# FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

## MEMORANDUM PRESENTING THE BUDGET FOR 1920-21.

With reference to No. 29 (1) of the rules for the discussion of the annual Financial Statement, I present the Budget of the Presidency for 1920-21 as finally sanctioned by the Government of India.

The preliminary estimates of Provincial revenue and expenditure embodied in the Revised Financial Statement for 1920-21 as modified by the memorandum issued from the Financial Department on 12th March 1920 have been finally accepted by the Government of India without any modifications. The Chief Secretary's memorandum which was printed as Part III of the Revised Financial Statement has been brought up to date and forms Part II of the budget statement. The figures in appendices A and B have also been brought up to date.

The budget proposals were explained on presentation of the Revised Financial Statement in March last and as there has been no alteration in the figures, the only important matter that need be referred to now is as regards the revision of the pay of establishments, how the revision proposals stand and how their introduction will affect the budget for 1920-21. In March last it was stated that the provision of 20 lakhs under the Land Revenue head and of 27 lakhs under specific heads for revision of the pay of establishments might be found insufficient. Practically all the establishment proposals either have been sanctioned or are undergoing examination preparatory to sanction and it is possible now to calculate more closely what the total requirements will be. The estimate, including other emergent requirements not foreseen at the time of the budget, exceeds the total provision of 47 lakhs mentioned above by another 47 lakhs. To meet this essential expenditure, it will be necessary, in view of the already large draft on provincial balances which the budget proposals involve, to postpone expenditure on other less urgent proposals which are included in the budget. A close scrutiny is being made to ascertain what reductions can be made without grave inconvenience.

# PART II.

# Memorandum explanatory of the figures under each Major Revenue head and under each Major Expenditure head of account.

#### Introductory.

1. The conditions of Provincial finance are determined by the terms of an administrative arrangement subsisting between the Government of India and the Local Government and known as the Provincial Settlement. The revenue and expenditure of the province as classified in the public accounts are divided between the two Governments in accordance with the terms of this settlement.

With effect from the 1st April 1911 this Provincial Settlement, which had hitherto been subject to change, was made permanent subject to the following conditions :---

(1) It shall not be subject to revision in the future, except by way of commuting fixed assignments into growing revenue;

(2) in case of serious famine the question of assistance from Imperial revenues will be duly considered by the Government of India;

(3) in special cases where the Local Government are unable to meet their requirements from their current revenues or by drawing on their balances, they should take the necessary amount as a short interest-bearing loan from the Government of India repayable in suitable instalments; and

(4) the Government of India reserve the right to call for assistance from Provincial revenues in case of serious enhancement in their own finances.

At the same time Excise and Forest revenue and expenditure, which had hitherto been divided, were made wholly Provincial.

2. The present statement does not deal with the heads which are wholly Imperial. The following table shows the several heads of revenue and expenditure which are divided between Imperial and Provincial :---

#### Revenue.

4. Ordinary Revenue.—The budget estimate for last year postulated normal conditions. The revised estimate anticipated a good harvest and the budget for 1920-21 took into account the suspended arrears and allowed for additional collections on the basis of experience in other post-famine years. The figures of the estimated demand, collections, remissions and suspensions of ordinary revenue for the years 1919 20 and 1920 21 are given helew. of ordinary revenue for the years 1919-20 and 1920-21 are given below :-----

#### Expenditure.

5. Charges of District Administration.—The increase in the revised estimate is caused mainly by larger expenditure on service postage, telegrams and other contingencies and works in connection with the development of Salsette. The increase in the budget for 1920-21 as compared with the budget for 1919-20 is due chiefly to the provisions made for the following items:—

Item (a) needs little explanation but it may be noted that provision is made under *specific* heads in respect of schemes of revision which were under the consideration of Government at the time of framing the first edition of the budget, and a lump sum of 20,00 is shown under this head for other schemes.

Item (b).—It is proposed to establish a Directorate of Development with large powers to undertake schemes for the development of "Greater Bombay" and to co-ordinate the work of local authorities and public bodies. Pending issue of orders regarding the constitution of the proposed directorate and its precise powers, a lump provision of 5,00 is made to meet expenses in connection with the working of the Department.

6. Allowances to District and Village Officers.—The increase in the revised is due chiefly to the grant of extra allowances to village officers for famine duty.

7. For work connected with the Reforms Scheme, a lump provision of 7,50 is made in the budget for 1920-21 as shown below :— -

#### Revenue.

8. The receipts represent the share of sale proceeds of unified stamps, the sale proceeds of bills of exchange and other general stamps, and of court fee stamps, duty on embossing receipt, cheque and other stamps, duty levied on documents voluntarily brought for adjudication and on documents unstamped or insufficiently stamped and fines and penalties levied under the Indian Stamp Act, 1899, on instruments not duly stamped.

The increases in the revised estimate for 1919-20 and in the budget estimate for 1920-21 over last year's budget reflect commercial activity.

### Expenditure.

9. Superintendence.—The decrease in the revised estimate as compared with last year's budget is due to smaller expenditure on account of packing and conveyance charges of post cards supplied from Calcutta. No provision on account of these charges is made in the butget estimate for 1920-21 which allows 9 for the revision of the establishment of the Central Stamp Depôt, Karachi.

10. License and distillery fees, etc.—There has been a steady increase of revenue under this head due mainly to the successive enhancements of rates of still head duty on country spirits. The increase received a slight check in the year 1914-15 from the disturbance of economic conditions caused by the war, but there has been a marked recovery since 1916-17. The open auction system coupled with the abolition of the maximum selling prices for country spirit, toddy and opium was introduced in the year 1918-19, and has led to a further increase of receipts in the form of vend fees. A review of the figures showing the growth of the excise revenue as well as the consumption of country spirit during the ten years ending 1918-19 shows that-

(i) the average yearly consumption of country spirit in thousands of proof gallons was 27,00 during the five years ending 1913-14 while during the five years ending 1918-19 it was 26,40-or a decline of 2.2 per cent.;

(ii) the average revenue for the first period was 1,99,80 while for latter period it was 2,80,29 or an increase of 40 per cent.

It is clear that the objects which Government set before them of securing a mixmum revenue, while at the same time restricting consumption by high rates of taxation, have been successfully achieved.

11. Gain on sale-proceeds of excise opium.—This Presidency is supplied with Ghazipur opium at a price of Rs. 13 per seer, which is credited to imperial revenues under the head II, Opium. The gross sale-proceeds less the cost price are credited to Provincial revenues under this head. The rentals derived from opium shops are, however, credited to the head License and distillery fees, etc.

12. Duty on Ganja.—The rate of this duty which stood at Rs. 15 per seer has been increased to Rs.  $17\frac{1}{2}$  from 1st April 1920. With effect from the same date the duty on charas has been raised from Rs. 30 to Rs. 40 per seer. These increases apply to the whole of the Bombay Presidency. The rate of duty on bhang in the Presidency proper and Aden, viz., Rs. 2-8-0 per seer, remains unaltered but the Sind rate, which was Re. 1, has been increased to Rs. 1-8-0.

#### Expenditure.

13. The increase in the revised estimate is due mainly to the payment of freight on molasses imported from Java. The large increase in the budget for 1920-21 as compared with last year's budget is due to the provisions noted below :-

(a) Expenditure in connection with the supply of country spirit to licensed retail vendors in certain areas (8,99).

The contract of Messrs. Carew & Co. for the supply of country spirit in the Town and Island of Bombay, the districts of Surai, Thána and Kolába and the Dangs expired on 31st March 1920. The new contracts have been enterd into with effect from 1st August 1920. This course was adopted in order to enable tenderers to have full information regarding the prospects of the new mhowra crop. Arrangements, therefore, had to be made for the supply departmentally of spirit to the areas in question from 1st April to 21st Tube 1920 and a question sufficient for one areas in question from 1st April to 31st July 1920 and a quantity sufficient for one month's supply from 1st August 1520 to be handed over to the new contractors.

Arrangements have therefore been made to obtain 8,00,000 proof gallons from Civil Budget Messrs. Parry & Co. of Madras and Messrs. Arratoon & Co. of Bombay at a cost of Rs. 16,87,500. Against the payment of Rs. 16,87,500 a recovery of about Rs. 8,00,000 is expected from licensed vendors at the usual supply rates. It is not proposed to recover the full cost as the licensed activity. recover the full cost as the licensed retailers have bid high at shop auctions and when the licenses were issued the heavy rise in the cost of spirit was not anticipated. In addition to the amount of Rs. 16,87,500 mentioned above, a sum of Rs. 10,000 will be required for the extra staff and Rs. 1,600 for rent of private warehouses.

(b) Compensation to licensed manufacturers of country spirit owing to the abnormally high prices of distilling materials (7,39).

Owing to the failure of the mhowra crop throughout India mhowra flowers were not available in sufficient quantities for distillation purposes and what stocks were available had to be purchased at exorbitant rates. This deficiency in the raw materials has to be made good by importing molasses from Java at prices far in advance of those payable for mhowra flowers in normal times. Licensed distilling contractors are therefore faced with ruinous losses, as their contract supply rates were fixed with reference to normal conditions. Uwing to the altogether abnormal circumstances and as the total collapse of all contractors would not be in the interests. of Government it has been decided to examine the accounts of all contractors and to compensate them to such extent as may be reasonable after consideration of all circumstances. A provision of Rs. 7,39,000 is made for this purpose.

(c) Amalgamation and reorganization of the non-gazetted establishments of the Department of Salt and Excise in the Presidency proper (2,50).

A scheme for the reorganization and amalgamation of the superior controlling A scheme for the reorganization and amaigamation of the superior controlling and supervising (gazetted) staffs of the Salt and Excise Departments in the Bombay Presidency proper was sanctioned in 1917, and has proved very successful. The existing rates of pay of the non-gazetted staff are found to be inadequate and it is difficult to obtain suitable recruits. It is now proposed to amalgamate the non-gazetted executive and clerical staffs of the two departments; with scales of pay which will attract men with educational qualifications sufficient to fit them for the higher posts and which will give adequate remuneration to those who are fit only for clerical duties, while at the same time keeping open the door for the promotion from lower to higher groups of able and deserving men who have shown their fitness for more responsible work. The scheme involves a net extra outlay of about 5,00 in the first year and has been submitted for the sanction of higher authorities. The expenditure will be divisible between the heads 5, Salt (Imperial) and 7, Excise (Provincial) and provision for about one-half of the charges is made under the ,

latter head. (d) Scheme for (i) completely pumping the Khanapur Distillery spent wash into a trenching ground, including the cost of acquisition of land in connection therewith (77), and (ii) the repacking of the purification filters at the Distillery (42). 

These schemes are to be undertaken with a view to prevent the pollution of the water of the Malaprabha river owing to the discharge of the Khanapur Distillery effluent.

(e) Construction of quarters for Excise menials (30).

The greater part of the menial establishment of the Salt Department is provided with rent-free quarters. The Excise menial staff is also entitled to rent-free quarters, but the accommodation hitherto provided is on a very limited scale thus entailing great hardship. When the Salt and Excise menial establish-ments are amalgamated and brought on one list, it will be necessary to provide them with free quarters; an amount of Rs. 30,000 for constructing the quarters is accordingly provided in the budget and it is included in the provision of Rs. 37,900 for Petty Construction and Repairs.

#### Revenue.

14. The collections under the Super Tax Act and the Excess Profits Duty Act are credited to wholly Imperial minor heads and are not included in the figures given above, which relate to the divided head of Income-Tax.

With effect from 1st April 1916 enhanced rates of taxation have been introduced by the Government of India for Imperial purposes, but as the receipts are credited to the divided head of Income Tax, the local Government has to make an assignment from Provincial to Imperial revenues equal to its share of the additional revenue.

15. In the budget and revised estimates for the current year allowance has been made for the loss of income-tax on account of the levy of excess profits duty and on account of the exemption of incomes below Rs. 2,000 per annum from assessment to income-tax. In order to recoup the loss a compensatory assignment is made from Imperial to Provincial revenues.

16. The increases in the revised estimate for 1919-20 and in the budget estimate for 1920-21 are due mainly to the greater profits made by mills and other commercial enterprises. Allowance is made in the budget estimate for the fact that the loss of income-tax in 1919-20 on amounts paid as excess profits duty will not continue during the current year.

#### Revenue.

18. Timber, etc., removed by Government agency.—The actuals for 1918-19 include special receipts to the extent of 21,40 from famine fodder operations. The increase in the revised as compared with last year's budget is due mainly to higher receipts (15,07 against 2,50 entered in the budget) on account of famine fodder operations, the general rise in prices, and the recovery of outstandings from the Munitions Board. The budget for 1920-21 provides for larger receipts in view of the extensive demand for, and the high prices of, timber and firewood and other forest produce.

19. Timber, etc., removed by consumers or purchasers.—The increase in the revised is due mainly to larger receipts expected from firewood and other minor produce. The budget for 1920-21 provides for higher receipts from timber consequent on the general rise in the prices of coupes.

#### Expenditure.

20. To the minor head Conservancy and Works are debited (a) the outlay on the improvement, extension and protection of forest generally, (b) the outlay on communications and buildings in charge of the Forest Department, (c) the cost of the extraction and transport to sale depôts of timber and other forest produce exploited departmentally, (d) the cost of supervision of the removal of similar produce by private agency, (e) charges for the survey and demarcation of forests, and (f) the cost of live-stock, stores, tools and plant. The actuals of 1918-19 were very high owing to large expenditure on account of famine fodder operations and the supply of timber and other forest produce to the Munitions Board and the Military Department. The increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20 as compared with the budget is ,due mainly to higher expenditure (18,00 against 54 estimated in the budget) on famine fodder operations, and communications and buildings (9,25 against 5,63 in the budget). As compared with last year's budget, the budget for 1920-21 includes larger provisions for departmental operations connected with the exploitation of timber and firewood, the construction of communications and buildings, the purchase of stores and tools and plant, and the demarcation, improvement and extension of forests. Also an increased provision of 67 is made for the appointment of 8 new forest engineers.

21. Establishments.—The increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20 as compared with the budget is due mainly to larger expenditure on travelling and other allowances and on service postage and telegrams. The increase in the budget for 1920-21 is chiefly due to the increments payable to officers under the time-scale of pay, larger expenditure on travelling allowances, and provisions for the three items noted below:—

(a) Establishment of a Forest College at Dharwar (3,55)-

The Government of India have decided that the Imperial College at Dehra Dun should carry on the training of candidates for the Provincial Forest Service only and 83

that the training of students for the forest rangers' course should be decentralised. It is accordingly proposed to build a Forest College at Dharwar for the purpose of training candidates for the rangers' course for this Presidency. A provision of Rs. 3,50,000 is made for the building and of Rs. 5,500 for the pay of two Provincial Forest Officers who will be required as Instructors at the College.

(b) Revision of the pay of Rangers, Foresters and Guards (2,68)-

The existing pay and prospects of promotion in all the three classes are inadequate. It is proposed to introduce a system of time scale promotion, which will go far to remove this objection. The Rangers are at present divided into six grades on pay varying from Rs. 50 to Rs. 150 a month. It is proposed to reduce the number of grades to four and to fix the pay of the lowest grade at Rs. 50—5—100 and of the remaining three grades at Rs. 125, Rs. 150 and Rs. 200 respectively. The extra cost of the scheme is estimated at 5,36 per annum, but as the sanction of the Secretary of State is necessary, provision is made to meet expenditure for six months only of 1920-21.

The figures given above represent the debits to Provincial funds of the expenditure under *Refunds* in proportion to the Provincial shares of the revenues under the respective heads in connection with which refunds are made. The charges under this head are of a fluctuating character and are not subject to any departmental control. The revised estimate for 1919-20 and the budget for 1920-21 allow for larger estimates of refunds of income-tax which is subject to adjustment under section 19 of the Indian Income Tax Act, 1918. In the revised estimate the decrease under Excise refunds is due to anticipated savings in last year's provision for refund of a portion of the vend fees recovered from certain shopkeepers whose shops had to be closed owing to the temporary failure of supplies of country spirit consequent on inadequate transport facilities. No provision is made in the current year's budget on this account.

#### Provincial Heads.

23. Excise compensations.—The increase in the revise estimate over the budget for the year 1919-20 is due mainly to the payment of 52 to the Sachin State being the excess of the actual abkari receipts for the year 1918-19 over the provisional compensation of 32 paid for the period. The excise compensations have been fixed for ten years from 1st August 1914 on the basis of the average revenue for three years preceding that date. The amounts are subject to revision after the third year of leases with reference to the actual revenue collected. The first adjustment will be made in 1920-21 and will, it is anticipated, involve payments to the extent of about 11,05 in excess of the present compensations. This accounts for the large increase in the budget estimate for 1920-21 as compared with last year's budget.

Revenue.

The revenue represents mainly the interest received by the Local 24. Government and advances on loans made from the Provincial Advance and Loan account. This account, the capital transactions of which are outside the current budget figures, provides for the grant of loans to agriculturists, local bodies, Indian States, etc. The money required for the loans is furnished by the Government of India. The Local Government pay interest thereon and bear any losses on account of bad debts. In order to cover risk and cost of management, the Local Government charge a higher rate of interest than that which they have to pay to India. The revenue under this head also includes interest on Government securities belonging to institutions taken over by Government along with the endowments for the upkeep of such institutions. In spite of the enhancements, which are noticed below, of the rate of interest charged by the Government of India to this Government no change has been made in the rate of  $6\frac{1}{4}$  per cent. charged by this Government for loans to agriculturists. The rate of interest charged on loans to local bodies made after the enhanced rates fixed by the Government of India came into force has, however, been raised to 6 per cent. and that to Indian State has been raised to  $6\frac{1}{4}$  per cent.

#### Expenditure.

25. The interest which is paid to the Government of India by the Local' Government on sums placed at the disposal of the latter for advances and loans to local bodies, agriculturists, etc., is shown as expenditure under this head, this interest being calculated on the mean of the outstanding balance of the Provincial Advance and Loan account at the beginning and at the end of each year. The rate of interest charged to the Local Government was  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. per annum, but with effect from the 1st October 1916 this rate was raised

to per  $4\frac{1}{2}$  cent. in respect of loans sanctioned on or after that date, and again to per  $5\frac{1}{2}$  cent. in respect of loans sanctioned on or after 1st April 1917.

26. The question of taking over from the Government of India the Provincial Loan Account by repaying from Provincial balances a part or whole of the outstanding balance, which is estimated to amount to 3,01,89 on 31st March 1921, is at present under consideration. If the account is taken over, Provincial Revenues will save the amount payable to the Government of India as interest on the moneys taken from them to finance the Loan Account.

The amounts of the sumptuary allowance and contract allowance of 28. His Excellency the Governor have lately been raised to 30 and 1,00 respectively. The revised estimate for 1919-20 includes certain arrear payments.

Staff and household of the Governor.-The increase in the revised 29. estimate for 1919-20 is due mainly to larger expenditure on the maintenance of Government House gardens and on contingencies. In the budget for 1920-21 provisions have been made for increased expenditure due to the revision of the establishments of the Private and Military Secretaries and for the purchase and repair of furniture.

Tour Expenses .- The revised estimate for 1919-20 includes provision 30. for the construction of metre gauge and standard gauge saloon carriages for the use of His Excellency the Governor. The estimated cost of 76 for the standard gauge saloon was not paid last year and will have to be met this year by a reappropriation of funds.

31. Civil Secretariat.—The increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20 is due chiefly to the salaries of temporary officers and increase in the postage and The budget for 1920-21 includes a lump provision of 1,14 telegram charges. for the revision of the Secretariat establishments. Also provision is made for the pay of a Deputy Secretary in the Revenue and Financial Departments, and the employment of a special officer and a temporary Assistant Secretary in the General Department.

Commissioner in Sind.—The increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20 is due mainly to larger expenditure on service postage, telegrams and other contingencies. The budget for 1920-21 includes larger provision for this expenditure as well as for travelling and other allowances.

Commissioners.--The decrease in the revised estimate for 1919-20 is 33. due to the non-utilization of the provision for payments to officers of other provinces and to smaller expenditure on allowances and contingencies. Larger estimates for charges on account of salaries, establishments and contingencies account for the increase in the current budget as compared with last year's . budget.

Civil Offices of Account and Audit.-To this head is debited the 34. expenditure connected with the Local Audit Branch of the Accountant General's office, which is classed as Provincial. The budget for 1920-21 provides 10 for temporary establishment required for the clearance of certain arrears and for the verification of cancelled currency notes.

35. The principal source of revenue is general fees, fines and forfeitures. The increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20 and the budget estimate 24 for 1920-21 occurs mainly under magisterial fines.

#### Expenditure.

36. High Court.—The budget estimate for 1920-21 provide for the 110-116 following new items:-

#### (a) Appointment of an eighth Judge in the High Court for work on the Original Side ••• ... 61 Δ.

The Honourable the Chief Justice represented to Government the necessity of appointing as a permanent measure an eighth Judge. The Government of India were asked to obtain the sanction of the Secretary of State to the proposal, but they have for the present sanctioned the appointment for a period of one year. A provision for a full year on account of the salary of the additional Judge, office establishment and other connected charges is made in next year's budget.

#### (b) Revision of certain establishment in the High Court 54

37. Law Officers.—The increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20 over last year's budget is due chiefly to Pleaders' fees in connection with the special Tribunals at Akola and Ahmedabad and to larger provision under " charges for special counsel".

38. Civil and Sessions Courts.-Larger expenditure on account of contingencies and payments to officers of other provinces is responsible for the increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20. The budget estimate for 1920-21, besides providing for the following items, allows increased provision for the entertain-ment of temporary Assistant Judges and their establishments, and for payments to officers of other provinces.

- (a) Lump provision for the scheme of the creation of four new District Judgeships ... ... 75
- (b) Establishment of separate courts of Subordinate Judge at Khed in the Ratnagiri District and at Hukeri in the Belgaum District ...

Item (a).—The revenue districts of Kaira, East Khandesh, Kolaba and Nawabshah are at present upprovided with District and Sessions Courts of their own, but are included in the jurisdictions of the District and Sessions Courts of the adjacent districts, viz., at Ahmedabad, Dhulia (in West Khandesh district), Thana and Hyderabad (Sind), respectively. A scheme for the constitution of separate District and Sessions Judgeships for these four revenue districts is under consideration. The cost of the whole scheme is estimated at 1,49 but for the present a provision of 75 for two new District Judgeships is made in the current year's budget.

Courts of Small Causes .- The decrease in the revised estimate for 39. . 1919-20 is due mainly to savings anticipated in the provisions for the Judges of the Courts of Small Causes due to changes in personnel. The budget estimate for 1920-21 provides 7 for the appointment of an additional temporary Judge in the Court of the Small Causes, Bombay, and 34 for the revision of the establishments of that Court.

40. Criminal Courts .- The increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20 and the budget estimate for 1920-21 as compared with last year's budget is due chiefly to larger provision for diet and road money to witnesses in consequence of the enhancement of the rate of subsistence allowance, from six to eight annas per diem for witnesses of the class of smaller cultivators and labourers attending criminal courts.

41. The receipts under this head consist of hire of convict labour, recoveries of transportation and jail charges from Indian States and sale-proceeds of articles manufactured in jails.

42. The high prices of jail manufactured articles and a larger demand for them account for the increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20.

### Expenditure.

43. To this head are debited the expenditure connected with the staff employed in the supervison of jails, the charges for the maintenance of convicts and the cost of raw materials purchased for jail manufactures. Subventions to the Released Prisoners' Aid Society and to the Salvation Army for charges for reformation of criminal tribes and in connection with Released Prisoners' Home are also debited to this head. Expenditure in connection with the settlement of criminal tribes which were debited to the head "3, Land Revenue" are brought to account under this head with effect from 1st April 1920.

44. Jails.—The increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20 is due mainly  $E_{\text{Estimate.}}$ to larger estimate for dietary and hospital charges, clothing and bedding of 133-141prisoners, charges for moving prisoners and miscellaneous services, and, supplies, owing to increased jail population and to the high prices of articles. As compared with last year's budget the estimate for the current year provides for larger expenditure on account of some of these items. The inclusion under this head of charges connected with the settlement of criminal tribes has also contributed to the increase.

45. Jail manufactures.-The increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20 is due to larger expenditure for the purchase of raw materials and to an increased demand for jail-made articles. -.'1

Presidency Police .- The increase in the revised for 1919-20 over that year's budget is due to (i) the grant of war allowances to the constabulary at revised rates, (ii) larger expenditure on account of travelling and house-rent allowances and contingencies, (iii) the revision of the clerical establishment of the Commissioner of Police and (iv) the revision of the pay of vazetted officers of the Police Department. The bùdget for 1920-21 provides for all these charges and further includes lump provisions of (i) 2,09 for increase in the pay and allowances of the European cadre of the Bombay City Police, and (ii) 2,31 for revised pay (1,06) and grain compensation (1,25) of the

Bombay City Police.

- \* 48: Superintendence.-The increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20 is due mainly to the revision of the pay of gazetted officers. The budget for 1920-21 also includes a provision of 9 for the re-organization of the clerical staff of the Inspector General of Police.

District Executive Force.—The decrease in the revised as compared 49. with the budget for 1919-20 is mainly due to savings in the lump provisions amounting to 14,69 made for the grant of special war allowance and grain compensation allowance to the constabulary. The savings are partially counterbalanced by larger expenditure mainly on salaries and travelling allowances, and the grant with effect from' 1st July 1919 of compensatory allowances (in addition to the existing war allowance) to the constabulary in the Presidency proper at rates varying between Rs. 3 and Re. 1 per mensem each. The budget for 1920-21 provides for the increased expenditure mentioned above, and for the items noted below :-

Special police.-The increases in the revised for 1919-20 and the 50. budget for 1920-21 as compared with the budget for 1919-20 are due mainly to the revision of the pay of gazetted officers and the re-organization of the Agency police of Palanpur and Mahikantha.

51. Railway police.-The Government of India have lately sanctioned a 171-176 revised system of apportionment of the cost of Railway police, under which the Railway companies will meet the cost of the watch and ward police, and Government that of the crime and order police with effect from 1st April 1919. The extra charge involved is estimated at 3,00 a year, and a recurring assignment of this amount is made from Imperial to Provincial revenues through the head "Transfers between Imperial and Provincial." This. accounts mainly for the increase in last year's revised and in the budget for 1920-21 as compared with the budget for 1919-20.

52. Criminal Investigation Department.—The increase in the revised over the budget for 1919-20 is due mainly to the revision of the pay of gazetted officers and the police force, and larger expenditure on contingencies. Thebudget for 1920-21 allows for these higher charges and also includes provisions for the re-organization of the department and the establishment of 'a Criminal Investigation Department Training School.

58. Fees, Government Colleges—Professional.—Owing to increased number of students seeking admission in the Government Law School, arrangements have been made for holding more classes. In 1918-19 the Second LL.B. class was

held in duplicate and the First LL.B. class in triplicate. Another additional class was formed with effect from last year. The increase in last year's revised estimate and the current year's budget estimate is due mainly to the larger number of students in this school.

59. Fees, Schools—General.—It has been the policy of Government to maintain as far as possible in each district one high school to serve as a model and to leave the further development of secondary education to private endeavour with the assistance of grants-in-aid from Government. Some districts are not yet provided with Government high schools and it is now proposed to establish them in those districts. Thus the Municipal secondary school at Larkana has already been taken over and converted into a Government high school and new high schools will shortly be established in the other districts. The current year's estimate under this minor head includes provision for fee receipts from the new high schools.

60. Miscellaneous.—The following receipts are chiefly credited to this head :—

- (i) Sale-proceeds of books,
  - (ii) Workshop receipts,
- (iii) Yeravda Reformatory school receipts,
- (iv) Cambridge Senior Local Examination fees,
- (v) School Final Examination fees,
- (vi) London Chamber of Commerce Examination fees,
- (vii) Drawing and Arts Examination fees at the School of Art,

•.

- (viii) Royalty on Vernacular text books,
- (ix) Government Scholarship Examination fees, and
- (x) Secondary Teachers' Examination fees.

The actuals of 1917-18 include the refund of the advance of 3,50 given in 1915 to the V. J. Technical Institute in connection with the scheme for the removal of the institute to a new site at Matunga.

Item (v).—The departmental School Final Examination has been discontinued with effect from 1918-19 and so no fees are now received by Government in respect of this examination.

Item (viii).-Government have decided to forego with effect from 1st April 1920 the royalty at present payable by Messrs. MacMillan & Co. on the Vernacular readers, the sale prices of which will be correspondingly reduced. The last year's revised estimate also allows for somewhat smaller receipts from this source.

#### Expenditure.

61. University.—The following annual grants have been sanctioned from Imperial Revenues for the objects specified below :—

(a) 10 for administration, inspection and travelling allowances;

- (b) 45 for the appointment of University lecturers, and for other University reforms (sanctioned in 1912);
- (c) 12 for the appointment of a Professor of Economics (sanctioned in 1915).
  - 67 Total

The Imperial grant referred to in (a) has been merged into the Provincial Settlement which came into force on 1st April 1911. Grants (b) and (c) are being given every year from Imperial to Provincial revenues through the head "Transfers between Imperial and Provincial Revenues". The grant-in-aid (c) was not paid to the University since 1915-16 as no Professor of Economics was appointed by the University.

62. Inspection.—The last year's provisions of 54 for the scheme for the medical inspection of school children and of 19 for the scheme for the appointment of an Educational Inspector for the Bombay Division were not unutilized owing to the delay in the introduction of the schemes. On 181

the other hand larger expenditure was incurred on "Establishments", "Travelling allowances" and "Contingencies".

The current year's budget contains increased provisions on account of (i) the scheme for the medical inspection of school children (71 against 54 in last year's budget), as Government have now decided to entertain six doctors, instead of five as originally proposed, (ii) additional Inspector for the Bombay Division, (iii) service postage and telegram charges and (iv) magic lanterns and slides. The inspecting agency for the Mulla Schools has recently been reorganized and provision for the additional inspecting staff for these schools is made in the current year's budget. The budget contains also provision for the additional inspecting staffs required for several districts. The scheme for the time-scale of pay for assistant masters and mistresses and assistant Deptty Educational Inspectors, for which a provision of 25 was made in the last year's budget, has been sanctioned by the Secretary of State. A lump provision of 2,00 for the extra charge on account of the scheme is made in the budget estimate of 1920-21. Outof this amount a sum of 40 is entered under this minor head.

63. Government Colleges—General.—The last year's budget contained a lump provision of 1,00 for the construction of a building and a hostel for students for the Arts College, Dharwar. A greater part of this provision remained unexpended. The small expenditure which was incurred last year was not debited to the head *Education* but appeared under *Civil Works*. This accounts for the decrease in the last year's revised estimate. The last year's provision of 1,00 for the Dharwar College buildings is not repeated this year under the major head 22, Education but on the other hand a sum of 3,50 for the buildings is provided under the head 45, Civil Works. Excluding the special provision of 1,00 in the budget of 1919-20 the small increase in the current year's budget is due chiefly to larger provisions for establishment and contingent charges.

64. Government Colleges—Professional.—The details of the figures 'under this minor head are given below :—

Item (i)—Owing to the increase in the number of students in the Law School, Bombay, Government sanctioned the formation in 1919-20 of an additional First LL.B. Class and the entertainment of two extra Professors. The budget of 1920-21 contains provision for the two Professors and their peons.

*Item* (ii)—The last year's provision of 24 for the scheme for instituting apprenticeships in the Public Works Department for Civil Engineering students was not utilized as Government have decided that the question of the introduction of the scheme should await the orders of the Government of India on the recommendations of the Public Works Department Re-organization Committee. The provision is, however, repeated in the current year's budget. There were also savings in last year's provision for salaries of officers.

Item (v)—The last year's provision of 1,00 for the equipment of the Institute remained unutilized and is therefore repeated in current year's budget. The Secretary of State has sanctioned the appointment of Dr. C. J. Fox as Principal of the Royal Institute of Science. A lump provision of 61 is made in the budget of 1920-21 for the pay of two professors—one for Physics and one for Botany—and for subordinate staff, etc., in addition to the pay of Dr. Fox which is already included in the provision for professors of the College of Engineering.

Item (i).—The Municipal Vernacular School at Larkana has been converted into a Government High School and the special provision of 19 which was separately made for the purpose in last year's budget is now merged into this head in the current year's estimates. In addition lump provisions of 1.20 for the revision of the pay of assistant masters and mistresses in secondary schools and of 12 for the revision of the pay of clerks in the Educational Department are made in the budget of 1920-21.

Item (iii).—The last year's provision was not utilized during that year and is repeated in the current year's budget.

Item (vi).—In response to a popular demand a lump provision of 8 was made in last year's budget for a scheme for the introduction of the teaching of English in primary schools. Government have sanctioned English classes to be attached to five vernacular schools in each Division as an experimental measure. The full estimated cost of this is provided in the budget of 1920-21.

Item (vii).—At the session of the Legislative Council held on the 29th July 1918 and subsequent days two Resolutions regarding the establishment of new girls' Anglo-Vernacular schools and the admission of girls into Government High Schools for boys, were accepted on behalf of Government and passed by the Council in modified forms. Accordingly the Director of Public Instruction was asked to submit proposals in the matter. The proposals approved by Government are summarised below :—

A provision of 65 (37 for the recurring expenditure and of 28 for the non-recurring expenditure) is made for the purpose in the budget of 1920-21.

Item (ix) (a).—The provision of 22 in last year's budget was intended for local normal classes for training primary school teachers. As additional training schools will be opened from the increased provision referred to in item (ix) (i), some of the normal classes will be abolished, and a reduced provision is accordingly made in the current year's budget.

Item (ix) (c).—The current year's provision includes a sum of 20 for nonrecurring expenditure required for a school house and teachers' quarters at Sholapur and for teachers' quarters at Bijapur.

Item (ix) (e).—The budget estimate for 1920-21 includes the following new provisions :—

69 for giving code pay, according to revised scale, to District Local Board primary school teachers sent out from training colleges during the year;

11 on account of extra pay and pension contribution of the second year trained men sent out as teachers from the several training colleges under the schemes sanctioned in 1912 from the recurring Darbar grant of 6,70.

Item (ix) (g).—The current year's budget contains an additional provision of 2,75 for bringing the grants to Municipalities for primary education to one-half of their total expenditure on this object during 1919-20.

Item (ix) (i).—In last year's budget a provision of 1,50 was made in connection with the scheme for the training of additional primary teachers to which the Secretary of State has now accorded his sanction. Pending the sanction a certain number of local training classes were opened provisionally. A further provision of 75 is made in the current year's budget to meet expenditure on opening new training classes.

Item (ix) (j).—The increase in the current year's estimate is due to the provision of 4,00 for opening new primary schools.

Item (i).—The last year's provision of 50 for the construction of a building for the Training College for Women, Poona, has not been utilized and is repeated in the current year's budget under the head 45, Civil Works. On the other hand larger expenditure is anticipated on contingencies and scholarships. The increased expenditure on scholarships is due to—

(a) the raising of the rate of stipends recently sanctioned by Government owing to the high prices of food-stuffs, and

(b) the additional stipends sanctioned in connection with the opening of the Urdu Training Class at Poona and the reorganization of the Urdu Training Class at Ahmedabad.

These factors mainly contribute to the net increase in last year's revised and current year's budget estimates. The current year's budget contains also a lump provision of 40 for revision of pay of assistant masters and mistresses.

Item (ii).—The increase in last year's revised estimate is due to larger very expenditure on contingencies.

Item (iii).—The decrease in the revised estimate of 1919-20 occurs under salaries of officers and is due mainly to the deputation of officers to other Departments.

Item (iv).—The increase in last year's revised estimate occurs under contingencies on account of the present high cost of food-stuffs, etc.

*Item (v).*—The total sanctioned grant for the Committee is 40, but as their expenditure has not been worked up to this amount owing to war conditions a provision of 15 is made in the current year's budget.

67. Item (d).—The Sind Madressah at present receives an annual grant of Rs. 18,000. In consideration of its financial stringency and with a view to improving its teaching staff Government have sanctioned, as a special case, an additional grant of Rs. 21,000 per annum with effect from last year. At the same time the Madressah Board has been asked to take steps to raise subscriptions from the public and to report the result to Government.

Item (e).—This is due to the increased cost of articles of foodstuffs and clothing.

Item (f).—Government have decided to increase the rate of Government grants to schools for the blind and deaf mutes from one-third to two-thirds of their expenditure.

72. The receipts and charges on account of sanitation were prior to the year 1917-18 exhibited under the major head "Medical." In view of the increased interest now taken in sanitation, it was decided to create a separate major head for the purpose in order to bring out more prominently the provision made and the expenditure incurred. on that object. The former heads XX and 24, Medical were accordingly sub-divided into XX-A and 24-A. Medical and XX-B and 24-B, Sanitation.

#### Revenue.

73. The contribution of the Bombay Port Trust towards the charges on account of seamen treated at the St. George's Hospital is to be increased from 26 to 31, from the current year.

#### Expenditure.

74. Medical Establishment.-Enhanced salaries of Indian Medical Service Officers and the larger number of senior officers on duty mainly account for the increased expenditure provided in last year's revised and current year's budget estimates.

Hospitals and Dispensaries.-Large expenditure on supplies and ser-. 75. vices and contingencies of Government hospitals owing to high prices and increased number of patients, and enhanced salaries of Indian Medical Service Officers were mainly responsible for the increase in the revised estimate for last year. Current year's estimate provides for the salaries of Indian Medical Service Officers according to the revised scale. As compared with last year's budget larger provision is made for dieting and clothing charges of patients, but this provision is less than that included in the revised estimate. Moreover, provisions for the following objects have contributed to the increase in the budget of 1920-21 :-

(a) Reorganization of the nursing arrangements in the Presidency and increase of Government grants in aid of nursing at certain hospitals;

(b) Opening of new dispensaries and increase of the Government grant-in-aid to the Lady Dufferin Hospital, Karachi;

(c) Building grant for the Leper Asylum at Palghar;

Item (a).—The question of providing all Government institutions with nurses is under consideration. At present some institutions are fully equipped with nurses, others only partially so and the great majority not at all. It is therefore proposed to create a unified nursing service for the whole Presidency under the Bombay Presidency Nursing Association, and a scheme is being worked out in detail. In the meantime a provision of 2,50 (50 recurring and 2,00 non-recurring) is made in the budget of 1920-21. The budget also provides for increased grants to some of the existing nursing associations in the proportion of one-half of their expenditure.

Item (b).—The usual provision of 60 (20 recurring and 40 non-recurring) for opening new dispensaries is repeated in the current year's budget. In addition, a provision of 10 is made for increasing the grant-in-aid to the Lady Dufferin Hospital, Karachi, from 10 to 20 as the expenditure of the hospital, which was 31 when the original grant was sanctioned, has nearly doubled this year.

Item (c).-The Mission to Lepers in India and the East have under consideration a scheme for the establishment of a Leper Asylum at Palghar and they have applied to Government for a contribution towards the initial expenditure. Government have given an undertaking to bear two-thirds of the cost of constructing and equipping the asylum subject to a maximum of 16. Provision is made for the proposed grapt-in-aid in the current year's budget.

Item (d).-The revision of the contract grants for the quinquennium beginning with 1920-21 is being undertaken. It is anticipated that owing to the general rise in prices, the grants will have to be raised. A lump provision of 40 for the increased charge is made in the current year's budget.

76. Medical Schools and College.—The scheme for the establishment of a school of Tropical Medicine has been submitted for the sanction of the Secretary of State. No part of the last year's provision of 1,00 for the scheme was utilized and a provision of 1,50 for the purpose is made in the current year's estimate. In addition a sum of 73 is included under this head for the establishment of a Central Hygiene Laboratory in connection with the school.

80. Sanitation and Vaccination Establishment.—The expenditure shown under this minor head relates mainly to (i) Sanitary Commissioner, Deputy Sanitary Commissioners and Health Officers and their establishments, (ii) Inspectors of Vaccination, and (iii) Charges of the Sanitary laboratory for Sind. A part of the charges on account of the Port Health Officers is recovered from the Port Trusts and these recoveries are deducted from the expenditure. The charges of the Belgaum Vaccine Depôt are also debited to this head, but a major portion of these is recouped by contributions from Local Boards, Municipalities, etc. The charges on account of the vaccination establishments employed under local bodies are almost wholly recovered from them. The last year's revised estimate and the current year's budget estimate include provisions for salaries of Indian Medical Service Officers on the revised scale and this, coupled with a larger number of senior officers on duty, accounts for the increased expenditure in last year's revised and current year's budget estimates.

81. / Grants for Sanitary purposes.—The main items of expenditure recorded under this minor head are the following:—

(a) Grants for special expenditure in connection with sanitation;

(b) Grants-in-aid to local bodies in connection with the employment of Health Officers and Sanitary Inspectors;

- (c) Grants to village Sanitary Committees; and
- (d) Pilgrim charges.

Item (a).—A provision of 16,37 (including 9,37 from the surplus excise revenue) was made in last year's budget for this item, but about one-third of this provision remained unutilized. Moreover, a large portion of the outlay on sanitary objects has been debited in the accounts to other major heads. These factors account for the decrease in last year's revised estimate. In the current year's estimates a provision of 22,00 (including 11,00 from the surplus excise revenue) is made for this item.

Item (b).—Government pay local bodies, subject to certain conditions, grants-in-aid equal to 2/3rds of the pay of Health Officers and 1/3rd of the pay of Sanitary Inspectors employed in mofussil towns. Provision of 40 is made for this item in the current year's estimates.

Item (c).—Government give grants to Village Sanitary Committees in the proportion of one-fourth of their expenditure, the other three-fourths being contributed by local bodies and villagers. The last year's provision of 70 for the purpose has been raised to 81 in the current year's estimates.

Expenses in connection with bubonic plague, malaria and epidemics.— The increase in the current year's budget is due to the lump provision of 22 for an isolation camp at Karachi for the prevention of yellow fever.

82. Bacteriological Laboratories and Pasteur Institutes.—The decrease in current year's estimates is due to a larger estimate of recoveries from local bodies, etc., on account of the plague serum supplied from the Bombay Bacteriological Laboratory. These recoveries are deducted from the total expenditure and the net expenditure only is shown under the minor head.

page in the Civil Budget Estimate. 90. The figures of expenditure under the various sub-heads of this minor head for the years 1918-19 to 1920-21 are shown below :---

Item (ii) .-- The increase in last year's revised estimate was due to larger expenditure on contingencies. The budget for 1919-20 included also a lump provision of 1,00 for storage of fodder. With reference to this it may be mentioned that the Director of Agriculture has been asked to make arrangements for the installation at Karajgi in the Dharwar district of a shredding and baling plant to deal with purchased *karbi*. A com-mencement is to be made with two shredders and one press, but provision will be made for the doubling of this plant, if necessary, later. Contracts will also be given on certain conditions for the right to remove grass from certain forests and Government waste lands with a view to maintaining reserves of grass in steam pressed and hydraulic pressed bales. In accordance with the arrangements thus made the stocks, which will now be available as reserves if no famine years intervene, will be as follows :-

- 575 lakhs pounds for the Northern Division and Kathiawar, to be stored at Nawapur, Palghar and Godhra as against nearly 131 crores despatched during the past famine ;
- 485 lakhs for the Deccan and Southern Maratha Country, consisting of three crores of grass at Manmad and 185 lakhs of karbi at Kopargaon and Karajgi, as against 630 lakhs moved during the past famine.

The provision thus made is only intended to meet the necessities of the first few months of a fodder famine and cannot be expected to cover the demands of a year of widespread distress.

Item (iii) .- The scheme of agricultural education at present being carried out consists in the provision of an Agricultural College at Poona, of University rank, where an endeavour is made to give the most thorough education in scientific agriculture, and a

number of agricultural boarding schools conducted entirely in the vernacular. The number of students in the College increased from 104 in 1912 to 170 in 1919 and the demand for the graduates is now so great that a good man can always obtain a suitable outlet for his energies and the number of landholders' sons who intend to manage their own lands tends to increase. There is a demand for specialized courses in dairying, in horticulture and in several other branches of agricultural work. It is proposed to extend the College in six years to accommodate 250 students and to provide within that time the land, the buildings and the staff necessary to deal with this number. A provision of 1,09 is made under this sub-head for the acquisition of land, construction of certain buildings and equipment for the College in addition to the provision of 2,20 from the current year's Imperial grant of 3,47 shown under item (xi). A provision of 13 is also made under this head for recurring expenditure on account of the entertainment of a Professor of Horticulture and a Mycologist. Nine agricultural schools are at present established or will shortly be ready. Government propose to establish at least one vernacular school in every district. With this end in view a provision of 45 is made under this head for three new schools and an additional amount of 1,20 for three such schools is included in the provision of 3,40 under item (xi). Provision for recurring expenditure for the whole year on account of the new schools is also made in the budget. This explains the large increase in the budget estimate for 1920-21.

*Item* (iv). - The charges of cattle breeding farms are now transferred from the minor head *Veterinary Charges* to this sub-head. Larger expenditure is also being incurred on contingencies of these farms. These factors contribute to the increase in the last year's revised and current year's budget estimates. The budget for 1920-21/ includes also the following important new provisions:---

(a)	Special grant in connection with the Chharodi Cattle farm in _ North Gujarat, for dividing the farm by fencing into seven plots of about 400 acres each, for constructing new silos for keeping fodder, etc	•
(b)	Non-recurring expenditure on purchase of cattle, and recurring expenditure in connection with the cattle breeding farm at Bankapur in the Dharwar District	• .
(c)	Recurring and non-recurring expenditure on the Willingdon Cattle farm at Karachi	

- (d) Opening of new demonstration farms at Baramati in the Poona district and at Bagalkot in the Bijapur district
- (e) Construction of office and quarters at the Karjat farm

Items (ix) and (xi) to (xiii).—The provisions in the current year's budget against; these items represent unspent balances of Imperial grants. Item' (xi) is the balance of the new grant of 3,47 given during last year, the other items represent unspent balances. of old grants. 91. Veterinary Charges.—As noticed in the preceding paragraph the charges on account of cattle breeding operations are now transferred to the minor head "Agriculture" and the charges on horse breeding operations continue to be debited to the head "Veterinery charges." The increase in the current year's budget estimate as compared with the last year's revised estimate is due mainly to the non-utilization of the last year's provision of 20 for the reorganization of the Glanders and Farcy Departments, and of 24 for the expansion of the Civil Veterinary Department, for which provisions of 25 and 24 respectively are made in the budget estimate of 1920-21.

92. Co-operative Credit.—The gradual increase of expenditure under this head is due to the growth of the operations of the department and to the increased provision for the pay of the Registrar, as a senior Indian Civil Service officer is now appointed Registrar.

### Revenue.

93. Examination fees.—The fees on account of the Vernacular Final Examination and the Public Works Accountants' Examination and the fees recovered by the Civil and Military Examination Committee are credited to this head.

94. Fees for Inspection of Steam Boilers.—The receipts and charges of the Steam Boiler Inspection Department, which formed a Local Fund, were provincialized with effect from 1917-18. The actuals of that year include also the sale proceeds of the securities belonging to the old fund.

95. Miscollaneous.—The fees for registering Companies and Societies are oredited to this head, and the increase in the last year's revised estimate is due to the present boom. The current year's estimate of receipts from this source allows for a small increase over the last year's budget.

### Expenditure.

96. Provincial Museums.—Government have promised an annual grant of 30 towards the maintenance of the Prince of Wales Museum of Western India. The premises which were occupied by Military authorities will not be ready for use as a Museum for some time, and a provision of 20 for the Government

Mr. H.R. Hamley was appointed to officiate as Principal, Secondary Training College, Bombay, for six months with effect from 1st May 1924 vice Hr. H.A. Sadarangani. Although the College was in vacation, Government considered it necessary that the appointment should in the interest of public service take effect from the date referred to. It was also 'necessary that Mr. Hamley should be able to prepare his own. lectures and make other arrangements before the beginning of the term commencing from the 20th June 1924. Mr. Hamley actually took charge on 16th May 1924. As the Accountant General has reported that the appointment of Mr. Hamley more than 4 weeks in advance of the date on which the college re-opened after the vacation contravenes the first canon of financial propriety the case is referred to the Public Accounts Committee (vide rule 14 of the Auditor General's Rules, Appendix I, Ludit Code).

contribution for eight months is made in the current year's budget. The Museum Estimate. Committee also receives an annual contribution of 25 from the Bombay Municipality towards the Museum. This contribution is also in effect a grant from Government as the amount of the contribution was taken as a set off against the Municipality's share of the City Police charges taken over by Government in 1907.

97. Donations to Scientific Societies.-The actuals of 1917-18 include a grant-in-aid of 30 to the Cama Institute of Oriental Learning as a special endowment fund for the formation of a fellowship. The current year's budget contains a provision of 10 for the proposed increase from 5 to 15 of the Government grant to the Natural History Society.

98. Inspector of Factories and Steam Boiler Inspection establishment. 263-264 Proposals for the amalgamation of the Factory, Steam Boiler and Smoke Nuisance Departments, and for the increase of the salaries of the Inspectors in those Departments have been recently sanctioned by the Secretary of State. The current year's budget contains provisions for the additional cost involved in these proposals.

99. Provincial Statistics.—The charges on account of establishments 264-265 entertained for collection of statistics of ran-borne traffic are debited to this head.

100. Miscellaneous.-The amount shown in the last year's budget and revised estimates are in connection with the charges incurred by the Controller of Prices and Director of Civil Supplies. These charges are covered by corresponding assignments from India. No specific provision for such expenditure is made in the current year's budget. The amount of 36 provided in the budget of 1920-21 is intended for the charges of the Director of Information whose appointment has recently been sanctioned.

101. Development of Industries.—The Department of Industries has recently been established. It is intended to develop the Department on the lines indicated in the Report of the Indian Industrial Commission. The constitution of the Department upto now, in addition to the Director and the Deputy Director, is briefly as follows :-

(i) Weaving.-The weaving establishment under the Registrar of Co-operative Societies has been transferred to the Director of Industries and has been strengthened.

(ii) Industrial Engineering.-The appointments of a Deputy Director and three Industrial Engineers have already been made. The Dapuri Workshops have been transferred from the Public Works Department to the Department of Industries.

(iii) Fisheries.—The appointment of a Superintendent of Fisheries has been created. It may be expected that this Department will ultimately be controlled by a Marine Biologist with two Superintendents to assist him. Negotiations are in progress for the purchase of a steam trawler and for the appointment of a master and skipper and a first hand to work it.

(iv) Pottery.-The services of the Superintendent of Pottery in the Educational Department have been placed temporarily under the Department.

(v) Chemists.—An Assistant Chemist and a research scholar have been appointed temporarily. Their work is supervised by two part-time advisers to the Depart-ment-Mr. Turner of the V. J. Technical Institute and Dr. Meldrum, Professor of Physics and Chemistry at the Gujarat College.

The current year's budget of 7,77 includes a provision of 5,00 for the development of the Department and of 42 for the Dapuri Workshops transferred from the Public Works Department.

Charges on account of European Vagrants.-The decrease in the last 106. year's revised estimate as compared with the budget is due to the non-utilisation of the provision for the construction of a building for the European Work-The budget estimate for 1920-21 includes a larger provision, viz., 68 house. against the last year's provision of 28, for this object. The increased provision is necessary because it is intended to erect a self-contained two-floor building with accommodation for the residence of an officer instead of the mere work and living shed originally planned, and because the cost of labour and materials has greatly increased.

107. Special Commissions of Enquiry.-The increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20 is due to the expenditure on account of the printing of records of the Rasai Committee and to the charges for the special Tribunals at Ahmedabad.

108. Rents, Rates and Taxes.—The budget estimate for 1920-21 provides for an increase of 29 in respect of the payment to be made to the Bombay Municipality on account of General Tax on Government properties.

109. Contributions.—The chief items of expenditure which are debited to this head are grants made for no specific purpose to Municipalities, Local Boards, etc., such as grants to cover a deficit balance or a compensation for revenue resumed, etc., which cannot be classed with reference to the objects to which they are to be devoted. The large increase in the budget estimate for 1920-21 is due to the following items :-

- (a) Additional provision for grants-in-aid to District Local Boards in the Presidency proper in connection with the abolition of tolls on their roads ... 1,69
- (b) Additional provision on account of subventions to District Local Boards to which non-official Presidents with a self-contained office may be appointed.

Item (c)—The Bombay Municipal Corporation have agreed to the repeal of section 190 of the City of Bombay Municipal Act with a view to discontinuing the toll leviable on vehicles entering the city from Salsette which are not liable to the tax leviable under section 180 of the Act in return of an annual subsidy of 25 from Government.

110. Miscellaneous and unforeseen charges.—The high figures of the actuals of 1918-19 are due to the adjustment in the accounts of the loss in respect of rice transactions with Messrs. Ralli Brothers. The budget estimate for 1919-20 included a provision of 2,00 for reserve with the Financial Department for unforeseen charges and for additional postage and telegram charges. As expenditure met from this provision will be debited to the heads concerned, the revised estimate shows a large decrease. The absence of a lump provision under this head for additional postage and telegram charges is responsible for the decrease in budget estimate for 1920-21 as compared with the budget for last year.

111. War Boards.—The War Purposes Board and the Committees under it except the Re-settlement Committee were closed during last year. This accounts for the decrease in the revised estimate for 1919-20. The small provision in the budget estimate for 1920-21 is on account of the charges of the, Re-settlement Committee which continued till the end of last year.

112. Peace Celebrations.—The revised estimate for 1919-20 takes account of the amounts placed at the disposal of district officers in connection with the peace celebrations. These amounts are exclusive of the charges on account of illuminations which will be debited to Public Works grants.

114. For purposes of classification in the accounts, irrigation works are divided into (a) Productive Works, (b) Protective Works and (c) Minor Works and Navigation.

115. Productive Works are of a remunerative character undertaken for the improvement of the country. The capital outlay on these works is met from borrowed money and is recorded under the wholly Imperial head 49, Irrigation Works. The interest and the cost of maintenance and working are provided out of current revenues, the income being credited thereto. The receipts are credited to the head XXIX, and the interest and working expenses are debited to the head 42, Irrigation—Major Works and both are divided equally between Imperial and Provincial.

Works which, although not directly remunerative to the extent which would justify their inclusion in the class of Productive Works, are calculated to guard against or diminish future expenditure on famine relief are termed *Protective Works*. The cost of the construction of such works is paid out of the annual grants under famine relief and insurance and is charged to the. wholly Imperial head 35, Protective Irrigation Works. The receipts and interest and working expenses are, as in the case of Protective Works, classed under the heads XXIX, and 42, Irrigation—Major Works.

116. The head Minor Works and Navigation includes all classes of irrigation works other than the above. These are paid for out of current revenues and are classed under the head 43, Irrigation—Minor Works and Navigation.

#### Revenue.

117. Land Revenue due to major productive and protective works is shown under Portion of Land Revenue due to Irrigation, no separate account being kept for a considerable amount of land revenue earned by minor irrigation works. The decrease in the revised for 1919-20 is attributed to deficiency of water in the Eastern Nara, Unharwah, Jamrao and Dad canals. The budget for 1920-21 is based on the estimates furnished by District Officers.

118. Direct receipts.—The increase in the revised for 1919-20 is due mainly to the recovery of arrears on account of the sale of water from certain irrigation works. The increase in the budget for 1920-21 is due to better receipts anticipated from the Hathmati and Khari Cut canals and larger sale of water expected from the Godavari and Mutha canals.

#### Expenditure.

119. Working Expenses.—The increase in the revised for 1919-20 is due to larger expenditure on works, repairs and establishments. The increase in the budget for 1920-21 as compared with last year's budget is due mainly to higher cost of labour and materials.

120. Interest on Debt.—Interest on the irrigation debt is calculated at the average rate of interest paid during the year on the total public debt of the Government of India. The capital outlay upon which interest is calculated in 1920-21 is that incurred up to the end of 1919-20, *plus* half the estimated outlay during 1920-21. The average rate of interest adopted for 1919-20 and 1920-21 is 3'4818 per cent.

121. The revised estimate for 1919-20 is based on the latest actuals available and the budget for 1920-21 nearly follows the revised estimate.

#### Expenditure.

122. Civil Department.—The outlay represents charges on account of the repair of small irrigation tanks and free grants for the encouragement of irrigation in precarious tracts.

123. Public Works Department.—The increase in the revised estimate for 1919-20 is due to the large additional grants sanctioned during the year for works and repairs. Larger provision is made in the budget for 1920-21 for new works, while the higher cost of labour and materials helps to swell the charges.

#### Revenue.

124. Civil Officers.—Fees for masonry graves and receipts in respect of travellers' bungalows and miscellaneous public improvements are credited to this head. Recoveries of overpayments in past years and refunds of grants-in-aid are treated as miscellaneous receipts under this head. The actuals for 1916-17 included 1,07 on account of the refund by the Alandi municipality of the amount of grant-in-aid paid in 1915-16 towards its water-supply scheme.

125. Public Works Officers.—The receipts consist mainly of rents of buildings in charge of the Public Works Department, sale-proceeds of buildings, materials and produce, net profits from workshops and fines levied from contractors for failure in the execution of works. The increase in the revised for 1919-20 as compared with the budget is due to higher receipts expected from sales of buildings and from fines, etc. The budget for 1920-21 follows the revised estimate for 1919-20 after making allowance for the larger receipts from sales of buildings during last year.

The balance of non-recurring expenditure which is met from ordinary revenues amounts to 2,16,35.

Note 2.—The total expenditure provided in the budget estimates of each year is divided into three classes-permanent recurring (column 3), fluctuating recurring (column 4) and non-recurring (column 6). The fluctuating recurring expenditure includes items (like temporary establishments, plague allowance and contingencies) for which provision has to be made every year, but of which the amount varies from year to year. The lowest figure in the "Budget Estimate, 1920-21", "Revised Estimate, 1919-20", "Budget Estimate, 1919-20", and "Accounts, 1918-19", has generally been taken as the minimum recurring charge for each item, and the total of all such items is entered under column 4 against the major head concerned. The difference between the total budget provision for such items 3 and the minimum recurring charge entered in column 4 is taken as non-recurring, and this, together with the provision for purely temporary objects, has been classed as non-recurring and entered in column 6. This method is adopted in the case of all major heads, except 29, Superannuation Allowances and Pensions, 42, Irrigation—Major Works, 43, Irrigation—Minor Works (Public Works Department) and 45, Civil Works (Public Works Department). In the case of 29, Superannuation Allowances and Pensions, the provisions for gratuities and refunds are classed as fluctuating recurring, while all other items are treated as permanent recurring. The whole provision under 42, Irrigation Major Works—Interest on Debt is classed as permanent recurring. Under the heads 42, Irrigation—Major Works—Working Expenses and 43, Irrigation— Minor Works (Public Works Department), the provision on account of ordinary repairs establishments and tools and plant is classed as permanent recurring, the provision for special repairs and the minimum provision considered absolutely necessary for works in progress, new works, discretionary grants and reserve is classed as fluctuating recurring, and the balance is classed as non-recurring. Under the head 45, Civil Works (Public Works Department), the provision on account of repairs, establishments and tools and plant is classed as permanent recurring, the minimum provision considered absolutely necessary for works in progress, new works, discretionary grants and reserve is classed as fluctuating recurring and the balance is classed as non-recurring.
