REPORT of the Auditor of Indian Home Accounts upon the Accounts OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE IN COUNCIL OF INDIA, from 1st April 1931 to 31st March 1932; prepared and submitted to the Secretary of State in Council, in pursuance of section 27 (5) of the Government of India Act.

1. This Report, which relates to the Accounts of the Central Government, is divided into two sections relating respectively to-

I. Receipts and Expenditure under heads other than those relative to Military Services;

II. Receipts and Expenditure relating to Military Services.

The sections will be reviewed as follows: No. I by the Public Accounts Committee set up by the Central Legislative Assembly; No. II by a special Departmental Committee constituted by the Government of India. The accounts of the Provincial Governments have already been dealt with in my Reports dated 19th January 1933.

SECTION L-NON-MILITARY SERVICES.

GENERAL.

2. The total amount saved to Indian Revenues as a result of audit Savings resulting questions relating to the Home Accounts for the year is estimated at about from audit.

3. It is laid down in section 22 of the Government of India Act that, Expenditure "Except for preventing or repelling actual invasion of His Majesty's requiring sanction Indian possessions, or under other sudden and urgent necessity, the revenues of India shall not, without the consent of both Houses of Parliament, be applicable to defraying the expenses of any military operation carried on beyond the external frontiers of those possessions by His Majesty's forces charged upon those revenues," and in section 27 (subsection 5) the Auditor is enjoined to make special note in his Reports to Parliament of any cases in which it appears to him that "any money arising out of the revenues of India has been appropriated to purposes other than

those to which they are applicable.' For eleven years in succession I had to draw attention to two payments of this nature and to the fact that the necessary sanction of the Imperial Parliament had not been obtained therefor. The amounts in question are (1) £13,100,000 paid provisionally to the War Office in 1919 in respect of a further additional contribution by India towards the cost of the war, and (2) £200,000 paid to the War Office in 1921 as an advance subject to adjustment on account of the cost of exchange concession on gratuities. I have pointed out in successive Reports that the submission for sanction has been deferred pending the settlement of various large claims by the Imperial Government against Indian revenues in respect mainly of non-effective liabilities arising out of the war and of counterclaims by India in respect of expenditure consequent upon the war which

was held to be chargeable against Imperial revenues.

In my last Report I stated that early in 1931 agreement had been reached by the Departments concerned that the claims and counter-claims should be regarded as cancelling each other, and that no further payments in respect thereof should be made by either Government. I am now able to report that the Resolutions of both Houses of Parliament required under the section of the Government of India Act quoted above to regularise the payments made in 1919 and 1921 were obtained in July 1932 and were to :the following effect:-

"Whereas, by Resolution passed on the 16th September and 26th November 1914, respectively, this House consented to the charge upon Indian revenues, subject to certain conditions, of the ordinary pay and

other ordinary charges of British and Indian troops despatched out of India for service in the Great War, as well as the ordinary charges of any vessels, belonging to the Government of India that might be employed in those expeditions:

"And whereas by a Resolution passed on the 14th March 1917 this. House consented to a contribution of £100,000,000 charged upon the revenues of India towards the expenses of the war:

"And whereas the Government of India, desirous of affording further assistance to His Majesty's Government, provisionally and subject to the consent of this House met out of the revenues of India in 1918–19, with the concurrence of their Legislative Council, further extraordinary charges in respect of the Indian troops employed in the war to the extent of £13,600,000:

"And whereas the Government of India are desirous of bearing finally such further extraordinary charges:

"That this House consents that the extraordinary charges of £13,600,000 aforesaid shall be borne by Indian revenues."

Some explanation of the difference between the amount mentioned in the Resolutions, viz. £13,600,000, and the two amounts referred to above, viz. £13,100,000 and £200,000, is necessary. The total sum involved in the exchange concession gratuities, in respect of which £200,000 was paid as an advance in 1921 to the War Office, amounted to £900,000, and consequently sanction for £14,000,000 would have been required to meet the two items which I have laid under objection in my Reports; but the matter was complicated by the inclusion in the "no-payment" settlement of numerous other amounts in respect of claims and counter-claims made by the two Governments. To enumerate and explain all these items, which have been the subject of interdepartmental conferences and voluminous correspondence, and have also been considered by successive Cabinets, would necessitate a lengthy discussion which at best would not be very intelligible to anyone not familiar with the many intricate financial problems involved. I think it will be sufficient if I say that, in my opinion, the solution reached is, on broad lines, equitable to both Governments. One point, however, I feel obliged to deal with rather more fully than was done in the speeches made in Parliament by the proposers of the Resolution. The Secretary of State wound up his speech as follows:—

"For the foregoing reasons, I move that this House consent to the treatment, as a final charge against Indian revenues, of the gift of £13,600,000 provisionally made by the Government of India in 1918-19. This sum takes no account of additional amounts for which India has accepted liability in order to secure the settlement, but as against these may reasonably be set certain sums accruing to Indian revenues in connection with the War."

In almost identical words the substance of the last sentence of the speech was repeated by the Under Secretary of State for India in the House of Lords.

The phrase "certain sums accruing to Indian revenues in connection with the War" refers to the amounts due to India in respect of her share of German reparations. As a result of the "no-payment" settlement, the total sum payable from Indian revenues for which Parliamentary sanction was required was calculated in 1927 to be approximately 19½ million pounds, at which date the present value of India's share of the Dawes annuities was about £6,000,000. In the opinion of the Secretary of State's advisers the position would be met by asking the sanction of Parliament for the difference between these two amounts, viz. 13½ million pounds, on the ground that as there was included in the sum of 19½ million pounds amounts payable in respect of casualty pensions of Indian troops employed in the war, and that as India's share of reparations was almost entirely based on the expenditure, past and prospective, on those pensions, it was not inequitable to take reparation receipts in reduction of the total for which Parliamentary sanction was required. In this opinion I concurred, and as at the date on which

the Resolutions were passed, viz. July 1932, the amount already received in respect of reparations, viz. £3,000,000, considerably exceeded pension payments already made, Parliamentary sanction for all payments to date in respect of which it is required by section 22 of the Government of India Act has been duly obtained.

4. For some years past questions relating to certain payments made by Tribunal on cer-4. For some years past questions relating to contain paymonts that by tain questions in India to the Imperial Government in respect of military expenditure have regard to defence been in dispute between the two Governments. In December 1932 an expenditure in disindependent tribunal was set up to investigate these matters and to make pute between the recommendations for their settlement. The tribunal consisted of five Government of India and the Imperial Government. of India, two British Judges nominated by the Imperial Government, with a former Australian Solicitor-General as Chairman.

The terms of reference were as follows:—

- (1) To consider and report whether there should continue to be contributions by India towards the recruiting and training expenses at home of the British Army in India; and to report the basis on which the contributions, if continued, should be calculated.
- (2) To examine India's claim that a contribution should be made from Imperial revenues towards military expenditure from Indian revenues, and to report the basis on which any contribution approved should be assessed.
- (3) To examine the War Office claim that India should pay a direct contribution towards the cost of the Regular and Supplementary Reserves, and to report the basis on which any contribution approved should be assessed.
- (4) To consider whether the Sea Transport contribution paid by the War Office to India should be continued or modified after 31st March 1932.
- (5) To examine and report mutatis mutandis on such of the questions raised in the preceding paragraphs as are relevant to the contribution at present paid from Indian revenues in respect of Royal Air Force personnel in India.

In respect of (1) and (5) provisional payments subject to adjustment have been made since 1st April 1926, to which reference has been made in Section II of my Reports. The payments to the War Office have been made at the rate of £1,400,000 per annum and those to the Air Ministry have been of the order of £100,000 per annum, the annual amounts varying slightly according to the numbers of the Royal Air Force serving in India. As regards (4) a contribution of £130,000 per annum has been made by the War Office in respect of Sea Transport Charges since 1901-02 under an award of the Royal Commission on Indian Expenditure (Welby Commission). This contribution was the subject of an arbitration award by the late Lord Cave in 1927, as a result of which it was to be continued for a further period of five years, when the question of its continuance was to be reconsidered.

(2) is a new claim by the Government of India, and (3) is a new claim by the Imperial Government.

The recommendations of the Tribunal have been presented to the Prime Minister.

5. Reference was made in paragraph 5 of Section I of the last Report to Amendment of the erroneous grant for extended periods of leave pending retirement to certain Indian Medical Service officers who, on account of their administrative rank, had been retained in civil employ beyond the normal age of 55 years fixed for retirement from the Civil Services in India. The obscurity which hitherto existed in the rules regulating the grant of leave to such officers has now been removed by an amendment which precludes the grant of leave for any period in excess of eight months at a time, or twelve months in all during any one tenure of an administrative post.

RAILWAY CAPITAL ACCOUNT.

Incorrect interrnles.

6. In paragraph 6 of the last Report it was mentioned that a question pretation of leave had been raised by this Department on the action of a Guaranteed Railway Company in granting extensions of leave pending retirement to certain of its officers, thereby causing the permissible maximum period of leave to be exceeded. It was also mentioned that the Company had maintained that they had acted correctly, but that the Secretary of State, after reference to India, had informed them that their action was irregular, and had requested that the overpayments to the officers concerned should be adjusted. In the cases of three officers who were still in payment, adjustment has since been effected by withholding sums aggregating about £560. No adjustment was found possible in certain other cases where the officers had left the Company's service and drawn all the amounts due to them.

Economy cuts.

7. In view of the reductions made in September 1931 in the case of all established and unestablished Civil Servants-whether whole or part timewhose salaries were not subject to variation in respect of the cost-of-living bonus, I enquired whether the question had been considered of reducing the remuneration of the Directors and Consulting Engineers of the Companyworked railways.

With regard to the Directors, I was informed that the various Boards, n agreeing at the request of the Government of India to the application of temporary cuts in the salaries of their Indian staffs, had offered also to forgo temporarily, with effect from 1st December 1931, 61 per cent. of Directors' fees in so far as these were chargeable to the undertakings; this offer, which involves an aggregate saving of about £950 per annum, was accepted by the Secretary of State.

I drew attention to the fact that in the case of one Company the cut had been applied only to £250 (i.e. the remuneration drawn by a Director) out of £1,250 per annum drawn by the Chairman and Managing Director. I was informed that the Chairman held that his remuneration in that capacity should not be reduced and that the Board acquiesced in this view.

As the cuts were voluntary I could not press the matter further, but I would observe that in the case of another Company the cut was applied to the full remuneration, i.e. £1,250 per annum, drawn by the Chairman and Managing Director.

With regard to the Consulting Engineers action was taken on my suggestion and cuts of 10 per cent. in their fees were made, involving a saving of about £550 per annum.

POSTS AND TELEGRAPHS REVENUE ACCOUNT.

Eastern Mail Service.

8. The cost of the Eastern Mail Service is divided in proportion to the Postal Union value of the mails sent by India and the other contributors. A payment of £9,792 was made in March 1932 in adjustment of advances made by India from 1st April 1923 to 31st December 1928 at the rate of £22,000 per annum.

The cost to India from 1st January 1929 is estimated at £28,000 per annum and the amounts advanced have accordingly been increased. Further adjustments will be made when the figures of actual cost are available.

I understand that the whole question of the Mail Service is under consideration by the Government of India.

INTEREST (RECEIPTS).

Loans to Persia.

9. The amount of £14,700 shown under this head represents interest on a moiety of a loan of £490,000 made jointly by the Imperial and Indian Governments to the Persian Government. India's share of the capital sum (i.e. £245,000) was transferred in 1923-24, together with other advances amounting in all to £2,367,270 1s. 8d., from a Suspense Account to Revenue.

Negotiations for the settlement of these loans have been in progress for

several years, but have not yet reached completion.

INTEREST ON ORDINARY DEBT.

10. In accepting the proposals made by the President of the United Interest on lia-States (see paragraph 15) for a moratorium of war reparation payments, bility assumed in His Majesty's Government offered to defer on the same conditions and for respect of British Government the same period the payments due from India to the United Kingdom on 5 per cent. War account of war liabilities, and this offer was accepted by the Secretary of Loan (1929-47). State and the Government of India. The payments in question were those which would ordinarily have been made to the Treasury in the course of the year 1st July 1931 to 30th June 1932 in respect of India's liability for British Government 5 per cent. War Loan.

This liability, which was undertaken in 1917, was to render assistance

towards the cost of the war to the extent of £100,000,000.

Of this amount, £77,284,000 was discharged by crediting His Majesty's Government with the proceeds of various rupee loans raised in India, leaving a balance of £22,716,000, with regard to which it was arranged that India should undertake interest and redemption charges for an equivalent amount of British 5 per cent. War Loan.

The outstanding amount has been reduced by periodic repayments of capital to £16,721,003 2s. 5d., on which the annual interest charge was £836,050 3s. 2d. In the year under review the half-yearly instalment of interest due on 1st June, viz. £418,025 1s. 7d., was paid as usual, but the payment due on 1st December was suspended in terms of the Treasury offer

described above.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.

11. The grant-in-aid by the Treasury towards the expenses of the India Contribution of Office was renewed for the year 1931-32 at the same standard figure of His Majesty's £119,000 as last year. The amount received was £119,000 less £10,000 in Government in respect of bonus variations, and is shown in the accounts in reduction of administrative payments under the following heads:-

AVIATION.

12. In paragraph 11 of Section I of the last Report reference was made Airship station, to a claim by the Air Ministry for the cost of the mooring mast erected at Karachi. the air station at Karachi. Correspondence is still proceeding with regard to the balance outstanding, which has now been increased from £6,339 10s. 11d. to £6,374 15s. 9d.

MISCELLANEOUS (RECEIPTS).

13. In paragraph 12 of Section I of the last Report reference was made Expenditure in to a question raised in my Department as to the apparent omission of Jeave Persia. and pension contribution in respect of certain posts from the accounts, which are compiled in India, of charges in connection with Diplomatic and Consular Establishments in Persia. Investigation by the Indian authorities showed that the contributions in question had never been levied, and that in consequence there had been an undercharge to Imperial Revenues between 1915-16 and 1929-30 of about £2,350. The scrutiny of the accounts in India in this connection appears to have brought to light an incorrect charge to Imperial Revenues of departmental expenses since 1921-22 amounting to about Rs. 14,000. It was decided to adjust the undercharge of leave and pension contribution from 1921-22 only, and to set off against it the overcharge of departmental expenses. In accordance with this decision the net amount recoverable was about £480, which is now under adjustment.

MISCELLANEOUS (PAYMENTS).

14. £7,000 was placed at the disposal of the Secretary of State during Secret Service. 1931-32 for Secret Service. The amount actually expended was £7,850 18s.5d., and the balance in hand on 31st March 1932 was £1,372 19s. 7d.

The Secretary of State has furnished me with a certificate that the

expenditure was necessary for the public service.

The receipts in respect of reparation annuities for the year 1931-32 are affected by the operation of the moratorium proposed by the President of the United States. The proposal was for the suspension for one year of payments of all inter-governmental debts, reparations and relief debts; and the Imperial Government offered to the Dominions and India the same concession. These arrangements came into force on 1st July 1931. The reparation receipts during the year under review relate, therefore, to the three months Λpril to June 1931. On the other hand, during the period of the moratorium, no amount is payable by India to the Imperial Government in respect of the balance of the amount of War Loan for which India had assumed responsibility (see paragraph 10).

The share of the balance of administrative funds of the Reparations Commission is India's share of such funds unexpended on transfer of the administration of reparation receipts from the Commission to the Bank for The Bank for International Settlements was International Settlements. instituted in 1930 as part of the Young Plan, and by agreement with the creditor Governments was appointed sole trustee to manage and distribute the annuities payable by Germany. The Trust Agreement stipulated that the creditor Powers should leave with the Bank part of the receipts to constitute a non-interest-bearing deposit amounting to 125 million Reichmarks. This deposit was to provide the Bank with sufficient resources to enable it to carry out the necessary exchange operations, and to provide in part the remuneration of the Bank for its services in the management of the annuities. The Bank was also to receive a commission of 1 per mille on the actual amount received from the German Government. It is understood that the deposit will be held by the Bank at the credit of the various Governments for the period during which the Trust Agreement remains in force, and will be refunded to the Governments in question at the end of that period. Of the total amount to be deposited the British Empire was to provide 26,587,500 Reichmarks; and by arrangement between His Majesty's Government and the Dominions and India, responsibility for this amount was divided between Great Britain and the rest of the Empire in proportion to their average shares in the first 37 annuities. The amount thus allocated to the rest of the Empire was further divided among the different units in accordance with the percentages of reparations assigned to them at the Imperial Conference of 1921. India's share amounted to 316,182 Reichmarks (about £15,000), which was provided by deduction from the second year's payment under the Young Plan.

Under the Statutes of the Bank any net profits remaining after meeting certain prior charges are divisible among such Governments, &c., as have maintained deposits subject to withdrawal in not less than five years, or after four years on not less than one year's notice. On a division of the profits for the first year's working of the Bank India became entitled, in respect of the deposit mentioned above, to the sum of £115 15s. 5d., which was received in July 1931.

(ii) The moratorium applied also to non-German reparations and accordingly the amount due from Czechoslovakia for 1931-32, about £800. was not received.

Deposits and Advances.

16. Reference was made in paragraph 22, Section I of the Report on Gold Standard the Accounts for the year 1929-30 to the Gold Standard Reserve Equalisation Reserve Equali-Fund, which was set up during that year in order to avoid such wide sation Fund. fluctuations as had previously occurred in the amounts accruing to revenue from the Gold Standard Reserve. The intention was to limit the annual credit to revenue from that source to £1,600,000, plus half of any surplus in excess of that amount on the year's working of the Reserve and to apply any remaining surplus to the Equalisation Fund, which was started with an opening balance of £442,709 2s. 5d. derived from Gold Standard Reserve profits in 1929-30. In 1930-31 the surplus on the year's working of the Gold Standard Reserve fell short of £1,600,000 by £33,748 ls. 6d., and that amount was taken from the Equalisation Fund, the balance on which at 31st March 1931 was £418,007 9s. 3d.

In 1931-32, owing to the depletion of the portion of the Gold Standard Reserve held in England and reduced yield on investments, the surplus on the year's working was £291,378 16s. 8d. only, and the Equalisation Fund was entirely exhausted by the transfer to Revenue of the balance at 31st March 1932, which amounted on that date to £435,034 14s.

REMITTANCES (RECEIPTS).

17. In paragraph 18 of Section I of the last Report reference was made to Repatriation of expenditure incurred in the maintenance and repatriation in 1921 of European refugees from refugees who entered India from Central Asia. Negotiations are still proceeding in regard to the recovery from the Government concerned of the amount of £3,426 17s. 5d. outstanding.

APPROPRIATION AUDIT.

- 18. Provision for Voted expenditure, excluding that on Railways, by the Secretary of State in Council was distributed under seven Grants, only one of which, Grant 86, related exclusively to expenditure by the Secretary
- 19. Under Grant 86 (Voted) the original provision amounted to £122,850. Two supplementary grants were obtained during the year, both under "Miscellaneous Civil Charges"; one voted in September 1931 provided £19,725 for the Second Round Table Conference; the other voted in February 1932 provided £2,475 for the Burma Round Table Conference. The total grant thus amounted to £145,050, out of which there was a saving of £15,200, i.e. approximately 10.5 per cent. As in previous years, there were considerable differences between grant and expenditure under many of the individual subheads, the largest being a saving of £6,582 of the supplementary grant for the Second Round Table Conference. Other noticeable variations were:-

20. Under "Non-Voted" considerable modification of the original appropriation was found to be necessary during the course of the year. On the whole, however, the expenditure approximated reasonably closely to the final appropriations under the various subheads.

Change in classification.

21. Interest amounting to £48,000 per annum on the £1,200,000 Debenture—Stock raised by the Madras and Southern Mahratta Railway for the Mysore State Lines is remitted by the Mysore Durbar through a bank to the Secretary of State, by whom it is disbursed to the stockholders. The transactions have hitherto been recorded on both sides of the Account under Railway Revenue—Interest on Capital deposited by Companies. The Secretary of State, who had under consideration a number of proposed amendments to the Finance and Revenue Accounts relating to railway transactions, decided that, as his position in regard to these interest payments was analogous to that of an Agent, the correct procedure was to record the items under "Miscellaneous Deposits." The change of classification was effected in the Accounts of the year under review.

SECTION II.—MILITARY SERVICES.

Capitation Rate on account of Indian regiments lent for service in the Colonies. 1.—(i) In paragraph 1 of Section II of the last Report mention was made of the Capitation Rate by the application of which to average strengths recovery is made each year of the pay, &c., of Indian regiments lent forservice in the Colonies. The rate is fixed for periods of five years, and revision was due for the quinquennium 1928–29 to 1933–34. Details of the new calculations were received from India in 1930. As is usual, the statements were communicated by the India Office to the War Office, in order that examination might be made simultaneously in the two Departments, and afterwards they were examined in my Department. Various points were raised and referred to India for consideration. On receipt of the Government of India's observations the statements were amended and submitted to final scrutiny and the rate has since been agreed. Certain omissions pointed out and suggestions made by my Department will have the effect of increasing the total amount of the claims for the five years during which the rate will continue in force by approximately £1,000.

(ii) In the calculation on which the Capitation Rate is based, provision is made for the maintenance of two efficers with the Training Battalion at Headquarters. In the audit of the claim on the War Office in respect of the unit at Hong Kong for 1930-31 it was observed that although the establishment of officers with the Training Battalion was at full strength, the returns of the capitation unit furnished from India included only one such officer, one only having been posted from the capitation unit. I pointed out that this appeared to be incorrect, and suggested that so long as the Headquarters establishment was maintained at full strength, two of the officers there ought to be included in the strength figures of the capitation unit. This was agreed, and as a result the claim on the War Office for 1930-31 was

increased by the sum of £468 19s. 6d.

Expenditure recoverable from the Imperial Government.

2.—(i) In the audit of the adjustment in this country of items included in the Outward Account Current of the Military Accountant-General for July 1931 it was observed that certain charges in connection with an officer's language duty in Persia were noted as recoverable from the Imperial Government. As no debits could be traced for the officer's pay and allowances, or for his travelling expenses beyond Basra, I suggested that the Military Accountant-General should be asked how adjustment of these items had been or would be made. As a result of this enquiry a further sum of £619 14s. 7d. was advised for recovery and has since been received.

(ii) The claims relating to additional Indian troops lent to the Imperial Government for service at Hong Kong are examined in my Department before submission to the War Office. I pointed out that in the claim for 1930-31 no charges appeared for the special furlough granted under the Regulations for the Army in India to details proceeding to or returning from the Hong Kong Mule Corps and the Indian Military Hospital at Kowloon. On enquiry being made from India it was ascertained that these charges had been overlooked. Debits were raised for £697 4s. and it was intimated that other items were under reference. The above-mentioned sum has been duly recovered and a further communication regarding the remaining items-

is awaited.

3. Prior to the Great War the cost of leave granted to officers of the Recovery of con-Indian Army in respect of service under the War Office while lent to that tribution towards Indian Army in respect of service under the war once while left to that Department was adjusted by the recovery, subject to certain conditions, of leave charges of Indian Army One and a half month's leave pay per head for each year of such service. officers and per-Owing to the changed conditions immediately after the war a modified sonnel lent to the 'arrangement was put into force in 1921 involving the recovery of the actual War Office. leave pay issued to individual officers. In 1929, as the particular conditions which gave rise to this arrangement had ceased to exist, it was decided that a return should be made to the pre-war practice, but without prejudice to any modification which might be agreed to on the revision of the Memorandum of Arrangement regulating transactions between the India Office and the War Office, then under consideration. Statements were prepared in India of the amounts due and a claim on the War Office was compiled. On examination of the claim in my Department in October 1931, certain points were raised which eventually resulted in the claim being increased by £862. The amount has since been received.

4. An officer of the Royal Air Force serving in India came on leave Falsification of a from that country and produced an original last pay certificate which showed last pay certifihim as having received in India pay in advance up to a certain date. Before cate. any payment was made it was noticed that the duplicate last pay certificate forwarded direct to the India Office showed pay as having been advanced to the corresponding date of the subsequent month. The case was reported to and investigated by the Air Ministry, and it having been proved that the officer had altered the date shown on the original certificate he was dismissed the Service.

While the attempt at falsification proved unsuccessful, certain defects in the preparation of original and duplicate Indian last pay certificates, which are the basis of pay issued in this country, were observed, and steps have been taken to amend the procedure regarding the issue of these documents.

5. Under Army Regulations, India, the amount of leave granted to Amendment of officers of the British Army on resignation is generally less than that Regulations. granted on retirement. It was pointed out by this Department that no such distinction was made in the case of officers of the Indian Army and that consequently officers on resignation were treated in this respect similarly to those on retirement. The Regulations have accordingly been amended.

6. £319,311 14s. 4d. was paid in 1931-32 to the War Office for marriage Marriage allow allowances and allotments disbursed by Army Paymasters in respect of ances and allot ments: British troops in India for the period April 1931 to March 1932.

troops.

A general examination was made of the claims and a test audit was carried out at certain pay offices, which resulted in a credit to Indian revenues of £221 5s. 8d.

Further questions raised in audit are still under consideration.

7. For the years 1930-31 onwards Indian revenues are liable for a Aden. contribution towards the military and political administration of Aden of one-third of the actual cost subject to a maximum of £150,000 a year.

The accounts for 1930-31 have been examined, and as the net expenditure exceeded £450,000 the amount charged in the accounts for last year is now finally passed.

As regards 1931-32 the accounts, which are still under audit, show a total cost of £373,304 19s. 6d. An advance of £135,000 was made to the Imperial Government and apart from any adjustments necessary as the result of my examination a credit of £10,565 0s. 2d. is due to Indian

The total shown in the accounts for 1931-32 under this head is £136,499 4s. The difference between that amount and the advance of £135,000 referred to above, viz. £1,499 4s., is made up of two items:-

(1) Contribution by Government of India towards cost 1,416 1 10 (2) Contribution by Government of India towards cost 83 2 2 of police barracks

The circumstances under which these amounts are chargeable to Indian Revenues are as follows—

- (1) In consequence of the withdrawal of Indian troops from Aden, under the new arrangements introduced in 1927 for its administration (vide paragraph 6 of Section II of my Report on the Accounts for 1927-28), the Aden Police, which was administered by the Government of Bombay, had to be maintained at greater strength and a higher standard of efficiency. It was agreed that the ordinary cost only should be borne by the Government of Bombay, the extra cost involved being shared between the Imperial Government and the Government of India, the former paying £8,000 and the latter the balance. No extra expense was, however, incurred before 1930-31, and even then the whole of the expenditure on which the above apportionments were based was not incurred. The proportionate sums payable were £1,559 2s. 3d. by the Imperial Government and £1,416 1s. 10d. by the Government of India.
- (2) It has been agreed that the capital expenditure on police barracks at Adeu shall be divided proportionately between the Indian and Imperial Governments. In 1931-32 the amount so expended was small and India's share was £59 0s. 2d. The difference between that amount and £83 2s. 2d. actually charged in the accounts for 1931-32, viz. £24 2s., was refunded in 1932-33.

War graves.

- 8.—(i) The amount of £7,650 under "Military Services—VII. Transportation and Miscellaneous" is the final half-year's payment at £15,300 a. year to the Imperial War Graves Commission in respect of the maintenance, &c., of the graves of soldiers of the Indian Expeditionary Forces who died in the Great War. The Imperial War Graves Commission was established by Royal Charter in 1917, and at the Imperial War Conference in 1918 it. was decided that the cost of carrying out the decisions of the Commission should be borne by the respective Governments in proportion to the number of graves. The charge to India was assessed on the number of graves of Indian soldiers and amounted to 1.02 per cent. of the whole. This arrangement was maintained until September 1925, up to which time India had contributed approximately £69,000, this sum including a share of the cost of the construction of cemeteries, the erection of memorials and. buildings, and of upkeep and administration. In 1925 the Commission decided to exercise the power under their Charter of establishing an endowment fund of £5,000,000, to provide income for the maintenance of the graves in perpetuity. Under the arrangements made India has contributed 1.02 per cent. of the amount required for this purpose spread overa period of six and a half years, together with the estimated share of maintenance expenses during that period, in all £15,300 a year. The amount contributed is subject to adjustment on receipt of final accounts and apparently about £3,000 will be repaid by the Commission.
- (ii) In 1929 the Commission agreed (a) to refund certain preliminary expenditure in India on the restoration of graves, and (b) to bear an annual composition charge of Rs. 19,500 for their maintenance.

In 1931 this Department suggested that, as there had been no receipts under either of these heads, investigation should be made. Correspondence with India ensued, and claims are now coming forward for the work of restoration and are being met as presented.

With regard to maintenance, the Commission admitted liability from September 1929, apparently on the assumption that all the graves would have been restored by that date and that the full charge for maintenance would be due. No claims have, however, yet been made, owing to the non-receipt from India of the certificates required by the Commission in support of the charges.

Non-recovery of pay and pension contribution in respect of service out of India. 9. Information is furnished periodically by the Government of India regarding recovery of pension contribution in respect of officers of units serving out of India. Attention was drawn by this Department to the fact that although contributions had been claimed in respect of the officers of a battalion which had been serving in the Federated Malay States since 1920, as well as of the officers of the Training Company in India, it seemed doubtful from the-

evidence available whether any recovery had been made for the proportionate cost of the headquarters of the Training Battalion in India to which the unit was affiliated. In reply to my enquiries I was informed that the relevant orders had been overlooked by the Controller of Military Accounts concerned. and that no claim either for pay or pension contribution had been made against the employing Government, but that the matter was being pursued in audit in India. I have not yet been informed of the amount which was consequently recovered from the Federated Malay States.

10. Under the terms of an Army Instruction relating to officers retiring Pension on preprematurely owing to prospective congestion in the higher and middle ranks mature retireof the Indian Army, it was proposed to grant to a certain officer on retire- ment. ment a pension containing an Indian element of £45 per annum based on 17 years' service. The case was submitted to this Department for pre-audit, when it was pointed out that only 11 years of his total service counted in computing the Indian element, and the amount was reduced to £21 per annum. The terms included the option of drawing a gratuity in lieu of the Indian element of pension, and this was exercised by the officer in question, with a saving of £367, owing to the reduction of pension.

11. A widow drawing a pension under the 1919 War Warrant who Gratuity to a re-marries is entitled to receive a gratuity equivalent to a year's widow on repension, not at the rate drawn, but at the lower rate operative under the marriage.

1918 Warrant. A case was submitted for pre-audit, in which it was proposed to issue a gratuity based on the higher rate of pension, but on the mistake being pointed out by this Department the lower rate was substituted, involving a saving of £45.

12. The rate of exchange for rupee pensions derived from Funds Rate of exchange instituted by the East India Company and subsequently transferred to the for rupee penadministration of the Secretary of State is dependent upon the pensioner's place of residence. Attention was drawn to a case where the English rate of exchange was being applied to payments made to a pensioner while resident in India. £14 overpaid was recovered and arrangements were made for future payments to be issued in India at the lower rate, which was £31 per annum less than the rate in issue.

13. The principal payments made from Indian revenues to Departments Payments to of the Imperial Government for services arising out of the maintenance of Imperial Govern-British troops on the Indian Establishment are dealt with in the following ment. paragraphs.

14. War Office: Capitation Rate for Effective Services:—

A provisional advance of £1,400,000 was made as in the preceding five years. These amounts are subject to adjustment when a decision has been reached on the recommendations of the Tribunal referred to in paragraph 4 of Section I of this Report.

15. War Office: for gratuities on death, discharge, &c.:-

£48,000 was advanced on this account in respect of payments during 1931-32, and £573 9s. 4d. was received in adjustment of the accounts from 1926-27 to 1930-31.

The accounts for 1931-32 are now under audit.

16. War Office: for unemployment insurance:

£136,000 was paid on this account during 1931-32. represents payment of advances for that year and adjustment of arrears amounting to £34,920 1s. 1d. for 1930-31. £773 4s. was received in adjustment of the accounts from 1926-27 to 1929-30.

I am making enquiries as to the basis on which Indian payments on

this account are made.

17. War Office: on account of clothing and necessaries in possession of regiments on their transfer to and from the Indian Establishment:

The advance of £9,500 referred to in paragraph 15 of Section II of the last Report has been adjusted.

A further advance of £6,500 was made to the War Office in March 1932 to meet the approximate amount due from Indian revenues for the second half of the trooping season 1930-31 and the first half of that of 1931-32. Detailed statements relating to the expenditure incurred during the period in question have recently been received from the War Office, and are now under audit.

18. War Office: Sea Transport:—

In paragraph 16 of Section II of my last Report I referred to the reassembling at my suggestion of the Committee, on whose recommendation a Joint Trooping Service to cover Indian and Imperial requirements was set up in 1925. The results of the first five years' working of the Joint Services are being reviewed, but the investigation is not yet complete.

The amount claimed in respect of trooping in 1930-31 was £433,331 12s. 1d., against which advances amounting to £423,500 had been made. The balance of £9,831 12s. 1d. has now been paid to the War Office. The accounts for 1931-32 are at present under audit. £620 has been credited to Indian revenues as the result of queries raised by this Department on the accounts for 1928-29 and 1929-30.

19. War Office: Retired pay, pensions, &c., of British Forces for service in India:-

The accounts relating to the period 1919-20 to 1926-27 have now been finally adjusted, and considerable progress has been made towards the settlement of those for 1927-28.

A further advance of £1,149,257 in respect of the year 1931-32 was made to the War Office.

20. Air Ministry: for Effective Services in respect of personnel of the Air Force serving in India:

An advance of £111,000 was made, based on a provisional Capitation

Rate of £50 on the numbers serving in India.

As in the case of the payment to the War Office for effective services. the payments made from 1st April 1926 are subject to adjustment. The question of the Air Force Capitation Rate was dealt with by the Tribunal referred to in paragraph 4 of Section I of this Report.

21. Air Ministry: for Non-Effective Services in respect of personnel serving in India:

A further advance of £18,800 was made on this account during Previous advances have been made as follows: 1926-27, £45,000 (including arrear payments); 1927-28, £15,800; 1928-29 £14,800; 1929-30, £15,200; 1930-31, £19,500.

These advances are subject to adjustment when agreement has been reached as to the method of discharging India's liability for a share of the Non-Effective charges of Royal Air Force personnel in respect of service in India. An enquiry has been in progress for some years with a view to discharging this liability by a Capitation Rate, but no conclusions have yet been reached.
