





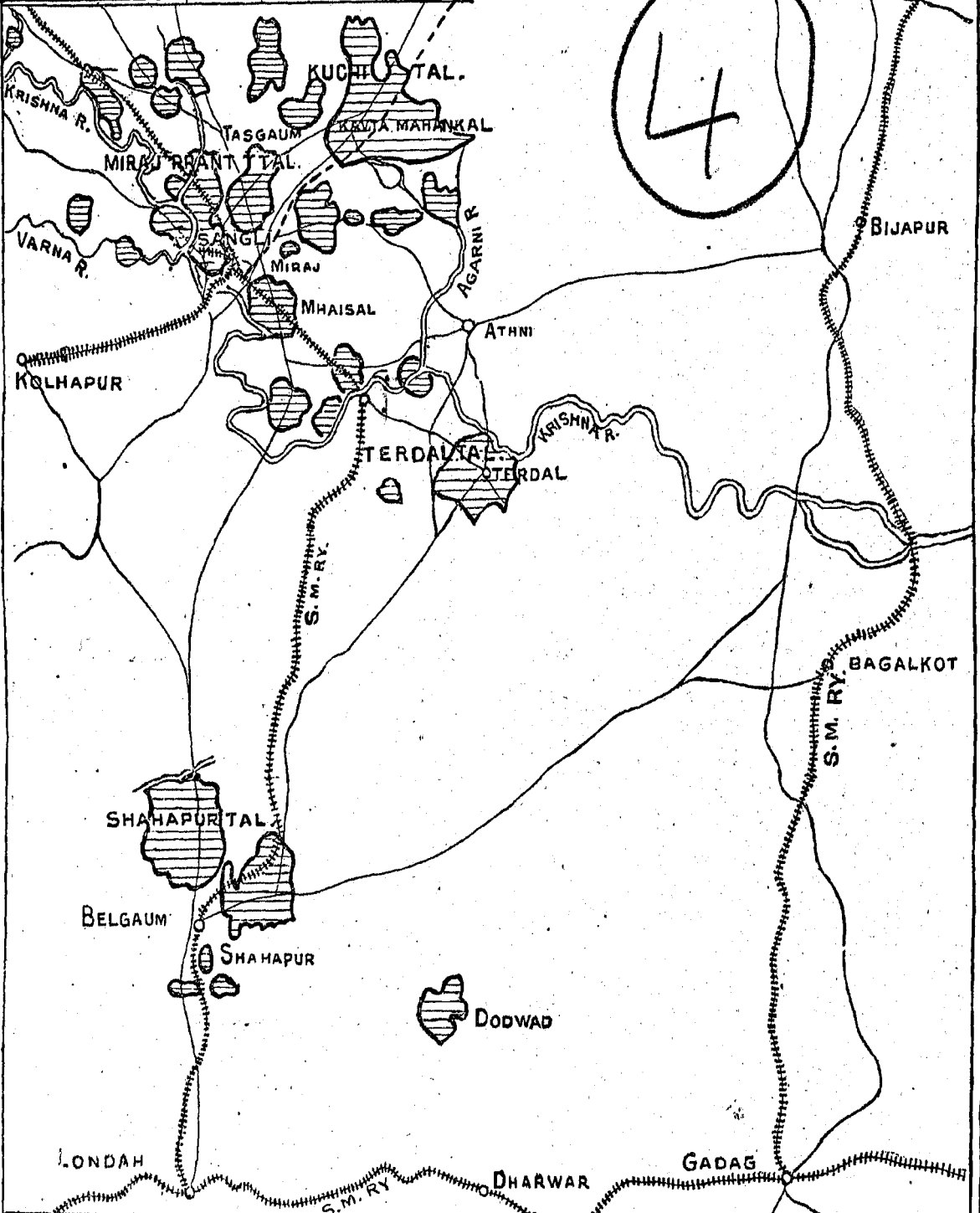






**MAP OF SANGLI STATE**

# The Administration Report

of the

## SANGLI STATE

for the year

1333 Fasli, ( 1923-24 A. D. )

### CHAPTER I.

#### GENERAL AND POLITICAL.

The State has been divided into five Talukas and one Peta in all comprising 244 villages scattered over four Districts of the Bombay Presidency. Mangalwedhe Taluka is to the south of Pandharpur in the Sholapur District; Shirhatti Taluka is on the borders of the Dharwar District being bounded on the south by the river Tungbhadra; Shahapur Taluka has its villages mixed up with those of the Belgaun and other Talukas of that District; Terdal Peta is surrounded by villages in the Belgaun District and is close to the Jamkhandi State; Miraj-Prant and Kuchi are thus the only two Talukas which are close to each other and within an easy reach of Sangli, the capital of the State.

**Area.** 2. The area of the State is 1136 square miles.

**Population.** 3. The population of the State according to the general Census of 1921 is 2,21,321 ( vide Government Gazette dated 6-10-1921 ).

**Gross Revenue.** 4. The gross revenue of the State on the average of the past five years is Rs. 12,58,986.

**Tribute.** 5. The State pays, no tribute either to Government or to any other State, having once for all, in 1821, ceded to Government in commutation of service, a territory then yielding an annual revenue of Rs. 1,35,000.

**Chiefsaheb & his family.** 6. Shrimant Chiefsaheb of Sangli, Honorary Lieutenant Meherban Sir Chintamanrao Dhundiraj alias Appasaheb Patwardhan, K. C. I. E., is a Brahmin. He was born on the 14th February 1890 and is 34 years old. He is blessed with 3 sons and 3 daughters eldest among whom is Shrimati Indumati Raje alias Taisaheb, born on the 6th March 1912. The eldest son Yuvaraj Shrimant Madhavrao

Rao Saheb was born on the 7th of March 1915. The other sons are Shrimant Pandurangrao Balasaheb, born on 26th of November 1916, and Shrimant Govindrao Bhayasaheb, born on 31st March 1918; Shrimati Chandravati Devi was born on the 21st of November 1919 while the youngest child Ushadevi was born 12-9-1923.

Honours enjoyed by the Chiefsahab. 7 The Chiefsahab enjoys the following honours:-

- (1) Permanent Salute of 9 guns, since 1st January 1918.
- (2) Military Rank of "Honorary Lieutenancy" since 14th October 1919 in recognition of his valuable services in connection with the war.
- (3) K. C. I. E., since 1st January 1923.
- (4) Honorary A. D. C. to His Excellency the Governor of Bombay. ( vide Bombay Gazette dated 15-5-1924 page 1086 ).

8 The Chiefsahab has been admitted by His Excellency the Viceroy to the Chamber of Princes as its permanent Member. The Tours of the Chiefsahab Chiefsahab was camped in the Mangalwedha and Kuchi Talukas in Feb. 1924 and visited several villages in those Talukas. The latter part of the Hot Season of the year was spent by the Chiefsahab at Mahabaleshwar.

9 The most noteworthy event of the year was the celebration of the Thread Ceremonies of Shrimant Yuvaraj Madhavrao Rao Thread Ceremonies. Saheb and Shrimant Kumar Pandurang-Rao Balasaheb which came off on the 14th and the 16th of April 1924 respectively. In view of the fact that there had been no such ceremony during the last 78 years, there was unprecedented enthusiasm on the occasion among all classes of the subjects of the State.

Lt-Col. Pottinger, Resident, Kolhapur, and Political Agent, S. M. C. States, Mrs. and Miss Pottinger, Major Lang, Assistant Political Agent, S. M. C. States and Mrs. Lang honoured the celebration by their presence on the 14th. His Highness the Maharaja of Kolhapur was also pleased to grace the occasion by his presence. Equally conspicuous among the guests were the Ruling Princes and Chiefs of Mudhol, Jath, Miraj Senior and Junior, Kurundwad Senior and Junior, Ichalkaranji and Ramdurg. The Ranis of Jath, Kurundwad and Ramdurg and the Yuvarajas of Mudhol, Jath and Kurundwad also added grace to the occasion by their presence. The Hon'ble Sir M. V. Joshi, Executive Councillor, Central Provinces was also good enough to be present on the occasion. Many other distinguished friends of Shrimant Chiefsahab also came for the occasion from Bombay, Poona, Berar and Central Provinces.

The whole town was gaily decorated with buntings and arches. The actual ceremonies were performed in a graceful Pandal erected in the palace for the function. Subjects from all parts of the State and especially people from the country side gathered in large numbers to demonstrate their

spontaneous loyalty and devotion to their beloved Ruler. As a part of the celebrations there were several processions, when the town was most artistically and profusely illuminated.

The Sangli Municipality gave a successful Garden Party in honour of Shrimant Chiefaheb and his illustrious guests on the 15th of April 1924.

The celebration was commemorated by the institution of 11 scholarships for students from the backward and depressed classes prosecuting their studies in the Sangli High School and the grant of liberal concessions as regards pensions to State servants.

10 The Political Agent paid an official visit to the State in Visit of the Political Agent & others to Sangli January 1924.

The Assistant Political Agent also paid his usual visit in December 1923.

During the year under report we had the honour of receiving Second Lieutenant Meherban Sir Malojirao Venkatrao alias Nanasaheb Ghorpade, K. C. I. E., Rajesaheb of Mudhol who had come down to Sangli for the benefit of health of his Yuvaraj Shrimant Jayasingrao and stayed here for a couple of months as the State guest.

11 Shrimant Chiefaheb was extremely grieved to hear of the sad and tragic death of Shrimant Captain Meherban Sir Parasharambhu The demise of the alias Bhausahab Patwardhan K. C. I. E., Chief of Jamkhandi Chief of Jamkhandi, at the age of 41. All public offices, schools and shops were closed as a mark of tribute to the memory of the departed Ruler. His death has been a distinct and irrevocable loss to the Southern Maratha Country. Several visits of condolence were paid by Shrimant Chief Saheb and Soubhagyavati Matoshri Ranisaheb to the bereaved Ruling Family of Jamkhandi.

12 I regret to have to record the lamentable death of Mr. B. R. Bhide a former Karbhari of Sangli State on the 25th March The death of Mr. of 1924 at the advanced age of 78. He enjoyed a high B. R. Bhide a former reputation for integrity and loyalty. All the public offices State Karbhari, were closed in honour of his memory on the 25th March 1924.

13 In the year under report the Diwan visited Kuchi, Mangalwedha, and Terdal Talukas and inspected the Taluka Offices and Tours of the Heads several villages in these as well as Miraj-Prant Taluka. of Depts. He made Jamabandi of these three Talukas. The Assistant Revenue Officer-Naib-Diwan visited the remaining three Talukas and made Jamabandi of them. The Diwan also visited Shahapur Taluka twice or thrice in connection with the sale of sandal wood trees there and other business.

16 A Conference of 15 prominent officers of the State including Mamlatdars was held on the 11th May 1924 to concert measures to The Mamlatdars meet the distress due to scarcity of rainfall in some parts Conference. of the State. The actual expenditure incurred on the several relief measures adopted is shown in a separate statement at Appendix "C".

## CHAPTER II.

## ADMINISTRATION OF LAND.

17. The Land Revenue demand according to the Jamabandi of the year 1923-24 was roughly speaking Rs. 7,66,278 as against Rs. 7,31,886 of the previous year. The arrears at the close of the year amounted to Rs. 3,52,068 as against Rs. 1,98,248 in the last year. The arrears are mainly due to a series of bad seasons in the past years and the famine conditions in the year under report.

18. Suspensions of the instalments of Land Revenue to the extent of Rs. 2,05,660 were given in some 65 Villages in Miraj-Prant Kuchi, Terdal and Shirhatti Talukas during the year under report. The amount of remission of Land Revenue granted during the year under report was Rs. 10,896. The latter represented the amount of water rate charged on parts which ran dry during the year. The suspensions were necessitated by the failure of crops in the Talukas mentioned.

19. The following table will show the extent to which notices were issued for the recovery of land revenue. No other form of coercive measures was resorted to during the year under report.

Land Settlement. 20. No new land settlements were introduced during the year under report.

21. The rates of assessment have been fixed in revision by Officers of the Survey Department with the approval of the Settlement Commissioner to the Bombay Presidency and sanctioned by Shrimant Chief-Saheb. The whole of the State with the exception of 8 Inam villages has been brought under the operation of the Revision Survey and assessment, is being levied according to the revised rates. The revised

rates were introduced into the several Talukas of the State in the years shown below:-

23. The area of the surveyed and settled villages amounted to 1,117 square miles and that of the unsurveyed villages was 19 square miles giving the total area of the State to be 1,136 square miles.

About 26 acres of waste Land in Kuchi Taluka were brought under cultivation during the year under report. The following table will show the

Alienations. 24. No land was given during the year under report as Inam.

25. There were 15 boundary disputes pending disposal during the year Boundary Disputes. under report. Out of these 6 are between this State and the British Dist. and the remaining are between this State and other States.

26. The following table will give details about the grants of Tagai Tagai Advances, advances made during the year and the arrears outstanding at the close of the year.

A large amount had to be granted owing to the scarcity of crops as well as water.

27. The Diwan completed the Revenue Jamabandi of Miraj-Prant, Mangal-Exmn. of Rev. Accounts. wedha and Kuchi Talukas while the Asst. Rev. Officer completed that of the rest of the Talukas.



28. The work of the introduction of the Record of Rights which was incomplete in Shahapur Taluka last year was completed and announced during the year. Mutation Registers have been opened every year but care must be taken to keep them up-to-date.

29. In the State the Revenue Accounts and Jamabandi of Villages and Introduction of new Talukas had been carried on in forms and statements forms in the Rev. Dept. introduced as long ago as in 1887. Naturally they had become out of date, inconvenient, and unsuitable to the modern requirements. Land Revenue and other miscellaneous items of Revenue were entered in one and the same Kird, yearly Adhavas were to be drawn which required months for their completion, after the year had elapsed and so the work dragged on from year to year. The Jamabandi remained to be done for several years in some Talukas. To avoid delay, to remove intricacies and cumbrousness and to simplify the revenue accounts and yet to be accurate, it was necessary to substitute new forms. After careful checking of the old forms and those contained in "Anderson's Manual" at present in force in British Districts, new forms based on the latter with necessary changes have been adopted in the State to suit the modern departmental requirements. The substitution of these new forms has proved much beneficial during the year under report. There has been a great saving and economy of paper and time and this year for the first time the Jamadandi has been completed and checked within the year in all Talukas. The closing of accounts at the end of the year has also made satisfactory progress. The tallying of the Taluka and Huzur accounts is also kept up-to-date.

30. The bulk of the Taluka records had much over grown as they were sorting and destruction not well sorted for many years together. It was necessary of Taluka Records to sort and differentiate the necessary and useful records from the unnecessary and the useless ones. After careful inquiry in all the Taluka records a scheme was adopted and records were sorted in A. B. C. and D. classes as in British Districts, with necessary changes. The scheme was promptly applied to all the Talukas and the Taluka Records now stand well sorted in an intelligible order, having been cleared of unnecessary and large burden of the records. Similar steps are in progress regarding Huzur Records and those from other Departments.

3 *Police.*

33 The Police Force consists mostly of local men of all castes. The details as regards their classes, number and pay, as Organization & description of well as rewards, punishments and their educational the force, its number & class qualifications etc. are given in Appendix IV. The of weapons. total sanctioned strength of the Police was 502. The number of foot-police was 467 and that of the Mounted-Police was 35. Out of the Foot-Police, 175 are armed with bored out Martini Henry Rifles. The rifles are now quite worn out and need to be replaced by new ones. A requisition for a new stock has been made and it is hoped it will soon arrive.

34 The total expenditure on the Police Force amounted to Rs. 1,07,427-6-3 as against Rs. 95,990 in the previous year. The The total cost of the body ratio of the Foot-Police to the total population & ratio of Police to population of 2,21,321 is 1 to 474 souls and to the area which & area. is 1,136 square miles, is 1 to every 2.4 square miles as in the previous year. Owing to improved salaries there is no difficulty in getting recruits for the Police duties; there are no vacancies in that Department.

Special Parties are sent to different localities as required out of the reserve force at the Head Quarters. No additional Police was quartered anywhere during the year.

38 The number of village police was the same as in the previous year, viz, 235. They assisted the District Police in the detection and prevention of crime. Some of them work partly on service tenure lands and partly on remuneration in cash and the remaining on remuneration in cash only. The subjoined table shows the details of the village Police according to Talukas.

39 An armed police guard consisting of one Head Constable and three Constables continued to be lent to the Sangli Bank at its cost Additional Police guard till the last year. It has been withdrawn during the year.

40 The results of the working of the Police are given in Appendix Working of the Police. VI, & VII which would appear to be fairly satisfactory.

The total number of cases for disposal by the Police was 405 in the year under report as against 345 in the previous year. Of these 191 were cognizable cases, 12 were found not punishable by Criminal Courts, 7 were false and malicious and the remaining 115 were under investigation at the close of the year. Of these latter 50 have been reported for being struck off the Register. Out of 191 cognizable cases 118 were sent up for trial, 73 remaining undetected at the end of the year as against 179, 121, 58 of the last year.

41 Five persons in five cases were prosecuted for making malicious Malicious complaints. complaints. Of these 3 were discharged and two are yet under trial.

42 Three cases of bad characters under Chapter VIII were dealt with under section 109 and 110 of the Criminal Procedure Code in the year under report as against 2 in the previous year. All the 8 accused involved in them were convicted.

45. The Drill Masters were performing their duties properly. The Drill & Musketry Superintendent of Police, Sangli, and a retired Military Officer Major Subhedar Yeshwantrao Bhosle, have been supervising the drill and musketry practice of the Police Force in addition to the Head-Quarter Sub-Inspector. Instructions were also given to the Sub-Inspectors in Talukas to make the Taluka Force efficient in Drill and Military practice and firing blank cartridges.

46. Only one candidate appeared for the Police Lower Standard Examination, Police Examination, and came out successful. Out of 3 candidates who appeared for the Police Higher Standard Examination only one came out successful.

47. During the year under report 63 Police men and 5 Sowars as against Health of the Police, 103 Police and 4 Sowars of the last year were under medical treatment, the mortality being 5 against 9 of the preceding year.

48. During the year under report the Superintendent of Police visited Inspection. all Talukas except Mangalwedha and completed the inspection of the 21 officers of Sub-Inspectors and Out-posts. The work was found to be satisfactory on the whole. Owing to arrangements in connection with the Thread Ceremonies and making Bandobast and investigation of serious crimes the other offices remained to be inspected.

#### 4 CRIMINAL COURTS.

49. The Number of Criminal Courts in the State was 22 in the year Criminal Courts. under report, 20 Magisterial and 2 Sessions Courts viz, the Huzur Court and the Nyayadhish Court. The Huzur Court takes up cases punishable with death or transportation for life while the other courts dispose of other cases.

Working of the Crimi- 50. The details of the working of these Courts are given nal Courts, in Appendices VII and VIII.

51. The number of Criminal Appellate Courts during the year under Appellate Courts. report was 4, the Huzur Court, the Nyayadhish Court, the District Magistrate's Court and the Sub-Divisional Magistrate's Court. Detailed information regarding the working of these Courts is given in Appendix IX. The Huzur Court disposed of 11 Revisionary Applications and the Nyayadhish Court disposed of 17 such applications.

#### 5 CIVIL JUSTICE.

52. During the year under report the number of Civil Courts was the Civil Courts and their same as that of the previous year viz, 6. The pecuniary work. and territorial jurisdiction of the Courts remained the same. The details of the working of these courts including execution of decrees &c., are given in Appendices X and XI. Mr. G. J. Kunte was temporarily appointed as Joint Sub-Judge at Shahapur to clear off old cases for a period of four months. The period has been subsequently extended.

53. In addition to regular suits disposed of during the year, 175 Miscellaneous Applica- cellaneous Applications were dealt with by the Subordinate tions. Courts as against 122 of the last year.

54. The number of Civil Appellate Courts was 2 as in the last year viz, Appellate Courts and the Huzur Court and the Nyayadhish Court. The details their work. of their working will be found in Appendix XII.

55. The receipts during the year under report from all sources including Receipts & expenditure. Stamps, Process fees etc, were Rs. 70,821 as against Rs. 63,457 of the previous year and the expenditure on all heads in connection

with the administration of justice was Rs. 28,638 as against Rs. 26,954 of the previous year.

56 During the year under report the Nyayadhish inspected the working of the Shabapur and Mungalwedha Courts. The working inspection by the Nyayadhish of the Civil Record room is satisfactory both as regards the public and as regards the State. The receipts on account of comparing and searching fees amounted to Rs. 470 as against 354 of the last year.

#### 6 Mamlatdars' Courts' Act

57 The Mamlatdars of all Talukas including the Vahiwad of Dodwad and the Sub-Saranjamidar of Mahisal disposed of 49 Mamlatdars' Courts' Act. cases as against 51 cases in the last year under the Mamlatdars' Courts' Act. Only 5 cases remained undisposed of at the end of the year. There were 4 revisionary applications to the Diwan against the Mamlatdars' orders.

#### 7 Extradition.

58 The following statement gives details regarding persons handed over to the British Government and Native States to the Sangli State.

#### 8 Prisons.

59 There is one Central Jail at Sangli & 7 Lock-ups at Taluka Stations including Jail and Lock-Ups at Mhaisul and Dodwad. Information regarding the number of persons admitted into the jail and lock-ups and their cost is given in Appendix XIII.

60 The Central Jail is located within the walls of the Fort of Sangli where accommodation is sufficient for the requirements of the State; the rooms are well ventilated, well lighted and well protected. It has a well of its own in the compound which supplies water for the vegetable garden. The supply of drinking water is taken from the City Water Works.

The lock-ups are situated in the Taluka Towns close to the Revenue Offices and are well lighted and ventilated. There too the accommodation is sufficient for local requirements.

61. The Civil prisoners are kept in a separate room in the Central Jail. In the year under report 4 prisoners were admitted and released.

Jail Offences. 62. The number of jail offences in the year under report was 12 as against 9 in the previous year.

63. The remission system is in vogue in the State and has been working well in the Central Jail, 14 out of 95 prisoners got advantage of it according to rules.

On the occasion of the Thread Ceremonies in the Ruling family 10 prisoners were released and 97 got partial remission of their sentences.

64. The prisoners in the jail as a rule enjoyed good health; 303 prisoners were under medical treatment of whom 274 were cured and 31 remained at the close of the year under treatment as against 184 prisoners under medical treatment of whom 169 were cured and 1 died in the jail and 1 was released being incurable. & 13 remained under treatment in the last year. No epidemic prevailed in the jail during the year.

65. The total expenditure on the dietary and clothing for the prisoners in the year under report was Rs. 8,100 as against Rs. 9,160 in the previous year. The annual cost per head on account of dietary charges alone came to Rs. 85 as against Rs. 91 in the previous year, and the total annual cost per head on account of all charges amounted to Rs. 91 as against Rs. 102 in the last year. The decrease is due to fall in prices of staple food grains in the year under report.

66. The male convicts sentenced to hard labour were given full tasks according to their health and working capacity; while female convicts were employed in grinding and winowing grain and spinning and twisting fibres etc.

67. There are two Japanese looms, three Fly Shuttle looms, 4 Hand Looms and two Vertical Looms. They are all in good order. The Looms turned out cloth and articles worth Rs. 965 as against Rs. 1,260 in the last year, and articles and cloth worth Rs. 860 were sold as against Rs. 1,500 in the previous year. This cost does not include wages of the prisoners but shows only the cost of raw materials used. The industry of preparing bricks and tiles and flower-pots was going on well in the year under report. Articles worth about Rs. 500 were prepared and those worth Rs. 35 were sold in the year under report.

The jail garden supplied vegetable to the prisoners during the whole year under report ( which according to Contractor's rate may be valued at about Rs. 765 ) and sold vegetables worth Rs. 60. The total product of vegetables was thus worth Rs. 825 as against Rs. 935 in the previous year.

68. The total amount realised in the year under report on account of Jail labour, jail labour came to Rs. 2,583 as against Rs. 2,710 in the last year as shown below:—

69. During the year under report Major Lt.-Col. R. S. Pottinger, Resident at Kolhapur and Political Agent, S. M. C. States and Major L. E. Lang, Assistant Political Agent, S. M. C. and Chiefsahab of Jath State paid visits to the Jail on 9-1-24, 20-12-23 and 29-11-23 respectively and made the following remarks in the Visit Book.

Remarks of the Resident at Kolhapur, & Political Agent, S. M. C. States. " Visited the Jail to-day with the Diwan and Dr. Thakar. "

" It is an admirably managed institution and very well kept. Every thing scrupulously clean and the prisoners healthy and were looked after. There are 72 convicts and 9 under-trial. "

Remarks of the Assistant, Political Agent, S. M. C. " Visited the Jail this morning with the Diwan; Convicts 74, under-trial 6. Jail scrupulously clean and prisoners most healthy. This institution reflects great credit on Doctor Thakar and the State authorities. "

Remarks of the Chiefsahab of Jath. " I paid a surprise visit to the State Jail and was very much pleased to see that everything was kept quite clean and tidy. "

## 9 Registration.

Working of the Registration Dept. 70 Appendix XIV gives details of the work done by the Registration Department.

71 Receipts and expenditure of the Registration Department amounted to Rs. 32,413 and Rs. 1,720 respectively. The details of the same are given in Appendix XV.

72 During the year under report the Nyayadhish, who is the District Registrar inspected the working of the Sub-Registrar's Office at Shahapur.



## 10 Municipalities.

73 The number of Municipalities in the State in the year under report was 6 as in the previous year. All these Municipalities are in the Head-Quarter Towns of the Talukas with the exception of Rabkavi, while the Taluka town of Kuchi has no Municipality, it being a very small place. A comparative statement of receipts and expenditure, opening and closing balances of the 6 Municipalities in the State is attached ( Appendix XVI ).

74 The total receipts of all Municipalities are Rs. 83,330 as against Income and expenditure Rs. 79,869 in the previous year.

The total expenditure of all the Municipalities amounted to Rs. 73,823 as against Rs. 70,661 of the previous year.

Shahapur Municipality acquired land for streets and markets and trapped monkeys and hence there is an additional expenditure incurred by that body this year.

75 The total amount of outstanding arrears of the six Municipalities Outstanding arrears. at the end of 31st March 1921, is rupees 23,480 against Rs. 25,410 of the last year.

The sub-joined table will show the arrears of each Municipality.

The arrears of Sangli and Mangalwedha Municipalities have increased. Steps are being taken for their early recovery.

76 The main source of income of all 6 Municipalities is house-tax. Octroi duty is levied at Mangalwedha and Rabkavi only, Sources of income. the income from that source to the said two Municipalities being Rs. 1,083 and 75.

The Octroi revenue of Shahapur Municipality has been taken over by the State and a fixed sum of Rs. 2,000 has been given in its stead.

77 The Cattle Bazars are held at Sangli and Mangalwedha. The Sangli and Mangalwedha Municipalities levy a small tax per head on all cattle, sold. The income from that source to Sangli for the year under report was Rs. 2,200 as against Rs. 2,405 of the last year and that for Mangalwedha Municipality was Rs. 369 as against Rs. 377 of the last year.

78 Out of the 6 Municipalities only 3—Sangli, Shahapur and Mangalwedha have the right of election. The Mamlatdars are ex-officio Elective Franchise. Presidents in all the Municipalities except Sangli, Rabkavi and Shahapur. It is only the Shahapur Municipality that elects its own President.

Wards and their estates.

79. At the beginning of the year under report there were 101 minors No. of Wards and their with 75 estates under the care of the State; 6 minors with estates. 4 estates as against 3 minors with 3 estates for the previous year came under the State management during the year under report, making a total of 107 minors and 79 estates. In the current year 6 estates were handed over to 7 minors on their attaining majority. At the end of the year under report there remained 75 estates owned by 100 minors. Particulars of these estates are given in Appendix "A" annexed hereto.

80. The opening and closing balance of the minors for the year under Financial position report were Rs. 1,88,187 and Rs. 1,91,789 respectively as against Rs. 2,24,890 and Rs. 1,88,187 respectively of the last year. The balance of the minors amounting to Rs. 1,91,789 was held as follows:—

83. Out of 100 minors 22 are girls of whom 4 are Brahmins, 18 non-Education of the minors. Brahmins; none of whom attends any schools—because several of them are married and unwilling to attend school and some of them are below school-going age.

Out of the 78 boy-minors 64 attend school. 7 are below school-going age and 8 follow their usual avocations.

84. The minors' affairs are carefully looked after. During the year Inspection. under report the Nyayadhish inspected the working of the estates in Shahapur and Mangalwedha Talukas, and found the work satisfactory. He also saw the minors and satisfied himself that they were very well-cared for.

85. Besides these, there are 5 minors holding 3 estates under the control Minors in charge of and management of the Revenue Officers. Appendix "A" Revenue Officers. shows the financial condition of these wards also in a separate column.

### 12 Local Boards.

86 There are 6 Taluka Local Boards in the 6 Talukas of the State, each Board consisting of 3 nominated and 3 elected members Local Boards. and 1 nominated President who is generally the Mamlatdar of the Taluka. They have their own accounts separately kept, prepare their budgets and submit them for the sanction of the Chiefsahab. The elected members are returned by the members of the Taluka Assembly who are in their turn returned by land-holders in the Talukas.

The Board is authorized to execute works of the value of Rs. 200 and below, the remaining being entrusted to the State Engineer for execution. The Members of the Board can supervise them and can make suggestions. The important works that were entrusted to the State Engineer for execution during the year under report are entered in the list given in Chapter IV of the report. The actual receipts of these Taluka Boards amounted to Rs. 43,260 during the year under report.

## CHAPTER IV.

## PRODUCTION AND DISTRIBUTION.

## 1. Rain-fall.

87. Information regarding the rain-fall at the Head Quarters of the 6 Talukas of the State is given in Appendix XVII. The total rain-fall at Sangli was 11.95 inches as against 20.72 inches of the last year. The highest rain-fall recorded in the State during the year was 53.30 inches at Shahapur and the lowest at Terdal being 8.20 inches.

The rain was much below the average in almost all the Talukas of the State. Ante-monsoon showers in April and May were but few. The Monsoon itself set in extremely weak. In the month of June the rain-fall measured less than an inch in Miraj-Prant and Mangalwedha. It was less than two inches in Kuchi, Terdal and Shirhatti. It was more than four inches only in Shahapur Taluka. The month of July brought only barely sufficient rain to allow the agriculturists in all of the Talukas to complete their sowing operations. It was four inches and more in almost all the Talukas. It was comparatively copious in Mangalwedha (7.80) and Shahapur (25.45). As a consequence, in August the crops appeared hopeful but they were badly in need of more rain immediately, which they did not get. Not a drop fell in that month in Terdal and Mangalwedha and scarcely an inch in Kuchi. Crops in all Talukas except Shahapur somehow struggled for existence. But the rain-fall in the month of September was more favourable, and improved the condition of crops to some extent rendering the situation more hopeful in all Talukas except Kuchi and Terdal. But ever since the very beginning of October there were no rains at all anywhere except at Shahapur. Even in Shahapur Taluka only two inches of rain were recorded during the two months of September and October and this affected injuriously the rice crop of the Taluka and retarded the sowing of the later crops also. In the other Talukas, the crops had been gradually withering after September and as there were no signs of improvement of the aspect, hopes of all people were almost gone. Last year, also in the middle as well as at the end of the rainy season similar situation had prevailed but owing to the latter rains of November, December 1923 the whole condition suddenly improved to a great extent. This year we hoped for a similar favourable turn but were unfortunately thoroughly disappointed. In the month of November last the sky became full of clouds for days together but all to no purpose. The situation went from bad to worse and a state of scarcity prevailed in three Talukas of the State, and relief measure became necessary. The supply of drinking water was inadequate almost everywhere. This situation has been brought about by successive seasons of deficient rain-fall and it is feared it may not improve unless we are favoured with copious rain-fall continuously during two or three seasons.

## 2 Prices of food grains.

88. A comparative statement showing the prices of food grains in the current Wages, labour & prices and the previous year is given in Appendix XVIII. During the year under report the prices of all food grains except that

of rice showed continuous increase owing to the shortness of rain and consequent scarcity. The wages of skilled and unskilled labour continued to remain as high as in the last year owing to the high prices of food grains and other necessities of life. Owing to the paucity of labourers who generally flock now-a-days to large centres of trade like Bombay, the employers have to pay whatever wages are demanded by the few labourers left in their villages.

### 3 Forests.

89. The area of the State Forests remained the same as in the last year viz, Forest area. 60,601 acres and 12 Gunthas. There are two forest areas in the State—one in the Shahapur Taluka and the other in the Shirhatti Taluka, being 32,693 acres 12 gunthas and 27,918 acres respectively.

90. The income and expenditure of the Forest Dept. of the State in the year Income & expenditure. under report amounted to Rs. 35,698-6-3 and 8,547 respectively as against Rs. 26,100 and 10,698 respectively of the last year. The increase in the income was due to timely auctions of the coupes and good competition for the same secured by a wide spread notice of the auctions. The decrease in the expenditure is due to retrenchment.

91. There is a small forest nursery in the Shahapur Taluka at Godihal and a Nursery. small grove at Basankol. They are reported to be in fair condition.

92. There was no great damage in the forests during the year under report Damage. from insects or fires. At Bhutramhatti, Halbhavi, Ramdurg in Shahapur Taluka there was some damage from insects in the month of October.

Demarkation. 93. No demarkation operations were undertaken during the year under report.

94. Both the forests in the State were fairly well looked after in the year Crime. under report. The number of forest offences detected during the year was 34 of which 32 were disposed of. There were 16 cases of cattle trespass as against 9 in the last year and the number of animals impounded was 183 as against 90 in the last year.

Numbering and sale of sandal wood trees in State and Rayats' lands has been undertaken. Illicit fellings of sandal trees is being observed here and there and due precautions are being taken.

95. Mr. Hasan Mohidin Kittur, the Forest Officer of the State, continued to Personnel. be in charge of the Dept. and kept the Forests in a good condition.

### 4 Trade.

96. The depression in trade continued during the year due to the famine Trade. conditions and the unsettled market in the moffussil. Sangli is noted for its trade in jagree, turmeric, ghee, tobacco, cotton, chillies and ground-nut. Owing to the failure of the rains the cultivation of cotton and sugar-cane

was undertaken on a much smaller scale. Trade in those commodities consequently did not prosper. Other commodities are exported to Gujrath, Punjab, Bombay, Nagpur and other places. Among the imports may be mentioned, rice, kerosine oil, cloth, wheat, dal, timber, iron &c. There was no difficulty in securing rolling stock during the year under report.

97. The other trade centres in the State are Rabkavi and Shahapur which export cotton piece-goods, coloured cotton and silk yarn; They have been since long known for the fast colours of their cotton and silk goods.

#### 5 Manufactures.

98. Sangli and Shahapur are noted for copper and brass pots. Sangli is also known for ornaments and other articles of gold and silver. Terdal and Hangandi make copper and brass pots of large size. Country blankets are manufactured at Shirhatti and in the adjoining villages and also at Mangalwedha. Kawathe Mahankal manufactures felt and rough woolen carpets. Mahhal and Balekundri in Shahapur Taluka and Bannikop in Shirhatti Taluka have small factories of glass bangles. Belhatti in the Shirhatti Taluka makes some articles of soft stone such as utensils of domestic use &c., as this sort of stone is found only in the quarries in the Shirhatti Taluka. Cotton articles such as Pasodies and carpets are manufactured on large scale in several places in the State such as Kawalapur, Dudhondi, Nagrale, Kawathe-Mahankal &c., on hand looms. There are two weaving factories at Sangli which produce ordinary Luddies and Dhotirs of various kinds for the use of the middle class people on a large scale. There are at Sangli two oil-mills which extract oil from ground-nuts and other seeds by the aid of power machines.

#### 6 Factories.

99. The following is a list of the factories that were in working order during the year under report in the Sangli State.

#### 7 Public Works Department.

100. The Public Works Dept. in the State is under the supervision and

Public Works. and control of the State Engineer. There were six Sub-Overseers under him—one for each Taluka and one special Sub-Overseer for the town of Sangli. The State Engineer makes arrangements for the carrying out of all sorts of works—Original and Repairs—in the State. He also executes Local Fund Works costing more than Rs. 200 each—the remaining ones being executed by that Taluka Mamlatdars. The total expenditure of the P. W. Dept. including establishment charges amounted to Rs. 1,80,285-2-8 as against Rs. 3,09,416 in the previous year. The main reason for the large decrease in the expenditure was the stopping of the several of the works to make provision for Famine Relief Works. Appendix XIX will show the details about classes of works undertaken in the year and the amounts spent on them. The total number of buildings owned by the State and entrusted to Public Works Department for up-keep was 226 as in the last year. The total length of the several roads under the management of the P. W. Department is 151 miles. The important works undertaken during the year under report by the P. W. D. and Local Boards are given below:—

## 8 Sangli Water-Works.

101. Sangli Water-Works supply water to the palace on the Mal, the Sangli Water-Works. Guest House, and the State Gardens and to some extent to the Willingdon College. These works are under the direct control in charge of a 1st Class Mechanical Engineer under the general supervision of the State Engineer. The Engines and Boilers were supplied by Messrs James Simpson and Co. in 1911 and erected in 1913. The engines work for about 10 hours a day and supply about 4,50,000 gallons of water per day. During the year under report the cost of the running plant was about Rs. 32,215. Water tax collected during the year amounted to about Rs. 16,000 only. The expenditure during the year under report was as under:-

The Boilers were inspected by the Government Boiler Inspector as usual. The guide blocks and the fire-doors of the Boiler are replaced and condenser tubes are to be renewed this year. The main had burst near the rising T under the steel Reservoir and it was temporarily repaired and a new one will be substituted shortly.

In addition to the usual working of 10 hours, an extra working of the Engine for two and half hours a day was undertaken for watering the fodder crops from the 21st of January last to the 1st of June. The extra quantity of water pumped daily was 1,50,000 gallons.

The distribution of water to the town - old and new - and the extension was adequate, some parts of the piping in the Extension and Petha were improved by substituting pipes of larger dimensions at the cost of about Rs. 10,000. Kakadwadi water supply could not supply any water owing to the insufficient rain-fall for the last five years.

## 9 Electric Light Installation.

102. Electric Light Installations are constructed at the Mal Bungalow Electric Light Plant. and the Guest House at the cost of Rs. 25,000 and Rs. 15,000 respectively and they are working on the whole satisfactorily.

## 10 Telephone.

103. The Telephones continued to work fairly well. The working cost Telephone. was Rs. 1,279 in the year under report.

## 11 Post and Telegraph Offices.

104. The number of Post and Telegraph Offices in the State was 20 Post and Telegraph. and 3 respectively as in the previous year.



## 12 Mint.

Mint. 105. The State has no mint of its own at present.

## 13. Excise.

Excise 106. The Abkari Revenue of the State have been farmed out to Government who control the manufacture and sale of liquor, toddy and hemp-drugs.

Opium is obtained from the nearest Government Treasury Opium Depôt and the right to sell opium in retail was sold for Rs. 8,741. Appendix XXI gives all details.

## 14. The Economic Condition.

107. The Economic condition of the people in the year under report may be described as far from satisfactory. Most of the people are agriculturists and therefore they are required to depend upon rain. When this fails they are totally doomed. This year the monsoon failed and caused failure of crops. Out of 6 Talukas only 2 viz, Mangalwedha and Shahapur had sufficient rain-fall while the other four were not fortunate enough to have half the quantity of rain which they had last year. In Shirhatti Taluka though there was scarcity of rain in general the quantity of the fall was somewhat timely and useful to Jowari and Cotton crops which had a fair yield. The black soil portion of the Taluka brought a good harvest while the Sandy soil portion was comparatively poor. There was no scarcity of fodder. Drinking water was deficient throughout the Taluka. The Mangalwedha Kharip crops were found to suffer slightly but later rains improved the condition considerably and were very useful to Rabi crops. Fodder and drinking water became sufficient. Miraj-Prant, Terdal and Kuchi Talukas suffered greatly owing to the scarcity of the rain-fall. To test the necessity of employment Kuchi Tank repairs were undertaken. Orders were also issued to open Famine works in the Miraj-Prant Taluka and Terdal Mahal but the people were not found to be willing to come on work at relief scale of payment and so relief works were not opened in those Talukas. Even on the Kuchi Tank the number of labourers never exceeded 250. Tagai advances were given for deepening wells &c. in Kuchi, Terdal and Miraj-Prant Talukas. Suspensions of revenue were given on a liberal scale in Kuchi, Terdal and Miraj-Prant Talukas. Doles are being distributed to the deserving poor in three Talukas. Experiments at State expense are being made at Kavatha and Terdal demonstrating the utility of prickly-pear as fodder. People have not taken to this owing to their proverbially conservative bent of mind. Numbers have gone over to Bombay and other Cities as usual for work and a large number of cattle was sold in anticipation of scarcity of fodder in these three Talukas. A statement "C" is appended showing the relief afforded in the several Talukas in different forms. In Saugli and the adjacent villages though there was scarcity of rain, still owing to the facility of Railway communication, famine conditions were not felt to a large extent. Cultivators and other

labouring classes could earn satisfactory wages in Factories and other miscellaneous occupations. Sangli Water Work was in good order and could supply ample water throughout the year. Owing to many facilities such as Railway, Bank, Town-Extension, Schools, College, Sangli, the metropolis of the State is attracting many people from the surrounding country and is becoming an important Centre.

## CHAPTER V.

## REVENUE AND FINANCE.

108 Appendix XXII gives information in a comparative form, regarding Income & Expenditure. income and expenditure of the State in the last two years namely 1922-23 & 1923-24.

109 The gross revenue of the State exclusive of Inam adjustments amounted to Rs. 12,00,685 as against Rs. 15,00,858 of the Gross Income: last year. The decrease is mainly due to the suspensions and remissions of revenue on account of famine conditions in 1333 and some adjustments in 1332. Explanation for increases and decreases has been given in Appendix XXII where necessary.

110 The State did not incur any debt in the year under report nor Debt. had it any previous debt to pay.

111 In the year under report the State Bank at Sangli had only four accounts as against 7 in the previous year. The branch State Banks. Bank at Shirhatti had 126 accounts in the year under report as against 141 in the previous year. The Sangli Bank Limited which was established on the 5th October 1916 does most of the business that the State Bank at Sangli used to do formerly. No fresh loans excepting in some exceptional cases are now advanced by the State Bank at Sangli; the work done by it as shown in the statement below represents the adjustment of interest accrued during the year.

The following table shows the amount of business done by the State Bank during the year under report.

\*Note (page 31):— The investments show the face value of the Government security which mostly belong to the 3½—4 p. c. loans and there is a very heavy depreciation in their value. Out of the old investments and loans there are some which have proved to be irrecoverable and may have to be written off. The amounts of the investments appearing in the table are thus far in excess of their real value.

## CHAPTER VI.

## 1. VITAL STATISTICS.

113 The number of births and deaths and the ratio per thousand Births and Deaths. of the population during the year under report as compared with that in the previous year will be found in Appendix XXIV. The ratio of births during the year under report is 36.18 as against 34.93 in the previous year and the ratio of deaths is 22.07 as against 23.59. The registration has evidently been done more accurately. The ratio of deaths is decreased as no epidemic of great severity prevailed during the period.

## 2. Epidemics.

114 There was a slight out-break of cholera in all Talukas except Cholera. Shirhatti and Miraj-Prant.

The following table will show the number of attacks and deaths due to it (Cholera.)

115 Almost all the Talukas of the State were free from the disease Saml-Pox. during the year under report. Shahapur Taluka records four attacks & four deaths due to it.

116 Plague epidemic prevailed in almost all the Talukas of the State. Plague. The following table will show the number of attacks and deaths from plague during the year under report.

One Sub-Assistant Surgeon was specially deputed on Inoculation Duty to Shahapur. The number of persons who resorted to inoculation in all the Talukas was about 2504 as against 2400 during the last year. Inoculation is gradually becoming more popular.

Influenza. 117 Influenza was endemic every where but it did not take any epidemic form.

118 The total expenditure incurred in connection with epidemics was  
Expenditure on epidemic. Rs. 1193-12-3 as against Rs. 18,6-7-5 in the previous year.

### 3. Medical Relief.

119 During the year under report the No. of Hospitals & Dispensaries Hospital & Dispensaries, in the State continued to be 7 as in the previous year. All of them, except that at Dodwad, have accommodatiou for indoor patients and quarters for the staff. Out of the six Dispensaries one was in charge of an Assistant Surgeon, 4 in that of Sub-Assistant Surgeons and one in charge of a senior compounder. The Dispensary at Dodwad is intended only for that single village which is isolated from the rest of the State. There is a Wahiwatdar and his small staff and a Police Station staff located there. The Dispensary is placed in charge of a senior Compounder who treats ordinary ailments. It is meant to be only better than a Medical Chest supplied to Touring Officers and to give better relief than "First Aid" in the case of accidents &c. and served its object very well.

120 The details of the work done in these institutions and the extent of medical relief diture incurred in connection therewith are given in given and expenditure Appendix XXIII. The total attendance in these institutions incurred. was 42,771 as against 44,708 of the previous year out of which 169 against 118 of the previous year, were indoor patients. The decrease in out-door attendance was due to the non-prevalence of any severe epidemic in the State. The expenditure incurred on medical relief during the year under report was 25882-8-11 as against Rs. 30390 in the previous year. The medicines were every-where distributed free of charge and without any distinction of caste or creed.

121 Besides the Dispensaries at each Taluka Head-Quarter, 18 medicine Other form of medical chests are kept in big villages in charge of respectable relief. persons, with full instructions to dispense the medicines contained in them. The stock of medicines in these chests is replenished from time to time from the Taluka Dispensaries.

122 The prevailing diseases in the year under report were malarial Prevailing Disease. fevers, dysentery, Rheumatism, worms, intestine diseases, diseases of skin, ear and eye, and diseases of the digestive system.

### 4. Vaccination.

123 Vaccination with Glycerinated Lymph is in force in this State and Vaccination, the supply of lymph is received from the Government, Vaccine Institute at Belgaum. The State has to pay a yearly contribution of Rs. 341 for the supply of lymph.

124 The Chief Medical Officer is also the Superintendent of Vaccination Staff. There are six Taluka Vaccinators and two Vaccination Inspectors, one of whom is a Sub-Assistant Surgeon and there is one paid candidate Vaccinator. The candidate is attached to the Superintendent's Office and acts as a relieving hand. Vaccination is free and has become popular.

125 The sub-joined table shows the work done by the Vaccination Primary & re-vaccination Department during the year under report as compared with that in the preceding year.

Expenditure. 126 The total expenditure incurred in connection with the vaccination Department was Rs. 4677-4-6 as against Rs. 4640-13-3 in the previous year.

## CHAPTER VII.

## Public Instruction.

127. The State has made provision for the Primary and Secondary education of its subjects in all the Talukas. Primary education has been made free to all classes of subjects and it has also been made compulsory in some places. There are three High Schools in the State and the Deccan Education Society has established a full grade Arts College on Kupvada Mal near Vishrambag Station on the Sangli State Railway. Sangli thus affords up-to-date educational facilities to the public, from infants to grown-up boys and girls and has been fast developing into an educational Centre. The number of school-going boys in the Primary and Secondary Schools at Sangli is about 4,000 in the year under report. Many of the students are helped by kind and benevolent persons in prosecuting their studies in various ways. The State also helps a large number of pupils by providing them with food twice a day for two and half months in summer. About 200 students are also given food once a day throughout the year on producing certificates from the respective Head Masters. There are Jain and Lingayat Boardings maintained by those Committees. The Namdev Samaj also contemplates starting a Boarding of its own in the near future.

128. The total number of schools of all sorts in the State is 181 with Total No. of schools & 14,789 pupils in the current year as against 177 schools percentage of pupils to with 13,356 pupils in the previous year. The percentage population in the State of students receiving instructions in these Institutions to the entire population of the State was 6.6 as against 5.9 in the previous year. The details of these schools are given in Appendix XXV and Schedule B.

129. There are three High Schools in the State, viz, the Sangli High School, Shahapur High School and City High School, Sangli. The first two are maintained by the State, to second, the Shahapur Municipality gives a grant of Rs. 3,000 and the third is conducted by the Sangli Education Society with the State's contribution. All the three High Schools are ably conducted and are doing efficient work which will be seen from the results of the University Examinations given below:—

It will be seen from the above results that the High Schools have cut a good figure this year. In Sangli High School 2 students secured University Scholarships — the Jaganath Shankar-shet and the Akabarnavis Scholarship. Sangli High School records for the third time the winning of the famous coveted Jaganath Shankarshet Scholarship since its inception. Two more students of the High School stood in the first ten boys of the whole



Presidency and several in the first hundred. 14 more have obtained distinctions in the University. Similarly 6 boys from the Shahapur High School have got distinction in Mathematics.

In addition to the usual curriculum the moral and religious education continues to be imparted as before. Physical education has been properly attended to. In Athletic tournaments held at Kolhapur and Baroda the Sangli High School students won 9 prizes all of a coveted nature. Students do drill, play cricket and foot-ball as also the Indian games viz, Atya-Patya and Khokho. A singing class has also been attached to the Sangli High School where a Gawai gives lessons to students in singing.

130. Drawing is one of the optional subjects selected for the first five Drawing standards and is taught in all the High Schools. The results of the Drawing Examination given below speak for the efficient teaching of the Drawing Masters in this Art.

One Sangli High - School student won an open-prize in the Intermediate Grade Examination.

Details regarding the classification of pupils attending these High Schools are given in Schedule B.

131. There is no hostel attached to any of the High-Schools. The Free Ships and Scholar- number of free-student-ships in Sangli and Shahapur High ships. Schools has been 15 % and half of this number has been reserved for the backward classes. There were 11 scholarships in the four higher Standards in the Sangli High School, 8 were open for general competition and 3 were reserved for the students of the backward classes. In addition the Chiefsahab has been pleased to open 11 scholarships for the first four Standards in the Sangli High School from this year. In the Shahapur High School there were 8 scholarships in the four Higher Standards open for general competition. In the City High School at Sangli the number of free-ships is 7 p. c. while there are four scholarships open for general competition one in each higher standard.

132. There are five Anglo Ver. Schools in the State viz, Kuchi, Mangal-Anglo Ver. Schools. wedha, Terdal, Rabkavi and Shirhatti, They teach up to III English Stds. in addition to 4 Ver. Stds. Drawing and Gymnastics are also taught in these schools for which trained teachers have been engaged. The percentage of free-ships in these Anglo-Ver. schools is the same as it is in the High Schools.

133. The total number of schools maintained by the State is 168 of Primary Education. which one is Night-School, 10 are Girls' Schools, 5 low-caste

Schools and the remaining 152 Boys' Schools. Provision has been made for Girls and low-caste boys for admission in Boys' Schools in places where there are no special schools for them. Ten Ver. Schools teach the full Ver.-course and send pupils for the Ver. Final Examination. During the year under report 38 students were sent, out of whom 26 passed.

134. There are 10 Girls' Schools in the State. The number on roll in these Girls' Schools. schools was 1,457 on the 31st March 1924, as against 1,291 in the previous year. In villages where there are no Girls' Schools, girls are admitted into Boys' Schools and the number of such girls was 719 as against 520 of the last year. The English Classes attached to the Sangli and Shahapur Girls' Schools were working well during the year under report. The management of the Girls' Schools at Sangli continued to be in the hands of a mixed Board of Ladies and Gentlemen since 1st April 1919. The Board also looks after the Home classes of Ladies started by the Mahila Samaj of Sangli. The number of Ladies attending these classes was 86 during the year.

135. The Assistant Political Agent paid an informal visit to the Girls' Assistant Political Agent's visit. School at Shirhatti on 18-2-1924 and remarked:—

“ Visited the School this morning with Mrs. Lang and asked the girls a few questions. Mrs. Lang was pleased with the needle-work which she thought excellent. The girls answered my questions most intelligently. Great credit is due to the Head Mistress for a very well conducted institution.

136. There is one Hindusthani School at Sangli and five Urdu classes at Hindusthani Schools. several other places in the State. The number of pupils attending these institutions during the year under report was 254 as against 233 in the previous year.

137. There are five independent schools and three classes for the children of Schools for the depressed the depressed classes in the State. A new class has been class Boys and Girls. opened in Shahapur for the depressed to facilitate their education. The number of pupils in the schools was 332 as against 270 of the last year. Besides these boys and girls of the depressed classes are allowed to attend the Ver. Schools and the number of such pupils was 540 as against 429 of the previous year.

Indigenous Schools. 138. There are 12 unaided schools in the State. The boys and girls attending them were 612.

139. There are 5 Sanskrit schools at Sangli. The number of scholars was Sanskrit Schools. 100 as against 98 of the previous year. These schools form a peculiar feature of the Educational Department of the State. No where else in this part of the country is there such a facility for acquiring the knowledge of the lores of our country. These schools have been sending year after year full fledged Sanskrit Shastris and Pandits in different branches of the old lores.

140. All the Schools in the State were regularly examined by the Deputy General remarks by the Educational Inspector and his two Assistants. The conduct Dy Edl. Inspector. and discipline of the students were found to be satisfactory every where. The progress of the system of compulsory education introduced into this State is carefully watched and scrutinised with special care by the Dy. Educational Inspector and his Assistants.

141. Every year some students are sent to Poona and Dharwar Training Trained Teachers. College and the Satara and Sholapur Training Schools at the expense of the State. During the year under report three students were deputed to the institutions for such training. Three of the students sent last year have joined the State service.

142. Primary education has been made free from the year 1906 throughout Free & compulsory the State. A detailed account about it was given in the Administration Report for the year 1919-20. It was also made compulsory since 1906 in some villages. In 1916 the scheme for the free and compulsory education was formulated in the light of the experience gained during the preceding years. The number of villages in which compulsory education has been introduced is 59 and the average attendance of pupils in them is 2,210 as against 1898 of the last year. A new change has been made from this year in the curriculum of the Vernacular 1st Standard by splitting it into two classes—one 1st Standard proper and the 2nd Infant class - consisting of beginners and those who read the Infant Primer.

143. During the year under report there were 12 Libraries in the State, 3 at Libraries & reading. Sangli, 1 at Kavtha-Mahankal, 1 at Mangalwedha, 2 at Rab rooms. kavi, 1 at Terdal, 1 at Digraj, 1 at Shahapur, 1 at Dodwad, 1 at Shirhatti. The Libraries at Sangli and Shahapur are in good condition while the rest are small ones with a limited number of news-papers, books, and subscribers. The Native General Library at Sangli received grants from both the State and the Municipality. The Libraries at Mangalwedha, Rabkavi, Kavtha-Mahankal receive grants from the Municipalities only. Reading rooms are also opened in some of the schools and they are maintained by subscriptions from students.

## CHAPTER VIII

## MISCELLANEOUS.

1. *Printing Presses.*

144 There are five Printing Presses in the State. One belongs to the State which is called the Sangli State Press and it does most of the printing work for the State. The second and the third Presses. belong to Mr. V. R. Rajwade and Mr. S. A. Vaishampayan respectively while the fourth is owned by Mr. Narayan Laxman Jog of Vita. Mr. Babu Tavanapa Upadhyaya has recently opened one more press called "Mahavir Press" in Sangli. All of them are located at Sangli. None of these prints any news-papers or periodicals but they do only job work.

2 *Destruction of wild animals.*

145 There are very few wild animals in the State, consequently there was no complaint of destruction of life on their account. Wild animals. The only wild animals that are occasionally heard of and that at times damage the crops are boars. One tigress was killed in Kakti forest by the Assistant Political Agent, S. M. C. States during this year.

There was one case of snake bite in the Kuchi Taluka. No other Talukas reported such accidents.

3. *Removal of prickly pear.*

146 About 16 acres 38 gunthas in Shahapur Taluka and 5 acres in Prickly pear. Shirhatti Taluka were cleared of prickly during the year under report.

4. *Fairs.*

147 There were in all about 25 fairs held in the State. Fairs are very common in this part of the country. Every village and Fairs every village deity has its own fair. The principal amongst them were as under.

1. Fakir-Swami fair at Shirhatti in the month of Vaishak.
2. Prabhu-Swami fair at Terdal in the month of Shravan.
3. Parbhatmal fair at Rabkavi in the month of Shravan.
4. Mardan Gaibi fair at Mangalwedha in the month of Rajab.

5 *Railways.*

148 The net earnings of the Sangli State Railway during the year ending 31st March 1924 amounted to Rs. 34,044 as against Railways. Rs. 32,849 in the previous year. The total expenditure incurred up-to-date on the construction of the Sangli State Railway line amounted to Rs. 2,03,340. This gives a percentage of 16.6 on the total expenditure as against 16.7 of the last year.

6 *State Cattle.*

149 The State cattle are kept under the supervision of two Agricultural Graduates. The State has Kuran lands at 12 places. Those State cattle. in Miraj-Prant Taluka measure 795 acres, in Kuchi 4,778 acres and in Mangalwedha 2,202 acres. They ordinarily supply the wants of the State in the matter of the fodder and enable a large number of cattle being maintained for agriculture and other purposes.

In the year under report the State had 532 heads of cattle in all. The State also keeps a camel herd which contained 111 camels out of which five have been sold during the year for Rs. 600. The expenditure incurred by the State on the maintenance of those animals was Rs. 6,344 as against Rs. 6,457 in the preceding year.

7 *Town Extension.*

150 The work of Town Extension is progressing satisfactorily since 1914 when the unusually high floods of the Krishna river Town extension. inundated almost the whole of the town. From that year the State has acquired land measuring more than 75 acres and has divided it into suitable building sites useful for both rich and poor. These have been graded according to various classes. There are at present 414 blocks in all out of which 408 have been given out to the people. 270 buildings have been completed and 24 are in progress. Although the extension sites were meant as a relief to the towns' people wishing to shift their residency from town, there is scarcely any case upto this time in which any of the residents has so shifted his residence. The extension has, all the same, proved very necessary to the growth of the town. The State has upto this time incurred an expenditure of Rs. 77,858 on the work of town extension. The buildings in the new sites are more popular and attractive and a large number of people from outside come here for the benefit of their health and education of their children. The town of Sangli has thus become a sort of sanitorium and an important centre in this part of the country. The State has, however, got no return whatever for the large expenditure it has incurred on acquiring the land, making the roads etc. It is entitled to an adequate return on the outlay. The matter is under consideration.

8 *Agriculture.*

151 Agriculture being the main-stay of the people in this State as in the rest of the country, efforts are being made to introduce Agriculture. improved methods of agriculture and to induce people to make them kindly. This is being done with the aid of the two Agricultural Graduates. Their principal duty lies in disseminating the knowledge of the improved methods of agriculture amongst the people, pointing to them their defects in the methods they follow and teaching them how to avoid those defects.

In the year under report one of the Agricultural Inspectors visited several villages in the Miraj-Prant and Terdal Talukas. The Agricultural Association at Digraj had prepared some plots, sown them with selected seeds,

and harrowed and stirred up the soil frequently—thus preserving the moisture, with the result that 12 anna crops was raised in them with only eight or nine inches of rain, as contrasted with a less than four anna crop throughout the other lands of the village. The cultivators of the village and other neighbouring ones were taken to these demonstration plots frequently and the crops were shown and thus the advantage of the system was impressed upon their minds.

The Agricultural Inspector was present on some of these occasions and explained the facts. He also brought to the notice of the cultivators of Terdal the value of using prickly pear as cattle food by starting and maintaining a cattle camp there since January 1924. The camp consisted of 21 cattle and these were kept purely on prickly pear fodder. The total cost per head came to nearly Rs. 3 per month which was a very insignificant amount compared with the high price of Kadbi prevailing then. Some experiments on ensilage were carried on with success in the Kuran lands. This year also the other Inspector did not undertake any tour of advantage to the agriculturists in the Talukas in his charge.

#### 9 Cooperative Societies.

152 The cooperative movement in the State was started in the year 1908. During the year under report the number of Registered Cooperative Societies continued to be 24 as in the last year. The total number of members on these Societies was 2,435 as against 2,443 of the last year. The amount of working capital was Rs. 55,474 as against Rs. 62,462 in the past year. The reserve fund was Rs. 13,242 as against Rs. 12,333 of the last year. No new advances were made by the State to any Society and those made previously are being recovered as the instalments fall due. The advantage was taken of the visit of Rao Saheb R. M. Sane of Barshi to the town and his lecture was arranged in the Diwan's Office. He explained the advantages of Agricultural Societies of various sorts. The work of the Societies cannot be said to be satisfactory on the whole, owing mainly to successive bad seasons and the dislocation of business on that account. A special officer needs to be entrusted with this work and the development of industries.

#### 10 The Sangli Bank Ltd.

153 The Sangli Bank Ltd., a Joint Stock Company, registered under the Indian Companies Act ( Act VII of 1913 ) as applied to the Sangli State, and having its registered office at Sangli commenced its business in October 1916. The authorized capital of the Company is two lacs of rupees divided into two thousand shares of Rs. 100 each. Half the number of these shares has been subscribed by the Sangli State. The State however, does not hold itself in any way responsible for the affairs of the Bank, save in the capacity of the share-holder. Under the Articles of Association an Officer from the higher grades of the State service is to represent the State on the Board of Directors and is to act as their Chairman. Since January 1922 the services of two officers from the State had been made

available to the Bank to do duties as Manager and Accountant respectively. From January 1924, however, one Officer has reverted as the work is being managed by the other. With regard to the proceedings in Insolvency against Manchand Walchand and Co; the Bombay Firm, the Bank has assigned its claim of Rs. 52,000 to Rs. 12,000 to one Mr. Dalsakhbhai Wadilal of Bombay. With regard to the other Rs. 52,000 due from the Insolvent, sale-deeds of his four houses have been passed in favour of the Bank and they have been taken possession of.

The following table will serve to give an idea of the working of the Bank since its establishment.

The working of the Bank was carried on sound lines during the last two years which show smaller profits owing to the big case of insolvency and other frauds by some traders of Sangli which were detected in 1920 and 1921 but whose ultimate results could only be realised in the later years.

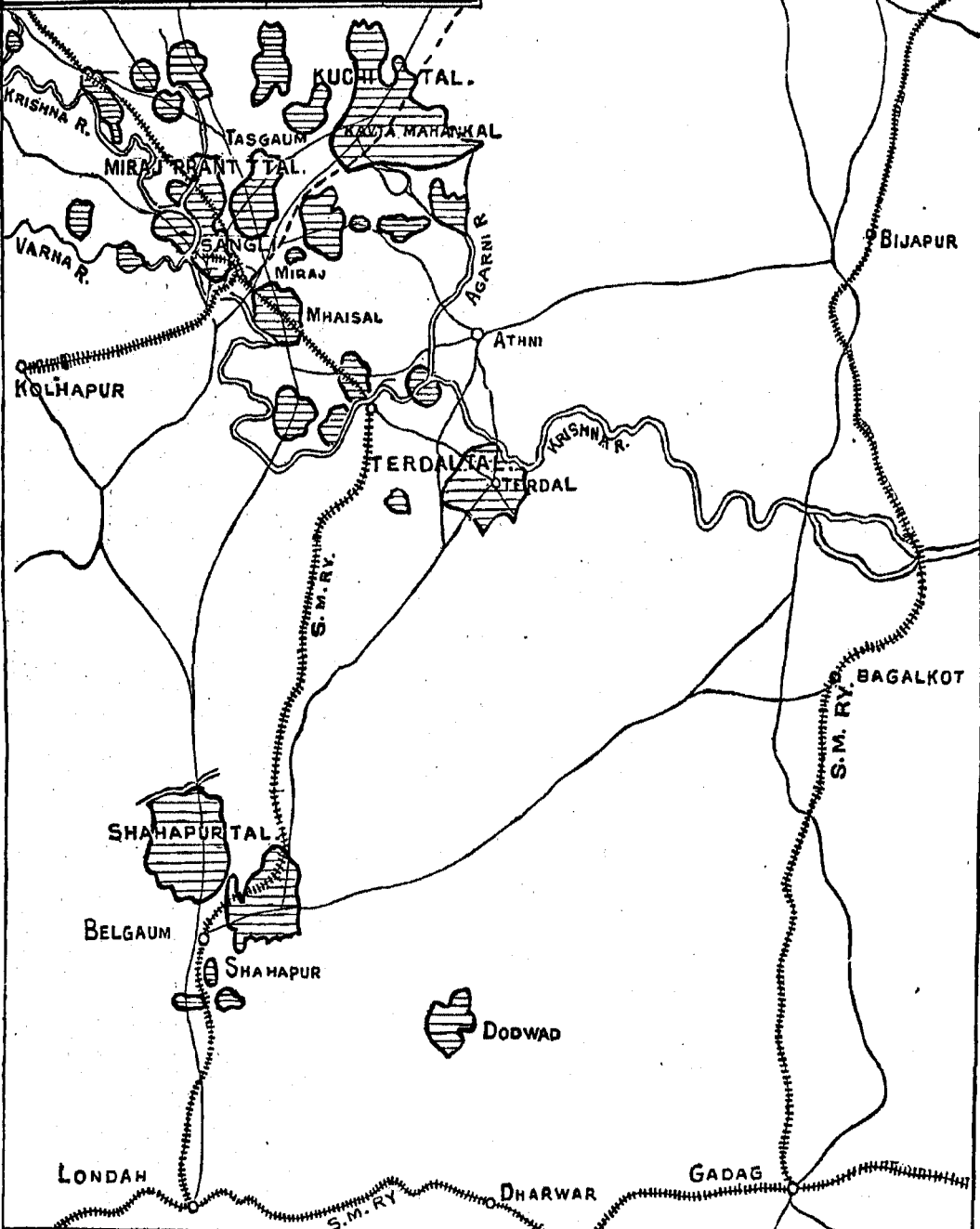
