member authorised by him in writing in this behalf may, with the permission of the President, move the resolution standing in his name. But if no member has been so authorised, or such permission is not granted, the resolution shall be deemed to have been withdrawn".

We have decided by a majority that the proposal of Mr. M. R. Jayakar to amend Standing Order X, 12 by adding the words "and decided by a vote of the Council" is unnecessary and should not be accepted. We have also decided by a majority that the existing Standing Order X, 12 should be numbered X, 12 (1) and the following clause should be added to it:

"2. When a resolution has been disallowed under the Rules or Standing Orders or has been withdrawn with the leave of the Council, no resolution raising substantially the same question shall be moved during the same session."

We have decided by a majority that the second amendment proposed by Mr. M. R. Jayakar in Standing Order X, 12, *viz.*, the substitution of the words "six months" for "one year" should be accepted.

### Motions Nos. IV, V, VI, VII, and VIII.

We are of opinion that the amendments proposed by Messrs. Pahalajani, Joshi, Bhopatkar and Shivdasani in the above motions are not necessary.

### Motion No III.

1. Chapter IV, Order 7 (3).—If the amendment proposed by Mr. P. G. Joshi regarding leave to introduce a Bill is not accepted, then the one propsed by Mr. Jayakar to the above Order becomes absolutely necessary. It is really strange that the members should be asked to note on the question of the leave to introduce a bill without furnishing them with a copy thereof and without giving them sufficient time and opportunity to consider it.

2. Chapter IV, Order 7 (3) (ii).—If the first amendment be accepted, this amendment becomes merely consequential in nature.

3. Chapter VI, Order 10.—Mr. Jayakar's amendment, namely, to substitute "may be taken as notice and shall be answered without further notice at a subsequent meeting of the Council" for "may be put only in the form of a fresh question at a subsequent meeting of the Council", is necessary in view of the growing importance of the power of the House to put supplementary questions, and of the desirability of making it incumbent upon the official benches to answer supplementary questions without further notice in the interest of the public at large.

### Motion No. V.

4. Mr. P. G. Joshi's amendment to Order VIII will enable a member to introduce his bill upon his securing 30 members ready and willing to grant leave to introduce it. True it is that it will mean a small expenditure to the Government; but that should count for very little when especially a piece of legislation is concerned. Such a procedure will not mean any encroachment upon the rights of the House, as the House has many opportunities to throw off the Bill, if it is found to be undesirable or inexpedient.

### Motion No. VI.

5. My motion was proposed entirely from the view point of the convenience of the members, and with the object of arranging the work.

Please note that I desire to move the above amendments in the House.

(Minute of dissent by Mr. B. G. Pahalajani, M.L.C.)

I cannot agree with the Select Committee's report that it is not necessary to send copy of a private Bill sought to be introduced by a member to all the members of the Council in advance. I do not think it is necessary to put the member seeking to introduce a private Bill to the necessity of printing 110 copies for circulation. It is necessary to send a copy through the Council office.

I, therefore, dissent from the Select Committee's report not to send intimation or copy of the Bill round.

It is worth while to dispense with fresh written notice as regards supplementary questions.

I cannot agree with the proposal not to substitute the words "until 12 months expire", for if the elected members of the Council cannot bring a motion within 12 months, so should not the Government members : the restriction as it stands is one-sided, and my proposed substitution seeks to make it common to all. The provision however cannot apply to consequential amendments in Bills.

While agreeing with the alteration of 1 year into 6 months I am of opinion that "decided by the vote of the Council" should be there; there are cases in which for expediency, or for giving an opportunity to the Government to redress a grievance, a Resolution is moved and withdrawn. There is no reason why it should not be repeated at the next session, 4 months after, and why the proposer should wait for 2 sessions.

In the case of budget objections in Chapter XI, Order 3, I am still of opinion that the option of curtailing notice should be given to the President as in the case of Bills. This difficulty has been felt very often.

Chapter X, Order 5 (2): Add -after "-been withdrawn-"-"-unless another-member---specially --authorised -- by--the member in whose name it appears on the agenda, is ready and willing to move it ".

### Subject.-Estimate for the Dandeli-Potoli Railway.

Sir,

I have the honour to refer you to my No. 961 of 10th instant and to inform you that the financial statements and estimates for the Dandeli-Potoli Railway were prepared as regards rolling stock on the basis of quotations for surplus war stock which was available in a limited quantity. The estimate and statements I took to you personally on 13th instant. The representative of Messrs. Robert Hudson and Co., Light Railway Engineers, met and had an interview with me on 14th instant. The first two items of this rolling stock, viz., 25 double-bogie box type wagons and 6 double bogie platform wagons have already been sold and therefore no longer available. I discussed the question with this Firm's representative and made some suggestions. Accordingly he has made and confirmed certain special offers based on previous quotations, but with some reductions in prices. There are special offers, but the prices are higher than those of the war surplus rolling stock originally selected.

2. As regards the selling price of fuel, the rate is Rs. 12-8-0 per ton for all quantities above a supply of 30,000 tons. Last year's supply being over 40,000 tons, I have assumed, with your approval, a rate of Rs. 12-8-0 per ton after deducting the freight charges for fuel from Dandeli to Alnavar.

3. Revised statements have therefore been prepared and included herewith.

4. Before going into the details of the estimate and revenue calculations, I wish to point out the necessity of very early sanction to the purchase of the rolling stock at present available. It is limited in quantity, and if procured now, will represent a saving of Rs. 27,500 to Government.

This therefore is a point which may be regarded as a reason for egards action and unless I get permission to place the orders with s:days the opportunity will be lost. As the result of my interview. Messrs. Robert Hudson's representative, I was able to effect a duction amounting to Rs. 12,500 on previous quotations. This v not hold if there is delay. The following is a copy of their telegram co. firming their special offers :--

" Bombay 16th, Forenger Dharwar.

Confirm offer 25 bogie-wagons two thousand each, six bolster bogies at five hundred each, six platform wagons 22 ft., at 15,000 each free on rails Calcutta Ex. stock 24 gauge all bogies identical as indicated in catalogue, but Calcutta asks for prompt order. Rails to-day's mail reports show slight rise will keep 28lbs. offer Rs. 8,255 per mile open subject confirmation. Will you not purchase now steel prices tend to rise owing to involved state affairs on Continent. Wagons offered subject being unsold.

5. Estimate.—The estimate for the Dandeli-Potoli Railway has been completed in general and is submitted in abstract herewith.

6. Alignment.—You are acquainted with the general line of the Railway. From the Dandeli depôt, it crosses the Kalinadi making use of the existing causeway as far as possible. Some special work, however, will be required in the river portion. The Railway then follows roughly the direction of the Dandeli-Shamjoida road, crossing the Bavla Zarroo nala by means of the road bridge recently constructed.

The Potoli terminus is at the top of the Potoli ghat at the site of the present dastan depôt. Allowance has been made for extending the line so as to pass through the Dandeli depôt.

7. General description and details.—The total length including this extension is 9 miles and one furlong. The total length of tract, including siding., however, is approximately 10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> miles.

As the traffic is all in one direction advantage has been taken of this in the grading. The maximum gradient against the load is 1 in 60, while the maximum reverse grade on the return journey (for the empties) is 1 in 30. The line has been designed as a gravity one as far as is possible and practicable. The alignment has furthermore been arranged so as to necessitate the minimum of earth work. This, of course, is a most important point, since the cost of earth work is a dead loss having no realisable value when the railway is closed or removed. The railway will have four sidings, one at each terminus and two intermediate, one for loading fuel and another as a crossing point at the top of the Virampalghat. Three run-rounds for the locomotive are allowed one at each terminus and one at Perdhane fuel depôt. The rail gauge is 2'.

non of rail selected is 28lbs. per yard which is more than ample, wise extravagance. Sleepers will be chiefly of rejected teak and and will be used at the rate of 2,000 per mile.

Sallast will consist of 1'ft. depth of murrum. The formation cross tion is the minimum to permit of reliable drainage, which latter means meap maintenance. The locomotive selected is well up to its work and the estimated individual loads average three-fourths of the capacities of the rolling stock. With slow running speed, light loads and ample rail section, the wear and tear on the rolling stock and tract will be reduced to a minimum.

8. The estimate which is attached is in six parts, viz.--

- Part 1.—Estimate for section from chainage 0—1500' to 7—1650' includes clearing the line earth work, ballasting, 28lbs. section tract, sleepers, laying, etc. Very generous rates have been allowed for the earth work. The quantities are from actual survey and the latest quotations for rails.
- Part 2.—Estimate for section 0—to 0—1500'. This is the portion from Dandeli depôt through the river portion. The details of the river portion have not been worked out, but the amount allowed is ample.
- Part 3.—Estimate for the extra cost for siding, run-rounds for locomotives, etc :—These are from actual survey and recent quotations.
- Part 4.—Estimate for cross drainage works :—These are taken from the approved standard type drainage works for roads, modified to suit railway purposes and with current local rates.
- Part 5.-Estimate for water supply, buildings, tools, etc.
- Part 6.—Estimate for extension of the line through the Dandeli depôt :—
  - Actual survey for this has not been completely carried out yet, but a rough alignment has been made and the figures allowed are ample.
  - Attached also is an abstract of the above six estimates-
    - Contingencies at 5 per cent. have been allowed giving a grand total for construction of the railway of Rs. 1,90,000. The total length of the railway including the 1500' fuelsiding at Dandeli is 9 miles and 1 furlong. This gives an average cost of Rs. 20,800 per mile of main line inclusive of sidings, buildings, extensions and other miscellaneous items.

9. The possibilities of this scheme have already been investigated and a preliminary estimate and project drawn up, *vide* my No. 44 dated 8th January 1922. This, however, has been revised in the light of actual survey, and recent quotations. The revised report is given in detail in the following pages.

This represents an investment bringing in interest at the rate of 17 per cent. per annum on the capital outlay.

It is pointed out that liberal rates of interest and depreciation have been allowed and all items including supervision and maintenance have been taken into account asuming the working to last 10 years. With improved methods of extraction, however, there is no reason why this railway should not become practically permanent.

In a scheme of this kind, there are two classes of expenditure one recoverable, e.g., rails, rolling stock, etc., and the other unrecoverable, e.g., earthwork, bridges, etc., and I wish to point out that the above net annual profit is arrived at after paying off annually one-tenth of the unrecoverable expenditure. The figures, therefore, are based on the assumption of 7 per cent. interest annually on the capital outlay and the paying off of all unrecoverable expenditure by the time of the supposed closing down of the scheme, viz., after 90 years' working: The figures throughout are fair, with a tendency always against the project.

11. In addition to the scheme as a whole, I give also an estimate (page 11) looking merely to the Pardhane fuel portion assuming that, that portion only might be carried out. It will be seen that the ton-mile rate is Re.0-10-9 as against Re. 0-9-3 for the entire railway including the logging portion Potoli.

12. Before proceeding to the details of this report, I have the honour to point out two things, viz., (1) that I have included in the projects the extension of the line through Dandeli depôt, an essential need which has been under contemplation for a long time and (2) that this railway enables us to tap an area of valueless forest (according to present conditions) which cannot be exploited without a railway or similar means of transport. These are both, in my opinion, very important points. The following pages give the details and calculations of the project.

13. Rolling Stock.

The material to be conveyed is as follows :--

19,000 tons of fuel from Pardhane.

4,000 tons of logs from Potoli.

The working season consists of 7 months of 25 days, *i.e.*, 175 days per year.

One locomotive can average three round trips per day.

One trip with logs and two trips with fuel will represent 36 miles per day which is a very reasonable allowance.

The type selected, viz., Fowler 60 I.H.P. six-wheel-coupled steam locomotive can negotiate :

a grade of 1 in 60 with a gross load of 68 tons; a grade of 1 in 50 with a gross load of 60 tons;

and a grade of 1 in 40 with a gross load of 50 tons.

The line has been designed with a maximum reverse grade of 1 in 60. It is therefore absolutely safe to figure on a gross train load of 50 tons. The wagon selected for this work is of the double-bogie box type with removable sides and ends and a capacity of 5 to 6 tons. The internal dimensions of the body are approximately  $17' \times 5\frac{1}{2}' \times 2'$ . By loading up to a depth of 4', 4 tons of loosely stacked fuel can be accommodated. The tare weight of one of these wagons is  $2\frac{1}{2}$  tons. Loaded, therefore, one wagon will weigh  $6\frac{1}{2}$  tons, and 8 such loaded wagons can be hauled by the locomotive selected, *i.e.*, net load of fuel per train is 32 tons. The average designed speed of the locomotive is  $8\frac{1}{2}$  miles per hour. To allow for slow and careful running on grades and curves, we may safely assume an average speed of  $6\frac{1}{2}$  miles per hour. To obviate loss of time, while loading and unloading operations are being carried out, 24 wagons will be required.

I therefore estimate for 25 for fuel traffic allowing one extra as spare which will be necessary.

Logs-

Total annual tonnage (weight) 4,000.

Average per day  $\frac{4,000}{175}$ , *i.e.*, 23 tons.

The wagons selected for fuel transport can be used as a platform type for logs, if the sides and ends are removed, as they are supplied with strong stanchions. An average sized log such as comes to the dastan depôt at Potoli will be 18' long  $1\frac{1}{2}$ ' diameter and  $\frac{3}{4}$  to 1 ton in weight. One of these wagons therefore could comfortably accommodate 5 or 6 logs, *i.e.*, 4 to  $4\frac{1}{2}$  tons weight. For longer logs, wagons with plain platforms 22' long will be used. For the longest logs, pairs of lumber bogie trucks with swivelling bolsters will be used. All rolling stock will be braked and the bogies are of standard type and can therefore be readily repaired and renewed. As it will take some time for the work to reach its maximum output, I recommend that we should purchase at the beginning :—

- 25 double bogie box wagons.
  - 6 double bogie platform wagons 22' long.
  - 3 pairs of lumber trucks for long logs.

I give below the comparative prices of surplus war and special material with ordinary rolling stock. All these figures are from the latest quotations in which I am up-to-date.

In calculating the haulage cost, 7 per cent. interest has been allowed on the total capital outlay. Sleepers, buildings, etc., have been allowed a rate of depreciation of 10 per cent., *i. e.*, at the close of the scheme. They have no marketable value. Other items such as rolling stock and rails have been accounted for by annual depreciation at very generous rates. To show the true financial aspect of the scheme, the unrecoverable expenditures on earth work, etc., must be wiped off in 10 years. This will be at the rate of Rs. 7,000 per year. The sum spent on such unrecoverable works, *viz.*, Rs. 70,000 has earned interest at 7 per cent. each year, *i.e.*, Rs. 4,900. This leaves a sum of Rs. 2,100 to be wiped off each year.

Total estimated annual profit is-Rs. 48,600.

Deducting Rs. 2,100 (the annual share of the unrecoverable expenditure) we have a true annual profit of Rs. 46,500. This net true profit of Rs. 46,500 is equivalent to interest on the capital outlay (Rs. 2,90,000) of 17 per cent. approximately.

In presenting the above estimates and the accompanying estimates, I beg to point out that every detail has been very carefully considered and figures are based on information obtained from every available source.

## APPENDIX 29.

#### REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

#### Bombay Castle, 16th April 1923.

No. 7198 —In exercise of the powers conferred by section 31 of the Indian Forest Act, 1878 (VII of 1878), and in supersession of Government Notification in the Revenue Department, No. 8205-B, dated the 22nd November 1902, as subsequently amended, the Government of Bombay is pleased to make the following rules, to have effect in and for the Protected Forests of the district of Kanara on and after 1st June 1923 :—

I. Occupants of spice gardens and tenants holding under such occupants may exercise in the Protected Forest assigned as betta to the gardens or group of gardens of which they are the occupants or tenants, the following privileges :---

(1) They may graze their own cattle.

(2) They may cut grass for their own use.

(3) For the purposes of building cattle-sheds or temporary huts, sinking wells, digging water channels, clearing paths, erecting threshing floors or sugarcane mills, storing grass, straw, grain, betel nuts, manure, or growing young plants in a nursery, they may, subject to the restrictions hereinafter mentioned, clear or break up the land assigned as betta.

(4) They may burn undergrowth and lantana, due care being taken to prevent the fire spreading to reserved forests.

(5) They may remove for their own use, but not for manufacture, sale or barter, clay, earth and stones.

(6) Subject to the restrictions hereinafter mentioned, they may remove for their own use, but not for manufacture, sale or barter, any kind of forest produce in the said betta. These restrictions are:

They shall not (a) lop or in any way injure any trees or sapling of the following species :---

#### Teak. Sandalwood.

### Blackwood. Ebony.

(b) except with the previous permission of the Mamlatdar, fell any living trees of the species mentioned in the Schedule hereto appended.

N.B.—Any occupant of a garden who requires, for his own use, for a bona fide agricultural purpose, or for the construction and repair of his house situated in or adjacent to the garden to which the betta is assigned, any tree of the kinds mentioned in the Schedule, must apply in writing to the Mamlatdar, who shall, if satisfied that the demand is reasonable, grant permission to cut and remove the trees required on payment of Re. 1 per tree.

II. Whenever the Collector is of opinion that the privileges conferred by these rules have been or are being abused, to such an extent as to

justify the suspension of such privileges, he may, subject to the general control of the Commissioner, suspend the exercise of all or any of the said privileges by any or all of the occupants or tenants of any garden or group of gardens or by their servants; or may permit their exercise on payment of such fees as may be reasonable.

### **RESOLUTION OF GOVERNMENT.**

The attention of the Governor in Council has been drawn to numerous articles in the public press and to pamphlets, which appear to be designed deliberately to accentuate the unfortunate differences which have arisen between Hindus and Mussalmans. The political sanity and moderation of the people of this Presidency have so far restricted the untoward consequences of such differences to comparatively unimportant incidents, but the Governor in Council cannot neglect the possibility that a campaign of wild accusations, of vulgar and even obscene abuse and of incitements to meet force with force may lead to outbreaks of bloodshed and murder such as have occurred in other parts of India. A perusal of these articles and pamphlets leads to only one conclusion, that the writers are deliberately and with full consciousness of what they are doing endeavouring to stir up religious hatred between the two great communities of India. Both sides are equally to blame, and for months past the baser journals-both Hindu and Mahommedanhave been vieing one with another in inflammatory attacks on the morals and religious beliefs of their opponents.

2. The Governor in Council is of opinion that the time has come for a public pronouncement in this matter and desires to give warning that, while he does not wish to interfere in any way with reasoned discussion, he will be compelled, if the campaign above described does not forthwith cease, to use all the powers entrusted to him by law to guard the feelings and religious susceptibilities of all sections of the public of the Presidency. He appeals confidently to the wise and respectable of both communities to take their share publicly in repudiating and eliminating from controversy bitter expressions and vulgar abuse which may result in actions which will bring disgrace on the whole Presidency.

ORDER.—Ordered that the above Resolution be published in a Press Note by the Director of Information, and also be published in the *Bombay Government Gazette* in English, Gujarati, Marathi, Kanarese and Urdu. The vernacular translations should be furnished to the Manager, Government Central Press, by the Oriental Translator to Government.

2. Ordered further that the Commissioner in Sind should take steps to have the Resolution published in Sind both in English and Sindhi.

#### Resolution No. 2837.

## Bombay Castle, 5th December 1923.

### RESOLUTION.

The Secretary of State ordered in his despatch No. 187-Public, dated 25th December 1919, that the question of special allowances for officers in stations where the cost of living is abnormally high should be taken into consideration by the Government of India in consultation with local Governments and that all reasonable grievances in respect of the heavy cost of living at such places should be removed as completely as possible and without delay.

The matter has been under the detailed consideration of the Govern- $\mathbf{2}$ . ment of Bombay during the last four years. In the meantime the power of passing orders relating to compensatory allowances has been delegated to the Government of Bombay by the Fundamental Rules, and it has been decided to grant compensatory allowances to officers stationed in the following expensive places, viz., Bombay and Salsette, and Poona and Karachi. The scheme now approved by Government is intended to meet the case of all officers who do not already receive, in some form or other, compensation for the high cost of living in these centres; but in view of the difficulties involved in calculating the compensation already enjoyed by officers recruited on rates of pay fixed heretofore with reference to local conditions then existing at those places, the scheme is being applied in the first instance and pending further examination of the salaries of those particular posts, to officers on the mofussil time scale of pay.

3. In exercise of the powers conferred by rules 44 and 93 of the Fundamental Rules, the Governor in Council is pleased therefore to authorise the grant of compensatory allowances according to the appended rules to officers under his administrative control paid from provincial revenues on scales of pay fixed without special reference to the high cost of living in Bombay, Salsette, Karachi or Poona, who are posted for service in these places. The scheme will come into force with effect from 1st March 1923. In the meantime a list of the officers entitled under these rules is under preparation and will be issued with as little delay as possible, and a supplementary grant in respect of the current year and provision

for the next year in respect of officers whose pay is votable will in due course be submitted to the Legislative Council.

RULES REGULATING GRANT OF COMPENSATORY ALLOWANCES.

Rule 1.—All officers on the time scales of pay not fixed with special reference to Bombay, Salsette, Poona or Karachi, other than (a) officers who are not whole time servants of the Government, (b) officers whose pay has been revised in accordance with Government Circular No. 438 of 25th June 1920 and (c) ministerial and menial Government servants are, subject to the following rules, entitled to draw a compensatory local allowance on the following scale.

Scale for Bombay and South Salsette.

- 1. For officers on pay not 40 per cent. exceeding Rs. 250 per mensem.
- 2. For officers on pay exceeding Rs. 250, but not exceeding Rs. 500 per mensem.
- 40 per cent. on the first Rs. 250, and 30 per cent. on the excess over Rs. 250.

- 3. For officers on pay exceeding Rs. 500, but not exceeding Rs. 1,000 per mensem.
- 4. For officers on pay exceeding Rs. 1,000 per mensem, but not exceeding Rs. 1,500.
- 5. For officers on pay exceeding Rs. 1,500 per mensem.

- 40 per cent. on the first Rs. 250, and 30 per cent. on the second Rs. 250, and 20 per cent. on the remainder.
- 40 per cent. on the first Rs. 250, and 30 per cent. on the second Rs. 250, 20 per cent. on the next Rs. 500, and 10 per cent. on the remainder.
- Rs. 350 per month.

Scale for Karachi, Poona and North Salsette.

- 1. For officers on pay not exceeding Rs. 250 per mensem.
- 2. For officers on pay exceeding Rs. 250, but not exceeding Rs. 500 per mensem.
- 3. For officers on pay exceeding Rs. 500, but not exceeding Rs. 1,000 per mensem.
- For officers on pay-exceeding Rs. 1,000 per mensem, but not exceeding Rs. 1,500 per mensem.
- 5. For officers on pay exceeding Rs. 1,500 per mensem.

- 20 per cent.
- 20 per cent. on the first Rs. 250, and 15 per cent. on the excess over Rs. 250.
- 20 per cent. on the first Rs. 250, 15 per cent. on the second Rs. 250, and 10 per cent. on the remainder.
- 20 per cent. on the first Rs. 250, 15 per cent. on the second Rs. 250, 10 per cent. on the next Rs. 500, and 5 per cent. on the remainder.
- Rs. 200 per mensem.

Note.—In the case of provincial services this order is conditional on the provision of funds by the Legislative Council.

Rule 2.--The allowance will be based on pay as defined by F. R. 9 (21).

Rule 3.—Officers who are required to tour regularly will draw the allowance only for the period from 1st May to 31st October.

Rule 4.—Any existing local allowances other than local allowances of the Deputy Commissioners of Police, Bombay, or conveyance allowance or travelling allowances will be merged in the compensatory allowances now sanctioned. Officers who receive free housing accommodation otherwise than as remuneration for extra duties performed by them will deduct 10 per cent. of their pay from the amount of compensatory allowances due under these rules.

Rule 5.—Officers of the Indian Medical Service who are permitted private practice or who receive an allowance in lieu of private practice will draw the allowance at half rates.

Rule 6.—The allowance will not be admissible during leave of any kind.

Rule 7.—The above orders are provisional and are liable to be withdrawn or modified in the event of a marked change in the cost of living in the localities to which the orders relate, or in the conditions of service or pay of particular posts, whenever Government consider such modification or withdrawal to be justified. Government also reserve the right to admit or refuse the allowance to any individual officer or class of officers in any case in accordance with the general spirit of these rules.

### **RESOLUTION OF GOVERNMENT.**

The Governor in Council is pleased to issue the following orders in amplification of Government Resolution, Finance Department, No. 2837, dated 5th December 1923.

Permanent Government servants holding substantively, or officiating in, posts in the following services and drawing only the scale pay or grade pay of these services with or without the addition of special pay, subject to the orders contained in paragraph 8 below regarding the re-scrutiny of such special pay, are entitled to this allowance :---

Bombay Police Service,

Indian Medical Service,
Bombay Medical Service,
Military Assistant Surgeons,
Non-Indian Medical Service Superintendents of Prisons,
Jailors,
Indian Service of Engineers, o
Bombay Service of Engineers,
Inspectors, Bombay Presidency Police,
Superintendents of Excise.

The following officers, in order to put all services on an equality, will be considered to be entitled to this allowance :--

Conservators of Forests,

Superintending Engineers,

Deputy Inspectors General of Police.

### Proviso :

The following officers of the above services are excluded pending further orders :--

(1) Officers holding posts above the time-scale :--Members of Council, High Court Judges, Judicial Commissioner. Additional Judicial Commissioners, Commissioners of Divisions, Commissioner in Sind; Commissioner of Excise, Secretaries to Government, Chief Engineers, Chief Conservator, Inspector General of Police, Inspector General of Prisons, Director of Public Health, Director of Public Instruction, Director of Agriculture, Surgeon General, Surgeon Superintendent, St. George's Hospital.

(2) Also officers holding posts of which the pay is specially fixed, e.g. :--

Director, Labour Office, Commissioner of Police, Bombay City Police, Director of Industries,

(3) and those officers who have been given advance increment. or enhanced starting pay in their time-scales on account of the cost of living in Bombay, Salsette, Poona or Karachi.

2. Under rule 3 of the Rules attached to the abovementioned Government Resolution officers who tour regularly will draw the allowance for six months only. All officers who tour should draw the allowance for six months only and Heads of Departments should report for orders of Government the circumstances of any touring officer who in their opinion should be permitted to draw the allowance for a longer period than six months.

3. In the case of officers whose present conveyance allowances exceed Rs. 200 per mensem the excess will be considered as local allowance and merged in this allowance.

4. House allowances granted in lieu of housing accommodation received as remuneration for extra duties and house allowances drawn under Government Resolution, Finance Department, No. 84, dated 22nd September 1923, will not merge in this allowance. All other house-rent allowances will be deemed local allowances under Rule 4 of Government Resolution No. 2837, dated 5th December 1923.

5. When Compensatory Allowances are already attached to posts admitted to the compensatory allowance now granted, officers who held the posts on or before 5th December 1923 will receive whichever allowance or sum of allowances is greater, and will draw the allowance now granted as soon as it exceeds the existing compensatory allowances. Officers appointed after 5th December 1923 to posts admitted to this allowance will receive this allowance only.

6. Compensatory allowances which merge in this allowance will be considered to cease from the date of the introduction of this allowance.

7. In modification of Rule 5 under Government Resolution, Finance Department, No. 2837, dated 5th December 1923, all medical officers admitted to this allowance, who are permitted private practice or who receive an allowance in lieu of private practice, will draw this allowance at half rates.

8. Government consider it necessary to re-examine the duty allowances attached to certain posts. The necessity for some of these allowances appears in part to have been based on the hardship caused by the heavy local cost of living to officers appointed to the posts and not solely on the arduousness or importance of the duties attached to the posts. These allowances have been defined by the Fundamental Rules as special pay, and the decision regarding them cannot therefore be made immediately. Except in those cases in which the duty allowance was clearly given for a specific addition to the work or responsibility of a post, the compensatory allowance drawn by an officer in receipt of special pay containing a duty allowance will be diminished by an amount equal to half the amount of such duty allowance, pending the decision on the re-examination now directed.

9. Officers entitled under the orders given in paragraph 1 may draw the allowance according to the scales in Government Resolution, Finance Department, No. 2837, dated 5th December 1923. Attention is however invited to Finance Department Circular No. 2920, dated 29th January 1924, and it is notified that amounts drawn irregularly will have to be refunded to Government and any case where it is doubtful to what if any allowance an officer is entitled under this Resolution should be immediately referred to Government.

#### Circular issued in the Bombay Division.

The control of the District Local Board Schools is to be transferred from the Educational Department to the District Local Board. Teachers are hereby informed that any one admitted to a training institution as a Vernacular Final, 1st year, or 2nd year teacher respectively in the 1st year, 2nd year or 3rd year class, will not get, after the completion of his training, a scale of pay higher than what he as a Vernacular Final, 1st year, or 2nd year teacher gets. Subject to this condition the teacher will get, for the higher certificate that may be earned by him next year, such a rate of pay only as may be fixed, with the approval of Government, for the class of teachers by the Local Body which employs him.

#### Circular issued in the Central Division.

#### WARNING TO STUDENTS SEEKING ENTRANCE INTO GOVERNMENT' TRAINING INSTITUTIONS.

The Compulsory Primary Education Bill and the Local Boards Bill are at present before the Legislative Council. If they are passed, the control of Primary Education will, as a result, be completely transferred from the Educational Department to District Local Boards and Municipalities. This new arrangement is likely to come into force from April 1923.

2. Government will guarantee that the rights in the matter of pay, promotion and pension of all V. F. and trained teachers who are in permanent Local Board or Municipal service on the date on which the said Acts take effect are safeguarded by the new Acts and that the scales of pay, rates of promotion and conditions of pension in force on that date are continued unaffected, subject to such modifications as may hereafter be ordered by Government from time to time.

3. In the case of those that are under training in the 1st, 2nd and 3rd year classes on the date of effect of the said Acts, as V. F., 1st year or 2nd year teachers respectively, holding permanent appointments, paragraph 2 above will be applicable in the matter of pay according to the nature of the certificate held on the said date, promotion and conditions of pension. But for the higher certificate earned by them after the said date, their rights in the matter of pay, promotion, etc., will be considered in accordance with the new rules that will be made by the local bodies under the new Acts with the sanction of Government.

4. Candidates under training in the 1st, 2nd and 3rd year classes on the date of effect of the said Acts, who hold no lien on a permanent post in the Educational Department will be subject to such rules regarding pay, promotion and pension, as may be framed under the new Acts—to have effect from the said date—with the sanction of Government by the Local authorities under which they will serve on completion of their course of studies.

5. Candidates and teachers holding no lien on a permanent post in the Educational Department, that are under training in any class on the date of effect of the said Acts can neither be guaranteed employment nor, if employed, the application to them of the existing rules regarding pay, promotion and pension.

6. The consent of candidates and teachers to the terms mentioned above will be obtained in writing. Those that are unwilling to give such a consent will not be admitted for training. The form of agreement will be modified in accordance with the above terms.

7. The number of admissions of candidates or teachers desiring to be trained on the above terms or of teachers permitted to appear for the examination for the purpose of earning a higher certificate from outside or from inside will be restricted as circumstances may render necessary. Hereafter, on no ground can anybody *claim* either entrance into a training institution or further training.

8. The above warning is given both to candidates and teachers whether stipendiary or non-stipendiary.

#### Circular issued in the Northern Division.

Under instructions from the Director of Public Instruction conveyed in his letter No. Tr.-10441 of 15th November 1922, all the teachers are informed that the control of the L. B. Schools is likely to be transferred from this Department to the District Local Boards as soon as the Compulsory Elementary Education and L. B. Bills passed and put into effect, i.e., probably from 1st April next. The rights in the matter of pay, promotion and pension of all teachers who are in permanent L. B. or Municipal service on the date on which the new arrangement takes effect will be safeguarded by the new Act or by rules made by Government thereunder, and they will be guaranteed the continuance of the sanctioned scales of pay and pension conditions in force on that date subject to such modifications as may hereafter be ordered by Government. The Local Bodies will be empowered to employ new teachers and to fix their own rates of pay for the various classes of such new teachers subject to certain maxima and minima to be prescribed by Government. Those students that are under training at the time that the new conditions take effect and who hold no lien on a permanent post in Government D.L.B., or Municipal primary school can neither be guaranteed employment, nor if employed, the rates of pay inforce at the time of the transfer of the schools, for the benefit of the present pension rules.

2. A teacher under training next year who holds permanent appointment in a Government or D.L.B. or a Municipal school will be

guaranteed continuance of service and the scale of pay to which he will be eligible on the date of the transfer of the schools according to the certificate held by him on that date; *i.e.*, one admitted to a training institution as a V. F., 1st year, or 2nd year teacher respectively in the 1st year, 2nd year or 3rd year class will not get, after the completion of his training, a scale of pay less than what he would be eligible for on the date of the transfer of the schools as a V. F., 1st year, or 2nd year teacher. Subject to this condition the teacher will get, for the higher certificate that may be earned by him next year, such a rate of pay only as may be fixed, with the approval of Government for the class of teachers concerned by the Local Body which employs him.

All the teachers are therefore informed that if they want to be trained or to continue their training on this express understanding they should submit their written *kabulayat* in the matter before 8th December 1922.

#### Circular issued in the Southern Division.

#### INSTRUCTIONS FOR STUDENTS SELECTED FOR TRAINING SCHOOLS IN 1923.

It is likely that the control of Primary schools will be transferred to Local Boards by 1st April 1923. Therefore the students that will be selected for training this year, *i.e.*, in December 1922, will be guaranted continuance of service and the scale of pay to which they will be eligible on the date of the transfer of the schools according to the certificate held by them on that date, *i.e.*, one admitted to a training institution as a V. F. 1st or 2nd year teacher respectively in the 1st, 2nd or 3rd year class will not get after the completion of their training a scale of pay less than what they would be eligible for on that date of transfer of the school as a V. F. 1st or 2nd year teacher.

2. Subject to this condition, the teachers will get for the higher certificate that may be earned by them next year, such a rate of pay only as may be fixed with the approval of Government for the class of teachers concerned by the local body which employs them.

#### Circular issued in the Sind Division.

All the local board and municipal teachers in the Taluka should be informed that the control of the Local Board schools is likely to be transferred from this Department to the District Local Boards as soon as the compulsory Elementary Education and Local Board Bills are passed and put into effect, *i.e.*, probably from 1st April next. The rights in the matter of pay, promotion and pension of all teachers who are in permanent Local Board or Municipal service on the date on which the new arrangement takes effect will be safeguarded by the new act or by rules made by Government thereunder, and they will be guaranteed the continuance of the sanctioned scales of pay and the pension conditions in force on that date subject to such modifications as may hereafter be ordered by Govern-

ment. The Local Bodies will be empowered to employ new teachers and to fix their own rates of pay for various classes of such new teachers subject to certain maxima and minima to be prescribed by Government. Those students that are under training at the time that the new conditions take effect and who hold no lien on a permanent post in a Government, District Local Board, or Municipal Primary school can neither be guaranteed, nor if employed, the rates of pay in force at the time of the transfer of the schools nor the benefit of the present pension rules. It is necessary to explain the position clearly to these students before they commence next year's training.

2. A teacher under training next year who holds a permanent appointment in a Government or a District Local Board or a Municipal school will be guaranteed continuance of service and the scale of pay to which he will be eligible on the date of transfer of the schools according to the certificate held by him on that date, *i.e.*, one admitted to a training institution as a Vernacular Final, 1st year or 2nd year teacher respectively in the 1st year, 2nd year or 3rd year class will not get after the completion of his training a scale of pay less than what he would be eligible for on the date of transfer of the schools as a Vernacular Final, 1st year or 2nd year teacher. Subject to the condition the teacher will get, for the higher certificate that may be earned by him next year, such a rate of pay only as may be fixed with the approval of Government for the class of teachers concerned by the Local Body which employs him.

#### APPENDIX 39.

Statement showing the progress made by the various local authorities in the Presidency towards the introduction of free and compulsory elementary education during the year 1923-24.

#### CENTRAL DIVISION.

#### Sholapur.

The Sholapur Municipality has prepared a scheme which is being submitted through the Educational Inspector.

#### Satara.

Satara City Municipality has already introduced free and compulsory primary education, so far as boys are concerned, under the Primary Education Act of 1918.

#### Ahmednagar.

The question of making primary education free and compulsory is under the consideration of the Ahmednagar Municipality.

The District Local Board, Ahmednagar, have prepared a scheme and increased the Local Fund cess to two annas with a view to secure money for free and compulsory primary education. Government have asked the Board to resubmit their scheme in accordance with the rules published by Government under the Primary Education Act, 1923, after the transfer of primary schools to local authorities has been effected.

#### East Khandesh.

The Jalgaon Municipality has resolved to make primary education free and compulsory as soon as Government hands over the control of the schools to it.

The District Local Board, East Khandesh, has made a rough schedule for 10 years and a detailed scheme for 3 years and has increased the Local Fund cess by 6 pies for financing the scheme.

#### West Khandesh.

The Dhulia Municipality has introduced a scheme of free and compulsory primary education both for boys and girls from 1st March 1923.

The District Local Board, West Khandesh, has prepared a scheme, and a Sub-Committee was appointed to suggest sources of income to meet the cost. The Committee has suggested certain taxes. A special meeting of the Board was convened, but consideration has been postponed until the new Boards are elected under the New Act.

#### Nasik and Poona.

No progress was made in these districts.

#### BOMBAY SUBURBAN DIVISION.

The Bandra Municipality has already introduced free and compulsory education under the Bombay Primary Education Act of 1918.

The District Local Board, Bombay Suburban District, have been anxiously considering the subject and have appointed a special Committee to make the preliminary enquiries referred to in paragraph 3 of Government Circular, Educational Department, no. 2272, dated the 2nd November 1923. Beyond this no steps have yet been taken by the District Local Board, Bombay Suburban District, towards the introduction of free and compulsory education in the District during 1923-24.

#### SOUTHERN DIVISION.

No progress has been made by Local Bodies in this Division towards the introduction of free and compulsory Primary Education except that an extra one anna cess was collected by the District Local Board, Belgaum, for the purpose last year.

#### SIND.

Free Education.—All the District Local Boards and Municipalities excepting the minor-municipalities of Keti Bunder, Tatta, Manjhand, Tando Md. Khan, Hala, Mirpurkhas, Ghotki and Bubak, have made primary education free in their jurisdictions.

Increase in Local Cess.—All the District Local Boards have raised the local cess from one anna to five pice to meet the expenditure in gradually making primary education free and compulsory as funds permit.

Other preliminary steps.—The Karachi Municipality has adopted a policy of rapid expansion and schools are opened as soon as suitable buildings are available.

The Shikarpur Municipality had completed all the arrangements for free and compulsory education before the Government Resolution postponing the date of transfer of control to Local Authorities was received.

The Sukkur and Rohri Municipalities have appointed a Sub-Committee to report on the question of free and compulsory education.

Sir,

I am sorry there should be any misapprehension as to my statement tendered in evidence on the 21st of November last to the Chairman of the Committee of Enquiry on the Reforms at Delhi as a Member of the Bombay Government.

The statement was my own statement prepared from my own information after a personal examination of the official records and was not submitted beforehand for opinion or perusal of any of the Ministers or other Executive Members. Indeed it would not have been practicable to have done so as the majority were at the time absent on tour out of Bombay.

• Sir Chimanlal has courteously acknowledged in his statement published in your issue of to-day several of the inaccuracies in his evidence which it was my duty to point out. He has also dealt with several matters of interpretation and opinion. It is not my purpose further to pursue those questions as they have been included in the Enquiries of the Committee on the Reforms. It is my present purpose merely to explain that the statement published now upon receipt of the final proof of my evidence was my own statement tendered over a month ago in evidence to the Chairman of the Committee of Enquiry on the Reforms at Delhi as a Member of the Bombay Government. It was signed by me personally and not formally by a Secretary to Government and was not, and was not intended to be taken as, a formal pronouncement by the Bombay Government.

#### APPENDIX 64.

#### Letter from Mr. P. Lory, Director of Public Instruction, no. 96-D. dated the 11th April 1924.

I have the honour to invite a reference to paragraph 2 of the Press Note, Educational Department, no. 206, dated the 19th February 1923, on the above subject, and to state that the Educational Inspectors were asked to report the names of schools managed by each Local Authority to which admission was refused to children of the depressed classes. They report as under :--

Educational Inspector, B.D.—No refusals or complaints regarding admissions of the children in question to any kind of schools in the Division have been reported except in the case of the following schools :---

Kolaba District	• •	Local Board School, Nizampur.
Nasik District	••	Local Board Schools at Nihal and Kalvan.
Thana District	• •	Local Board School, Nalla-Sopara (vide
		this office no. O-34-D, of 8th March 1924).

The Deputy Educational Inspectors concerned have been instructed to explain the Government orders in the matter to the people of the above villages.

Educational Inspector, C.D.—No difficulty is reported to have been experienced in admitting the depressed class children except in a few cases where the Local Board Schools are held in temples. Objections are raised by the villages to seating such boys in the class among other boys. In such cases the boys are seated outside the temple with the consent of their parents. The Deputy Educational Inspectors have been instructed to provide other accommodation for such schools as early as possible, but it is reported that it is not always easy to find another building.

Educational Inspector, N.D.—In the following schools in the Surat District only people have protested against the seating of the depressed class children along with the other children in school buildings :—

In dealing with the villagers the Deputy Educational Inspector and his assistants noticed that the very idea of their children touching the depressed class ones was shocking to them from a religious stand-point. In such cases it has been arranged to seat the depressed class children inside the school building but a little apart from the other children. In some cases the parents of the depressed class children preferred that their children should not sit alongside the other pupils. They were afraid that the higher caste parents would trouble them, and said they would only send their children to school if they were allowed to sit in

#### APPENDIX 64—contd.

the verandah or outside as before. Another difficulty experienced is that in the National Schools which are working side by side with the District Local Board schools the depressed class children are not allowed to sit along with the other children. In such villages the Deputy Educational Inspector has been instructed to exercise due tact. The Educational Inspector is of opinion that it will take time to overcome the longstanding prejudices of the higher castes.

Educational Inspector, S.D.—In the following schools admission was refused to children of the depressed classes on account of the schools being held in temples :—

Dharwar District	••	Ugginkari, Shivalli.
Bijapur District	••	Khed.
Belgaum District	••	Shunpali, Badkihal.

Satisfactory arrangements have, however, since been made for the admission of depressed class children to these schools by providing sheds in some cases.

Educational Inspector in Sind.—In no school was admission refused to the childrenof the depressed classes except one Local Board school at Panwhar in the Sukkur District. The Hindu people of the village objected to sending their boys to the schools if the boys of the depressed classes were admitted to it. The Deputy Educational Inspector has instructed the headmaster to admit the depressed class boys to the school and to seat them at some distance from other boys in the class to avoid the difficulty.

In reply to your letter No. 1480-B., dated 12th December 1924, I am directed to furnish the following information regarding the School of Indian Medicine, Madras.

#### APPENDIX 67—contd.

2. The school consists of three sections corresponding to the three systems of Indian Medicine in vogue in this Presidency, namely, the Ayurveda, the Unani and the Siddha. The course of instruction extends over three years. The training given in the respective Indian systems will be supplemented by an elementary course in Anatomy and Physiology according to the Western system. Details of the course of study are given in the annexure.

3. The accommodation provided in the school includes a library, a museum and a herbarium in addition to the usual class rooms, office, etc. The intention is to open a dispensary in October 1925 and an inpatient hospital of 30 beds in April 1926.

4. The number of admissions to the school has been fixed at 120 a year, 60 for the Ayurveda section and 30 each for the other two sections. Candidates are expected to possess a knowledge of Sanskrit or Telugu, Hindustani or Tamil (for the three sections respectively) and in addition a working knowledge of English. Twenty free studentships are awarded annually, preference being given to members of backward communities. The other students have to pay fees at the same rates as in the existing Allopathic Medical Schools, namely, Rs. 60 a year in the case of students belonging to this Presidency and Rs. 100 a year in the case of others. Admissions are made by a Selection Committee appointed by the Government, consisting of the Principal of the School and two representatives of each of the three Indian systems.

5. The staff consists of a Principal (Pay Rs. 600-50-900), a lecturer in Anatomy and Physiology (medical graduate of the Madras University), two lecturers in Ayurveda, one in Unani and one in Siddha. An assistant lecturer will be appointed for each section from October 1925. With a view to economy, it has been decided that the lecturers and assistant lecturers need not be whole time Government servants but only part time officers receiving fixed honoraria of Rs. 100 and Rs. 50 per mensem respectively. A small clerical and menial staff is also provided; compounding and ward attendants will be appointed when the dispensary and the hospital are opened.

6. The school was formally opened by His Excellency the Governor on 24th November 1924. As the appointment of lecturers and the selection of candidates for admission took some time, actual working could be commenced only this month.

It is essential that the collection of land revenue should be made punctually this year. The Mamlatdars and Mahalkaris are therefore directed to issue necessary instructions to the village officers in this connection. The public should also be warned that one-fourth fine is leviable on all amounts of land revenue due, but not paid by February 15th in the case of first instalment and April 15th in the case of the second. #### APPENDIX 75.

#### Memorandum giving the information asked for in the question put by Mr. Hoosenally M. Rahimtoola on the subject of changes in the rules for Government Vernacular Training colleges, etc.

(1) (a) i The number of admissions has been regularised to meet the actual requirements of each district.

ii Rules have been made to provide for an adequate number of Intermediate and Backward class men being appointed.

(b) i To bring about greater uniformity in the proportion of trained teachers in each district.

ii To give non-Brahman classes a reasonable share of the vacancies.

(2) (a) The only change is that candidates are not allowed to appear for the Training College Examination without previous residence at a training institution.

(b) A teacher who has not actually attended a training institution ought not to be considered as a trained teacher.

(3) (a) No fees are charged for studying at Training Colleges or for the Training College Examinations.

The fees for the Vernacular Final Examination have been raised from Rs. 2 to Rs. 3, but all depressed class candidates now included under 'Backward' have been exempted from payment.

(b) The object was to enable more adequate remuneration to be paid to examiners. As expenditure under the head was not sanctioned by the Legislative Council, it is proposed to use the savings for prizes.

#### DISCUSSION OF MATTERS OF GENERAL PUBLIC INTEREST.

#### Resolutions by Mr. S. A. Sardesai, M.L.C.

1. "In view of the recurring famines in Bijapur district, this Council recommends to Government that two irrigation schemes should be taken up immediately with a view to irrigate a large area in the Bijapur district."

7 "This Council recommends to Government that primary school tea ers be given their salaries according to the Sathe-Paranjpye Scheme wit I effect from the 1st March 1923."

#### Resolutions by Mr. M. R. Gunjal, M.L.C.

1. "This Council recommends to Government that the photocopying system introduced recently in the Registration Department of this Presidency as an experimental measure be abolished forthwith and the old system be restored."

2. "This Council recommends to Government that they be pleased to give substantial help to the Shrimati Nathibai Damodar Thakersey Indian Women's University as a mark of appreciation of their efforts in conducting for the last eight years the very useful and important experiment of imparting secondary and higher education to women through the medium of the vernacular and that this help be given without imposing any such restrictions as may interfere with the internal administration of the said University or affect its independence."

#### Resolution by Mr. C. M. Saptarshi, M.L.C.

1. "This Council recommends to Government that a committee of officials and non-officials with a non-official majority be appointed to report on the question of the recognition and encouragement of the indigenous systems of medicine in vogue in this Presidency with a view to enabling Government to declare their policy regarding State-help and State-encouragement to be given to such systems."

#### Resolution by Moulvi Rafuddin Ahmad, M.L.C.

1. "This Council recommends to Government that they be pleased to establish a chair for Arabic at the Elphinstone College, Bombay, and lecturers for Urdu in Government Arts Colleges at Poona and Bombay."

#### Resolutions by Mr. H. H. Narielvala, M.L.C.

1. "This Council recommends to Government that in order to allay the discontent prevailing among the agriculturists of the presidency and to give them real relief, the following fees and fines, wherever they have been recently increased, be reduced to their original level :--

Grazing fee per head of cattle,

Fees per cart and head-load of grass,

Fees per cart and head-load of Anjan leaves,

Fees per cart-load of thorns,

Fees per cart and head-load of fuel,

Fees per cart-load of stones of various kinds, and

Fines per head of cattle impounded."

2. "This Council recommends to Government to suspend the introduction of the revised rates of assessment in the Sindkheda taluka in West Khandesh till legislative or other action is taken by Government on the resolution passed by this Council on the 15th March 1924 regarding the revision of the land revenue assessment."

3. "This Council recommends to the Governor in Council that the present system of appointing honorary magistrates be abolished."

4. "This Council recommends to the Governor in Council that he may be pleased to vest all the non-irrigational tanks in district local board areas in the district local boards concerned or that Government may be pleased to order that the proceeds of the sales of trees standing in the beds of the tanks may be credited to the local funds of the district local boards concerned."

5. "This Council recommends to Government that in view of repeated scarcity in many parts of Northern Gujarat an investigation be undertaken on scientific lines with the help of experts and such number of nonofficial members of the Council as Government may deem necessary, to consider the possibilities of irrigational projects by deep boring, construction of dams and barrage works on rivers like the Narbada and any other methods that may be suitable."

6. "This Council recommends to the Governor in Council that Government be pleased to empower the Municipality of Bombay to determine the number and location of liquor-shops within their jurisdiction."

7. "This Council recommends to the Governor in Council that Government be pleased to communicate and commend to all local bodies in the presidency the resolution of the Bombay Corporation for establishing one Unani and one Ayurvedic dispensary in each of the wards of the city and to intimate that any effort made by any local body for the encouragement of the indigenous systems of medicine will have the whole-hearted sympathy and support of Government."

8. "This Council recommends to the Governor in Council to make charkha spinning a compulsory subject in the girls' schools of this presidency."

9. "This Council recommends to the Governor in Council to appoint a committee with non-official majority to report on the necessary changes to be introduced in the curriculum and the next books of the primary and secondary schools so as to bring them into greater accord with the requirements of the times and to ensure a healthy growth of national sentiment."

10. "This Council recommends to the Governor in Council that all political prisoners convicted in this presidency for offences not involving violence to person or property be forthwith released."

11. "This Counci \_\_ecommends to Government that the photocopying system introduced recently in the Registration Department of this presidency as an experimental measure be abolished forthwith, and the old system restored."
