





SIR.

I have the honour to submit the Annual Administration Report, together with the usual tabular statements, on the Prisons and Jails in the Bombay Presidency, (including the Province of Sind and Settlement of Aden), for the year 1899.

JUDICIAL.

- The number of Central, District, Special, and Extra-mural Prisons has undergone no change during the year under report. Under the orders, however, contained in Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 5120 of 20th July 1899, the Lock-ups at the Head-quarter Stations of Talukas and Mahals have been declared Third Class Subsidiary Jails. The number of Subordinate or Subsidiary Jails has, therefore, risen from 29 in 1898 to 204 in the year under report. The change is one more of name than anything else as regards the additional Subordinate Jails of the Third Class. The staff of a Subordinate Jail of the Third Class ordinarily consists of a Mamlatdars' or Mahalkaris' peon. It is, therefore, impossible to give the statistics of these additional new Subordinate Jails in the same detail as is done in the case of Subordinate Jails of the First and Second Class. In the annexures to this report these new Subordinate Jails have been, as hitherto, classified as Lock-ups. It has been usual hitherto in Annual Reports to give statistics of some 20 Subordinate Jails of the Third Class in the same detail as in the case of the Subordinate Jails of the First and Second Class. The practice is continued in this Report, but in future years' Reports it will be discontinued, all Subordinate Jails of the Third Class being grouped together along with Lock-ups.
- 3. The General Summary, which is to be found amongst the appendices of this Report, deals with the prisoners confined in Central and District Prisons, Subordinate Jails of all classes, Civil Jails and Lock-ups, and shows that the total population during the year under report has been 109,922 as against 93,990 in 1898, an increase of 15,932. The daily average population has risen from 10,167 to 10,949. For the increase in the total population referred to above, the Central and District Prisons are responsible for 3,047, Subordinate Jails for 1,705, and Lock-ups for 11,190, while the population in the Civil Jails has fallen by 10 as compared with the previous year, i.e., from 1,243 to 1,233. The increase referred to above will be commented upon in a later portion of this report.
- 4. The subjoined table refers to the admission of convicts into Prisons and Statement No. I—Number and disposal of convicts.

5. The total number of prisoners admitted into Prisons and Subordinate Jails during the year under report has been 20,417 males and 1,151 females, or a total of 21,568 prisoners. The numbers in the previous year were 17,531 males and 981 females, or a total of 18,512. The daily average number for 1899 in the above Prisons and Jails has been 8,928 males and 217 females, while in 1898 it was 8,366 males and 209 females.

The Common Prison of Bombay, Dhulia, Bijápur, Dhárwár, Ahmedabad and Hyderabad Prisons show a very large increase in the number of admissions, while the Bombay House of Correction, and the Prisons of Yerrowda. Thána, Shikarpur and Aden exhibit a decrease. The increase of 543 in the Common Prison is ascribed to an unusually large number of persons having been convicted for the offence of begging. The City of Bombay has, as Government are aware, been visited during the last few months by a large number of people from the famine districts. Sentences for begging are of a light character. and as only prisoners sentenced to upwards of a year's imprisonment are sent to the House of Correction, the above cause has not operated to increase the admissions into the latter Prison, which shows a decline. The increase in the remaining five Prisons has been due to the high prices of food-grains following on a scanty rainfall. The deficient monsoon of last year has contributed to largely increase the number of admissions into the Ahmedal ad Central Prison and the Prisons of Dhulia and Dharwar. The Superintendent of the Yerrowda Central Prison is inclined to attribute the decrease, in the number of admissions into that Central Prison, to a number of the criminal classes in the districts from which it mainly draws its population, having left those districts for others in which the pinch of famine has been less severely felt. Thána shows an appreciable decrease, and the crop failures in that district do not appear, therefore, to have contributed to force up the number of admissions into the Thána Prison.

8. The statement given below shows that there has been an increase of 170 in the number of admissions of female prisoners, equal to 173 per cent, over the figures of the previous year. This is attributable to the famine:—

9. The subjoined table furnishes particulars regarding the disposal of convicts in Prisons and Subordinate Jails during the years 1898 and 1899. In my Report for the year 1897, I gave some figures illustrative of the effects of the famines of 1876-77 and 1296-97, on the population of our Prisons and Subordinate Jails. These I now recapitulate. The figures include under-trials as well as convicts.

On the 31st of December 1898, the population of the above Prisons and Jails consisted of 9,445 prisoners, and on the 31st of last December, the number had risen to 11,510. At the present time, the population of our Prisons and Subordinate Jails is just over 12,400, and it appears to me to be well within the bounds of possibility that before the coming monsoon sets in—and heaven grant that it may be a bounteous one—the figures for December 31st, 1877, may be exceeded:—

^{10.} There has been a decrease of 687 prisoners under the head "Transfers to undergo sentence." This decrease is due to the fact that nearly every one of the Prisons in this Presidency have been overcrowded during the past year and consequently transfers have not been carried out as extensively as would have been the case had there been spare accommodation available in many of them. In December 1899 the Royal Indian Marine steamer "Dalhousie" was placed at the disposal of this Department for the conveyance of prisoners from Bombay to the two Coast Prisons, in each of which at the time accommodation was available, and 250 convicts from the Yerrowda, Thana and the Bombay Prisons were accordingly so transferred, 125 to Ratnagiri and the same number to the Kárwar Prison. Both of these Prisons are now full. The rise under the head

"Released on expiry of sentence" is due to the short terms of sentences awarded during the year to a large number of prisoners for petty offences of theft and begging as will be seen from the figures appearing under columns 4 A and 4 B of Statement No. III. exhibits an increase of 463; six* prisoners were released on the ground of sickness, 1 from the House of Correction, 2 from Yerrowda Central Prison, 2 from Dhárwár Prison, and 1 from the Sind Gang. Of the total number of 16 + prisoners released on other grounds, 3 were European ex-Military convicts released from the House of Correction shortly before the expiration of their sentences to admit of advantage being taken of favourable opportunities for deporting them to England, 9 were from Yerrowda, 1 from Ratnágiri, 2 from Thána, and 1 from Shikarpur Prisons. The Government Resolutions, sanctioning the release of the above convicts, are quoted in the margin. 281 convicts, including 24 life and term females, have been transported beyond the seas during the past against 210 during the preceding year. The transports were deported direct from Bombay to the Andamans on two different occasions, 157 males and 24 females on the Royal Indian Marine Steamer "Canning" in April, and 100 males on the Royal Indian Marine Steamer "Elphinstone" in November 1899.

Warder from the House of Correction went in charge of each party, the Matron of Thana Prison also accompanying the earlier one. The deportation to the Andamans of term transports having been, under the orders of the Government of India, revived, it is anticipated that the measure will, to a slight extent, tend to relieve the overcrowding of some of our Prisons. Six convicts have been transferred to lunatic asylums during the past against four in the preceding year. Four prisoners of those who escaped from Prisons during the year are still at large against 10 in 1898. The details of the escapes will be more fully commented upon later on in this Report when dealing with Statement No. V. The number of executions carried out has been 44 during the year against 39 in the year previous. The number of deaths shows an increase of 44 over the figure of the previous year. 220 deaths have occurred in Prisons and 17 in Subordinate The total number of convicts remaining on the 31st December 1899 was 10,120 males and 250 females, of whom 685 males and 32 females were confined 'in Subordinate Jails. There were 66 Burmese prisoners in continement on the last day of the year under report. One State prisoner was in confinement in the Yerrowda Central Prison on the 31st December 1899.

Jains, an increase under Mahomedans and a very large increase under "All other classes," and a decrease under the head of Eurasians.

The number of juveniles admitted during the year under review has consisted of 96 males and 21 females against 80 males and 21 females in the previous year. Of the 96 male and 21 female juveniles—of whom five had been previously convicted—78 males and 18 females were each sentenced to one month and under, 5 males and 3 females to above one month and not exceeding six months, and the remaining number to over six months. All the other heads under column 4 "Age" show an increase. The head "Illiterate" shows a rise over the figure for the previous year, while the remaining two heads "Able to read and write" and "Able to read only" show a fall.

12. A reference to the table below will show that, as regards the various occupations of convicts prior to imprisonment, a markedly larger number of those engaged in "Agriculture and with animals" and those engaged in "Mechanical arts, manufactures and engineering operations" have been admitted in the past than in the preceding year. There is also an increase under the heads "Professional persons" and "Miscellaneous." The remaining three heads all show a decline. The increase under the above heads, particularly that under "Agriculture and with animals" is due of course to the famine, and the same remark holds good in regard to the increase appearing against "Mechanical arts, &c.," under which head all labourers other than agricultural are classified.

- 17. There has been a relatively small increase in the number of habituals identified before conviction and a substantial increase in the number who confessed themselves to be habituals. There has been a slight decline in the number of those who were identified as old offenders subsequent to their trial and a marked decrease in the number of those who were classified by Courts as habitual offenders.
- 18. 19. There have been 13 escapes and 12 recaptures—11 from Prisons and Statement No. V.—Escapes and 12 from Subordinate Jails—against 18 escapes and 13 recaptures in the year provious. Of the 13 escapes, 2 occurred from inside and 11 from outside Prisons and Jails. The two escapes from inside were from the Deccan Gang, and the circumstances under which the prisoners made off were as follows:—

One prisoner escaped on the morning of 14th January 1899 at about 3 A.M. by slipping his ankle ring over his heel and leaving his fetters on the night chain. The other prisoner escaped on the night of the 8th March 1899 at 11-30 P.M. The prisoner having been well conducted his fetters had been removed. In both the cases the warders at fault were punished departmentally.

20. Of the 11 prisoners who escaped from outside Prison or Jail walls, 9 belonged to Prisons and 2 to Subordinate Jails. The escapes from outside Prison or Jail walls were distributed as under:—

In Dhárwár 2, Thána 1, Hyderabad 1, Shikárpur 3, and the Sind Gang 2, and 1 from the Subordinate Jail of Naushahro in the Hyderabad District, and 1 from the Násik Subordinate Jail. In all these cases the

warders at fault were either punished criminally or dealt with departmentally.

The statement marginally noted gives the offences committed by 21. and the punishments awarded to the convicts confined in Prisons and Subordinate Jails. This form No. Offences and punishments. has been slightly modified in accordance with the orders contained in Government of India's Resolution, Home Department Bection 52 of

(Jails), No. 75-85, dated 16th February 1899, embodied in this Government's Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 1840 of 13th March 1899, and an additional column, headed "combination of minor punishments" has been opened under the head of "major punishments" in this statement. The offences dealt with by Criminal Courts have fallen from 41 in number in 1898 to 18 in the year under report. The details of the offences are summarized in the margin. It will be observed that the offences "relating to work" and "escapes, mutiny and assaults" respectively numbered 3 and 14 during the year under review against 12 and 27 in the year previous.

22. Notwithstanding the rise in the daily average number the total number of offences and punishments has fallen very considerably. A reference to the subjoined tables will show that under offences dealt with by minor punishments there has been a decrease under all the heads except under that of offences "relating to assaults, mutiny and escapes", where the number has risen from 75 in 1898 to 125 in the year under report. Under "offences dealt with by major punishments" the first two heads each show a decrease, while the remaining two each exhibit an increase. The total of the figures in columns 1 and 3 and 2 and 4 exhibit a decline of 1,313 and 412, or in all 1,725 offences, in the year under report, dealt with by Superintendents:-

24. Out of a total of 9,184 punishments awarded by Superintendents of Prisons and Jails, 7,235 or 79 per cent. have belonged to the minor class and 1,949 or 21 per cent. have belonged to the major class. All the heads under the "minor class" except that of "hand-cuffing and link fetters" show a decrease. Under "major" all the heads exhibit a decrease with the exception of "corporal punishments," which show an increase of 41 over the figure for the last year. The Central Prison of Yerrowda, chiefly, and the Sind Gang, in a measure, are responsible for the increase under this head. The punishment register, during my inspection of a Prison, is a book which I very closely scrutinize, as I do also the weekly returns of whippings received in this office from the various Prisons, and I have certainly no reason to suppose that any of our Superintendents are given to unduly awarding the form of punishment under reference. Government will remember that some years ago when, as the result of the Prison Conference in Calcutta in 1892, punishment by stocks was abolished, I forefold an increase in the number of whippings, and what has happened in the last few years has confirmed what I then wrote.

25. The following table gives the particulars of the number of stripes inflicted in prisons. With the exception of the award of "above 20 to 25 stripes" and "above 25 to 30 stripes" all the heads show a decline:—

During 1899, 6,443 prisoners have been confined in fetters against 5,672 in the preceding year. This increase of 771 in the number of prisoners fettered is mainly due to the increased strength of the Deccan and Sind Gangs and to the formation here and there of segregation

27. The number of prisoners released under the Mark Rules has been 2,050 in 1899 against 1,587 in the previous year. The table which follows summarizes the result of the Mark System for the last five years, from which it will be observed that the percentage of the number, on the Mark Register, released to the number who might have been released, if of average good conduct up to date of release, under the Mark System during the year, has slightly risen as compared with the year previous. Since the receipt of Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 9033, dated 10th December 1897, the Superintendents of all Prisons and Jails continue to muster all the prisoners to read and to explain to them the benefits of the Mark System.

28. With the increase in the average population the average number of Statement No. VII.—Convict Officers employed during the year has risen from 820 in the previous to 878 in the year under report. In the case of female convict officers the number has declined from 10 to 8. The ratio of convict officers, male and female, to population remains the same as in 1898, namely, 9.8. The total number employed as prison officers at one time or another during the past year and the number of reductions and other punishments inflicted on them have respectively been 1,151 and 1,038 against 1,266 and 1,183 in 1898.

29. The statement noted in the margin relates to the Diet scales in force in the Prisons and Subordinate Jails in this Presidency. Such changes as have been made during the year under report in the Diet scales have been shown in the last column of the statement. The Diet scales have been found to work satisfactorily.

Statement No. XVIII.—
Under-trial prisoners.

30. The statement marginally noted appearing among the appendices to this Report furnishes particulars regarding under-trial prisoners in Prisons, Subordinate Jails and Lock-ups.

31. There has been a considerable increase in the number of male and female under-trial prisoners admitted into Prisons, Subordinate Jails and Lockups. In the case of Prisons, Subordinate Jails and Lock-ups the total undertrial population has respectively risen from 4,664, 4,538 and 53,738 in 1898 to 5,446, 5,117 and 64,928 in the year under review. The Prisons of Dhulia, Bijápur, Dhárwár, Kárwár, Ahmedabad and Rájkot, the Subordinate Jails in the Districts of Hyderabad, Thár and Párkar and the Panch Maháls, and the Subordinate Jails of Násik, Wadhwán, Surat, Belgaum and Ahmedanagar contribute in a more or less degree to this increase. The Lock-ups in the Districts of Shikárpur, Hyderabad, Karáchi, Ahmedabad, Kaira, the Panch Maháls, Broach,

Surat, Kánara, Khándesh, Belgaum and Bombay, and in Káthiáwár are mainly responsible for the abnormal increase in this class of prisoner. There have been 14 escapes of under-trial prisoners during the year under review against 35 in the year previous. Of the 14 escapes, 1 occurred from the Subordinate Jail at Kashmor in the District of the Upper Sind Frontier, and 13 from various Lockups. These 13 escapes are distributed as follows:—

Shikarpur District 4, Hyderabad District 3, Kaira District 3, and Satara, Belgaum and Dharwar Districts 1 each.

The deaths amongst under-trial prisoners have numbered in all 38 males and 1 female. There has been one such death in each of the Prisons of Dhulia and Ahmedabad, one in each of the Subordinate Jails of Kashmor, Broach, Sátára and Wadhwán, and two in each of the Godhra, Násik and Surat Subordinate Jails, while 27 under-trial prisoners have died in Lock-ups. This latter mortality has been distributed amongst the Lock-ups of the Districts of Shikár-pur, Karáchi, the Panch Maháls, Kánara, Kolába, Násik, Sátára, Kaira, Ahmedabad, Belgaum, Dhárwár, Bombay and Káthiáwár. In 1898, 22 males and 1 female under-trial prisoners died. The number of under-trial prisoners remaining in confinement on the last day of the year was 634 males and 14 females in Prisons, 354 males and 10 females in first and second class Subordinate Jails, and 1,446 males and 47 females in third class Subordinate Jails and Lock-ups, making a total of 2,434 males and 71 females.

FINANCIAL.

34. The statements noted in the margin deal with the gross expenditure on account of all classes of prisoners—both convicted and under-trials—in the Central and District Prisons, Subordinate Jails and Lock-ups. The cost of Police

and Military Guards is omitted from the expenditure, and the realizations from the Prison and Jail gardens are deducted from the total charges. The gross expenditure during the years 1898 and 1899 is contrasted in the following table:—

^{35.} There has been an increase of Rs. 2,085 in the total expenditure which has been Rs. 6,90,485 in the year under report against Rs. 6,88,400 in the past year. All the heads with the exception of "Dieting charges," "Clothing and bedding to prisoners," and "Contingencies" exhibit an increase. The average cost per prisoner has, however, fallen from Rs. 68-3-7 in 1898 to Rs. 63-7-10 in the year under report.

36. Notwithstanding the decrease under this head in the cost per head Establishment. which has fallen from Rs. 22-2-4 in 1898 to Rs. 21-1-3 in the year under review and which is due to a higher average number of prisoners confined during the year, the total expenditure has risen from Rs. 2,23,428 in 1898 to Rs. 2,29,209 in the year under report. The increase in the gross outlay is due (a) to the higher rate of pay allowed to the Assistant Surgeon attached to the House of Correction, (b) to the grant of arrears of Exchange Compensation Allowance to two European warders of the House of Correction, (c) to the salary of the Press Superintendent at the Yerrowda Central Prison, and to the salaries of the six press subordinates temporarily drafted from the Government Central Press, during the year under report for employment in the Yerrowda Press. The cost of "Inspection and general supervision" has increased from Rs. 22,752 in 1898 to Rs. 23,820 in the past year. This rise is principally due to the fact that I was absent on leave for six months in 1898 and was in charge of the Department for the whole of the year under report.

37. The table which follows shows that the average rates of chief foodgrains in the year 1899 have been much higher than those prevailing in the year preceding though they have been considerably cheaper than those obtaining in the year 1897. The average rates for food-grains were throughout the fist six months of the year under report abnormally low, and subsequently, owing to the general failure of the monsoon almost throughout the whole of Western India, abnormally high. This explanation will account for the appearance in column 4 of figures which at first sight may appear to partake of the impossible,

The total cost and the cost per head of "Dieting charges" have respectively been Rs. 2,55,857 and Rs. 28-10-11 in the Disting charges. Central, Special and District Prisons, or a decrease in the one case of Rs. 19,217 and in the other of Rs. 4-1-4 compared with the figures of the previous year. The average cost per prisoner in Prisons has been Rs. 28-10-11. The Prisons in which the cost per head has exceeded this amount are the Common Prison (Rs. 32-14-6), House of Correction (Rs. 38-13-0), Dhulia (Rs. 29-15-11), Deccan Gang (Rs. 48-8-8), Ratnágiri (Rs. 31-9-2), Rájkot (Rs. 39-14-1), Karáchi (Rs. 33-10-8), Sind Gang (Rs. 49-10-2) and Aden (Rs. 58-14-11). With the exception of the Dhulia and Rájkot Prisons and the Deccan Gang, which respectively show an increase of Rs. 6-0-11, Rs. 8-11-10 and Rs. 6-14-4, compared with the figures for the year 1898, all the Prisons exhibit a decrease in the cost per prisoner. This decrease has been due partly to favourable contract rates having been obtained in March 1899, and partly to the system of departmental purchases which was resorted to as in some of our Prisons favourable offers for provisioning contracts were not forthcoming. The reduced diet scale, referred to in paragraph 39 of my Administration Report for 1898, was in force in the Thana Special Prison till the close of September 1899, and this has, in a slight measure, helped to reduce the cost under Rations in that Prison. This reduction in the diet scale has not produced any ill effects on the health of the prisoners. In the City of Bombay the rationing charges per prisoner during the year under review have been Rs. 35-8-10 against Rs. 42-2-2, in the Deccan Rs. 29-2-2 against Rs. 33-1-2, in the Southern Marátha Country Rs. 20-13-6 against Rs. 26-9-9, in the Konkan Rs. 27-3-0 against Rs. 33-3-3, in Gujarát Rs. 27-0-5 against 29-7-7, in Sind Rs. 30-7-7 against Rs. 32-9-4 and in Aden Rs. 58-14-11 against Rs. 61-10-2. Notwithstanding the reduction in the cost per head the total expenditure for dieting prisoners in Subordinate Jails and Lock-ups has been higher owing to the larger number of prisoners confined therein. The total cost and cost per head of dieting charges, including Prisons, Jails and Lock-ups, have respectively been Rs. 3,20,464 and Rs. 29-7-5 during the year under report against Rs. 3,32,248 and Rs. 32-14-10 in 1898.

39. The remarks regarding the total cost of dieting charges and the average cost per head contained in the foregoing paragraph will doubtless come as a surprise on any one reading them, when it is borne in mind that famine prices have now for so many months been ruling practically throughout the whole of the Bombay Presidency proper. It should be explained, therefore, that the contracts which I entered into in March 1899, for the rationing of most of our Prisons and Jails, were extremely favourable. I have during the past few

months had many applications made to me by the contractors to modify or to cancel their contracts. This I have steadily refused to do, while at the same time expressing my readiness when the contract year-which terminated on the 31st of last month—was over, to consider the propriety of recommending Government—as I did in 1896—to allow some compensation to the contractors for the undoubtedly heavy losses which they have sustained. I am at present engaged in collecting a quantity of information in connection with the above question and shall have the honour hereafter of addressing Government in the matter. The present rates for food-grains are so extraordinarily high that I have again, as I did in 1896, recently entered into a number of contracts for the supply of grain to our Prisons and Jails for four months from April 1st, instead of for the usual period of a year, and I have done this in the hope that when July comes I may obtain much better rates than I can at present. If rates have not fallen appreciably by July, I shall continue to renew the contracts for brief periods until the big drop in prices-which I trust the next few months may witness-comes, when I hope, as I did about November 1896, to "catch the ball upon the hop," and obtain really favourable rates.

- 40. The Gardens attached to the Prisons and Principal Subordinate Jails

 Gardens.

 have yielded a fair amount of profit during the past
 year. The total value of vegetables and other articles
 supplied to the prisoners from these gardens has been Rs. 20,538-8-3 against
 Rs. 19,739-0-11 in 1893. Had it not been for the drying up of wells in some
 of our Jail Gardens consequent upon the scanty rain-fall, the gardens would
 have shown still better results.
- 41. The total Hospital charges have amounted in Prisons to Rs. 29,222 in the past year against Rs. 27,102 in that preceding, Hospital charges. the average cost per head having been Rs. 3-4-5 in the later against Rs. 3-3-8 in the earlier period. For our principal Subordinate Jails the figures are 1898, Rs. 499 and Re. 0-10-3; 1899, Rs. 940 and Re. 1-0-7. The Prisons in which the cost per head has exceeded the average cost of Rs. 3-4-5 are the Common Prison (Rs. 4-8-4), the Deccan Gang (Rs. 4-6-6), the Prisons of Dhárwár (Rs. 4-10-10), Ratnágiri (Rs. 6-4-7) and Thána (Rs. 7-10-1). In the Deccan Gang and the Common Prison and the Prisons of Ratnágiri and Thana the increase has been due partly to a higher average number of sick prisoners in each case and partly to the extra diet issued to the sick on medical grounds. In the Deccan Gang an extra 4 ozs. cake was, on the recommenda-tion of the Medical Officer, issued daily to each of the prisoners who lost weight. In the Dharwar Prison, the increase has been due to enhanced charges for milk consequent upon the rise in the price of fodder required for feeding the cattle belonging to the Prison Dairy. In the Prisons the cost per head of average number of sick has been Rs. 118-8-9 during the year under report against Rs. 111-5-7 in the year previous. The total cost under this head in our Principal Subordinate Jails has increased from Rs. 499 to Rs. 940. Belgaum Subordinate Jail has very largely contributed towards this increase by reason (a) of payments on account of the rations of prisoners treated in the Civil Hospital and (b) of extra diet issued, under the Medical officer's recommendations, to a large number of Pathan prisoners at one time confined in the Jail.
- 42. In the Prisons the total cost under this head has fallen from Rs. 33,654

 been Rs. 2-13-9 against Rs. 4-0-2 in the preceding year, a reduction of Rs. 1-2-5 per head. The above circumstance is due to the fact that we commenced the year under report with a somewhat unusually large stock of clothing in store in some of our Prisons.

 The Prisons in which the above rate has been exceeded are Dhulia (Rs. 4-11-7), Dhárwár (Rs. 3-9-4), Kárwár (Rs. 3-3-6), Rathágiri (Rs. 4-3-7), Ahmedabad (Rs. 4-3-0), Rájkot (Rs. 3-9-11), Karáchi (Rs. 3-1-11) and Sind Gang (Rs. 3-12-9). The total charges for clothing and bedding in the Subordinate Jails and Lock-ups have increased from Rs. 1,526 in 1898 to Rs. 2,056 in the past year, the cost per head having risen from Re. 0-14-5 in the earlier to Ke. 1-0-10 in the later period.

- 43. The total cost under this head has been Rs. 22,782 in the past against Rs. 18,616 in the preceding year, an increase of Rs. 4,166. The Bombay House of Correction, the Central Prison of Yerrowda, and the Special Prison of Thana are mainly responsible for this increase. The rise in the first-named Prison has been due to arrear payments for water supplied in 1898 having been made in 1899. The increase in the water charges at Yerrowda is due to the increased use of the bathing platforms of that Central Prison. The water service of Yerrowda until within quite recent times did not admit of the bathing platforms being as frequently used as they now are. The payment for the first time of Rs. 700 for water charges to the Thana Municipality has largely contributed towards the increase of expenditure under this head in the Thana Special Prison.
- A reference to Statement No. IX (Financial) will show that there has been an increase under "Charges for water-supply" and "Extraordinary charges." The increase under the former head has been explained in the foregoing paragraph and that under the latter has been principally due to the purchase of disinfectants and to the maintenance of the Segregation Camps established outside the Prison and Jail walls at Thána, Dhárwár and Sátára. The outbreak of relapsing fever and plague in the Common Prison, Bombay, necessitated the removal of the sick prisoners to the Arthur Road Hospital for treatment, temporary Warders being entertained to guard the sick prisoners, a police guard not being available for the purpose. The pay of these temporary Warders employed at the Arthur Road Hospital has been, for the first time, debited to the head under reference in the case of the Common Prison. That portion of the Nowpada Lunatic Asylum buildings, which Government were pleased to place at the disposal of this Department in 1898, is still used for the isolation of all fresh committals to the Thana Prison, an arrangement which has of course necessitated the continued employment of a considerable extra staff of temporary Warders on the establishment of that Prison.
- Moving prisoners, Transfer dinate Jails where the expenditure has fallen from Rs. 2,702 to Rs. 2,236. As regards Prisons and Lock-ups there has been an increase from Rs. 16,830 in 1898 to Rs. 17,738 in the past year, due principally to the move of the Sind Gang to its new camp in March 1899. The conveyance by the Royal Indian Marine Steamer "Canning", of 44 prisoners from Karáchi to Bombay in April 1899, and of 250 prisoners by the Royal Indian Marine Steamer "Dalhousie" to the Coast Prisons in December last saved this Department a money outlay of about Rs. 2,700 under the head under reference.
- Transportation charges have increased from Rs. 2,079 in 1898 to Rs. 2,411 in the year under report, and this increase is due to the deportation to the Andamans of a considerably larger number of transports in the later than in the earlier period, the number having been 281 in 1899 against 210 in 1898. If these 281 transports had been despatched via Madras to Port Blair—according to the arrangements in force before the prevalence of plague in this Presidency necessitated the adoption of the present system of direct deportation by Royal Indian Marine Steamers from Bombay—the cost of sending them only as far as Madras would have amounted to a trifle over Rs. 3,000.
- Charges for miscellaneous heads of this major head which show a considerable increase are "Annual expenses for uniforms, &c.", "Money payments as rewards, &c.", and "Other miscellaneous charges." The charge for Warders' uniforms is, in the case of each individual Prison or principal Subordinate Jail, a biennial one and the majority of our Prisons and principal Subordinate Jails were entitled to the issue to them of the above clothing during the past year. Under the second sub-head the increase is due to the payment of gratuity—under the deferred pay system—to a larger number of convict officers released during the year than was the case in 1898. The increase under the third sub-head is traceable to the cost of conveying from Lahore, where they were manufactured, to the Sind Gang Camp a large

number of new tents purchased for the use of that gang. The total cost and the cost per head under the major head noted at the commencement of this paragraph has risen from Rs. 17,727 and Re. 1-12-1 in 1898 to Rs. 20,042 and Re. 1-13-6 in the past year.

- 48. The rise in the expenditure under this head is principally due to the move of the Sind Convict Gang and the travelling allowances paid to the establishment which accompanied it.
- 49. This head shows a decrease under the total cost and the cost per head.

 The total cost under Prisons has risen from Rs. 4,362 in 1898 to Rs. 4,529 in the year under report, but that under "Subordinate Jails" and "Inspection and General Superintendence" has fallen respectively from Rs. 742 and Rs. 1,240 to Rs. 669 and Rs. 974. The increase in Prisons is due to the payment of Rs. 300 made to the Thána Municipality for House-tax levied for the first time on the Jail buildings. This amount represents the tax for two years, i.e., 1896-97 and 1897-98, which was paid during the year under report.
- 50. This head exhibits a large increase amounting to Rs. 5,949, the total cost and the cost per head having risen, respectively, from Rs. 3,826 and Re. 0-6-1 in 1898 to Rs. 9,775 and Re. 0-14-5 during the year under review. This increase is due to the purchase of tens for the use of the Sind Gang, at a cost of Rs. 5,811—the old tents of the gang were completely worn out and a new supply was sadly needed—and to the purchase of buffaloes and dairy appliances for the use of the dairy attached to the Prison at Dharwar.

Statement No. XI.—Employment of convicts.

51. The following table exhibits the employment of convicts for the last two years:—

has increased from 8,025 to 8,483. Except "Unremunerative labour" and "Gardening" all the heads show an increase due to the rise in the average number of prisoners. The rise of 4 under "Sick and Convalescent" does not call for any remark. The rise in the "Average number not employed for other reasons" is due to fresh arrivals being kept under medical observation in view of the presence of plague in the district, and to the large number of prisoners who, on account of having undergone inoculation, were temporarily excused from labour. Although prison servants show an increase, the percentage, owing to increased population, is actually less, it being 9 3 against 9 8 in 1898. The increase under "Grinding grain, &c." is due to the increased requirements of the Prisons, and that under "Manufactures" mainly to the employment in Hyderabad Central Prison of a larger number of prisoners in the factory. The increase under "Extra-mural labour" is due to remunerative work having been found for the prisoners of the Deccan Gang, and this fact accounts for the fall under "Un-

remunerative labour." The fall of 2 under "Gardening" calls for no comment. At Bijapur 114 prisoners on an average have been employed on cutting down prickly-pear. This number has been shown under "Unremunerative labour," and unremunerative it is so far as this Department is concerned, although about Rs. 3,300 represent the value of the labour of the prisoners. During the year under report 1,358 prisoners, or in other words a daily average of 4, were, at the request of the Collector of Ahmedabad, employed on the philanthropic though unremunerative work at the Sabarmati Cattle Relief Camp of unloading and stacking grass, making fences, &c. The cost of the guard—amounting to Rs. 63—required to look after these convicts was paid by the local Relief authorities, and the value of the labour of these prisoners was equal to Rs. 167-4-0.

'53.4 'Turning to Subordinate Jails, all the heads of the above table exhibit an increase except "Manufactures" and "Extramural labour." This increase is due to the increased population. The increase under "Sick and convalescents" will be accounted for when dealing with the vital statistics. The large increase under "Average number not employed" is due to the temporary, though prolonged, vacation—on account of plague—of the Subordinate Jail of Belgaum, the prisoners being accommodated some in tents and others in the local Civil Jail, no suitable labour being obtainable for the prisoners while occupying their temporary quarters. The rise under "Unremunerative labour" is very trifling while that under "Prison officers" is due to the increased employment in Subordinate Jails of prisoners as convict warders and convict overseers. "Gardening" and "Grinding grain, &c." show an increase over the figures for 1898, and this is due to the increase in the population of our principal Subordinate Jails. The increase under "Additions and alterations, &c." is due to the employment of several prisoners in relaying the floors of the sleeping quarters of the Belgaum Subordinate Jail.

Statement No. XII.—Net of convicts sentenced to labour. The earnings, cash earnings.

Statement No. XII.—Net of convicts sentenced to labour. The earnings, during the year under report, have amounted to Rs. 1,04,296-9-0, and when compared with the earnings for 1898, show an increase of Rs. 22,981-12-0. The earnings of the Printing Press at Yerrowda appear for the first time in this Report. The average earnings of each prisoner employed on jail manufactures have been Rs. 37-0-0 against Rs. 9-10-0 and Rs. 32-10-0 respectively in the preceding year. The subjoined table shows the cash earnings for the past two years and is a summary of the figures in column 11 of Statement No, XII, grouped under four heads:—

^{55.} The figures in connection with factory and extramural labour exhibit an increase of Rs. 5,137 and Rs. 17,937 respectively, and the Subordinate Jails show a decline of Rs. 586 below the figures of the preceding year. The fall in cash profits in the Common Prison and the Prisons of Yerrowda, Dhárwár, and Ratnágiri is due to less demand for prison-made articles. The development of the Press at Yerrowda has apparently had a tendency to interfere somewhat with the factory operations of that Central Prison. That, however, is a circumstance which I do not altogether deplore, as I shall explain later on. The decrease in the cash profits of Subordinate Jails has been due to the stoppage of the work of metal-breaking, arising out of the want of orders on account of plague and famine.

56. In March 1899 this Gang moved its camp from Shahpur in the Shabdadpur Taluka in the Hyderabad District to Sagna Sayed in the Tando Alahyar Taluka of the same District. The Gang has earned Rs. 30,163-15-0 with an average of 409 prisoners against Rs. 27,916-8-0 with an average of 326 prisoners in 1898 The Gang has been employed on excavation work on the Sangrowah diversion of the Jámráo Canal. This Gang has completed its work on the Jámráo Canal and is being moved to the neighbourhood of the Bhiri Road Station on the Kotri-Rohri section of the North-Western Railway in Naushahro-Feroze Taluka in the Hyderabad District, for employment on the Nasrat-Bagwah project, where it is expected to remain for some two or three years.

57. The earnings of the Deccan Gang have risen from Rs. 3,182-10-0 with adaily average strength of 278 prisoners in 1808—during the greater portion of which year the Gang was not employed on remunerative work—to Rs. 20,138-4-0 with a daily average strength of 336 prisoners in the year under report. The Gang was employed near the Head-quarter town of Dhulia on the Chalisgaon-Dhulia Railway project. The work in question was completed on the 12th of December last, and the question of its future location, after the present famine is over, is a matter for consideration. The Gang has been retained for the present at Dhulia as affording a very convenient means of partly relieving the enormous overcrowding—due to the famine—in the neighbouring Prison of Dhulia, which the last few months have witnessed.

58. The summary that appears below relates to the sale of quinine in the Central Prisons of Yerrowda and Hyderabad. The Sale of quinine packets. Sale of quinine packets. profits arising from this industry have amounted to Rs. 85-13-3 as against Rs. 1,655-9-5 in the year previous. The chief causes of this decline have been the rise in the price of the drug and the receipt of ready made quinine packages, instead of quinine in bulk, from the plantations. The sale of quinine packed at Yerrowda was carried out with a fair margin of profit until the end of June 1899 when, under the orders contained in Government Memorandum, General Department, No. 1952 of 6th May 1899, ready made packages of quinine were ordered from the Cinchona Plantations. These packages were sold during the months of July, August, September and October, and as the price we had to pay for them was Re. 1-9-6 per package, the loss during these months was considerable. On referring the matter to the Director of Cinchona Plantations that officer offered to arrange to supply the packages at a reduced rate of Re-1-6-6 each, but, as this price would not have allowed a fair margin for profit, further representations were made to him and he was asked whether he had any objection to resuming the practice of supplying to us quinine in bulk. To this arrangement the Director having assented, 100 lbs. of quinine in bulk were ordered in November last, and the work of manufacturing pice packets and of putting them up in packages was resumed. By the present arrangement a fair amount of profit is capable of being earned notwithstanding the rise in the price of the drug.

59. In paragraph 54 of my report for 1898 I alluded to the measures which were then being taken towards developing the The Yerrowda Press, Yerrowda Central Prison Press. For a number of years the Central Prison Press was one which limited its operations to departmental work, that is to say, to printing the Books, Registers, &c., employed in this Department. In our accounts credit was never claimed for the value of the work which the Press on its limited footing turned out. In June last six press subordinates were temporarily transferred, for a period of three months, from the Government Central Press, Bombay, to the Yerrowda Prison Press. Mr. W. George, the Second Deputy Superintendent of the Central Press, who was selected to supervise the operations of enlarging the Yerrowda Press, was, for the months of June, July and August, deputed to visit the Yerrowda Press at intervals in each of the above three months in order to guide the measures in progress, and on the 1st of October Mr. George's services were made over to the Yerowda Press. 77 prisoners specially selected for employment in the Yerrowda Press were transferred from number of other Prisons to Yerrowda on several occasions during the closing months of the year. In May of last year a quantity of machinery was indented for through the Secretary of State, a small portion of which was received just as the year was drawing to a close. In June a quantity of material, in the shape of machinery, &c., was made over to the Yerrowda Press from the Government Central Press. An equipment of English type was procured from the Government of India's printing stores in Calcutta; Maráthi and Gujaráti type was purchased in Bombay, and Kanarese type was ordered from the Basel Mission at Mangalore. Some miscellaneous articles for Press use were obtained from the Marine Department, Bombay. A six horse-power engine with an eight horse-power boiler has been purchased locally, and has lately, since the commencement of the present calendar year, together with the shaftings worked in connection therewith, been placed in position, a special shed having been built for the engine and boiler. This is the only building which, at a cost of Rs. 1,166, has so far been constructed at Yerrowda in connection with the Press operations. One sleeping barrack and one work-shed have been made over to the Press, the engine-shed being placed between these two buildings. The above arrangements have necessarily tended to somewhat increase the overcrowding in the Yerrowda Central Prison, which overcrowding has, however, been alleviated as far as possible by the distribution of many of the prisoners at night among the worksheds, which are large and airy. The Yerrowda Press on its enlarged footing is still, of course, in its very early infancy, but I trust that a perusal of the statement which follows this paragraph will satisfy Government that the Press in its new condition has at all events made a good start. There is no reason why in the near future the Yerrowda Press should not undertake the whole of the vernacular form printing for Government. In paragraph 55 of this Report I have remarked that any interference with the ordinary factory operations at Yerrowda which may be produced by the enlargement of the Press of that Central Prison is a circumstance which I do not altogether deplore, and this is because I am absolutely convinced that the more—within certain limits—the operations of that Press are extended the greater will be the saving to Government in their outlay on printing. This I view as a far more important object of attainment than the maintenance of a constantly increasing, let us say, carpet industry in that Central Prison.

60. In the foregoing statement, in which the value of the work turned out from the Yerrowda Press is calculated according to the principles laid down in the Government of India's Resolution, Home Department (Jails), No. 550—561, dated 19th December last, and in which a profit of Rs. 3,404-2-11 is shown, no account is of course taken of the outlay on or value of machinery, &c., pur-

chased or obtained by transfer during 1899. The sum of Rs. 8,595-8-0 may be taken as representing the above amount.

61. The following figures may be deemed interesting. During the months of the past year, throughout which the Yerrowda Press has been engaged in developing its capabilities, 220,280 official or demi-official envelopes, with printing thereon, were made and issued from the Press; 1,326 Guard Books and blank books were printed and bound; 32,000 Field telegraph forms were printed; 369 Jail Registers were printed and bound, and a very large number of Jail forms were printed. There was no steam power available during the period under reference as—as already explained—the press engine and boiler have only recently been placed in position.

62. In bringing my remarks on the Yerrowda Press to a conclusion, I desire to freely acknowledge the very ready assistance which, in connection with its development, I have at all times received from Mr. Framroz, the Superintendent of the Government Central Press, during the past year, while to this I would add that the selection of Mr. W. George to supervise that development, and to conduct the working of the Yerrowda Press under its new conditions, appears to me to have been amply justified by the manner in which he has dis-

charged the duties which have fallen to his lot at Yerrowda.

63. The statement which follows shows the extent to which prison-made articles have been supplied to Government Departments during the year under report and that preceding it:—

64. It will be observed that there has been a falling off of Rs. 4,897-9-1 during the year under report compared to the realizations in the previous year. The supplies furnished to "Other Civil Departments" and "Marine Department" show an increase. All the other heads show a decline, that against the "Military Department" alone amounting to Rs. 5,275-13-8. The largely decreased demands during the past year on the part of the Commissariat and Military Departments for Jail-manufactured articles are difficult to account for.

65. The marginally noted statement shows the total cost of guarding and maintenance of all Prisons, Subordinate Jails, and Statement No. XIII.—Npt Look-ups. The total expenditure, excluding Inspection Cost. charges and General Superintendence, has amounted to Rs. 6,65,271 in the past against Rs. 6,64,035 in the preceding year, an increase of Rs. 1,236. The actual cash realizations have been Rs. 1,04,297 against Rs. 81,315—an increase of Rs. 22,982—thus making the total net cost to Government of the Department Rs. 5,60,974 in 1899 against Rs. 5,82,720 in 1898—a decrease of Rs. 21,746. The average net cost per prisoner, in the year under review, has been Rs. 51-10-0 against Rs. 57-12-0 in the preceding year—a decline of Rs. 6-2-0. In view of the rise in the daily average population of our Prisons, Jails, and Look-ups from 10,090 in 1898 to 10,876 in the year under report, and with famine on the one hand and plague on the other, I view the above financial result as decidedly satisfactory, and in giving expression to this opinion—with which I am respectfully disposed to hope that Government may see fit to agree—I have not overlooked the further expenditure, in connection with compensation to our ration contractors, properly belonging to the past year, which I have ventured to foreshadow in paragraph 39 of this Report.

VITAL.

- Statement No. XIV.—Sickness and mortality amongst prisoners of all classes during the year. With a daily average strength of 10,949 confined in Central, Special, District and Extra-mural Prisons, Jails, Civil Jails, and Lock-ups, there have been 6,561 admissions into Hospital, the daily average number of sick has been 270 5 and the total number of deaths 276 or a ratio of 25 2 per mille of average strength. During 1898 the figures were as follows. Daily average strength 10,167; total number of admissions into Hospital 7,689; daily average number of sick 273 3; total number of deaths 216; or a ratio of 21 2 per mille of average strength.
- 67. The subjoined table shows the capacity of the several Prisons together with the daily average and the maximum population on any one day. During the past year the total accommodation in the Aden Prison has been increased from that for 61 to that for 83 prisoners.

- 68. It will be seen from the above table that, looking to the daily average, 11 out of the 15 Prisons have been overcrowded throughout the year under report. Out of these eleven Prisons, three Prisons—the Common Prison, Dharwar and Thana—exhibit a rate of mortality in excess of 33.3 per mille of average strength.
- 69. It has been, as will be gathered from the figures in the foregoing table, an absolute impossibility to terminate the overcrowding in many of our Prisons during the past year. I can but claim that I have done my best to, as far as possible, relieve the pressure in an overcrowded Prison by the transference therefrom to another Prison—which though also overcrowded was so in a less degree— of batches of prisoners. Every effort too has been made in the overcrowded Prisons to lighten the pressure on the regular sleeping accommodation by largely utilizing the work-sheds or other buildings as sleeping barracks. The Gangs are not taken into account in the above table. In the fifteen Prisons named therein, the aggregate population at the commencement of September consisted of 8,262 prisoners; by the end of December, owing to the famine, the numbers had risen to 9,667. The Coast Prisons of Ratagiri and Kárwár, to each of which, as stated in an earlier portion of this Report, 125 prisoners were transferred in the month of December, were at the close of the year more than full, a rare circumstance in the case of either Prison.

70. The statement which follows deals with the sickness and mortality amongst convicts and under-trials confined in Prisons during the past two years:—

71. While the number admitted to hospital has been less by 915 than in the year 1898, the daily average number of sick during the year under report has been higher by 31 than in the preceding year. During the year under review, the number of deaths has been 222—an increase of 32 over the figures for 1898. The Prisons which show a ratio of mortality in excess of 33 aper mille are those of the Common Prison (120 o), Thána (71 o), and Dhárwár (45 2). In 1898, the Prisons which showed a mortality in excess of 33 per mille were those of Shikárpur (58 3), the Sind Gang (64 4), the Common Prison (52 9), and the House of Correction (44 5).

Common Prison.—There have been 45 deaths—all male convicts—in this Prison. Out of this number no less than 37 deaths were due to relapsing fever, and of the rest plague was responsible for two, and diarrhoea, phthisis, remittent fever, valvular disease of the heart, tetanus and general debility for one each. Out of the total of 316 prisoners admitted into hospital during the year 244, or over 77 per cent. of that number, were for relapsing fever. One hundred and fifty-nine cases of relapsing fever and one of plague were removed for treatment to the Municipal Hospital for contagious diseases situated in Arthur Road. Had it not been for this very severe outbreak of relapsing fever amongst the inmates of the Common Prison, the rate of mortality of that prison for the year under report would have stood at only 213 per mille. Lieutenant-Colonel Waters, in medical charge of the Common Prison, writes as follows with regard to the health of the prisoners:—

"For the first six months of the year we had a remarkably good state of health in this Jail, the death-rate for that period being only 8-1 in the thousand, and meanwhile the death-rate among the surrounding population transcended all record in Bombay, reaching not less than something like 300 in the thousand in the month of March. The deaths of the last six months of the year were, with the exception of three-cases, all from relapsing fever. These three were, one a case of heart disease, one of debility, and one of tetanus. There were thus from ordinary causes just three deaths in each six months of the year. All the other deaths in the last six months of the year were from relapsing fever and occurred for the most part in the Arthur Road Hospital, Otherwise from relapsing fever the sickness in the Prison has been but nominal."

The Medical Officer further adds :-

"A very noticeable fact is that the female prisoners (averaging for the year 29.8 persons) have not had relapsing fever among them, in fact there has been no mortality at all among them during the year under report; and no sickness to speak of. They seldom perambulate the yards and are constantly housed in upper stories."

With regard to plague Lieutenant-Colonel Waters states:-

"I think the circumstance that there have been no deaths from indigenous plague in this Jail since my return to duty in July 1898 worthy of notice having regard to the mortality from this disease among the inhabitants of this City living in the immediate vicinity of the Prison. There was no inoculation performed here from the 4th July 1898 till 12th October last, and this being a short term Prison the inoculated were practically all released within three months; so the immunity of the prisoners as a whole was in no way due to inoculation, but to the rigid system of dryness which has been maintained throughout the year within the Prison, partly by the sun and partly by the use of burning charcoal."

In view of the epidemic of relapsing fever in the Common Prison and of the recommendations of the Acting Sanitary Commissioner, Lieutenant-Colonel Channer, and of Lieutenant-Colonel Waters, the garden attached to the Superintendent's quarters has, since the present calender year commenced, been altogether abolished.

Thana Special Prison.—There have been 59 deaths in this Prison. Out of this number tubercle was responsible for 9, remittent fever for 8, dysentery and scurvy for 7 each, diarrhea for 6, pneumonia and bronchitis (chronic and acute) for 4 each, broncho-pneumonia, rheumatism, and synovitis for 2 each, and spasmodic asthma, leprosy, choleric diarrhea, secondary syphilis, valvular disease of the heart, fatty degeneration of the heart, dilatation of the heart, and emphysema for 1 each. The very heavy mortality in the Thána Prison is attributed by the Medical Officer mainly to climatic causes. The Medical Officer writes as follows with regard to the heavy rates of sickness and mortality in that Prison:—

"There were 599 admissions into hospital as against 487 of the previous year, showing an increase of 112 for the year under report. Ague, remittent fevers, respiratory affections, diarrheea and dysentery constituted the prevailing diseases. Out of the 618 cases made up by the 599 admissions during the year and 19 brought over as remaining from last year's return, 465 were discharged cured, 49 were discharged otherwise, 59 died, and 45 are remaining still under treatment. Out of the 599 admissions during the year, 53 cases had to be admitted at once in the hospital on their admission into the Prison for diseases contracted outside it. The mortality for the Prison population was 72 per mille of the average number. The cause of the heavy mortality is explainable by the following conditions:— The year under report was exceptionally unhealthy on account of climatic causes chiefly amongst which was the failure of the last monsoon. The mortality in the town was also coincidently heavy and the diseases which prevailed in the Prison were also prevalent in the town. Another fact worth observing in the causation of the heavy mortality above referred to, is the physical condition met with amongst prisoners on their admission into Prison. It is to be noted that out of 59 deaths which occurred during the year there were 41 deaths amongst prisoners admitted from Násik alone, and out of these 41, 27 were admitted into Prison in a weak state of health and succumbed easily to the various diseases from which they died. These prisoners have no stamina in them, their vital powers being enervated before their admission into Prison by poverty and want and are, therefore, not able to withstand the climate of the Prison, which is considered to be a very unhealthy one on account of malaria and other causes not yet discovered.'

With regard to the prevalence of malarial fever the Medical Officer of the Prison further adds:—

"In my opinion the most running underneath the hospital walls may have had some influence in producing or aggravating the malarial fever present in this Prison. A part of the most, however, has been filled up during the year under report. Overcrowding might have exerted an unfavourable influence on the general health of the prisoners. Another prejudicial element in the health of the Prison is a large tract of marshy ground on the east, north, and part of the south side of the Prison. This tract of marshy ground is

inundated twice a day by the tide running in from the Thána creek, and with each tide is left a very large amount of organic residue to rot and decompose during ebb-time. This evil is irremediable."

The fact that 41 of the 59 deaths in the-Prison of Théna occurred amongst the prisoners transferred thither from the District of Násik is a significant circumstance. Násik is an above-ghát District, Thána a Konkan, or Coast, District. It has for many years been customary to transfer from the Násik Jail to the Thana Prison all prisoners sentenced to over six months. Owing to the terrible overcrowding which, during the closing months of the year under report, was of such frequent occurrence in the small Subordinate Jail of Násik, very many prisoners with shorter sentences than that indicated above were transferred from Násik to Thána to undergo those sentences. I have before now stated my opinion to Government that Nasik is a station at which a Jail should always be maintained. In view of the circumstances referred to above I am on the present occasion disposed to stretch that opinion and to maintain that Nasik should be provided, not with a Subordinate Jail with accommodation for some 60 or 70 prisoners—the present little Subordinate Jail at Násik has accommodation for only 31 prisoners and in the month of last December at one time no less than 189 prisoners were packed within its walls—but with a District Prison with accommodation for not less than 200 prisoners. A strange feature about the very heavy mortality in the Thana Prison is that that mortality has in no way been due to anything in the nature of an epidemic, for the 59 deaths have been caused by no less than 11 different diseases, and to tubercle of the lungs has been due the highest number of deaths (9) from any one cause. The moat running round a great portion of the walls of the Thána Prison, to which the Medical Officer refers, is in process of being filled up by means of Jail labour-this measure was referred to in paragraph 59 of my Report for 1896 and paragraph 58 of that for the following year—and, though the work is a heavy one with which but slow progress can be made, I hope that before my connection with this Department ceases I shall witness something like the completion of the work in question.

Dharwar Prison.—Out of the 22 deaths (20 males and 2 females) which have occurred in this Prison, 7 have been due to cholera, 3 each to debility and pneumonia, 2 each to dysentery, diarrhea and dropsy, and 1 each to bronchitis, spasmodic asthma and hepatitis. The ratio of deaths per mille of average strength would have remained exactly the same (viz., 30.8) as that of the year previous, if the 7 deaths from cholera had not occurred. With regard to the high rate of mortality the Medical Officer, Major Corkery, writes:—

"The high mortality during the year under review as compared with that of last year was due to the prevalence of a sharp but acute epidemic of cholera in the Jail, there being 7 deaths under this heading. In consequence of the prices of grain and other eatables being so high and a scarcity of these commodities, several of the prisoners admitted for dacoity, the result of starvation, arrived in a half-starved and debilitated condition and easily succumbed to ordinary ailments. The health of the prisoners has on the whole been good. Cholera was prevalent in the town of Dhárwár and immediate neighbourhood, and broke out in the Jail. The first case occurred on the 17th May. In all there were 12 cases, of which 7 proved fatal. The last occurred on the 13th June.* Plague was also rife in the Town and District of Dharwar for about six months. Two cases occurred in the Jail in October, both of which recovered. Inoculation of all prisoners was resorted to when dead rats first appeared in the Jail and before any actual cases occurred, and to this fact is the recovery of the two due and the further prevention of the spread of the disease."

72. Of plague during the past year there have been 2 cases—both recent admissions into prison, and both of which proved fatal—in the Common Prison, 2 cases in the Dharwar Prison

The Dhárwár cholera cases were the only ones which occurred during the year under report in any Prison or Jail.

and 1 in the Prison of Thána, all of which recovered, 3 cases with 1 death in the Subordinate Jail of Belgaum, 2 cases with 1 death in the Subordinate Jail of Násik, 1 case, which recovered, in the Subordinate Jail of Sátúra, 1 fatal case in a Lock-up in the Belgaum District, and 3 cases, all fatal, in Lock-ups in the District of Dhárwár. There have therefore during the year under report been in all—in Prisons, Jails and Lock-ups—15 cases of plague, 8 of which proved fatal. In the preceding year we had 39 cases of plague, 22 of which proved fatal.

- 73. In a previous paragraph of this report I have shown that the ratio per mille of deaths in Central, Special, District, and Extramural Prisons, during the past year, has been 25.2 on the daily average strength. This is not an unfavourable rate. If the Common Prison and the Prison of Thána, in which the mortality has been so very heavy, be left out of account as regards daily average strength and mortality, we get for the remaining 15 Prisons the abnormally low ratio of 15.2 per mille of deaths on daily average strength.
- 74. The following measures have been adopted during the year in the case of some of our Prisons and Jails with a view to improve the health and condition of the prisoners:—
 - (1) Issue of wheat in lieu of bájri and jowári.
 - (2) Issue of extra rations to weakly prisoners and convalescents.
 - (3) Issue of extra clothing to weakly prisoners.
 - (4) Issue of special diet to the above class of prisoners.
 - (5) Wherever necessary, free administration of cinchona alkoloids to all cases showing tendency to malaria.
 - (6) Issue of potatoes three times a week in lieu of ordinary succulent vegetables.

The above information is inserted in accordance with the orders contained in paragraph 1 of Government Resolution, Judical Department, No. 9115, dated 29th December 1896.

75. The following table contrasts the sickness and mortality in Subordinate Jails and Lock-ups during the years 1898 and 1899:—

- 76. Notwithstanding the rise in the total population and in the daily average strength of Jails and Lock-ups, the daily average number of sick in the case of Jails has fallen from 23 9 in 1898 to 20 1 in the year under review, and in the case of Lock-ups from 5 7 to 3 9. The deaths have, however, risen from 16 to 27 in the first case and from 10 to 27 in the second.
- 77. It will be observed from the foregoing statement that the ratio per mille of deaths to strength and admissions into Hospital has considerably increased in the Subordinate Jails and Lock-ups during the year under report as compared with 1898.

79. The Dhárwár Prison has contributed the whole of the cholera cases and deaths shown in the above table. With the exception of "Dysentery," "Other General Diseases," and "Abscesses, boils and ulcers of all kinds" the admissions under all the heads in the above table show a decrease which is extraordinarily marked under "Malarial Fevers." For the increased admissions under "Dysentery" the Decean Gang and the Prisons of Thána, Karáchi, and Hyderabad are mainly responsible, while the Bombay Common Prison, the Prison of Thána, and the Sind Gang chiefly contribute to the increase in admissions under "Other General Diseases." An increase is observeable in the number of deaths under "Dysentery," "Other General Diseases." "Tuberele of the lungs, Tubereulous Phthisis, &c.," and "Other Respiratory Diseases." The Prisons of Thána and Dhárwár and the Decean Gang have been mainly responsible for the rise under the first named head, the Bombay Common Prison and Thána Special Prison for the rise under the second; the Thána Prison and House of Correction for the rise under the third and the Prisons of Dháwár and Thána for the rise under the last mentioned head. There has been an extraordinary decline under admissions for Malarial Fevers which have fallen from 2,188 in 1898 to 1,283 during the year under report. This is doubtless more or less attributable to the scanty rainfall of last monsoon. The Prisons of Yeraoda and Ahmedabad have largely contributed towards the decline. The slight increase or decrease under the other heads does not call for any comment.

- 89. No cubicles have as yet been provided in any of our Prisons or Jails. The plans and estimates of the new Prison which it is in contemplation to erect at Karáchi are being framed with a view to the sleeping quarters of that Prison being fitted up with cubicles.
- 90. The Revised Jail Manual is being passed gradually through the Government Central Press. The process is a slow one as owing to the heavy demands on that Press at present, and the large amount of printed work contained in the Manual, the latter can only be printed piecemeal, that is to say, in batches of about fifteen chapters at a time.
- 91. J. M. Cardozo, the absconding Jailor of Kárwár, whose case was referred to in the last four Annual Reports, and who made himself scarce as long ago as February 1895, was in August last arrested in the Panch Maháls District where he was living under an assumed name, and was in October last tried by the Sessions Court of Kánára under Section 409 of the Indian Penal Code, and sentenced to three years' rigorous imprisonment. I have since transferred Cardozo to Yerrowda where he should prove useful in the Printing Press. His defalcations amounting to Rs. 725-5-3 have, since last year's Report was written, been recovered from his sureties.
- 92. My cordial acknowledgments are due to Khán Sáheb Dadabhai Sorabsha Munsiffna, who has recently been confirmed in the post of Personal Assistant in this office, for the manner in which during the year under report he has discharged the duties of that post.
- 93. I propose very shortly to submit to Government a brief report summarizing the various schemes which have during the past few years been formulated and provisionally approved for the construction of additional Prison or Jail accommodation in the Bombay Presidency, and I shall add to that list some further schemes, as I should wish before my connection with this Department is finally severed to place on record my views as to the projects which should, as funds are available, be taken in hand and completed with the object of placing the Bombay Jail Department, in the matter of its buildings, well in line with the foremost of the sister Departments in this country.
- 94. This is the last occasion on which it will fall to my lot to submit to Government an Annual Report on the Bombay Jail Department, as the early months of next year will witness my retirement from the service. The thirteen and a half years, during which I have filled my present post, have, in this Department, been busy ones. That period has witnessed the commencement and completion of the two Central Prisons of Ahmedabad and Hyderabad, while in many ways Indian Jail Administration has been well nigh revolutionized by the passing of Act IX of 1894. I have been content in my present post to endeavour to move quietly ahead on the lines indicated by the Indian Jail Commission of 1888 and, in the midst of a sea of changes, to endeavour to keep the departmental machine running smoothly. And if in this I am held to have been in any way successful, that circumstance is due to the loyal and hearty co-operation which I have at all times experienced at the hands of the very many Superintendents of Prisons, Gangs and Jails with whom my duties have during the period under reference brought me into close official relation.
