Sir,

I have the honour to submit the annual report on the administration of the Industrial Housing Scheme for the year 1st April 1936 to 31st March 1937.

2. There are 207 Chawls in the Scheme and their distribution at the different centres and the number of rooms and shops at each centre are shown in the following table:—

During the year 5 rooms, 3 at Naigaum and 2 at Worli were converted into shops at a monthly rental each of Rs. 25 and Rs. 20 respectively.

4. The scale of rents for single roomed tenements at the four centres remained unchanged throughout the year; that is to say, at DeLisle Road Rs. 8, at Naigaum Rs. 7, at Sewri Rs. 7 and at Worli Rs. 5. Rupee one extra is charged for corner rooms at all centres and rupees two extra are charged in those cases in which a tenant arranges to have a water tap in his room.

The only remarkable feature of these figures is the marked increase at Worli in October 1936, maintained in November, and followed by a sudden drop in December. This was due to the opening up, and subsequent vacating of the Temporary Prison, by the Jail Department. On the whole the year under report resulted in an increase of 78 in the number of rooms and shops occupied.

In Chawl No. 12 "B" at Naigaum 24 double room tenements are occupied while 16 rooms are let out singly. In Chawl No. 14 "B" at Naigaum 20 double room tenements are occupied and 23 single rooms. What rooms there are, that are let at Chawl No. 13 "B" at Naigaum and in Chawl No. 10 at DeLisle Road are all let as single rooms, in the absence of any demand for two and three roomed tenements. 70 rooms in Chawl No. 13 "B" at Naigaum and 78 rooms in Chawl No. 10 at DeLisle Road are occupied in this manner.

There was a slight improvement at centres other than Sewri, at which centre the number of shops occupied was the same as at the close of the year before. In spite of the reduced rate of rent for shops at Sewri, letting of shops there did not improve. No improvement is likely as long as the occupancies at that centre do not increase, as the shopkeepers depend for their earning entirely on the tenants living in these chawls.

In the market situated on the ground floor of Chawl No. 41 at Worli the number of stalls occupied for the sale of mutton, fish and vegetables at the end of the year was 13, the same number as at the end of the year 1935-36. The number of stalls available in this market is 35.

One plot of land behind Chawl No. 62 at Worli is leased to a Toddy Shop licensee, the size of the plot being increased from 2nd November 1936. Total rent now paid for the plot is Rs. 75 per month.

A piece of land admeasuring 29 square yards between Chawl Nos. 11 and 12 at Naigaum was leased from 1st May 1936, on a monthly tenancy at a monthly rent of Rs. 12 for a beef shop.

Rent Collections.

8. 'The following table 'A' shows the assessment, collection and percentage of recovery for each group of chawls month by month during the year and table 'B' shows the assessment, collection and percentage of recovery for the last quinquennium.

The amount involved on account of the allotment of rent-free accommodation to Government menials and to the Police Department for the year was Rs. 95,591. This amount is not included in the assessment and collection in table 'A' as it will be shewn by book credit as receipts in the *pro forma* accounts of the Scheme.

The total collection on account of rent of chawls amounted to Rs. 5,94,793. Of this amount Rs. 7,520 were obtained by collection of arrears of rent for the year 1935-36 and Rs. 9,151 constituted advance rent for the year 1937-38. The actual assessment for the year was Rs. 5,96,708, out of which, counting a sum of Rs. 7,766 received during 1935-36 as advance rent, Rs. 5,85,888 were collected in all. The rent collected amounted therefore to 98·1 per cent. of the demand which was an improvement on the 1935-36 figure (97·8 per cent.) and was fairly satisfactory.

The miscellaneous recoveries on account of hawkers' fees, demand notices, and warrant fees, etc. amounted to Rs. 1,746-9-0 during the year.

During the year under report 717 tenants absconded leaving Rs. 5,409 of rent unpaid. In 1935-36 there had been 685 absconders involving Rs. 5,937. Out of the rent of Rs. 5,409 for 1936-37 unpaid by absconders and the previous year's balance of Rs. 7,653-4-7, Rs. 2,718-14-3 were recovered in all after the absconders had been traced, Rs. 2,396-1-0 had to be written off leaving a balance of Rs. 7,947-5-4 to be recovered. This amount has been included in the total arrears of rent shown in paragraph 10 below.

Amounts written off. . .

10. The total amount written off was Rs. 2,396-1-0 as against Rs. 5,371-15-9 in the preceding year.

The total arrears of rent recoverable and irrecoverable on 31st March 1937 were Rs. 14,645-14-9 as against Rs. 13,742-13-9 on 31st March 1936.

Establishment Charges.

11. The establishment charges amounted to Rs. 76,411-8-9 which on the assessment of Rs. 6,92,299-9-0 (including the assessment on account of Government menials) gives a percentage of 11.0.

Other Charges.

12. Incidental charges on account of licence fee for the Worli market paid to the Bombay Municipality and ground rent on account of land leased at Sewri paid to the Bombay Port Trust amounted to Rs. 688 and Rs. 13,824-10-5 respectively.

The average number of occupants per room has been taken as five for the purpose of calculating the specific death rate. During the previous year the specific death rate was 22 per thousand.

Amenities.

14. Certain Charitable Institutions, such as the Bombay Presidency Infant Welfare Society and the Baby and Health Week Association are providing medical relief to the tenants in the Development Department Chawls through maternity homes and créches and the Naigaum Social Service Centre and the Young Men's Christian Association are carrying on social welfare work for the tenants' children. The Bombay Municipality has its schools at all the Chawl Centres and has also a dispensary at Worli.

The bus service introduced by the Bombay Electric Supply and Tramways Co. Ltd. from Worli Chawls to Lower Parel Station and thence to other parts of the City continued to run during the year under report.

General.

15. Five Chawls Nos. 4, 30, 51, 78 and 107 at Worli which were vacant were opened for occupation and Chawl No. 2B at Naigaum was given to the Police Department for housing the constables during the year under report.

The work in connection with the remodelling of Chawl No. 51 at Worli was completed at the beginning of the year. The Manager's office was shifted from Naigaum to Worli early in April 1936 and the Manager took up his residence in this chawl from the middle of May 1936. This was done with a view to help to popularise the Worli Chawls.

The Naigaum Social Service Centre which had 10 rooms in Block No. 16A at Naigaum was given 10 more rooms from 1st April 1936 as it urgently required more accommodation. All 20 rooms were provided for through a grant-in-aid.

Mr. T. A. J. Ayyar held charge of the office of the Manager, Development Department Chawls, throughout the year and performed his duties very satisfactorily.

PRESIDENCY DIVISION. INDUSTRIAL HOUSING SCHEME.

Certain minor works such as barricading the entrances to the vacant floors of certain Chawls, provision of separate water taps in some of the rooms of Development Department Chawls, converting rooms into shops, removing certain partition walls and providing doors at suitable places were carried out during the year under report at a cost of Rs. 2,547.

- 2. All the Development Department Chawls at Naigaum, DeLisle Road, Worli and Sewri were looked after and maintained by the Executive Engineer, Presidency Division, at a total cost of Rs. 82,505.
 - 3. An expenditure of Rs. 202 was incurred on electrical works.
