Explanatory Memorandum of the Railway Budget for 1932-33.

1930-31.

Commercial and Strategic Lines together.

In February last, when presenting the budget estimates for 1931-32, we anticipated that the results of working of railways in 1930-31 would be a loss of $5\cdot12$ crores (2.93 crores on commercial lines and $2\cdot19$ crores on strategic lines). In order, therefore, to pay our contribution of $5\cdot74$ crores we thought we should have to withdraw $10\cdot86$ crores from our reserve. The actual results were not very different: our total loss was 6 lakhs more and we withdrew $10\cdot92$ crores from the reserve, leaving a balance of $5\cdot42$ crores at the end of the year.

It should be added, however, that while the actual receipts were very near anticipations, the difference being only 5 lakhs, our working expenses were nearly a crore higher than we expected, and it was only because the excess was almost wholly counterbalanced by an increase in the arrear adjustments with the depreciation fund, referred to in paragraph 7 of our memorandum last year, that the net result showed our total loss as only 6 lakhs higher than we had anticipated.

The expenditure from the depreciation fund (11:40 crores) was nearly 2½ crores more than was anticipated. This was partly due to the adjustments referred to above. The balance at the credit of the Fund at the end of the year was 13:92 crores.

1931-32.

A.—Commercial Lines.

2. In framing our budget for 1931-32 about a year ago, we allowed for a modest improvement in traffic over what we thought were the abnormally low figures of 1930-31, and for increased receipts from alterations of rates and fares already given effect to or under investigation at the time. We also allowed for a large reduction of expenditure as a result of the economy measures which railway administrations had already started. The reduction has exceeded our expectations, for excluding the emergency deductions from pay, our working expenses are likely to be lower by nearly 3 crores than we budgetted for: but on the other hand, the general economic depression in the country and abroad has been so severe and our traffic receipts have fallen so heavily that, instead of getting a small gain from commercial lines as we had hoped, we now expect a loss during the current year still heavier than in the last-

^{3.} We have at various times during the year introduced enhancements both in passenger fares and in goods rates wherever it seemed likely that it would increase earnings to do so; but notwithstanding all these measures to improve revenue, our receipts have fallen to a lower level than in any year since 1922-23. Instead of being 6 crores more than last year as we had hoped, our gross traffic receipts

will, so far as we can see at present, be about 8 crores less. Both passenger and goods earnings are expected to be over 8 per cent. below last year's level. The details of our estimates are as follows:

cent.) below last year in spite of enhancements in fares during the year estimated to give us an additional \$1\frac{1}{2}\$ crores in a full year. The number of passengers carried in the first seven months of the year has fallen from 344 million to 292 million, adecline of over 15 per cent. The total number of passenger miles has fallen from \$11,887\$ million to \$10,135\$ million, a decrease of \$14.7\$ per cent. and the average lead is only slightly better than last year—\$34.71\$ miles against \$34.54\$ miles. We expect a fall in our other coaching traffic earnings of 29 lakhs (nearly 6 per cent.) though, since May last, our luggage and parcels rates have been enhanced by \$15\$ per cent. and are now at a level not appreciably different from that in force before the reduction three years ago.

5. The fall in our goods earnings is at present expected to be as severe.

Goods earnings.

Our present anticipations are that we shall lose nearly 5 crores as compared with last year and 8 crores as compared with our budget estimates. In the first seven months of the year the number of tons carried fell by 8.8 million, a decrease of just over 15 per cent. Here again, there was a slight increase in the average lead from 191.9 miles to 194.4 miles and the decrease in ton miles was only 14 per cent., the actual figure being 9,605 million against 11,178 million last year.

The traffic carried has throughout been considerably lower this year than last, and there has been a large decrease in the number of wagons loaded. Up to the 2nd of January, we loaded 83,000 fewer wagons under coal and coke, a decrease of 10 per cent.; 26,500 fewer under oilseeds, a decrease of 15 per cent.; and 22,500 less under cotton, a decrease of 23 per cent. The loading of miscellaneous full wagons shows a fall of 229,000 or 13 per cent. as compared with last year, and though the percentage decline under miscellaneous 'smalls' is comparatively small, being 3 per cent. the decrease in the number of wagons loaded is 32,000.

6. The present estimates of working expenses are compared in the following Working expenses.

- 7. Our total ordinary working expenses, exclusive of depreciation, will, it is now anticipated, be 4,72 lakks below last year in spite of the fact that last year's figures were diminished by arrear credit adjustments to the extent of 1,66 lakks. The actual decrease is thus 6,38 lakks of which about 58 lakks has been obtained from the emergency deductions from pay, which railways, in common with all Government departments, have been constrained to introduce from January. The balance of 5,80 lakks represents the result of the strenuous efforts made by railways to decrease their working expenses.
- 8. We estimate that the total charges grouped under the head 'Administration.

 Administration.

 Administration.

 When we remember that owing to the large number of discharges of staff as a result of retrenchment during the current year, our expenditure on gratuities has been 25 lakhs more than last year, and that there is a normal and inevitable tendency to increased expenditure year by year as a result of increments and staff required for new lines, the decrease this year is remarkable and bears testimony to the energetic efforts of railway administrations to reduce expenditure. It would take too long to mention all the various ways and methods which they have tried, but a brief description of a few of them may be found interesting:
 - (a) A large number of superior posts have been abolished in the course of the year, and others held in abeyance during the absence on leave of permanent incumbents or otherwise. Some have been replaced by posts of lower grade. On State-managed railways following the recommendations of the Retrenchment Committee, it has been decided to abolish the 36 construction posts that were added in the last revision, the deputation reserve of 4 per cent., and the training reserve of 41 posts. These account for the reduction of the cadre by 104 posts. In addition, the working posts in the cadres have been reduced and as a result of re-arrangement 37 posts have been abolished and 28 more held in abeyance. On Company-managed railways, similarly, 24 posts have been abolished and 44 more left unfilled.

- (b) Special pay has been withdrawn or reduced to a large extent; and compensatory allowances have been reconsidered and, in many cases reduced or abolished.
- (c) A large number of office staff has been reduced either by vacancies remaining unfilled or by actual discharges.
- (d) Large decreases in contingent expenditure have been effected by economising in the use of stationery, curtailing printing, reducing expenditure on telegrams and postage, use of cheaper paper, etc.
- (e) Publicity expenses have been reduced to a considerable extent by putting publicity under the Gommercial Department, reducing the number of tourist advisers and cinema cars, etc.
- 9. The largest saving, however, has been in the cost of repairs and maintenance of our works and rolling stock. The Repairs and Maintenance. revised estimate for 1931-32 is 1,72 lakhs less than the booked expenditure for 1930-31, which, as has been pointed out, was diminished by 1,66 lakhs as a result of correction of certain past erroneous adjustments. In other words, the total expenditure is expected to be 3,38 lakhs, or 20 per cent. lower than in 1930-31. Part of this saving must be taken as expenditure postponed for the time being, but we are confident that a considerable portion can be taken as a permanent saving. It is one of the advantages of a period of acute depression like the present that it impels every authority responsible for expenditure to examine each item of expenditure very carefully in order to see whether he could do without it or carry out the work at cheaper cost. Every railway has for instance carefully considered the scales of consumable stores, tools and plant with a view to reduction. Cheaper substitutes have been experimented with. Scrap material has been reclaimed and reconditioned and brought into use. The strength of the permanent-way gangs and level crossing gatemen has been carefully examined and reduced wherever possible. Repairs to staff quarters, buildings and bridges have been drastically curtailed. Only essential minor works have been undertaken. Rolling stock has been laid up when not required. The period between overhauls has been increased. Overtime has been reduced in workshops and sheds. Short time has been introduced in many workshops. Some railways have closed certain workshops altogether.
- 10. Our total cost of operation is now estimated at just over 23 crores— $2\frac{1}{2}$ crores lower than the expenditure last year: Operation. of this, 1,18 lakhs is due to a reduction in fuel charges. The price of coal was about the same as in the previous year and this reduction is entirely due to the decrease in train and engine mileage consequent on the fall in traffic and measures taken to economise in the use of coal. About half a crore is expected to be saved in expenditure on staff. All railways have reduced, or are attempting to reduce, staff to correspond, as far as possible, to the fall in traffic. Large numbers have been discharged or given inducements to retire voluntarily. Some have been placed on compulsory leave for a time or reduced to a lower grade. Other economy measures adopted, have included the closing down of a number of stations or converting them into flag stations; closing wholly or in part of certain branch lines with little traffic; reduction of scales of consumable stores and substitution of cheaper qualities; and revision of scales of handling charges. Finally, all railways have been effecting, wherever possible, reductions in train mileage, both goods and passenger as well as shunting. It is interesting to note that in the first eight months of the year, the total train mileage has been reduced from 1121 million to 101 million, a reduction of over 10 per cent.

The share of the expenditure which is recovered from worked lines mainly depends on their earnings and is likely to be 31 lakhs lower than last year.

 - 12. Interest charges show an increase of 55 lakhs which is somewhat lower than the usual annual growth; this is the result of our reduced scale of capital expenditure.

The net loss in working is likely to be 10 lakhs less than in 1930-31 mainly as a result of the fact that the working expenses of 1930-31 were increased abnormally by a debit to revenue of 9 lakhs representing the cost of the dismantled Decauville railway. The fall in traffic receipts of 16 lakhs has been more than made up by economies in expenditure.

C.—Summary of Results.

14. Our total receipts from commercial lines will, on these estimates, be 86.68 crores, or 8.62 crores below last year. Our total charges will be 94.12 crores, or 4.24 crores less than last year. This leaves us with a deficit of 7.44 crores as compared with 3.06 crores last year. The loss on strategic railways of 2.03 crores brings the total loss to 9.47 crores. This exceeds the balance of 5.42 crores in our reserve at the beginning of the year, of which only 4.95 crores can be considered free; for 47 lakhs have been invested in securities, such as shares in private railway companies, which it is inadvisable to realize. In the circumstances, the contribution to general revenues has to be postponed; and in order to pay our full interest charges, the balance of 4.52 crores left after utilising the free balance of the Reserve Fund must be met by a temporary loan from the Depreciation Fund.

The expenditure from the Depreciation Fund is expected to be $8\frac{1}{2}$ crores against the payment to the fund of $13\cdot43$ crores, leaving a balance of $5\cdot18$ crores, but as we intend to borrow $4\cdot52$ crores from the Depreciation Fund to meet our deficit, the balance at credit to the fund will be increased by only 66 lakks and will amount to $14\cdot58$ crores at the end of the year.

1932-33.

A.—Commercial Lines.

15. The principal figures of the budget estimates for 1932-33 for commercial lines are compared in the following statement with our present estimate for the current year. In order to facilitate comparison between the two sets of figures, the amount of credits from material released from works charged to the depreciation fund, which is deducted from working expenses in the current year, but will be shown on the receipts side in 1932-33, is shown separately.

16. In placing gross traffic receipts one crore higher than in 1931-32 we are merely allowing Gross traffic receipts. effect during a whole year of the enhancements of rates and fares, including the surcharge on coal freights, that we have introduced at varying dates during the current year; this should give us an extra crore and a quarter, but we shall receive about twenty-five lakhs less than this year because 1932-33 has only 365 days instead of 366. There are no sufficient indications that traffic will improve to justify our anticipating an increase in its volume; on the other hand we do not think it necessary to anticipate still further deterioration. The estimate therefore assumes that the volume of traffic in 1932-33 will be about the same as in the current year.

Our total working expenses including depreciation show a decrease of 1,88 lakhs from this year's figure, of which about ½ crore may be taken as due to the abnormally heavy expenditure on gratuities in the current year, and ½ crores, net after payment of 22 lakhs to the Income-tax Department, will be derived from the emergency deductions in pay which will be in force during the whole year. Excluding these we expect to bring down our total expenditure by 13 lakhs. But seeing that the surcharge on coal freights will increase our fuel charges by about 37 lakhs (of which account had been taken in our receipts' estimate); that

25 lakks more has to be provided for depreciation; and that increments in pay and, to a smaller extent, the staffing of new lines opened this year mean an increase of at least half a crore in our charges, our estimate really provides for a further reduction of 1½ crores in working expenses following on the decrease of about 6 crores in the current year.

Teserve fund in any substantial increase in the balance in the depreciation fund, since interest-free loans will have to be taken from the latter fund both this year and next; consequently we have to face a reduction in our receipts from interest, which is the chief individual factor in the decrease of 20 lakhs in our estimates of other receipts.

19. The estimates of working expenses are given in the following table with the current year's figures. A direct comparison between the two sets of figures is however difficult owing to certain accounting changes which we explain below—

20. Of the decrease of 2,12 lakhs (excluding decreases due to the emergency deductions in pay) under this head, 1,75 lakhs in all represent the result of certain accounting changes which increase the expenditure under 'Operation' correspondingly. Gratuities and contributions to Provident Fund in respect of all railway staff were formerly debited to this head; but it has been decided that from 1932-33 onwards gratuities and provident fund contributions of staff whose pay is not debited to this demand should be shown under 'Operation'. This accounts for 1,62 lakhs. The balance is due to the decision to discontinue the transfer from the head 'Operation' to this head of part of the pay of Assistant Station Masters doing telegraph duties which is considered to be set off by the work done by telegraphists on purely operating duties.

Allowing for these, and for the fact that in 1931-32 we had to meet an exceptionally heavy gratuities bill, there is still a decrease under this head notwithstanding the increase ordinarily to be expected from annual increments and the opening of 400 miles of new line in the current year.

- 21. The estimated cost of repairs and maintenance during 1932-33 is

 Repairs and Maintenance. 7 lakhs lower than in the current year.
- 22. When the accounting changes referred to earlier are taken into account, the nominal increase of 1,61 lakhs under this head is turned into a real decrease of 14 lakhs. But for the fact that the surcharge on coal freights will increase our fuel charges by 37 lakhs—with a corresponding increase in receipts—the decrease would have exceeded half a crore. A small part of this is due to a decrease in the price of coal.
- 23. The emergency deductions from pay which will be in force throughout the whole year, are expected to yield 2,30 lakhs; but we shall have to pay 22 lakhs to the income-tax department in respect of additional income-tax payable by railway staff exempted from it during these two years.
- 24. Surplus profits payable to railway companies and Indian States are expected to be slightly less than in the current year; but our miscellaneous charges show a relatively large decrease (over 20 per cent. as compared with the previous year), as a result of drastic curtailment of various activities. The increase of 43 lakhs in our interest charges is small compared with what it has been in recent years owing to the drastic curtailment of new capital expenditure.

Summary of results.

26. If these estimates prove correct, the net results of next year's working ought to be better, if slightly, than the current year's. Our total receipts from commercial lines should be $88\cdot70$ crores or $2\cdot02$ crores better than this year: while our total charges ought to be 94:30 crores or only 18 lakhs more. The net loss will then be $5\cdot60$ crores or $1\cdot84$ crores less than in 1931-32. Adding the loss on strategic lines, the total deficit comes to $7\cdot59$ crores, to meet which we shall again be compelled to have recourse to a temporary loan from the Depreciation Fund.

The opening balance of the Depreciation Fund is expected to be 14.58 crores. We are putting in 13.70 crores into it during 1932-33 and taking out 5.60 crores for works expenditure and 7.59 crores as a temporary loan or 13.19 crores in all, so that the closing balance is estimated at 15.09 crores.

Capital Expenditure.

27. Our works programme for the current year amounted to 21.70 crores; and since we expected to reduce our stores balances by 2 crores, we asked the Assembly for a grant of 19.70 crores. Of this 8½ crores was to be found from the Depreciation Fund and the balance was capital expenditure. Our present anticipations are that the total cash expenditure this year will be 16.60 crores, or 3.10 crores less.

We have no reason at present to suppose that our anticipations regarding a reduction in stores balances will not materialise, nor that the expenditure from the Depreciation Fund will be appreciably different from our budget estimates. The chief saving is in our capital expenditure, especially on open line works.

28. Our works programme for 1932-33 is still more attenuated; we have been able to provide only 9½ crores for it.

The total cost of the works in the programme is present in stock, thus reducing our stores balances which ought to be below 13½.

crores at the beginning of the year:

We have allotted only 1,01 lakhs for new construction where our aim has been to complete all lines now under construction. By the end of the year, the Sagaing Bridge over the Irrawaddy will be the only unfinished item on our new construction programme, and it will be very near completion, the balance required for it in the following year being barely 13 lakhs. Open line works are expected to cost 10½ crores, of which about 2½ crores are required for works in progress, about 4½ crores for track renewals and 1¾ crores for rolling stock. The amount provided for new works is less than 2 crores and more than a half of this is on small items costing not more than a lakh each for which we allow a lump sum to Agents to be utilised at their discretion.

The only individual new works of any importance for which any large provision has been made in the budget are the rebuilding or strengthening of certain important bridges, like the Gorai bridge on the Eastern Bengal Railway, the Barakar bridge on the East Indian Railway and the Betwa bridge on the Great Indian Peninsula Railway, werks which could not be postponed any longer consistently with the safety of the public.

29. Finally we wish to express our gratitude to the members of the Standing Finance Committee for Railways for the help they have given us

throughout the year.

(1) and (2). Track and Bridges.—In order to be able to run the new heavy standard locomotives without restriction the previous policy of strengthening and improving track and bridges is being pursued though owing to general financial stringency the programme has had to be somewhat curtailed.

The Nerbudda bridge on the Great Indian Peninsula Railway and the Kotri bridge on the North Western Railway have been completed and only a small provision is necessary to complete the Roopnarayan bridge on the Bengal Nagpur Railway. The renewal of the Nerbudda bridge at Broach on the Bombay, Baroda and Central India Railway is in hand and a substantial provision has been made to push on this work, as well as the renewal of girders on the metre gauge section of that railway between Rut am and Ajmer. On the Great Indian Peninsula Railway the programme of bringing up to main

line standard the North East main line between Itarsi and Agra is being continued as far as Jhansi only for the present, and this involves the renewal of girders on the Narain and Betwa Bridges in addition to those which were commenced in 1931-32. On the East Indian Railway the down line girder on the Barakar bridge is also being renewed as well as the Gorai bridge on the Eastern Bengal Railway.

A further instalment of relaying with 115 lb. section in the colliery area of the East Indian Railway and of relaying of with 90 lb. section of rails on the Dinapur Division of that railway is being provided. On the Burma Railways main line 10 miles of 75 lb. section relaying is being carried out, the released rails being re-utilised on the Mu Valley Branch. Provision is being made for a further instalment of relaying with 90 lb. section on the Itarsi-Agra section so as to complete this work up to Jhansi, at the same time the 69 lb. section rails on the Wardha Balharshah section are also being renewed with 90 lb. section rails. On the North Western Railway it is proposed to renew a further instalment on the Delhi-Ambala-Kalka section with 90 lb. rails and on the Madras and Southern Mahratta Railway provision has been made for over 60 mi es of relaying with 60 lb. section rails on the metre gauge section between Hubli and Castle Rock.

(3) Traffic facilities.—Of the doubling schemes mentioned last year that of the Ishurdi-Abdulpur section on the Eastern Bengal Railway has been completed and the only item under this head is the doubling between Cawnpore and Tundla on the East Ind an Ralvey, which it is proposed to hold in abeyance when the section between Tondla and Etawah has been completed, provision made being to this end. The only important remodelling scheme of those mentioned last year that will require funds in 1932-33 is that at Erode junction on the South Indian Railway where a provision of some Rs. 13 lakhs has been made for its completion.

(4) Workshops, Station and other buildings.—Under this head the only important items are as shown below:—
