APPENDIX 1

BILL No. V OF 1927

*A Bill further to amend the Indian Stamp (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1922*Bom. II
of 1922.(As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the
9th February 1927)

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Indian Stamp (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1922, in manner hereinafter appearing; And whereas the previous sanction of the Governor General required by section 80-A (3) of the Government of India Act, and the previous sanction of the Governor required by section 80-C of the said Act have been obtained for the passing of this Act; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

1. *Short title.*—This Act may be called the Indian Stamp (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1927.

2. *Commencement.*—This Act shall come into force on the 1st day of April 1927.

3. *Amendment of section 1 of Bom. II of 1922.*—In clause (iii) of section 1 of the Indian Stamp (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1922, hereinafter called the said Act, the words "and shall be in force for five years thereafter" shall be repealed.

4. *New sections 1-A and 1-B of Bombay II of 1922.*—After section 1 of the said Act the following sections shall be inserted, namely:—

"1-A. *Amendment of sections 4 and 6 of II of 1899.*—In sub-section (1) of section 4, and in the proviso to section 6 of the Indian Stamp Act, 1899, hereinafter called the said Act, for the words 'one rupee' the words 'two rupees' shall be substituted.

"1-B. *Amendment of section 28 of II of 1899.*—For the proviso to sub-section (4) of section 28 of the said Act the following shall be substituted namely:—

'Provided that notwithstanding anything contained in article 23 of Schedule I the duty on such last-mentioned conveyance shall in no case be less than two rupees.'

5. *Amendment of section 2 of Bom. II of 1922.*—In section 2 of the said Act for the words "the Indian Stamp Act, 1899, hereinafter called "the said Act," the words "the said Act" shall be substituted.

6. *Amendment of section 4 of Bom. II of 1922.*—After clause (c) of section 4 of the said Act the following clauses shall be inserted, namely:—

"(d) in clause (a) in column 1 of article 25 for the words 'one rupee' the words 'two rupees' shall be substituted; and

(e) in the proviso in column 2 of article 35, in provisos (a) and (c) in column 2 of article 45, and in the proviso in column 2 of article 58 for the words 'eight annas' the words 'one rupee' shall be substituted."

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS

The Indian Stamp (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1922, was passed to enhance the Stamp Fees in certain cases for the purpose of increasing the revenue of Government. It was to remain in operation for four years from the 1st April 1922, and, if at the end of that period the financial position still made it necessary, its life was to be extended. A Bill making the Act permanent was introduced in the session of the Bombay Legislative Council which met in February 1926 but the Legislative Council agreed to an extension of the Act by one year only. The result of five years' experience has proved the necessity of the retention of the revised scale of fees which was enacted in the measure and it is, therefore, proposed to continue the Act. This will bring it into line with similar Acts in Madras, Bengal and the Punjab. Clause 3 of the Bill gives effect to this proposal.

2. The object of clauses 4, 5 and 6 is to make certain consequential amendments in the Indian Stamp Act, 1899, rendered necessary by the amendments made in that Act by the Indian Stamp (Bombay Amendment) Act, 1922, so as to bring the rates of stamp duty levied on the instruments referred to in clauses 4 and 6 of the Bill to the level of the duty levied in respect of similar instruments under Bombay Act II of 1922.

STATEMENT OF DEMANDS FOR SUPPLEMENTARY GRANTS

RESERVED 1. The Honourable Sir CHUNILAL MEHTA.Elections for the Bombay Legislative Council and the
Legislative Assembly

The provision of Rs. 1,25,000 made in the current year's budget under the head "22—General Administration—Legislative Bodies—Elections for Provincial Legislature"—proved insufficient to meet the expenditure on account of the recent elections for the Bombay Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly. The increase in estimated expenditure was largely due to the fact that there was a great increase in the number of electors (with consequent increase in cost of paper, printing, etc.) and in the number of polling stations (with consequent increase in cost of equipment travelling allowance to presiding and polling officers, etc.). An additional grant of Rs. 20,000 had, therefore, to be re-appropriated from the Reserve at the disposal of the Finance Department to cover the anticipated expenditure up to the end of the current financial year. The total amount of Rs. 1,45,000 so provided will, however, be less than that provided in 1923-24, namely, Rs. 1,50,000.

2. A further additional grant of Rs. 10,000 has also had to be re-appropriated from the Reserve at the disposal of the Finance Department to meet the costs and expenses of election commissions appointed for the trial of election petitions made under rule 32 of the Bombay Electoral Rules. These costs and expenses will eventually be recovered from the parties under the Indian Election offences and Inquiries Act, 1920.

RESERVED 2. The Honourable Mr. J. E. B. HOTSON.

Provision on account of the pay and allowances of the Registrar, High Court, Appellate Side, Bombay, was made on the non-voted side of the budget in the current year, since the post is ordinarily held by a member of the Indian Civil Service. The appointment was, however, held in an officiating capacity by an officer not belonging to that Service till the 7th November 1926 (inclusive). An additional allotment of Rs. 13,906 on account of the pay and allowance of the Non-I.C.S. incumbent of the post is therefore required. The voted grant of Rs. 63,70,422 under the head 24—Administration of Justice has accordingly to be increased by Rs. 13,906. Corresponding savings are available in the provision for non-voted expenditure under the same major head.

RESERVED 3. The Honourable Sir CHUNILAL V. MEHTA, Kt.

Current repairs to Government House, Bombay

This award was accepted by Government only in February 1926 and hence no provision could be made on that account in the current year's Budget. The cost being debitable to repairs, a sum of Rs. 13,860 was provided out of the repair grant of the Superintending Engineer, Central Circle, for Government House works under the head 41-Civil Works—Provincial-Reserved and the balance of Rs. 28,150 has still to be provided. The grant voted by the Legislative Council for the current year under the head 41-Civil Works—Provincial-Reserved is Rs. 2,84,000 and the provision of an additional sum of Rs. 28,150 under this head requires the sanction of the Legislative Council. As the matter was urgent and as there was to be no session of the Legislative Council till February 1927, Government authorised the expenditure of Rs. 28,150 under the head 41-Civil Works—Provincial-Reserved in anticipation of the approval of the Legislative Council. The sum of Rs. 28,150 will be met out of the following savings under the head 41-Civil Works—Provincial—Transferred :—

Approval of the Legislative Council to the action taken by Government is required.

RESERVED 4. The Honourable Mr. J. L. RIEU**Additional contract grant under '7' Stamps, for the Central Stamp Depot, Karachi**

The Stamp Depot, Karachi, stores and issues postage stamps, with other kinds of stamps, to all the Treasuries served by it. Up to 1925-26 consignments of stamps for the Karachi Depot were received directly from England at Karachi, and their shipment charges were paid in England. The Karachi Depot had to pay only the Port Trust charges such as wharfage, hamalage, etc., for which the sanctioned contract grant of Rs.10,000 was quite sufficient. From the current financial year stamps are being manufactured at the Nasik Security Printing Press and as the Railway freight charges on postage stamps issued to the Karachi Depot were not paid by the Nasik Press, they had to be paid by the Karachi Depot. As consignments of postage stamps were generally sent to Karachi in full wagons by the longest route *via* Delhi and North Western Railway, *i.e.*, without a break of gauge en route with a view to minimising the risk of theft in transit, the freight charges were very high. The contract grant of the Karachi Depot was in consequence nearly exhausted by the end of July. As further consignments were expected from Nasik the grant had to be supplemented immediately by re-appropriation of Rs. 9,500 from the reserve at the disposal of the Finance Department. As it was not possible to place the proposal before the old Legislative Council, it is now submitted for the formal sanction of the present Legislative Council. The charges will eventually be recovered from Government of India as the consignments were in respect of postage stamps.

TRANSFERRED 5. The Honourable Diwan Bahadur HARILAL DESAI.**Honoraria to the Honorary Staff at the J. J. and G. T. Hospitals**

Since the year 1888, the principle of engaging the services of independent medical practitioners for the Bombay Hospitals which are concerned with medical teaching has been adopted to an increasing extent by Government. With the steady relinquishment of appointments in the J. J. group and elsewhere by the officers of the Indian Medical Service, a larger number of medical practitioners has been included on the staffs of these Hospitals. In addition to these, an increasing amount of work at the J. J. and G. T. Hospitals is being carried out by members of the medical profession on either a purely honorary or a part-time basis.

At the J. J. Hospital group there are 3 Honorary Associate Professors (of Medicine, Surgery and Midwifery) who have not only clinical work in the wards but have also to prepare and deliver lectures to the students of the Grant Medical College. These entail much labour not only in delivery but also in preparation and the Associate Professors are put to some expense in the matter of conveyance to and from the College.

In addition, there are 14 honorary officers at the J. J. and allied Hospitals and 10 at the G. T. Hospital.

Up to now no honorarium was being paid to these officers but it was represented to Government that though these gentlemen offered their services on a purely honorary basis, it was only fair that they should be reimbursed for the conveyance charges which they had to incur, and as the matter assumed urgency in view of a similar arrangement at the King Edward Memorial Hospital and the consequent unfavourable position of the staff at the Government Hospitals in comparison with the staff of the latter Hospital, Government have sanctioned with effect from the 1st July 1926, in anticipation of the sanction of the Legislative Council, the grant of honoraria to the Honorary Staff at the J. J. and G. T. Hospitals at the rates mentioned in the accompanying list. The charge for 8 months during the current year amounts to Rs. 33,600. Corresponding savings are available in the non-voted provision made for the pay of officers under the head "32, Medical—Medical Establishment—District Medical Officers." The sanction of the Legislative Council is requested to the grant of Rs. 45,68,000 under "32, Medical—Transferred" being increased by Rs. 33,600.

Fees for Special Counsel

The provision of Rs. 42,000 made in the current year's budget on account of fees for Special Counsel under the head "24—Administration of Justice—Law Officers—Mofussil Establishment" proved insufficient owing to the heavy expenditure on the fees in the Cama Case from Surat and two cases from Sind. An additional grant of Rs. 10,000 had therefore to be reappropriated from the reserve at the disposal of the Finance Department to cover anticipated expenditure up to the end of the current financial year. The sanction of the Legislative Council is requested to the grant of Rs. 63,70,422 under "24—Administration of Justice" being increased by Rs. 10,000.

Repair grants of the Superintending Engineer, Central Circle, and the Electrical Engineer to Government in connection with the three Government Houses.

In March 1926 the Legislative Council sanctioned a supplementary grant of Rs. 10,000 for the work of protecting the foreshore of Government House grounds, Malabar Point, Bombay, estimated to cost Rs. 1,60,454. The work was sanctioned by the Secretary of State for India late in the last financial year and hence no provision could be made for it in the current year's Budget. The Superintending Engineer, Central Circle, asked for a sum of Rs. 1,47,600 to push on with the work as much as possible during the current year. There being no provision for the work and the matter being urgent, Government sanctioned a sum of Rs. 88,000 by temporarily reducing the repair grants of the Superintending Engineer, Central Circle, and the Electrical Engineer to Government for Government Houses. These repair grants had therefore to be restored as soon as possible.

2. In April 1926 the Superintending Engineer, Central Circle, also required an additional allotment of Rs. 7,500 for urgent current repairs

to (crib work) sea wall along the eastern shore of Government House, Bombay.

3. An allotment of Rs. 5,980 was also required for running the temporary pumping plant at Government House, Ganeshkhind, for the supply of water to Government House during the months of April to July 1926. Owing to great shortage of water in Pashan Lake water had to be pumped out of the Mutha Left Bank Canal. A sum of Rs. 5,980 was required to meet the expenditure incurred during the current year. The question of permanently solving this difficulty is under the consideration of Government.

4. The total additional grant required under the head "41, Civil Works—Provincial—Reserved" is therefore Rs. 1,01,480. This addition to the voted grant of Rs. 2,84,000 for the current year requires the sanction of the Legislative Council. As the matter was urgent and as there was to be no session of the Legislative Council till February 1927 Government authorised the expenditure of Rs. 1,01,480 under the head "41, Civil Works—Provincial—Reserved." in anticipation of the approval of the Legislative Council. Corresponding savings are available in the following provisions under the head "41, Civil Works—Provincial—Transferred":—

Change in the classification of accounts in respect of the provision for commuted value of pensions

Hitherto provision for the commuted value of pensions has been made under the head "45—Superannuation Allowances and Pensions." From the current year all payments on account of the commutation of pensions whether made in England or India are to be brought to account in India on the books of this Government under a new capital major head "60-B—Payment of commuted value of pensions." The idea underlying the introduction of the new accounting procedure is that commutation if otherwise in order, should, as far as possible, not be postponed owing to lack of budget provision. The amount debited to the capital major head in each year is to be repaid from revenue by system of equated instalments spread over a period of 15 years which are to include interest on the capital payments. In the current year provisions of Rs. 1,25,000 and Rs. 10,000 on account of commuted value of pensions were made in the subject grant under the head "45—Superannuation Allowances and Pensions" and in the composite grant of the High Commissioner for India, respectively. The experience of the past few years has shown that the requirement of applicants for the commutation of pensions have far exceeded the budget provisions made for that purpose. Government have, in anticipation of the sanction of the Legislative Council, incurred expenditure on this account to the extent of Rs. 3,83,000 (voted) and met it from the general balances. The provisions of Rs. 1,25,000 and Rs. 10,000 mentioned above will not be utilised as the expenditure will be booked under the new capital head. In the circumstances, the sanction of the Legislative Council is requested to a provision of Rs. 3,83,000 (voted) being made under the new capital major head "60-B, Payment of commuted value of pensions."

Resumption of plots for the development of the Artillery Maidan, Karachi

In connection with the development of the Artillery Maidan at Karachi, it was necessary to acquire certain private buildings, as otherwise the scheme of development could not be proceeded with. There are four buildings on the west edge of Preedy Street within the area of the Maidan, and these had to be resumed from the lessees of the plots on which they stood. The cost on account of payment of compensation to the owners of these plots was estimated at Rs. 72,378. In view of the urgency of the matter, Government authorised their immediate resumption. The above expenditure was therefore incurred in anticipation of the sanction of the Legislative Council. A part of the expenditure has been met from the provision of Rs. 12,000 made in the current year's budget

for this purpose under the head "56-A, Capital Outlay on Improvements on Public Health (Reserved)," and an additional grant of Rs. 60,878 is necessary to meet the balance of the expenditure. Sufficient savings are available in the provision for the Poona Drainage Improvement Scheme and Poona Cantonment Water Works under "56-A, Capital Outlay on Improvements on Public Health (Transferred)."

The sanction of the Legislative Council is now requested to the sanctioned grant of Rs. 5,22,000 under "56-A, Capital Outlay on Improvements on Public Health—Reserved" being increased by Rs. 60,878.

Grant-in-aid to the Karachi District Local Board for the
restoration of communications damaged by floods

Owing to heavy river floods and abnormal cyclonic rains in August and September last, serious damage has been done to local board roads, bridges and buildings in the Karachi District. The havoc wrought this season is exceptionally widespread and it will be a very serious situation both for the administration and for the people if the main roads connecting taluka head-quarters are not made passable before the river rises next year. Owing to its very limited resources the District Local Board is unable to meet the charges for restoring the damaged communications. Government have therefore authorised the payment of a grant-in-aid of Rs. 30,000 to the Board for the purpose in anticipation of the sanction of the Legislative Council. As no provision exists in the budget on this account, it is proposed to reappropriate the amount from the Reserve at the disposal of the Finance Department under "47—Miscellaneous—Reserved."

Construction of the Visapur Tank Project

The Visapur Tank Project was started in 1896 as a famine relief work and certain amount of work was done in the famine of 1896-97. It was resumed as a famine work at the end of 1899 and continued as such till 1902. Since 1902, the work has been treated as an ordinary public work and the expenditure is being met from ordinary revenues. The total cost of the project is estimated at Rs. 41,11,085. The expenditure

incurred to end of 1925-26 was Rs. 26,93,961 and the current year's grant is Rs. 2,35,000. The work is primarily protective as it commands one of the worst tracts in the Ahmednagar District, which is particularly liable to famine, and it will, when completed, protect a large area in times of famine. It has, therefore, been decided by Government that the additional amount (Rs. 11,82,124) required for its completion in future should be met wholly from the Famine Insurance Grant. As the work has been dragging on for a very long time and large expenditure has already been incurred in the past, it is desirable for the sake of economy as well as in the interests of the cultivators that it should be completed as soon as possible. As the current year's grant (Rs. 2,35,000) was found inadequate to enable sufficient progress being made on the work, the Executive Engineer asked for an additional allotment of Rs. 1 lakh which Government have decided to meet from "43-B—Transfers to Famine Insurance Fund." As this involves a transfer of funds from non-voted to voted, the sanction of the Legislative Council is necessary to the re-appropriation. As it was not considered desirable to retard progress on the work, the Executive Engineer has been authorised to incur the additional expenditure in anticipation of sanction to the re-appropriation.

Grant-in-aid to the Poona City Municipality for Poona

Drainage Improvement Scheme

In accordance with the sanctioned programme a grant-in-aid of Rs. 2,90,000 was due to be paid by Government to the Poona City Municipality during the current year for expenditure in connection with the Poona Drainage Improvement Scheme. This grant-in-aid is debitable to "33, Public Health." At the time when the budget provisions for the current year were being considered the Sanitary Engineer to

Government reported that the expenditure during 1926-27 was estimated to amount to Rs. 6,50,000. The allotments subsequently sanctioned by Government and placed at the disposal of the Municipality amounted to Rs. 6,60,000 (Rs. 2,65,000 grant-in-aid plus Rs. 3,95,000 loans) and it was considered that further funds would not be required for the work during the current year. No provision for the grant-in-aid of Rs. 2,90,000 due in the current year was accordingly made in the current year's budget. In August 1926 the Sanitary Engineer reported to Government that work in connection with the scheme had been speeded up and that the balance of funds available with him at the end of July 1926 would be insufficient even to carry on the works to the end of August as the monthly expenditure in July alone amounted to about Rs. 90,000. Unless therefore funds were made available there was grave risk of the work coming to a standstill.

As no savings were possible under "33, Public Health" to which the charge is debitable, the amount required for grant-in-aid to the Poona City Municipality, viz., Rs. 2,90,000 was accordingly sanctioned by Government, in anticipation of the sanction of the Legislative Council in September 1926 by re-appropriation from the Finance Department Reserve under "47-Miscellaneous (Transferred)."

Expenditure on famine relief.—Since July 1926 applications have been received by Government for the allotment of fund for famine expenditure for which no provision was made in the current year's budget. As the money was urgently required sums aggregating Rs. 1,15,400 were allotted by Government and the sanction of the Legislative Council is requested to the transfer of the amount from "43-B, Transfers to Famine Insurance Fund," to 43-A, Famine Relief." The details of the expenditure sanctioned by Government are as follows :—

(1) *Storage of kadbi in the Bijapur District.*—Rs. 60,000 kadbi is being stored in the Bijapur District as a reserve against famine. The amount of kadbi stored up to the end of the 1925-26 season was 6,517,608 lbs. Government have sanctioned the purchase of an additional quantity of about 21,900,000 lbs. during the 1926-27 season at a cost of Rs. 1,50,000. Out of this sum Rs. 60,000 were sanctioned for expenditure during the financial year 1926-27 and Rs. 90,000 have been entered in the budget for the year 1927-28.

(2) Compensation to contractors for the cancellation of the contract for the storage of grass at Navapur, Chinchpada and Khandbara—Rs. 50,000.

Under the stress of the severe fodder famine which occurred in 1918-19 the problem of fodder storage was examined by Government, and they mentioned a scheme for the storage of fodder which involved the storage, during famine years intervened, of 5,75 lakhs lbs. of grass at Navapur, Kathar and Godhra as famine reserve for the Northern Division and of Khandbara as against nearly 13½ crores lbs. despatched during the famine supply 1918-19. Navapur was regarded as the area whence the largest quantities of grass could be drawn.

After due consideration the contract for the supply of grass was given to the Bombay and Mofussil Grass Trading Co. for a term of nine years from 1921 at an average rate of about Rs. 12 per 1,000 lbs. It was to be delivered in hydraulic pressed bales and stacked in sheds provided by the Forest Department. The price of Rs. 12 comprised expenditure on cutting, carting, stacking, dryage, wastage, establishment, baling, etc., and contractors' profits, but not the cost of grass as the Company was given the right of cutting and removing it from certain areas of the Government forests. The Company undertook to purchase and provide portable hydraulic presses. The grass storage arrangements were subsequently modified, and in 1924 they were as follows:—

(1) Navapur	200 lakhs lbs.

(1) and (2) were intended for the Deccan, (3) for Ahmedabad and Gujarat, and (4) for Kaira and Broach. The contractors supplied annually 75 lakhs lbs. of grass for storage at (1) and (2).

As no famine has occurred since this scheme was inaugurated, steps were taken in 1924 to dispose of the old stocks. Stocks in the sheds have been accumulating to a quantity beyond that fixed for the various places, and are running the risk of deterioration, unless three years old grass is sold annually to make room for new grass. But great difficulty has been found in finding a market for the Navapur, Khandbara and Chinchpada grass. It is coarse grass, and the Deccan ryots will not take it when *kadbi* is available. Ahmedabad will not take this steamed pressed grass even though grass is the main source of fodder in Gujarat. In the event of actual famine such questions of preference would have to be set aside, as under the pinch of necessity the cultivators would be glad to obtain by any means possible whatever fodder might be available. In the 1918-19 famine Government had to get grass of a quality as inferior as the Navapur grass from such distant places as the forests in the Central

Provinces at prices ranging from Rs. 30 to Rs. 40 per 1,000 lbs. But in normal seasons like the present the disposal of grass is very difficult. The only market in which the quantity of 75 lakhs lbs., which in 1924 was due for disposal after three years storage, could be sold was Bombay. The railway freight from Navapur to Bombay was Rs. 7 per 1,000 lbs. and the loss on the sale of old grass in Bombay was estimated at Rs. 50,000 a year. In the same year (1924), Nawapur grass so in Bijapur at a loss of Rs. 10 per 1,000 lbs. The contract with the Jb and Mofussil Grass Trading Company runs for nine years, and, if it is continued in accordance with the terms of the contract, the loss is very great, while the increased storage will entail additional expense on new sheds for storing the new grass which must be taken over by the contractors, insurance, interest on capital, etc.

It was at first proposed, in order to reduce this loss, to store less grass in West Khandesh, and, as compensation, to give the contractors work elsewhere, *viz.*, Kapadvanj and Bhilad or Dholka, and to increase the storage at Dohad. After various proposals for solving this problem had been considered, it was eventually decided to wind up operations at Navapur, Khandbara and Chinchpada, even if this measure involved the payment of compensation to the contractors. The total quantity of grass which the contractors supplied at Navapur, Chinchpada and Khandbara was 75 lakhs lbs. a year. By determining the agreement the contractors have been deprived of their profits during the remaining four years of their contract. Government sought to make up this quantity of 300 lakhs lbs. to the contractors by enabling them to make up the loss by increased storage at Dohad and Kapadvanj and extending the period of the existing contract at Palghar, Dohad and Godhra. Negotiations on these lines were entered upon with the contractors, but no satisfactory understanding could be reached. Government have accordingly finally decided to compensate the contractors for the termination of their agreement so far as the storage at Navapur, Khandbara and Chinchpada is concerned.

The books of accounts of the Company have been examined by a firm of accountants with a view to ascertaining the profits made by them. The accountants have submitted their report, and the amount of compensation payable is under the consideration of Government. In the meanwhile Government have sanctioned the payment of Rs. 50,000 to the contractors, but the contractors have at the same time been informed that this amount should not be considered as part payment of compensation claimed by them but will be adjusted subsequently after the examination of the books of accounts.

(3) *Measures for the relief of distress in Thar Parkar* .. 5,400

This amount was allotted in order to supplement the grants which have been sanctioned by Government since December 1925 for the relief of distress in the Thar Parkar District, *viz.*, water supply and purchase of grain, cotton seed and *kadbi*.

Acquisition of property for use as a liquor warehouse at Ratnagiri

The building in which the country liquor warehouse is at present located is in a dilapidated condition and the Executive Engineer, Ratnagiri Division, who has inspected it, has declared it to be beyond repair and unsafe for human habitation, as also for storing Government property. The landlady in spite of repeated requests has failed to carry out repairs. As the building was unsafe for occupation, the warehouse officer, who occupied its upper floor, was asked to move elsewhere, the ground floor continuing to be used as a strong room pending other arrangements. It is reported that there is no suitable building or site for building a warehouse except a house opposite the Mamlatdar's office. The owner of the

house was requested to lease it to the Department but is not willing to do so on any reasonable terms. The Commissioner of Excise considered the possibility of shifting the warehouse to some other coastal town but dropped the idea as Ratnagiri is more easily accessible to licensees than other places. He therefore recommended the acquisition of the property under the Land Acquisition Act at an estimated cost of Rs. 10,580 which includes the statutory 15 per cent. compensation for compulsory acquisition. As the matter was urgent, a notification under the Land Acquisition Act has been published in the *Bombay Government Gazette*. Savings to the extent of the amount now required for the above acquisition are available in the provision of Rs. 10,35,453 made in the current year's budget under the head "6, Excise—District Executive Establishment—Pay of Establishment." As the charge is debitable to the head "41, Civil Works—Transferred" an additional grant of Rs. 10,580 is required under this head. The savings indicated under "6, Excise" will not be expended.

Improvement of water supply in the Bhal tract, Ahmedabad District

The question of the improvement of the water supply in the Bhal tract has for some time been under the consideration of Government and for this purpose they sanctioned Rs. 60,000 and Rs. 30,000 in the years 1925-26 and 1926-27." The programme of works to be carried out consists solely of deepening the village tanks. It may be noted that earth works on many of the tanks in the tract have already been carried out, but still some works remain to be finished. The Collector of Ahmedabad therefore requested Government in January last to sanction an additional grant to undertake additional works of the same kind. It was reported that if the earth works of the kind were undertaken it would go a long way to relieve distress as well as to improve the water supply of the tract. Government have therefore placed Rs. 20,000 at the Collector's disposal. The sanction of the Legislative Council is now requested to the voted grant under "43-A-Famine Relief" being increased by Rs. 20,000.

Statement of demands for Supplementary grants

In the current year's budget a provision of Rs. 10,000 was made on account of Travelling Allowances of the Honourable Ministers. Since the expenditure on this account up-to-date amounts to Rs. 15,000, an additional provision of Rs. 6,000 is considered necessary to meet the expenditure up to the end of the financial year. The sanction of the Legislative Council is therefore requested to the grant of Rs. 1,54,000 under "22, General Administration—Transferred" being supplemented to that extent.

TRANSFERRED 18. The Honourable Mr. G. B. PRADHANRegularization of capital expenditure incurred at distilleries
under departmental management

During the years 1924-25 and 1925-26 the capital expenditure on account of the Nasik and Khanapur distilleries was met from the Personal Ledger Accounts of those distilleries. In November 1925 the Accountant General brought to the notice of Government that this procedure was not in accordance with the rules in the Account Code under which charges on capital account are required to be covered by an appropriation sanctioned by a competent authority. Orders were accordingly issued in April and June 1926, in consultation with the Accountant General, debiting the following capital expenditure incurred in 1924-25 and estimated in 1925-26 to the grant for the year 1925-26 under "6, Excise" under which savings were then reported to be available :—

The Accountant General has now brought to the notice of Government that the Director of Commercial Audit who has audited the accounts of the two distilleries has reported that the actual capital expenditure in respect of the two distilleries during the two years has amounted to Rs. 1,17,931 and that owing to large debits amounting to over Rs. 3

lakhs received from the Accountant General, United Provinces, through his exchange account for March 1926 (Final) against the provision for "Cost of Opium supplied to Excise Department" there was no saving under "6, Excise" from which the capital expenditure could be met in 1925-26. He has therefore asked that the orders already issued should be cancelled and that the expenditure should be adjusted by obtaining a Supplementary grant of Rs. 1,17,931 from the Legislative Council for the current year as it is not desirable to regularize it through the appropriation report for 1925-26. A portion of the amount required, viz., Rs. 80,000 has been reappropriated from the provision made in the current year's budget for "Cost of opium supplied to Excise Department" and the sanction of the Legislative Council is requested to an additional grant of Rs. 37,931.

2. The additional expenditure under "6, Excise" for which the supplementary grant is now asked for is due to account adjustment only and does not involve drawal on Provincial Balances. When the original wrong debit to the Personal Ledger Account is reversed, this will set free the full amount that has to be credited to Government as profit from the two distilleries so that what is sanctioned as an additional grant for capital expenditure is available for credit to Government as revenue.

APPENDIX 3

BILL No. XIX OF 1926

A Bill further to amend the Aden Civil and Criminal Justice Act, 1864.

(As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the 23rd December 1926.)

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend the Aden Civil and Criminal Justice Act, 1864, in manner hereinafter appearing; And where-^{II} as the previous sanction of the Governor General required by sub-section ^{1864.} (3) of section 80A of the Government of India Act has been obtained for the passing of this Act; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

1. *Short title.*—This Act may be called the Aden Civil and Criminal Justice (Amendment) Act, 192 .

2. *Amendment of section 1 of Act II of 1864.*—In section 1 of the Aden ^{II} Civil and Criminal Justice Act, 1864, hereinafter referred to as the said ^{1864.} Act, the words " words importing the singular number include the plural number, and words importing the plural number include the singular number; words importing the masculine gender include females " shall be repealed.

3. *Amendment of section 5 of Act II of 1864.*—In section 5 of the said Act for the words " Code of Civil Procedure " the words and figures " Code of Civil Procedure, 1908 " shall be substituted.

4. *Substitution of a new section for section 11 of Act II of 1864.*—For section 11 of the said Act, the following shall be substituted, namely:—

" 11. *Parties may appear and be heard in person or by pleader.*—The parties to any suit or proceeding or the accused in any criminal case or proceeding in the Court of the Resident and other Civil and Criminal Courts or in the High Court may appear and be heard in person or by an advocate, pleader or attorney."

(2) Subject to the provisions of this Act the Judicial Assistant shall exercise the same civil jurisdiction as is conferred by this Act on the Resident and the provisions of sections 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 12, 14, 15 and 16 of this Act shall apply to him in the same way and to the same extent as they do to the Resident.

(3) The Judicial Assistant shall try such cases and hear such appeals and dispose of such applications for revision as the Resident may by general or special order refer to him for disposal.

(4) No appeal shall lie under section 5 from any decision or order of the Judicial Assistant."

6. *Amendment of section 14 of Act II of 1864.*—In section 14 of the said Act,

(a) For the words, figures and brackets—

(3) Except as otherwise provided by such definition, the jurisdiction and powers of such persons shall extend throughout such district."

18C. *Rules for the guidance of Benches of Magistrates.*—The Governor in Council may, or subject to the control of the Governor in Council, the Resident may from time to time make rules consistent with the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898, for the guidance of Magistrates' Benches V of 1898. respecting the following subjects :—

- (a) the classes of cases to be tried ;
- (b) the times and places of sitting ;
- (c) the constitution of the Bench for conducting trials ;
- (d) the mode of settling differences of opinion which may arise between the Magistrates in session. '

18D. *Powers may be withdrawn.*—The Governor in Council may withdraw all or any of the powers conferred on any person under the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898.

18E. *Sentences, etc., passed prior to this Act.*—In all cases in which, prior to the commencement of this Act, all or any of the powers conferable by the Governor in Council under sections 18, 18A and 18B of this Act have been exercised by any person duly authorized by the Governor in Council to exercise such powers, the powers shall be deemed to have been conferred on such person under this Act from the date on which such person began to exercise such powers and all notifications published, powers conferred, local limits defined, orders and appointments made, sentences passed and acts done shall be deemed to have been respectively published, conferred, defined, made, passed and done under this Act. V of 1898.

10. *Amendment of section 20 of Act II of 1864.*—In sections 20, 23 and 27 of the said Act, for the words " Code of Criminal Procedure " the words and figures " Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898 " shall be substituted. V of 1898.

11. *Amendment of section 22A of Act II of 1864.*—In section 22A of the said Act,—

(a) in sub-section (2) for the words " provisions of this Act regarding criminal procedure " the words " provisions of sections 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28 and 29 of this Act regarding criminal procedure " shall be substituted ;

(b) for sub-section (4) the following shall be substituted, namely :—
" (4) No appeal shall lie under section 19 from any decision, sentence or order of an Assistant Resident when exercising the powers of a Court of Session.

(5) The powers of the Resident under section 19 of the Act shall not be exercisable by an Assistant Resident when exercising the powers of a Court of Session : Provided that when such Assistant Resident is the Judicial Assistant to the Resident, Aden, he shall have and may exercise all the powers of the Resident under the said section in respect of any case which may be transferred to him by or under any general or special order of the Resident. ”

12. *Amendment of section 31 of Act II of 1864.*—In section 31 of the said Act, (a) for the words “ Court of the Additional Sessions Judge ”, wherever they occur, the words “ Courts of the Additional Sessions Judge and District Magistrates and of Subordinate, Special and Bench Magistrates appointed under sections 18, 18A and 18B ” shall be substituted; and (b) before the words “ and also ” the words “ for the admission of proper persons to be advocates, pleaders and attorneys in the Court of the Resident and in the other Civil and Criminal Courts and for the removal or suspension from practice for misbehaviour of any person so admitted and for prescribing the holidays and vacations of the said Courts ” shall be inserted.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS

The administration of civil justice at Aden is vested under section 2 of Act II of 1864 in the Court of the Resident, who may hear and determine all cases of a civil nature. Assistant Residents may, under section 4, try and determine all cases instituted in the Court of the Resident and which are referred to them for disposal. In all important cases an appeal from the decision of an Assistant Resident lies to the Resident ; but there is no appeal from the decision of the Resident, whether acting as a Court of original jurisdiction, or as a Court of appeal, or of revision.

Section 8, however, provides that in cases in which the claim does not exceed Rs. 1,000 the Resident may either of his own motion, or on the application of the parties, refer any question of law, of usage having the force of law, or of interpretation to the High Court. When the value of the claim exceeds Rs. 1,000 the Resident may, but must on the application of any of the parties to the suits, refer any question of fact, of law, of usage, or of interpretation, to the High Court. These references are heard by a Bench of the High Court and the suits are disposed of by the Resident in conformity with the High Court's decision.

The Act providing for the administration of civil and criminal justice was passed in 1864, and Aden has since grown into an important commercial centre, with a population, if its dependencies are included, of 56,000. Many of its citizens have valuable trade connections with India and other parts of the world. Litigation has consequently increased and the cases now coming for trial in Aden Courts often involve intricate questions of law. The Resident's administrative work has also increased with the rapid development of the Settlement ; and it is no longer possible for him adequately to discharge the judicial duties which are imposed on him by the Act of 1864.

The proposal contained in the amending Bill is to preserve the Resident's jurisdiction, as it is at present, but to afford him relief from his judicial duties by taking power to appoint a Judicial Assistant to the Resident, who will be able to exercise in any case, or class of cases, referred to him, all the powers now exercised by the Resident. The intention is to appoint an experienced judicial officer to the post of Judicial Assistant, who will in future relieve the Resident of the whole, or at least, of the greater part of his civil judicial work whether original, revisional or appellate. The Judicial Assistant will exercise powers similar to those of a Joint Judge under the Bombay Civil Courts Act (XIV of 1869) and will ordinarily be the Court of Appeal in civil cases, and will also have the power of making references to the High Court at Bombay under section 8 of the Act.

On the Criminal Side section 22A, which is an amendment effected by Act V of 1918 already makes provision for the appointment of one of the Assistant Residents as an Additional Sessions Judge; and it is intended that these powers also should in future be vested in the Judicial Assistant who, if the amendment now proposed is effected, will then be empowered to dispose of all the criminal work which is now done by the Resident and the 1st Assistant Resident.

Provision has also been made for the creation of a Bar in the Aden Courts, for the enrolment of advocates, pleaders and attorneys and for their appearance on behalf of parties in all civil and criminal proceedings in the Courts in Aden.

The Act contains no provision for the appointment of District Honorary, Special and Bench Magistrates. Appointments of Honorary, Special and Bench Magistrates have sometimes been made in the past; but Government have since been advised that these appointments were of doubtful legality. Advantage is being taken of this amending Bill to provide for such appointments being made in the future and also to legalize all acts and orders done and made in the past by such Magistrates.

Some of the references in the Act which are now antiquated are also being modernized.

2. *Amendment of section 2 of Bom. II of 1918.*—In clause (a) of sub-section (1) of section 2 of the Bombay Rent (War Restrictions) Act, 1918, hereinafter called "the said Act",—

4. *Amendments made by section 2 to have retrospective effect.*—The amendments made by section 2 shall be deemed to have been made and to have had effect from the 1st day of January 1926.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS

The Bombay Rent (War Restrictions) Act, 1918 (Bom. II of 1918), and the Bombay Rent (War Restrictions, No 2) Act, 1918 (Bom. VII of 1918), apply in respect of all premises used wholly or principally as dwelling houses, *vide* section 1 (4) of Bom. II of 1918 and section 1 (2) of Bom. VII of 1918. The Acts as originally passed applied to all such premises irrespective of the nature of their occupation. In amending section 2 (1) (a) of Bombay Act II of 1918 in 1925, no express definition was, however, inserted of standard rent in relation to any premises which were first let after the 10th day of April 1918. Doubt has been expressed that in the absence of such a provision section 2 of the Act does not apply to such premises. The object of this Bill is, therefore, to make good this omission so as to make it clear that the provisions of Bombay Acts II and VII of 1918 apply to premises that were first let after the 10th April 1918 also. As this was the intention of the legislature from the beginning, the Bill provides for retrospective operation of the amendments referred to in clause 2.

BILL No. VI OF 1927

A Bill further to amend the Bombay City Municipalities Act, 1925

(As published in the "Bombay Government Gazette" of the 14th February 1927.)

WHEREAS the term of office of certain municipalities to which the Bom. Bombay City Municipalities Act, 1925, applies has expired and no fresh ^{XVI of 1925.} elections have been held for the constitution of the municipalities in accordance with the provisions of the said Act ;

And whereas it is expedient to remove certain doubts which have been expressed as to the legality of any further extension under the said Act of the term of office of such municipalities and to validate the acts and proceedings of such municipalities done or purporting to have been done in good faith after the expiry of their term of office ;

And whereas it is expedient to amend the said Act in manner hereinafter appearing ;

And whereas the previous sanction of the Governor General required by ^{5 & 6} section 80A (3) of the Government of India Act has been obtained for the ^{Geo. V, c. 61.} passing of this Act ;

It is hereby enacted as follows :—

1. *Short title.*—This Act may be called the Bombay City Municipalities (Amendment) Act, 1927 .

2. *Amendment of section 4 of Bom. XVIII of 1925.*—To section 4 ^{Bom. XVIII of 1925.} of the Bombay City Municipalities Act, 1925, hereinafter called the said Act, the following sub-section shall be added, namely :—

“(4) *Property and rights of municipalities which have ceased to exist to vest in Government.*—Save where it is otherwise provided in this Act, when a municipality ceases to exist on account of its members ceasing to hold office, or for any other reason whatsoever, the property and rights vested in the municipality shall, subject to all charges and liabilities affecting the same vest in His Majesty, and the proceeds thereof, if any, shall be expended under the orders of the Government for the benefit of the local area in which such municipality had jurisdiction.”

3. *Amendment of section 24 of Bom. XVIII of 1925.*—To subsection (1) of section 24 of the said Act the following proviso shall be added, namely :—

Provided that,—

(a) Government may, by a notification in the *Bombay Government Gazette* and subject to the other provisions of this Act, extend the term of office of any municipality for a period up to a date not later than the thirty-first day of December 1927 ;

(b) any notification issued under proviso (a) after the expiry of the term of office of any municipality constituted under the Bombay District Municipal Act, 1901, and before the thirty-first day of May 1927 shall be deemed to have been issued and to have had effect as from the date of expiry of the term of office of such municipality; and any appointment, notification, notice, tax, order, scheme, license, permission, rule, bye-law or form made, issued or imposed under the Bombay District Municipal Act, 1901, by any such municipality so far as is not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act shall be deemed to be valid and to have been made, issued or imposed under this Act and shall continue in force unless and until it is superseded by any appointment, notification, notice, tax, order, scheme, license, permission, rule, bye-law or form made, issued or imposed under this Act.

4. *New section 24A.*—After section 24 of the said Act the following section shall be inserted, namely :—

“24A. *Validation of acts of expired municipalities.*—(1) Any municipality of a municipal borough included in Schedule I which has not been constituted in accordance with the provisions of this Act and the rules made thereunder shall, save where it is otherwise provided in this Act, be deemed not to have been duly constituted and its members, both elected and nominated, shall be deemed not to have been duly elected and nominated.”

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS

Under section 17 of the Bombay District Municipal Act, 1901, the normal period of a Municipality constituted under that Act is three years. Under section 24 of the Bombay City Municipalities Act, 1925, Councillors elected or nominated under the Bombay District Municipal Act, 1901, and deemed to have been elected or nominated under sub-section (3) of section 9 of the first-mentioned Act continue to hold office for the term for which they were originally elected or nominated under the Act of 1901. When this provision was inserted in the Act of 1925 it was expected that the time given to the newly constituted borough municipalities would be sufficient to enable them to digest the provisions of the new Act and to frame rules for the holding of new elections. Unfortunately this expectation has not been realized in the case of some Municipalities which have not been able to frame proper rules within the time allowed. In other cases elections purporting to be held under the new Act had to be declared invalid. In some cases, the term of office of the Municipalities has expired without fresh elections having been made under the new Act. To avoid further complications it is proposed to take the power of extending beyond the period prescribed by section 24 of the new Act and up to a date not later than the 31st December 1927 the life of an expiring Municipality and of a Municipality whose term has expired, validating all acts and proceedings done by the latter Municipality as from the date of expiry of its original term of office. Councillors of Municipalities the term of office of which

has expired, and who have not been duly elected in accordance with the provisions of the new Act, will vacate their offices.

2. The Act makes no provision for the disposal of the property of a Municipality in a Municipal Borough after the Municipality has ceased to function. Such provision appears necessary. Clause 2 of the Bill makes the necessary provision.

APPENDIX 7

BILL No. XIX OF 1926

(A Bill further to amend the Aden Civil and Criminal Justice Act, 1864)

REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE

We, the undersigned members of the Committee appointed to consider Bill No. XIX of 1926, a Bill further to amend the Aden Civil and Criminal Justice Act, 1864, have the honour to submit the following report :

2. We have carefully considered the Bill and have made several important changes in it.

3. We have extended the provisions of paragraph 1 of Section 8 of the Act to appeals.

4. We have after careful consideration and full discussion decided that the provision made in clause 10 of the Bill for the appointment of special Magistrates and Benches of Magistrates should be retained.

5. We have included in a single section all provisions relating to appeals against decisions of Magistrates of all classes. The necessary changes have been made in clause 11.

6. We are of opinion that in criminal matters appeals should be allowed to the High Court against judgments or orders of the Resident or his Judicial Assistant except in cases in which the punishment awarded is imprisonment for less than six months or fine not exceeding Rs. 500. We have made the necessary provision in clauses 13 and 14 of the Bill.

7. We have added two new sections (32 and 33) to the Act giving the Resident power to frame rules for petition-writers in the Aden Courts and for prescribing and regulating the levy of process fees.

8. We recommend that this report together with the minute of dissent and the Bill as amended be published in English. We do not think it necessary that they should be translated into any of the vernaculars.

While in general agreement with the spirit in which the Bill is handled by the Committee, I cannot, without a cut on my conscience, agree to the creation of the institution of the Honorary Magistracy.

Only arguments advanced in its favour are two in number : (1) It is already in existence in India, (2) It gives occasion to those who have a desire for public service.

The first reason advanced is the one on which I rest my case against the creation. Honorary Magistracy particularly in districts, while it has in very rare cases given any real aid to justice, it has been an influence that has been found to be demoralizing. It has been, and is being used, as a sop and a bait, that has diverted many from paths of duty. Let us have no more repetition of the wrong in Aden.

If it is really the intention to afford opportunities for public service, then, there are a thousand and one ways in which the same can be afforded. This is not one of them.

I believe the institution is sufficiently found out, is vicious in its influence, and as such, should not be countenanced by the House.

I do not as well subscribe to the perpetuation of the executive control over the judicial, particularly, when we can very conveniently and without any additional expenditure, separate the two functions. The only argument of the peculiarity of the position of Aden, I believe, cannot hold good. British Government is sufficiently settled in Aden to dispense with any extra precautionary measures that are admittedly antiquated. I disagree with the designation of the Judicial Assistant, therefore, and would also wish that some provision ought to be made in the Bill, that, the Political Agents from Kathiawar and Gujarat, who are often appointed as Assistant Resident at Aden, and who may be said to be officers with judicial experience in technical sense of the term, though they are, as a matter of fact, generally innocent of the principles of law, cannot be thrust upon Aden as their Chief Judicial Officers.

6. 7. *Amendment of section 14 of Act II of 1864.*—In section 14 of the said Act,

8. 9. *Substitution of a new section for section 18 of Act II of 1864.*—For section 18 of the said Act, the following shall be substituted, namely :—

“18. (1) *District and Subordinate Magistrates.*—The Governor of Bombay in Council may invest any Assistant Resident with the powers of a District Magistrate, or may invest any Assistant Resident or any other person with the powers of a Magistrate of the first, second or third class, as described in the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898, and such Assistant Resident or such other person so invested shall exercise such powers subject to the provisions of this Act.

(2) The Governor in Council may from time to time define the local area within which any Assistant Resident or any person invested with the powers of a Magistrate as aforesaid may exercise all or any of the powers with which they may respectively be invested under the said Code.

(3) Except as otherwise provided by such definition, the jurisdiction and powers of such persons shall extend throughout such district.”

9. 10. *New sections 18A, 18B, 18C, 18D and 18E.*—After section 18 of the said Act, the following sections shall be inserted, namely :—

V of 1898.

“18A. *Special Magistrates.*—The Governor in Council may confer on any person all or any of the powers conferred or conferrable by or under the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898, on a Magistrate of the first, second or third class in respect to particular cases or to a particular class or particular classes of cases, or in regard to cases generally in any local area.

Such Magistrates shall be called Special Magistrates, and shall be appointed for such term as the Governor in Council may by general or special order direct.

18B. *Benches of Magistrates.*—The Governor in Council may direct any two or more Magistrates to sit together as a Bench, and may by order invest such Bench with any of the powers conferred or conferrable by or under the said Code on a Magistrate of the first, second or third class, and direct it to exercise such powers in such cases, or such classes of cases only, and within such local limits, as the Governor in Council thinks fit.

V of 1898.

Except as otherwise provided by any order under this section, every such Bench shall have the powers conferred by the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898, on a Magistrate of the highest class to which any of its members who is present taking part in the proceedings as a member of the Bench, belongs, and as far as practicable shall, for the purposes of the said Code, be deemed to be a Magistrate of such class.

18C. *Rules for the guidance of Benches of Magistrates.*—The Governor in Council may, or subject to the control of the Governor in Council, the Resident may from time to time make rules consistent with the

Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898, for the guidance of Magistrates' Benches respecting the following subjects:—

- (a) the classes of cases to be tried ;
- (b) the times and places of sitting ;
- (c) the constitution of the Bench for conducting trials ;
- (d) the mode of settling differences of opinion which may arise between the Magistrates in session .”

18D. *Powers may be withdrawn.*—The Governor in Council may withdraw all or any of the powers conferred on any person under the V of 1898. Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898.

18E. *Sentences, etc., passed prior to this Act.*—In all cases in which prior to the commencement of this Act, all or any of the powers conferable by the Governor in Council under sections 18, 18A and 18B of this Act have been exercised by any person duly authorized by the Governor in Council to exercise such powers, the powers shall be deemed to have been conferred on such person under this Act from the date on which such person began to exercise such powers and all notifications published, powers conferred, local limits defined, orders and appointments made, sentences passed and acts done shall be deemed to have been respectively published, conferred, defined, made, passed and done under this Act. ”

11. *For section 19 of the said Act, the following shall be substituted, namely:—*

“ 19. *Substitution of a new section for section 19 of Act II of 1864.*—

(1) *An appeal shall lie to the Resident from the judgment or order of a District Magistrate or a First Class Magistrate, except in cases in which the punishment awarded is imprisonment for a period of not more than six months with or without fine or a fine not more than five hundred rupees.*

(2) *Appeal and Revision.*—An appeal from a judgment or order of any magistrate of the second or third class, where such appeal is allowed by the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898, shall lie to the Resident.

(3) *The Resident may, in all cases within the period allowed for appeal in appealable cases, call for any proceedings whatever of any magistrates at any stage thereof and may pass such order thereon as he may think fit.”*

(4) An appeal shall lie to the High Court of Bombay against the judgment or order of the Resident or Additional Sessions Judge, where such an appeal is allowed by the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898. Provided that there shall be no appeal by a person who has been sentenced at one trial to an aggregate period of imprisonment not exceeding six months with or without fine, or to a fine not exceeding Rs. 500.

(5) The powers of the Resident under section 19 of the Act shall not be exercisable by an Assistant Resident when exercising the powers of a Court of Session : Provided that when such Assistant Resident is the Judicial Assistant to the Resident, Aden, he shall have and may exercise all the powers of the Resident under the said section in respect of any case which may be transferred to him by or under any general or special order of the Resident. ”

14. Substitution of a new section for section 29 of Act II of 1864.—For section 29 of the said Act the following section shall be substituted, namely :—

(1) No appeal shall lie from a judgment or order of a criminal court except as provided in this Act.

v of 1898. (2) No appeal against an acquittal shall lie except as provided in the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898.

(3) Appeal when allowed, Power to reserve point for High Court.—It shall be at the discretion of the Resident to reserve for the opinion of the High Court any point of law, arising in the course of any criminal proceedings whatever pending before him.

12. 15. Amendment of section 31 of Act II of 1864.—In section 31 of the said Act, (a) for the words “ Court of the Additional Sessions Judge ”, wherever they occur, the words “ Courts of the Additional Sessions Judge and District Magistrates and of Subordinate, Special and Bench Magistrates appointed under sections 18, 18A and 18D ” shall be substituted ; and (b) before the words “ and also ” the words “ for the admission of proper persons to be advocates, pleaders and attorneys in the Court of the Resident and in the other Civil and Criminal Courts and for the removal or suspension from practice for misbehaviour of any person so admitted and for prescribing the holidays and vacations of the said Courts ” shall be inserted.

16. New sections 32 and 33 of Act II of 1864.—After section 31 of the said Act the following sections shall be inserted of namely :—

“ 32. Power to make rules.—(1) The Resident may, from time to time, with the sanction of the Governor in Council, make rules consistent with this Act,—

(a) declaring what persons shall be permitted to act as petition writers in the Courts subordinate to him ;

(b) *regulating the issue of licenses to such persons, the conduct of business by them, and the scale of fees to be charged by them ;*

(c) *providing a penalty of fine not exceeding Rs. 50 for the breach of any of the rules so made and determining the authority by which such breaches of the rules shall be investigated and the penalties imposed.*

(2) *Every fine imposed under clause (c) of sub-section (1) shall be recoverable as if it were a fine imposed by a magistrate in the exercise of his ordinary jurisdiction.*

“ 33. *Process fees.—The Resident may, from time to time, with the sanction of the Governor in Council, prescribe and regulate the fees to be taken for any process issued by any Court the constitution of which is declared by this Act, or by any officer of such Court.*

Tables of fees so prescribed shall be published in the Government Gazette.”

STATEMENT OF DEMANDS FOR SUPPLEMENTARY GRANTS

In the current year's budget the following provisions have been made under the head 21, Appropriation for Reduction or Avoidance of Debt :—

- (1) 5,88,000 Annual charges in respect of the Sinking Fund of the Bombay Development Loan of 1920.
- (2) 4,02,000 Amount equal to the portion of principal included in the annual equated instalments for the repayment of loans drawn from the Provincial Loans Fund for "other irrigation purposes" and "other unproductive purposes."
- (3) 3,62,000 Amount equal to the assignment from the Government of India in refund of customs duty paid on the stores imported for works which are financed from loans.

All these items have been treated as non-voted under section 72-D (3) (ii) of the Government of India Act. But it has since been found that item (3) does not represent payment into regularly constituted sinking funds as it is utilised in reducing fresh borrowings required for capital works. The provision cannot therefore be removed from the vote of the Legislature under the section mentioned above. It has therefore been decided to treat the provision as voted with effect from the current year.

The revised estimate for the item (3) now comes to Rs. 2,75,000 in lieu of Rs. 362,000 taken in the budget and it has been treated as "voted". Approval of the Legislative Council is required for this expenditure.

RESERVED 20. The Honourable Mr. J. E. B. HOTTSON*24. Administration of Justice*

The latest revised estimate under the head "24, Administration of Justice" is Rs. 64,29,000 (voted) against the estimate of Rs. 64,00,525 voted by the Legislative Council, showing an excess of Rs. 28,475. A contribution of Rs. 15,000 is expected from the Government of India on account of work done by Provincial Law Officers on behalf of the Central Government, the credit for which will be taken by deduction of charges. But for this deduction the excess in expenditure would have gone up to Rs. 43,475. The excess is mainly under the minor heads "Law Officers" and "Civil and Sessions Courts". The increase under the former head is due to the heavy expenditure incurred for the

payment of fees of Special Counsel during the first nine months and that under the latter is mainly due to changes in the personal. These increases have been partially counterbalanced by decrease under other minor heads. A supplementary grant of Rs. 28,475 is necessary to cover the excess over the *net* grant.

APPENDIX 10

DISCUSSION OF MATTERS OF GENERAL PUBLIC INTEREST*

Resolutions by Rao Bahadur R. R. Kale, M.L.C.

DISCUSSION OF MATTERS OF GENERAL PUBLIC INTEREST

Resolutions by Sardar G. N. Mujumdar, M.L.C.

1. "This Council recommends to Government that Resolutions, Orders, Notifications and Circulars, regarding alienated lands and villages, Vatandars and Saranjamdars, issued and to be issued by Government and their officers, be immediately issued to all the Inamdars, Saranjamdars and Vatandars in the Bombay Presidency before giving effect to them."

2. "This Council recommends to Government that copies of original Sanads issued by the British Government be issued instead of extracts of the Land or Cash Alienation Registers to applicants."

3. "This Council recommends to Government not to recognise the adoption by a Vatandar, holding a Sanad under the Gordon Settlement, of a person who is not a member of the Vatan family, without the unanimous consent of all the sharers of the Vatan and the consequent consent of Government."

Resolutions by Mr. P. R. Chikodi, M.L.C.

1. "This Council recommends to Government that the orders recently issued for giving Head Masters' and 1st Assistants' allowances be withdrawn and, instead, the scales of pay contained in the Sathé-Paranjpye Scheme be sanctioned at a very early date as recommended by the last Council in 1926."

2. "This Council recommends to Government to suspend the collection of land revenue this year in the talukas of Athani, Gokak, Parasagad with Muragod Mahal, portions of the talukas of Hukeri and Chikodi in the Belgaum District in view of the widespread failure of crops and the consequent prevalence of famine conditions therein."

Resolution by Rao Bahadur S. N. Angadi, M.L.C.
