There is an increase in the Budget for 1898-99, as compared with the Account for 1896-97, of £353,711 under Interest, of £158,448 in the Non-Effective charges, of £113,994 in the charge for Stores of all kinds, of £95,663 in the Railway Revenue Account, of £77,246 in the Army Effective charges, and of £18,709 in other payments; so that there is an increase of £817,771 in the net sterling Expenditure, while the charge for Exchange is reduced by Rx 1,101,756.
