2. The Defence Department of the Government of India controls the expenditure under all the heads except that pertaining to the Military Accounts Offices which are under the control of the Finance Department.

3. The budget estimates are based on the cost of the actual anticipated strength of the Defence Services. The actual compiled expenditure for previous years is also used as a guide and allowance made for all reorganisations, new measures and changes in policy or equipment.

4. The term "Pay" used in this budget includes all allowances except when they are shown separately e.g., kit and clothing allowances.

Budget 1938-39 is less than Budget 1937-38 by 111 lakhs due chiefly to shortage of British troops (121 lakhs), mechanisation of certain cavalry and infantry units including the contribution of 27 lakhs from His Majesty's Government (36 lakhs) and other decreases including War Block retirements (5 lakhs) partly counterbalanced by the cost of certain amenities to British troops (27 lakhs), the transfer from Head 7 to this Head of the provision for the pay of unemployed officers (20 lakhs) and an increase under pay of officers unemployed or under training (3 lakhs).

SUB-HEAD A.—*Forces in India proper.*

ORGANISATION.

British Cavalry.

After the Great War the number of Line Cavalry regiments of the British Cavalry establishment, namely 28, was reduced to 20. Of these, 5 regiments are now serving in India. The reduction in the Cavalry of the Line was effected by amalgamating 16 regiments in pairs and reconstituting them as 8 regiments. The identity of the original regiments was preserved by retaining within each re-constituted unit two squadrons of the senior original regiments and one squadron of the junior; and by giving to the new regiment a title combining the designations of the 2 regiments from which it was formed. Drafts for the regiments in India are obtained from linked regiments at home. Each regiment remains in India for a tour of about five years, when it is relieved by another regiment.

2. *Organisation of the regiment.*—Certain British Cavalry regiments are now converting to British Cavalry light tank regiments. The organisation of British Cavalry in India will be :—

Horsed regiment.—Regimental headquarters (containing a Vickers Berthier troop).

Light tank regiment.—Regimental headquarters and headquarters squadron (containing 1 anti-tank troop) 3 light tank squadrons.

Indian Cavalry.

Before the Great War there were in the Indian Army 39 regiments of Cavalry, excluding the Bodyguards of H. E. the Viceroy and Their Excellencies the Governors of Madras, Bombay and Bengal, and the Aden Troop which was maintained for local service in Aden.

(The Bodyguards of the Presidency Governors are now administered and financed by the respective Local Governments. The Aden Troop was disbanded on the 15th January 1929.)

2. In the post-war re-organisation, 36 regiments were converted from a *silladar** to a non-silladar basis and were amalgamated to form the existing number, *viz.*, 21.

During 1937, a re-organisation took place by which these 21 regiments were linked into 3 groups. Each group consists of 6 active regiments and 1 training regiment. The training regiment is responsible for the training of recruits and reservists of all active regiments of the group.

Each active regiment is now organised on the basis of headquarter wing (including a Vickers Berthier Troop) and three sabre squadrons each consisting of three sabre troops and one light machine gun troop.

Each training regiment is organised on the basis of regimental headquarters and three training squadrons. A training squadron maintains two active regiments of the group.

3. The total reserve establishment of the Indian Cavalry is 1,980 class C. Reserve training is biennial, consisting of three periods of training during reserve service.

4. *Reliefs.*—Periodical reliefs of active regiments are carried out.

Royal Artillery.

(i) *Present organisation.*—Under a change introduced in 1924, the Royal Artillery, which formerly comprised two corps, *viz.*, (i) The Royal Horse and Royal Field Artillery and (ii) The Royal Garrison Artillery, now consists of one only, though the Royal Horse Artillery retains its title as a section of the single corps, the Royal Artillery.

(ii) *Training centres.*—The Royal Artillery Training Centre at Muttra recruits and trains Indian ranks for Horse, Field and Medium Artillery.

The Mountain Artillery Training Centre at Ambala recruits and trains Indian ranks for Light and Mountain and Heavy Artillery.

Indian Artillery.

As a measure of Indianization an Indian Regiment of Artillery was formed with effect from the 15th January 1935, i.e., the date on which the 14th Field Brigade, Royal Artillery left India. The first unit of this new corps which has been raised is a field artillery brigade and is designated "A" Field Brigade, Indian Artillery. In consequence of this formation, "A" Company Madras Pioneers was abolished with effect from the same date. A training battery to recruit and train Indian ranks for the Indian Artillery was formed from 1st April 1936 by expanding the Royal Artillery Training Centre at Muttra.

Engineer units.

(i) *Present organisation.*—The Engineers include four branches :—

- (1) Field Units.
- (2) Works Services (provided for under Head, 8—Military Engineer Services).
- (3) Defence Lights Maintenance Section.
- (4) Transportation.

1. *Field Units.*—The Field units in India consist of 4 Field troops, 17 Field companies 4 Divisional headquarters companies and 4 Army troops companies. The units form part of the 3 Corps of Sappers and Miners.

EXPLANATIONS—*contd.*

The British officers and British other ranks of the Corps of Sappers and Miners are found from the Corps of Royal Engineers.

The Indian ranks are trained at the Headquarters and Depôts of the 3 Corps of Sappers and Miners

2. *Defence Lights Maintenance Section.*—Detachments of this section, which consists of a few Royal Engineer ranks, are maintained at Bombay, Karachi and Calcutta for the purpose of assisting A. F. I. Fortress Companies, R. E., to maintain the lights at these defended ports.

3. *Transportation.*—A small reserve of essential trades is now maintained in peace for the formation of the Railway Reserve Regiment, when required.

(ii) *Main changes.*—In 1932-33 the strength of the 3 Corps of Sappers and Miners was increased by approximately 35 per cent. to enable them to discharge their increased responsibilities consequent on the abolition of Pioneers. Pioneers totalling 7 Battalions and 3 Corps Headquarters were disbanded in 1932-33. In 1933-34 steps were taken to abolish all litho sections and one printing section, Sappers and Miners.

British Infantry.

Organisation.—There are 43 British Infantry battalions in India. Each battalion is linked to a battalion of the same regiment in the United Kingdom; its strength is maintained by drafts from this home battalion, which, in turn, receives recruits from the regimental depot after they have done a course lasting 20 weeks.

This system of linking battalions in pairs—so that one of them serving at home shall provide re-inforcing drafts for the other serving abroad—has been in force since 1873, and is generally spoken of as the "Cardwell system".

Normally three battalions leave India each year and are replaced by battalions from the United Kingdom or from the Colonies.

Organisation of the battalion.—A change of organisation is now being introduced, whereby there will be 4 machine gun battalions and 39 rifle battalions in India.

A machine gun battalion will consist of:—

- (a) Battalion headquarters and headquarter company;
- (b) Three machine gun companies; and
- (c) one rifle company.

Each machine gun company is organised into headquarters and 3 platoons (all mechanized), each of 2 sections. Each platoon has 5 machine guns. The rifle company is organised into headquarters, one anti-tank platoon (4 anti-tank guns), one light machine gun platoon (4 light machine guns) and two rifle platoons each of three rifle sections and 1 light machine gun detachment (1 light machine gun).

A rifle battalion will consist of:—

- (a) Battalion headquarters and headquarter company; and
- (b) Four rifle companies.

A light machine gun platoon is included in headquarter company, and each rifle company is organised into headquarters and 4 platoons, each of 3 rifle sections and 1 light machine gun detachment.

Indian Infantry.

In 1914 the number of Indian Infantry units was:—

A large number of units was raised during the war and disbanded on its termination.

2. In the post-war re-organisation, the number of Indian battalions* (excluding the Gurkha rifle battalions) was fixed at 85, including 5† for overseas garrison, divided up into groups of between 3 and 5 battalions. Each group is allotted a regimental centre for the location of its depot or training battalion, where the recruitment and preparation of drafts for active battalions and also the training of reservists are carried out. In the case of Gurkha regiments, each battalion, except when on the frontier, trains its own recruits. When a Gurkha battalion is moved to the frontier, it leaves its training company at its regimental centre station.

(2) *Reserve establishment.*—The total Infantry reserve establishment (for 77½ battalion at 280 per battalion) is 21,560, class 'C'. A number of classes 'A' and 'B' still exist; these, however, will be gradually eliminated. Reserve training is biennial consisting of three periods of training during reserve service.

Reserve service for Gurkhas is voluntary, their reserve establishment being 2,000.

(3) *Reliefs.*—About one-third of Indian Infantry units (active) are always serving on the frontier and, according to the approved policy of reliefs, are relieved after 2 years by units from other non-frontier stations, in which a unit is stationed for 4 years, e.g. Lahore, Poona, Quetta, etc. Training battalions are stationed at permanent locations.

Royal Tank Corps.

The Royal Tank Corps was formed in 1917 in order to provide for the new arm introduced during the Great War. It comprises Tank battalions, Light Tank companies and Armoured Car companies. There are none of the former in India. Light Tank companies were formed during 1933 on the re-equipment of Armoured Car companies with light tanks.

Units of the Royal Tank Corps in India are being gradually disbanded in conjunction with the re-organisation of British Cavalry regiments.

A Royal Tank Corps Depot has been temporarily set up at Kirkee.

Signals.

Signal Units were first raised in India in 1911 and at that time formed part of the Corps of Sappers and Miners. In 1914 a separate depot called the Signals Service Depot was raised and the Indian Signal Corps was formed.

In 1927 and again in 1933 the Indian Signal Corps was re-organised and now comprises the following units :—

- Signal Training Centre, India.
- 2 Corps Signals.
- 4 Cavalry Brigade Signal Troops.
- 4 Divisional Signals.
- 3 District Signals.
- 1 Experimental Wireless Section.
- Zhob Signal Section.

The British personnel of the Indian Signal Corps are found by the Royal Corps of Signals and they are trained and maintained by Signal units of the Home establishment. While serving on the Indian establishment, personnel of the Royal Corps of Signals are on the strength of "L" Company, Royal Corps of Signals which is a purely administrative unit.

The Indian ranks of the Indian Signal Corps are trained at the Signal Training Centre, India.

Depots—The depôts for both British and Indian personnel form part of the Signal Training Centre, India.

* The cost of 2 Indian Infantry battalions (including their affiliated training companies in India) serving overseas is charged to the Impl. Govt. and Federated Malay States Government.

† Includes reserve establishment of the Indian Infantry battalions lent for service in China and Federated Malay States.

EXPLANATIONS—*contd.*

(ii) *Main changes.*—Prior to the re-organisation of the Indian Signal Corps in 1927 the British personnel were recruited from all arms of the service and were trained and maintained in India. In 1927, under the general re-organisation, the British portion of the Indian Signal Corps was amalgamated with the Royal Corps of Signals.

All British personnel are now trained and maintained by Home establishments.

(iii) The main changes in the re-organisation of the Indian Signal Corps during 1933 were:—

(1) Abolition of "T" Company, Indian Signal Corps.

(2) Re-organisation of the Signal Training Centre (India).

(3) Conversion of Zhob Wireless Section into an independent Zhob Signal Section.

4th Indian Divisional Signal and 4th Cavalry Brigade Signal Troop are in the process of Indianisation.

Reservists.

The Army reserve is intended to supplement the regular Army on mobilization. It consists of:—

- (1) The Indian Regular Reserve of Officers.
- (2) The Army in India Reserve of Officers.
- (3) Indian Army Reservists.
- (4) The Indian Supplementary Reserve.
- (5) The Railway Reserve Regiment.

2. (1) *The Indian Regular Reserve of Officers* consists of officers of the regular Indian Army who retire with a pension or gratuity and who are liable for recall to regular service in the event of an emergency. They receive no reserve pay and are not liable for reserve training.

(2) *The Army in India Reserve of Officers* furnishes the officer categories required for the various arms and departments of the Army in India.

The establishment of the Army in India Reserve of Officers is 1,455 comprised of 838 officers in class "A" and 617 officers in class "B". This establishment is divided into two wings as follows:—

Training is ordinarily carried out either annually or biennially according to the arm or department of the service to which the officer is posted. Officers in class "B" do no training in peace.

Pay.—On joining the Reserve, officers of class "A" receive an outfit allowance of Rs. 400.

In time of peace every officer of class "A" receives a retaining fee of Rs. 200 per annum and every officer of class "B" Rs. 100 per annum. This allowance in the case of officers of class "A" includes a sum of Rs. 50 for the maintenance of the prescribed outfit.

When called to Army service on general mobilization, or for training, officers receive the pay and allowances admissible to regular officers of the same status and rank in the arm or department to which they are posted.

(3) *Indian Army Reservists.*—The Indian Army Reserve consists of private soldiers or their equivalent. It is comprised of class 'C' reservists for Indian Cavalry, Artillery, Sappers and Miners, Signals and Infantry and class I for Gurkha Rifles. The new class 'C' reserve was introduced for Indian Cavalry, Artillery, Sappers and Miners and Signals with effect from 1st October 1932 and for Indian Infantry with effect from 1st May 1932. There still remain a number of classes 'A' and 'B' reservists which count against the authorised establishment of the reserve but these are gradually wasting.

Training for Indian Cavalry, Infantry and Gurkha Rifles reservists is carried out biennially.

Pay.—Reserve pay at certain specified rates is admissible from the date of transfer to, or enrolment in, the reserve. When called up for service or training, reservists receive pay and allowances, in lieu of reserve pay, at regular rates according to their arm of the service.

(4) *The Indian Supplementary Reserve* consists of technical personnel required to complete the requirements of the Army in this personnel on general mobilization, not provided for or only partially provided for by the normal Indian Army Reserve.

EXPLANATIONS. —*concl.*

The Indian Supplementary Reserve is divided into two categories:—

- (1) Category B, consisting of 21 classes of tradesmen who are required to undergo an annual trade test in peace.
- (2) Category C, comprising 5 classes of tradesmen (drivers, electricians, fitters, turners and vulcanists) who are *not* required to undergo an annual trade test in peace.

Pay.—Category B reservists receive an annual bounty ranging from Rs. 48 to Rs. 72 according to trade.

On being called out on mobilization, the issue of bounties ceases with effect from the date a reservist joins his unit for active service and the conditions of service then conform to those of Indian Army in all respects.

Category C reservists are *not* paid any pay or bounty in peace.

(5) *The Railway Reserve Regiment* is intended to maintain and operate military railways in the field during hostilities.

Training.—Reservists are not required to undergo military training.

Pay.—Reserve pay is admissible at various rates according to qualifications. Special rates are admissible when called up for service on general mobilization.

Note.—*British Army Reservists.*—Subject to certain conditions the only British soldiers who may be transferred to the Army Reserve in India are:—

- (i) Those who enlisted in India;
- (ii) Those who, on expiration of their colour service or within six months thereof or on premature transfer to reserve on compassionate grounds, elect to reside in India or in another Command abroad; and
- (iii) Those who, on expiration of their colour service, or on premature transfer to the reserve on compassionate grounds, wish to proceed to a British Dominion, Colony, Possession, or a foreign country.

A British Army Reservist resident in India is not liable for training nor for recall to Army service on mobilization, consequently reserve pay is not admissible.

The following main changes have been considered in budget 1938-39:—

- (a) Alterations in peace establishments of Indian cavalry and infantry battalions, active, due to replacement of Viceroy's commissioned officers by a further batch of Indian commissioned officers and Indian warrant officers, as a result of Indianization.
- (b) Re-organisation of Indian cavalry and reduction in the authorised establishment of cavalry reservists.
- (c) Artillery—(i) mechanization of one Royal Horse Artillery Battery, (ii) second and third stages in conversion of Light Batteries into Mountain Batteries, (iii) Re-organisation of Coast Defences, (iv) alterations to Fort Armament establishments and (v) alterations to Training Centre establishments.
- (d) Royal Tank Corps.—Disbandment of four light tank companies (equipped with armoured cars) and the formation of a Royal Tank Corps Depot.
- (e) Indian Signal Corps.—Line of communication telegraph companies and other minor re-organisations.
- (f) Conversion of two British cavalry regiments into Light tank regiments and the return of one horsed cavalry regiment to the Home establishment without replacement.
- (g) Conversion of 4 British infantry battalions into machine gun battalions and 20 into rifle battalions.

SERVICES—contd.**EXPLANATIONS.***General.*

The expenditure under this head represents the pay and allowances and miscellaneous charges of the fighting units of the various arms of the service, which form the first line of the Army in India. The number of such units is indicated on pages 28 and 29.

Item (1).—Pay of rank of regimental officers (including officers of the army in India reserve for the period they come up for training), command or additional pay, compensation for inferior quarters, syce and forage allowances for chargers, presidency town allowance at Calcutta and Bombay, local allowance at Chitral and Drosh and marriage allowance are included under this head. Lodging allowance is also included for officers who are not provided with free Government quarters.

In March 1925, orders were issued revising the rates of pay of all regular King's commissioned officers of the army in India with effect from July 1924. The principles adopted in the revision departed considerably from previous practice and the officers' pay was based on the rates current in England. The main departure has been to distinguish between the emoluments of married and unmarried officers by the grant to the former (if over 30 years of age) of a marriage allowance and a higher rate of lodging allowance. The result is that the emoluments of British officers in India now consist of the following elements:—

- (1) A basic pay of rank.
- (2) An Indian allowance.
- (3) A servant's allowance.
- (4) Free quarters or a lodging allowance in lieu.
- (5) A marriage allowance for married officers of the age of 30 and over.

The pay of Indian army officers contains in addition an Indian army allowance. Officers holding staff and departmental appointments receive consolidated rates of pay which while including the above items, have a further element as payment for their more onerous duties or as a compensation for the loss of prospects which the departmental service entails. Officers of the Royal engineers also receive engineer pay which is granted in all parts of the Empire for their special qualifications and similarly officers of the Indian signal corps receive an addition of signal pay.

In addition, separation allowance has been introduced for married officers serving in stations, where, under the orders of Government, their families may not accompany them.

Item (2).—Pay of British other ranks according to rank at normal rates (including proficiency pay at 6 annas per diem up to the rank of Sergeant) or tradesmen's rates, if employed in a technical arm of the service, messing allowance at an average of 6½ annas a day, additional messing allowance to junior non-commissioned officers attending army schools of instructions, etc., extra duty pay, marriage and furniture allowances are included under this head. Also money compensation in lieu of rations when the latter cannot be supplied and mostly drawn when travelling by rail is included under this head. A consolidated ration allowance (including messing allowance) admissible during the period of their leave or furlough in India when they are not rationed in regimental messes is also provided under this head. Pay charges of drafts and details during the voyage period, when proceeding to and from India, have been included under this head.

EXPLANATIONS—*contd.*

Reduced rates of pay for British soldiers enlisted or re-enlisted on or after 26th October 1925 have been introduced in England and have been applied to India. The bulk of the British troops on the Indian establishment are now drawing these reduced rates of pay.

Item (3).—Pay of Viceroy's commissioned officers and other ranks according to rank, serving soldiers and reservists undergoing training, reserve pay at Rs. 7 per mensem for class A, Rs. 4 per mensem for class B and Rs. 5 per mensem for class C reservists for the period they do not come up for training, good conduct or good service pay according to the length of service, proficiency pay, extra duty pay, engineer pay, signal pay, M. T. pay in the case of mechanical transport drivers, pay of the staff of the Nucleus Depôt of the Railway Reserve Regiment, allowance to trained surveyors, personal allowance of Rs. 50 per mensem to certain Viceroy's commissioned officers, local allowance at Chitral and Drosh and allowance of annas 10 per mensem to supplement purchase of ration articles, are included under this head. An allowance of Rs. 2 per mensem during winter months and Re. 1 per mensem during summer months is paid, in lieu of 10 annas per mensem, to Viceroy's commissioned officers, Indian other ranks, and religious teachers employed in the concessional area in Waziristan. Also money compensation in lieu of rations when the latter cannot be supplied is included under this head; this is mostly drawn when travelling by rail.

Item (4).—Includes pay and tradesmen's rates of pay to enrolled followers and nerrick or local rates to unenrolled followers (including victualling establishments) and a lines allowance of Rs. 6-4-0 per mensem.

Item (5).—This allowance is granted to British other ranks to meet the cost of upkeep and renewal of personal clothing and necessaries. The rate *per capita* is Rs. 90 per annum.

Item (6).—Besides the grant of clothing allowance for the upkeep, etc., of personal clothing and necessaries to Viceroy's commissioned officers and Indian other ranks, compensation paid to Indian Army reservists on transfer to the reserve for the value of clothing taken over by Government is also included under this head. The rate for Viceroy's commissioned officers and Indian warrant officers is Rs. 40 per annum, inclusive of the allowance for the maintenance of mosquito nets, blankets and dhurries. In the case of Indian other ranks and enrolled followers the rates are Rs. 32-4 and Rs. 19-8 per annum respectively.

Item (7).—A lump sum payment is made to Indian warrant officers, class II, Indian non-commissioned officers and men on discharge, transfer, to the Reserve or promotion to commissioned rank and Indian warrant officer, class I, calculated at Rs. 2 for each month of service rendered after 31st March 1922. The rate has been reduced to Re. 1 in the case of men enrolled on or after 1st January 1932. Gratuities to British non-commissioned officers and men enlisted after 31st March 1898 are included under this head.

Item (8).—Includes allowances to officers' messes, band allowance, weapon training allowance (which includes musketry prize money, upkeep of butts and targets, upkeep of bayonet fighting equipment, upkeep of riding schools and jumps) stringing allowance for charpoys, outfit allowance to officers, stationery allowance at varying rates, horses and mules lines contingent allowance, prizes for lance and sword practice, skill in driving, etc., cost of maintenance and replacement of typewriters, official postage and telegrams, rewards to recruiters, supply of water from other than military sources such as municipalities, etc., cost of repairs to army signalling stores and purchase of petty articles, charges connected with the repair of kit bags, etc., repairs to and manufacture of section boxes for small arms ammunition, cost of instructional stores of signal companies and equipment of engineer units consumed, repaired and replaced, and the cost of stores used in the sappers and miners park and for field practice.

Budget 1938-39 is Rs. 79 lakhs less than Budget 1937-38 due mainly to shortage of British troops (87 lakhs) mechanization of certain cavalry and infantry units (9 lakhs) and other decreases based on actual requirements (10 lakhs) including saving from War Block retirements, partly counterbalanced by the cost of certain amenities to British troops (27 lakhs).

Minor Head (b)—Officers with King's commissions unemployed or under training for the Indian army.—The pay of unemployed officers residing in India, and of unattached list Second Lieutenants from Sandhurst posted to British regiments in India for a year's duty prior to their appointment to the Indian army, is charged to this minor head. The pay, etc., of Indian commissioned officers of the special list of Indian land forces, who will either be posted to British regiments for a year's duty or proceed for post-graduate training prior to their appointments to the Indianized units is also included under this head.

Minor Head (c)—Leave allowances paid by non-military departments.—The provision against this head represents proportionate leave pay charges debited to the Defence Estimates on account of civil officers and subordinates who have had military service and who take leave after reversion to the Civil Department.

Minor Heads (d), (e) and (f) represent recoveries effected from British soldiers under the Contributory Pensions Act, 1936, and for family allotments.

The increase of 6 lakhs as compared with the Budget for 1937-38 is due mainly to larger provision for officers under training due to an under-estimate in 1937-38 and smaller recoveries of family allotments, etc. on account of shortage of British troops.

(a) This item represents the cost of raising and training in England British troops for service with the British Army in India.

(b), (c) (d). These charges pertain to the British troops serving in India, the Indian liability being determined by establishments in India or period of service rendered to India.

(e) This represents the amount payable to the British Government on account of the Contributory Pensions Act, 1936. Under the Act, the amount of contribution per week is 11d. Half of this amount is recovered from the soldiers.

(f) and (i). In the case of ordinary reliefs between the Indian and the Imperial establishments, the pay, etc., of British units during the voyage period is borne by Indian revenues.

(g) and (h). These represent payments in England to families of British soldiers serving in India. Recoveries of allotments are made in India from the pay of the soldiers.

(j) Vocational training is intended for training of selected men about to return to civil life as craftsmen in the less highly specialised trades.

(k) This represents leave pay of officers of the Indian Army employed regimentally while on leave *ex-India*.

(l) Pay, etc., issued to British officers on their appointment to the Indian Army is provided for under this head.

(m) This represents unemployed pay of officers of the Indian Army residing in England. Up to 1935-36 this was debited to the heads to which their pay while on the active list was charged.

(n) This represents the unemployed pay of surplus Indian Army Officers transferred to the Special Unemployed list under the " War Block " scheme. Upto 1937-38 this provision was made under Head 7.

(p) The leave allowances paid to civil officers in respect of leave earned during their military service are charged to this head.

Minor Head (a).—Command Physical Training Staff.—The responsibility for and supervision of physical training in commands is a part of the functions of the General Staff of Commands. A garrison physical training officer is, however, appointed without additional pay at each of the stations Rawalpindi, Quetta, Lucknow and Poona. They are assisted by four sergeants, whose pay is charged to this head.

Minor Head (b).—The Army School of Physical Training at Ambala (at Kasauli during summer) corresponds to the Army School of Physical Training, Aldershot (England). Its objects are to maintain uniformity, continuity and progress in physical training, to promote research work in connection with the development of physical education in the Army in India and to train instructors in physical training and its co-related subjects. The Commandant of the school is also the Inspector of physical training.

2. The annual outturn of students is British and Indian Commissioned officers 52, British other ranks 115, Viceroy's commissioned officers 16 and Indian other ranks 360.

Minor Head (c).—The Staff College, Quetta, is maintained for the purpose of affording selected officers instruction in the higher branches of the science of war and in the duties of the staff. Admission is by competition and by nomination by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief. 31 students graduate each year.

- (i) Headquarters, Weapon Training and Mechanisation, Pachmarhi.
- (ii) Small Arms School, Pachmarhi (Rifle, light machine gun, bayonet, grenade and pistol).

- (iii) Small Arms and Mechanisation School, Ahmednagar.

This school consists of:—

- (a) Armoured Wing (machine gun, light machine gun, anti-tank gun, anti-tank rifle, pistol, rangefinder).
- (b) Driving and Maintenance Wing (armoured and unarmoured vehicles.)

The objects of these schools are:—

- (i) To train officers, warrant officers and non-commissioned officers as instructors in weapon training and mechanisation subjects as shown above, including the technical handling of weapons and armoured fighting vehicles.
- (ii) To train in the case of the Driving and Maintenance Wing of the Small Arms and Mechanisation School, non-commissioned officers and men (and trade test them when eligible) as driver mechanics.
- (iii) To keep in close touch with training methods in these subjects in units, and to ensure thereby and by the teaching at the schools, that training throughout the army in India is conducted on a uniform system and in accordance with the manuals. The annual out-turn of students is 910 British and 937 Indian ranks.

The increase of 2.37 lakhs as compared with Budget, 1937-38 is due to extra expenditure entailed by the mechanization of certain cavalry and infantry units.

Minor Head (k)—Kitchener College.—The object of the Kitchener college is to enable selected Indian officers and other ranks of the Indian Army and boys of the K. G. R. I. M. schools to receive a preparatory training with a view to nomination to an Indian Army cadetship at the Indian Military Academy. The outturn of the college is 60 students per annum.

The increase of .27 lakh as compared with budget 1937-38 is due to an under-estimate in 1937-38.

Minor Heads (l), (m) and (n).—The object of the King George's Royal Military Schools is to afford a sound general education to the sons of Indian officers and other ranks with the eventual object of fitting them to join the Indian Army. The schools are designed to accommodate 258, 303 and 210 boys, respectively.

Minor Head (o).—Indian Military Academy, Dehra Dun, was opened in 1932 to train candidates for commissions in the Indian Land Forces.

Minor Head (p)—Miscellaneous.—Under this minor head is included the provision of funds required for the grant of rewards to officers, non-commissioned officers and men of both services for proficiency in English (Indian officers and other ranks only) and in Indian and other oriental languages. The expenses of the Board of Examiners who conduct examinations in Indian and other oriental languages are provided under this minor head.

Detailed head (9).—The Lawrence Memorial Royal Military School, Lovedale, was founded by Sir Henry Lawrence for the education of the children of British soldiers. It is administered by a board of governors. A grant of Rs. 2,10,000 is paid from the Defence Services estimates.

Detailed head (10).—A grant of Rs. 250 per mensem is made to each of the Roman Catholic orphanages at Simla (for girls) and Mussoorie (for boys) exclusively confined to children of British soldiers.

The other items consist of miscellaneous charges connected with education generally.

Minor Head (a).—Supply Companies and Supply Depots.—The system for the provision and maintenance of articles of Royal Indian Army Service Corps supply (*viz.*, food stuffs of all kinds for men and animals, petrol and lubricants and fuel) is as under :—

There is a District Supply Company or an Independent Brigade Supply Company in each Military District or Independent Brigade. The functions of these Supply Companies are to maintain Station Supply Depots and Sub-Depots, receive and check indents from units and carry out the necessary supply. In order to provide for mobilization requirements it is necessary in addition to maintain in Peshawar a Base Supply Depot, the duties of which are to maintain stocks while issues to units are made by the Station Supply Depot.

In addition to their other duties, the District Supply Companies maintain Bakeries and Butcheries at the various stations within their districts.

2. Government Bakeries bake all bread required for the Army, approximately 22 million loaves of bread annually. There are 78 Army bakeries.

3. Government butcheries functioning as such exist only at Razmak and Wana. At all other military stations meat is supplied locally by contractors through and under the supervision of the Royal Indian Army Service Corps.

4. The supply record section of the Royal Indian Army Service Corps records, now forms part of the supply personnel depot, Royal Indian Army Service Corps, Ambala.

Minor Head (b).—The Royal Indian Army Service Corps record office is located at Dagshai. It deals with the records of service and administration of personnel of animal transport units other than officers and clerks and co-ordinates questions of general interest.

The decrease as compared with the Budget, 1937-38 is due to transfer to minor heads (a) and (f) of the provision for Supply and Mechanical Transport Record Sections.

Minor Head (c)—School of Cookery.—Adequate and uniform training of all ranks who are required to cook for or to supervise the cooking arrangements of British units in India is given at the School of Cookery, Poona.

Minor Head (d)—Animal Transport.—The animal transport consists of the following:—

- (i) 13 animal transport companies (mule) (3 troops).
- (ii) 22 animal transport companies (mule) (4 troops).
- (iii) 1 animal transport company (mule) (lower establishment) (2 troops)—charge to the Government of Burma.
- (iv) 4 animal transport companies (camel) (Silladar).
- (v) Zhob local transport (camel).

In addition, there are two animal transport training companies (mule), one at Lahore and the other at Meerut. These training companies receive and train recruits and remount mules for the maintenance of transport units in peace and war and are responsible for the training of reservists.

2. The location of these transport units at various stations in India is designed to keep the expenditure on hired transport as low as possible.

Mechanical Transport Service.—*Minor heads (e) to (l).*—The units and formations comprising the Mechanical Transport Service in peace are :

- (e) Mechanical transport units and Headquarters, Chaklala.
- (f) Royal Indian Army Service Corps training group.
- (g) Technical inspectors of mechanical transport.
- (h) Headquarters, maintenance group (mechanical transport).
- (i) Heavy repair shops (mechanical transport).
- (j) Central mechanical transport stores depot.
- (k) Vehicle reserve depot (mechanical transport).
- (l) Experimental section (mechanical transport).

The duties assigned to the respective units and formations are described in detail under the respective minor heads.

Budget 1938-39 for M. T. Services, *i.e.*, Minor heads (e) to (l) is more than Budget 1937-38 by 3.92 lakhs due mainly to Mechanization of certain cavalry and infantry units (8½ lakhs) partly counterbalanced by reduction due to an over-estimate in 1937-38.

Minor Head (e).—*Mechanical transport units and headquarters, Chaklala.*—

There are—

(i) Load carrying units :—

- (a) Six mechanical transport companies equipped with 30 cwt. four or six-wheeled lorries consisting of a headquarter and four 30-cwt. four or six-wheeled sections each ;
- (b) Four independent mechanical transport sections on the higher establishment, equipped with 3 ton six-wheeled lorries ;
- (c) Four independent mechanical transport sections on the lower establishment, equipped with 3 ton six-wheeled lorries ; and
- (d) Eight independent mechanical transport sections, equipped with 30 cwt., four or six-wheeled lorries.

(ii) Six motor ambulance units each consisting of :—

- (a) Headquarters ;
- (b) One workshop section (not allowed for the unit in Waziristan) ;
- (c) One motor ambulance section.

These units provide motor ambulances for military hospitals in peace and war and also hold in reserve motor ambulances for certain field medical units.

(iii) Seven workshop companies consisting of :—

- (a) Five headquarters, Class I, and two headquarters, Class II.
- (b) Twenty-two workshop sections.

These companies are responsible for carrying out second line repairs to mechanical vehicles on charge of units having no workshops of their own.

(iv) Headquarters, Chaklala.

The Officer Commanding, Chaklala, like an officer Commanding station is responsible for the local administration of all units in Chaklala.

Eight workshop companies consisting of eight headquarters and 22 workshop sections are being added to the mechanical transport service as a result of the mechanisation of certain cavalry and infantry units.

Minor Head (f).—*The R. I. A. S. C. Training Group.*—The R. I. A. S. C. training group consists of (a) headquarters, (b) mechanical transport training battalion, (c) mechanical transport record section and (d) R. I. A. S. C. School. The function of the R. I. A. S. C. training group is to train all ranks of the Royal Indian Army Service Corps in the duties of the supply, animal transport and mechanical transport services, and driver personnel of other arms of the army ; and to deal with records of service and administration of mechanical transport personnel other than officers and clerks. The administration of technical personnel is vested in the Deputy Director of Transport (Maintenance).

Minor Head (h).—Headquarters Maintenance Group, Mechanical Transport.—This formation is responsible for standardising the system of repair in all heavy repair shops (M. T.) and exercising a general control over all maintenance units in the Royal Indian Army Service Corps (Mechanical Transport).

Minor Head (i)—Heavy Repair Shops (M. T.).—There are four heavy repair shops located at Chaklala, Quetta, Bannu and Deolali. Major repairs including complete overhauls and retrieving of mechanical transport stores are carried out in these workshops. All training of artificer apprentices is now carried out in Heavy Repair Shop (M. T.) Class I, Chaklala. With effect from 1st April 1936, 22 vacancies per year within the present sanctioned establishment of apprentices are being filled by Anglo-Indian boys.

Minor Head (j)—Central M. T. Stores Depot.—This depot deals with the receipt, storage and issue of spare parts, tyres, material and accessories required for all mechanically propelled vehicles. The depot is also responsible for the preparation of the specification and compilation of drawings of spare parts, etc.

Minor Head (k).—Vehicle Reserve Depot, M. T.—This depot deals with the receipt and issue to units of mechanically propelled vehicles imported from the United Kingdom and those for repairs in Heavy Repair Shop (M. T.) Class I, Chaklala. This unit also looks after the mobilization reserve of mechanical transport vehicles, the fit vehicles of the repair reserve awaiting issue to units in replacement of unserviceable vehicles and those passing in and out of heavy repair shop before and after repairs.

Minor Head (l).—Experimental Section (M. T.).—Experimental trials on vehicles and equipment are carried out in this unit.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES—contd.**EXPLANATIONS.*****Sub-Head (D).—Remount Depots and Breeding Operations :—***

The army remount department is responsible for the supply of all classes of animals to the Army in India. Full grown riding horses and mules up to the number procurable are purchased in India and supplied direct to units.

2. The Army Remount Department maintains 310 horse and 218 donkey stallions in order to encourage the breeding in India by private breeders of horses and mules suitable for the Army. There are five breeding areas with Headquarters at Rawalpindi, Sargodha, Lyallpore and Montgomery (Punjab) and Babugarh (U. P.), and two breeding studs, viz., one at Mona (Punjab) for the production of donkey stallions and the other at Ahmednagar (Deccan) for the breeding of horse stallions.

3. Mules, camels and bullocks according to requirements and about fifty full grown Indian horses are purchased yearly in India. In addition, a large number of young stock horses and mules are purchased and reared in the young stock depôts at Mona and Sargodha (Punjab) for issue to the Army when full grown. The authorised establishment of animals of these depôts is 3,335 young stock horses, 2,700 young stock mules and 450 full grown mules and 240 Indian remounts.

4. As the full requirements of the army in India (about 3,000 horses and 2,000 mules) could not be met from the above source, about 1,012 horses, and 330 mountain artillery mules were hitherto imported from overseas. This position will, however, change as a result of the mechanisations now in progress.

5. There are two Australian Remount depôts, viz., at Ahmednagar (Deccan), and Saharanpur (U.P.) where imported horses are acclimatized for about nine months before issue to the service. The authorised complement of animals in these depôts is 1,644 Australian horses (including war reserve) and 50 full grown equipment mules, besides which up to 300 horses may be boarded out to private individuals and 172 horses are maintained at the Equitation School, Saugor.

6. In addition to horses and mules, the army remount department also maintains 1,185 bullocks for farming operations and hackney work.

Minor Head (a).—Veterinary Hospitals.—The army veterinary services are responsible for the welfare of the animals of the army, including those of remount depots and military farms department, about 75,000 in number, and for the promotion of efficiency by preventing disease and reducing wastage amongst them. The organisation consists of 29 veterinary hospitals, class I, 24 veterinary hospitals, class II, 23 branch veterinary hospitals and 9 sick lines. The staff and establishment maintained consists of 63 British officers (including a leave reserve of 7), 16 Indian commissioned officers, 4 British other ranks, 125 veterinary assistant surgeons, 623 Indian other ranks (including 77 reservists), 58 clerical establishments and 83 followers. The Indian other ranks organised into 13 sections and 1 Indian Army Veterinary Corps Depot are posted to veterinary hospitals during peace and form a cadre designed to supply trained technical personnel to all veterinary units on mobilisation. All sick and injured animals are treated in veterinary hospitals.

Minor Head (b).—There are two army veterinary schools located at Ambala and Poona. Their functions include the technical training of Indian army veterinary corps personnel and training of officers, warrant and non-commissioned officers and men of the British and Indian units in veterinary first aid and animal hygiene.

Minor Head (c).—The veterinary record office at Ambala maintains and deals with the records of service of all veterinary personnel serving in India, excluding British officers.

EXPLANATIONS.

Minor Head (a)—Arsenals, Ordnance and Clothing Depots and Inspectorate of General Stores and Clothing—

Arsenals and Ordnance Depots.—There are at present five arsenals at Rawalpindi, Ferozepore, Kirkee, Quetta and Allahabad and four ordnance depots at Fort William, Bombay, Drigh Road (Karachi) and Lahore, under the executive control of the Chief Ordnance Officers or Ordnance Officers in Charge. They are administered by the Director of Ordnance Services, under the Master General of the Ordnance in India. The functions of the organisation are the receipt, storage, repair and issue to troops, in their respective areas, of all equipment and ordnance stores, including barrack, hospital and miscellaneous equipment, also the maintenance of war and mobilization reserves. The arsenals at Kirkee, and Quetta and the ordnance depots at Drigh Road and Lahore also stock clothing stores for supply to troops in their respective areas. The arsenal at Rawalpindi undertakes the receipt, washing, repair and issue of all extra winter clothing required by troops in the Northern Command, while the arsenal at Quetta acts similarly in respect of the troops in Western Command. The equipment and stores stocked in arsenals and ordnance depots are obtained from ordnance factories in India, by purchase abroad and by purchase in India. Workshops are attached to arsenals and certain ordnance depots where minor repairs to stores and petty manufacture are carried out.

2. *Clothing Depots.*—There is a clothing depot at Shahjahanpur. This depot is under the control of an ordnance officer acting under the Director of Ordnance Services. It is maintained for retailing clothing to troops and it also holds working stocks and war and mobilization reserves. Clothing stores and necessaries are obtained from the Army Clothing Factory, Shahjahanpur and by purchase in India and abroad.

3. *Inspectorate of General Stores and Clothing—*

There are at present five inspectorates at Bombay, Cawnpore, Hastings, Rawalpindi and Shahjahanpur under the executive control of the Chief Inspector of Stores and clothing, Cawnpore (with Assistant Inspectors at Cawnpore and Calcutta.)

This Inspectorate is administered by the Director of Ordnance Services. The functions of the organisation are :—

- (a) to inspect the outturn of the Harness and Saddlery and Clothing Factories;
- (b) to carry out the initial inspection and chemical tests, as necessary, of general stores which include brushware, hardware, oils, paints, soaps, glass, earthenware, textiles, rubber and leather stores; and
- (c) to carry out the initial inspection of clothing and clothing stores, boots, blankets, etc.

In addition, each of the above officers advises the Director of Artillery on all technical questions concerned with the stores for which he is responsible, particularly in regard to experimental work and trials connected with the introduction or modification of equipment for the use of the Army.

4. The provision under head 2-F (a) is exclusive of the cost of all I. A. O. C. establishment employed at Army Headquarters and of the I. A. O. C. officers at Command and District Headquarters. The cost of the I. A. O. C. establishments employed at those Headquarters amounts to Rs. 4,18,270 and Rs. 2,85,350 provided under Head 4—A (g) Master General of the Ordnance Branch and Head 4—B and C Staff of Commands and Districts, respectively.

Minor Head (b)—I. A. O. C. School of Instruction—

This school is located at Kirkee and was established in 1927. Its function is to train officers and men of the I. A. O. C. and to give practical instruction in the care and inspection of ammunition, equipment, general stores and clothing. The capacity of the school is 84 officers and men. The average number of students in the school in 1936-37 was 55. Three courses of about 3 to 5 months' duration are held yearly.

Sub-Head G.—Medical Colleges and Schools.—The provision represents the cost of education and training of military medical students in the medical colleges at Calcutta, Bombay and Madras and in the medical schools at Agra, Amritsar and Stanley Medical School, Madras, before appointment as military assistant surgeons or sub-assistant surgeons. They are primarily recruited and trained for military duty, but a portion is employed in the Civil Department and is liable to be recalled to military duty in case of emergency.

Sub-Head I.—Medical Services—

The Medical Services are organised mainly into (I) British Military Hospitals, (II) Indian Military Hospitals, (III) Indian Hospital Corps and (IV) Military Food Laboratory. The British Military Hospitals are entrusted with the medical and sanitary care of all British officers, British other ranks and their families (including children), while the Indian Military Hospitals are generally responsible for the treatment, etc., of Indian officers, Indian other ranks and all classes of followers whose pay and allowances are paid from the Defence Estimates. In order to effect economy it has been arranged at certain stations that Indian Military Hospitals should have small British sections attached to them and vice versa instead of having two complete hospitals at the same station. The Indian Hospital Corps is organised in connection with the maintenance, training and upkeep of the records of the Indian Hospital Corps personnel employed in hospitals for British and Indian troops and their families and in field medical units when mobilised. The Military Food Laboratory advises the Director of Contracts whether the samples of foodstuffs tendered to him are of suitable quality, tests supplies by comparison with the samples and assists by expert advice in regulating the turnover of stocks and reserve. The hospitals are classified according to the strength of the garrison at each station. At present there are 28 hospitals, first class, 2 second class, 33 third class, 36 fourth class and 17 fifth class, which are open throughout the year except at certain hill stations, where they are only open for a portion of the year varying between 6 and 8 months. The sick treated in these hospitals are roughly 2·69 per cent. of British troops, 1·54 per cent. of Indian troops and ·98 per cent. of followers. The staff and establishments maintained for this purpose including those employed at the headquarters of the Indian Hospital Corps Companies are 234 Royal Army Medical Corps officers, 311 Indian Medical Service officers, 25 Dental officers, 360 Royal Army Medical Corps other ranks, 40 Army Dental Corps other ranks, 269 nurses, 43 matrons, 333 assistant surgeons, 525 sub-assistant surgeons, 8,668 Indian Hospital Corps personnel and 3,335 reservists. In addition, 155 Mechanical Transport drivers for running the motor ambulances and other miscellaneous establishments (e.g., ayahs, female sweepers, X-ray mechanics, etc.) are maintained.

The Military Accounts Department in its superior personnel is at present composed of a cadre of 55 officers including military officers, borne on the supernumerary list, European civilians and Indian civilians, latest and future recruitments being confined almost entirely to the last mentioned class. The department is under the control of the Finance Department of the Government of India.

2. The present organisation is as follows :—

(1) At the head of the Department, there is a Military Accountant General whose functions are :—

- (i) To administer the department, under the control of the Financial Adviser, Military Finance.
- (ii) To organise the arrangements for the disbursement of pay to officers and men of the Defence Services.
- (iii) To maintain a record of Defence Services expenditure and receipts in such a form as will be of the greatest help to the military and financial authorities.
- (iv) To examine all general questions of accounting and audit.
- (v) To deal with all work connected with India's claims against His Majesty's Government in respect of Indian troops employed overseas and of stores supplied to overseas garrisons; as well as all work connected with claims from His Majesty's Government arising out of the employment of British troops in India, etc.
- (vi) To deal with all questions connected with (including disbursement of) the pay and allowances of the staff employed at Army Headquarters.
- (vii) To control the work relating to the audit of the Army List.
- (viii) To inspect every year, either personally or by a Deputy, one or more of the Command and District Controllers' offices and of those of the Controllers of Army Factory, Royal Air Force and Naval Accounts.

(2) At the Headquarters of each of the 4 Army Commands, there is a Command Controller. The Command Controllers are Financial Advisers to the General Officers Commanding-in-Chief of the Commands, as well as to the Commanders of Districts and Independent Brigades. The Command Controllers are, in addition, the chief authority for accounts and for internal audit in their respective commands and they also assist the General Officers Commanding-in-Chief and the District Commanders, in the preparation of all estimates and furnish them regularly with such statistics relating to accounts as they may require to control expenditure against grants placed at their disposal. The following list shows the Command Controllers and the Districts and Brigades for the accounts of which they are responsible:—

(3) There is also a Controller of Military Accounts for Lahore District. He is designated as Controller of Military Accounts and Pensions and deals also with the payment, audit and adjustment of all claims to pension, passages and service funds excepting I. O. D. and I. O. F. W. P. Funds.

- (4) There are separate Controllers for Army Factory Accounts, Royal Air Force Accounts and Naval Accounts. The first named officer deals with the accounts (including the cost accounts) of Army Ordnance and Clothing Factories and Depots, which also undertake the manufacture of clothing for troops, and is the financial adviser of the administrative authorities concerned. He has a central office at Calcutta with subordinate offices at each of the factories. This office also deals with railway charges and I. O. D and I. O. F. W. P. Funds.
3. The cardinal principles of the existing system of accounts are:—
- (a) The concentration of the issue of funds at certain central stations (*viz.*, the offices of the various Controllers).
 - (b) The local preparation of pay accounts, by accountants and clerks of the Military Accounts Department attached to the units, formations, etc.
 - (c) The maintenance of proper accounts of manufacture at all manufacturing establishments by accountants and clerks of the Military Accounts Department.
 - (d) The audit of store accounts by a system of local audit which includes a continuous verification of stock.

Minor Head (a)—Administration.—The municipal administration of cantonments in India is carried out under the provisions of the Cantonments Act, 1924, as amended by the Cantonments (Amendment) Act, 1936. The Cantonments Department is being reorganized so as to divide it into 2 groups, viz., the Cantonments Branch and the Lands Branch. The Civilian Executive Officers half of whose pay only will be met from Defence Estimates will form the Cantonments Branch. The Lands Branch will consist of 20 Military Estates Officers including 5 on account of Leave Reserve and the inspecting staff will consist of one Director of Military Lands and Cantonments at the Headquarters of the Government of India, four Deputy Directors and four (at present three, one appointment being held in abeyance) Deputy Assistant Directors of Military Lands and Cantonments at Command Headquarters. The officers of the Lands Branch will be full-time officers of the Cantonments Department and their salary will be paid by Government.

Minor Head (b).—Cantonments which cannot maintain a suitable standard of municipal administration on the basis of income derived from local sources receive a grant-in-aid from the Defence Estimates.

Minor Head (c).—The duties of the Military Estates Officers are to look after the land entrusted to their management under the Cantonment Land Administration Rules and the Complementary Land Rules. The 'management' of Land includes the planting and maintenance of trees.

The decrease of 1·18 lakhs as compared with the Budget, 1937-38 is due mainly to a reduction in the provision for grant-in-aid to Cantonments.

Minor Head (a)—Lethal Stores Inspectorates and Chemical Defence Research.—These Inspectorates are under the control of the Director of Artillery; their functions are shown below:—

Inspector of Small Arms, Ishapore—

- (a) inspects the outturn of the Rifle Factory (small arms and machine guns) and carries out the sighting and proof of small arms and machine guns;
- (b) inspects small arms, machine guns and bicycles in the hands of troops and civil and military police, and under repair in arsenals; and
- (c) instructs Indian armourers before enlistment and prior to the grant of tradesmen's certificates.

Inspector of Guns, Cossipore—

- (a) inspects the outturn of the Gun and Shell Factory;
- (b) inspects all electrical and optical stores and signal stores for the army;
- (c) inspects ordnance in the hands of troops; and
- (d) inspects the outturn of the Metal and Steel Factory (gun and shell billets, forgings, Q. F. cartridge cases, etc.).

Inspector of Ammunition, Kirkee—

- (a) inspects the outturn of the Ammunition Factory; and
- (b) inspects all kinds of ammunition, explosives and connected stores in the hands of troops, including the Royal Air Force and Royal Indian Navy, and in arsenals.

Inspector of Gun Carriages and Vehicles, Subbulpore—

- (a) inspects the outturn of the Gun Carriage Factory;
- (b) carries out the proof of artillery carriages; and
- (c) inspects artillery carriages, transport vehicles and connected stores in the hands of troops.

Chemical Inspector, Kirkee—

- (a) inspects chemical defence stores;
- (b) tests all explosives and advises on chemical and chemical defence questions; and
- (c) maintains cordite records.

Proof and Experimental Officer, Balasore—

- (a) carries out the proof of guns and ammunition; and
- (b) carries out such experimental work connected with guns and ammunition as may be ordered.

Controller of Chemical Defence Research, Rawalpindi—

Carries out research work in connection with chemical defence.

In addition, each of the above officers advises the Director of Artillery on all technical questions connected with the stores for which he is responsible, particularly in regard to experimental work and trials connected with the introduction or modification of equipment for the use of the army.

The increase of 1.04 lakhs as compared with 1937-38 is due mainly to larger provision for establishments to cope with the anticipated increase in outturn of factories.

Minor Head (a)—Governor General's Band.—Governor General's Band is maintained for Viceregal functions and entertainments and consists of 1 Director of Music, 1 Regimental Sergeant Major, 1 Regimental Quartermaster Sergeant and 25 Sergeants.

(b) *Recruiting Staff.*—Provision for staff and establishments required to control the recruitment of enlisted and enrolled men (including followers) for all branches of the military service is made here. The organisation consists at present of 7 recruiting officers, 4 assistant technical recruiting officers (including 1 part time assistant technical recruiting officer at Karachi) and 14 assistant recruiting officers (seconded) for two years extendable to three years and 2 assistant recruiting officers for a period of approximately 6 months only at the various recruiting centres (viz., Rawalpindi, Peshawar including Kohat, Lahore, Jullundur, Delhi including Lucknow and Ajmere; Gorakhpur including Ghoom, Garhwal and Poona including Bangalore), paid recruiters and menials. The clerical staff of the ordinary recruiting organisation consists of 40 combatant Indian ranks and that of the technical recruiting organisation consists of 3 civilian clerks.

Minor Head (c)—Hill Sanitaria and Depôts.—The provision under this head represents the cost of sanitarium and hill depôts for British troops which are maintained for the accommodation of convalescent families, etc. As a measure tending towards increased efficiency and eventual economy, bulk allotment of funds is placed annually at the disposal of the General Officers Commanding-in-Chief to meet the expenditure connected with the administration of these depôts and such roadside camps, rest camps, etc., as are opened specially to meet the requirements of the sanitarium, with full powers to vary the establishments to suit local conditions, to open sanitarium at places where they were not previously authorised and to extend or shorten the period for which they are normally open.

EXPLANATIONS.

Minor Head (d)—Military Prisons and Detention Barracks.—Detention Barracks have been established at Lucknow, Sialkot and Trimulgherry for the reception of British soldiers who have been sentenced to detention either by courts martial or, in some cases, by their commanding officers. The barracks at Lucknow and Trimulgherry include military prisons for the reception of British soldiers convicted of serious offences. These establishments are administered by the Adjutant General in India. The present establishment employed in these barracks is 2 Officers and 23 British warrant and non-commissioned officers excluding 24 extra regimental employees.

Minor Head (e)—This head provides for the pay and money allowances to Indian religious teachers attached to both the British and Indian units to impart religious instruction to the Indian ranks employed in them. The number of religious teachers provided is based on the scale of 1 teacher for each religious class not less than the authorised establishment of a squadron in each Indian cavalry regiment, brigade of artillery, divisional ammunition column, headquarters stations of sappers and miners. In each Indian infantry battalion, active or training, 1 teacher is allowed for each religious class, provided the authorised establishment of such religious class is not less than 120. In the Royal Artillery Training centre, the Mountain Artillery Training Centre and the Signal Training Centre (India) one teacher for each of the three main religious classes for each centre is authorised. One teacher is authorised for British Infantry Training Company, and also for the Gurkha Training Companies located in Shillong. One teacher for each of the three main religious classes is also authorised for mechanical transport units stationed at Chaklala.

Minor Head (f)—Anti-Malarial Measures.—Under this minor head is included recurring expenditure on account of (i) treatment of breeding places and destruction of adult mosquitoes; (ii) employment of labour in connection with (i); (iii) purchase and maintenance of bicycles for anti-malarial work; (iv) purchase of blowers, sprayers, etc., and (v) supply of Paris green and other approved products for anti-mosquito work.

Minor Head (g)—The provision under this minor head represents the pay and allowances and office allowance of the Staff Captain (vocational training), and his staff whose duty is to assist Commands in the organisation and administration of vocational training and to place men for training, supervise the actual training and to discover facilities for extending vocational training. Vocational training is intended for training of selected men about to return to civil life as craftsmen in the less highly specialised trades.

Minor Head (s)—Miscellaneous (1).—Under this item is included *inter alia*, fixed annual grants made to various institutions such as, Central Library at Army Headquarters, Walker Hospital, Simla, United Service Institution of India, etc.

(3) The provision under this head represents the contribution to Provincial Governments at the beginning of each financial year in respect of British officers of the Indian Medical Service belonging to the war reserve and maintained by Provincial Governments.

(4) The provision under this head is intended to finance such small measures as are considered necessary by the Adjutant General in India.

Sub-Head N.—The increase of 5.06 lakhs as compared with Budget 1937-38 is due mainly to payment of contribution to Provincial Governments in respect of the War Reserve of I. M. S. officers and the secondment of assistant recruiting officers.

Sub-Head O—Miscellaneous services under the Chief of the General Staff.—The provision against item (2) is made up as follows:—

- (a) Rs. 3,50,000 annual contribution to the Survey of India Department, in return for which that department assumes responsibility for the maintenance of the Frontier Circle and for the provision of Badragga escorts required by survey parties in areas where these are necessary; also for all equipment required by survey units on mobilisation, and for all normal charges incurred by survey units in connection with operations undertaken in peace time.
- (b) Rs. 1,500 annual contribution towards the cost of combined training of survey units with other arms.

The provision against item (3) is a reserve for special emergency measures that may be found necessary in the course of the year.

Minor head (a)—Grain crushing depots.—There are three grain crushing depots at Peahawar, Lucknow and Lahore. Their function is to crush grain for animals. The crushing is done under an agency arrangement entered into by the Director of Contracts.

Minor head (b)—Controlled Flour Mills.—There is one controlled flour mill at Lyallpur. Its function is to grind wheat for eventual supply of flour, atta and bran to supply depots.

Minor head (c)—The provision under this head is intended to finance such small measures as are considered necessary by the Quarter Master General.

Minor Head (d)—Technical Examination Branch.—This Branch deals with questions relating to technical examination of bills, measurement and check of measurements of works, revision of schedules of rates, preparation of bills of quantities and specifications, examination of and, when ordered, preparation of contract documents.

EXPLANATIONS.

Head 3. A.—*Medical Store Depots and Workshops.*—The authority at Headquarters responsible for control of expenditure under this sub-head is the Director-General, Indian Medical Service who in conjunction with the Director, Medical Services in India, and the Quartermaster General in India, is responsible to the Government of India in the Defence Department for the supply of medical and veterinary equipment and stores to the Army in India both in peace and war time. The equipment and stores required are obtained:—

- (i) by purchase in England through the High Commissioner for India,
- (ii) from other Government Departments,
- (iii) by purchase from private firms and contractors in India, and
- (iv) by manufacture at the Medical Store Depots, Madras and Bombay.

2. For storage and supply of this equipment and stores there are four Government Medical Store Depots in India. They are located at Madras, Bombay, Lahore Cantonment and Calcutta. The Medical Store Depots, Madras and Bombay have workshops attached to them and manufacture pharmaceutical preparations on a large scale. The Medical Store Depot, Bombay stocks also dental equipment for supply to Army dentists throughout India.

3. The supply on payment of medical stores to the Royal Air Force, Royal Indian Navy and Military Engineer Services, Local Governments and Government-aided Civil institutions (both medical and veterinary) is also arranged for by these four medical store depots. They further undertake the repair of surgical instruments for both military and civil Government institutions.

4. A certain sum is set aside annually to cover the cost of renewals and replacements of such machinery and plant as become unserviceable by constant use or are discarded as obsolete. This amount is added to the balance at the credit of the reserve known as "The Renewals Reserve Fund for Medical Store Depots and Workshops in India". The reserve is maintained by contributions of the residual book value of machinery and plant discarded during a year and of a certain percentage of the value of plant and machinery. These contributions are included in the issue price of articles supplied by the medical store depots. The balance at the credit of the reserve is carried forward from year to year, but the total balance is limited to Rs. 50,000, any excess being re-credited to the Defence budget.

Head 3-C.—*Ordnance and Clothing Factories.*

1. There are eight Army factories controlled by the Director of Ordnance Factories under the Master General of the Ordnance in India. The seven ordnance factories are each in direct charge of a superintendent; the clothing factory is in charge of a superintendent of manufacture. They were formed with the object of supplying the Army's needs of guns, rifles, ammunition, clothing, and connected equipment and are organised in peace in such a way as to be ready for rapid expansion in war. The functions of each factory are given below:—

- (1) *Metal and Steel Factory, Ishapore.*—Manufacture of steel for guns, rifles and shell metals for Q. F. and small arms ammunition, fuzes, etc., also steel bars and rods, shell forgings; stampings for fuzes, etc., and of Q. F. cartridge cases.
- (2) *Gun and Shell Factory, Cossipore.*—Production of guns up to 60 pdr., howitzers up to 6" and their components; machining of shells, fuzes, primers and miscellaneous stores; also the production of anti-gas respirators.
- (3) *Rifle Factory, Ishapore.*—Production of rifles and their components and of sword bayonets, also manufacture and repair of machine guns.
- (4) *Ammunition Factory, Kirkee.*—Production of small arms and pistol ammunition, filling of shell, fuzes and primers; also the manufacture of pyrotechnics.
- (5) *Gun Carriage Factory, Jubbulpore.*—Manufacture of artillery carriages and vehicle's general service wagons, transport carts, oil cookers and numerous miscellaneous articles.
- (6) *Harness and Saddlery Factory, Cawnpore.*—Manufacture of harness, saddlery, accoutrements and leather articles of various sorts; the leather used is tanned in this factory.
- (7) *Cordite Factory, Arurankadu.*—Production of cordite, cordite charges, cannon cartridges and gun cotton, also activated charcoal for gas-masks.
- (8) *Clothing Factory, Shahjahanpur.*—Manufacture of military clothing of every description except woven garments. Other miscellaneous textile articles used by the army are made here too, e.g., badges and flags while repairs to colours are also undertaken at Shahjahanpur.

Head 3. C - Ordnance and Clothing Factories—*contd.*

2. The factories mentioned above are run and cost-accounted on commercial lines, i.e., the cost of any store produced is arrived at by allocating to it the actual cost of labour and material used in its production plus an appropriate share of all indirect expenditure. The value of services rendered, and stores supplied, by other Army formations and departments to the factories, free of cost, is also taken into account in the production cost. Credit for the stores supplied and services rendered by the factories to the Army is afforded in their trading accounts at priced vocabulary rates which are based on production costs of the factories and on Home vocabulary rates. Cash provision is made in the factories' budget on the basis of the cash actually required to meet the standing charges and the cost of labour and material required for production. Thus the whole of the expenditure incurred by the factories under "Revenue" is spread over the total output of factories.

3. The cost of renewal and replacements of such buildings, machinery and plant as become unserviceable by constant use or are discarded as obsolete is found from the renewals reserve fund. The reserve is maintained by contributions of the residual book value of machinery and plant discarded during a year and of a certain percentage of the value of buildings and machinery in stock and in use. These contributions are included in the issue price of articles manufactured in the Ordnance and Clothing Factories. The balance at the credit of the reserve carried forward at the end of any year is limited to Rs. 15 lakhs; any excess is recredited to the Defence budget.

4. The factories employ labour to the extent normally of approximately 14,000 workmen.

Head 3.C (b).—*Capital.*—The amount provided under this head is utilised for the expansion of buildings and plant in the Ordnance and Clothing Factories and also to keep them efficient and up-to-date.

2. The provision under this head is made under the following two sub-heads—

(a) *Financed from new grants.*—This grant is found from the general Defence funds and is intended—

(i) to finance expansion of industrial buildings or machinery due to (a) growth of Army requirements, and (b) introduction of new methods of warfare or new measures or new or additional equipment; and

(ii) to finance provision and expansion of residential buildings for staff and labour.

(b) *Financed from renewals reserve fund.*—Funds under this grant are found entirely from the renewals reserve fund. The cash in the reserve is drawn on as needed and expenditure is confined to replacements or additions due to wastage and obsolescence.

Budget, 1938-39 is more than Budget 1937-38 by 17.05 lakhs due mainly to increase in provision for normal maintenance based on anticipated requirements for issue to troops on sanctioned scales (5 lakhs) provision for manufacture of stores for the Government of Burma (3 lakhs)—this is counterbalanced by increased receipts—and increased provision for new measures and mechanization (9 lakhs).

Head 3. D. Grass Farms.—There are 38 Grass Farms with 25 depots grouped into 5 Circles i.e. No. 1 Circle with Headquarters at Peshawar comprising Peshawar, Kohat and Waziristan Districts, No. 2 Circle with Headquarters at Lahore Cantonment comprising Rawalpindi and Lahore Districts, No. 3 Circle with Headquarters at Meerut comprising Lucknow, Meerut and P & A. Districts and Delhi Independent Brigade Area, No. 4 Circle with Headquarters at Quetta comprising Baluchistan District, Zhob Independent Brigade Area and Sind Independent Brigade Area, No. 5 Circle with Headquarters at Poona comprising Deccan, Bombay and Madras Districts and Poona Independent Brigade Area, all under the control of the Director of Farms and under the higher administration of the Quartermaster General.

2. The policy is (i) to maintain stocks of fodder required for issue to the Army other than (a) a Remount Depot located at a station where the Military Farms Department do not function (b) at stations at and in front of all railheads where no production farm of the Military Farms Department exists, (ii) to maintain baled fodder for war reserves according to sanctioned complements and (iii) to accumulate gradually in good years when fodder is cheap and abundant, a reserve of hay upto the limit approved by Government.

3. Total actual requirements for the Army for 1936-37 were 1,54,985 tons. Fodder is obtained partly by production and partly by purchase. During 1936-37 the quantities actually dealt with were 1,59,994 tons (including purchases by the Royal Indian Army Service Corps); of this 96,626 tons were produced at a cost of Rs. 24.87 per ton and 63,368 tons were purchased at Rs. 31.18 per ton. These rates include all overhead and general charges and all direct charges including stacking, thatching, protection and retail issues to units.

4. Fodder is issued both dry and green. Dry fodder comprises chiefly hay and white bhoosa Green fodder comprises green grass, green khasil (wheat, barley and oats), lucerne, barseem gram, sugarcane and monsoon crops (juar and maize).

5. Fodder is classified as "Working stocks" "Farms reserves" and "Mobilization reserves."

The decrease of 1.4 lakhs as compared with Budget, 1937-38 is due mainly to reduced requirements of fodder on account of reduction in number of animals as a result of mechanisation.

Head 3. E. Dairy Farms.—There are 31 main dairies, 5 Young Stock Farms and 18 Depots grouped into 3 Circles, *i.e.*, Frontier circle with headquarters at Peshawar comprising Peshawar, Kohat and Waziristan Districts, Northern Circle with headquarters at Lahore Cantonment comprising Rawalpindi, Lahore, Baluchistan Districts and Zhob Independent Brigade Area and Southern Circle with headquarters at Jubbulpore comprising Meerut, Mhow, Deccan, Bombay, Lucknow and Madras Districts, Poona Independent Brigade Area and Delhi Independent Brigade Area, all under the control of the Director of Farms and under the higher administration of the Quatermaster General.

Budget 1938-39 includes provision for opening of military dairy farms at Wana and Mir Ali.

2. The Military Dairy Farms are worked as quasi-commercial concerns.

3. The policy of the Dairies is to provide a safe and reliable supply of pure milk, butter and cream to hospitals and the issue thereof on payment to officers, troops and their families, messes and institutions at reasonable rates without loss to Government.

4. The quantities of milk sold during 1936-37 were 8,983 tons at an average sale rate of Rs. 0-1-8-3 per lb. and 436 tons of butter at an average sale rate of Re. 0-15-10-4 per lb. These quantities represent in the case of milk 12 per cent sales to Government hospitals and institutions and 88 per cent to other customers and in the case of butter 5-3 per cent to Government hospitals and institutions and 94-7 to others (officers, troops, and families, messes and institutions).

Budget, 1938-39 is more than Budget, 1937-38 by 2-11 lakhs due mainly to cost of amenities to British troops (.5 lakh) and to expansion of trade. The latter is partly counter-balanced by increased receipts.

MAIN HEAD 4.—ARMY HEADQUARTERS

EXPLANATIONS.

Definition and Composition of "The Staff".—The staff is the establishment of officers employed at the headquarters of each higher military formation to assist the commander in carrying out his duties of command and administration.

2. The staff of the Commander-in-Chief in India is known as the Army Headquarters Staff.

3. The officers appointed to the staff are specially selected officers, taken normally from among those who have graduated at the Staff College at Camberley or Quetta. The Staff Colleges are institutions where officers, after passing a competitive entrance examination, undergo a course of instruction in advanced military science and where they study the work of each fighting arm and of each administrative service and department of the army. No officer is posted permanently to the staff. After a period of staff employment, limited as a general rule to four years, an officer returns to his unit for a tour of regimental duty, in order that he may keep in touch with regimental work. Moreover, no staff officer is trained solely for duty with one of the branches of the staff: it is important that officers of each branch should be acquainted with the working of other branches, in order that they may know what assistance they can give and receive, and in order also to ensure the proper allocation of responsibility and to avoid overlapping of work. To obtain this result, arrangements are made for the periodical exchange of staff officers between the different branches of the staff.

4. *Organisation and the functions of the several branches.*—The staff at Army Headquarters is organized in four principal branches:—

- (a) The General Staff Branch.
- (b) The Adjutant General's Branch.
- (c) The Quartermaster-General's Branch.
- (d) The Master General of Ordnance Branch.

5. *The General Staff Branch.*—The General Staff Branch deals with military policy, with plans of operations for the defence of India, with the organization and distribution of the army for internal security and external use in accordance with the policy of Government, with the collection and distribution of intelligence, with the supervision of the training of the army, with the use of the military forces in war, with war regulations, with the education of officers and other ranks, and with the inter-communication services.

6. *The Adjutant General's Branch.*—The Adjutant-General's Branch deals with all matters appertaining to the raising, organizing, and maintenance of the military forces, the peace distribution of the army, discipline, martial, military and international law, medical and sanitary measures relating to the troops, personal and ceremonial matters, prisoners of war, pay and pension questions, recruiting, mobilization and demobilization.

7. *The Quartermaster-General's Branch.*—The Quartermaster-General's Branch is concerned with the maintenance and issue of supplies, *i.e.*, foodstuffs, forage, fuel, Mechanical Transport vehicles and connected stores and animals and reserves of these articles with the services responsible for the transportation, movement and quartering of troops, with the supply and transport service, military works, with the remount and veterinary services, the farms department and with garrison and regimental institutes. Since the Great War the responsibilities of the Quartermaster-General's Branch have increased to a very great extent. This is attributable specifically to the creation of new services such as Mechanical Transport, and to the fundamental change of policy by which, since the war Indian troops are fed, and mounted directly by Government, instead of under regimental arrangements.

8. *The Master-General of the Ordnance Branch.*—The branch consists of four Directorates with duties that are interdependent. These are—

- (i) Ordnance Factories.
- (ii) Artillery.
- (iii) Ordnance Services.
- (iv) Contracts.

(1) The Directorate of Ordnance Factories administers the army factories in India and assists the development of manufacture in India by private manufacturers.

STAFF OF COMMANDS, ETC.—contd.**EXPLANATIONS.**

(ii) The Director of Artillery deals with design, research experiment, patterns, and scales of all equipment of the Army and inspection of the same with the exception of:—

(a) Mechanical Transport (dealt with by Quartermaster-General's branch) and

(b) Clothing, footgear and general stores (dealt with by Director of Ordnance Services).

(iii) The Director of Ordnance Services controls the Arsenals and Depots and the Indian Army Ordnance Corps and is responsible for the provision of all equipment (except Mechanical Transport) and clothing for the Army. He also deals with design, research, experiment, patterns and scales and inspection of clothing, footgear and general stores.

(iv) The Contracts Directorate deals with the purchase of foodstuffs, coal, oil, petrol, paints varnishes, etc., hardware, machinery, engineering stores, etc., also the disposal of surplus and obsolete and unserviceable stores, machinery, etc., pertaining to the Army in India, Royal Air Force and Royal Indian Navy. In matters relating to the purchase of foodstuffs and other Indian Army Service Corps stores, this Directorate is now responsible to the Quartermaster-General in India. Policy questions concerning the branch with particular reference to mobilisation and war, calculation of war maintenance reserves, and co-ordination of resources in peace to meet war requirements are dealt with by a section working directly under the Master General of the Ordnance.

9. The Military Secretary deals with the appointment, promotion and retirement of officers holding the King's Commission and the selection of officers for staff appointments.

10. In addition to the above, the Army Headquarters staff includes certain advisers, viz.:—the Major General, Cavalry, the Major General, Royal Artillery, the Signal Officer-in-Chief and the Lieut.-Colonel, Royal Tank Corps. Their duties are to inspect and co-ordinate the training of their arms and to render advice to the Staff on technical questions connected with the administration of their arms of the service. These officers are attached to the General Staff Branch. For Engineer matters, the Engineer-in-Chief (provided for under Main Head 8—Military Engineer Services) is the technical adviser.

11. *Lower formations.*—The staff in Commands and Districts is organised on the same lines as at Army Headquarters, and the duties are allocated similarly. There are of course certain differences, e.g., the lower the formation, the fewer in number are the appointments and the lower is their grading; there is no Master-General of the Ordnance Branch in lower formations, ordnance matters being dealt with by the Quartermaster-General's Branch; the work of the Adjutant-General's and Quartermaster-General's Branches is usually combined in one administrative staff officer. The composition of the staff of Commands and Districts varies with the special requirements of each.

12 Provision is made under this head for the chargers of commanders and their staffs including their personal staffs.

Budget 1938-39 is more than budget 1937-38 by Rs. 8.80 lakhs due mainly to certain new measures (3 lakhs) increased provision for printing and stationery (2 lakhs) and an under estimate in the budget for 1937-38.

The normal gross annual expenditure on the purchase and manufacture of ordnance stores is estimated at Rs. 2,19·10 lakhs as against only Rs. 2,06·96 lakhs (excluding new demands) required during the year 1938-39. The normal figure given above is arrived at by pricing the annual maintenance figures of all articles. These annual maintenance figures are based on the actual normal issues during past years. In no year would the normal expenditure and the actual expenditure correspond as the actual expenditure depends on consumption, which varies, and the extent to which surplus stores can be utilised.

6. Barrack and hospital stores include all kinds of general stores for messes, quarters, barracks, hospitals and prisons; also stores for gymnasia and recreation rooms including articles of bedding

Camp equipment includes tents and their gear, tools for entrenchment, etc.

Gun mountings and transport vehicles for artillery, if of special pattern are included in carriages.

Swords and lances are included in small arms.

Clothing.

7. The normal gross annual expenditure on the purchase and manufacture of clothing is estimated at Rs. 69·90 lakhs as against only Rs. 66·97 lakhs (excluding new demands) required in 1938-39. The remarks in paragraph 5 regarding ordnance stores above apply equally in the case of clothing.

Deduct Heads.—The value of stores issued to M. E. S., R. A. F. and Royal Indian Navy and other departments of Central Government is charged to them.

The increase of 12·33 lakhs as compared with Budget 1937-38 is due mainly to increase in normal requirements (4 lakhs) mechanisation of certain Cavalry and Infantry units (3 lakhs) and increased provision for new measures (5 lakhs).

Minor Head (a)—Embarkation and Railway Transport Staff and Transit Sections.—The embarkation staffs deal with the reception of troops (both British and Indian) at Indian ports and their despatch from India to oversea destinations. They also deal with the shipping of stores from the sea ports and receipt of stores from overseas and their onward despatch. The embarkation staffs at Bombay and Karachi have been reorganised in order to make extended use of the port of Karachi for the embarkation and disembarkation of troops proceeding to and from Northern India and by bringing together under the Embarkation Commandants the supply establishments employed at both ports on embarkation duties.

The railway transport establishments which are employed at Bombay work under the orders of the Embarkation Commandant and deal with the frequent and important rail movements which take place to and from that port.

Minor Head (b)—Indian Troop Service.—This head includes a portion of the expenditure on marine transport establishments at Bombay and Karachi and full cost of stores and troops bedding supplied to hired transports.

EXPLANATIONS.

The buildings, roads and other works required for purposes of the defence of India and the receipts connected therewith are dealt with under the head 8/VIII.—Military Engineer Services.

2. The Military Engineer Services are responsible for the execution and maintenance of engineer services required by the Army in India and all duties connected therewith, except in certain outlying military stations which are in charge of the local Public Works Department. The Military Engineer Services are also charged with the construction, etc., of all works for the Royal Air Force, for Army Ordnance and Clothing Factories and such works as are entrusted to them in respect of the Royal Indian Navy.

They may also undertake engineer services on behalf of private persons and bodies, Local Governments and Administrations and other departments of the Government of India under proper authority. As there is no executive branch of the Public Works Department in the tribal areas of the North-West Frontier Province and in Baluchistan, the Military Engineer Services perform the functions of the Public Works Department in respect of all civil works expenditure in those areas under the orders of H.E. the Governor and the Agent to the Governor General. For this purpose the Chief Engineer in the Northern Command is *ex-officio* Secretary in the Public Works Department to the Governor in respect of trans-border areas. Similarly, the Chief Engineer, Western Command is *ex-officio* Secretary in the Public Works Department to the Hon'ble the Agent to the Governor General, Resident and Chief Commissioner in Baluchistan.

3. The Military Engineer Services are divided into four branches, *viz.*, "Buildings and Roads", "Electrical and Mechanical", "Furniture and Stores" and "Technical examination of works" with the following responsibilities—

- (a) *Buildings and Roads.*—The design, construction, inspection and maintenance of buildings, engineering structures, defences, roads, drains, sewage installations and rifle ranges.
- (b) *Electrical and Mechanical.*—The design, construction, maintenance and operation of installations for the supply of electric energy, water, and ice, and such other duties in connection with machinery as may be ordered and the disposal of surplus machinery, etc., through the central army agency.
- (c) *Furniture and Stores.*—The supply and maintenance of furniture to buildings and the supply of engineer stores, other than those supplied by other departments, also the disposal of surplus articles through the central army agency.
- (d) *Technical examination of works.*—Technical examination of bills, measurement and check of measurements of works, revision of schedules of rates, preparation of bills of quantities and specifications, examination of and, when ordered, preparation of contract documents.
- (e) *Miscellaneous.*—The payment of purchase money or rent for land, buildings and railway sidings.

4. Ordinarily, all administrative authorities (Military or Civil) competent to accord approval to the execution of engineer services have an engineer adviser to assist them in this duty. Usually the engineer adviser belongs to the engineer service charged with the execution of the work. When the Military Engineer Services or the Public Works Department carry out engineer services on behalf of any authority (Military or Civil), administrative approval to the estimated expenditure is accorded and funds allotted by the authority concerned. The Military Engineer Services or Public Works Department are then responsible for technical sanction, execution and accounting, in accordance with the rules of their respective services.

5. Expenditure in the Military Engineer Services is incurred by the Engineer-in-Chief under the control of the Quartermaster-General in India.

6. The Military Engineer Services are organised by Commands under the administration of Chief Engineers, and in executive districts (corresponding with military districts) in charge of Commanders, Royal Engineers. Each District is divided into Divisions in charge of Garrison Engineers whose areas are further divided into sub-divisions in charge of sub-Divisional Officers

EXPLANATIONS.

The increase of Rs. 10 lakhs as compared with budget 1937-38 is due mainly to mechanisation of certain British Cavalry and Infantry units (26 lakhs) larger grants for works in progress etc. (7.5 lakhs), increased provision for normal M.E.S. expenditure (4.5 lakhs) partly counterbalanced by reduced provision for new measures (28 lakhs). The total amount included for grants is Rs. 23.92 lakhs.

Sub-Head A.—Works.—The provision under this head represents capital outlay on an accepted programme of normal and special works and includes a reserve for unforeseen expenditure. The amount of grant included under this head is 19.69 lakhs.

Sub-Head B.—Maintenance, Buildings, Communications etc.—The requirements under this head are calculated on fixed percentages on the value of buildings and certain fixed charges for the maintenance of roads. The increase of Rs. 1.15 lakhs is mainly due to revised system of budgeting for special repairs (formerly called renewals) costing less than Rs. 20,000 in each case and to normal fluctuations.

Sub-Head C.—Maintenance and Operation—Installations etc.—The increase of 1.92 lakhs is mainly due to the provision of certain new water supply and electrical installations.

Sub-Head E.—Establishment.—The increase of Rs. 3.02 lakhs is mainly due to (i) the employment of 8 additional surveyors of works and 1 Superintending Surveyor of works and consulting Architect at A. H. Qrs. and the decision to charge this head with the pay of officers of the normal M. E. S. cadre employed on Quetta Reconstruction whose pay was hitherto charged to Main Head 12—Quetta Reconstruction (ii) the appointment of architectural draftsman and (iii) fall in credits owing to reduction in the rates of departmental charges to be levied on work done for Ordnance and Clothing Factories.

Sub Head F.—Tools and Plant.—The increase of .40 lakh is mainly due to the provision of four cement testing laboratories.

Sub-Head G.—Stores.—The provision of 5.43 lakhs is made up of (i) grant for the replacement of mobilisation stores issued to Waziristan Operations etc. (4.23) lakhs and (ii) new money for mobilisation stores (1.50 lakhs) partly counterbalanced by an anticipated decrease in existing stock.

Sub-Head J.—England.—The decrease of Rs. 3.07 lakhs is mainly due to the revised system of budgeting for English stores whereby the cost of such stores will be adjusted in the Indiction of the accounts instead of in the accounts of the High Commissioner.

Main Head VIII—Military Engineer Services.—The increase of Rs. 9.13 lakhs is due to larger transfer from Land Sales Suspense Account (8.53) and other normal fluctuation

1. *Sub-Head A.*—Represents a proportion of the charges on account of the staffs employed at Army Headquarters, Commands, Districts and Brigade headquarters in connection with Auxiliary and Territorial Force duties (excluding proportionate charges in respect of the units whose expenditure is debitable to Civil Grant).

2. *Auxiliary Force.*—The Auxiliary Force, India, is constituted by the Auxiliary Force Act, 1920. This Force is the successor of the Indian Volunteer Force, which in 1917 gave place to the Indian Defence Force in which service was obligatory for the period of the war.

Under the reorganisation the Force consists of units of all arms and including reservists aggregates some 18,000 of all ranks.

Pay is drawn at special Auxiliary Force rates, and subject to fulfilment of the complete obligation, a bonus equivalent to the pay earned is also admissible.

3. *Indian Territorial Force.*—The Indian Territorial Force is constituted by the Indian Territorial Force Act, 1920.

The Provincial Battalions are intended to form a second line to the regular Indian Army and their liability for military service is, therefore, a general one, i.e., they may be employed anywhere within the limits of India, and in an emergency, beyond those limits by a special order of the Governor General in Council. The liability of Urban Units is confined to the Province in which located, while the University Training Corps are purely educational and have no liability for military service.

Pay is as for the Indian Army with the exception of King's commissioned officers who draw British Service rates of pay. Members of Urban units are also eligible for a bounty of Rs. 30 on completion of training, and these units further draw a capitation grant for each efficient member.

Training is carried out as follows:—

- (i) *Provincial units.*—Recruit training 1 month.
Annual training 1 month.
Additional annual training (13 units) 1 month.

Cadre training of about two months duration may be carried out by all units as funds permit.

(ii) *Urban units—*

- Preliminary (recruits) training 32 days.
Annual training 16 days.

(iii) *University Training Corps units—*

78 hours drill in the first six months after enrolment and thereafter 2 hours per week during a university term, and to be embodied in camp for a period not exceeding 15 days during the year.

The charges pertaining to all University Training Corps, all units of the Urban Infantry and certain selected Provincial battalions of the Indian Territorial Force are met from the special grant for the expansion of the territorial forces.

The decrease of Rs. - 92 lakh as compared with Budget 1937-38 is due mainly to the exclusion from this head of provision for works and other miscellaneous charges relating to Head 9-C(b) Civil grant.

The budget for 1938-39 provides for the following establishments :—

Royal Air Force.—250 British Royal Air force officers, 2 M. E. S. officers, 1 Indian meteorologist, 2 officer supervisors, 1,859 British airmen, 1 Indian officer, 3 Indian other ranks, 306 Indian artificers, 116 Indian mechanical transport drivers, 185 civilian clerks, storekeepers and draftsmen, 23 British clerks and 11 Indian clerks of Indian Army Corps of clerks, 3 clerks, Indian Hawai sepoy, 6 school mistresses, 8 language teachers and 787 followers, in addition 4 British and 3 Indian clerks of I. A. C. C. upto 31st August 1938.

Indian Air Force.—7 British officers, 11 Indian officers holding the Dominion commission, 1 Indian assistant education officer, 35 British airmen, 75 Indian airmen, 7 Indian mechanical transport drivers, 25 Indian apprentices and 46 Indian followers.

The following are the units of the air forces in India :—

Headquarters, Royal Air Force, Simla—Delhi.

Group headquarters, at Peshawar having under its administration 2 wing stations, each comprising 1 station headquarters and 2 bomber squadrons, at Risalpur and Kohat.

1 Wing headquarters, at Chaklala with two army co-operation squadrons—1 at Chaklala with a detached flight at Miranshah and 1 at Peshawar—under its administration

1 Army co-operation squadron temporarily located at Karachi, with a detached flight at Fort Sandeman directly under the administration of the Headquarters, Royal Air Force.

1 Station headquarters at Ambala with 1 Army co operation squadron and headquarters and 1 flight of the Indian Air Force under its administration.

1 flight of the Indian Air Force will be located at Peshawar and a third flight will form at Karachi.

Aircraft depot at Drigh Road.

Aircraft park including a bomber transport flight at Lahore.

Besides the above, there is a hill depot, open at Lower Tops, Murree hills, during the summer months only.

2. The duties and functions of these units are :—

The Headquarters, Royal Air Force, controls the operation, training and administration of the whole of the Royal Air Force and Indian Air Force in India.

The Group Headquarters, Peshawar, commands Nos. 1 and 2 Indian Wing Stations (at Kohat and Risalpur, exercises operational control and co-ordinates the work of these two stations. The function of the Station Headquarters is to control the operation and training of the squadrons and to look after all administrative details in connection with the station. In the interest of economy, certain services such as transport, stores, etc., are centralized under station control.

The functions of the Wing Headquarters, Chaklala, are similar to those of a station headquarters, Royal Air Force.

The Aircraft Depot receives all stores from England, erects new aeroplanes, overhauls engines, carries out repairs to aeroplanes, parachutes, armament and all aircraft equipment including instruments, etc. It is a supply base for Quetta direct when a squadron is located there and for other stations through the Aircraft Park, Lahore.

The Aircraft Park stores the "immediate reserve" aircraft for the squadrons on the North-West Frontier, repairs all motor transport chassis, manufactures and repairs bodies for all mechanical transport vehicles in the Command. It is the supply base for all Royal Air Force stations other than Quetta.

EXPLANATIONS—*contd.*

The increase of Rs. 24 lakhs as compared with budget 1937-38 is due mainly to the cost of certain amenities to British airmen (1½ lakhs) increased provision for new measures (10½ lakhs) increased provision for voyage pay and transportation charges owing to reduction in the tour of service of R. A. F. personnel (2 lakhs), expansion of the Indian Air Force (2½ lakhs) inclusion of provision for payment of customs duty on petrol (5½ lakhs) and other normal fluctuations.

Minor head (c).—Indian Air Force—As a result of the recommendations of the Indian Sandhurst Committee, it was decided, with the approval of the Secretary of State for India, to form an Indian Air Force unit. Six Indian cadets were sent to Cranwell in September 1930 for the normal two years' course for all entrants to the Royal Air Force; of these one cadet was transferred for training in stores duties in England. These cadets graduated as pilot officers in August 1932 and were attached to squadrons of the Royal Air Force in England for six months becoming available to form the first unit of the Indian Air Force in April 1933.

One cadet was sent to Cranwell in September 1931 for a similar course, three were sent in January 1932, three in August 1932, three in August 1933, two in August 1934 and two more in September 1936 and three are to be sent in September 1938 to ensure a steady flow of regular officers for the Indian air force. Of these one arrived in March 1934, three in September 1934, one in April 1935, two in April 1936 and one in April 1937. Of the two cadets sent to Cranwell in September 1936 one was found unsuitable for flying and was transferred to an Equipment course; he will arrive in India in September 1938.

The first batch of Indian apprentices engaged in 1931 were given technical training in R. A. F. workshop. Those who successfully completed the training were selected for service and others discharged. Airmen of semi-technical trades have been engaged and apprentices are being trained to complete the squadron to establishment.

Sub Head A.—The increase of Rs. 2·82 lakhs as compared with budget 1937-38 is due mainly to the cost of amenities to British airmen, the introduction of certain new measures, the expansion of the Indian Air Force and smaller recoveries of family allotment.

Sub-Head B.—Minor head (a).—Two Royal Air Force officers are seconded for training at the Staff College, Quetta. The object is to afford selected officers higher instruction in the art of war and in the duties of the staff than is obtainable in a squadron.

Minor Head (b).—Royal Air Force Education.—This minor head provides for the pay and allowances of eight Royal Air Force education officers, one Indian assistant education officer, six Army school mistresses and eight language teachers.

The functions of education officers in India are to provide educational facilities for officers and airmen in preparation for service courses and examinations and for general education with a view to raise the level of general intelligence and to develop those qualities of mind and character which go to form an efficient disciplined force under modern conditions.

School mistresses are employed for the education of airmen's children.

Minor Head (c).—R. A. F. Medical Service.—Under this head provision has been made for the personnel of the Royal Air Force medical service which is organised for the prevention of disease and for the care and treatment of such sick and injured as may not require hospital treatment. On grounds of economy, all hospital cases are sent to the Army hospitals for treatment and their expenses are met from Royal Air Force funds on fixed rates.

His duties are to advise the Air Officer Commanding on all matters pertaining to buildings, roads, water and electrical supply, etc., to interpret Royal Air Force requirements to the Military Engineer Services, and to check and revise plans, specifications, etc., to ensure their suitability for Royal Air Force requirements. Establishment charges at 6 per cent. and tools and plant charges at 1 per cent. are paid to the Military Engineer Services for work done by them for the Royal Air Force; works audit charges at 1½ per cent. are provided under Head 2-J.

The increase of Rs. 10.45 lakhs as compared with budget 1937-38 is due mainly to provision for the re-equipment of aerodromes.

EXPLANATIONS.

The Royal Indian Marine which was reorganised on a combatant basis from the 1st April 1928 by an Act of Indian Legislature became the "Royal Indian Navy" with full combatant status, with effect from the 2nd October 1934. The combatant strength of the force consists of 106* officers, 52† warrant officers and 1,335 ratings. The present head of the service is a Rear-Admiral of the Royal Navy who is designated "Flag Officer Commanding, Royal Indian Navy." The squadron at present consists of the following vessels :—

Five sloops—"Cornwallis", "Clive", "Lawrence" "Hindustan" and "Indus".

The survey ship—"Investigator", and

The depot ship—"Dalhousie".

The patrol vessel—"Pathan" which serves also as a tender to the depot ship "Dalhousie".

The target towing trawler "Madras" and a number of small vessels, tugs, etc., employed in the Bombay Dockyard on harbour service.

2. The functions of the Royal Indian Navy in peace-time are as follows :—

- (a) Training of personnel for service at sea in war.
- (b) Organization of the naval defences of Indian coasts and harbours for the protection of trade in Indian waters in time of war.
- (c) Marine survey work in Indian waters.
- (d) Sea transport work for the Government of India, i.e., all arrangements afloat for the conveyance of troops, animals and stores for Government.

3. The Royal Indian Navy maintains a dockyard which is capable of dealing with all work in connection with the repair, maintenance and refit of all vessels and their various parts. The dockyard also accepts work from local Governments, private firms and the Admiralty.

4. The Royal Indian Navy is responsible for the administration and maintenance of Royal Indian Navy buildings (including the buildings constructed by the Military Engineer Services for the Royal Indian Navy).

5. The Ordnance services in connection with the Royal Indian Navy are carried out by the Master General of Ordnance in India. The expenditure connected therewith is, however, charged to the Royal Indian Navy estimates.

The increase of Rs. 19 lakhs compared with budget 1937-38 is due (i) to the provision of Rs. 14 lakhs as contribution to the Royal Indian Navy Equalisation Fund (ii) larger provision for new measures (3 lakhs) and other miscellaneous increases due to expansion. The total provision on account of the R. I. N. Expansion Equalisation Fund is Rs. 29 lakhs made up of the normal contribution of 14 lakhs which was withheld in 1937-38 and 15 lakhs provided out of savings due to the remission by His Majesty's Government of (1) the contribution hitherto paid towards the expenses of His Majesty's ships in Indian waters and (2) the liability to maintain certain subsidized vessels on behalf of His Majesty's Government in the Persian Gulf.

EXPLANATIONS.

Non-effective charges mainly represent the discharge of liabilities in connection with individuals who no longer serve in the army and consist of payments of pensions and gratuities to them or their families. Rewards attached to certain military decorations and medals and for distinguished war service which frequently involve payments to officers and men still serving in the army are also taken to this head, those to individuals on the retired list being compiled under sub-head B as part of pension charges and those to serving officers and men to sub-head A. The charges for pensions are under three main categories, viz., (1) pensions to retired or disabled officers and men, (2) pensions to families of individuals and (3) payments to War office of a proportionate share of retired pay, etc., of British service officers and troops serving in India.

A. Rewards for Military Services.—Budget, 1938-39, is more than Budget, 1937-38, by 1.30 lakhs due to larger provision for the issue of medals in connection with the Waziristan Operations.

B. Pensions.—Budget 1938-39 (net) is less than Budget, 1937-38 (net) by .87 lakhs mainly due to larger recovery of pension contributions from Burma Government in respect of personnel lent to them for service and reductions anticipated in the payment of War pensions, partly counterbalanced by increased equated payments.

C. England.—Budget, 1938-39, is more than Budget, 1937-38, by 4.83 lakhs due mainly to larger provision for payments to War Office for British forces serving in India and for pensions payable by the Secretary of State, partly counterbalanced by larger receipts from His Majesty's Government on account of contributions in respect of Indian troops serving overseas.
