SIR,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Administration Report, together with the usual Statistical Tables, on the Prisons and Jails in the Bombay Presidency (including the Province of Sind and the Settlement of Aden) for the year 1907. The office of Inspector-General of Prisons was held by me during the period under report.

JUDICIAL.

2. The number of Central, District, Special and Extra-Mural Prisons has undergone no change during the year under report. Statistics of all the 3rd Class Subsidiary Jails have been grouped together with those of Lock-ups as was done in previous years. The 2nd Class Subsidiary Jail at Umarkot was abolished on 15th April 1907, under the orders of Government contained in Judicial Department Resolution No. 1642, dated 16th March 1907.

3. From the general summary preceding the statements in the appendices to this report it will be seen that the total population of all classes of prisoners confined in the Prisons, Subsidiary Jails, Lock-ups and Civil Jails during the year 1907 has been 87,250 against 92,408, a decrease of 5,158. The daily average population has been 8,854, showing a decrease of 503 over the figures of the year previous.

4. The following table, which compares the figures of the past two years, refers to the admission of convicts into Prisons and 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails only:—

5. There has been a decrease in the number of convicts admitted. The two Bombay Prisons, Yeránda Central Prison, Thána Special Prison and the Dhárwár Prison show a marked decline, while the Prisons of Karáchi, Hyderabad and Sukkur show a marked increase, which is chiefly due to the great activity shown by the Police in prosecuting bad characters under Chapter VIII, Criminal Procedure Code. The fall in admissions of male prisoners in

His Majesty's Common Prison was mainly due to the number of cases of begging and road obstruction being less than in 1906. His Majesty's House of Correction was not made use of as a receiving Prison, as was the case in 1906, and this accounts for the fall in admissions in that Prison.

6. With regard to the disposal of convicts there is an increase under the head of "Transferred to other Jails". This is due to large batches of prisoners having been transferred from Sukkur to the Central Prison of Hyderabad and to the Sind Gang and from Hyderabad to Prisons in the Presidency proper. There was considerable overcrowding in Sind Prisons during certain portions of the year. In November 1907, 40 male transports were deported to the Andamans against 80 males and 5 females in the year previous. As a Royal Indian Marine Steamer was not available, arrangements were made with the Alipore Jail Authorities to deport the transports in batches to the Andamans. This accounts for the decline, as only 40 out of 102 transports could be transferred during the year under report. Of the 22 prisoners released by order of Government, five males were released on the ground of sickness, 2 each from His Majesty's Common Prison, Bombay, and the Ahmedabad Central Prison and 1 from the Karachi Prison. Seven ex-military convicts were sent to England from the House of Correction. Seven unfit life transports were released, 5 from Yeránda, 1 from Thána and 1 from Ahmedabad. Three prisoners—1 each from Thána, Dhulia and Ahmedabad—were released on other grounds. The heading "Transferred to Lunatic Asylum" shows a decrease of 12 over the figures of the year previous. The number of deaths shows an increase of one only, which will be commented on later. There were no state prisoners in confinement at the close of the year.

Statement No. II.—Religion, Age, Education and previous occupation of convicts.

7. It will be observed from the figures appearing in the statement noted in the margin that there is an increase under females "Native Christian" and males "Mahomedan," while all the other heads under Religion show a decline.

8. The number of Juveniles admitted during the year under report was 57 as against 143 in the year previous or a decline of 86. In Bombay City, 4 children were admitted into prison against 64 in 1906, and in most other places a satisfactory decline in the admissions is observable. Of the 35 male and 22 female youthful offenders convicted, 19 males and 12 females were sentenced to one month and under, 12 males and 8 females to above one month and under six months and 4 males and 2 females to over six months. Out of the 57 admitted, 10 males and one female had previous convictions. All the other sub-heads show a decline with the exception of the sub-head "above 60". Under the head "education of convicts" the sub-head "able to read only" shows an increase of 3 over the figures of the year previous. There is an increase under the sub-heads "Persons employed under Government or Municipal or other local authorities," "Professional persons," "Persons engaged in agriculture and with animals" and "Persons employed in mechanical arts, manufactures, etc.," while the remaining three heads under "previous occupation of males" show a decline. There is a marked increase under sub-head "Female prostitutes" for which the Bombay Common Prison is responsible. The percentage of the total number admitted to free population according to the census of 1901 is 0.145 during the year as compared with 0.158 in 1906.

9. There has been a marked increase under the head "above six months and not exceeding one year" for which the prisons of Karachi, Hyderabad and Sukkur are responsible owing to large admissions in those prisons, as mentioned in paragraph 5 of this report. The headings "above two years and not exceeding five years," "exceeding ten years," "sentenced to term transportation" and "sentenced to death" also show an increase, while the remaining heads show a decline. The Sind prisons are also responsible for the increase under "above two years and not exceeding five years." The Yeránda Central Prison and the Dhulia Prison show an increase under those sentenced to term transportation, while the Bijápur Prison is mainly responsible for the rise under those sentenced to death. The slight increase

Statement No. III.—Nature and length of sentences.

under "exceeding ten years" does not call for any comments. There were 968 prisoners sentenced to simple imprisonment, 13,647 prisoners sentenced to rigorous imprisonment and 185 prisoners sentenced to rigorous imprisonment with whipping as compared with 1,365, 14,649 and 227 in 1906. The number of prisoners sentenced to rigorous imprisonment with solitary confinement was 406 as compared with 450 in 1906, 436 in 1905, 365 in 1904, 46 in 1902 and 30 in 1901. 5,167 persons were sentenced to "not exceeding one month" as compared with 6,277 in 1906. Of the 5,167 persons 2,740 were in the Common Prison, Bombay. This is an improvement on last year's figures and as most of the districts show a decrease under this head, I trust that the provisions of sections 562—564, Criminal Procedure Code, relating to first offenders, are now being more generally applied. At the time of writing I am unable to obtain figures in connection with this subject.

10. The statement noted in the margin deals with reconvicted prisoners.

Statement No. IV.—Reconvictions.

It will be seen that with the decline in the number of admissions, the number of reconvicted prisoners received during the year was almost the same, the figures being 2,771 in 1907 as against 2,739 in the year previous. The following table shows the number of habitual prisoners received during the year. There has been a decline in the number of prisoners identified as habituals by Courts and Jail officials. In previous years all reconvicted prisoners were shown in this statement. This was a mistake, and such prisoners are excluded this year which accounts for the decline :—

11. It appears from the information supplied by the Inspector-General of Police that 910 persons were identified in the Bombay Presidency inclusive of Sind as compared with 918 in the year previous. Of the 910 prisoners 127

were indentified in Bombay, 39 in Dhárwár, 121 in Dhulis, 77 in Thána, 161 in Ahmedabad, 116 at Yeránda, 55 in Belgaum, 42 in Násik, 56 in Sholápur and the rest in other parts of the Presidency.

12. The number of escapes during the year under report has been 4 against 9 in the year previous. Of the 4 escapes, 2 got away from outside the Central Prisons of Yeránda and Ahmedabad and 2 from outside the Subsidiary Jails of Násik and Belgaum. The prisoners who escaped from the Yeránda Central Prison and Ahmedabad Central Prison were employed in the gardens and were recaptured immediately. They were sentenced to 4 months and 6 months' rigorous imprisonment respectively, and the Convict Officers in charge departmentally dealt with. The prisoner who got away from outside the walls of the Násik Jail was employed on quarry work and while so employed ran away. He was immediately caught, was dealt with by a Criminal Court and sentenced to 3 months' simple imprisonment under Section 225-B, Indian Penal Code. The Convict Officer and Warder were not responsible for this escape. The prisoner who escaped from outside the Belgaum Jail was employed on quarry work and was in charge of a paid warder. He was caught the same day by a Police Constable in the Belgaum market. The Warder in charge of the prisoner was prosecuted but was discharged by the Magistrate for want of sufficient evidence.

13. The statement noted in the margin relates to offences committed by and the punishments awarded to convicts confined in the Prisons and First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails. The offences dealt with by Criminal Courts show a decrease of one over the figures for the year previous, as will be seen from the details given below :—

14. It will be observed from the following table that the number of offences has fallen from 16,199 to 15,303 or a decrease of 896 over the figures of the year previous. This was due to the smaller average number of prisoners confined in our Prisons and Jails during the year under report. All the heads show a decline with the exception of the heading "All other breaches of Prison rules" which show an increase of 60 over the figures for the year previous and calls for no remarks :—

It will be seen that the total number of minor and major punishments awarded by Superintendents during the year under report was 15,515 and the total number of offences was 15,303. This difference is due to 212 offences having been dealt with during the year 1907 by the award of combined punishments:—

16. Out of a total number of 15,515 punishments awarded by the Superintendents of Prisons and Jails, 12,283 or 79 per cent. belong to the minor class and 3,232 or 21 per cent. belong to the major class. All the heads under minor punishments except warnings show a decline. The heading "separate cellular and solitary confinement" shows a marked decline and for this the Yerávida Central Prison is responsible. There is an increase under major punishments under sub-heads "Corporal punishments," "combination of minor punishments" and "other punishments," while the remaining three heads show a decline. The Yerávida and Ahmedabad Central Prisons are responsible for the increase under the first heading which will be commented upon later. The increase under the other two headings is noticeable in the Ahmedabad Central Prison and is in a measure due to the large number of Sindhi prisoners who gave the authorities a great deal of trouble. As mentioned in the earlier part of this report, these prisoners were transferred to relieve overcrowding in the Sind Prisons. Out of a total of 15,303 offences 2,001 were committed by habituals and these prisoners were given 5,562 punishments. There were fewer punishments at Yerávida during the year which is satisfactory. The women also behaved better. Of the 4,563 punishments 1,440 or 31 per cent. fell to habituals. The average number of habituals was 332 out of a population of 1,521. There were 43 cases of assault as against 64 in 1906. The Superintendent, Captain Twigg, reports that the Sindhi prisoners gave considerable trouble. They had to be severely punished before they would settle down and become useful convicts. There was a slight increase of punishments at Kárwár, Dhulia, Bijápur and Karáchi due to increased population, while there were fewer punishments at Thána due to decrease in population. There was a very great increase of punishments at the Central Prison, Hyderabad. This increase did not begin to show itself until the Prison became uncomfortably overcrowded and then every class of offence rose rapidly. Assaults became somewhat frequent and the Superintendent found considerable trouble in exacting tasks and many punishments for these classes of offences had to be inflicted. There was an increase at the Central Prison, Ahmedabad, which the Superintendent, Captain Lowson, attributes to the Sindhi prisoners. There is no doubt that Sindhi prisoners give a great deal of trouble when they first arrive at a Prison in the Presidency proper. Lazy by nature they try every dodge and take much punishment before they will settle down to work. The cells alluded to in

paragraph 4 of Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 2837, dated 24th May 1906, are now built and will be handed over to the Department very shortly. The separation of habituals and casuals is always kept in view. As prisoners who fail to give security under Chapter VIII of the Criminal Procedure Code are now treated as habituals difficulties in finding accommodation has arisen at both Dhulia and Hyderabad. However, in both these Prisons the two classes of prisoners are kept quite apart. At Ahmedabad the two classes of prisoners are now separated day and night, but not, owing to lack of accommodation, in quite such a satisfactory manner as in Hyderabad. Although the Press is now in its own building little can be done at Yeránda beyond separating the two classes at night. Educated and intelligent prisoners must be supplied to the Press and therefore many habituals find their way there.

17. The subjoined table gives particulars as to the number of stripes inflicted on prisoners during the year 1907 in our Prisons. It will be seen that there is an increase in the total number of corporal punishments for which the Central Prisons of Yeránda and Ahmedabad are mainly responsible. Out of the 38 corporal punishments inflicted at Yeránda, 20 were awarded to habituals. Of these, 5 were for assaults and 20 were for short work, refusing to work or malingering. The Sindhi prisoners gave, as was stated above, a great deal of trouble and this class of punishment had to be resorted to. Out of the 35 corporal punishments inflicted in Ahmedabad Central Prison, 20 were awarded to habituals and 15 to casuals. 13 floggings were for violent assaults and out of this number 10 were inflicted on Sindhi prisoners :—

18. During the year under report 5,178 prisoners were fettered as compared with 5,653 during the year previous. The decline is due to less number of convicts confined in our Prisons.

Mark System.

19. It will be seen from the figures appearing in Statement C appended to this report, that 2,240 prisoners were released during the year under the

remission system, as compared with 2,531 in the year previous. The percentage during the year 1906 of those released under the mark system to the total number who might have been released under that system if of average good conduct up to the date of release was 98.4 against 99.2 in 1906. The practice of mustering prisoners and reading and explaining to them the benefits of the Mark Rules has been continued. Special reward under Rule 515 (7)—Remission for committing no offence during the previous twelve months—was granted to 1,448 prisoners as against 1,240 in the year previous. With a view to simplify the present remission system, the Government of India directed certain Inspectors-General of Prisons to meet at Simla to discuss, in consultation with the Home Department, the final draft of new rules. Accordingly draft rules of the proposed new remission system were submitted to the Government of India and it is to be hoped that they will be brought into force during the present year.

20. The average number employed as Prison Officers during the year under report in our Prisons and First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails was 1,003 males and 11 females against 1,012 males and 10 females in 1906.

Statement No. VII—Convict Officers.

21. The statement noted in the margin shows the different diet scales in use in Prisons and First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails. These scales have been found to work satisfactorily. Such changes as have been made during the year have been noted in the fifth column of the statement.

Statement No. VIII—Diet.

22. The statistics of under-trial prisoners confined in our Prisons, Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups are embodied in the statement noted in the margin. The number of prisoners admitted during the year shows a decline of 3,340 as compared with the year previous. The daily average number has also fallen from 1,317 in 1906 to 1,276 during the year under report. The number of prisoners transferred shows an increase of 317 over the figures for the year previous. The increase is noticeable in the Central Prisons of Ahmedabad and Hyderabad and the Prison of Sukkur. In the two Sind Prisons large numbers of under-trial prisoners were admitted from the Larkhana District as no accommodation was available there.

Statement No. XVIII—Under-trial prisoners.

23. The number of escapes from 3rd Class Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups has fallen from 28 to 13 during the year under report. Of the 13 escapes, 4 male prisoners escaped from the 3rd Class Subsidiary Jails in the Sukkur District, 3 males from the Larkhana District, 1 male each from the districts of Ahmedabad, Dhárwár and Thar and Párkar and 2 males and 1 female from the Bijápur District.

24. The number of deaths has fallen from 45 in 1906 to 20 in the year under report. Of the 18 male and 2 female under-trials who died, 3 males died in Prisons, 3 males and 1 female died in First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails and 12 males and 1 female died in 3rd Class Subsidiary Jails. The death of one male under-trial prisoner in the Hyderabad Central Prison was due to Pneumonia, the death in the Sukkur Prison was due to Dysentery and the death of the under-trial prisoner in the Dhulia Prison was due to suicide. The under-trial prisoner was admitted in the Dhulia Prison on 1st April and committed suicide on the 2nd idem after lock-up between 7-30 and 7-45 p. m. He was kept in a separate cell as he had come from an infected place. He was seen at 7-30 p. m., when some water was given to him. The warder on round duty happened to visit the deceased's cell at about 7-45 p. m. and found the prisoner suspended from the roof by his own dhotie. The case was carefully enquired into and I was satisfied that none of the Jail officials were in any way to blame in the matter. Of the 3 males and 1 female who died in the First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails, 1 male each died in Násik and Belgaum Subsidiary Jails and 1 male and 1 female in the Ahmednagar Jail. The death in Násik Jail was due to Dysentery, in Belgaum to Bright's disease and in Ahmednagar Jail the male died of Dysentery while the female died of Hemiplegia. 2 male prisoners died in the 3rd Class Subsidiary Jails of Thar and Párkar District, and 1 male each in the districts of Hyderabad, Upper Sind Frontier,

Ahmedabad, Panch Maháls, Bijápur, Dhárwár, Kárwár, Ahmednagar, Násik and Sátára, and 1 female died in the 3rd Class Subsidiary Jail of Murbád in the Thána District.

25. The number remaining on 31st December 1907, was 187 males and 6 females in Prisons, 98 males and 6 females in First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails, and 748 males and 54 females in 3rd Class Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups, thus making a total of 1,033 males and 66 females.

26. In the beginning of the year 1907 there were 49 male prisoners in Civil Jails. The number admitted during the year was 838 male and 1 female prisoners. 842 male prisoners were released during the year under report thus leaving a balance of 45 male prisoners and 1 female prisoner at the close of the year 1907. The daily average has been 40 as against 43 in the year previous. The total cost and cost per head have respectively been Rs. 5,477-6-3 and Rs. 136-14-11 during the year under report as against Rs. 5,833-2-3 and Rs. 135-10-3 in the year previous.

FINANCIAL.

27. The statements noted in the margin deal with the gross expenditure on account of convicted and under-trial prisoners confined in the Central, District and Extramural Prisons and the Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups. The cost of Police guards has been omitted as usual except in the case of the Central Prisons of Yerávda and Ahmedabad, and the Special Prison of Thána, where the guarding has been undertaken by the Reserved Armed Warder Guard. The realization from the sale-proceeds of garden produce has been deducted from the total charges. The gross expenditure during the year 1907 has been Rs. 7,28,672 and the cost per head Rs. 82-10-9 against Rs. 7,71, 659 and Rs. 82-13-7 in the year previous.

28. The total cost under this head has risen from Rs. 2,78,449 in 1906 to Rs. 2,78,947 or an increase of Rs. 498. The increase is due to salary paid to Lieutenant J. Anderson while a probationer at Yerávda and to increments drawn by Jailors.

29. Both the total cost and cost per head under this head have fallen from Rs. 3,41,725 and Rs. 36-11-0 in 1906 to Rs. 2,88,657 and Rs. 32-12-0 respectively during the year under report. The decline is partly due to the smaller average number confined during the year under report, and partly to more favourable contract rates for staple food-grains.

30. The value of vegetables and other supplies from the gardens attached to our Prisons and Jails has been Rs. 17,657 in 1907 as against Rs. 19,533 in the year previous or a decline of Rs. 1,876. The Yerávda Central Prison, the Thána Special Prison and the Sukkur Prison are mainly responsible for the decline. At Yerávda it was due to excessive rain at the commencement of the rainy season and to the want of rain at the end of the season. The decline in the Thána Special Prison is more apparent than real. The value of vegetables and other supplies given to prisoners was Rs. 1,339-12-10 against Rs. 2,034-15-6 in 1906, while the amount paid into the Treasury was Rs. 996-7-7 against Rs. 475-1-9 in the year previous. Besides this, the average number employed on gardening in 1907 was 36 as against 40 in 1906, and vegetables were sold to the Prison at a lower rate than in the year previous. In Sukkur Prison there is no garden whereas there was a good one at Shikárpur and this accounts for the decline.

31. The total cost and cost per head under "Hospital Charges" are Rs. 32,950 and Rs. 3-11-10 against Rs. 33,899 and Rs. 3-10-3 in 1906. The decrease in the total cost is mainly due to the cost of medicines supplied during the year to the Yerávda and Hyderabad Central Prisons not having been adjusted before the close of the year, while the increase in the cost per head is due to the smaller number of prisoners. The sub-head "Extras or special diet for weakly prisoners not in

Hospital" shows an increase which is due to more liberal issues of extras to weakly prisoners in His Majesty's Common Prison, Thána Special Prison, and the Central Prisons of Ahmedabad and Hyderabad.

32. The expenditure under this head has risen from Rs. 32,761 in 1906 to Rs. 33,038 in 1907. The cost per head has also risen from Rs. 3-8-3 to Rs. 3-12-0 during the year under report. There is an increase in Prisons while the First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails and Third Class Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups show a decline. The increase in Prisons is due to clothing and blankets having been supplied in larger quantities to Yeránda, Ahmedabad and Hyderabad Central Prisons and the Prisons of Dhulia and Karáchi.

33. The total cost and cost per head has risen from Rs. 17,797 and Rs. 1-14-7 in 1906 to Rs. 20,624 and Rs. 2-5-5 in 1907, respectively. "Charges for water-supply" have risen from Rs. 12,884 in 1906 to Rs. 15,072 in the year under report. The Central Prison of Yeránda and the Prison of Karáchi are responsible for the increase. At Yeránda more water had to be given to the Press. In Karáchi Prison the charges for water-supply are for 12 months whereas in 1906 charges for 4 months only were shown. "Extraordinary charges" have risen from Rs. 835 in 1906 to Rs. 1,584 in 1907. The two Bombay Prisons are responsible for the rise under "Extraordinary charges" which is due to the payment to the Bombay Municipality of charges for the treatment of prisoners suffering from Plague in Municipal Hospitals.

34. This head shows an increase of Rs. 3,744, the figures being Rs. 27,777 in 1907 and Rs. 24,033 in 1906. The cost per head has also risen from Rs. 2-9-3 to Rs. 3-2-5. The increase is due to more transfers having been carried out during the year under report. A good many prisoners were transferred from Sind to the Presidency proper owing to overcrowding in the Sind Prisons.

35. The total cost and cost per head has risen from Rs. 25,396 and Rs. 2-11-8 in 1906 to Rs. 26,383 and Rs. 2-15-11, respectively. The increase under "Lighting charges" is noticeable in the Hyderabad Central Prison where more lights were required on account of overcrowding, in the Karáchi Prison where a larger number of lights were required than in the old Prison and in Yeránda where it is due to more lights being required, to the value of cocconut oil having increased and to a debit to this head, by mistake, of oil used for sanitary purposes. The increase in "Disciplinary charges" is due to supply of new zinc body tickets whereby uniformity has been obtained in all our Prisons, the supply of ammunition, and repairs to fetters and padlocks. The heading "Money payments as rewards and recaptures and services" shows an increase for which the Thána Special Prison is mainly responsible and is due to payments of gratuities to and charges for tobacco, etc., for the prisoners of the Special Class.

36. This head shows an increase of Rs. 1,288, the figures being Rs. 3,061 in 1906 and Rs. 4,349 in 1907. The cost per head has also risen from Rs. 0-5-3 to Rs. 0-7-11 in 1907. The increase is visible under "Inspection and General Superintendence" and is due to Plague Allowances being granted to the clerical and menial Establishment of my office, to the travelling allowance of the Personal Assistant from Sind to my office and partly to my having visited Sind twice on inspection duty during the year under report.

37. This head shows an increase of Rs. 195, the figures being Rs. 9,640 in 1906 and Rs. 9,835 in 1907. The cost per head has also risen from Rs. 1-0-7 to Rs. 1-1-10. The cause of the increase is mainly due to the house-tax levied by the Karáchi Municipality on the new Karáchi Prison buildings.

38. There has been an increase in the total cost and cost per head during the year under report; the figures being Rs. 4,898 and Rs. 0-8-5 in 1906 as against Rs. 6,107 and Rs. 0-11-1 in 1907. The principal cause of this rise

is due in the case of Kárwár and Ratnágiri Prisons to the purchase of alarm bells. In Yeránda it is due to the purchase of a beam scale from Europe, in the Ahmedabad Central Prison to the purchase of padlocks, cooking-pots, privy pans and great coats for warders, and in the Sind Gang to the purchase of cooking-pots, grinding-mills, bel-chains and fetters.

39. The statement noted in the margin deals with the employment of convicts in our Prisons and First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails. The average number of convicts sentenced to labour has fallen both in Prisons and First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails, the figures being 7,555 and 304 in 1906 against 7,174 and 244 during the year under report. In Prisons all the heads with the exception of "average number not employed for other reasons," "Prison servants," "additions and alterations" and "Jail repairs" show a decline, while there is a decline under all the heads in First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails. This decline is due to the smaller average number sentenced to labour during the year under report. The increase under "Prison servants" is due to increased employment of prisoners in the Yeránda Central Prison as water-carriers and sweepers on account of the new Press buildings and new quarters, and to the employment of prisoners on Pump work in the new Karáchi Prison. The increase under "Additions, alterations and repairs" is due to the employment of prisoners on unskilled labour at the Dhulia Prison for constructing quarters for subordinates.

40. The statement noted in the margin deals with the net cash earnings of convicts sentenced to labour. The cash earnings have fallen from Rs. 1,19,164 in 1906 to Rs. 40,348 during the year under report. The decline is most marked in the Central Prisons of Yeránda and Ahmedabad and the Sind Convict Gang. The Bombay Common Prison, Deccan Gang, the Prisons of Bijápur, Kárwár, Sukkur and the Aden Special Prison show a decline. The House of Correction, the Prisons of Dhulia, Dhárwár, Ratnágiri, Thána and Karáchi show a rise as compared with last year. In the case of Yeránda Central Prison, the Printing Press is responsible for the loss of Rs. 20,544-8-0. The Prison Factory proper shows a profit of Rs. 7,497-11-0 while the Press shows a loss of Rs. 28,042. The drawings have increased from Rs. 1,07,477-15-0 to Rs. 2,21,367. There was a large stock of Raw Materials in hand at end of the year, *viz.*, Rs. 78,357-3-1 as against Rs. 15,338-7-7 at the close of 1906. The Manager of the Press considered it necessary to lay in a heavy stock of paper and other Raw Materials in anticipation of the early running of the power plant and also to avoid delay in case the mills should stop working during the Plague season. I think he is right in doing this as we have experienced difficulty owing to non-receipt of paper on more than one occasion. Again the value of Plant and Machinery purchased in 1907 was Rs. 22,802-10-11 against Rs. 3,146-3-9 in 1906. These two big items account for the loss above referred to. The decline in profits in the Ahmedabad Central Prison is due to a considerable quantity of manufactured articles being on hand and to the outstanding debts amounting to Rs. 2,405 being due to the Prison at the close of the year. The decline in profits of the Sind Convict Gang are more apparent than real. The cash profit was Rs. 10,812-12-0 against Rs. 19,070-11-0. There is metal worth Rs. 5,760 on hand and an adjustment of Rs. 2,400 for the work of loading and unloading metal along the Railway is still to be made. If the metal had been sold and the value of work done been adjusted the profits would have been Rs. 18,972. The decline in profits in His Majesty's Common Prison, Bombay, and the Sukkur and the Aden Prisons is due mostly to smaller average number of prisoners employed on manufactures, and in the Deccan Convict Gang to smaller number sent on extra-mural work. The fall in the Bijápur Prison is due to a large amount of manufactured articles and raw materials remaining on hand at the close of the year. In the case of Kárwár Prison the decline in profits is due to a large stock of raw materials and manufactured articles remaining in hand at close of the year. The chief industry at Kárwár is the manufacture of coir yarn and the profits on this have been affected owing to the high rates ruling for cocoanuts.

Out of the sum of Rs. 40,346, mentioned at the commencement of this paragraph a sum of Rs. 22,062 represents the profits of our Prison Factories, Rs. 16,920 of extra-mural labour and Rs. 1,364 of our First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails. The average cash earnings per head of those sentenced to labour and of those employed on manufactures in the case of Prisons and First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails have fallen respectively from Rs. 15-3-0 and Rs. 42 to Rs. 5-7-0 and Rs. 16-5-0 during the year under report.

41. During the year under report, Jail-made articles of the value of Rs. 19,112 were sold to Government Departments against Rs. 19,305 in the year previous or a decline of Rs. 193. The Commissariat, Marine and Military Departments show an increase, while Public Works Department, Telephone Department and other Civil Departments show a decline. The figures for 1907 are:—

Public Works Department Rs. 2,212, other Civil Departments Rs. 12,055, Commissariat Department Rs. 210, Marine Department Rs. 3,378 and Military Department Rs. 1,257.

42. This Gang was located at Gánja Takar near Hyderabad throughout the year. The earnings of the Gang have fallen from Rs. 19,071 with a daily average of 444 prisoners to Rs. 10,813 with an average of 428 prisoners during the year under report. The loss has been explained in paragraph 40. Throughout the year the prisoners were employed both on laying ballast on Hyderabad-Badin Section of North-Western Railway and in breaking metal in the quarries near the Gang Camp. It is satisfactory to note that this Gang has been doing good work on the line which has met with the approval of the Railway Officers.

43. This Gang was located at Visápur in the Ahmednagar District throughout the year. With an average population of 492 prisoners the Gang has earned Rs. 2,854 in 1907, against Rs. 3,453 with an average of 693 prisoners in the year previous or a decline of Rs. 599. The decline is chiefly due to the average number employed on works being less than in the year previous.

44. The net profit of the quinine industry in the Central Prisons of Yeránda and Hyderabad during the year under report amounted to Rs. 3,125 against the loss of Rs. 479 in 1906. The Central Prison of Yeránda shows a profit of Rs. 1,901, while a sum of Rs. 1,224 represents the profit of the Hyderabad Central Prison. The value of quinine and packing materials purchased during the year was Rs. 22,341 against Rs. 22,632 in 1906, and the amount paid into the treasury during the year under report was Rs. 22,811 against Rs. 24,283 in the year previous. The supply of quinine in bulk sanctioned in Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 6602, dated the 9th November 1906, was received during the year under report. A large order for the supply of 2,000 packages for the Thar and Párkar District was received during the year and accounts for the somewhat high profit made at Hyderabad.

45. In addition to supplying the requirements of this Department, the Yeravda Printing Press has, during the year under report, printed in four languages 5,825,890 Magisterial and Police and Judicial Forms, 12,973,931 Stock Envelopes, 57,672 Special Envelopes, 144,550 forms for the Registration Department and 2,056,363 Miscellaneous forms. A total of 75,010 books were printed and bound for the several Government Departments during the year. Besides, during the year under report, the Press has taken over the printing of forms and books for Cantonment, Dispensary, Educational, Sanitary, Revenue, Local Fund (Incorporated and Excluded), Municipal, General, Public Works, Treasury and Forest and 3,966,500 forms and 9,730 books were supplied to the above Departments. The total number of forms, envelopes and books supplied to several Departments was respectively 11,993,303, 13,031,623 and 84,740 against 13,908,928, 4,448,138 and 58,217 in the year previous. The net profit is Rs. 52,698 as against Rs. 44,346 in 1906. The decline in cash profits has already been commented on in paragraph 40 of this report.

46. The new Press buildings were occupied on 1st May 1907, but up to the present the engines have not been supplied. This delay in giving us power to work the machines has caused us the very greatest inconvenience.

47. The statement noted in the margin shows the total cost of maintenance of all Prisons, Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups. The total expenditure, excluding charges for Inspection and General Superintendence, has amounted to Rs. 6,89,327 during the year under report against Rs. 7,33,537 in 1906, or a decline of Rs. 44,210. The total cash earnings have been Rs. 40,346 against Rs. 1,19,164 in the year 1906, thus making a total net cost to Government of Rs. 6,48,981 during the year under report as against Rs. 6,14,373 in the year previous. The average net cost to Government per prisoner has been Rs. 73-10 in 1907 against Rs. 65-15 in 1906. The increase is mainly due to fall in the cash earnings the reasons for which have been explained in paragraph 40 of this report.

VITAL.

48. The statement noted in the margin deals with the sickness and mortality amongst prisoners of all classes during the year. The following table compares the figures for 1906 and 1907 of prisoners confined in Central, District, Special and Extra-Mural Prisons, Subsidiary Jails and Civil Jails and Lock-ups:—

49. Looking to the daily average number of prisoners it will be seen that there was overcrowding, during the year under report, in His Majesty's Common Prison (43.2), the District Prisons of Dhárwár (5.6) and Rájkot (23.0) and the Hyderabad Central Prison (34.0). Of these only His Majesty's Common Prison and the Hyderabad Central Prison exhibit a ratio of mortality in excess of 33.3 *per mille* of average strength. Overcrowding in His Majesty's Common Prison, Bombay, cannot be prevented as is well-known. Many prisoners were transferred from this prison during the year which afforded some relief. The overcrowding at Rájkot and Dhárwár was not serious and requires no comment. There was much overcrowding in the Hyderabad Central Prison due to the large number of admissions under Chapter VIII, Criminal Procedure Code. To relieve overcrowding in barracks tents were erected, and as mentioned in the earlier portion of this report large batches of prisoners were transferred to Prisons in the Presidency Proper and also to the Sind Gang.

50. From the figures in connection with sickness and mortality amongst convicts and under-trials confined in Prisons during the past two years, it will be seen that, with the decline in the daily average strength during the year under report, the number of admissions into hospital, the daily average sick and the number of deaths have respectively gone down from 5,460, 243.2 and 164 in 1906 to 5,221, 240.3 and 158 during the year under report. There is an increase in the admissions of prisoners into hospital in the Central Prisons of Yeránda, Ahmedabad and Hyderabad, Dhulia and Kárwár Prisons and the Sind Gang. In the Yeránda Central Prison there were more admissions on account of malarial fever, and in the Central Prison, Hyderabad and the Sind Gang the increase is due to more admissions under "Pneumonia" and "Other Respiratory diseases." His Majesty's House of Correction, Bombay, Dhulia Prison and the Central Prison of Yeránda show an increase in the number of deaths as compared with the year 1906.

51. The prisons, which show a ratio of mortality in excess of 33·3 *per mille* of average strength are noted below :—

Common Prison.—There were 15 deaths during the year under report against 34 in the year previous. Out of this number 3 each were due to dysentery and tubercle of lungs, 2 each to bronchitis, pneumonia and diarrhoea, and 1 each to rheumatism, chronic bronchitis and debility. Of the prisoners who died 7 prisoners were admitted in good health, 4 in fair and 4 in bad health. Three of the prisoners died within one month of their admission into Prison and 1 of these, who died within 10 days of admission, was actually suffering from pneumonia when admitted into Prison.

Sind Gang.—Of the 17 deaths which took place, 13 were due to pneumonia, 2 to dysentery and 2 to diarrhoea. The Medical Officer writes “Pneumonia occurred in a sporadic form this year also, there were 54 attacks with 13 deaths during the year under report. The precautionary measures as usual were at once adopted but they all mitigate the severity of the disease but do not eradicate it. In Sind especially the atmospherical changes are great and rapid. At an Extra-Mural Camp there are always hardships and exposure, and so long as these facts exist sporadic cases are likely to be met with during winter.” If the 13 deaths due to pneumonia are excluded the ratio *per mille* of average strength falls to 9·3.

Hyderabad Central Prison.—Out of the 33 deaths which occurred during the year under report, 18 were due to pneumonia, 3 each to dysentery and tubercle of lung, 2 to ague and 1 each to enteric fever, scurvy, valvular disease of the heart, fatty degeneration of the heart, bronchitis, pleurisy and splenitis. The Medical Officer writes:—“There was overcrowding from May to the end of the year and for some months cases of respiratory diseases with fever were very numerous. Most of these were mild but a few of them went on to pneumonia of which disease there were 18 deaths during the year.” The latter part of 1906 and the early part of 1907 appear to have been very unhealthy in Sind. From 1st January to 10th April 1907 there were no less than 32 deaths in Sind Prisons as compared with 11 deaths this year in the same period. Of the 32 deaths alluded to, 14 occurred at Hyderabad against 5 this year. The overcrowding no doubt contributed to the increased mortality. Transfers were effected as speedily as possible but it was not till quite at the close of the year that the population was reduced to the holding capacity of the Prison.

House of Correction.—There were 8 deaths during the year under report and of this number 2 died of Plague in the Marátha Municipal Hospital. Three prisoners died of tubercle and one death each was due to active congestion of liver, debility and acute enteritis.

Dhulia Prison.—There were 15 deaths during the year under report. Of this number 5 deaths were due to diarrhoea, 2 each to tubercle of lung and scurvy, and 1 each to dysentery, malarial cachexia, haemorrhage, fatty degeneration of heart and pneumonia, and 1 undertrial prisoner committed suicide. The female prisoner, who died of malarial cachexia, was admitted in bad health suffering from malarial cachexia with enlarged spleen. The Medical Officer states that the sickness and mortality is due to climate and sudden changes in weather. I am inclined to think that an indifferent water-supply may have something to do with it. All drinking water is boiled but I do not feel at all certain that prisoners only drink the water that has been boiled. The Municipality are constructing filter beds so an improvement in the water-supply may be expected.

Sukkur Prison.—Of the 14 deaths which occurred during the year under report, 3 each were due to pneumonia and dysentery, and 1 each to tubercle of lung, syphilis, scurvy, rheumatism, pericarditis, bronchitis, pleurisy and hæmoptysis. Of the 14 prisoners, 5 were admitted in bad health and of these 5, 2 went straight into Hospital and died of tubercle of lung and scurvy. The prisoner who died of syphilis was in a very bad state of health on admission. He was under sentence of death but as he was so ill his case was reported to Government and accordingly the sentence of death was commuted to transportation for life, *vide* Government Resolution, Judicial

Department, No. 5326, dated the 24th September 1907. This prisoner died on 18th November 1907. There were 14 deaths in 1907 as compared with 21 in 1906 and the mortality *per mille* was 39·3 against 48·3 in 1907. The Medical Officer, Captain Murison, I.M.S., writes:—"These figures in my opinion are very satisfactory when we consider the unhealthy condition of the district during the months of January, February and March 1907."

52. *Plague*.—There were 8 cases of Plague and 3 deaths and of this number 7 cases occurred in His Majesty's House of Correction, Bombay, resulting in 2 deaths. All cases were at once removed to the Municipal Plague Hospital. The remaining 1 death was that of an undertrial prisoner which took place in the 3rd Class Subsidiary Jail of Wái in the Sátára District.

53. The following measures were adopted during the year under report with a view to improve the health of prisoners confined in some of our Prisons and Jails and are inserted in accordance with the orders contained in paragraph 1 of Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 9115, dated the 29th December 1896:—

- (1) Issue of wheat and rice in lieu of bájri and jowári.
- (2) Issue of extra rations to weakly prisoners and convalescents.
- (3) Issue of 2 ounces of extra flour to working prisoners in the Deccan Gang.
- (4) Issue of quinine as a prophylactic.
- (5) Issue of potatoes and onions in lieu of green vegetables.
- (6) Inoculation by Professor Haffkine's prophylactic serum.
- (7) Issue of extra warm clothing when considered necessary.

54. Reviewing the health statistics of Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups, it will be observed that the total population has decreased from 62,400 in 1906 to 58,596. There is also a decline in the daily average strength, number of admissions into hospital, daily average sick and the number of deaths, the figures being respectively 1,315, 692, 15·2 and 22 against 1,426, 819, 18·2 and 40 in 1906. The ratio of deaths *per mille* of average strength has also fallen from 28·1 to 16·7 during the year under report.

55. From the figures appearing in the marginally noted statement, it will be seen that there were no cases of cholera in any of our Prisons. With the exception of "Malarial fever," "Tubercle of lungs" "Pneumonia" and "Other respiratory diseases" all the other heads under admissions show a decline. The increase of 2 admissions under "Tubercle of lungs" calls for no remarks except it may be well to mention that the question of providing special accommodation for prisoners suffering from this disease is again under consideration. The Yeránda Central Prison is responsible for the increase under malarial fever. The Medical Officer writes:—"Prophylactic quinine parades were not practised as freely as in 1906 and hence perhaps the increase in cases." Special attention will be paid to the issue of quinine as a prophylactic this year and I trust that the result will be satisfactory. The Hyderabad Central Prison is responsible for the rise under respiratory diseases and pneumonia. The Sind Gang is also responsible for the increase under pneumonia. The number of deaths has risen under all other heads except dysentery, malarial fever, other general diseases, abscesses, boils and ulcers of all kinds. His Majesty's House of Correction, Bombay, is responsible for the increase under tubercle in which Prison 3 deaths occurred against none in 1906. The deaths under "Other general diseases" are attributable to 2 deaths from plague having occurred in His Majesty's House of Correction. The Karáchi Prison, Hyderabad Central Prison and the Sind Convict Gang are responsible for the rise in deaths under pneumonia. The causes of the increase have already been explained in the earlier paragraphs of this report. The Hyderabad Central Prison and the Deccan Convict Gang account for the increased number of deaths under "Other Respiratory diseases." The increase in the Hyderabad Central Prison has already been commented upon. The increase in the deaths from diarrhœa is noticeable in the Dhulia Prison where 5 deaths occurred against 1 in 1906. This matter has already been commented upon.

Statement No. XV—Chief diseases.

56. I think that the two new Prisons in Sind (Karáchi and Sukkur) are likely to prove healthy. The Medical Officer of the Karáchi Prison writes :— "The only local condition which may have predisposed to sickness and mortality is the exposed situation of the Jail which is open to the prevailing north-east wind. This would tend to increase the number of cases of pneumonia," and again "the Jail site is exposed to the prevailing winds and thus in cold weather tends to be chilly." It was found necessary to issue an extra blanket in the cold weather to all prisoners, but except that the new Prison has been found to be somewhat colder than the old Prison everything else appears to be in its favour. As regards the Prison at Sukkur Captain Murison, I.M.S., the Superintendent and Medical Officer, writes:—"From the table it will be seen that no cases of heat-stroke have occurred during the year. In fact not a single prisoner showed the slightest sign of being affected by the heat, while 9 prisoners in 1906 (in Shikárpur Prison) were actually admitted into the Hospital for heat-stroke. The Superintendent's order book shows that during the hot season at Shikárpur the work had to be reduced to less than half on account of the great heat while at Sukkur the work in 1907 went on as usual. This is very satisfactory when one considers that the maximum temperature recorded in Sukkur in 1907 was 110° F and the maximum temperature in Shikárpur in 1906 was 112° F. The great advantage Sukkur Prison has over Shikárpur is that the nights at Sukkur all through the summer except just a few are very pleasant and so the prisoners get a good night's sleep and rest and are thus prepared to undergo the heat of next day. Further Sukkur Prison has no large trees and this in my opinion is very beneficial to the prisoners as the slightest breeze can find its way into the prison."

57. Out of a total number of 16,269 prisoners who were discharged during the year, 9,036 or in other words 55·5 per cent. gained weight against 61·6 in the year 1906, 3,281 or 20·2 per cent. lost weight against 17·7 and 3,952 or 24·3 per cent. remained stationary as compared with 20·7 per cent. in 1906.

OFFICIAL AND NON-OFFICIAL VISITORS.

58. There were two hundred and ninety-three official visitors during the year for our Prisons and First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails. Seventy-five quarterly meetings were held during the year and all were well attended. Seven hundred and ninety-three visits were paid by official visitors while one hundred and thirty-four were paid by non-official visitors.

60. In addition to the above a sum of Rs. 18,000 was allotted for the discretionary grant, the whole of which was expended during the year under report.

62. The convicts in the Special Class established at Thána continue to work well and give no trouble whatever. There were no attempts made to escape but one prisoner was caught selling garden produce and was very severely punished. The advantages of being in this Special Class are gradually becoming known to prisoners in other Prisons and the offer of a transfer to the Special Class is now never refused.

63. The juvenile adults in the Special Class at Dhárwár Prison have worked satisfactorily during the year under report. Under the excellent supervision of Lieutenant-Colonel Lyons, L. M. S., the carpentry industry is thriving. The young convicts appear to pick up carpentry fairly quickly and they certainly turn out nicely made furniture which finds a ready sale in the neighbourhood. It is now time in my opinion to provide these youthful criminals with an institution of their own and I am drawing up a scheme which I hope soon to submit to Government.
