

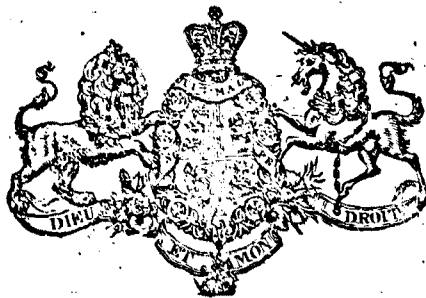

INTRODUCTION.

1.—The Returns of the External Trade of the Presidency of Bombay for the year 1871-72 or for the 12 months ending 31st March 1872, are herewith submitted for general information.

PORT OF BOMBAY.

2.—The value of the whole External Trade of the Port of Bombay for the year 1871-72 was Rs. 50,38,49,290, exceeding by Rs. 91,04,604 the value of the Trade of the preceding year, which amounted to Rs. 49,47,44,686. These values are exclusive of the Interport Trade between Bombay and the other British Ports in the same Presidency.

3.—The following Statement exhibits the value of the same Trade for the 5 years preceding 1871-1872:—

4.—The value of Government Stores imported and exported during the year 1871-72 was Rs. 39,18,330 against Rs. 33,30,913 in the year preceding, so that deducting these items from the aggregates above given, the following net results are derived:—

Considerable remittances in Specie pass annually on Government account between Bombay, Calcutta, Madras, Aden, Persian Gulf, Malabar, and elsewhere, and these also have been excluded from the figures shown above.

so that of the whole Import Trade of the Port during 1871-72 about 79 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. has been with Foreign countries beyond the Seas, 5 per cent. with Foreign Ports within the Presidency, and 15 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. with British Ports under the Presidencies of Bengal and Madras including Scinde, while of the same Trade 31 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. has been in Bullion and Coin, and 68 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. in Merchandise. The various Countries and Ports with which Trade has been carried on and the Articles of Commerce employed, will be found in Parts II. and III. appended.

6.—After deducting the value of Government Stores the Import Trade of the Port of Bombay. during the two years 1870-71 and 1871-72 stands thus—

8.—It will be observed that the large increase in the imports of the year under report is principally attributable to an increase of a little over $3\frac{1}{2}$ crores in the importation of Bullion and Coin alone, deducting this item the remainder shows really a deficit of over $1\frac{1}{2}$ crores in the value of the Imports. Real values have, as far as possible, been entered in the returns as required by Section XXVI. of the Consolidated Customs Act VI. of 1863.

9.—In many of the Articles of Commerce in the importation of which Bombay is concerned, there has been, during 1871-72, an increase in quantity as well as in value, and the following important items produce the percentage increase given against each :—

10.—The most important items on the favourable side are Apparel, which shows an increase of 14 per cent., Coffee 69 per cent., Fuel—Coal 20 per cent., Hides and Skins 312 per cent., Liquors—Spirits 42 per cent., Metals—Iron 8 per cent., Quicksilver 29 per cent., Oils 39 per cent., Silk Manufactures 16 per cent., Sugar and Sugarcandy 23 per cent., Tea 58 per cent., and Tobacco 60 per cent.

In the import of Silver Bullion there has been a noticeable rise of 170 per cent.

11.—The causes of increase in the more important articles may be briefly explained as follows:—

COFFEE.—Large imports of this article were made from the Malabar Coast owing to the favourable crop, and also from the Red Sea and Aden. Soon after the cessation of the Franco-German War a heavy and sudden demand arose for this article from the United Kingdom and France, and the value then ruling in those markets being most favourable, Merchants were induced to bring in large consignments of Malabar Coffee for exportation,—Foreign Coffee also shows an increase in Imports attributable to the same causes.

FUEL—COAL.—This article shows an increase in the importation as compared with the previous year, but scarcely reaches the average of former years.

HIDES—SKINS.—A great impulse was given to the trade owing to the unusual demand in the United Kingdom and the Continent generally. The famine in Persia and scarcity of fodder in many parts of India which caused extensive mortality among cattle, greatly assisted in meeting this demand.

IVORY AND IVORY WARE.—The principal mart for this article is the Port of Cutch, but owing to some misunderstanding between the Ivory Merchants and the Rao of Cutch the greater portion was imported direct into Bombay. Large exports of Ivory are said to have been made from Zanzibar direct to England, and there was an unusually large importation from the United Kingdom this year of this article which had been rejected in the English market.

SPIRITS AND WINES.—Owing to the facilities afforded by the Firman privilege accorded to the Portuguese factory at Surat the revenue on this account suffered severely, but imports of Spirits and Wines taken together from all Ports exhibit an increase of upwards of 8 lakhs, to meet probably the exhausted stock in the market owing to less imports during the Franco-German War.

METALS—IRON.—Chiefly attributable to large imports of Hoop Iron, which is now extensively used for Cotton Bales instead of rope.

OILS.—Chiefly owing to heavy imports of Kerosine oil which have been quadrupled this year, and is gradually superseding the country oils owing to its cheapness and brilliancy of light.

SILK PIECE GOODS.—There appears to have been a considerable increase in Silk manufactures in China. In addition to the usual traders, manufacturers have commenced to consign goods on their own account to this market, which in consequence has been overstocked.

SUGAR AND SUGAR CANDY.—The increase is attributable to the large Imports from Mauritius where the crop is said to have been very favourable. There is an unusually large stock in hand.

TEA.—The importation last year was so small as compared with the preceding years that the increase in the year under report goes to make up the quantity usually imported.

WOOL, RAW.—The Imports were principally from the Persian Gulf and from Kurrachee for exportation to the United Kingdom where prices have ruled very high.

13.—The chief articles of Import in which a decrease is apparent are, Candles 57 per cent., Cotton Twist 43 per cent., Raw Cotton 19 per cent., Grain and Pulse 17 per cent., and Raw Silk 27 per cent. In Metals—Copper, Brass, Lead, Steel, and Tin show a decline from 25 per cent. to 50 per cent. The shipments of Railway Materials exhibit a falling off of 55 per cent., while in articles of luxury as Cabinet Ware, Carriages, Clocks and Watches, Fireworks, Jewellery and Perfumery, there has been a marked diminution. In respect to other articles the fluctuations appear to be of an ordinary character.

14.—The causes of decrease in Imports of important articles are as follows:—

Decrease.

CANDLES.—Owing to the substitution of Kerosine oil which has been largely imported this year, and to large balances of stock on hand from previous years.

COTTON TWIST.—The number of Spinning Mills in Bombay is gradually increasing and the Country Twist manufacture is competing with Europe Twist, and it is likely that there will be a proportionate decrease in the importation of this article year by year.

COTTON, RAW.—There has been a large falling off from Persia owing to the famine, and from Cutch owing to the unseasonable rains.

COTTON PIECE GOODS.—The decrease is chiefly in the importation of T Cloth and Domestics, which are now manufactured in large quantities at the Bombay Mills, and being cheaper, meet with a ready sale.

GRAIN AND PULSE.—The large item of decrease in this article is chiefly attributable to the less importation of Rice from Siam and Straits Settlements, and of Wheat from the Persian Gulf.

METALS—COPPER, BRASS, LEAD, STEEL, TIN.—The Trade in Metals has been very dull throughout the year except perhaps in Iron, owing to the market being overstocked and to enhanced prices at home. Lead is also subject to restrictions on importation and transport. Tin is mostly imported from Singapore. Prices have risen there owing to a large demand from other markets. In Steel there has been a falling off in the country manufactures. Arms and other articles such as tools, implements, &c., &c., being chiefly imported ready made.

RAILWAY MATERIALS.—Railways are nearly approaching completion and the demand is proportionately less every year.

SILK, RAW.—The decrease in this article is attributable to extensive transshipments made in this harbour and to the opportunities for direct shipment to Europe from China afforded by the Suez Canal.

WOOLLEN PIECE GOODS.—The extreme prices for these goods ruling this year in England have operated to restrict business.

21.—The causes of increase and decrease in the more important articles are explained as below:—

Increase.

COFFEE.—Large exports *vid Suez Canal* on account of the high prices ruling in Great Britain and the Continent, possibly affected by the pending repeal of the Import Duty on Coffee in the United States.

HIDES AND SKINS.—Attributable to the scarcity and high prices ruling for this article in the European Markets. Large quantities now find their way to Bombay from the Central Provinces which formerly went to Calcutta. The chief cause has, however, no doubt been the shortness of the voyage by the Suez Canal, which has enabled this class of goods to be delivered without danger of injury from vermin or decay.

OILS.—Nearly three-fourths of the entire Export is in Coconut Oil; very large importations were received from the Malabar Coast, and there being little demand for country consumption, low prices ruled which induced large Exports elsewhere.

SEEDS—Attributable to the increased facilities of transport by the extension of the lines of Railway. The foreign market was also favourable.

WOOL.—Consequent on the very high prices ruling during the year in the European markets which was a natural reaction from the very low prices of the previous years. These low prices having checked the growth of Wool in Australia and other wool-producing countries.

Decrease.

GRAIN.—The decrease is only as compared with the previous year when the Exports were unprecedentedly large, doubling the average of the two previous years. The Exports for this year are nearly two lakhs and a half above the average of the past four years. There has been a noteworthy falling off of upwards of three lakhs in quantity to the Port of Cutch alone.

22.—The Export of Cotton, Raw, has decreased $6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. in value with an increase in quantity of $23\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., whereas the average ruling prices for the year were only about 5 per cent., below that of the year preceding. The large decrease in value shown against the present year is to be accounted for by the Exports for the preceding one having been greatly over-valued. In the returns furnished by the Merchants much carelessness is displayed in respect to free goods where no payments are concerned, especially in the case of native consignments. The returns for the present year appear much more reliable, taking the average of the ruling prices for the 12 months as the basis of comparison.

34.—The decrease of Rs. 53,81,241 in Re-Exports as shown above may be ascribed to less dutiable Imports from Foreign External Ports. It is also attributable to a decrease of nearly 21 lakhs to the Persian Gulf alone, owing to the great famine, which likewise affected our Import Trade with that country to the extent of nearly 24 lakhs, and partly to an unusual exportation direct from Bond under Section 103 of Act VI. of 1863.

40.—*General Remarks.*—So full an explanation has been given under the respective heads that there is little left for remark. Trade was generally depressed and unremunerative throughout the year. The Famine in Persia has affected both the Import and Export Trade to an appreciable extent. The Trade with the Port of Cutch has been very unsatisfactory, owing, it is alleged, to the general maladministration of the State.

41.—There has been a decrease in the value of Merchandise imported (exclusive of Government Stores, Bullion and Specie) of Rs. 1,59,94,234.

42.—In Bullion and Specie imported, there has been an increase of Rs. 3,54,13,155. Many influences were at work during the year under report to produce a considerable influx of Bullion. Putting aside the subtle question of the balance of Trade, the Cotton season opened with great vigour and earlier than was generally expected, while on the other hand the sale of Imports was unusually small. The Exchange Banks thus found no market for their paper as returns for Imports, and were driven to London for returns, and these were made in the shape

of Council Bills and Bullion. In these days Capital is turned over as rapidly as possible. The amount of Council Bills offered was inadequate and Bullion was shipped so long as its costs and rate of Exchange on London enabled the Banks to work in that manner to a profit.

43.—The items of Imported Merchandise which show the principal increase are Coffee, Spirits, Oils, Sugar, and Tea, whilst there was a decrease in Cotton, Raw, Cotton Twist, Cotton Piece Goods, Grain, Copper, Railway Materials, and Silk, Raw.

44.—In the value of Exports there has been a decrease of Rs. 55,36,055 which is purely nominal in view of the false declaration of value already commented upon as regards free goods, and more particularly Cotton.

45.—There has really been a considerable increase in the chief articles of Export such as Coffee, Cotton, Raw, Cotton Piece Goods, Hides and Skins, and Wool, which is over-balanced by the fictitious values of Cotton during the preceding year, thereby showing a decrease.

46.—There has also been a decrease in Re-Exports of Merchandise of Rs. 54,68,088 while there has been an increase in Bullion and Specie of Rs. 88,050.

47.—In the Collection of Customs Revenue there has been a falling off of Rs. 5,69,799-1-1.

48.—In Import Tonnage there was an increase of 602 Ships carrying 59,532 Tons, and in Export Tonnage of 132 Ships, showing a decrease of 9,418 Tons.

The rates for Freight for the year 1871-72 have averaged higher than for the previous year by 10s. for Sailing Vessels and 15s. for Canal Steamers.

49.—The subjoined Statement will be interesting, as showing the gradual rise of Trade since the opening of the Suez Canal with other Countries in Europe formerly comparatively unknown, and which speaks for itself:—
