



# **JOINT STOCK COMPANIES**

1946-47.

Introductory Note.

With a view to economy in printing and overtaking the arrears in the publication the table relating to the Alphabetical list of Companies at work in India has been omitted from the present Volume which relates to Joint Stock Companies at work in British India and in the Indian States of Hyderabad, Mysore, Baroda, Gwalior, Indore, Travancore, and Cochin during the year 1946-47. The above table will however be reintroduced in the Volume for 1948-49 with up-to-date revision of the particulars. The volumes in this series included figures for British India and Mysore only till 1918-19, but Baroda, Gwalior and Indore were added from 1919-20, Travancore from 1920-21, Hyderabad from 1921-22 and Cochin from 1935-36. The sources of these statistics are the returns prepared by the Registrars of Joint Stock Companies in provinces in regard to companies governed, by the Indian Companies Act VII of 1913 as amended by Act XXII of 1936 and in the case of the Indian States concerned by similar laws relating to registration of companies in force in them. As the information relating to the number, description and capital of companies at work in India, prior to the year 1946-47 is readily available from the thirtieth, thirty-first and thirty-second (Combined) issue of the volume, the figures for such back period have been omitted from the tables of the current issue which have been confined generally to the data for the year 1946-47.

m the}$ year 1946-47 shown in table No. 3. The number of such companies increased in 1946-47 by 67.1 per cent as compared with the previous year. The authorised capital and the paidup capital of the newly registered companies, as compared with the preceding year, however, increased by 95.7 per cent and 265.8 per cent respectively. The number of private companies registered in 1946-47 was 2,192, as against 1,475 in 1945-46. The total authorised capital of the companies both private and public registered during 1945-46 and 1946-47 was distributed between the different classes as shown below:-

Companies limited by shares incorporated. Table No. 2 contains information regarding number, description and capital of companies limited by shares at work in India at the end of the the year 1946-47 together with the distribution of the number of such companies registered in India according to classes of Joint Stock enterprise at the end of the above year. The total number of these companies registered in India up to 1946-47 under the laws relating to the registration of companies, was 38,461. Of these, 21,853 companies or 57 per cent of the total number registered were working at the end of the year 1946-47; the remainder were either wound up or discontinued, or never commenced business. All the companies registered in India have a rupee capital. The number of companies at work and the capital invested in them stood as follows at the end of each of the last three years:—

The total paid-up capital invested in banking, loan, investment and trust, nidhis and chit associations and insurance companies amounted in 1946-47 to R62,43 lakhs, to which Bombay contributed R19,21 lakhs or 31 per cent, Bengal R20,77 lakhs or 33 per cent and Madras R4,96 lakhs or 8 per cent. There is a striking contrast between the authorised and the paid-up capital of insurance companies.

Transit and Transport. Transit and transport companies accounted for a paid-up capital of R40,69 lakhs in 1946-47 of which R10,64 lakhs or 26 per cent, were invested in railways and tramways. Bombay contributed R5,58 lakhs or 52 per cent, and Bengal R4,66 lakhs or 44 per cent, of the total capital invested in railways and tramways.

Trading and Manufacturing. Trading and manufacturing companies accounted for a paid-up capital of R1,77,60 lakhs in 1946-47 of which R26,63 lakhs, or 15 per cent, were invested in public service companies; R15,47 lakhs in clay, stone, cement, lime and other building and constructing materials; R13,61 lakhs in agencies, R13,81 lakhs in iron, steel and shipbuilding;

R14,91 lakhs in chemicals and allied trades; R9,79 lakhs in engineering; R5,61 lakhs in tobacco (cigars, etc.); and R5,01 lakhs in printing, publishing and stationery.

Nearly one-fourth (R1,06,22 lakhs) of the aggregate paid-up capital in 1946-47 was Mills and invested in mills and presses, chiefly for working or pressing cotton, jute, wool and silk. Bombay had 32 per cent (R34,78 lakhs) of the total investments under this head, most of it being employed in cotton mills and presses and silk and woollen mills and Bengal followed closely with R34,98 lakhs, mostly invested in jute and cotton mills and jute presses.

In tea, coffee, and other plantations, a paid-up capital of #23,76 lakhs in 1946-47 Planting. was invested, and of this amount R11,22 lakhs were held in Bengal, mostly in tea companies, the majority of which own gardens in north-east India and are registered at Calcutta.

The paid-up capital of mining and quarrying companies was R24,94 lakhs in 1946-47, of which 47 per cent (R11.82 lakhs) was invested in companies registered in Bombay and 41 per cent (R10.28 lakhs) in companies registered in Bengal, most of the latter representing capital invested in coal mines. Paid-up capital amounting to R10.49 lakhs was invested in iron ore.

Mining and Quarrying.

Estate, land and building absorbed a paid-up capital of R17,47 lakhs in 1946-47; Estate, land Bombay and Bengal accounting for R7.60 lakhs and R7,19 lakhs, respectively.

R18,07 lakhs were invested in sugar (including jaggery) manufacturing concerns in 1946-47; Bengal and the United Provinces having between them R7,54 lakhs or 42 per cent of the total paid-up capital.

At the close of the year 1946-47, there were 1.017 companies limited by guarantee (including associations not for profit) having no paid-up capital, incorporated in India, with a total membership of 229,269 as against 825 companies with 178,854 on the 31st March, 1946.

Statistics have been collected, so far as possible, regarding companies which have been incorporated elsewhere than in India, chiefly with sterling capital, but which carry on work in India. Information regarding number, description and capital of these companies working at the end of the year, 1946-47 is shown in Table No. 5. The total number of such companies working at the end of 1946-47 for which returns are available was 834 and the paid-up capital thereof amounted to £724,090,000 besides debentures to the extent of £90,958,000. Of the paid-up capital and debentures, £119,834,000 and 18,393,000 respectively, were invested in petroleum mining, £97,877,000 and £40,855,000 in engineering, £95,657,000 and nil in banking, £79,809,000 and £4,345,000 in insurance, £50,015,000 and £9,678,000 in iron, steel and shipbuilding, £30,468,000 and £3,315,000 in navigation, £26,703,000 and £2,036,000 in tea planting, £31,354,000 and £4,184,000 in railways and tramways, £21,591,000 and £76,000 in chemicals and allied trades, £10,584,000 and £250,000 in investment and trust, £3,853,000 and £197,000 in public service companies and £7,402,000 and £3,000 in docks, harbours, shipping, landing and warehousing. The gold fields in Southern India are chiefly worked by companies formed in the United Kingdom, the paid-up sterling capital invested therein being £1,951,000. It should, however, be borne in mind that in the case of most of the banking and insurance companies and of some of the navigation and other trading companies incorporated outside India, only a portion, of the capital shown above is invested in India, as these companies work also in other countries besides India.
