EXPLANATORY NOTE.

NATURE OF THE TRADE RECORDED.

The trade dealt with in these accounts is that of the Port of Bombay and of the subordinate ports of the Bombay Presidency, excluding Sind, for the year 1913-14, and for the four previous years, 1909-10 to 1912-13 inclusive.

The Foreign and the Coasting trade of ports in Native States of the Presidency is not recorded and is therefore not included in these accounts.

The volume is divided into three parts :—

Part I—(Foreign Trade)—contains tables relating to trade of the Bombay Presidency with foreign countries.

Part II—(Coasting Trade)—contains tables relating to trade between the Bombay ports and other British Indian ports as well as with ports which, although Indian, are not British Indian.

Part III—(Shipping, Foreign and Coasting)—contains tables relating to shipping, both foreign and coasting.

PART I (FOREIGN TRADE).

EXPLANATION OF IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.

The accounts of both imports and exports are exclusive of foreign merchandise transhipped at ports within the Presidency of Bombay. Indian ports are not transshipment centres for foreign countries to any considerable extent; the trade returns do not take such transshipments into account and they, therefore, do not figure in these tables. The import tables record the quantity and value of goods landed, whether they are intended for home consumption, bonding or re-exportation. Only so much of passengers' baggage as is dutiable is included. Imports and exports from and to foreign countries by parcel post are included, but the contents of registered letters are not included either for imports or exports. Imports and exports of gold and silver, coin and bullion are recorded separately and are not included in the tables of merchandise. Imports and exports of Government stores are also dealt with separately.

QUANTITIES AND VALUES.

The statements of both quantities and values are based on the declarations of importers and exporters in bills of entry and shipping bills as subsequently checked by the Customs officials. The quantity of goods imported and exported is recorded, so far as it is possible to do so. In most cases the quantity is recorded by weight, though, in certain instances, the quantities are recorded by number or by gallons, or by yards. When weight is the prescribed denomination, different units (tons, cwt., lb. and oz.) are specified according to the nature of the articles and trade practice. The weight recorded is the net weight of the goods, *i. e.*, not including the weight of the covers or receptacles in which the goods are packed. According to the provisions of the Indian Sea Customs Act (section 30) the values of goods imported or exported represent :—

(a) the wholesale cash price less trade discount for which goods of the like kind and quality are sold or are capable of being sold at the time and place of importation or exportation, as the case may be, without any abatement or deduction whatever except (in the case of goods imported) of the amount of the duties payable on the importation thereof; or

(b) where such price is not ascertainable the cost at which goods of the like kind and quality could be delivered at such place without any abatement or deduction except as aforesaid.

CLASSIFICATION OF THE TRADE BY COUNTRIES.

Imports are classified according to the countries of consignment, *i. e.*, the countries from which the goods have come, whether by land and sea or by sea only, without interruption of transit (save in the course of transshipment or transfer from one means of conveyance to another).

Exports are shown according to the countries of final destination, *i. e.*, the countries to which goods exported are intended to pass whether by sea and land or by sea only, without interruption of transit (save in the course of transshipment or transfer from one means of conveyance to another.)

Mention may be made of shipments to Port Said to await orders for delivery in ports beyond the Canal. In such cases exporters are required to give information, as soon after shipment as it is obtainable, as to the final destination of the goods.

ARRANGEMENT OF THE TABLES.

Summary tables on the model of those for the United Kingdom distinguishing between the following four main groups have been prefixed to Part I:—

- I. Food, drink and tobacco.
- II. Raw materials and produce and articles mainly unmanufactured.
- III. Articles wholly or mainly manufactured.
- IV. Miscellaneous and unclassified.

In Part I there are 18 tables showing the trade of the Presidency, the Chief Port (Bombay) and the subordinate ports with foreign countries for a period of five years.

In tables 5 to 7-A, 12 and 16 to 18-3 articles of trade with their sub-heads and details specified under sub-heads are arranged in alphabetical order.

In tables 5 to 7-A figures are shown under a detailed head when the value is not less than Rs. 20,000, under a sub-head when the value is not less than Rs. 50,000, and under a main head when the value is not less than 1 lakh of rupees. Where the limit of Rs. 20,000 has not been attained by a detailed head or Rs. 50,000 by a sub-head, the figures are included under "Other sorts" of the sub-head or main head, respectively.

In tables 16 and 17 the trade with each country is recorded separately when its value is not less than Rs. 1,000; and when there are two or more countries the value of the trade with which is less than Rs. 1,000 in each case, such countries have been grouped under the head "Other Countries." Also, when the value of the trade under any major, subordinate or detailed head is less than Rs. 1,000, it has been merged, in the case of major heads in the head "All other Articles," of the group to which it belongs, and in the case of subordinate or detailed heads, in the sub-head "Other Sorts," under the major or sub-head unless special reasons exist for specifying it separately. For convenience of reference to the summaries which are prefixed to this volume, there is shown opposite to each article in the tables a number indicating its appropriate main group in the summaries and a letter indicating its position within that group.

In tables 18—1 to 18—3 only those countries are exhibited the value of the trade with which is of a lakh of rupees or more, and only those articles the trade in which under each major head is not less than Rs. 10,000.

The articles in tables 9 to 11 are arranged in accordance with the latest tariff schedules, with a note against each article of the rate of duty in force from time to time.

In all tables where trade is shown according to countries, the countries included in the British Empire have been grouped separately from Foreign Countries.

The term "Indian Merchandise" comprises all goods which are the growth, produce, or manufacture of India. Indian merchandise is distinguished from British or Foreign merchandise in the declarations of shippers made in the shipping bills from which the trade statistics are compiled.

A classified list of articles, the trade in which is separately exhibited in tables 16 and 17 (general imports and general exports) and a complete list of all the countries, the trade with which is separately recorded, are appended to this note.

PART II (COASTING TRADE).

NATURE OF THE TRADE RECORDED.

The trade dealt with in this part is the trade of the British ports within the Presidency of Bombay (the chief port and the subordinate ports) with one another and with other ports in India. The accounts distinguish Indian merchandise from the merchandise of Foreign Countries.

EXPLANATION OF IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.

The accounts of both imports and exports are exclusive of merchandise transhipped at Customs ports in the Presidency. Only so much of the passengers' baggage as is dutiable is included. Imports and exports of gold and silver, coin and bullion are recorded separately and are not included in the tables of merchandise. Imports and exports of Government stores are recorded separately, but are not shown in Part II of this volume.

QUANTITIES AND VALUES.

Quantities and values are based on the definitions given in Part I except that in the Coasting trade Customs and Excise duties previously paid are, for statistical purposes, included in the value of the goods exported and imported.

ARRANGEMENT OF THE TABLES.

There are 11 tables in this part, in all of which the articles are arranged alphabetically.

In tables 3 to 6-E the same limits of value as in the Foreign trade tables 5 to 7-A have been observed. Separate abstracts are prepared only for those subordinate ports whose total trade value is not less than Rs. 50 lakhs.

Tables 7 to 10 detail the particulars of imports and exports of country produce and foreign merchandise of the Presidency with (1) British ports in other Presidencies, (2) British ports within the Presidency, and (3) Indian ports not British. In these tables the trade in each article, with each province or port is shown separately when its value is Rs. 10,000 or more, and when the value of the trade under a major, subordinate or detailed head is less than Rs. 10,000, it has been merged, in the case of major heads, in the head "all other articles of merchandise," and in the case of subordinate or detailed heads, in the sub-head "other sorts" under the major or sub-head unless special reasons exist for specifying it separately; similarly, if the value of the trade with any province or port in any particular article is less than Rs. 10,000, it is grouped under one of the heads "Other Provinces" or "Other Indian Ports not British".

PART III (SHIPPING).

NATURE OF THE STATISTICS RECORDED.

These statistics deal with the shipping which entered and cleared at Bombay and the subordinate ports of the Presidency during the year.

ARRANGEMENT OF THE TABLES.

Tables 1 to 9 contain particulars of the tonnage of vessels engaged in the Foreign trade and tables 10 to 14 of vessels engaged in Coasting trade, *i. e.*,

trade with Indian ports, British and non-British. In these tables separate figures are shown for steam and sailing vessels as well as for vessels which entered and cleared with cargo and in ballast.
