## APPENDIX No. 5.

## QUALIFICATIONS FOR ADMISSION TO THE COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING, POONA.

18. (1) Candidates desiring admission to the First Year Class in Engineering should send their applications on the prescribed printed form, together with the necessary certificate of Physical fitness, to the Principal, College of Engineering, Poona, on or before 15th May in each year. *Applications received after that date will not be considered.*

(2) The prescribed printed form of application and form of medical certificate can be obtained from the Principal, College of Engineering, Poona, on application from 1st February to 14th May every year.

(3) Only candidates eligible for admission to the College should apply.

(4) The application for admission submitted by each candidate must be countersigned as regards the correctness of marks and age of the candidate therein stated by the Principal of the Arts College attended by him.

(5) As the number of applications for admission from students of the Bombay Presidency is largely in excess of the actual places available, no applications from students resident outside the Presidency can, at present, be considered.

(6) In making admissions to the College preference will be given to students who have passed in any examination qualifying for admission with first class marks in Mathematics and Physics and who have good qualifications in English.

(7) A certain number of the best qualified candidates will be called to Poona for a personal interview about the 10th of June, when the final selection will be made, and those admitted will be required to join the College immediately. No guarantee is given to students called for an interview that they will be selected.

(8) Candidates not called for an interview before the 10th June have no chance of admission. No intimation to this effect can be sent to them.

(9) Selection for admission is generally made from among students who are below 20 at the time of admission though this rule is not rigidly adhered to.

(10) All candidates should be of good physique, preference being given to those who have regularly taken part in School and College sports and games. Preference is also given to those who have passed an examination in Drawing, and have some practical knowledge of carpentry.

(11) Selection is at the discretion of the Principal, from among the qualified candidates.

19. All students will be expected to supply themselves with text books, slide rule, and a box of drawing instruments of approved pattern.

Copy of the Press Note No. P. 194 dated 19th October 1925 issued by the Director of Information.

*Coal for Sukkur Barrage.*

The Secretary to the Government of Bombay, Public Works Department, has replied to the representation of the Indian Merchants Chamber regarding coal for the Sukkur Barrage project, in which the Chamber pointed out that they were not convinced that Karachi was the most suitable place for storing coal for use in connection with the Barrage and suggested that future tenders should be called for delivery at Sukkur in order to enable Indian collieries to secure the business. Government in their reply point out that Karachi is the most suitable point for the storage of coal and that Government cannot alter their previous decision in this respect.

Judging from the number of tenders received in response to the last advertisement for the supply of coal for the Lloyd Barrage and Canals Construction, it is quite feasible for firms to hold stocks at Karachi. Moreover, in connection with the requirements for the year 1925-26 which were advertised for *f.o.r.* Karachi ex-stock, a tender for Indian coal has been accepted. In conclusion the letter states that it is the definite intention of Government to give every facility to Indian coal and they do not consider that having a depôt at Karachi is in any way inconsistent with that policy.

## RESOLUTION OF GOVERNMENT (TRANSFERRED DEPARTMENTS).

Government have had under consideration for some time past the question of allowing District Local Boards to include in the Datum Line for the purposes of the Bombay Primary Education Act, 1923, the cost of the supervising, inspecting, clerical and menial staffs to be entertained by their School Boards and are now pleased to issue the following orders :—

(a) The District Local Boards should in the first instance be invited to take over as School Board Administrative Officers for a minimum period of 3 years such Deputy Educational Inspectors or senior Assistant Deputy Educational Inspectors as cannot continue to be provided with posts in the Department on the understanding that, if they do so, Government will give them a grant equal to the whole cost incurred by the School Boards on this account, the pay of the Government employees taken over being what they would have received as Deputy Educational Inspectors or such pay as Government may decide.

(b) If any District Local Board does not accept the offer in (a) above, the expenditure on account of the post of School Board Administrative Officer created by the Board should be treated as new expenditure for a period of three years and a Government grant should be paid equal to *two-thirds* of such expenditure only. At the end of three years an addition will be made to the grant under the datum line in accordance with paragraph (c).

(c) On the retirement of the officer taken over as School Board Administrative Officer or on the expiry of the period of 3 years, if the District Local Boards do not desire to retain the services of the Departmental Officers, they will be at liberty to fill the post of School Board Administrative Officer in accordance with section 9 (1) of the Primary Education Act, and Government will give a permanent grant, to be included in the grant under the datum line, on account of the post of School Board Administrative Officer equal to the minimum pay plus *one-third* of the difference between the maximum and minimum pay.

(d) The District Local Boards should also be invited to take over such Assistant Deputy Educational Inspectors, clerks and menials employed in the Educational Department as cannot continue to be provided with posts in the Department on the understanding that, if they do so Government will give them a grant equal to the whole cost incurred by the School Boards on this account, the pay of the Government employees taken over being what they would have received had they remained in Government service.

(e) If any District Local Board does not accept the offer in (d) above, the expenditure on account of the posts created by the Board which would have been filled up by Government employees should be treated as new expenditure and a Government grant should be paid equal to two-thirds of such expenditure only.

(f) On the retirement of the Departmental Officers taken over, the District Local Boards will be at liberty to fill the vacant posts themselves and Government will give a *permanent* grant on account of each post equal to the minimum pay plus *one-third* of the difference between the maximum and minimum pay.

(g) Government will give a permanent grant to be included in the grant under the datum line, equal to the minimum pay of each post plus *one-third* of the difference between the maximum and minimum pay on account of all posts of supervisors, clerks, and menials which are created by the District Local Boards with the sanction of Government when the Primary Education Act comes into operation, and for which Government do not desire that Departmental Officers should be appointed.

(h) The cost of all additional posts necessitated by the expansion of primary education on a voluntary basis or the introduction of compulsion should be treated as new expenditure and a Government grant of two-thirds should be paid.

Under the terms of the contracts purchasers of annual coupes are required to leave branch wood up to 6" in girth (3" in girth in Gokak and Gujrat Ranges) for free removal by head loads by forest villagers for domestic purposes only.

*Bijapur.*—Free use of Branch-wood up to 3" in girth left in coupes under felling by coupe contractors under the terms of their agreements is allowed to forest villagers for domestic purposes only.

*Dharwar.*—Paragraph B (f) of the Code of Forest Privileges printed in slip No. 69 at page 577 of the Bombay Forest Manual, Volume II.

*Ratnagiri.*—There are no such rules in this district, as there are very few Government forests or waste lands having trees. Villagers get fuel from their own private lands.

There are no villages or lands in Sind in which the rights of Government to trees have been reserved under section 40 of the Land Revenue Code, subject to the privileges of private individuals to cut firewood or timber for domestic or other purposes; nor are there any lands which have been set apart under section 38 for forest reserves subject to such privileges. Consequently it has not been necessary to make any rules or to pass any departmental orders under section 44 for regulating the supply of firewood.

There are large areas of occupied lands in Sind which, for various reasons, but generally on account of soil conditions, remain fallow. There is spontaneous growth of small trees or brush-wood in such lands and the villagers generally cut fuel from them for domestic purposes. Moreover there are large areas of revenue jungles or Government waste lands throughout the Province in which concessions have been made as under :—

1. Free grant of timber by the Collectors up to the value of Rs. 50 in each case in the following cases :—
  - (a) for the relief of poor people whose houses have been destroyed either by fire or flood ;
  - (b) in special cases for the construction of dwellings where members of wild tribes or new settlers are too poor to purchase wood ; and
  - (c) for agricultural purposes in cases in which it is satisfactorily shown that such grants are absolutely necessary.
2. Free grant of reasonable quantity of fuel to agriculturists for burning bricks for wells used for agricultural purposes.

There are no Thakurs or any similar class in Sind who collect firewood in Government forests. In the Sind Forest Circle retail sale of firewood by villagers is not carried on.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit the following report of the Hindu-Moslem riot which occurred on the night of the 2nd August. The two big days of the Mohurrum passed off without serious trouble. On the night of the 2nd August there was to be a small Mohammadan procession called the Sandal procession. This consists usually of 50 or 60 people but owing to the excitement prevailing this year it appears to have been followed by numbers which are variously estimated at from 200 to 500. There is no fixed route for the procession and this year it took the route leading past Malkarjun's Temple. A police force of one Head Constable and six men had been detailed to accompany the procession which in normal years arouses little interest. The Head Constable protested against this route but one of the leading Hindu merchants of the City overruled him and said that there was no danger of a clash between Hindus and Musalmans. He being an influential man in the City his word was accepted and the procession proceeded past the Malkarjun Temple. Here a large number of Lingayats were assembled for a kirtan and as the procession went past shouts were raised both by the Mahomedans and the Lingayats. From shouting they proceeded to stone-throwing and from stone-throwing to beating. The Police Sub-Inspector was on the spot within 10 minutes but even by the time he arrived the riot had almost fizzled out and he finally stopped it. The Inspector, Deputy Superintendent of Police and District Superintendent of Police were all on the spot within half an hour.

## APPENDIX No. 48.

*Police Report.*

Has the honour to report that at 8-15 a.m. on the 17th January last a grain merchant named Khimji Pasoo of Wadala called at the Kingsway Police Station and reported to Sub-Inspector Shaik Hussain that his brother-in-law named Pancharia Hadu, aged 19 years, left home about 10 p.m. the night previous, saying that he was going to answer a call of nature, and had not been seen again. These facts were entered up in the Station Diary and information circulated in the Police Notices. Three days later, i.e., on the 20th ultimo, one Bhanji Dewsey came to the Police Station at 12-15 p.m. and reported to Sub-Inspector Inamdar that the young man who was reported to have been missing by Khimji Pasoo had returned home. He did not volunteer any further information and when questioned by the Sub-Inspector as to whether he had returned safely and had any complaint to make Bhanji replied in the negative and added that he had returned wearing the silver Kargota he had on. An entry to this effect was made in the diary.

It appears that after Khimji Pasoo had made his report to Sub-Inspector Shaik Hussain on the 17th ultimo he went to Bandra and informed some grain merchants there that Pancharia was missing and asked them to keep a look out for him. One Lalji Chapsey took him to Inspector Ring and requested him to have information circulated. Inspector Ring took down a few particulars and told Khimji that if he could procure a photo of the missing man he would have it published in the *Police Gazette*.

After Pancharia's return to Bombay, Khimji Pasoo and the Bandra merchant Lalji Chapsey went to Inspector Ring and asked him to take no further action on their report as the missing man had returned. As they desired not to give the matter publicity, Ring questioned them as to what the young man had been up to and where he had been, when Khimji related to Pancharia's strange story which was as follows :—

On the 16th ultimo about 10 p.m. he was answering a call of nature on an open space of ground about 100 paces away from the shop when two Punjabies drove up in a Motor Car and ordered him to accompany them, threatening that if he refused and tried to raise an alarm they would kill him. Through fear he got into the car and was taken to Grant Road Railway Station. The train was on the platform and they got in without purchasing tickets. The compartment was a small one and there were no passengers with them. They alighted at Baroda and after roaming about Baroda sight seeing they took train for Ahmedabad, arriving there early in the morning. The Punjabies fed him and gave him a new suit of clothes and remained with him all day in a room on the 3rd floor of a building in Ahmedabad. In the evening they locked him up in the room and left saying that on their return they would take him to the Punjab.

This unnerved him and some time after midnight he opened a window and jumped down on to some cotton bales. He roamed about Ahmedabad in search of one Ramji Luxman, a mill hand employed in Ahmedabad, who was once a customer of his shop. He met Ramji outside the Jubilee Mill and related to him his story and asked for a loan of money to take him back to Bombay. Ramji paid his fare back and accompanied him to Bombay.

On hearing this incredible story, Inspector Ring decided to see the boy as he suspected that if his strange experience was true, the motive of the Punjabies was probably to have committed an unnatural offence on him. He accompanied Khimji to Wadala and as he was still dubious about the truthfulness of the young man's story, he took them to the Kingsway Police Station. Here Pancharia was again closely questioned and made contradictory statements. It was ascertained that he was not quite right in his head and that prior to coming to Bombay had suffered from some mental malady. Though he assisted his brother-in-law in his business, he was a simpleton and was always very quiet and morose.

No action could be taken on his story as he and his relatives, not wishing to proceed further in the matter, made statements which would have made action abortive. Pancharia was taken to the open space from which it was alleged he was kidnapped and he pointed out different spots as the places from which he was removed. Next he went back on his original statement that he had been abducted by main force and stated that he had been compelled to enter the car by threats; then again he said that he had voluntarily gone with the Punjabies, why he could not explain. In the face of these contradictory statements no action for forcible abduction could be undertaken. Inspector Home suggested that he would record his statement about being confined in a room at Ahmedabad and would send it on to the Police there for investigation. Pancharia and his relatives would not agree to this as they did not desire to give the matter publicity. The relatives said that no one could believe Pancharia's story and he on his part said that he would not be able to identify the Ahmedabad house nor was he in a position to say whether the Punjabies were Mohamedans or Hindoos. The brief facts were entered up in the Non-Cognizable Register and the parties were allowed to go.

Pancharia's statement appears on the face of it not only improbable but most incredible as he does not seem to have raised an outcry at Grant Road Station where there is always a crowd and Police on duty. The train waiting for them, non-purchase of tickets, and a compartment reserved for themselves makes his story sound like a fairy tale. The next question, how were the Punjabies to know that Pancharia would be found at 10 p.m. at the spot from where he was alleged to have been kidnapped unless there was a previous appointment? Khimji Pasoo states that he was not in the habit of frequenting this open space at nights for the purpose of answering a call of nature. It is curious also that

although he was able to muster courage to jump down from the 3rd floor he did not raise an alarm along the line from Grant Road to Baroda and then at Ahmedabad.

Even assuming that his strange story is true and that he was afraid to raise an alarm whilst in the company of his captors he escaped from the building in Ahmedabad shortly after midnight, roamed about the City till 12 noon and yet makes no complaint to any one except Ramji Laxman for whom he waited outside the Jubilee Mill till the recess hour.

Pancharia was sent away to Cutch Mandvi a couple of days after his strange story was published in the *Prajamitra* of the 24th ultimo and he is not likely to return for at least a couple of months.

*Statement of Khimji Pasoo.*

I am a grain merchant and have my shop at Wadala. Pancharia Hadu aged about 19 or 20 years is my brother-in-law and has been living with me for the last five or six months, and used to assist me in my business. He was not mad but a simpleton for his age, and prior to coming to Bombay did become light-headed for a while. He did not show signs of it here but was always very quiet and morose.

On the 16th January last I went to Kandawadi to attend a meeting of the Grain Merchants Association. Pancharia and a boy named Khanji Khimji, aged 14 years, were left in charge of the shop. I returned during the small hours of the morning and Khanji informed me that about 10 p.m. Pancharia told him that he was going to answer a call of nature and as he did not like being left alone in the shop, he suggested that he (Pancharia) should close up for the night. This was done and Pancharia went out and had not returned. As Pancharia had not returned by the morning of the 17th ultimo I went to the Kingsway Police Station about 8 a.m. and reported the matter. I also reported the facts to my relatives and friends and asked them to keep a look out for him. Lalji Chapsey, a grain dealer who does business at Bandra, took me to Inspector Ring and we requested him to have information circulated. The Inspector told me that if I could procure a photo of the missing man he would have it published.

On the morning of the 20th ultimo when I was going out in search of him I met him in company with one Ramji Luxman, an old customer of mine, who has taken up employment in the Jubilee Mill, Ahmedabad.

Pancharia was dressed in a new suit of clothes and when I questioned him as to where he had gone to, he told me that on the night in question he had gone to an open space about 100 paces from my shop to answer a call of nature when two Punjabies, he could not say whether they were

Mahomedans or Hindus, caught hold of him and forcibly put him into a blue motor car and drove him to the Grant Road Railway Station. The train at that time was standing on the platform. His captors did not purchase tickets and took him into a compartment in which there were no other passengers. They alighted at Baroda the next day and went round the city. That evening they caught another train and arrived at Ahmedabad early next morning. He was taken to a room on the 3rd floor of a building and the Punjabies remained with him all day. In the evening they locked him inside the room and went away saying that on their return they would take him to the Punjab. This alarmed him, and shortly after midnight he succeeded in opening a window which looked on to some cotton bales and jumped out. He roamed about Ahmedabad in search of the Jubilee mill as he wanted Ramji Luxman to give him some money to bring him back. About 12 noon he located the mill and waited outside till Ramji came out. He related his story to Ramji, and he accompanied him back. The Punjabies gave him food to eat and a new suit of clothes to wear. It was a very strange story to believe and I questioned him as to why he did not raise an alarm at Grant Road and the other railway stations and he replied that he was afraid to do so as they had threatened to kill him.

I sent Bhanji to the Kingsway Police Station to inform them that he had returned home, and I went and informed Lalji Chapsey of Bandra.

We both went to Inspector Ring and requested him to take no further action on our report as the man had returned. I told Mr. Ring the man's story and told him that I did not desire publicity. Inspector Ring accompanied me to Wadala and heard the story himself from Pancharia, and then took us to the Kingsway Police Station. The Police and I carefully questioned Pancharia as to whether the Punjabies suggested committing an unnatural offence on him. He replied in the negative. He seemed very unstrung and could not give reasonable replies to questions put to him. I do not know whether this was due to fright or to any mental trouble. He went with the Police to point out the spot from where it was alleged he was taken away and I was told that he made contradictory statements.

The Inspector suggested taking down his statement and said that he would send it to Ahmedabad Police with a view to enquiring into the charge of wrongful confinement. Pancharia was not willing to do so and we did not agree to the suggestion as we knew that no one would ever believe the story, and it was not possible for Pancharia to identify the building from which he had escaped. We suggested that no further action be taken as we did not desire publicity.

There is a lavatory closer to our shop than the open space, but we prefer going to the latter as the lavatory is situated in a lonely spot and smells. Pancharia was not in the habit of regularly going out at nights to answer a call of nature. He may have gone there once or twice during the night since he has been with me.

I have Punjabies and Pathans coming to my shop to make purchases but Pancharia states that he has never seen these men before.

I have no reasons to suspect that there is anything wrong with my accounts.

I found that he seemed very nervous and frightened after his return so I sent him away to his native place about the 25th or 26th of last month.

Letter from the Director of Public Instruction, no. S.—67 (c)-C., dated the 11th April 1924 :—

“ I have the honour to submit two letters which have been received in connection with the amendment of Rule 4-A of the Grant-in-aid Code, sanctioned in Government Resolution, Educational Department, no. 2409 of 8th June 1923, one from the Secretary, Educational Board of the Bombay Christian Council, and the other from the Chairman of the Western India Mission Council of the United Free Church of Scotland.

“ 2. Both Missions hold that the amended rule does not correspond with the Resolution passed by the Legislative Council. It would appear that there is a difference of opinion as to the interpretation of the words :— ‘ the attendance . . . . would be perfectly voluntary ’. By the amended rule a boy will not attend religious instruction unless his parent agrees to his doing so.

“ What the Missions apparently want is that in their schools a boy should attend religious instruction unless his parent objects in writing.

“ 3. I suggest that the simplest course is for the Manager of the school to ask the parent or the guardian of each pupil who has been admitted to the school the question :—

“ Are you willing that your son should attend ‘ the religious instruction given in the school ? ’ and to abide by the result. The question must be asked after the boy has been admitted, and not before, to prevent discrimination in favour of boys whose parents do not object to religious instruction.”

Letter from the Secretary, Educational Board of the Bombay Christian Council, to the Director of Public Instruction, dated the 1st April 1924.

I have the honour to inform you that the Educational Board of the Bombay Christian Council having had its attention called to the form of the Conscience Clause, which has recently been inserted in the Grant-in-aid

Code, observes that its wording is materially different from the wording of the Resolution adopted by the Bombay Legislative Council (see B. L. C. Debates, Vol. VII, p. 624) on October 6th, 1922, and that the rule is seriously opposed to the considered views of the Educational Board, whereas the wording of the Resolution is more compatible with their views, and with the general policy of Missionary Schools and Colleges.

I am instructed by the Board respectfully to request that Government may see their way to reconsider the rule in the Grant-in-aid Code and to have it redrafted, so as to correspond with the Resolution adopted in the Council.

Letter from the Chairman of the Western India Mission Council,  
United Free Church of Scotland, to the Director of Public  
Instruction, dated the 2nd April 1924.

With reference to the regulation as to religious instruction which has been added recently to the Grant-in-aid Code and particularly with reference to the application of this rule to the John Elphinstone High School, Alibag, I have the honour to state that the Council of this Mission considers that the regulation in the terms in which it has been formulated does not adequately interpret the recommendation passed by the Legislative Council (Debates VII, page 624), and that this Council request Government to consider whether the rule can be redrafted so as to be more in accordance with that recommendation.

The regulation in the Grant-in-aid Code omits all reference to the sanction of parents or guardians, and might be taken as prohibiting the holding of a special class for religious instruction in such Aided Schools, whereas we take it that the intention of the Legislative Council was not to prohibit the holding of such a class, which would be attended by the children whose parents were willing that they should attend it, but to secure that if a parent in a single school area objected to his child being given religious instruction that was not in accordance with his own beliefs and informed the school authorities to that effect then the child should not be required to attend the class for religious instruction.

This Mission welcomed the passing of the recommendation by the Legislative Council, as it is in accordance with the policy which seemed to us to be fair to all parties, and which we therefore adopted some time ago. In March 1921 the following statement was drawn up by an Educational Board on which this Mission, as well as most of the Missions at work in this Presidency, is represented, and it was published in the leading English and Vernacular newspapers.

If a mission school is the only school in an area where either the total number of pupils is too small to warrant the existence of two schools, or the total number of conscientious objectors to Christian teaching too small to make up a school by themselves, the authorities of the Mission school should exempt from the Scripture period the children of such parents as express in writing their wish to have their children so exempted.

Adhering to this policy we are prepared to exempt pupils from attendance at the Scripture class in the John Elphinstone High School, Alibag, if their guardians write to the Superintendent stating that on religious grounds they object to their wards attending it. Such exemption would normally take effect from the beginning of a term. It would not be desirable that these pupils should remain idle during the Scripture period, and the Superintendent might arrange that they should be engaged in some other work.

I have the honour to request you to inform me whether we have your sanction to follow the course I have described.

**RESOLUTION.**—The accompanying notification should be published in the *Bombay Government Gazette*.

2. The Manager, Government Central Press, should be requested to supply the Director of Public Instruction with 1,000 copies of the notification.

Sir,

I have the honour, at the request of the Western India Mission Council of the United Free Church of Scotland, to address you on the subject of a Notification issued by you on 21st May 1924 giving intimation of an Explanation to be inserted in the Grant-in-aid Code with reference to Notification no. 2409, dated 8th June 1923. As you are aware, the effect of this explanation is, in brief, that no pupil in a school situated in what is known as a "Single School Area" may be required to attend a class for religious instruction unless his guardian shall have asked in writing for his enrolment in such a class.

2. The School managed by this Mission which is most seriously affected by this "Conscience Clause" is the John Elphinstone High School, Alibag. Before the passing of the Resolution in the Legislative Council by which Government was instructed to frame a Conscience Clause, the Mission had accepted the policy of giving exemption from religious classes to any pupils whose parents might demand it, and no difficulty was anticipated in maintaining these classes, which form the distinctive feature of the School, in full usefulness under these conditions. But Government in its Explanation has given an interpretation to the Conscience Clause which, while on the surface it does not seem to differ much from that which the Mission was prepared to accept, really has had the effect of making the continuance of classes for religious instruction impossible. This has been so not chiefly because of active opposition, of which there has been a certain amount, but chiefly because most parents are not sufficiently interested to make any request of this sort

in writing. The attendance at the Scripture classes has been greatly reduced, and our Mission Board in Scotland has given instructions that the school should be closed in 1926 unless conditions be improved.

3. I may add that the adherence of Government to the Explanation will inevitably mean that no Mission School will be opened in future in a Single School Area.

4. I am instructed to suggest to you that the Explanation be withdrawn and that the onus of seeking exemption from religious classes be laid on the guardians of the pupils. This is the form which the Conscience Clause takes in the United Provinces, where, however it is applied to all Schools and Colleges. The missionaries in that Province are quite satisfied with it, and the adoption of a similar policy for Single School Areas in this Presidency would remove all our difficulties.

## RESOLUTION OF GOVERNMENT.

As indicated in their Resolution No. 3334 of September 13th, 1923, Government have had under consideration the question whether municipalities should be asked to increase their contributions towards civil hospitals, which were fixed as early as 1889, in proportion to the increase in the expenditure on these hospitals from provincial revenues, and on a careful consideration of the financial condition of the municipal bodies concerned and their expenditure on medical relief as shown in Statement 'A' \* attached to this Resolution, Government have arrived at the conclusions set forth below.

2. The statement referred to above indicates that some municipalities contribute nothing towards the maintenance of hospitals which have been established in their areas primarily to meet the needs of the local residents. Other municipalities contribute very small sums to this purpose. A large number make no adequate provision for medical relief in any form. Government consider that as a general standard the proportion of 4 per cent. of their total expenditure should be regarded as a reasonable provision to be made by municipalities for medical relief, and desire to point out that such medical relief is an obligatory duty of every Municipality.

3. The annual expenditure on civil hospitals has increased very largely of recent years, the total expenditure rising from Rs. 4½ lakhs to Rs. 10½ lakhs within the last ten years. In the interests of the general tax-payer it is desirable that local bodies should bear their proper share of medical relief granted to their tax-payers. It is however still more important that local bodies should be encouraged in establishing and maintaining independent municipal medical institutions and Government are prepared not only to give reasonable assistance towards the equipment and upkeep of such institutions but also to hand over the maintenance of some of their existing civil hospitals to local bodies if the latter would agree to bear the cost of their maintenance with the assistance of a grant-in-aid from Government.

4. It will be recognised from what has been stated above that the main object which Government have in view is to urge upon municipal bodies the advisability of increasing their expenditure on medical relief to 4 per cent. of their total expenditure in cases where it falls short at present of this limit, these bodies being at liberty to decide whether the additional money which they should thus provide on medical relief should be spent as increased contributions to Government hospitals or expended on their own medical institutions.

5. The Commissioner in Sind and the Commissioners of Divisions should be requested to bring to the notice of the municipalities concerned the principles enunciated above.

(1) That the petition enclosed herewith was submitted to the Jail Quarterly Committee held on 7th January 1924 at the District Prison, Ratnagiri, requesting that the grievances contained therein be redressed by them and where they themselves could not redress, to move higher authorities concerned to redress them.

(2) The District Magistrate who was the President of the Committee said that they do not want to go beyond the Jail Manual and to redress the grievances contained therein requires the modification of some of the rules of the Jail Manual. He further told the prisoner that he might forward the application to Government if he wants.

(3) Now the petitioner begs to forward the whole application to Your Excellency and requests that the grievances contained therein should be redressed and the requests be granted.

Sir,

I, the undersigned prisoner No. 21, Madhao Bhimrao Kabboor, beg to bring to your notice the following grievances and to request you to redress them where you yourself can and where you cannot, to move the higher authorities concerned and to recommend for the redressing of the same, and thus get them redressed.

(1) Religious prayer services and observances should be allowed without any let or hindrance to prisoners of all persuasions taking care that it will not interfere either with Jail discipline or with Jail work. Recently the Hindus of this prison had requested that *Hari Katha* service should be allowed to them on "Kartiki Ekadashi". But the Inspector General of Prisons disallowed the request on the grounds that it should not be allowed, as it is undesirable to congregate prisoners at the time of religious prayers. I submit that such service should be allowed because—

(a) the Christians are allowed the services of their Divines ;

(b) if every prisoner is to call his own religious priest or preacher, it would be an expensive and troublesome affair to the Jail Official themselves ;

(c) congregation at the time of what is called "Moral Instructions" is allowed ;

(d) if it is the fear of there being any rowdism or disturbance, then the badmashis and the roughs may be restrained and not allowed to join such congregation. It would be serious injustice to deny to the innocent and well-behaving their religious consolation for the sake of a few roughs and badmashis ;

(e) all religions are equally true to the ignorant, equally useful to the Magistrate and equally false to the philosopher.

Generally the Jail is concerned with the ignorant and the Magistrate only.

However the days of such service may be settled by rule. In case of Hindus they should at least include (1) Gokul Ashtami, (2) Ramnavmi, (3) Shivratri in the month of Magh, (4) Ashadhi Ekadashi, (5) Kartiki Ekadashi.

2. That all the gazetted holidays in general and religious holidays in special should be allowed to prisoners, now only four such holidays are allowed by the Jail Manual except Sunday ; because—

(a) the four holidays allowed are all Christian ;

(b) the majority of the Jail population is non-Christian, and they, too, should have their religious holidays for offering their prayers, etc. ;

(c) even a little of religious practice is likely to work a good deal of improvement in the moral tone of the prisoner ;

(d) the prisoners are a species of hard-worked animals and they need now and then a little extra rest in addition to their Sunday rest ;

(e) it would give them extra time for reading for which obviously the Jail Library is meant. On week days they hardly get any time for reading. At night they do not get any light which they ought to get as recommended by the Jail Commission of 1920 ;

(f) this reading would effect a great improvement if good books are put into his hands ;

(g) if religious holidays of only one persuasion or religion are allowed and that of others not allowed, it is likely to be understood as the patronage of one religion and an indirect petty persecution of others.

3. The Hindus should be allowed on their religious fast days such food as is allowed by their religion, in lieu of ordinary Jail rations. It being understood that the value of such substitute will not exceed the value of the ordinary daily rations. The Inspector General of Prisons' suggestion that the Hindus also may be given on the fast days two meals in the evening is against Hindu sentiment and custom and therefore should be modified, because—

(a) Hindu fasts are not like Muhammadan ones which end with sunset. They continue till next day dawn. Therefore they cannot take these meals. A fasting Hindu is not allowed to take the ordinary cooked food. He is allowed to take only a particular kind of food on such days ;

(b) The Hindu considers it an insult to offer him food on fast days ;

(c) To observe complete fast without anything is almost impossible, as he is to stand the rigor of Jail life, and work if necessary on that day ;

(d) To say that Hindus should observe their fast as Muhammadans do, is to say that Hindus should become Muhammadans ;

(e) To deny the right of Hindus to observe their religious fast is to persecute their religious beliefs.

Care may, however, be taken by the Superintendent not to allow the fast where the question of immediate danger to health is concerned, or where only a frivolous pretext is made. However the days of general fast may be fixed, and they should include Ekadashis, Gokul Ashtami, Mahashivratri.

4. Hindus should be allowed to wear *Gandha* on their forehead if they want to do, especially the high caste Hindus. As—

(a) it is not likely to interfere with Jail discipline in any way ;

(b) it does not cost anything ;

(c) they need not be allowed the possession of anything extra except a piece of "Rava", i.e., red-termeric, which would suffice days together ;

(d) it is the genuine belief of Hindus that they should wear this *Gandha* after bath and before meals. There is nothing in the Jail Manual against this. On the contrary there is a general provision

that the caste prejudices should not be interfered with. It is a genuine religious prejudice of the Hindus.

5. Prisoners should not be stripped off stark naked as they are done now, amidst the whole file of prisoners at the time of search, because—

- (a) it is revolting against all sense of decency ;
- (b) it greatly annoys and vexes the prisoner ;
- (c) it is likely to deaden the sense of shame which, when properly kept alive, is a great force for human improvement ;
- (d) the purpose of search may be best served by feeling the human body and loosening and shaking off the clothes. At least this course should be followed ordinarily, and naked search may be resorted to only when there is great suspicion. Then, too, search should be effected by taking the prisoner aside in a room, but in no case amidst the prisoners. This is the procedure followed in case of Convict Officers, and it should be made the general rule.

6. Prisoners should be allowed tobacco on tenor of good conduct and in case a prisoner is punished, his tobacco may be stopped subject to the maximum of 15 days, because—

- (a) unfortunately it has become an article of necessity especially among the lower classes which supply the bulk of prison population ;
- (b) it is more an article of necessity than tea is with European prisoners ;
- (c) the cost does not exceed more than 4 annas a month per head if each prisoner is allowed 2 drams ;
- (d) inspite of all restraints and searches the badmashes and hard-head criminals get it by their knowledge of Jail ways ; and always they tell that crow dropped it when they are cased up ;
- (e) by their tobacco they—and tempt young persons to administer to their beastly passions ;
- (f) more than 50 per cent. of Jail offences are connected directly or indirectly with this article ;
- (g) it teaches prisoners all the offences from petty assault and abuses to bribing of lower Jail officials and such shameless and brutal ones as unnatural offences ;
- (h) its prohibition is a potent cause for all mischiefs ;
- (i) its supply would improve the moral tone of the prisoners, reduce the number of Jail offences and the work of the Jail officials also. It is in short the banker's point in prison : integrity, honesty, and good conduct.

Sirs, I have put all the points before you and the facts contained therein are true to the best of my knowledge. Partly much of it is based on personal experience. Wherever the technicalities of laws come in the way of your redressing these grievances, I hope your Committee

R. 62841 of 9th November 1924, we have to inform you that your Company had recovered these bales and detained them till the litigation with the culprits had been decided. Abnormal shortage from coal has been often complained of by mills and I had asked several questions on the subject in the Bombay Council during the last year. Recently in my own mills I had suffered abnormal shortage from some wagons. If you can at this juncture take up this enquiry in your own hands and engage the Poona C. I. D. to trace the crime which is since years I am sure you will be able to trace the culprits and bring them to book. If you require a list of abnormal shortages from coal wagons, I shall be glad to obtain particulars from the mills and send them to you. *Statement.*

The main points referred to in these applications are as under:—

(1) The applicants are of opinion that people residing in the city and the Mill operatives living in the suburbs would not leave the areas in which they now reside in order to take up plots in the Scheme area.

(2) They are further of opinion that the valuation of the original plots has been assessed very low and the final value is too high. Thus they will be called upon to pay heavy incremental contribution.

(3) They maintain that the proposed scheme would merely be experimental.

(4) The lands affected in the scheme are mostly agricultural and even though the scheme comes into force these lands would remain agricultural for a number of years thereafter. In consequence though the annual income from these lands would remain practically the same until they are converted for non-agricultural uses, the burden of contribution will fall upon them immediately after the scheme comes into force.

(5) They suggest that the Municipality should provide cheap housing accommodation and transport facilities for the middle class at Municipal expense if congestion in the city were to be removed.

(6) The cost of the High Level Bridge should entirely be borne by Government.

RESOLUTION OF GOVERNMENT.

The question of allowances to non-gazetted ministerial and non-ministerial officers serving in Bombay, Poona, the Salsettes, Karachi and other places has been under the consideration of Government for some time. A careful and detailed investigation—statistical and otherwise—has been made, and Government have come to the conclusion that relief is necessary in some cases in Poona and Thana only.

2. The Governor in Council is accordingly pleased to sanction with effect from 1st March 1926 the grant of a house-rent allowance of Rs. 5 per mensem to non-gazetted non-ministerial and ministerial officers on pay up to Rs. 100 per mensem stationed in Poona. As regards Thana the Governor in Council is pleased to sanction with effect from 1st March 1926 the following increased rates of allowances in supersession of the existing rates admissible to officers on pay up to Rs. 100 per mensem :—

	Rate of local allowance.
	Per cent.
On pay up to Rs. 40 per mensem .. .. .	20
On pay from 41—60 .. .. .	15
On pay from 61—100 .. .. .	12

No change is made in the rate of the existing allowance admissible to officers on pay between Rs. 101 and Rs. 200.

3. The necessary budget provision for the scheme detailed above has been made in the next year's budget. The scheme will come into effect if the necessary provision is passed by the Legislative Council.

4. When compensatory allowances are already given to officers admitted to the present scheme those who are drawing the allowances when the present orders come into force will receive whichever allowance

or sum of allowances is greater and will draw the allowance now sanctioned if and when it exceeds the existing allowance or sum of allowances.

(1) The Council of the Deccan Sabha is strongly of opinion that the re-introduction of book-makers on the race-course would lead to more dishonesty and gambling and urges the Government, in the interests more especially of the poorer sections of the community, to insist that they shall in no case be re-allowed.

(2) To the same end, the Council also requests Government to arrange for the stoppage of the third enclosure, the running of third class race specials and the raising of the minimum stake from Rs. 3 to Rs. 10.

(3) The Council of the Sabha requests that the license to the Western India Turf Club for the new year be published for public criticism before finally granting it.

APPENDIX No. 86—*contd.**Resolution passed by the Poona Missionary Conference.*

The Poona Missionary Conference desires to associate itself with the protest of the Council of the Deccan Sabha against the re-introduction of book-makers on the race-course as likely to lead to increased dishonesty and gambling, and joins in urging the Government, in the interest more especially of the poorer sections of the community, to insist that in no circumstances shall this be permitted.

The Missionary Conference would point out that the Totalisator was introduced with the object of preventing the growth of gambling but that this object has not been kept in view with the result that this evil has greatly increased. The Conference accordingly joins with the Council of the Deccan Sabha in requesting Government, with a view to checking the further growth of the evil, to take measures for the discontinuance of the third enclosure, to prevent the running of third class race specials and to raise the minimum stake from Rs. 3 to Rs. 10.

The Conference further expresses its firm belief that horse racing in its modern European form is serving no good purpose in this country, but that, even if it were admitted to provide some innocent amusement for a few, these few ought to forego it in view of the wide-spread havoc that the gambling connected with it is producing, and particularly does this Conference urge the Government to cease extending any official patronage to horse racing, as is done by Governors attending races in state, etc.

*Resolution passed by the Fourth Bombay Provincial Liberal Conference, 1925.*

This Conference urges, especially in the interests of the poorer sections of the community, that (1) book-makers in connection with horse-racing in this Presidency shall in no case be re-allowed; (2) the running of III class race specials be discontinued; (3) the third enclosure on the race courses in Bombay and Poona should be closed; and (4) the minimum stake should be raised from Rs. 3 to Rs. 10.

The humble memorial of  
Assistant Master.

RESPECTFULLY SHEWETH,

1. That your memorialist is an assistant master in of the Division of the Bombay Presidency, having put in years' service under government.

2. That in view of the contemplated revision of the pay of Secondary teachers as mentioned in Government Resolution, Educational Department, No. 737, dated 8th July 1924, your humble memorialist respectfully ventures to submit the following in the hope that the points raised therein may receive sympathetic consideration at Your Excellency's hands.

3. That there have been two revisions recently ; one took effect on the 14th March 1920, and the second on 1st March 1921.

The first revision, effected irrespective of increased cost of living, did not alter the minimum or the maximum pay, which were Rs. 50 and Rs. 150 respectively. But it introduced the principle of progressive salary, fixing the annual increment at Rs. 5 up to Rs. 80 and Rs. 10 thereafter, granted to Sind the benefit of higher start by Rs. 10 and instituted two selection grades of Rs. 165 and Rs. 180.

The second revision raised the minimum to Rs. 70 and the maximum to Rs. 200, merged the two selection grades into one of Rs. 100—10—250 and introduced the special grade of Rs. 250—10—300. It retained the benefit given to Sind. Unfortunately the rate of increment above Rs. 80 was reduced from Rs. 10 to Rs. 5 up to Rs. 140.

This latter scale, in force at present, was sanctioned at an extremely unfortunate time when Government were confronted with serious financial stringency. They did not, therefore, find themselves in a position to contemplate a more liberal scheme which could have satisfied reasonable expectations of assistant masters, nor could they persuade themselves to sanction the time-scale proposed by the Director of Public Instruction in his letter No. B.—8227, dated 23rd August 1920, viz. :—

75—5—100—10—200—Selection grade of Rs. 200—10—300 at 15 per cent. of the cadre with allowances of 25-5-50 for certain special posts.

4. That the present time-scale is, in the humble opinion of your memorialist, vitiated by three defects :—

(i) Low Start.

(ii) Slow rate of increment.

(iii) Low maximum.

Considering the qualifications that are needed of a graduate assistant master, the delicate and responsible nature of his duties, the position he occupies socially as well as by caste, the standard of comfort which he is used to and the high cost of living due to high prices of all things that constitute 'living', the starting salary of Rs. 80 in Sind and Rs. 70 in the Presidency proper is much too low. It is lower than in any other department where a University degree is necessary for entrance, or any other profession where a technical qualification combined with high academic attainments is needed. The professions of Engineering and Medicine are more liberally treated in this respect by Government than the profession of Education and your memorialist believes that by universal recognition the skill that is needed in moulding and developing mental and moral powers of human beings is not any the less than in healing the sick or handling brick and mortar. In this connection it is pertinent to mention that even United Provinces where both the standard and cost of living are lower than in this Presidency, the scale of pay in force for the graduate master is much more attractive than the one that obtains in this Presidency. The duties of an assistant master having become more strenuous on account of the policy of retrenchment pursued of late by Government, whereby the number of working periods for an assistant master have been increased. Your humble memorialist, therefore, requests that at least Rs. 100 should be fixed as starting salary for the graduate assistant master in the Presidency proper, with two increments of Rs. 10 each for Sind in view of the admittedly excessive material requirements of a Sindhi over his brother in the Presidency proper.

5. That the low rate of increment is a much more objectionable feature of the present time scale, for it has wiped out even what little advantage in point of a better start it has conferred on masters. Under each of the two scales, an assistant master gets Rs. 120 after 8 years of service, but thereafter he gets more under the previous scale than under the present. The maximum limit of the previous scale does not stand as a bar to his further promotion, for he has been given the option of being placed on that scale until such time as that scale is advantageous to him. Hence the present scale is advantageous only to those teachers who get by it advance increments on account of their special qualifications. It is an improvement upon the previous one in so far only that it has raised the maximum limit from Rs. 150 to Rs. 200. This limit is reached after full 20 years' service.

This, I submit, is inordinately a long period. The average age of a graduate at the time of his permanent appointment in the department, as shown by the Director of Public Instruction in his letter No. B.—8227, dated 23rd August 1920, is 23, so that it will be at the age of 43 that he would draw Rs. 200. In consideration of the short duration of the life of an Indian especially a school master and the fact that he is generally a married man and has a family to support even before he enters service,

it is necessary that the rate of increment should be such as to enable a person to reach the maximum in much shorter time than at present. Even the Director of Public Instruction in the same letter had recommended an increment of Rs. 10 after Rs. 100 and said "Indian graduates are generally married men and have to maintain families. *They should not be obliged to wait too long before reaching a maximum that will afford the necessary modicum of comfort and respectability.*" In United Provinces too, the rate of increments is Rs. 10, although that province is much cheaper than this presidency. In the "Customs" in the case of Examiners and in Public Works Department in the case of upper subordinates the rate of increment is not less than Rs. 10. In fact, in no department requiring a University degree as a necessary qualification for admission is the rate of increment anything below Rs. 10. Your memorialist, therefore, prays that the annual increment of Rs. 10 be sanctioned in the case of graduate assistant masters too.

6. That the third defect that mars the present scale is its low maximum of Rs. 200. This is hardly an income on which it is possible for a middle aged family man, belonging to a respectable *portion of Indian society*, to live a decent but simple life free from pecuniary worry and anxiety. The School Master, of all persons, should be absolutely free from pecuniary embarrassment if at all he is expected to discharge his duties properly. A disaffected teacher is both a social danger and an infliction on his pupils. Your memorialist, therefore, most respectfully urges upon Your Excellency to raise the maximum from Rs. 200 to Rs. 300, as it is in United Provinces, so that in 20 years' time every graduate teacher may reach the maximum.

7. That the general scale of Rs. 100—10—300 will meet the requirements of ordinary cases. To secure, however, graduates of some special merit or experience for the department, your memorialist thinks, it is necessary to offer an inducement of some additional increments such as in force at present. The proposal to do away with this system of granting additional increments for special educational qualifications would, therefore, be a step of retrograde character, sure to effect adversely the best interests of education by scaring away from the department men of special merit and aptitude. Your Excellency's humble memorialist, therefore, prays that the advance increments so kindly granted by Government be retained under any new appellation if necessary or in any modified or amended form.

8. That in order to prevent stagnation on Rs. 300, the maximum of the proposed time-scale, your humble memorialist requests that there should be selection grade posts of Rs. 300—15—375 at 20 per cent. of the men's cadre. This is absolutely necessary in view of the fact that the higher posts to which senior assistant masters can rise after reaching the maximum of the time-scale are very few and will be considerably reduced in number by the transfer of control of primary education to local bodies and direct recruitment to U.E.S. and B.E.S.

There is, therefore, no doubt that quite a large majority of assistant masters, otherwise quite efficient, would fail to get promotion to either of these services. To enable such masters to retire on a salary commensurate with their long and meritorious service, it is both fair and desirable that selection grade posts be provided.

9. That though the scale proposed in this memorial along with the selection grade posts would go a long way to improve the pay of graduate assistant masters, it does not sufficiently compensate for the abolition of about 36 posts of Deputy Inspectors in the B.E.S., consequent upon the transfer of the control of primary education to local bodies. The chances of rise to B.E.S. would, henceforth, be reduced to nullity. This is, to say the least, is extremely disquieting as it is sure to lower the status of an assistant master, who at any rate lives at present in the hope of rising to B.E.S. at least towards the end of his service. The gloomy prospect of retiring in S.E.S. is sure to react upon the efficiency of the teacher by damping his enthusiasm for work and taking away an incentive to improvement. To partially remedy this, your humble memorialists prays that the 8 special posts in the S.E.S. be raised to the status of B.E.S.

10. That the scale of pay for under graduate assistant masters, sanctioned under the same circumstances of financial stringency of Government, is open to the same objections, viz., low start, slow rate of increment and low maximum as in the case of graduates. Your Excellency's memorialist, therefore, prays that their lot be improved by the adoption of a more liberal scheme, viz., Rs. 70—5—100—250.

11. In conclusion Your Excellency's humble memorialist prays—

(1) That Government be graciously pleased to raise the ordinary scale of pay for graduate assistant masters to the following revised scale—Rs. 100 - 10—150—efficiency bar—10—300, with two increments for Sind.

(2) That there be selection grade posts of Rs. 300—15—375 at 20 per cent. of the cadre of graduate teachers.

(3) That the advance increments for special academic qualifications be retained in any modified form.

(4) That 8 special posts in the S.E.S. be raised to B.E.S.

(5) That the scale for under graduates now in the department may be as under :—

70—5—100—10—250.

(6) That the revised scale of pay be kindly given effect to from 1st March 1924.

## APPENDIX No. 97 (a).

*Statement giving the information asked for in the Question put by  
Mr. S. A. Sardesai at the current session of the Bombay  
Legislative Council.*

(a) How many University Professors and Lecturers there are in the Bombay University and in what subjects ?

The University maintains four full-time teachers in the University School of Economics and Sociology, viz., one Professor of Economics, one Assistant Professor of Economics, and two Readers in Sociology. There are no full-time appointments of Lecturers in the University. Part-time Lecturers are appointed annually in (1) Sanskrit and allied languages, (2) History, more especially Indian History, (3) Mathematics. The number of such Lecturers is not fixed. It is either three or four in each of the three branches of study named.

(b) What the University has hitherto done by way of helping research ? And what are the University publications hitherto ?

(i) *Research.*

Chiefly owing to lack of funds the University was not able to do anything in the matter of the promotion of research up to the year 1914. The liberal grants made by the Government of India in 1912 enabled the University to take active steps in all matters of University development, including teaching and research. In 1914-15, a Research Fund was established and is available for grants to research workers in any branch of learning. Grants are made annually out of this Fund for expenses for purchase of material, for local expenses where investigation demands them, for the copying of documents or inscriptions, for working up of results, and similar purposes. Since the inauguration of this Fund in 1914, the University has disbursed a total sum of about Rs. 24,000 by way of research grants to investigators in various departments of learning. The average annual expenditure under this head is Rs. 2,000.

2. The University's contribution to the cause of research is not confined to the award of grants out of the Research Fund. With the assistance of grants from the Government of India the University is maintaining a School of Economics and Sociology whose object is the organization of research work in the fields of Economics and Sociology, under the guidance of those who have an intimate acquaintance with India, and with research methods in these subjects. In order to attract good students willing to devote themselves to research, the University has set apart an annual sum of Rs. 3,600 for the award of six research scholarships in the School. Research work in both the above branches of knowledge is done in the School by the staff and research students. The option to offer a thesis in lieu of certain papers at the M.A. Examination has only recently been introduced in the University regulations and so far, six students of the school have obtained the M.A. Degree by research. The number of such students is likely to increase in the

future. In the current year, for instance, six students of the School have offered a thesis in connection with their candidature for the M.A. Examination and twelve students are working on their respective thesis for next year's M.A. Examination. The University considers the training of students in the methods of research work as the primary duties of Professors and Readers in its School of Economics and Sociology. Lecturing to students on these subjects as included in the course for the M.A. Degree is only a subsidiary part of their duties. The annual expenditure on the maintenance of the School is about Rs. 48,000. This expenditure is largely expenditure on research work.

3. The aim of the University is to award the Master's Degree in recognition of satisfactory original research work wherever this is possible. As it is not possible to attain this aim at once the University has decided that the present system of testing the efficiency of candidates by means of examination shall continue, but that of doing so by the character of original research produced should be introduced where practicable, and, in such cases, the two shall run side by side until the time is ripe for the complete elimination of the former system. With a view to the gradual attainment of the ideal aimed at, the University has set apart annually a sum of Rs. 17,000 for expenses in connection with post-graduate lectures in the subjects of Sanskrit and allied languages, History and Mathematics. The Lecturers are part-time officers appointed annually by the University and are selected mainly from the staffs of its affiliated Colleges. Their duties are not merely to lecture on text-books but to train students in methods of research in their respective subjects.

4. The University has also encouraged research workers by the award of grants-in-aid of the expenses of publication of the results of their researches. Some of these grants run into considerable figure, e.g., a grant of Rs. 6,000 per volume for three volumes of a *History of Indian Philosophy* in eleven volumes projected by Professors Belvalkar and Ranade, part of which grant is repayable to the University on the publication of the volumes and a grant of Rs. 3,000 per annum for five years to the Bhandarkar Oriental Research Institute towards the expenses of publication of a critical edition of the *Mahabharata*.

Letter from the Chairman, Committee of Management, Ahmedabad Municipality No. Mis.—1343-(b), dated 7th February 1923 :—

“ In continuation of the loan application for the cost of the extension of the Water Works and Drainage Works sent by the Committee of Management, I have the honour to request that you will be so good as to move Government to accord ‘ technical and administrative approval ’ to the project submitted under this office No. M.I.S.—896, dated 10th March 1922, through your office. It may be noted that the Loan applied for is for *half* the programme of works outlined in the comprehensive project of Water Works and Drainage combined, and the requisite loan programme and draft prospectus have been submitted to Government as per paragraph 2 (3) of Government Resolution No. 1393, dated 23rd December 1922 (*vide* this office No. M.I.S.—223/1343, dated 13th January 1923). If Government require any further professional information the present Municipal Engineer Mr. Gore, who is a lent servant of Government, will be requested to put all the data to enable Government in the Public Works Department to form an opinion as to the project for expenditure.

“ 2. I shall be obliged if the matter is treated as urgent inasmuch as no expenditure from the loan fund can be incurred without this ‘ technical and administrative approval ’.”

Read endorsement thereon by the Collector of Ahmedabad, No. M.U. N.A.—23, dated 8th February 1923.

Read endorsement thereon by the Commissioner, Northern Division, No. M.U.N.A.—14, dated 8th March 1923.

Read letter from the Sanitary Board, No. 4941, dated 5th September 1923.

Read Government Memorandum No. 5105-M, dated 5th December 1923 to the Commissioner, Northern Division, returning the project with remarks.

Letter from the Sanitary Engineer to Government, No. 44, dated 5th January 1925 :—

" In continuation of my No. 6660 of 5th November 1924, and with special reference to Public Works Department Memorandum No. 5105-M, dated 27th November 1924, I have the honour to forward the revised project for the improvement of the Ahmedabad Water Supply as received from the Municipal Engineer.

" 2. The Municipal Engineer's figures for the population to be supplied by the different mains and in the different zones do not in all cases agree, but I have satisfied myself that the new trunk mains and principal branches are of suitable diameters and in order not to delay progress unnecessarily, I am therefore not returning the project to Ahmedabad for the necessary corrections to be made. I am however corresponding with Mr. Gore with regard to the minor inconsistencies shown by some of his figures.

" 3. The future total population to be provided for may be assumed to be 424,000, and that of the six city wards 249,000, as stated by the Municipal Engineer in paragraph 4 of his report and in his Table I-a; the Suburban population will therefore be 175,000 and the population to be supplied by each of the three mains leaving the headworks may be taken approximately as follows :—

" 4. The Municipal proposals with respect to the new mains of 20" diameter and over have been carefully scrutinised and are now satisfactory. The proposed enlargements of the intake works and pumping plant appear to be generally satisfactory for the time being; these works will require to be added to from time to time."

Government Memorandum in the General Department No. P.W.D.—5105-A, dated 18th May 1925 to the Commissioner, Northern Division :—

" The undersigned presents compliments to the Commissioner Northern Division, and is directed to state that the Sanitary Engineer to Government has submitted plans and estimates, the latter amounting to Rs. 31,35,729 of the revised project for the improvement of the Ahmedabad Water Supply for the technical approval of Government. The Commissioner is therefore requested to ascertain and report how the Ahmedabad Municipality proposes to finance the project.

" 2. In paragraph 3 of the letter No. Mis.—896/354, dated the 4th/8th August 1922, from the Chairman, Committee of Management, Ahmedabad Municipality, which was forwarded with the Commissioner's memorandum No. M.U.N.A.—175, dated the 23rd August 1922, a much cheaper

water supply scheme was suggested. The Commissioner is requested to ascertain and report what stage the proposed scheme has reached."

Letter from the President, Ahmedabad Municipality, No. Mis.—245/142 dated 9th July 1925 :—

"With reference to your No. M.U.N.A.—23, dated 25th May 1925, I have the honour to state as under :—

"The combined Water Works and Drainage Project estimated to cost Rs. 91,23,800 was submitted to Government by the Committee of Management for technical and administrative approval with an application dated 10th March 1922 requesting permission to raise a loan of 45½ lakhs and a grant-in-aid to meet the remaining half of the estimated cost in pursuance of the policy laid down in Government Resolution No. 6935, dated 30th June 1920. Although the application was very strongly supported by the Commissioner, Northern Division, by his Memorandum No. 14, dated 28th/30th March 1922, Government expressed their inability to consider the application owing to financial stringency (*vide* Government Resolution No. 2420, dated 15th May 1922). The loan application was however sanctioned by Government in June 1923 (*vide* Government Resolution No. 2441, dated 6th June 1923). Attention is invited to the revised application M. I. S. No. 1343-(b), dated 7th February 1923 by the Chairman, Committee of Management, requesting early sanction of the project, wherein it is clearly specified that the loan applied for is for half the project of Water Works and Drainage combined. According to the instructions received from the Sanitary Engineer, the Municipal Engineer subsequently revised the water works project. The original water works project was estimated to cost Rs. 27,88,500 but the estimates of the revised project amount to Rs. 31,45,487. The increase is mainly due to the extensive alteration in the distribution system proposed in the present project as advised by the Sanitary Engineer. In the original project the changes in the distribution section were estimated to cost Rs. 5,26,000 only while in the present project the estimates of this section alone amount to Rs. 15,97,550. Although it is true therefore that in paragraph 3 of the letter No. M.I.S.—896/354, dated the 4th/8th August 1922 of the Chairman, Committee of Management, a much cheaper water supply scheme was suggested, the suggestion does not appear to have been based on any careful examination of the situation. The original scheme of taking water direct from the river current and treating and filtering it by means of a rapid gravity filtration plants was altogether abandoned by the Committee of Management as soon as the Government expressed its inability to render financial assistance by a 50 per cent. grant-in-aid and accepted the present project of improving the supply by the addition of new infiltration wells. The work of constructing new wells for the present needs has already been completed although it is considered necessary to make some provision for future needs in this direction.

"The work of the erection of the new Engine which is now included in the scheme, is also completed but the mains and the sub-mains being of much smaller dimensions, it has not been possible to take full

advantage of the working of this Engine. The advice of the Sanitary Engineer for a wholesale alteration of the distribution system has been found to be too true. The Municipality has already called for tenders for pipes and other materials required for that purpose on the strength of an application for permission to raise two instalments of the loan. The present water supply project has reached this stage and its early approval is anxiously awaited.

“ Though there has been excess in the water supply project, it is a matter of satisfaction that the estimates of the Drainage project have been considerably reduced. In the same paragraph 3 of the letter from the Chairman, Committee of Management, referred to above, it appears to have been clearly stated that the aggregate cost of the combined Water Works and Drainage Project will under no circumstances be less than 60 lakhs. With the revised estimates of the Drainage Project prepared by the Municipal Engineer according to the instructions of the Sanitary Engineer which too has now been submitted to him the total estimates of the combined project amount to Rs. 61,96,825, as the estimates of the revised Drainage Project have been reduced from Rs. 63,35,300 to Rs. 30,51,338. Thus on the whole there has been no practical difference in the rough calculations of that time and the present detailed estimates of the combined project. The present combined scheme therefore on the whole is no doubt much cheaper than the original.

“ As regards the arrangements for financing the project, the situation, so far as the Municipality is concerned, remains the same. Beyond raising the loan of Rs. 45½ lakhs as already sanctioned, it is not possible to suggest ways and means for making up the deficit. It must be remembered that the Drainage Project covers only the walled area of the City. The outside area of the City and its Suburbs cannot long be kept without Drainage. Besides that there are large expensive schemes of City Improvement requiring urgent consideration. The Municipality has also declared its intention for the introduction of free and compulsory primary education. The maximum limit of taxable capacity has already been reached. The City is now passing through a period of financial depression, the like of which was never known before. Local sources of taxation such as the entertainment tax which should properly be available to the local body have been tapped by the Government. Under the circumstances the only alternative left is to request Government to revise its decision and to reconsider the original application for a grant-in-aid of 50 per cent. in accordance with the declared policy. The Government have already sanctioned a similar application from the Poona Municipality and agreed to bear half the cost of its Drainage Scheme. There is no reason why Ahmedabad should be treated differently. It is therefore earnestly requested that Government should now be pleased to sanction a subsidy equal to ½ of the whole cost of the combined project and to distribute it in such instalments as they may deem fit.

“ It is also requested that the technical and administrative sanction should now be given as early as possible. ”

Endorsement thereon by the Collector of Ahmedabad, No. M.U.N.A.—23, dated 13th July 1925 :—

“ Forwarded with compliments to the Commissioner, Northern Division.

“ 2. I have had the advantage of discussion of this matter with the President, Mr. Vallabhbhai J. Patel and the late Chairman of the Committee of Management in a Conference on 8th instant.

“ 3. It is now positively asserted that the financing of the full combined Drainage and Water Supply Scheme cannot be secured without aid from Government. The position is thus :—

“ 4. The Municipality are faced with heavy impending expenditure on the introduction of compulsory primary education and improvement of communication in congested areas. Their revenue is expanding in a normal way but they do not see any way to meet exceptional expenditure.

“ 5. They rely on the policy announced in Government Resolution No. 4326, dated 15th July 1907 which has been reiterated in Government Order No. 6935, General Department, dated 30th June 1920 (paragraph iii) and now ask for a grant-in-aid of one-half of the total cost of the combined scheme. Government in Government Resolution No. 2420, dated 15th July 1922, had once refused a grant-in-aid owing to the financial stringency then prevailing.

“ 6. I can only say that words of the Commissioner in his letter of 28th March 1922 are as true now as then and that if the financial situation has now improved aid is well deserved.

The efforts of the Municipality in raising a loan of 45½ lakhs, under stringent strict conditions of sinking Fund, is no mean effort on their part.

“ 7. I am therefore of opinion that the request of the Municipality deserves to be granted.

" 8. As regards paragraph 2 of Government Memorandum, I think that the cheap scheme is rightly rejected. The improvement of the distribution at a cost of only Rs. 5 lakhs would be a poor makeshift. It would hardly be even a palliative measure.

" 9. Lastly in view of the provision Government of India Resolution No. 1019-A, dated 10th November 1914, Financial Department, paragraph 4 (3), I support the request of the Municipality for early technical and administrative sanction to the Water Works Scheme. The work is in fact in progress and money has been expended already on certain parts of the Drainage and Water Supply Schemes."

Endorsement thereon by the Commissioner, Northern Division, No. M.U.N.A.—14, dated—July 1925 :—

" Copies submitted to Government with reference to their Memorandum No. P.W.D.—5105-A, dated 18th May 1925.

" 2. The Commissioner supports the Municipality's request for the technical and administrative approval of the water works scheme and recommends a grant-in-aid in such proportion, not being more than half, as Government may be pleased to make."

**RESOLUTION.**—The combined water supply and drainage project for Ahmedabad originally submitted to Government and estimated to cost Rs. 91,23,800 now stands at Rs. 61,96,825, owing to revision. The project should be considered as administratively approved in view of Government Resolution, General Department, No. 2441, dated 6th June 1923 in which the Municipality's proposals for the raising of a loan in the open market have been sanctioned.

2. The revised estimate for the water supply improvement project alone which stands at Rs. 31,45,487 (inclusive of the Municipal contribution of Rs. 2,69,263 towards the cost of the provision of a new engine sanctioned in Government Resolution No. 914 dated 4th September 1923) is sanctioned technically.

3. The revised estimate for the Drainage project which is said to stand at Rs. 30,51,338 should be submitted to Government for technical sanction.

4. The question of grant-in-aid asked for by the Municipality is still under the consideration of Government. It should however be distinctly understood that in issuing these orders Government are not committing themselves to any grant-in-aid.

RESOLUTION.—In the representation submitted by the Bombay Presidency Sub-Registrars' Association, the following requests *inter alia* have been made :—

- (1) Amalgamation of the last two grades of Sub-Registrars ;
- (2) more even distribution of posts between the various grades than exists at present ;
- (3) fixing of grades on a divisional and not provincial basis, so as to provide more higher grade appointments for Sind ;
- (4) removal of the notice put up in sub-registry offices, inviting the public to bring their complaints, if any, to the notice of the Mamlatdar.

2. As regards request No. (2), the number of posts in the various grades is as follows :—

I grade (Rs. 200—20—300) ..	..	4
II „ (Rs. 125—15/2—200)	..	40
III „ (Rs. 80—5—120) ..	..	91
IV „ (Rs. 50—3—80) ..	..	136

The Sub-Registrars in the higher grades are eligible for the six posts of inspectors, two posts of Sub-Registrars in Bombay City and one post of Assistant Superintendent of Stamps. The proportion of posts in the first three grades, including the nine higher posts, to the total cadre of the department is therefore 51·4 per cent., which compares favourably with that in other departments. Government therefore are of opinion that the number of posts in the various grades does not require any alteration.

3. As regards request No. (3), it is true that there is no appointment in the first grade in Sind and the proportion of appointments in the lowest grade to those in the higher grades is higher in Sind than in the other divisions. In view, however, of the comparatively light nature of the work in the sub-registry offices in Sind, Government do not think that any change in the present distribution of posts in that province is necessary.

4. With regard to request No. (4), it is understood that the Sub-Registrars do not object to inspection by Mamlatdars, but only to the notice inviting the public to bring their complaints, if any, to the notice of the Mamlatdar. The question of the propriety or otherwise of retaining this notice was carefully considered by Government in 1914, and in accordance with the recommendation of the Divisional Commissioners Government came to the conclusion that it was very important that the people should know and the Sub-Registrars should realise that it was the duty of the local magistrates to take cognizance of their proceedings. The Mamlatdar's control is, however, restricted to Sub-Registrars in the lower grades only, and all complaints against Sub-Registrars in receipt of a pay of Rs. 150 and over and those posted at District headquarters are to be made to the District Registrar or the Huzur Deputy Collector. Government are not aware that these orders have been in any way prejudicial to the Sub-Registrars, while from the point of view of the public their effect has been entirely salutary. Government therefore see no reason to order the removal of the notice in question.

5. The question of the amalgamation of the last two grades has been carefully considered by Government. The immediate reason urged for this step is the block in promotion which now occurs at the top of the last grade. As stated in paragraph 2 above, the cadre of Sub-Registrars does not compare unfavourably with that of other Departments. The present block at Rs. 80 arises out of the heavy increases of pay granted at the revision of 1920, which have made it impossible for all the men placed on Rs. 80 to be absorbed in the higher grades within the normal period. The block therefore is temporary and will gradually disappear. Nevertheless, Government consider that a large

number of men held up at Rs. 80 have some ground for dissatisfaction which requires to be remedied. The grievance, however, is of a temporary nature and must be met by a temporary solution. Government are therefore pleased to accord administrative approval to the following proposals, viz., that—

(a) Sub-Registrars who, on 1st March 1926, have been on Rs. 80 in the last grade for not less than three years continuously should from that date be eligible, subject to the ordinary rules regarding the grant of increments in time scales of pay, to personal pay on the scale of Rs. 3-3-12 ;

(b) Sub-Registrars who have been on Rs. 80 in the last grade continuously for not less than  $3\frac{1}{2}$  years on 1st March 1927 should be eligible for personal pay on the above scale from that date ; and after that date and up to 28th February 1929, Sub-Registrars who complete four years on Rs. 80 in the last grade should become eligible for the personal pay on the 1st March following the date on which the four years are completed ;

(c) Sub-Registrars drawing personal pay, when promoted from grade IV to grade III, will carry the personal pay with them. Thus a Sub-Registrar, drawing Rs. 80 plus Rs. 6 personal pay in grade IV, will, on promotion, draw Rs. 80 plus Rs. 6 personal pay in grade III. Such men will draw their next increment in grade III from the 1st of March following the date of their promotion. Thus, if the officer just referred to is promoted on 1st September 1927 he will draw Rs. 85 plus Rs. 6 in grade III from 1st March 1928.

(d) Only those Sub-Registrars who are judged by the Inspector General to be fit for promotion to grade III will be eligible for personal pay, and they will lose it if at any time they are judged not fit for promotion. A Sub-Registrar who has been declared to be not fit for promotion will become eligible for personal pay, starting at the lowest rate, from such date as the Inspector-General so decides, if he is subsequently declared to be fit for promotion.

(e) The personal pay will continue to be drawn until the combined grade pay and personal pay exceeds Rs. 110, when the personal pay will be reduced so that the combined pay will be Rs. 110. Thus a man drawing Rs. 100 plus Rs. 6 will from the date of his next increment draw, not Rs. 105 plus 6, but Rs. 105 plus 5. At the next following increment he will draw simply Rs. 110 grade pay. When the whole of the personal pay has been absorbed in this way, and grade pay of Rs. 110 has been drawn for one year, subsequent increments in grade pay will be due in the ordinary course.

(f) To prevent anomalies, Sub-Registrars who are on Rs. 80 in the third grade on 1st March 1926 will draw their next increment in that grade from that date and count service for future increments from that date.

(g) The service of 3,  $3\frac{1}{2}$  and 4 years referred to in clauses (a) and (b) must be of a kind which would have counted for increment in a time-scale of pay.

6. It is estimated that the extra cost of the above proposals will amount to about Rs. 35,000 spread over a period of 11 years. The extra cost during the next year will amount to Rs. 1,464. Provision for this amount should be included in the list of new items in the next year's budget estimates. Final orders sanctioning the grant of personal pay will be issued if the provision is retained.

APPENDIX A.

BILL No. I OF 1926.

*A Bill to amend the Indian Stamp (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1922.*

(As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the 22nd January 1926.)

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Indian Stamp (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1922, in manner hereinafter appearing; and whereas the previous sanction of the Governor General required by sub-section (3) of section 80A of the Government of India Act has been obtained for the passing of this Act; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

1. *Short title.*—This Act may be called the Indian Stamp (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1922.

2. *Amendment of s. 1 (iii) of Bom. II of 1922.*—In clause (iii) of section 1 of the Indian Stamp (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1922, the words "and shall be in force for four years thereafter" shall be repealed.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The Indian Stamp (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1922, was passed to enhance the Stamp Fees in certain cases for the purpose of increasing the revenue of Government. It was to remain in operation for four years from the 1st April 1922, and if at the end of that period, the financial position still made it necessary, its life was to be extended. The result of the four years' experience has proved the necessity of the retention of the revised scale of Stamp Fees which is enacted in the measure; and it is therefore proposed to continue the Act. This will bring the Act into line with similar Acts in Madras, Bengal and the Punjab.

BILL No. III OF 1926.

*A Bill further to amend the Court-fees Act, 1870.*

(As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the 3rd February 1926.)

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Court-fees Act, 1870, in its application to the Presidency of Bombay VII of 1870—

in manner hereinafter appearing; It is hereby enacted as follows :—

1. *Short title, extent, commencement and duration.*—(1) This Act may be called the Court-fees (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1926 .

(2) It extends to the whole of the presidency of Bombay.

(3) It shall come into force on the 1st day of April 1926.

2. *Amendment of section 7 of VII of 1870.*—In section 7 of the Court-fees Act, 1870, hereinafter called “the VII of 1870. said Act”,

(a) to clause (d) of paragraph iv the words “or other consequential relief” shall be added;

(b) after the word “appeal” in paragraph iv the words “with a minimum fee of rupees fifteen in each case” shall be inserted; and

(c) in clauses (1), (2) and (3) of the proviso to paragraph v for the words “five”, “ten” and “ten” the words “ten”, “twenty” and “twenty” shall, respectively, be substituted.

3. *Amendment of Schedules I to VII of 1870.*—For articles 1, 6, 7, 8, 11, 12 and 12-A of, and the Table of rates of *ad valorem* fees in Schedule I to the said Act the following shall be substituted, namely :—

## STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of this Bill is to enhance the Court fees in certain cases for the purpose of increasing the revenue of Government. In enhancing the Court fees the general principle followed is that where fixed fees are prescribed as in Schedule II of the Court Fees Act, 1870; the fees should be raised in consequence of the decreased value of money. In the case of *ad valorem* fees prescribed in Schedule I of the Court Fees Act, an enhancement is made only where experience has shown that the present fees levied are so inadequate that they lead to the abuse of judicial facilities or do not cover the actual cost to Government of the services rendered. The enhancement is effected by clauses 3 and 4 of the Bill which alter the fees in the case of those articles in Schedules I and II of the Court Fees Act in respect of which an enhancement of fee is considered necessary. A few applications have been added to Article 18 of Schedule II of that Act which, it is believed, should properly be brought under that Article as they are on the same footing as applications under paragraph 17 of the Second Schedule to the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908. The table of *ad valorem* fees is amended where the fee is altered.

2. In this Bill the fees imposed under the corresponding Bengal Act are taken for probate and letters of administration : they rise to a maximum of five per centum only as against seven per centum in Bombay Act I of 1922. Further, this Bill makes no change in the fees in respect of plaints, etc., in suits of the amount of Rs. 1,000 and under, whereas in Bombay Act I of 1922 no change was made in respect of suits of the amount of Rs. 500 only and under. The maximum fee leviable under the Bill is Rs. 10,000 as in Bengal instead of Rs. 6,000 as in Bom. I of 1922. In Madras and the Punjab there is no maximum limit.

3. Clause 2 of the Bill makes certain amendments in section 7 of the Court Fees Act which are based on the recommendation of the High Court and other judicial officers. The amendment in sub-clause (a) calls for no comment. The amendment in sub-clause (b) is intended to provide against under-valuation of the suits mentioned in clause (iv) of section 7 of the Act which exists at present with consequent loss of revenue. Sub-clause (c) amends the proviso to section 7 (v) so that the amounts payable may bear a better approximation to present-day values of land.

The tax now proposed is in the form of a Stamp duty on transfers of property in the City of Bombay: it involves no additional expense in collection; it will be paid by people at the most convenient time when the transaction taxed places them in funds, and the incidence is restricted to a small percentage of the price obtained by the transaction.

## APPENDIX D.

## BILL No. II OF 1926.

(As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the 2nd February 1926.)

*A Bill further to amend the Cattle-trespass Act, 1871, in its application to the Presidency of Bombay.*

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Cattle-trespass Act, 1871, as amended by Bombay Act LX of 1924, <sup>I of 1871.</sup> in its application to the Presidency of Bombay in manner hereinafter appearing; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

1. *Short title.*—This Act may be called the Cattle-trespass (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1926 .

2. *Amendment of section 6 of Act I of 1871.*—In section 6 of the Cattle-trespass Act, 1871,

(1) for the second proviso, the following proviso shall be substituted, namely:—

“ Provided further that in the Presidency of Bombay

(a) in any local area which has been declared to be a village under clause (a) of section 3 of the Bombay Village Panchayats Act, 1920, when the police patel, or the head of the village, is the Sarpanch or a member of the Panchayat, the Panchayat may appoint another person to be pound-keeper;

(b) in any local area in which the functions of the Magistrate of the District under this section are transferred to the local authority, the local authority may appoint another person to be pound-keeper; ”

(2) after the words “such Magistrate” the words “or in the Presidency of Bombay, in any local area in which the functions of the Magistrate of the District under this section are transferred to the local authority, by such local authority; and in the said Presidency every pound-keeper appointed by a Panchayat may be suspended or removed by such Panchayat” shall be inserted.

## STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

Bombay Act LX of 1924 [The Cattle-trespass (Amendment) Act, 1924] was passed to remedy the anomaly whereby in areas in which Village Panchayats were established under Bombay Act IX of 1920, the village patel, who under the proviso to section 6 of the Act I of 1871 as it stood before its amendment by Bombay Act IX of 1924, was *ex-officio* "a member of the Panchayat and was, in most cases, the Sarpanch of the Panchayat controlled himself as pound-keeper. A similar anomaly exists where the police patel or the head of the village is a member of the Panchayat and the object of proviso (a) in the Bill is to remove this further anomaly." In drafting the proviso the wording of section 2 of Bombay Act LX of 1924 has been repeated where necessary to facilitate drafting.

The Bill also provides that in local areas in which the functions of the District Magistrate under section 6 of the Cattle-trespass Act, 1871, are transferred to the local authority, the local authority may appoint another person than the police patel to be pound-keeper. This provision is necessary for the proper exercise of their powers under the said section by the local authorities to whom such powers have been transferred.

As a corollary to the above, the Bill also provides that in local areas in which the functions of the District Magistrate are transferred to the local authority the pound-keeper may be suspended or removed by the local authority whether appointed by the District Magistrate before such transfer of functions or by the local authority thereafter. The same power to suspend or remove pound-keepers is conferred on the village panchayats in respect of pound-keepers appointed by them.

## APPENDIX E.

## BILL No. V OF 1926.

*A Bill further to amend the City of Bombay Police Act, 1902.*

(As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the 6th February 1926.)

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the City of Bombay Police Act, 1902, in manner hereinafter appearing; Bomb IV of 1926  
It is hereby enacted as follows:—

1. *Short title.*—This Act may be called the City of Bombay Police (Amendment) Act, 1926.

2. *New section 29A of Bombay IV of 1902.*—After section 29 of the City of Bombay Police Act, 1902, the following section shall be inserted, namely:—

"29-A. (1). *Destruction of suffering or unfit animals.*—Any police officer who finds any animal so diseased, or so severely injured, or in such a physical condition, that it cannot without cruelty be removed, shall, if the owner is absent or refuses to consent to the destruction of the animal, at once summon the Veterinary Practitioner in charge of the area in which the animal is found and, if the Veterinary Practitioner certifies that the animal is mortally injured, or so severely injured, or so diseased, or in such a physical condition, that it is cruel to keep it alive, the police officer may, without the consent of the owner, destroy the animal or cause it to be destroyed.

(2) *Power to appoint Veterinary Practitioners.*—The Governor in Council may appoint such persons as he thinks fit to be Veterinary Practitioners and may declare the areas of which they shall be in charge for the purposes of this Act."

**STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.**

There is no provision in the City of Bombay Police Act, 1902, enabling police officers to destroy animals which are diseased or so severely injured that it would be a cruelty to let them linger on.

The power given by section 10 of the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, 1890 (XI of 1890), extends only to the destruction of animals in respect of which an offence under that Act has been committed. It does not cover other cases such as those of animals injured in street accidents.

Clause 2 of the Bill which follows the provisions of section 25 (3) of the Bengal Cruelty to Animals Act, 1920 (Ben. I of 1920), gives the necessary power.

## APPENDIX F.

## BILL No. III OF 1926.

*(A Bill further to amend the Court Fees Act, 1870.)*

## REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE.

We, the undersigned members of the select committee appointed to consider Bill No. III of 1926 (a Bill further to amend the Court Fees Act, 1870), have the honour to submit the following report:—

2. We are of opinion that the Act should remain in force for two years only. We have therefore made the necessary amendment in clause 1, sub-clause (3).

3. *Clause 2.*—We are of opinion that it is not necessary to have any minimum fee at all. We have therefore deleted sub-clause (b).

In sub-clause (c) of clause 2, we have substituted the words "seven and a half", "fifteen" and "fifteen" for the words "ten", "twenty" and "twenty".

4. *Clause 3.*—In the 4th clause under item 1 of schedule I, we have substituted Rs. 5 for Rs. 7-8-0.

We have decided by majority to retain Rs. 10,000 as the maximum fee leviable on a plaint or a memorandum of appeal.

We consider it undesirable to increase the fees on copies of translations of judgments or orders not being or having the force of decrees and on copies of decrees or orders having the force of decrees. We have therefore deleted items Nos. 6 and 7 of schedule I.

5. *Clause 4.*—We have decided by a majority that the provision in clause 4, schedule II, raising the fee on applications or petitions to 2 annas, should be retained.

In item 1 (d) of schedule II, we have reduced the fee on applications or petitions presented to a High Court to Rs. 3. We have deleted 1 (a) of schedule II.

We consider it undesirable to increase the fees on mukhtyarnamas or vakalatnamas, and have therefore deleted item 10 of schedule II.

In item 12 of schedule II we have provided that the enhanced fee of Rs. 10 should be levied only when the value of the property involved exceeds Rs. 2,000.

In clauses 1, 2 and 5 of item 17 of schedule II, we have provided that the fee of Rs. 15 should be levied only when the value of the property involved exceeds Rs. 500.

We consider it undesirable to increase the fee on applications for the appointment of the guardian of a minor, or for declaring a person to be such a guardian, or for the removal of a guardian under the Guardians

and Wards Act, 1890. We have therefore deleted clause (d) of schedule II.

*A Bill further to amend the Indian Stamp Act, 1899, in its application to the Presidency of Bombay.*

(As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the 13th February 1926.)

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Indian Stamp Act, 1899, in its application to the Presidency of Bombay, to provide for the levy of a duty on the transfer of land in the City of Bombay; And Whereas the previous sanction of the Governor General required by section 80A (3) of the Government of India Act has been obtained for the passing of this Act; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

1. *Short title.*—(1) This Act may be called the Indian Stamp (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1926.

2. *Extent.*—This Act shall extend to the City of Bombay only.

3. *Levy of increased duty on instruments relating to immovable property.*—Notwithstanding anything contained in the Indian Stamp (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1922, in respect of any instrument (not being a lease or transfer of a lease as defined in the Indian Stamp Act, 1899, hereinafter referred to as the said Act, or an under-lease or sub-lease or an agreement to let or sublet or a power of attorney) relating to immovable property situate within the City of Bombay for the entries in columns 1 and 2 against item 23 of Schedule I to the said Act the following entries shall be substituted, namely:—

BILL No. IV OF 1926.

*A Bill further to amend the Bombay Prevention of Gambling Act, 1887.*

(As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the 6th February 1926.)

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Bombay Prevention of Gambling Act, 1887, in manner hereinafter appearing; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

1. *Short title.*—This Act may be called the Bombay Prevention of Gambling (Amendment) Act, 1926.
2. *Amendment of section 6 of Bom. IV of 1887.*—In section 6 of the Bombay Prevention of Gambling Act, 1887, for the words "Assistant Superintendent" the words "Assistant or Deputy Superintendent" shall be substituted.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

Under section 6 of the Bombay Prevention of Gambling Act, 1887 (Bom. IV of 1887), the Commissioner of Police in the City of Bombay and elsewhere any Magistrate of the First Class or any District Superintendent of Police or any Assistant Superintendent of Police, empowered by Government in this behalf, has power to authorise, by special warrant under his hand, any Inspector or other superior officer of Police of not less rank than a Chief Constable, to enter and search a gaming house, take into custody and bring before a Magistrate persons concerned, and seize all instruments of gaming, moneys, etc. It is the usual practice to give this power to all Assistant Superintendents of Police in charge of Sub-Divisions. By the introduction of the Sub-Divisional scheme Deputy Superintendents of Police are now put in charge of Sub-Divisions and are interchangeable with Assistant Superintendents of Police. It is desirable therefore that Deputy Superintendents of Police should also be invested with these powers.

**BILL No. VII OF 1926.**

*A Bill to amend the Bombay Prevention of Prostitution Act, 1923.*

(As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette"  
of the 19th February 1926.)

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Bombay Prevention of Prostitution Act, 1923, in manner hereinafter appearing; And whereas the previous sanction of the Governor General required by section 80A of the Government of India Act has been obtained for the passing of this Act; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

1. *Short title.*—This Act may be called the Bombay Prevention of Prostitution (Amendment) Act, 1926.

2. *Amendment of s. 1 of Bom. XI of 1923.*—In sub-section (2) of section 1 of the Bombay Prevention of Prostitution Act, 1923, hereinafter called the said Act, for the words and figures "sub-section 8 (3)" the following words and figures shall be substituted:—

"section 8, sub-section (3)."

3. *Amendment of s. 3 of Bom. XI of 1923.*—In section 3 of the said Act,

(a) for the words "eight days" the words "three months" and

(b) for the word "fifty" the words "one hundred" shall be substituted.

4. *Amendment of s. 9 of Bom. XI of 1923.*—After sub-section (5) of section 9 of the said Act the following sub-section shall be added, namely:—

"(6) (a) Elsewhere than in the City of Bombay all or any of the powers conferred by this section on the Commissioner of Police for the City of Bombay may be exercised, as regards his district or part of his district by the District Magistrate when empowered in that behalf by the Governor in Council by a notification in the *Bombay Government Gazette*.

(b) Any person who disobeys any requisition contained in any notice issued by the District Magistrate under the powers exercisable by him under clause (a) shall be liable to the penalties provided in sub-section (4).

(c) Whoever, within two years from the date of his removal under the provisions of this sub-section, returns to any place within the district from which he has been

removed without the permission in writing of the District Magistrate shall be liable to the punishment provided in sub-section (5)."

5. *Amendment of s. 10 of Bom. XI of 1923.*—For sub-section (1) of section 10 of the said Act the following shall be substituted, namely :—

"(1) Any police officer on information and, if the offence is committed in his view, any police officer specially authorised in this behalf by the Commissioner of Police, may arrest without a warrant any person committing any offence punishable under section 3."

6. *Amendment of s. 13 of Bom. XI of 1923.*—In section 13 of the said Act,—

(a) For clause (c) of sub-section (1) the following shall be substituted, namely :—

"(c) in clause 33 (1) after the figures '23' the words and figures 'or under section 128 of this Act or' shall be inserted."

(b) For clause (e) of sub-section (1) the following shall be substituted, namely :—

"(e) the following shall be inserted as sub-section (1) of section 35 :—

'any police officer empowered in this behalf by the Commissioner of Police may arrest without warrant for any offence specified in section 120.'"

#### STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The objects of the amendments are explained in the following notes on the clauses of the Bill :—

*Clause 3.*—Under section 3 the offence of soliciting for the purpose of prostitution is punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to eight days or with fine which may extend to fifty rupees. The punishment has proved inadequate and has no deterrent effect. It is therefore proposed to enhance the punishment to one of three months' imprisonment or a fine of one hundred rupees.

*Clause 4.*—Under section 9 the Commissioner of Police, Bombay, has been vested with certain powers which may be exercised by him with respect to persons residing in the City of Bombay. Since the passing of the Act it has been represented to Government that the powers exercisable by the Commissioner of Police under section 9 should also be available in other places where conditions approximate to those in the City of Bombay, and the object of the amendment is to give District Magistrates such powers. As, however, the conditions in places other than the City of Bombay are, in many respects, different from those in Bombay, it is proposed that the District Magistrates

should ordinarily exercise the powers conferred on them by section 153 of the Bombay District Municipal Act, 1901, and that they should exercise the wider powers conferred by proposed section 9 (6) only so far as the conditions in each district render the exercise of such powers necessary.

*Clause 5.*—Sub-section (I) of section 10 of the Act by its grammatical structure restricts the powers of a police officer to arrest a person, against whom information of an offence under section 3 of the Act has been received, to cases where the offence is committed in his presence. This was not intended when the Act was passed and hampers the action of the police in cases in which immediate action is necessary. The amendment is intended to remedy this defect. For the same reason the last two lines of the sub-section have been omitted.

*Clause 6*—Sub-clause (a).—Section 128 of the City of Bombay Police Act, 1902, as it stood before amendment included two sections and made punishable an unauthorized return to the City of Bombay of persons removed under section 27 which related to gangs or under section 28 which related to prostitutes and brothel keepers of the same Act. Section 33 (i) authorized a police officer to arrest without warrant any person offending under section 128. Section 28 was repealed by the Bombay Prevention of Prostitution Act, 1923, which reproduced its provisions in section 9; and in making consequential amendments the fact that section 128 included 2 cases was overlooked in amending section 33 (I) and the reference to section 128 therein was wholly omitted. The consequence is that the power of a police officer to arrest without warrant gangs has been taken away, a result which was not contemplated when the Act was passed. This clause is intended to re-enact the former provisions of section 33 (I) as regards gangs under section 128 of the City of Bombay Police Act, 1902.

Sub-clause (b).—The effect of the existing clause (c) of sub-section (I) of section 13 of the Act is to deprive a police officer in the City of Bombay of the power to arrest without warrant in respect of all the offences specified in section 120 of the City of Bombay Police Act, 1902. The intention, however, was to deprive him of such power in respect of the offences specified in clauses (a) and (b) only of that section as these clauses have been repealed by clause (f) of sub-section (I) of section 13 of the Act. Clause (b) gives effect to this intention.

APPENDIX K.

BILL No. VIII OF 1926.

*A Bill further to amend the Bombay Civil Courts Act, 1869.*

(As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the 20th February 1926.)

XIV of 1869. WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Bombay Civil Courts Act, 1869, in manner hereinafter appearing; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

1. *Short title.*—This Act may be called the Bombay Civil Courts (Amendment) Act, 1926.

XIV of 1869. 2. *Amendment of section 32 of Act XIV of 1869.*—For section 32 of the Bombay Civil Courts Act, 1869, the following section shall be substituted, namely:—

Cy. XIV of 1869, s. 32. "32. *Government Suits.*—(1) No subordinate court other than the court of a subordinate judge of the first class and no court of small causes shall receive or register any suit in which the Secretary of State for India in Council or any officer of Government in his official capacity is a party.

V of 1908. (2) In every such case the plaintiff shall be referred to the court of the Subordinate Judge of the first class and such suit shall be instituted only in the court of the subordinate judge of the first class and shall be heard by such subordinate judge, subject to the provisions of section 24 of the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908.

(3) Nothing in this section shall be deemed to apply to a suit against the administration of a Government railway: or to apply to any suit merely because an officer of Government is a party thereto, in his capacity of—

(a) member of a local authority,

(b) curator, guardian, manager or representative of a private person or estate in virtue of an appointment, delegation, declaration or exercise of powers under:—

V of 1908. (i) Order 32, rule 4 (f), of the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908; .

IV of 1912. (ii) section 69 or 71 of the Indian Lunacy Act, 1912;

VIII of 1890. (iii) section 7, 18 or 42 of the Guardians and Wards Act, 1890;

Bom. VI of 1862. (iv) section 1 or 17 of the Ahmedabad Talukdars' Act, 1862;

Bom. I of 1905. (v) section 3, 19 (1), 19 (2), 20, 23 (1) or 41 (1) of the Bombay Court of Wards Act, 1905."

## STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

It is proposed to extend to the Courts of the First Class Subordinate Judges the jurisdiction in respect of official suits at present restricted to the District Courts, and to follow in this respect the provisions of clause 37 of the Sind Courts Bill, of which the principles have been approved by the Legislative Council and the details by the Select Committee on that Bill. This subject has already engaged the attention of Government for some time. It has however recently become more urgent owing to the assumption by Government of the administration of the Great Indian Peninsula Railway on 1st July 1925. Since that date all suits against that railway administration have to be filed in the District Court, a procedure which causes inconvenience and delay and throws a considerable amount of petty work on the District Courts. It is proposed therefore that such suits should be triable by any Subordinate Judge, as was the practice before July 1925.

## APPENDIX L.

## BILL No. XXXI OF 1925.

*A Bill to amend the law relating to the emoluments claimable by Watandar Hindu priests.*

(As introduced on the 3rd November 1925 and published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the 30th November 1925.)

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the law relating to the emoluments claimable by Watandar Hindu priests ; It is hereby enacted as follows :—

1. *Short title.*—This Act may be called the Invalidation of Hindu Ceremonial Emoluments Act, 1925 .

2. *Definitions.*—In this Act, "Ceremonial emoluments" means all perquisites, fees and any other dues claimable by any person for religious ceremonials, on account of his being a hereditary priest.

3. *Right to claim ceremonial emoluments.*—No person shall be entitled to claim, as a matter of right, any ceremonial emoluments from any Hindu who does not call in the services of the person claiming those emoluments.

The principle laid down in this Bill has been long the established law in all parts of British India except the Bombay Presidency, where it has been held that a watandar priest or Joshi can obtain a decree for his customary emoluments, though, as a matter of fact, his services for performing the ceremonies may not be requisitioned by a Hindu. This state of the law has caused considerable annoyance to non-Brahman Hindus in the Bombay Presidency. The priests who claim these emoluments, belong universally to the Brahman caste and non-Brahman Hindus resent their being forced by the law courts to pay for services which they neither desire nor utilise. This bill is intended to do away with the cause of this injustice to the non-Brahman Hindus and bring the law as administered by the Bombay High Court into line with the law laid down by the other High Courts.

**BILL No. XXXI OF 1925.**

*A Bill further to amend the Bombay Prevention of Gambling Act, 1887.*

WHEREAS it is necessary to amend the law relating to gambling; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

1. This Act may be called the Bombay Prevention of Gambling Amendment Act of 1926.

2. For clause (c) of section 3 of the Bombay Prevention of Gambling Act, 1887, substitute the following:—

“(c) between any individual in person, being present in the enclosure, on the one hand, and such licensee or other person licensed by such licensee in terms of the aforesaid license on the other hand, in such manner, or by such contrivance as may be permitted by such license.”

**STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.**

The purpose of this Bill is to enable Government to authorize the authorities of the Western Indian Turf Club to permit the presence on the Race Courses at Bombay and Poona of a limited number of book-makers. Until the passage of Act V of 1922, this could have been done, but by the alteration of the words of section 3 of the Amending Act, the only form of betting which could be legalised by a license under the Bombay Race Courses licenses Act (Act III of 1912) is betting by means of the totalisator. It has been found by experience to be impossible to suppress the unlicensed bookmaker from the premises of the Turf Club, and despite the efforts of the police it is known that bookmakers exist outside of these premises. It is obviously better that such gambling as does take place should be under proper control, and it is believed that under the strict conditions which it will be possible to enforce, much of the unlicensed gambling could be suppressed. The Turf Club could be permitted to allow a strictly limited number of book-makers in the first enclosure with proper limits on the amount which could be bet. It is believed that large sums of money which ought to pass through the totalisator are laid with bookmakers and there is likely to be a serious loss of income to Government from this source. If the Bill is passed it will be possible to tap this source of income.

Motion No. V also deals with amendments to Standing Order IV, 1 (1). The amendment made to Standing Order IV, 1 (1) by this motion will come after the amendment made in Motion No. V.

*Motion No. IV.*

We are of opinion that the amendment proposed in this motion is necessary, and should be accepted.

*Motion No. V.*

We are of opinion that the amendments proposed are necessary, and should be accepted.

I do not agree that a member whose election as Deputy President has not been approved by the Governor should be disqualified from being proposed as a candidate for fresh election, during the whole life-time of the Council. If a member is elected Deputy President at a session of the Council and his election is disapproved by the Governor, it is, no doubt, undesirable that conflict should be created between the Governor and the Council by electing the same member as Deputy President *at the same session*. But this argument loses its force when a fresh election is to be made at a *subsequent session*. Much may have happened during the interval, leading the Governor himself not to disapprove his election, in case the Council again elects him. In the interest of harmonious relations between the Governor and the Council, it is eminently desirable that he should have an opportunity of reconsidering his former decision. I am, therefore, strongly of opinion that the disqualification should last only for the particular session at which the election has taken place.

With regard to the new standing orders proposed, viz., VIII-A Statutory Motions, I am of opinion that the period for giving notice should be 8, and not 10, clear days.

I am of opinion that Standing Order (3) (b) should be as follows :—

(b) If any one candidate obtains more than half the total number of votes cast in favour of all the other candidates collectively, the President shall declare such candidate elected. In case a candidate obtains half the number of votes, and the President gives him the casting vote, the President shall declare such candidate elected. In every other case a fresh ballot shall be taken. For the purposes of the fresh ballot, the names of candidates shall be arranged in the order of the number of votes obtained by each, and the names of all candidates, whose total collective votes are less than the votes obtained by the candidate immediately above them in the order of the number of votes, shall be omitted from the list of the fresh ballot. This process shall be continued until the President declares some candidate duly elected. In the event of an equality of votes or half the number of votes as the case may be, the President shall have a casting vote.

2. I am of opinion that such a rule would save time. As an illustration I may mention two possible cases :—

(1) The order of votes is as follows :—

It would be seen that A has more than half the total number of votes, and could be declared elected at the very first ballot. A would have more votes than B even if at the subsequent ballots under the standing order proposed B obtained all the votes given to C, D, E and F. Under the proposed Standing Order the process would have to be repeated five times unnecessarily.

In case A had 50 votes, the President could give him his casting vote.

(2) My second illustration is this:—

In this case B would have more votes than C even if at subsequent ballots the votes given to D, E and F were given to C. These could make 27 only. The object of arranging in the order of votes is to facilitate the process of elimination.

For Standing Order III the following shall be substituted, namely:—

#### “ III.—Council officials.

“ 1. *Election of Deputy President.*—(1) After the members have been sworn in at the beginning of a new Council and after the election of the President the Council shall elect one of its members to be Deputy President.

“ (2) Every member who wishes to propose a member for election as Deputy President must—

(a) ascertain previously that the member he wishes to propose is willing to serve if elected, and

(b) hand to the Secretary a notice containing the name of the member he desires to propose signed by himself and some other member as seconder.

“ (3) The President shall read out to the Council the names of the candidates together with those of their proposers and seconders and if only one person has been proposed for election shall declare that person duly elected. If more than one person has been proposed, the

members other than the President shall then proceed to vote on the question by a ballot and the President shall declare the person who receives the majority of votes to be duly elected.

The ballot shall be held in the following manner :—

(a) Every member shall be entitled to vote for one person only at each ballot.

(b) If there are only two candidates only one ballot shall be held. If there are more than two candidates the name of the candidate who obtains the fewest number of votes at the first ballot shall be omitted from the list of candidates. The remaining candidates shall then be balloted for, and the name of the candidate obtaining the fewest number of votes at the second ballot shall similarly be omitted from the list of candidates.

This process shall be continued at the third and all succeeding ballots until only two candidates' names remain on the list, when a final ballot shall be held. In the event of an equality of votes the President shall have a casting vote.

“(4) If a vacancy in the office of Deputy President occurs in the life of a Council, or if the Governor withholds his approval to any election, a fresh election shall be held in accordance with the procedure hereinbefore laid down; Provided that a member whose election has not been approved by the Governor shall not be proposed as a candidate during the continuance of that Council.”
