#### INTRODUCTORY NOTES.

- 1. Unless otherwise stated, the amounts given in these statements are in lakhs of rupees, and the expressions "last year", "current year" and "next year" stand for the financial years 1936-37, 1937-38 and 1938-39 respectively.
- 2. In the figures relating to previous years expenditure incurred in sterling has been converted into rupees at the average of the daily rates for telegraphic transfers in Calcutta on London throughout the year in question. The current year's sterling expenditure has been converted at the rate of 1s. 6 3/32d. on the basis of the actual rates during the first ten months of the year, but in accordance with the usual practice the budget estimates for 1938-39 are based on the standard rate of 1s. 6d.
- 3. The statements of revenue and expenditure are based on net figures, i.e., the totals include only the net expenditure on the Defence Services, the net surplus or deficit of the Posts and Telegraphs Department, and the net contribution paid by the Railways to general revenues. Unless otherwise stated, however, the cost of collection is treated as expenditure and is not deducted from the figures given on the revenue side.

### Notes on the revenue estimates.

Customs and Central Excise Duties.—The distribution of these estimates is shown in Statements II and III. The figures for next year include Rs. 18 lakhs on account of customs and excise duties on motor spirit and kerosene supplied to the Defence Department. Such supplies have hitherto been free of duty.

Taxes on Income other than Corporation Tax.—The share of income-tax revenue payable to the Provinces is calculated as follows:—

Salt and Opium.—The distribution of these estimates is given in Statements IV and V.

Interest.—The variations are mainly due to the interest on the Silver Redemption Reserve. In the closing months of last year there was a considerable depreciation in the market value of the securities held in the Reserve. The whole of the interest received during that year and part of the interest received during the current year has had to be used to make good the deficiency resulting from this depreciation.

Currency and Mint.—The main items are shown in Statement VI.

Payments from Indian States.—The decrease in the revised estimate is due to the decision that Indian States whose tribute amounts to more than 5 per cent. of their total revenue should have the excess over that percentage remitted. The small increase in next year's budget is due to the absence of provision for certain refunds payable in the current year.

Other sources of revenue.—The following are the largest items in the increase anticipated in next year's budget:—

- (1) Post Office cash certificates which have remained unclaimed for more than three complete years from the date of maturity are credited to revenue, any claim subsequently received in respect of such certificates being charged to the revenues of the year in which the payment is made. Next year the certificates due to be credited to revenue in this way amount to over Rs. 16 lakhs against Rs. 4 lakhs assumed in the current year's budget.
- (2) A sum of Rs. 8½ lakhs will be paid by the Posts and Telegraphs Department next year in respect of accumulated losses on press telegrams.

This special factor necessitates a reduction in the excise estimates for next year and a corresponding increase in the customs estimates.

<sup>(</sup>b) The payments to Indian States in respect of the excise duty on matches have hitherto been treated as deductions from revenue but will be treated as expenditure with effect from 1938-39. This involves an increase of Rs. 32½ lakhs in the revenue estimates for that year and a corresponding increase in the expenditure estimates under Central Excise.

### Notes on the expenditure estimates.

Customs.—The amounts payable to Cochin and Travancore States during the current year under the Cochin Port Agreement are less than was anticipated, but there will probably be a considerable increase in these payments next year.

Central excise duties.—See note (b) on page 7.

Taxes on Income.—The staff of the department is being strengthened as a result of the recent enquiry.

Salt.—The increase in the budget estimates is mainly due to additional provision for preventive measures on the land frontiers.

Interest.—See statement VIII.

Administration of Justice.—The increases are due to the establishment of the Federal Court.

Agriculture.—The decrease in the revised estimate is mainly due to the postponement of the Anand Creamery Scheme for which provision was made in the budget. In next year's estimates this saving is more than counterbalanced by an increase in the provision for expenditure on sugar research.

Aviation.—Some further expansion is necessary in this department in connection with the inauguration of the Empire Air Mail Scheme and the increase in internal air services.

Broadcasting.—The estimates for 1938-39 provide for some expansion of activities. It is anticipated that there will be an increase of about Rs. 3 lakhs in broadcasting receipts.

Mint.—Additional expenditure is necessary in the current year owing to the increase in the absorption of small coin.

Civil Works.—The decrease in the revised estimate and the increase in the budget for 1938-39 are mainly due to delay in the anticipated expenditure on civil buildings in Quetta and on the new custom house at Calcutta.

Central Road Fund.—In accordance with the procedure introduced this year the budget estimate of Rs. 1,41 lakhs will not be increased on the basis of the revised estimates for revenue from duties on motor spirit, but the effect of this increase will be carried forward to 1938-39. The estimate of Rs. 1,70 lakhs for that year is therefore based on the budget estimate for receipts from duties on motor spirit during that year plus the additional payment due on the basis of the revised estimate for 1937-38.

Stationery and Printing.—The increase in the budget estimate for 1938-39 is due partly to a rise in prices and partly to the necessity of replenishing stocks which have become seriously depleted owing to efforts to keep within the budget provision of previous years.

Miscellaneous.—See notes under "Payments to Crown Representative" and "External Affairs".

Grants to Provinces.—See statement X.

Ecclesiastical.—The increase in the budget for 1938-39 is due to the decision that expenditure on ecclesiastical buildings should in future be shown under this head instead of under "Civil Works".

Payments to Crown Representative.—It has been decided that the quit rent of Rs. 25 lakhs paid to Hyderabad in respect of Berar should in future be shown under this head instead of under "Miscellaneous".

Tribal Areas.—The increase in the revised estimate is due to the construction of roads and other civil expenditure in connection with the Waziristan operations. This figure would have been more than Rs. 24 lakhs higher but for the utilisation of the balance remaining in a special fund created for expenditure on other roads in tribal areas.

External Affairs.—Payments in respect of the League of Nations will in future be shown under this head instead of under "Miscellaneous".

#### APPENDIX I.

### Memorandum on the Defence Estimates.

The Defence Estimates cover expenditure on the Royal Indian Navy and the Royal Air Force as well as the Army in India.

2. The subjoined table gives comparative figures of defence expenditure since 1930 and the estimated expenditure in the current and next financial years:—

- 3. The budget estimates for 1938-39 thus show a decrease of 204 lakhs as compared with the revised estimates for 1937-38, but an increase of 56 lakhs over the budget estimates. Of this increase of 56 lakhs, however, 18 lakhs is in respect of customs duty on petrol and kerosene used by the Defence Forces: hitherto, purchases of these oils for defence requirements have been exempt from duty and the change in accounting procedure under which this exemption is being withdrawn, while throwing additional expenditure on the defence estimates, does not represent any increased cost to the State. The true rise in the budget provision for the Defence Services is therefore 38 lakhs.
- 4. It was pointed out a year ago that the difficult financial situation then prevailing compelled the imposition of drastic cuts in the provision in the current year for even the maintenance services of the Defence Forces, but Hon'ble Members were reminded that these cuts were achieved at the expense of merely postponing unavoidable and urgent liabilities.
- 5. The standing charges of the Defence Forces in 1938-39 are up by 70 lakhs as compared with 1937-38. The largest single item contributing to this increase is an addition of 21 lakhs to the maintenance budget of the Ordnance Services, a rise which is inevitable after a period of eating down surplus stocks and of enforced economy. As it is, deficiencies in maintenance stocks to the value of nearly 30 lakhs are being left unfilled for want of funds.

The other main items which make up the increase in standing charges are additions of 10 lakhs and 14 lakhs respectively to the Mechanical Transport and the Royal Indian Navy expenditure equalization funds. The object of these funds is, as their name suggests, to equalise budget provision for the replacement of mechanical vehicles and vessels of the Royal Indian Navy. Until three years ago, the budgetary provision for the Mechanical Transport equalization fund stood at 25 lakhs, but it was reduced in 1935-36 to 15 lakhs. In view of the heavy replacements which fall to be made during the next few

years, it is necessary to restore the annual contribution to its former level. Even this sum is much less than what is required for the existing fleet of mechanical vehicles in the Army. The annual contribution to the Royal Indian Navy equalization fund was, for the reasons given in the preceding paragraph, eliminated from the budget of the current year, and it is now necessary to restore it for the same reason as necessitates the increase in the contribution to the Mechanical Transport equalization fund. Other items contributing to the rise in standing charges include (a) the recurring effect of new measures introduced in 1937-38 (9 lakhs): (b) partial restoration in the cut made in the current year's provision for Military Engineer Services  $(4\frac{1}{2}$  lakhs): and (c) payments to Provincial Governments for maintaining a number of I. M. S. officers on their cadres (4 lakhs).

- 6. It may be asked how with an additional budget grant limited to 38 lakhs, it is possible to meet a 70 lakh increase in standing charges, as well as to finance other measures dealt with later in this memorandum. The main reason is that during 1938-39 there will be a temporary shortage of British troops on the Indian establishment and that this shortage will produce a net reduction of about 90 lakhs, after allowing for the increase in cost, amounting to about 35 lakhs, of various amenities which were introduced for British troops in the course of the current year in an attempt to arrest the growing shortage of recruits.
- 7. The amount left over after meeting the rise in standing charges is therefore 38+90—70=58 lakhs, to which must also be added the 27 lakhs which is the first of the three equal annual instalments which His Majesty's Government are contributing to the capital cost of mechanizing the British cavalry and infantry in India. The total therefore comes to 85 lakhs, which is the amount which is estimated to be required for the first phase of this mechanization programme. This first phase provides for the conversion of four British battalions into machine gun units and of a proportion of the remainder into rifle battalions. During 1938-39 also two British cavalry regiments will be converted into cavalry light tank regiments: a third regiment will be returned to the United Kingdom next trooping season without replacement and four companies of the Royal Tank Corps will have been disbanded by the end of the year.
- 8. Government has not found it possible in recent years to provide in the annual defence budgets more than the funds required to meet standing charges plus a small grant for miscellaneous new measures of a minor character. The result has been that not only have the defence authorities been unable to complete the programme of re-equipment which was begun as long ago as 1928-29 with a view to making good the deficiencies in equipment and organisation which existed even at that time, but also that little has been possible to keep the defence forces in India abreast of the great changes which have taken place in the interval in military science and equipment.
- 9. The "free" balance of the defence reserve fund which, during the past few years, has been used to supplement the budget grants for defence is now approaching exhaustion, and amounts to 35 lakhs. The whole of this balance is being devoted to the most important of the re-equipment measures requiring funds, but since this sum is quite inadequate for the purpose, it is proposed also to draw on other balances in the defence reserve fund which are no immediately required for the purposes for which they exist. The amoun so drawn will be 45 lakhs, so that the total to be expended on re-equipmen

in 1938-39 comes to 80 lakhs. Among the measures which will be financed, or for which funds are being earmarked, are improvements in coast defences, the erection of a factory designed to make India self-sufficient in the matter of high explosives, modernization of aerodromes, and the mechanization of certain Indian units, a scheme for which is under consideration. Relatively large though this sum is, it will provide for but a fraction of the measures which, in the view of the defence authorities, are necessary if the Defence Forces in India are to be brought up to the standard dictated by present day conditions.
