#### I.--INTRODUCTION

SEPARATION OF CENTRAL AND PROVINCIAL FINANCES .

The chief Provincial Governments in India have assigned to them specific revenues of their own, and are responsible for the discharge of those functions of Government which have been classified as "provincial subjects."

The finances of the Central Government and of the several Provincial Governments are thus kept separate and distinct from each other.

The annual volumes of the "Finance and Revenue Accounts of the Government of India," commencing with that for 1921–22, exhibit separately the revenue and expenditure of the Central Government and of each of the Provincial Governments. The Central Government and each Provincial Government issues annually its own budget estimate for the forthcoming year and, in most cases, a revised estimate for the closing year. This Memorandum, however, deals with the Accounts and Estimates of the Central Government only, except where otherwise stated.

New Governors' Provinces of Sind and Orissa were constituted on 1st April, 1936, in accordance with the provisions of Section 289 of the Government of India Act, 1935.

### SEPARATION OF RAILWAY FINANCE FROM GENERAL FINANCE

In accordance with a Resolution passed in the Legislative Assembly in September, 1924, Railway Finance has been separated from the general finances of Government with effect from the year 1924–25. Notes on the Railway Budget and Capital Expenditure will be found on pages 11 to 14 and 17 and 18, respectively.

#### RATES OF EXCHANGE

The sterling amounts under Revenue and Capital heads in the Annual Accounts are converted into rupees at the average of the daily rates for telegraphic transfers in Calcutta on London in each year; the rate applied in 1934-35 being Rs. 13.29639 per f. In the Budgets for 1935-36 and 1936-37, a conversion rate of 1s. 6d. per rupee is assumed, and in the Revised Estimate for 1935-36 a rate of 1s.  $6\frac{3}{32}d$ . per rupee.

The sterling amounts under Debt and Remittance heads are converted into rupees at Rs. 13<sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> per f (1s. 6d. per rupee).

## II.—REVENUE, AND EXPENDITURE CHARGED TO REVENUE

#### GROSS REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE

The Gross Revenue and Expenditure of the Government of India for the three years to which this Memorandum refers are shown in Table A on pages 6 and 7.

All receipts on revenue account are included in the total of revenue and all outlay in the total of expenditure, with the main exceptions that the working expenses of railways, irrigation works and posts and telegraphs, and the surplus profits paid to Indian States and certain railway companies, are treated not as expenditure but as a deduction from revenue.

#### NET REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE

The figures of Gross Revenue given in Table A, although showing the net receipts of railways and other commercial undertakings, make no deduction on account of interest charges; the total receipts under tax revenue do not eliminate the cost of collection; and the receipts from opium sales take no account of the cost of cultivation and manufacture. Customs revenue includes the portion of the Customs and Excise duties on motor spirit payable to the Road Development Fund for expenditure by Provincial Governments, etc. On the expenditure side, Defence expenditure is shown gross, the Defence receipts being included under revenue, and the appropriation to the Road Development Fund is included under Civil Works.

To present a picture of the revenue available for administrative purposes and the expenditure on such purposes, an analytical table of the Net Revenue and Expenditure of the Central Government is given in Table B on pages 8 and 9.

#### ACCOUNTS, 1934-35

The Revenue Account for 1934-35 showed a net improvement of Rs. 169 lakhs over the Revised Estimate, mainly due to increased receipts of Rs. 151 lakhs under Customs. The unallocated surplus to be transferred to the Rural Development Fund is therefore increased from Rs. 113 lakhs to Rs. 282 lakhs.

#### REVISED ESTIMATE, 1935–36

As compared with the original estimated surplus of Rs. 6 lakhs in 1935–36, the Revised Estimate foreshadowed a surplus of Rs. 242 lakhs.

From this anticipated surplus of Rs. 242 lakhs, it was decided to allot Rs. 45 lakhs to a special fund for assisting the new provinces of Sind and Orissa in meeting their expenditure on buildings, Rs. 17 $\frac{1}{2}$  lakhs being provided for Sind and Rs. 27 $\frac{1}{2}$  lakhs for Orissa. The balance of the surplus, viz. Rs. 197 lakhs, will be transferred to a Revenue Reserve Fund available to help out the finances of the first year of Provincial Autonomy. The final Revised Estimate figures exhibited, therefore, both Revenue and Expenditure as Rs. 124,37 lakhs.

In the course of voting Supplementary Demands for Grants the Legislative Assembly made a reduction of Rs. 100 in the Demand in respect of Baluchistan.

#### BUDGET, 1936-37

In framing the estimates for 1936-37 a surplus of revenue over expenditure of Rs. 205 lakhs was envisaged and, in view of the pledges previously given to the Legislature in regard to the removal of emergency taxation, further reduction in Taxes on Income has been effected. With effect from 1st April, 1936, the remaining tax on incomes below Rs. 2,000 has been abolished and the surcharges on income-tax and super-tax on higher incomes have been reduced from one-sixth to one-twelfth. The net cost of these measures is estimated at Rs. 185 lakhs. In addition the weight of the one anna letter has been raised from half a tola to one tola, with corresponding alterations in the rates for heavier letters, and the weight of registered newspapers to be carried for a quarter of an anna has been raised from eight to ten tolas.

Expenditure includes the provision of (a) Rs. 108 lakhs and Rs. 50 lakhs, respectively, as subventions to the new Provinces of Sind and Orissa and (b) Rs. 60 lakhs under "Defence" and Rs. 40 lakhs under "Civil" towards reconstruction and other expenditure in connection with the earthquake at Quetta. The final Budget Estimate shows a small surplus of Rs. 6<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> lakhs.

The following reductions were made by the Legislative Assembly in the demands for grants for 1936-37 presented to them, viz. :---

Of these reductions the Governor-General in Council has, under Section 67A (7) of the Government of India Act, restored the demands under "Executive Council," "Defence Department" and "Baluchistan" as being essential to the discharge of his responsibilities.

The reductions in taxation were effected by the Indian Finance Act, 1936. The Bill in recommended form was not passed by the Legislative Assembly, but after certification it was passed by the Council of State and was made an Act on the 31st March, 1936, by the Governor-General under the provisions of Section 67B of the Government of India Act (vide Parliamentary Paper H.C. 129 of 1936). The additional import duty on foreign salt was also continued for another two years subject to a reduction of the rate from  $2\frac{1}{2}$  to  $1\frac{1}{2}$  annas per maund, by an Act, which received the assent of the Governor-General on the 21st April, 1936.

#### III.—RAILWAYS

In accordance with the resolution passed by the Legislative Assembly in September, 1924, railway finance was separated from the general finances of the Government of India with effect from 1924-25. After deducting all working expenses, including interest charges of commercial lines, the railways have to make a contribution to general revenues equal to 1 per cent. on the capital at charge of the commercial lines (excluding Capital contributed by Companies and Indian States) in the penultimate year *plus* onefifth of surplus profits in such penultimate year and one-third of the amount remaining available for transfer to Railway reserves in excess of Rs. 3 crores, but from the amount of these contributions are deducted the interest on capital and loss in working of strategic lines. The contribution to general revenues during the six years 1924-25 to 1929-30 totalled Rs. 36 crores. The contribution for 1930-31—some Rs. 6 crores—was found from the Railway reserves, but in consequence of the serious fall in Railway earnings due to the general economic depression, a contribution has not been found practicable since. At the end of 1936-37 the total contributions to general revenues remaining unpaid during the six years commencing with 1931-32 will amount to about Rs. 31 crores.

The Railway Revenue and Expenditure figures for the years from 1934-35 to 1936-37 are given in the following table.

The losses on commercial lines—after making full provision for accrued depreciation—are: 1934-35, Accounts, Rs. 3,11 lakhs; 1935-36, Revised Estimate, Rs. 2,48 lakhs; and 1936-37, Budget Estimate, Rs. 1,40 lakhs.

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Since 1932-33, there has been no free balance in the Reserve Fund, and the Railway Accounts and Estimates have been balanced by loans from the Railway Depreciation Reserve Fund, amounting for the five years 1931-32 to 1935-36 to Rs. 32,04 lakhs.

The Budget estimate for 1935-36 was based on the assumption that the improvement which had set in in the previous year would continue. Unfortunately this hope was not realised and instead of the deficit originally estimated at Rs. 190 lakhs a deficit of Rs. 454 lakhs is anticipated (of which Rs. 206 lakhs represents the loss on strategic lines) which is, however, an improvement of about Rs. 50 lakhs over 1934-35. Traffic receipts from State-owned lines are estimated at Rs. 90 crores or Rs. 31 crores less than the original estimate. Passenger earnings are expected to show an improvement of about Rs.  $\frac{1}{2}$ Goods traffic, on the other hand, suffered a serious crore. setback. The reduction in the groundnut crop, as a result of smaller sowings following a very serious drop in prices in 1934-35, accounted for a fall of Rs. 60 lakhs in receipts from April to October and receipts from rice and cotton traffic were disappointing. The figures for rice were, however, exceptional in 1934-35 owing to the imports to the areas devastated by the Bihar earthquake. Working expenses show a slight reduction as compared with the Budget estimate and with the figure for the previous year though the restoration of the balance of the pay cuts involved an increase of Rs. 87 lakhs. Interest charges show a reduction of Rs. 43 lakhs as compared with 1934-35 due to a fall in rates charged consequent on Government's conversion operations.

If the estimate for 1936-37 proves correct the deficit for the year will be appreciably reduced. The Budget for the year anticipates an increase in gross earnings from State-owned lines of about 11 crores, of which about 50 lakhs may result from a gradual improvement in traffic and about 100 lakhs from the operation of certain alterations in rates and fares. A small increase of  $\frac{1}{2}$  pie per mile in third class fares for distances between 51 and 300 miles on the North Western Railway is expected to bring in about Rs. 12 lakhs and a similar increase on the Burma Railways will yield Rs. 6 lakhs. Increases of upper class fares on the Great Indian Peninsula, Bombay, Baroda and Central India and South Indian Railways are likely to result in increased earnings of Rs. 5 lakhs. An increase in terminals on the North Western, Great Indian Peninsula and East Indian Railways is expected to yield Rs. 34 lakhs. The most important of the enhancements in goods freights are on petrol, liquid fuel and cement over the Bombay, Baroda and Central India, Great Indian Peninsula and East Indian Railways and on stone metal over the East Indian and North Western Railways. These and other similar enhancements in goods rates are expected to bring in increased earnings of about Rs. 50 lakhs during 1936-37. If the results are as anticipated, the deficit on the year will be Rs. 344 lakhs of which Rs. 140 lakhs will be in respect of commercial and Rs. 204 lakhs in respect of strategic lines.

An attempt is also to be made, it is hoped during the year, to cope with the problem of ticketless travel, which involves the Railway Revenues in a loss of revenue estimated to be at least Rs. 50 lakhs a year, and an amendment to the Indian Railways Act is to be placed before the Legislature. As a result of discussions now proceeding steps may also be taken for the coordination of transport and the regulation of motor traffic. The removal of the uneconomical competition from which the railways now suffer, while it would be in the interests of all concerned, should benefit railway revenues.

The Railway Depreciation Fund is estimated to have a closing balance on 31st March, 1937, of Rs. 11.81 crores after allowing for some Rs.  $35\frac{1}{2}$  crores borrowed to make up the deficits since 1931-32.

Particulars of the capital expenditure on Railways are given in chapter V (vide page 17).

### IV.-TAXATION PER HEAD IN BRITISH INDIA

The above figures include both Central and Provincial revenue.

For the purpose of calculating the taxation per head, the population of British India has been estimated at 282,232,000 in 1935, 284,952,000 in 1936, and 287,698,000 in 1937.

#### V.—PUBLIC DEBT AND CAPITAL EXPENDITURE

#### DEBT TRANSACTIONS, 1935-36

Indian Treasury Bills of three months maturity were sold weekly, with temporary suspensions for short periods, from 16th April, 1935, to 31st March, 1936. The amount outstanding on 31st March, 1936, was Rs. 32-13 crores.

On 1st June, 1935, £3,500,000 East Indian Railway  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. Debenture Stock, 1935–55, was repaid.

On 11th July, 1935, £10,000,000 India 3 per cent. stock, repayable at par in 1949-52, was issued in part replacement of the £12,000,000 6 per cent. Bonds, 1935-37, then under notice of repayment. The issue price was £98 per cent. and the loan was oversubscribed.

On 5th August, 1935, a 3 per cent. Rupee Loan, repayable in 1951-54, was opened to subscription in the form of cash, 5 per cent. Bonds, 1935, or  $6\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. Treasury Bonds, 1935. The issue price was  $96\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. and the loan was to be closed as soon as the total subscriptions amounted approximately to Rs. 15 crores, cash subscriptions receiving, if necessary, only partial allotment. The loan was closed on the opening day, allotments being as follows:—Cash, Rs. 2.11 crores; 5 per cent. Bonds, 1935, Rs. 8.38 crores;  $6\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. Treasury Bonds, 1935, Rs. 4.64 crores; total Rs. 15.13 crores.

On 15th October, 1935, the balance outstanding of the £12,000,000 India 6 per cent. Bonds, 1935-37, was repaid.

The Permanent Debt in India was reduced in 1935-36 by approximately Rs. 12.4 crores, about Rs 15.1 crores new debt having been raised and about Rs. 27.5 crores of debt having been discharged by repayment or conversion. The floating debt in India was reduced by Rs. 20.2 crores owing to a reduction in the amount of Treasury Bills outstanding.

Unfunded Debt: Savings Bank deposits of Rs. 15<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> crores (net) were anticipated. Receipts from and encashments of Post Office Cash Certificates were expected to be about equal. Unfunded debt in India was estimated to be increased by Rs. 15.69 crores.

Permanent Debt in England was reduced by f7.46 millions (net), resulting from the repayment of f11.95 millions of sterling stock, f3.5 millions of East Indian Railway Debenture Stock, f1.8 millions of the capital portion of the Railway Annuities, and the redemption of f174,150 of debt by the operation of the State Railways Sinking Fund; partly set off by the issue of f10millions of sterling stock.

#### DEBT TRANSACTIONS, 1936-37

The Budget provided for the net discharge of Rs. 25.44 crores of Permanent Debt, including £16.86 million for the repayment of  $5\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. Sterling Stock, 1936-38, £1.9 million for part capital redemption of the Railway Annuities created in purchase of railways, and £0.17 million for the statutory sinking funds established in connection with the purchase of certain railways. Treasury Bill issues were expected to be increased by Rs. 11 crores, and Unfunded Debt by Rs. 14.7 crores. The latter figure includes increased Post Office Savings Bank deposits of Rs. 84 crores and the net repayment of Rs. 50 lakhs of Post Office Cash Certificates.

The sale of 3 months' Indian Treasury Bills was continued weekly with a temporary suspension between 26th May and 30th June. The amount outstanding on 1st August, 1936, was Rs. 34.94 crores.

On 26th May, 1936, subscriptions in cash were invited to an issue of  $2\frac{3}{4}$  per cent. Rupee Loan repayable at par in 1948-52. The loan was issued at par and it was provided that the loan would be closed as soon as the total subscriptions amounted to approximately Rs. 12 crores. The loan was closed shortly after opening, approximately Rs. 30 crores having been subscribed. The amount allotted was Rs. 12,01,28,000

From 1st July, 1936, the rate of interest on cash deposits in the Indian Post Office Savings Bank was reduced to 2 per cent. per annum; and from the same date the issue price of Post Office Cash Certificates was raised so as to give a reduced yield of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. per annum compound interest on maturity in five years.

On 15th July, 1936, the outstanding balance of the  $\pounds$ 17,181,249 India 5 $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. Stock, 1936–38, was repaid.

From the year 1933-34 inclusive, the amount provided from' revenue for the reduction or avoidance of debt has been a uniform figure of Rs. 3 crores per annum. (For a description of the variable. provision that was in force prior to 1933-34, and the reasons for the adoption of a provision on the lines now followed, see the Explanatory Memorandum for 1935-36 [Command Paper 5000 of 1935]).

In addition, the final realised revenue surplus shown for any year goes to the reduction or avoidance of debt.
