### 2. Rain Gauge Station Maps of India, Burma and Ceylon.

Maps on a scale of 1''=32 miles, showing raingauge stations in India, were printed in November 1944. The Meteorological Office, Poona, gave this station all the facilities in this connection. There was such a large demand from various Provinces and States for these maps that almost all the copies have been sold out, though a large number was printed. It was, therefore, considered desirable to reprint these maps. These are attached in a separate volume of the Report. An Index Sheet showing the sections 1, 2, 5, 6, 7, 8, 10 and 12 into which the map is divided is also given.

There are about 3,100 stations in India whose rainfall data are published in monthly tables by the Provincial Governments as shown below:—

Rainfall is measured once a day, at 8 hrs. local time, at all these stations. Symon's Pattern of rain-gauge, 5" diameter, is in use at most stations, except in Mysore and Travancore, where a Stanley Gauge of 4.7" diameter is used.

At the time of the first printing of these maps, rainfall stations in Ceylon had not been included. There are more than 400 raingauge stations in Ceylon; and, in order to avoid overcrowding, about 80 stations only have been shown in the map of Ceylon on sheet no. 10. All these stations, however, are indicated in a separate large scale map of Ceylon (Scale 1"=16 miles), which appears as sheet 10 A in the present series. It may be added that the names of the rainguage stations have been taken from the report on Colombo Observatory (1944) issued by the Superintendent, Observatory Ceylon, Survey Department. This map has been supplied by the Meteorolgical Office, Poona.

In the first printing, the stations in sheet 10 were found to be crowded; hence while reprinting this sheet, the names of various stations, particularly in Travancore, have been re-arranged to facilitate easy reference; and where the names were too crowded, only serial numbers are shown in the map and the corresponding names of stations are given on one side.

The Station is very grateful to the Meteorological Office, Poona, for the facilities given in this connection.
