INTRODUCTORY.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

The accounts are presented in the usual form to facilitate comparison with last year's figures. A second statement is, however, provided which shows, for the sake of clearness, the same figures in another form with the following changes:—

(a) The Development figures are excluded from both sides and from the opening and closing balances.

(b) The total Irrigation expenditure is shown on the expenditure side instead of deducting working expenses on the revenue side.

2. It should be noted that expenditure includes 20 lakhs of reserve, and a foot-note explains that this reserve with the Finance Department is intended to meet unforeseen expenditure under the various heads which may be transferred in any emergency without further reference to the Legislative Council in the following proportions:—

60 per cent. for Reserved Departments;

40 per cent. for Transferred Departments.

Experience has shown that in practice practically every Department of Government has to meet unforeseen expenditure in the course of the year, and this can only be met by re-appropriations from some provision made in the budget. In the current year a margin on which Government could draw was provided (a) by changes in the opening balance involving smaller withdrawals than were at first anticipated from our balances with the Government of India; (b) by the reduction of grants asked for in the Legislative Council; and (c) from the exiguous provision of 1 lakh provided last year. The provision of a reasonable reserve in each Department would aggregate too high a figure, and it is therefore considered desirable to lump the reserve in one sum under the control of the Finance Department, with power to transfer it to any Department in which an unforeseen need arises when Council is not sitting, without further reference to Council. It is not proposed to exclude Council in any way from control of this additional provision. The Finance Department will, in the first place, see that the expenditure is in accordance with the general wishes of Council, and is only incurred without Council's prior consent in the event of a real emergency, and all grants will be immediately reported to the Finance Committee for their information. Where no such emergency arises, supplementary grants will be asked for in the usual way. It is absolutely essential, however, that some reserve should exist for the purposes of practical administration, and that in an emergency Government should be in a position to make provision without waiting for the next Sessions.

3. Further, expenditure also includes a statutory provision of 63,60 which is not intended to be wholly spent. Last year Government marked this statutory provision for expenditure on

(a) famine;

(b) protective irrigation;

and eventually spent considerably more than the provision made for famine. This year we desire to build up a famine reserve, and in order to do so have under the rules to provide on the expenditure side a sum greater than our expected expenditure, as only savings from such provision can go to the reserve at the end of the year. We aim, with the assistance of taxation (1 crore estimated under the revenue heads VII and XXXV), at a small excess of revenue over expenditure after allowing 36½ lakhs as savings out of the provision of 63,60 made under 43. So far we have only an expenditure of 3 lakhs in sight against this provision, so that, given a fairly normal year, we are safe in providing 2½ lakhs for possible famine expenditure.

4. In addition to the revenue and expenditure figures, we show as usual the capital account figures under the distinct headings 'Receipts' and 'Disbursements'. The distinction between 'Revenue' and 'Receipts,' or 'Expenditure' and 'Disbursements' must be noted. Accountancy demands a capital account as well as a revenue account. Productive irrigation has always been financed from capital, and this year a useful step forward has been taken in similarly debiting to capital large works, the expenditure on which should undoubtedly be spread over a series of years and not met from one year's revenue. Loans, advances, etc., are credited to the capital account under the head receipts, and expenditure on large operations, which are appropriately financed from capital, is debited to the same under the head disbursements. This banking account, as it may be termed, shows the surplus or deficit, as the case may be, on the receipts or disbursements side, the loans, advances, or deposits made and credited to Government and all expenditure debited to capital, and both sides are then balanced by the addition of the opening balance on the receipts side and the closing balance on the revenue side. Interest charges are not shown in this capital account as they are properly met from current revenues. When loans are taken for unproductive purposes, a sinking fund is formed, and this is shown as expenditure in the revenue account for the same reason, but also as a receipt in the banking account, accumulating till in the fulness of time it is wiped off by the repayment of the loan when a corresponding entry is made on the disbursement side. It is necessary, therefore, in order to find the total expenditure of any department to consider the expenditure figure both in the revenue account and in the capital account. The expenditure of the Development Department is shown wholly in the capital account except the charges for debt services. The *total* expenditure under various heads is shown in Statement C.

The total expenditure for which provision is made is thus

5. Loan money is provided for ordinary expenditure as follows :—

(a) *Irrigation*.—Expenditure is confined under rules to construction of a lasting character, and the rapid completion of the big Deccan irrigation works at Batghar and Bhandhardara with a consequent saving of overhead charges and an earlier return of revenue is thus insured. These works are only partly productive and a sinking fund is provided (at 4 per cent. for 60 years) to pay off the loan raised. When these works are completed, it will be for Council to say whether new irrigation works should be commenced, or whether we should first revise our system of assessment and make such works wholly productive before embarking on any further expenditure on Deccan irrigation. At present land under command does not pay enough to cover interest charges, and the general tax-payer has to make up a very considerable deficit, say, 4 per cent. on any money raised for Deccan Irrigation.

(b) *Civil Works*.—No new works are contemplated; but we aim at the completion or reasonable progress of works hitherto financed from revenue. A sinking fund will be provided, and in addition to each department concerned will be debited a charge at $1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. for maintenance which will be transferred to the Public Works Department repair grant. When the works are completed it will, as in the case of Irrigation, be for Council to say if any,

and what, new works should be undertaken in the future. A long list of such works, many of them extremely urgent, awaits the allotment of funds, but there is no place for any of them in a strictly economy budget.

(c) Special non-recurring expenditure is provided for by loan under the heads—

The financial effect of this expenditure from loan funds is to increase our expenditure from revenue for the next 60 years by 13,65 lakhs only (2,55 only this year), and in return we secure economical progress with works in hand, productive development under Forests, Excise, Stationery and Printing, and Public Health. The extent to which loans will be raised in future years depends in a great measure on the Council's demand for permanent improvement and development; but we are not committing Government at present to more than the recurring expenditure from revenue shown above. Last year's loan of 90 lakhs was finally distributed as follows :—

II. Taxes on Income.

6. Under revised rule 15 of the Devolution Rules the whole cost of income-tax establishments is to be borne by the Central Government, and Provincial Government is to receive from the Central Revenues a sum calculated at the rate of three pies in the rupee not on the assessed income for 1922-23 but on the amount by which the assessed income of that year is estimated to exceed the assessed income of the year 1920-21. The question regarding the determination of the assessed income of 1920-21 for the Bombay Presidency is still under consideration, but pending such determination, the estimate of 3,00 communicated by the Government of India has been entered on the receipt side as Provincial share of "Taxes on Income".

Revenue.

7. The decrease in the revised as compared with the budget for 1921-22 for Land Revenue proper is due to the fact that the portion of revenue under

suspension during the past year, which was put down for collection during the current year, has had to be further suspended as the season is not so good as was expected owing to excessive kharif rains in parts of Gujarat and failure of late October and November rains in parts of the Deccan (especially Ahmednagar, Poona, Satara and Nasik Districts). For the same reason the rabi crop is not expected to be very good. The increases in the revised as compared with the budget for the current year under Miscellaneous Revenue and Refunds are based on the latest figures furnished by the district officers, and the decrease of 38 under Assessment of alienated lands is chiefly due to relinquishment and forfeiture of some inam lands in certain districts.

8. The increase in the budget for 1922-23 as compared with the budget for 1921-22 is due mainly to a large portion of revenue under suspension having been put down for collection during the next year. The estimate is framed on the assumption that the next season will prove normal. The figures of the estimated demand, collections, remissions and suspensions of ordinary revenue for the years 1921-22 and 1922-23 are given below :—

Expenditure.

9. The decrease in the revised as compared with the current year's budget is chiefly due to (i) the transfer to "22—General Administration" of charges on account of District Administration in those cases where the expenditure on account of a particular office is charged to more than one major head, (ii) the relinquishment and forfeiture of inam lands in certain districts, and (iii) the expenditure in England from 2,46 to 28. On the other hand additional expenditure of 37 has already been sanctioned by the Legislative Council, for the revision of pay of Patels in the Kanara District, of the city survey establishment in the Presidency proper and of the Collection-of-Ghee-Tax establishment in Thar Parkar.

10. *Charges of District Administration.*—The decrease in the budget for 1922-23 as compared with the budget for 1921-22 is due mainly to (i) transfer to "22—General Administration" of charges on account of District Administration in those cases where the expenditure on account of a particular office or establishment is charged to more than one major head, and (ii) reduction under the sub-head "Contingencies" on account of postage and telegram charges, construction of chavdis and purchase of tents. The decrease is partly counterbalanced by the increased provision due to revision of pay of clerical establishments, new provision for leave and deputation allowances, and transfer of discretionary grants of Commissioners from "22, General Administration" to this major head.

11. *Survey and Settlement*.—The small decrease is due to omission of the provision on account of Europe stores for the Photozincographic Office, Poona, which has been separately provided for under the minor head "Expenditure in England". Please see paragraph 6 below.

This is counterbalanced by (i) the increased provision for revision of pay, (ii) provision for temporary appointment of an Assistant to the Consulting Surveyor at Karachi, and (iii) provision for leave and deputation allowances.

12. *Land Records*.—The increase in the budget estimate for 1922-23 is mainly due to (i) revision of pay, (ii) increased provision (a) for the establishment of the Superintendent, Bombay City Survey, and (b) for contingencies for Superintendents of Land Records, as full provision was not made for these two sub-heads in the current year owing to misapprehension, and (iii) new provision for leave and deputation allowances. The increase is partly counterbalanced by reduced provision for (i) pay of talatis and (ii) travelling allowances and contingencies of Kanungo establishments.

13. *Allowances to District and Village Officers*.—The increase is principally due to the provision for the proposed additional remuneration to Shetsanadis in the Karnatak and increased provision for allowances to Village Executive Officers.

14. *Compensations*.—The increase is due to increased provision for (i) payments of inams not exceeding Rs. 5,000 and (ii) fixed allowances. It is partly counterbalanced by the reduction in the provision for commutations.

15. *Expenditure in England*.—The provision for the current year was made according to the sanctioned estimate. But it is not expected to be fully utilised. For next year the budget provides for expected charges on account of (i) freight and value of Europe Stores for the Photozincographic Office, Poona, (ii) law charges in connection with appeals from India and (iii) payment of leave allowances in England.

Revenue.

16. *License and distillery fees, etc.*—The decrease of 86,01 in the revised as compared with the current year's budget occurs mainly under country-spirit and toddy revenue. The decrease is due (i) to an amount of about 40,00 on account of vend fees in municipal areas in the Presidency proper, due for the current year, having been collected in advance in March 1921, and entered in last year's accounts, and (ii) to picketing movement and consequent decrease in consumption. The decrease of 45,66 in the ensuing year's estimate as compared with the current year's budget is due to anticipated fall in vend fees and general unfavourable conditions.

17. *Gain on sale proceeds of excise opium.*—The diminution of 8,00 in the revised as compared with the current year's budget is due to (i) high price of the drug and consequent decrease in consumption, and (ii) the auction bids being considerably below those for the previous triennium. The decrease of 7,00 in next year's estimate as compared with the current year's budget is due to the same reasons.

18. *Hemp drugs.*—The increase of 1,04 in the revised as compared with the current year's budget is based on the latest actuals furnished by district officers. The decrease of 67 in next year's estimate as compared with the current year's budget is mainly due to the exclusion of receipts of about 3,15 on account of duty on charas in the Presidency proper, where the consumption

of the drug is to be prohibited from next year. The decrease in duty on charas is partly counterbalanced by anticipated increased receipts under vend fees and duty on ganja.

19. *Fines, Confiscations and Miscellaneous.*—The small increase in the revised as compared with the current year's budget is based on the latest actuals furnished by district officers. The next year's estimate is based on the current year's revised.

Expenditure.

20. The decrease in the revised as compared with the current year's budget is mainly in the share debitable to Provincial Government for combined Salt and Excise establishment, partially counterbalanced by increased Expenditure in England.

21. *Presidency establishment.*—The increase of 48 in next year's budget as compared with the 1921-22 budget is due to the provision of 40 for the provincial share of the expenditure on account of the Customs and Excise laboratory, and larger provision for temporary and provisional allowances owing to the increase from Rs. 6 to Rs. 10 of the rate of allowance admissible to menials in the Town and Island of Bombay.

22. *District executive establishment.*—The increase of 27 in next year's budget as compared with 1921-22 budget is due mainly to (a) the misclassification in the 1921-22 budget of certain charges (about 60) properly debitable to this head on account of the pay and temporary and provisional allowance of the Excise menial staff, and (b) the provision of 15 for clothing to menials, partially counterbalanced by the absence of the provision of 42 made in 1921-22 for the repacking of the purification filters at the Khanapur Distillery.

23. *Excise compensations.*—The decrease of 27 is the net result of (a) the absence of the provision of 2,23 made in 1921-22 for adjustment of the amounts of compensation paid to Native States for the lease of their Abkari Revenue, (b) increased provision of 36 owing to revision with effect from 1st October 1921 of leases of Abkari Revenue of States in the Mahi Kantha Agency, and (c) increase of 1,60 due to the renewal with effect from 1st April 1921 of Hemp Drugs leases of Native States.

24. *Expenditure in England.*—The increase of 8 is due mainly to larger provision for leave allowances payable in England.

Revenue.

25. The decrease in the current year's revised and next year's budget is due to smaller receipts from the scale of general and court-fee stamps and from duty on impressing documents owing to the general depression of trade and to lack of speculative purchases of property.

Expenditure.

26. The decrease in the current year's revised is chiefly due to the decrease in the charges for the sale of general stamps. It has been partially counterbalanced by an additional grant for increased rent for the Central Stamp Depot at Karachi sanctioned by the Legislative Council.

27. *Superintendence.*—The increase of 12 in next year's budget compared with current year's budget is due to (i) revision of pay—8, (ii) provision for leave and deputation allowance—7, and (iii) increased charge for rent of the office of Superintendent of Stamps, Karachi—7, counterbalanced by a decrease of 10 which was made in the current year's estimate for purchase of an electric machine for Impressment work in the office of Superintendent of Stamps; Bombay.

28. *Charges for the sale of general and Court fee stamps.*—The decrease of 30 is due to the reduced provision on account of discount for sale of stamps, the receipts from which during the next year are expected to be less than in the current year.

29. *Expenditure in England.*—The increase of 62 over the current year's figure is due to the excess provision on account of expenditure in England for stamp and plain paper supplied from Central Stores against the current year's provision of 1,61.

Revenue.

30. *Timber, etc., removed by Government Agency.*—The decrease in the current year's revised and next year's budget is due to the fall of price of timber owing to the unfavourable London market.

31. *Timber, etc., removed by consumers or purchasers.*—The decrease in the current year's revised is due to lower prices obtained for coupes and poor demand for minor produce. The increase in next year's budget is due to (1) larger demand for timber from the saw mills and the Bombay Development Department, (2) the improvement of forest communications combined with the introduction of mechanical transport facilities to meet the probable demand for timber and fuel better than hitherto, and (3) the realization of the surplus revenue from the new contracts with the Madras and S. M. Railway.

Expenditure.

32. The increase in the current year's revised is due to (1) 3,72 for taking up new contracts with the Madras and Southern Mahratta Railway for supply of railway fuel and sleepers and for supply of fuel in Sind (this expenditure is remunerative), (2) 5,31 for famine fodder, (3) 77 for expenditure on additional exploitation in the Sind Circle, and (4) 30 for increments to Rangers and Foresters in connection with the revision of salaries.

33. A saving of about 2,54 is anticipated in the sanctioned estimate which is chiefly due to (1) the impending closure of the Dharwar Forest College (1,53), (2) arrival of two Forest engineers in India later than was anticipated (26), (3) suspension of the departmental working at the Mahabaleshwar depôt, (4) curtailment of expenditure on roads, bridges and buildings in the Central Circle and (5) failure of contractors to work up to agreements for delivery of timber at the depôts in the Southern Circle.

34. The estimate of 60,00 for next year is exclusive of 10,00 for productive works to be met out of loan.

35. *Conservancy and works.*—The reduction is principally due to the decrease by 1,28 in the provision for purchase of stores and construction of roads, bridges and buildings as they will be financed out of loan funds.

36. *Establishments.*—The increase is due chiefly to revisions of salaries. The principal variations are as follows :—

Increase of 21 on account of the Provincial Forest Service and Ranger students at Dehra Dun, 3,51 for subordinate forest and depôt establishments, 2,70 for office establishments, 10 for temporary establishments, 66 for enhanced rates of permanent travelling allowance, 61 for increased pay to Extra Assistant Conservators, and 12 for increased pay to Extra Deputy Conservators promoted to the Imperial Service.

Against this there is a reduction of 1,47 for deputation and special allowances, omission of the provision of 3,60 for revision of salaries of subordinate establishments, and a reduction of 2,69 in the provision for the Dharwar Forest College.

Revenue.

37. The decrease in the current year's revised and next year's budget is mainly under "Fees for registering documents" and is due to reduction in speculative purchases of properties.

Expenditure.

38. The increase of 95 under 'District Charges' as compared with the current year's budget is due to the provision of 1,13 for arrears of revised pay for 1920-21 for which there is no provision in the current year's budget. It is partly counterbalanced by smaller provision (60 against 75 in the current year) on account of 'service postage and telegrams'.

Irrigation Revenue and Expenditure.

39. Till the year 1921-22 irrigation works were divided for accounts purposes into two classes, *viz.*, major works, *i.e.*, those which were financed either from loans or from famine insurance funds, and minor works, *i.e.*, those which were financed from ordinary revenues. Receipts from both classes of works were divided equally between the Imperial and Provincial Governments, and so were charges with the exception of capital expenditure on major works which was borne wholly by the Imperial Government, either from revenues or from loans.

40. Under the Reforms receipts and expenditure relating to all kinds of irrigation works are wholly Provincial, while the method of classification in the accounts has undergone considerable alteration. The Irrigation section of accounts has now to include Irrigation, Navigation, Embankments and also Drainage works required for relief of water-logging, whether for agricultural or anti-malarial purposes, or for both. These works are divided into two main categories, *viz.*, works for which capital accounts are kept and those for which such accounts are not kept.

41. The expenditure on works for which capital accounts are kept may be provided from ordinary revenues, from Famine Insurance Grants, or from other sources of which the most important is loans, but this expenditure shall be booked under one major head '55'. This head will be divided so as to show (A) Irrigation and (B) Navigation, Embankment and Drainage Works separately, each of these divisions being again sub-divided into (i) productive and (ii) unproductive works. The major head '55' is, however, intended to include only expenditure incurred outside the revenue account and it is therefore necessary to deduct from this head the capital expenditure defrayed from general revenues and to show it in the revenue section of the accounts. There will thus be two deductions in lump sums at the foot of the account of the major head '55' and the amounts thus deducted from the head '55' are booked, without details of works, under the major head '16'—A—Financed from Famine Insurance Grants and B—Financed from Ordinary Revenues, according to the source from which funds are provided. The interest on capital expenditure is provided from ordinary revenues and is shown under the head '14'. The revenue on works for which capital accounts are kept is shown under the revenue head XIII, which is divided into (1) productive and (2) unproductive. Working Expenses are to be shown as a deduction from revenue under each of these two sub-divisions separately.

42. The expenditure on works for which capital accounts are not kept is wholly financed from ordinary revenues and is booked under the head '15', the revenue on such works being shown under the head XIV.

XIII.—Irrigation, Navigation, Embankment and Drainage Works for which Capital Accounts are kept.

Revenue.

43. The revenue from irrigation works includes (a) direct receipts from sales of water, plantations and other canal produce, etc., and (b) the portion of land revenue due to irrigation in respect of productive and unproductive works. These receipts are wholly Provincial.

44. The working expenses of works for which capital accounts are kept are to be deducted from receipts. Similarly refunds of revenue, which were formerly treated as an item of expenditure, will now be treated as *minus* revenue to be deducted before the total of the gross receipts is struck.

45. The budget and revised estimates of revenue for the current year and the budget estimate for the ensuing year are as shown below :—

46. The increase in gross revenue of 2,00 in the revised as compared with the budget estimate for 1921-22 is due to larger demand for water on the Godavari, Pravara and Krishna Canals and Ekruk Tank. The increase in working expenses is mainly due to substantial increase in canal clearance in Sind being found necessary.

47. The budget estimate for 1922-23 shows improvement on the current year's revised estimate and the increase is partly due to extension of cultivation of sugarcane under the Godavari and Pravara Canals and Kadwa River works and partly to decrease in working expenses owing to certain permanent works, which were hitherto being charged to working expenses, are now proposed to be charged to the capital account of the canals concerned.

XIV.—Irrigation, Navigation, Embankment and Drainage works for which no Capital Accounts are kept.

Revenue.

48. The revenue under this head for works for which no capital accounts are kept includes only receipts from sales of water, plantations and other canal produce, etc., and no credit is afforded to this class of works on account of the portion of land revenue due to irrigation.

49. The budget and revised estimates for 1921-22 and the budget estimate for 1922-23 are as shown below :—

14.—Interest on Works for which Capital Accounts are kept.

Expenditure (Reserved).

51. Under No. 24 of the Devolution Rules the capital sum spent by the Governor General in Council upon the construction of productive and protective irrigation works and of other works financed from loan funds is to be treated as an advance made to the local Government from the revenues of India. This advance is to carry interest at the following rates :—

- (a) In the case of outlay (Rs. 7,62,50,807) up to the end of the financial year 1916-17 at the rate of 3·3252 *per centum*...25,35.
- (b) In the case of outlay (Rs. 1,30,95,424) incurred after the financial year 1916-17 up to the end of the financial year 1920-21 at the rate of 5·1979 *per cent.* 6,81.

15.—Other Revenue Expenditure financed from Ordinary Revenues.

Expenditure (Reserved).

55. The works accounted for under this head will in most cases be financed partly from ordinary revenues and partly from the Famine Insurance Grant or Fund, since small works having a protective aspect and famine surveys are legitimate objects of expenditure from that Fund. As the expenditure on all works for which capital accounts are not kept is to be booked in the first instance under this head without reference to the source from which the funds are to be provided it will be necessary to deduct at the foot of the account of this major head a lump sum showing the amount financed from the Famine Insurance Fund, the residue representing the amount financed from ordinary revenues. The amount thus deducted will be shown in lump sum under a separate major head "15 (1)—Other Revenue Expenditure financed from Famine Insurance Grants".

56. The budget and revised estimates under this head for the current year and the budget estimate for the ensuing year are as shown below :—

57. The increase in the revised as compared with the budget estimate for 1921-22 is mainly due to larger expenditure in connection with repairs to canals and bunds in Sind. In order to meet a part of this excess expenditure a supplementary grant of 1,33 was voted by the Legislative Council in September last.

58. The budget estimate for 1922-23 shows a decrease as compared with the current year's budget, which is mainly due to the fact that the latter included a provision of 2,50 for a steamer for the Indus River Commission, which has however not been utilised for that purpose and is now being utilised to meet other urgent demands. The provision made for the ensuing year is thus normal.

60. According to the revised procedure of irrigation accounts this head is intended to show the capital expenditure on irrigation works provided from Famine Insurance Grants and Ordinary revenue, but no details of works will be booked under this head. It will merely contain the two lump sums to be deducted at the foot of the account of the major head "55" as described under that head. It is thus purely a transfer head.

63. The ordinary revenue represents the interest received by the Local Government on advances and loans from the Provincial Loan Account. This account, the capital transactions of which are outside the ordinary budget figures, provides for the grant of loans to agriculturists, local bodies, Indian States, etc. Government has to pay interest on the amounts borrowed either from the Central Government or from the public and to bear any losses on account of bad debts. In order to cover risks and cost of management Government charge a higher rate of interest than that which they have to pay. The present rate is $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. for all loans but it is less than that in certain special cases.

64. The revenue of the Bombay Development Department shown under this head is discussed in the accompanying memorandum.

Expenditure.

65. Under this head the following is shown as ordinary expenditure :—

(i) 13,31—The interest to be paid by the Local Government to the Central Government on the balance of the Provincial Loan Account. The rate of interest charged to the Local Government is 4.752 per cent.

(ii) 5,85—The interest on the amount of loans advanced by the Government of India during the current year for general purposes at 6.5 per cent.

(iii) 1,25 is the further provision made for interest charges in connection with the loan of Rs. 115.5 lakhs which it is proposed to raise in the ensuing year for other than irrigational purposes as explained under the head *Debts, Deposits and Advances* below. As regards the expenditure of the Bombay Development Department shown under this head, *vide* remarks in the accompanying memorandum.

66. A provision of 9,39 equal to one per cent. of the loan of 9,38,91 raised in 1920-21 in connection with the Development of Bombay has been made in the current year's budget to form a depreciation fund. This has been repeated in next year's budget.

67. In the current year an advance of 90,00 will be drawn from the Government of India for general purposes. As this amount will be utilized solely for productive works it is not necessary to make any provision for sinking funds. In 1922-23 it is proposed to raise a loan of rupees two crores out of which about 42,00 will be utilized for productive works, and about 1,58,00 for unproductive. A provision of 38 for seven months has been made in next year's budget to pay off the loan of 1,58,00 (at 4 per cent. for 60 years). This is a non-voted head.

The variations under minor heads are explained below.

69. *Staff and Household of the Governor.*—The decrease in the revised estimate for 1921-22 is due to the transfer from this head of the grants of 1,10 and 11 for the Royal Visit and Darbar presents, etc., respectively, to the head "47—Miscellaneous". The absence of these provisions also accounts for the decrease in the next year's estimate.

70. *Executive Council.*—The saving in the current year's revised estimate is in the grant for travelling allowance.

71. *Legislative Council.*—The current year's budget estimates for salary of the President and travelling allowance for non-official Members were unduly high. The following provisions have been made in the ensuing year's budget:—

72. *Civil Secretariat.*—The decrease in the revised estimate is due to the transfer to the Public Works Department of the grant of Rs. 7,50,000 for purchase and construction of houses for Government officers. The decrease is partially counterbalanced by (i) discontinuance of the transfer of seven-tenth portion of the cost of the joint establishment of the Legal Department and the Remembrancer of Legal Affairs to the head "24—Administration of Justice" under the revised system of classification of accounts, and (ii) expenditure on the Retrenchment Committee and its staff. These factors, together with a provision of 85 for payment of leave allowances in India, are also responsible for the difference in the budget of 1922-23 compared with that of 1921-22.

73. *Director of Land Records and Inspector General of Registration.*—Provision for this item was hitherto made under “5—Land Revenue”, but under the revised account system it has been transferred to “22—General Administration”.

74. *Local Fund Audit Establishments.*—The decrease in the current year’s revised and next year’s budget estimates is due to one-fourth share being debited to Central Revenues. It is partially counterbalanced by an increase on travelling allowances owing to enhanced rates of railway fare and daily allowance.

75. *Commissioner in Sind.*—The increase in the ensuing year’s budget estimates is due mainly to provisions for (i) revision of pay and reorganisation of the offices of the Commissioner in Sind and the Sindhi Translator to Government (25), and (ii) leave allowances in India.

76. *Commissioners of Divisions.*—The excess in the revised estimates for the current year is mainly under (i) salaries, due to payment of leave allowances in India, and (ii) travelling allowances. These items, together with a provision of 10 for the temporary removal of the office of the Commissioner, Central Division, to a new building account for the increase in the budget of 1922-23.

77. *Charges of District Administration.*—These charges were hitherto debited to the head “5—Land Revenue”, but under revised classification they have been transferred to the head “22—General Administration”. The ensuing year’s estimate includes a new item of 1,95 for leave allowances in India and increased provisions for (i) new recruits to, and Indian candidates for, the Indian Civil Service, and (ii) temporary appointments of Deputy Collectors. The salary for the leave reserve of the Indian Civil Service has been provided under this minor head, *viz.*, “Charges of District Administration”, but as provision for leave allowances payable in England has also been made under the minor head “Expenditure in England” mentioned in the next paragraph of this note, a lump deduction of 4,00 has been made from this minor head.

78. *Expenditure in England.*—The provision of 5,53 for 1922-23 has been made as intimated by the Secretary of State and the High Commissioner for India.

Revenue.

79. The principal source of revenue is general fees, fines and forfeitures. The decrease in the current year's revised and next year's budget is mainly under magisterial fines.

Expenditure.

80. *High Court.*—The increase in the current year's revised is due to revision of establishments and that in next year's budget is due to the lump provision of Rs. 1 lakh made on account of the revision of High Court establishments and Sind Judicial establishments.

81. *Law Officers.*—The decrease in next year's budget is due to the discontinuance under the revised classification of the annual transfer of seven-tenths share of the office of the Remembrancer of Legal Affairs from General Administration, partially counterbalanced by larger provisions under "Public Prosecutor's fees in Criminal Cases" and "Fees in Criminal and Civil Cases".

82. *Presidency Magistrates' Courts.*—The increase of revised estimate and the estimate for the next year as compared with the sanctioned estimate during the current year is chiefly due to the revision of pay of the establishments.

83. *Civil and Sessions Courts.*—Excluding about 1,38 on account of arrears payment on account of revision of establishments during the last six months of the last year which will not recur, the latest 6+6 months' actuals are 36,38, but the revised estimate is taken at 37,50 in view of the progress of actuals in the first six months of the current year.

The decrease in the budget estimate for the next year as compared with the budget estimate for the current year is due mainly to omission of the following items :—

and to the fact that only about one-half of the lump provision of 5 lakhs for revision of establishments made during the current year has been utilized under this minor head.

84. *Courts of Small Causes.*—The increase in next year's budget is due chiefly to the revision of establishments.

85. *Criminal Courts.*—Excluding fixed adjustments amounting to 9,95 on account of the salaries of the officers and their travelling allowances annually transferred from "5.—Land Revenue" to this major head, the charges for which are now being debited to the major head "22.—General Administration" the 6+6 months' actuals are 6,38 and the revised estimate and the estimate for the next year have been taken at 6,52 and 6,39 respectively on the progress of actuals in the first six months of this year.

86. *Leave allowances paid in England.*—The decrease in the current year's revised is in accordance with the intimation received from the High Commissioner for India and is apparently due to smaller number of officers on leave.

Revenue.

87. The receipts under this head consist of hire of convict labour, recoveries of transportation and jail charges from Indian States and sale-proceeds of articles manufactured in Jails. The increase over the current year's budget occurs mainly under sale-proceeds of Jail manufactures.

Expenditure.

88. The increase in the revised estimate under head (1) is due to extra expenditure on account of the revised scale of pay of establishments and under head (2) is due to expenditure for the purchase of raw materials at the current high market rates.

89. The increase in the next year's estimate under head (1) over the current year's is due to increased provision on account of the revision of the pay of establishments and increased charges in connection with the Settlement of Criminal Tribes, partly counterbalanced by the reduction in the dietary charges on account of favourable rates of foodstuffs and the probable release of prisoners as a result of the revision of sentences recommended by the Indian Jails Committee—the total excess being also due to the addition of Home Charges on account of stores and leave allowances.

Revenue.

90. The decrease in the revised for 1921-22 as compared with the budget for the same year is due to smaller receipts anticipated by the Commissioner of Police, Bombay, under fees recoverable for licenses under the Motor Act, which are credited to the minor head "Presidency Police". The decrease is partially counterbalanced by enhanced receipts under the head miscellaneous under "Fees, fines and forfeitures."

91. The departmental estimate under Presidency Police for next year was too low, and the figure adopted in the budget is based on the revised for the current year. The estimates for next year under other minor heads are repetitions of the current year's budget.

Expenditure.

92. *Presidency Police.*—The difference between the budget estimates for 1921-22 and the revised estimate of the same year is based on the latest actuals furnished by the departmental officers. The increase in the budget for 1922-23 as compared with the budget for 1921-22 is due to (1) increase in the armed strength of the Bombay City Police, (2) purchase of a motor lorry (fourth) and upkeep of four motor lorries and the payment of allowances to the drivers of the lorries, (3) rental to be paid to the Bombay Improvement Trust for the Police Accommodation Schemes which have been completed by the Trust and occupied by the Police, and (4) increase in the Contract Grant of the Commissioner of Police.

93. *Superintendence.*—The increase in the revised estimate of 1921-22 as compared with the budget for the same year is mainly due to the increased expenditure (i) under "Establishments," chiefly due to the revision of pay of the clerical establishments of the Inspector General of Police and the Deputy Inspectors General of Police in the Presidency proper, and (ii) under "Contingencies." The increase in the budget for 1922-23 as compared with the budget for 1921-22 occurs mainly under "Salaries and Allowances" and "Travelling Allowances".

94. *District Executive Force.*—The increase in the revised estimates for 1921-22 as compared with the budget for that year is due to (i) the revision of the Police clerical establishments in the Presidency proper and (ii) the increased expenditure under—

- (a) Travelling allowance,
- (b) House rent allowances,
- (c) Cost of Railway Warrants,
- (d) Additional Police establishments including extra Armed Police at Karachi,
- (e) Advance made with the sanction of Legislative Council for payment of urgent claims for compensation for loss during riots at Malegaon,*
- (f) Grant of Grain Compensation allowance to the Constabulary.

The difference between the budget for 1921-22 and 1922-23 being small, does not require any detailed explanation.

95. *Special Police.*—The difference between the budget estimate for 1921-22 and the revised estimate for that year is based on the latest actuals furnished by the departmental officers. The increase in the Budget for 1922-23 as compared with the budget for 1921-22 is due to the increased provisions made under (i) Contract Contingencies, (ii) Clothing Charges and (iii) Service Postage and Telegram Charges, and (iv) Travelling allowance, and to the additional provisions made for the following principal items:—

- (a) Local allowance to the Kathiawar Agency Police stationed at Bhuj, and
- (b) Revision of the clerical establishment of the Agency Police at Kathiawar.

96. *Railway Police.*—The increase in the revised estimate for 1921-22 as compared with the budget for that year is due (1) to increased expenditure under (i) Travelling allowance, (ii) Service Postage and Telegram Charges and (iii) House Rents, and (2) to the revised rates of pay of the Railway Police clerical establishments. The increase in the budget estimate for 1922-23 as compared with the budget estimate for 1921-22 is due to (1) the increased provisions under Contract Contingencies, House Rents, Service Postage and Telegram Charges and Salaries and Establishments chiefly due to the revision of pay of the Police clerical establishments, and (2) the additional provisions made for the following items:—

- (a) The payment of bills for messages sent on G. I. P. and B. B. & C. I. and other Railways, reporting crimes under Indian Penal Code, Abkari Act, etc.

* NOTE.—This amount has been formally adjusted under 26, Police but does not actually represent police expenditure.

(t) Increase in the rent for office accommodation of the Railway Police Sub-Inspector at Grant Road.

97. *Criminal Investigation Department.*—The increase in the budget for 1922-23 as compared with the budget for 1921-22 is due to (i) the increased provisions made under Rent, Rates and Taxes, Subscriptions to Newspapers, Contract Contingencies, Service Postage and Telegram Charges and Travelling allowance, and (ii) the provision made for the reorganization of the Criminal Investigation Department in Sind.

98. *Leave Allowances, etc., paid in England.*—The increase in the Budget for 1922-23 as compared with the budget for 1921-22 is based on the estimates furnished by the High Commissioner.

99. Under the Reforms, ports, except such as may be declared to be major ports, and inland waterways, including shipping and navigation thereon, so far as they are not declared to be Central subjects, are Provincial subjects. The other subjects are Central.

Expenditure.

100. The first two minor heads relate to charges in connection with the steamer *Jhelum* and the flat *Multan* which are placed at the disposal of the Commissioner in Sind for touring purposes.

101. Under the Reforms only the receipts in connection with the survey of inland vessels and the cost of the establishment thereof are to be treated as Provincial, while those connected with ocean-going vessels are to be treated as Central. The expenditure connected with the Marine Survey Department is to be treated as for a joint establishment, but pending the decision on the question regarding the apportionment of the cost of the Department between the Central and the Provincial Governments the whole cost is debited to this minor head. The decrease in the revised estimate as compared with the current year's budget is mainly due to the non-utilization of the lump provisions for the revision of pay of the existing Shipwright Surveyors and for the appointments of two additional Surveyors. The new budget provides for two additional Surveyors as well as for the grant of increased salaries to the existing Surveyors.

102. *Miscellaneous.*—The absence of the current year's special provision on account of the contribution to the Landing and Wharfage Fees Fund and for the improvement of the chief ports of the Southern Coast accounts for there being no provision under this minor head next year.

103. *Hydro-Electric Survey.*—The office of the Electrical Engineer in charge Hydro-Electric Survey was abolished with effect from November 1921. It accounts for the decrease in the revised estimate as compared with the current year's budget.

104. *Provincial Museums.*—Government have promised an annual grant of 30 towards the maintenance of the Prince of Wales Museum, Bombay. The Museum also receives an annual contribution of 25 from the Bombay Municipality. This contribution is also in effect a grant from Government as it was taken as a set-off against the Municipality's share of the City Police charges which were taken over by Government in 1907. The new budget provides for a special grant of 2 to the Nagarkhana Museum, Bijapur.

105. *Donation to Scientific Societies.*—A supplementary grant of 40 was voted by the Legislative Council as a non-recurring grant-in-aid to the Bombay Natural History Society to cover the expenditure of removing the Society's collections to the Prince of Wales Museum. This is responsible for the increase in the revised estimate for the current year. The new budget contains the following items among others :—

Revenue.

106. *University.*—The fees from Government Arts and Professional Colleges are now credited to this head. The ensuing year's estimates provide for larger fee receipts from Government Arts and Professional Colleges on account of the proposal to increase the rates of fees in these institutions.

107. *Secondary.*—The ensuing year's estimates provide for larger fee receipts from secondary schools on account of the proposed increase of fees in these institutions.

108. *General.*—The following receipts are credited to this head :—

- (i) Sale-proceeds of books,
- (ii) Workshop receipts,
- (iii) Yeravda Reformatory School receipts,
- (iv) Vernacular Final Examination fees,
- (v) London Chamber of Commerce Certificate Examination fees.
- (vi) Drawing and Arts Examination fees at the School of Art,
- (vii) Government Scholarship Examination fees,
- (viii) Secondary Teachers' Examination fees,
- (ix) Contributions,
- (x) Income from endowments,
- (xi) Miscellaneous.

*Expenditure.**Expenditure on account of leave allowance, etc., paid in England.*

109. The decrease of the current year's revised is in accordance with the intimation received from the High Commissioner for India and the Secretary of State.

110. In view of the present financial stringency the budget estimates under the head '31—Education' for next year have been entered at 1,83, which gives very little scope for inclusion of new items of expenditure. As there are several new items of an absolutely essential nature retrenchments in the current sanctioned charges have had to be made in order to make room for these items.

111. *University.*—Next year's budget includes provisions for (1) grant for apparatus for the Royal Institute of Science, Bombay (50); (2) grant to Bombay University as compensation for loss sustained by it owing to the introduction of the Joint Examination Board's School Leaving Certificate Examination (25); (3) grant for apparatus, etc., required for the D. J. Sind College, Karachi (24); (4) revision of the pay of the subordinate staff of the College of Engineering (10); (5) grant of stipends for practical training to graduates in Mechanical Engineering of the College of Engineering, Poona (13).

112. A retrenchment of 20 in the provision for grants to aided colleges has been made owing to the financial stringency.

113. *Secondary.*—Next year's estimates include provisions for (1) the admission of larger number of pupils to the N. J. High School, Karachi, by the introduction of a double shift system (22); (2) establishment of a hostel for depressed class boys at Poona (12). The retrenchments made are mainly in the provisions for (a) building grants to aided schools (80) and (b) excursion charges (12).

114. *Primary.*—The next year's estimate under this head falls short of the current year's estimate by about 5,30. The reduction has been effected by the total omission of (1) the provision for free building grants (1,80); (2) the provision for giving extra assistants or special allowances to taluka masters for taluka work (50); and (3) the provision for Local Normal Classes (12); and by retrenchments in the provisions for (4) ordinary building grants (80); (5) introduction of compulsory primary education in municipal areas (50); (6) giving code pay to trained primary school teachers (80), and grants-in-aid to Mulla Schools in Sind (50).

These retrenchments are counterbalanced by provisions for the following new items, namely, (1) grants to Local Boards for the entertainment of additional assistants in undermanned schools (50), and (2) supply of books, slates, etc., to pupils of depressed classes studying in Local Board Primary Schools (10). As in the current year a provision of Rs. 1 lakh has been made for the payment of a further instalment of the building grant of 5 lakhs to the Bombay Municipality in connection with the programme undertaken in 1907 by it at the instance of Government for the construction of buildings for some of the municipal primary schools in the city.

115. *Special.*—The ensuing year's estimates include provisions on account of (1) the reorganization of the Women's Branch of the Provincial Educational Service (12), (2) grant of a duty allowance to the Headmasters of Training Schools, etc. (8), (3) improvement of the School of Architecture, Sir J. J. School of Art, Bombay (7), and (4) revision of the pay of the establishment of the David Sassoon Industrial and Reformatory Institution (8). On the other hand retrenchments have been made in the provisions for (1) building grants to special schools (40), (2) scholarships in training institutions (20), and (3) education of defectives (10).

116. *General.*—This head comprises the following sub-heads: (a) Direction, (b) Inspection, (c) Scholarships and (d) Miscellaneous.

The estimates for next year include provisions for (1) special scholarships to depressed class boys studying in secondary and primary schools (49), (2) creation of three additional selection grade posts in the Indian Educational Service (15), and (3) inclusion of 16 further posts in the Bombay Educational Service and appointments to the selection grade in that service (50). Retrenchments have been made in the provisions for (i) Assistant Deputy Educational Inspectors (27*) and (ii) scholarships for the daughters of the indigenous midwives (8). It is also proposed to save 8 by the suspension of the post of Inspector of Training Schools.

The provision for expenditure in England is entered in next year's budget at 1,55 against current year's 1,39. The increased provision has been made in accordance with the figures received from the High Commissioner for India.

Revenue.

117. The increase in the revised estimates as compared with the current year's budget is mainly due to larger Hospital receipts. The increase in next year's estimate as compared with the current year's budget is mainly due to enhanced rates of fees proposed to be levied from students attending the Grant Medical College.

Expenditure.

118. *Medical Establishment and Lunatic Asylums.*—There is no appreciable difference in expenditure under these heads from the revised estimates of 1921-22. The increase in the revised estimates over the budget estimates for 1921-22 is due to the revision of pay of Indian Medical Service Officers. The next year's budget provides 28 for the appointment of a temporary I. M. S. Officer on special duty for making investigations regarding indigenous drugs.

119. *Hospitals and Dispensaries.*—The decrease in the budget estimate for 1922-23 as compared with the current year's expenditure is due mainly to the non-utilization of the following non-recurring items of expenditure in the budget for 1921-22 and also to the postponement of certain schemes such as (i) the proposed School of Tropical Medicine and allied institutions, (ii) opening of new dispensaries; (iii) Touring Medical Officers, and (iv) Reorganization of nursing arrangements in the Presidency:—

The estimate under this head provides for expenditure on account of the revision of pay of (i) Assistant and Sub-Assistant Surgeons and compounders as well as revised rates of pay sanctioned by the Secretary of State for Indian Medical Service Officers attached to hospitals and dispensaries.

120. *Medical Schools and Colleges.*—The increase under this head is mainly due to the enhanced rates of pay of (i) Professors of the Grant Medical College who are mostly members of the Indian Medical Service, (ii) teachers at Medical Schools, and (iii) the clerical establishments at these institutions.

121. *Chemical Examiners.*—Increased provision has to be made under this item on account of the enhanced rates of pay of officers and establishments and additional grants for stores indented from Europe.

122. *Leave allowances, etc., in England.*—Increased provision under this head is based on the figures furnished by the High Commissioner for India and is probably due to a larger number of medical officers expected to proceed on leave during next year.

Revenue.

123. Sale-proceeds of quinine, Sanitary Surveyors' examination fees and contributions for sanitary purposes are credited to this head.

Expenditure.

124. *Public Health Establishment.*—The expenditure shown under this minor head relates mainly to (i) Director of Public Health, Deputy Directors of Public Health and Health Officers and their establishments, (ii) Inspectors of Vaccination and (iii) charges of the Public Health Laboratories, Poona and Sind. Half of the charges on account of the Port Health Officers is recovered from the Port Trusts and these recoveries are deducted from the expenditure. The charges of the Belgaum Vaccine Institute are also debited to this head, but the major portion of these charges is recouped by contributions from Local Boards, Municipalities, etc. The charges on account of the vaccination establishments employed under the local bodies are almost wholly recovered from them. The increase in next year's estimates is mainly due to revision of salaries of establishments.

125. *Grants for Public Health purposes.*—The main items of expenditure recorded under this minor head are the following :—

- (a) Grants for special expenditure in connection with Public Health ;
- (b) Grants-in-aid to local bodies in connection with the employment of health officers and sanitary inspectors ;
- (c) Grants to village sanitary committees ;
- (d) Charges on account of development and town planning schemes ;
- (e) Pilgrim charges.

Item (a).—A provision of 9,70 was made in the current year's budget for this item. A part of the provision has been transferred to other major heads for expenditure debitable to those heads. In the ensuing year's estimate a provision of 7,52 is made.

Item (b).—Government pay local bodies, subject to certain conditions, grants-in-aid equal to two-thirds of the pay of Health Officers and half of the pay of Sanitary Inspectors employed in the mofussil towns under the revised scheme for the appointment of Health Officers and Sanitary Inspectors to Municipalities. The ensuing year's budget estimate provides 1,15 against the current year's provision of 80 for this item.

Item (c).—Government give grants to village sanitary committees in the proportion of one-fourth of their expenditure, the other three-fourths being contributed by local bodies and villages. The current year's provision of 86 for the purpose has been repeated in next year's estimate.

Item (d).—In the current year's budget a provision of 5,00 was made for contribution towards expenditure on new military buildings at Quetta in lieu of Military lands in Karachi taken up for the Karachi Development Scheme. Out of this 3,50 have been paid to the Government of India and the balance has been transferred to "41, Civil Works" to meet expenditure on account of Koregaon Development Water Supply Scheme. The amount has been met from the advance of 90,00 made by the Government of India this year. Next year's budget contains a provision of 6,00 for contribution towards expenditure on the military buildings at Quetta which is to be met from loan funds. The amount is therefore provided under "Expenditure not charged to Revenue" instead of under this head. No provision has been made for other Development and Town planning schemes.

126. *Expenses in connection with bubonic plague, malaria and epidemics.*—The reduced figure in next year's estimate is due to the fact that no provision has been made in it on account of epidemics and free distribution of quinine.

127. *Bacteriological Laboratories and Pasteur Institutes.*—The increase under this head in next year's estimate is due to increase in establishment charges.

128. *Sanitary Engineer and his staff.*—The question of the transfer of the Sanitary Engineer to the Government of Bombay and his staff to the control of the General Department has been postponed for the present. But in accordance with the view of the Government of India the provision of 4,82, on account of the Sanitary Engineer and his establishment has been transferred from "41, Civil Works" to this head, though that officer continues to remain under the administrative control of the Public Works Department.

129. *Agricultural Receipts.*—The Agricultural College and Schools fees and sale-proceeds of farm produce, cotton seed and implements sold by the Agricultural Department are credited to this head.

130. *Veterinary Receipts.*—These consist mainly of the Bombay Veterinary College fees and the sale-proceeds of bulls and stallions.

Item (ii).—The decrease in 1922-23 compared with the previous year is due to omission of provision for temporary establishment (22), for workshops (20), lump provision for revision of establishments (25), purchase of apparatus and chemicals (6), oil engines and pumps (20), implements, tools and plant (12) and stores (15), and curtailment of expenses on account of cultivation and other charges. This is to some extent counterbalanced by an increase under salaries of officers mostly due to incremental pay (54) and under travelling allowances (20).

Item (iii).—Compared with 1921-22 there has been an increase under salaries of officers (14) and travelling allowances (10), which has been counterbalanced by a decrease under various contingent charges and under agricultural schools (10).

Item (iv).—The decrease is due to reduction under temporary and provisional allowances (11), petty construction (17), purchase of implements, machinery, live-stock, manure, etc. (47), cultivation charges (35), labour charges (9), upkeep of machinery (7), cattle farm in Sind (46) and premium bulls (5), omission of provision for milk supply in Poona (5), for permanent improvements (27), for purchase of dairy stock (2), for haulage of coal for steam plough (12), for Bagalkot farm (10), for Mirpurkhas factory (6), for cotton development (50), etc. This is partly counterbalanced by increase under establishment charges due to revision of pay (1,65).

Item (v).—The decrease is due to reduction under petty construction (4), cultivation charges (5), garden expenses (2), purchase of machinery (6), etc.

Item (vi).—The decrease is due to reduction under agricultural experiments (12) and hydraulic experiments (32) and omission of provision for potash manure (3).

Item (vii).—The increase is due to provision for agricultural propaganda work (16) which is partly counterbalanced by decrease under demonstration and agricultural shows (7).

Item (viii).—A provision of 72 has been made for leave allowances.

132. *Veterinary charges.*—The increase over the current year's budget is due to larger provision on account of the pay of officers and establishment which have been revised, increased cost of sera and vaccines and increase in rates of travelling. These have been counterbalanced to some extent by reduction in the provision for grants to veterinary hospitals and dispensaries.

133. *Co-operative credit.*—The increase on the current year's budget is due to revision and reorganization of establishments.

134. The cessation of the working of the trawler accounts for there being no receipts under the second minor head.

Expenditure.

135. The decrease in the current year's revised estimate as compared with the budget is chiefly due to savings (1,08) in the provisions for (1) Mechanical Engineer (temporary), (2) Engineer (temporary), (3) establishment and (4) repairs and suspense accounts for stores. Savings to the extent of 42 are anticipated in the salaries of officers under the minor head—Director of Industries. The decrease is, however, partially counterbalanced by payment of charges incurred in England in connection with the purchase of trawler.

136. *Director of Industries.*—The decrease of 2,38 in the next year's budget as compared with the budget for 1921-22 is mainly due to the cessation of the working of the trawler (1,75). Against the lump provision of 2,10 (3,56—1,46 for the working charges of the trawler) for the development of Industries in the budget for 1921-22, 1,02 have been provided for the purpose in the budget for 1922-23. The amount has been distributed among the different items and not provided in lump as in 1921-22. On the other hand there is an increase of 45 in the provision for scholarships, establishment, allowances and contingencies.

137. *Central Stores and Workshops, Dapuri.*—The decrease as compared with the budget for 1921-22 is mainly due to the omission of (78) under (1) Engineer (temporary), (2) Mechanical Engineer (temporary) and (3) establishment and to the reduction of (1,22) in the provision for original works and tools and plant.

139. *Inspector of Factories.*—This head shows charges on account of salary, allowances, etc., of the certifying surgeon.

140. *Steam Boiler Inspection establishment.*—The expenditure of the amalgamated departments of Factory, Steam Boiler and Smoke Nuisances Departments is debited to this head. The increase in the next year's budget estimate as compared with the current year's is mainly due to the following items:—

141. *Provincial Statistics.*—The charges on account of establishments entertained for collection of statistics of rail-borne traffic were debited to this head. According to item No. 39 in part 1 of schedule 1 to the Devolution Rules, Census and Statistics are central subjects but the Government of India have declared Provincial Statistics to be of purely local nature and decided that provision required for Provincial Statistics should be made in the estimates of local Governments. As the statistics are not absolutely essential, no provision has been made in next year's budget for the purpose and the Government of India are being informed accordingly.

142. *Examinations.*—Charges on account of Accountancy Diploma Board are debited to this minor head.

150. Up to 1921-22 the expenditure on account of Famine was shown under the head 33.—*Famine Relief* and was shared between Imperial and Provincial in the proportion of 3 : 1. The amount shown for the year 1920-21 represents the Provincial share.

151. Under the Reforms Scheme the Local Government is entirely responsible for expenditure on famine. Under Schedule IV to the Devolution Rules the Government of Bombay is required to provide every year in its budget 63,60 for expenditure upon relief of, and insurance against, famine. The amount may be spent upon famine relief or upon the construction of protective irrigation works or other works for the prevention of famine. Any portion of the amount which is not so spent is to be transferred to the Famine Insurance Fund of the Province. The heads "XXXII.—Transfers from Famine Insurance Fund" and "43.—Famine Relief and Insurance" subdivided into—

A.—Famine Relief,

B.—Transfers to Famine Insurance Fund,

have accordingly been introduced in the accounts with effect from the current year under the receipt and expenditure heads respectively. The provision of 10,67 made in the current year's budget under the sub-head "43-A.—Famine Relief" being found insufficient for relief on a larger scale than was originally expected, an additional grant of 22,76 was voted by the Legislative Council in September last, and the whole amount of 33,43 is likely to be spent in the current year. Under the sub-head "43-A.—Famine Relief" a provision of 63,60 has been made in the ensuing year. This amount includes a provision of 3,00 on account of famine fodder to be transferred to the head "8.—Forest". The amount that will remain unutilized at the end of the year will be transferred to the sub-head "43-B.—Transfers to Famine Insurance Fund".

Revenue.

159. The increase in the current year's revised and next year's budget is due to the provision for the sale-proceeds of plots of land and bungalows under the schemes for the development of the towns of Poona and Sholapur, partially counterbalanced by the absence of the provision under the minor head "Unclaimed deposits" which has been treated as "Central" under the revised classification.

Expenditure.

160. *Donations for charitable purposes.*—The increase in next year's budget is due to the provision of 75 for building grant to the Society for the Protection of Children in Western India.

168. The comparison of the revised with the budget estimate for 1921-22 shows a decrease of 5,50, which is due to large savings in the grants for Begari canal, Mahiwah, new head regulator on the Fuleli canal, Dad canal, Sukkur Barrage and Sehar canal, the last of which was not taken up owing to its unremunerative character.

169. The budget provision of 13,71 for the current year under this head was intended to meet the capital expenditure on works which were classified as *productive*. In addition, a provision of 54,44 was also made for capital expenditure on *protective* works in the Deccan under the head '16'. There was thus a total budget provision of 68,15 for capital expenditure on irrigation works in 1921-22. The budget provision of 84,49 for 1922-23 which is proposed to be provided from loans is intended to cover the capital expenditure on *all* irrigation works, whether productive, protective or unproductive, and it has therefore to be compared with the current year's budget of 68,15 mentioned above. The increase is mainly due to 7 lakhs out of 54,44 having been surrendered this year to meet unexpected famine expenditure and this leeway has now to be made good and to a demand of 5,00 for a dredger required by the Indus River Commission, and also to demands for several new works (detailed in Statement D) which are considered to be very necessary.

These contain entries regarding two schemes not referred to in the notes submitted to the Legislative Council when an additional grant of Rs. 85 lakhs was voted in October last. These are:—

(i) *B. 8, Murzban Road.*—It is proposed to sell the site of the existing Public Works Department store in Murzban Road, after providing a new temporary store on the Kennedy Sea Face at an estimated cost of Rs. $1\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs, and provision has been made for this expenditure. A permanent store is proposed to be constructed later on the Back Bay Reclamation near the present and future Government buildings.

It is anticipated that a much larger sum will be realised from the sale of the present site (a sum of Rs. 20 lakhs is shown under Receipts) than the Rs. $3\frac{1}{2}$ to 4 lakhs which represents the estimated cost of the temporary and new permanent stores.

(ii) *S. 5, Malavni.*—Government own 448 acres and 15 gunthas of land in Malavni village which were marked out many years ago for ultimate development of a seaside suburb. The first step to be taken in

regard to the development of this area is to provide access to it by remarking the road from Malad to Marve. The sum of 1 lakh shown under this minor head is intended to meet part of the cost of remarking this road, the remainder being provided by reappropriation during the current year. The improved road will also be useful in connection with the supply of building materials, including stone from the Government quarries at Kharodi.

A separate Press Note has been circulated giving details of the East Colaba scheme, under which an expenditure of 13,00 is proposed.

A big bridge is necessary and the road is to be pushed on to Dongri to enable exploitation of Block XXIV to be undertaken more cheaply than at present. Total estimated cost Rs. 12,000.

This road is very necessary for exploiting compartments 15, 16, 17, etc., of Block XII and has been aligned. Total estimated cost Rs. 5,000.

The revision of the pay of these establishments like that of the establishments of other Departments was to have been sanctioned retrospectively from 1st March 1920; but owing to financial stringency it was decided to sanction it from 1st March 1921, the question of sanctioning it from 1st March 1920 being postponed. The proposed provision is intended to meet the cost of arrear payments.

This establishment consisting of Surveyors, Assistant Surveyors, Foremen, Assistant Foremen, clerks and menials is required for the two Forest Engineers (Rs. 15,000) and for saw mills (Rs. 20,160).

In the revision of the scale of pay of the Provincial Forest Service the Extra Assistant Conservators, with one exception, did not get any increase. A proposal is under consideration to give them advance increments equivalent to about 20 per cent. of their pay with effect from 12th March 1920, the date of the revision. Rs. 40,550 is the amount to be paid on account of arrears.

The Chief Presidency Magistrate has applied for a duty allowance of Rs. 45 per mensem to enable a third clerk from his establishment to attend in addition to his own duties the Honorary Magistrate's Court at Mazagaon. There are only two such clerks at present and a third is required as in the other Honorary Magistrates' Courts, Bombay.

The District Judge, Kanara, surrendered his tent for Military purposes in 1918, and urgently requires another. A second hand tent in good condition having become available, it has been purchased. The required amount is Rs. 800 for tent *plus* Rs. 50 as conveyance charges for which provision has been made.

(a), (b) and (c).—The necessity for a properly established School of Architecture has long been recognised and a scheme for the establishment of such a school has been approved by Government. Owing to financial considerations however the scheme has not been brought into operation. It has since been represented that there is a great need for properly trained architects. There is now all over India phenomenal building activity. Housing and town planning schemes, Municipal and Port projects are being proceeded with and a great reclamation scheme is in progress. There is therefore an enormous amount of work for architects to do. The chief obstacle with which the students of the architectural classes are faced when they leave the school, is that ordinarily they cannot obtain a building license; nor do they expect to obtain it until they secure a Government Diploma or a University degree in Architecture. It is therefore proposed to open a fifth year class with a view to enable the students to qualify for the Government Diploma in Architecture.

(d) The draughtsman sanctioned for the school having most important work to do and having enough work to occupy all his time cannot attend to any other work such as the keeping up of registers of class, daily attendance, etc., nor can he keep in order library, surveying instruments and lantern slides, casts, etc. It is therefore necessary to entertain a studio assistant who must have technical knowledge and who can distinguish between different kinds of drawings and different styles of architecture and take care of technical instruments. As such a man cannot be secured under Rs. 100 per mensem, it is proposed to give him a pay of Rs. 100—5—150 per mensem.

In view of the prospective needs of the Presidency the services of Mr. N. K. Vacha, a Deputy Superintendent employed on inoculation work at the Muktesar Laboratory, have been secured for this Presidency from July last and at present a temporary appointment of Deputy Superintendent has been created for him. This temporary arrangement will have to be continued till a permanent appointment is made next year. Provision for the next year at the rate of Rs. 250 per mensem with travelling allowance of Rs. 125 per mensem and a peon on Rs. 16 has therefore been proposed.

The present lorry is worn out and costs a good deal for repairs. It will be necessary either to spend a large sum on putting it in good order, or to purchase a new one. Expert advice is being taken on this point, and this provision has been made in case it is decided to be necessary to purchase a new one.

The present arrangement whereby the Vernacular-Readers are published by Messrs. Macmillan and Company has been subjected to a great deal of criticism from all quarters, chiefly with regard to the prices charged for the Readers and the inadequacy of the stocks kept in hand. It is expected that this work can be done cheaper and more satisfactorily at the Government Presses. The recurring provision is on account of the necessary additional establishment and other charges. The non-recurring amount is required for the purchase of plant and machinery and the construction of the requisite additional buildings. It is proposed that Rs. 2,01,000 out of this should be met from loan funds. The recurring provision is for two months of next year.

It is proposed to print the translations of the audit notes of local bodies at the Yeravda Prison Press. The provision is intended for the additional work that will be entailed on the Press.

The Municipal Commissioner for the City of Bombay has proposed to raise the rate of the general tax for next year from 9½ to 11 per cent. and the fire tax from ¾ per cent. to ½ per cent.

The present scale of pay of the post is Rs. 500—30—800 per mensem. The Accountant General has reported that the Auditor General has proposed to the Government of India higher rates of pay for all Assistant Account Officers in the Indian Audit Department. If the Auditor General's proposals are approved by the Government of India, there will be an annual extra cost of Rs. 900 on account of the post, out of which ¼th (Rs. 675) will be debitable to the Provincial Government.

The Accountant General has requested that provision should be made for the contemplated revision of rates of pay of Auditors in the Local Audit Department similar to that for the Auditors in the main office of the Accountant General, Bombay.
