- 1. Under section 272 of the Constitution, Union Duties of Excise other than duties of excise on medicinal and toilet preparations as are mentioned in the Union List, shall be levied and collected by the Government of India, but if Parliament by law so provides, these shall be paid out of the consolidated fund of India to the State to which the law, imposing the duty, applies; sums equivalent to the whole or in part of the net proceeds of that duty, and those sums shall be distributed among those States in accordance with the principles of distribution as may be formulated by such laws.
- 2. The Second Finance Commission appointed by the Government of India widened the range of central excises to be shared by States to include the duties on coffee, tea, sugar, paper and vegetable and non-essential oils. Till then, only the proceeds of the central excise on matches, vegetable products and tobacco were distributed. According to the Second Finance Commission's recommendations, the States share stands lowered from 40 per cent. to 25 per cent. of the net proceeds of the excises and this amount has to be distributed among the various States at 90 per cent. of the share on the basis of population, the balance of 10 per cent. being used for adjustment. Bombay State has been assigned 12·17 per cent. of the States' share in the net proceeds. The estimates of receipts at (a) above in the current year's revised and the next year's budget estimates are made on this basis.
- 3. Additional Excise Duties on Sugar, Textiles and Tobacco.—The State's share in additional Excise Duties on Sugar, mill-made Textiles and Tobacco in lieu of Sales Tax has been arrived at on the following basis:—
 - (i) In respect of the union territories, 1 per cent. of the net proceeds in any financial year of the additional duty of excise, on each of the three commodites, namely mill made textiles, sugar and tobacco (including manufactured tobacco) to be retained by the Union;
 - (ii) A sum equal to one and one-quarter per cent. of such net proceeds to be paid to the State of Jammu and Kashmir; and
 - (iii) Out of the balance of the net proceeds i.e. after deduction of the sums mentioned at (i) and (ii) above, the following sums being the "present income" of the States, to be paid to them:—

Revenue.

- 8. Ordinary Revenue.—The receipts under this head are inclusive of the portion of land revenue due to irrigation which is subsequently transferred to the Irrigation heads (XVII and XVIII). The decrease in the next year's estimate is due to the proposed reduction in the rates of assessment in some areas, of the State.
- 9. Sale of Government Estates and Sale Proceeds of Waste Lands and Redemption of Land tax.—The receipts are of a fluctuating nature depending upon the demand for land. The increase in the next year's budget is mainly due to more provisions proposed by the Commissioners of Poona and Bombay.
- 10. Recoveries on account of Survey and Settlement charges.—The current year's revised estimate is based on the progress of the current actuals.
- 11. Rent etc. of Fisheries.—The current year's revised and the next year's budget estimates are based on the progress of actuals.
- 12. Recoveries of cost of maintenance of Boundary Pillars.—The current year's revised and the next year's budget estimates are based on the progress of actuals.
- 13. Rates and Cesses on Lands.—The current year's revised and the next year's budget estimates are based on the progress of actuals.
- 14. Collection of payments for services rendered.—Recoveries on account of land acquisition work done on behalf of public bodies by Consulting Surveyor's Department and payments received for management of estates are accounted for under this head. The receipts are therefore of a fluctuating nature. The revised and the next year's budget estimates are based on the progress of actuals.
- 15. Miscellaneous.—The receipts under this head include quarry fees, items of miscellaneous land revenue and the annual contribution from the Government of India in lieu of abatement of non-agricultural assessment on private lands used for the manufacture of salt. The receipts are of fluctuating nature.
- 16. Deduct Refunds.—This is a fluctuating item. The current year's revised and the next year's estimate are based on the progress of the current and the past actuals.

Expenditure.

17. Charges of Administration.—The increase in the revised estimate and the next year's budget estimate is due to the additional staff for land acquisition work.

The "Charged" provision in the next year's budget estimate is on account of the payment of decretal amounts.

18. Land Records.—The decrease in the current year's revised es imate is mainly under "Settlement and Classification work" and "Pot Hissa Measurement Operations" partly counterbalanced by increase under "Record of Rights", "District Charges" and "Implementation of the Bombay Prevention of Fragamentation and Consolidation of Holdings".

The next year's estimate provides for the schemes of Land Development and Survey works as per plan phasing.

- 19. Assignments and Compensations.—The increase in the current year's revised and the next year's budget estimate is on account of compensation to land holders under the various Land Tenure Abolition Acts which were in operation in the pre-reorganised areas of the State and other Land Revenue Compensations. The provision for charged expenditure is on account of compensation under the Saurashtra Land Reforms Act.
- 20. Contribution to Saurashtra Local Development Fund.—The provision under this head represents the amount of land cess levied under the Saurashtra Local Development Land Act to be paid to District Panchayats. According to the accounting procedure decided in consultation with the Accountant General, Bombay, the receipt of cess is to be credited under the head "Rates and Cesses on Lands" on the receipt side and equivalent amount is to be provided for transfer to the Saurashtra Local Development Fund under this head. The amounts thus provided under "7-Land Revenue" are to be transferred to the new minor head "Saurashtra Local Development Fund" opened under "S-Deposits and Advances—B—Reserve Fund". Necessary provision for payment of grant-in-aid to District Panchayats from this fund has been made on the payment side under that head under "S-Deposits and Advances".

Revenue.

22. Country Spirits.—Decrease in the revised estimate of the current year is due to fall in consumption and closure of certain country liquor shops whose licences are either suspended or cancelled in Marathwada area. Considerable decrease in the next year's estimate is mainly on account of introduction of prohibition and drug control in the entire area of the State.

Country Fermented Liquor.—Decrease in the estimate for 1959-60 is due to the above reasons.

- 23. Malt Liquor.—Increase in the revised estimate for 1958-59 as well as hudget estimate for 1959-60 is due to the fact that duty on foreign liquor from abroad is now levied at the port of landing by the Government of India. But duty on such liquor manufactured in India and imported into this State is levied by the State Government. As the Government of India has imposed heavy reductions on the imports of intoxicants from abroad, there is increase in the imports of Indian made liquor and heer.
- 24. Wines and spirits (Foreign liquors other than beer, medicated wines and commercial spirits).— Increase in the revised estimate for 1958-59 and budget estimate for 1959-60 is due to the same reasons as for changes under "Malt Liquor".
- 25. Opium.—The revenues realised depend on the consumption of opium and hemp drugs by the permit holders. As the drugs permit system has been extended to the component parts of the New State the consumption has gone down.
- 26. Duties on medicinal and toilet preparations containing alcohol, opium etc.—The revenue depends on the production of spirituous, medicinal and toilet preparations by the Fonded laboratories.
- 27. Hemp and other Drugs.—The decrease in the revised estimate is due to introduction of prohibition in the component parts of the New State. Hemp and other drugs will be completely stopped from 1st April 1959.
- 28. Fines, confiscations and miscellaneous.—This is a fluctuating item of receipts. The revised estimate for 1958-59 and budget estimate for 1959-60 are based on the progress of actuals.

 Expenditure.
- 29. Superintendence.—The increase in the revised estimate for 1958-59 is on account of the decision to introduce prohibition and drugs permit system in the component parts of the New State and also due to the expenditure on research work on drinking habits of the people in these areas. Increase in the rates of pay and allowances of the additional staff for component parts and increase in the rates of postage charges are accounted for. The budget estimates have been framed on the basis of current and past years actuals.
- 30. Further increase in the revised estimate of the current year and budget estimate of the next year is due to sanction of grant-in-aid to Nasha-Bandi, Mandal.
- 31. District charges.—The increase in revised estimate for 1958-59 is due to the reasons mentioned in the case of expenditure under "Superintendence". Decrease in the next year's budget estimates is mainly due to less expenditure under Travelling Allowance (ordinary) and also due to more provision proposed for contribution for establishment employed at the cost of other parties. The budget estimates have been framed on the basis of current and past actuals. Payment of unforeseen decretal amounts have also been reflected in the revised estimate.
- 32. Departmental and Commissioned shops.—Decrease in the revised estimate, 1952-59 and budget estimate, 1959-60 is due to reduction in the strength of staff in Vidarbha and Marathwada areas employed for retailing drug to the permit holders. This work has been entrusted to the revenue staff on remuneration has is in Vidarbha, in Marathwada area this work is being done by the clerks in tabsil offices in addition to other excise work.
- 33. Cost of opium supplied to State Excise Department.—No provision was made in the current year's budget under this head. The revised estimates, 1958-59 represent the cost of opium supplied to the Deputy Commissioner, Bhandara, prior to reorganisation. Provision for this item was made in the budget for 1957-58 but the adjustment could not be carried out in the Accounts for 1957-58 by the Accountant General, Bombay, and hence the excess. The stock on hand is sufficient to meet the requirements, during the current year as well as next year. Therefore, no provision for next year is necessary.
- 34. Purchase of Ganja and other drugs.—The stock of Ganja and Bhang on hand is sufficient. Therefore no provision is required to be made in the next year's budget.
- 35. Compensations.—Annual payment of compensation to leased Indian States has since been stopped. A provision of Rs. 1,000 is made for settlement of outstanding claims.

- 36. A—Non-Judicial—Sale of Stamps.—The decrease in the revised estimate for the current year is based on progress of actuals. The next year's budget estimates takes into account the increased receipts under the Bombay Stamp Act, 1953, likely to be brought into force in near future.
 - 37. Duty on Impressing Documents.—The estimates are based on progress of actuals.
 - 38. Miscellaneous.—The estimates are based on progress of actuals.
- 39. Deduct Refunds.—The increase in the revised estimates and the next year's budget is on account of introduction of section 54-A in the Indian Stamp Act according to which value of stamps in denomination otherwise than four annas and multiples thereof is refundable in full.
 - 40. B-Judicial-Court Fees realised in Stamps.—The estimates are based on progress of actuals.

Expenditure.

- 41. Non-Judicial and Judicial—A-Superintendence.—The estimates are based on progress of actuals.

- 44. Timber and other produce removed from the forests by Government Agency.—The increase in the revised estimate is due to more quantity of timber being put to auction in Amravati Circle and due to better prices expected from the sale of timber by way of auctions in Amravati Circle.
- 45. Timber and other produce removed from the Forests by Consumer or Purchasers.—The increase in the revised estimate and the next year's budget estimate is due to better prices expected from the sale of coupes from Junagadh and Nagpur Circles and better production expected from coupes in the Amravati Circle.
- 46. Drift and Waif Wood and confiscated Forest produce.—The increase in the revised estimate is due to more revenue realised from the sale of seized material in Nagpur and Nasik Circles. The next year's estimate follows the revised estimate.

- 49. Deduct—Refunds.—The increase in the revised and budget estimates is due to more refunds expected in various Circles.
- 50. Subvention from the Government of India.—The grants received from the Government of India for plan as well as non-plan scheme of the State Government, are exhibited under this head.

Expenditure.

- 51. Conservancy and Works.—The increase in the revised estimate is due to working of more coupes departmentally in almost all the Circles, supply of grass to scarcity areas and departmental extraction of bamboos in Baroda Circle and more ordinary repairs to the roads and bridges being unavoidable and for payment of annewari and Kumbala Aunsh to Khatedars in Sawantwadi and Janjira Divisions.
- 52. Establishment.—The decrease in the revised estimate is due to non-appointment and late appointment of certain staff. Increase in the next year's estimate as compared with the revised estimate of the current year is due to the provision made to meet the pay of subordinates in the Nagpur Circles at the higher rate on account of fixation of their pays according to the revised scales and due to additional temporary staff required in various Circles.

Revenue.

55. The increase in the revised estimate for 1958-59 is due to larger receipts anticipated under the Indian Motor Vehicles Act, on account of the fact that Motor Driving Licences which were previously renewed yearly are now renewed for 3 years.

Receipts under the State Motor Vehicles Taxation Act.—Increase is due to larger receipts under Motor Vehicle Tax under the State Motor Vehicles Tax Act, 1958 which has come into force from 1st April 1958 and due to increased number of vehicles in operation and registration of new vehicles.

Fees and other receipts.—The increase in the revised estimate of the current year and budget estimate of the next year is mainly due to the fact that the Taxation of Passengers Act has come into force from 15th October 1958.

Expenditure.

55. A—Charges of Collection.—A fixed proportion of expenditure under the B—Inspection of Metor Vehicles is transferred to this minor head the estimate under this head, therefore, varies in proportion to the estimates under the head "B—Inspection of Metor Vehicles."

57. B—Inspection of Motor Vehicles.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to the creation of additional staff in the State Transport Office for the administration of Motor Vehicles Tax Act, and for unification of Motor Vehicles Laws and Rules, creation of additional posts of A. R. T. Os. at Surat, Kolhapur, Kutch and Amravati and grant of P. T.A. to executive Staff in the former States of Hyderabad, Saurashtra and Kutch and Madhya Pradesh is also the reason for the increase.

The next year's estimate follows the revised.

- 58. D—Other Charges.—The decrease in the revised estimate 1958-59 is due to reduction in the staff and less tours by the officers. The increase in the next year's estimate is due to the normal increment of the staff and for sundry expenditure.
- 59. E—Transfer to the State Road Fund.—Under section 11 (1) of the Bombay Motor Vehicles Tax Act, 1958, the proceeds of the tax recovered under this Act shall first be credited to the consolidated Fund of the State; and thereafter the proceeds of the tax for each quarter, after deducting the expenses of collection thereof not exceeding an amount equal to fifteen per centum of such proceeds shall, under appropriation made by law in this behalf, be entered in and transferred to a separate account called the State Road Fund.

Revenue.

- 60. Taxes under the Central Sales Tax Act.—The increase in the revised estimate is based on the progress of actuals in the current year. It includes tax on exports of non-dutiable stock of scheduled goods, viz. cloth, sugar and tobacco.
- 61. Sales Tax on Motor Spirit.—The increase in the revised estimate 1958-59 and the budget estimate 1959-60 is due to levy of tax on diesel oil at 5 nP. per rupee under the Unified Motor Spirit Law.
- 62. Sales Tax On Intoxicants.—The decrease in the revised estimate of the current year and budget estimate of the next year is due to postponement of the operation of intoxicant tax on all the spiritious medicinal preparation containing 10 per cent. or more by volume alchorol other than those specifically exempted.
- 63. Sales Tax on other commodities.—The increase in the revised estimate of the current year is based on the progress of actuals of the current year. It includes tax on sales of non-dutiable stocks of scheduled goods, viz. sugar, cloth and tobacco.
- 64. Licence fees.—The increase in the revised estimate of the current year is due to licence fee in Marathwada being on slab system varying with turnovers. The next year's estimate shows decrease as compared with the revised estimate of the current year. It is due to the fact that the unified sales tax law comes into force, and hence the major source of revenue in Hyderabad, viz. the General Sales Tax Act of 1956 under which licence fees are payable for licensing of dealers dealing in exempted goods and commission agents is likely to disappear.

65. Miscellaneous.—The increase in the revised estimate of the current year and budget estimate of the next year is mainly based on the progress of actuals in the current year.

Expenditure.

- 66. A—Collection charges.—It e increase in the revised estimate of the current year is due to increase in the establishment and probable provision due to refixation of pay of the allocated Government servants and due to additional provision required for cases decided against Government during the current year than anticipated. The next year's estimate is based on actual requirements, and additional provision for additional offices to be opened during the next year.
- 67. Transfer to the Sicts Road Fund.—Under the unified Motor Spirit Law, 50 per cent. of the net proceeds of the Sales Tax on motor spirit and penalties other than fines, imposed under the Act are to be retained in the general revenue and the balance is to be transferred to the State Road Fund.

The current year's revised estimate and budget estimate of the next year represent the amounts transferable to the State Road Fund.

Revenue.

- 68. Tax on Luxuries including taxes on Extertainments, bettings and gambling.—The revised estimate of the current year and budget estimates of the next year provide for normal receipts for the respective years. They take into account the revised rates of Entertainment duty.
- 69. Receipts from Electricity Duties.—The increase in the revised estimate is due to revised rates of electricity Duty which have come into force from 1st July 1958 and due to more consumption of electricity. The next year's estimate provides for normal receipts during the year.
- 70. Receipts from Tobacco Duties.—The revised estimate 1958-59 and the budget estimate 1959-60 provides for normal receipts for the respective years.
- 71. Tax on trade Professions, calling and Employment.—This tax has been abolished from 1st April 1958. The revised estimate 1958-59 provides for arrears of the past years which are yet to be recovered. Next year's estimate is nil in view of the abolition of tax.
- 72. Urban Immovable Property Tax.—The revised estimate 1958-59 and Budget Estimate 1959-60 provides for normal receipts.
- 73. Receipts under the Bombay Sugarcane Cess Act, 1958.—The increase in the revised estimate for 1958-59 is due to the increase in the number of sugar factories. The next year's estimate follows the revised estimate of the current year.


Expenditure.

- 74. Betting Tax.—The increase in the revised estimate 1958-59 is due to making good to the R. W. I. T. club, the loss by an ex-gratia payment which represented 2 per cent. out of the collected totalisator tax paid by the R. W. I. T. club to Government in respect of the seven race meetings which were prior to 21st December 1953. The next year's estimate is based on actual requirements.
- 75. Transfer to the State Sugarcane Cess Fund.—The figures represent the amount of Sugarcane Cess receipts transferable to the Sugarcane Cess Fund after deduction of Collection charges.

NOTE ON THE SYSTEM OF CAPITAL AND NON-CAPITAL ACCOUNTS OF IRRIGATION WORKS.

- 76. Irrigation works are divided into two main categories (1) works for which capital accounts are kept and (2) works for which capital accounts are not kept. All irrigation works, for which it is both desirable and possible to maintain accounts on a quasi-commercial basis, are included in the former category and those for which the maintenance of such accounts is unnecessary, either because they produce little or no revenue or because owing to their restricted size, it is not worthwhile examining the returns paid by each individual work, are put in the latter class. The important criterion in the case of a quasi-commercial undertaking is whether the work is remunerative or the reverse and it is, therefore, essential for this class of works to maintain a capital account, since it is only by reference to the amount of capital expended that the value of the results can be determined.
- 77. The works for which capital accounts are kept are divided into (A) Irrigation and (B) Navigation, Embankment and Drainage Works separately, each of which is again sub-divided into (1) Productive and (2) Unproductive Works.
- 78. The initial expenditure on the construction of an irrigation project for which capital accounts are kept is charged to the capital account of that project and such further expenditure after its completion as is necessary for the full development of the scheme is also added to that account.
- 79. The capital invested on the work includes (1) direct charges, i.e., cost of works, establishment tools and plant and pensionary charges, (2) indirect charges, i.e., capitalised value of abatement of revenue from land occupied by works and audit charges, and (3) all arrears of simple interest, if any, i.e., balance of total interest over net revenue. This capital cost is commonly known as "Sum-at-charge."
- 80. As soon as a work begins to earn revenue, a Revenue Account is opened for it. The revenue derived from the works credited to that account and annual maintenance charges are debited to it. The difference between this gross revenue earned and the maintenance charges is the net revenue of the work
- 81. If the net revenue from a capital work is expected to repay after ten years from its completion; the annual interest charges on the capital invested, i.e., sum-at-charge, at 4 per cent. or at such other rate as may be fixed by Government from time to time, the work is considered as "Productive"; otherwise it is treated as "Unproductive". If any productive work for which a capital account is kept fails at any time after the expiry of ten years from its completion in three successive years to yield the relevant return, it is transferred to the unproductive class. Similarly, if a work though classed as unproductive succeeds in yielding for three successive years the relevant return prescribed for a productive work, it is transferred to the productive class. The same principle applies to all extensions and improvements of an existing work.
- 82. The capital expenditure on irrigation works is booked in the accounts under two major heads viz., "68, Construction of Irrigation, Navigation, Embankment and Drainage Works (Commercial)" and "68-A, Con truction of Irrigation, Embankment and Drainage Works (Non-Commercial)". Funds for works may be provided from ordinary revenues, Famine Fund or from other sources outside the revenue of which the most important is loans and the expenditure is booked under two major heads "68" and "68-A". These major heads are however, intended to include only expenditure incurred from sources outside the revenue and it is therefore necessary to deduct from these Heads the capital expenditure defrayed from general revenues and to show it is in the revenue section of the accounts. There will thus be two deductions in lump sums at the foot of the account of the major heads "68" and "68-A" and the amounts thus deducted from this head are booked, without details of works under the major head "19-A, financed from Famine Relief Fund" and "B, Financed from Ordinary Revenues" according to the sources from which funds are provided. The net total of the major heads "68" and "68-A" after the deductions referred to above have been made, represents that portion of the capital expenditure on irrigation works which is financed from sources outside the ordinary revenue.
- 83. The revenue derived for irrigation works for which capital accounts are kept and the annual expenditure on maintenance and working expenses on these works are respectively credited and debited to the revenue accounts of those works under a separate revenue head "XVII-Irrigation, Navigation Embankment and Drainage Work:—Commercial—i.e. for which capital accounts are kept. The divisions and sub-divisions of this account also being the same as those under the corresponding capital expenditure head "68".
- 84. In the budget estimates of revenue for Irrigation Works under "XVII", the working expenses and maintenance charges of capital works are shown by a minus entry under gross revenue in order to show the estimated net revenue, as the essential matter is the net and not gross revenue. Although these working expenses are shown under the receipt head, they are of course, treated in all respects as ordinary expenditure; they are subject to the same rules and conditions and as in the case of other outlays, are included in the demand for grants.
- 85. There is one more minus entry to be made in the budget estimates of revenue under the head "XVII" before the net revenue is shown and that is "refunds of revenue".
 - 86. The interest on capital outlay is shown under the head "17- Interest on Works."

- 87. The second division of irrigation works, viz., works for which capital accounts are not kept includes a very large number of works which while collectively of great importance, are individually too small to make it worthwhile to maintain separate accounts for each. All expenditure upon such works—which are classified as minor irrigation works whether upon the construction of new works or upon extensions or improvements costing more than Rs. 20,000 each is booked under the major head "63-A, Construction of Irrigation, Navigation, Embankment and Drainage Works (Non-Commercial)" in the Capital Section, which the expenditure on the new works and extension and improvements, costing Rs. 20,000 or less and expenditure on maintenance and repairs to existing works is accounted for under the major head "18, other Revenue Expenditure financed from ordinary revenues" in the Revenue Section. Since the works under these classes are on a non-commercial basis and no capital accounts are kept for them, there is no object in treating maintenance charges as a minus entry under revenue as in the case of quasi-commercial works, and therefore, they are shown under the expenditure heads "68-A" and "18". The only comparison here possible is that between the gross revenue (shown under revenue head "XVIII") and the total expenditure of all kinds. In this division is also booked, under a separate sub-head "Miscellaneous expenditure" all expenditure upon the preliminary surveys of new projects and also the cost of famine surveys required for the preparation of the famine programme. (The works in this division are financed from ordinary revenues of the year as well as from sources other than ordinary revenues. These works which have a protective aspect as well as surveys for the preparation of famine programme may be financed from the Famine Relief Fund).
- 88. The revenues earned by this class of works are shown under the revenue head "XVIII-Irrigation, Navigation, Embankment and Drainage Works (Non-Commercial)" i.e. for which no Capital Accounts are kept and the refunds of revenue are deducted from the gross receipts in order to show the net revenue for the works.



Definitions.—1. "Capital Works—Commercial Works" are works for which capital and revenue accounts are kept on a quasi-commercial basis. The capital expenditure is accounted for under the head "68" Revenue realised from them is credited to the head "XVII".

- 2. "Capital Works—Non-Commercial Works" are works for which individually neither Capital nor revenue account are kept because of their restricted size.

 The expenditure on these is accounted for under the head "68-A". Revenue realised from them is credited to the head "XVIII". The works under this category are those involving an expenditure exceeding Rs. 20,000 each.
- 3. "Non-Capital Works—Non-Commercial Works" are works for which individually neither capital nor revenue accounts are kept because they produce little or no revenue owing to their restricted size. The expenditure on these is accounted for under the head "18" Revenue realised from them is credited to the head "XVIII". The estimated cost of each individual work under this category is Rs. 20,000 or less.

NOTE SHOWING THE MAIN IRRIGATION WORKS COMPLETED.

- 89. Cultivation in this State depends chiefly upon rainfall, and advantage is taken of irrigation mainly for growing valuable crops (e.g., sugarcane) or to counteract the effects of drought. The larger irrigation schemes necessarily involve the construction of storage reservoirs on rivers for feeding the canals supplying water to the irrigated areas. The principal irrigation works are mentioned bleow.
- 90. Lower Panjhra River Works, Kadwa River Works and Krishna Canals.—The oldest of the Government irrigation works in the Deccan are the P. njhra River Works in Khandesh. They date from 1851–52 and were constructed at a cost of about 5 lakhs of rupees. Next to these among many small works are the Kadwa River Works in the Nasik District and the Krishna C. nal in Satara District which came into operation in 1869. They were constructed at a cost of about Rs. 10½ lakhs and Rs. 9½ lakhs respectively.
- 91. Mutha Canals.—The Mutha Canals system consist of a large storage reservoir called Lake Fife, on the Mutha River at Khadakwasla near Poona, and two canals, the Mutha Right and Left Bank Canal. It came into operation in 1874-75 and has cost about 70 lakhs of rupees.
- 92. Ekruk Tank and the Hathmati Canal.—The Ekruk Tank in the Sholapur District and the Hathmati Canal (which was the first and is still the most important work in Gujarat) came into operation in 1872–73 and 1873–74 and about 13½ and 13½ lakks of rupees respectively, have been spent on them.
- 93. Nira Right and Left Bank Canals.—The Nira Right and Left Bank Canals in the Poons and Sholapur Districts receive their supply partly from the Nira River and partly from the reservoir at Bhatgar (called Lake Whiting) and one of the tributaries of that river. The Left Bank Canal was opened in 1885 and has cost about 147 lakhs of rupees including Shetphal Tank. The right Bank Canal was opened in 1924 and has cost about 412 lakhs of rupees.
- 94. Gokak Canals.—The Gokak Canal in the Belgaum District is a small canal taking, direct from above a weir on the Ghataprabha River without a storage work. It was opened in 1884 and over Rs. 15½ lakhs have been spent on it.
- 95. Girna Canal.—The Girna Canal in the Nasik District is fed from the Chankapur Tank. It was constructed at a cost of Rs. 20% lakhs and was opened for irrigation in 1909.
- 96. Godavari Canal.—The Godavari Canals system includes a storage reservoir (Lake Beale) on the Darna River and pick-up-weir at Nandur-Madhmeshwar on the Godavari from which take off the Right and Left Bank Canals. This project has cost about 106 lakhs of rupees and was brought into operation in 1912. The canals irrigate lands in Nasik and Ahmednagar Districts.
- 97. Provara River Works.—The Pravara River Work system comprises (i) a storage reservoir, called Lake Arthur Hill, in the Ahmednagar District on the Pravara River at Bhandardara, (ii) a pick-up-weir at Ojhar and (iii) two canals named the Pravara Right and Left Bank Canals. The project was sanctioned by the Government of India in 1907. Work was commenced in 1908 and both the dam and the canals have been completed. The capital cost of the whole scheme, including the dam, amounts to over Rs. 151 lakhs. The masonry dam or the storage reservoir is 274 feet high about the river bed at its highest point and about 1,600 feet in length. It is one of the highest dams in the world.
- 98. Meshoo Canal Project.—The Meshwa Canal Project in the Kaira District estimated to cost about Rs. 53 lakhs, is the first one to be put into operation under the Development Programme of Major Irrigation Works in the State of Bombay. The project envisages utilisation of the waters of the Meshwa River irrigation in the Kharit season to the extent of about 18,000 acres of land in the Kaira District. The project has been practically completed and irrigation started in June 1950.
- 99. Kakrapara Weir and Canals Project.—The project consists of a diversion weir at Kakrapara about 50 miles upstream of Surat together with a system of canals commanding a gross area of 800,000 acres. The revised estimated cost of the project amounts to about Rs. 18-68 crores. The scheme is expected to irrigate 562,000 acres in Surat District. The Chaltan Branch has largedy been completed and opened for irrigation since June 1953. The R ght Bark Canal has been opened for irrigation very recently. The Surat Branch is also nearly completed. It has been possible to provide irrigation facilities to an area of 1,18,000 acres from the completed canals, during the period ending June 1958.
- 100. Ranand Tank.—The project is estimated to cost Rs. 30·18 lakhs and irrigate 3,550 acres in Satara District. The earthen dam has been completed and an area of 1,118 acres has already been irrigated during 1957-58.
- 101. In addition to the above schemes, there are many other small canals and tanks which collectively irrigate large areas of lands.
- 102. Bendsura Project.—The project is estimated to cost Rs. 58-82 lakhs and irrigate 9,200 acres in Bhir District in Marathwada area. The project has been practically completed and irrigation started.
- 103. Khasapur Project.—The project is estimated to cost Rs. 51.26 lakhs and irrigate 13,500 acres of land in Osmanabad District in Marathwada area. The irrigation has started from this project.

- 104. Brahmani Irrigation Scheme.—The scheme is estimated to cost Rs. 90:86 lakhs in Zalawad District in Saurashtra area. The Scheme has been completed and irrigation started. An area of 27,000 acres of land will be benefited by this scheme.
- 105. Moj Irrigation Scheme.—The scheme envisages the construction of a dam on river Moj in Madhya Saurashtra District in Saurashtra area. The Scheme is estimated to cost of Rs. 96.45 lakhs and has been completed and irrigation started. An area of 15,000 acres of additional land will be brought under irrigation by this scheme on full development.
- 106. Sanandro.—The scheme envisages the construction of Masonry Dam to act as weir in the river portion. The scheme is estimated to cost Rs. 11.63 lakhs and will bring an area of 2,423 acres of land under irrigation in Kutch District. The scheme has been completed and water is being given for irrigation.
- 107. Kaila.—The scheme is estimated to cost Rs. 14 24 lakhs and will irrigate 4,753 acres of land in Kutch District. The scheme has been completed and irrigation has been started since 1955-56.
- 108. Gangapur Stage I.—The scheme is estimated to cost Rs. 3,27 lakhs and will irrigate 45,000 acres in Nasik District and Ahmednagar District on completion. Recently in 1957-58 a portion of Left Bank. Canal has been opened for irrigation, and an area of 22,700 acres has already been irrigated during 1957-58.
- 109. Mahi Stage 1.—Mahi R. B. Canal Project is the first stage of Mahi Valley Development Scheme. The scope of the original project was substantially revised by raising the discharge capacity of the canal from 2,000 to 7,000 acres and the acreage to be irrigated from 1½ lakhs to 5.7 lakhs acres. The Project is at present under revision and the revised estimate is likely to amount to about Rs. 23 crores. Head regulator work including fixing of gates has been completed. Work on Main Canal is practically completed. That on branches is in progress. Distribution channels in the upper reaches have been completed in an area of 21,000 acres.

110. The revenue derived from Irrigation Works (Commercial) is classified under the following two heads:-

(a) Direct Receipts; and

(b) Indirect receipts, which includes that portion of the land revenue which is credited to irrigation, and receipts from Betterment Levy and Irrigation Cess. The former head includes the sale proceeds of water supplied for irrigation and non-irrigation purposes, the sale proceeds from canal plantat ons, and other canal produce (e.g. wood, grass, etc.), while the latter represents the irrigation share of land revenue, and receipts from betterment levy and Irrigation Cess.

111. The working expenses of the Works (Commercial) are deducted from the total receipts under the two heads ment oned above, in order to show the "net revenue" earned.

A. Irrigation (Productive).

(i) Direct Receipts.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to grant of concessional water rates, and smaller receipts anticipated from water supply of towns, partly counterbalanced by larger receipts from sale of water. The increase in the next year's budget, as compared with the current year's revised estimate, is mainly due to larger receipts anticipated from water rates and water supply of towns.

(ii) Indirect Receipts.—The decrease in the current year's revised and next year's budget estimates, is mainly due to non-realisation of receipts from Betterment Levy, counterbalanced by larger receipts

from Irrigation Cess.

(iii) Defuct—Working Expenses.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to larger expenditure under "Maintenance and Repairs" on closing breaches of some canals and strengthening banks. The increase in the next year's budget, as compared with the current year's revised estimate, is due to larger provision under "Maintenance and Repairs" which is considered as quite essential to keep the tanks, bandharas, canals and drainage, channels in satisfactory condition, and appointment of additional staff.

A. Irrigation (Unproductive).

(i) Dire t Receipts.—The increase in the current year's revised and next year's budget estimates is mainly due to larger receipts anticipated from Water Rates.

(ii) Indirect Receipts.—The decrease in the current year's revised and next year's budget estimates, is mainly due to non-realisation of receipts from Betterment levy and smaller receipts anticipated from Irrigation Cess.

(iii) Deluct—Working Expenses.—The increase in the current year's revised estimates is due to larger expenditure on m intenance and repairs. The increase in the next year's budget estimates, is mainly due to larger expenditure on maintenance and repairs, and appointment of additional staff.

All ordinary establishment and tools and plant charges of the Public Works Department are also included under "59, Civil Works". The gross demand to be put to the vote of the Legislature under "XVII-Irrigation, etc.—Deduct—Working Expenses" for the next year amounts to Rs. 87,49,400 (Productive Rs. 16,46,700 and Unproductive Rs. 71,02,700).

113. This is merely a pro forma head to indicate the interest on cummulative capital outlay on Irrigation expenditure incurred under "68—Construction". The expenditure under this head is deducted from the expenditure under "22—Interest" under which provision is made for interest charges on the consolidated debt including irrigation debt. For computing the interest on capital outlay on irrigation works, the capital outlay is looked on as irreducible unlike debt which is usually redeemable after a fixed term of years. Capital outlay can only increase and never diminish, whereas debt may be completely repaid.

- 115. A-Irrigation and B-Navigation etc. Works.-Works.-The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to taking over some small works on account of scarcity conditions. The next year's estimate is required for completion of works in progress and for new works.
- 116. Extensions and Improvements.—The reasons given against the minor head "Works", are also applicable against this minor head.

124. Interest received by the State Government on advances and loans made through the States Loans, and Advances Accounts (to agriculturists, local bodies, Presidency Corporations, etc.) is credited to 'XX-Interest'.

(1) Interest on Loans and Advances by the State Government.—The 1958-59 revised estimate and 1959-60 budget estimate are based on the progress of the actuals and the estimates of Departmental Officers. The increase in the current year's revised is mainly on account of more interest receipts on loans granted to the Bombay Housing Board (including arrears of interest), the Bombay Electricity Board and Displaced Persons. The decrease in the next year's estimate is mainly due to provision of lesser interest receipts from Displaced persons partly counter balanced by larger interest receipts from the Bombay State Electricity Board.

(?) Interest on arrears of revenue.—The estimates have been framed on the basis of progress of actuals.

(3) Interest realised on Investment of State Balances.—The increases in the current years' revised and the next year's budget are mainly due to receipt of central assistance by way of monthly ways and means advances against plan expenditure.

(4) Miscellaneous.—The estimates have been framed on the basis of progress of actuals.

 (e) Deduct—Share of interest on Permanent loans of Bombay Government transferred to the
- Mysore Government.
- (f) Deduct-Share of management charges of Bombay Government loans transferred to Mysore Government.
 - (g) Deduct-Interest on Capital under Road Transport Scheme.
- 126. (1) Interest on Permanent Loans.—The increase in the 1958-59 revised estimate and next year's budget is mainly due to the provision of interest of 4½ per cent. Bombay State Development Loans, 1970-1971 partially counter-balanced by the absence of provision for interest on the Bombay State Development Loan, 1958 which has been redeemed during the current year. The 1958-59 revised estimate includes provision for payment of arrears of interest to the Madhya Pradesh Government.
- (2) Discount on Loans.—The revised estimate of 1,09 is on account of discount paid on the 41 per cent. Bombay State Development Loan, 1971.
- (3) Floating Loans-Interest on Other Floating Loans.—The current year's revised and next year's budget include, in addition to interest on loan taken for the Shri Shahu Chhatrapati Mills, interest on loans taken from the State Bank of India for the Narsinggirjee and Saksaria Mills which have been taken over by Government as Employment Relief Schemes.

(4) Other Items .-

- (ii) Expenditure connected with the issue of New Loans.—The provision in 1958-59 revised estimate is in respect of expenditure incurred in connection with the issue of 4½ per cent. Bombay State Development Loan, 1969 which has been claimed by the Reserve Bank of India in the current year and also includes expenditure connected with the issue of Ex-M. P. Loans to be passed on to that Government.
- (v) Interest on bonds issued in lieu of Compensation under the Land Tenure Abolition Acts.—This head is debited with the interest payable on Bonds issued to Landholders whose tenure rights on the land are abolished under acts of the Legislature. The bonds are issued to tenure holders in lieu of cash compensation, and are redeemable over twenty years by equated instalments.
- (5) Interest on Loans taken from the Central Government.—The increase in the revised estimate, 1958-59 is mainly due to larger interest payments on loans taken from the Central Government for rehabilitation of Displaced Persons, partly counter-balanced by lesser interest payments on certain loans consequent on the Government of India reducing the rate of interest on these loans as recommended by the Finance Commission.
- (6) Interest on Other Loans.—This head is debited with interest payments on loans taken from bodies other than the Government of India, such as the Reserve Bank of India, the National Co-operative Development and Warehousing Board etc. The current year's revised and next year's budget provide for interest payments on loans taken from the latter body.

B—Interest on Unfunded Debt.

(iv) Provident Funds.—(a) Interest on General Provident Funds.—The increases in the current year's revised and next year's budget are due to larger accumulations in the provident funds of Government

C-Interest on Other Obligations.

(i) Miscellaneous.—The increase in the current year's revised is due to interest on food debits which was paid to the Government of India in past years and which was outstanding in the Personal Ledger Account of the Director of Civil Supplies (Accounts). It is proposed to clear the Personal Ledger Account by passing on the debit to this head in the current year.

Deduct-Interest Transferred to Commercial Departments, etc.—The major transfer of interest from this head is to "17-Interest". For explanation of the current year's revised and the next year's budget please see para 118 under "17-Interest".

- 129. Sinking Funds.—Under this minor head are recorded the amounts appropriated from revenue for maintaining a sinking fund for each loan floated by the State Government. The contribution to the sinking fund of each loan is such that together with the amount put in the depreciation fund it should suffice to liquidate the loan when it matures. Contributions are made annually with this end in view. Sinking Funds are also created for loans taken from the Central Government which are repayble after a fixed number of years—such as (i) Loan sanctioned from the National Plan Loan, (ii) Loans sanctioned from Small Savings Collections, and (iii) Public debt of the former Hyderabad Government treated as loans from the Central Government to this Government under section 82 of the State Reorganisation Act. The increase in the next years' estimate is due to sinking fund provisions for (i) 4½ per cent. Bombay State Development Loans, 1970 and 1971 and (ii) Small Savings Loans to be received in the current year.
- 130. Depreciation Charges.—Provision equal to 1½ per cent. of the total loan floated is made annually for purchase and cancellation of securities of the same loan. The increase in the next years' budget is on account of such provisions for loans raised in the current year.
- 131. B-Other Appropriations.—Under this minor head are recorded the amount appropriated from Revenue for reduction or avoidance of debt other than specific appropriations for regularly constituted Sinking Funds. Thus this head provides for repayment of loans taken from the Government of India, repayment of the principal portion of the equated instalment of 3 per cent. Land Tenure Compensation Bonds, etc. It has been decided not to meet from revenue repayments relating to the loans received after 1st April 1956 or loans received by the former Governments of Saurashtra, Hyderabad and Madhya Pradesh. Hence this head does not reflect such payments. The increase in the current year's revised is mainly due to larger repayment of loans taken for rehabilitation of displaced persons.
- 132. Transfer—Deduct.—The consolidated debt includes three long-dated loans of Bombay Municipal Corporation and loans utilised to finance the State Loans and Advances Accounts. The reasons for showing repayments in respect of these loans as deduct entries under the head "23" are explained below:—
 - (i) The repayment made by the Bombay Municipal Corporation in respect of its long-dated loans is credited in the first instance to the head "Loans and Advances by State Government" (receipt side) in the debt section, but in order to utilise it towards the repayment of the consolidated debt which is provided in gross under the minor head "B-Other Appropriations" a corresponding credit is given to this head by a deduct entry.
 - (ii) The consolidated debt includes the loans taken to finance the State Loans and Advances Accounts. With effect from 1940-41 it has been decided to utilise towards repayment thereof recoveries arising from the operations of the State Loans and Advances Account due on 1st April 1937 over a period of 45 years with interest at 4½ per cent.

- 134. Staff and Household of the Governor.—The decrease in the current year's Revised Estimate is due to economy in expenditure. The increase in the next year's estimate is due to inclusion of provision for purchase of two motor cars.
- 135. Government Hospitality Organisation—Hospitality charges of the Governor.—The increase in current year's Revised Estimate is due to entertainment of important personages. The next year's provision is ir accordance with the grants sanctioned in the States Re-organisation (Governor's Allowances and Privileges) Order, 1957.
- 136. Expenditure from the contract Allowance.—The increase in the current year's Revised Estimate is due to all round increase in expenditure and due to grant crilocal allowance to house-held establishment, next year's estimate provides for normal expenditure.
- 137. Ministers.—The increase in the revised estimate is due to re-fixation of pay and drawal of arrears of pay of the staff of Ministers and Deputy Ministers and enhancement of the rates of d. a. of Class IV Servants and more touring. Next year's budget estimate provides for normal requirements.
- 138. B-Parliament and State Legislature.—The revised estimate is based on the progress of actuals. Next year's estimate is based on actual requirement for staff and allowances payable to M.L.As. and M.L.Cs.
- 139. C-Elections.—Increase in the current year's Revised Estimate and next year's Budget Estimate is due to intensive revision of electoral rolls.
- 140. Civil Secretariat.—Increase in the revised as also next year's estimate is due to all round expansion of the staff on account of increased activities of the Departments.
- 141. Public Service Commission.—The increase in the Revised Estimate is due to creation of additional posts and higher expenditure on advertisement charges. Next year's estimate is based on actual requirement.
- 142. Local Fund Audit Establishment.—The Local Audit Department has been taken over by this State Government from the Accountant General, Bombay, with effect from the 1st May 1958 and the provision which was made under "Accounts Offices" is transferred to this head under advice of the Accountant General.
- 143. Accounts Offices.—The decrease in the next year's budget estimate is due to transfer of provision to the head "Local Fund Audit Establishment."
- 144. Commissioners.—The revised estimate is based on progress of actuals. The increase in the next year's budget estimate is due to creation of additional temporary posts to cope with increased work.
- 145. District Administration.—The current year's revised estimate is based on the progress of actuals. The next year's estimates basides normal expenditure include provision for payment of emoluments to Patels in Vidarbha and remuneration to Stipendiary inferior village servants in the districts in which their watans will be abolished.
- 146. Expenditure from Rural Reconstruction grants.—Increase in the next year's budget is mainly due to transfer of provision on account of relief for seasonal unemployment among agricultural labour, from the head "81-Civil Works" in addition to normal provision.

In accordance with the existing procedure gross expenditure is to be put to the vote of the Legislature. Accordingly a sum of Rs. 9,79,82,300, "Voted" is included in the schedule of demands and a sum of Rs. 14,52,200 "Charged" will be included in the Appropriation Bill.

- 147. (1) Sale proceeds of unclaimed and escheated property.—The increase in the current year's revised estimates as well as the next year's budget is based on the current and past actuals.
 - (2) Court fees realised in cash.—The increase in the budget for 1959-60 is based on past actuals.
- (3) Miscellaneous fees and fines.—The increase in the next year's budget is based on the past actuals.
- (4) Miscellaneous.—The decrease in the next year's budget is due to reduced receipts anticipated during the next year.
- (5) Deduct Refunds.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate as well as the next year's budget estimate is based on the latest actuals.

Expenditure.

- 148. (A) High Court.—The decrease in the current year's Revised estimate is due to discontinuance of temporary staff and non-appointment of leave substitutes. The next year's Budget Estimate is based on actual requirements.
- 149. (B) Law Officers.—The increase in the current year's Revised estimate is due to creation of additional temporary posts and also due to the payment of fees to Law Officers instead of retainers, and more expenditure on fees to D. G. Ps. in Civil and Criminal cases. The increase in the next year's B. E. is on account of more expenditure anticipated on fees and law charges in Civil and Criminal cases, and also due to creation of additional posts and the office of Director of Public Prosecutions, and due to provision for Legal Assistance Scheme.
- 150. (G) Presidency Magistrate's Court.—The decrease in the revised estimate in the current year is due to less expenditure anticipated on account of diet and Road money to witnesses. The next year's budget is based on actual requirements.
- 151. (H) Civil and Sessions Courts.—The increase in the current year's Revised estimate is due to grant of refused leave to the C. O. C. District Court, Poona, expenditure for Travelling Allowance bills on account of transfers of officers and establishment and the Travelling Allowance claim of deputation Courts' purchase of furniture for the Gandhidham Link Court and purchase of Law books and stamps for D. J., Kutch, creation of additional posts of Joint Civil Judges in Mehsana District and creation of the Courts of Junior C. I. S. D. Surat, and Joint C. J. (J. D.), Navsari and Joint C. J., Bulsar and creation of two Civil-cum-Magisterial Courts, at Sindkheda and Sakri. The increase in the budget of 1959-60 is due to additional Civil Courts, creation of additional Judicial Districts, and sanctioning additional staff of some of the Courts, on account of uniform Judicial set up to be introduced, and additional provision on Processes Serving Establishment and administration of B. A. D. R. Act.
- 152. I. Courts of Small Causes.—Increase in the current year's Revised Estimate as well as that of the next year's budget is due to the creation of additional staff and the post of additional Judge at Poona and Additional staff at Ahmedabad. The next year's budget is based on actual requirements.
- 153. J. Criminal Courts.—The decrease in the current year's R. E. is due to the discontinuance of the post of Judicial Magistrate, First Class, Dholka and vacant posts and due to the Judicial Magistrates provision shown under H-3—Civil Judges.
- 154. In accordance with the revised procedure adopted from 1953-54 only gross expenditure is to be put to vote of the Legislature. The gross total under the Head "27, Administration of Justice" thus amounts to 2,39,96,000 after excluding the recoveries of 19,500, the details of which are as follows:—

- 153. Contribution for Railway Police.—The increase in the next year's budget estimate is mainly on account of addition of 'Order' Police from the Saurashtra Railway Region.
- 159. Police supplied to Public Departments, Private Companies and persons.—The decrease in the next year's estimate is due to withdrawal of guards at some places.
- 160. Receipts and recoveries on account of Presidency Police.—The increase in the revised estimate and next year's budget estimate is mainly due to more receipts anticipated under Cattle Pounds owing to extension of Greater Bombay limit.
 - 161. Fees, Fines and Forfeitures.—The next year's receipts are based on the progress of past actuals.
- 162. Recoveries of over payments.—The revised estimate is based on the progress of current actuals and the next year's estimate is based on past actuals.
- 163. Collection of payments for services rendered.—The current year's budget estimate includes recovery of cost of the Police Officers and men employed on behalf of the Central Government. It has since been decided to treat this as reduction of expenditure and therefore the same is taken into account under '29-Police' which explains for the decrease in the revised estimate figure. The increase in the next year's estimate is on account of arrears due from the Government of India for the passport work done by this Government.

Expenditive.

- 164. Presidency Police.—The increase in the revised estimate is due to additional staff sanctioned and larger expenditure on conservancy charges, telephones, lighting charges, rent, rates and taxes, water supply, clothing charges, purchase of vehicles and payment of refreshment allowances to policemen during municipal and dock workers strikes. The increase in the next year's budget estimate is mainly on account of additional staff, purchase of motor vehicles and general increase under items of contingencies.
- 165. Superintendence.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate and the next year's budget is due to additional establishment and excess expenditure under contingencies.
- 166. District Executive Force.—The increase in the revised estimate is mainly due to posting of Policemen for bandobast duty, fixation of the pay of the staff transferred from other areas at enhanced rates of pay and allowances, increase in rates of a nveyance allowance, purchase of motor cars and payment of last year's bills for clothing. The next year's estimate provides for normal expenditure plus the expenditure of 1676 for new items of expenditure.
- 167. Railway Police.—The decrease in the revised estimate is mainly on account of vacant posts remaining unfilled. The increase in the next year's budget estimate is mainly on account of extra establishment sanctioned during the current year and next year.
- 163. Criminal Investigation Department.—The increase in the revised estimate is mainly on account of additionl establishment, enhanced rates of travelling alk wance and purchase of equipment. The increase in the next year's estimate is mainly on account of extra establishment to be sanctioned.
- 169. Home Guards.—The revised estimate is based on the progress of current and past actuals and the departmental report.
 - 170. The net budget estimate of 13,28 50 is made up as under :-

Accordingly a sum of Rs. 13,76,21,000 is included in the "Schedule of Demands."

- 171. Ports Establishment.—The receipts and the cost of establishment in connection with the survey of inland vessels are treated as pertaining to State while those for ocean-going vessels are treated as pertaining to the Union. Accordingly, expenditure in connection with Ship Survey Department, Bombay is treated as partly Union and partly State, the proportion being 93 per cent. Union and 7 per cent. State. The estimates accordingly represent 7 per cent. of the cost of the Ship Survey Department of the Indian Union.
- 172. Sale proceeds of Vessels and Stores.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to sale by auction of unserviceable stores. For next year the provision is for normal receipts.
- 173. Freight, Passage and Tonnage.—The increase in the revised estimate is due to recovery of more foodgrain and Cargo wharfage. The next year's budget estimate is based on past and current actuals.
- 174. Registration and other fees and Miscellaneous.—The increase in the revised estimate is due to recovery of receipts on account of more traffic. Next year's estimate includes more subvention from Government of India.
- 175. Deduct Refunds.—The excess in the revised estimate is due to payment of refunds. Decrease in next year's estimate is due to opening of "Personal Deposit Ledger Account" system.

Expenditure.

- 176. Pay and Allowances of Officers and Men afloat.—The revised estimate is based on the progress of current actuals. Next year's estimate represents actual requirement.
- 177. Marine Survey Division.—The increase in the revised estimate is mainly due to sanctioning additional staff. Increase in next year's estimate is due to transfer of provisions relating to Marine Division, Bandra to Ports Establishment.
- 178. Purchase of Marine Stores and Coal for Building repairs and outfit of ships and vessels.—The revised estimate as well as next year's budget estimate are based on progress of actuals.
- 179. Ports Establishment.—Increase in next year's budget estimate is due mainly to transfer of provision from Marine Survey Division.
- 180. Miscellaneous Shore Establishment and Miscellaneous.—Next year's budget estimate shows an increase which is mainly due to creation of new posts.
- 181. Miscellaneous.—The increase in revised estimate and next year's budget estimate is due to increase in foodgrain traffic and increase in the rate of dearness allowance.
- 182. Works.—The next year's budget estimate represents estimated expenditure on works in progress and certain new works. The increase is also due to inclusion of provision from "Suspense—Purchase of Stores" under "Works".
- 183. Provision for Depreciation for transfer to the Port Depreciation Reserve Fund.—The increase in the revised estimate is due to adjustments of past years. Next year's budget estimate is for normal provision.
- 184. Suspense.—The item is of a fluctuating nature and the current year's revised estimate is based on the departmental estimates. Provision for next year is included under "Works."
- 185. Deduct—Recoveries.—The recoveries represent amounts of works and other expenditure to be adjusted in reduction of expenditure and to be met from the Depreciation Reserve Fund.

^{185.} Consequent on the constitutional changes and the abolition of the Residencies, the Government of India transferred the Administration of the Dangs Area which was formerly being administered by the Crown Representative, to this Government with effect from the 15th August 1947. The Dangs Area has therefore been merged in the State by an order called the Bombay (Enlargement of Area and Alteration of Boundaries) Order, 1947, with effect from the 19th January 1948. As Government desires to keep separate accounts of the receipts and payments of the Dangs on the amelioration of the people of the Dangs it has become necessary to prescribe a separate procedure for the accounting of the transactions relating to the Dangs.

187. The increase in the current year's revised estimate and the next year's budget estimate under "Other Items" is chiefly on account of more interest accruirg on Government securities.

- 195. A—University.—The decrease in the current year's revised and the next year's budget is due to increased grant of free studentships and half free studentships and less receipts on account of post-graduate courses. The estimates are based on past actuals.
 - 196. B—Secondary.—The estimates are based on progress of actuals.
- 197. C—Primary.—The estimates are on account of fees realised in primary schools attached to primary training colleges and primary schools run by Government. The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to increased receipts expected from schools from the other component parts of the State.
 - 198. D-Special.—The estimates are based on progress of actuals.

- 199. *E—General.*—The increase in the current year's revised and the next year's budget is due to larger recoveries expected from School Boards and also on account of subsidy from Government of India on account of various plan schemes.
- 200. Deduct-Refunds.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to more refunds likely to be sanctioned by the Director of Education. The next year's estimates are based on progress of actuals.

Expenditure.

- 201. A—University.—The increase in the current year's revised and the next year's budget is due to (i) additional matching grants to Universities on account of their development schemes, (ii) payment of arrear of grants to Colleges for three-year degree courses in respect of Marathawada Colleges, (iii) expansion of facilities for Education in Arts, Science, Commerce and Engineering Colleges, and (in) Grants to Delhi University for providing facility for teaching of Marathi and Gujarati.
- 202. B—Secondary.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is mainly on account of payment of grants to non-Government Secondary Schools.
- 203. C—Primary.—The increase in the current year's revised as well as the next year's budget is due to expansion of compulsory primary education, conversion of voluntary schools into single teacher schools and providing extra-staff to existing schools. The increase in the next year's estimates is also due to opening of additional Ashram Schools for Scheduled Tribes; the Government of India Scheme to relieve educated unemployment and expansion of primary education and revision of pay-scales of primary teachers.
- 204. D—Special.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is due to various technical posts remaining vacant. The increase in the next year's budget is due to proposed starting of three additional polytechnics in the State and expansion of existing polytechnics and expansion of School of Printing Technology.
- 205. R—General.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to continuance of educational concessions in Vidarbha. The decrease in the next year's estimate is due to various educational schemes of Backward Class Welfare having been transferred to the Labour and Social Welfare Department and hence provisions for these schemes have been included under "47-Miscellaneous Departments".
- 206. F—Charges in England.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to more purchase of foreign stores payment for which is likely to be made in the current year. The increase in the next year's budget is due to more officers likely to enjoy leave abroad.
- 207. The net budget estimate of Rs. 25,05,21,000 (voted) under this budget head is made up as under:—

Revenue.

- 208. Medical School and College Fees.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is based on actuals. The increase in the next year's budget is mainly due to anticipated increased receipts under (i) C. E. M. Dental College, Bombay, (ii) B. J. Medical College, Poona, and (iii) B. J. Medical College, Ahmedabad.
- 209. Hospital Receipts.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is based on actuals. The increase in the next year's budget is mainly due to increased receipts under the item 'Paying patients'.
- 210. Bacteriological Laboratories Receipts.—The increase in the revised estimate of the current year which is based on actuals is due to the increased demand for Vaccine and Sera and other products manufactured at the Bacteriological Laboratories specially at the Haffkine Institute. The increase in the next year's budget is also due to the above reason.
- 211. Contributions.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is based on actuals. The next year's budget which shows decrease is based on past actuals.
- 212. Subventions from the Central Government for Development Schemes.—The increase in the next year's budget is due to inclusion of more centrally sponsored schemes.
- 213. Miscellaneous.—The increase in the current year's budget is based on actuals. The nerease in the next year's provision is based on the latest actuals.
- 214. Receipts from Employees' State Insurance Corporation.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is due to the fact that there is less amount spent on the implementation of the scheme. The receipt from the Corporation is proportionate to our expenditure and hence the decrease. The next year's increase is based on the expenditure provision made for implementation of the scheme.

Expenditure,

- 215. A.—Medical Establishment.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to change in personnel and also due to vacant posts. The increase in the next year's provision is mainly on account of additional staff for: (1) Planning section in the Surgeon Generals' Office and the Office of the Director of Ayurved, (ii) Internal Audit and Accounts maintained by Government Medical Institutions, and (iii) Drugs Laboratory, Baroda.
- 216. B—Hospitals and Dispensaries.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to grant-in-aid to additional charitable institutions. The increase in the next year's budget estimate is due to (i) appointment of Leprosy Assistants (Technicians) in Hospitals and Dispensaries for the establishment of Survey, Education and Treatment Units, (ii) Provisions for Ambulance Cars with establishment for District Hospitals at Bhir, Osmanakad and Parbhani, (iii) establishment of 150 bedded T. B. Hospital at Jamnagar, (iv) establishment of six leprosy Centres, and (v) establishment of V. D. Training Centre at J. J. group of Hospitals at Bombay.
- 217. C—Grants for Medical Purposes.—The increase in the next year's hudget is mainly due to the provision for (i) grant-in-aid to voluntary agencies doing anti-leprosy work, (ii) grant-in-aid to the Board of Research in Ayurved, and (iii) grant-in-aid to Shuddha Ayurvedic Vidhyalayas and Hospitals.
- 218. D—Medical Colleges and Schools.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate which is based on actuals is mainly due to vacant posts. The increase in the next year's budget is mainly on account of provision for (i) training of Medical Laboratory Technicians, and (ii) establishment of full time teaching units at Government Medical Colleges by revising the Rules of the Pay and Allowances of the teaching staff.
- 219. E—Mental Hospitals.—The increase in the current year's revised budget is due to unavoidable expenditure under Contingencies. This is based on actuals. The increase in the next year's hudget is due to (i) the additional staff and equipment for Mental Hospital, Nagpur, and (ii) additional staff for the new 50 bedded Mental Hospital at Jamnagar.
- 220. H—Chemical Examiner.—Current year's provision is made under the major head "29-Police" on the assumption that the control on the Chemical Examiner section on the whole was to be transferred to the Home Department. However, in view of the fact that Dy. Chemical Analyser's Office at Junagadh is still under the control of the Local Self-Government and Public Health Department, necessary provision has been made in the next year's budget.
- 221. I—Bacteriological Laboratories.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate which is based an actuals is due to heavy demand for Cholera Vaccine, Sera and the other Therapeutic drugs. The next year's rudget which is just near the current year's revised estimate is on account of the above reasons. The provision includes an amount of Rs. 8 lakhs for payment to the Haffkine Institute for its research and development schemes. This is based on 50 per cent. of its profits.

222. L—Employees' State Insurance Scheme.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is due to non-implementation of the extension of the scheme to the families of workers. The increase in the next year's budget is mainly on account of the provision made for treatment of insured workers suffering from T. B. and creation of additional posts of Medical Officers and other ancillary staff for the State Insurance Dispensaries at Nagpur, Akola and Hinganghat.

223. The gross demand for grant under "38-Medical" will be Rs. 8,39,73,500 excluding recoveries amounting to Rs. 64,500 details of which are as under:—

Revenue.

- 224. Sale Proceeds of Sera and Vaccine.—The next year's budget is based on actual receipt of sale of Lymph and of Sera and Vaccine.
 - 225. Contributions. Next year's estimate is normal.
- 226. Subventions from Government of India. The provision represents grant-in-aid from Government of India on account of certain development schemes.
 - 227. Recoveries of overpayment.—Revised and next year's estimate are normal.
- 223. Collection of payman's for services rendered.—The next year's budget is based on the actual requirments.
- 229. Miscellaneous. The decrease in the revised estimate is due to reduction of rates of water at certain places. The decrease in the next year's budget is mainly due to Central assistance for a number of Public Health schemes being provided for under the minor head 'Subventions from Government of India'.

Expenditure.

- 230. Public Halth Establishment.—The increase in the next year's budget is due to normal increments etc. and also due to taking over of Public Health Centres in C. D. Blocks.
 - 231. Grants for Public Health Purposes.—Next year's budget is for normal requirements.
- 232. Expenses in connection with Epidemic diseases.—The increase in the next year's budget is mainly due to the expansion of B. C. G. vaccination scheme and the Anti-Malaria scheme in the State.
- 233. Works.—From next year, expenditure equivalent to the Grants received from Government of India on schemes provided under "70, Capital Outlay" is booked in the revenue section by reducing provision in capital section. The increase in the next year's budget is mainly due to that.

Revenue.

- 234. Agricultural Receipts.—The decrease in the revised estimate is mainly due to smaller receipts on account of less area under cultivation in some agricultural schools and non-starting of some schemes. The decrease in the next year's budget estimate as compared to the revised e timate for 1958-59 is mainly due to non-transfer of profits on the Agricultural iron and steel supply scheme.
- 235. Subventions from the Government of India for Development Schemes.—The decrease in the next year's budget estimate is due to smaller subvention from the Government of India for development schemes.

Expenditure.

- 236. Direction.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate as compared to the current year's budget is mainly due to creation of some additional posts of officers and increase in expenditure on travelling allowance. The next year's budget provides for smaller expenditure on this account.
- 237. Superintendence.—The increase in the revised estimate as compared to the current year's budget is mainly due to creation of some additional posts of officers and larger expenditure on Touring.
- 238. Subordinate and Expert Staff.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate and the next year's budget as compared to the current year's budget, is due to vacant posts and transfer of some staff to N. E. S. Blocks.

- 239. Experimental Farms.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to larger expenditure anticipated under "Contingencies" mainly on account of land acquisition charges and increase in expenditure on labour charges. The increase in the next year's budget is mainly due to somenew schemes as follows:—
 - (i) Establishment of trial-cum-demonstration farm under Ghod weir project.
 - (ii) Establishment of a trial-cum-demonstration farm under Mahi canal project.
 - (iii) Trial-cum-demonstration farm under Dheku irrigation project.
 - (iv) Agricultural Research and demonstration farm under Purna project.
- 240. Agriculture demonstration and propaganda including Public Exhibitions and Fairs.—The increase in the revised estimate is mainly due to larger expenditure, on subsidised distribution of Fertilizers in Saurashtra area. The increase in the next year's budget estimate is due to larger expenditure anticipated on the Scheme for supply of Rahats and Persian wheels and pumping sets for increasing water supply for cultivation.
- 241. Agricultural Experiments and Research.—The decrease in the revised estimates as compared to the current year's budget is due to non-implementation of some schemes. The increase in the next year's estimate is mainly due to larger provision for intensive cultivation in paddy areas and the following new schemes:—
 - 1. Scheme for establishment of Horticultural Research Station at Poona.
 - 2. Scheme for Fertilizer and veriatial trials on cultivator's fields.
 - 3. Rajkot Milk Scheme.
 - 4. Agriculture Research Station at Chansma, Vijapur and Dehgam ir the Gujarat tube wells area.
- 242. Agricultural Education.—The increase in the revised estimate is due to payment of land acquisition charges at the Agricultural schools at Dohad, Puntamba and Kolad. The further increase in the next year's budget is due to the following new schemes:—
 - 1. Establishment of a Farm Dairy and Garden at Agricultural College at Akola.
 - 2. Scheme for starting the Fourth Year Class at the College of Agriculture, Parbhani.
 - 3. Development of the Agriculture College Dairy Farm at Nagpur.
 - 4. Starting of Post-graduate training at Nagpur Agriculture College.
 - 5. Equipment for the Agriculture School, Kolad.
- 243. Agricultural Engineering.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to larger expenditure on the State machine tractor stations in Vidarbha for purchase of spare parts and larger expenditure on soil conservation works. The increase in the next year's estimate is mainly due to larger expenditure anticipated on soil conservation works and the scheme for air compresser blasting.
- 244. Grant-in-aid, contribution, etc.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate as compared to the current year's budget is due to smaller expenditure on cotton schemes. The increase in the next year's budget is due to two new schemes viz. Virnar Cotton Scheme and the C. J. 73 (Sanjay) cotton scheme.
- 245. Deduct—Recoveries adjusted in the accounts in reduction of Expenditure.—The decrease in the revised estimate is due to smaller transfer of expenditure under the scheme for measures for intensification of Grow More Food Campaign and scheme for multiplication and distribution of improved strains and seeds and less recoveries under soil conservation works. The increase in the next year's budget in estimate as compared to the current year's budget and revised estimates is mainly due to larger transfer of expenditure under the soil conservation projects as a result of increased expenditure anticipated on soil conservation works.

The Gross demand for grant under "40, Agriculture" amounts to Rs. 8,08,55,100 after taking into account the expenditure of Rs. 1,15,82,000 to be met from the State Sugarcane Cess Fund and excluding the recoveries and transfer entries amounting to Rs. 2,80,91,200.

Revenue.

- 246. Other Receipts.—The decrease in the next year's budget is due to the fact that the receipts on account of grant from the Government of India which was being shown under the above item during the current year has been shown separately under the minor head "Subventions from the Central Government" during the next year.
- 247. Collection of payments for services rendered.—The decrease in the next year's budget is based on actuals during the current year. It is also in keeping with the actuals of 1957-58.
- 248. Animal Husbandry Section.—The decrease in the next year's budget is due to the closure of Cattle Breeding Farm at Jamnagar.
- 249. Subvention from the Government of India.—This represents grants from the Government of India in respect of the Centrally Sponsored Schemes and the State Plan Schemes. In the current year, amount on account of this was shown under "Other Receipts". It has been now decided to show this separately. The increased provision in the next year's budget is due to more grants on Development Schemes from the Central Government.

Expenditure.

- 250. B—Superintendence.—The decrease in the revised estimate is due to late appointment of incumbents to the posts of Regional Deputy Director and the District Animal Husbandry Officers and vacant posts due to late starting of their offices. The increase in the next year's budget is, however, due to provision for the full year for the schemes in the Second Five Year Plan started Curing this year.
- 251. C—Subordinate Establishment.—The decrease in the revised estimate is due to (i) vacant posts of Veterinary Officers, Stockman and Stock Supervisors, (ii) closure of the offices of the District Live Stock Officers in the revised set up. The decrease in the next year's budget estimate is mainly due to the reason as at (ii) above.
- 252. D—Hospitals and Dispensaries.—The decrease in the revised estimate is due to the facts that (i) a number of posts are vacant and (ii) the scheme for assuming control of veterinary dispensaries by Government has been postponed. The increase in the next year's budget estimate is due to (i) establishment of Outlying Veterinary Dispensaries, (ii) opening of Rural Veterinary Dispensaries in Marathwada Region, and (iii) opening of Veterinary Dispensaries in Bombay Region.
- 253. E—Veterinary Education and Research.—The decrease in the revised estimate is due to (i) vacant posts of officers at the Veterinary College, (ii) appointment of substitutes drawing salary at lower rates, (iii) non-purchase of certain equipment and apparatus for the Serum and Vaccine Institute, (iv) less number of students coming forward to avail of the concessions available under the Education in Animal Husbandry and Veterinary Service Scheme, and (v) a number of posts which remained vacant for a long period. The decrease in the next year's budget is due to less provision for Bombay Veterinary College which is based on actual requirement. It is also due to abolition of some posts. The decrease is partly wiped out on account of institution of Post Graduate Course at Bombay Veterinary College.
- 254. F—Other Charges.—The increase in the revised estimate is mainly due to (i) appointment of a substitute in the place of the Assistant Superintendent, who has proceeded abroad for training, (ii) purchase of special equipment for the study of cattle sterility, (iii) establishment of a Sheed Breeding Farm at Morvi, (iv) purchase of additional equipment for the training course in connection with the scheme for Research in development of meat and mohir goat, (v) additional amount required for payment of grant-in-aid to the Institute of Agriculture, Anand. The increase in the next year's budget estimate is mainly due to extension of sheep and wool centres in the Old Bombay State area.
- 255. H—Breeding Farms.—The considerable increase in the next year's budget estimate is mainly due to (i) establishment of Key Village and Artificial Insemination Centres in the State, (ii) establishment of Poultry Demonstration Centres, (iii) acquisition of land, purchase of live stock and dead stock for Khillar Cattle Breeding Farm and various other schemes included in the Second Five Year Plan.
- 256. Deduct—Recoveries.—The decrease in the next year's budget which represents recoveries from Indian Council of Agricultural Research is due to the fact that the schemes subsidised by the Council during the next year are less.
- 257. The gross demand for grant under "41—Animal Husbandry" will be Rs. 1,51,60,500 excluding the recoveries amounting to Rs. 1,44,500 details of which are as under:—

- 258. Audit Fees.—The increase in the budget estimate for the next year is on account of larger receipts from audit fees.
- 259. Miscellaneous—Receipts.—The decrease in the revised estimate for the current year is mainly due to reduced receipts from the Government of India, as some of the departmental schemes are not held eligible for subsidy. The budget estimate for the next year represents receipts from the departmental schemes only.
- 260. Subvention from the Government of India for Development Schemes.—The budget estimate for the next year represents receipts from the Government of India for various Co-operative schemes.
 - 261. Deduct-Refunds.—The budget estimate for the next year is based on the progress of actuals.

Expenditure.

- 262. Direction.—The decrease in the budget estimate for the next year is due to the fact that the provision for temporary staff has been made under the head viz: Reorganisation of Administrative set up under the minor head "Other Charges".
- 263. Superintendence.—The decrease in the revised estimate for the current year is on account of certain posts having been kept vacant and non-appointment of certain staff sanctioned during the current year. The increase in the budget estimate for next year is mainly on account of creation of additional staff in connection with the continuous and concurrent audit of the Co-operative Milk Supply Societies in Kaira District and Shetkari Sahakari Sangh, Limited, Kolhapur and larger expenditure under some of the existing schemes.
- 264. Grants-in-aid.— The increase in revised estimate for the current year is on account of payment of increased subsidies to Backward Classes Housing Societies, Co-operative Societies in Scheduled and undeveloped areas, Co-operative Agricultural Credit Institutions and Co-operative Societies connected with fruits and vegetables preservation. The increase in the budget estimate for the next year is mainly on account of payment of increased subsidies to Co-operative Agricultural Credit Institutions and Co-operative Societies connected with fruits and vegetables preservation.
- 265. Other Charges.—The decrease in the revised estimate for the current year is due to reduced expenditure under the various schemes, mainly under "Staff for Recovery work", "Staff for Supervising Unions", "Establishment for the administration of the Money Lender's Act", "Organisation of Co-operative Farming Societies", "Co-operative Training and Education", "Co-operative Lift Irrigation Schemes" and "Improvement of Agricultural Marketing in India" and "Regulated Markets". The increase in the budget estimate for the next year is on account of creation of additional staff for the reorganised Administrative set-up in the enlarged Bombay State and larger expenditure under various other schemes.
- 266. Expenditure on Sarvodaya Schemes.—The increase in the budget estimate for the next year is due to increase in the number of Sarvodaya Centres.
- 267. Deduct—Recoveries adjusted in the accounts in reduction of expenditure.—The increase in the budget estimate for the next year is due to transfer of larger expenditure to the Sugarcane Cess Fund.
- 268. In accordance with the revised procedure to be adopted from 1953-54, only gross expenditure is to be put to the vote of the Legislature. The gross demand under "42-Co-operation" thus amounts to Rs. 2,33,51,000, after taking into account the amount of Rs. 7,84,000 financed from the State Sugarcane Cess Fund, the details of which are, as shown below:—

- 269. Industries.—The increase in the revised estimate for the current year is due to transfer from the head "VII-Land Revenue" to this head of the receipts from minor minerals from the other component parts of the State under the Mineral Extraction Rules. The increase in the budget estimate for the next year is mainly on account of receipts from dividend on investment in the Bombay, Saurashtra and Kutch Road Transport Corporations and larger receipts under Mineral Concession Rules.
- 270. Cottage Industries.—The decrease in the revised estimate for the current year is due to reduced receipts from the Government of India, than anticipated, on account of the various Cottage Industries Schemes, which will be implemented partly. The budget estimate for the next year represents receipts from the departmental schemes only.
- 271. Fisheries.—The increase in the budget estimate for the next year is mainly due to anticipated larger receipts from the Fisheries Technological Laboratory.
- 272. Recoveries of overpsyments.—The revised estimate for the current year and the bulget estimate for the next year are based on the progress of actuals.
- 273. Subvention from the Government of India for Development Schemes.—The budget estimate for the next year represents receipts from the Government of India for various Cottage Industries Schemes.

The details of recoveries are given in Part III under the major head, 47—Miscellaneous Departments in the 'White Book'.

Revenue.

294. Tolls of Roads.—The decrease in the current year's revised and next year's budget estimates, is due to abolition of tolls on certain roads.

Recoveries of Expenditure.—The increase in the next year's budget is due to larger recoveries from the Bombay Municipal Corporation on account of expenditure on Express Highways.

- 295. Miscellaneous.—The receipts under this head are of a fluctuating nature. The current year's revised is based on the reports received from the Controlling Officers.
- 296. Deduct-Refunds.—The remarks made against "Miscellaneous" are also applicable to this item.
- 297. Subvention from the Government of India for Development Schemes and other Schemes.—Therefore shown in the next year's budget estimate is on account of grants to be received from the Central Government for Development and other Schemes, which were hitherto shown as deduction of expenditure under the head concerned.

^{.293.} Rents of Buildings.—The increase in the current year's revised is based on the progress of actuals.

- 298. Original Works—(a) Civil Buildings (i) Ordinary.—The increase in the current year's revised and next year's budget estimates is due to additional grants required for minor works.
- (ii) Centrally sponsored building works, and (iii) provision on account of partially centrally sponsored buildings works provided under "81-C. W." The next year's budget estimate provides for expenditure on the above schemes.
- 299. (ii) Communications—Central Road Fund.—The revised estimate is based upon the progress of expenditure. The next year's budget provides for Works in progress and new works. The expenditure on these works is met from Central Road Fund.
- 300. (iii) Communications—National Highways.—The current year's and next year's budget estimate is "Nil" as, it has been decided separately not to show the programme in State Government Budget.
- 301. (iv) Communications.—West Coast Road Programme—The revised estimate is based on the progress of actuals. The next year's estimate provides for new works and works in progress. Expenditure is partially recoverable from Government of India, and State Government's share is to be met from State Road Fund during 1959-60.
- 302. (v) Communications—Roads jointly financed by the Central and State Governments—The revised estimate is based on the progress of actuals. The next year's estimate provides for works in progress out of which $\frac{1}{3}$ share is recoverable from Government of India, $\frac{1}{3}$ share is to be met from C. R. F. (Ordinary allocation) and $\frac{1}{3}$ share is to be borne by the State Government and to be met from State Road Fund.
- 303. (vi) Communications—State Roads of Economic or Interstate importance.—The revised estimate is based on progress of actuals. The next year's budget estimate provides for works in progress. The expenditure is fully recoverable from Government of India.
- 304. (vii) Communications—Financed from Sugarcane Cess Fund.—The revised estimate is based on the progress of expenditure. The next year's budget provides for works in progress. These works are to be financed from Sugarcane Cess Fund.
- 305. (viii) Communications—Express High Ways.—The revised estimate is based on progress of actuals. For the next year, provision of 94,44 has been made out of which 31,48 is recoverable from Government of India, 35,00 is to be met from State Road Fund, and the remaining share is to be borne by the Bombay Municipal Corporation. Government of India and Bombay Municipal Corporation's shares have been taken as receipts under "XXXIX-Civil Works".
- 306. Items IX to XII.—The next year's estimate provides for expenditure on the Schemes in question.
- 307. (B) Repairs (i) Ordinary.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate and next year's budget, is due to larger expenditure on special repairs to roads.
- 308. (C) Establishment (i) Gross Charges.—Increase in the current year's revised estimate and the next year's budget is due to creation of new Divisions and Sub-Divisions.
- 309. (D) Tools and Plant.—The increase in the next year's budget is due to larger provision for purchase of road rollers, jeeps, Motors, Trucks and Scientific instruments for the newly opened Divisions and Sub-Divisions.
- 310. (E) Suspense.—This item is of a fluctuating nature. The cost of the materials and machinery is finally adjusted against the respective works for which they are required.
- 311. In accordance with the existing procedure, the gross expenditure is to be put to the vote of the Legislature. Accordingly, a sum of Rs. 19,38,50,000. (Voted) is included in the schedule of demands, after excluding recoveries amounting to Rs. 11,09,72,900. The details of these recoveries are given on page and of the Civil Budget Estimates.

NOTE ON THE BUDGET PROVISION AND FINAL DEBIT OF EXPENDITURE ON PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT ESTABLISHMENT AND TOOLS AND PLANT CHARGES.

- 312. The staff of the Public Works Department does work which is accounted for under many major heads, e.g., revenue heads "XVII", "18", "30", "30-A", "36", "39", "50", "51", "51-B" and "XLI", capital heads "68", "70", "80", and "81", and deposit heads such as the State Road Fund. In order to account for the establishment and tools and plant charges under each head, the following procedure is in force.
- 313. Where any special establishment and tools and plant are required under one head only they are booked direct under that head. So far as deposit heads and works for other Governments are concerned, the establishment and tools and plant charges are first debited to "50" and then recovered on following percentage basis which represent the average of the incidence of such costs:—

For the remainder, the establishment and tools and plant charges are debited in the first instance direct to head "50", "Civil Works" and are then distributed to each major head on a percentage basis.

- 314. However, in making the distribution for establishment charges the cost of works and repairs under "XVII" is doubled in order to allow for the cost of supervising the work of the purely revenue establishment. The share of the establishment and tools and plant charges debitable to "39", "54-A" and "70" which are not Public Works Department head is treated as a recovery of expenditure under "50, Civil Works" and the demand in respect of these charges is shown under the respective heads concerned. As regards the remaining heads with which the Public Works Department is directly concerned the demand for the ordinary establishment, etc., charges is made under "50, Civil Works" and also under those heads.
- 315. Separate accounts in respect of expenditure on National Highway Works is required to be maintained. Expenditure in this connection appears under the minor heads "Communications National Highways", "Repairs-National Highways" "Establishment National Highways" and "Tools and Plant National Highways". These figures have been shown separately.
- 316. As irrigation is treated as a commercial department, the heads "XVII", "18" (Public Works Department) and "68" are also debited with pensionary charges calculated at a certain percentage fixed by Government every year on the cost of establishment charges, including the cost of Special Establishment, by a credit to the head "55, Superannuation, etc." where pensions of all Government servants are initially debited.
- 317. The cost of Special Establishment under "XLI" in respect of Vijapur Power House is debited to that head. In addition to this, Secretariat and supervision charges are also levied under this head on certain percentage basis.

318. The subjoined table shows the incidence of special as well as ordinary establishment charges (including pensionary charges in the case of irrigation heads, under the Public Works Department head proper):—

- 320. I. Rents from Properties-The estimated increase in the revised estimate for 1958-59 and Budget estimate for 1959-60 is partly due to the merging of electrical charges of D. D. Chawls in rent with effect from 1st September 1958 and partly due to increased receipts and recoveries during the current and next financial years.
- 321. Sale of Electricity.—The increase in the next year's Budget Estimate is based on the actuals for the last two years.
- 322. Miscellaneous Receipts.—The decrease in the current year's Revised Estimate as well as the next year's budget is on account of transfer of certain land at Kol ba to the Government of India. (G.C.P.) MO-A H 5068-10

- 323. Sale of Electricity.—The increase in the next year's Budget Estimate is due to some new works undertaken during the next year.
- 324. II. Repairs.—The increase in the current year's Revised Estimate is due to non-availability of credit for electrical charges which has been merged in rent. The reasons for the increase in the budget of 1959-60 is on account of large expenditure on repairs to D. D. Buildings, cost of electric energy and fused bulbs and rent, rates and taxes.
- 325. III. Establishment (Ordinary) and Tools and plants.—The increase in the current year's Revised Estimate as well as the next year's Budget Estimate is due to additional provision for establishment and tools and plant on the works and repairs, which have been worked out on percentage basis.
- 323. IV. Establishment (Special).—The increase in the current year's Revised Estimates is due to the continuance of 24 posts of sweepers which were to be retrenched for which there exists no provision in the current year's budget. Similarly the reasons for increase in the next year's Budget Estimate is due to grant of increments and increased expenditure on D. A., C. L. A., H. R. A., etc.
- 327. V. Grant-in-aid.—The provision of 25 for the Revised Estimate of the current year and the next year's Bidget Estimate represents the payment of grant-in-aid to the Bombay Municipality by way of interest charges and contribution to sinking fund in connection with the work of improvements to water supply arrangements at Development Department Chawle, Worli. The demand to be put to the vote of the Legislature under "51-Bombay Development Scheme" for 1959-60 amounts to Res. 27,81,350.

333. The increase in the revised estimate is based on progress of actuals. The next year's provision represents normal requirements. The receipts from interest and securities held in Famine Relief Fund are utilised to meet a part of expenditure on famine by means of a deduct entry under this head.

54-B, Transfer to Famine Relief Fund.

334. Under the Famine Relief Fund Act, 1958 which replaced the Bombay Famine Relief Fund Act, 1936, the Central Province and Berar Famine Relief Fund Act, 1937 and the Saurashtra Famine Relief Fund Act, 1951 a minimum balance of Rs. 4:00 crores has to be maintained in the Famine Relief Fund of the New Bombay State, and the deficiency, if any, in the balance thereof has to be made up by transferring funds from the Consolidated Fund. The present holdings in the fund are to the tune of 2,80,82,500. The deficiency has to be made up by transferring amounts in instalments of not less than Rs. 15 lakhs from the general revenues. A provision of Rs. 15 lakhs has accordingly been included in the revised and the next year's estimate.

Broadly speaking S nd has to pay to Bomb y the amount by which the total p yment from Bomb y Tressuries in respect of preparation period exceeds 85 per cent of the total liability of both the States for the period. Due to partition of the country, the question of finencial settlement of outstanding questions between this Government and S nd Government is a parately under consideration. - 314. In accordance with the revisid procedure adopted from 1953-54 only gross expenditure is to be put to the vote of Legislature. Accordingly a sum of Rs. 3.33,57,560 is included in the "Schedule of Demands" and a sum of Rs. 52,60,300 charged will be included in the appropriation bill.

^{345.} I-Stationery Receipts.—The decrease in the current year's revised estimate is due to smaller recoveries and outstanding dues during the last four months of the current year. The increase in the Budget of 1959-60 is due to recoveries of past arrears etc. during the next financial year,

^{346.} II—Sale of Gazettes and other Government Publications.—The increase in the current year's Revised estimate is mainly due to the large number of posts advertised by the Public Service Commission and consequent sale of application forms. The decrease in the next year's budget is due to reduced receipts anticipated on account of sale of gazettes and other publications.

- 347. III—Other Press Receipts.—The increase in the current year's Revised estimate is due to adjustment of 113 with the Controller of Stores, Western Railway, settlement of old Bills, sale of unserviceable articles, jobs done on chargeable basis and items like photostat material supplied to Photo Registry Office, Poona, recoveries of previous year's bills of the Central Government, etc. The decrease in the next year's budget is due to the introduction of books of private publishers on account of which the sales are expected to be reduced by about 50 per cent. at the G. P. P. alone.
- 348. IV—Receipts in England.—The inclusion of the figure under the current year's Revised estimate is based on the progress of current and past actuals.

- 349. A—Stationery Offices and Stores.—The increase in the Revised estimate of the current year is due to the conversion of the post of Asstt. Director into Dy. Director which carries a higher pay and due to the difference between the pay scales, payment of arrears to the staff since 1st November 1956 and also due to the sanction of additional staff. The decrease in the next year's budget is on account of reduced expenditure anticipated on staff, contingencies, etc.
- 350. B—Purchase of Stationery Stores.—The increase in the current year's Revised estimate is due to increased consumption of paper and strawboards at Bombay, Poona, Yeravada and Baroda, higher rate of direct purchases and pending bills of jail supplies, etc. The next year's Budget is based on actual requirements.
- 351. E—Government Presses.—The increase in the current year's Revised estimate is due to overtime working and holiday allowances and continuance of II shift at Baroda, Government Photozinco Press, Poona, etc., and more expenditure on service postage, electrical energy and purchase of Machinery and Stationery articles. The reasons for the increase in the next year's budget is due to the creation of new posts etc. and continuance of II shift and additional posts for II shift at Government Printing Press, Poona and due to the bringing of piece work establishment on salaried basis at Government Press, Nagpur and purchase of offset press, two colour, double demi size for that press.
- 352. G—Cost of printing work done by other Governments.—The inclusion of the figure under current year's Revised estimate is due to the receipts of copies of Appropriation Accounts from A. G., Gwalior and A. G., Hyderabad the cost of which is to be detailed under this head.
- 353. I—Charges in England.—The decrease in the current year's Revised estimate is due to less expenditure anticipated on office establishment and purchase of stationery during the remaining four months of the current year.
- 354. D—Value of stationery supplied to other Governments and Paying Departments.—The decrease in the current year's Revised estimate as well as the next year's budget estimate is due to reduction in the number of Commercial Departments and Central Government Offices indenting for stationery.
- 355-56. H—Cost of printing work done for other Governments and Paying Departments.—The reasons for the increase in the current year's Revised estimate is due to more printing work received at Y. P. P., Poona from the Central Government Offices and Paying Departments. The increase in the next year's Budget estimate is due to fluctuating trend of actuals and increased work expected by the Rajkot Press from other Governments and Paying Departments. The net Budget estimate of Rs. 2,02,03,555 (voted) under this budget head is made up as under:—

- 359. Subvention from Government of India under the (i) S. I. H. Schemes.—The Government of India assistance is received in the form of subsidy or loan on 50.50 basis. The actual assistance is based on the progress of expenditure. The Revised Estimate and the next year's budget are based on the expected progress of housing schemes by the Housing Boards in the current and next year.
 - (ii) Slum Clearance Schemes.—The Revised as well as the next year's estimates are based on the subsidy payable by the Government of India.
 - (iii) Subvention from the Government of India for other Plan Schemes.—Represents Government of India share of Central assistance in respect of Plan Schemes provided under "36—Scientific Departments."
- 360. Subsidy from Government of India on account of expenditure on scheme for improving the emoluments of low paid Government Servants.—The financial assistance will be at the uniform rate of two thirds of the extra expenditure incurred by the State Government in raising the emoluments (the term 'emoluments' for this purpose is defined as pay plus dearness allowance only) by an amount which may go up to Rs. 12 per month in each case in respect of employees whose emoluments after such increase would not exceed Rs. 100 per month. If the emoluments after the increase exceed Rs. 100 per month, only the portion of the increase up to Rs. 100 per month will qualify for financial assistance. The provision in the Revised and next year's estimate for subsidy are based on the anticipated recoveries from the Government of India.

Expenditure.

361. Donations for Chariatble purposes.—The increase in the Revised estimate is due to the provision for grant-in-aid equal to betting tax collected in respect of special race meeting and provision for gratuitous relief to victims to flood and fire.

The next year's estimate is based on anticipated requirements.

- 362. Special Commissions of Enquiry.— The increase in the revised and then ext year's estimates is due to increase in the staff consequent on increase of work in respect of integrated areas and extensive touring by the Executive Secretary and other members of the Committee for History of Freedom Movement in India for scrutiny of Record.
- 363. Petty Establishments.—The increase in the Revised Estimate is due to the larger anticipated expenditure in connection with the Local Board Elections, counterbalanced in part by saving under "Nazul Establishment". The next year's estimate is based on normal requirements.
- 364. Irrecoverable Temporary Loans and Advances Written off.—The increase in the current year's revised estimate is mainly due to the writes off of irrecoverable temporary loans and advances granted by merged states and due to swaving off the recovery of the advance of Rs. 40 lakhs outstanding against the Maharaja of Baroda. The next year's estimate is based on the estimates proposed by the Departments.
- 365. F-Rents, Rates and Taxes.—The Provision for the next year represents payments to the Bombay Municipal Corporation in lieu of general tax leviable on Central and State Government properties in Bombay.
- 366. Grants-in-aid contributions etc.—(Charged).—Provision under this head represents grants-in-aid to Local Bodies in Old M. P. for loss of revenues due to fees, fines etc., credited by them to Government under various grants. These are statutory grants.
- 367. Grants-in-aid, contributions etc.—(Voted).—The decrease in the current year's Revised Estimates is due mainly to the fact that some of the Corporations may not be able to claim subsidy during the current year under the slum clearance Schemes, as works are not likely to be completed.
- 368. Miscellaneous Compensations—(Charged).—The provisions was made in the current year's budget under 'voted' for payment of compensations to H. E. H., the Nizam for loss of saife khas land and commutation payments to Jagirdars in respect of exclusive and mixed Jagirs.

As the payment is made initially by the Andhra Pradesh Government and that Government is to be reimbursed subsequently, the expenditure has to be treated as 'Charged', under the S. R. Act. Hence the provision has been included accordingly in the Revised and the next years estimates.

369. Charges in connection with Village Panchayats Acts.—The revised estimates under this head is based on the progress of actuals in the current as well as on last year's actuals.

The provision for the next year's intended for committed expenditure and provision for plan schemes as per plan phasing.

370. Miscellaneous and Unforseen charges—(Voted).—The increase in the Revised estimates is mainly due to claim for subsidy on account of completion of works under S. I. H. Schemes included in earlier year's programme and providing for payment of compensation to the Bembay State Road Transport Corporation to the extent of net excesses amount payable by the Corporation on account of purchase of vehicles in Bombay.

The increase in the next years estimate is due to provision for Plan schemes as per Plan phasing.

- 371. Expenditure on D. P.s.—The decrease in the current year's estimate is due to the transfer of educational schemes pertaining to financial assistance to D. P. Students from this head to "37-Education".
- 372. Deduct—Recoveries.—The current years' Revised Estimates is based on past actuals. The decrease in the next year's budget is due mainly to the absence of provision for transfer from the Village Deveplopment Fund and to less recoveries anticipated from the Central Government for Rehabilitation Schemes, due to transfer of provision for Educational Schemes to "37-Education."

- 406. Works.—The decrease in the revised estimate is mainly due to slow progress and non-finalisation of Plans and Estimates of certain works. Next year's estimate is based on estimated expenditure on works in progress and some new works as well as works transferred from "30-Ports and Pilotage" to this head.
- 407. Tools and Plant and equipments survey dredging.—The decrease in revised estimate is due to non-finalisation of indent and absence of transformer so far. Next year's budget provides mainly for purchase of cranes for certain ports and for new Dry Dock at Porbunder.
- 408. Deduct—Recoveries.—The recoveries under this head mainly respresent expenditure on certain works which is met from the (1) Port Development Fund and (2) Bhavnagar Port Reserve Fund and is adjusted in reduction of expenditure. It has been decided that from year 1959-60 an amount equivalent to grant-in-aid from Government of India should be transferred to revenue head. An amount of 3,00 is therefore proposed for transfer in 1959-60.

The gross demand under the head "73-Capital Outlay on Ports" amounts to Rs. 89,66,800.

80 Bombay Developement Scheme.

409. All activities of the Developement Department were originally financed from loan funds under the capital expenditure head "59-(now 80), Bombay Developement Scheme", the capital receipts realised therefrom being taken in reduction of expenditure under the same head and the revenue receipts being shown under the head "XXXI- Bombay Developement Scheme". From the year 1927-28 revenue heads "42-(now) 51 and XXXI (now XL) Bombay Developement Scheme" were opened for those schemes of the Developement Department, on which capital expenditure was complete, and the Industrial Housing Scheme was transferred to these heads. During 1928-29 two more schemes of water and electric supply were transferred to the revenue heads. The Development Department was abolished from 1st March The Developement Department was abolished from 1st March 1930 and all charges pertaining to the schemes of the Department except those of the Back Bay Scheme were transferred to the revenue heads with effect from 1930-31. Revenue Accounts for Back Bay Scheme were opened with effect trom 1939-40. The receipts and expenditure of a revenue nature in respect of that scheme appear from that year under the heads "XL" and "51" respectively. Only capital expenditure on that scheme required for the completion of the works already undertaken, and capital receipts were recorded under the capital head.

The original plans for the reclamation of Back Bay provided for a sea wall from Chowpatty extending as far as Colaba point and enclosing 1,100 acres of reclaimed land, this area being divided into eight blocks. Block No. 1 starts from opposite the Marine Lines Station and extends upto the Churchgate Station. Block No. II extends from the Churchgate Station to the Back Bay Swimming Baths. The area from this point, past the old Cuff Parade Reclamation and beyond the Afghan Memorial Church at Colaba, is divided into five blocks No. III to VIII admesuring 245 acres abuts on the lands at Colaba Point. A small portion of old reclaimed land near the Marine Lines Station had also been included in

In accordance with the decision of the Legislative Council in 1927, work in connection with the Back Bay Reclamation Scheme were restricted to the reclamation and development of Blocks Nos. I, II and VII and the reclamation of Block No. VIII without development with a connecting road along the existing foreshore between Blocks Nos. II and VII.

Blocks Nos. I and II comprising over 150 acres were fully reclaimed and the plots in this area were available for building purposes. Block No. VII comprised about 135 acres, out of which about 47 acres at the east end were fully reclaimed, leaving about 88 acres partially reclaimed. The partially reclaimed. area is being completed by the slow but cheap process of filling with suitable building debris.

At present the dry filling operations have been suspended. Block No. VIII comprising 245 acres was reclaimed and sold to the Government of India for Rs. 2,06,53,000.

The project estimate of the curtailed scheme sanctioned in March 1932 amounted to Rs. 7,23,06,000. Against the modified project estimate, the total expenditure (excluding interest) incurred to the end of the March 1958 is Rs. 6,32,99,465 leaving a balance of capital expenditure of Rs. 90,06,535 to be incurred. Government has decided to close the Capital Account of the original Back Bay Reclamation Scheme as recommended by the Public Accounts Committee. However, a new scheme is being prepared and this will cover developement expenditure on roads, drains and lights, etc.

Payments on accounts of commutation of pensions are accounted for under the capital head "83-Payments of commuted value of pensions" and are repaid from revenue by equated payments of capital and interest spread over fifteen years. 451. In accordance with the Comptroller and Auditor General's direction, Government had opened with effect from 1st April 1943, a new capital major head of account, viz., "85A-Capital Outlay on Provincial Schemes connected with the war, 1939" to record disbursements and receipts from Schemes connected with the last war. The nomenclature of this major head which was changed to "85A-Capital Outlay on Provincial Schemes of State Trading" with effect from the 1st April 1946, is now "85-A-Capital Outlay on Schemes of Government Trading". Personal ledger accounts were opened for these schemes and advances were sanctioned for them by debit to "Advances Repayable" in the debt section of the Accounts. The personal ledger accounts have been retained under the new procedure which has been devised not only to provide the essence of control but also to combine the advantages of a final head of account with those of personal ledger accounts without undue complications in accounts.

452. The minor heads opened under this head are "Grain Supply Schemes", "Standard Cloth Scheme" and "Other Miscellaneous Schemes". The last minor head includes Schemes such as Scheme for the purchase and sale of potators. "Scheme for purchase of seed for the Grow More Food Campaign" "Scheme for the distribution of Milk-Bombay City", "Scheme for the purchase and sale of Iron and Steel", "Scheme for the purchase and distribution of Ammonium Sulphate and other fertilizers", etc., etc. The transactions of the various schemes are recorded under the following detailed heads:—

- (1) Cost of Purchase.
- (2) Advances.
- (3) Suspense -
 - (a) Personal Deposits.
 - (b) Insurance Fund.
- (4) Deduct—Receipts and recoveries on Capital Account—
 - (a) Repayment of advances.
 - (b) Other Receipts.
- (5) Deduct—Capital expenditure financed from ordinary revenues.

453. When a Scheme is worked out without the aid of advance the expenditure is to be debited to (1), (2) is intended to provide for advances granted for the working of Schemes. A corresponding credit is given to 3(a) which also records the subsequent incomings and outgoings of the personal ledger accounts. In view of the constitution of the Insurance Fund with effect from 1st August 1951, the detailed head 3(b) will not be operated upon now, except for the purpose of transferring the amount, if any, appearing on the credit side, under 3(b) to the newly created Insurance Fund. But till the constitution of the Insurance Fund the amount set apart to cover possible losses by fire, etc., used to appear on the credit side under 3(b). The debit side of this detailed head used to record withdrawals from the fund, if and when necessary to cover losses. All recoveries including those of advances and ultimate profits, if any, are to be accounted for under (4) and any losses under (1). On the winding up of a personal ledger account, the final result would either wipe out the original issue or if not, the balance may be left to the debit of the Capital Account under (1) or written off to revenue account against (5).

- 454. Grain Supply Scheme.—The decrease in the current year's revised is mainly due to smaller expenditure under the Grain Supply Scheme for Bombay City and Moffusil. The next year's estimate takes into account smaller expenditure anticipated under "Price Support and Fair Price Shops Scheme".
- 455. Standard Cloth Scheme.—The scheme has already been closed. No provision is, therefore, made in the current year's revised and the next year's budget.
- 456. Other Miscellaneous Scheme.—The increase in the current year revised estimate is mainly on account of provisions made for the Narsinggirji Mills (Unemployment Relief Scheme) and the Seksaria Mills (Unemployment Relief Scheme) partly counter balanced by smaller expenditure on the Bombay Milk Scheme and the Poona Milk Scheme. The increase in the next year's budget as compared to the current year's revised is mainly on account of larger expenditure anticipated on the purchase and distribution of Ammonium Sulphate and other fertilizer's and Milk Schemes viz. the Bombay Milk Scheme, and the provision made for some new schemes, viz., the Nagpur Milk Supply Scheme, the Baroda Milk Supply Scheme and the Rajkot Milk Supply Scheme.
- 457. (1) These are loans under the Subsidised Industrial Housing Scheme of the Government of India.

Most of the loans are passed on to the Bombay Housing Board and Co-operative Societies.

(2) These loans are sanctioned by the Government of India for housing displaced persons and for industries in the displaced persons' colonies and Townships. The increase in the current year's revised estimate is due to passing on amounts recovered from the displaced persons.

- (7) These loans are meant for Irrigation and other Development Schemes included in the State Plan. The decrease in the revised estimates for 1958-59 is due to less amounts agreed to by the Government of India.

- (22) This is a Centrally sponsored scheme. The loans are generally posed on to the Municipal Corporations and other Municipalities in the State.
- (24) The increase in the next year's budget is due to more houses to be build for Police Staff throughout the State.

- 472. Loans to Municipalities.—The increase in the current year's revised and next year's estimates under advances is due to larger provision for water supply and drainage schemes.
- 473. Loans to District and other Local Fund Committees.—The next year's provision under Advances includes provisions of 24 lakhs for Agricultural Produce Marketing Committees and Rs. 33.76 lakhs for School Boards for construction of primary School Buildings.
- 474. Loans to Land holders and other Notabilities.—The recoveries are of old loans which are still being recovered. No such advances have been given in recent years.
- 475. Advances to cultivators, Co-operatives Societies, Backward Classes etc.—The increase in the current year's revised and next year's budget under advances is due to provision of larger amounts for wells and pumping sets schemes designed to increase food production.
- 476. Loans in connection with Community Development Projects.—The higher provision for the next year on the recoveries side is based on the progress of past and current actuals.
- 477. Miscellaneous Loans and Advances.—Under this minor head are provided miscellaneous loan schemes under which loans are given to individuals, Co-operative Societies and other private bodies for purposes other than agricultural. The gradual increase in the estimates on the recoveries side is due to larger loans given in recent years. The decrease in the current year's revised estimate under advances is based on actuals. The next year's estimate includes provisions of Rs. 1,11,91 lakhs for the National Extension Service Blocks, Rs. 24 lakhs each for Trading Estates and Small Scale Industries, Rs. 39:31 lakhs for educational purposes and Rs. 62:24 lakhs under Low Income Group Housing Schemes.
- 478. Loans to Displaced persons.—The increase in the current year's revised on the receipt side is due to settlement of dues from Displaced Persons at the time of settlement of their compensation claims. The reduction in the current year's revised and next year's budget on the expenditure side is due to less demand for loans from Displaced Persons.
- 479. Loans to Government Servants.—The revised estimates on the recoveries side are based on instalments due from Government servants as reported by the Audit Officers. Provision on the expenditure side is made on the basis of actuals. The next year's estimates includes a provision of Rs. 10 lakhs for loans to Government Servants for construction of houses under liberalised rules.

Government accepted the donations of Rs. 9 lakhs and Rs. 6 lakhs respectively, for establishment of the Anand Institute from the Trustees of Sheth Mansukhlal Chhaganlal and Sheth Mungalal Geenka Trusts on certain conditions, one of these being that Government should pay to the Governing Bedy of the Institute interest at 3½ per cent. per annum on the donations, after deducting therefrom the actual expenditure on buildings and equipment of the Institute. In the contributory fund, the subscribers' deposits are supplemented by contributions from State Revenue in lieu of pension. The amount at a subscriber's credit is paid to him upon the termination of the service. During service, temporary withdrawals from the subscribers own accumulations are allowed in certain circumstances.

^{489.} In accordance with the Section 7(2) of the Bombay State Famine Relief Fund Act, 1958 which replaced the Bombay Famine Relief Fund Act, 1936, as amended by the Bombay Famine Relief Fund (Amendment) Act, 1954, and the Central Provinces and Berar Famine Relief Fund Act, 1937 in their application to the State of Bombay and the Saurashtra Famine Relief Fund Act, 1951, the Famine Relief Fund is to be maintained at a minimum of Rs. 4 crores on the 31st March of each financial year. The fund comprises of-

(i) Securities of the Government of India, and State Governments and

(ii) Cash, including-

(a) Interest on the invested securities, and

(b) Contribution made from general revenues under Proviso below section 7(2) of the Act in order to make up any deficiency by which the total of items (i) and (ii) (a) may fall short of the prescribed limit.

The Fund can be expended only upon—

- (1) the relief of serious famine in the State, and
- (2) the relief of distress caused by serious drought, flood or other natural calamities in the State.

Subject to the proviso that when the balance of the Fund exceeds the minimum of Rs. 400 lakks which limit will be operative after the end of the current year, Government may utilise the excess to meet expenditure on protective irrigation works and other works for the prevention of famine in the State, or for the grant of loans to cultivators, either under the Land Improvement Loans Act, 1883, or under the Agriculturists Loans Act, 1884, or to meet irrecoverable balance of loans granted under the said Act, or for relief purposes or for the repayment of advances made by the Government of India.

The amount invested in the Government of India Securities on account of "Famine Relief Fund (Bombay)" is Rs. 2,80.83 lakhs.

The credits of 9,20 lakhs during the current financial year and 9,99 during the next financial year represent the Interest receipt on the securities held under this Fund.

As per provision below sect on 7 of the aforesaid Act, to recoup the deficiency in the Fund an annual instalment not less than Rs. 15 lakhs except the last instalment, is required to be assigned from the general revenues. Accordingly provisions for Rs. 15 lakhs have been made in the current year's revised and next year's budget.

The debits shown in the revised estimate for current year and the budget estimate for next year represents the amount available for transfer to the revenue head "54-A, Famine Relief" for meeting the famine expenditure.

Receipts.

491. Under section 9 (3) of the Bombay Motor Vehicle Tax Act, 1935, as amended by the Bombay Charged Expenditure Act, 1950, if the net proceeds of the tax in any year exceed the sum of Rs. 26,57,000 the excess amount shall be entered in a separate account and shall be expended in such manner as the Local Government may determine solely on the construction, improvement and maintenance of new and existing roads including roads vesting in, belonging to, or managed by, any local authority. The amount so set apart and the expenditure incurred there from is recorded under "State Road Fund". In addition to the receipts under the Bombay Motor Vehicles Tax Act, 1935 the Fund also gets credits on account of transfers under the Bombay Sales of Motor Spirit Taxation (Amendment) Act, 1952. Under section 5A(2) of this Act, after deducting from the proceeds such sum not exceeding 50 per cent. of the proceeds as the State Government may determine in this behalf, the remaining amount shall be entered in and transferred to the State Road Fund. The provisions of the above two Acts applied to the ex-Bombay State area. Uniform legislation providing for constitution of a State Road Fund for the entire New Bombay State, governing transfers to the Fund from '12-Taxes on Vehicles" and "12-A Sales Tax" and regulating the purposes of expenditure from the Fund has since been enacted. Transfer from the former major head is governed by section 11(1) of the Bombay Motor Vehicles Tax Act, 1958, which has come into force from the 1st April 1958, while transfer from the latter major head is governed by the provisions of section 8(2) of the Bombay Sales of Motor Spirit Taxation Act, 1958 which came into force from 1st October 1958. The amounts entered on receipt side show the transfer made to the State Road Fund from "12-Taxes on Vehicles" and "12-A Sales Tax" under the relevant Acts mentioned above.

Disbursements.

492. The revised estimate for the current year is based on progress of expenditure. The increase in the next year's estimate is main'y in view of the position that provision for road works in all areas of the new Bombay State has been made under State Road Fund while hitherto only works pertaining to ex-Bombay area were provided under State Road Fund.

497. The sums of Rs. 20,000 for Current Year and Rs. 26,000 for next year have been set aside for depreciation is credited on the receipts side under this head with a corresponding debit to the head "8, States Excise". The amount required for renewals and replacement is met from the Depreciation Reserve and it is provided on the disbursement side under this head with a corresponding deduct entry under "8, State Excise". In the current financial year's revised estimate and the next year's budget estimate a provision of 5 for exepnditure from this Fund has been made.

SHRI SHAHU OHHATRAPATI MILLS, KOLHAPUR.

498. Shri Shahu Chhatrapati Mills came into the possession of this Government with the merger of Kolhapur in this State. The Mills are managed by Messrs. James Finlay and Company who credit to Government under this head amounts set apart for Depreciation machinery replacement and electrification of the Mills. The expenditure on those items is debited to the heads "43-A, Capital Outlay on Industrial Development," and "72-Capital Outlay on Industrial Development" and the debit passed to the fund by means of suitable deduct entries under these heads.

DEPRECIATION RESERVE OF PORTS.

499. This Depreciation Reserve Fund was created for the port department being quasi-commercial department by the former Surreshtra Government. The estimate under receipts for current year and next year are according to the rates of depreciation reserves prescribed for floating crafts, machinery etc. The provision under expenditure both for current year and next year represents the withdrawals from the Fund for meeting the expenditure under "30-Ports and Pilotage" with a corresponding deduct entry.

ROAD TRANSPORT DEPARTMENT DEPRECIATION FUND.

100. This fund was contributed by the former Hyderabad Government for renewals and replacement of plant, machinery and buildings of Road Transport Department. It has been decided not to transfer any amount for depreciation from the Current financial year. No provision has therefore been made in the Current Year's revised, next year's budget. 502. Though the transactions of the Dangs District form part of the Public Account of this Government they are taken against the accumulation of the Dangs revenue in accordance with the intention of Government to keep the receipts and payments on account of the Dangs District separate from the accounts of this State with a view to utilising the surplus, if any, realized from the Dangs towards the amelioration of the condition of the Dangi people. The following procedure of accounting has, therefore, been prescribed for the Dangs District.

The receipt and expenditure of the Dangs area are to be recorded in the Revenue Section in lump separately on the receipt and expenditure sides of the State Section of the Accounts of this Government. The net Deficit or surplus is transferred at the end of each year to a Deposit Fund (Reserve Fund) in the Deposit Section of the State Government's Accounts. The balance in the reserve transferred from the Government of India is also to be credited to this head. The debt and remittance transactions of the Dangs are also recorded directly under the relevant debt and remittance heads in the State Section of the Government's Accounts. The investments transferred from the Government of India and any other investments made thereafter from the Dangs District Reserve Fund are to be debited to a separate head of account in the Deposit Section.

In accordance with the above procedure an amount of Rs. 25,56,000 representing the anticipated surplus during the current financial year and Rs. 15,90,000 during next financial year to be transferred to the Dangs District Reserve Fund.

504. According to section 11 (1) of the Sugarcane Cess Act, 1948, the proceeds of the cess and fees recovered under this Act are to be credited first to the revenues of the State and after deduction of the expenses on collection and recoveries are transferred to a separate fund called "the State Sugarcane Cess Fund". The Fund is to be expended for the development and improvement of the cultivation, growth and marketing of sugarcane and other irrigated crops and for the development of agriculture in general in the State of Bombay. To reckon the amounts transferred to the Fund and the expenditure incurred therefrom a new major head "State Sugarcane Cess Fund (Bombay)" has been opened with effect from the year 1948-49. The total amount spent from the Fund appears on the payment side. The provision in the next year's budget estimate disbursement side is on account of schemes or control of sugarcane, pests, development work on sugarcane, development of agriculture, Minor and Lift Irrigation Schemes, Drainage Works, Road Works passing through Sugar Cane areas, Scheme for development for Co-operative farming Societies and Co-operative Societies undertaking Schemes of Lift Irrigation Schemes. - 506. Under State Aid to Industries Rules, 1935, Loans are granted to fishermen or their Co-operative Societies. One of the conditions governing the loans was that the fishermen were required to insure their boats and nets to the extent of the amounts advanced. Government decided in 1950-51 that the condition should be waived in the case of loans not exceeding Rs. 5,000 grants to fishermen or their Co-operative Societies under the State Aid to Industries Rules, 1935. Insurance is compulsory for loans above Rs. 5,000. The rate of interest is $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. in cases where assets are insured and $8\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. in cases where they are not so insured. Out of the $8\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. interest received in the latter cases, 4 per cent. is credited to a separate Fund called the "Fishermen's Relief Fund". The Fund is to be utilised in the following manner:—
 - (i) If any loan is required to be written off due to loss of assets at sea, the loan should be repaid to Government from the Fund.
 - (ii) The balance remaining in the Fund should be utilised for granting relief to fishermen who have suffered loss at sea according to the merits of the cases.

The expenditure from the Fund for purposes of writes off mentioned at-

- (i) above is initially recorded in the revenue section under "57-Miscellaneous—E-Irrecoverable Temporary Loans and Advances written off" and the expenditure from the Fund for grant of relief to fishermen as mentioned at.
- (ii) above is initially recorded in the revenue section under "43-Industries—F-Fisheries—C-12 Grant of relief to fishermen who suffer losses at Sea". The expenditure is finally transferred to the Fund by a deduct entry.

- 508. Government has constituted with effect from 1st August 1951 a common Insurance Fund which would act as an insurer for all Government Commercial and Industrial Schemes. The Fund will be governed by the following general principles:—
 - (1) Industrial and Commercial Undertakings run by Government including all the State Trading Schemes, will provide for adequate insurance of their property in accordance with the practice prevailing in private commercial and industrial undertakings.
 - (2) Property held by Government and not included in clause (1) above will not, as heretofore be insured and any damage thereto will continue to be met from the ordinary revenue to the extent necessary and possible.
 - (3) The premia payable in respect of property in clause (1) will be credited to a separate Fund and will be included in the working expenses of the appropriate undertaking.
 - (4) Damage covered by the insurance thus provided for will be met from the Insurance Fund.
 - (5) Government property will hereafter be not insured with private insurers. But where the risk involved is such that it is considered that the Fund should not carry the risk, the officer in charge of the Fund, will, with previous approval of Government, take out the necessary policy with a private Insurance Company (this will usually be from the Indian Insurance Companies Association Pool) and pay the premium out of the Fund.

Thus, the State Government can ask for the allotment from the Government of India only after utilising the unspent balances at the end of the previous year. The amounts received from the Government of India are credited on the receipt side under this head and the expenditure is shown on the disbursement side. The actual expenditure, is however, recorded in the first instance in the revenue section under the head "50-Civil Works" and a corresponding credit is given to that head by transfer from the Fund, by means a deduct entry under "50-Civil Works". The amount estimated to be received during 1958-59 is 96,10 and the anticipated expenditure is also 96,10. The expenditure figure on petrol tax works during 1959-60 has been estimated at 82,93 and the same figure has been adopted for the estimate on the receipt side.

- (6) The Accounting procedure for grants made by the Indian Central Sugarcane Committee is similar to that for grant from Indian Council of Agricultural Research, the relevant heads in the revenue section being "40-Agriculture".
- (5) (7) (8) and (10) Accounting procedure for grants made under "Deposit Account of grant made by the Indian Central Tobacco Committee", "Deposit Account of grant made by the Central Cocoanut Committee", "Deposit Account of grant made by the Central Oilseeds Committee" and "Deposit Account of grant made by the Indian Central Arecanut Committee" is similar to that in the case of subvention from the Central Road Fund, the relevant head in the revenue section being "40-Agriculture".
- (11) The minor head "The Private Donations and Contributions Fund" has been opened with effect from 1947-48. The Fund has been formed from the donations given by the public for general or specific purposes and is to be utilised for the schemes and objects for which the donors have given their subscriptions. The donations will be credited in the first instance to the Fund in the Deposit Section of the Account. The expenditure incurred from the Fund will be entered under the relevant service major heads by opening suitable sub-heads for the purpose with due regard to the general principles of accounting as laid down in Article 30 of the Account Code, Volume I, while an equivalent amount will be shown as deduction in expenditure by debit to the Fund in cases where control over expenditure rests with Government. In other cases the expenditure will be direct to the Fund.
- (9) Accounting procedure for "Deposit Accounts of grants from the Central Government" for the food production drive scheme is similar to that for subvention from Central Road Fund, the relevant service heads being "47-Miscellaneous Departments". This head has been opened during the financial year 1951-52 for recording receipts from the Central Government on account of Food Bonus and expend ture out of Food Bonus. No provision for expenditure during current year and next year under "47-Miscellaneous Departments" has been made.

Government Guarantee Fund.—The Central Financing Agencies' grant loans to Co-operative Societies on Government's Guarantee to make good, to a specified extent, losses, if any, incurred by the Central Financing Agencies in the transaction. From the year 1954-55 Government have opened a new Fund called "Industrial Co-operative Societies Government Guarantee Fund".

(15) Deposit Account of grants-in-aid to the Education Institutions of Displaced Persons from the Government of India. The new minor head has been opened in accordance with the procedure laid down by the Government of India in the Ministry of Rehabilitation with the consent of the Comptroller and Aud tor General. The receipts of the grants-in-aid are to be directly recorded under this head and an equal amount representing the expenditure is to be shown on the disbursement side of this head.

Under the head "Central Accounts Office—Reserve Bank Suspense" are recorded transactions relating to Reserve Bank Suspense which shows credits and debits, on behalf of the Government of India, other State Governments, Indian Stores Department and charges in England. It has been decided by the Auditor General that with effect from 1941-42, the system of showing the credit the "minus debit" instead of "plus credit" should be followed by all State Governments. The effect of this decision is that the debit side expected to be mostly cleared by the reduction due to credit and consequently no provision is required in the budget.

Under the head "Cash Balance Investment Account" are recorded transactions of the State Government by way of investment of its cash balances in short and long term loans, e.g., the Treasury Bills of the Government of India or of other State Governments, and the Government of India Securities, or loans of other State Government. The profits derived from such investments are credited as receipts under the head "XX—Interest realised or investments of State Balance" in the revenue section. The amount appearing under this head on the disbursement side is the total of the amounts invested for shorter or long periods from time to time during the course of the year and on receipt side the total amounts realised on maturity (less the discount earned or interest derived thereform) during the year.

The head "Departmental Adjusting Account" is intended for recording the provisional adjustments of departmental receipts and payments and Inter-departmental transfers.

The head "Recoveries of Service Payments" is intended for recording the recoveries made in the course of audit before they are finally brought to account.



Remarks.—As the areas of the existing forest Divisions in Vidarbha have become very extensive due to taking over of ex-proprietory forests, it is intended to split up some of the heavy Divisions in the interest of efficiency. For the present one extra Division in Chanda District and one in Nagpur-Wardha District are proposed to be created. It is estimated that an expenditure of Rs. 65,000 will be incurred on the formation of these two additional Divisions during 1959-60. The cost will be met from the Scheme "Formation of Additional Conservation Circle" Scheme No. 145 for which a provision of Rs. 3,02,000 exists in the sanctioned Plan for the Vidarbha Region.

Remarks.—The existing scales of pay of the posts of Rangers in the Bombay State viz. Rs. 80—5—100—8—140—10—200 for II grade and Rs. 210—10—250 for I grade are not adequate and the reason why sufficient number of candidates for Rangers course are not available is the inadequacy of pay scales. These scales are also low as compared to the scales of pay of Rangers in other States. The question was discussed in the Senior Forest Officers' conference held in August 1957 and the consensus of opinion was that the Bombay scale in the initial stages is extremely unattractive and unless it is suitably revised, it will not be possible to recruit the necessary number of candidates. The conference also recommended that the minimum pay of the scale should be Rs. 140 rising upto Rs. 275 by suitable increments and efficiency bar at different stages. The revision of the pay scales of the posts of Rangers, the minimum of which remains the same as it was in 1920 is thus an extreme necessity. It is therefore proposed to fix the revised scale of pay of Rs. 140—10—200—E.B.—15/2—275 for the posts of all Rangers in the Bombay State in lieu of the existing scales of Rs. 80—5—100—8—140—E.B.—10—200 and Rs. 210—10—250, the extra cost on account of which amoun's to Rs. 2,09,700 for 12 months worked out on the basis of average cost of the pay scale of 279 pos's of Rangers in existence after Reorganisation of the States. The details of the extra cost of Rs. 1,92,225 for 11 months for which a provision during 1959-60 is required are as under:—

Remarks.—A total area of 5,468 square miles of ex-proprietary forests which has been taken over by the Forest Department is to be constituted as Reserved Forests. For this purpose it is necessary to appoint 3 Forest Settlement Officers—(1) One in Nagpur-Wardha and Bhandara Divisions combined, (2) the other for South Chanda Division and (3) the third for East and North Chanda Divisions combined, to enquire into and determine the existing nature and extent of rights, if any, existed on the land to be so constituted as Reserved Forests. As these areas are very large it is not possible for Assistant or Deputy Collectors who are normally appointed as Forest Settlement Officers to undertake the Forest Settlement work in addition to their own duties. Three independent officers as mentioned above are therefore essential. The staff required to be appointed under each of the above 3 Forest Settlement Officers is as follows:—

1 Aval Karkun, 2 Surveyors, 2 Chainmen, 1 Clerk, 2 Peons for the Forest Settlement Officers and 1 Orderly for the Aval Karkun.

The question of creation of these posts during 1958-59 is under consideration. The provision for the year 1959-60 for the scheme is estimated to be Rs. 69,436 as under:—

Remarks.—The present Chhota Udepur Division comprises of Chhota Udepur, Kawant, Jambughoda and Halol Ranges and Sankheda Sub-Range with a jurisdictional area of 1,552 square miles and consists of 362 square miles of Government forests and 115 square miles of private forests, excluding the vast area of teak bearing Revenue lands.

These areas formerly comprised of ex-Chhota Udepur and Jambughoda States and a portion of Baroda State. Till 1st April 1952 these areas, but for the part of Baroda State which was in charge of Vyara Division, were administered by the Gujarat States Division with head quarters at Devghad Baria. While reorganising these areas into Chhota Udepur Sub-Division and then into a Division, it was necessary also to redistribute the Ranges, Rounds and Beats within the Chhota Udepur Division itself, according to the extent of area and intensity of working. This, however, was not done, indeed, two of the Ranges, viz. Jetpur and Karali Ranges in the premerger set up in ex-Chhota Udepur State were straightaway abolished and the portions of Gujarath States Division and Vyara Division were merely consolidated into Chhota Udepur Division after abolishing the above two Ranges. The result was and still is that the areas of Ranges, Rounds and Beats are in excess of the normal size.

3. The whole of Sankheda Mewas estate forests which soon after merger were taken over by Government and constituted as Gadboriad Range with one Range Forest Officer, Four Round Officers and 13 Beat Guards, has had after abolition of the Range, no staff for the control of feeling and general supervision. This vast area full of forests has however been formally attached to Sankheda Sub-Range in charge of Sub-Range Forest Officer, Sankheda of the Forester's rank, in addition to his own duties.

In the light of the above observations it is found necessary to reorganise Chhota-Udepur and Kawant Ranges and Sankheda Sub-Range as follows:—

Remarks.—The Joint Conference of Central and State Statisticians recommended that a District Statistical Officer should be appointed in each district to improve the quality of statistics flowing from District level as well as to look to the statistical work on account of Planning from the District level. The importance of setting up of District Statistical Organisation was further stressed by various committees like the Agricultural Prices Enquiry Committee, etc. even before. Therefore, a scheme for setting up of District Statistical machinery which was prepared after taking into account similar provisions that existed in the various areas of the Bombay State was included in the Second Five-Year Plan. The scheme started functioning from the year 1956-57.

Under the original phasing, 8 offices were to be set up in 1956-57, 8 in 1957-58, 8 in 1958-59, 7 in 1959-60 and 10 in 1960-61. The District of Dangs and Bombay City will be looked after directly from the headquarters and will have no separate District Statistical Offices. However, as a result of the experience gained in the first two years, it was found necessary to accelerate the programme of setting up of District Statistical Offices. Therefore, the target for the year 1958-59 was raised from 8 to 16. Thus, under the revised phasing, 8 offices were to be set up in 1956-57, 8 in 1957-58, 16 in 1958-59 and 9 in 1959-60.

The District Statistical Officers have been entrusted with the task of preparing socio-economic reviews for the entire district as well as expediting the progress reports of the schemes included in the Plan. They are also required to prepare Plan reviews for the districts. In addition, they are giving guidance to the various district officers in the maintenance of statistical records properly so that the quality of the statistics flowing from the disrict level may be improved. The work that has been entrusted to the District Statistical Officers has, thus, been found to be extremely useful, for all the District Offices functioning in the districts.

Up to the end of current year 1958-59, 32 offices have been sanctioned out of which 14 have started functioning so far. The programme envisages 9 offices to be set up in the year 1959-60. Therefore, an amount of Rs. 50,130 has been provided by way of Section I of the New Item for the 9 offices which are proposed to be set up in the year 1959-60 under the phasing envisaged in the Plan. Provision has been made only for four months since sanctions, recruitment, etc. will take considerable time.

Out of an amount of Rs. 50,130, the Government of India will be sharing an amount of Rs. 15,835 being 50 per cent. of the cost of the recurring expenditure.

Remarks.—Under this provision, it is proposed to purchase 2,500 Community Radio Sets, 9 Jeeps and some miscellaneous workshop equipment and furniture during the year 1959-60. The radio sets are supplied by the Government of India at 50 per cent. of cost price (Rs. 125 per set approximately) and are installed and maintained in Villages agreeing to share a part of the installation and maintenance expenditure. Although at the time of the introduction of this "Contributory Scheme" there were some mis-givings about its success the experience has been otherwise. Contribution and applications for sets have been coming in a steadily increasing volume and a stage is rapidly being reached when the number of radio sets provided for, would fall, far short of the actual demand. Added to this, the Community Listening Scheme in the Vidarbha area which was being operated separately so far, has now been amalgamated with the existing State-wide Rural Broadca.ting Scheme. The villages in the Community Development Project and National Extension Service Blocks in the State have also now been brought under the purview of the existing State-wide Scheme of Rural Broadcasting. The demand for radio sets is, therefore, expected to increase very considerably during the next year and the provision of additional 2,500 sets would be essential to meet it.

The jeeps are required for being posted in areas, which have not been provided with vehicles so far, for the expeditious installation and efficient maintenance of the radio sets installed there.

The purchase of some additional testing equipments, machinery and furniture will be necessary to cope with the increased work in connection with the scheme which is expanding from year to year.

Remarks.—After the re-organisation of the State of Bombay there has been manifold increase in the publicity activities with the result that requests for photographs of news of topical interest and photographs pertaining to various development activities from newspapers and other agencies have increased. The expenditure on purchase of photographs has increased from Rs. 8,000 in 1954-55 to Rs. 15,800 in 1957-58. There is no regular photographic section in the Directorate of Publicity and it is now proposed to open one. The functions of this section would briefly cover the following activities:—

- (1) To look after the pictorial publicity in newspapers, periodicals, etc.
- (2) To make pictorial photographs for exhibitions.
- (3) To provide photographs to the periodicals published by the Directorate.
- (4) To prepare photographs of life and people of this State to give fillip to the tourists traffic.
- (5) To maintain a library of photographs and negatives.
- (6) To maintain a catalogue of photos taken and issued.

The establishment of the photographic section would, it is expected facilitate timely and efficient service. It is proposed to make a beginning with a photographer and an Assistant to the photographer with necessary equipments needed for the purpose. Two photographers of the former Madhya Pradesh and Saurashtra States have been allotted to the Directorate and with their allocation and in view of the increasing expenditure on photographs there is real need for the Directorate to have its own photographic section.

Remarks.—At present the schemes for grant of legal assistance to the members of the Scheduled Tribes and Vimukta Jatis in civil proceedings as well as in Criminal proceedings (in non-cognisable cases only) is in operation. Besides these, scheme for grant of free legal assistance to Harijans in civil proceedings has been put into force from 30th August 1958 and scheme for assistance to members of the Scheduled Castes whose annual income does not exceed Rs. 1,800 in civil proceedings or criminal proceedings in non-cognizable cases will be initiated soon. In view of the fact that there are instances of poor persons remaining undefended in Sessions Courts, in cases other than murder cases, in which a pauper pleader is available, in the mofussil, it has been proposed to extend free legal assistance to poor accused persons, whose income does not exceed Rs. 1,800 per annum, in Sessions cases in the mofussil. The figures of Sessions cases in which accused were undefended are 295, 241, 149 for the years 1955, 1956 and up to August 1957 respectively. None of the previous schemes provided for legal assistance in cognizable cases which is now contemplated under the present scheme.

A provision of Rs. 21,574 will be necessary for extending the scheme to the whole of the Bombay State.

The scheme for grant of free legal assistance to undefended poor accused persons in Sessions Courts in the mofussil has not been included in the State Second Five-Year Plan. However as the scheme will benefit all areas of the State it has been proposed to treat it as plan scheme from 1959-60 and to include in the overall ceiling allocated for Social Welfare Schemes.

The merits of various proposals made by Principal Port Officer and Engineer, Bombay State, for these ports have been examined. It is absolutely necessary to undertake above mentioned works during 1959-60. The detailed justification for each item is given below:—

Item (1)—Extension of First Class passenger shed at Dabhol.—Passenger-Ships reach late in the evening and most of passengers have to wait at port overnight. It is necessary to provide adequate facilities for accommodating-First Class Passengers as existing accommodation is not sufficient.

Item (2)—Improving waiting shed and repairs to approach road at Murud.—Passengers are experiencing difficulties without proper shed as daily steamer service call at odd-hours at day and night at this port. The existing shed is not in good condition and requires repairs to flooring, windows, and extension, etc. It is also considered necessary to widen and improve appraoch roads to the port to facilitate the traffic.

Item (3)—Purchase of 5 barges at various Ports.—As there are no lighterage facilities at various ports mentioned above it is considered necessary to equip these ports by providing requisite barges for lighterage purposes.

Compulsion as in the past is to apply progressively to the children of the age range 7-8, 7-9, 7-10 and 7-11 so that, during the period of four years, children of the age-range 7-11 in the places concerned would have been brought under compulsion. However, the question of extending the scheme of compulsion to the age group 7-10 during the third year of the Plan has been deferred to the year 1959-60.

It is, therefore, proposed to extend the scheme of compulsion to the age group 7-10 in the fourth year of the Plan, i.e., in 1959-60 which involves the appointment of 1,770 teachers including the teachers required for normal development. The total cost on this account is estimated at Rs. 14,59,365. Out of this amount, an amount of Rs. 4,23,215 will be found by the Community Development Projects and National Extension Service Administration from the budgets of Community Development Blocks. Under the Government of India Scheme for relief to educated unemployed and expension of primary education, the Government of India have sanctioned, 2,000 teachers for the State of Bombay for 1959-60. A part of this allotment will be utilized towards compulsion scheme in Bombay Region. It is, therefore, proposed to provide an amount of Rs. 2,25,000 in the budget for 1959-60.

Remarks.—The Polytechnics at Sholapur and Karad are yet in developmental stage. These Polytechnics are, therefore, required to be further equipped in respect of staff, equipment and furniture as indicated below:—

Government Polytechnic, Sholapur.—This Polytechnic which has been started from June 1956. has an anunal intake capacity of 60 students (20 each of Civil, Mechanical and Electrical Engineering) Although it was projected to increase the annual intake at this Polytechnic from 60 to 120 from June 1958. it was not possible to do so during the current academic year tiz. 1958-59 in the absence of physical facilities, especially of accommodation. Since the problem of accommodation has now eased to some extent, it has been proposed to increase the intake of this Polytechnic from 60 to 120 with effect from June 1959 and has therefore to be provided with equipment and furniture of about Rs. 80,000 during the next year, for the training of the diploma students.

Government Polytechnic, Karad.—This Polytechnic has started functioning from June 1957, and will enter the 3rd and final year of its development during the course of the next academic year. The admissions to this Polytechnic which has an intake capacity of 120 students (60 Civil and 30 each for Mechanical and Electrical Engineering) were restricted to Civil Engineering only during the year 1957-58 for want of sufficient accommodation. Admissions were, however, made in full during the current year only. The Polytechnic will, therefore, be having 120 students each for the 1st and 2nd year and 60 students for the 3rd year diploma course in Civil Engineering. It is necessary to provide additional staff as shown in Appendix "A" and equipment and furniture worth Rs. 80,000 during the next year.

It is therefore proposed to provide a sum of Rs. 2,02,000 in the budget for 1959-60.

Remarks.—The Regional School of Printing Technology, Bombay, is at present catering for only one course viz. Letter Press Printing with an annual intake capacity of 25 students. Although the scheme of establishment of this school envisages the starting of various courses in the Printing Technology, it has not been possible so far to start any additional course for want of accommodation.

The construction of the ground floor of the new building of the school is now completed and the school will in all probability be in a position to occupy this floor by the beginning of the next year. It is, therefore, proposed to start the course in Lithography and Offset printing with an annual intake capacity of 25 students with effect from June 1959. It is, therefore, necessary to provide the school with one Lecturer in Litho and Offset printing in the B. E. S. Class II scale of Rs. 200—650 from June 1959. The expenditure on this account is estimated at R: 2,610.

It is also necessary to provide a sum of Rs. 75,000 for purchase of equipment and furniture.

It is, therefore, proposed to make a provision of Rs. 77,610 in the budget estimates for 1959-60.

Remarks.—In pursuance of the Government policy of providing each District of the Old Bombay State with a Technical High School, all the Districts of the Old Bombay State (excepting Dangs and South Satara) have been provided with at least one Technical High School. Although all these schools are now full-fledged, they have yet to be provided with adequate equipment and furniture. It is, therefore, proposed to provide a sum of Rs. 75,000 for purchase of equipment and furniture.

Industrial-cum-Technical High School, Satara;
 Technical High School, Thana; and

(3) Technical High School, Baroda.

Remarks.—The Technical course at the Government Multipurpose High Schools, at Nagpur and Akola has been introduced during the current year only by converting one division of Standard IX into a Technical division. Although the former Madhya Pradesh Government had sanctioned skeleton staff for the Technical course at these schools, this course could not be introduced earlier for want of accommodation. The course has now been started from the year 1958-59 by arranging for the Technical instruction at the Government Vocational High Schools at these places. It is now proposed to arrange for the Technical training of students at the Government Multipurpose High Schools, Nagpur and Akola, with effect from the next academic year. It is also necessary to bring the pattern of the staff for the Technical course on the lines of the staff for the Government Technical High Schools obtaining in the old Bombay State. It is therefore necessary to sanction the staff as detailed in Appendix "A" for each of these two multipurpose High Schools with effect from June, 1959. These schools are also required to be provided with adequate equipment for instructional purpose, the expenditure on account of which is estimated at Rs. 30,000 for each of these schools. It is, therefore, proposed to make provision of Rs. 75,000 in the budget estimates for 1959-60.

Remarks.—The former Hyderabad Government had sanctioned the introduction of Technical course at the Government Multipurpose High Schools at Nanded and Aurangabad. This course has accordingly been introduced at these schools from June 1957 and June 1958 respectively by converting one division of Standard IX into a Technical Division, and will respectively be in the III (i.e., final) and 2nd year of their development during the next academic year. As no staff for the Technical course was sanctioned by the former Hyderabad Government, the instruction in Technical subjects is arranged by the staffs of the Technical Training Centres, Nanded and Government Polytechnic, Aurangabad. As however, this is not a sound arrangement, it is proposed to conduct the Technical training at the Multipurpose High Schools themselves from June 1959. Remarks.—The question as to how to extend educational facilities in the rural areas specially with regard to Middle Schools and High Schools was discussed at the Second National Level Seminar on Education, Social Education etc. held at Gwalior and Group I (Education) of the seminar had recommended that some educational machinery was necessary for picking up the brightest children in rural areas with a view to provide them education up to the University stage at Government cost. Keeping this recommendation in view it is proposed that really brilliant students in rural areas should be awarded scholarships. The amounts of scholarships proposed to be awarded are Rs. 15 per mensem at the Middle School stage, Rs. 25 per mensem at the High School stage and Rs. 50 per mensem at the Collegiate Stage. Remarks.—The All India Council of Technical Education had recommended the establishment of three additional polytechnics in the State out of 27 proposed. This is a "Centrally sponsored" scheme and the Government of India will pay Central Assistance at the rate of 50 per cent. of the recurring and non-recurring expenditure. It is therefore absolutely essential to provide a sum of Rs. 5,00,000 by State Government as the expenditure on the scheme is initially to be debited to the State budget. One Polytechnic will be established at Bombay and the location of the remaining two will be decided later on.

It is proposed to provide a sum of Rs. 5,00,000 in the budget estimates for 1959-60.

Remarks.—The University of Delhi has proposed to provide facilities for teaching the languages of Marathi and Gujarati and to arrange for making available data and information in the cultural literature associated with these two languages. For this purpose the University will have to appoint Lecturers and Readers in the Languages of Marathi and Gujarati. The cost involved on this account as per the estimates framed by the University works out to Rs. 40,000 per annum. The University will also have to provide for non-recurring expenditure on account of equipment, literature, language material etc. The step in this direction will help not only in promoting emotional integration of India but also in making available at the capital city of India facilities both to students and the general public to get acquainted with the culture of these two languages, and at the same time provide facilities for persons speaking these languages who join the University, to remain in contact with their own languages. It is therefore, proposed to pay an annual grant of Rs. 20,000 to the University of Delhi for appointment of the additional staff and a non-recurring grant of Rs. 50,000 for purchase of books, equipment etc. Accordingly, it is proposed to make a provision of Rs. 70,000 in the Budget Estimates for 1959-60.

Remarks.—Out of the 20 Ashram Schools proposed to be opened under the Second Five-Year Plan for the promotion of the education of the Scheduled Tribes, 13 Ashram Schools will have been started by the end of 1958-59 (2 Ashram Schools in the year 1956-57. Five Ashram Schools in the year 1957-58 and 6 Ashram Schools proposed to be started in the year 1958-59). In addition to these, two Ashram Schools, one at Talawada and the other at Chaswad have been expended in the year 1956-57 by admitting 30 inmates over and above maximum strength of 120 inmates in them during that year. The underlying idea was that the expansion of these Ashram Schools should be in lieu of opening of Additional Ashram Schools during that year. It is proposed to open 5 new Ashram Schools during the year 1959-60. The Ashram Schools will be started through the voluntary agencies and a grant will be sanctioned to them at 90 per cent, of the recurrent expenditure and 100 per cent. of the non-recurrent expenditure. The cost on account of five Ashram Schools is estimated at Rs. 1,85,000 (Rs. 35,000 recurrent and Rs. 1,50,000 non-recurrent). It is, therefore, proposed to provide a sum of Rs. 1,85,000 in the budget for the year 1959-60 for this measure. A grant of Rs. 93,000 is expected from the Government of India.

Region. An Anti—T. B. Clinic Centre has been established by Government at the Medical College and Hospital Nagpur under the 2nd Five Year Plan for which Government had sanctioned 10 posts of Health Visitors but the services of the qualified Health Visitors could not be secured. The Dean, Medical College Hospital had, therefore, appoined untrained personnel in the vacancies of Health Visitors and trained them at the Anti—T. B. Clinic Centre at the Medical College and Hospital, Nagpur for service under the Anti—T. B. Project. From the figures of the new cases diagnosed as tuberculars and the figures of the patients undergoing treatment it is revealed that the number of T. B. Cases are increasing in the Districts of the Vidarbha Region. It is, therefore, essential in the interest of the population to train additional Health Visitor and to appoint them at the District Hospitals for rendering treatment to the T. B. Patients at their homes. In the new approach of control of Tuberculosis the Health. Visitors services are ever increasing in the recent devlopment of Tuberculosis control programme. It is therefore proposed to train 15 additional Health Visitors in tuberculosis at the Anti—T. B. Centre at the Medical College and Hospital, Nagpur and to appoint them at the District; Government Hospitals for service. It is essential to appoint a qualified Public Health Nurse for the training of the Health Visitors at the Anti-T. B. Centre Medical College Hospital, Nagpur.

The proposal will involve an extra expenditure of Rs. 28,117 during the year 1959-60 and an ultimate annual recurring expenditure of Rs. 47,636 during the subsequent years as shown below. The extra expenditure involved in the proposal will be met from the five years, allocation of the scheme of establishment of Anti-T. B. Centre at the Medical College and Hospital, Nagpur, included in the 2nd Five-Year Plan.

Remarks.—It has been recommended that the bed strength of the DistrictHead Quarter Hospital at Akola be increased by 75 beds in the Second Five-Year Plan under Scheme No.543 and that there should be provision for higher and specialised medical services. It is, therefore, proposed to increase 75 beds at the Main Hospital, Akola. Full time specialists will also be appointed for the branches of surgery intended to be opened here. Thus the increase in beds will provide extension and specialised medical services to the patients and will remove the existing shortage of beds in that district. It has been decided to start three types of specialities.

(1) Anaesthetists, (2) Paediatrics and (3) Orthopaedics. The distribution of beds will be as follows:—

Remarks.—From a rough survey and from statistics available it is found that there are many leprosy patients in the State and the accommodation available for them at present is quite inadequate in the existing hospitals. It is, therefore, proposed to establish leprosy subsidiary centres in the endemic areas in the State during the Second Five-Year Plan period whereby treatment could be given in the very early stage of the disease in order to avoid its spread and reduce the demand on additional hospital accommodation. It is proposed to establish six such centres in the Bombay State during 1959-60. The Central Subsidy for the centres is available on the following basis:—

- I. 100 per cent. of the non-recurring expenditure subject to the limit of Rs. 16,200 (Rs. 15,000 for van and Rs. 1,200 for cycles).
- II. 80 per cent. of the recurring expenditure for the 1st year.
 - 70 per cent. of the recurring expenditure for the 2nd year.
 - 50 per cent. of the recurring expenditure for the 3rd year.
 - 30 per cent. of the recurring expenditure for the 4th year.
 - 20 per cent. of the recurring expenditure for the 5th year.
- III. The balance of the recurring expenditure during the Plan period and the salaries of local staff if appointed will be borne by State Government.

The State Government will continue the operation of the centre after financial assistance from the Government of India ceases.

It is proposed to start the centres from September 1959 as other preliminaries such as purchase of equipment, etc., will not be completed till then.

The proposal involves a recurring and non-recurring expenditure of Rs. 1,73,592 and Rs. 1,50,000 respectively, the details and classification of which are given below:—

Remarks.—It has been observed that there is high percentage of incidence of T. B. amongst the insured persons in Bombay. This is also proved from the attendance at the Diagnostic Centres and different Hospitals recognised under the Scheme. In order, therefore, to augment facilities in this regard so as to provide reliable diagnostic service and also to develop home visiting and domicillary treatment service to Insured Persons, it is found essential to establish T. B. Clinics at the Diagnostic Centres in Bombay City the function of which will be as under:—

- (1) Diagnostic Service including X-Ray, Laboratory and Clinical Section.
- (2) Facilities for Isolation and treatment of infected cases.
- (3) Preventive Section including propaganda and education.

In order to establish these Centres sufficient and suitable space to accommodate all the departments, equipment and additional staff etc. is necessary. The existing Diagnostic Centres are at present located in the premises of Government Hospitals and hired buildings and as the T. B. Clinics are to be attached to the Diagnostic Centres, it will not be possible to accommodate both the Diagnostic Centres and T. B. Clinics in the present premises. The proposal was, therefore, reviewed with reference to the staff etc., at the Diagnostic Centres at present with due regard to the requirements of the T. B. Clinics. The following additional staff and other expenditure is proposed for establishment of 5 T. B. Clinics attached to the Diagnostic Centres under the Scheme:—

Remarks.—In order to improve the standard of treatment of patients and teaching at Government Medical Colleges and Hospitals attached thereto at Bombay, Poona, Ahmedabad and Baroda, a scheme to convert the existing Honorary posts into full time posts has been included in the Second Five Year Plan. Rs. 10,00,000 have been earmarked in the Plan for this scheme. It is proposed to create one fulltime Unit for each of the Major subjects of (1) Medicine, (2) Surgery and (3) Midwifery and Gynaecology at each Medical College Hospital at Bombay, Poona, Ahmedabad and Baroda. In all 24 full time posts are to be created during the Plan period. In view of the limited funds available in the Second Five Year Plan for this scheme, the scheme will be spread over a period of 4 years. The scheme has been implemented at Poona and Baroda during 1957–58 and at Ahmedabad during 1958–59. It is proposed to be introduced in Bombay during 1959–60. Accordingly it is proposed to create full time Unit for Major subjects of (1) Medicine, (2) Surgery and (3) Midwifery and Gynaecology at the Grant Medical College and J. J. Group of Hospitals, Bombay during the year 1959–60. The scales of pay and allowances proposed for the senior posts and their assistants are the same as are sanctioned for the posts of professors and Lecturers at Government Medical Colleges. The incumbents of these posts will be debarred from private practice of all kinds and will be paid compensatory allowance in lieu thereof at the rate sanctioned for Professors and Lecturers.

The proposal involves a recurrent expenditure of Rs. 61,578 during 1959-60 and ultimate annual recurrent expenditure of Rs. 82,440 as shown below:—

Remarks.—In view of the expansion of the V. D. programme for the control of V. D. in the Second Five-Year Plan, necessity of trained personnel is deeply felt to meet the requirements of skilled man power to implement the various schemes. A training centre for V. D. workers has been established in the Safdarganj Hospital, New Delhi which gives intensive refresher course to the staff which is required to work for V. D. Department. Looking to the need of such centre, it is proposed to establish such training centre in the J. J. Group of Hospitals, Bombay. There are four honorary medical Officers on staff of the V. D. Department of J. J. Group of Hospitals, Bombay. They are fully qualified and experienced specialists. The proposed training centre, besides training Medical Officers, will also provide facilities for training of nurses, social workers, laboratory technicians and serologists. For this training centre it is necessary to provide following additional staff and other expenditure for the V. D. Department of J. J. Group of Hospitals, Bombay.

As regards non-recurring expenditure, an amount of Rs. 65,035 will be required for purchase of equipment furniture etc. During the year 1959-60 an amount of Rs. 34,752 will be needed for staff referred to above and Rs. 6,783 for Contingencies, besides non-recurring expenditure of Rs. 65,035 thus in all, an amount of Rs. 1,06,570 is required to be provided during 1959-60 for the above Scheme.

To combat the above difficulties, it is proposed to santion the following proposals:-

- (a) The T. B. Demonstration and Training Centre at Nagpur should be made directly responsible to the Deputy Director of Medical Services, Nagpur.
- (b) The Medical Officers should preferably be recruited from young B. M. S. Class II Officers possessing T. D. D. qualifications. It will be difficult to get young well qualified persons to work as B. M. S. Class II Officers at the Centre unless they are adequately paid. It has been found that generally even the candidates selected for B. M. S. Class I posts are not willing to join these appointments on a starting salary of Rs. 300 per mensem, the probationary stage of the B. M. S. class I scale. There is difficulty in getting candidates to work a B. M. S. Class II Officers having the special qualification of T. D. D. for filling the posts on the minimum of the scals. It is therefore proposed that the following scale of pay and allowances may be given to the officers mentioned below:—

Remarks.—The Government of India has formulated a scheme for the grant of assistance to State Governments for the establishment of T. B. Isolation beds in various Hospitals, Sanatoria etc., for the segration of advanced T. B. cases in which chances of recovery are less bright. The proposed isolation of advanced T. B. Patients will result in the release of existing beds in T. B. Hospitals which can more appropriately be used for institutional treatment of curable patients. Under this Scheme, the Government of India proposes to subscribe a part of non-recurring cost in the establishment of such beds. Construction for accommodating these beds which are to be of a simple and cheap-type is intended to be provided in or near the city and would primarily be meant for those patients living in unhygienic houses for whom domicilliary services or isolation facilities in their houses are not possible. The isolation beds are proposed to be put up as annexes to existing Institutions or in new institutions that may be set up for the purpose. It is estimated that the non-recurring cost will be Rs. 2,500 (including the cost of building and equipment) and the recurring cost of Rs. 1,250 per bed per annum. The Government of India will pay subsidy at the rate of 50 per cent. of the non-recurring expenditure subject to a maximum of Rs. 1,250 per bed after the beds are established.

It is accordingly proposed to establish 50 T. B. Isolation beds to be attached to the Hospital for Diseases of the Chest, Camp Aundh and the Civil Hospital, Ahmedabad during 1959-60. Necessary accommodation for the beds is available at the Hospitals. The expenditure involved is as under:—

Remarks—At present there is a very small mental hospital at Bhavnagar in Saurashtra consisting of 18 beds only which not only remains always full but many patients have to be refused admission for want of accommodation with the result that some of the patients had to be directed to Mental Hospital outside Saurashtra and hence it has been proposed to establish a new 50-bedded Mental Hospital at Jamnagar.

Necessary additions and alterations to the building proposed to be utilised for the Hospital are being carried out by the P. W. D. and the building will be ready for use by the end of current financial year i.e. 1958-59. It is now proposed to provide for the following staff for this hospital in the budget estimates of 1959-60.

Ward equipment was already been purchased by the former Government of Saurashtra. Only mattresses and bed linen will have to be purchased for 50 patients at an estimated cost of Rs. 4,000 and kitchen articles will also have to be purchased at an estimated cost of Rs. 500. It is, therefore, proposed to provide the amount of Rs. 4,500 for the above purpose.

Remarks.—A large proportion of Community Health services are devoted to children because they are more easily affected by adverse conditions of environment, hygiene and food. The physician of the to-day must be well qualified in preventive and social paediatrics as well as in the treatment of children. The Physician should also have sound knowledge of Health Education to assist teachers in the health of school children and to impart such knowledge of Health education as would enable the child to actively participate in his own as well as the community Health Service

The existing provisions for teaching of paediatrics in the Colleges are not adequate. The Government of India has therefore, formulated a scheme in their Second Five-Year Plan under centrally aided Health Schemes for the establishment of Paediatric Centres in the Medical Colleges and their attached Hospitals. As such proper and adequate facilities are not available for such training in Bombay State, it is proposed to establish one Paediatric Centre attached to the J. J. Hospital and Grant Medical College, Bombay with the help of Central assistance.—

Remarks.—There are 20 posts of Housemen and 10 of Registrars at the M. P. Shah Medical College, Jamnagar. Appointments to these posts are required to be made from candidates studying for post-graduate courses. As, however, there are no post-graduate courses yet started at the M. P. Shah Medical College, Jamnagar, no condidates are available for these posts, with the result that the work at the College and the Hospital suffers. It is, therefore, proposed to create 15 posts of Medical Officers (non-Gazetted) at the College and the Hospital in the scale of Rs. 180—10—300—E. B.—15—450 (Mofussil) plus the usual allowances as a temporary measure, i. e. till post graduate courses are started at the College and candidates become available for appointment as Housemen and Registrars, when those posts will be revised.

The expenditure involved in the proposal during 1959-60 would be Rs. 53,280 and on average basis it would be Rs. 1,34,280 per annum. The expenditure will be met from the provision included in the Second Five-Year Plan for the scheme of additional staff, equipment, additions, etc. for the existing medical institutions.

Remarks.—There are in all 17 Ayurvedic Schemes included in the Second Five-Year Plan and several non-plan schemes of the Ayurvedic Department. Out of 17 plan schemes 4 are Centrally sponsored schemes. According to the instructions from G vernment registers are required to be maintained for watching the progress of expenditure of the plan schemes as well as that of Centrally sponsored, and several returns and reports such as quarterly and annual reports with detailed notes on the progress of the schemes are required to be submitted to Government in the Political and Services Department, Local Self-Government and Public Health Department, Bureau of Economics, Accountant General, Bombay. Reports required by the Man-power Committee regarding assessment of requirements of technical and non-technical posts during the plan period and the next third Five-Year Plan, are also required to be sent often whenever called for. Returns and reports regarding claiming central assistance are also required to be submitted to Government after verifying the expenditure with reference to Treasury Vouchers etc. with progress reports. Moreover, several schemes of development are required to be formulated for being implemented in the remaining period of the Second Five-Year Plan and inclusion in the Third Five-Year Plan. The existing arrangement of distributing this work to 2 Clerks in addition to several other subjects is inadequate and hence unsatisfactory and the requirements of the Planning Section of the Political and Services Department, Local Self-Government and Public Health Department, Finance Department, and Bureau of Economics etc., are not complied with in time nor the plan schemes are being implimented properly with the result that several schemes of this Department are behind schedule. This office is finding it difficult to carry on the work pertaining to the Second Five-Year Plan and non-plan schemes with the existing inadequate staff. It is also not possible for this office to frame or plan several schemes of development such as opening of new Ayurvedic Hospitals, Dispensaries, Colleges, instituting courses for Ayurvedic Compounders, Ayurvedic Nurses, opening of grant-in-aid dispensaries, opening of new S. M. P. Centres, Schemes of Ayurvedic research, establishment of Pharmacies, appointment of District Inspectors etc., for the vast area of the new Bombay State for inclusion in the Third Five-Year Plan.

In view of the above, it is quite essential to open a separate Planning Section in this Directorate for the proper, efficient and prompt disposal of plan-work and systematic and timely implementation of plan-schemes and framing of Third Five-Year Plan. The following staff is therefore considered absolutely essential to cope up with the increased volume of work of the plan and non-plan schemes. Moreover Government have also suggested to the Officers of Departments to have a separate Planning Branch in the Head Offices for the proper and efficient implementation of the Plan Schemes and called for proposals for the same.

Remarks.—The Government Ayurvedic College, which was opened at Nanded on 15th August 1956 under the Second Five-Year Plan, is now running its third year and will enter into 4th year during 1959-60. As there was no Ayurvedic Hospital attached to this College to fulfil the requirements of providing of facilities for clinical training to the students of the Ayurvedic College, Nanded, Government have sanctioned the establishment of a 50 beded Ayurvedic Hospital at Nanded.

The Hospital started functioning during the year 1957-58 and it is experienced that the staff sanctioned for it is quite inadequate for the smooth running of the hospital including the O. P. D. Besides this, the arrangements for practical clinical training in Dentistry, Surgery and Midwifery, etc., which are wanting, are to be made at this hospital from 1959-60, as the College will enter the fourth year and the arrangements for clinical training of the 4th year students in Surgery, Dentistry, etc., are required to be made. Hence the staff proposed below is quite. Similarly, it is considered that all the above said arrangements cannot be made within the existing bed strength i.e. 50 beds sanctioned by Government for this hospital and hence it is proposed to increase at least 25 beds for the present and raise the total beds strength of this hospital to 75.

Remarks.—The Board of Research in Ayurveda, Bombay, was first constituted in August, 1951 and since then it is engaged in the work of carrying out research in Ayurveda. Its work is divided into different sections like the section for the preparation of Text Books, that for clinical research for the standardization of drugs, etc. The Board is also entrusted with the work of co-ordinating research work done in the various Ayurvedic Teaching Institutes and Hospitals in the State. In order to enable the Board to carry on its activities, Government pays grant-in-aid to it every year. A provision of Rs. 1,15,000 on account of payment of grant to the Board during 1959-60, is, therefore proposed for inclusion in the next year's budget.

Remarks.—Shuddha Ayurvedic Vidyalayas in the State impart training for the Diploma Course in Shuddh-Ayurved known as Ayurved Pravin. This course has been prescribed by the Committee for Shuddha Ayurvedic Course, Bombay. The students of these Vidyalayas are given practical training in the hospitals attached to them. Government pays grant every year to these Vidyalayas to enable them to carry on their activities. Recently, the jurisdiction of the Committee for Shuddha Ayurvedic Centre has been extended so as to cover the areas which have come over to the Bombay State. More and more Vidyalayas in these areas will, therefore, be affiliated to the Committee. A provision of Rs. 1,50,000 on account of payment of grant to these Vidyalayas is, therefore, proposed for inclusion in the budget for 1959-60.

Remarks.—The District of Ratnagiri has a population of 1,711,964. There are no training centres for Nurses and Midwives in this District. With the establishment of a training centre for Auxiliary Nursing and Midwifery at the Civil Hospital, Ratnagiri, it will be possible for the women/girls who are reluctant to leave the District and who possess limited basic education i. e. who have completed seven standards of schooling, to take this training near their homes and return back to the taluka/village after qualifying and practice as midwives in the same areas.

There are in this area 174 Hospital beds for women including maternity beds where 2682 deliveries were conducted in 1957.

As on an average of 30 births taking place per thousand of the population, a very large proportion of domicillary midwifery is carried out by indigenous dais greatly endangering the lives of mothers and infants. Lack of siklled service by qualified midwives plays an important part in preventing high rates of maternalmortality and infantile deaths in the first month of birth. With the plan of establishment of the Primary Health Units, as it is being implemented, it would be possible to cover only a limited percentage of the pouplation. These women/girls of the District who will qualify as Auxiliary nurses midwives will thus also be rendering domicile midwifery service in the villages.

It is, therefore, proposed to undertake the training of 15 girls in Auxiliary Nursing and Midwifery at the Civil Hospital, Ratnagiri.

The proposal will involve an extra expenditure of Rs. 19,000 during the year 1959-60 and Rs. 29,354 as ultimate annual recurring expenditure on an average basis as shown below:—

Remarks-

Sisters 3.—This Hospital has no post of sister. All the work including the theatre work is managed by the staff.

Nurses. The bed strength of this Hospital is 138 and according to the usual ratio of one sister's post for a Unit
of 40-50 beds, this Hospital should have 3 sisters.

Staff Nurses 5.—According to the requirements of the Nursing Education Programme in the Medical and Public Health field, this Hospital must have in all 11 staff nurses, while it has 6 staff Nurses and hence five more are very necessary. Provision for 5 staff Nurses is made.

House Keeper 1.—This Hospital, being a teaching centre, has a hostel for the pupil Nurses. For the present hostel is managed by the pupil Nurses, under the Supervision of the Nursing Superintendent. The Nursing Superintendent has very little time to supervise the work of the Hospital. Hence a House keeper is very essential for the Nurses Hostel. Provision for the House Keeper is made.

Social Welfare Worker 1.—There is no post of Social welfare worker in this Hospital. It has being experienced that patients and their relatives, especially these coming from villages are at a loss to know where to inquire and get the required information and help for getting proper treatment. All technical staff being busy with their work are not easily available to these new comers. A social Welfare worker can work in a sort of inquiry office at the Gate and advise all these needing help, thereby saving them lot of trouble and hence one post of Social welfare worker is very essential. Provision for one Social Welfare worker is made.

Laboratory Technician 1.—There is no post of laboratory technician and work has to be sent to the Main Hospital, Akola. There is plenty of pathological work to be done, so provision for one laboratory Technician is made.

Midwife 1.—One post of Midwife has been sanctioned. One more is required for the night as this is Maternity Hospital and hence provision is made for one Midwife.

Compounder 1.—This Hospital is a class I Hospital and accordingly this Hospital should have 5 compounders. For the present there are 2 compounders and hence provision for one more compounder is made as it is very essential.

Store-Clerk 1.—There is no Clerical Assistant to the Nursing Superintendent. She is in charge of all Stores except Medicine and also all the trainees are under her charge this being a training Centre. She has to maintain all detail records of the Pupil nurses. So one Store Clerk is very essential for the Nursing Superintendent and hence provision for one Store Clerk is made.

Ward Attendants 9.—The Present Female Ward Attendants are 8 and 6 more are sanctioned but according to bed strength of 138 and as per the ratio 1:6 of ward Attendant to Patients, total numbr should be 23 and hence provision for 9 more is made to maintain the cleanliness of the Wards.

Female Sweepers 7.—According to the ratio of 1:8 for Female Sweepers to patients, there should be in all 17 Female Sweepers. There are at present 6 Female Sweepers and 4 more are sanctioned. Hence provision for 7 is made.

Dhobi 1.—For the present there are only two Dhobis and they have to wash clothes five times in a week which ought to be two times in a week. Hence one more Dhobi is very essential to reduce the burden of the present Dhobis. Hence provision is made for one more Dhobi.

Watermen 2.—There are no servants for the Nurses Hostel and cleaning and sweeping of the rooms are carried out by the Pupil nurses and hence two watermen are very essential for the nurses hostel and hence provision for two watermen are made.

The provision for 3 months works out as below:—

Remarks.—The present sanctioned bed strength of Mayo Hospital, Nagpur, is 309 and daily average beds occupied are now above 475.

There are only 30 wards boys, 5 ayas and 47 sweepers for out-patients departments, various wards, Operation theatre and other departments which are scattered over a compound of 44 acres. This number falls short of actual requirements for day and night duties. Patients cannot therefore be looked after properly. In order that patients get prompt service, it is essential that the number of ward boys and sweepers is increased 20 wards boys and 20 sweepers are considered absolutely essential.

There are only six dhobis for the Hospital for more than 475 patients. The increased work of washing clothes justifies appointment of two more dhobis.

There are only 6 cooks for the dieted patients which is on an average at present 375 per day. There are no Assistant Cooks or Machalchis to help them. It is therefore absolutely essential to provide for 3 more cooks to cope with the increased number of diets.

There is an ambulance car attached to the Mayo Hospital for conveyance of patients to the city and to the adjoining tahsils and districts. There is only one ambulance driver. There is at present no cleaner who could clean the car and accompany the abmulance driver on his trips in the city and in tahsils for conveyance of the patients. It is therefore absolutely essential to provide for one cleaner.

Remarks.—New training centres for the Auxiliary Nurse-Midwives Course in Government Hospitals of Old Bombay State as well as in the other parts of the former States which have been added to the State are being opened with the financial assistance from Government of India. The Government of India have made a provision of Rs. 10 lakhs in the budget estimates for the year 1958-59 in order to provide, Central Assistance to the State Government Institutions participating in the Scheme. Government of India is anxious that the training units should be albe to train 6,000 additional auxiliary Nurse-midwives during the Second Five-Year Plan and they have therefore requested the State Government to train maximum number of candidates in each training centre.

Government have already sanctioned the number of students for the Auxiliary Nurse-Midwives Courses as shown against the name of the Institutions mentioned below. Remarks.—In order to develop an overall nutritional programme in the State, especially in the areas of Vidarbha, Saurashtra and Marathwada, it is essential to study the dietary trends and the nutritional status of selected population groups in these areas.

The main activities of the Department of Nutrition are to carry out research into the various problems of human nutrition and dietetics, assess the state of nutrition of different population groups, improve community nutrition and advise the Government in matters relating to the subject. In addition, the Department offers liasion service in UNICEF Skim Milk Distribution Schemes in the State.

At present, there is no staff earmarked in the three areas mentioned above to develop such activities. It is essential that the nutrition services organised and developed in the old Bombay State are also extended immediately to these areas. To achieve this object, it is necessary to create one Nutrition Unit each at Nagpur, Rajkot and Aurangabad, on a permanent basis. Each Unit will consist of one Medical Officer (B. M. S. Class II), one Senior Lady Nutritionist, one Clerk-Typist and one Peon.

The present staff of the Department is not adequate to undertake these additional activities since only the minimum Staff, was sanctioned when the Department was first created in 1949 for the old Bombay State. When once these Units are established, they will also help in Co-ordinating the work connected with the UNICEF Skim Milk Distribution Schemes in these areas. At present the UNICEF schemes are looked after by both the Medical and Public Health Departments and there is no uniformity in the operation of these schemes.

Remarks.—In view of the increase in work, both qualitatively and quantitatively and in view of the fast expanding administration, it is proposed to re-organise the Drugs Laboratory, Baroda. After the merger of the former Baroda State, the two laboratories, the Drugs Laboratory and the Excise Laboratory—were combined to constitute the Drugs Laboratory, Baroda and the following technical staff was sanctioned:—

The staff of the former Baroda Drugs Laboratory and the Excise Laboratory was absorbed in the above posts.

The Baroda Drugs Laboratory continued to do the alcohol certification work but due to ever increasing Prohibition work, the staff of the Laboratory could not cope up with Excise work, resulting in the accumulation of samples and considerable delays in reporting. Similarly, the Laboratory which was planned to analyse samples sent by one Drugs Inspector has not been able to cope with the work, as a result of the re-organisation of the States and sanctioning of additional posts of Drugs Inspectors in the Northern Division. This has also resulted in accumulation of work and delays in reporting the samples. To clear up the arrears, on two occasions, temporary additional staff was sanctioned, but that has not solved the problem. Further it has become incumbent on the Excise Section to test not only the alcohol content but also for the medicinal ingredients and, therefore, the number of samples that can be tested by the existing staff has also been considerably reduced.

It is, therefore, proposed to increase the staff of the Drugs Laboratory, Baroda by creating the additional post given below:—

Remarks.—With a view to speed up the progress of the Plan Schemes it is proposed to have a separate section in the Surgeon General's Office in charge of a senior officer where the work of various plan scheme can be co-ordinated. There is already a small section (one branch) which is entrusted with the work of Second Five-Year Plan Schemes. This staff is quite inadequate considering the magnitude of the Second Five-Year Plan of this Medical Department which costs about Rs. 9 crores and which consists of 75 major schemes. The work of the Plan Schemes involves amongst other things the initial examination, planning and formulation of each scheme in detail and later its execution. In addition to this there is a constant work of collection of statistics, information and data for different periodical reports, their tabulation, compilation and consolidation. The following staff is, therefore, qu te essential if the work in connection with the Second Five-Year Plan schemes is to be done expeditiously and satisfactorily.

The proposal involves a recurring expenditure of Rs. 33,506 as detailed below:—

Remarks.—Under their centrally sponsored Health Scheme No. 17 regarding establishment of full-time teaching units in the clinical and non-clinical departments at Medical Colleges, the Government of India have offered to bear the full extra expenditure incurred by Governments in establishing such full-time teaching units in their colleges. The Government of India's assistance would however, be restricted for the present to the Second Five Year Plan period and is subject to the condition that the scales of pay and allowances of teachers are revised to the rates proposed by them. The extra expenditure after the Second Five Year Plan period may have to be borne by the State Government. The statement below shows the existing scales sanctioned by the Government of Bombay and those proposed by the Government of India.

As a first step towards the implementation of the scheme, the Government of India have advised this Government to revise the scales of pay and allowances of the existing full-time posts, the question of converting the Honorary teaching units into full-time teaching units being taken up at a later date. In view of the acute paucity of duly qualified personnel, it is proposed to accept the offer of the Government of India. The extra cost involved on this account would be about Rs. 3,75,000 per annum on average basis. As, however, the central assistance for this scheme during 1959-60 would be restricted to Rs. 2,50,000 only, the scales are proposed to be revised from 1st June 1959, so as to restrict the extra expenditure to Rs. 2,50,000.

Remarks.—Government of Bombay have sanctioned 4 chairs of Social and Preventive Medicine, one each in the four Medical Colleges in the State (Bombay, Baroda, Poona and Ahmedabad). This will facilitate a new orientation in the teaching of medicine to under-graduates and inculcate in them the need to develop an integrated outlook in curative and preventive medicine and a desire to appreciate such integrated problems especially in rural areas. As a further step it is proposed in consultation with the Universities, to provide for a period of internship for two months in rural areas together knowledge on rural health, on a total intenships of 12 months after passing M. B. examination and before completing the degree. About 20 students can be trained in a batch for 2 months. Thus 120 students can be trained in one Health Unit in a year. In order to facilitate training of about 400—500 Medical Graduates every year, Government has sanctioned the establishment of 3 more Health Units on the lines of Sirur Health Unit, one each at Bavla (Ahmedabad District) Padra (Baroda District) and Palghar (Thana District). Similar facility is also proposed to be extended for Jamnagar Medical College students and there is a need to open such one more Health Unit at Sikka in Halar District on the lines of Sirur Health Unit and these three Health Units mentioned above which have been established in this State already. Besides there is a Cement Factory at Sikka and from industrial health point of view this will be an additional advantage in this respect.

Remarks.—The B. C. G. Vaccination Programme has been given high priority in the Tuberculosis Control Measures to be undertaken during the Second Five Year Plan and the campaign is to be continued till the entire susceptible population is protected. In view of the importance and urgency of the mass vaccination campaign, it is necessary that the programme is completed by the end of the Second Five Year Plan period.

At present, 22 B. C. G. Vaccination Teams are functioning in this State, out of which 3 teams are working in the Vidarbha Region. It is necessary to provide one more team in that area so as to cover the entire susceptible population in the Region. Also there is comparative low output of B. C. G. work in the Vidarbha Region due to lack of sufficient advance publicity and propaganda and therefore, it is considered necessary to provide one Publicity Unit for that Region on the lines of 3 Units functioning in the old Bombay State area and the Saurashtra Region. The B. C. G. Team and the Publicity Unit would consist of the following personnel:—

It is proposed to obtain vehicles for the B. C. G. Team as well as the Publicity Unit from the UNICEF.

Over and above the needs of the Vidarbha Region, it is proposed to augment the staff in the other areas in the State with a view to accelerating the Mass B. C. G. Vaccination work as under:—

- (i) In the B. C. G. Team working in the Kutch Region, there are only four posts of Technicians as against the requisite number of six posts. Hence two additional posts are required.
- (ii) In the Saurashtra Region, there are 18 Technicians and it is necessary to provide one additional post by way of leave reserve.
- (iii) In the Marathwada Region, there are 13 Technicians. 'The area is not well developed and about half the area is yet to be taken up for mass B. C. G. Vaccination work. In order to accelerate the work, it is considered necessary to provide one additional post of Technician, and
- (iv) At present, 34 Vehicles are in operation under the Mass B. C. G. Vaccination Campaign, but there is only one post of Mechanic and there are no leave reserve posts of drivers with a view to carrying out the work of routine checking, minor repairs and periodical inspection of the B. C. G. Vehicles as to the general condition, it is considered necessary to provide one additional post of Mechanic. Also it is considered essential to provide three additional posts of Drivers by way of leave reserve so that if any drivers are absent for one reason or the other, the work may be continued uninterrupted. These posts will be attached to the State Health Headquarters at Poona.

It is proposed to provide the above staff for a period of one year in the first instance. The extra expenditure involved in the proposals is estimated at Rs. 41,200 during the year 1959-60 as under:—

Remarks.—A survey carried out by the Haffkine Institute during December 1954 and March 1955 in Kaira District revealed that hook-worm disease is prevalent in all the 10 talukas of the District. The degree of prevalence varying from 13 per cent. in Balasinor Taluka to 50 per cent. in Nadiad and Cambay Talukas. Mohmedabad has an infestation rate of 43 per cent., Matar Taluka 39 per cent., Kapadvanj Taluka 37 per cent., Anand Taluka 30 per cent., Petlad Taluka 26 per cent., Borsad Taluka 25 per cent. and Thasra Taluka 24 per cent.

The prevalence of hookworm infestation is a measure of the degree of low sanitation prevalent in a locality especially in the matter of defecation.

The Scheme aims at a Concentrated drive to construct bore hole latrines in this District.

To begin with, the Scheme for the control of Hook-worm infestation was sanctioned during the year 1957-58 in Nadiad, Cambay and Mehmedabad Talukas where the degree of prevalence of the disease was highest, and during the year 1958-59, the scheme was extended to two more talukas, viz., Matar and Kapadwanj.

It is proposed to extend the scheme to four more talukas viz., Anand, Petlad, Borsad and Tharsa by providing Hookworm Units from September, 1959. The proposal involves a recurring expenditure of Rs. 17,042 and non-recurring expenditure of Rs. 26,400 during the year 1959-60 as detailed below, and the ultimate annual recurrent expenditure is estimated at Rs. 32,324:—

Remarks.—Medical relief and health services have not yet reached the rural population of the State and there are a number of Villages which have absolutely no facilities for medical treatment. The State has for this purpose accepted a policy of providing integrated curative and preventive medical services to the rural population in the C. D. and N. E. S. Blocks. This will take years before the entire State is covered by a network of Primary Health Centres. It should, therefore, be in the interest of the rural population if the Sanitarian already trained in First Aid and treatment of minor ailments are provided with medicine chests, gradually. Thereby the villages that will be visited by the Sanitarians during the course of their regular tour will get some kind of treatment at their doors. The facilities that would thus be available to the rural population would be more than commensurate with the expenditure of Rs. 27,000. There will be about 200 Sanitarians trained in treatment of minor ailments and first-aid available by the end of 1959-60, and the requisite provision of Rs. 140 for each medicine chest for them would be Rs. 28,000. Provision of Rs. 27,000 is however proposed as there may be some saving in bulk purchase.

The recurrent expenditure involved is for replacement of the medicines and would be about Rs. 28,000 per annum from the following year.

Remarks.—The State Government has accepted to participate in the Government of India Family Planning Programme. During the Second Five-Year Plan period, the State Government is entitled to open 232 Rural Family Planning Centres. During the year 1957-58, 34 Rural and 5 Training Centres and during the year 1958-59, 7 training centres in Medical Colleges plus 35 Rural Centres have been established. It is proposed to open 69 Rural Family Planning Centres during the year 1959-60 as per phased programme.

In addition to the 69 Rural Family Planning Centres proposed to be established during 1959-60 4 Training Centres for imparting training in Family Planning Methods to Doctors, Medico Social Workers Nurses and Health Visitors etc. are to be set up in the State. Proposals for starting these centres have already been submitted to Government. These Training Centres will be located at Nagpur, (2) Rajkot, (3) Ahmedabad and (4) Poona.
- 4. A training centre is also proposed to be established at the Daga Memorial Hospital, Nagpur where personnel who have no previous medical or health training will be given training for a period of one year. The pattern of staff and equipment proposed is as per Government of Indias pattern.

The 5 centres mentioned above are training centres and hence eligible for 100 per cent. subsidy by the Central Government. The estimated expenditure is as shown in Statement III and Statement III.

Remarks.—The need for a Public Health Institute for the Bombay State has been felt since long. This need was strongly stressed by the Administrative Enquiry Committee. Government accepted the recommendation of the Committee and included in the Second F ve Year Plan a Scheme to start such an Institute. The Institute is to be located at Nagpur and for that purpose, it is proposed to develop the Vaccine Institute at Nagpur by providing additional floors over the existing structure of the Vaccine Institute.

2. The Institute will be a Training Centre where facilities for post-graduate training in the D.P.H.'s Course to Medical Graduates will be provided. Besides at the Institute, Officers of the Public Health Department will be trained at all the levels and research in the Public Health Subject etc. will also be conducted there.

3. The Institute in short will be on the lines of a Medical College and will be staffed on similar lines as mentioned

The Halar District which is also to be developed into a demonstration district, will require one such Public Health Nurse. Research. The report submitted by this special sub-committee was considered by the Horticultural Committee at its meeting held in October 1956, which recommended the establishment of five main regional stations and eleven sub-stations in India. According to this, a three year scheme costing Rs. 3,71,021 for establishment of Main Horticultural Research Station in the Central Tropical Zone at Poona with a sub-station at Nagpur has been proposed and submitted to Indian Council of Agricultural Research for its approval with a request to agree to bear part of the expenditure on it. The scheme aims at carrying out intensive research on mango, grapes and citrus at Poona and orange at Nagpur. A provision of Rs. 1,63,000 will be required during 1959-60 as shown below:—

Remarks.—In the Second Five Year Plan a Milk Supply Scheme has been proposed for Marathwada area at a cost of Rs. 10,09,000. Also a Creamery at Udgir is proposed to be started at a cost of Rs. 3,75,000. Under the present scheme, potential areas around important cities much as Aurangabad etc., and interior areas round about Udgir will be surveyed. During the survey, information on the existing production, future potentialities, availability of fodder, water, communications, possible markets, rates of milk, etc., will be collected for systematic and sound planning of Dairy Schemes in Marathwada.

2. The Survey Unit would work under the Regional Dairy Development Officer, Nagpur. For completing the work expeditiously and touring in the interior areas a jeep has been provided for the use of the Unit. 2. The scheme is proposed to be continued for a period of five years at a total cost of Rs.1,71,420 in the first instance. During 1959-60 a provision of Rs. 1,17,192 will be required as shown below. Government of India will be approached for grants equal to 100 per cent. of the works part of the expenditure.

Remarks.—The Government of India are already developing about 15 land colonies in Uttar Pradesh, Purjab, Popsu, Andhra Pradesh, Madras, Mysore and Madhya Pradesh for ex-servicemen. At the instance of the Government of India, therefore, a land colonisation scheme to settle 60 ex-servicemen has been formulated in this state. The Government of India have selected an area of 807 acres of land at Jaysingpur in Shirol talaka of the Kolhapur district for the purpose and it would be made available by the State Government. The Ex-servicemen who are willing to join in, will form themselves into co-operative Tenant Farming Society which will run the Scheme. Facilities like improved housing irrigation, community institutions village industries, etc. are intended to be provided in the colony so toat it may serve as a model of living conditions. The experience gained from the development of colonies in other States shows that at least Rs. 3,500 per man is required for organising model villages with all reasonable amenities for the resettlement of ex-servicemen. The per capita expenditure under the scheme is thus estimated at Rs. 3,750 which would be approximated as follows:—

The exact manner in which the amount is to be utilized will be determined later.

- 2. The land colony will be developed by the State Government in consultation with the Government of India, Ministry of Defence and with the co-operation of the various nation-building departments. The actual implementation of the scheme would be taken up during 1959-60 but in the meantime all preliminary actions like inspection of land, preparation of estimates and layout of the colony etc. will be taken up. It is proposed that the Collector of Kolhapur should, in consultation with all Departmental heads in his district, draft a comprehensive scheme with a view to provide inter alia for planned economy and housing including minimum amenities, reclamation of land, crop patterns, establishment of co-operative institutions, measures for adoption of mixed farming and ancillary activities establishment of rural industries, etc.
- 3. Out of the estimated expenditure of Rs. 3,750 per settler, Rs. 2,250 will be utilized for land development, housing including cattleshed, layout roads for village site, bullocks and buffaloes, agricultural implements, carts seeds, manures and cultivation expenses, irrigation facilities etc. A lump provision of Rs. 45,000 for settling 20 exservicemen is required. During 1953-60 for the scheme the remaining amount at Rs. 1,500 per head will be advanced to each settler as loan.
- 4. The entire expenditure on the Scheme except the loan will be incurred by the State Government and the contributions from the Central Government, Post War Reconstruction Funds and the Settlers will be treated as receipts. The loan will be firsted by the Government of India for which provision under the head "P—Loans and Advances by State Governments" is being made separately.

Remarks.—Government have started milk supply scheme for the Nagpur Town and the premises (inclusive of the machinery) of the College Dairy Laboratories, boiler house, etc., at Ramdas Peth, Nagpur, have been placed at the disposal of the Nagpur Milk Supply Scheme. It is, therefore, essential to provide additional buildings and facilities in place of those handed over to the Milk Scheme, as well as additional staff for running the dairy farm after reorganising the same on a sound footing so as to make it a Modern Dairy Production Research Centre which would serve the purpose of teaching both the post graduate and under-graduate students. The Dairy will be placed in charge of the Senior Lecturer in Animal Husbandry and Dairying, who will stay on the farm and look after the animals as well as fodder cultivation and will be provided with rent-free quarters. A total provision of Rs. 1,12,425 will be required during 1959-60 for the development of the Dairy Farm. The details of both the recurrent and non-recurrent expenditure are as given below:-

- (i) to undertake soil survey in the area of the whole of the Command-area;

 - (iii) to study various other problems arising out of a continuous irrigation;

(iv) work out a cropping scheme for the Command-area.

Action for the acquisition of 200 acres of land is being taken. The main items of work during 1959-69 will be, (1) layout of the farm, (2) water channels, (3) construction of buildings for office as well as residential and laboratories, (4) purchase of tractors and other equipments, (5) appointment of staff, (6) soil survey work, etc.

Remarks.—The sanctioned period of the scheme for multiplication and distribution of Pratap Cotton is due to expire on the 28th February 1959. A new strain, viz., C. J. 73 has, however, been evolved and it has been found to be superior to the existing Pratap Strain in all respects. The Indian Central Cotton Committee has also recommended at its meeting held in February 1953, the release of the above new strain to replace Pratap Cotton. Accordingly, it has been proposed to undertake a new scheme for multiplication and distribution of C. J. 73 (Sanjay) Cotton for a period of five years from 1959-60 at a total estimated cost of Rs. 3,83,833 out of which the Indian Central Cotton Committee will bear the expenditure of Rs. 54,602. The object of the scheme is to replace the local Mathio and improved Pratap by C. J. 73 cotton in Saurashtra region in an area of 3 lakks acres within a period of five years from 1959-60 and it is proposed to utilise the plan provision of the existing Pratap Cotton Scheme for the new Scheme C. J. 73 Cotton. During the year 1959-60, 1,222 acres are proposed to be covered by the new strain from the available certified seed. The expenditure involved in the scheme during the year 1959-60 amounts to Rs. 63,591 (Rs. 53,591 recurring and Rs. 15,000 non-recurring), the Indian Central Cotton Committee's share being Rs. 8,340, and the details are given below:—

Remarks.—It is being increasingly recognised that the results of the carefully planned and well conducted trials in cultivators' fields alone can form the basis for making firm, practical and economic recommendations for improvements of plant husbandry. Without the basic data collected from these trials it would not be possible to launch vigorous food production campaigns. Further, such large number of trials scattered all over the districts would also have a great demonstrational value to the cultivators under their own conditions of farming.

Since 1952, trials on limited scale are being conducted in the cultivators' fields in the State on paddy, kharif Jowar, Cotton and Irrigated wheat. The results of these trials clearly show that the responses to the recommended treatments varied from those obtained for these very treatments at the agricultural research stations. The trials also show that there were soil pockets where the responses to the treatments were quite different from the surrounding areas of the Agricultural Research Stations. This experience is also borne out by extensive trials in cultivators' fields carried out in Bihar. Hence the urgency and importance of large scale trials in cultivators' fields to collect the basic data.

Remarks.—The object of the scheme is to induce the Municipalities and bigger Village Panchayats to produce compost manure from the town wastes collected by them. The target for the year 1959-60 is 4,27,000 tons of compost manure. At present separate schemes for composting of town refuse of municipalities into manure are in operation in the component parts of the Bombay State viz. old Bombay region, Vidarbha, Saurashtra, Marathwada and Kutch. Subsidy for compost making is sanctioned under the Saurashtra, Vidarbha and Kutch areas only. In order to bring all those schemes on a uniform basis, it is proposed to grant subsidy at the rate of Rs. 2 per ton to the Municipalities and bigger Village Panchayats in the new Bombay State. Necessary provisions have separately been proposed for the continuance of the existing schemes in Vidarbha, Saurashtra, Kutch, Marathwada and old Bombay areas. If the integrated scheme is approved, the provisions proposed for individual schemes will be deleted or surrendered. (Compost Development Scheme, Marathwada, being a non-plan scheme it has been included to the extent of subsidy only). An amount of Rs. 2,21,296 will be required during the year 1959-60 as detailed below:—

Remarks.—For improving the standard of cultivation and to eradicate pernicious weeds from lands, periodical ploughing by tractors is necessary. Mechanical Cultivation Section in the old Bombay State, used to undertake ploughing operations but they were discontinued from July 1955. The scheme for revival of tractor ploughing activity in the Old Bombay State was approved by the Agricultural Sut-Committee of the State Development Committee which recommended that pending easing of the foreign exchange conditions which will enable the tractors and equipments to be imported, one unit (of eight tractors) be formed from the existing surplus tractors. This unit which has already been sanctioned by Government will go into operation from the next working season, of 1958-59. The scheme for expansion of tractor ploughing activity which was approved in November 1957, in principal envisaging purchase of 50 tractors and equipment for establishment of five units, has been approved in details on 5th May 1958. The Government of India has been approached to release necessary foreign exchange and to grant importing licence for the purchase of 50 Tractors. Until then, it is proposed to purchase two tractors with necessary equipment, to augment the existing unit of 8 tractors, involving an estimated expenditure of Rs. 2,00,000 as detailed below:—

The revival and expansion of tractor ploughing activity forms an integral part of the Grow More Food Drive.

2. Under the scheme, tractor ploughing on the lands of cultivators will be undertaken on demand at Rs. 30 per acre. It is estimated that about 1,000 acres of lands will be ploughed annually with these two tractors. Tagai loans to cover ploughing charges will be granted to cultivators, on the usual terms and conditions under the normal tagai rules except that it will be recoverable in five annual equated instalments. Besides the capital expenditure of Rs. 1,80,000 for purchase of two tractors and equipments, the annual recurrent expenditure is estimated at Rs. 52,000 including depreciation and interest, against the anticipated receipts of Rs. 30,000. Annual loss, will thus approximate Rs. 22,000 which will be eligible for central assistance by way of grant under the Grow More Food Scheme, equal to 50 per cent. of the net loss subject to maximum of 12½ per cent. of the total cost besides loans to cover (a) full capital cost and (b) for advancing tagai advances to cultivators to cover the ploughing charges.

Remarks.—The Milk Conservation Project at Rajkot wish the assistance of UNICEF is an approved Second Five Year Plan Scheme sanctioned by the former Saurashtra Government.

According to the Plan of operation the objects of the scheme are :-

- (i) To distribute free to mothers and children over a period of five years milk to the value of 1.5 times the UNICEF contribution.
- (ii) To make increasing quantities of milk available under retail sale of the public and to ensure by a system of rationing or otherwise that opportunities to make purchases are accorded to families with young children as first priority customers.
- (iii) Subject to availability of funds to continue this free milk distribution scheme beyond the period of the plan of operations.
- (iv) To improve milk production in the Rajkot, Madhya Saurashtra areas as a basis for more stable agricultural practice and as a means of raising the standards of living within the milk producing communities.

Programme of work.—As per agreement, UNICEF is to provide free of cost machinery worth Rs. 12 lakhs for this project, out of which machinery worth about Rs. 2 lakhs has a already arrived in Rajkot. The rest of the machinery is likely to be received during 1959-60. For the railway freight, insurance charges, transport, storage, and upkeep of machinery, necessary provision is proposed.

The land for this project is already acquired and the necessary funds will have to be provided for the payment of compensation of the land.

Remarks.—A milk conservation Project for producing milk powder (to be distributed throughout the Saurashtra State) and also for providing processed liquid milk for the city of Rajkot and in particular for distribution of low fat fluid milk or skim milk powder to mothers and children we a undertaken by the former Saurashtra Government through the assistance of the UNICEF. According to the terms of agreement entered into by the ex-Saurashtra Government, the Government of India and the UNICEF Project authorities, the UNICEF is to supply milk drying and starilising plants and other machinery valued (inclusive of freight) at 2.45 lakhs doller (R3. 1,167 lakhs approximately). The State Government on its part is to provide all personnel, materials, supplies and equipment (other than that provided by the UNICEF) and finances as detailed below:—

The UNICEF Project will need a large quantity of milk the collection, transport, etc. of which will have to be organised from the villages. Improvement in the quality of milk will also have to be built up. It is, therefore, very necessary that this Pilot Milk Supply Scheme should be continued till the UNICEF Project starts.

By the end of 1958-59, 40 B. Mds of milk is likely to be handled through this scheme. In 1959-60 it is proposed to take it up to 125 B. Mds. Increasing quantities of milk from the collection area will be made available and accordingly the sale of milk will be increased. Additional staff that will be required for handling this increased quantity of milk will be appointed as and when required. A provision of Rs. 1,48,000 would be required as detailed below:—

Remarks.—The amount of rupes three lakhs was contributed by the former Saurashtra Government as 60 per cent. share capital for the establishment of a Joint Stock Dairy company at Junagadh. The remaining 40 per cent. of the share capital was to be contributed by the public. So far about Rs. 14,500 have been received from the public towards the purchase of shares. As no further amount towards share contribution in forthcoming the latter of the latt and the dairy had incurred heavy loses in the handling of raw milk, it was experiencing great difficulty to proceed with the work of developing the project. It was therefore decided by the Government to purchase all the shares held by the private individuals and wind up the Company and run the dairy departmentally, in conjuction with the Rural Creamery that is to be established at Junagadh.

It is also envisaged in Second Plan to establish a Rural Creamery in the Gir Forest area of Sorath District with the assistance of Technical Co-operation Mission. The Machinery for this Creamery is to be supplied free of cost by the Technical Co operation Mission which is likely to arrive during 1959-60. The Dairy Company has purchased the pasteurisation plant and other requisite dairy machinery worth about Rs. 1 lakh. The Dairy had also started handling raw milk before the pasteurisation plant could be installed. Objects of the schemes are—

(1) To supply clean and wholesome milk to the public at a fair price.
(2) To provide a ready market to the milk producing communities and thereby their economic and social condition.

(3) To produce ghee, butter etc., by mordern and scientific methods and thereby, claiminate heavy losses incurred in the production of by products by the out-model methods of manufacture.

(4) To meet with the demand of the public by providing them with guranteed and tasted products.

MINISTER IN CHARGE—SHRI V. P. NAIK.

Programme of work.—To take over the Sorath Public Dairy in case the procedure of winding up of the Company is not completed during 1958-59.

The land for the project will be taken possession of and the work of construction of buildings, erection of machinery, etc., will be taken up during 1959-60. The machinery for the Rural Creamery at Junagadh is also likely to be received during 1959-60.

Necessary staff for taking up the preliminery work of the project will be appointed and the potentiallity of milk and milk products of this area will be studied.

The amount of Rs. 3,32,000 would be required during 1959-60 as detailed below. A provision of Rs. 50,000 has been included in this amount on an ad-hoc basis on account of the expectation that equipment to that extent will be received from the Technical Co-operation Mission.

Remarks.—The strain H-420 being a low giner lost its popularity, resulting in giving a considerable set back to the existing scheme for multiplication and distribution of H-420 Cotton in Vidarbha. The results of the varietal trials indicate satisfactory performance of Virnar (197-3) in almost all the districts of Vidarbha. There is an increased demand for supply of pure Virnar Cotton seed from the Cotton growers in Akola, Buldana, Yeotmal and Amraoti Districts. In order, therefore, to enable the Cotton Growers in Vidarbha to grow pure Virnar Cotton and thereby to enhance its reputation, a new scheme for multiplication and distribution of Virnar (197-3) cotton seed in Vidarbha Cotton tract is proposed for implementation from the 1st March 1959 at an estimated cost of Rs. 1,34,614 during 1959-60 by replacing the existing scheme for multiplication and distribution of H-420 cotton as shown below:—

^{2.} The scheme is proposed for operation for a period of three years, i.e., up to 1961-62 in the first instance at an estimated cost of Rs. 4,10,964. The Indian Central Cotton Committee had been approached for the approval of the scheme. It has however not expressed itself favourably towards the scheme and has asked the State Government to justify the establishment of the suitability of (197-3) for replacing H-420. This point is being examined by Government. Pending approval of the Indian Central Cotton Committee, the State Government proposes to start the scheme from March, 1959. In case, the Indian Central Cotton Committee does not approve the scheme, it will have to be implemented as a State scheme.

Remarks.—The scheme for investigation into the peparation of fuel gas from cattle dung and the manurial value of the residue was undertaken by Government as early as in 1948. The work under the scheme was carried out on laboratory scale. On the basis of these studies, a commercial gas plant was designed for preparing fuel gas from cattle dung, Accordingly these gas plants were created at ten selected agricultural Schools, as an experimental measure.

With a view to saving Cattle dung as an invaluable source of organic manure, which is usually burnt by the cultivators through ignorance as fuel, it is proposed to erect seventeen gas plants in selected development blocks in order to demonstrate the working of plants for preparing fuel gas from cattle dung. A provision of Rs. 17,000 is therefore, required for the purpose as under:

Remarks.—The Agricultural Production Adviser, with the Government of India, during his visit to the State in the month of October 1958, observed that at present really experienced and technically qualified officers are not available for appointment as Farm Managers. It is, therefore, imperative that the Officers so appointed are imparted some practical training before they are put on the job. The training would be theoritical-cum-practical and given on the field itself. The candidates would be selected on the basis of aptitude. It is therefore, proposed to impart training to the selected candidates in farm management on farms which are well run.

Remarks.—The object of this scheme is to supply pure and wholesome milk to Surendranagar Town. Milk will be collected from the Maldheri Co-operative Societies, established round about Surendranagar and will be brought to Surendranagar Dairy for processing. This will enable the public of Surendranagar to get clean and wholesome milk at reasonable rate and at the same time the social and economic condition of the Cattle Breeders will improve as they will receive better price for their milk from this established market.

An amount of rupees three lakhs was contributed by the former Government of Saurashtra as 60 per cent. Share Capital for the establishment of a Joint Stock Deiry Company at Surendranagar. The remaining 40 per cent. Share Capital was to be contributed by public.

The dairy company has purchased dairy machinery approximately worth Rs. one lakh. As no public contribution was forthcoming after contributing a small sum of Rs. 3,800 and the Management was incurring heavy losses and experiencing great difficulties in proceeding with the work of developing the dairy, the Government has decided to run this dairy company departmentally, after purchasing shares held by the private persons.

During 1959-60 it is proposed to examine the possibility of milk production and its utilisation. Meanwhile the machinery and land already purchased by the Company will be properly looked after and building construction will be undertaken during the year 1959-60. The provision of Rs. 2,00,000 will, therefore, be required for the purpose as indicated below:—

Remarks.—The Government of India have changed the pattern of the Key Village Scheme by increasing the scope of its working and framed a model scheme for the guidance of the State Governments. According to the Model Scheme, each Key Village Centre should have one full fledged Artificial Insemination Centre with six Key Village Units attached to it. The Key Village Centres at Arvi, Telankheri, Kharangana and Buldhana, were sanctioned by the then ex-Madhya Pradesh Government and they have been continued by Bombay Government.

All the above mentioned four Key Village Centres have, at present, one full fledged Artificial Insemination Centre with the following number of Key Village Units, attached to each—

Regions of the re-organised Bombay State, and the Veterinary Dispensaries are opened in these regions according to the local requirements and plan targets of individual schemes. There is, however, no separate scheme of opening of Veterinary Dispensaries in the old Bombay State and a Veterinary Dispensary is opened in the Old Bombay State if and when a particular area is covered by the National Extension Service or Community Development Project. There are many places in the Old Bombay State where, in the interest of Cattle population of those areas, it is necessary to open Veterinary Dispensaries. It is, therefore, proposed to open additional Veterinary Dispensaries in non-community Development Project areas of the Old Bombay State by utilising the available funds under the scheme for assumption of full control of Veterinary Dispensaries from local Bodies, it may improve their efficiency but it will not help to achieve the overall objective of extending veterinary aid wherever it is needed. The plan allocation for assuming control of 16 Veterinary Dispensaries in the remaining two years of the Plan can thus be utilised for opening of 16 new Veterinary Dispensaries in the following talukas of the Old Bombay State area which are without Veterinary Dispensaries at present:—

Remarks.—Under the Key Village Scheme in Saurashtra 4 Key Village and Artificial Insemination Centres started in the first five-year plan are being continued and it is proposed to establish four new Key Village and Artificial Insemination Centres during the Second Five-Year Plan period. Till the year 1958-59, two Artificial Insemination Centres have been sanctioned and they are opened at (1) Kurdale and (2) at Rajkot. There was already a Key Village Centre at Kundla having no Artificial Insemination Centre and hence the one Artificial Insemination Centre was attached to the Key Village Centre, Kundla. The Artificial Insemination Centre at Rajkot is an urban centre and will have no Key Village units attached to it. Thus in real sense no new Key Village and Artificial Insemination Centre, according to the pattern of the Government of India, has been opened in Saurashtra, so far, during the Second Five-Year Plan. It is, therefore, proposed to open such two centres in Saurashtra during the year 1959-60. The total expenditure involved in the proposal comes to Rs. 1,13,000 the details of which are as under:—

Remarks.—The Joint Indo-American Team on Agricultural Research Education recommended that four of the existing State Veterinary Colleges should be developed into strong centres of Post-Graduate education on a regional basis for imparting training in appropriate fields leading to M. V. Sc. degrees. This recommendation is intended to provide in India first class post-graduate training facilities on the lines of the facilities available in some of the reputed post-graduate institutions in the Western Countries Government of India have accordingly selected the Bombay Veterinary College for giving financial assistance for the development of the College as one of the regional centres of the Post Graduate training in Veterinary Science and it has been decided to start the course from the academic year 1959-60.

The teaching and non-teaching staff required for the institution of the course will be as stated below :-

Remarks.—During 1958-59, Government has sanctioned a full-fledged Cattle Breeding Farm of Khillar Breed of Cattle at a total cost of Rs. 15,85,886 under the Second Five-Year Plan. The farm has accordingly been opened and is temporarily started at the Sheep Breeding Farm, Mahud, pending final selection of site.

As per orginal scheme, the experimental herd at this station will be comprised of 100 breeding cows and 5 pedigreed bulls of high quality. During 1957-58, 40 cows and 2 bulls have been purchased.

As stated above the farm has been temporarily started at the Sheep Breeding Farm, Mahud. It is proposed to acquire the land for which proposals are in progress and an amount of Rs. 1,00,000 is proposed to be provided during 195:-60 as under:—

Remarks.—The Government of India has suggested that piggery is a profitable livestock industry neglected in the past and could be taken up with advantage to ease the food pr blem of the State as well as to help in making nutritional det. The Government of India has also stated that it is prepared to bear the entire expenditure on a Regional Pig Breeding Station-cum-bacon factory that may be established in the State if the State Government provide about 20 acres of land free of cost. The total cost of such a Regional Station comes to about Rs. 10,74,000 for a peri d of 2 years. It has also suggested that the State Government may establish 12 Piggery Development Blocks at a cost of Rs. 1,56,000 for a period of 2 years including 3 months' training course in Swine Husbandry and manufacture of piggery products and the expenditure would be borne by it on 50 per cent. basis. The Government of India's scheme is still under consideration of Government. However, in the first instance it is proposed to provide a sum of Rs. 30,000 during 1959-60 as under for the establishment of a small piggery unit at Thatvade.

Remarks.—The State Sarvodaya Committee had taken a decision to introduce the Scheme of Contributory Provident Fund for the benefit of staff and teachers employed in Sarvodaya areas as far back as in June 1954. The contributory Provident Fund is proposed to be introduced for the staff and teachers working in Sarvodaya areas from the Year 1959-60. Under the staff rules of the scheme a worker in Sarvodaya area may be contributing a minimum of 6½ per cent. and maximum of 15 5/8 of his salary while the Government Contribution to the fund may be of the order of Rs. 6½ per cent. At the end of the current year i.e. 1958-59 there would be 40 Centres of which 38 are full fledged Centres while 2 are small Centres. It is also proposed to open 4 new Centres during 1959-60 in the component parts, viz. Saurashtra, Vidarbha, Marathwada (42 full-fledged and 2 small centres). The total expenditure on staff and teachers c mes to about Rs. 20,000. The total cost on staff and teachers for 42 full-fledged Centres would come to about Rs. 8,50,000. The total cost on staff and teachers for 42 full-fledged Centres would come to about Rs. 8,50,000 (42×20,000=8 40,000 plus 2×5,000=10,000). Of this, Government Contribution will be 6½ per cent. which works out at Rs. 53,125 say Rs. 50,000. The expenditure on the item will be met from the overall provision of Rs. 26 lakhs proposed for the Sarvodaya Scheme during the year 1959-60.

Remarks.—A Special Auditor in the Bombay Co-operative Service Class II (Scale Rs. 220—15—400—E.B.—20—500—E.B.—650) has been appointed at each of the Bombay, Poona, Nasik, Baroda and Ahmedabad Divisions of the Co-operative Department. These Divisional Special Auditors have to control the entire work of all the audit staff in their respective Divis ons. They also have to ensure that adequate work is put in by the audit staff and that the quality of audit is maintained. It is one of their duties to ensure that all the co-operative societies in their respective Divisions are audited regularly. In addition to this they have also to take test audit of the work done by Special Auditors (in the Bombay Civil Services Class II) in their Divisions. It is essential that an officer who takes test audit of work done by another officer should be an Officer of a higher status. With this consideration and also looking to the fact that the Divisional Special Auditors are in charge of the entire audit work in the respective Divisions, it is proposed to upgrade the five posts of the Divisional Special Auditors to the Bombay Co-operative Service Class I (f cale Rs. 410—30—650—E.B.—45—1,100). Remarks.—Consequent upon reorganisation of States in 1956, the areas of Vidarbha, Merathwada, Saurashtra and Kutch have formed a part of Bombay State. In 24 Districts of Pre-reorganised Bombay State the Bombay Moneylenders Act, 1946, is now in operation and under the revised set up of reorganisation of the Administrative machinery, special additional staff has been appointed in the districts for effective administration of the Act.

The responsibility for general administration of the Act devolved on the Registrar of Co-operative Societies who has been appointed under the Act, Registrar General of Moneylenders.

A proposal for unification of Moneylenders Laws in the Bigger Bombay State is under consideration of Government. After the approval of unification of Moneylenders Laws by Government the responsibility of the Administration of the unified Act would also lie on the Registrar of Co-operative Societies and Registrar General of Moneylenders. In view of this position, and in view of the necessity that uniformity in the administrative structure can be maintained it is absolutely necessary to appoint special staff of Registrars, Assistant Registrars of Moneylenders and Inspectorial as has been done in 24 Districts of old Bombay State.

Present Position.

Vidarbha.—In 8 Districts of Vidarbha, the C. P. and Berar Moneylenders Act, 1934, has now been in operation and it is being administered by the Registration Department. The Sub-Registrars and the Deputy Commissioners viz. the Collector have been appointed statutorily as Registering authority. On examination of the provisions of the existing Moneylenders Act it is seen that there is no control over the transactions of Moneylenders in Vidarbha as the Sub-Registrars are only authorised to grant registration certificate and as they are not authorised to inspect the accounts of moneylenders. Control and preventive measures can therefore be taken if and when a case is taken to the courts and through the general machinery for laws and order. A statement indicating the number of Moneylenders holding registration certificates is appended hereto (Appendix "A"). In order to control their transactions, as it is done in the 24 districts of old Bombay State, administrative machinery should be established. Under the proposed Moneylenders Act, provision of inspection of accounts has been made, which would necessitate appointments of Registrars and Assistant Registrars of Moneylenders. The staff has, therefore, been suggested for carrying out the administration of the Act in the component areas. At present, in Vidarbha no special staff exclusively for the administration of the Moneylenders Act has been appointed by the former Government.

Marathwada.—In 5 Districts of Marathwada area the Hyderabad Moneylenders Act, 1349 F. is in operation and administrative control is vested in Revenue Authorities. The Mamlatdars and Collectors have been appointed to work as licensing authorities under the Act. However, independent staff has not been appointed for inspection of accounts of Moneylenders. In Marathwada the administration of the Act is carried out by Revenue Authorities as was done in 24 Districts of Bombay State before reorganisation of the Administrative set up.

The Revenue Authorities in old Bombay State were relieved of the work of administrating the Act as they were ever worked with their duties as Revenue Officers and in order to vest control over the administrative machinery solely in the Registrar General, who is responsibile for this administration. It would therefore be necessary to relieve the Revenue Authorities of this work in Murathwada area also in the interest of uniform and effective enforcement of the proposed Moneylenders Laws. Appointment of special staff as indicated in statement (Appendix "B") on the pattern of the appointments in other parts of the State is necessary. A statement of moneylenders holding licence in each of the district is enclosed (Appendix "A"). At present no special staff has been appointed in Marathwada area for administration of Hyderabad Moneylenders Act.

Kutch.—In Kutch the Bombay Moneylenders Act has already been made operative by the former Kutch Government. It is, therefore, necessary to appoint Inspectorial and clerical staff for the District. At present no special staff is appointed in Kutch for administration of the Moneylenders Act. A statement of moneylenders holding valid licences in Kutch area is enclosed (Appendix "A").

Saurashtra.—In Saurashtra Moneylenders Legislation is not in operation. However, after unification of Moneylenders Law it will be necessary to appoint inspectorial staff to control over licences and also for detection of illicit moneylending cases and staff for clerical work will have to be appointed in the district as per the statement attached hereto (Appendix B"). As there is no Moneylenders Law in Saurashtra the number of moneylenders in the area cannot be furnished.

MINISTER IN CHARGE—SHRI T. S. BHARDE.

In view of the position, as pointed out above, the administrative set up in the component parts would be as under:—

The Sub-Registrars of Registration Department in Vidarbha and the Revenue Authorities in Marathwada and Kutch will be relieved of their work so far as administration of the Moneylenders Act of these areas is concerned. It will be seen from the Appendix "A" that in each of the 8 districts of Vidarbha there are more than 500 moneylenders holding licences. In Buldhana District 1495 moneylenders are holding licences. It will be seen from the Appendix "B" that each district of V darbha is provided with one Assistant Registrar of Moneylenders and in Buldhana 2 posts of Assistant Registrars of Moneylenders have been suggested as it is done in Kolhapur District where 2 Assistant Registrar of Moneylenders have been appointed. Otherwise, the charge of Buldhana District would be very heavy for one Assistant Registrar.

As regards 5 districts of Marathwada the number of Moneylenders is not reported to be very large except in Aurangabad District (464). Though this is less than 500, it is likely to reach 500 on the appointment of a Special Assistant Registrar. It is, therefore, proposed that one Special Assistant Registrar should be appointed for Aurangabad District and the Assistant Registrar of Co-operative Societies in the rest of 4 districts may be appointed as Assistant Registrar of Moneylenders as it is done in the 24 districts of old Bombay State.

In Kutch District the number of Moneylenders is reported to be 60. It is, therefore, proposed that the Assistant Registrar of Co-operative Societies may be appointed to work as Assistant Registrar of Moneylenders also. Regarding 5 districts of Saurashtra no estimate of the number of moneylenders can be fir med at this stage. Pending availability of this information, it is, proposed to appoint Assistant Registrar of Co-operative Societies of all these districts as Assistant Registrar of Moneylenders also. Thus it would be seen that 10 Special Assistant Registrars of Money enders may be appointed, 9 for Vidarbha and one for Aurangabad District. In the remaining districts the will be seen from the Appendix "B" that 4 posts of Assistant Registrars of Moneylenders. It will be seen from the Appendix "B" that 4 posts of Assistant Registrars of Moneylenders have been suggested in the grade of Rs. 250—325 and 4 posts in 340—400 and 2 posts in 420—500 respectively. It would be desirable that some of these posts should be in selection grade and I grade so as to allow some incentive and sufficient scope of promotions to the officers holding the posts and with a view to attract capable persons for being appointed to these posts. At present there are 4 posts of Assistant Registrars of Moneylenders in pre-reorganised set up. After reorganisation of M. L. set up, 6 additional posts of Assistant Registrars in the grade of 250—325 have been sanctioned. Taking into account these 6 posts and the 10 posts of Assistant Registrars of Moneylender proposed for the component parts, it would be seen that some of these 16 posts should be in the selection grade (i.e., Rs. 420—5 0) and some in the I grade (Rs. 340—15—400) so as to allow some incentive and sufficient scope of promotions to the officers holding the posts and also with a view to attract capable persons for being appointed to the posts. It is, therefore, proposed that out of these 16 posts two posts may be sanctioned in selection grade and 4 posts in grade I and 10 posts in the

The special Assistant Registrars will be provided with office staff of 3 junior clerks and Inspector of Money-lenders (Appendix "B"). This is just on the line of scheme which is now in operation in 24 districts of the old Bombay State.

As regards appointment of Special Registrars of Moneylenders, Statement "C" indicating the proposed divisions is appended. It is proposed that 2 Registrars of Moneylenders may be appointed for Vidarbla, two for Marathwada areas with the Head Quarter at Nagpur, Akola, Osamanabad and Aurangabad respectively. In Saurashtra one Registrar of Moneylenders is proposed to be appointed with the Head Quarter at Rajkot.

As regards the gradation of the posts of Registrars of Moneylenders it may be pointed out that there were three permanent posts of Registrars of Moneylenders in the old administrative set up, which are in existence under the reorganised set up. Out of these two posts are in the selection grade (Re. 695—875) and one in the grade of Rs. 350—30—650. In the reorganised Administrative set up, sanctioned in March 1957, four posts of Registrars of Moneylenders have been sanctioned in the grade of Rs. 350—650. Taking into consideration these 4 posts and the proposed 5 posts of Registrars of Moneylenders for integrated areas there would be in all 9 posts, of Registrars in the new set up. On the analogy of proposal made for the post of Assistant Registrars it necessary that at least two of these 9 posts of Registrars may be sanctioned in selection grade of Rs. 695—875 and 7 posts in the grade of Rs. 350—30—650. With a view to implement this proposal it is suggested that Government may sanction 2 posts of Registrars in the grade of Rs. 695—875 and 3 posts in the grade of Rs. 350—660.

Other Staff:-

- 24 posts of Inspectors of Moneylenders in the grades of Rs. 150-10-200.
- 5 posts of Senior Clerks in the grade of 100-8-140 for the offices of Registrars of Moneylenders.
- 55 posts of Junior Clerks for the office of Registrars and Assistant Registrars of Moneylenders (grade 46—130).
- 35 posts of Peons (30-35).
- 24 Attendants (on Rs. 45 fixed).
- 3 Senior Clerks in Registrar General's Office.
- 3 Junior Clerks in Registrar General's Office.

The cost on account of these staff requirements works out at 2,08,000 during the year 1959-60, as shwen in Statement "D".

MINISTER IN CHARGE—SHRI T. S. BHARDE.

As regards the financial aspect of this scheme it has been separately proposed to levy fees for inspection of accounts of the Moneylenders on a graded structure. As a result of the proposed provisions it may be possible to recover fees on account of examination of accounts approximately to the extent of Rs. 1.35 lakh. This figure however very roughly estimated on the basis that each Moneylender may have to pay Rs. 10 approximately towards inspection of his account books in a year. Exact estimates of income from this source can only be made after unified Moneylenders Act is in operation for at least one year. However, taking into account the licence fees and the fees for inspection of accounts, it may be possible to meet part of the total cost from this source of Revenue.

Remarks.—The Scheme inter-alia envisages grant of financial assistance to the Fisheries Co-operative Societies (i) Subsidies towards managerial cost and (ii) Short-term loans for purchase of fishing accessories. In addition to these concessions, it has been proposed to extend financial aid by way of loan and subsidy on the basis of 50×50 per cent to the two Federal Institutions of the Fisheries Co-operative Societies to construct three godowns for storage of dry fish for assisting the affiliated societies in Marketing their dry fish. A provision of Rs. 1,50,000 has been proposed for this, during the remaining period of the Plan.

The need for proper co-ordination between the fisheries Department and the Co-operative Department which are responsible for the execution of this Scheme, even at the Departmental leval and also at the lower level is keenly felt. It is, therefore, proposed to provide the following staff to bring about effective coordination between the two Departments and the Fisheries Societies for speedy execution of the Scheme. The creation of this staff is essential because of the increasing scope for development of the fishing industry on Co-operative lines and because the demand for fishermen societies is growing. This staff will study the needs of the fishing industry, maintain a constant contact with the fisheries department and fish markets in the State and guide and supervise the work of Fisheries Societies. The following staff, in addition to one Senior Clerk and one Junior Clerk already sanctioned under the Scheme is therefore proposed to be appointed.

A target of 120 societies has been proposed for Development for the remaining period of the plan. In addition to this, target of construction of the godowns two at Bombay and one at Veraval (Saurashtra) had also been proposed. During the year 1959-60 it is proposed to sanction managerial subsidies to 244 Co-operative Fisheries Societies in the component parts of the State. It is also proposed to sanction short-term loans to 15 Co-operative Fisheries Societies towards the purchase of the accessories etc. One Society will be sanctioned financial assistance for the construction of godowns. Remarks.—With a view to achieving uniformity in the supervision scheme all over the State it has been proposed to introduce the supervision scheme at present under implementation in the pre-reorganised State of Bombay in the other component parts of the State.

In Bombay area there is a Taluka Co-operative Supervising Union at the Taluka level. A Supervisor, who is a Government hand, is attached to the Taluka Union whose duties are to supervise and to guide the working of the societies affiliated to the Union by taking periodical inspections, etc. The strength of the Supervisors attached to the Unions varies according to the number of societies affiliated to the Unions. As per the revised standard each Supervisor is expected to supervise 25 societies. The cost of Supervisors, who are Government hands, is borne by Government. The Supervising Unions are given grants for meeting their expenditure. Supervision fee at 25 nP. for Rs. 100 of the working capital of Societies affiliated to the Unions is levied and recovered from Societies.

At the District level, there is an adhoc body styled as District Supervision Committee which is represented by the Co-operative Department, Central Financing Agencies, Taluka Co-operative Supervising Unions and Agricultural Non-Credit Institutions. District Committees control the Taluka Supervising Unions and render necessary guidance. Government grants upto Rs. 500 each are given to these committees.

The State Board of Supervision is an Apex Institution which consists of officials and non-officials. This body also guides the Co-operative Department in implementation of the Supervision Scheme and framing policies for the purpose.

It is proposed to appoint 245 Supervisors in the integrated areas of Marathwada, Vidarbha, Saurashtra and Kutch. The Supervisors would be in the grade of Rs. 46—3—85—E. B.—4—105. It is proposed to grant them a Permanent Travelling Allowance of Rs. 28 per month. The expenditure on account of the 245 posts of Supervisors (Pay, Dearness Allowance, Permanent Travelling Allowance) works out to Rs. 3,44,800. As against a total cost of Rs. 3,44,800 involved in this proposal, a sum of Rs. 2,18,250 is expected to be recovered by Government in the form of supervision fees in addition to saving of another Rs. 50,000 in other expenses as incurred at present on subsidies to the Nagpur and Amraoti Institutes since these latter bodies will be relieved of their responsibilities of supervision over Co-operative Societies.

Remarks.—The Co-operative Movement is expanding rapidly in the State and all round development is noticeable. Government have considered it essential that both intensive and extensive touring should be undertaken by the Assistant Registrars of the Co-operative Department to maintain close contacts with the rural population particularly in the interior and underdeveloped parts of the State. In some of the areas communication is saverely handicapped and the Assistant Registrars are not in a posision to visit places for organisation of new Co-operative Societies for inspection of existing Societies. It is, therefore, proposed to supply jeep cars to eleven such Officers who have to work in such areas. With jeep cars at their dispoal, they would be able to undertake brisk touring which is very essential for prompt and efficient discharge of their multifarious duties. A provision of Rs. 2,00,000 is therefore, proposed for the next financial year.

Remarks.—Supervision is as an absolute necessity for the full growth of Co-operative Societies. Hitherto each supervisor was in charge of 35 to 40 societies. This charge was proved to be very heavy. There was cry from officials and non-officials to reduce this charge. The Reserve Bank of India has indicated that normally Supervisors should not have more than 20 to 25 societies under his care. There are above 6,200 societies in this area. Taking a standard of 25 societies per individual total requirement as worked out comes to 248 as against the present staff of 171. The additional requirements thus would be of 80 more Supervisors.

The Supervisors would be in the grade of Rs.46—3—85—E. B.—4—105. It is proposed to grant them P. T. A. of Rs. 29 p. m. The expenditure on account of 80 posts of Supervisors works out to Rs. 1,22,880, the details of which are given below:—

Remarks.—There are as many as 395 Co-operative Housing Societies in Ahmedabad District. By the end of the Co-operative year 1958-59 the number is expected to be up to 450.

- 2. As many as 17 Backward Class Co-operative Housing Societies have obtained loans and subsidies from Government for construction of tenements and purchase of land. Due to availability of financial assistance from Government and the acute problem of Housing number of societies is rapidly increasing. As the members of some of the Societies belong to Backward Class Communities, the Departmental staff has to guide and supervise at every stage to ensure expeditious implementation of the Scheme. The Departmental staff has to exercise control over the Societies and watch carefully the utilization of Government Funds and prompt recovery thereof. It is also essential to see that the affairs of the Societies are managed on sound lines and for this purpose Societies need assistance of a Departmental hand in solving their day to day difficulties. Complicated problems pertaining to Housing Societies due come up frequently and the public approach Government often and even representations are sent to Government about disposals. All these problems need to be enquired into personally by contacting the respective parties concerned. This work can only be done by responsible Officer of a higher rank.
- 3. At present this work relating to Housing Societies is entrusted to the Auditor and District Co-operative Officer (Stores), Ahmedabad. As the volume of the work has increased considerably, the Auditor and the District Co-operative Officer (Stores), is heavily burdened with work and finds it difficult to cope with the varied nature of work, pertaining to Co-operative Housing Societies in Ahmedabad. In order to attain to the problem of Housing Societies promptly, the additional staff consisting of one District Co-operative Officer (Ist Grade), 5 Assistant District Co-operative Officers and 1 Junior Clerk would be necessary exclusively for looking after the problem of Co-operative Housing Societies, taking into consideration the number of Housing Societies, varied complicated problems arising in the day to day working. The charge of the Ahmedabad District is already heavy and the formation of Housing Societies including those for Backward Classes has been very rapid. Additional staff is, therefore, proposed to be sanctioned as under.

Remarks (1) Accountants.—All the district offices of Assistant Registrars have got an Accountant except the Assistant Registrar at (1) Ratnagiri, (2) Alibag, (3) Dangs, (4) Sabarkantha and (5) Banaskantha. On careful examination of the position in regard to staff requirement for the offices of the Assistant Registrars it is found quite essential to provide the services of an Accountant to each of the Assistant Registrars mentioned above.

A large amount of Government money in the form of subsidies and loans are handled by the Assistant Registrars and it is necessary for them to maintain accurate and proper account of the money withdrawn from the Treasury and also maintain day to day watch on the utilisation of the money made available to the institutions in their charge. They will have to keep a close watch over the recoveries of the loans advanced by Government to the institutions.

It is therefore proposed that the following Assistant Registrars may be given help of an Accountant each so as to carry cut the work smoothly and with due efficiency as shown below:—

(2) District Co-operative Officers.—With the expansion of the activities of the Co-operative Department, it is essential to provide the services of Additional District Co-operative Officers in the below mentioned offices of the Assistant Registrars:—

Ratnagiri ... Kolaba ... Dangs.
Sabarkantha ... Mehsana ... Banaskantha.
Amreli ... Bombay.

In the year 1951 when the separate offices of District Co-operative Officers were integrated into those of Assistant Registrars under the revised Administrative set up of the Department, it was anticipated that the most important work of inspection of societies would be so co-ordinated between the Assistant Registrar and District Co-operative Officer that each society in the district would be inspected by them at regular intervals. The Assistant Registrars find it very difficult to attend to field work in addition to office work. A responsible officer of the status of District Co-operative Officer at the head-quarters would be of immense help to Assistant Registrar to speed up the office work as well as to impart guidance and help the office-bearers of Co-operative Societies seeking personal advice from the Assistant Registrar. The Additional District Co-operative Officer is also expected to attend to the correspondence when the Assistant Registrar is on tour and work as Personal Assistant leaving the Assistant Registrar free to attend to the important work of development and consolidation in the district proper.

It is proposed to demarcate the charges between the two District Co-operative Officers viz. the regular District Co-operative Officer and the Additional District Co-operative Officer to enable them to undertake comprehensive field work, organisational and inspectional in the best interest of the Co-operative Movement. Touring is inevitable for the Additional District Co-operative Officer in the course of executing their duties. In view of this, it is essential to make the services of Attendant available to the Additional District Co-operative Officer also. Seven posts of District Co-operative Officers and Attendants are to be sanctioned.

It is necessary to keep some proportion of the posts of District Co-operative Officers in the higher grade so that senior persons could be appointed to the posts. All the 14 posts sanctioned for other districts are in the grade of Rs. 150—10—200 and hence 7 posts are to be sanctioned in the higher grade of Rs. 200—10—300 and it is proposed to allot these posts in higher grade to heavy districts.

Remarks.—Processing Co-operative and Fruits and Vegetables Co-operatives are being organised on a large scale under the Second Five-Year Plan development programme. In order to encourage this type of Co-operative activity, the programme in this regard in coming years is to be considerably stepped up. One of the major difficulties that has so far been experienced in the case of these new types of Co-operative activity is the paucity of technical guidance. These processing Co-operatives need considerable technical and engineering advice and guidance at various stages. In view of considerable stake, the Government has in these institutions by way of share contribution, loans etc., it is advisable that Government arranges for departmental technical advice and guidance. There is already one Mechanical Engineer sanctioned under the scheme and it is now proposed to have two mechanical Supervisors under him and the necessary clerical staff. It is, therefore, proposed to create the following additional staff during 1959-60 for one year in the first instance:

Remarks.—The National Development Council has adopted a comprehensive Resolution for intensive development of the co-operative Movement all over the State, especially by the organisation of competent all purpose Village Primaries. To begin with, it is proposed to organise 3,600 such primary societies in the State during the remaining two years of the 2nd Five-Year Plan. It is accepted that the Village Panchayat and the Co-operative should cover identical areas. In this State, the average number of Villages covered by the Village Panchayats works out at 1.4 villages, the population covered being 600 on an average. The village Co-operatives are, therefore, expected to cover a population of 1,000 to 1,200 each. The extent of the problems can be seen from the following figures:—

There are 54,000 villages in the State. Out of these about 43,000 villages are covered by village Primaries, including Multi Purpose Societies. Thus, there are about 11,000 to 12,000 villages which will have to be brought within the Co-operative fold in 2 years. Taking into consideration, that one Society will serve 2 villages, the work of organisation of 6,000 village Primaries will have to be undertaken during this limited period.

It is, necessary to sanction some field staff consisting of Assistant District Co-operative Officers for this purpose. On an assumption that an Assistant Co-operative Officer will be able to organise 50 Societies in a year, it will be necessary to have 72 Assistant District Co-operative Officers in the State for this work during the year 1959-60. Each Assistant District Co-operative Officer will have to be provided with an Attendant.

Remarks.—The Registrar of Co-operative Societies in his capacity also as the Director of Agricultural Marketing is responsible for the ord rly development of both Co-operative Marketing and statutory regulation of marketing of Agricultural Produce. Both these types of activities have been given increased emphasis in the development programme under the Second Five Year Plan. The National Development Council has laid further emphasis on this aspect of co-ordinated development of marketing of agricultural produce through the Co-operative Agencies and with the policy of State Trading and general food-grains procurement policy through Co-operatives in prospect, this aspect of development is expected to increase considerably in the coming years. Added to this the burden of work devolving on the Registrar and the Officers working under him on account of the labour and probity they have to put in extra labour bringing about an effective link between credit and marketing in the context of an expanded programme of Co-operative Finance is considerable. Added to this is the ever growing responsibility and strain of having to spons r the organisation and supervise and guide the development of a large number of different types of Processing Co operatives. The Registrar, it is feared will not be able to cope with this increasing responsibility with the assistance of only two Senior Officers at Headquarters viz. the Chief Marketing Officer and Joint Registrar and the Deputy Registrar for Co-operative Marketing. It is felt that a re-organisation of the administrative machinery of the marketing section with necessary reinforcement of staff at upper and lower levels is called for to meet with the situation. It is therefore proposed to have two Senior Officers to assist the Registrar in this aspect of marketing dev 'opment viz. Chief Marketing Officer and Joint Registrar who will look after the development of statutory regulation of murketing of agricultural produce and one Joint Registrar, Co-operative Societies (Marketing) for devoting his sole attention to the development of co-operative marketing and processing with the assistance of the Deputy Registrar (Marketing) who is already in position. It is also proposed to strengthen the section looking after of statutory regulation of agricultural marketing by the addition of a Deputy Registrar (Regulated Marketing) in the Bombay Co-operative Service Class I. It is proposed to re-organise the administrative set up at the Divisional at the District Level also by placing the Assistant Morketing Officers directly under the Divisional Deputy Registrars, Co-operative Societies and make the Divisional Deputy Registrars fully responsible for all activities of the department including development of agricultural marketing. The same pattern is proposed to be introduced at the districts by placing the Marketing Inspectors under the Assistant Registrars. Since there are already 8 Assistant Marketing Officers and adequate number of Marketing Inspectors to cover all the districts the additional demand for staff on account of this proposed works out, as under :-

Remarks.—The Scheme of Co-operative Lift-Irrigation has been under implementation in the pre-reorganised Bombay State, since June 1949. This Scheme has not yet been extended to the component parts except Marathwada for which a limited provision was made in the budget of 1958-59. It is now proposed that with a view to bring about uniformity in the pattern of development in all the component parts of the State, the Scheme as it obtains in the area of former Bombay State should be applied to all the other component parts of the State. The Scheme envisages financial assistance to Co-operative Lift-Irrigation Schemes as under:—

(i) 50 per cent. of the Capital Cost as Loan;

(ii) 25 per cent. of the Capital Cost as Subsidy;
(iii) 15 per cent. of the Capital Cost as Medium-Term Loan towards working expenses;
(iv) Subsidies at Rs. 900 during the first year and Rs. 450 each during the second and third year(s) towards the cost of Secretaries-cum-Drivers.

Remarks.—Co-operative Housing Societies of Scheduled Castes in the former Bombay Region are given financial assistance in the urban as well as rural areas as under:—

- (1) Free grant of land for housing purposes subject to a maximum of Rs. 5 per square yard in expensive localities;
- (2) Subsidy for management at Rs. 10 per tenement for the first two years and at Rs. 5 per tenement for the subsequent years until the loans given to the societies are fully repaid;
- (3) Financial assistance up to 75 per cent. of the construction according to approved type plans—50 per cent. is by way of interest-free loan repayable in 25 years and the balance of 25 per cent. by way of subsidy.

It is proposed to extend the benefits under this scheme to the urban areas throughout the State. All places having a population of 10,000 and above will be deemed to be urban areas for the purposes of this scheme. With the introduction of this scheme, the present scheme will cease to apply to the rural areas of former Bombay region. However, Societies which have already become eligible for assistance in the former Bombay region will not be affected. A token provision of Rs. one lakh—Rs. 40,000 for subsidies and Rs. 60,000 for loans is proposed to be made for financial assistance to Scheduled Caste Co-operative Housing Societies in the remaining component units to start with. The Government of India grant on the expenditure on subsidy at 50 per cent. rate will be Rs. 20,000. No central assistance will be forthcoming on the expenditure on loans.

Remarks.—Dairy Industry has great potentiality to solve unemployment problem and raise the level of income of Agricultural commodity and of nutrition of public at large. The Scheme aims at the expansion programme of the Ahmedabad District Co-operative Milk Producers' Union Ltd., Ahmedabad and Baroda District Co-operative Milk Producers' Union Ltd., Baroda for developing their activities of collection, processing and distribution of milk. It envisages grant of financial assistance to the Milk Producers' Union and its feeder societies in Baroda and Ahmedabad Districts under their expansion programme:—(i) Subsidies towards managerial cost, and (ii) Loans for purchase of Dairy equipments.

Under the expansion programme proposal, each of the above Unions proposes to organise 100 dairy societies in its respective district during three years so as to achieve the target of 1,000 maunds of milk per day at end of the plan period.

For speedy organisation, supervision and direction from time to time and for proper coordination between the Milk Unions and the Co-operative Department, it is proposed to provide the following additional staff. Remarks.—The Visiting Committee of the Western Regional Committee of the All India Council for Technical Education, visited the R. C. Technical Institute, Ahmedabad on 22nd September 1955 and submitted its report on the development of the said Institute. The Scheme of expansion of this Institute as recommended by the visiting Committee has been approved by Government in principle. This Scheme is to be undertaken in stages, the first stage being restricted to Rs. 2,98,193 (Rs. 1,44,750 for buildings and Rs. 1,53,443 for equipment). Out of the expenditure of Rs. 1,53,443 to be incurred on equipment, expenditure of over Rs. 58,000 has already been incurred. It is proposed to purchase additional equipment worth Rs. 40,200 during 1959-60, as recommended by the Visiting Committee.

Remarks.—As a result of the reorganisation of States and also development of Cottage Industries as an important sector in the Second Five Year Plan, the activities of the Department of Cottage Industries and Industrial Co-operatives have increased considerably. With effect from 1st April 1957 the Department of Cottage Industries and Industrial Co-operatives which formerly formed part of the Co-operative Department has been formed into a separate Department of Cottage Industries. Government had, after the reorganisation of the States sanctioned 25 per cent. ad hoc increase in staff for the head office and administrative and executive staff for the regional and divisional set up of the Department of Cottage Industries and Industrial Co-operatives to cope up with the increased work.

To sustain and foster the present enlargement of the Industrial Co-operatives, it is essential to provide for adequate supervision for purposes of guiding and assisting these institutions at all stages. Organisational base also needs strengthening in order to make for efficiency and speed and also to attend to follow-up programme. It is therefore necessary to strengthen the supervisory and organisational staff of the Department at regional, divisional and district level along with that in the Office of the Director of Cottage Industries and Additional Registrar for Industrial Co-operatives, Poona.

Remarks.—In addition to the Plan scheme there are a number of schemes which fall under the normal activities of the Department of Cottage Industries and Industrial Co-operatives such as technical training institutions, production centres, research institutions etc. involving a total annual expenditure of about 40 to 45 lacs. There are in all at present 134 Training Institutions, 21 Training-cum-Production Centres, 13 Production Centres and 13 Research Institutions. Apart from these there are about 3,000 Industrial Co-operatives in the State established for the promotion of various Industries like Handloom, Tanning and Leather, Oil, Light Engineering, Fibre and Coir etc.

For the proper functioning and the ultimate success of the institutions mentioned above, it is necessary that technically qualified persons are appointed to impart instructions at the Training, Research and Production centres and also Industrial Co-operatives. It is also essential that marketing of the produce of the industrial co-operatives and production centres must be given equally earnest consideration.

At present there are only four gazetted Officers, one each for the following industries attached to the Office of the Director of Cottage Industries and Industrial Co-operatives:—

- ' (i) Light engineering.
 - (ii) Textiles.
 - (iii) Tanning and Leather.
 - (iv) Wool.

In addition, there are two non-gazetted Officers, one for Dysing and Printing and the other for Coir and Fibre. It is not possible for the existing technical staff to attend to the needs of all the technical training institutions, Industrial Co-operatives and individual artisans all over the State.

It is, therefore, proposed to create the following posts in the Department of Cottage Industries and Industrial Co-operatives.

Remarks.—The programme under Rural Arts, Crafts and Industries occupies a very important place in the community development programme. For the purpose of formation of suitable programme and proper and speedy implementation of schemes the Extension Officers (Industries) are appointed in the Blocks since 1956, after giving them specialised training. These Extension Officers form a co-ordinating link between the Project Authorities on the one hand and the Department of Cottage Industries and Industrial Co-operatives or the other. There are at present 75 Extension Officers (Industries) in position in C. D. and other Blocks and about 90 persons are under training. According to revised pattern of C. D. programme each C. D. stage I and Stage II Blocks will have one separate Extension Officer for Rural Arts, Crafts Industry.

At present there are in all 163 stage I Blocks and 4 C. D. Blocks and during the year 1959-60, 42 more stage I Blocks are likely to be allotted to Bombay State in two reries of 21 each. This makes the total of 258 Blocks by 31st March 1960 out of which 40 existing Blocks, 37 C. D. Blocks and 3 stage I Blocks) will be converted into stage II phase thus leaving a balance of 219 Blocks where the Extension Officers (Industries) are required to be appointed at the rate of one Extension Officer (Industries) for each Block.

It is necessary to create a "Leave reserve" at least 5 per cent. of the total number of posts required which worked in this case to 12 posts. 12 posts of Extension Officers (Industries) will have to be created during 1959-60, so as to meet the deman is of leave reserves.

Remarks.—The Department of Cottage Industries and Industrial Co-operatives already organised a retaining and finishing centre at Satara for manufacture of rolled leather and dyeing as well as finishing of skins. The bag tanned leather turned out by the village tanners are rolled and finished at a nominal rate. Because of the finishing processes the leather fetches more value and gets a very good market. By organising such centre at Chalisgaon, the village tanners would be benefitted.

2. As the selection of place, selection of site, construction of building and pits for tanning, securing of equipment will require more time it would be possible to start the working of the centre in the latter part of the year. However, as the staff will be required to attend to the construction work, erection of machinery etc., the staff will be appointed for 9 months during the year.

Remarks.—With the formation of the new Bombay State, the mineral potentialities of the State have enhanced to a very considerable extent, warranting, prospecting and surveying over a large part of the State. Moreover, under the Industrial Policy Resolution announced by the Government of India on the 30th April 1956, the exploitation of certain minerals such as iron ore, mangnese ore, chrome ore, gypsum etc. has been made the exclusive responsibility of the State. If the minerals are to be properly classified and utilized in various industries, detailed surveys and investigations are necessary. It is, therefore, necessary to collect data regarding quantity and quality of the raw materials available. It is also necessary to devise proper methods for extraction of the areas and benefication. In view of this and in order to enforce more effectively the Mines and Minerals (Regulation and Development) Act, 1957 and the rules framed thereunder, it is proposed to reorganise and strengthen the Directorate of Geology and Mining during the period of the 2nd Five Year Plan. A small Department of Mining has started functioning from May 1957 and it consists mainly of the units of the component parts, which were previously functioning independently. It is now necessary to reorganise and strengthen it. A provision of Rs. 80,000 is proposed for the year 1959-60 to meet the expenditure on account of the reorganisation and expansion of the Department.

ITEM 219. Subsidy to Central Financing Agencies on loans sanctioned from their own funds under the scheme of giving financial assistance to Industrial Co-operatives for development of Small Scale and Cottage Industries.

Remarks.—Under the State Aid to Small Scale and Cottage Industries Rules, loans to the industrial co-operatives for working capital are being channalised through the Central Financing Agencies. The funds for this purpose are granted to the State Government by way of loan, by the Government of India in the ratio of 2:1 (Centre: State). These loans are sanctioned to the industrial co-operatives at concessional rate of interest of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum. In order to divert the private resources of the Central Financing Agencies for development of Small Scale and Cottage Industries, it is proposed to grant subsidy to such of the Central Financing Agencies which are willing to sanction loans from their own funds to the industrial co-operatives at concessional rate of interest viz. $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum. The Central Financing Agencies usually raise the funds from sources, other than Government, at $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. to 6 per cent. per annum. It is therefore, necessary to sanction the difference between their borrowing rate viz. $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. to 6 per cent. per annum and their lending rate to the industrial co-operatives viz. $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum.

- 2. It is estimated that the Central Financing Agencies will be able to sanction loans to Small Scale Industries from their own funds to the extent of Rs. 10 lakhs per year. The maximum amount of subsidy at 3½ per cent. per annum on loans to the extent of Rs. 10 lakhs will be about Rs. 35,000 per year. On the assumption that the Central Financing Agencies will sanction loans from their own funds to the extent of Rs. 10 lakhs, an amount of Rs. 35,000 will be required during 1959-60 for payment of subsidy. A provision of Rs. 35,000 is, therefore, proposed.
- 3. The Government of India have agreed to give Central assistance to the full extent of the expenditure incurred by the State Government on this scheme.

Remarks.—Nylon and Hemp twine form important accessories to fishing industry. Dara fishing which is done in the North of Bombay need nets prepared out of nylon and hemp twine which are best suited for the purpose. Nylon due to its durability, non-absorbing nature and higher efficiency in catching fish has become one of the essential requirements all over the world for increasing output of fish from the seas. Nylon and hemp twine have, therefore, become articles of daily utility of our fishermen. Purchase of quality fish hooks (imported variety) is also beyond the capacity of ordinary fishermen in view of high cost involved. Government of India have imposed heavy import duty from 36½ per cent. to 50 per cent. on these goods with the result that the fishermen are required to pay exorbitant prices on these articles. The fishermen who are noted for their age-old poverty ill afford to pay these high prices on the aforesaid material. The Government of India were, therefore, requested to reduce the import duty. Government of India did not agree to this request of the State Government but have agreed to grant sharable subsidy to the extent of 331 per cent. under Grow More Food rules on all these articles. A scheme for allotment of fishery requisites on subsidised rates already exists in the Saurashtra and Vidarbha regions, for betterment of the economic condition of the fishermen. Their counterparts in the former Bombay region are also equally poor and deserve similar facility, which will lead to increased supplies of fish.

It is, therefore, proposed to make available to the fishermen in the former Bombay region, nylon and hemp twine and fish hooks at the subsidised rates through the fishermen's Co-operative Societies under the supervision of the Fisheries Department. The nylon, fish hooks and hemp twine, will be purchased by the fishermen's societies generally dealing in these requisites of the trade and distributed to their members and other fishermen. Actual subsidy at the rates admissible will be made available by the Department direct to the fishermen concerned on production of necessary vouchers by the Societies indicating the sales. With this method, it will be ensured that subsidy reaches the fishermen.

As mentioned above, fish hooks, nylon and hemp twine worth about Rs. 13,32,600 will be sold to the fishermen through co-operative societies. In order to have proper check over the accounts of the societies and two assess subsidy over the material sold to the fishermen at the subsidised rates it is necessary to create responsible post of a supervisor who will be required to visit the concerned societies for necessary verification. Besides considerable correspondence will have to be done with the societies and individual fisherman who will receive actual subsidy. It is, therefore, necessary to have following staff which is the minimum requirement to handle the work:-

(1) Supervisor (1) Rs. 170—10— (2) Jr. Clerk (1) Rs. 75—200.

Remarks.—The fishermen of Kolaba District are considerably backward compared to their counter-parts in the North of Bombay. It is necessary that their difficulties are properly investigated and they are made conscious of the urgent need to develop their industry on modern lines. It is also necessary to survey the coast and provide refrigeration, landing and transport facilities and solve the day to day problems of the fishermen by studying them first hand.

The fishery work in this District is at present being looked after by Superintendent of Fisheries (Marine) of fisheries department, who has also to look after marine fishery work of the Greater Bombay and Thana Districts. With the increasing activities as envisaged in the Second Plan it is not possible for one person to look after these three districts. It is, therefore, quite essential to establish a fisheries office in Kolaba District with the following staff:—

- (1) Superintendent of Fisheries, Alibag (Gazetted) in the scale of Rs. 220-650.
- (2) One Investigator in the scale of Rs. 80-220.
- (3) Clerk-cum-typist in the scale of Rs. 46-130.
- (4) One peon in the scale of Rs. 30-1-35.

The Department has to execute 47 Plan Schemes in five Regions. The work in respect of these schemes consists of maintenance of registers for expenditure and receipts, watching the progress on physical and financial targets; submission of quarterly progress reports; claiming central assistance over plan scheme supplying information to Divisional Development Boards; submitting various information to assembly questions, submission of annual budget preparation of Development programme and District-wise break-up etc. Besides, there is volume of other work to be disposed of in the Plan Branch. The present Junior Superintendent in charge of the Plan Branch is fully occupied with the supervision of the aforesaid work. Besides he has to supervise work pertaining to central assistance and fresh water fisheries of the State. It is, therefore, proposed to create a post of Planning Supervisor (previously designated as Junior Superintendent in the Plan Book).

During recent review of the Plan schemes, it was noticed that the Department could not achieve physical targets to the extent the financial targets were achieved. The creation of the post of Planning Supervisor will greatly help achievements of physical targets as per programme during Second Five Year Plan.

There being no separate Registry section in this office work in respect of linking up of cases and filing is being done by Junior clerks. It is, therefore, proposed to create the post of Daftari, who will be entrusted with this work so that Junior clerks will be able to devote their time for disposal of cases.

Remarks.—At present there is a large number of ex-servicemen who require some gainful employment. Though certain concessions have been given to them for admission in the peripatetic schools, this is not a sufficient measure to ease the growing unemployment amongst them. Many of them do not get any pension and those who get pension find that it is not quite sufficient to maintain them and their families. These men have rendered laudable service to the country and it is therefore necessary to take steps to relieve their economic distress and to rehabilitate them in life. It is accordingly proposed to open for the present a Training-cum-Production Centre at Satara to train 12 ex-servicemen at a time in trades such as "Cotton Weaving, Hosiery, Carpentry and the Fitters' course" so as to enable them to secure some employment in Government or private service or to settle themselves in small scale business of their own. The Centra will be in the overall charge of the Bombay State, Soldiers', Sailors' and Airmen's Board. The expenditure involved in the scheme works out as under:—

It is, however, proposed that the non-recurring and recurring expenditure should be shared by the Services Post-War Reconstruction Fund and Government on a 50:50 basis for a period of the first three years after which the Centre is likely to be self-supporting, manufacturing only those articles which would be required largely by the Army. The Government's share in the scheme on that basis would come to Rs. 34,465 non-recurring and Rs. 34,560 recurring, and accordingly Rs. 69,025 would be required on this account during the year 1959-60.

Remarks.—It is a matter of common observations that milking performance of animals varies in each lactation. The condition of the animal when she calves seems to have considerable effect on her performance during the entire lactation period that follows. It has been seen at Aarey, that animals salvaged in the villages, do not do so well as those kept at the Government Dry Stock Farms.

- 2. It has been noticed that in commercial herds many animals drop in milk production to the extent of 1,000 lbs. (some even more in subsequent lactations). This creates an impression that the animals are not economical to maintain, when salvaged once or twice. This also impedes the reduction in the production cost of milk.
- 3. The Animal Husbandry Workers and some of the owners at Aarey have been feeling that to achieve the best results out of salvaged buffaloes it was necessary to study in a critical manner the various factors which influence their milking performance. One such sure factor seems to be the nutritional treatment, given to them during late pregnancy, or the aspect of 'steaming up'. Preliminary calculation show that the steaming up may involve an extra feeding cost of Rs. 100 to Rs. 150 but on the other hand it may be possible to obtain Rs. 400 to Rs. 500 worth of more milk. In that case steaming up would not only be economically feasible, but may become absolutely necessary. The reverse of this, will also be true.

It is necessary to study the behaviour of the same animals under different treatments in successive lactations. On the assumption of a 15 months inter-calving interval it will take about 5 years to study the effect over four lactations, in the same animals. The scheme will be spread over a period of 5 years, at an estimated cost of Rs. 99,973 out of which a provision of Rs. 17,781 will be required for the 11 months during 1959-60 as detailed below:-

Remarks.—Due to restrictions on the import of cheese, it has become scarce. The small quantities of imported cheese now sells at Rs. 8 to Rs. 12 per lb. that is, 400 per cent. of the price, before import restrictions came in. Initial calculations show that Indian made cheese could be sold wholesale at Rs. 2.50 per lb. with substantial profit.

There are many prospective parties in Bombay State, and also elsewhere, who have shown interest in the new possibility of making cheese in India. The Bombay Milk Scheme is also interested in the problem as a means of disposal of surplus winter milk and gaining experience in this new line.

At the Aarey Milk Colony, there are 28 dairy Farm Units in which 180 cattle owners maintain over 15,000 buffaloes in milk. Although the milk is obtained pure from all units, the bacterial quality of milk is not the same, with regard to all the 180 producers.

Since milk for cheese making has to be of adequate top quality, it is proposed to develop a technique of production of high grade "cheese-milk" at one of the farm Units which would compare favourably with milk delivered to cheese factories in other parts of the world. For this it is proposed to pay a small premium in price.

To start with 2 years should be sufficient to study the seasonal variations in the quality of milk, behaviour of the starter and of the various stages of manufacture, etc. It is proposed to use at least 1,000 lbs. of standardised buffalo milk or Toned Milk each day, as the study progresses. The scheme is estimated to cost Rs. 76,638 during the two years period out of which a provision of Rs. 54,652 will be for the 11 months during 1959-60 as detailed below:—

Remarks.—Over 15,000 buffaloes of Murrah, Mehsana, Surti and Jaffarabadi feeds are at the Aarey Colony. They are fed with green para-grass throughout the year, to the extent of 12 to 20 lbs. per animal per day.

2. The total area under Para-grass at present is about 425 acres and the existing annual yield of para grass is

1,75,000 lbs. per acre on an average.

3. The type of manuring and management of the lands may be classified into 3 groups, which effects the yield of fodder per acre.

(1) Irrigated with washings from the cattle-sheds, including urine. (No direct irrigation water is used).

The area covered is about 234 acres and the annual average yield per acre is 250,000 lbs. in 10 cuttings. Individual plots have yielded even higher. As far as is known there is no fodder to beat this crop, which is also fairly high in proteins.

(2) Irrigated with water mixed with liquified fresh dung.

The area covered is about 173 acres. The annual average yield per acre is 100,000 lbs. in 7 to 8 cuttings.

(3) Irrigated with the wash water from the dairy (containing milk washings and detergents), mixed with liquified fresh dung.

The area covered is about 18 acres and the annual average yield per acre is 150,000 lbs. in 8 to 9 cuttings.

It would be thus seen that there is considerable variation in the out-turn of the para-grass whereas the cost of cultivation is about the same, or even less in the case of (1) above. In order to step up production it would be necessary to find out the exact requirement of para grass in terms of N, K_2O and P_2O_2 . Once the above details are known it would then be possible to either increase or decrease the manurial (F. Y. M.) does and obtain the maximum output with reference to available F. Y. M. and the irrigation water.

Duration of Investigation.—3 years, at an estimated cost of Rs. 1,00,000. A provision of Rs. 52,231 will be required for the 11 months during 1959-60 as detailed below:—

Remarks.—The usual practice of irrigating crops is the flow system. In this system, the land is required to be levelled, beds are prepared and water channels are laid out with suitable gradient. This system is followed for irrigating the para-grass at Aarey Milk Colony, also and requires about 90 acre inches of water, per acre per year. It is felt that considerable economy can be effected in quantity of irrigation water and yet the same results could be obtained, if the system of spray irrigation is adopted.

As there is general shortage of irrigation facilities in most parts of the State and in order to grow the folder economically there is need to study the optimum dose of irrigation water required for para-grass per acre per year by spray irrigation system.

Further it is also to be seen whether there would be any increase in yield of the crop by adopting the spray irrigation system as compared to flow irrigation. There are indications that this may be possible. It is proposed to try three doses of irrigation by sprinkler system viz.—(i) 60 acre inches, (ii) 75 acre inches and (iii) 90 acre inches per acre per year, and compare the yields with the existing doses of 90 acre inches, by flow irrigation.

To carry out this experiments, the scheme will be spread over a period of 3 years and is estimated to cost Rs. 68,852 out of which a provision of Rs. 3,511, as detailed below, will be required for the 11 months during 1959-60:—

Remarks.—The Scheme aims at starting Labour Welfare Centres at Industrially important places in Marathawada. During the Plan period, it has been proposed to open 8 centres-1 (one) each at Aurangabad and Jalna in Aurangabad District, Nanded in Nanded District, Sailu, Parbhani and Hingoli in Parbhani District, Latur in Osmanabal district and Bri/Parli in Bhir district. Each centre will also be provided with a suitable building having one thousand eight hundred square feet area with adequate play-groump in front preferable 80 yards by 150 yards. Total cost of the Scheme during the plan period would be Rs. 3,54,350. Construction of buildings shall be taken up in the years, 1959-60 and 1960-61. Pending construction, it has been proposed to start the centres in the rented premises or rent-free premises, wherever such a facility exists.

During 1953-59 five centres—one each at Aurangabad, Jalna, Nanded, Sailu and Latur have been opened. They will be continued in 1959-60 for which provision of Rs. 67,000 has been proposed in Section II, New Item separately. These new centres will be opened in 1959-60 at Parhhani, Hingoli, and Bhir or Parli at a cost of Rs. 18,000. Accordingly provision of Rs. 18,000 has been proposed therein.

Remarks.—The former Government of Saurashtra had decided to open an Institution for the Blind at Junagadh at an estimated cost of Rs. 3 lakhs, towards which a donation of Rs. 1.50 lakhs has already been received from Shri Meghji Pethiai Trust. It is now proposed to open a School for the Blind at Junagadh at an estimated cost of Rs. 3 lakhs. The school will have free hostel facilities and will accommodate 50 children during the first year 1959-60 and the number may go up according to the need during the next year 1960-61.

2. The first requirement of the Institution will be a functional building for a School for blind children. It is proposed to utilise an amount of Rs. 1,00,000 towards the construction of a suitable building during 1959-60 and another sum of Rs. 50,000 during 1960-61 to complete the required buildings. A sum of Rs. 50,000 will be utilised during 1959-60 for the maintenance of inmates, pay and allowances of staff and purchase of initial equipment. Till the new buildings are ready, the Institution will be housed in the Vikas Home buildings where accommodation will be made available temporarily.

Remarks.—With a view to training sufficient number of skilled workers to meet the requirements of the country's industry the Government of India have started Technical Training Institutes/Centres throughout the country. Of these Institutes/Centres the four at Bombay, Poona, Aundh and Kolhapur have already been transferred to Bombay State with effect from 1st November 1956. Under the scheme two types of training viz., technical training in engineering and building trades and Vocational training in Cottage and Small Scale Industries is being imparted. The training for technical trades is of two years duration of which 18 months are spent in a training Institute/Centre and the remaining six months in an industrial undertaking or in the institute/centre itself as may be convenient. The training is imparted free and in addition a scholarship of Rs. 25 per mensem each is granted to not more than 33-1/3 per cent. of the total number of trainees.

Under Second Five-Year Plan scheme, Government have sanctioned the scheme of double shift at the existing 4 centres at Bombay, Aundh, Poona and Kolhapur. Additional Centres have been also started from the year 1957-58 at Jamnagar, Nanded, Aurangabad, Ahmedabad, Nagpur and Kandla. The Second Year Classes were started during 1958-59. The Training Centre at Akola has been started from 1958-59. It is, therefore, necessary to sanction additional equipment for the new Centres. It is also proposed to start one more additional Centre at Amravati from the year 1959-60. For implementation of this scheme it will be necessary to sanction equipment for new centre and additional equipment for the old centres.

The cost of the scheme will be shared by the Central and the State Government in the ratio of 60: 40 respectively. The entire expenditure will, however, have to be incurred initially by the State Government and the Government of India's share of expenditure will be made available to the State Government later on at the time of adjustment of accounts. The total cost on account of the additional staff for old Centres and new Centre at Amravati during the year 1959-60 is estimated at Rs. 16,16,740. It is accordingly proposed to provide an amount of Rs. 51,540 recurring and Rs. 15,65,200 non-recurring on this account in the budget estimates for the year 1959-60.

Remarks.—The need for instituting a programme of Youth Employment Service arises from the fact that there are in a labour market at any given time a large number of persons who are not occupationally set in their choice of employment and who need assistance in adjusting to or progressing in a field of work. The vocational guidance work is taken up as a specialised service under the scheme of Youth Employment Service. The functions of the Youth Employment Service are (i) to advise young persons out of school regarding possible employment openings to suit their education and abilities, (ii) to advise on the selection of subjects for future study in the light of employment prospects, (iii) to produce information regarding facilities for further education in the vocations chosen by young people, (iv) to place them in suitable employment, where possible and (v) generally to give expert personal advice regarding problems of young persons relating to employment.

2. Under this scheme, a Youth Employment Service unit was opened at the Regional Employment Exchange, Bombay, in 1957-58 and it has been decided to open two more units one each at Rajkot and Nagpur during 1953-59. During the year 1959-60, it is proposed to open 5 more units, one each at Ahmedabad, Amravati, Aurangabad, Bhavnagar and Poona. The Scheme is being executed in collaboration with the Government of India and the expenditure thereon is shareable between the two Governments in the usual ratio of 60: 40. A total provision of Rs. 69,000

Remarks.—The Report of the First Five Year Plan endorsed the need for the reorganisation of an efficient Employment service. The Planning Commission recommended an enquiry into the working of the Employment Service for re-orientation of its methods. A Committee (known as Shiv Rao Committee) made such an enquiry and submitted its report which was accepted by the Government of India. This Committee recommended, inter alia, that the Employment Exchanges should be developed and strengthened so as to be able to collect factual information relating to the employment situation on a national, regional, and local basis and for particular industries and occupations. It was, therefore, proposed to expand the Employment service in a phased manner during the Second Five Year Plan.

Under this scheme "Expansion of Employment Service" which is included in the Second Five Year Plan, 8 new Employment Exchanges were opened during 1957-58, one each at Baroda, Nasik, Ahmednagar, Koyna, Akola, Chanda, Bhandara and Wardha. During 1958-59, eight more Employment Exchanges have been sanctioned one each at Ratnagiri, Palanpur, Nadiad, Dhulia, Yeotmal, Buldhana, Nanded and Bhuj. During the year 1959-60, it is proposed to open with effect from 1st September 1959, 5 more Exchanges in the districts of Panch Mahals, Kolaba, Sabarkantha, Bhir and Mehsana. The scheme will be executed in collaboration with the Government of India. The expenditure thereon is shareable between the two Governments in the usual ratio of 60:40. A total provision of Rs. 4,54,000 representing State Government's share has been made for the scheme in the Second Five Year Plan. During 1959-60 the expenditure on the new Exchanges to be opened is estimated at Rs. 30,400 out of which the State Government's share would be Rs. 12,960. Each Exchange will have a staff of 1 Assistant Employment Officer (Gazetted) and 1 Assistant, 2 Junior Clerks and 2 Peons. The details of the expenditure are given below:—

Remarks.—The Scheme of Collection of Employment Market Information envisages collection of information in regard to the chief characteristics of the unemployed together with trade-wise details in respect of fresh registrants on the one hand and trade-wise statistics of employment opportunities on the other. The work is done at the Employment Exchanges with the help of additional staff sanctioned for the purpose. The scheme is included in the Second Five Year Plan of the State and is being executed in collaboration with the Government of India. The expenditure is shareable between the Central and the State Governments in the ratio of 60:40.

2. During the year 1957-58, Employment Market Information Units were started at 16 Employment Exchanges and it has been decided to start 8 more during the year 1958-59. During the year 1959-60, it is proposed to open 6 new units at the Exchanges at Ratnagiri, Dhulia, Nadiad, Mehsana, Bhuj and Nanded. It has also been found necessary to sanction additional staff for the existing units at Ahmedabad, Poona, Rajkot, and Aurangabad as the private sector will also be covered at these Exchanges. A total provision of Rs. 2,77,300 representing the State Government's share of the expenditure on the Scheme has been made in the Second Five Year Plan. During 1959-60, the expenditure on the 6 new units to be opened is estimated at Rs. 35,820, out of which the State Government's share would come to Rs. 14,328. The details of the expenditure are given below:—

Remarks.—The pattern of Backward Class Welfare measures differs widely from region to region in this State and wide disparities exist. The extra cost in unifying all Backward Class Welfare Schemes would be very heavy and it would not be possible to accommodate it within the ceiling allotted for the Backward Class Welfare Plan. It is, therefore, proposed to unify some important Schemes from the next financial year to start with.

The total extra cost will be Rs. 48,67,319 during the year 1959-60. The central grant on this expenditure at 50 per cent. rate will be Rs. 24,33,660.

Remarks.—Under this Scheme it is proposed to give grants-in-aid to private institutions for Handicapped for developing specific vocational training and rehabilitation programmes.

There are following four institutions for the Deaf, Dumb and Blind in Vidarbha:-

- (1) The Blind Boys Institute, Nagpur,
- (2) The Deaf, Dumb and Blind Industrial Institute, Nagpur,
- (3) The Bhonsala Deaf, Dumb Institute, Nagpur,
- (4) Bharat Muk Vidyalaya, Nagpur.

These institutions and also other suitable institutions will be paid grant-in-aid for purchase of equipments for Craft Classes and appointment of teachers of Vocational subjects etc. for promotion and development of vocational training in these institutions. Remarks.—There is a plan provision of Rs. 2,83,000 in the Saurashtra Plan for the Scheme "Grant-in-aid to institutions working for the Welfare of the Handicapped".

It is proposed to start sheltered workshops for the handicapped to be run by voluntary agencies on 100 per cent. grant-in-aid basis. In the old Bombay State Plan there is a Scheme for giving grant-in-aid to voluntary agencies for running sheltered workshops for the Handicapped. It is proposed to extend similar welfare activities in respect of the Handicapped in Saurashtra also. As this kind of Welfare work is quite new in that region it is proposed to give grant-in-aid on 100 per cent. basis to provide the necessary incentive to the voluntary agencies to undertake the work.

The non-recurring provision of Rs. 40,000 is meant for the construction of buildings, purchase of equipments, etc. while the recurring expenditure will be on items such as salaries of Instructors, maintenance of inmates, etc.

Remarks.—In the old Bombay State Plan there is a scheme for giving grant-in-aid to voluntary agencies for running Sheltered Workshops for the Handicapped persons. It is proposed to give grant-in-aid to specialised institutions for developing their Workshops for the Handicapped. At present there are no facilities for the training and employment of the Blind Women as also for the Crippled Children and the adult deaf and mute. It is, therefore, proposed to give grant-in-aid to the following institutions:—

- 1. Industrial Homes for Blind Women run by the Dadar School for the Blind.
- 2. Society for the Welfare of the Physically Handicapped, Poona for running a Sheltered Workshop for the Physically Handicapped Children.

Remarks.—On the recommendations of the Study Group of Educated Unemployed set up by the Planning Commission in September 1955, the Government of India approved the establishment of work and Orientation Centres in the Country for assisting the educated unemployed in their placement in life. It is proposed to establish three such work and Orientation Centres of 100 seats—each in Bombay State from November 1959, at Aunch (Poona), Nagpur and Ahmedabad.

The object of Work and Orientation Centres is to assist educated unemployed persons to equip themselves to seek avenues of employment other than white collar jobs, i.e. to enable them after completion of Training to work as organisers of Cottage and Small Scale Industries Co-operative Organisers, Sub-contractors, small businessmen, etc. The Orientation and instruction to be provided at the Centres are designed to increase their capacity for securing employment.

The period of trade training will be of 18 months institutional training followed by 6 months in plant training. The latter training will be arranged in small scale industries/Establishments where the trainees will enter-alia learn the practical problems of management and production which will assist them in launching out as private enterpreneurs. The training is imparted from and in addition, a scholarship of Rs. 25 per mensem is awarded to 50 per cent. of the trainees.

The expenditure will be shared by the Central and State Governments in the usual ratio of 60:40.

The entire expenditure will, however, have to be incurred initially by the State Government and the Government of India share of expenditure will be made available to the State Government at the time of adjustment of accounts. It is accordingly proposed to provide an amount of Rs. 73,692 recurring and Rs. 7,86,000 non-recurring on this account in the budget estimates for 1959-60.

Remarks.—The Industrial Training Institute at Bombay, Aundh, Poona, Kolhapur and Aurangabad have been transferred to the State Government, with effect from 1st November 1956 and they are being administered by the State Government from that date.

During the Second Five-Year Plan, Government has sanctioned 300 seats in double shift at Bombay, Aundh, Poona and Kolhapur. Additioal Centres have been also started in 1957-58 at Jamnagar, Kandla, Nagpur, Nanded, Ahmedabad. One more Centre at Akola has been started from 1958-59. It is now proposed to further expand the training facilities at the existing State Government Institutes, with a veiw to training sufficient number of skilled workers to meet the requirements of the country's Industry. The places selected for such expansion are Ratnagiri, Kolhapur, Satara, Dhulia, Godhra, Amraoti, Surendranagar, Bhavnagar, where facilities like accommodation and equipment exist to some extent. It will, however, be necessary to add some equipment and carry out extensions to existing buildings wherein training will be imparted to the trainees.

The cost of the Scheme will be shared by the Central and State Governments in the ratio of 60: 40 respectively. The entire expenditure will, however, have to be incurred initially by the State Government and the Government of India share of expenditure will be made available to the State Government later on at the time of adjustment of accounts. It is accordingly proposed to provide an amount of Rs. 7,22,011 recurring and Rs. 34,56,100 non-recurring on this account in the budget estimates for the year 1959-60.

Remarks.—A vast majority of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes subsists on agriculture mainly as landless seasonal labourers. A small section of these classes owns petty lands but their income from such lands is meagre. A still smaller section follows hereditary occupations like tanning, leather work or weaving, but their methods of production are outmoded, yielding very little income to them. Unless, therefore, they take to subsidiary occupations or new avocations or improve their existing methods of their work, reasonable improvement in their standard of living would not be possible. It is, therefore, proposed to give Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes assistance on lear-cum-subsidy basis for taking to suitable cottage industries or avocations or for improving their existing methods of works such as hawking, brick making, repairs to umbrellas, etc., hair-dressing salcons, tailoring, rough iron ware, cycle repairing shop, earthen pots, coir making, purchase of bullocks carts for transport purposes, playing on musical instruments, etc. The maximum amount of loan-cum-subsidy assistance would be Rs. 500—50 per cent. being subsidy and 50 per cent being loan. The loan would be interest-free and would be recoverable in ten equated yearly instalments. The expenditure during 1959-60 is expected to be Rs. 1,85,000—Rs. 20,000 for Scheduled Tribes and Rs. 1,65,000 for Scheduled Castes. Half of this amount (Rs. 92,500) would be utilised in granting subsidies and the central grant on this expenditure will be Rs. 46,250. No grant would be admissible on the expenditure on leans.

Remarks.—Recruitment to the Indian Administrative, Indian Police and other Class I Central Services is made on the basis of results of the competitive examinations held annually and the personality tests conducted by the Union Public Service Commission. Experience has shown that due to their weak foundations in studies and lack of general knowledge, Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes candidates either fail in the competitive examinations or do not do well at the time of personality test. It is, therefore, proposed to start special coaching classes at 5 important educational centres of Bombay, Poona, Ahmedabad, Nagpur, Rajkot and Aurangabad. Graduates belonging to the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes having good academical record will be admitted to these classes at the above mentioned centres. Noted Professors and Lecturers of the concerned colleges in these cities will be invited to give them suitable coaching. Such Professors and Lecturers will be given an honorarium of Rs. 20 per lecture. The extra expenditure during 1959-60 is estimated to be Rs. 14,000. The Government of India grant on this expenditure at 50 per cent. rate will be Rs. 7,000.

Remarks.—With a view to providing suitable leisure time occupation, to inculcate in the minds of the pupils ideas of self-help and love for labour and to make them as far as possible self-sufficient in respect of their clothing requirements, it is proposed to introduce spinning in 27 selected non-government backward class hostels as an experimental measure. The Superintendents of these hostels will be given an intensive training in spinning for two months during the ensuing summer vacation and they in turn will teach spinning to the hostel inmates later. The financial implications of the proposal are as under:—

Remarks.—With a view to encouraging the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes to take to cattle breeding and dairy farming and thus supplement their income, it is proposed to supply them pure bred cows on loan-cum-subsidy basis. 50 per cent. of the cost would be born by Government by way of subsidy and the balance by way of interest free loans to be recovered in ten annual instalments. The average cost of a pure bred cow is about Rs. 300. Every year about 200 cows will be supplied at a total cost of Rs. 60,000 (Rs. 30,000 as subsidy and Rs. 30,000 as loan). The Government of India grant at 50 per cent. rate on the subsidy portion will be Rs. 15,000 during 1959-60.

Remarks.—There has been considerable expansion in agricultural and engineering services as a result of emphasis placed on agricultural production and building and irrigation programmes in the current and future plans. There is a serious shortage of candidates for posts of Agricultural Assistants and Overseers. Most of the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in government employ are employed in Class III ministerial posts or in the posts of inferior servants. There are very few qualified candidates from Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes for posts of Agricultural Assistants or Overseers. To meet this dearth of qualified candidates from Schedule Castes and Scheduled Tribes it is proposed to start a special Training College imparting a two-year certificate course in agricultural science and three-year certificate course in civil engineering. Such an experiment has already been tried at the Janata College at Amravati and is found to be working well.

2. The two-year certificate course in agricultural science will include the following subjects:—

(1) Agriculture, (2) Animal Husbandry, (3) Rural Economics and Co-operation (including agriculture legislation and Marking), (4) Public Health, (5) Humanities (ncluding village administration and language, (6) Village Industries, (7) Horticulture, (8) Forestry and (9) Agricultural Extension.

The three-year certificate course in Civil Engineering will include the following subjects:-

Ist Year.—(1) Mathematics, (2) Mechanics, (3) General Science, (4) Surveying, (5) Languages, (6) Drawing, (7) Humanities and Extension Methods, (8) Workshop-Carpentry, Smithy, Fitting.

Remarks.—There are at present four Labour Courts—2 each in Bombay and Ahmedabad—functioning in the State. These were set up under section 9 of the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946 and are in existence since June 1947. They have also been notified as Labour Courts for purposes of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947, since March 1957. A review of the work done by the Labour Courts during the last three years has revealed that the rate of filing has progressively increased and the number of cases in arrears has gone up. Remarks.—Shri Manekji Cooper Education Trust, have promised to donate Rs. 5 lakhs for the construction of a Theatre-cum-Museum for children in Bombay. A non-recurring grant of Rs. 5 lakhs for the construction work is proposed separately. It is estimated that a recurring grant of Rs. 40,000 per annum will be required for the expenditure on staff and maintenance charges of the museum, under the Head "47-Miscellaneous Departments". Remarks.—Article 46 of the Constitution, which embodies one of the Directive Principles, requires State Governments to promote with special care, the educational and economic interests of the weaker sections of the people and in particular of the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes. The practice so far has been to equate the weaker sections of the people with the Scheduled Castes, the Scheduled Tribes and the Other Backward Classes and adopt caste, as the basis to determine the weaker sections of the people. While there can be no doubt that the Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes constitute weaker sections of the people, it cannot be said that the castes now known as the "Other Backward Classes" alone constitute the weaker sections of the people.

The question of giving effect to Article 46 of the Constitution was engaging the attention of Government for some time past and Government has come to the conclusion that time has now come to make a beginning in this direction. The concessions at present given to the Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes are not proposed to be touched since the Constitution requires the State Government to undertake special measures for their welfare. The list of the "Other Backward Classes", which has been prepared on the basis of Caste is however proposed to be drafted afresh on another suitable thasis. If the provisions of Article 46 of the Constitution are to be given effect to, the criteria for preparing the fresh list of "Other Backward Classes" will have to be income. Roughly speaking, the income of a person with economic agricultural holding per year would be Rs. 900. Any one therefore having an income of Rs. 900 or less will be deemed to be in need of assistance from State funds. Such persons will roughly be Small land holders. (Rs. 1,50 lakhs), landless labourers (57 lakhs), low-paid servants and persons with low income in urban areas (67 lakhs) and Small traders and hawkers (32,000) etc., Such persons will hereafter be deem to belong to the newly constituted "Other Backward Classes". The population of such "Other Backward Classes" by application of this criterion will it is estimated be 2.93 crores i.e., 60 per cent. of the total population of the State.

To start with pupils belonging to the newly constituted "Other Backward Classes" will be given free-studentships at all stages of education. This scheme will apply to the entire State. The extra cost on account of this concession is roughly estimated at Rs. 65 lakhs. It is, therefore, proposed to make an additional provision of Rs. 65 lakhs for the next year's budget.

Henceforward, Other Backward Classes based on caste will cease to exist. Similarly, concessions now being given to them will also cease to exist, However, individuals from Other Backward Classes who are already granted concessions will not be deprived of them.

Remarks.—The State Government has taken a great lead in the encouragement of cultural activities in the State which are constantly on the increase after reorganisation. Every year State Natya and Sangeet Mahotsavas are celebrated and Tamasha and Bhavai Mahotsavas are held. Prizes are distributed to the best performances and best actors and directors. Grants are also given to indigent artists as token of appreciation of their services in the past. Under the Scheme, grants are also given to Municipalities and other private institutions for construction of open air theatres. All efforts are being made to organise the festivals at district head quarters where there are no facilities for the public to witness such festivals. It is the intention of Government that all district head quarters should have by rotation an opportunity to hold such festivals. The participating Village Panchayats should bear the expenditure on account of Travelling Allowance and Dearness Allowance of the member delegates. Remarks.—Purna Town is a junction station on the Manmad Secunderabad Meter Gauge Branch line of Central Railway. There is a general scarcity of water in Purna Town. The Central Railways are also greatly handicapped due to scarcity of water as they need storage of water for their own use. At present the water supply is made from the well in the bed of Purna river. With the expansion of facilities the present arrangement is quite inadequate. The Central Railways therefore offered to undertake the construction of an anicut across the river and build the storage of water for their use. Accord on the agreement of either undertaking the work by Central Railways or by both i.e. Central Railway and State Government however was not reached. If the Central Railways were given permission to undertake the work, Government would have lost the only site suitable for water supply to Purna Town. After careful consideration of the matter, Government has decided to take up the Scheme as Government Scheme and execute it accordingly. The Scheme will take into account the requirement of water supply to the town as well as to the railways. The supply of water to railways will be made on rate basis which will be decided later on. The plans and estimates of the scheme will be sanctioned during the current financial year and the scheme will come up for execution in 1959-60. The scheme is admitted in the Plan. A sum of Rs. 3,50,000 is required for 1959-60.

The pipes are badly choked to the extent of 50 per cent. to 70 per cent. of the area of the pipe sections and hence give a low discharge of about 62,500 gallons per day. To give immediate relief to the people, it is proposed to lay a new 6 inches diameter C. I. Main for about 5,000 feet and to remove old 4 inches and 3 inches C. I. Main recondition them and relay the useful length. This is expected to increase the discharge from about 80,000 gallons to 180,000 gallons per day. The work is proposed to be carried out by relay method without disturbing water supply to the town. The scheme amounting to Rs. 93,600 gross has been administratively approved by Government and technical sanction is being accorded by the Superintending Engineer concerned shortly. The scheme will come up for execution in next year. A sum of Rs. 50,000 is required for 1959-60.

Remarks.—Umri is an important cotton exporting town in Bhokar Taluka of Nanded District. There are two main areas of the town, one is cotton market area called the Gandhi Ganj which is situated on high level and the other is called old town which is situated on a low hillock. At present people of the town draw water from wells. In Ganj area there are no wells and people of that area have entirely to depend on the wells in the valley portion. Almost all wells become dry during the hot season. Great hardship is therefore felt in hot season to collect water and transport it to long distances and high altitudes. It is therefore proposed to construct a storage Reservoir of 35 M.C. F. T. capacity in the upstream of Gorta Nalla very near Somtana village. The site is the best available and provides deep water basin. The ultimate capacity of the Reservoir will be 1,20,000 gallons per 12 hours. The immediate requirement of the town is 1,50,000 gallons per day. These scheme covers distribution system of laying 1,500 feet of 9 inches Hume Pipes 'C' class trunk main to supply water to Ganj area and old town. The scheme is estimated to cost Rs. 5,62,000. The plans and estimates are at present being scrutinised by the Superintending Engineer. The scheme will be taken up for excution during 1959-60. The scheme is proposed to be admitted in the Plan. A sum of Rs. 1,00,000 is required for 1959-60.

Remarks.—It is proposed to establish experimental and Seed Multiplication Farms in Canal Zone area at Palitana and Wankaner for conducting experiments on the proper utilisation of canal water in connection with the crops in the region along with other agronomic trials such as multiplication of improved varieties of crops and arranging demonstration. The acquisition of additional land for the experimental and seed multiplication farm at Puna-Sasoi is also necessary as the former Saurashtra Government had handed over to the Defence Department, 38 acres of land for the cantonment area. A provision of Rs. 1,00,000 is, therefore, proposed for the acquisition of land at the above three places during the year 1959-60.

The merits of various proposals made by Principal Port Officer and Engineer, Bombay State, for these ports have been examined and are considered absolutely necessary to undertake above mentioned works during 1959-60. The detailed justification for each item is given below:—

- Item (1) Providing open transit shed with ramp and asphalt approach road at Malwan.—At present great difficulties are being experienced for want of transit shed. Also the top of Jetty being higher than the ground level it is essential to provide a ramp for easy entrance and exit. The approach road being in bad condition is required to be improved to facilitate traffic.
- Item (2) Constructing low level approach road and platform for landing at Dahanu.—Considerable traffic at this port has necessitated the construction of this work to facilitate berthing of craft and handling of cargo.
- Item (3) Constructing concrete platform as open Cargo space for Port Deogad.—As there is no stacking cargo on open space near jetty and platform, inconvenience is being experienced. This work is considered absolutely necessary for facilities of traffic and convenience to passengers.
- Item (4) Constructing Passenger shed at Shriwardhan.—Passengers are mostly from surrounding villages and they have to wait for steamer both while in sailing or disensailing. This work is proposed for extending facilities to passengers embarking and disembarking at this port. The proposed shed will accommodate nearly 200 passengers.
- Item (5) Making additions and alterations to Chavdi building to convert it into Rest House at Elephanta.— Taking into consideration the increasing traffic at Elephanta, it is considered essential to convert the existing old dilapidated Chavdi building into inspection bungalow, with two suits and extra rooms.
- Item (6) Making water supply arrangements at Ports.—Due to non-availability of drinking water at the ports passengers are experiencing great difficulties. Necessary arrangements for water supply facilities either by open wells or boring are required to be made by providing storage tanks, taps etc.

Remarks.—In order to reduce the adverse effect of sea waves on the front side of the existing break water which is damaged due to wave action, it is considered absolutely necessary to completely close this break water and extend it by 15'. by means of concrete blocks and suitable filling. This will prevent further damage and provide-more shelter to the proposed Jetty. This will help to give shelter to the water basin for working mall vessels. The wall of concrete block similar to one proposed now is already constructed on western side. This has proved well after monsoon and hence it is necessary to construct another one to provide similar concrete blocks along the break-water in Circular shape. These blocks are joined to the existing break-water by filling the indice with rubble stone to the required level. The estimated cost of the work is Rs. 64,000 and work has been administratively approved vide, Government Memorandum, Public Works Department, JET 1958-M, dated the 9th June 1958. The work has been technically sanctioned. The work is included in Second Five Year Plan and classified as "Absolutely Essential".

Remarks.—In the 2nd Five Year Plan dry dock has been provided with a view to providing overhaul repairs to port crafts. The dimensions of the proposed dock are 150' × 55'. Every year every craft is required to be examined below the water line and this needs some facility for the purpose. Dry dock is considered a necessary requirement at a port where some steel fleet operates. Besides this annually a dry dock is useful for major overhaul. In Porbander, previously great hardship was not felt as mostly the timber crafts of small dimensions and the traffic was essentially of sailing vessels. With the steamer traffic coming up the projected development of the port sizeable vessels are being acquired for the port and this alone needs a dry dock of the medium size.

The plans and estimates are under scrutiny and are expected to be sanctioned shortly.

Remarks.—For 16,000 animals accommodated in the Aarey Milk Colony some 7 crore lbs. of hay costing Rs. 35 lakhs is annually imported from hay producing areas in Thana and Surat Districts. The purchases are made from hay merchants from these as well as those in Bombay who buy grass from local producers. The Department has, therefore, to buy the stock from these merchants at high prices. There is also no choice regarding the quality of hay purchased. In order, therefore, to obtain good quality hay at reasonable rates directly from the local producers and thereby avoiding the commission charges of the hay merchants it is proposed to establish 4 or 5 Government hay depots in the vicinity of the important railway stations between Palghar and Bilimora. Arrangements will be made at each of these depots for buying hay directly from producers in season as well as for pressing, baling and storage. The hay will, thereafter, be imported into Bombay as and when required. By so doing it would be possible not only to control the quality of hay but also it would ensure the availability of hay at very reasonable rates. The first of such depots is proposed to be started at Palghar where considerable quantity of good quality hay is produced. The Department also owns about 3,000 acres of grass lands in its vicinity.

The total expenditure proposed to be incurred on the establishment of the hay depot at Palghar is to the tune of Rs. 3,50,000 as per details given below, which amount is proposed to be provided in 1959-60 budget:—

Remarks.—The Indian National Dairy Research Institute holds two years courses for the Indian Dairy Diploma at Bangalore. The Agricultural Institute at Allahabad also holds such courses. In view of the expansion of dairying all over the country in which Bombay State has the largest number of schemes, the existing training arrangements are inadequate.

- 2. Government of India have, therefore, desired that the Aarey Milk Colony should start giving instructions for the Diploma Course to 40 to 50 students each year.

Remarks.—The Bombay Milk Scheme is handling about 4,200 maunds of pasteurised bottled milk per day, which is about half of the City's requirements. At present the scheme is distributing milk for domestic consumption through about 900 centres which work for an hour or so in the mornings and in the evenings. It is proposed to have a few Milk Centres throughout the day to sell milk bottles to the customers and also sell flavoured m'k ice-cream, etc. for on the spot consumption. For this purpose Milk Bar and Refrigerated Milk Distribution Equipment are required. During his tour of Australia in 1955, under the Colombo Plan, Shri D. N. Khurody, the Milk Commissioner, Bombay, saw Milk Bars in operation in Australia and in the course of his discussion with the Honourable Mr. R. G. Casey, Minister for External Affairs and the Honourable Mr. M. C. Ewan, Minister for Commerce and Agriculture, Government of Australia, he discussed the feasibility of getting a few such Milk Bar equipments for India when he was informed that if a request was made through official channel, the request would be considered sympathetically. This item is proposed in pursuance of that discussion.

The necessary application for the supply of equipment under the Colombo Plan has been made to the Government of India. The installation of Milk Bars would also permit the economic utilization of surplus milk during the seasonal variations.

The net cost to the State Government is estimated to be Rs. 8,01,000 as under:-

An amount of Rs. 87,00,000 at the rate of Rs. 290 per ton including cost price, incidental charges and commission to co-operative societies is accordingly required for purchasing 30,000 tons of superphosphate during 1959-60.

2. At present superphosphate is supplied to the cultivators in Saurashtra, Kutch and Vidarbha at subsidised rates in pursuance of the policy laid down by the ex-Saurashtra, Kutch and Madhya Pradesh Governments. The subsidised sales are not made in old Bombay State area and in Marathwada. In Marathwada and Vidarbha tagai loans are advanced to cultivators to meet 75 per cent. of the cost of purchases. It is now proposed to sell the superphosphate to cultivators at a subsidised rate of Rs. 254.75 per ton throughout the State. The expenditure on the payment of subsidy works out to Rs. 10,87,500 for which a Section I New Item has been put up separately under '40-Agriculture'. A section I new item for grant of tagai loans to cultivators in Marathwada and Vidarbha has also been put up under "P-Loans and Advances" has also been put up under "P-Loans and Advances".

Mds. of milk is likely to be handled through this scheme. In 1959-60 it is proposed to handle upto 125 B. Mds. An amount of Rs. 3,00,000 will therefore be required for the purpose during 1959-60. Probable receipt would be Rs. 4,85,000.

Remarks.—Under Scheme No. 737 of the Second Five-Year Plan of the Reorganised Bombay State, an allotment of Rs. 5 lakes has been made for making loans to Municipalities in Kutch region for development of 4 towns of Bhuj, Mandvi, Anjar and Mundra in accordance with the approved development plans for these towns. No provision for payment of loans under this scheme was made so far in the budget as detailed were to be settled in consultation with all concerned.

The Plan allotment is only Rs. 5 lakhs and the municipalities concerned may require larger amounts for development of their towns. It is, therefore proposed to make ad hoc provision of the whole amount of Rs. 5 lakhs in the Budget estimate for 1959-60, for payment of loans to the Municipalities concerned provided that the financial position of the Municipality is certified to be sound and it is able to repay the principle and interest of the loan during a prescribed period.

Remarks.—The scheme for grant of financial assistance to small scale dairy farmers for purchasing dairy animals, dairy equipment, construction of cattle-sheds etc., was in existance in the old Bombay State, but was discontinued due to financial stringency. It is necessary to encourage mixed farming in the state and to that end grant assistance to agriculturists for subsidiary activities like small scale dairying. This would enable even small-holders to become self-supporting. It is, therefore, proposed to revive the scheme and to make a provision of Rs. 2,00,000 for the scheme. The terms and conditions for advancing the loan would be as under:—

- (1) The loan should be advanced to small-scale dairy farmers for purchasing dairy animals, dairy equipment, construction of cattle-sheds etc.
 - (2) The loan in each case should not exceed Rs. 1,000.
 - (3) The rate of interest will be as fixed by Government.
 - (4) The loan will be recoverable in five equal annual instalments.
- (5) Loans will be advanced by the Regional Dairy Development Officers concerned, in consultation with the Dairy Development Commissioner.
 - (6) The recovery of loan will be made by the Revenue authorities.

A provision of Rs. 2,00,000 (Rupees two lakhs only) is required for the purpose.

Remarks.—There are small distributors of milk who collect milk from small dairy farmers and after processing it, supply it to consumers. At all the places Government may not be able to set up its own distribution schemes. It is therefore proposed to encourage the enterprising distributors and help them not only with technical advice, but in the beginning give them financial help to enable them to appoint properly qualified staff as Chemists, Managers, etc., and also to provide them with milk testing equipment. In the Anand area, such help is given to Co-operative Schemes by the Bombay Milk Department. The terms and conditions for advancing the loans will be as under:—

- (1) The loan will be advanced to small distributors and/or processors in towns and small cities, upto a maximum of Rs. 5,000 per party for setting up a milk testing laboratory and for employment of technical staff.
 - (2) The rate of interest will be as fixed by Government.
- (3) The loan will be recovered in five equal annual instalments, from the year following the year in which the loan is paid.
- (4) Loans will be advanced by the Regional Dairy Development Officers of the area, in consultation with the Dairy Development Commissioner.
 - (5) The recovery of loan will be made by the Revenue authorities.

A provision of Rs. 1,00,000 (Rupees one lakh) only is required for the purpose during 1959-60.

Remarks.—India is the largest exporter of cashew kernels supplying to the extent of about 95 per cent. of the world's demand. The value of exported material amounts to about Rs. 14 crores annually, out of which 85 per cent, is exported to the United States of America, which ultimately forms the most important source of dollar earning. At present the area occupied by the cashewnut crop in the entire Bombay State is about 4,900 acres. It is proposed to extend the area to 84,900 acres by the end of the Second Five Year Plan. This tree can be grown on hill slopes, Varkas lands and on poor stony soils in dry areas. The climate and soil conditions of the entire Konkan tract and parts of Kolhapur and Satara districts are most congenial for the cultivation of cashewnut. The maximum scope for extension of cashewnut cultivation is in Ratnagiri district where about 9 lakhs acres, accounting for nearly 40 per cent. of the area of the district, can be gainfully brought under cashewnut cultivation. A scheme has accordingly been drawn up for extensive cultivation of cashewnut and has been forwarded to the Indian Council of Agricultural Research for its approval. Certain staff for preliminary survey work has been sanctioned during the current year. It is proposed to bring an area of about 13,300 acres of land under cashewnut cultivation during 1959-60. For this purpose, it is proposed to grant loans to the cultivators at the rate of Rs. 60 per acre. The loans will be disbursed through the Revenue Department, will carry a simple rate of interest, of 4½ per cent. and will be recovered in 8 equated annual instalments, the first instalment being payable after a period of not more than 5 years from the date of advancement. Accordingly, a provision of Rs. 7,98,000 will be required during the year 1959-60 for the grant of loans.

It is expected that the entire amount required for advancing loans will be provided by Indian Council of Agricultural Research, who have already been approached in the matter.

Remarks.—The Scheme which has been in existence in old Bombay area envisages grant of financial assistance to the Fisheries Co-operative Societies by way of (i) Subsidies towards managerial cost and (ii) Short-term loans for purchase of fishing accessories. In addition to these concessions, it has been proposed to extend financial aid by way of loan and subsidy on the basis of 50:50 to the two Federal Institutions of the Fisheries Co-operative Societies to construct three godowns for storage of dry fish for assisting the affiliated societies in marketing their dry fish.

A target of 120 societies has been proposed for the remaining period of the plan. In addition to this, target of construction of the godowns two at Bombay and one at Veraval (Saurashtra) had also been proposed. Of these 50 societies will be from component areas. And remaining societies will be from Bombay area.

During the year 1959-60 it is proposed to sanction managerial subsidies to 244 Co-operative Fisheries Societies in the component areas. It is also proposed to sanction short-term loans to 15 Co-operative Fisheries Societies towards the purchase of the accessories, etc. One society will be sanctioned financial assistance for the construction of godowns. Remarks.—Under the Subsidised Industrial Housing Scheme sponsored by the Government of India in 1952-53 financial assistance by way of 50 % loan and 25 % subsidy is granted to employers for constructions of tenements for their employees. The Scheme was being administered by the Government of India till 1958-59. In the middle of 1958-59 Government of India have transferred the administration of the scheme to the State Government and accordingly applications for loans under consideration of Government of India have been transferred to the State Government. A loan provision of Rs. 7 lakhs is, therefore, proposed to meet expenditure on these schemes during 1959-60. A provision of Rs. 1 lakh for grant of subsidy to employers under the scheme has been proposed separately. The entire amount will come from the Government of India.

Remarks.—With a view to encouraging the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes to take to cattle breeding and dairy farming and thus supplement their income, it is proposed to supply them pure bred-cows on loan-cumsubsidy basis. 50% of the cost would be borne by Government by way of subsidy and the balance by way of interest free loans to be recovered in ten annual instalments. The average cost of a pure bred-cow is about Rs. 300. Every year about 200 cows will be supplied at a total cost of Rs. 60,000 (Rs. 30,000 as subsidy and Rs. 30,000 as loan).

Remarks.—A vast majority of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes subsists on agriculture mainly as landless seasonal labourers. A small section of these classes owns petty lands but its income from such lands is meagre. A still smaller section follows hereditary occupations like tanning, leather work or weaving, but the methods of production adopted are outmoded, yielding very little income. Unless, therefore, they take to subsidiary occupations or new avocations or improve their existing methods of their work, reasonable improvement in their standard of living would not be possible. It is, therefore, proposed to give Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes assistance on loan-cum-subsidy basis for taking to suitable cottage industries or avocations or for improving their existing methods of work such as hawking, brick making, repairs to umbrellas, etc., hair-dressing saloons, tailoring, rough iron ware, cycle repairing shop, earthen pots, coir making, purchase of bullock carts for transport purposes, playing on murical instruments, etc. The maximum amount of loan-cum-subsidy assistance would be Rs. 500—50 per cent. being subsidy and 50 per cent being loan. The loan would be interest-free and would be recoverable in ten equal yearly instalments. The expenditure during 1959-60 is expected to be Rs. 1,85,000—Rs. 20,000 for Scheduled Tribes and Rs. 1,65,000 for Scheduled Castes Half of this amount would be utilised in granting subsidies.

Remarks.—Co-operative Housing Societies of Scheduled Castes in the former Bombay region are given financial assistance in the urban as well as rural areas as under:—

- (1) Free grant of land for housing purposes subject to a maximum of Rs. 5 per sq. yard in expensive localities;
- (2) Subsidy for management at Rs. 10 per tenement for the first two years and at Rs. 5 per tenement for the subsequent years until the loans given to the societies are fully repaid;
- (3) Financial assistance up to 75 per cent. of the construction according to approved type plans—50 per cent. by way of interest-free loan repayable in 25 years and the balance of 25 per cent. by way of subsidy.

It is proposed to extend the benefits of this scheme to the urban areas throughout the State. All places having a population of 10,000 and above will be deemed to be urban areas for the purposes of this scheme. With the introduction of this scheme, the present scheme will cease to apply to the rural areas of former Bombay region. However, Societies which have already become eligible for assistance in the former Bombay region will not be affected. A token provision of Rs. one lakh—Rs. 40,000 for subsidies and Rs. 60,000 for loads is proposed to be made for financial assistance to Schedulod Castes Co-operative Housing Societies in the remaining comporent units to start with. Remarks.—The Scheme of Co-operative Lift Irrigation has been under implementation in the pre-Reorganised Bombay State since June, 1949. This Scheme has not yet been extended to the other component parts except Marathwada for which a limited provision was made in the budget of 1957-58. It is now proposed that with a view to bring about uniformity in the pattern of development in all the component parts of the State, the Scheme as it obtains in the Bombay area should be uniformly applied to all the other component parts. The Scheme envisages financial assistance to Co-operative Lift Irrigation Societies as under:—

- (i) 50 per cent. of the capital cost as loan;

Remarks.—Dairy Industry has great potentiality to solve unemployment problem and raise the level of income of Agricultural commodity and of nutrition of public at large. The Scheme aims at the expansion programme of the Ahmedabad District Co-operative Milk Producers' Union Ltd., Ahmedabad and Baroda District Co-operative Milk Producers' Union Ltd., Baroda for developing their activities of collection, processing and distribution of milk. It envisages grant of financial assistance to the Milk Producers' Union and its Feeder Societies in Baroda and Ahmedabad Districts under their expansion programme. (i) Subsidies towards managerial cost and (ii) Loans for purchase of Dairy equipments.

Under the expansion programme proposed, each of the above Unions proposes to organise 100 Dairy Societies in its respective districts during three years so as to achieve the target of 1,000 maunds of milk per day at the end of the plan period.

For speedy organisation, supervision and direction from time to time and for proper co-ordination between the milk Unions and the Co-operative Department, it is proposed to provide the following additional staff. The creation of this additional staff is essential because of the increasing scope for development of Dairy Industries on Co-operative lines.

Remarks.—Ahmedabad city Taluka office was reorganised in 1955 by amalgamating two offices of City Mamlatdar and City Deputy Collector with a view to bringing under one control all the revenue and other recovery work in the Ahmedabad city and suburbs. The experience of the past 3 years has shown that with the existing set up the arrangements are not working as satisfactorily as was expected. It is, therefore, proposed to further reorganise the office by adding the following posts. After creation of these posts nine posts of Circle Inspectors previously sanctioned will be abolished.

Remarks.—There are several nomadic tribes and backward class communities like Laman, Banjara, Wadar, Kanjarkhaut, Phisipardhi, Vitolia, Halpati, Kolcha, etc., who generally move from place to place. Now, due to changed circumstances many have already settled at some places and others intend to settle somewhere. They are mostly landless. It is essential to secure for these persons a settled existence. To encourage these people to settle down in groups, it has been decided to grant them Government waste lands, not exceeding 2 gunthas in area and Rs. 200 in value, in individual cases for housing, free of occupancy price or where no Government waste lands are available, to acquire private lands for the purpose.

Remarks.—A large number of temporary posts borne on the District establishment under the Revenue Department are in existence for a long period which in some cases extends from 5 to 10 years. In view of the general increase in the work in all spheres under the Revenue Department, the posts are required permanently. As the posts have not been made permanent, a large number of Government servants some of whom have rendered 10 to 12 years service are still temporary and this is leading to discontent amongst the staff. It is, therefore, proposed to make permanent the following posts which are the absolute minimum requirements of the offices. The districtwise break up is given in the appended statement.

- 1. Eleven posts of Circle Officers in the grade of Rs. 100-8-140.
- 2. Eighty three posts of Circle Inspectors in the grade of Rs. 46-3-85-EB-4-125-5-130.

Remarks.—At present, whenever vacancies in clerical cadre occur, the Employment Exchange has to be approached. It takes time before the candidates recommended are selected. Further, the candidates selected are often reluctant to join if they are posted in out of the way Range Offices, when vacancies exist in such offices. Thus, the vacancies remain unfilled for a major period, and consequently the work suffers. The inconvenience is all the greater in smaller offices where the number of posts is small and in the Range offices where there is only one clerk.

- 2. This unsatisfactory state of affairs can be remedied only if there is a leave Reserve in the cadre, which will enable the posting of clerks from the leave reserve posts immediately when vacancies occur.
- 3. In these circumstances it is found necessary to sanction leave Reserve posts at 9 per cent. of the permanent cadre i.e. 54 leave Reserve posts as the number of permanent posts is 592. As four leave reserve posts already exist in Junagadh circle, exact number of leave reserve post to be created is 50 only. The ultimate cost of this proposal comes to Rs. 56,650 as detailed below:—

Remarks.—The Sales Tax Department has been functioning since 1946 and so far there has been no regular section attending to the maintenance of records in any of the offices in this Department. During the course of the last twelve years, a huge number of files have accumulated. Some of the files pertaining to these records are important and they are required to be produced in the Courts. It has therefore, become necessary to take steps for systematic preservation and classification of records and to maintain an up-to-date index of the record. For this purpose, a separate unit of record section consisting of three clerks, one peon and one Dafterband for each of the following seven Offices in the Sales Tax Department is necessary for the present :-

- Office of the Collector of Sales Tax, Bombay.
- Office of the Commissioner of Sales Tax, Eastern Division, Nagpur.
- Office of the Additional Collector of Sales Tax, Bombay City Division (Adm.), Bombay. Office of the Additional Collector of Sales Tax, Central Division, Bombay.
- 5.
- Office of the Additional Collector of Sales Tax, Northern Division, Ahmedabad.
 Office of the Additional Collector of Sales Tax, Bombay City Division (Adm.), Range II, Bombay.
- Office of the Assistant Collector of Sales Tax (Adm.), Northern Division, Range II, Ahmedabad.

Remarks.—A certain amount of evasion practised by dealers is normally detected at the time of their assessment. For the purpose of the ad hoc investigation of information received from time to time relating to large scale evasion and for the detection of dealers carrying on business without registration though liable under the Act to pay tax, the Enforcement Branch in Bombay City came into being in April 1953. Experience of the working of the Enforcement Branch shows that both the Sales Tax Officers and the Sales Tax Inspectors there, have far more arduous work and greater responsibilities than their opposite numbers in the ordinary ward offices. The latter are largely concerned with the more routine type of checking, and usually the assessee is only too anxious to supply information and evidence called for by the Sales Tax Officer. On the other hand, in Enforcement Branch work, it has been found that every action of the Sales Tax Officer and the Sales Tax Inspector, including the very order of seizure of books and issue of

notices to produce certain details, are subjected to very close scrutiny by the dealers and their consultants and every possible effort is made to detect some defect in the proceedings with a view to an immediate challenge of the validity of the entire proceedings. Besides, the checking to which the books are subjected in the Enforcement Branch is of a very thorough and meticulous nature and not even the smallest items can be passed without the strictest scrutiny. The responsibility for carrying out a successful visit and scrutinizing the account books and deciding on the spot as to the propriety of seizing any of them, and thereafter safeguarding the seized books till they are fully checked, is also very great. There is also some element of personal risk as certain hostile dealers might stop at nothing in seeing that the duplicate set of books or their secret notes of transactions do not fall into the hands of the Sales Tax Officers. In the ordinary assessment case, the Sales Tax Officer and Sales Tax Inspector would be able to finalise it at two or three sittings. With Enforcement Branch cases, a single investigation might take several months, and might call for a reference to Sales Tax Officers in various other places and even to the authorities of other States. The figures of extra tax assessed by the Sales Tax Officers in the Enforcement Branch are:—

In view of all these circumstances it is considered necessary to sanction special pay of Rs. 35 per mensem to each of the Sales Tax Officers working in the Enforcement Branch of Bombay City and Rs. 15 per mensem to three senior Sales Tax Inspectors out of those working under each Sales Tax Officer in the Enforcement Branch in Bombay City.

There are in all 19 Sales Tax Officers in the Enforcement Branch of the Bombay City and the annual extra cost en account of the special pay to the Sales Tax Officers and Sales Tax Inspectors, in the Enforcement Branch of the Bombay City comes to Rs. 18,240.

Remarks.—A large number of temporary posts in the Revenue Offices in the districts are in existence for a long period which in some cases extends from five to ten years. In view of the general increase in work in almost all offices, all these posts are required permanently. As the posts have not been made permanent a large number of Government servants some of whom have rendered ten to twelve years service are still temporary and this is leading to discontent amongst the staff. It is, therefore, proposed to make permanent the following posts which are the absolute minimum requirements of the offices:—

Funds placed at the disposal of Divisional Commissioner, Nagpur Rs. 9,80,500 under 25 General Administration-G-District Administration-S-Other Establishment-S-2 Pargana and Village Watandars and village expenses for payment of remuneration for the collection of land revenue, during the current financial year is hardly sufficient to meet the demands of the village Patels in Vidarbha in respect of their remuneration which is to be now based on the scales prevalent in Bombay. The remuneration which the village Patels were getting up to 1st October 1956, according to former Madhya Pradesh Government scales after abolition of the watandari system was Rs. 17,58,308 while according to the scale of rates now sanctioned under Rule 9 of Madhya Pradesh Land Revenue (Village Patels) comes to Rs. 7,11,515 only. In order to narrow down this large difference in payment of remuneration it is decided to grant to the Patels in Vidarbha as in Bombay, additional remuneration on Potgi, Chora Kharch, collection of local cess, special remuneration and 50 per cent increase. If this is done the total remuneration payable to Patels in Vidarbha would come to Rs. 14,55,662 which is less than what they were getting before reorganisation. It is, therefore absolutely necessary to place an additional grant of Rs. 4,75,170 at the disposal of the Commissioner, Nagpur Division, during 1959-60.

ITEM 21. Introduction of uniform Judicial set-up in the State of Bombay.

Lump-sum provision on ad-hoc basis Rs. 5 lakhs.

Explanatory Memorandum.—As enjoined in the directive principle of State policy in the constitution of India, the separation of Judiciary from the Executive was brought into force in the pre-reorganisation State of Bombay with effect from 1st July 1953, by the enactment of the Bombay Separation of Judicial and Executive Functions Act, 1951. Saurashtra, which followed the Bombay pattern, had also passed an Act, for this purpose, known as "The Saurashtra Separation of Judicial and Executive Functions Act, 1952". In the Hyderabad area, which now forms part of the Bombay State though there has been separation of judicial and executive functions in fact, it was not effected by law but by executive instructions. In the Vidarbha and Kutch areas of the present State of Bombay, there was no separation of the Judiciary from the Executive, though in the former area it was accepted in principle and some preliminary steps were taken in that direction. Government had, therefore, appointed a Special Officer for formulating proposals for (i) a uniform judicial set up; and (ii) unification of procedural laws, including proposals for the separation of the Judiciary from the Executive where this was not operating. report submitted to Government by him envisaged a uniform judicial set-up in the newly added areas of Vidarbha, Marathwada, Saurashtra and Kutch on the Bombay pattern. To achieve this, it was also necessary to undertake legislation for extending (i) the Bombay Separation of Judicial and Executive Functions Act, (ii) the Code of Criminal Procedure, in its applications to the old Bombay State, and (iii) the Bombay Civil Courts Act, to the newly added areas of Vidarbha, Marathwada, Saurashtra and Kutch. In this connection, the Legislature has already passed Bill No. LIII of 1958, providing for the Separation of the performance of judicial and executive functions by Officers throughout the State of Bombay, to provide for uniformity in the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898, in its application to the whole of the State, and for matters connected with the purposes aforesaid and Bill No. LXXXV of 1958, providing uniformity in the Law relating to the District and Subordinate Civil Courts in the State of Bombay.

The acceptance of the principle of uniform judicial set-up in the newly added areas of Vidarbha, Marathwada, Saurashtra and Kutch on the Bombay pattern will involve setting up of additional Civil Courts, creation of additional Judicial Districts and sanctioning of additional staff for some of the Courts. The High Court has proposed initially to introduce the uniform judicial set-up in the newly added areas on the Bombay pattern with as little as extra expenditure to Government as possible. The extra cost to Government for replacing the Judicial set-up in the newly added areas by the set-up of Bombay with effect from the 1st April 1959 is estimated as follows:—

Although the initial cost on account of uniform judicial set-up to be introduced in the newly added areas is estimated to be at Rs. 5,62,295, steps will be taken to accommodate this initial expenditure in the allocated amount of Rs. 5 lakhs. Later on once the uniform judicial set-up is introduced in the newly added areas, the question of setting up of new additional Civil Courts and sanctioning of additional staff for some of the Courts will be taken by Government as and when funds permit. It has therefore been proposed for the present to make a total provision of Rs. 5 lakhs in the budget estimates of 1959-60 for the initial introduction of the uniform judicial set-up in the newly added areas of Vidarbha, Marathwada. Saurashtra and Kutch as proposed by the High Court.

Remarks.—Consequent on the reorganisation of the States, the Police Wireless operating staff from Vidarbha, Marathwada, Saurashtra and Kutch has to work in conjunction with the wireless staff of the former State of Bombay. In order to ensure quick and efficient communication over the Police Wireless in the new State of Bombay it is considered necessary to arrange for a Refresher Course for the operating staff. It is therefore, proposed to open a Wireless Training Centre at Nagpur. In all, about 235 men will undergo the Refresher Course, which would extend over at least six months' duration, in batches of twenty-five. The opening of the proposed centre necessitates the entertainment of staff and provision of equipment, tools and instruments, etc. the staff will be employed for a period of 1 year in the first instance. The provision required on this account during the year 1959-60 is as shown below:—

a strength of 1 Unarmed Head Constable and 3 Unarmed Police Constables. Its jurisdiction covers a population of about 8,000 persons opproximately, which is gradually increasing. Bhabhar is an important railway station on the Deesa-Kandla line of the Western Railway, from the business point of view. It is surrounded by 120 villages which are dependent upon it and a very large number of displaced persons from West Pakistan have settled there. The area surrounding Bhabhar is just close to the Pakistan Border and it is very important from the security point of view to have a Police Station there. In order to have an effective control over crime in such a flourishing town, it is proposed to convert the Out Post at Bhabhar into a Police Station with an additional strength of 1 Police Sub-Inspector, 6 Head Constables, 6 Police Constables (Unarmed) and 1 Head Constable and 4 Police Constables (Armed). On the whole the total strength required for Bhabhar Police Station will be 1 Police Sub-Inspector, 9 Head Constables, 5 Police Constables (Unarmed), 1 Head Constable and 4 Police Constables (armed), out of which, 3 Unarmed Head Constables and 9 Unarmed Police Constables will be made available from the existing strength of the Banas Kautha District Police Force, i.e., by transferring the present out-posts at Inderwa and Terwada with their strength under the jurisdiction of the proposed Police Station at Bhabhar.

Remarks.—With the amalgamation of the areas covered by the 5 Police Stations from Thana District now transferred to the Greater Bombay, namely Borivli, Malad, Kandivali, Aarey and Mulund, the Prohibition work has increased considerably, as all these areas are distillation centres and supply cases for the City. The whole place is full of jungles, hills,c reeks, etc., which provides natural hideouts for bootleggers. To meet this situation, a new Borivli Prohibition Sector with the necessary staff therefor and the additional staff to augment the Northern Preventive Sector (Ghatkopar) have been sanctioned during the year 1958-59. It is now proposed to sanction the additional staff, motor vehicles and furniture as detailed below:—

Remarks.—The work of the Crime Branch of the C. I. D. in Greater Bombay has progressively increased with the increase in the population of the City and the general public asks for C. I. D. investigation almost in every criminal case in which the local police has been unsuccessful or where exhaustive enquiries of the C. I. D. are essential. The Crime Branches of the C. I. D. in Bombay were last reorganised in 1944 but the strength remained what it was decided some years ago although other factors have contributed to the increase in work such as the influx of displaced persons etc. after partition, merging of the B. S. D. areas etc. in the City which has increased the number of Police Stations from 20 in 1945 to 26 at present. There has also been increase in the number of serious crimes. It is therefore considered necessary to reorganise the Crime Branch of the C. I. D. with a view to ensure more efficient and speedier investigation of serious cases. As a first stage towards reorganisation of this Branch, it is proposed to sanction the additional staff of 2 Inspectors, 8 Sub-Inspectors, 1 Head Clerk, 3 Clerks, 1 Photographer, 1 Searchers, 10 Head Constables including 3 Head Constable Writers and 27 Constables including 3 Constable Writers for this Branch.

The following provision will be necessary in the budget for 1959-60 for meeting the cost of additional staff:—

Remarks.—On account of inadequate accommodation in the Police lock-ups in Greater Bombay, all lock-ups were over-crowded. A new lock-up comprising of 15 cells, including 2 cells for women, "to accommodate 60 undertrial prisoners was, therefore, constructed in the compound of the Bhoiwada Police Station, to relieve the congestion. The lock-up started functioning from 7th February 1955. The Inspector of Police, Bhoiwada Police Station, has been entrusted with the additional charge of this lock-up and he is responsible for payment of Bhatta to prisoners and maintenance of daily accounts of permanent advance account. He is assisted in his work by two constables who have been provided temporarily from the sanctioned strength. An armed guard consisting of three Head Constables, three Lance Naiks and 15 Constables, with relief after every 12 hours, is required to keep guard at the lock-up by day and night. Further, 18 Unarmed Constables are required to work in three shifts for the custody of the prisoners in the cells. The extra men required have been temporarily spared from the sanctioned strength. It will, however, not be possible to spare these men permanently from the sanctioned strength, as it would have adverse effect on the working of Armed Force and the Police Stations from which they have been drawn. It is, therefore, proposed to sanction the additional staff comprising of three Head Constables and 38 Constables for duty at the lock-up.

The following provisions will be necessary in the budget of 1959-60 for meeting the cost of additional staff:-

Remarks.—The scales of pay of Head Clerks and Accountants of the District Police Clerical Cadre are not commensurate with the heavy duties and responsibilities devolving upon them. Government, therefore, sanctioned special pay of Rs. 20 per mensem and Rs. 10 per mensem to the Head Clerks and Accountants respectively, borne on this cadre. Subsequently in supersession of these orders, Government restricted the grant of special pay of Rs. 10 per mensem to both Junior and Senior Accountants and special pay of Rs. 20 per mensem to the Junior Grade Head Clerks, subject to the condition that pay plus special pay should not exceed the maximum of their grade pay. It is, however, observed that the condition so imposed works harshly on the Accountants and the Head Clerks. It is, therefore, proposed to remove this condition. The provision required for this purpose during the financial year 1959-60 is shown below:—

Remarks.—On account of the extension of the limits of Greater Bombay, the number of Police Stations and Sub-Police Stations has increased by 6 (3 Police Stations plus 3 Sub-Police Stations). In consequence of the increase in the number of Police Stations and Sub-Stations the demands for transport facilities from all the new Police Stations and Sub-Stations have increased to a considerable extent. The existing fleets of motor vehicles of the Greater Bombay Motor Transport Section is unable to meet their demands for the Police Vehicles in view of the shortage of vehicles. In order to meet the normal demands of these new Police Stations and Sub-Stations, for efficient disposal of Police work, it is necessary to increase the number of motor vehicles. It is, therefore, proposed to purchase 2 jeeps and one Station wagon and to entertain necessary staff for a period of one year in the first instance. The Sub-Divisional Police Officer, Eastern Division, has 14 Police Stations under his jurisdiction covering an area of 2,926 square miles and over 1,000 Criminal Cases in this Division. Remarks.—At a conference of the Inspectors General of Police held in May 1956, it was decided that there should be a Police Research Centre in each State for the study of socio-economic developments in the country, with particular reference to the impact they have on the law and order position and to devise ways and means to check the incidence of crime. The centre will collect and collate necessary statistics and disseminate the results of research work for the benefit of the Police and find out causes and circumstances as to why a particular form of crime is on the increase in a particular district and in a particular area, which criminals are suspected or actually involved in such crimes, etc., etc. and from this data, the Research Centre will draw conclusions concerning investigations and suggest remedies to bring about improvements. On the recommendation of the Government of India, this Government has decided to establish a Research Centre with a staff of 1 Deputy Superintendent of Police, 2 Sub-Inspectors, 2 Head Constables and 1 Statistician for a period of one year. The following provision will be necessary in the 1959-60 budget on this account:—

Remarks.—The old Bombay State had 3 Police Motor Transport Workshops at Poona, Baroda and Belgaum for repairs and reconditioning of Police Vehicles. On account of the reorganisation of States, the entire workshop at Belgaum along with equipment and personnel was transferred to the Mysore State. The existing two workshops at Poona and Baroda cannot cope up with the additional repair work from the new Districts added to the Bombay State. The condition of the Motor Vehicles which have come to this State along with the new areas, is far from satisfactory. In the absence of proper servicing facilities the condition of these vehicles is deteriorating. It is, therefore, absolutely necessary, to set up Police Workshops at three Range Headquarters, i.e., at Nagpur, Rajkot and Aurangabad, with necessary staff, equipment and mobile repairs workshops. It is, therefore, proposed to set up Police workshops at Nagpur, Rajkot and Aurangabad, with equipment and necessary staff at a total cost of Rs. 7,45,000 (non-recurring), including the cost of buildings, and Rs. 1,94,507 recurring. It is, however, proposed to spread the setting up of these workshops over a period of three years. During the financial year 1959-60, it is accordingly proposed to entertain staff and purchase equipments at a total cost of Rs. 1,86,400 only, excluding the cost of buildings. The proposed staff will be entertained for a period of one year, in the first instance. The total provision required on this account during 1959-60, is as shown below:—

Remarks.—Due to the Re-organisation of the State of Bombay, the set-up of the Police Offices was re-organised and six offices of Range Deputy Inspectors General of Police were sanctioned with head-quarters at Rajkot, Ahmedabad, Bombay, Poona, Aurangebad end Nagpur. The clerical work in these offices has increased tremendously and the existing staff is finding it extremely difficult to cope up with the increased work. Experience has also shown that the Head Clerks in these offices are not in a position to manage the increased volume of work. It is therefore proposed to sanction one post of an Office Superintendent for each of these offices. It is also considered necessary to sanction one post of a Selection Grade Clerk for each of the Offices of the Deputy Inspectors General of Police at Rajkot and Aurangabad. This staff is proposed to be entertained for a period of one year, in the first instance. The provision required for this purpose during 1959-60 is as follows:—

Remarks.—With the reorganistion of States, the area comprising the eight districts of Nagrur, Akola, Amravati, Bhandara, Buldhana, Chanda, Wardha and Yeotmal of the former State of Midhya Pradesh was transferred to the new State of Bombay along with a staff of 16 Deputy Superintendents of Police, 56 Police Inspectors, 321 Sub-Inspectors, 1182 Head Constables and 5648 Constables. This strength was found to be inadequate and to meet the immediate needs of the area, 5 additional posts of Deputy Superintendents, 10 posts of Police Inspectors 68 posts of Sub-Inspectors, 447 posts of Head Constables and 1695 posts of Constables were sanctioned during the year 1957-58 and 1958-59. To make necessary adjustment 22 posts of Reserve and Circle Inspectors were abolished in 1957-58.

2. The existing strength of the Police Force in the Vidarbha region is as follows :-

21 Deputy Superintendents, 44 Police Inspectors, 389 Sub-Inspectors, 1629 Head Constables and 7343 Constables. This strength has been found to be in adequate and the following additional staff is required for the districts in Vidarbha area:—

6 posts of Inspectors, 33 posts of Sub-Inspectors, 654 posts of Head Constables and 694 posts of Constables.

Out of this staff it is proposed to sanction during the year 1959-60 the following staff:-

6 posts of Inspectors, 33 posts of Sub-Inspectors, 160 posts of Head Constables and 129 posts of Constables, and the following provision is required to be made in the budget for 1959-60.

Remarks.—With the reorganisation of States, five districts of the former Hyderabad State, viz. Aurangabad, Bhir, Osmanabad, Nanded and Parbhani were transferred to Bombay State. The strength of the Police force in these districts is found to be inadequate. Government has sanctioned 300 posts of Head Constables for the immediate requirements of the Marathwada Districts. It is necessary to sanction at least 10 Sub-Inspectors, 100 more posts of Head Constables and a clerical staff in the interest of better administration in this area. The posts will be required for a period of one year in the first instance and the following provision will be required to be made in the budget of 1959-60.

Justification for each item is given below:

- 1. Replacement of Sand Pump of T. S. D., "MATIVIJAY."—The sand pump was purchased in the year 1953 and replacement has become overdue. Changing this pump will increase efficiency of dredging. Sand Pump includes casing, impeller and impeller shaft.
- 2. Purchase of two diesel Buses.—Two old buses of Bhavnagar port are in very poor condition. They are petrol driven. They are now beyond economical repair. The new buses proposed are of diesel. Initial cost will be little higher but it will be cheaper in running.
- 3. Special repairs to L. C. T., "NAGMATI."—The craft L. C. T., Nagmati is in dilapidated condition and requires complete overhaul of the Engine and repairs to hull. This craft was purchased from the disposal stock of the War Department and is very useful being a self-propelled craft. Moreover, Port Bedi handles during monsoon period, passengers from Africa and this craft is very suitable for the use and safety of the passengers. Hence special repairs to this important craft at an estimated cost of Rs. 1,50,000 are quite essential. In view of the difficulty of getting foreign exchange for procuring self propelled craft for the Port, it will not be possible to scrap this craft. Hence to overhaul this craft by rebuilding the hull will be an asset to Flotilla strength at Port Bedi.
- 4. Special repairs to Dredger at Porbander Port.—R. B. D., "PAVANKUMAR" the present deep Dredger at Port Porbandar has got timber hull and is of Non-Propelling type. It was purchased in the year 1924. Its present condition is very bad and the engine is of non-condensing type and thus it cannot give satisfactory service. Due to its deteriorated condition and especially due to the worn-out condition of the timber hull this plant has practically stopped working. This dredger is very useful for the maintenance of the navigational creek.

It is, therefore, proposed to carry out a complete overhaul of the engine changing its non-condensing system. and re-building its entire hull with steel plates.

Remarks.—The ex-Government of Hyderabad had decided to lay out a garden at the foot of Ajanta caves, which attract tourists from all over the world in order to provide the basic amenity of rest and recreations for the tourists and to beautify the otherwise bare surroundings. As the Government of India is interested in promoting tourist traffic, they were approached to give Central assistance for the Scheme. The Government of India have agreed to give a grant of Rs. 10,000 only towards the capital cost of the scheme on the condition that the cost of maintenance of the gardens will be met exclusively by the State Government. The Government of India are being approached to enhance their contribution towards the capital cost of the Schemes.

This scheme is not included in the Second Five-Year Plan. It is, however, an obligatory scheme in so far that it was proposed by the former Hyderabad Government to lay a garden at Ajanta. Besides it is highly desirable in so far that it will bring indirect economic benefits to the State resulting from increase in tourist traffic.

The work is required to be carried out at a very early date. Full provision of Rs. 63,822 is accordingly proposed for inclusion in the Budget Estimates for 1959-60.

Remark .- Bombay Act No. XIX of 1958 viz. Gandhidham (Development and Control on Erection of Buildings) Act, 1957, has come into force with effect from 7th August 1958 under the provisions of section 3 of the Act Gandhidham Deve opment Authority has been constituted. To he p the Authority in its day to day work the Authority has to establish an office and su ficient staff is required to be appointed. To start with the following post have been sanctioned from 16th October 1958, for a period of one year in the first instance:-

(1) One post of Head Clerk in the scale of Rs. 100—8—140—10—150 plus Dearness Allowance.
(2) One post of Steno-typist in the scale of Rs. 46—3—35—E.B.—4—125—5—130 with a stenography allowance of Rs. 30 per mensen or 40 per mensem plus Dearness Allowance.

(3) One post of peon in the scale of Rs. 30-1-35 plus Dearness Allowance.

In addition an amount of Rs. 1,390 has been sanctioned for purchase of articles of furniture etc. As the total expenditure during the financial year 1958-59, has been expected to be less than Rs. 15,000, the charge during the year will be met out of the savings in the grants placed at the disposal of the Consulting Surveyor to Government under "39, Public Health ".

As the work of the Authority will increase during the year 1959-60 it is proposed to appoint additional staff and sanction funds for furniture and stationery etc. required for the additional staff. The staff already sanctioned will also continue. This is a non-plan item but is absolutely obligatory in view of the provision of the Act. A provision of Rs. 41,520 for staff, rent of the premises, for office, telephone, stationery and contingencies etc. Rs. 6,542 for furniture etc. is proposed to be made for the year 1959-60. It is expected that an amount of Rs. 20,000 will be received during the year on account of fees etc.

Remarks.—After the re-organisation of States, the entire work pertaining to agricultural statistics of the other component parts of the State was transferred to the Statistician, Department of Agriculture, Bombay State, Poona. In order to cope up with the increased work due to the enlargement of the State, Government had sanctioned a few posts for immediate purposes upto 28th February 1959. It has not been possible to carry out the work of the Section according to schedule which has resulted in delay in the compilation and issue of various Agricultural Statistical publications submission of the reports to Government and Commodity Committee. Additional staff in the Statistical Section is absolutely necessary to facilitate timely compilation and publication of agricultural statistics, etc. The details are appended herewith. A provision of Rs. 33,246 is therefore required in the Budget for 1959-60.

Remarks.—The Shetkari Sahakari Sargh Ltd., Kolhapur, and the Kaira District Co-operative Milk Producers Union Ltd., Anand, District Kaira, on its behalf as also on behalf of the Milk producers societies supplying milk to it have requested the Registrar of Co-operative Societies that arrangements for continuous audit of their accounts by the Special Auditor may be made and that they are prepared to bear the entire cost involved on this account. It is, therefore, proposed to appoint 2 special auditors (220—C50) with their regular units viz. one sub-Auditor (100—140), 3 clerks (55—130), and 2 peons (30—35) under each of them. The Special Auditor, Kolhapur, would take continuous audit of the Head Office and of all the branches of Shetkari Sahakari Sangh Ltd. while the Special Auditor, Co-operative Societies, Anand, would take continuous audit of the Kaira District Co-operative Milk Producers Union Ltd., and of the Milk Producers Societies supplying milk to it. The entire cost of the Scheme would be met by the beneficiaries viz. the Shetkari Sahakari Sangh, Kolhapur and the Kaira District Co-operative Milk Supply Union and Milk Supply Societies affiliated to it and there would be no extra cost to Government except some expenditure on dead stock etc. in the beginning. The cost during 1959-60 amounts to Rs. 29,000. The details of which are, as shown below:—

Remarks.—In order to secure better regulation of buying and selling of agricultural produce and establishment of markets Government enacted the Bombay Agricultural Produce Marketing Act, 1939, and created the post of the Chief Marketing Officer under the Registrar of Co operative Societies and Director of Agricultural Marketing and Rural Finance. With the decontrol of foodgrains after the war, the scope of regulated markets expanded and the officer had to shoulder increasing responsibilities. He has now to look after not only the regulation of markets but also Co-operative Marketing, Price Intelligence, Grading etc. The pay-scale of the post was therefore, temporarily raised from Rs. 350—1,100 to Rs. 590—30—650—45—1,100—50—1,300. This was brought to the notice of the legislature in the Budget Session of 1954–55. The post was redesignated as Chief Marketing Officer and Joint Registrar of Co-operative Societies.

The scheme regarding Development of Agricultural Marketing (Regulated Markets) is included in the Second Five Year Plan and great emphasis is laid on the development of agricultural marketing and ancillary measures like Marketing, Intelligence, Co operative Marketing, Grading etc. The Chief Marketing Officer and Joint Registrar of Co-operative Societies will have to shoulder the responsibilities of this important work all over the new State of Bombay. It is therefore, proposed to upgrade the pay-scale of the post to Rs. 590—1,300 on a permanent basis. Provision on account of this stands included in the budget estimates for 1959—60 under "42-Co-operation-D-Other charges-D-3-Improvement of Agricultural Marketing". The proposal to upgrade the pay scale of the post of the Chief Marketing Officer and Joint Registrar of Co operative Societies on a permanent basis is brought to the notice of the legislature.

Remarks.—The Government Transport Service has been functioning since April 1944, and all the staff sanctioned for it is continued on temporary basis from time to time. At present the staff is continued up to 28th February 1959. The vehicles required for the milk transport have been transferred from the Government Transport Service and a separate service called Milk Transport Service has been formed under the Milk Department from 1st February 1955.

The main functions of the Government Transport Service at present are as follows:—

- (1) Providing transport to Distinguished Visitors to the State, various Delegations, Ministers and other important officials of the Union and State Governments,
- (2) Providing transport to various Government Departments, Officers and Deputy Ministers of Bombay State.
- (3) Repairing, maintenance and servicing the vehicles with the Government Transport Service, and cars placed at the disposal of the Ministers, the Speaker of the Bombay Legislative Assembly and the Chairman of the Bombay Legislative Council. Also undertaking repairs to cars of Government Officials and vehicles belonging to other Governments on payment, when time permits.
- (4) Checking the repairs carried out to Government vehicles at private workshops and scrutinise the estimates and the bills for such repairs.

In view of the fact that the Government Transport Service has been in existence for the last 14 years and that the nature of work now done by it is of a permanent nature, it is considered necessary to make permanent some of the staff of the Government Transport Service.

It is, therefore, proposed to make permanent the following 42 posts out of 53 temporary posts in the Government Transport Service:—

The permanent retention of these posts involves an annual recurrent expenditure of Rs. 62,582 as shown below. Necessary provision on account of the temporary establishment has been made separately in the Budget Estimates for the year 1959-60.

Remarks.—Under the new arrangements, practically all the Government Buildings which were on the P. W. D. Returns and which housed the Government Certified Schools, Beggars Homes and some of the Remand Homes, have now been transferred to the Books of the Director of Social Welfare. Most of these buildings have become old and require maintenance cost in excess of the usual rate of maintenance which is 1 per cent. of the value of the buildings. Majority of the Buildings are in need of special additions and alterations such as provision of septic tanks, latrines and major repairs to roofs and wells. Remarks.—Under Section III of Appendix IV of Bombay Civil Services Rules, Volume II, all Class IV Government servants posted in areas included in the Bombay City as it existed prior to the extension of the City's limits under the Bombay Municipal (Extension of Limits) Act, 1950, are entitled to rent-free accommodation in the B. D. D. Chawls. According to the present orders on the subject, those Class IV Government servants who are entitled to, but cannot be provided with accommodation in the B. D. D. Chawls, are entitled to house rent allowance at the rate of Rs. 6 per month. Government has received representation for the increase of this house rent allowance from the Class IV servants and has decided to increase the house rent allowance to Class IV Government servants from Rs. 6 per month to Rs. 10 per month. The cost on account of the proposal works out to Rs. 1,25,000 per annum.

As the expenditure will be incurred under various Major Heads, the provision is proposed under "57, Miscellaneous".

Remarks.—Under the scheme for subsidised distribution of superphosphates it is proposed to purchase 30,000 tons of superphosphate at Rs. 290 per ton and supply it to cultivators at the subsidised rate of Rs. 254 75 per ton. Out of this quantity, 9,000 tons will be supplied to the cultivators in Vidarbha and Marathwada regions. In accordance with the present practice the cultivators in these two regions will also be required to be granted tagai loans for meeting 75 per cent. expenditure on the purchase of the fertiliser. An amount of Rs. 17,13,000 is accordingly proposed for grant of tagai loans to cultivators taking advantage of the scheme.

2. The provisions of Rs. 87,00,000 and Rs. 10,87,500 required for (i) purchase of 30,000 tons of Superphosphates and (ii) their subsidised sale have been proposed separately as Section I New Items under "85-A-Capital Outlay" and "40-Agriculture" respectively.

During the year 1959-60 it is proposed to launch an intensive campaign for Kharif Jowar in Compact areas of-

(i) Nagpur Division, (ii) Poona Division, (iii) Aurangabad Division.

Target of 10,000 acres is proposed for each block.

A provision of Rs. 7,50,000 is required during 1959-60 for advancing loans at the rate of Rs. 25 per acre. A provision of Rs. 24,570 is proposed under "40-Agriculture" for the staff and other expenditure under the scheme.

Remarks.—Under the scheme referred to above, a detailed description of which has been given in the New Item on the same subject under the head "40-Agriculture" it is proposed to give loans to 60 ex-servicemen who are proposed to be settled on 807 acres of land in Shirol Taluka of Kolhapur district. Each settler will be given a loan of Rs. 1,500 repayable in 10 years with interest. The manner and agency for giving the loan and also the purposes for which it would be utilised will be determine shortly by the Collector of Kolhapur while formulating the detailed scheme is explained in the New Item referred to above. A provision of Rs. 90,000 is, therefore necessary in the Budget for 1959-60.

The loan requirements will be financed by the Government of India.
