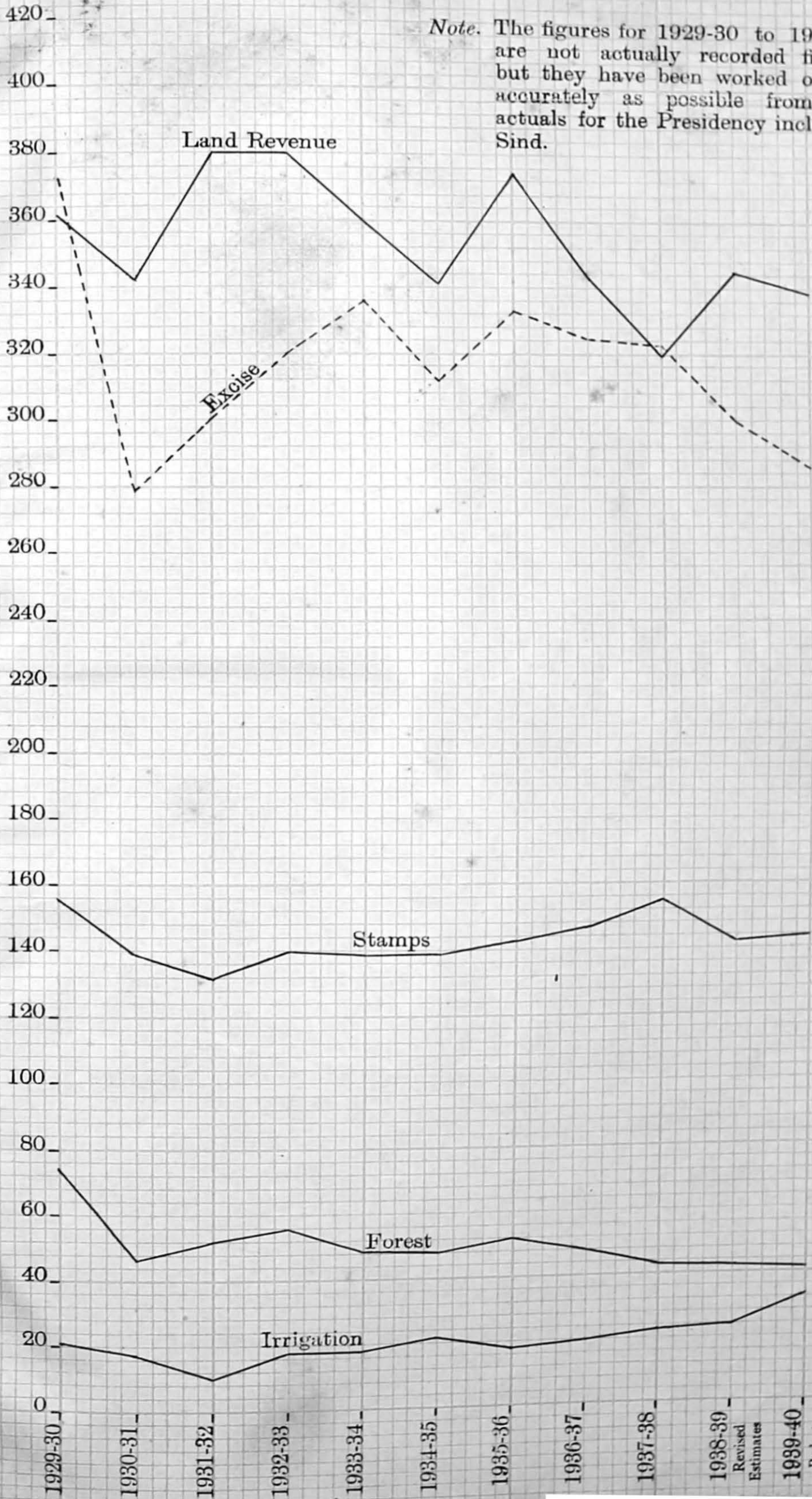

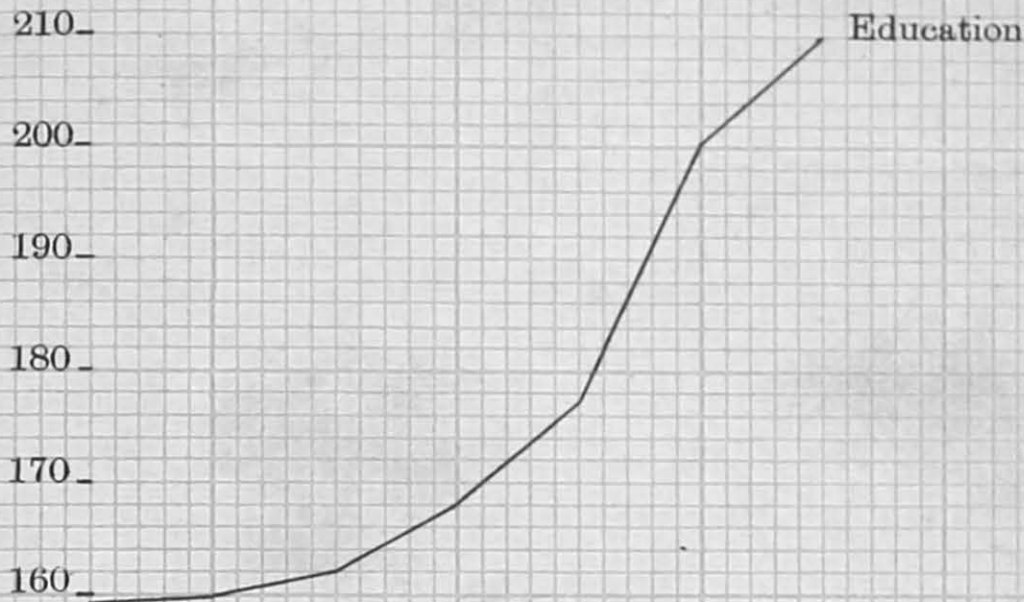

Under section 138 (1) of the Government of India Act, 1935, taxes on income other than agricultural income shall be levied and collected by the Federation, but a prescribed percentage of the net proceeds in any financial year of any such tax, except in so far as those proceeds represent proceeds attributable to Chief Commissioners' Provinces or to taxes payable in respect of Federal emoluments, shall not form part of the revenues of the Federation, but shall be assigned to the Provinces and to the Federated States, if any, within which that tax is leviable. The Government of India (Distribution of Revenues) Order, 1936, has accordingly fixed the prescribed percentage at 50 and the share of the Government of Bombay at 20 per cent. of the prescribed percentage. But during the first period of 5 years, the whole of such prescribed percentage or such amount as together with any contributions towards general revenues from the Railways will bring the Central Government's share in the divisible total up to 13 crores, whichever is less, is to be retained by the Central Government. The revised estimate of the current year is higher than the budget estimate because the final accounts for 1937-38 revealed that a further 7,84 was due to this Government for that year, counterbalanced by a small decrease in the revised estimate of the distributable surplus for the current year. Next year's estimate takes into account the probable increase in Income Tax receipts as a result of the new Income Tax Bill.

3. *Ordinary Revenue.*—The receipts under this head are inclusive of the portion of land revenue due to irrigation which is subsequently transferred to the irrigation heads (XVII and XVIII). The increase in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate of the current year is due to the generally satisfactory agricultural conditions in the Province after making allowance for rebates granted on account of the slump in prices. The next year's estimate is based on the assumption that the season will be a normal one.

4. *Sale proceeds of waste lands.*—The receipts are of a fluctuating nature depending upon the demand for land.

5. *Recoveries on account of survey and settlement charges.*—The decrease in the revised estimate of the current year and the budget estimate of next year is due to smaller recoveries on account of the cost of boundary marks recoverable from landholders.

6. *Deduct—Portion of land revenue due to Irrigation.*—Up to now the net revenue after deducting the cost of collection in the Civil Department was passed on to the irrigation heads. With effect from next year the gross revenue will be passed on to the irrigation heads, the credit for the cost of collection in the Civil Department being taken by deduct entry under "25-General Administration—District Administration".

7. *Refunds.*—The increase in the budget estimate of next year compared with the current year's estimates is due to the provision for refunds of non-agricultural assessments in Vile Parle and Juhu.

*Expenditure.*

8. *Charges of Administration.*—The decrease in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate of the current year is mainly due to a surrender of 40 in the provision for acquisition and improvement of land for village sites and other economies in contingent expenditure. The increase in the budget estimate of next year compared with that of the current year is under "Pay of Officers" owing to the appointment of a senior officer as the Collector of Bombay and under "Contingencies" mainly due to (a) larger provisions for acquisition and improvement of land for village sites and construction and repairs to chavdis and (b) an additional provision for conservancy of certain foreshores in Bombay City.

9. *Survey, Settlement and Record Operations.*—The decrease in next year's estimate compared with the current year's estimate is mainly due to smaller provision under "Pay of Establishment" due to the abolition of a post of Assistant Manager at the Government Photozinc Press.

10. *Assignments and Compensations.*—The increase in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate of the current year is due partly to the insufficiency of sanctioned provision and partly to the payment of past arrears. The next year's provision is based on normal requirements.

11. *Charges in England.*—The increase in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate of the current year is under "Leave salaries and deputation pay" due to an officer having proceeded on leave to the United Kingdom, for which no provision was made in the current year's budget. The increase in next year's estimate is due to a larger provision made for the stores of the Government Photozinc Press next year.

*Revenue.*

12. *Country spirits, Country fermented liquor, Hemp and other drugs and Receipts from distilleries.*—As details of the prohibition measures to be adopted in the current year were under consideration, the estimated loss of revenue amounting to Rs. 27·4 lakhs on their account was shown in lump in the budget estimates of the current year. The budget estimates shown under the various minor heads, therefore, represented the receipts that would have accrued if the prohibition measures were not introduced. These measures mainly affected the four heads (i) Country spirits (ii) Country fermented liquor (iii) Hemp and other drugs and (iv) Receipts from distilleries. The decrease in the revised estimate of the current year and the budget estimate of next year under these heads is mainly due to the effect of the prohibition measures. The decrease is accentuated in next year's budget owing to the fact that some of the prohibition measures which were introduced late in the current year will be in operation for the whole of the next year.

13. *Opium.*—The rise in the revised estimate of the current year is due to an increase in the current year's license fees and the decrease in the next year's budget is due to prohibition measures.

14. *Fines, confiscations and miscellaneous.*—The increase in the revised estimate of the current year and the budget estimate of next year is due to the inclusion of receipts from dry areas and from the departmentally managed shops in the prohibition areas.

*Expenditure.*

15. *Superintendence.*—The increase in the revised estimate of the current year and the budget estimate of next year is mainly due to—

(1) the promotion of the Commissioner of Excise to the rank of a first grade Commissioner,

(2) discontinuance of the contribution from the Government of India on account of supervision charges of the Commissioner in connection with the matches and sugar excise duty work and

(3) employment of additional establishment in the office of the Commissioner of Excise.

16. *District charges.*—The increase in the revised estimate of the current year is due to the employment of additional establishment in the Bardoli prohibition area and the Ahmedabad dry area and the anticipated increase in expenditure under prohibition propaganda contingencies. The increase in next year's estimate is due to the employment of the additional establishment in the Bardoli prohibition area and the Ahmedabad dry area for the whole of next year partly counterbalanced by less provision on "Prohibition Propaganda".

17. *Distilleries.*—The decrease in the revised estimate compared with the current year's budget is mainly due to the reduction in the allotment to the depreciation reserve of the Nasik Distillery from Rs. 95,000 to Rs. 20,000 and non-utilisation of the provision of Rs. 5,000 for fire insurance at the Nasik Distillery counterbalanced by anticipated excesses under other items of contingencies at the Nasik, Dhadgaon and Chowka distilleries. Next year's budget estimate is smaller than the current year's revised estimate because less expenditure is expected on contingencies of the Dhadgaon and Nasik Distilleries.

18. *Compensation.*—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate compared with the current year's budget is due to the anticipation of less expenditure under "Surplus amount payable to certain States in respect of their Abkari and Hemp drug leases". The decrease in next year's estimate is mainly due to the elimination of the provision for a contribution of Rs. 1,43,750 to the Bombay Municipality.

19. *Charges in England.*—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is mainly under "leave salaries and deputation pay" due to more officers having proceeded on leave. The increase in next year's estimate is due to the provision made on account of the leave salary of the Commissioner of Excise.

20. *Works.*—The revised estimate of the current year includes expenditure anticipated on the construction of certain minor works at distilleries for which no provision was made in the current year's budget estimate.

21. *A-Non-judicial.*—The increase in the next year's estimate compared with the current year's budget and revised is mainly due to additional taxation. It is partially counterbalanced by a decrease of 24 on account of fees in stamps under the Petroleum and Explosives Acts which are first credited to the central revenues but subsequently credited to provincial revenues by adjustment under "L-Miscellaneous Adjustments between Central and Provincial Governments".

22. *B-Judicial.*—The decrease in the revised estimate for the current year and the budget of the ensuing year compared with the budget estimate of the current year is mainly due to the fall in the receipts from court fees realised in stamps.

23. *Timber and other produce removed from the forests by Government agency.*—The decrease in the ensuing year's estimate, compared with the current year's revised estimate, is mainly due to the discontinuance of the departmental working of coupes and compartments in the East Kanara division and to the reduction in the indent for sleepers by the M. & S. M. Railway.

24. *Timber and other produce removed from the forests by consumers or purchasers.*—The increase in the revised over the current year's budget estimate is due to better prices realised for coupes and compartments in the Northern and Southern Circles and to the recovery of outstandings in the East Kanara division. Next year's estimate shows an increase over the current year's revised estimate due mainly to better prices expected for coupes in the East Thana and the Panch Mahals divisions and also in the Southern Circle.

25. *Miscellaneous.*—The increase in the revised over the current year's budget estimate is partly due to the adjustment of part of the earnings of the Alnawar and Dandeli Railway pertaining to 1937-38 and partly to the levy of fines on contractors for illicit cutting of reserved trees. Next year's estimate shows a decrease in comparison with the current year's revised estimate which is mainly due to the disforestation of some plots under in-forest cultivation in the Panch Mahals division.

26. *Refunds.*—The increase in the revised over the current year's budget estimate is due to the refund of grazing fees recovered last year before orders sanctioning their abolition were issued.

*Expenditure.*

27. *Conservancy and Works.*—The increase in the current year's revised over the budget estimate is due to (1) thinning, etc., to be carried out in certain old coupes, extensive overhauling of tractors and skidding machinery, payment of stores ordered in 1937-38, etc., (2) payment of certain khoti and other bills pertaining to last year, (3) cost of effective measures against fires in the important high forest areas and (4) urgent repairs to certain roads and buildings. The further increase in next year's estimate is due to the increase in the rates of wages paid to labourers employed by the Forest Department on regeneration and fire protection, to the inclusion of provision for departmental working of a compartment in Kanara W. D., and to more consumable stores being required for skidding works and the sawmill in the Southern Circle.

28. *Establishments.*—The increase in the current year's revised over the budget estimate is mainly due to the disbursement of more leave salary than expected. Next year's estimate shows a decrease owing to the reduction in the number of appointments in the Indian Forest Service on the retirement of one officer, his place being filled by the appointment of an officer in Bombay Forest Service, Class I, deputation of an Indian Forest Service Officer to the Government of India, deputation of a Class I officer as Forestry Instructor at the Agricultural College, Poona, and two vacancies in the Bombay Forest Service having been kept unfilled.

29. *Charges in England.*—The decrease in the current year's revised and next year's estimate, compared with the current year's budget estimate, is due to fewer officers proceeding on leave out of India.

*Revenue.*

30. The decrease of 61 in the current year's revised estimate as compared with the budget estimate is due to general economic depression.

*Expenditure.*

31. *District charges.*—The increase in the current year's revised over the budget estimate is mainly due to the increase in expenditure on service postage and telegrams and to the purchase of photo stores in India instead of in England. The increase is partly counterbalanced by a decrease in expenditure under pay of establishment due to the employment of staff on lower scales of pay in place of senior members retired and to the abolition of 9 posts of clerks on account of the extension of the photo-copying system to eleven more offices.

32. *Charges in England.*—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate, compared with the budget estimate, is due to the transfer of 16 from this minor head to the minor head "District charges" owing to the introduction of the system of making purchases of photo stores in India. As these stores will be purchased in future in India no provision has been made for the next year under this minor head.

### Revenue.

33. *Receipts under the Indian Motor Vehicles Act and Provincial Motor Vehicles Taxation Act.*—The increase in the revised estimate of the current year and budget estimate for 1939-40 compared with the budget estimate of the current year is mainly due to the increase in the number of motor vehicles.

### Expenditure.

34. *Charges of collection.*—The increase in the estimate for next year compared with the budget and the revised estimates of the current year is due to the proposed hiring of railway and municipal weigh-bridges and the purchase of eight pairs of portable weighing machines for the purpose of assessment of motor vehicles tax and prevention of overloading.

35. *Inspection of Motor Vehicles.*—The increase in the budget estimate for 1939-40 compared with the budget and revised estimates of the current year is due to the debit on the expenditure side of the expenditure incurred on rule 22 of the Public Conveyances (Motor Vehicles) Rules, 1922, which was previously debited direct to the receipt side.

36. *Compensation to local bodies.*—Provision is made under this head for payment of compensation to local bodies for the abolition of tolls under section 9 (1) (a) of the Bombay Motor Vehicles Tax Act, 1935. The increase of 9 in next year's estimate is due to the fact that arrears of 1938-39 are to be paid to some municipalities next year.

37. *Other charges.*—Provision for the amount to be transferred to the Provincial Road Fund under section 9 (4) of the Bombay Motor Vehicles Tax Act, 1935, is made under this head. It depends upon the receipts under the Act and the cost of collection of the tax including overhead charges. The increase in the revised estimate of the current year and budget estimate of next year compared with the budget estimate of the current year is due to the anticipated increase in receipts from the Motor Vehicles Tax.

38. *Charges in England.*—The increase in the revised over the budget estimate of the current year is mainly due to more expenditure incurred on leave salary as more officers went on leave than anticipated.

*Revenue.*

39. *Taxes on luxuries including taxes on entertainments, amusements, betting and gambling.*—The increase of 2,17 in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate of the current year is mainly due to (i) the anticipated increase of 44 under "Entertainment tax" due to better attendance at places of entertainment, the opening of two new cinemas and an extra race meeting and the Gymkhana Hunt meeting and (ii) additional receipts to the extent of 1,70 expected under "Betting Tax" due to an increase in the number of Book-makers and to better backing by the public with book-makers.

40. *Receipts from Electricity Duties.*—The increase of 1,00 in the revised estimate of the current year and of 1,61 in the estimate of next year over the budget estimate of the current year is due to increased consumption of electricity.

41. *Receipts from Tobacco Duties.*—The increase of 1,07 in the revised estimate of the current year and of 2,06 in the budget estimate of next year compared with the budget estimate of the current year is due to (i) enhanced rates of license fees and to a rise in the consumption of tobacco in the City of Bombay, and (ii) more receipts anticipated under the Bombay (District) Tobacco Act during next year. As the tax was introduced late in the year in certain urban areas the full effect of the tax will not be felt until next year.

*Expenditure.*

42. *Charges in connection with Tobacco Duties.*—Provision on account of (i) grant-in-aid payable to the Bombay Municipality out of the receipts realised under the Tobacco Duty (Town of Bombay) Amendment Act, 1932 and (ii) charges of collection is made under this head. Upto 1937-38, the Bombay Municipality was paid a grant equal to the net proceeds from the Tobacco Duty. The grant was fixed after taking into account the gross receipts provided on the receipt

side and the arrears of past years and deducting therefrom refunds and collection charges. The current year's budget estimate of 10,90 for the grant was fixed on this basis after making a cut of 5 lakhs from the net amount payable to the Municipality. It has now been decided by Government to change this basis and to pay in lump a fixed amount of 12,00 to the Municipality on this account during the current year irrespective of the gross receipts realised from the Tobacco Duty and the arrears of past years. The increase in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate of the current year is due to this additional payment and to the employment of additional establishment in connection with tobacco work in the sales tax areas. The decrease in next year's budget estimate compared with the revised estimate of the current year is due to no provision being made for additional establishment and to a reduced provision of 9,88 being made for the grant to the Bombay Municipality as a result of the decision that in future grants will be made exclusively to the account of the Improvement Trust just sufficient to cover the deficit in the Improvement Trust budget subject to the condition that the grant will not exceed three-fourths of the net realisations by Government from the Tobacco Duty or Rs. 10 lakhs whichever is less. The limit of Rs. 10 lakhs has been fixed because the deficit in the next year's Improvement Trust budget is less than Rs. 10 lakhs and as the financial position of the Trust has been progressively improving, the deficit in its budget in future is not likely to exceed that amount.



NOTE ON THE SYSTEM OF CAPITAL AND NON-CAPITAL  
ACCOUNTS OF IRRIGATION WORKS.

43. Irrigation works are divided into two main categories (1) works for which capital accounts are kept and (2) works for which capital accounts are not kept. All irrigation works, for which it is both desirable and possible to maintain accounts on a quasi-commercial basis, are included in the former category and those for which the maintenance of such accounts is unnecessary, either because they produce little or no revenue or because owing to their restricted size, it is not worthwhile examining the returns paid by each individual works, are put in the latter class. The important criterion in the case of a quasi-commercial undertaking is whether the work is remunerative or the reverse and it is, therefore, essential for this class of works to maintain a capital account, since it is only by reference to the amount of capital expended that the value of the results obtained can be determined.

44. The works for which capital accounts are kept are first divided to show (A) Irrigation and (B) Navigation, Embankment and Drainage Works separately, each of which is again sub-divided into (1) Productive and (2) Unproductive Works.

45. The initial expenditure on the construction of an irrigation project for which capital account is kept is charged to the capital account of that project and such further expenditure after its completion as is necessary for the full development of the scheme is also added to that account.

46. The capital invested on the work includes (1) direct charges, i.e., cost of works, establishment, tools and plant and pensionary charges, (2) indirect charges, e.g., capitalised value of abatement of land revenue occupied by works and audit charges, and (3) all arrears of simple interest, if any, i.e., balance of total interest over net revenue. This capital cost is commonly known as "sum-at-charge".

47. As soon as a work begins to earn revenue, a Revenue Account is opened for it. The revenue derived from the work is credited to that account and annual maintenance charges are debited to it. The difference between the gross revenue earned and the maintenance charges is the net revenue on the work.

48. Turning to the sub-divisions Productive and Unproductive works, it may be observed that if the net revenue from a capital work is expected to repay after ten years from its completion the annual interest charges on the capital invested, i.e., the sum-at-charge, at 4 per cent. or at such other rate as may be fixed by Government from time to time, the work is considered as "Productive", otherwise it is treated as "Unproductive". If any work for which a capital account is kept, which is classed as productive fails at any time after the expiry of ten years from its completion in three successive years to yield the relevant return, it is transferred to the unproductive class. Similarly if a work though classed as unproductive succeeds in yielding for three successive years the relevant return prescribed for a productive work it is transferred to the productive class.

The same principle would apply to all extensions and improvements of an existing work.

49. The capital expenditure on irrigation works is booked in the accounts under one major head, viz., "68, Construction of Irrigation, Navigation, Embankment and Drainage Works". Funds for these works may be provided from ordinary revenues, Famine Fund or from other sources outside the revenue of which the most important is loans, but the expenditure is booked under one major head "68" only. This major head is, however, intended to include only expenditure incurred from sources outside the revenue and it is therefore necessary to deduct from this head the capital expenditure defrayed from general revenues and to show it in the revenue section of the accounts. There will thus be two deductions in lump sums at the foot of the account of the major head "68", and the amounts thus deducted from this head are booked, without details of works under the major head "19-A—Financed from Famine Relief Fund" and "B—Financed

from ordinary Revenues ” according to the source from which funds are provided. The head “ 19 ”, is therefore, purely a transfer head. The net total of the major head “ 68 ”, after the deductions above referred to have been made, represents that portion of the capital expenditure on irrigation works which is financed from sources outside the ordinary revenues.

50. The revenue derived from irrigation works for which capital accounts are kept and the annual expenditure on maintenance and working expenses on those works are respectively credited and debited to the revenue account of those works under a separate Revenue head “ XVII—Irrigation, Navigation, Embankment and Drainage works for which Capital Accounts are kept ”, the divisions and sub-divisions of this account also being the same as those under the corresponding capital expenditure head “ 68 ” mentioned above.

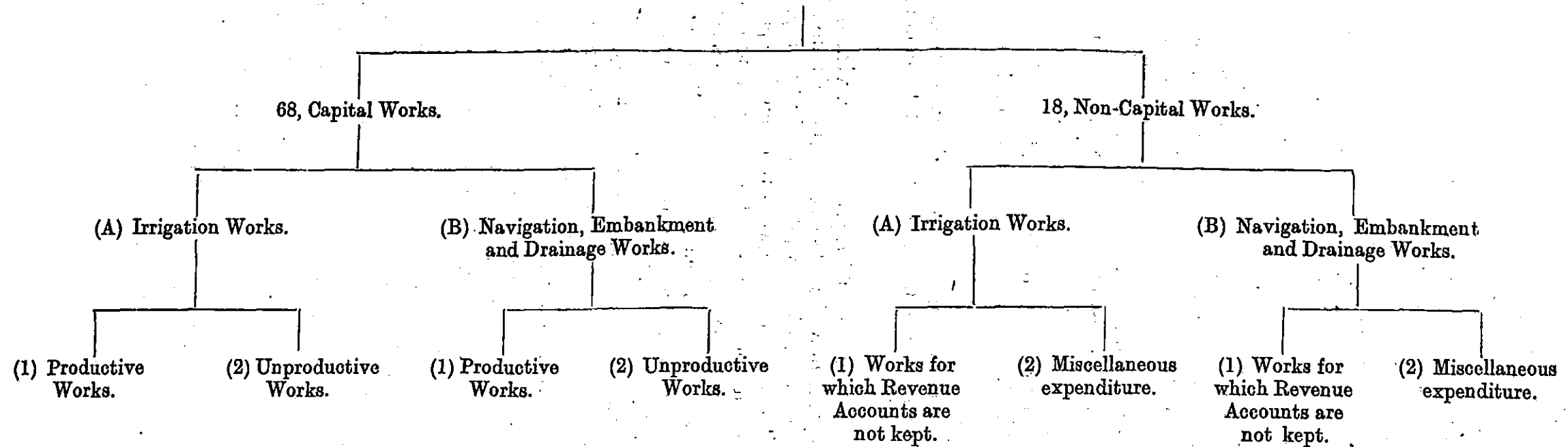
51. In the budget estimates of revenue for Irrigation Works under the above mentioned head “ XVII ”, the working expenses and maintenance charges of capital works are shown by a *minus* entry under gross revenue in order to show the estimated NET revenue, as the essential matter financial is the net and not gross revenue. Although these working expenses are shown under the receipt head, they are, of course, treated in all respects as ordinary expenditure, they are subject to the same rules and conditions and, as in the case of other outlay, are included in the demand for grants.

52. There is one more *minus* entry to be made in the budget estimates of revenue under the head “ XVII ” before the net revenue is shown and that is the “ refunds of revenue ”.

53. The interest on capital expenditure met from ordinary revenues is shown under the head “ 17—Interest on works for which Capital Accounts are kept ”.

54. With reference to the second division of irrigation works, viz., works for which capital accounts are not kept, it may be observed that this division includes a very large number of works which, while collectively of great importance, are individually too small to make it worthwhile to maintain separate accounts for each. All expenditure upon such works—whether upon the construction of new works or upon extensions or improvements, maintenance or repairs of existing works—is accounted for under one major head “ 18—Other Revenue Expenditure ”. Since the works under this class are on a non-commercial basis and no capital accounts are kept for them there is no object in treating maintenance charges as a *minus* entry under revenue from these works as in the case of quasi-commercial works, and therefore, they are shown under the expenditure head “ 18 ”. The only comparison here possible is that between the gross revenue (shown under revenue head “ XVIII ”) and the total expenditure of all kinds. In this division is also booked, under a separate sub-head “ Miscellaneous expenditure ”, all expenditure upon the preliminary surveys of new projects and also the cost of famine surveys required for the preparation of the Famine programme. (The works in this division are financed from ordinary revenues of the year. Those works which have a protective aspect as well as surveys for the preparation of famine programme may be financed from the Famine Relief Fund.) The whole of the expenditure on all works under this class is, however, to be booked in the first instance under one major head “ 18 ” mentioned above without reference to the source from which the funds are provided and it is necessary, therefore, as in the case of the major head “ 68 ” for capital works, to deduct at the foot of the account of the major head “ 18 ” a lump sum showing the amount financed from the Famine Relief Fund, the residue representing the amount financed from ordinary revenues. The amount deducted from this head is booked without details under a separate major head “ 18 (1) Other Revenue Expenditure financed from Famine Fund ” which is merely a transfer head. The revenue earned by this class of works is shown under the Revenue head “ XVIII—Irrigation, Navigation, Embankment and Drainage Works for which no Capital Accounts are kept ” and the refunds of revenue are deducted from the gross receipts in order to show the net revenue for the works.

## IRRIGATION WORKS.



Definitions 1.—“Capital Works” are works for which capital and revenue accounts are kept on a quasi-commercial basis. The capital expenditure is accounted for under the head “68”. Revenue realised from them is credited to the head “XVII”.

2.—“Non-Capital Works” are works for which individually neither capital nor revenue accounts are kept because they produce little or no revenue owing to their restricted size. The expenditure on these is accounted for under the head “18”. Any revenue realised from them is credited to the head “XVIII”.

NOTE SHOWING THE MAIN IRRIGATION WORKS COMPLETED  
AND IN PROGRESS.

55. Cultivation in this Province depends chiefly upon rainfall and advantage is taken of irrigation mainly for growing valuable crops (e.g., sugarcane) or to counteract the effects of drought. The larger irrigation schemes necessarily involve the construction of storage reservoirs on rivers for feeding the canals supplying water to the irrigated areas. The principal irrigation works are mentioned below.

WORKS IN OPERATION.

56. *Lower Panjhra River Works, Kadwa River Works and Krishna Canals.*—The oldest of the Government irrigation works in the Deccan are the Panjhra River Works in Khandesh. They date from 1851-52 and were constructed at a cost of about 5 lakhs of rupees. Next to these among many small works are the Kadwa River Works in Nasik District and the Krishna Canal in Satara District which came into operation in 1869. They were constructed at a cost of about Rs. 10½ lakhs and Rs. 9½ lakhs respectively.

57. *Mutha Canals.*—The Mutha Canals were constructed at a cost of about 65½ lakhs of rupees. This system consists of a large storage reservoir called Lake Fife, on the Mutha River at Khadakwasla near Poona, and two canals, the Mutha Right and Left Bank Canals. It came into operation in 1874-75.

58. *Ekruk Tank and the Hathmati Canal.*—The Ekruk Tank in the Sholapur District and the Hathmati Canal (which was the first and is still the most important work in Gujarat) came into operation in 1872-73 and 1873-74 respectively and about 13½ and 13¼ lakhs of rupees respectively have been spent on them.

59. *Nira Left Bank Canal and Gokak Canal.*—The Nira Left Bank Canal in Poona District receives its supply partly from the Nira River and partly from the reservoir at Bhatgar (called Lake Whiting) on one of the tributaries of that river. It was built at a cost of Rs. 66½ lakhs and was opened in 1885. The Gokak Canal in Belgaum District is a small canal taking off direct from above a weir on the Ghataprabha River without a storage work. It was opened in 1884 and over Rs. 14½ lakhs have been spent on it.

60. *Girna Canal.*—The Girna Canal in Nasik District is fed from the Chankapur Tank. It was constructed at a cost of Rs. 20½ lakhs and was opened for irrigation in 1909.

61. *Godavari Canals.*—The Godavari Canals system includes a storage reservoir (Lake Beale) on the Darna River and pick-up weir at Nandur-Madhmeshwar on the Godavari from which take off the Right and Left Bank Canals. This project has cost about 105 lakhs of rupees and was brought into operation in 1912. The canals irrigate lands in Nasik and Ahmednagar Districts.

62. *Pravara River Works.*—The Pravara River Works system comprises (i) a storage reservoir, called Lake Arthur Hill, in Ahmednagar District on the Pravara River at Bhandardara, (ii) a pick-up-weir at Ojhar and (iii) two canals named the Pravara Right and Left Bank Canals. The project was sanctioned by the Government of India in 1907. Work was commenced in 1908 and both the dam and the canals have been completed. The capital cost of the whole scheme including the dam, amounts to over Rs. 150 lakhs. The masonry dam of the storage reservoir is 274 feet high above the river bed at its highest point and about 1,600 feet in length. It is one of the highest dams in the world. The opening ceremony of this dam was performed by His Excellency the Governor of Bombay on the 10th December 1926, and since that date the dam is known as "Wilson Dam."

In addition to the above schemes there are many other small canals and tanks which collectively irrigate large areas of lands.

## WORK UNDER CONSTRUCTION.

63. The project for remodelling the Nira Left Bank Canal is the only important scheme under construction at present. The scheme will enable the irrigation of an additional area of 19,000 acres. It is expected to be completed by the end of 1940-41.

64. The financial results of irrigation works for which capital accounts are kept for the triennium ending 1937-38 are shown in the accompanying statement.

65. The revenue derived from irrigation works for which capital accounts are kept is classified under two heads, viz. (a) direct receipts, and (b) that portion of the land revenue which is credited to irrigation. The former head (a) includes the sale-proceeds of water supplied for irrigational and non-irrigational purposes, the sale-proceeds from canal plantations and other canal produce (e.g., wood and grass), etc., while the latter head (b) represents the irrigation share of land revenue.

The working expenses of the works for which capital accounts are kept are deducted from the total receipts under the two heads mentioned above (which total receipts are termed "gross revenue") in order to show the "net revenue" earned.

In comparison with the budget and revised estimate for 1938-39, the budget estimate of gross revenue for 1939-40 shows an increase which is due to the proposed cess on land under the command of canals.

The increase in the current year's revised estimate compared with the budget estimate of that year under Working Expenses is due to urgent special repairs to certain works. The increase in the budget estimate for 1939-40 compared with the budget estimate of the current year is mainly due to the provision for collection charges in respect of direct receipts (54) under working expenses from next year.

69. Under Rule 24 of the Devolution Rules under the Government of India Act, 1919, the capital sum spent up to 1920-21 upon the construction of productive and unproductive irrigation works was treated as an advance made to the Local Government from the revenues of India. This advance carried interest at the rate of 3·3252 per cent. per annum on outlay incurred up to the end of 1916-17, and at 5·1979 per cent. per annum on outlay incurred from 1917-18 to 1920-21. The amount repaid on account of this debt on 31st March 1937 under the financial settlement following the Niemeyer Report was 4,02,06 and the outstanding balance is included in the consolidated debt, the interest on which is provided under "22-Interest" (see paragraph 82). Since 1921-22 capital expenditure on irrigation has been met from loans raised for general purposes and the amount of interest payable on these loans is also provided under the same head. The repayment of the old debt referred to above or of the subsequent borrowings does not affect the head "17-Interest" which is merely a *pro-forma* head to indicate the interest on irrigation capital outlay—the credit of the amount shown as expenditure under this head being taken by deducting the same amount from the expenditure shown under the head "22-Interest" under which head provision is made for interest charges on the consolidated debt which includes irrigation debt also. For computing the interest on capital outlay on irrigation works shown under "17" the capital outlay is looked on as irreducible and is unlike debt which is usually redeemable after a fixed term of years; capital outlay can only increase and never diminish whereas debt may be completely repaid.

73. The current year's budget includes lump grants of 12,50 for new works and 3,50 for repairs to existing works, against which the revised estimate shows a decrease of 5,50. The decrease is mainly due to the non-utilization of the full provision of 12,50 for new works. Before executing the schemes proposed some years ago by the Special Engineer, Minor Irrigation Works, Government considered it desirable to have the plans and estimates scrutinised by two officers on special duty. These officers were appointed in July last with instructions to work on the most important projects and submit them by the end of October 1938, so that the works could be taken up for execution in the cold weather. Several projects have been started, while others are ready and an amount of 7,50 is likely to be spent out of 12,50.

77. Interest received by the Local Government on advances and loans made through the Provincial Loans and Advance Account (to agriculturists, local bodies, Presidency Corporations etc.) is credited to "XX, Interest".

(1) *Interest on loans to the Presidency Corporations.*—The decrease of 2,34 in the next year's budget estimate is due to repayments made in the current year.

(2) *Interest on other loans and advances by the Provincial Government.*—The decrease of 1,10 in the current year's revised estimate as compared with the budget estimate is due mainly to the reduction in the rate of interest to 5½ per cent. on all past tagai loans carrying a higher rate of interest and to the suspensions of tagai recoveries sanctioned by Government.

(4) *Interest realised on investment of Provincial balances.*—The increase of 58 in the current year's revised over the budget estimate is due to a larger balance available for temporary investment than was anticipated.

*Expenditure.*

78. The following charges are debited to the head "22-Interest on debt and other obligations" :—

(a) Interest and discount on permanent loans, treasury bills and other floating loans and the charges for management, brokerage, commission and advertisement, etc., in respect of such debt.

(b) Interest payable to the Central Government on advances taken from them.

(c) Interest on the balances in the Provident Funds and educational and charitable funds which have been decentralised.

79. Credit is given to this head under the heads :—

(a) *Deduct*—Interest transferred to commercial Departments.

(i) Interest on irrigation works, transferred to the head "17, Interest on works for which capital accounts are kept".

(ii) Interest on commercial undertakings (Dapuri Workshops).

(b) *Deduct*—Interest transferred to Forest Department for the amount shown as expenditure under the head "10, Forest".

(c) *"Deduct"*—Interest portion of equated payments out of revenue" provided under "55, Superannuation Allowances, etc." in respect of the commuted value of pensions.

80. (1) and (2) *Discount on treasury bills and interest on other floating loans.*—As a consequence of provincial autonomy, provincial Governments are themselves responsible for their ways and means operations. The provision of 50 for discount on treasury bills made in the budget of 1938-39 has been omitted as it is proposed not to issue treasury bills in the current year. A provision of 2 has however been made in the revised estimate for payment of interest on Ways and Means Advances from the Reserve Bank which will be required during the current year.

81. (3) to (5) *Interest on expired loans, management of debt, brokerage, commission, etc.*—The current year's revised estimate represents mainly the unclaimed interest payable on the outstanding Bombay Development loan. It is expected that no interest will be payable on that account in 1939-40.

82. (6) *Interest on the consolidated debt.*—The consolidated debt is repayable to the Government of India in the form of bi-annual equated payments of principal and interest over 45 years on 31st July and 31st January of each year from 1937. The reduction of 76 in the estimate for 1939-40 is due to the repayment made in 1938-39.

83. (7) *Interest on loans to Presidency Corporations excluding those included in the consolidated debt.*—The reduction of 2,17 in the estimate for 1939-40 is due to the repayments made in 1938-39.

84. (8), (9) and (10) *Interest on Unfunded Debt—State Provident Funds and Interest on Charitable and other Funds.*—The estimates are on account of the liabilities assumed by the Government of Bombay as a result of decentralization of balances on the introduction of provincial autonomy. In the budget estimate for 1938-39 provision for interest on Charitable and other funds was made under "C-Interest on other obligations", but with effect from the revised estimate it has been made under "B-Interest on Unfunded Debt—Special Loans".

85. (11) *Deduct—Interest transferred to Commercial Departments.*—

(i) "17-Interest on works for which capital accounts are kept".—The figures are explained under "17, Interest on works for which capital accounts are kept".

86. (12) *Deduct—Interest transferred to "10, Forest"*—A corresponding debit appears under the head "10, Forest".

87. (13) *Deduct—Interest portion of equated payment on account of commuted value of pensions.*—See paragraph 253 under "83-Payments of commuted value of pensions".

88. The minor head "Other Appropriations" is intended for the record of appropriations from revenue for reduction or avoidance of debt other than specific appropriations for regularly constituted sinking funds. The consolidated debt referred to in paragraph 82 under the head "22" is repayable by half-yearly equated instalments of principal and interest in 45 years commencing from 1937. The principal portion of the instalments is debited to the head "23". During the year 1937-38 interest on the consolidated debt was payable for 10 months only instead of for 12 months. The half yearly equated instalment being fixed, the decrease in the interest charges correspondingly increased the principal repaid. This accounts for the decrease of 15,99 in the budget estimate for 1938-39 over the accounts of 1937-38.

## 89. (B) Transfers—Deduct—

The consolidated debt mentioned above includes three long-dated loans of the Bombay Municipal Corporation and also the loans utilised to finance the expenditure under "83—Payments of Commuted value of Pensions" and "85—Payments to Retrenched Personnel" and it is explained below why repayments in respect of these loans are shown as deduct entries under "23".

(i) The repayment made by the Bombay Municipal Corporation in respect of its long-dated loans is credited in the first instance to the head "Loans and Advances by Provincial Government" (receipt side) in the debt section, but in order to utilise it towards the repayment of the consolidated debt which is provided in gross under the minor head "A—Other Appropriations", a corresponding credit by a deduct entry is given to this head.

(ii) and (iii) Loans included in the consolidated debt have been utilised for expenditure under "83—Payments of commuted value of Pensions" and "85—Payments to Retrenched Personnel". The expenditure debited to "83" is being written back to revenue by equated instalments of principal and interest over a period of 15 years by debit to "55" and by credit of the principal portion to the capital head "83" and of the interest portion to "22".

90. The expenditure under "85" was similarly being written back to revenue by equal instalments of principal over a period of 5 years by debit to "55" and credit to "85" but it has been decided to write back the whole outstanding debit under "85" to "55" this year. In order to avoid a double debit to revenue section a *per contra credit* equal to the debit under "55" is given to this head by a deduct entry. The increase of 4 in the deduct entry against item (iii) this year is due to the above decision.

91. *Staff and household of the Governor.*—The decrease in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate of the current year is due to less expenditure under (a) "Band Establishment" and (b) "Maintenance of Government House and upkeep of gardens". The decrease under (a) is due to the establishment being under strength and that under (b) is due to the post of the Garden Superintendent remaining vacant for a part of the year. The decrease in the budget estimate of next year is mainly owing to less provision made under the "Inauguration grant for furniture and carpets".

92. *Secretarial staff of the Governor.*—The decrease in the budget estimate of 1939-40 compared with the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to the fact that the latter figure includes a debit for the leave salary of the previous incumbent.

93. *Ministers.*—The increase in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate of 1938-39 is mainly due to more expenditure under allowances due to extensive touring by Ministers and Parliamentary Secretaries and to an increase under contingencies due to the replacement of a motor car for the use of a Minister.

94. *Provincial Legislative Assembly.*—The decrease in the revised estimate is due to less expenditure under travelling allowance to M. L. A.s as one session less was held than expected. The increase in next year's estimate is due to the provision for four additional reporters for reporting Marathi, Gujarati, Kanarese and Urdu speeches and to an increase in the provision for travelling allowance as the sittings of the Assembly next year are expected to be more frequent.

95. *Provincial Legislative Council.*—The increase in the revised estimate of the current year is mainly under travelling allowance to M. L. Cs.

96. *Elections for Legislatures.*—The decrease in the revised estimate of the current year and the budget estimate of next year is due to fewer bye-elections being expected.

97. *Civil Secretariat.*—The increase in the revised estimate of the current year is mainly due to (a) excess under contingencies of the Separate Department due to large expenditure on furniture, telephones, insurance of Ministers' cars, etc., and (b) continuance of the additional Assistant Secretary's post in the General Department for the whole of the year though provision was made for part of the year and extra debits of joining time pay and allowances of an officer transferred to hold the Secretary's post. The increase in next year's estimate is due to provision for (i) the additional "Labour" branch in the Political and Services Department, (ii) increase in the contingencies of the Separate Department, (iii) additional temporary establishment in the General Department, (iv) additional staff in the Legal Department for doing legal work in the city of Bombay which was entrusted hitherto to a Solicitors' firm, (v) the employment of some temporary establishment in the Oriental Translator's Office and the continuance of the post of the Public Relations Officer. The temporary post of Deputy Secretary in the Political and Services Department which was sanctioned for two years in March 1937 has been continued for a further period of one year ending on 31st March 1940.

98. *Public Service Commission.*—The increase in the revised estimate of the current year is mainly due to the employment of additional establishment and increased expenditure on travelling allowance, advertisements and postage charges.

99. *Director of Land Record.*—The increase in the current year's revised and next year's budget estimates compared with the current year's budget estimate is mainly due to the higher provision for the pay of the Director of Land Records as a senior officer now holds the post.

100. *Local Fund Audit Establishment.*—The estimates under this head are framed by the Government of India. This entry is a transfer entry from the Central head "26-Audit" under which the details will be found. The increase in next year's estimate is mainly due to provision for the additional establishment proposed to be employed for clearing off arrears.

101. *Commissioners.*—The increase in the revised estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to leave salary paid in India to two Commissioners. The decrease in the budget estimate for 1939-40 compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to provision having been made for two first grade and one second grade Commissioners instead of for three first grade Commissioners and the provision for the special pay of the Commissioners having been made for one month only.

102. *District Administration.*—The increase in the revised estimate is under (a) "General Establishment" and (b) "Other Establishment" partially counterbalanced by savings under "Sub-Divisional Establishment". The increase under (a) is under "Pay of Officers" and "Pay of Establishment" due to the non-realisation of the estimate for probable savings and under "Contingencies" due to the supply of service postage stamps to village officers. The increase under (b) is mainly under "Allowances" due to the sanctioned provision having been found insufficient and to the payment of arrears.

The next year's budget estimate allows for (a) increased provision under "Contingencies" of the "General Establishment", (b) increased provisions under "Allowances" to village officers and (c) a lump provision of 14 for revision of pay of inferior servants in certain expensive places in the mofussil. These increases are counterbalanced by a deduct provision of 56 on account of a debit to "XVII and 18, Irrigation" for collection charges of Irrigation revenue. The next year's budget estimate also includes additional provision of 8 under the major head "25" on account of an increase from three to four annas of the ordinary daily allowance to Government servants of the fourth grade. Similar provisions aggregating 9 on account of the increased daily allowance have been made under other major heads excluding "Forest" (where the increased rate already operates).

103. *Miscellaneous—Expenditure from Rural Reconstruction Grants.*—The charges in connection with the village improvement schemes to be financed from provincial revenues as well as from Government of India grants are recorded under this head. The decrease in the next year's estimate compared with the current year's estimates is due to smaller provisions being required for the schemes next year. The question of placing these grants, viz. Rs. 52,000 for the provincial schemes and Rs. 1,60,000 for the Government of India schemes, at the disposal of the Registrar of Co-operative Societies from 1st April 1939 is being considered.

104. *Charges in England—High Commissioner for India.*—The increase in next year's estimates compared with the budget and revised estimates of the current year is mainly due to increased provision for leave salaries of officers expected to proceed on leave to the United Kingdom.

*Revenue.*

105. The decrease in the revised estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to less receipts from (a) fees in the office of the Insolvency Registrar on account of a fall in the number of insolvency petitions and (b) magisterial fines in criminal cases.

The increase in the estimate of 1939-40 is mainly due to the inclusion in Government accounts of fees, fines, etc., which were hitherto credited direct to local bodies or institutions. Grants-in-aid equal to these fines after deducting administrative expenses have been shown under the head "57—Miscellaneous—Miscellaneous compensations".

*Expenditure.*

106. *High Court.*—With effect from the revised estimate of 1938-39 the provisions for the Official Assignee and his staff have been shown under the minor head "Official Assignee." This mainly accounts for the decrease in the current year's revised and the next year's estimate, compared with the current year's budget estimate.

The decrease in the revised estimate is also due to not filling short leave vacancies of Puisne Judges and non-utilisation of the provision for a tour of inspection by a High Court Judge. It is also due to the difference between the pay of the old incumbent of the post of the Court Receiver and Liquidator, who has retired, and that of the new incumbent.

The decrease in the next year's estimate is also due to the inclusion of provision for only one Additional High Court Judge and his establishment as against the provision made in the budget estimate of 1938-39 for three additional Judges and their establishments.

107. *Law Officers.*—The decrease in the current year's revised and the next year's budget estimate is mainly due to the reduction in salaries of Presidency Law Officers.

108. *Presidency Magistrates' Courts.*—The increase in the current year's revised over the budget estimate is due to the appointment of two more additional Presidency Magistrates and their establishments from 1st September 1938.

The estimate for 1939-40 includes provision for the continuance during the whole year of all the four additional Presidency Magistrates and their establishments.

109. *Civil and Sessions Courts.*—The increase in the revised estimate is mainly due to the fact that officers, who were expected to be on leave ex-India during the year 1938-39, did not proceed on leave. This increase is partly counterbalanced by savings under "Subordinate Judges" due to vacancies in the Subordinate Judges' posts being left unfilled for some time.

110. *Criminal Courts.*—The increase in the revised estimate is mainly due to the creation of two temporary appointments of Special Magistrates for three months each in the Ahmedabad and East Khandesh Districts for the trial of certain criminal cases. It is also due to heavy expenditure incurred under "Contingencies" mainly on the payment of bhatta to a large number of witnesses in criminal cases.

111. *Charges in England.*—The decrease in the current year's revised and the next year's estimate is due to fewer officers proceeding on leave ex-India.

112. *Jails.*—The decrease in 1939-40, compared with 1938-39, is mainly due to the closure of the Government Prison Farm, Visapur, during the current year. The decrease is partly noticed in the revised estimate for 1938-39.

*Expenditure.*

113. *Jails.*—The decrease in 1939-40, compared with 1938-39, is mainly due to the closure of the Government Prison Farm, Visapur, and also due to the taking over by Government from the 1st October 1938 of the Management of the Criminal Tribes Settlement at Sholapur from the American Marathi Mission.

114. *Jail Manufactures.*—The increase in 1939-40, compared with 1938-39, is due to purchase of larger quantities of raw materials such as, timber, etc. to comply with the orders from Government Departments, manufacture of woollen blankets for Dharwar Borstal School, supply of cotton clothing in place of gunny clothing to prisoners in Bombay City jails and purchase of mochi machines for chappals and of looms of modern types.

115 *Charges in England.*—The decrease in the estimate for 1939-40, compared with 1938-39, is mainly due to fewer officers being expected to proceed on leave in England than in the current year.

*Revenue.*

116. The decrease in the revised estimate for 1938-39 compared with the budget estimate for the same year is mainly due to (1) less receipts under the minor head "Fees, fines and forfeitures" and (2) deduction of the amount to be transferred to Central Revenues on account of the fees realised under the Petroleum and Explosives Acts, with effect from the current financial year in accordance with the decision of the Government of India. The increase in the budget estimate for 1939-40 compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39 is mainly under the minor heads (a) "Receipts and recoveries on account of Presidency Police" and (b) "Fees, fines and forfeitures". The increase under the minor head mentioned at (a) above is chiefly due to (1) the credit of receipts under the Public Land Conveyances Act, which were hitherto shown as deduction under the head "29, Police—Presidency Police", to meet the cost on account of the working of the Public Land Conveyance Licensing Department and (2) the credit of receipts from the Bombay Port Trust of the  $\frac{1}{4}$ th share of the cost of the new motor launch to be purchased for the Bombay Harbour Police for which provision has been made under the head "29, Police—Presidency Police—River, Harbour or Marine Police". The increase under the minor head mentioned at (b) above is mainly due to (1) the credit of receipts under the Public Land Conveyances Act, which were hitherto credited to "Civil Deposits" under the debt head section and (2) the credit of receipts for giving expert opinion on handwriting from the Handwriting Branch to be created in the Criminal Investigation Department, Poona, for which provision has been made as a new item under the head "29, Police—Criminal Investigation Department (Presidency)".

*Expenditure.*

117. *Presidency Police.*—The increase in the revised estimate for 1938-39 compared with the budget estimate for the same year is mainly due to (1) additional expenditure incurred on account of the creation of temporary appointments of 3 Police Prosecutors, 3 Head Constables and 12 Constables for the Courts of the temporary additional Presidency Magistrates, Bombay, sanctioned by the Legislature as a supplementary demand and (2) provisions sanctioned under "Contingencies" being found insufficient. This increase is, however, partially counterbalanced by the non-utilization of the provision made for the organization and training of volunteer Police Corps in Bombay City, as the scheme is not ready for introduction. The increase in the budget estimate for 1939-40 is due to (1) the provision made for the purchase of a new motor launch for the Bombay Harbour Police to replace two of the existing motor launches, (2) new provision made for the continuance of the temporary appointments of 2 Police Prosecutors, 2 Head Constables and 8 Constables for the Court of the temporary additional Presidency Magistrates, Bombay, (3) the absence of provision for reduction of expenditure under the Public Land Conveyances Act, as the receipts under that Act will be accounted for under the head "XXIII-Police" with effect from the year 1939-40 and (4) increased provisions made under "Contingencies", on the basis of past actuals.

118. *Superintendence.*—The decrease in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to less expenditure under "Pay of Establishment" of the Inspector General of Police and the Range Deputy Inspectors General of Police.

119. *District Executive Force.*—The increase in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to (1) additional expenditure on account of the increase in the strength of the Ahmedabad District Police sanctioned by the Legislature as a supplementary demand, (2) more expenditure under "Pay of Establishment" owing to fewer vacancies in the Police force due to good recruitment and (3) the provisions sanctioned under "Allowances" and "Contingencies" having been found insufficient. The increase in the budget estimate for 1939-40 is mainly due to (1) provision for the full year for the increased strength of the Ahmedabad District Police, (2) the absence of provision for reduction of expenditure under the Public Land Conveyances Act, as the receipts under that Act will be accounted for under the head "XXIII-Police"



with effect from the year 1939-40 and (3) new provision made for the opening of a Police station at Vedach in the Jambusar taluka of the Broach and Panch Mahals District.

120. *Police Training School.*—The decrease in the revised estimate and also in the budget estimate for 1939-40 compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to fewer students being admitted for training in the Police Training School, Nasik.

121. *Railway Police.*—The increase in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39 is under the heads (1) "Pay of Officers" owing to changes in personnel, (2) "Pay of Establishment" owing to fewer vacancies in the Police force due to good recruitment and (3) "Allowances" and "Contingencies" owing to the provisions sanctioned under these heads being found insufficient.

122. *Criminal Investigation Department.*—The increase in the revised compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39 is mainly under the heads (1) "Pay of Establishment" owing to non-realisation in full of the lump cut made for probable savings and (2) more expenditure under "Allowances" owing to an increase in the investigation work of the Criminal Investigation Department. The increase in the budget estimate for 1939-40 compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39 is due to (1) new provision made for the formation of a Handwriting Branch in the Criminal Investigation Department, Poona, and (2) more provisions made under "Pay of Officers" owing to change in personnel and under "Allowances" on the basis of past actuals.

123. *Charges in England.*—The decrease in the revised estimate for the year 1938-39 compared with the budget estimate for the same year is mainly due to less expenditure on account of leave salary of officers, as fewer officers went on leave than expected. The increase in the budget estimate for 1939-40 is mainly due to more provision made for leave salary of officers who are expected to proceed on leave in England.

124. The receipts from and the cost of establishment of the survey of inland vessels are treated as Provincial, while those for ocean going vessels are treated as Central. Accordingly expenditure in connection with the Ship Survey Department, Bombay, is treated as partly Central and partly Provincial, the proportion being 93 per cent. Central and 7 per cent. Provincial. The above provision in the Bombay budget represents 7 per cent. of the total cost of the Ship Survey Department of the Government of India.

125. *Museums and Scientific Societies.*—The current year's estimate includes provision for a non-recurrent grant to the Prince of Wales Museum. This explains why next year's estimate is smaller than the current year's. The provision proposed for next year does not include the usual provision on account of the Historical Museum, Satara, which is to be closed but includes the additional provision of 2 on account of grant-in-aid to the Lord Reay Industrial Museum, Poona.

## Revenue.

126. *A—University.*—The increase of 82 in the revised estimate over the budget estimate for 1938-39 is due to the increase from fees in Government Arts and Professional College consequent on an increase in the number of students. The increase of 76 in the estimate for 1939-40 compared with the revised estimates for 1938-39 is partly to be attributed to the same cause and partly to the levy of fees at the Secondary Teachers Training Colleges at Bombay and Belgaum.

127. *E—General.*—The increase of 21 in the revised estimate over the budget estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to (1) the refund of the building grant by the American Marathi Mission Girls' School at Byculla, and (2) the library fees collected from students having been credited to "Miscellaneous". The increase of 5,38 in the estimate for 1939-40 over the revised estimate for 1938-39 is accounted for mainly by the transfer of 5,00 from the deposit account of the Special Development Fund for the construction of school buildings for primary schools, and partly by anticipated increases under "Recoveries of overpayments" and "Miscellaneous".

## Expenditure.

128. *A—University.*—The increase of 76 in the revised estimate over the budget estimate for 1938-39 is due to the following causes:—

(1) The inclusion under this sub-major head of the estimated expenditure in the current year for research in Kannada literature and the revival of the Deccan College, for which provision was made in the current year's lump provision of 32,92 under the sub-major head "E—General" (49).

(2) The reorganisation of the Government Law College (6) and

(3) The introduction of the University bifurcation scheme at the Sydenham College of Commerce and Economics, Bombay (21).

The increase of 80 in the budget estimate for 1939-40 over the revised estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to—

(1) a grant of 75 to the Deccan College Research Institute, and of 11 for research in Kannada literature against an amount of 49 included in the revised of the current year for those objects (37) ;

(2) a provision of 41 under this sub-major head on account of the opening of the Secondary Teachers Training College at Belgaum, the estimated expenditure for which in the current year appears under "E-General" counterbalanced by a saving of about 20 as a result of the retirement of I.E.S. Officers and the appointment of substitutes on lower pay ; (21)

(3) additional staff in the Sydenham College of Commerce and Economics (4) ; and

(4) additional provision for grants to non-Government Arts Colleges ; (17).

129. *B-Secondary.*—The increase of 63 in the revised estimate over the budget estimate for 1938-39 is due to the expenditure being shown under this sub-major head on grants for secondary education for which an amount of 99 is included in the current year's lump provision for new schemes of educational expansion and improvement under "E-General" counterbalanced by a saving of 36 due to the death of a senior headmaster and transfers and retirement of some teachers and non-utilisation of the provision for Provident Fund scheme for teachers in recognised Secondary schools. The increase of 92 in the budget estimate for 1939-40 over the revised estimate for 1938-39 is due to—

(1) the conversion of the Middle schools for Girls at Bijapur, Ahmednagar, Thana and the Anglo-Urdu Girls School, Poona, into full-fledged High Schools ;

(2) the conversion of five Government High Schools into Junior Vocational Schools ;

(3) the provision of facilities for the teaching of Hindustani in the Urdu and Devanagari scripts to the students in the Government Secondary schools ; and

(4) the grants for physical education and for the provision of playgrounds and sites.

The estimated expenditure in the current year on account of (2) and (4) appears under "E-General" in the revised estimate for that year.

130. *C-Primary.*—The revised estimate compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39 shows an increase of 9,98, which is made up of an excess in voted expenditure of 11,98 counterbalanced by a saving of 2,00 in the charged grants. The charged saving of 2,00 is due to the decision recently taken to treat the expenditure as voted, a corresponding excess being registered in the voted expenditure. The remaining voted excess of 9,98 is due to the transfer to this sub-major head of the following allotments from the lump provision for new schemes of educational expansion and improvement provided under "E-General" in the current year's budget estimate :—

8,05 for the restoration of temporary cuts in the provincial grants to local bodies for primary education ;

3,25 for additional grants to local authorities on admissible items of expenditure ;

9 for training of teachers in basic crafts ;

2 for the conversion of the primary school at Thamna into a basic craft school ;

47 for the opening of 200 district local board schools ;

1,00 for construction of school houses.

Total 12,88

This excess is counterbalanced by a saving of 2,90 on account of the reduction in the grants to local bodies equal to the cost of the staff taken over from them under the amended Primary Education Act.

The excess of 9,33 in the budget estimate for 1939-40 over the revised estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to the following additional provisions counterbalanced by a reduction of 1.08 equal to the difference between the cost in the current and next years to be recovered from local authorities on account of the administrative and inspecting staff taken over from them:—

131. *D-Special*.—The increase of 5,26 in the budget estimate for 1939-40 over the revised estimate for 1938-39 is due to the inclusion of additional provisions on account of the following items:—

- (1) 3 for teaching of Hindustani in Government educational institutions;
- (2) 73 for the opening of basic craft primary schools on the Wardha lines;
- (3) 2,32 for expansion of the existing training institutions and the opening of new training institutions;
- (4) 28 for additional stipends to candidates deputed by local bodies for training;
- (5) 33 for expenditure in connection with the physical training institute;
- (6) 69 for short term courses for teachers in physical education;
- (7) 70 for grants for Adult Education;
- (8) 10 for grants to gymnasia; and
- (9) 8 for grants to Special institutions for training in Hindustani.

133. *Direction*.—The changes in the figures are due to changes in personnel.

134. *Inspection*.—The decrease of 6 in the revised estimate under Anglo-Indian and European Communities compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39 is due to the departure on leave of the Inspector of European schools for England. The increase of 9 in the estimate for 1939-40 over the revised estimate for the current year is due to the inclusion of provision for the payment of compensation to the Inspector of European Schools on the termination of his contract. The excess of 2,90 in the revised estimate compared with the budget for 1938-39 under 'other Communities' is due to the administrative and inspecting staff taken over into Government service from the local authorities. The increase of 2,02 in the budget estimate for 1939-40 over the revised estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to the inclusion of a provision of 1,00 for the strengthening of the Inspecting staff of Government and of additional provision required for the full year 1939-40 on account of the staff taken over from local bodies as against the cost for eight months included in the revised estimate for 1938-39.

135. *Scholarships*.—The decrease of 14 in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39 is due to a saving of that amount in the provision for scholarships to scheduled classes as a result of the fact that free studentships granted to the pupils of those classes in Government schools appear as a loss of revenue instead of as expenditure. The increase of 98 in the budget estimate for the year 1939-40 over the revised estimate for 1938-39 is mainly accounted for by (a) the inclusion of the provision of 79 under this sub-major head on account of educational facilities for the Backward and intermediate Classes and the Muhammadans provided in the current year in the lump provision for educational schemes under "E-General" and (b) the addition of a provision of 14 for the free-studentships to students in non-Government schools, and (c) a provision of 2 on account of additional scholarships in Government High Schools converted into junior vocational schools.

136. *Miscellaneous*.—The increase of 12 in the revised estimate over the budget estimate for 1938-39 is due to (a) an expenditure of 5 on the Vocational Training and Primary Teachers Training Committees (b) an additional grant of 4 to the Bhandarkar Oriental Research Institute and (c) an expenditure of 3 on account of purchase of copies of some important classical publications for the use of educational institutions. The increase of 23 in the budget estimate for 1939-40 over the revised estimate for 1938-39 is due to (i) the provision of 12 made for research work in Gujarati literature, (ii) an amount of 18 provided for the Board of Physical Education and (iii) a provision of 5 for grant to the S. N. D. T. Indian Women's University counterbalanced by the absence of provisions on account of the 3 additional items included in the revised estimate for 1938-39 and referred to above.

137. *F-Charges in England*.—These charges consist of provisions for (1) leave pay of officers on leave in England, (2) overseas pay of European Officers and (3) Government Scholarships. The first two fluctuate according to the number of officers going on leave. The decrease of 27 in the revised estimate compared with the budget for 1938-39 is due to certain officers not going on leave as anticipated and to scholars going to England late in the year. The increase of 11 in the budget estimate for 1939-40 over the revised estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to the inclusion of provision for compensation to certain European Officers on the termination of their contracts.

138. *Lump provision*.—The expenditure anticipated in the current year against the lump provision of 32,92 for new schemes of educational expansion and improvement is 23,96. An amount of 14,36 out of this has been accounted for in the revised estimate of the current year under the appropriate sub-major, minor and detailed heads. The balance of 9,60 has been shown as the revised estimate against the lump provision. The saving of 8,96 is due to the time taken in the settlement of the details of the various schemes and to the consequent delay in starting those schemes.

*Revenue.*

139. *Medical Schools and College fees.*—The increase in the estimate for next year compared with the budget and revised estimates for the current year is mainly due to the anticipated receipt of fees from students at the Sir Currimbhoy Ebrahim Dental School which it is proposed to establish in the course of next year.

140. *Hospital Receipts.*—The increase in the revised over the budget estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to an increase in the number of paying patients at hospitals owing to stricter enforcement of the revised hospital fee rules. For the same reason the budget estimate for the next year has been taken at a slightly higher figure.

141. *Mental Hospital Receipts.*—The increase in the revised over the budget estimate for year is due to the increase in the number of paying patients at the Mental Hospitals.

142. *Income from Endowments.*—Increase in the revised estimate and the budget estimate for next year compared with the budget estimate for the current year is due to additional income from interest on the endowment attached to the 26 beds in the Ellappa Balaram Pavilion at the J. J. Hospital, Bombay, which have now been taken over by Government for maintenance from Provincial revenues.

143. *Miscellaneous.*—The increase in the revised estimate and the budget estimate for next year is due to the fact that the Central Government pays to the Provincial Government at the beginning of each year a lump sum of Rs. 4,800 in respect of each British Medical Officer belonging to the War Reserve. It is expected that a sum of Rs. 43,200 will be paid to the Provincial Government on this account in the current year as well as in next year.

*Expenditure.*

144. *Medical Establishment.*—The decrease in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to (i) the appointment of a non-I.M.S. Officer as Personal Assistant to the Surgeon General, (ii) Vacancies in the I.M.S. Cadre, (iii) changes in personnel in the Surgeon General's Office. For the same reasons next year's estimate is lower than the current year's estimates.

145. *Hospitals and Dispensaries.*—The decrease in the revised estimate compared with the current year's budget estimate is mainly due to (i) less expenditure on the scheme for subsidising medical practitioners, (ii) changes in personnel, (iii) posting of B.M.S. Officers instead of I.M.D. officers at St. George's Hospital, Bombay, (iv) not filling up of the post of the Leprosy officer, (v) savings under house rent allowance to the Medical Officer at the Cama and Albless Hospitals and (vi) reduction in the rates of compensatory allowances. The increase in next year's estimate compared with the current year's budget estimate and the revised estimate is mainly due to (i) additional provision on account of the scheme for subsidising medical practitioners in rural areas, (ii) purchase of mattresses, bed sheets and other articles of linen required for the J. J. Group of Hospitals and the Cama and Albless Hospitals, (iii) additional X-Ray equipment for the J. J. Hospital, (iv) additional provision for grants to local and municipal hospitals and dispensaries, (v) additional short term Casualty Medical Officer for the J. J. Hospital, Bombay, and (vi) the appointment of additional inferior establishment at certain civil hospitals.

146. *Grants for Medical purposes.*—The increase in the revised over the budget estimate for the current year is mainly due to special grants to the King Emperor's Anti-Tuberculosis Fund and to the J. J. Hospital Nursing Association. The increase in next year's estimate compared with the budget estimate for the current year is on account of revision of grants-in-aid to several nursing associations.

147. *Medical Colleges and Schools.*—The decrease in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate for the current year is mainly due to the savings anticipated in the grant of Rs. 1 lakh provided for Ayurvedic and Unani institutions. The increase in next year's estimate is mainly due to additional provisions on account of (i) the proposed establishment of the Sir Currimbhoy Ebrahim Dental School and (ii) the maintenance charges of two Ayurvedic Schools which it is proposed to establish next year.

148. *Mental Hospitals.*—The increase of 1,05 in the revised estimate over the current year's budget estimate is due partly to the enhanced pay of a Deputy Superintendent on promotion, to leave salary, and to additional expenditure on travelling allowances but chiefly to increased expenditure under "Contingencies" due to an increase in the number of patients and to inadequate provisions in the first place. The increase of 28 in next year's budget compared with the current year's budget, is due to increased provision under "Contingencies" in view of the increase in the number of patients, and provision on account of two new items viz., (1) additional S.M.S. Officer at the N. M. Mental Hospital, Thana, and (2) Hydrotherapy at the same Hospital.

149. *Charges in England.*—The decrease in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate for the current year is due to the early return of an officer from leave, postponement of leave of one officer and the surrender of the provision of 9 for stores for being utilised in India.

150. The sale proceeds of quinine, sera and vaccines etc. and contributions from the local bodies towards the pay of vaccinators, the Infectious Diseases Hospital and receipts from water works are credited to this head.

151. *Sale proceeds of sera and vaccines, etc.*—The receipts under this head are fluctuating as they depend on the demand for plague and other vaccines from local bodies, Indian States and other Provinces. The increase in the revised estimate is based on the progress of actuals during the current year.

152. *Contributions.*—This head represents contributions received from local bodies towards—

- (i) the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Poona,
- (ii) the pay of vaccinators,
- and
- (iii) the Public Health Laboratory, Poona.

The revised estimate is less than the budget estimate of the current year because the contribution of 17 from the Rockefeller Foundation towards the health unit scheme is not likely to be received this year as that scheme will not be started until next year, when a contribution of 15 is expected, which accounts for the increase in next year's estimate over the current year's revised.

153. *Transfer from the deposit account of the Special Development Fund.*—The provision of 8.55 represents the transfer from the deposit account of the Special Development Fund for expenditure on village water supply works which will be financed from that Fund.

154. *Miscellaneous.*—The increase in the revised estimate for this year and the estimate for next year is mainly due to a greater demand for water from the public in Salsette.

*Expenditure.*

155. *Public Health Establishment.*—The revised estimate is less than the current year's budget on account of—

- (i) the substitution of an I.M.S. Assistant Director of Public Health by a non-I.M.S. Officer, (ii) the debit on account of the leave salary of Mr. Stamper under "Charges in England", and (iii) the delay in starting the health unit scheme.

The increase in next year's estimate over the revised estimate is mainly due to (i) the proposed appointment of a personal assistant to the Director of Public Health, (ii) provision for the purchase of a gas plant for the Public Health Laboratory, Poona, and (iii) additional provision for establishment charges provided *pro rata* on account of works executed by the Public Works Department.

156. *Grants for Public Health Purposes.*—The increase in next year's estimate over the revised estimate for the current year is due to (i) an additional provision of 5 for grants-in-aid to municipalities on account of health officers and sanitary inspectors as it is proposed to admit for Government grants municipalities with a population of 10,000 and above instead of those with a population of 15,000 or over as at present, and (ii) the additional provision of 7 for the Bombay Mofussil Maternity Child Welfare and Health Council.

157. *Expenses in connection with epidemic diseases.*—The increase in the revised over the budget estimate is due to the necessity for sanitary arrangements at Morwad. No provision has been made for this item next year as it is not known how long the pilgrimages to Morwad will continue. This together with smaller provision for anti-malaria staff accounts for the reduction in next year's estimate.

158. *Bacteriological Laboratories.*—The increase in the revised over the budget estimate of the current year is due to more expenditure on contingencies under the Haffkine Institute on account of greater demand for sera and vaccines. The increase in next year's budget estimate over the revised estimate is due to (i) the provision for additional establishment at the Haffkine Institute, (ii) additional provision for contingencies of the Haffkine Institute and (iii) full provision on account of the Pharmaceutical Laboratory being made next year.

159. *Works.*—The expenditure on village water supply works which was provided under this head up to the current year will, in the next year, be met from the Special Development Fund. The provision on this account has, therefore, been shown under the minor head "Special Development Programme". The decrease in next year's estimate is due mainly to the absence of the current year's provision of Rs. 10,00,000 on this account counterbalanced by an increase of 26 for providing water mains at Juhu under the Salsette Water Supply Scheme and at the North-East of Jogeshwari Railway Station.

160. *Special Development Programme.*—The provision for village water supply works has been made under this head as it has been decided to finance the works from the Special Development Fund. As against the provision of 10,00 in the current year's budget made under "Works" the provision for next year is 8,55.

161. *Charges in England.*—The increase in the next year's estimate over the revised estimate is due to more officers going on leave ex-India.

162. *Agricultural Receipts.*—The Agricultural College and School fees and proceeds from farm produce, cotton seed and implements sold by the Agricultural Department and also grants from the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research transferred from the deposit section are credited to this head. The increase of 25 and 46 in the current year's revised and next year's estimate respectively compared with the budget of the current year is due mainly to increased provision for transfer from the deposit account of the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research on account of the Dry Farming Research scheme (which has since been extended), the Sugar-cane pests scheme, the scheme for testing the reactions of wheat to black stem rust and for certain works in connection with the Sheep-breeding and the Virus Diseases schemes.

*Expenditure.*

163. The classifications by minor heads of this major head have been changed with effect from 1939-40. For purposes of comparison with the estimates of next year the actuals of 1937-38 and the revised estimates of 1938-39 have been re-cast in accordance with the new classification and are not actuals nor estimates of the figures as they will be booked finally.

The difference between the budget estimate i.e., 16,35 and the revised viz. : 15,77 for the whole major head is mainly due to the non-utilisation of the lump provision for propaganda.

164. *Superintendence.*—The decrease of 32 in next year's budget compared with the current year's figure is due to the abolition of two posts of Deputy Director of Agriculture in consequence of the reorganisation of rural development work.

165. *Subordinate and Expert staff.*—The decrease of 1,91 in next year's estimate compared with the current year's figure is due mainly to the transfer to the head "42, Co-operation" of the provisions for pay and allowances on account of (a) two Cotton Superintendents, and the Divisional Superintendent of Agriculture, Deccan Canals, and their staff and (b) 45 Agricultural Overseers, 30 Agricultural Sub-overseers and 29 kamgars transferred to the Co-operative and Rural Development Department as part of the scheme for the organisation of rural development work.

166. *Agricultural demonstration and propaganda including public exhibitions and fairs.*—The decrease in next year's budget compared with the current year's figure is mainly due to (i) the absence of lump provision for "Propaganda" and (ii) the transfer of the provision for "Bunding Classes" to the minor head "Agricultural Education" as supervision of bunding work has been entrusted to the Professor of Agricultural Engineering, Physics and Mathematics, Agricultural College, Poona.

167. *Agricultural Experiments and Research.*—The increase in next year's estimate compared with the figure for the current year is due to the inclusion of additional provision on account of the Dry Farming Research scheme and the Sugarcane Research Scheme (which have since been extended) and other new schemes financed wholly or partly by the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research.

168. *Agricultural Education.*—The increase of 30 in next year's estimate is due mainly to the inclusion of the provision for training agriculturists in bunding work (*vide* para. 166 above).

169. *Grants-in-aid, Contributions, etc.*—The increase of 23 in next year's estimate compared with the current year's figure is due mainly to the inclusion of provisions for cotton seed distribution and extension schemes financed by the Indian Central Cotton Committee.

170. *Other charges.*—The provision under this head is for expenditure on the quinquennial cattle census to be held next year.

171. *Charges in England.*—The decrease in next year's estimate compared with the figure for the current year is due to less provision on account of leave-salary for officers going on leave ex-India.

172. The increase of 12 in the current year's revised estimate compared with the budget estimate is due to the increase in the number of students joining the Veterinary College, sale of rinderpest vaccines to Indian States, larger receipts from fees for inoculations and vaccinations against contagious animal diseases and the contribution of 5 from the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research on account of the Tick Control Scheme. The next year's estimate is the same as the revised estimate for the current year.

*Expenditure.*

173. *Superintendence.*—The increase of 16 in the revised over the budget estimate of the current year is due to larger purchases of sera and vaccines occasioned by widespread epidemics among cattle.

174. *Hospitals and dispensaries.*—The decrease of 17 in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate of the current year is mainly due to savings anticipated in the provision for grants-in-aid towards the construction of veterinary dispensary buildings at Sindgi, Taloda and Bhusawal as the buildings are not likely to be completed during the current year. The increase in next year's estimate under this head is due to the new item of 31 for grants-in-aid towards the construction of veterinary dispensary building at Hubli and those at Sindgi, Taloda and Bhusawal, provision for which has been repeated.

175. *Other charges.*—The increase of 6 in the revised over the budget estimate of the current year is due to the purchase of two spraying machines for the Scheme for the Control of Ticks. The increase in the provision for next year is due to inclusion of the full year's cost of the Tick Control Scheme.

176. *Charges in England.*—The increase of 7 in next year compared with the budget and revised estimates of the current year is due to the provision for leave salary of two officers of the Bombay Veterinary College who intend to proceed on leave out of India.

## Revenue.

177. *Audit fees.*—The increase of 18 in next year's estimate compared with the budget and the revised estimates of the current year is due to larger receipts of audit fees on account of increase in the working capital of the Co-operative Societies and recovery of past arrears.

178. *Miscellaneous Receipts.*—Under this minor head (i) receipts of the Registrar and (ii) transfers from the deposit account of subsidy from the Government of India towards the Scheme of Co-operative Training and Education and from the Sugar Excise Fund are recorded. The decrease of 42 in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate of the current year is due to reductions in the transfers from the deposit account of the subsidy towards the Co-operative

Training and Education Scheme and the grant from the Sugar Excise Fund, due to less expenditure. Next year's estimate includes no transfer from the Sugar Excise Fund. This accounts for the decrease of 25 in that year's estimate compared with the current year's budget estimate. The increase of 17 in next year's estimate over the revised estimate is due to larger receipts expected from the Co-operative Training and Education Scheme.

*Expenditure.*

179. The decrease of 63 in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate of the current year is mainly due to (i) the provisions made for the additional staff and grants-in-aid to village multi-purpose societies not being fully utilised, (ii) the post of Assistant Registrar for Land Mortgage Banks being held in abeyance for part of the year, (iii) less expenditure on the Scheme for the Organisation of Co-operative Societies for sugar manufacture and the Co-operative Training and Education Scheme and (iv) the provision made for leave salary of the Registrar under the minor head 'Charges in England' not being utilised.

The estimate for 1939-40 exceeds the current year's budget estimate by 10,38. This large increase is due to (i) the expansion of the activities and the staff of the Co-operative Department in consequence of the decision of Government to undertake intensive measures for the organisation of rural development work and to entrust it to the Co-operative Department and (ii) provision being made for the staff and contingencies of debt composition boards to be set up when the legislation for composition of debts of agriculturists is passed. The lines on which the rural development work will be organised and the details of additional staff which will be employed for that work are explained in statements of new items under 42, Co-operation.

180. *Industries.*—The increase in the revised estimate over the budget estimate of the current year is mainly due to larger receipts (70) under the Weights and Measures Act, the reason being that the verification of weights and measures which is carried out once in two years falls due in the current year and to the additional transfer (10) from the deposit account of the grant from the Government of India on account of the development of handloom and small scale woollen industries.

181. *Fisheries.*—The decrease in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate is partly due to no further instalments on the launch "Sir Frederick Sykes" being payable and partly to smaller receipts from the sale of salt.

*Expenditure.*

182. *Industries.*—The decrease of 95 in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate for the current year is mainly due to (i) a saving of 43 under “Industrial Development” due to the completion only late in the year of the Industrial Engineer’s Workshop and the Industrial Chemist’s Laboratory, and the consequent saving on staff and experimental work; (ii) saving of 40 mainly due to certain schemes of industrial development, namely, the scheme for the manufacture of lead pencils, development of paper pulp industry, survey of sericulture and ericulture and pottery experiments, being postponed or started late in the year and (iii) a saving of 31 under “Vocational Training for middle class unemployed” due mainly to the abandonment of the scheme for establishing a Tailoring School and to the late starting of the Leather Working School; partly counterbalanced by increased expenditure of which the main item is an increase of 14 under “Direction” as the Director of Industries did not proceed on leave ex-India, which accounts for the saving under “Charges in England”.

The increase of 292 in next year’s budget compared with the current year’s revised estimate is mainly due to provision (3,49) for several new items of expenditure for industrial development partly counterbalanced by less provision under existing schemes of industrial development.

183. *Fisheries.*—The decrease of 53 in the revised estimate under this head is mainly due to the scheme for improvement of fishing methods having been postponed until next year.

184. *Inspector of Factories.*—The revised estimate is less than the budget estimate of the current year because one Inspector went on leave *ex-India*. The increase in the estimate for next year is due to the appointment of additional Inspectors, clerks and peons in the Factory Department in connection with the extension of the provisions of the Factories Act and the Payment of Wages Act to small concerns.

185. *Labour.*—The increase in the revised estimate over the current year's budget estimate is mainly due to the expenditure of about 50 on account of the Textile Labour Inquiry Committee. The decrease in the budget estimate of next year is due to less expenditure on the Textile Labour Enquiry Committee and the new Commissioner of Labour and a part of the expenditure on social amenities for labour being provided under the head "50-Civil Works".

186. *Miscellaneous.*—The increase in the revised estimate over the budget estimate of the current year is due to (i) the additional grant to the Children's Aid Society on account of the increase in the number of children dealt with under the Bombay Children Act and in the grant to the Bombay Province Probation and After-care Association and (ii) additional grants to the backward class hostels as a result of the increase in the rates of capitation grants and extra expenditure on scholarships to backward class students.

The increase in the estimate of next year over the revised estimate is due to (i) the proposed payment of a block grant of Rs. 2 lakhs to the Children's Aid Society, Bombay, for construction of a Children's Home at Chembur, (ii) increased provision for grant-in-aid to the Children's Aid Society owing to the large number of Children that the Society will have to accommodate in its new Home, (iii) appointment of an Assistant Inspector of Certified Schools, (iv) maintenance charges of children committed to the Sholapur Children's Home and (v) additional provision for scholarships for backward class students.

187. *Charges in England.*—The increase in the estimate of next year over the budget and the revised estimates of the current year is due to more officers going on leave *ex-India*.

188. The receipts consist mainly of rents of buildings and transfers from the Central Road Fund.

The increase of 3,06 in the revised over the budget estimate for 1938-39, is mainly due to the increase under transfers from the Central Road Development Account on account of new works taken up during the course of the year (2,89) and under recoveries of expenditure (22), partly counterbalanced by less receipts from rents of buildings. The increase of 2,22 in the budget estimate for 1939-40, compared with that for 1938-39, is mainly due to the increased provision for Central Road Development works.

*Expenditure.*

189. The increase of 7,86 in the revised over the budget estimate for 1938-39 is mainly due to expenditure of an urgent nature authorised on Medical, Scarcity and Petrol Tax works, tools and plant and grant-in-aid to local bodies for scarcity works, etc. The increase of 9,80 in the budget estimate for 1939-40, compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39, is due to provision for new major works enumerated in statement F and to increased provision for Central Road Development works.

NOTE ON THE BUDGET PROVISION AND FINAL DEBIT OF  
EXPENDITURE ON PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT  
ESTABLISHMENT AND TOOLS AND PLANT CHARGES.

191. In this Province the Public Works Department establishment is not divided into two distinct branches to deal separately with "Irrigation" and with "Roads and Buildings" (or "Civil Works"). A considerable proportion of the ordinary establishment executes work in connection with both branches. With a view to facilitating the booking of expenditure and appropriation audit, all establishment and tools and plant charges (excluding special establishments and those tools and plant which are required for the carrying out of Irrigation survey works as well as tools and plant purchased from the Provincial Road Fund) are included in one demand for grant under the head "50, Civil Works".

192. At the end of the year when the final figures of expenditure are known, the expenditure on ordinary establishment and tools and plant in each circle of superintendence is distributed over the major heads, in proportion to the total expenditure on works and repairs debited to those major heads in that circle. It is necessary that the budget provisions for both these items under all the major heads concerned should correspond as nearly as possible with the sums that will be finally debited to those heads.

193. *Establishment.*—During the years up to and including 1933-34 the ordinary establishment charges provided in the budget were calculated at the rate of 24 per cent. of the estimated cost of works and repairs in the case of all Central heads and the Provincial heads "XVII", "18", "68", "81" and "52", the residue being shown under the head "50". The figures worked out in the accounts on the basis of a *pro-rata* distribution under the several major heads varied very greatly from those provided in the budget on the above basis. In order to bring the budget figures closer to the actuals it was decided, with effect from the year 1934-35, that ordinary establishment charges under all the Provincial Major Heads concerned should be provided on a *pro-rata*, instead of a percentage basis, but that in the case of the Central heads they should continue to be provided at a percentage rate. It was also decided that special establishments should continue to be provided under the heads to which their cost is debitable. The establishment charges under the several heads of accounts concerned have been provided in accordance with the decisions outlined above.

194. *Tools and Plant.*—The original estimates are based on the requirements of the local officers. As a rate of 3 per cent. has been prescribed in respect of works carried out for other Governments and also from the Provincial Road Fund, provision for tools and plant required for such works is made at that rate by deduction from the total actual requirements. The residue is distributed over all other Provincial heads, including "50", in proportion to the estimated outlay on works and repairs under those heads.

195. Certain establishment is engaged solely on work in connection with the Back Bay Reclamation Scheme and it is accordingly classified under the head "80, Bombay Development Scheme", to which head the cost of works in connection with that scheme is debitable. That head also bears the cost of part of the pay and allowances of the Superintending Engineer, Northern Circle, the Executive Engineer, Presidency Division, and one Assistant Engineer, and full pay and allowances of one overseer, who are now in charge of the Back Bay Reclamation work. Secretariat charges, calculated at 1 per cent. on the cost of works are also included under that head.

196. The details of the establishment and tools and plant charges except those of the special establishment and those tools and plant which are required for carrying out Irrigation survey works are given in the detailed account under the major head "50, Civil Works" and the details of the special establishments and tools and plant required for Irrigation survey works are given in the detailed accounts under the major heads concerned.

The total gross estimated cost of the Public Works Department for the year 1939-40 is Rs. 37,24,200 (Rs. 5,25,200 Charged + Rs. 31,99,000 Voted) while the total net estimated cost is Rs. 30,80,500 (Rs. 4,69,200 Charged + Rs. 26,11,300 Voted). 198. *Item 1—Total establishment charges excluding pensionary charges.*—The decrease in the budget estimate for 1939-40 compared with the budget and the revised estimates for the year 1938-39 is mainly due to—

(i) the retirement of senior officers of the Indian Service of Engineers and deputation of one officer of the Indian Service of Engineers to the Educational Department;

(ii) reorganisation of the Dapuri Workshops which have been converted into a Sub-division under the control of the Consulting Public Health Engineer to Government;

(iii) the abolition of one Divisional and three Sub-divisional charges in the Deccan Irrigation Circle; and

(iv) conversion of the temporary posts of clerks and inferior servants in sub-divisions and staff of the Electrical Branch into permanent posts.

199. *Item 2—Establishment charges recoverable from other Governments and Departments.*—The smaller recoveries anticipated in the budget estimate of 1939-40 compared with the budget and the revised estimates for 1938-39 are due to less work carried out on behalf of other Governments and Departments.

200. *Item 3—Pensionary charges of the Irrigation Department.*—Pensionary charges are adjusted on a percentage basis on the establishment charges under the Irrigation heads "XVII", "18" and "68" by credit to the head "55-Superannuation Allowances and Pensions" after the close of the year. The rate of adjustment was fixed at 14 per cent. until the year 1930-31, when, this rate being considered excessive, the Government of India directed that in future it should be decided with reference to the rate of interest paid on loans taken from that Government in any particular year. The rate of adjustment is fixed accordingly every year and in doing so the fact that certain establishment in this Department is temporary is taken into account.

The pensionary charges debitable to the Irrigation Department are calculated every year at the rate of adjustment fixed, as mentioned above, - on the ordinary establishment charges debitable to the Irrigation heads concerned on a *pro rata* basis; charges on account of special establishments, which with the exception of one measurer in the Central Circle are all of a temporary nature, are excluded. The pensionary charges thus vary each year consequent on the variations which occur in the share of ordinary establishment charges debitable to the Irrigation heads and the rate of adjustment.

201: Up to and inclusive of the year 1938-39 receipts and expenditure for all the schemes of the late Development Department except the Back Bay Reclamation Scheme and the Salsette and Ambernath Water Supply Schemes appear under these heads, the transactions pertaining to the Back Bay Reclamation Scheme being shown under the head 80-Bombay Development Scheme. #### Revenue.

202. The increase in the revised estimate over the budget estimate for 1938-39 is due to the increase in occupancies in the Development Chawls. The estimate for 1939-40 is based on the anticipated number of occupied rooms in the Development Chawls and it also includes receipts from rents from lease of lands and other miscellaneous receipts of a revenue nature in the Back Bay Reclamation Scheme for which revenue accounts are to be opened from that year.

#### Expenditure.

203. *Original Works.*—The decrease of 47 in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39 is due to the late acceptance of tenders for the work of additions and alterations to the Development Chawls and to low tendered rates. The reduction of 1,60 in the budget for 1939-40 compared with that for 1938-39, is due to completion of the work of providing 710 additional storage tanks on the Development Chawls during 1938-39.

204. *Repairs and Maintenance.*—The municipal taxes on the Development chawls for a particular year vary with the amount of the rent for the previous year. The decrease in the revised estimate compared with the budget estimates for 1938-39 is due to this reason. The increase in the budget estimate for 1939-40 compared with that for 1938-39, is mainly due to special repairs for remodelling the chawls. It is also due to the transfer of revenue expenditure on Back Bay Reclamation scheme from 80-Bombay Development Scheme to this head.

205. *Establishment.*—The increase of 15 in the Charged expenditure in the budget estimate for 1939-40, compared with that for 1938-39, is due to *pro rata* distribution of establishment charges which depend upon the expenditure during a particular year for works under the several heads for which the establishment is utilised. Out of the total increase of 1,49 under Voted an amount of 71 is also due to similar reasons. The opening of revenue accounts for the Back Bay Reclamation Scheme from next year, requiring the transfer of the debit for brokerage charges on the sale of lands in that scheme from “80-Bombay Development Scheme” to this head accounts for an increase of 66. The balance of increase under Voted, *viz.*, 12 is due to the increase of pay of inferior servants and the additional establishment required for the maintenance of the Development Chawls.

206. *Tools and Plant.*—The estimates under this head are based on the *pro rata* distribution of the Public Works Department charges.

207. The amount to be drawn from the Famine Relief Fund for expenditure under the revenue heads is shown under the receipt head "XLIII-Transfers from Famine Relief Fund". The revised estimate for 1938-39 has been placed at 2,17 as that amount will be available to meet famine expenditure in the current year. As no direct expenditure on famine relief is anticipated in 1939-40 the Famine Relief Fund receipts amounting to 2,16 next year will be utilised to meet indirect famine expenditure on protective irrigation works.

*Expenditure.*

208. *54-A-Famine Relief.*—The actuals of 1937-38 are high on account of relief measures in the scarcity affected areas in the eastern portion of the Panch Mahals and parts of the Pooona, Ahmednagar, Sholapur and Bijapur Districts. Timely and well distributed rains eased the situation in most of these parts during 1938-39 with the exception of Bijapur where relief measures continued up to 1st October 1938. The budget provision of 3,34 is likely to be fully utilised in the current year. No provision is made in next year's estimates as no scarcity or famine is anticipated in that year. Expenditure to the extent of 6,17 out of the total expenditure of 7,12 in 1937-38 was met from the Famine Relief Fund and the balance of 95 was financed from the general revenues. Similarly,

out of the total expenditure of 3,34 in the current year 2,17 will be met from the Famine Relief Fund and the balance (1,17) will be financed from general revenues.

209. *54-B-Transfers to Famine Relief Fund.*—Under paragraph 7 (1) of the Bombay Famine Relief Fund Act the accounts of the fund shall be made up at the end of each financial year, the securities belonging to the fund being valued at their market value on the last day of such year. Paragraph 7 (2) of the Act provides that if the accounts so made up show that the balance in the fund at the end of such year falls short of rupees sixty-three lakhs, the deficiency shall be made up from the revenues of the Province. The current year's budget estimate of 2,48 represented the deficiency expected at the end of 1937-38 which was to be made good in the beginning of 1938-39. It has since been decided that the deficiency of a particular year should be made good in the same year and consequently 2,72 more, in addition to 3,79 provided for in the revised estimate of 1937-38, i.e., 6,51 in all, were adjusted in the accounts of 1937-38 to make up the statutory minimum balance in the Fund at the end of 1937-38. It is anticipated that the deficiency to be made good on 31st March 1939 will amount to 1,00 and this will fall in the current year's accounts. No provision has been made in next year's estimate as it is quite impossible to estimate so far in advance whether there will be any deficiency which will have to be made good on 31st March 1940 on the basis of the market value of the securities belonging to the Fund on that date.

*Revenue.*

210. The increase in the current year's revised is mainly due to the recovery in arrears of pension contribution in respect of the Order and Crime Police supplied to Railway Companies. The decrease in the next year is due to the starting of provident and pension funds by more local bodies for their employees taken on loan from Government.

*Expenditure.*

211. Under the Government of India Act, 1935, pensions payable to Judges of the High Court and to persons appointed by the Secretary of State or to persons appointed before 1924 to services or posts declared as superior, and Government

contribution to pension or provident funds in respect of such persons are charged on the revenues of the Federation, in the first instance, a corresponding contribution being payable by the Provincial Government to the Central Government. The amounts of contribution payable by this Government to the Central Government are shown separately in detail in the Civil Budget Estimates.

212. *Superannuation and retired allowances.*—The revised estimate for 1938–39 is based on the progress of actuals. The estimate for 1939–40 provides for the growth of expenditure indicated by the trend of the actuals of recent years.

213. *Gratuities.*—The decrease in 1939–40, compared with 1938–39, is due to no write-back being necessary in respect of expenditure on gratuities paid in the past to retrenched personnel, as that amount has been fully debited to revenue in 1938–39.

214. *Covenanted Civil Service Pensions.*—The current year's revised and the next year's estimate are based on actual requirements so far as now known.

215. *Equated payments of commuted value of pensions transferred from capital.*—Since 1926–27 the capital expenditure debited to the head "83, Payments of commuted value of pensions" together with the interest accruing thereon, is being repaid from revenue by equated payments spread over fifteen years. These equated payments are debited to this head. The increase in 1939–40 over the revised estimate for 1938–39 is due to the fact that the revised estimate includes equated payments for twelve years whereas next year's estimate includes those for thirteen years.

216. *Charges in England.*—The expenditure under this head includes pre-separation pension charges in respect both of Bombay and Sind. The portion recoverable from Sind on this account is included under the minor head "Deduct—Actual amount of pensions recovered from other Governments". The revised estimate for 1938–39 is based on the progress of current actuals which indicate a reduction, compared with the current year's budget estimate. Next year's estimate provides for the growth of expenditure indicated by the trend of the actuals of recent years.

217. *Deduct—Actual amount of pensions recovered from other Governments.*—The pension charges pertaining to the period prior to 1st April 1936 are to be shared by Bombay and Sind in the manner specified in the Government of India (Constitution of Sind) Order, 1936. Broadly speaking, Sind has to pay to Bombay the amount by which the total payments from Bombay treasuries in respect of pre-separation pensions exceed 85 per cent. of the total liability of both provinces for that period. Recoveries from Sind in this respect have been made with effect from 1st April 1936.

218. *Deduct—Pensionary charges transferred to Commercial Departments.*—The pensionary charges which are debitable to the accounts of the Irrigation Department are shown as deductions from charges under this minor head. These pensionary charges depend upon establishment charges and on works expenditure in a year.

219. All expenditure on pensions and superannuation allowances is provided in the first place under the major head "55, Superannuation allowances and pensions". The pensionary liabilities of commercial departments met either from ordinary revenues or loans are, however, debited to their respective major heads and corresponding credits are taken in reduction of the expenditure under the major head "55". These debits to the capital head "68, Construction of Irrigation etc., works" in relief of expenditure under the head "55", involve a utilisation of loan money to finance expenditure debitable to revenue. The debits of pensionary charges under the capital head are therefore utilised in relief of expenditure under the capital head "83, Payments of Commuted Value of Pensions" thereby reducing the loan funds required for that head. The accounts procedure for doing this is to debit the expenditure to the major head "55-A". The provisions under this head therefore correspond to the provisions for pensionary liabilities under the head "68, Construction of Irrigation, etc., Works" which depend on the provisions for establishment charges under that head.

*Revenue.*

220. The increase in the revised over the budget estimate for the current year is due to the printing of the History of Services for the Sind Government, consolidated and classified Abstracts of the Comptroller in Sind and voting papers for District Local Board elections for 10 districts. The next year's estimate is based on the normal actuals of past years.

*Expenditure.*

221. *Purchase of Stationery Stores.*—The increase in the revised over the budget estimate for 1938–39 is due chiefly to expenditure on :—

- (1) purchase of additional typewriters,
- (2) supply of stationery articles to Committees appointed by Government,
- (3) increase in rates of paper,
- (4) additional paper, stationery, etc., required for new offices and for additional works done at the Government Central Press, Bombay.

The increase in the estimate for 1939–40 over the budget estimate for 1938–39 is due to the (i) supply of stationery articles, forms, etc., to the Inspecting Officers taken over by Government under the Bombay Primary Education (Amendment) Act, 1938, (ii) supply of stationery articles required by the officers in charge of the Primary School Leaving Certificates Examination Centres, (iii) supply of stationery articles to the new offices created by Government, and (iv) additional provision of 1,65 for substitution of mill made cloth by khadi, mill-made paper by hand-made paper and for the purchase of other articles of Indian manufacture.

222. *Government Presses.*—The increase in the current year's revised over the budget estimate is mainly due to the following causes :—

(1) The printing of (a) several leaflets in English and other regional languages issued by the Director of Information, (b) reports of various Committees appointed by Government, (c) Bombay Civil Services Manual, Volumes I and II, (d) History of Services for the Province of Sind, (e) heavy debates of the lengthy Sessions of the Bombay Legislative Assembly and Bombay Legislative Council,

- (2) the employment of 6 apprentices at the Government Central Press, and
- (3) the increase in pay to inferior servants.

The additional expenditure will continue in 1939–40.

223. *Charges in England.*—The decrease in the revised estimate, compared with the budget estimate of 1938–39, is due to the purchase of a larger number of articles of Indian-make in substitution of foreign goods.

224. *Cost of Services rendered by the Printing and Stationery Department to the Bombay Legislative Assembly and the Council.*—Out of the net provision made for the purchase of Stationery Stores in the year 1938–39, a sum of Rs. 50,000 was earmarked for the work to be done for the two Legislative Bodies. The cost of the printing work, etc., done for the Bombay Legislative Assembly and the Bombay Legislative Council during the year 1937–38 works out to Rs. 39,463.

225. *Unclaimed Deposits.*—The estimate for next year is based on the average of past actuals.

226. *Sale of old Stores and Materials.*—The increase in the revised estimate over the budget estimate of the current year is based on the progress of actuals.

227. *Transfer from the deposit account of grants for economic development and improvement of rural areas.*—The expenditure from grants made by the Government of India for rural development is provided under “25, General Administration” under the revenue section and a corresponding credit is taken under “XLVI-Miscellaneous” by transferring an equal amount from the deposit section. The figures under this head depend entirely on the estimates for schemes of rural development provided under “25-General Administration”.

228. *Collection of payments for services rendered.*—The increase in the revised estimate and the estimate of next year over the budget estimate of the current year is based on the progress of actuals of recoveries on account of I.C.S. and Indian Police officers of the joint cadre serving in Sind.

*Expenditure.*

229. *Donations for charitable purposes.*—The decrease in next year's estimate compared with the revised estimate is due to the percentage cut made in the grants payable to certain institutions.

230. *Special Commissions of Enquiry.*—The revised estimate of 10 is for expenditure on certain committees appointed by Government, the expenditure on which could not be debited to other major heads.

231. *Petty Establishments.*—The increase in the revised over the current year's budget estimate is due to additional expenditure in connection with the local board elections in the Northern and Central Divisions. The decrease in next year's estimate is due to the fact that only a few elections will be held during next year.

232. *Irrecoverable Temporary Loans and Advances written off.*—The increase of 20 in the revised estimate over the budget estimate of the current year is based on the progress of actuals. The increase in the estimate of next year over the revised estimate is mainly due to the fact that Government has decided to write-off tagai debts to the extent of 2,79 in the three divisions below :—

as detailed enquiry showed these debts to be irrecoverable. Of this amount 1,79 is the principal and 1,00 interest and according to accounting practice provision has to be made under this head for the amount of principal written off.

233. *Rents, Rates and Taxes.*—Under this head provision is made for—

(i) the rent for the Bombay-Poona Telephone line and (ii) the general taxes to the Bombay Municipality due from Government under section 144 of the City of Bombay Municipal Act, 1888. Pending settlement of a dispute with the Municipality regarding certain buildings and lands included in Mr. Kanga's award for 1934-39 a provisional sum of 1,71 is payable by Government according to the rateable value fixed in Schedule I of the award for Government buildings and lands in the City. The estimate of next year takes into account only 1,24 for the general taxes, due to the fact that an amount of 48 has been provided under "50, Civil Works", "52, Bombay Development Scheme" and "80, Bombay Development Scheme."

234. *Contributions.*—The increase in the revised estimate over the current year's budget estimate is due chiefly to the additional special grant of 10 to the District Local Board, Sholapur. The increase in next year's estimate over the current year's budget estimate is due to the provision of 28 for grants to local bodies on account of the receipts under the Bombay Public Conveyance Act. Hitherto the net receipts under this Act were paid to local bodies through a deposit head but under the new constitution the receipts, being provincial revenues, have to be credited to the revenue section of the provincial accounts, under the head "XXIII-Police" and the expenditure on establishment is to be provided under "29, Police". The amount of the grant has been based on the average of past three years' actuals of the net receipts handed over to Local bodies.

235. *Miscellaneous Compensations.*—The increase of 3,40 over the current year's budget and revised estimates is due to the provision for grants-in-aid to local bodies on account of compensation for the revenues from fines credited to Government. Hitherto these fines were credited direct to local bodies. Under the present Government of India Act these fines must be credited to provincial accounts, under "XXI, Administration of Justice", as they form part of provincial revenues, but Government proposes to give local bodies grants-in-aid equal to the net receipts from these fines in order not to deprive them of a source of revenue they have enjoyed hitherto.

236. *Charges in connection with Village Panchayats Acts (Bombay).*—The revised estimate is less than the budget estimate of the current year because the provision of 4,00 on account of expenditure for encouraging the growth of village panchayats could not be utilised during the current year pending the passing of the Village Panchayats Bill. This provision has been repeated in next year's budget.

237. *Miscellaneous and unforeseen Charges.*—The increase in the revised estimate is due to the provision of 50,00 on account of the transfer to the deposit section for the formation of a Special Development Fund (*vide* para. 273).

238. Officers of the Provincial Government who are District Authorities under the rules framed under the Petroleum Act, 1934, and the Indian Explosives Act, 1884, administer these Acts and collect the license fees. Hitherto these fees were credited direct to provincial revenues as agency fees. It has now been decided by the Government of India, in consultation with the Auditor-General, that these fees must be credited to central revenues as they are a source of central revenue but that the Government of India will pay an equivalent amount to this Government as payment for the work done by provincial officers. According to this decision, the Accountant General will, with effect from 1938-39, credit the total amount of fees received in the province in each year to central revenues by debit to IX-Stamps and XXIII-Police to which fees are first credited and an equal amount will be credited to this Province under this head. The revised estimates of the current year and the budget estimates of the next year represent this adjustment on equal amount having been deducted from the receipts under "Stamps" and "Police".

239. *Sale of land.*—The sale proceeds of certain lands at Mazgaon to the Bombay Port Trust are likely to be realised in 1939-40 instead of in the current year.

240. *Sale of other Government assets.*—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to the premium of Rs. 4 lakhs paid for the lease of Government property "Tavistock" on Ridge Road, Bombay.

*Expenditure.*

241. The increase in the current year's revised and the next year's estimate, compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39, is mainly due to the provision for repurchasing lands forfeited and sold during the civil disobedience movement.

*Expenditure.*

242. The provision of funds for capital expenditure on irrigation works for which capital accounts are kept is made under the head "68." The capital expenditure on these works may be defrayed from the general revenues of the year, or from the Famine Relief Fund, or from sources outside the revenues of the year, such as loans, accumulated balances of the previous years, etc., but the major head "68" is intended to include only such expenditure as is incurred from sources outside the revenues of the year, and for this reason the provisions made from ordinary revenues of the year, or from the Famine Relief Fund, are deducted in a lump sum from the gross provision made under this head and are shown under a separate head, viz. "19."

245. 246. *Item 1.*—According to the terms of agreement for the purchase of the Kirkee Water Works made with the Government of India in 1929, payments are to be made in 20 equal instalments of 25 each. The amount of 25 in the next budget is on account of the ninth instalment.

247. *Item 2.*—The provision is on account of the works “Diversion of Sadar Bazar Nala” and “Sadar Bazar Nala Sewer” under the Sholapur Development Scheme. The decrease in the revised estimate compared with the current year’s budget estimate is due to less requirements for the work “Diversion of Sadar Bazar Nala.”

248. *Item 4.*—Hitherto each work under the Poona Cantonment Water Works was shown as a separate minor head. It has now been decided to show such works as sub-heads under the minor head “Poona Cantonment Water Works.” The provision of 59 in next year is on account of the three new works explained in the statements of new items under the head “70”.

### 80, Bombay Development Scheme.

249. All the activities of the Development Department were originally financed from loan funds under the capital expenditure head "59 (now 80), Bombay Development Scheme," the capital receipts realised therefrom being taken in reduction of expenditure under the same head, and the revenue receipts being shown under the head "XLII-Bombay Development Scheme." From the year 1927-28, revenue heads "42" (now 52) and "XXXI (now XLI), Bombay Development Scheme" were opened for those schemes of the Development Department on which capital expenditure was complete, and the Industrial Housing Scheme was transferred to that head. During 1928-29 two more schemes, viz., the schemes of water and electric supply at Ambernath, were transferred to the revenue head. The Development Department has been abolished from 1st March 1930, and all charges pertaining to the schemes of the Department excepting only those of the Back Bay Scheme, have been transferred to revenue heads with effect from 1930-31. It has now been decided to open revenue accounts for the Back Bay scheme with effect from 1939-40. The receipts and expenditure of a revenue nature in respect of that scheme will appear from that year under the heads "XLI" and "52" respectively. Only capital expenditure on that scheme required for the completion of the works already undertaken and capital receipts will be recorded under this capital head.

250. As capital expenditure is still being incurred on the Back Bay Scheme, it may be useful to recapitulate here the main features of the Scheme.

The original plans for the reclamation of Back Bay provided for a sea wall from Chowpatty extending as far as Colaba Point and enclosing 1,100 acres of reclaimed land, this area being divided into eight blocks. Block No. I starts from opposite Marine Lines Station and extends up to Churchgate Station. Block No. II extends from Churchgate Station to near the Back Bay Swimming Baths. The area from this point, past the old Cuffe Parade reclamation and beyond the Afghan Memorial Church at Colaba, is divided into five blocks Nos. III to VII; while Block No. VIII enclosing 245 acres abuts on the Military lands at Colaba point. A small portion of old reclaimed land near Marine Lines Station has also been included in the Scheme.

In accordance with the decision of the Legislative Council in 1927, work in connection with the Back Bay Reclamation Scheme has been restricted to the reclamation and development of Blocks Nos. I, II and VII and the reclamation of Block No. VIII without development with a connecting road along the existing foreshore between Blocks Nos. II and VII.

Blocks Nos. I and II comprising over 150 acres have been fully reclaimed and the plots in this area are now available for building purposes. Block No. VII comprises about 135 acres out of which about 47 acres at the east end have been fully reclaimed, leaving about 88 acres partially reclaimed. The partially reclaimed area is being completed by the slow but cheap process of filling with suitable building debris. Block No. VIII comprising 245 acres has been reclaimed and sold to the Government of India for Rs. 2,06,53,000.

The project estimate for the curtailed scheme sanctioned in March 1932 amounts to Rs. 7,23,06,000. Against this project estimate, the total expenditure (excluding interest) incurred to the end of March 1938 is Rs. 6,13,09,000, leaving a balance of expenditure of Rs. 1,09,97,000 still to be incurred if the curtailed scheme is to be completed. Government have no intention at present of embarking on any works on block VII beyond filling it up with such building debris as may be available free of cost. It has been found necessary, however, to incur expenditure on the development of blocks I and II, viz., the provision of roads, drains and lights, as otherwise the reclaimed land would have been unsaleable. These works are estimated to cost about Rs. 40½ lakhs and have been started from 1934-35. An expenditure of about Rs. 20 lakhs has been incurred till the end of 1937-38. An amount of about Rs. 6½ lakhs has been provided in the current year's budget and a sum of Rs. 1¼ lakhs is provided in the next year's budget leaving an amount of Rs. 12½ lakhs to be incurred in 1940-41 and further years. The total area of building plots in the two Blocks is approximately 4,97,000 square yards of which an area of 2,27,000 square yards has been leased to date. The forecast of receipts

from rents from the lease of lands in these blocks is Rs. 79 lakh in 1938-39 and Rs. 2.95 lakhs in 1939-40.

The increase of 92 under works and repairs "Charged" in the revised compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39, is on account of the settlement of the claims of certain contractors. The decrease of 1,97 under "Voted" is mainly due to (1) postponement of certain works, (2) adoption of a cheaper type of road construction and (3) low tendered rates. The decrease under "Suspense" is due to the refund by the Bombay Municipality of the deposit lodged with it for certain sewer works which are now to be undertaken departmentally. The increase under receipts from the sale of surplus plant is mainly due to larger realisation from the sale of cranes, rails, etc., at Kandivli. The decrease under receipts of a capital nature is due to the fact that sales of land in the suburban schemes are not expected to be realised to the extent previously anticipated.

The decrease in expenditure in 1939-40, compared with the budget estimate for 1938-39, is mainly due to the slowing up of the programme. The decrease is also partly due to the transfer of the provision for maintenance and sanitation to the head 52—Bombay Development Scheme in view of the decision of Government to open revenue accounts for the Back Bay Reclamation Scheme with effect from the year 1939-40.

The establishment items provided under this head consist of the following :—

(i) Cost of establishment employed specially in connection with the Back Bay Reclamation Scheme and the contingencies arising therefrom.

(ii) Secretariat charges calculated at 1 per cent. on the estimated cost of works and repairs. For this item, a corresponding credit is afforded under the head "50-Civil Works".

(iii) 5, 10 and 30 per cent., respectively, of the pay and allowances of the Superintending Engineer, Northern Circle, the Executive Engineer, Presidency Division, and one Assistant Engineer and the full pay and allowances of one Overseer are debited to this head. These percentages have been based on the proportion of the time spent by those officers on work connected with the Back Bay Reclamation Scheme. For this item also corresponding credit is afforded under the head "50-Civil Works".

253. All payments on account of commutation of pensions are accounted for under the capital major head "83, Payments of commuted value of pensions" in the first instance, and such portion of the expenditure recorded under that head as it may be decided to finance from revenue is transferred at the end of the year to the major head "55-A, Commutation of pensions financed from ordinary revenues". The net amount debited to "83", after deducting therefrom the expenditure financed from ordinary revenues, is repaid from revenue by equated payments of capital and interest spread over fifteen years. The equated payments in respect of each year commence from the year following that in which commutations are sanctioned. The total equated payments in respect of each year's commutations are debited to the head "55, Superannuation allowances and pensions" and credits are transferred to (a) the capital head "83" of the capital portion of the payments and to (b) "22, Interest on debt and other obligations" of the interest portion.

254. *Payments of commuted value of pensions.*—The increase in the revised estimate for 1938-39 is due to the fact that a larger number of applications for commutations of pensions have been received than anticipated. The budget estimate of 1939-40 is based on normal expectations.

255. *Deduct—Amount financed from ordinary revenues.*—See remarks under the head "55-A, Commutation of pensions financed from ordinary revenues".

256. *Deduct—Capital portion of equated payments out of revenue.*—The increase in 1939-40 over the year 1938-39, is due to the fact that the figures for 1938-39 include capital portion of equated payments for twelve years whereas the budget estimate for 1939-40 includes that for thirteen years.

257. Up to 1938-39 payments on account of gratuities to retrenched personnel were, in the first instance, debited to the capital head “85”. These payments (after transferring a portion of expenditure debitable to the Irrigation Department, viz., to the head “XVII-Irrigation etc.”) were written back to revenue within a period of five years beginning from the year 1933-34, i.e., one-fifth of the expenditure in each year was being debited to the revenue head “55, Superannuation allowances, etc.” until the expenditure in respect of that year under “85” was wholly wiped out. The debits to “55” on account of write-backs were counter-balanced by corresponding credits to “85”.

258. It has been decided to write-back to revenue in 1938-39 the entire outstanding balance under this head and to meet further payments of gratuities to retrenched personnel direct from revenue by debit to “55, Superannuation allowances and pensions—gratuities”. This accounts for the increase in the current year’s revised over the budget estimate and for the absence of provision in 1939-40.

263. These are provident funds subscribed to by Government servants. Subscription is compulsory for certain classes of servants and optional for others. In the contributory funds, the subscribers' deposits are supplemented by contributions from provincial revenues in lieu of pension. The amount at a subscriber's credit is paid to him on the termination of his service. Temporary withdrawals from the subscriber's own accumulations are allowed in certain circumstances during service.

264. The estimates on the receipt side represent contributions of the subscribers to the Provident Funds, repayments with interest of advances given to them from the funds and interest on the balances in the funds paid by Government for which provision is made under "22-Interest on Debt and other Obligations".

265. On the disbursement side provision is made for advances from and withdrawals of the balances in the Provident Funds.

266. According to the Bombay Famine Relief Fund Act, 1936, which came into force on 1st February 1937 the balance to the credit of this Government in the old fund was withdrawn and after setting apart a sufficient amount for the grant of loans to cultivators and for the relief of famine in the year 1936-37, the remaining amount was invested in securities of the Government of India as provided in section 4 of the Act. The Famine Relief Fund now consists of—

- (i) the securities of the Government of India in which the fund is invested;
- (ii) the interest which may from time to time accrue on the investments;
- and
- (iii) such other sums as the local Governments may from time to time contribute to the Fund under sub-section (2) of section 7 of the Act or otherwise.

The Fund can be expended only upon—

- (1) the relief of serious famine in the Province, and
- (2) the relief of distress caused by serious drought, flood or other natural calamities in the Province:

Provided that when the Fund exceeds the minimum of Rs. 63 lakhs, the local Government may utilise the excess to meet expenditure on protective irrigation works and other works for the prevention of famine in the Province, or for the grant of loans to cultivators either under the Land Improvement Loans Act, 1883, or under the Agriculturists' Loans Act, 1884, or for relief purposes or in the repayment of advances made by the Government of India or to meet irrecoverable balances of loans granted under the said Acts or for relief purposes.

267. The various items on the receipt side are explained below.

*Item (a).*—See paragraph 209 under “XLIII, Transfers from Famine Relief Fund” and “54-Famine”. This head records the transfer from revenue to make good the estimated deficiency in the market value of the invested securities.

*Item (b).*—Interest realised on the securities in which the fund is invested is credited to this head.

*Item (c).*—Recoveries of expenditure in the past on direct relief of famine which are of a fluctuating nature are credited to this head.

*Item (b).*—Represents amounts invested in long-dated securities.

269. In the current year's budget a credit on account of the gross amount provided under "23, Appropriation for Reduction or Avoidance of Debt" in the revenue section for the repayment of the consolidated debt was given under this head while the debit on account of the deduct entries under "23" was given under the Deposit Head "Miscellaneous Government Account" by an adjusting entry. It has since been decided to discontinue the adjusting entry and to credit to this head the net amount provided under "23". This accounts for the decrease in the revised estimates for the current year and the budget estimate for next year.

270. Under section 9 (4) of the Bombay Motor Vehicles Tax Act, 1935, if the net proceeds of the tax in any year exceeds the sum of Rs. 26,57,000 the excess amount, after satisfying the requirements, if any, of sub-section (3) of that section shall be entered in a separate account and shall be expended in such manner as the local Government may determine solely on the construction, improvement and maintenance of new and existing roads including roads vesting in, belonging to or managed by, any local authority. This section continued in operation for the first two years of Provincial autonomy and it is now being re-enacted. Under that enactment the expenditure from the Provincial Road Fund will be treated as charged. The investment operations of the fund not being of the nature of expenditure will be treated as neither charged nor voted. The head "Provincial Road Fund" has been opened to record the amounts transferred to the Fund and the expenditure incurred therefrom.

*Receipts.*

271. The sums shown against item (2) show the surplus realised in 1937-38 and the estimated surpluses for the years 1938-39 and 1939-40. The revised estimate for 1938-39 also includes a sum of 12, being the refund of unutilised grants by certain District Local Boards for village roads. The surplus balance in the fund was temporarily invested in 1937-38 in treasury bills and the estimate against item (1) in the revised estimate of 1938-39 is on account of the maturity value of these bills. The surplus balance is to be utilised in the manner shown on the disbursement side against the minor head "Other Account" of the head. The estimated surplus of 10,01 in the current year together with the balance of 3,94 is proposed to be invested towards the end of the year but it will be made available for expenditure in 1939-40.

*Disbursements.*

272. The expenditure from the fund under this head in the current year is mainly on modernising the Bombay-Poona Road and Approach Roads to villages. Next year it is proposed to spend the proceeds of the Fund on modernising the Bombay-Poona and Bombay-Nasik Roads. Larger provision has also been made for Approach Roads to villages.

273. A fund called the "Special Development Fund" is to be created at the end of the current year by the transfer of 50 lakhs from the accumulated revenue surplus of past years to this new major head. This fund is intended to be utilised for non-recurrent development schemes of agriculture, education, public health etc. A supplementary demand will be placed in due course before the legislature for the necessary appropriation. The main object in creating the Fund is to ensure that it will remain available only for specified purposes and that unutilised grants lapse not to the general revenues but to the Fund itself. In order to ensure this, the following accounting procedure has been decided upon. Expenditure on different development activities will be recorded in the revenue section under the major heads concerned and corresponding credits will be given at the same time under the corresponding receipt heads with a per contra debit to the fund in the deposit section. In 1939-40 the following amounts will be required for expenditure :—

281. According to the accounting procedure prescribed for transactions of the Central Road Fund the amounts received by Provincial Governments are credited to "Subventions from Central Road Fund" in the deposit section of the accounts. The actual expenditure on works executed is recorded under "50, Civil Works—Communications and Repairs." At the same time an equal amount is debited to the above mentioned deposit head and credited to the minor head "Transfers from Central Road Development Account" under the receipt head "XXXIX-Civil Works". According to the orders of the Government of India all allocations to the provinces from the Central Road Fund are retained by it until the previous years' balances with the local Governments are exhausted. The cash balance at the end of 1937-38 with this Government was 3,20 and this Government had to draw, in the current year, on the balance of 25,11 retained by the Government of India in respect of the year 1937-38. The annual share in petrol tax receipts to be received in 1938-39 has not been communicated by the Government of India so far, but it has allowed us to draw upon that balance in the current year in anticipation of allotment. According to the procedure laid down by the Government of India for drawing on this balance, the provincial Governments have to apply to the Government of India at the beginning of each quarter for 90 per cent. of the amounts estimated to be required by them in that quarter after exhausting the previous cash balance and on this basis, a credit of 31,78 is anticipated in the current year. The expenditure expected to be incurred in the year current is 36,89 and after utilising the previous year's cash balance of 3,20, there will be a deficit of 1,91, mainly due to the allotment by the Government of India being equal to only 90 per cent. of the estimated expenditure in last two quarters of the current year. This deficit will be made up early next year but a similar deficit will recur at the end of next year. The expenditure on petrol tax works in 1939-40 has been estimated at 36,00 and the estimate of receipt has therefore been taken at 36,00.

(a) In the year 1935-36, the Government of India sanctioned an allotment of Rs. 7 lakhs for expenditure on schemes for the economic development and improvement of rural areas in the Bombay Presidency including Sind of which the Bombay share was 5,62 and it was utilised on various schemes approved by the Bombay Legislative Council. The unspent balance from that allotment on 31st March 1938 amounted to 2,08. The anticipated expenditure this year is 1,87, leaving an unutilised balance of 21 for expenditure in 1939-40. The Government of India sanctioned a further allotment of Rs. 5 lakhs in 1936-37. It is proposed to draw, from this allotment, a sum of 1,42 for expenditure in 1939-40. With effect from 1938-39 the expenditure on the improvement of rural areas is being debited to the service heads concerned, i.e., 25-General Administration and 40-Agriculture in the first instance. An equal amount is debited to the deposit head with a corresponding credit under "XLVI-Miscellaneous" and "XXIX-Agriculture" respectively.

(b) The Government of India have also sanctioned a grant of 1,74 for co-operative training and education on the understanding that after it is utilised in full, the local Government will endeavour to carry on the work of training from their own revenues. The grant is being paid as and when required. The procedure for the accounting of expenditure from the grant is exactly similar to that followed in the case of subventions from the Central Road Fund. The unutilised cash balance out of 60 so far made to Bombay Province was 24 on 31st March 1938. The expenditure expected to be incurred in the current year is 20 and in view of the expenditure of 49 provided in next year's estimate, an amount of 45 will be received from the Government of India in 1939-40.

(c) The Government of India have agreed to make a grant for five years with effect from 1936-37 for a scheme for cottage and small scale woollen industries. In the first year that Government made a grant of 13. With effect from the following year it is making a grant of 14. The accounts procedure will be that given in paragraph 284.

282. Up to the end of 1936-37 the grants given by the Indian Central Cotton Committee were credited to a deposit head and the expenditure was taken as a direct charge to that head in the deposit section of the Central accounts. But with effect from 1937-38 the transactions relating to these grants appear both on the receipt and disbursement sides of the Provincial Accounts.

283. The accounting procedure for subsidies from the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research is similar to that followed in the case of subventions from the Central Road Fund. They are credited in the first instance to this deposit head. The actual expenditure on the various schemes of research is recorded under the service heads, viz., "40-Agriculture" and "41-Veterinary" and at the same time an amount equal to that expenditure is debited to the deposit head. A corresponding credit is given on the receipt side under "XXIX-Agriculture" and "XXX-Veterinary".

284. The grant made by the Government of India for the development of the handloom industries is credited in the first instance to the deposit account on the receipt side and the amount actually spent under the service head "43-Industries" is credited to the revenue head "XXXII-Industries" and the deposit amount is cleared by a corresponding debit on its disbursement side.

285. Allotments of 35 and 17 are expected from the Government of India in the current and next years from the sugar excise fund to be utilised in furtherance of co-operative effort for the manufacture of sugar. The accounting procedure is similar to that followed in the case of subventions from the Central Road Fund. Accordingly the receipts expected from the Government of India are credited in the first instance, to the deposit account on the receipt side. An amount equal to the actual expenditure booked under the service heads "40-Agriculture" and "42-Co-operation" is credited to the respective revenue heads "XXIX-Agriculture" and "XXXI-Co-operation" and the deposit account is cleared by a corresponding debit on the disbursement side.

290. The heads "Suspense Account" and "Local Public Works Expenditure" record expenditure on purchase of stores, road materials etc., and it is cleared by credit when the stores, etc., are issued to departments by debit to the proper head.

Under the head "Central Accounts Office—Reserve Bank Suspense" are recorded the transactions relating to Reserve Bank suspense which shows credit and debits on behalf of the Government of India, other Provincial Governments Indian Stores Department and charges in England.

The head "Cash Balance Investment Account" records the transactions of the Provincial Government by way of investment of its cash balances in short term loans e.g., in Treasury Bills of the Government of India. The interest derived from such investment is credited as receipts under "XX-Interest—Interest realised on investments of Provincial balances". All that appears under this head is capital invested on the disbursement side and when it is realised on maturity, it is shown on the receipt side. The current year's revised estimates assume that the balance likely to remain invested at the end of the year will amount to about 75 lakhs which will appear as a receipt in 1939-40 while it has been estimated that no such investment will remain at the end of next year.

The head "Departmental Adjusting Account" is intended for the provisional adjustment of departmental receipts and payments and inter-departmental transfers.

The head "Recoveries of service payments" records recoveries made in the course of audit before they are finally brought to account.

The estimates on receipt and disbursement sides are framed on the basis of past and current actuals.

294: The loans advanced to the Bombay Municipality have been divided for purposes of repayment into four classes, viz., (i) for its improvement purposes granted to the late Improvement Trust, (ii) for general purposes, (iii) for development purposes and (iv) for the construction of the Vehar Lake and Water Works. The outstandings on 31st March 1937 of loans advanced in 1931-32, 1932-33 and 1935-36 under (i) have been included in the consolidated debt referred to in paragraph 82 under "22-Interest on debt and other obligations" and are being repaid by the Bombay Municipality in equated half-yearly instalments in 44 years from 1937-38. The other loans under (i) are being repaid by fixed instalments of principal spread over 30 years with accrued interest on the outstanding amounts. The Municipality is repaying (ii) by annual equated instalments of principal and interest spread over 30 years. The loans under (iii) for development purposes were taken by the Municipality in 1923-24 and 1924-25. In both cases it repaid on 2nd April 1929 the accumulations in the sinking funds maintained by it. The balance of the 1923-24 loans outstanding at the beginning of 1934-35 is being repaid by equated instalments of principal and interest spread over a total period of 30 years, the last instalment being payable on 31st March 1954. The balance of the 1924-25 loans is being repaid by equated instalments of principal and interest spread over 30 years from 1929-30. The loan of 82,67 advanced in 1935-36 to liquidate the portion of the Bombay development loan outstanding with the Bombay Municipality is being repaid by equated instalments of principal and interest spread over 15 years. The loan under (iv) was given by the Central Government but the amount of 13,30 outstanding on 31st March 1937 has been transferred to this Government on that date. The loan is repayable, including interest, in monthly instalments of 9 for a period of sixty years beginning from 1893.

*Remarks.*—The office of the District Inspector of Land Records, Bombay Suburban District, was first created in 1921 in order to maintain the survey records in the Bombay Suburban District up to date as frequent changes took place owing to extensive acquisition of land for development of suburban areas for residential and industrial purposes and numerous alterations in land boundaries and tenures. Owing to keen building activity and the launching of numerous suburban development, town planning and private schemes, the volume of measurement and survey work has not decreased and even after the abolition of the Development Department in 1930, this office had to be continued as a temporary addition to the Land Records Department, and it has been so continued from year to year up to the end of 1938-39. The measurement and survey correction work of this office is still increasing. Accordingly it is proposed to make the temporary establishment of the District Inspector of Land Records, Bombay Suburban District permanent with effect from 1st March 1939. The cost on account of the temporary establishment is now being met from the provisions made under “7—Land Revenue”. The annual average cost of making the establishment permanent comes to Rs. 12,968 as shown below:—

*Remarks.*—On 1st April 1932, the number of clerks and circle inspectors on the district establishments of the Southern Division was reduced from 929 to 814 as a measure of economy. This reduction has placed an undue strain on the rest of the staff in almost every revenue office of the division. To mitigate this state of affairs Government considers the following additional staff imperatively necessary in revenue offices of the Southern Division—

(i) addition of one extra aval karkun (on Rs. 80—5/2—95) and one clerk (on Rs. 25—5/2—55) to the taluka establishment of Parasgad, which has been enlarged by the addition of Murgod mahal, coupled with the reduction of a post of circle inspector by giving the extra aval karkun charge of a circle;

and

(ii) replacing a circle inspector (on Rs. 25—5/2—55) by an extra aval-karkun (on Rs. 80—5/2—95) in the Athni taluka.

Out of the ultimate annual recurrent cost of Rs. 1,656 Rs. 1,128 is debitable to “7, Land Revenue” and Rs. 528 to “25, General Administration”.

This additional staff has afforded some relief to the clerical staff in the Commissioner's office which was greatly overworked, though most of the clerks are still required to attend office earlier than the prescribed office hours and work until late in the evening. *Remarks.*—The Bhiwandi range in the West Thana division as at present constituted comprises 10 felling series and is therefore too big a charge for one range forest officer to manage efficiently especially in view of the intensive silvicultural operations carried out under the provisions of the revised working plan for the Thana forests. Similarly, the present arrangement whereby the Range Forest Officer, Bassein, is appointed as Instructor of the forest class held at Mandvi for six months in the year in addition to his own duties for training foresters, roundguards and guards in the Northern and Central circles has proved unsatisfactory, although he is given the assistance of a range forest officer, since he is not able for six months in the year to devote his personal attention to the silvicultural and other important operations in most of the felling series in his charge and the responsibility for these important works consequently becomes divided between him and his assistant. It is, therefore, proposed to reconstitute these two ranges in three charges as shown below :—

*Remarks.*—Caterpillars cause damage to teak plantations by defoliation, the result of which is loss not merely of increment but also of form through causing forking and branching. On his visit to the Thana forest, Dr. Beeson, Forest Entomologist, Forest Research Institute, Dehra Dun, found that whole plantations of teak had been severely attacked by these defoliators. Dr. Beeson has been dealing with similar damage in Nilambur teak plantations in Madras and has established an insectary there where the parasites, which destroy these pests, are being bred and let loose in the plantations and the damage has been greatly reduced. It is proposed to ask for Dr. Beeson's services and to start similar operations in teak plantations in this Province. The cost of the proposal is estimated at Rs. 4,600 in 1939-40 as shown below :—

*Remarks.*—The afforestation of bare hills would have important results in the Deccan in checking erosion and the silting of fields, improving the conservation of water supplies and increasing the supply of fuel and timber apart from giving possible indirect benefits such as improvement of climate. A very successful technique has been developed in Italy where the afforestation of bare hills is now undertaken on a large scale. A beginning has now been made in other parts of India and Government consider it desirable to provide a small sum so that experiments in this direction may be made in two centres in this Province.

The system of payment of rewards has been successful in securing the co-operation of the villagers in the matter of efficient fire protection. As grazing fees have been abolished, rewards will be given in some other form. The result is that little has been done towards the collection of the data which are essential for the efficient management of the forests. It is therefore proposed to send a senior Deputy Conservator of Forests in this Province to the Forest Research Institute, Dehra Dun, for three months' training in research methods and to appoint him as silviculturist from 1st November 1939. *Remarks.*—Dindal is available in quantity but has no market at present except as a superior fuel. Attempts have been made to develop its utilisation for mill picking sticks but have failed up to the present, probably owing to faulty seasoning. As soon as the Forest Research Institute, Dehra Dun, succeeds in evolving a cheap seasoning kiln easy to work, it is proposed to purchase it. It is also proposed to experiment with producer gas. *Remarks.*—The system of reproducing documents presented for registration by photography was introduced in 1921. In the initial stage the work was done under the supervision of the Manager, Photozinc Press, Poona, but the cost was borne by the Registration Department. This arrangement worked well when the system was in the experimental stage and was confined to a few registration offices only. After 1930, numerous offices were brought under the system and it was considered necessary to have a separate staff for, and some responsible officer in charge of, the work. Mr. M. C. Trivedi, who had been associated with this process since its inception, was appointed to the post with the designation of Supervisor of the Government Photo Registry. The whole of the establishment in the Government Photo Registry including the post of the Supervisor is temporary. At present the photo copying system has been extended to 62 Sub-registry offices and further extensions are proposed.

2. Since 1933, the Government Photo Registry office has progressed in various ways. As the utility of the photo copying system as a means of maintaining permanent records of documents has been proved and the system is regarded as a permanent arrangement, it is now proposed to separate the Government Photo Registry office from the Photozincographic Press, Poona, and to make the staff permanent with effect from 1st April 1939. As it is necessary that the head of the Government Photo Registry should have status befitting his position, it is also proposed to convert the non-gazetted post of the Supervisor into a gazetted post of Manager and to delegate to the Manager the same powers as are given to other Managers of Government Presses.

*Remarks.*—Before the Bombay Motor Vehicles Tax Act, 1935, came into operation, it was assumed that the correct unladen weights of motor vehicles of all makes and models could be ascertained from the specifications supplied by manufacturers of the vehicles or by weighment on the local railway weigh-bridges. In practice, it has been found that these specifications are not a sure basis for ascertaining the unladen weights in all cases. The weights of trucks and buses, for instance, vary with the size and material of bodies subsequently built on them. In doubtful cases, where authentic weight certificates could not be furnished by owners due to the absence of weigh-bridges in the districts, the Motor Vehicles Tax has been assessed on approximate weights only. This has often resulted either in a loss of revenue to Government or dissatisfaction among motorists that they are being overtaxed. Government therefore propose to supply the more important districts with portable weighing machines. These machines will also be very useful for the effective administration of the Motor Vehicles Rules for the prevention of overloading, which at present causes much damage to the roads. Further, when the new Motor Vehicles Act comes into force next year, stricter weight control of motor vehicles on the roads will be necessary. It is therefore proposed to purchase in the first instance eight pairs of portable weighing machines for supply to eight districts where motor transport is heavy. The cost of each machine is estimated at Rs. 950 and the total cost of the eight pairs will amount to Rs. 15,200.

2. In addition to these weighing machines, Government also propose to make use of weigh-bridges belonging to the railways and municipalities wherever they are available. These bodies have agreed to allow the use of their weigh-bridges provided that the fees and other charges are paid by Government. The cost of these charges during 1939-40 is estimated at Rs. 5,300. Government have accepted the conditions proposed by the railway companies and propose to provide Rs. 5,300 in the budget for the purpose. These charges will not be incurred when weighing-machines belonging to Government are provided in all districts.

*Remarks.*—The Legislature sanctioned a non-recurrent grant of Rs. 12,50,000 for 1938–39 to enable Government to execute some of the many schemes for minor irrigation works prepared by Mr. C. O. Lowsley, late Special Engineer, Minor Irrigation Works. Before deciding on a comprehensive programme for the execution of these old schemes, Government considered it desirable that the plans and estimates for them prepared several years ago should be scrutinised by two officers on special duty. They were appointed in July last with instructions to work on the most important projects and submit them by the end of October, so that the works can be taken up for execution in the cold weather. Several projects have been started, while several others are ready, and an amount of Rs. 7½ lakhs or thereabout is likely to be utilised in 1938–39 out of the grant of Rs. 12½ lakhs on the construction of new projects. It is proposed to complete all the works already in hand during 1939–40 and to start such new projects as funds permit. It is, therefore, proposed to provide Rs. 7½ lakhs for the purpose in the ensuing year's estimate from the Development Fund. It will be inclusive of the cost of such special establishment as may be found necessary.

*Remarks.*—In view of the abnormal increase of work in the translation and reporting branches of the office of the Oriental Translator to Government owing to the heavy increase in the number of petitions in regional languages received and in the number of newspapers to be scrutinised, and the consequential increase in the work of the clerical section of that office, it has been found necessary to sanction four temporary posts of junior translators, one for each of the Marathi, Gujarathi, Kannada and Urdu Branches, on a pay scale of Rs. 70—5—120 (efficiency bar)—10—170 and of a clerk on a pay scale of Rs. 50—3—95.

2. A temporary post of a peon on a monthly pay of Rs. 22 has also been created in the Directorate of Information in view of the heavy increase in the work of issuing press notes and leaflets.

3. *Remarks.*—The present arrangements for the disposal of non-agricultural and other revenue work in the city and suburbs of Ahmedabad sanctioned by Government involve division of responsibility and duplication of accounts and revenue work between the City Deputy Collector's office and the ordinary revenue establishment of the North Daskroi taluka. Government therefore proposes to abolish the present North and South Daskroi talukas and to form a separate revenue charge consisting of Ahmedabad city and the surrounding 28 villages and to place this charge under a Mahalkari working directly under the City Deputy Collector. The remaining villages from the North and South Daskroi talukas will be formed into a taluka called the Daskroi taluka in charge of a Mamlatdar under the Prant Officer, Viramgam sub-division. A post of Mamlatdar set free by this arrangement will be converted into a post of 1st class Resident Magistrate, Ahmedabad, a post which is very badly required. This reorganisation necessitates the creation of an additional post of Mahalkari in the grade of Rs. 150—5—200 with a permanent travelling allowance of Rs. 27 per mensem but also makes it possible to curtail the present revenue establishment by the abolition of two talatis and one Circle Inspector. The Personal Assistant to the Collector of Ahmedabad will cease to be the Prant Officer of the North and South Daskroi talukas and accordingly the permanent travelling allowance and tentage allowance of the Personal Assistant to the Collector will be discontinued. Thus the net extra cost on account of the rearrangement will be Rs. 100 a year and a full-time Resident Magistrate will be available for this almost trivial extra cost:—

*Remarks.*—Owing to the considerable growth of revenue and expenditure of local bodies, the expansion of school boards and additional work due to new audits being entrusted from time to time, the work of the Local Audit Department has increased to such an extent that the Examiner, Local Fund Accounts, finds it impossible to prevent arrears mounting up without additional staff. *Remarks.*—Until the introduction of the new Provincial Constitution all work in connection with the subject of "Labour" was dealt with in the first instance by a Senior Assistant in the Political and Services Department, who was attached to a Branch dealing with various other subjects, assistance being given, when necessary, by the existing staff. During the last two years, and particularly since the formulation of its Labour programme by the present Government, work pertaining to Labour has increased enormously and it has been found impossible for a single assistant to cope with it. In view of the need for economy, endeavour was made to carry on without additional staff but this arrangement was found to be unworkable. "Labour" work has been rapidly growing in importance and magnitude day by day and it has been found by actual experience that it is essential to make adequate arrangement for the efficient and prompt disposal of it. Government have therefore decided that the Labour section of the Political and Services Department should be strengthened and that it should be constituted as a separate Branch consisting of a Superintendent, two Assistants (of whom one has already been sanctioned) and a clerk. In view of the urgent need for such staff, the Branch was temporarily created from the 1st December 1938 to the 28th February 1939, and it is proposed to sanction it permanently with effect from the 1st March 1939 after the approval of the Legislative Assembly has been obtained.

*Remarks.*—The present sanctioned strength of Presidency Magistrates (including the Chief Presidency Magistrate) is six permanent and four temporary magistrates. One of the four temporary appointments of Additional Presidency Magistrates was created for a period of one year in the first instance from 2nd June 1934 owing to the abnormal congestion of work in the courts of the Presidency Magistrates. This appointment has been continued on a temporary basis from year to year up to 28th February 1939, as the work in the Courts continued to be seriously congested.

Another temporary appointment was created for a period of six months in the first instance from 1st September 1937, specifically for the trial of cases under the Gambling Act as there was an abnormal increase in the number of cases under that Act. This appointment also has been continued since then on a temporary basis up to 28th February 1939.

In addition to the two temporary appointments of Additional Presidency Magistrates, two more temporary appointments were created from 1st September 1938 up to 31st March 1939 in order to dispose of all arrears of gambling cases, as the appointment of only one Magistrate for the trial of cases under the Gambling Act was found insufficient. There are thus in all three temporary appointments of Additional Presidency Magistrates sanctioned exclusively for the trial of cases under the Gambling Act, one of which expires on 28th February 1939 and the other two on 31st March 1939.

2. The state of work in the Presidency Magistrates' Courts has again been reviewed and it is found that the work is still seriously congested. The total number of outstanding cases in the courts of Stipendiary Presidency Magistrates on 1st October 1938 was 4,452. The total number of gambling cases disposed of by the three Additional Presidency Magistrates from the commencement of their appointments up to 30th November 1938 was 2,052. The total number of gambling cases pending on that date before the three courts was 1,585.

In view of the state of work the Chief Presidency Magistrate has proposed that all the four temporary appointments should be continued further during the next year 1939-40 and the High Court have supported this recommendation. As there is no likelihood of the congestion of work being relieved in the near future by the normal permanent strength of the Presidency Magistrates, Government consider it essential that all the four appointments should be continued further on a temporary basis up to 29th February 1940, and that all the four should be put on the new scale of remuneration which was fixed for the two recent appointments.

The further continuance of all the four appointments up to 29th February 1940 involves an additional expenditure of Rs. 59,988 as shown below:—

*Remarks.*—There has been in recent years a large increase in the number of offences, such as crop-cutting, house-breaking and theft, committed in the villages of Uber, Vedach, Nodhna, Valipur and Nobar of the Jambusar Taluka of the Broach and Panch Mahals District, due partly to the inadequate police control and partly to the turbulent nature of the people, such as Barias and Patanwadias, who inhabit these areas. The local officers, who were asked to investigate the matter, have reported that the opening of a permanent police station at Vedach is necessary to cope with the long-standing evil of crop-cutting and harassment of the population and for making the general administration of the police in this area effective. Besides, suggestions have also been made for the transfer of the existing Police Station at Kavi to Kora and the conversion of the former into an outpost under the latter and the transfers of Kareli outpost under Jambusar Police Station and Sarod outpost under Kavi Police Station to the new Vedach Police Station. These proposals involve a net addition to the police strength of the Jambusar Taluka of one Sub-Inspector, three Head Constables and eleven Constables. Government is satisfied that the proposed arrangements are absolutely necessary for the proper policing of the local areas and they propose to put them into force from the 1st April 1939. The net additional cost involved amounts to Rs. 5,824 for eleven months of the next year as shown in detail below :—

by them but also because certain of them, while giving professional evidence, were proved on occasion to be quite unreliable. In 1933 an experiment was started in the Criminal Investigation Department of specialising in the science of handwriting examination and an expert in the Finger Print Bureau was put on the work. The experiment proved successful and to-day the Expert is regarded throughout the Province as an authority on the subject, so much so that numerous demands are made for his opinion in matters of forged cheques, false vouchers, altered documents, etc. The following figures show how the Handwriting Expert's work has been expanding from year to year :—

2. The cases referred to the Handwriting Expert are mainly of two kinds viz. those sent by Superintendents of Police or Courts *suo motu* and those sent by Courts at the request of parties to a case or suit. In the former cases i.e., Crown cases, no fees are charged and in the latter cases, fees are charged at the rate of Rs. 20 for each opinion given and Rs. 15 for each day's attendance in Court. Photographic work is undertaken by the Photo Zinco or Photo-Registration Department. The amount of money credited to Government since 1933 on account of this work is shown below :—

3. The work is increasing in volume and is already too much for one Expert. Government is convinced that it is now necessary to form a Handwriting Branch in the Criminal Investigation Department and proposes to constitute it as follows with effect from 1st April 1939 :—

1 Handwriting Expert on Rs. 200—10—300.

1 Handwriting Assistant Expert on Rs. 125—5—175 (probation for two years on Rs. 100 per mensem).

1 Junior clerk on Rs. 25—5/2—55.

1 Peon on Rs. 17 per mensem.

In order to economise expenditure it is proposed to abolish one post of Expert in the Finger Print Bureau, the annual cost of which amounts to Rs. 1,590.

4. It is also proposed to increase the present fees from Rs. 20 to Rs. 40 for an opinion with an extra charge of Rs. 5 for each document over 8 and from Rs. 15 to Rs. 20 for each day spent in attendance in Court or in travelling to or from Court. It would be possible for the Branch to deal with about 300 cases in a year and it is estimated on a very conservative basis that income from this source will amount to Rs. 5,000 per annum apart from the profit that will accrue to Government from Photographic work at the Photozinco Office. The increase in fees is not excessive considering that private agencies charge Rs. 100 for an opinion and Rs. 100 per day for giving evidence in Court *plus* travelling expenses. The Branch will thus in the long run be self-supporting and Government will not be involved in any extra expenditure.

*Remarks.*—The Lord Reay Industrial Museum, Poona, is an old institution having been established in about 1895. The Museum has been under the management of the Poona City Municipality. Its activities are at present controlled by a Board of Trustees consisting of eight members four of whom represent the Municipality. The Museum has been receiving an annual recurrent grant of Rs. 5,000 from the Poona Municipality since 1930. The Museum authorities are contemplating an ambitious scheme for the development and expansion of the activities of the Museum and have approached Government with requests for a recurrent grant for its maintenance and a non-recurrent grant to the extent of the value of timber required for constructing a building. The Museum is being conducted on sound lines and is doing very useful work. The activities of the Museum deserve encouragement and financial assistance and it is proposed that Government should give an annual grant of Rs. 2,000 rising up to Rs. 5,000 by an annual instalment of Rs. 500. The Trustees of the Museum have accepted the following conditions proposed by Government in regard to the grant to the Museum :—

(1) That the Poona City Municipality should agree to pay annually Rs. 5,000 as hitherto done.

(2) That Government should have power to appoint two nominees on the Board of Trustees for the management of the Museum.

The request of the Museum authorities for a non-recurrent grant in connection with its project of constructing a building is under the consideration of Government. In the meanwhile Government desires that a recurrent grant as proposed above should be given to the Museum on the conditions mentioned above with effect from 1939-40.

It has been represented to Government that the school should be developed into full High School as there have been instances of girls who had to discontinue their education after passing the 3rd standard for want of a separate girls' high school. It is the policy of Government that whenever possible, Middle Schools for Girls should be gradually developed into full high schools and as there is a real demand for the opening of higher standards in the Bijapur Girls' School, Government proposes to meet this demand as soon as possible. As a preliminary step, it is proposed to open Standard IV from June 1939, the remaining three standards being added later on.

*Remarks.*—The first year class for teaching Poster-designing and Commercial Art was started with the sanction of the legislature from the year 1935-36 and the second year class from 1936-37. This new Section of the School of Art has more than fulfilled its function in supplying the real needs of students requiring practical training in this subject. The Section has already become popular and Government started in anticipation of the sanction of the Legislative Assembly the 3rd year class from the 10th of June 1938, on a temporary basis. "Commercial Art" as a vocation has a promising future in India. Industrialists are becoming increasingly conscious of the importance of Commercial Art as an aid to modern advertising. Numerous small publicity companies in big cities are constantly on the lookout for good Commercial Artists. Blockmakers, lithographers, and commercial photographers have also a place for the Commercial Artist in their organisation. Automobile and radio companies, and certain other commercial houses as well as Tiles, Cement and Concrete Companies have begun to maintain their own staff of Commercial Artists. Poster-designing which is an important form of Commercial Art is in great demand by railways, film producing and distributing companies, insurance, shipping and aviation concerns, post and telegraphs, commercial associations, etc. Schemes of rural reconstruction are now being launched by all Provincial Governments, and as these involve widespread propaganda, the use of attractive posters has become almost indispensable to the village uplift movement. Commercial Art

has thus a very important part to play in the movement for industrial development and rural uplift. Besides being of a great public utility, this Section of the School of Art has been more than self-supporting as can be seen from the fact that its income during the three years 1935-36 to 1937-38 was Rs. 2,160, 6,050 and 5,200 while the expenditure was Rs. 1,500, 2,542 and 3,142 respectively. Government has therefore decided to place the Section on a permanent footing and to make the post of Assistant Teacher attached to it permanent and pensionable. The teaching staff at present sanctioned for the Commercial Art Section is as follows:—

- 1 Assistant Teacher on Rs. 200—10—300 (subject to revision).
- 2 Fellows on Rs. 60 per mensem each.

The recurring expenditure expected on contingencies is Rs. 692.

*Remarks.*—The Government Girls' Middle School at Ahmednagar teaches at present only four Anglo-Marathi Standards. It has been represented to Government that the school should be developed into a full High School as there have been instances of girls who had to discontinue their education after passing the IVth Standard for want of a separate girls' High School. It is the intention of Government that wherever possible Middle Schools for girls should be gradually developed into full High Schools and as there is a real demand for the opening of the three highest Standards in the Ahmednagar Girls' School, Government propose to meet this demand as soon as possible.

As a preliminary step it is proposed to open Standard V from June 1939, the remaining two standards being added in the two succeeding years, i.e., from June 1940 and June 1941 respectively.

The details of the extra recurring and non-recurring expenditure required to be incurred for the opening of Standard V are given in the appended statement. The details of the additional expenditure to be incurred in opening of Standards VI and VII in the School are not yet fully settled; but the ultimate annual average recurrent expenditure on the School when fully developed will be Rs. 7,132, if a special Science teacher is not entertained in addition to three Assistant Mistresses for the additional standards. In case however a *fourth* Assistant Mistress is appointed to teach Science the average cost will be Rs. 8,716. Besides this, non-recurring expenditure to be incurred during 1940-41 and 1941-42 for the opening of Standards VI and VII will be Rs. 4,000 and Rs. 1,000 respectively. Against this expenditure the estimated additional fee receipts which are likely to be received will be Rs. 500, Rs. 1,000 and Rs. 1,500 respectively in the first, second and third years.

*Remarks.*—The Government Anglo-Marathi Girls' Middle School at Thana teaches at present only first four Anglo-Marathi standards. It is the intention of Government that wherever possible the Middle Schools for girls should be gradually developed into full-fledged High Schools. In the interests of girls' secondary education in Thana, it is considered desirable that the Girls' School at Thana should be developed into a full-fledged High School. As a preliminary step it is proposed to open Standard V from June 1939 the remaining two standards being added with effect from the academic years 1940-41 and 1941-42.

*Remarks.*—In pursuance of the decision of Government to introduce the study of Hindustani in the schools of this Province, it is necessary to ensure that there is an adequate supply of teachers able to teach the language in the schools. Instruction in Hindustani will be included in the curriculum for the training courses, but it will be some time before it materialises and Government training institutions are able to cope with the demand for the requisite type of teachers. In the meantime, to meet the immediate demand for the supply of teachers who will be able to teach Hindustani it is necessary to take the help of private institutions affording courses of instruction in the language for purposes of training teachers and to pay them a suitable grant-in-aid.

There are at present some institutions in this Province run on sound lines providing the necessary courses of instruction in Hindustani—e.g., the Karnatak Hindi Shikshak Vidyalaya, Dharwar, the Maharashtra Hindi Shikshak Vidyalaya, Poona and the Hindi Pracharak Mandal, Surat. A recurring provision of Rs. 8,000 on account of grants-in-aid to such institutions has accordingly been made in the next year's budget.

*Remarks.*—The Training Institute for Physical Education has started its work with effect from 1st November 1938. On the recommendation of the Board of Physical Education the appointment of a Resident Medical Officer for the Training Institute has been sanctioned in the interests of the students and the staff as it was considered highly desirable to provide a medical officer for the Institute which is situated at a distance of about 2 miles from the Kandivali Railway Station. In addition to the work of medical supervision of the hostel the Medical Officer is entrusted with the work of teaching the medical subjects mentioned below included in the courses of study to be taught at the institute :—

- (i) Elementary knowledge of human body and principles of hygiene.
- (ii) Principles of physical examination and first aid.
- (iii) Mother craft and infant care (for women students).

The creation of a temporary non-Gazetted post of Resident Medical Officer on Rs. 150 per mensem with free quarters has been sanctioned for the period commencing from 1st November 1938 to 28th February 1939. The Institute has been sanctioned at present for three years. It will therefore be necessary to continue the post of Resident Medical Officer up to 31st May 1941 till which date other posts in connection with Physical Education have been sanctioned. The necessary additional provision of Rs. 1,800 has been made in the budget estimates for 1939-40.

*Remarks.*—The Chancellor of the Shreemati Nathibai Damodhar Thackersey Indian Women's University has applied for a recurrent annual grant for enabling that body to extend its activities. The following are some of the measures which are contemplated by the University for its expansion :—

- (1) Better equipment of the Chemistry and Biology Departments of the University and raising the standard of instruction in these subjects to that qualifying for admission to the L.C.P.S. course.
- (2) Equipment and expansion of the Library.
- (3) Arrangements for the teaching of a larger number of optional subjects.

The University has represented that it has to incur expenditure on the following additional items besides the normal expenditure :—

- (1) Instruction in the University being imparted in the regional languages duplication of teaching is unavoidable and a greater number of teachers have necessarily to be engaged.

(2) Colleges run by the University or affiliated to it have, in the absence of Government grants, to be substantially aided by the University to keep them in a state of efficiency and consequently are a great strain on the finances of the University.

(3) Feeder schools from which the University has to draw its students have also to be substantially aided out of its funds if the size and scope of the institution is to be increased.

It is stated that the total expenditure of the University in 1936-37 amounted to Rs. 1,20,585 out of which, excluding office expenses and incidental expenses, Rs. 91,070 represented the amount spent solely for educational purposes. The Chancellor has requested for the reasons given above that Government should sanction to the University a recurring annual grant equal to one-third of the amount of Rs. 91,070 referred to above. In view of the many demands of a more urgent nature on Government, it is not possible to accede to the request made by the Chancellor of the University to the fullest extent. Government, however, considers that in recognition of the valuable work the University is doing it deserves some aid from Government. It is therefore proposed to make an annual grant of Rs. 5,000 to the University.

*Remarks.*—The Anglo-Urdu School for Girls, Poona, is the only institution in the Province for Urdu-speaking girls. There was provision in the school for teaching the first five standards only. The question of developing it into a full High School has been before Government for some time. The main difficulty was the small number of girls attending the school especially in the higher standards. In view of the extremely backward condition of girls' education amongst the Muslims, Government have accepted the suggestion to develop the school into a full High School and have sanctioned the opening of standard VII from 1939-40.

The school is at present held in a building, which also houses two other Institutions, viz. the Urdu Training College for Women, Poona, and the Practising School attached to it. The present arrangements are not satisfactory and in order that the Institutions concerned should develop freely, provision for a separate building for the girls' school is proposed to be made.

A suitable building called "Ratan Villa" is available in the locality in which the school meets at present. The landlord is willing to carry out the additions and alterations necessary, to pay rates and taxes and conservancy charges in respect of the building and to arrange for the annual seasonal repairs. It is proposed to hire this building for a period of 5 years from next year.

The development of the school into a High School involves the inclusion of the post of Head Mistress in the B.E.S. Class II and the employment of 3 graduates Assistant Mistresses for standards VI and VII and to meet the present deficiency in staff, in addition to part-time special teachers for needle-work and drawing. There will also be an increase in the contingent expenditure of the school to some extent.

It is also proposed to provide a hostel for the school, provided the number of boarders is not less than 15. The necessary provision has, therefore, been made for the purpose, but the expenditure will not be incurred, unless there is a minimum number of 15 boarders.

*Remarks.*—It has been decided by Government that the Anglo-Urdu Girl's School, Poona, should be developed into a High School and it should be removed to a separate building with effect from June 1939. At present, the Head Mistress of the Practising School attached to the Urdu Training College works practically full-time in the college, and two Assistant Mistresses on the Practising School staff (one full-time and the other half-time) work in the middle school as a result of the arrangement made to combine standards V and VI of the Practising School with standards I and II of the Middle School. This arrangement will be terminated when the Middle School is transferred to a separate building and the primary standards V and VI restored to the Practising School. The Practising School has at present 6 classes—Infants (2 classes) and standards I to IV, so that when standards V and VI are restored to the school, there will be 8 classes. For these eight classes, there will, however, be seven teachers available for work if the Head Mistress of the Practising School continues to work in the college. When the Middle School is transferred to a separate building, the Head Mistress will have to devote her whole time to the Practising School. It has therefore been proposed to appoint one additional graduate mistress on Rs. 85—175 for the Urdu Training College for Women, so that the Head Mistress of the Practising School may be relieved of her work in the college and be set free entirely for work in the Practising School.

Four posts of Assistant Masters in the Dharwar High School will be set free as a result of the proposals for the disbanding of 4 classes in the school from next year. It is proposed to convert one post of a graduate Assistant Master at the Dharwar High School into that of a graduate Assistant Mistress on the scale of Rs. 85—175 and to transfer it to the Urdu Training College for Women, Poona, from June 1939 to provide an additional teacher for the college from the next year. This arrangement will not involve any extra cost.

The present clerk who works for both the Middle School and the College has been sanctioned for, and is borne on the establishment of, the Middle School. When the two institutions are accommodated in separate buildings from June 1939, the clerk in the Middle School will not be available for work in the Training College. There is thus a need for a separate clerk for the college.

The three Urdu Girls' institutions are at present accommodated in Madon Buildings with great difficulty and there is much congestion. There is no accommodation for a teachers' room for the college and for a laboratory for the teaching for Domestic Science. Also when the Middle School is shifted to a separate building, two class rooms will be required for standards V and VI of the Practising School. It is therefore proposed to utilise all the rooms at present used by the Middle School for the above purposes after its removal to another rented building.

The average annual cost involved on account of the above proposals amounts to Rs. 1,428 but as the proposed arrangements will take effect from June 1939, an amount of Rs. 945 only being the total pay of the clerk for nine months at Rs. 30 per mensem and rent at Rs. 75 per mensem for that period has been provided in the next year's budget.

*Remarks.*—In pursuance of the decision of Government to introduce the study of Hindustani in the schools of this Province as one of the steps by which it may be enabled to take its rightful place in the national life of India, it is necessary to make provision for the teaching of the subject in both the Devanagari and the Urdu scripts in all the Government Secondary Schools, the Primary training institutions, the Secondary Training College, Bombay, and the Secondary Training College which will be opened at Belgaum. So far as the secondary schools and Primary Training institutions are concerned, it is considered sufficient if a part-time teacher of Hindustani on Rs. 30 per mensem is appointed in each of the schools other than Anglo-Urdu schools and in the non-Urdu Training institutions. In regard to the Secondary Training Colleges in Bombay and Belgaum, it will be necessary to appoint a part-time assistant lecturer at each of these institutions on Rs. 75 per mensem, on the same lines as the posts of assistant lecturers for the regional languages sanctioned for the Government Arts Colleges in connection with the bifurcation scheme introduced in 1937.

The scheme as proposed above will involve an expenditure of Rs. 9,450 for the next year and an ultimate annual recurrent expenditure of Rs. 12,600—*vide* Statement A placed below.

With a view to making an early beginning in this direction instructions have already been issued to the heads of the Government Training institutions to make arrangements for the teaching of Hindustani to all Primary teachers under training from the beginning of the second term of the current year. The extra charge to Government during the current year on account of these arrangements will be Rs. 954 as shown in the accompanying Statement B and this charge will be met from savings.

Class I officer on Dr. Belvalkar's retirement and a Class I post of Sanskrit would have remained, had it not been abolished owing to the closure of the Deccan College as a measure of retrenchment. At present the position is that although all other subjects including French, Persian and Arabic have one or more Class I posts, only Sanskrit has none. For University requirements, Sanskrit is of greater importance than any other language as a larger number of students take Sanskrit. In foreign Universities also considerable importance is attached to Sanskrit as an oriental language. The absence of a Class I post for that language in Bombay cannot be justified. It is essential therefore that the status of the Class II post of Professor of Sanskrit at the Elphinstone College, Bombay, should be raised to Class I. Against this Class I post, there will be a saving of a Class II post of Rs. 250—650, so that the net ultimate annual recurring cost to Government on this account will be Rs. 1,512 only.

*Remarks.*—It has been recognised for some time now, that the Inspecting staff at present maintained by Government is quite inadequate in numbers to exercise efficient supervision over the educational institutions in the Province. This fact has been repeatedly brought to notice in the Annual Reports on Public Instruction year after year. Even as early as 1931, at the time of the re-organisation of the educational services the Director of Public Instruction had urged the necessity of a substantial increase in the Inspecting staff of Government if the standard of education, particularly in the Primary stages was to be maintained and improved and it was only the prevailing financial stringency that prevented Government at the time from sanctioning the required additional staff. Now that Government has resumed control of the Inspecting staff of the Local Authorities, to ensure that the considerable sums out of public funds spent on Primary education are being properly spent and that the standards of instruction in the schools are being maintained and steadily improved, the additional inspecting staff required to ensure the attainment of these objects has to be provided for without any further delay.

2. Having regard to the numbers of the Inspecting staff in sister Provinces, Government has decided that for purposes of proper supervision an Inspecting staff on the basis of one officer for every 75 schools should be maintained. This is a modest estimate compared with the recommendation of the Vocational Training Committee which recently made its report to Government that 50—60 schools would be the limit for each Inspecting Officer if supervision was to be efficient. Though it is not possible all at once to provide the full compliment of staff required on the basis of one Inspecting Officer for every 75 schools, the following additional staff is absolutely necessary for the present and is required to be sanctioned with effect from the beginning of the next financial year :—

- 3 Assistant Educational Inspectors in the B.E.S. Class II.
- 2 Assistant Inspectresses of Girls Schools in the B.E.S. Class II.
- 20 Deputy Educational Inspectors in the B.E.S. Class II.
- 38 Assistant Deputy Educational Inspectors in the Subordinate Educational Service (25 women and 13 men).
- 25 Clerks for the 25 officers in B.E.S. Class II.
- 68 peons 30 for the 25 officers in the B.E.S. Class II and the remaining for the 38 officers in the Subordinate Educational Service.

At the same time it is proposed to abolish 19 posts of Senior Assistant Deputy Educational Inspectors.

B. *Non-University Courses.*—(3) To institute Diploma Courses in (i) Accountancy and (ii) Secretarial Practice. The former will meet the demand for a diploma in accountancy of the same status as the G.D.A. Examination which was held by the Accountancy Diploma Board, Bombay, up to 1934, and the latter is to meet the demand for training in secretarial work.

The appended statement furnishes the details of the additional expenditure to be incurred on the extra staff which will be necessary for providing the arrangements mentioned above. The ultimate annual average recurrent expenditure involved in these proposals will be Rs. 5,300. It is proposed to charge a fee of Rs. 50 per term for each Diploma course and Rs. 75 per term in the case of students taking up both courses.

*Remarks.*—The Physical Education Committee appointed by Government in 1937 recommended *inter alia* the starting of Short-Term Courses for training primary teachers in Rural and Urban areas in Physical Education activities. This recommendation was accepted by Government in their Resolution No. 5310, dated the 25th May 1938, a copy of which was placed on the Assembly and Council Tables for the information of the members of both the houses of the Legislature. It is proposed to start the courses for both rural and urban areas from next year. The courses will be conducted on lines similar to those recommended in paragraph 14-B of the Report of the Physical Education Committee, 1937. The expenditure in the next year will be as shown below. The courses for Rural areas are proposed to be started from April 1939 while those for Urban areas will be started from June 1939. *Remarks.*—Government has decided to start about 60 Basic Craft Primary schools in selected compact areas of the Province from June 1939. It is proposed to convert all types of schools in a compact area, viz. 1st grade schools, 2nd grade schools, Girls schools, Urdu Schools, etc., into Basic Craft schools on the lines of the Wardha Scheme. Teachers will be specially trained for this purpose and will be put in charge of the bottom classes. About 100 trained teachers will be required for these 60 schools. It is not however necessary to have 100 additional new teachers. About 60 teachers from the schools which are proposed to be converted into Basic Craft schools will be replaced by teachers who will be specially trained for the purpose and the old teachers will be transferred to other ordinary schools. Thus there will be 40 extra teachers for the 60 schools and the cost on their account will be additional. The teachers working in these schools will be required to teach crafts and will have also to keep a record of day to day work and detailed notes regarding co-ordination. The work in these classes will be of a difficult nature particularly during the experimental stage and it is therefore proposed that the teachers working in the classes under the Basic Education Scheme should be given an extra allowance of Rs. 5 per mensem each.

2. It is necessary to guide the work of the schools very carefully in the initial stage. The teachers will also require some technical help in crafts from time to time. It is therefore proposed to have one special Supervisor and two Craft Supervisors for each compact area.

3. The schools under the Basic Education Scheme will have to be equipped not only for spinning and carding but also for agriculture. The schools will therefore require a plot of land at least of one acre in area. It is proposed to rent such plots in the case of about 30 schools and to purchase them in the case of the remaining 30 schools.

4. It is also proposed to encourage isolated schools in other districts run by local authorities on the lines of the Wardha Scheme by paying them grants on a liberal scale. A provision of Rs. 34,000 (Rs. 17,000 recurring and Rs. 17,000 non-recurring) has therefore been made in the next year's budget for grants-in-aid to such schools.

5. The total annual cost involved in these proposals will be Rs. 65,000 recurring and Rs. 44,000 non-recurring. The cost in the next year's budget for nine months will be Rs. 49,050 recurring and Rs. 44,000 non-recurring the details of which are given in the statement marked A.

6. If the Basic Craft Primary schools are to be started from June next it will be necessary to train teachers on the lines of the Wardha Syllabus. For this purpose a short course of training for four months will have to be given to about 100 teachers specially selected for the purpose at 3 places according to linguistic divisions, viz., Gujarat, Maharashtra and the Karnatak. The Gujarat Vidyapith has agreed to run a short training course on the lines of the Wardha Syllabus for the training of the Gujarat Primary teachers required for the Basic Schools to be started in Gujarat from June next. As regards the remaining two Divisions, viz., the Maharashtra and the Karnatak arrangements have been made by Government to open such training centres from 1st February 1939. The teachers deputed for training to these short-training centres will be given in addition to their own pay a deputation allowance of Rs. 10 per month each to cover the cost of board. They will also be given their actual travelling expenses. It will be necessary to continue these training centres for the whole year 1939-40 and also in future years for preparing teachers for the higher classes that will be opened in Basic Craft Primary schools in the year 1940-41 and thereafter. All these three training centres will be run by Government. The staff will practically remain the same as in the case of the short training course but the number of teachers to be trained will be 150 in all so that the private schools that may be opened by private individuals and local authorities outside the compact areas will also get teachers trained in basic crafts. These 150 teachers will be selected from the 1st year trained teachers in the employ of various local authorities and will be given 2nd year certificate on satisfactorily completing the course for the whole year 1939-40. While under training they will be given stipends at the same rates as are given at present to the primary teachers deputed to the ordinary Primary Training Institutions.

The cost to Government on account of the short-training courses during the current year, viz., for the month of February 1939 will be Rs. 5,933 and it is proposed to meet this charge from the provision of Rs. 2.35 lakhs made in the current year's budget for central (Basic Craft) schools and included in the lump provision of Rs. 32.92 lakhs for new schemes of educational expansion and improvement under "37-Education". The cost during the next year will be Rs. 46,172 recurring and Rs. 2,400 non-recurring. The details of this cost are shown in the Statement marked B.

7. In addition a special non-recurring grant of Rs. 25,000 is necessary for erecting temporary sheds in the compact areas by way of additions to the centrally situated First grade schools where it may be found necessary to shift the training centres. It is necessary that the training centres should keep contact with the schools under experimentation. The staff of the training centre will act as supervisors and frequent visitors to schools and it is therefore necessary that the training centres should be in the centre of the compact areas. There is no possibility of any such village providing the necessary buildings to accommodate 50 teachers and it is therefore necessary to erect temporary sheds for this purpose.

8. Government has already appointed a Special Officer for Basic Education to organise work in connection with the initiation and development of the Scheme of Basic Education. The cost on account of the pay of this officer and of his staff during the next year will be about Rs. 7,000 the details of which are given in the statement marked C.

9. After the starting of training centres it is proposed to invite the leaders and the framers of the Wardha Scheme to give lectures at the three centres. These outside lecturers will be given the travelling allowance admissible to them under the rules. The cost on this account is estimated at Rs. 1,500.

*Remarks.*—In January 1938 Government appointed a Committee to advise it on the question of training of primary teachers. The Committee in its report observes that half the teachers charged with the responsible task of imparting primary education are those who have had inadequate general education and no training at all and that the remaining though trained, have had unsatisfactory general education and a training of an intermittent character. The Committee goes on to say that it is indeed a tragedy that the responsible work of laying the foundation of national education in our country has to be entrusted to such poorly equipped teachers. The Committee has accordingly recommended a scheme of training under which persons after passing the Primary School Leaving Certificate Examination will first have to receive general education for three years in institutions called Lokashalas and will then be admitted into training institutions in which they will be given continuous training of two years. The Committee has further recommended that the 1st year trained teachers in service between the ages of 22 to 40 should be given further training of one year in the present course of training and that the qualified teachers in service between the ages of 22 to 40 should also be given continuous training for two years in the existing training college course. Government is convinced that the standard of teaching in primary schools must be raised and that this can only be done by training the teachers. Government has accordingly decided that the qualified and 1st year trained teachers in service should be given further training on the lines recommended by the Committee.

So far as men teachers are concerned it is proposed to admit a larger number of students in the existing Government Primary Training Institutions from next year and also to open two District Training Schools for Marathi teachers in Satara and Ratnagiri and one for Gujarati teachers in Surat. With these Training Institutions it will be possible to increase the number of teachers under training every year from 835 to 1,340. There is no need at present for an additional training school for Kannada and Urdu teachers as the number is small and they can be accommodated in the existing Institutions. As regards Women Teachers it is proposed to open two additional Training Schools in Nasik and Nadiad providing for 120 students in each and also to admit 110 additional teachers in the existing institutions. It is also proposed to ask the Private Primary Training Institutions to admit about 300 additional teachers for training with effect from next year.

4. The Primary Teachers Training Committee has made a recommendation, so far as the present teachers are concerned that Government should declare that the teachers obtaining a higher certificate shall not be entitled to a higher salary merely by virtue of that certificate. It is, however, necessary to consider this recommendation along with the Committee's recommendation No. 45 (c) to (e). The Committee itself has recommended that 1st year trained teachers as well as qualified teachers should be considered eligible to the new scale proposed by the Committee for training teachers after they have received further training. A declaration will be made before the teachers are sent up for higher training, as recommended by the Committee, that they will not be entitled to receive any increase in pay merely on the ground of their having completed the full course of training. There is, therefore, no question of additional cost on account of increased pay to trained teachers for the present. Government however, realises that it will not be equitable to ask trained teachers to work on the lower pay indefinitely. The teachers trained under this scheme will have to be given the higher pay that may be sanctioned for them by Government hereafter. If the scale of pay recommended by the Committee is adopted it would mean incurring an additional liability of about Rs. 15 lakhs ultimately on the existing number of teachers a part of which namely about Rs. 9 lakhs will have to be borne by Government. Government has, however, recently decided that the expenditure on the payment of Head Master's and 1st Assistant's allowances should not be admitted for the purposes of Government grant from 1st April 1939. The annual cost to Government and to local authorities on account of these allowances is estimated roughly to be Rs. 5 lakhs and Rs. 2½ lakhs respectively. If this saving is taken into account the *ultimate* recurring cost to Government, on account of the revision of pay of primary teachers if the Committee's recommendation is adopted, will be Rs. 4 lakhs while the actual total extra cost during the next three years, if the scale of pay proposed by the Committee is adopted, will be roughly as shown below:—

There will, therefore, be no extra cost to Government for a few years to come even if the scale of pay proposed by the Committee is adopted. The question regarding the revision of pay of primary teachers is at present under consideration and pending the decision of Government on that question the teachers sent up for higher training will be warned that they will not be held entitled to any higher pay on their having completed the full course of training.

*Remarks.*—In accordance with its general scheme for providing suitable vocational training for boys of the educated classes in order to relieve unemployment among them Government has decided to convert some of their High Schools into junior vocational schools. The general outline of instruction of these converted schools as at present conceived will be that general education will be given as at present up to Standard IV with a little vocational bias and in the next three or four standards there will be specialisation in vocational subjects but some general education will be continued side by side particularly the study of English in order that the boys may be acceptable to the University for admission to Professional colleges if they so desire. To start with it is proposed to convert five schools from next year into (1) two commercial schools, (2) one technical school and (3) two agricultural schools. A lump provision of Rs. one lakh recurrent and one lakh non-recurrent was made in the current year's budget for the purpose but as the decision as to what vocational schools were suitable for what localities could not be arrived at in time the change could not be effected during the current year. The details of the recurrent provisions in the case of all the 3 types of schools are shown in the accompanying statements. The non-recurrent expenditure required for purchasing the equipment, etc., of the proposed schools will be met from the non-recurrent provision of Rs. 1,00,000 made in the current year's budget.

*Remarks.*—I. *Addition of standard VII to Girls' Primary Schools teaching up to standard VI.*—The Primary Teachers' Training Committee has expressed the view that no fundamental differentiation should be made between the education of boys and girls who should offer the same public examination at the end of the course. The Committee has accordingly recommended that one more standard should be added to girls' primary schools and the syllabus of the girls' schools should be so revised as to bring the girls' course on a par with the boys' course. Government agrees with the Committee that the Primary course for girls should be extended by one year and should to a certain extent be brought into line with the primary course for boys. This will mean the opening of standard VII in all the existing girls' schools which teach up to standard VI. There are at present about 550 girls' schools teaching up to standard VI and preparing girls for the girls' Primary School Leaving Examination. The opening of an additional standard in these schools will involve additional expenditure roughly estimated at Rs. 1,50,000. The cost to Government at the usual 2/3rds rate will be about Rs. 1 lakh. A provision of Rs. 1 lakh has accordingly been made in the next year's budget for giving grants-in-aid to Local Authorities for adding standard VII to those girls' primary schools which teach up to standard VI at present.

II. *Grants to Local Authorities for introducing compulsory elementary or primary education.*—One of the main objects with which the Primary Education Act of 1923 was passed was to provide for compulsory education up to the end of standard IV for children between the ages of 6 and 11. These hopes have not, however, been fulfilled and this has been largely due to the inability of Government to finance compulsory education according to the terms of the Primary Education Act. The policy of Government is to provide compulsory education at least for the elementary stage. A provision of Rs. 3 lakhs has accordingly been made in the next year's budget for giving grants-in-aid to the Local Authorities which will introduce compulsory elementary or primary education in their areas.

III. *Opening of Local Board Schools in school-less villages with a population ranging between 700 and 1,000.*—It is the earnest desire of Government to provide at least the bigger school-less villages with primary schools immediately. A provision of Rs. 40,000 was accordingly made in the current year's budget to help Local Boards to start 200 primary schools in school-less villages with a population of 1,000 and over. The response given by the Local Boards to the appeal made by Government in this connection has been satisfactory. Government now desires to go a step further by encouraging the Local Boards to open schools in smaller school-less villages, i.e., with a population ranging between 700 to 1,000. The total number of such villages which have got no schools at present is 574. It is expected that about 500 additional schools will be opened in such villages during the course of the next year. A provision of Rs. 1 lakh has accordingly been made for this purpose taking Rs. 200 as the average grant per school.

*Remarks.*—Government has made in the current year's budget a provision of Rs. 1 lakh with a view to encouraging Local Boards to construct school buildings of their own for their primary schools with the help of the building grants from Government. This provision has been distributed among the 20 districts of the Province at the rate of Rs. 5,000 for each district. The amount allotted to each board has been placed at the disposal of a special committee constituted for the purpose for each district on the distinct understanding that an equal sum is also placed at the disposal of this committee by the district local board from its own funds or partly from its funds and partly from private contributions. It is proposed to make a provision of Rs. 5 lakhs for this purpose in the next year's budget. The amount will be distributed among the 20 districts of the Province at the rate of Rs. 25,000 for each district and

will be placed at the disposal of the District Building Committees constituted for the purpose on condition that a contribution equal to *half the* amount paid by Government is placed at the disposal of the District Building Committee by the District Local Board concerned from its own funds or partly from its own funds and partly from private contributions. The local share is reduced from one-half of the cost to one-third as it is believed that local boards will find it increasingly difficult to contribute a larger share either from their own limited resources or from private contributions or from both as financial conditions in rural areas are generally speaking far from satisfactory.

*Remarks.*—There are at present two honorary radiologists working in the X-Ray Department of the J. J. Hospital, Bombay. The work in this Department has increased considerably. It has been found impossible for the two radiologists to cope with the increased work and the necessity for a full time paid assistant is keenly felt. It is accordingly proposed to appoint a House Physician in this Department. He will be paid a stipend of Rs. 50 per mensem throughout the year. The proposal involves a recurrent expenditure of Rs. 600 per annum. The cost during 1939-40 will amount to Rs. 550.

*Remarks.*—The question of opening a Dental School and Hospital in Bombay has been under the consideration of Government for several years past. In 1927 the Trustees of the Sir Currimbhoy Ebrahim Memorial Fund offered a donation of Rs. 1,00,000 towards the construction of a Dental School and Hospital in memory of the late Sir Currimbhoy Ebrahim, 1st Baronet. This offer was accepted by Government, and administrative approval was given to the work of erecting a Dental School and Hospital above the Out-Patient Department of the J. J. Hospital. In March 1929 Government sanctioned the recurrent expenditure required for starting the Dental School and Hospital and the necessary provision was actually made in the budget estimates for 1929-30. At the last moment, however, Government decided not to proceed with the scheme in view of the gravity of the financial situation at the time. Since then although the building built out of the generous donation given by the Trustees of the Sir Currimbhoy Ebrahim Memorial Fund has been lying vacant, Government has not been able to find funds for opening the school and hospital. Repeated representations have been made to Government regarding the necessity of opening the school and hospital at a very early date, and Government has accordingly drawn up a scheme which will be self-supporting when it is fully in force. The opening of the Dental School and Hospital will help to turn out properly qualified dentists and also pave the way for the framing of a Dentists' Registration Act, proposals in regard to which are separately under the consideration of Government.

2. Under the scheme approved by Government the Sir Currimbhoy Ebrahim Dental School and Hospital will be run in connection with the Grant Medical College and the J. J. Group of Hospitals, Bombay, and the curriculum of the School will be based on the diploma course adopted by the College of Physicians and Surgeons, Bombay. A candidate for the License in Dentistry to be styled "L.D.S.C.P.S., Bombay" will be required to pass three professional examinations. The course of studies extends over a period of four years. Twenty students will be admitted to the First Year Class of the School every year. There will thus be accommodation for 80 students in all in the School. The qualifying examination for admission to the School will be the Intermediate Science Examination of the Bombay University, comprising the subjects of Chemistry, Physics and Biology, or an examination recognised by the College of Physicians and Surgeons, Bombay, as equivalent to it. Candidates who have passed the first M.B.B.S. and L.C.P.S. Examinations in certain subjects will also be eligible for admission to the School as also are Medical Graduates and Licentiatees. The tuition fee to be charged will be Rs. 500 per annum per student.

3. A statement showing the financial effect of the Scheme is attached. In addition to the non-recurrent expenditure of Rs. 31,800 which will have to be incurred in the first year on equipment, expenditure of Rs. 16,000 and Rs. 12,000 will have to be incurred on additional equipment at the end of the First and Second Year, respectively.

*Remarks.*—The scheme of subsidising private medical practitioners started as an experimental measure in October 1936 has been extended during the current year by increasing the number of centres to about 200. Government now proposes to extend the scheme still further by opening about 250 more such centres during next financial year. The conditions of subsidy in the case of the new centres will be the same as those sanctioned in the case of the existing centres. As some time is likely to elapse before the types (Allopathic, Ayurvedic and Unani) of the new centres and the places at which they are to be opened are settled in consultation with the District Local Boards concerned and before the private medical practitioners to be subsidised are selected it is proposed to make a provision of Rs. 1 lakh only during the year 1939-40 on account of the 250 additional centres proposed on the assumption that the new centres will be opened during the second half of next year. The annual recurrent cost on account of the 250 centres is estimated at Rs. 2 lakhs.

*Remarks.*—With a view to encourage the study and spread of the Ayurvedic system of medicine, Government proposes to open two Ayurvedic schools, with hospitals attached to them for clinical instruction to students. One of them will be located in Belgaum and the other at a place to be selected in Gujarat.

The course of studies will be that prescribed by the Board of Indian Systems of Medicine and admissions to the schools will be restricted to candidates who have passed the examination in general education prescribed by the Board. A fee of Rs. 75 per annum will be charged to each student. It is proposed to allot five free studentships for each school.

The accompanying statement shows the expenditure proposed to be incurred on each school and hospital. Provision has been made for the staff for 6 months only next year. It may be necessary to have some additional staff after the first two years when the clinical studies commence.

*Remarks.*—The Bombay Branch of the Town Planning and Valuation Department was opened on 2nd November 1936, on the abolition of the post of Land Manager, and the following permanent and temporary staff from the Land Manager's office was taken over for the branch office :—

Head Clerk, Land Acquisition Surveyor (part-time), Dafterband and 3 peons (one on part-time basis).

*Temporary staff :—*

In addition, a temporary post of typist clerk was sanctioned with effect from 1st April 1937 up to 28th February 1939.

The temporary posts of Land Acquisition Clerk and Senior Draftsman have been in existence since 1921, the post of Surveyor was created in 1933 and the additional post of Typist-Clerk was created in 1937 because the existing two clerks (permanent Head Clerk and temporary Land Acquisition Clerk) were fully occupied with land acquisition cases and town planning work and no clerk was available for general office work and typing.

2. The work of the Bombay Office of the Town Planning and Valuation Department shows steady increase in all its branches, viz. Town Planning, Land Valuation and Land Acquisition, and the existing staff is barely sufficient to cope with it. There is no likelihood of any decrease of work in the near future and, so far as can be foreseen, the whole staff will be required permanently. It is, therefore, proposed to convert the four temporary posts of Land Acquisition Clerk, Surveyor, Senior Draftsman and Typist-Clerk into permanent posts with effect from 1st March 1939. The scales of pay of the posts will be as follows :—

Remarks.—The northern part of the Juhu Island has large areas waiting development due to want of suitable water supply and there has been constant demand from property holders for new connections. The owners of these properties will use water from 1,000 gallons to 2,000 gallons per day for domestic use and gardens. *Remarks.*—The provision of the proposed mains is necessary to meet the increased demand for water in these areas where a number of milch cattle stables and a few bungalows have developed. The present 4" and 2" mains are found to be insufficient to meet the increased demand and it is proposed to replace them by 6" and 4" new pipes and also to re-lay the old 4" pipes after clearing them. The provision of these mains will also improve the water supply to the Malcolm Bag and remove the complaints of the occupants of that area. Many more stables have been recently built between Jogeshwari and Goregaon and hundreds of villagers and stable owners are put to a great hardship for lack of water in that area. The Bombay Municipality has been supplying 2.7 million gallons of water per day for distribution to suburbs but the Municipality has now agreed to supply 6 million gallons per day. The capital expenditure of Rs. 15,700 will be partly realised by the premia and the balance by the profits derived during the next four or five years.

*Remarks.*—The Director of Public Health has to be on tour for supervision, control of epidemics and arrangements at fairs and a Personal Assistant at headquarters is necessary to relieve him of routine work. The activities and duties of the Director have also greatly increased in recent years, hence he is not able to devote much time to the study of statistical reports of this and other Provinces and to tour more to be in touch with local authorities and special problems. He has to spend time in doing work that should properly be done by a personal assistant. Similar other heads of Departments in this Province have a Personal Assistant. For these reasons it is proposed to give the necessary relief to the Director of Public Health by appointing a Personal Assistant for him in the scale of Rs. 200—20/2—300—20—400.

*Remarks.*—In the year 1920 when the grades in the Town Planning and Valuation Department were revised a requisition for 11 posts was made, but only 6 posts were sanctioned by Government in the permanent establishment and the remaining 5 were provided for from the grant for temporary contract establishment. In the year 1930 when the activities of the Department were curtailed 3 temporary posts were retrenched but even when the activities were again renewed the retrenched clerks were not reinstated with the result that the whole burden of clerical work had to be divided between 6 permanent clerks and 2 temporary clerks. The estate is still without drainage facilities. It is necessary for Government to provide these facilities. This work has been approved administratively by Government.

*Remarks.*—The B. D. 8 Cotton seed multiplication and distribution scheme, which had for its object the extension of that cotton in the Broach district, was introduced in December 1935 for three years. The period expired on 1st December 1938. This cotton has a high ginning percentage and its spinning quality is even superior to that of 1027 A. L. F. Attempts were accordingly made to bring this quality to the notice of mill-owners in Bombay with a view to obtaining full Surat prices for it. The results obtained during the period of operation of the scheme are satisfactory and the gin-owners and merchants have been convinced of the advantages of this superior strain. The replacement of the inferior and coarse short-staple Goghari cotton in the Broach tract, by B. D. 8 cotton is in the interests of the cotton cultivators of this tract. It is, accordingly, proposed to extend the scheme for five years from 1st December 1938.

2. According to the new policy of the Indian Central Cotton Committee in financing seed-distribution schemes, expenditure on such schemes is to be divided into (1) cost of staff and (2) cost of incidental charges on the distribution of seed *minus* receipts, if any. The Committee will finance one of these two items, but not both. The cost of the scheme spread over five years will be Rs. 57,958. The Indian Central Cotton Committee has agreed to bear expenditure to the extent of Rs. 36,902 (Rs. 38,274 gross expenditure *minus* Rs. 1,372 anticipated savings in the current year's expenditure), and Government's share of the cost will be the balance, viz., Rs. 19,684. Government's share during the next year will amount to Rs. 2,500.

*Remarks.*—In the South Surat area the best cotton is "1027 A. L. F." In 1919 the reputation of Surat cotton was at a low ebb. The Agricultural Department was instructed to help the cultivator by distributing all available seed of "1027 A. L. F." and of another variety known as "I-A". "1027 A. L. F." went ahead on its fibre merits until it occupied an area of nearly 5 lakhs acres. The characteristics of this cotton are long staple and high ginning percentage. In 1934 the question of adopting a definite policy with regard to the type of cotton to be extended in South Gujarat was considered by the Indian Central Cotton Committee and it was decided that the then existing policy of growing "1027 A. L. F." type of cotton should be continued. A scheme for the distribution and extension of "1027 A. L. F." cotton seed was, accordingly, sanctioned for five years at an estimated cost of Rs. 66,390 and was financed from the subsidy received from the Indian Central Cotton Committee. As the results obtained are satisfactory it is proposed to continue the scheme for three years from 1st April 1939 at an estimated cost of Rs. 35,341 and the Indian Central Cotton Committee has been approached for a subsidy. According to the policy of the Indian Central Cotton Committee in financing seed distribution schemes which has been accepted by Government, the Committee will bear Rs. 16,718 the balance of Rs. 18,623 being met by Government as its contribution towards the scheme during the entire period of three years. The cost on account of the Government contribution for the next year will amount to Rs. 6,122. A provision to this extent has, therefore, been made in the estimates for 1939-40.

for over four years and it has been definitely proved that Banilla cotton thrives very satisfactorily on the Deccan Canals area and on the well-irrigation tracts of Sholapur, Poona and Ahmednagar districts. Moreover, the cotton crop has lately become one of the main supports of the agriculturists on this area as it responds well to manurial treatment and gets the benefit of the residual effect of manure given to sugar cane. It is, accordingly, proposed to continue the scheme in the interests of the cotton growers in the Deccan Canals area for five years from 1st April 1939 at an estimated cost of Rs. 51,961 and the Indian Central Cotton Committee has been approached for a subsidy.

2. According to the policy of the Indian Central Cotton Committee in financing seed distribution schemes, which has been accepted by Government the Committee will bear Rs. 6,841, the balance of Rs. 45,120 being met by Government, during the entire period of five years. Council of Agricultural Research. The work will be done at the Wheat Breeding Station at Niphad in collaboration with the Crop Botanist to Government. The cultures of physiologic races of black rust will be maintained either at Poona or Mahableshwar. The scheme which is estimated to cost Rs. 51,280 spread over five years has been approved by the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research, but it has decided to allocate Rs. 30,000 for the scheme for three years only in the first instance. As the conditions in the black soil areas of the Central Provinces and Berar closely resemble those in the Province of Bombay, the scope of the scheme has been so enlarged as to include these areas also. For this purpose the Research Council has included additional provision for one agricultural overseer and one agricultural sub-overseer and a small grant for their travelling allowance, etc. The entire cost of the scheme will be borne by the Research Council, the contribution of the Bombay Government towards its cost being limited to the supervision of the Plant Pathologist over the work and the provision of a site for the glass house at Mahableshwar. *Remarks.*—In accordance with an arrangement sanctioned in 1910 the cost of construction of buildings for veterinary dispensaries was borne by Government, the local bodies and the Wadia Bequest Fund in the proportion of 1 : 1 : 2 respectively. The building programme was stopped in 1927-28 and since then, no contribution has been asked for from the Wadia Bequest Fund. The contribution received from the Wadia Bequest Fund up to 1926-27 has not been fully utilized; there is still a balance of Rs. 30,861-15-0. This balance is treated as lapsed and credited to Government as "Unclaimed Deposits" under "XLVI—Miscellaneous". The District Local Boards, Bijapur, West Khandesh, East Khandesh and Dharwar, are anxious to construct buildings for veterinary dispensaries at Sindgi, Taloda, Bhusawal and Hubli and are prepared to meet half the cost of construction provided the other half is made available out of the Wadia Bequest Fund. The District Local Boards are prepared to undertake construction of the buildings in the ensuing year and to provide the funds to meet their share of the constructional cost in their estimates for that year. *Remarks.*—Rinderpest is one of the most dreaded and fatal of cattle diseases. Cattle can be effectively protected for a fairly long period by the method of vaccination with rinderpest virus obtained from goats. As this virus can be manufactured locally at small cost Government sanctioned in 1935, as an experimental measure for three years, the establishment of a goat-virus producing station at Bombay. The station is located at the Bombay Veterinary College and is conducted under the supervision of the College staff. The following staff has been sanctioned for work at the station :—

1 Veterinary Assistant Surgeon (Rs. 50—4—90—5—125) with compensatory local allowance.

1 Inferior servant on Rs. 25 per mensem.

2 Inferior servants on Rs. 19 per mensem each.

The period of sanction expired on 31st May 1938 and orders have been issued for the continuance of the station up to 28th February 1939. As goat virus has been proved to be the cheapest and the most effective method of immunizing cattle against rinderpest, the question whether the work should be continued at the Bombay Veterinary College or at the Haffkine Institute, Bombay, was considered with special reference to the relative cost and advantages of producing goat virus at these institutions. As it is not possible for the Haffkine Institute to undertake the work without additional staff and extra accommodation for animals it is proposed to continue the work at the Bombay Veterinary College on a permanent basis. The expenditure on this account during 1939-40 is estimated at Rs. 6,328.

*Remarks.*—The Royal Commission on Agriculture remarked that a veterinary assistant surgeon would usually be called upon to treat the diseases of ruminants and mainly of cattle and that special prominence should be given in the curriculum of a veterinary college for the training of veterinary assistant surgeons in the subjects of anatomy, physiology and diseases of the ox tribe. A committee of experts was accordingly appointed by the Imperial Council of Agriculture Research in 1933 to draw up a model curriculum for the training of veterinary assistant surgeons. A revised three years' curriculum based on the proposal of the Committee of experts has been prepared and it is proposed to introduce it from the academic term of the college beginning from 15th June 1939. Inter-science (B Group) will be the minimum qualification for admission to the College. For this purpose the superior college staff which consists of a Principal in class I and four Assistant Professors in class II of the Bombay Veterinary Service requires to be strengthened by two additional posts, viz., a bacteriologist and a part-time lecturer. For the post of bacteriologist a man with considerable training and experience in bacteriology is required. It is, therefore, proposed to create the post in class I of the Bombay Veterinary Service in the scale of Rs. 300—900. The part-time lecturer who will be appointed on a pay of Rs. 100 per mensem will take up the subjects of physiology and physiological chemistry until an officer from the Veterinary Department is trained in those subjects. The cost on account of these posts for the next year will amount to Rs. 3,910.

the Co-operative Departments should be reorganised so as to avoid duplication of work and secure greater efficiency and an economical use of Government's resources. After careful consideration Government has come to the conclusion that this can best be achieved by combining all rural development work and propaganda in the hands of one department with a sufficiently extensive and well equipped organisation. In the opinion of Government that Department should be the Co-operative Department which is well familiar with this kind of work and the methods of which are best suited to bring the results of the specialised research work of departments, like the Agricultural Department, etc., within the reach of the masses. Government has, therefore, decided that the Agricultural Department should cease to do any propaganda work and devote its energies to education, i.e., work in the College of Agriculture, research, experiment and live stock improvement. The propaganda staff of the Agricultural Department will then be transferred to the Co-operative Department. The reorganised Co-operative Department will, in addition to dealing with the problems of the Co-operative Movement, be in charge of all propaganda and demonstration work and the rural development work. The Department should be designated as the Co-operative and Rural Development Department and the Registrar of Co-operative Societies will be the Registrar of Co-operative Societies and the Director of Rural Development.

2. With the transfer of the propaganda and demonstration work to the reorganised Co-operative and Rural Development Departments, two of the four posts of Deputy Director of Agriculture will be abolished. The two Cotton Superintendents and the Divisional Superintendent of Agriculture, Deccan Canals, and their staff and the present propaganda staff of the Agricultural Department consisting of 45 Agricultural Overseers, 30 Agricultural Sub-overseers and 29 Kamgars and the 50 temporary kamgars employed at the taluka demonstration centres will be transferred to the Co-operative and Rural Development Department.

3. To enable the Registrar of Co-operative Societies and Director of Rural Development to perform satisfactorily his duties as the head of the reorganised Co-operative and Rural Development Department, he will be given the assistance of a Deputy Director of Rural Development and the requisite office staff. This officer will be drawn from amongst the Deputy Directors of the Agricultural Department.

4. The present divisional Assistant Registrars of Co-operative Societies will also be Rural Development Officers for their respective charges. The present charges of the Assistant Registrar are too heavy and if the Assistant Registrars are to perform their duties of supervision and control over co-operative societies properly and also take up the rural development work it is necessary to reduce the extent of their charges. Under the proposals of Government there will be one Assistant Registrar and Rural Development Officer for every two districts.

5. Below the Assistant Registrars and Rural Development Officers there will be Rural Development Inspectors each in charge of a revenue sub-division. Where the rural development work is intensive additional Rural Development Inspectors may have to be employed. These officers will be the Agricultural Overseers who will be transferred from the Agricultural Department and from the existing Agricultural Organisers of the Co-operative Department.

6. Next to Rural Development Inspectors there will be Assistant Development Inspectors for each taluka and peta. The 30 Agricultural Sub-overseers and 29 Kamgars who will be transferred from the Agricultural Department will be merged as Assistant Development Inspectors.

7. For work in villages it is proposed to employ 1,000 workers after thorough training in—(1) agricultural improvements to be popularised in the areas concerned; (2) co-operative methods of work for re-constructing rural life; (3) cottage industries likely to succeed in the areas concerned; and (4) management of village panchayats. These village workers will be given pay in the scale of Rs. 20—1—35, but while under training which will last about a year they will be paid stipends at the rate of Rs. 8 per mensem each to meet their expenses of boarding and lodging. It is also proposed to give a bonus to workers who show application and ability during the period of training to secure the best available material for rural development work.

8. Even under the existing conditions the necessity of an officer to assist the Registrar of Co-operative Societies in his statutory duty of audit and to advise him in matters relating

to co-operative finance, banking, etc., is keenly felt. With the expansion of the activities of the Department and the increase in the duties and responsibilities of the Registrar the necessity of such an officer will be still more keenly felt. It is, therefore, proposed to employ an Assistant Registrar for Co-operative Finance with a staff of one sub-auditor, one clerk and peon under the Registrar.

9. The proposals also provide for the establishment of a price intelligence service in Bombay and for that purpose it is proposed to appoint a Marketing Officer who will be in touch with marketing organisations and supply information regarding the Bombay markets and be a liaison officer between marketing organisations and consumers and traders in Bombay and co-operative sale and multipurpose societies in rural areas. He will also organise co-operative marketing in Bombay.

10. For systematic and speedy recovery of co-operative societies' dues which have become heavy it is proposed to employ a recovery staff consisting of 100 recovery officers and an equal number of clerks and peons for a period of 3 years.

11. To give effect to the proposals outlined above the following staff in addition to the staff that will be transferred from the Agricultural Department is considered necessary :—

*Remarks.*—Owing to the expansion of the Department of Industries the work of the Director of Industries had greatly increased and it had become difficult for him to handle it satisfactorily and expeditiously. Government therefore created with the sanction of the Legislature the post of a Personal Assistant to the Director for a period of two years in the first instance on the scale of pay of Rs. 170—10—250—efficiency bar—15—400—efficiency bar—20—500. *Remarks.*—Installation of an Electrical Engineering Laboratory at the R. C. Technical Institute, Ahmedabad, is required in connection with the introduction of an apprentice course in Electrical Engineering at the Institute. At present there is no provision for teaching electrical engineering at the Institute. There is, therefore, neither accommodation for an electrical laboratory nor any equipment for the same. The installation of such a laboratory is absolutely necessary for the training of apprentices at the Institute. It is proposed to construct a separate building for housing the proposed electrical laboratory. *Remarks.*—There are in this Province about 51,144 acres under cultivation of Sisal Hemp and 35,618 acres under Sann Hemp producing considerable quantities for export and utilization locally for manufacture of twines and ropes. There is great scope for the development of the market for hemp fibre and, in view of this, Government has sanctioned the appointment of a Fibre Expert who is now carrying on the work of survey and preliminary experiments on the cultivation of hemp plants and extraction with the use of improved appliances.

2. The American Mission School at Ahmednagar under Reverend and Mrs. Long has been making experiments in the manufacture of articles besides ropes from Sisal fibre and very useful results have been obtained by this School which was visited by the Director of Industries. There is however considerable scope for improving the present work there as well as for utilizing the school with certain alterations and additions of equipment to train apprentices in the manufacture of hemp articles. The apprentices will be selected from all districts in this Province and from the class of rural workers at present engaged in this industry making only ropes. This method of training proposed at a central school at Ahmednagar would enable the training of a considerable number of workers in improved methods of fibre extraction, dyeing and spinning, weaving and other processes for the manufacture of utility articles.

3. It is proposed to subsidize the School for this purpose by payment of recurrent and non-recurrent grants for a period of 3 years in the first instance with effect from 1939-40. The school will be controlled by the Mission authorities and will be visited periodically by the Government Fibre Expert.

*Remarks.*—In 1936, Government had sanctioned the appointment of a Tanning Expert for a period of three years. The term of appointment of the officer is due to expire on 31st March 1939. Government considers that it is desirable to continue the work of imparting instruction in improved methods of tanning to the tanners in the Province. It is also proposed to establish a Tanning School at Khar. In view of these facts, Government proposes to combine the post of Tanning Expert with that of the Superintendent of the Tanning School, to make it permanent and pensionable and to include it in the General Provincial Service—Industries Department—Class II, with a scale of pay of Rs. 170—10—250—Efficiency bar—15—400—E—B. 20—500. *Remarks.*—The All India Village Industries Association has prepared a scheme for the manufacture of hand-made paper of a kind superior to the variety which is at present produced by the hand-made paper manufacturers at Junnar. For superior kind of hand-made paper there would be a good market and a better market can be created with a little propaganda. Sawkars and Deshi commercial firms use hand-made paper for their account books. Hand-made paper is also used for share certificates, insurance certificates and documents and there is also a demand for it in Government departments and big commercial firms. In the beginning the object will be to manufacture a superior kind of hand-made paper, but later on, the establishment would become a training centre where the pupils could be taught to make all kinds of paper from village waste and raw products. *Remarks.*—Previous to the introduction of the Payment of Wages Act whenever an Inspector was allowed leave, his work was arranged for by re-distribution among the remaining Inspectors without requiring leave substitutes to be engaged for temporary periods. This course, however, is not now practicable without seriously affecting the efficiency of the Department whose work has enormously increased owing to the Payment of Wages Act and the increased number of complaints regarding wages, etc., which require in particular prompt investigation. On account of the absence on leave of two Inspectors the Factory Department will be short by two men till September 1939, while applications may be received from four or more Inspectors for shorter periods of leave in India during the succeeding two or three years after which the Chief Inspector of Factories is due to retire. Having regard to this leave position and the increased work which the Department has to face, Government considers that it would be in the best interest of the Department to have a permanent leave reservist in the Department on a fixed pay of Rs. 300 per mensem with Rs. 40 per mensem as conveyance allowance. The scale of pay will be subject to revision along with the scale of pay of other Junior Inspectors of Factories. It is proposed to sanction this post from the next year.

*Remarks.*—A Scheme for carrying on social welfare work among the mill hands in Bombay Ahmedabad and Sholapur has been undertaken by Government and it has been decided to employ social workers in all the three labour centres who are familiar with the work of labour welfare. In Bombay City workers are being induced to occupy the Worli Chawls where they are to be provided with amenities such as radios, a library, gymnasium, etc. Out of the provision of Rs. 1,00,000 made during the year 1938-39, it was intended to spend some amount for smaller centres also. The detailed items on which expenditure was proposed to be incurred are given below :—

- (1) Training of social workers.
- (2) Pay, etc., of social workers.
- (3) Subsidising or starting libraries and reading rooms.
- (4) Subsidising or starting physical culture and recreation centres.
- (5) Preparation and publishing literature for the enlightenment of the industrial workers.
- (6) Promotion of co-operative credit societies among workers.
- (7) Training for alternative occupations and arrangements for supply of work for the relief of distress caused by unemployment.

2. In pursuance of the above programme, Government has sanctioned the appointment of a Labour Welfare Officer for Ahmedabad, and social workers have been appointed at Worli and DeLisle Road. In Bombay three recreation centres are being established of which one will be on the DeLisle Road and one each at Naigaum and at Worli. The cost of erection of the DeLisle Road pavilion has been provided for by a private donation and will be ready before the end of the financial year. The cost of the other two centres is being met by Government partly out of the current year's grant and partly next year's.

The two pavilions are expected to be ready for occupation in May. A recreation centre similar to those proposed for Bombay and Ahmedabad will be established at Sholapur and a suitable site for the centre has been selected by the Collector. Furniture for the centres at Ahmedabad and Bombay, equipment for the gymnasia and cinematographs and libraries are being provided out of the current year's grant.

The cost of pavilions (including supervisory charges) is Rs. 24,000 each, and a provision of Rs. 59,000 has been made under 50, Civil Works, for the Sholapur Pavilion and for completing the two pavilions in Bombay. *Remarks.*—The present institutional accommodation available for the administration of the Bombay Children Act is quite inadequate and it is imperative both for the present and future needs to increase the accommodation. At present Government pays substantial grants to several institutions in Bombay City. It is necessary to co-ordinate the activities of these bodies and at the same time to provide for a new school which will cater at minimum cost for the needs of the class of children dealt with under the Children Act. Government has had under consideration a proposal to establish a new school at Chembur, mainly agricultural in character, which will provide accommodation in the first instance for about 750 children. This school will serve the needs of most of the children detained under the Children Act, for the first few years and also of senior children who will stay on for purely agricultural education. The existing Junior Boys Home at Umarkhadi, Bombay, will be closed and the children transferred to the new Home. The Willingdon Boys' Home, Bombay, will no longer be utilized as a certified school for boys and all the boys in that School will also be transferred to the new Home. Similarly the David Sassoon Industrial School, Matunga, Bombay, will be utilised only for those children who show special aptitude for advanced industrial training, the other boys being catered for in the new school at Chembur.

2. The proposed new Home (including a School) will be managed by the Children's Aid Society, Bombay, under the control of Government. Government proposes to pay a grant of Rs. 2,00,000 to the Children's Aid Society, towards the cost of erecting the buildings necessary for starting the Home and the Society proposes to raise an additional sum of Rs. 2,00,000 for completing the scheme. The terms and conditions on which the grant should be paid to the Society will be settled hereafter.

3. The only alternative to the above proposal is for Government to undertake full responsibility for administering the Children Act which in no way will be financially advantageous.

*Remarks.*—In September 1937, the Superintending Engineer, Southern Circle, submitted to Government a detailed report explaining the necessity for the immediate opening of the Bijapur Division. The Commissioner, Southern Division, strongly supported the Superintending Engineer. In view of the severe scarcity conditions in the Bijapur District and the Minor Irrigation Schemes undertaken there, Government after careful scrutiny sanctioned the reopening of the Bijapur Division on a temporary basis for one year with effect from the 1st February 1938. The item was brought to the notice of the Legislative Assembly by means of a supplementary demand—demand No. 16—in the year 1937-38. The Superintending Engineer has again approached Government for the continuance of the Division during next year for the following reasons :—

(i) There are about 25 major original works estimated to cost more than Rs. 16 lakhs now in progress in that Division. These require careful and frequent supervision.

(ii) Government have decided to build about 45 small tanks in the scarcity talukas of the Bijapur District. The work is spread over 9 talukas and will entail close and frequent inspection at various stages during the preparation of projects.

(iii) Government have sanctioned the construction of the following Bandharas :—

(a) at Hippargi, Taluka Sindgi, estimated to cost Rs. 13,490,

(b) at Ingalgi, Taluka Indi, estimated to cost Rs. 44,341,

(c) at Indi, Taluka Indi, estimated to cost Rs. 37,541,

and a tank at Nandargi, estimated to cost Rs. 1,51,908.

(iv) The surveys of the pick-up weir scheme at Shivyogmandir and Herkal over the Malaprabha and Ghatprabha rivers have been ordered to be undertaken.

(v) Investigation of a scheme for constructing a storage reservoir on the Don River has been sanctioned.

All the items stated above will require the presence of the Executive Engineer at Bijapur as it will not be possible either for the Executive Engineers at Belgaum and Dharwar to attend to that work in addition to their own, or to distribute the work at present done in the Bijapur Division between the Belgaum and Dharwar Divisions.

The Commissioner, Southern Division, strongly supports the Superintending Engineer's proposal. Government is satisfied that it is necessary to continue the Bijapur Division up to the 29th February 1940. *Remarks.*—The clerks and inferior servants in Sub-divisional offices of the Public Works Department are all on the temporary establishment though their services have always been required on a permanent basis. They should have really formed part of the permanent establishment from the very beginning like permanent clerks and inferior servants in Divisional and Circle offices of Executive Engineers and Superintending Engineers. The question of bringing them on to the permanent establishment was considered in the past but was dropped or postponed in view of the financial stringency on the ground that it would much enhance leave and pension charges if the establishment in question were maintained on a permanent footing. The effect has been that these low paid Government servants have been denied the benefits of leave and pension though their services are utilised exactly like those of men in permanent pensionable service. This has caused much hardship and discontent among the men concerned.

2. There are usually 3 clerks in a Sub-divisional office and their total number throughout the Province including those in the Electrical Circle is 243, out of which it is proposed to bring 215 clerks on to the permanent establishment with effect from the 1st April 1939 leaving 28 junior men in temporary posts as a margin for any possible reduction in establishment.

There are usually 3 inferior servants called a peon, a chowkidar and a tapali in a Sub-divisional office and their total number throughout the Province, including those in the Electrical Circle is 225, out of which it is proposed to make 186 men permanent with effect from the 1st April 1939 leaving 39 junior men on the temporary establishment to provide for any possible retrenchment in future.

3. There will be no extra cost on account of the pay of the men to be appointed to permanent posts, as their pay will be regulated in the prescribed scales as hitherto. On the other hand, the proposal to convert the temporary posts in question into permanent ones will yield a substantial saving in pay as it is intended to fix the starting pay of the clerks concerned on their promotion to the permanent establishment at the stage next below their present pay in the prescribed scales. The total saving thus expected in pay is about Rs. 10,000 per annum. The annual average cost of the establishment to be made permanent is Rs. 1,51,000 as shown below which will be met by a corresponding reduction in the total cost of the temporary establishment in the Public Works Department.

Remarks.—The question of bringing the temporary staff in the Electrical Branch of the Public Works Department on a permanent footing has been engaging the attention of Government for some years past but it was postponed from time to time on account of the financial stringency as it involved increase in leave and pensionary charges.

2. The Electrical Branch is carrying out advisory, administrative and executive work. The advisory work consists of advising Government on all electrical matters in regard to the grant of licenses to private companies, persons and local bodies for the supply of electrical energy to the public and other matters connected therewith, such as the scrutiny of the conditions and rates of supply, methods of construction, etc., as also the revision of tariffs every seven years. The administrative work consists of the supervision of the working of the various electrical undertakings and the inspection of places of public amusement, mills, factories, power stations, etc., which have to be carried out in the interest of public safety. It also comprises the examination of and the grant of licenses and competency certificates to electrical contractors, electricians and wiremen. The executive work consists of the preparation of plans and estimates for electrical installations in Government buildings for the whole of the Province, and the supervision of such works when executed by contractors, and the maintenance of all installations, including the running of Government owned power stations.

3. The electrical industry is rapidly expanding in this Province. There is no doubt that the Electrical Branch will be required permanently and that its activities will be increasing in future. With the exception of a few subordinates such as clerks, draftsmen, etc. the whole subordinate establishment in the Electrical Branch is borne on the temporary establishment and it is quite unfair that this establishment should be treated as temporary and denied the privileges of permanent service although their appointments are really of a permanent nature and will continue to be so. It is therefore proposed to make the following temporary establishment permanent with effect from the 1st April 1939:—

The annual average cost of this establishment amounts to Rs. 89,700 as shown above which will be met by a corresponding reduction in the cost of the temporary establishment of the Public Works Department.

4. As the present rates of pay of the above establishment (excepting the peons who will be made permanent on their present rates of pay) will be reduced by 16 per cent. on their being made permanent there will be an immediate saving of Rs. 16,600 on the cost of pay of that establishment as against increase of Rs. 22,400 in the cost of leave and pensionary charges.

5. The estimate of Rs. 89,700 referred to in paragraph 3 above includes an amount of Rs. 1,992 on account of two clerks in the office of the Electrical Engineer to Government, whose pay and allowances are debited to a separate major head, viz. "47, Miscellaneous Departments". *Remarks.*—The Bombay Legislative Assembly has at present under its consideration a Bill No. XVI to amend the Bombay Village Panchayats Act, 1933. The Assembly referred the Bill to the Select Committee which has now submitted its report. Clause 4 of the Bill provides for the compulsory establishment of panchayats for every local area having a population of 2,000 or more and empowers Government to direct the establishment of a panchayat for any area having a population of less than 2,000. It appears that the number of villages having a population of 2,000 and over in this province is about 1,000 and that the cost of each election will amount to about Rs. 50. It will, therefore, be necessary for Government to incur an expenditure of Rs. 50,000 (Rs. 50×1,000) for village panchayat elections distributed as under:—

Rs. 20,000 for travelling allowance.

Rs. 30,000 for contingencies.

2. Clause 20 of the Bill provides for the appointment by Government of a Secretary for every panchayat. The question of employing trained rural reconstruction workers paid for from rural development grants as panchayat secretaries is under consideration. As the training of these workers will take some time, it is proposed to make a non-recurrent provision of Rs. 2,40,000 for salaries of secretaries during the next year. The salaries will not ordinarily exceed Rs. 20 per mensem per head.

3. In addition to the two provisions referred to above it will be necessary to give a grant of Rs. 110 to each newly started village panchayat so that they may have some initial amount to start with. A provision of Rs. 1,10,000 (Rs. 110×1,000) is required to be made in next year's budget on this account.

4. The total of the above items thus amounts to Rs. 4,00,000.

*Remarks.*—The estimate is for providing and laying 4" diameter C. I. pipe (costing Rs. 18,743 inclusive of percentage charges at 27 per cent.) and for providing electric pump, engine house, sump well and elevated service reservoir (costing Rs. 8,989 inclusive of percentage charges at 27 per cent.) on Ganeshkhind Road, Poona. It has been agreed that the development of Ganeshkhind area would take place at once if water supply was laid on as the soil is suitable for building purposes. The residents in this area have at present to arrange for water in water carts and for want of proper water supply find it very difficult to live in the locality. Besides, nearly a lakh of people annually visit the famous Chaturshringi Temple situated on Ganeshkhind Road and they suffer very much for want of good drinking water which is hardly available in the hot season. Cases of even sun-stroke have occurred in the months of April and May. It is accordingly proposed to carry out the work of providing water supply. The consumption of water has been assumed at 50 gallons per head per day. The scheme would give a return of 4 per cent. clear profit after paying 5 per cent. interest charges on the expenditure, etc., and will therefore be remunerative.

*Remarks.*—Owing to the different educational schemes launched by Government the work of the Educational Department has increased enormously. It has therefore become necessary to have an officer in the Educational Department conversant with the various schemes and with a higher status than the Under Secretary so that more responsible powers could be delegated to him and he could devote himself more exclusively to educational matters. A temporary post of Deputy Secretary to Government has accordingly been created in the General and Educational Departments for two years, in the first instance, and the post of Under Secretary in these Departments has been temporarily held in abeyance during that period. Messrs. Wood and Abbott had in their report also criticised the fact that the Secretary to Government in the Educational Department who is an I.C.S. officer has to deal with subjects other than Education and thus has responsibilities to more than one Minister. They recommended that the Secretary to Government, Educational Department, should have a much longer tenure than at present and that he should devote his undivided attention only to education. This Government agreed with this view generally and informed the Government of India that they had decided to create a temporary post of Deputy Secretary in special charge of education. The officer appointed to that post is getting the same pay as he would have drawn as Under Secretary, viz., his grade pay in the Provincial Civil Service, the only difference being that as Deputy Secretary he draws special pay at the higher rate of Rs. 200 per mensem instead of Rs. 150 which he would have drawn as Under Secretary.

*Remarks.*—Prior to the appointment of two Honorary Magistrates at Nadiad in June 1938, there were two Benches of Honorary Magistrates—A Bench trying Municipal cases and B Bench empowered with Second Class powers. A clerk of the Nadiad Municipality was doing the clerical work of A Bench and as B Bench used to sit only for three days in a week, a clerk of the office of the Mamlatdar at Nadiad was deputed to work in that Court.

The new Honorary Magistrates have been invested with First Class powers and they have been entrusted with the work of two police stations. They hold their courts each for three days in a week from 5 to 6 hours every day. It was, therefore, necessary to engage a whole-time clerk for taking down depositions and do any other work. *Remarks.*—The subject of Actuarial Science was being taught at the Sydenham College by a part-time Professor till last year. As there are very few actuaries in this Province it has been very difficult to secure the services of one to teach the subject in the college, and Government had to pay Mr. Vaidyanathan who was appointed to the part-time post, first on the scale of Rs. 400—40—600 and then at Rs. 750 per mensem. This pay was, however, reduced to Rs. 500 per mensem in the general cut in pay introduced in 1931. Mr. Vaidyanathan resigned the post in 1937 and it was advertised on a pay of Rs. 350 per mensem. Only three candidates applied for it and out of them Mr. G. S. Diwan who was in Government service as Assistant Lecturer in Mathematics, Elphinstone College, Bombay, was the best. He was appointed to the part-time post on probation for one year with permission to do private practice. From this year the subject of Mathematics has been introduced in the courses for the B. Com. degree and with a view to economy instead of having two posts one of a part-time Professor of Actuarial Science and another of a lecturer or assistant lecturer in Mathematics the part-time post of Professor of Actuarial Science on Rs. 350 per mensem was converted into a full-time post in the Bombay Educational Service Class II scale of pay of Rs. 170—10—250—Efficiency Bar—15—400—Efficiency Bar—20—500 for teaching both Actuarial Science and Mathematics. Mr. Diwan was then appointed to it on a starting pay of Rs. 295 per mensem with effect from 20th June 1938. There has thus been a saving of Rs. 460 during the current year and also an ultimate saving of Rs. 84 per annum as the average monthly cost of the Bombay Educational Service Class II scale of pay is about Rs. 343. The conversion of the post has thus caused a saving not only in the cost of the post itself but has also saved the extra expenditure that would have been incurred on an additional post of a lecturer or assistant lecturer in Mathematics.

*Remarks.*—Three posts of Divisional Accountants representing a leave reserve on the cadre of Divisional Accountants were abolished in May 1935 as a measure of economy. In the absence of these leave reserve posts, Public Works Department clerks who are qualified for appointment as Divisional Accountants and officiate as Divisional Accountants in leave vacancies have frequently to revert to their posts in this Department on return of the men from leave. The Public Works Department offices are also much inconvenienced, as the clerks appointed as officiating Divisional Accountants in leave vacancies are frequently removed and reverted and no permanent arrangements can be made to fill in their places. It has therefore been found very necessary to revive the three leave reserve posts. Their abolition in 1935 has not resulted in any appreciable saving, as their cost is almost counterbalanced by the expenditure on officiating arrangements necessitated by the absence of the leave reserve posts.

## 50, CIVIL WORKS—concl'd.

2. The total period for which the posts of Divisional Accountants were held during the last three years by men officiating in leave vacancies was 35 1/3 months on an average per year. If three additional posts are sanctioned as a leave reserve in lieu of the officiating arrangements, there will be extra cost per year only to the extent of one man's pay for 2/3rds of a month. The average cost of a Divisional Accountant's post according to the sanctioned old pay-scale of Rs. 100—10—270—30/5—300 is Rs. 193 per mensem. The extra cost on account of the revival of the three posts of Divisional Accountants as a leave reserve in lieu of the present officiating arrangements will therefore be only Rs. 128 per annum.

3. The three leave reserve posts will thus replace the present acting appointments made in leave vacancies and the actual net extra cost on account of the three posts will be only the difference between the cost of the three posts and the cost of the present officiating arrangements viz. Accordingly, the creation of three additional permanent posts of Divisional Accountants as a leave reserve has been sanctioned with effect from the 1st February 1939.
