The current year's budget estimates of Provincial revenue and expenditure embodied in the Revised Financial Statement for 1915-16, as modified by the memorandum issued from the Financial Department on 12th March 1915, have been finally accepted by the Government of India without any modification. The figures given in Appendices C and D of the Revised Financial Statement have been brought up to date and statements (marked B and C) containing the revised figures are appended to this memorandum.

2. The details of the land-revenue demand, collections, remissions, suspensions and arrears for the years 1914-15 and 1915-16 given in paragraph 10 of the Revised Financial Statement for 1915-16 have undergone some changes in view of later information supplied by district officers. The grants of 10 and more in each case for major works in progress will be spent chiefly on—

- (i) Central Offices, Poona (1,00), distillery at Khánápur (50), buildings at Nawábsháh (45), Collector's bungalow at Belgaum (20), Mámlatdárs' kacheris at Mángaon (20) and Honávar (15), and Electric Installation at Government House, Mahábaleshvar (17);
- (ii) Hostel for the Northcote High School at Sholápur (39), New High School at Násik (30), and Agricultural College, Poona (10);
- (iii) New Small Causes Court, Bombay (2,00), Subordinate Civil Court at Mirpurkhás (23), and District Judge's bungalow at Bijápur (12);

- (iv) Jail at Hindalgi (50);
- (v) Police buildings at Mirpurkhás (17), quarters for four European police officers in the compound of the Esplanade Police Court, Bombay (29), additions and alterations to the office of the District Superintendent of Police, Poona (17), police lines at Matiari (18), Bándra (15), Jherruck (11), and Mándvi (10), head-quarter police lines at Thána (15) and Sholápur (10), and additions and alterations to the head-quarter police lines at Bijápur (10);
- (vi) King Edward Memorial Hospital, Sholapur, (1,00), additions and alterations to the old Government House, Parel, to render it suitable for accommodating the Bacteriological Laboratory (60), school for the training of midwives and nurses of the Victoria Jubilee Dispensary, Ahmedabad (16), and Out-patient Department at the Civil Hospital, Ratnágiri (15);
- (vii) Buildings for the new Public Works Department district at Alibág (10);
- (viii) Bridging the Poona-Sholápur road between Diksal and Indápur (50), and bridges at Mahuli (30), and over Parit Nalla in the Poona district (14), roads from Savalvihir to Bharvas (48), from Lákh Station to Karegaon and thence to Belpimpalgaon (38), from Deogaon to Bharvas (30), from Deoláli to Belápur (30), from Bhátkal to Mysore Frontier (25), from Pimpalner to Shelbari (17), and from Vihigaon to Khodala (12), improvements to Sholápur-Akalkot road (35), improvements to the Khándesh-Nizám Frontier road (67), widening the Bombay-Agra road between Thána and Kurla (20), bridging nallas on Mahád-Nágothna road (20), improving and metalling the Malhárpeth-Pandharpur road (10), causeways at Khánápur (20), and over the Tápti near Bhusával on the Bhusával-Yával road (25), and surfacing the road from Indápur to Sarate (10); and
  - (ix) Kennedy Sea Face Improvement, Bombay (1,54), and Visápur tank (50).

Among the new major works the most important are—

- (i) Resumption of properties on Malabar Hill (1,00), acquisition of bungalows Nos. 16 and 20, Queen's Gardens, Poona (67); re-roofing His Excellency the Governor's bungalow at Malabar Point (17), purchase of a house at Karwar for the accommodation of certain Government officers (10);
- (ii) District Court at Larkana (25);
- (iii) Railway police lines at Dádar (50), and police lines in Sind Mehar (15), Khar (15) and Miro-Khán (10);
- (iv) Acquisition of land for the extension of the Civil Hospital, Ahmedabad (33);
- (v) Bridge over the Darna at Chehedi (23); and
- (vi) Working the boring plant for the Sanitary Engineer (60).

NOTE 2.—Column 5 represents the minimum expenditure on account of items. (like temporary establishments, plague allowance, contingencies, and supplies and services) for which provision has to be made every year, but of which the amount varies from year to year. The lowest figure in the "Budget Estimates, 1915-16," "Revised Estimates, 1914-15," "Budget Estimates, 1914-15," and "Accounts, 1913-14," has generally been taken as the minimum recurring charge for each item, and the total of all such items is entered under column 5 against the major head concerned. The difference between the total budget provision for such items and the minimum recurring charge entered in column 5 is taken as non-recurring, and this, together with the provision for purely temporary objects, has been classed as non-recurring and entered in column 7. This method is adopted in the case of all major heads, except 29, Superannuation Allowances and Pensions, 36, Reduction or Avoidance of Debt, 42, Irrigation-Major Works, 43, Irrigation-Minor Works (Public Works Department), and 45, Civil Works (Public Works Department). In the case of 29, Superannuation Allowances and Pensions, the provisions for gratuities and refunds are classed as fluctuating recurring, while all other items are treated as permanent recurring. The whole provision under 36, Reduction or Avoidance of Debt is treated as nonrecurring, while that under 42, Irrigation—Major Works—Interest on Debt is classed as permanent recurring. Under the heads 42, Irrigation—Major Works— Working Expenses, and 43, Irrigation-Minor Works (Public Works Department), the provision on account of ordinary repairs, establishments, and tools and plant is classed as permanent recurring, the provision for special repairs and the minimum provision considered absolutely necessary for works in progress, new works, discretionary grants and reserve is classed as fluctuating recurring, and the balance is classed as non-recurring. Under the head 45, Civil Works (Public Works Department), the provision on account of repairs, establishments, and tools and plant is classed as permanent recurring, the minimum provision considered absolutely necessary for works in progress, new works, discretionary grants and reserve is classed as fluctuating recurring, and the balance is classed as non-recurring.
