INTRODUCTION

I regret the delay in publishing the Census Statistics of 1941. It was unavoidable. After the statements had been set in type to a size approved by Government it was discovered that due to war, paper of the special dimension was not available in the market and so the printing was withheld. When paper of the required size came to market the work was done *de novo* and printed.

The Statistics have been tabulated in sixteen forms as desired by the Census Commissioner, Government of India. It is customary for all provinces and states to conform to the all-India pattern and so the tables are called 'Imperial' tables in contrast to 'State' tables, which are seven in number. The former afford easy comparison with relative statistics of other Provinces and States. The State Tables are more detailed and informative. To each of the Imperial tables are added several subsidiary statements so that consultants may have little difficulty in studying such data as they may be in need of.

While referring to the statistics, the notes appended to each Imperial Table may be consulted. They give useful information such as cannot be had elsewhere in the volume. Formation of new taluqs and a new District changes in administrative jurisdiction of some taluqs or parts thereof, expansion of city and town boundaries by the inclusion of villages in close proximity, changes in the classification of occupation, constitution of communities, etc., are all succinctly explained in the notes. Several improvements have also been made in the presentation of subsidiary statistics.

I have also compiled in a more comprehensive style the districtwise village lists. The villages in a district are arranged alphabetically, and in addition to useful statistics against each unit, a taluqa map for reference is attached. Copies of these can be had from my office.

I record my appreciation of hard work done by my assistant Mr. Mohammad Ali, B.A., Mr. Fida Husain, B.A., Branch Superintendent and Mr. T. Brahmiah of my office in compilation of this volume and in correcting the proofs.
