P R E F A C E .

The object of this volume which is supplementary to the Civil Budget Estimates and the Budget Memorandum is to show in one place the expenditure pertaining to the Post-War Reconstruction and Development Programme of the Government of Bombay. With a view to making this publication self-contained, there have been included here, instead of in the main Budget Memorandum, the explanatory memoranda of variations between budget and revised estimates of the year current and those between revised estimates of the current year and budget estimates of the next year. A summary of expenditure by major heads is first given; thereafter, each head of expenditure is taken up separately and there is an explanatory memorandum for that head followed by details of expenditure. Then there is a statement of New Items and New Major Works under the different heads of expenditure. Finally, a statement showing the accumulations, year by year, in the Post-War Reconstruction and Development Fund is included in the volume.

The decrease in the ensuing year's budget estimate compared with the current year's revised estimate is due to the revised programme of the Working Plans and the abolition of the Kanara Working Plans Division.

Establishment.—The decrease in the ensuing year's budget compared with the current year's budget is due to anticipated savings on account of retrenchment of temporary staff entertained for Post-War Reconstruction Schemes.

Emergency Irrigation works.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to increase in rates of material, labour and transport charges. The decrease in the next year's budget estimate is mainly due to Government's decision not to undertake any more new works.

New Works and Works in Progress.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to increase in rates as mentioned above. Decrease in the next year's budget estimate is mainly due to Government's decision not to take up any more new works.

Extensions and Improvements.—The decrease in the current year's revised and the next year's budget estimate, compared to the current year's budget estimate is due respectively to slow progress in work and Government's decision not to take up any more new works.

Minor Irrigation Works.—The large decrease in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to the works not being taken up owing to paucity of technical personnel, shortage of material and scarcity of labour. The decrease in the next year's budget estimate is due to Government's decision not to take up any more new works.

Establishment.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate and the next year's budget estimate is mainly due to revision of pay scales, increase in the rate of dearness allowance, and appointment of additional establishment for carrying out the Lift Irrigation Schemes.

Tools and Plant.—The large increase in the revised estimate during the current year is mainly due to the purchase of heavy machinery and tools and Plant required for carrying out the Lift Irrigation Works expeditiously.

B—Navigation, etc., works.

New Works and Works in Progress.—The decrease in next year's budget estimate, is mainly due to Government's decision not to take up any more new works.

Extensions and Improvements.—No works were undertaken owing to acute paucity of technical hands, shortage of material and scarcity of labour and hence no expenditure was incurred. No provision is proposed for the next year, due to Government's decision not to take up any more new works.

A—University.—Increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to (i) opening of additional Basic Training Centres (ii) payment of non-recurring grant to the Engineering colleges at Sangli and Hubli, counterbalanced to some extent by savings due to (i) probable non-arrival of equipment already indented for College of Engineering, Poona and (ii) amount sanctioned for purchase of apparatus and chemicals for Ahmedabad College not having been spent for want of storage facilities. The next year's provision of 41,61 includes 15,25 on account of grants to the Universities, (1,00 to the Bombay University, 6,25 to the Regional Universities and 8,00 (non-recurrent) to the Karnatak University); 3,48 on account of new items, 91 on account of grants to the non-Government Arts' Colleges, etc.; 21,97 on account of grants to Professional Colleges. The important new items of expenditure sanctioned are:—

B—Secondary.—Increase in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to (i) additional grants to Agricultural High School for purchase of tools and equipment etc. and (ii) sanctioning of additional building-grants to non-Government secondary schools.

The next year's provision of 15,85 includes 25 on account of new item in respect of "grants to non-Government Secondary Schools for purchase of 16 m.m. Film Projectors" 14,00 on account of grants to non-Government Secondary Schools, 25 on account of "Building grants" and 1,35 on account of Agricultural and Technical High Schools.

C—Primary.—Decrease in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to (i) a smaller number of hostels and schools having been opened during the current year, and (ii) restricted expenditure on construction of primary school buildings and craft education.

A—Medical Establishment.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is due to the fact that the expenditure on account of scholarships for training of students abroad in Medical subjects is incurred by the High Commissioner for India and recorded separately under "Charges in England". The next year's budget estimate is on account of provision made for the clerical establishment for the Special Officer for the Post-War Reconstruction.

B—Hospitals and Dispensaries.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to (i) delay in opening Hospitals under the scheme of "Conversion of dispensaries into Cottage Hospitals", (ii) expectation that Tuberculosis Hospital under the Scheme of "Establishment of T. B. Hospital" is not likely to be opened in the current financial year and (iii) delay in opening Subsidised Medical Practitioners' centres in the Province.

The next year's budget does not include any provision for Tuberculosis Hospital but provides for opening of Cottage Hospital at Mansa (please see New Item No. 25) and expected normal working of other Post-War Reconstruction Schemes.

D—Medical Colleges and Schools.—The increase in the next year's budget estimate is due to revised scales of pay and allowances. The current year's revised estimate also includes for revised scales for pay and allowances but the increase is counterbalanced by reduction on account of College of Nursing, Poona, which can not be opened for want of suitable accommodation in the current year.

J—Charges in England.—The current year's revised and the next year's budget estimates are due to provision on account of scholarships for training of students abroad which was hitherto shown under "A—Establishment".

Public Health Establishment.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is due to (i) postponement of scheme of "Establishment of Health Units" to the next five year period, (ii) restriction to 20 units only for the working of the scheme of the "Establishment of combined Medical and Public Health Units in selected talukas", (iii) non-availability of the full staff for the scheme for "Appointment of District Health Officers" and (iv) postponement of the scheme of "Opening of Health Schools in Gujarat and Karnatak for Training of Health Visitors" to 1949-50. The next year's budget estimate provides for full staff of District Health Officers and takes into account the normal working of the various P. W. R. schemes and increased expenditure on Karnatak Sanitary Sub-Division.

Grants for Public Health Purposes.—The increase in the next year's budget estimate as compared with the current year's budget and revised estimates is due to Government's policy to give assistance to the Municipalities on a liberal scale for water supply and drainage schemes. (Please see New Item No. 27).

Expenses in connection with Epidemic Diseases.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate and the next year's budget estimate as compared with the current year's budget estimate is due to (i) savings on account of non-availability of full staff for the P. W. R. Schemes, viz., (1) Establishment of a Permanent Plague Organisation in the Province and (2) Formation of Mobile Units and (ii) less expenditure under the scheme of "Comprehensive Scheme for the Control of Malaria in Karnatak and Dharwar Districts". The decrease in the next year's budget estimate over the current year's budget estimate is due to reduced allocation of funds on Public Health Department Post-War Reconstruction Schemes.

Works.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is due to the fact that Water Supply Works in many villages could not be taken up owing to non-availability of material particularly cement and labour. The next year's budget estimate includes provision on account of New Item No. 28.

N-(1) *Direction*.—The increase in the next year's budget estimates is due mainly to the revision of pay scales and increased rates of dearness allowance.

N-(3) *Experimental Farms*.—The increase in the next year's budget estimates is mainly due to revision of pay-scales.

N-(4) *Agricultural Demonstration and Propaganda*.—The increase in the current year's revised estimates and next year's budget estimates is mainly due to (a) provision for two new schemes viz. (i) Scheme for the construction of new wells and tanks and repairing of old ones and (ii) Scheme for intensification of "Grow More Food" Campaign not provided for in the current year's budget, and (b) provision for revision of pay-scales, dearness allowance, etc.

N-(5) *Agricultural Experiments and Research*.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to less expenditure on (i) the purchase of sulphate of ammonia and (ii) Bunding Scheme partially counterbalanced by additional expenditure under (a) Scheme for research and extension work on rice and (b) co-operative compost making in rural areas. The decrease in the estimate for the next year as compared with the current year's budget estimate is due to smaller provision for bunding works.

N-(6) *Agricultural Education*.—The increase in the current year's revised estimates is mainly due to the (i) provision proposed for acquisition of land for the Agricultural School, Devihosur; (ii) construction of school building for the Puntamba Agricultural School departmentally, (iii) purchase of military pig farm, Chinchwad and (iv) acquisition of land for the Agricultural College, Dharwar.

N-(7) *Agricultural Engineering*.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due mainly to (i) the purchase of additional tractors and implements and their up-keep and maintenance and (ii) additional expenditure under the scheme for the revival and expansion of the boring Section. The increase in the next year's budget estimates is mainly due to revision of pay scales, increased rates of dearness allowance and the grant of house-rent allowance.

N-(9) *Grant-in-aid*.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to payment of grant-in-aid to the Agricultural Institute, Anand, for the construction of buildings for the Agricultural College, Anand.

Superintendence.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is due to transfer of establishment charges from Post-War Reconstruction to Ordinary Section.

Veterinary Education and Research.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to the purchase of equipment for the laboratories of the Disease Investigation Officer.

Subordinate Establishment.—The absence of any provision in the current year's revised estimate and the next year's budget estimate is due to the fact that the whole expenditure under this sub-head has been transferred to the sub-head "Other Charges".

Hospitals and Dispensaries.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is due to the fact that some Veterinary Dispensaries could not be opened as contemplated. The next year's budget estimate provides for these dispensaries and also for the creation of additional posts of compounders and assumption of full control of more Veterinary dispensaries.

Other Charges.—The current year's revised estimate provides for an amount of 55 transferred from "Subordinate establishment". In spite of this there is a decrease in the estimates as compared with the current year's budget estimate and it is due to (i) non-execution of dipping tanks and (ii) non-functioning of the scheme for cattle welfare in Bombay City and Bombay Suburban District. The increase in the next year's budget estimate is due to transfer of expenditure to this sub-head, *vide* explanation under "Subordinate Establishment".

Industries.—The increase in the current year's revised estimates is mainly due to (i) revision of pay scales and (ii) increased rates of dearness allowance.

The decrease in the next year's budget estimates is mainly due to smaller provision for the grant-in-aid to the V. J. T. Institute as most of the non-recurring grants for building and equipment sanctioned for the Institute will be drawn during the current year.

Fisheries.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimates is mainly due to postponement of some of the post-war schemes for the next year, e.g., (i) loans and fisheries to fishermen for establishment of ice plants and (ii) establishment of Marine Biological Research Stations.

Charges in England.—The decrease in the next year's budget estimates is mainly due to discontinuance of the overseas scholarships scheme by the Government of India.

Labour.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to (i) the schemes regarding "Anti-Tuberculosis Sanatoria for Industrial Workers" and "Supervision of Welfare Work in Factories" not having been started during the current year, (ii) late starting of the schemes regarding "Universal Literacy and Adult Education (General) among workers" and "Research into Industrial Diseases and Hazardous Occupations", (iii) partial working of the schemes regarding "Pre and Post Employment Training" and "Establishment of 15 additional 'C' Type Centres, etc." due to non-availability of sites.

The next year's budget estimate includes 1,16 on account of the following new items:—

(1) Opening of Reading Rooms and Circulating Library Post².

(2) Establishment of 15 additional "C" type Centres each in Bombay and Ahmedabad and three at Sholapur.

(3) Establishment of an additional "A" types Labour Welfare Centre at Ahmedabad.

(4) Establishment of "B" type centres.

In view of the decision of the Expenditure Priority Committee, no provision has been made in the next year's budget on account of the scheme of "Pre and Post Employment Training".

Miscellaneous.—Increase in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to (i) the general revision of pay scales, (ii) sanctioning of the post of "Controller of Buildings" and the establishment under him" and (iii) purchase of furniture, payment during the current year for the grass purchased last year, freight and labour charges under the "Improvement of Milk Supply Scheme".

The next year's budget, includes 5,33 on account of new items in respect of "Dry Stock Farm No. II at Palghar" (3,63) and "Construction of 5 insulated vans for bringing milk from Anand (1,70).

A—Original Works—(i) Civil Buildings.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is due to the postponement of certain works and also due to non-selection of sites for certain works. The next year's budget estimate provides for works which are already in progress.

(ii) **Communications.**—The decrease in the revised estimate is due to non-execution of certain works either due to postponement or non-acquisition of land or want of plans and estimates. The next year's budget provides for two new Inspections Bungalows, one at Viramgam and another at Alibag and also for works already in progress.

(iii) **National Highways.**—The decrease in the revised estimate is due to the fact that only a few works have been approved and financially sanctioned by the Government of India. The next year's budget provides for works already in progress, new major works proposed to the Government of India for being taken up and minor works.

B—Repairs—(National Highways).—The increase in the revised estimate is due to additional repair works undertaken during the current year.

C—Establishment—(i) Post-war Reconstruction and Development Programme.—According to the revised procedure all establishment and tools and plant charges (gross) are first treated as one i.e. ordinary and after transferring these charges on percentage basis to other P. W. D. heads, the residual charges are distributed between "ordy." and "P. W. R." in proportion to "ordinary" and P. W. R. works outlay under "50-C. W.". The provisions shown in the current year's revised estimates and the next year's budget estimates under this head are calculated on the above basis.

(ii) **National Highways.**—The estimates shown under this head represent agency charges calculated at 9 per cent. of the total expenditure on National Highways.

D—Tools and Plants—(i) Post-war Reconstruction and Development Programme.—For explanation, please see remarks made against "C Establishment—P. W. R."

(ii) **National Highways.**—The estimates shown under this head represent tools and plant charges calculated at 1 per cent. of the total works expenditure on National Highways.

E—Grants-in-aid.—The decrease in the revised estimate is due to the classification of this item under "Original Works—Ordinary" on the closure of the "Special Development Fund" for purposes other than the Backward Class Schemes.

(i) *Establishment*—

(a) The decrease in the revised estimate is due to non-appointment of full staff and less touring than anticipated. The increase in the next year's budget estimate is due to appointment of additional establishment and revision of pay scales.

(b) The *deduct* entry represents the share of cost of establishment transferred to “81-A—Capital Outlay on Electricity Schemes”. It is in proportion to expenditure on Grid works under the heads “52-A” and “81-A”.

(c) Secretariat charges are calculated at 1 per cent. on the cost of works outlay.

(ii) *Miscellaneous expenditure (including surveys)*.—The increase in the revised estimate as compared with the current year's budget is mainly due to expenditure on the investigation of the Kalinadi Hydro-Electric Scheme being authorized in the current year. The decrease in the next year's budget, as compared with the current year's revised estimate, is mainly due to provision for investigation of the Kalinadi Hydro-Electric Scheme being not required as the Scheme has been abandoned, partly counterbalanced by provision of 93 for operation and maintenance of Diesel Nursery Schemes having been made for the first time.

(iii) *Suspense*.—It has since been decided that, with effect from the year 1947-48, suspense transactions relating to Electric Grid Schemes should be shown under the head “81-A—Capital Outlay on Electricity Schemes”. The revised estimate and the budget estimate for the next year under the head “52-A” are therefore nil.

(b) This represents the share to be adjusted under the head "50—Civil Works" on account of the supervision charges of the Grid works by the Secretariat. This charge is levied at 1 per cent. on the works outlay.

(3) *Suspense*.—This minor head has been recently opened under this major head to record stock transactions relating to the Electric Grid works. Previously these transactions were recorded under the head "52-A".

(4) *Deduct—Receipts and recoveries on Capital Account*.—The next year's budget provision represents the revenue that will be realized for the first time on account of supply of electricity from certain electrification schemes of the Concentrated Rural Areas.

The works under the milk supply and housing schemes are executed by the departments concerned through their own technical staff and not through the Public Works Department agency. It has, therefore, been decided in consultation with the Accountant General, to record, with effect from the last year, the expenditure in respect of these works under "82, Capital Account of Other Provincial Works outside the Revenue Account". The expenditure on account of the technical staff and tools and plant required for the schemes will be initially debited to "47-Miscellaneous Departments".

A—Original Works.—The revised estimate for the current year represents expenditure on account of acquisition of land and construction of buildings for the Are Farm (55,31) under the scheme for the Improvement of Milk Supply and also expenditure on the various housing works undertaken during the current financial year according to the approved Housing programme of Government (1,63,26).

The budget estimate (gross amount) for the next year provides for expenditure of 1,56,31 (38,00 for milk supply scheme and 1,18,31 for housing programme) on works in progress and 2,13,81 (66,00 for milk supply scheme and 1,47,81 for housing programme) on new works.

B—Repairs (Industries).—The increase in the revised estimate is mainly due to expenditure on repairs to buildings damaged in the recent cyclone. The next year's estimate represents expenditure on repairs and maintenance of the buildings under the Housing scheme.

C and D—Establishment, Tools and Plant Charges.—The expenditure on establishment and Tools and Plant charges in connection with works undertaken by the Milk Commissioner and the Housing Commissioner is initially debitable to "47-Miscellaneous Departments" as stated above. This expenditure will be divided between "47-Miscellaneous Departments" and "82-Capital Account of Other Provincial Works" on *pro-rata* basis, and expenditure, which is debitable to "82" will be transferred from "47-Miscellaneous Departments" to "82" by a deduct entry under "47-Miscellaneous Departments". The revised estimates for the current year and the budget estimates for the next years represent expenditure on Establishment, tools and plant charges calculated on the above lines.

Class I—Advances to Cultivators, Co-operative Societies, Backward Classes, etc.—(i) The provision of 1,33,00 is in respect of tagai advances to cultivators taking advantage of the scheme for construction of 50,000 new wells and improvement of 10,000 existing wells for the purpose of extending well irrigation to help the cultivation of food crops.

(ii) The provision of 2,34 is made for loans to co-operative societies to assist them in financing the purchase and sale of manure, seed, agricultural implements, etc., in connection with the scheme regarding the Organisation of Co-operative Farming Societies (New Item No. 36 under "42-Co-operation").

(iii) The provision of 1,62 is in respect of interest-free loans to cultivators whose holdings are utilised as Demonstration Centres under the Mixed Farming Scheme.

(iv) The provision of 15 is made for the grant of interest-free loans to Backward Classes to enable them to purchase land under the scheme regarding "Ameliorative Measures for Improvement of Backward Classes".

(v) The provision is in connection with the schemes for the establishment of settlement colonies at Indoor, Hillur and Rampur in Kanara District as a measure of increasing food crop production.

Class V—Miscellaneous Loans and Advances.—(i) A scheme for assisting the formation of 50 new dairies in cities and big towns as an experimental measure has been sanctioned by the Government. The provision of 6,00 is in respect of loans to the *bona fide* dairy farmers for purchasing dairy animals, lands, equipment, construction of buildings, etc., provided they invest in the same dairy business, one-third of the capital required.

(ii) The provision of 18 is made for loans to Milk Supply Unions for expenditure on equipment, transport and other capital expenditure.

(iii) and (iv) The provision of 5,00 in the next year's budget estimate is in respect of loans to persons undertaking construction of tenements of approved designs and layout, in areas to be developed by Government. The provisions of 15,00 and 30,00 in the current year's revised estimates and the next year's budget estimates respectively are in respect of loans to Tenant Co-partnership Societies and to Co-operative Housing Societies constructing tenements of higher standards.

Remarks.—Government had always held that it was in the public interest that survey and settlement should be introduced in all alienated villages in the Province, but under the law existing before the enactment of the Bombay Land Revenue Code (Amendment) Act, 1947, this could not be done without the consent of the holders of these villages. As such section 216 of the Code was suitably amended. Government has, therefore, now set upon the task of introducing survey and settlement in all unsettled alienated villages so as to bring them on par with the adjoining unalienated villages. Government has already sanctioned a 5-year Post-War Reconstruction Scheme for the introduction of Record of Rights in all Khoti and Inam villages. The present scheme of settlement is being co-ordinated with the above Post-War Reconstruction Scheme so as to effect economy and speed. The survey and settlement and Record of Rights are the backbone of rural reforms and unless these are introduced the other agrarian reforms like the tenancy legislation, the consolidation of holding and fragmentation prevention legislation, cannot be effectively administered in the alienated villages. The importance of the present scheme cannot therefore be over-estimated. Moreover, under section 216 of the Code, as now amended, the cost of the survey and settlement operation is recoverable, subject to obligations undertaken by Government under existing agreements, from the holder or holders, of the alienated villages. The details of the recurring and non-recurring expenditure to be incurred during 1949-1950 on the proposed staff for the scheme of survey and settlement operation is as shown below :—

Remarks.—Agriculture in this Province suffers seriously from the evils of excessive fragmentation and sub-divisions of holdings. Cultivation of fragments or sub-divisions involves waste of time and labour in moving from one fragment or sub-division to another and leads to waste of a substantial area which has to be left uncultivated as boundary strips. It also prevents permanent improvements like bunding, fencing, etc. The scheme is intended to remedy these evils as far as possible by preventing further fragmentation and by providing for consolidation of sub-divided holdings, so as to reduce uneconomic cultivation to a minimum. In order to implement the provisions of the Act and make the scheme successful it is necessary to engage the staff as shown in the accompanying two statements. The cost for 1949-50 will be Rs. 9,74,472-8-0.

Remarks.—In view of abnormal increase in work in the offices of the Deputy Educational Inspectors, 14 clerks, i.e., one clerk each for the offices of the Deputy Educational Inspectors except those of Kolaba, West Khandesh, East Khandesh, Thana, Ahmednagar and Bombay Suburban District have been sanctioned with effect from 1st April 1948 in the scale of Rs. 100—8—140 for a period of two years in the first instance. As a result of the expansion of education in different branches on account of various Post-War Reconstruction schemes and the general increase in correspondence with the public, these offices are unable to cope with the work and it is necessary to further strengthen their clerical staff. It is therefore proposed to sanction the following additional staff with effect from 1st April 1949 :—

Remarks.—With a view to make increased use of films in imparting education in secondary schools, Government has sanctioned a Visual Education Scheme under which it has been decided to purchase educational films and send them in circulation to the secondary schools for showing them to the school going children with the help of 16 mm. film projectors. With a view to enabling non-Government Secondary Schools to have their own 16 mm. projectors, it has been proposed to give to schools, desiring to purchase these projectors a grant at the rate of 1/3rd of the cost of the projectors, on the conditions (i) that the school undertakes to exhibit the films sent to it under circulation to its own pupils as well as to pupils from other schools in the locality, (ii) that the school undertakes to keep the projector in good working order and (iii) that the recurring expenditure incurred by schools for freight charges of films and remuneration to operators etc. will be admissible for Government grant. It has been proposed to make a lump provision of Rs. 25,000 for each of the next three years i.e. for 1949-50, 1950-51 and 1951-52. A provision of Rs. 25,000 is therefore proposed to be made in the next year's budget.

This is the most necessary as it has been decided that officers may be considered for deputation on study leave rather than as scholars under the Overseas Scholarship Scheme. It is considered that the Officers thus trained will prove to be very useful in enhancing the efficiency of the Department of Education. It is, therefore, proposed to depute for 2 years three Government servants for advanced studies overseas, during 1949-50. Remarks.—In July 1948, the University of Bombay, *inter alia*, requested Government to sanction a non-recurring grant of Rs. 10 lakhs towards its building programme consisting of (1) two hostels for the students of the Technology Department and the School of Economics and Sociology, (2) building for the expanded School of Economics and (3) additional accommodation for its library. Government considered that the extension of the University building itself should have priority over other buildings like hostels for students etc. and sanctioned in June 1948 the payment of a non-recurring grant of Rs. 3 lakhs to the University towards the extension of its administrative buildings estimated to cost Rs. 5½ lakhs, on the assumption that a part of the cost of the proposed extension would be met by the University itself. The University have again approached Government for additional grant towards the construction of a new wing joining the present North and South Wings, as the grant of Rs. 3 lakhs is inadequate, and as it has been unable to raise the balance required for the Administrative block building. It is, therefore, proposed to make an additional grant of Rs. 2½ lakhs to the University, during the year 1949-50, towards the construction of the new wing.

In view of the need for a senior accounts clerk for the preparation of the Post-War Reconstruction budget and for accounts work involved in the various schemes, Government sanctioned from 14th April 1947, a post of an accounts clerk in the grade of Rs. 135—5—180 (revised scale of Rs. 150—10—200).

3. Most of the work pertaining to the Post-War Reconstruction scheme is of a permanent character particularly the work relating to the introduction of free and compulsory primary education. As it has been decided to introduce the Bombay Primary Education Act, 1947, from 1st January 1949, further additional work will have to be dealt with in the office of the Director of Public Instruction much of which will be of a stable nature. In addition the increasing amount of work consequent on the implementation of the scheme pertaining to Physical Education, Medical inspection of school children, the liquidation of adult illiteracy, the training of Primary teachers will be of a permanent character. It is, therefore, proposed to sanction as a permanent measure the additional staff mentioned above from 1st April 1949. The necessary provision required during the next financial year has been included in the next year's budget estimates.

Remarks.—It is proposed to introduce compulsion by stages in villages with a population of 500 and over in the five talukas of Thana District, namely, Umbergaon, Dahanu, Mokhada, Shahapur and Palghar which have a large proportion of Adiwasi population. Compulsion will be introduced next year in the Umbergaon taluka to the age-group 7-8 and will be extended to the age-groups 7-9 and 7-10 in the years 1950-51 and 1951-52 respectively. In the year 1950-51 again, compulsion will be introduced for the age-group 7-8 in the two talukas of Dahanu and Mokhada and will be extended to the age-group 7-9 in the year 1951-52 in those two talukas. Similarly compulsion will be introduced in the remaining two talukas of Shahapur and Palghar in the year 1951-52 for the age-group 7-8. Education will be imparted according to the Wardha plan with agriculture and wood-work as the basic crafts.

It is also proposed to start, in the year 1950-51, one full grade central school (Kendra Shala) with an agricultural bias to enable the Adiwasi and Backward class pupils of Umbergaon taluka to receive higher primary education. Similarly two more such schools are proposed to be started in the year 1951-52 for the benefit of such children from the Dahanu and Mokhada talukas.

It is also proposed to give a short training of about two months' duration to about 80 teachers every year, in the problems of Adiwasi areas. The teachers serving in these areas will be paid a special allowance of Rs. 5 per mensem per teacher and will be provided with free quarters. The proposal involves extra cost as under during the years 1949-50, 1950-51 and 1951-52 :—

Remarks.—A great majority of the Primary teachers serving in Primary Schools in the Indian States which have merged in this Province are untrained teachers. It is, therefore, necessary to provide for the training of such untrained teachers in these States as soon as possible. Although teachers from such schools in Indian States will be admitted to some of the existing Primary Training Institutions maintained by Government and by private bodies in the same district or in the adjoining districts, it is necessary to increase the output of trained teachers to meet the requirements consequent upon the introduction of compulsion in this Province.

To provide for the training of a very large number of primary teachers from the merged Indian States, therefore it is necessary to open two new Training Colleges for Men. Attempts will be made to locate these Training Colleges in buildings already available in some of the Indian States, if possible. Each of these colleges will have a Practising School and will provide for the teaching of one or two crafts—Spinning and Weaving, and Agriculture, as in other colleges already opened.

Remarks.—Under the Post-War Reconstruction Scheme No. 79, ten new Training Colleges for Men have already been opened with a view to increasing the output of trained teachers. Under the scheme it was intended to open six new Training Colleges for Women with effect from June 1949. As it is difficult to secure the necessary accommodation on rent for six Training Colleges for Women and also to obtain adequate staff of trained women graduates to serve in these colleges, it is proposed to open only two Training Colleges for Women with effect from June 1949. The new Training Colleges will be located in places where the necessary accommodation may be available. The exact places where it will be possible to open the Colleges will be decided after the necessary enquiries are complete. Each of these two colleges will maintain two classes in 1949-50 and two more classes in 1950-51. Each college will also maintain a Practising School and provide for the teaching of Spinning and Weaving and Kitchen gardening as crafts. The Colleges will be located in rented buildings to begin with and the question of constructing buildings for them will be considered later when it is known that the colleges are well established. The additional staff and contingent grant required for each College is given in the sub-joined statement.

Remarks.—Government has decided to provide camping facilities to Primary and Secondary teachers during vacations in order that they may be able to get recreation, improve their health, and acquire a spirit of fellowship. The camps are not intended to be merely recreational. Educational facilities at the Camps will be provided by the officers of the Department who will give lectures, organise discussion groups, show educational films and teach simple craft work (Similar camping facilities are contemplated for school children in due course).

2. The organisation of five camps has already been sanctioned during the current year. It is expected that about 8 camps in all may be opened during the year 1949-50. As the opening of camps depends upon the availability of a site, it may not be possible ultimately to open more than 17 camps all over the Province.

3. Each camp involves an expenditure of about Rs. 1,100 (Recurring) on account of the cost of servants, travelling expenses of teachers, hire of furniture and other incidental expenses and about Rs. 600 non-recurring on the purchase of utensils, etc. The financial arrangements are intended to be as follows:

4. Government will provide free accommodation, utensils, furniture, the pay of servants who may be employed and other incidental expenses of the camp. The teachers will bear their own messing charges. Travelling allowance expenses, in the case of Secondary teachers will be met by the schools concerned and their expenditure on this account will be admitted for Government grant. Travelling allowance expenses of primary teachers, in the case of District School Board teachers, will be borne by Government and also in the case of teachers of authorised Municipalities if such Municipalities decline to bear this expenditure.

5. It will, therefore, be necessary to make a provision of Rs. 10,600 in the budget for 1949-50 on account of the holding of 8 camps.

Remarks.—With a view to making arrangements for the imparting of sound Secondary Education, (without English) of the Matriculation standard through the medium of the regional languages of this Province to our pupils, as a beginning, 4 institutions called Lokashalas were started in 1946 at Poona, Dhulia, Nadiad and Biapur. The course prescribed for the Lokashalas is spread over three years and the pupils admitted to these Lokashalas in 1946 will be completing their course in 1949 so that it is necessary to arrange for the holding of the Final Lokashala Examination with effect from 1949. The number of candidates at the first Lokashala Examination is estimated at 200 and the amount of remuneration required to be paid to the examiners, paper setters, etc., calculated at the rates sanctioned for the S. L. C. Examination amounts to Rs. 5,245.

Remarks.—In consequence of Government having undertaken, with effect from 1947-48, the Post-War Reconstruction Scheme for the eradication of the Adult illiteracy, it has been decided that provision in the “ordinary” budget on account of adult education should be limited to the extent of the average provision for 5 years prior to 1947-48 and that the balance of the extra amount required to meet the expenditure as a result of expansion of adult education work should be shown under the Post-War Reconstruction budget.

2. In view of the speeding up of the adult education programme, increased provisions are necessary in respect of the following items :—

There are about 3,000 village libraries aided at present as part of the adult education programme. As part of the literacy campaign, it is proposed to open additional new village libraries. It will therefore be necessary to raise the provision on this account to Rs. 67,000 in the next year's budget.

Similarly, in view of the necessity of training a sufficient number of workers, to meet the demand for literacy drive, it is necessary to raise the current year's provision of Rs. 10,000 on account of training of Adult Education workers to Rs. 15,000 in the next year.

3. Out of the increased provision of Rs. (1) 67,000 and (2) 15,000 in respect of the two items, the provision under “ordinary budget” on the basis of the expenditure during 1946-47 stands at Rs. 27,000 for item (1) and at Rs. 5,000 for item (2). It is accordingly proposed to provide for Rs. 40,000 and Rs. 10,000, respectively, in the next year's Post-War Reconstruction budget as shown below :—

The University has also been approached for the grant of affiliation to the College for the additional course in S. E. (Civil) and S. E. (Mechanical and Electrical) with effect from June 1949. Besides the third year diploma classes in Civil and Mechanical and Electrical Engineering will also commence from June 1949. When the opening of the College was sanctioned from June 1948 staff and expenditure necessary for the first year only were sanctioned though details of the staff and expenditure for the full working of the College were examined. Remarks.—The College of Nursing established in Bombay trains only 35 students for each course. This number is obviously not adequate to meet the requirements of all the training schools for nurses in the Province. Moreover the instruction given at the Bombay College is in English. The result is that a majority of the student nurses from mofussil who take the nursing course in Marathi or Gujarati cannot get the benefit of the present college. To overcome this difficulty and to facilitate training of nurses Government have sanctioned the establishment of the College of Nursing at Poona where instruction is to be given in Marathi. Pending construction of a building for the college in the compound of the Sassoon Hospital, Poona, it was proposed to start the college in a rented building. All efforts to secure a suitable building near the hospital have proved unsuccessful. As the sanction granted for the establishment of the College of Nursing at Poona expires on 31st March 1949 and as the college has not been started it is proposed to renew the sanction to the establishment of the college for two years from 1st April 1949.

Remarks.—In pursuance of the decision taken by Government for abolishing the Licentiate Course in Medicine in order to have a uniform standard of medical qualification, the B. J. Medical Schools, Poona and Ahmedabad, were converted into Medical Colleges with effect from June 1946. The Colleges have been granted affiliation by the Bombay University for the 1st M.B.B.S. course. The University Commission has inspected the colleges for the purpose of granting affiliation for the 2nd M.B.B.S. course and the affiliation is awaited. Now the colleges have entered into their third year and the schools will be transformed into Colleges by April 1949. It is therefore proposed that the staff sanctioned for the colleges for a period of three years in the first instance should be sanctioned on a permanent basis.

Remarks.—The existing dispensary at Mansa is in a bad state of repairs which has an accommodation of only four beds. The aggregate population of Mansa and the villages round it comes to 25,000. The need at the present moment all over the Province is for increase in in-door accommodation. Sheth Vithaldas Hakamchand of Mansa is willing to donate Rs. 3 lakhs plus seven bighas of land, well, compound wall, steel and cement for the establishment of a cottage hospital at Mansa. The donation will cover all the non-recurring expenditure involved in the establishment of a hospital and Government will have to bear only the recurring expenditure which amounts approximately to Rs. 36,000 per annum. Remarks.—Due to increase in the number of Talukas of the Ratnagiri District—from 11 to 13, and the mountainous terrain of the District, the present staff of Vaccinators or Sanitary Sub-Inspectors, viz. 22, falls considerably short of requirements. Under the District Health Officers' Scheme, two Vaccinators or Sanitary Sub-Inspectors are required for each taluka or Petha and as such the additional staff of 4 Sanitary Sub-Inspectors and 4 Squads under them is required. It is proposed to sanction the staff for a period of three years in the first instance. With the increase in the number of vaccinators or Sanitary Sub-Inspectors from 22 to 26, the population under each vaccinator or Sanitary Sub-Inspector will be 52,852 which is reasonable.

Remarks.—Prior to 1931, Government used to give financial assistance to Municipalities on a liberal scale for water supply and drainage schemes. With the development of local self-Government and owing to the necessity of conserving the limited funds of Government to be utilised for social services for the benefit of the general public, the view was taken that Municipalities should carry out such schemes, which should in theory be self-supporting by the imposition of local taxation. Assistance was therefore limited to the partial remission of centage charges in the case of schemes entrusted to the Public Works Department for execution. Experience, however, showed that the Municipalities were unable to take up new projects with the limited assistance from Government. Government therefore decided in 1942 that whenever funds were available grants-in-aid should be given to Municipalities which taxed themselves adequately and which maintained an adequate standard of general administration and were yet unable to meet the cost of their schemes, without assistance from Government. Accordingly a lump provision of Rs. 10,00,000 was made annually during the years 1942-43 to 1944-45 for the purposes of giving grants to deserving Municipalities for their public health schemes. Very few municipalities could however avail themselves of this offer owing to the scarcity of materials and labour during the period of the War.

In 1945-46 and 1946-47 therefore the provision was reduced to Rs. 5 lakhs. It was subsequently found that more and more municipalities were availing themselves of the offer owing perhaps to a little improvement in the position of material and labour. In the year 1947-48 the provision was increased to Rs. 8,74,000. In the year 1948-49 on account of the possible improvement in the position of material and labour, a provision of Rs. 10,00,000 was made in the Budget. It is now considered that the position regarding material and labour is likely to improve further during the next year, and that there would be a demand for more funds from municipalities. It is accordingly proposed to make a provision of Rs. 15,00,000 in the budget estimates for 1949-50 for grants-in-aid to municipalities for their public health schemes.

Remarks.—Government has given high priority to the scheme for improving village water supply. The target is to provide every village with a population of 200 or more with at least one well and an amount of Rs. 2,46,18,000 is proposed to be spent during the first five years. The provision in the current year's budget is Rs. 40,00,000. Examination of Village Water Supply Projects has shown that in some cases well water is not available at a reasonable distance from the village and at reasonable depth. In such cases it is necessary to have piped water supply scheme or Bhandaras. It is not within the financial capacity of small local bodies like Panchayat to make financial and executive arrangements required to carry out such schemes. For such works Government has decided to provide all the money required for execution of the scheme and treat sixty per cent. of the cost as subsidy and the balance less any amount voluntarily collected and contributed by villagers as loan to the local authority responsible for maintenance and repairs of the work. It is proposed to provide an amount of Rs. 33,48,230 in the next year's budget for Village Water Supply Schemes.

An additional provision of Rs. 6,51,720 is also required during the next year for the purchase of 45 boring machines for Village Water Supply Works and for maintenance and repairs charges of a jeep in charge of the Public Health Engineer. A total provision of Rs. 40,00,000 is therefore required in the next year's budget.

Remarks.—Alandi is an important pilgrim centre where thousands of pilgrims gather and in the interest of public health it is essential to supply filtered water to the place in order to prevent the spread of epidemics. It is therefore proposed to provide water purification works at the Alandi Water Works at an estimated cost of Rs. 93,199 gross including Secretariat charges at 1 per cent. The proposed work forms part of Public Health Scheme No. 136 included in the P. W. R. Blue Book.

The Alandi Water Works were constructed and are owned and maintained by Government. The Alandi Municipality pays the annual depreciation and maintenance charges of the water works. The Municipality, whose financial condition is not sound, has agreed to pay 50 per cent. of the annual depreciation and maintenance and repairs charges for the filtration plant proposed to be installed.

A provision of Rs. 75,750 is required for expenditure on the work during 1949-50. It includes a provision of Rs. 750 on account of Secretariat charges at 1 per cent.

The plans and estimates are ready and are under the consideration of Government.

Remarks.—In 1941, Government sanctioned as an experimental measure, a scheme for the appointment of District Health Officers in certain selected districts in order to carry on intensive public health measures in rural areas in those Districts. The experiment was confined in the beginning to the Districts of Surat, Solapur and Bijapur and the District Health Officers with the necessary health staff were appointed in these districts. The experiment was extended in 1944 to the Ahmedabad District with the necessary health staff. As the scheme has yielded good results it was made permanent in those districts.

2. Government further extended the scheme for a period of three years in the first instance to the border districts of East Khandesh, West Khandesh, Nasik and Ahmednagar, and has also taken over the health and epidemic staff maintained by the District Local Boards of Satara and Dharwar. Subsequently the scheme has been extended to the remaining districts of this Province. As the scheme has proved its usefulness and as it is necessary to ensure security of employment to the staff in the interest of efficiency and satisfactory working of the scheme, Government proposes to continue it on a permanent basis in the Districts of East Khandesh, West Khandesh, Nasik, Ahmednagar, Satara and Dharwar with effect from 1st March 1949. The scheme in these districts has been sanctioned on a temporary basis upto 8th July 1949. It is however proposed to sanction it on a permanent basis from 1st March 1949. The budget provision has been made in the budget estimates under temporary establishments for the year 1949-50. The ultimate annual recurrent cost on account of the proposal will be, Rs. 8,61,020.

Government now considers that it is necessary to establish a small research and educational centre for Sheep Breeding at Dharwar in conjunction with the Agricultural College. It

is therefore proposed to sanction the establishment of the Dharwar sub-station at a cost of Rs. 63,326 (Rs. 18,870 non-recurring and Rs. 44,456 recurring) spread over a period of four years in the first instance. This sub-station would form a part of the expansion programme undertaken in Post-War Reconstruction Scheme No. 34. The object in establishing the sub-station is to co-ordinate the work of research undertaken in the southern zone of the Bombay-Deccan and to evolve new type of sheep which would be suited to the heavier rainfall areas of the transitional tract. The institution will serve as a directive for the breeding plan of the rural Sheep Breeding Centres and also guide the developmental work at the other sub-stations. Remarks.—This is the fourth year of affiliation of the Veterinary College to the University of Bombay. Seven lecturers have been temporarily employed for conducting the 3 Degree Classes. Besides the Degree Classes, there are 2 classes still running for the Diploma Course students studying under the old curriculum as the Degree and Diploma courses are not identical. The seven posts of lecturers, in the scale of Rs. 140—8—220—10—250, have been continued up to the 28th February, 1949. As the services of these lecturers are still required it is proposed to continue them for a further period of one year, in the first instance. The details of the expenditure involved during 1949-50 are given below:—

Remarks.—Tick infestation is an ever-present menace to cattle improvement as it causes immense suffering to livestock and enormous economic loss to cattle-owners in large tracts of Bombay Province. It also causes damage to the hides. Regular dipping has effected considerable improvement in the dipping stock. Under the Post-War Reconstruction Plan (Scheme No. 52) it is proposed to extend the work by the provision of more tanks in the very heavily infested areas of the Konkan districts and the Mawal areas of Nasik, Poona, Satara, Belgaum and Dharwar districts. The work under this scheme is not up to the programme as much time has already been wasted in construction and erection of steel dipping tank at Sirur. Experiments on "Hexyclan", a Dutch preparation, have been conducted and these show satisfactory results. It has been decided to construct dipping tanks in places where the use of "Hexyclan" may not achieve the desired object. It has accordingly been proposed to construct seven cattle dipping tanks during the year 1949-50 in tick-infested areas of this Province. The cost of construction during the year 1949-50 will be as shown below:—

Remarks.—Under the Post-War Reconstruction Plan (Scheme No. 47), Government has decided to assume full control of all veterinary dispensaries in the Province which are at present maintained either by District Local Boards or Municipalities. Having regard to the financial considerations, it has been decided that the change over should be gradual. In pursuance of this policy, on 7th March, 1946, Government accorded sanction to assume full control of 10 Veterinary Dispensaries, viz. Kumta, Haliyal, Sirsi and Karwar (Kanara District), Palghar, Dahanu, Kalyan and Vada (Thana District), Olpad and Chikhali (Surat District). These 10 Veterinary Dispensaries have accordingly been taken over under Government control with effect from 1st April, 1946, along with the staff. The staff at these 10 Veterinary Dispensaries has since then been continued from time to time up to 28th February, 1949.

Similarly, on the 10th April, 1947, Government accorded sanction to assume full control of 20 more Veterinary Dispensaries, viz. Dhansura Prantij and Sanand (Ahmedabad District), Surat, Bular, Eru-Four Roads and Bardoli (Surat District), Taloda, Shahada, Nawapur, Sindkheda and Shirpur (West Khandesh District), Alibag, Mahad and Panvel (Kolaba District), Ratnagiri and Chiplun (Ratnagiri District) and Yeola, Malegaon and Sinnar (Nasik

District) along with the staff. Out of these, the first 17 Veterinary Dispensaries have been taken over under Government control with effect from 1st June, 1947, and the remaining 3 Veterinary Dispensaries (in Nasik District) with effect from 15th September, 1947. The staff at these 20 Veterinary Dispensaries has been continued from time to time up to 28th February, 1949.

As the above 30 Veterinary Dispensaries were intended to be taken over permanently under Government control, it is proposed that the staff at these Veterinary Dispensaries may be continued on a permanent basis with effect from 1st March, 1949. The proposals involve the following expenditure during the year 1949-50 :—

Remarks.—In order to increase the yield of the land and to secure better return to the cultivators by consolidation of holdings and by adoption of methods of improved farming and marketing of agricultural produce, it is proposed to sanction the following scheme for organisation of co-operative farming societies. The scheme has been modified in the light of the recommendations made in his report entitled "Co-operative Farming in Bombay Province" by Captain S. P. Mohite who was specially appointed by Government to go into the question.

A co-operative farming society may take any of the following forms: Co-operative Better Farming Society, Co-operative Joint Farming Society, Co-operative Tenant Farming Society or Co-operative Collective Farming Society. The lands available for co-operative farming may be classified as follows:—

- (1) lands which are actually under cultivation in fragments, but which can be pooled together for joint cultivation on co-operative basis by the land-holders and protected tenants;
- (2) lands which are Government lands or lands owned by absentee landlords and which are actually under cultivation; and
- (3) lands which are Government waste or private uncultivated lands which need to be reclaimed or developed.

In the case of lands at (1) organisation of co-operative joint farming societies is visualised while the lands at (2) and (3) provide a suitable basis for collective or tenant farming societies. In the case of Government waste lands the Agricultural Department will undertake the work preliminary to making the lands fit for cultivation. Tractor ploughing of lands, provision for lift irrigation facilities by putting up engines and pumping sets, bunding on a mass scale, and introduction of other improvements, will be possible for a well organised Co-operative Farming Society.

2. The scheme is to be worked throughout the Province with particular reference to the districts of Thana, Surat, Kanara, Dharwar, East and West Khandesh where greater scope exists.

3. It is proposed to constitute three co-operative farming units, one for each of the linguistic divisions, each unit consisting of the following staff:—

- (1) One District Co-operative Officer in the grade of Rs. 200—10—300.
- (2) One District Agricultural Officer in the grade of Rs. 140—10—200.
- (3) One Surveyor in the grade of Rs. 70—3—85—4—125.
- (4) Two clerks including one typist in the grade of Rs. 46—3—85.
- (5) Two peons in the grade of Rs. 30— $\frac{1}{2}$ —35.

The primary duty of the staff would be to carry out intensive propaganda to explain the benefits of co-operative farming, and where a possibility of establishing such a society is seen, to carry out a detailed survey of the nature of the lands, their tenures, and productivity; and investigate lines of future development, and work out other details, such as preparation of cropping schemes, share of owner, labour and capital in the yield, etc., after a society is registered.

4. The stipendiary staff will require active co-operation and is expected to get it from local honorary workers. Accordingly, it is proposed to appoint one District Honorary Organiser for each of the 6 districts, viz. Thana, Surat, Dharwar, Kanara, East and West Khandesh, to prepare ground for organisation and dispelling doubts and fears about the scope and objectives of co-operative farming among illiterate cultivators. These honorary workers will be given a short course of training with a view to equip them in the economics of co-operative farming. The work done by the stipendiary staff in the districts as well as the honorary workers is expected to increase the work regarding co-operative farming in the head office. It is, therefore, proposed to create a separate post of senior clerk in the grade of Rs. 100—8—140 to deal with this work.

5. The success of these societies will largely depend on availability of expert and technical staff well trained in agricultural practices. It is accordingly proposed that each of these societies should be given the services of a trained agricultural assistant. The target aimed at is at least 112 co-operative farming societies of all types. Accordingly, in all 112 agricultural assistants will be required during the course of 5 years. In so far as better farming societies are concerned it may not be necessary to give a trained agricultural assistant in all cases but it may employ any other suitable person for which it will be given adequate subsidy if necessary equivalent to the full cost for 2 years and half the cost for the next three years.

6. The following assistance is proposed to be granted under the scheme:—

(1) Land Revenue: Remission of—

Co-operative farming by pooling of lands requires to be encouraged. Landlords who pool their lands for joint cultivation would be given remission or rebate of land assessment for one year.

(2) Subsidy—Grant of—

Each co-operative farming society would be given a subsidy not exceeding Rs. 1,500 in the first year and Rs. 750 in each of the 2nd and 3rd years for purchase of seed, manure, implements, etc., according to the size and nature of the co-operative farm as may be decided by the Registrar.

(3) Loans—

(a) Short-term loans—Co-operative farming societies formed for backward class people or in backward areas will have to be helped to secure short-term finance to meet current cultivation expenses. The contribution to share-capital by backward class agriculturists will be too meagre to make it possible for them to raise adequate finance from the co-operative banks. Government would, therefore, contribute up to Rs. 4,000 to the share capital of each society. The advance would be returnable in five annual instalments. The loans will bear a nominal rate of interest of 1 per cent. per annum.

(b) Long-term loans—

(i) Long-term loans at a concessional rate of interest at 3½ per cent. for purchase of heavy costly agricultural implements such as oil engines, installation of pumping sets, tractor ploughing, etc., and for other land improvement and development schemes will be given by Government. The entire farm and its assets would remain the property of Government until the loan is fully repaid. Normally, co-operative farming societies should arrange to raise loans from the land mortgage banks and central banks. But where such loans are not available at low rate of interest, loans may have to be provided. Roughly, on an average, a loan of Rs. 10,000 will be required for each society.

(ii) Financial assistance may also have to be given to societies to enable them to construct godowns for storage of their agricultural produce as well as agricultural implements or other farm equipment. Similarly, these societies may have to construct buildings for cattle sheds. For this purpose, Government is prepared to give 25 per cent. of the cost of such godowns or sheds as subsidy and up to 75 per cent. by way of long-term loan at 3½ per cent. interest. The loan should be repayable in five annual instalments. Provision may be made at the rate of Rs. 1,500 by way of subsidy and Rs. 4,500 by way of loan per society for half the number of societies.

(iii) Special provisions in the case of backward class farming societies :

In the case of backward class farming societies, the lands are usually given on new tenure. There will, therefore, be no security for loans to be given to such societies. Accordingly, Government is prepared not to insist upon any security from such societies for the long-term loans, in addition to land, machinery, etc., purchased or constructed out of the amount of loan. In case such societies need finance from central banks to whom also they cannot offer additional security, Government will be prepared to consider the question of giving guarantee of the margin of losses to co-operative financing agencies provided such cases are referred to Government as and when they arise.

(4) Assistance for land development purposes—

(a) Where co-operative farming societies take over Government waste lands on lease from Government, their development according to Government policy is to be undertaken by the Agricultural Department and the cost on account of their development will be borne by Government in the first instance, the cost of development being treated as a loan to the co-operative farming society to which the lands are to be handed over for *exploitation*. In certain cases, however, where a co-operative farming society takes up the work of development or reclamation of private land, it would be entitled to subsidy of 25 per cent. of the cost of development and the remaining 75 per cent. would be given in the form of a long-term loan bearing 3½ per cent. interest provided that such subsidy and loan from Government shall be subject to scrutiny of estimates and Government may refuse to consider any case which is considered too costly compared to land to be re-claimed.

(b) There are special rules for the remission of land revenue during the period of reclamation of khar lands, etc. In the case of waste lands for development of which there are no such rules, relating to the grant of remission of land revenue, Government is prepared to remit land revenue for one year.

7. The estimates of cost on account of the scheme have been shown in the attached appendices A, B and C. The total cost of the scheme for five years is estimated at Rs. 20,89,000 the cost during the first year being Rs. 3,25,000 (capital cost Rs. 2,34,000 and recurring Rs. 91,000). The capital cost is entirely on account of short and long terms loans and loans for construction of godowns to be granted to societies under the scheme and is being provided for separately under the head "Loans and Advances by Provincial Government". The recurring cost is debitable to the head "42—Co-operative—G-Post-War Reconstruction and Development Programme—G-8-Scheme for organisation of Co-operative Better Farming Societies", for which this new item is put up.

Remarks.—It is proposed to take up for execution Post-War Reconstruction Scheme No. 63 for organisation of Milk Supply Unions as now modified. The Scheme visualises organisation of milk supply unions in medium sized cities where there is keen demand from consumers with feeder societies in the surrounding rural areas and making arrangements for utilising the surplus, if any, to the best advantage. The areas selected for application in order of priority are Surat, Ahmednagar, Nasik and Belgaum districts. The scheme can be extended to other cities as and when necessary. The Department of Agriculture would be concerned also. The lower staff required would consist of:

(i) Manager at Rs. 150 per mensem (first year free of cost, 2nd year at 50 per cent. cost and 3rd year at 25 per cent. cost).

(ii) Dairy Inspectors at Rs. 125 per mensem (first year free of cost, 2nd year at 50 per cent. cost and 3rd year at 25 per cent. cost). Each milk supply union is proposed to be provided with a Manager and Dairy Inspector at Government cost for a period of three years. The staff is proposed to be obtained by transfer of the Departmental staff of the Co-operative Department and Agriculture Department and by direct recruitment. The rough estimates of the cost involved are as follows:—

The calculations are based on the assumption that two unions will be organised in the first year and one each in the following two years. The scheme as now revised above, shows an increase in cost over the original scheme as printed in the Post War Reconstruction Blue Book by Rs. 20,000 in the five years' period, but whereas the capital cost during the five years' period in the original scheme was only computed at Rs. 1,800 in the scheme as now modified the capital cost will reach Rs. 73,000. On the other hand the recurring cost in the original scheme was computed at Rs. 74,220 while in the scheme as now revised it is only Rs. 23,100. Provision may be made for about five milk collection centres the cost per centre being estimated at Rs. 850 (Rs. 100 for land, Rs. 500 for shed, Rs. 150 for water trough and Rs. 100 for milk pots and measures). The cost of 5 centres would be Rs. 4,250 of which half would be subsidy and half loan repayable in 15 instalments at 4 per cent.

The union will arrange for transport of milk but assistance towards purchase of motor vans estimated to cost Rs. 8,000 is proposed to be given, half the cost as subsidy and half as loan at 4 per cent. repayable in 15 years. The cost of equipment like cans, boiler and testing apparatus is estimated to cost Rs. 6,000 half of which is proposed to be made available as subsidy and half as loan. Besides the capital expenditure mentioned above, the union will employ technical staff, viz., Manager from the Co-operative Department and Dairy Supervisor from the Agriculture Department. It is proposed to make the above staff available to the union free of cost in the first year, half free in the second year and one-fourth free in the third year.

In all Rs. 36,500 will be required for grant of loan at 4 per cent. and Rs. 59,600 for grant of subsidy which is spread over three years; the detailed estimates of which are as follows:—

Remarks.—With a view to providing facilities for finishing to the tanners in their profession and to train them in machine work of finishing leather, Government has decided to start, as a post-war measure, Tanning Demonstration centres finishing units at suitable places. These centres besides having an education value will also be self-supporting after some time say in the 3rd or 4th year of their beginning. The first such centre has already been started at Satara. Remarks.—This is an approved Post-War Reconstruction Scheme. In accordance with the scheme two additional 'A' type centres, one at Ahmedabad and the other at Sholapur, have to be opened. But in view of reduction in the Post-War Reconstruction grant the establishment of an additional 'A' type centre at Sholapur has been postponed to the next quinquennium. It is proposed to start one 'A' type centre at Ahmedabad during the next financial year. The present 'A' type centre at Ahmedabad is situated at a place which is out of the way for the majority of the workers living in Ahmedabad. A Government plot at Rakhial (Ahmedabad) has already been selected for the proposed 'A' type centre at Ahmedabad and administrative approval has also been accorded by Government to the work of constructing the centre. Remarks.—Sixteen "B" type centres are to be established under the Post-War Reconstruction Programme, which has been approved by Government. One "B" type centre in hired premises has already been started at Hubli and six more centres one each at Poona, Gadag, Jalgaon, Barsi, Dhulia and Viramgaum for which provision has been made in the current year's budget may be started during the course of the current year. It is proposed to extend the Labour Welfare activities to other industrial centres as contemplated under the Post-War Reconstruction Programme. It is accordingly proposed to start three more "B" type centres during the next financial year at convenient industrial centres. Suitable sites for erection of "B" type centre buildings are likely to be made available. Necessary provision on account of construction of buildings for the proposed "B" type centres is being made under "81-Capital Accounts".

Remarks.—Government had approved the schemes of pre-employment training and post-employment training of workers for execution during the first five period of the Post War Reconstruction Programme. The schools have not started so far for want of a suitable site and building. In pursuance of Government's anti-inflationary policy it has now been decided to postpone the question of starting pre-employment and post-employment training schools, and instead to give grants-in-aid to institutions running similar schools. It is accordingly proposed to give a grant-in-aid of Rs. 5,000 for a period of one year in the first instance to the Textile Technical School at Parel run by the Social Service League, Bombay. The grant will be subject to the condition that the students deputed by Government for training in the school will get preference over those who go directly for training and that the training will be under the supervision of the Director of Labour Welfare. It is, therefore, necessary to provide for a grant of Rs. 5,000 in the next year's budget.

Remarks.—The provision is required for the construction of 5 more insulated vans for the transport of milk from Kaira District to Bombay.

The B. B. & C. I. Railway has so far constructed and placed at the disposal of this Government 9 insulated vans, and the Railway has been instructed to construct, at the cost of this Government, two more insulated vans bringing the total to 11.

Government has, however, recently decided to work departmentally the Long Term Scheme of bringing milk from Anand to Bombay. Under this scheme, daily about 1,00,000 lbs. of milk will be brought to Bombay and it would require seven wagons to transport it. Each day 7 wagons would bring the milk and seven would have to be returned to Anand, thus making up 14 wagons. It is proposed to keep 2 wagons as stand-bys to be used when any are detained by the Railway for repairs. To the present strength of 11 wagons sanctioned so far, will have to be added five more insulated vans.

The latest estimate for construction of an insulated van furnished by the B. B. & C. I. Railway is Rs. 34,178. For five vans, the cost will be Rs. 1,70,890, i.e. Rs. 1,70,000 in round figures.

From the second year (i.e. 1950-51) Government will be paying about 10 per cent. to the Railway by way of depreciation, maintenance, supervision charges, etc.

When the actual work of constructing the dam on the Godavari river begins, it will be very difficult for one Sub-Divisional Officer, Construction, to manage the entire work and hence it is proposed that one more Sub-Division should be opened when the work comes in full swing. As it will not be possible for the Executive Engineer to supervise the entire work of construction with 4 Sub-Divisions under him, it is also proposed to appoint one Deputy Engineer as P. A. to the Executive Engineer, Gangapur Storage Division.

In addition to the staff for the proposed new Sub-Division, it is proposed to strengthen each of the existing Sub-Divisions by one overseer each. (i) *Inspection Bungalow at Viramgam.*—In the programme of five years for Post-War Development Works a sum of Rs. 2,79,000 has been allotted for expenditure in the year 1949-50 on new buildings such as Inspection Bungalows, District Bungalows, Rest Houses, etc. The work referred to above is included in the programme. There is no Inspection or District Bungalow at this place. It is, therefore, considered necessary to construct an Inspection Bungalow at Viramgam. The estimated cost is Rs. 36,825. Remarks.—In August 1945, certain additional technical staff for the designing and construction work of the various Electric Grid Schemes undertaken by this Department was sanctioned. Since then, due to advance in the work of the schemes and the preliminary work in connection with the new schemes proposed to be taken in hand, the work in all sections in the Grid Department has considerably increased as detailed below :—

I—Hydro Section (including Civil Engineering Works).

In connection with the Koyna Scheme it is proposed to take up the work of the construction of colonies obtaining construction plant, making approach roads and material transport roads by end of 1949 and the main project work by the end of 1950. A large amount of preliminary work is required to be done immediately.

II—Transmission Section.

This section deals generally with the work of transmission and distribution lines of the North Gujarat and South Gujarat Schemes, preparation of development scheme like supply for Bombay Baroda and Central India Railway, electrification and other new schemes which are in the investigation stage. In addition, the section has to attend to the work of the Talegaon distribution system and will have to undertake the transmission line work of the Koyna Hydro Electric Scheme, the estimated cost of which is of the order of 7 to 8 crores.

III—Diesel and Steam Section.

Government has decided to establish a steam power station in the Surat region and orders for the machinery required have been placed. The machinery when received will be installed as soon as the power house is ready. It is usual and prudent in works of this magnitude to employ some nucleus technical staff for working along side the manufacturers' erectors to study the features of the new plant and get accustomed to handling it before the commencement of the work of the operation and of maintenance of the power station. This staff will be absorbed in the staff for operation and maintenance work, which will be asked for separately soon after the completion of erection work.

2. To cope with the increase in work, the additional staff as detailed in the accompanying statement is proposed to be sanctioned. The gazetted posts are proposed to be continued for a period of five years and the rest for three years. The staff will be granted the same conditions of pay, contributory provident fund and other allowances as have been granted to similar Grid establishment. The staff will be engaged as required from 1st April 1949. The cost during 1949-50 will be as under :—

Remarks.—The scheme for the nationalisation of Road Transport was inaugurated in Division No. 10 in June 1948 and is gradually expanding. As programmed it is expected that by the end of the current financial year divisions Nos. 1, 2, 9, 10 and 11 will have been taken over for operation. It is proposed to entrust the administration of the scheme to a State Transport Corporation as soon as it is constituted. Necessary legislation for the establishment of the State Transport Corporation is being drafted. In the meanwhile the services are being run departmentally.

Programme of Nationalisation.—The scheme is to be spread over three years and 1949-50 is the second year in the programme. This year it is proposed to take over for Nationalisation of Road Transport divisions Nos. 3, 4, 7, 8 and 12, namely, Panchmahal, Broach and Surat, Ahmednagar, Nasik and Belgaum. The remaining four divisions, namely, 5, 6, 13 and 14 will be taken up in 1950-51.

The total capital cost of assuming control over the divisions proposed to be taken over in 1949-50 will be Rs. 2,27,05,362. This capital cost has been provided for under the Major Head "82-B—Capital Outlay on Road Transport Scheme outside the revenue account". The cost of running the scheme in these divisions during 1949-50 has been estimated at Rs. 1,01,84,669.

Remarks.—The project is included in the First Five-Year Programme of Major Irrigation Works. The work of constructing the tank was taken up as a famine relief work in 1899 but was stopped and left unfinished in 1902, as survey for the complete project had yet to be done.

The work of completing the project is estimated to cost Rs. 25,68,454 including direct and indirect charges. The project comprises an earthen dam 8,675 feet long and a canal on the left bank 12 miles long. It is expected that an area of 8,754 acres will be irrigated annually in an average year and of 11,064 acres when the tank is full. The project will yield a return of about 1·53 per cent. on the total capital outlay including the old expenditure.

Remarks.—Preliminary investigations in connection with supply of power to Talegaon-Dabhade were made in 1945 on the assumption that Tatas would tap the 100 K. V. line at Talegaon for supply of power to this Department at 11 K. V. for local distribution. Tatas were unwilling to bear capital expenditure involved in making 11 K. V. supply available at this point and offered supply at 100 K. V. under their standard R. S. 4 Rate Schedule applicable to licensees which was not acceptable to Government. They, however, agreed that bulk supply may be taken under R. S. 4 Schedule at 22 K. V. at Lonavla and distributed at this voltage from there to Talegaon. The power thus purchased can be economically distributed in the rural area between Lonavla and Talegaon and the scheme is expected to become self-supporting in about five years from the commencement of the supply. The scheme is estimated to cost Rs. 6.82 lakhs and Government has approved it. A provision of Rs. 50,000 is proposed for the work for the next year.

2. The electric service is demanded by the public for small industries and lighting. The shortage of fuel oil has accentuated the situation.

Remarks.—Government has decided to electrify certain towns which satisfy the following criteria and which are not within the economic reach of the grid system, in the first five years' period of the reconstruction plan :—

(1) The total number of houses in the town is about 2,000 or more.

(2) There are either cottage industries like hand weaving, oil pressing, etc., of reasonable magnitude in which hand operated appliances can be replaced by electrically operated appliances thereby making for appreciable increase in the earning capacity of the inhabitants or there are irrigation facilities where electrically operated irrigation pumps can be installed.

2. The Electrical Commissioner was accordingly authorised to undertake detailed investigations of 21 such towns. In accordance with this decision the Electrical Commissioner has investigated the possibility of electrification of the towns of Guledgud, Kamatgi, Ilkal, Hungund, Sulebhavi, Amingad and Gudur in Bijapur District. This scheme has been approved at an aggregate cost of Rs. 12,78,100 as detailed below :—

(iii) The Aarey Milk Colony consists of 32 Dairy Farm Units with a central Dairy. Out of 32 Dairy Farm Units, the construction of 7 will be completed by March 1949 and the construction of 10 units (in progress) will be completed by March 1950. It is proposed to construct the remaining 15 units in the year 1949-50. On the basis of the tenders accepted for the construction of the 10 Dairy Farm Units during the year 1948-49, a sum of Rs. 48,00,000 is proposed for the additional 12 Dairy Farm Units.
