ADMINISTRATION REPORT 1992-93 INTRODUCTION

Under the Section 124 of the M. M. C. Act, I place the 'ADMINISTRATION REPORT' for the year 1992-93 before the Corporation. The report brings out salient features of the activities carried out and the services rendred by various departments of the Municipal Corporation during the year 1992-93, which are briefly narrated below :--

2. The Public Health Department collected vital statistics on various communicable and other diseases including births and deaths and has been maintaining Public Health Laboratory for examination of water and food samples. The Department implements National Programmes like T. B. Control, Malaria Eradication etc. along with combating the dreaded disease like Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS). AIDS Surveillance Centres with blood sample testing facilities have been started with assistance from ICMR at various Hospitals through Government of Maharashtra.

During the year 1992, in all 2, 11, 127 births and 80,074 deaths were registered. Birth and Death rates for 1992 were 20.8 and 8.00 respectively. The infant mortality rate for 1000 live births was 47.2 and the maternal mortality rate was 0.3. There is decline in infant and maternal mortality rate as compared to that of the preceding year.

As part of preventive work, emphasis is given on the Medical Examination of the school children. Further, the public Health Department is rendering Medical Service to the citizens through 14 General Hospitals, 5 specialized hospitals one each for E. N. T., Eye, T. B., Infectitious diseases and leprosy, 25 maternity Homes, 154 Allopathic dispensaries, 3 Aurvedic dispensaries, 2 Unani dispensaries, one S. T. D. clinic and one drug de-addiction centre.

Indian Population Project V launched in the year 1988 with the World Bank Assistance provided preventive and promotive health care services through various health posts in different localities at the door step of the needy people.

3. City Engineer's Department carried out construction of Bridges, Municipal Markets, Schools. Similarly, the Environment Sanitation and Project Department carried out air quality monitoring in different parts of Mumbai. Similarly, Slum Improvement Cell provided basic civic amenities under Environmental Improvement Scheme for construction of Primary Schools, dispensaries, reconstruction of dilapidated sanitary blocks in the slum areas.

4. Development Plan Department finally had the Development Control Regulations approved by the State Government effective from 25-3-1991. The State Government had accepted the concept of Transfer of Development Rights, to be given to the owners of the land which are under reservations and if handed over free cost and free of encumbrances to the Municipal Corporation. Accommodation reservation had also been accepted by State Government.

5. The Road Department is mainly responsible for construction, resurfacing and maintenance of asphalt roads admeasuring about 1500 kms. and mastication of the junctions.

6. The cement Concrete Roads Department has taken up the works of construction of Cement concrete Roads. Uptill now 110 kms. of major roads were concretised at the cost of Rs. 135 crores. Hence, the problem of pot holes on the roads is now reduced.

7. Mechanical & Electrical Department carried out the work of Planning, Procurement, erection, supervision, service maintenance and repairs of the Mechanical & Electrical works of the various departments such as --

1) Municipal Power Laundry.

2) Municipal Workshop.

3) Medico Electronic Cell.

4) Air Conditioning Plants.

5) Municipal Foundry.

6) EPABX System.

8. Solid Waste Management Department is concerned with the sweeping of roads, collection and disposal of garbage, removal of debris due to road excavation and building repairs. The major scheme carried out by this department are as follows :--

1) Refuse removal and clearance by dumper placers and containers.

2) Removal of garbage with 70 compactors.

3) Construction and maintenance of Sulabh Complex at 164 sites.

4) Vermiculture Project for production of vermi-compost from garbage and construction of pilot plant for conversion of garbage into fuel pallets.

5) Scheme for pay and use toilets for the pavement dwellers.

9. The Fire Brigade Department is organized to save lives and property in the event of fire and other emergencies such as house collapses, Bomb blast, motor and train accidents, oil and chemical spillages etc.

10. Water Supply Project Department is trying to keep place with increasing demand of Water Supply to Mumbai's increasing population by continuously embanking upon land and exploiting the water resources. Out of 455 MLD Water supply expected on completion of Bombay III Projects, 90 MLD Water is already being brought from 26th March 1993.

11. Similarly, Hydraulic Engineer's Department looks after the maintenance of the water works and distribution of water supply including implementation of the works required for distribution of water.

12. The Sewerage Project Department is carrying out various works under Bombay-II & Bombay-III Projects. In Bombay II Sewerage Project 13 Pumping Stations and 45 km. of pipe-line have already completed, whereas in Bombay III Project 17 kms. sewer lines have been completed.

13. The Sewerage Operation Department is assigned the overall functions of the Sewerage Operation and Maintenance System for City of Bombay. Maintenance and Operation of Storm Water Drainage System of the Suburbs and City are also looked after by Sewerage Operation Department.

14. The Assessment & Collection Department is the major revenue earning department of the Corporation. The total collection of the year 1992-93 was Rs. 878.51 Crores which was excess that the previous year. Octroi being principal source of revenue, all out efforts are being made to improve collection and reduce leakages. Various measures also being taken to improve the administration of levy, collection and refund of Octroi.

15. The Education Department carried out different schemes to promote the primary education. About 15,000 students appeared for Government Scholarship examination out of which about, 6,500 students passed and 27 students secured Government Scholarship. Computer education centre for primary schools students has been started in Los Angeles Municipal School to spread awareness and generate keen interest in school students about computer.

16. The Civic Training Institute & Research Centre (CTI & RC) arranged training programmes in Administrative Management, Financial Management, General Management, Management techniques. Induction training programmes also organized for the newly recruited employees to acquaint with the functions and activities carried out by the Corporation. C.T.I. & R.C. also organizes and conducts National Refresher Courses at the request of Ministry of Urban Development, Government of India.

The Municipal Government of Greater Bombay is controlled by the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act.

The Municipal area of 437.71 Sq. K. Mts. is divided into 23 wards which are grouped under six administrative zones, which service the civic needs of nearly One Crore citizens by employing a work force of about 1,30,000 with a budgetory outlay of Rs. 1804.97 crores. Each of the six zones is supervised by a Deputy Municipal Commissioner who is delegated with most of the executive powers of the Commissioner for smooth administration of the wards through the Ward Officers. In addition, there are six functional Dy. Municipal Commissioners who head certain departments dealing with specialised subjects, like Water Supply and Sewerage, Development Plan of the City, Personnel Administration etc. One of the functional Deputy Municipal Commissioners is designated as the Director (Engineering Services and Projects).

Since 1984, by an amendment to the B. M. C. Act, the post of Additional Municipal Commissioner was constituted and three such posts were created to assist the Commissioner in the overall management of the Municipal affairs. One more post of A. M. C. has been added to the present strength of 3 A. M. Cs. for assisting the Commissioner. Thus there are 4 Addl. M. Cs. assisting the Commissioner.

The present Municipal Corporation came into office on 3rd March 1992 after the Nineth Municipal General Election held in February, 1992 with an added strength of 51 Councillors, raising the strength of the Councillors to 221. For the first time, in the history of the Corporation, 3 seats of Councillors are reserved for Women candidates belonging to Scheduled Castes and 63 seats are reserved for Women from open category.

The basic philosophy in framing this legislation, enunciated way back by the memorable pronouncement by Lord Ripon on Local Self Government in 1882, seems valid even today. The resolution of 18th May 1882 interalia states - ``It is not primarily with a view to improvement in administration that this measure is put forward and supported. It is chiefly designed as an instrument of political and popular education. As education advances, there is rapidly growing up all over the country an intelligent class of public-spirited men whom, it is not only bad policy, but sheer waste of power, to fail to utilise." Many great Indians, who were associated in framing this legislation and piloting it through the Council of Governor in 1887 were Shri K. T. Telang, who later became one of the youngest Indians to be nominated as Judge of the Bombay High Court, Sir Pherozeshah Mehta, Lord Reay, Mr. Forbes Adam and other eminent jurists. As Shri K. T. Telang expressed, the philosophy of this status "My beau ideal of Municipal Government includes a strong executive responsible to the Corporation, and an enlightened Corporation watchful over its Executive." This is ensured by constituting relatively independent authorities within the overall legal entity called Bombay Municipal Corporation. While the Municipal Government of the City vests in the Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay, the entire executive power of the Corporation for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of Bombay Municipal Corporation Act vests in the Municipal Commissioner, Except whenever by the provisions of this Act, the sanction of the Corporation or its Statutory Committees, is expressly provided. The Councillors are elected on the basis of adult franchise from constituencies which normally have about 29,000 voters, and they are expected to deliberate in the meetings of the Corporation/its Committees or all its Sub-Committees either statutorily constituted or constituted by the Corporation for Specific purpose and express the demands and grievances of the people whom they represent and control the Municipal Administration by casting their votes on the proposal submitted by the Municipal Commissioner as the head of the Municipal Administration. The Municipal Commissioner is appointed by the State Government for a period not exceeding three years but this appointment also is renewable by the State Government for a further period not exceeding three years. He can be recalled by the State Government at any time after consultation with the Corporation. He can be removed by the State Government from office if at a meeting of the corporation not less than 5/8 of the whole number of Councillors vote in favour of such a proposition. He is a member of the Corporation and one of the seven Municipal Authorities charged with carrying out the provisions of B. M. C. Act, each of the authorities having its own independent existance, sphere of jurisdiction and powers; at the same time these authorities are interdependent and support one another in a large measure for smooth governance or civic affairs.

The Municipal authorities are :

(a) a Municipal Corporation,

(b) a Standing Committee,

(c) an Improvements Committee,

(d) a Bombay Electronic Supply and Transport Committee

(e) an Education Committee,

(f) a Municipal Commissioner

(g) a General Manager of Bombay Electric Supply and Transport Undertaking.

The Municipal Administration has Municipal Officers and servants such as Special Engineers, City Engineers, Hydraulic Engineer, Executive Health Officer, Education Officer, Municipal Secretary, Municipal Chief Auditor and others. These officers are not given the status of Municipal authority and they are the servants of Municipal Corporation.

The Municipal Commissioner is a member of Municipal Corporation and has all the rights of a Councillors, except the right to vote. He has, in addition, certain other special powers in making statements, in addressing the Corporation or calling special meetings at a short notice, under special circumstances.

The Mayor is the presiding functionary of the Corporation and is not vested with any executive or statutory authority. He is elected every year from amongst the Councillors by the Councillors. His authority extends to calling the meetings of the Corporation and conducting the proceedings of the Corporation in an orderly fashion in conformity with the Law. He is accorded respect due to a presiding functionary of the august body of the Municipal Corporation and for protocol, social purposes is exalted and described as the "First Citizen of the City." The Mayor and the Chairman of various committees are helped by an organisation independent of the control of the Municipal Commissioner and headed by a Municipal Secretary who renders all the ministerial assistance, advice based on the precedents and keep the record of the proceedings for future references.

The Municipal Chief Auditor, like the Municipal Secretary is also an independent officer of the Municipal Corporation for the purpose of conducting the audit of the Municipal Finances.

Apart from the four statutory Committees mentioned above, the Corporation has constituted five Special Committees viz.

- 1. Works Committee (City),
- 2. Works Committee (Suburbs), "
- 3. Public Health Committee,
- 4. Markets and Gardens Committee,

5. Law, Revenue & General Purposes Committee. which deal with the subjects covered by the designations of these Committees. In addition, a Consultative Committees called Grant-in-Aid Committee has been also constituted for submitting proposals to the Corporation for awarding of grants to certain organisations.

An informal forum for deliberations is constituted in the form of "Group Leaders' Meeting" which is a device for the Leaders of different political groups to discuss informally various proposals before they are crystallised in the form of propositions which can be put before the Corporation or its statutory authorities for formal sanction. This system was evolved soon after Independence, when the Municipal Corporation Elections came to be organised on the basis of political affiliations and by political parties. By established convention, the political group or party which commands the largest number of councillors, is called a majority party and the Leader of this group is called the Leader of the House. On the other hand, the largest group in the opposite party have their own Leader, who may or may not necessarily have a support of other opposition group and is given the honour of Leader of the Opposition. However, unlike in the state Government where the party or the group, which commands the majority of votes, is in charge of executive Administration, in the Municipal Corporation, the executive administration headed by the Municipal Commissioner, is independent of all the majority at any particular time during the elected period of Councillors. The Govt. of India, Ministry of Urban Development Deptt., has formulated a scheme titled as "Nehru Rozgar Yojana" (N. R. Y.). The scheme is being financed by Govt. of India and Govt. of Maharashtra. The Government of Maharashtra is 1990 has requested to implement the shceme in the City of Bombay to the Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay and also deposited an amount of Rs. Fifty Lakhs with the Corporation for implementing the scheme. The Govt. of India has also deposited Rs. Fifty Lakhs with the Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay.

The scheme provided for self employment and employment to the persons whose household income does not exceed Rs. 11,850/- per annum.

Department of Personnel and Administrative Reforms (D. P. A. R.) (including Organisation and Mehod Division of M. C.'s Office)

The Departdment of Personnel and Administrative Reforms comprises of the Personnel Department. The Labour Department, Establishment Proposal Sections, a Revision of Grades Cell and Organisation and Methods Division under the control of Dy. Chief Accountant (Establishment) and a Backward Class Cell, a Marathi Section, an Examination Section and an Organisation and Methods Section in Municipal Commissioner's office dealing with Personnel Matters.

The main functions expected to be carried and provide a policy frame work and make rules and procedures in all personnel matters; (ii) to ensure that the policies and procedures are implemented uniformly at various decentralised levels; (iii) to motivate the employees with a view to increasing productivity and making the administration more and more responsive to public demand; (iv) to strive to make continuous appraisal of the existing procedures and methods.

The process of streamlining the existing system had already begun with - (1) standardisation of qualifications for various posts of similar nomenclature and methods and recruitment, (2) formation of committee at appropriate levels to consider the matters regarding promotions, continuation in Municipal Service beyond 55 years, redressal of grievances of employees at various levels, establishing panels for recruitment and selection of staff, change in the date of birth, proposals for P. T. cases, etc., (3) revision of Recruitment Rules as required under various provisions of the Constitution and maintenance of reservations for backward classes, sportsmen, handicapped persons and ex-servicemen, in employment, (4) a regular programme of meeting at fixed intervals with (i) officers dealing with personnel matters in all departments for implementation of personnel policies, and (ii) representatives of the recognised unions to settle disputes of a general nature.

The office of the Organisation and Methods Officer has been carrying out ``dafter inspection" in the departments and in the Ward Offices, In addition, the records of the department regarding confirmation of employees, Suspension of employees, Settlement of P. F./Pension Claims in respect of the retired employees or those expired while in service, P. T. cases etc. are checked and the reports of the Daftar Inspection are sent to the Head of the Department for compliance.

Review Committee for deciding the cases of suspension

The Review Committee under the Chairmanship of the A. M. C. in-charge of personnel matters has been constituted to decide the cases of employees placed under suspension. The cases where the suspension of employees is required to be extended beyond a period of six months due to certain reasons, are required to be placed before the Review Committee for decision. During the year 1992-93, 16 such cases were reviewed by the Committee.

MARATHI SECTION :

6. A Marathi Section has been established as per directives of the State Govt. and the Corporation in order to ensure that Marathi is used to the maximum extent in day-to-day administrative work. Translation work of the drafts, notes, qualifications, technical terms, forms, etc. are carriedout regularly and the books useful in translation work in official language *viz*.

etc. are prepared by collecting the information from various departments of B. M. C.

7. A scheme for providing training in Marathi typing and stenography as well as to give incentive prizes to English Typists and English Stenographers has been implemented on the lines of State Govt. Scheme with the sanction of the Corporation. Steps are being taken to implement a scheme to hold an examination in Marathi language for non-Marathi employees. A scheme for training to Municipal employees in noting and drafting is implemented and training classes for the same are started. Similarly, a scheme for providing compulsory training of Marathi Stenography and Marathi Typing to English Typist, English Stenographers, Clerk-cum-English Typist on the lines of State Govt. is under execution.

ESTABLISHMENT AUDIT WING UNDER D. P. A. R.

Two Dy. Chief Accountants (Establishment-I and II) are working under D. M. C. (P) in the Department of Personnel and Administrative Reforms. The Organisation and Methods Division is functioning under Dy. Chief Accountant (Estt-I) whereas Revision or Grades Cell is under Dy. Chief Accountant (Estt-II).

ORGANISATION & METHODS DIVISION

The main function of this Division is to scrutinise proposals regarding creation/continuation of additional posts, filling in the vacant posts, grant of Charge Allowance, Overtime Allowance and proposals for attaching Allowances to the posts, fixing up norms in this respect by undertaking time and method study from time to time.

Achievements :

(i) The proposals involving creation of additional temporary posts to the extent of 4609 (including about 2668 seasonal posts) were scrutinised.

(ii) A scrutiny was undertaken by the O. & M. O. staff at 4 major Octroi Check Nakas to fix up target times for clearing of vehicles at Export Chowky by the Octroi staff by observing the working of the Export Chowkies, the inflow of vehicles vis-a-vis the number of staff working at each of these Check Nakas during night shift (i. e. 1st shift). The report is being implemented by A. & C. at all these Check Nakas.

Revision of Grades Cell

(i) Pursuant to the Agreement on grant of Monthly Interim Relief pending overall settlement on wage revision, etc., three committees were appointed under the Chairmanship of three Dy. Municipal Commissioners. The issues relating to revision of pay-scales, Dearness Allowance, House Rent Allowance, Leave Travel Assistance, Monthly Medical Aid and other Allowances were negotiated with the Unions and Memorandum of Settlement was reached on 11-8-1992 with the Unions. The total additional liability for revision of pay-scales and 5 major demands was to the tune of Rs. 53.90 crores and Rs. 5 crores were earmarked for other demands. Further negotiations on the details of the settlement were continued and final settlement was reached on 14-4-1993.

(ii) Information regarding different categories employed in different departments, their pay-scales, working hours, qualifications, duties, mode of recruitment, etc., has been collected from the departments and the same is being computerised so that it would be possible to have easy access to the voluminous data and to have quick analysis of the information.

(iii) Municipal employees are paid different types of Special Pays and Allowances for specific reasons. the demands made by various Unions in their last charter of demands for revision in those Special Pays and Allowances were examined, negotiated and finalised.

BACKWARD CLASS CELL

The Backward Class Cell is headed by Deputy Personnel Officer (Backward Class Cell) which is put under the control and supervision of Dy. Municipal Commissioner (Personnel) with a view to check whether the Govt. Policies with regards to reservation of vacancies for Backward Class Communities as per prescribed percentage in the matter of direct recuitment and also at the stage of promotions are being implemented effectively in all the Wards and Departments.

The Cell keeps a watch over proper implementation of various reservation rules through quarterly and six monthly returned called from all the offices. During the year of report, the quarterly return up to the quarter ending 31-12-1992 and six monthly report up to the period ending 30-6-1992 have been submitted to the Govt., and the Corporation respectivelly.

During the year under report (i) 1129 proposals involving the question of reservation were scrutinised by this Cell (ii) 216 complaints and grievances of B.C. employees regarding resevation in recruitment, promotions, seniority, other concessions etc., were attended by this Cell. (iii) Representatives of B. C. Cell have attended 364 meeting called by the Departments and served as a member of the Panel for recruitment and promotion to ensure the reservation of B. C. Communities.

This Cell has complied the yearly report of backlog worked out on percentage basis in various cadres as on 31-12-1992 from all the departments and complied. The position of backlog in recuitment in various cadres is given below:

In addition to above usual work this Cell has also attended to the following work.

(1) S. C. Welfare Committee held on 4-8-1992 :

Scheduled Caste Welfare Committee of Legislative Assembly has called a meeting on 4-8-1992 to consider compliance of 15th Report of the Committee on the recommendations made in 1987-88 when A. M. C. (B) had attended the meeting.

During the discussion, Committee's member has raised the issue that whether the 50-100 point roster registers are maintained by the B. M. C., so far as reservation to B. C. is concerned and whether same are inspected by the G. A. D. Deptt., of Maharashtra State. It was decided that initially Corporation will verify the roster registers maintained by various departments and to inform the Govt., for their inspection.

(2) Roster Inspection :

Accordingly the staff of B. C. Cell of Corporation has verified 50/100 point roster registers maintained by twenty departments. However, in the meantime before completion of verification by B. C. Cell Asstt. Commissioner, Kokan Division, New Bombay had informed about their inspection programme and as per the programme roster registers and relevant record of 20 deptts., had been inspected by the Asstt. Commissioner and his staff during the period from 3-12-1992 to 5-12-1992, 14-12-1992 to 19-12-1992 and 7-1-1993 to 8-1-1993. Thereafter Asstt. Commissioner has submitted his report of Inspection carried out vide letter No. BCC-1/Insp-250 of 6-2-1993.

(3) Backlog position as on 1989 :

Maharashtra Govt., vide their circular No. BCC/1089/C No. 229/16B of 12-7-1989 and vide circular No. BCC/1089/C No. 238/16B of 30-9-1989 has directed to launch a special dreive to wipe out the backlong of B. C.'s calculated as on 30-6-1989 and 30-8-1989 in the posts filled in by recruitment and promomotion respectively. In order to implement Govt.'s directives in the above circulars, backlog as on 30-6-1989 and 30-8-1989 in various posts filled in by recruitment and as well as by promotion respectively has been calculated and the position of the backlong in the Corporation is as under.

(4) Efforts made by Corporation - to wipe out Backlong of 1989 as a special dirve :

In order to wipe out the backlong of 1989 calculated in respet of the posts filled in by recruitment it was decided to call the proposals of all the concerned deptts., and to issue a consolidated advertisement in the local news papers exclusively for B. C.'s Accordingly first consolidated advertisement was given in April, 1991 for the 11 categories such as M. S. W., S. Eng., Jr. Eng., Tracer, Medical Asstt., Foreman, Teacher Pri. (Marathi), Jr. A. M. O., X-Ray Tech., and Pharmacist. The 2nd consolidated advertisement was given in February 1993 for 12 cadres exclusively for B. C.'s for the post of P. O. Jr. A. & A. A., Helper, Slaughterman II Grade, Nurses, Pharmacist, S. E. (Arch), Diatetian, Teacher (Pri) Marathi, F. O., A. M. O., M. S. W., Besides B. C. Candidates were called from Govt. Agencies by certain Deptts., and B. C. candidates were selected equal to the backlog of 1989. The backlog wiped out by Special Drive up to 31-12-1992 is as under.

The work of wiping out the above backlog is in process.

(5) Deemed Promotion :

In a Civil appeal (No. 2616 of 1983 was filed by the Corporation in Supreme Court against Smt. Kalpana Kamble, employee of E. O.'s Deptt.) regarding dispute in Promotion. The Supreme Court had issued judgement in August, 1988 that promotion to B. C. Employees of the Corporation should be given from 12-9-1975 considering the reservation.

In order to implement Supreme Court's orders this office had already issued a circular under No. MBC/8380 of 14-3-1989 giving guidelines to the H. D. S./W. O.s. regarding how to work out the deemed promotions of B. C. employees. However, in order to make the directives contained in the aforesaid circular more clear this Cell issued another circular No. MBC/1461 of 9-6-1992 giving full clarification covering all the points. It was felt very necessary to give the practical training on how to put up the deemed promotion proposal. This Cell has therefore arranged a Lecture on above subject on 31-7-1992 at Nair Dental Hospital when about 200 H. C./O. S./A. O.s participated when they have been explained in detail regarding deemed promotion and the formated prescribed by this Cell were distributed.

During the period 1992-93, this Cell has scrutinised total 20 proposals of deemed promotions out of which 7 proposals of following deptts., were finally submitted to P. O./D. M. C. (P) for sanction.

1. C. I. S. E. -- 2 cases.

2. E. O. -- 5 cases

and the proposals of 13 deptts., such as S. O., W. O. P./N, W. O. R/N, W. O. K/E, C. M. W.O. `L', Dean (L), W. O. (Mkt.), W. O. F/N, W. O. K/W, Dy. H. E. (OP), Dy. P. O. (Estt.) & W. O. F/S were scrutinised and were sent to the concerned deptts. back under certain observations.

(6) Reservation in Municipal Services to the Physically Handicapped :--

As per C. R. No. 1889 of 7-12-1992 a policy of keeping reservation to physically handicapped in Municipal Services was accepted by the Corporation and circular No. MRT/4443 of 22-5-1976 and MRT/ 2703 of 23-2-1977 were issued. This work was entrusted to B. C. Cell and hence in continuation of above circular, this Cell has issued Govt. circular No. SRV/1082/3772/CR, 89-16B of 10-11-1982 vide circular No. MBC/3117 of 7-10-1992 and all the H. D. s/W. O.s were directed to identify the categories on their Estt., in light of the list of cadres at Govt. in which the reservation can be kept and to maintain 100 point roster and work out the backlog as on 31-12-1991 and get the same verified from this Cell. The H. D./W.O.s were also directed to call the required P. H. Candidates from the appropriate Govt. agencies when there is backlog. The work of verification of backlog is in process.

(7) Policy regarding giving preference to the Swantantrya Sainik in the service of Corporation on the lines of State Govt. is decided and circular in this respect is being circulated to all H. D.s/W. O.s.

SPECIAL VIGILANCE SQUAD

The Special Vigilance Squard is a small vigilance unit on M. C.'s Establishment, working under the direct supervision and control of the Municipal Commissioner.

Control Room at Municipal Head Office.

A Control Room under the supervision of Vigilance Officer (Special Duty) functions at Municipal Head Office round the clock as a communication system to keep M. C. and all other key officials informed for all the important events, emergencies, taking place in the city. Simultaneously, orders of emergency nature are communicated to various civic agencies without any loss of time.

During the year 1992-93, the Special Vigilance Squad conducted 145 investigations, carried out 85 surprise raids, 525 visits and checkings and disposal of about 2,730 matters of miscallaneous nature including important cases of confidential and secret nature.

An additional squad comprising 5 persons from Octroi Deptt., working under Vigilance Office (S. D.) has carried out 253 octroi raids and recovered octroi duty worth Rs. 32,74,349/-

A Special Squad for removal of stray cattle and destruction of unwholesome food comprising 9 persons from Health Deptt. working under Vigilance Officer (S. D.) has carried out 59 raids and seized 1,244 stray cattle and recovered Rs. 5,49,986/-. The squad has destroyed unwholsome food and liquid worth Rs. 73,29,447/- in 183 raids.

STORES VIGILANCE CELL

In order to have control and check over the qualify and quantity of the store articles purchased by the various stores, departments, wards and hospitals of the M. C. G. B. a special technical Cell has been created on the Establishment of Municipal Commissioner's office since 1988. The said stores Vigilance Department is headed by Dy. City Engineer from Civil faculty which is assisted by five other Officers and they are working under the direct supervision of and control of Municipal Commissioner. The main function of Stores Vigilance is to keep vigilance on purchase, procedure of Tender/Quotation's, rates, quality and quantity of receipts and issue etc. of the various materials purchased by different stores, departments, wards, hospitals etc.

During the period from 1-4-1992 to 31-3-1993 the work done by the Stores Vigilance Department is given below :--

1.	No. of Visits		During the period from 1-4-1992 to 31-3-1993, the staff of the said departments have carried out 229 visists at various stores, departments, wards, hospitals, maternity homes, printing press, garden department and education department etc.

VIGILANCE BRANCH OF ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

The special technical cell of the Municipal Commissioner's Office/Establishment, works directly under Municipal Commissioner. This Cell is put in charge of technical head designated as Dy. City Engineer (Vigilance). A Cell pertaining to Mechanical/Electrical Engineering, Vigilance created is also placed under the control of Dy. C. E. (Vigilance). Similarly the Municipal Material Testing Laboratory which was connected to the Roads Department has also been brought under the Administrative Control of Dy. C. E. (Vigilance) since 1988.

Administrative Reports for these various Sub-Sections are as under :

(A) Civil Engineering Vigilance Cell :

(1) Main functions of this Cell :

(a) The most important and the prime function of this Cell is to keep an overall check and vigilance over all the technical matters, mainly pertaining to the Civil Engineering works being executed by the various contracting agencies working under the supervision of various departments. These works include road constructions, building constructions, bridge constructions, drainage construction, water supply and sewerage project works and various maintenance works executed by the ward offices etc;

(b) Municipal Commissioner forwards complaints received from the public, Municipal Councillors, M. L. A. etc. for investigations and report from technical angle which is done by scrutinising some of the Building Proposal files;

(c) Dy. City Engineer (Vigilance) alsokeeps watch on the material test results obtained at the Municipal Laboratory.

(d) This Cell checks at random final bills of the Civil works carried out under various agencies.

(2) Working of this Cell :

The irregularities, descripancies, lapses, ommissions etc, are looked into and the findings are submitted to M. C. suggesting corrective and disiplinary actions to be taken against the erring contractors and the supervisory staff. Surprise inspections are carried out periodically on the Civil Engineering works like Road Construction, Building Construction, Drainage Construction, W. S. S. D. Works, P. W. C. works in Wards etc. which are being executed through contracting agencies. The inspections are carried out with a view to verify whether the works are being carried out as per the design, specifications, terms of contract etc. It is also verified whether the material being used on the works conform to the specified standards etc. The cases of deviations/irregularities/lapses etc. are noted down and these observations are forwarded to the concerned department for taking remedial/corrective actions and proposing disciplinary action against the contractors and the supervisory staff. This Cell submits report to Municipal Commissioner proposing remedial/corrective actions and penalties, rebates, warnings, degradation of the contractors and the disciplinary actions against the supervisory staff, depending upon the seriousness of the lapses. The M. C. sometimes forwards the complaints received from the public, Municipal Councillors, M. L. A. etc, for technical investigation. This Cell investigates such cases and submits investigation report to M. C. with suggestions and replies to the complainant. Occassionally, M. C. forwards the reports submitted by the Department Heads, for the remarks of Dy. C. E. (Vigilance) such cases are also scrutinised and remarks are forwarded for M. C.'s approval.

The Building Proposal Files are audited at random to verify whether the files are disposed off/dealt with as per prevailing rules/regulations such as D. C. Rules, Building, Bye-Laws, B. M. C. Act, M. R. T. P. Act, B. M. R. D. Act, U. L. C. & R. Act. The report of lapses found during scrutinty is then submitted to the M. C. suggesting further course of action in the matter.

The construction material used on various construction works are sent for testing to the Municipal Testing Laboratory. The test result will indicate whether the material confor to the specified standard. This office pursues the cases of failure of the materials and often directs the concerned department to carry out further tests such as load test, hammer test, etc.,

The surprise element involved in the visits of the vigilance staff to various sites helps keeping the supervisory staff and contractors alert on the work to give better quality of work.

(B) Mechanical/Electrical Engineering Vigilance Cell

(1) Main functions of the Cell

(a) The main functions of the Electrical and Mechanical Vigilance Cell is to keep overall check on the technical matters pertaining to Electrical and Mechanical Engineering works which are carried out by the various Electrical and Mechanical Departments in City, Eastern and Western Suburbs and outside the Brihanmumbai Mahanagarpalika limits. The works mainly include the operation and maintenance of electrical and mechanical installation, maintenance of Municipal vehicles, installation of new machineries by project department, repair and maintenance of various articles in S. W. M. Department, Hospitals, Wards, etc.

(b) Inspection of the complaints received from M. C., Addl. M. C., M. O. M. L. A. etc., and report thereof to Commissioner.

(c) This Cell also check at random work order book, specification, sheets, final bills etc., for the electrical and mechanical works carried out by various departments.

(d) This Cell is also takes initiative to settle the long pending cases such as rate schedule and offers suggestions in case of technical matters.

(i) Creation of Development Fund :

Government of the Maharashtra has amended M.R.T.P. Act, empowering Corporation to levy the development charge for new construction, which is effective from 10-8-92 as well as a separate fund called Development Fund is created.

(ii) Open Market Borrowing :

Financial source available to meet the Capital Works expenditure of Budgets 'A', 'B', 'E' & 'G' are Loan allowd to be raised by the Government through Open Market Borrowing and internal Funds. As the O. M. B. quota alloted by the Govt., is too inadequate the matter was therefore taken up with Central Finance Ministery and ultimately Government of Maharashtra have permitted the Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai to raise additional open market loan of Rs. 25 crore before 31st March, 1993, and necessary steps were taken

To have maximum return on investment of Surplus moneys, average amount of Rs. 30.63 crore and Rs. 283.41 crore were invested in Fixed Deposit and Certificate of Deposit respectively during the year 1992-93 and we earned interest of Rs. 48.90 crore *i.e.*, average rate of earning at 15.30% as against 14.24% during the year 1991-92.

(iii) Introduction of Personal Copmuter :

Two personal computers are purchased and installed during the year for the Budget work in respect of Budget 'E' after Development of software system. Budget work of 'E' Budget for 1994-95 will be done on P.C. on regular basis.

i Similarly it is proposed to take Budget work of all divisions as well as the work of liability noting, tabulation on computer at Hospital A/c. Unit and Zonal Offices.

The total number of complaints registered and followed up during the year under report was 1358 as detailed in the accompanying statement as against 2311 in the preceeding year.

The Section worked in close Co-operation with the Fire Brigade and Water Supply Control Room and ensured that in cases of house collapses and such other emergencies, the Municipal Officers and staff reached the site in time, to mitigate the hardships of the victims. Co-operation among various agencies including maharashtra Housing & Area Development Board was also brought about on such occasions.

Public Relations Department. Administrative Report for the year 1992-93

Shri D. B. Shivjatak was Public Relations Officer and Editor, Brihan Mumbai Managarpalika Patrika during 1-4-1992 to 31-3-1993.

Efforts were made to give wide publicity to the various activities of the Municipal Corporation through the conventional and mass publicity media such as newspapers, All India Radio, Doordardhan, informative films, exhibitions and Civic Journal etc. The dissemination of information about the civic activities and the services rendered by different Municipal Departments through Civic Journal had been a major activity of this department. The information-counter of this department continued to give necessary guidance and information to the public.

Press Notes, Handouts etc : During the year under reference 605 press notes, and 13 handouts giving information about various civic services and declarations of the Civic projects etc. were issued to the press, Radio and T. V.

Press Room : During the year 1992-93, Municipal Commissioner's, Addl. Municipal Commissioners' and Dy. Municipal Commissioners' about 25 meets for briefing the press on important issues were arranged. Four press visits to the Municipal institutions and installation were also arranged to give information related to civic services and programmes etc.

Production of Publicity Literature : The Civic Diary, 1993 consisting of useful civic information with ten coloured photographs was brought out in addition to a list of Municipal Councillors and Officers as a regular publication. The department also extended co-operation to the Municipal secretary in bringing out multi-coloured Municipal Year Book, 1992-93. Other publicity literatures such as folders and posters on Various subjects such as common House Gullies, civic measures against stray dogs, Save Water and Conservancy. were brought out.

Film Shows : The department organises film shows to educate the masses especially slum dwellers in the suburbs & as a part of it, 228 film shows/slides & video shows on health, education, civic sense etc., were organised during 1992-93.

Photography : The photography Section of the department continued to cover all the major civic events, Civic Reception to Honourable President of India and functions.

Protocol, Liaison and Exhibitions : Receiving the guests of the Corporation and arranging for their hospitality has been a major functions of this department. During the year under reference, over 78 guests including Mayors, Commissioners and other top officials of the various Municipal Corporations in India, and other dignitaries were received by this department and they were extended hospitality by way of arrangements of their staying and sight-seeing etc. Most of the visitors were taken at various Municipal projects. Discussions with the Heads of the departments concerned were also arranged for the benefit of the visitors.

This department organised a health exhibition at Mount Mary Fair at Bandra and at various Ward Offices and at other places in Co-operation with the help of social, educational and charitable institutions.

Publicity : The department assisted the Municipal Secretary in organising the annual ``Clean Mumbai'' Green Mumbai Competitions, Cleansing Composing, so also the open tournaments in Kho-Kho, Wrestling etc., for the Mayor's shield. Efforts were also made to give wide publicity to the declarations and announcements made by the Mayor and Chairmen of the respective Committee `Due publicity was given to the functions and meetings organised in the Mayor's Chambers and at Mayor's Bunglow from time to time.

This year, the road concretisation work was given due coverage in the press and on T. V., This department had arranged press visits to show the progress in the concretisation work and cleansing of major and minor nallas in the city.

The department also participated in the observance of the World Health Day, National Cleanliness Day, World Leprosy Day, Social Educations Week, Family planning Campaign, Grow More Trees Campaign, Anti-Fire Campaign, Flag Day and also other health drives exhibitions organised by various Social Welfare Organisations.

Various articles on civic activities, important Municipal Circulars and some of the items of the minutes of the Municipal Commissioner's meetings with Additional Municipal Commissioners, Dy. Municipal Commissioners, Heads of the Departments and Ward Officers were published in the monthly issues of the Patrika for giving information to the readers about the multifarious activities undertaken by the Corporation for their welfare. The general elections of the Municipal Corporation, Annual Budget of Municipal Corporation, Celebration of Shiv-Jayanti, Presentation of Nurses' Awards, inauguration functions of important civic projects, Balkotsava of school children etc., the special articles and write-ups obtained from various Heads of the Departments on the activities of civic services were also included in the issues of the year under report.

Trade Unions :

The Trade Union activities amount Labour and other staff member were mostly confined to 36 unions/Associations recognised by the Municipal Commissioner and covers about 89168 employees.

Grievance Procedure :

The periodical meetings of Grievances Committees at Unit level, Zonal level and Apez level were arranged to settle the Labour problems as well as individual grievances of the employees of different department and Wards.

Individual Grivances:

35855 individual grievances received from the individual employees or represented by the employee's unions or received through the Wards/Deptts., in this departments are attended by this office.

 - (15) Qualifications.
 - (16) Attaching allowance to certain posts etc.

Immediate Cash Assistance :

As per C. R. No. 746, dated the 29th November 1989 an amount of Rs. 1000/- is paid towards immediate cash assistance to the immediate direct dependents of the Municipal employees who die while in service. and a star of a second second

There was a provision of Rs. 12,00,000/- in the budget estimate for the year 1992-93.

The expenditure of Rs. 7,85,500/- (city) + Rs. 93,000/- (E.S.) + Rs. 91,500/- (W.S.) totalling to Rs. 10.70,000/- (Approx) was incurred during the year under report.

Medical Assistance Scheme for Municipal employees :--

291 Municipal employees have been given financial asisitance amounting to Rs. 787490.90 from Labour Welfare Fund under the scheme for granting medical aid to the Municipal employees.

Inter Ward/Departmental Drama Competition :--

25 Wards/Deptts., took part in the Inter Ward/Deptt., Drama Competion held from 2-3-1993 to 23-4-1993 at Birla Kreeda Kendra.

First three dramas were awarded with rotating trophies Besides these trophies, 9 individual prizes are awarded to the Best Actor, Best Actress, the best Director, the best setting the best Lighting & best Music in the form of Silver Medals. A cash prize has been awarded to the writer from amongst the Municipal employees. Besides cash prize of Rs. 51/- was also awarded as consolation prize.

Recruitment of Telephone Operator & Sub-Clerk :---

. The work of recruitment, promotion and confirmation of Telephone Operators is done by this department. 1. 1. 1.

During the year under report---

(1) 15 Telephone Operators 'B' Grade were appointed

(2) 3 Telephone Operators 'B' Grade are promoted to the post of Telephone Operator 'A', Grade.

The posts of Record Assistants/Registration Assistants etc., Sub-Clerical posts are also filled in by this office through Preferential Treatment candidates and under LO/38 circular. The total number of such candidates appointed by this office during year 1992-93 are Part Time Reg. Asstt.--37 Full time Reg. Asstt.--32.

Recruitment of candidates as "Preferential Treatment".

755 cases of dependents of Municipal employees who either died while in service or declared unfit by the M.M.E./L.M.M.E. for further service on medical grounds have been considered under Preferential Treatment for employment in the year under report. Beside, 203 candidates have been appointed in IVth categories as well as in the Sub-Clerical posts, as per the policy decision in this behalf.

Job Evaluation :

The National Producitvity Council's draft reports in respect of Labour/Artisan, Clearical, Paramedical/Nursing and Teaching categories were delivered to M.M.U., Shikshak Sabha and both factions of Mahasangh in August 1992, requesting them to submit their comments by first week of September 1992. Reminders were also sent to unions on 20th October 1992 requesting them to submit their comments on N. P. C.'s draft reports on or before 7th November 1992. The Shikshak Sabha submitted their comments on 4th January 1993 pointing out that they do not agree with certain suggestions of N. P. C., in respect of Dy. Head Teachers, Head Teachers, Special Teachers, Instructors, etc., categories in Teaching draft report. The M.M.U. submitted their comments on 15-2-1993 rejecting the N. P. C's draft reports in respect of Labour/Artisan, Clerical and Paramedical/Nursing categories in toto on the grounds mentioned in their letter and demanded to refer the entire matter to arbitration. Sarvashri Prakash Devdas and S. H. Pande both of Mahasangh have not submitted their comments upto 31-3-1993.

During the period from April 1992 to March 1993 meetings of various committees were held as detailed below *i*--

During the period from February 1992 to October 1992, 194 interviews for executive categories were conducted, out of which 24 executive have not yet submitted their Job Analysis forms duly filled in. Reminders to these executives have already been sent. In the meanwhile, N. P. C. submitted their draft report for executive category on 16-2-1993 except the 24 executives as mentioned above. During the period from March 1993 to July 1993, 680 Supervisory incumbents were interviewed and N. P. C., is expected to submit their draftreport for Supervisory category by the end of September 1993.

As per the legal opinion given by the Law Officer, the Apex Panel is authorised to resolve disputes by discussion. If such disputes are not settled by discussion it will have to be referred to N. P. C., or its consultant who will hear all the arguments and give their opinion. If the disputes are still not resolved such disputes will have to be listed and referred to arbitration for its final decision at the end of the exercise*. The end of exercise means and stage as per the agreement up to the submission of final reports in respect of categories referred to N. P. C., viz., Labour/Artisan, Clerical, Paramedical/Nursing, Teaching, executive and Supervisory categories. The Municipal Corporation has incurred an amount of Rs. 1,17,97,000/- upto 31st March 1993 towards N. P. C.'s consultancy fees, establishment cost of B. M. C. Personnel and cost of infrastructure facilities. The Municipal Corporation will have to incur an additional cost of Rs. 18,16,000/- for the period from 1st April 1993 to 30th September 1993 towards N. P. C.;s consultancy establishment cost of B. M. C. Personnel and infrastructure facilities. Thus the total cost of the project will be Rs. 1,36,11,000/- approximately. The total revised consultancy cost of N.P.C., will be Rs. 55.26 lakhs. However, if the project is not completed by the end of September 1993 the consultancy cost including establishment and infrastructure facilities cost will increase.

Out of these 50 welfare Centres, 17 centres are provided with coloured Television Sets by replacing black and white television sets.

Harmony Centres are run at 3 Welfare Centres by the Social organisation "Maitreyi" which has helped to settle family problems such as Dowry etc. The benefit is taken by municipal employees and their families, especially female members.

Legal Department deal with all the litigations filed by or against the Corporation in various court and Tribunals. In addition to this, Legal Department gives opinion to various departments of the Corporation of the reference made to it. CENTRAL STORES DEAPRTMENT

The Controller of stores acts as a Central agent on behalf of departments working under budget heads A, B, E. to procure Stores and distribute various required materials in order to minimise the lengthy procedures at various B. M. C. Departments for achieving cost effectiveness. In order to carry out this activity effectively, the materials have been classified into 146 schedules forming group of materials having common composition of raw materials. These 146 schedules contain 742 items of materials for which C. S. invites tenders.

These 146 annual schedules covering 742 items are divided in two categories :

(A) Store Stock Items :

49 store stock schedule with 174 items such as clothing, uniforms, chemicals, electricals, hardware, conservancy are purchased by inviting tenders. The materials under these schedules are procured from the supplier agencies fixed by placing indents, by receiving the supplies and then delivering the same to Consumer Departments on receipt of indents from the Departments.

(B) Direct Debit Items :

97 schedules with 568 items such as steel and wooden furniture, paints, fans, calculators, fire fighting hoses, R. C. C. spun pipes, fabrics for laundry etc., are Direct Debit Items wherein C. S. invites tenders for fixation of agencies. After the agencies are fixed by obtaining the sanction of Competent Authorities and compliance with necessary formalities, the rate circulars are issued to Consuming Departments for placement of orders and procurement of the required quantity directly from the supplier agencies.

In order to procure materials in the intervening period between end of previous contract and award of next contract or in case of urgent requirements of Consumer Departments, number of Market Rate purchases are done either through the existing/recommended contractors after obtaining their consent for replenishing the Stores Stocks.

In all 133 tenders and 43 quotations were invited and processed in the year under report of these 89 contracts were awarded for Store Stock Items amounting to Rs. 2,28,592/- and 141 contracts for Direct Debit Items amounting to Rs. 5,75,16,980/-.

In order to effect economy and optimising the cost as well to avoid parallel tendering of purchases the materials such as Steel, Dry Cells, Ropes of sorts, C. I. Pipes & Valves, R. C. N. P. 3 class pipes etc. are procured on Sales Mema from the Stores of Common Services (W.S.S.D.) and are made available to Consuming Departments under A, B, E Budgets.

In case of Cements, G. I. Pipes, G. I. Fittings, common tenders are invited by Engr. (C.S.) by including requirements of Controller of Stores, who supplies these materials to 'A' Budget Contractors. The requirements of cement is about 80,000 M.T. in a year at an aggregate cost of about Rs. 27 crores. This department arranges to supply this cement on receipt of indents from various B. M. C. Departments.

Besides Cement, there are other items like G. I. Pipes, Fittings, Electrods, Dry Cell etc., at probable cost of Rs. 60 Lakhs, are also procured from the agencies appointed by W.S.S.D. & distributed to the Departments.

Totally 8, 878 indents were received from various Municipal Departments for issue of various Stores articles out of which 4078 indents were admitted for issue of Stores. In all 5, 640 Sales Mema were received during the year for issue of Cement and casting articles to the Municipal works contractors appointed by the Engineering Department.

QUALITY CONTROL:

On receipt of materials in Stores, the same are tested for quality. The materials such as clothing, chemicals, Steel of various descriptions etc. are sent to respective laboratories to see if the same conforms to the specifications laid down in tenders. Some materials where so laboratory tested are prescribed as per tender provisions, the same are inspected visually by comparision with store/tender sample and by physical measurements. As regards Direct Debit Items of furniture the materials are inspected for quality in the factories before delivery. Market survey is also conducted when considered necessary to see the charges effected in description of materials, ready availability and the market rates.

On receipt of materials the bills are paid to suppliers and on distribution of the Stores, the bills are recovered from the Consuming Departments against which the advances are adjusted.

In order to do speedy job on above, Computerisation of Stores Accounts was introduced from the year 1988-89 in order to have centralised functioning of all items at the computative, uniform, fair market rates and with minimised incidental costs. centralised stock account is maintained to have coordination and control in order to avoid overstocking, wastage of labour, duplication of work etc.

Chief Officer (Enquiries) 1992-93

The department of Chief Officer (Enquiries) is a central Agency for investigation of complaints of lapses against Municipal employees and to conduct Departmental enquiries against delinquent employees.

The department is headed by the Chief Officer (Enquiries) who is assisted by 1 Addl. Chief Officer (Enq.), 4 Dy. Chief Officer (Enq.), 9 Chief Inspector (Enq.), 41 Inspector (Enquires) and other administrative staff.

The department carried out the following functions :---

- 1. a) Detection of mal-practices indulged in by Municipal employees of all categories including officers, such as acceptance of illegal gratification, defalcation, misappropriation, of municipal money or property, negligence and other misconduct.
 - b) Holding of departmental enquiries against the employees.
 - c) Giving advice and instructions in the matter of investigation and departmental enquiries to other departments whenever sought.
 - d) Verification of inventories prepared by ward staff shifting the slum dwellers from old places to new places.

2. During the year department conducted 542 investigations, paid 590 surprise visits to various municipal Institution and mustering places and disposed 6946 cases of miscellaneous nature.

BOMBAY MUNICIPAL SECURITY FORCE ADMINISTRATION REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1992-93

The Security Department has been separately established in the year 1964. At present 4276 persons including executive, administrative and labour staff are working under establishment of Security Department. For the convenience of the administration, the department is decentralised in four Zones *i.e.*, City, Eastern Suburbs, Western Suburbs & Central Zone. All the Zones are headed by Dy. Security Officers. A separate Security Force for guarding the installations of W. S. S. D. has been formulated under the Contral of Hydraulic Engineer and this wing has also now been brought under the overall control of Security-Officer.

The main work of this department is the protection of the municipal property against thefts, pilferage etc., and also to attend a special security arrangements for the bandobast of Corporation, Meetings at the Corporation Hall. The Officers have to attend special duties round the clock in case of emergencies like strikes, bundhs etc. The Security Force also participates each year in Flag Hoisting Ceremony on Republic Day, Independence Day and Maharashtra Day.

Since 1984 the departmental enquiries against the employees of Security Department are entrusted to Asstt., Security Officer and Dy. Security Officer of this deptt.

In the year 1989 this department has started a fullfledged Training School at Bhandup Complex, where new recruits and regular guards & Officers are imparted full-fledged training on the lines of para military forces. In addition to that a new Task Force has been constitued where 100 security gards are working for removal of encroachment and any other emergency duties.

This department has formed a musical Band of a platoon which gives performance in Municipal functions as well as public places for entertainment of public. This has attracted the public who are engaging our band for private functions and thus the department has collected a revenue of Rs. 18,200.00 during this year.

The Security Deptt., had arranged proper handobast during the celebrations of Centenary of the Corporation Hall on 16th January 1993.

The Pay & Park System has been re-introduced and started at several places during the year. The same is managed by the Security Department under guidance and directives from the DMC(Z-VI) since the Deptt. has been put under control of DMC(Z-VI) from October 1992.

3. The Chief Accountant is the principal Municipal Finance officer to advise the Municipal Commissioner on Financial matters of the Corporation. The Jt. Chief Accountant is the Principal Treasury officer responsible for maintenance of Accounts in respect of Budget 'A', 'B', & 'E'.

4. The Chief Accountant's Department is situated at Head Office in the Old and New Building and there are two Zonal Offices at Bandra Chembur which are headed by Dy. Ch. Accountants. There is also a separate Accounting Wing at Munucipal Head office for maintenance of Accounts of Budget 'E' under the control of Deputy Ch. Accountant (Education Fund). Besides, there are Ward Account Units in all the Wards in City and Suburbs, Deonar Abattoir and the Transport and Workshops including the Major Hospitals like K. E. M., Nair, Sion Hospital, Cooper Hospital and Rajawadi Hospital for expediting the financial matters and for the convenience of the Municipal employees as well as the Public.

5. In addition to the normal functions of this department, the following noteworthy schemes have been carried out during the year 1992-93.

(i) Creation of Development Fund.

Government of Maharashtra has amended M. R. T. P. Act empowering Corporation to levy the development charge for new construction. The said provision has come in to effect from 10-8-92 The amount so recovered is required to be credited to a separare Fund called as "Development Fund " to be utilised for developmental needs of the area. We have started recovering the said charge from 10-8-92. The sanction of the corporation to create a Development Fund for the purpose is being obtained.

(ii) Open Market Borrowing.

Financial sources available to meet the Capital Works expenditure of Budgets 'A', 'B', 'E' & 'G' are Loan allowed to be raised by the Government through Open Market Borrowing and internal Funds. The O. M. B. quota alloted by the Govt. is too inadequate to finance on Capitial Works. The matter was therefore taken up with Unior Finance Minister when he paid visit to the Corporation with a request to raise this limit at least to Rs. 50crores. as a result, the Government of India accorded sanction to raise additional Ioan of Rs. 25 crore from open market for development works of the Bombay Municipal Corporation during the year 1992-93 only, Accordingly, Government of Maharashtra *vide* their Resolution No. OMB/1092/173/CR-7/92/UD-3, dated the 19th March 1993 have permitted the Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay to rise additional open market Ioan of Rs. 25 crore before 31st March, 1993. Additional open market Ioan of Rs. 25 crore was raised on 27th March 1993 for financing Capital Works of Budget `A' Division-II.

To have maximum return on investment of surplus moneys, average amount of Rs. 30.63 crore and Rs. 283.41 crore were invested in Fixed Deposit and Certificate of Deposit respectively during the year 1992-93 and we have earned interest of Rs. 48.90 crore *i.e.*, average rate of earning at 15.30% as against 14.24% during the year 1991-92.

(iii) Introduction of Personal Computer.

It was proposed to take the Budget work in respect of Budget `E' on P.C. Two personal computers are purched and installed during the year. M/s. Micro Associates Consultancy (India) Pvt. Ltd. have developed a softwere system for Budget work in respect of Budget `E'. Necessary training is given to the staff of Budget Section. Budget work of `E' Budget for 1994-95 will be done on P.C. on regular basis.

Similarly it is proposed to take Budget Work of Budget `A' & `B' on Personal Computer next year. The work of Liability noting and tabulation is proposed to be taken on Computer initially on experimental basis at 3 zonal offices and K. E. M. Hospital Account Unit during 1993-94.

There was a remarkable improvement in the total tax collection including Government taxes during the year under report in as much as the department brought Rs. 334.51 crores as against Rs. 312.96 crores during the previous year.

The total demand of Municipal Property Taxes, including Water Charges and Wheel Tax was Rs. 640.58 crores whereas the total outstanding which includes arrears of past & previous years was Rs. 343.35 crores. out of these arrears 45% are generally recovered during the subsequent year & balance remains locked up on account of various reasons whows in Appendix VII.

The rateable Value of railway properties upto 31-3-77 has been finalized & finalisation of rateable value for further period is under progress. The quantum of taxes to be paid is 42% of general tax payable at normal rates by an ordinary person.

The assessment of Bombay Port Trust properties for the quinquennium 1969-74 is in progress.

As regards the assessment of State & Central Government properties for the quinquennium 1979-84, Shri C. D. Vaidya, Valuer, who has been appointed to fix the Rateable Value of lands & buildings in charge of State & Central Government in Greater Bombay has taken up the matter in hand & same is in progress.

Building Repair Cess:

Repair Cess amounting to Rs. 19.46 crore was collected during the year 1992-93.

Maharashtra Tax on Buildings with Larger Residential premises (Re-enacted) Act 1979 :---

Under the aforesaid Act effective from 1-4-1974, the State Government has levied retrospectively a tax on Residential premises having floorage of more than 125.59 Mts. & the Rateable Value whereof being more than Rs. 1,500/- at the rate of 10% of the rateable Value per year the work of levy & recovery of this tax is entrusted to Assessment & Collection Department. Maharashtra Tax on Buildings (with Large Residential Premises) collected Rs. 1.18 crore during the year 1992-93.

Octroi :

The amount of octroi collection (including Miscellaneous Receipts) during the year 1992-93 was Rs. 544.00 crores as against Rs. 494.85 crore collected during the year 1991-92. This showed an increase of Rs. 49.15 crore in octroi collection in the year 1992-93 as compared with the octroi collection in the year 1991-92.

EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

Adminstrative Report for the Year 1992-93

Under Section 61(q) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act, it is incumbention to the Corporation to provide Primary Education to the children in school going are between 6 to 11 years and this responsibility is being carried out by the Education Department of the Bombay Municipal Corporation, right from 1907.

In addition to the primary education, the Corporation also run 51 Municipal Secondary Schools since 1965 just to give a helping hand to the State Government.

The entire supervision and administration of Education Department was carried out by the Education Officer; Shri Deorao Uddhavrao Dandawate-M. Sc. (Chem.) Ist / M.Ed. (I Class) from 4th February 1989 as the Head of the Department with the assistance of Officers on Academic side as well as the administrative staff.

School Premises :

In order to meet the ever increasing educational needs of school going children, the Corporation has planned a programme of construction of school buildings at various places. The position of the school premises is shown in the statement given below :--

Health Care :

1 -- Medical Inspection of School Children :

During the year under report 3,08,894 children, 1,52,519 boys and 1,56,375 Girls were examined in 1325 Primary Municipal Schools. 23,537 children were examined in 51 Municipal Secondary Schools. This includes Medical Inspection in Tansa Dhamangaon, Modaksagar and Abhinav Gyen Mandir in Datta Nagar, Lepsory Colony, Chembur. These schools have been taken up in the School Health Service from 1988.

II -- Correction of Defects :

The number of defective children was 2,84,454 in **Primary** Municipal Schools (92.08) and 20,914 Secondary Municipal Schools (88.85) his includes those to be kept under observation as well as those to be referred to the School mic and Dispensaries for treatment.

Total number of defects -detected amongst these children was 6,46,727 in Primary schools (2.29) defects per defective child) and 46,868 secondary schools (2.24) defects per defective child.) 74,565 quardians were interviewed and explained the necessity of getting their wards investigated and treated early.

23,973 children with minor ailments were directed to the nearby Municipal Dispensaries for free treatment.

Children with major ailments were referred to the 7 School Clinics attached to K. E. M., Nair, Nair dental, Sion, Rajawadi, Dr. R. N. Cooper and Bhagawati Hospitals. During the year, 91,634 **new and old cases were treated at these clinics.** 22,695 children were **referred to the honoraries** of various dispensaries for expert opinion.

276 children were **admitted** in these hospitals for investigations and treatment, 137 **consillectomies** were carried out and 27 **operations** for various other ailments were carried out. 115 **major** investigations like E.C.G., E.E.G., ECHO, Cardiac Catheterisation, Angiography Sonography & C. T. Scanning were carried out.

646 children with refractive errors were supplied with spectacles, 1 with Telescopic sepctacles, 8 children with Orthopaedic defects were suppled with callipers.

881 Cases of Tuberculosis, 451 cases of Lepsory, 531 of Poliomyelitics, and 44 cases of Rhematic Heart Diseases were detected and referred to the Special Clinics for investigations and treatment.

(e) Healthy children competition was held in all the 23 Wards in which 4475 + 80 Mentally Retarded Municipal School children. participated at 68 centres and 243 + 243 + 7 Mentally Retarded children were awarded prizes.

(f) Audio Visual Scheme :

A total of 374 sessions of slide shows on health educational topics were exhibited to 45, 249 parents, teachers and children of Municipal Schools.

(g) Child-to-Child Programme conducted in 5 Municipal Primary Schools.

Key School Project :

Key School Project is organised in Many Beats for gifted children of Municipal Schools under the guidance of experts. Drawing, Music, Craft are taught alongwith academic subject.

Endowment Fund :

[°] The information in respect of the disbursement of the endowment fund during the year 1993-94 is as follows :

Talented students from Municipal Schools are awarded scholarship every year to develop their potential talents in various fields such as Art, Music, Drama Dance, Sports, etc. These shcolarships are awarded from the Endowment fund created for this purpose. During the year 1992-93, 37 talented students in various fields have been awarded scholarship.

Community Development Project :

The Community Development Officers are working in Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai since 1985. C.D. Os. are working mainly to bring back the pupils and to prevent drop-outs. They also work to bring educational awareness in the society.

Under the Sponsorship Programme. They provide economical help up to graduation for needy and poor students. For all this, they gets help from the various institutions and donors.

Non Formal Education Classes :

Education Department started Non Formal Education for the school going children and drop-out children.

This year we have started 141 classes in 7 different languages in which 3861 children were the beneficiaries.

Teacher's Library :

1. Education departments of Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai, has 4 Libraries running for the benefit of teachers and employees under Budget `E'.

2. Membership :

The total strength of Members at above 4 Libraries as on 31-3-1992 was 22845 and in 1992-93, 796 new members have been enrolled. so the total strength as on 31-3-1993 is 23641.

. 3. Circulation :

During the year 1992-93, 39238, books were issued and 35370 Books were received from 4 Libraries.

Municipal Free Reading Rooms and Libraries :

The Corporation has provided reading rooms and Libraries to meet the needs of citizens.

There 34 Municipal free reading rooms and Libraries. Out of which, 29 Libraries have been handed over to Mumbai Marathi Granthe Sangrahalaya for Management.

During the current year, Corporation started 2 more Libraries for teachers and public at Mulund and Borivali.

Balkotsav :

As usual `Balkotsav' cultural programmes, Dramatic folk dance competitions and programmes for schools of Mentally Retarded children., programmes for the children in Slum Schools are arranged.

About 23,000 students and 2300 teachers participated which were enjoyed by 40,200 parents.

School Feeding Programme :

Under the School Feeding Programme snacks in the form of Glucose Biscuits, and usal of Sprouted seed grains (i.e. Chana, Watana, Chawali, Matki, Sheera, Upama, Rajgira, Laddoo, etc.) were supplied to the Municipal School children studying in std. I to IV during the year under report. Glucose Biscuit manufactured by M/s. Farm House Biscuit Company, M/s. Champion goods. Pvt. Ltd., and M/s. Key Aar Biscuit Co. Ltd. were supplied and distributed by them to 475000 students studying in Std. I to IV of the 1200 Municipal Schools in city, Eastern and Western Subs. area from 7-10-1992 to 11-3-1993. However, due to suspected food poisoning occured to the students in 5 Municipal schools, the supply and distribution of glucose biscuit programme was suspended from 11-3-1993 *i.e.* 15 days early to expire the contract.

The P.S.M. Department of Nair, Sion and K.E.M. Hospitals have prepared and supplied snacks in the form of Usal, Khichadi, to about 12000 students from 15 schools in slum besides 37 Register Mahila Organization have also prepared and supplied snacks in the form of usal of sprouted seed grains, Rajgira laddoo, Sheers and Upama, etc., to about 50,000 students from Municipal Schools, School children in Manori and Gorai Schools were also supplied snacks by preparing the food articles in school premises.

Free Distribution of Text-Books and slates :

The Municipal Corporation has spent Rs. 84,33,817.70 towards distribution of free text-books to the students of Municipal Primary School studying in Std. I to VIIth.

1,32,600 Enamal Slates were provided free to the Std. Ist students of Municipal Primary Schools.

Summer Classes :

During the year 308 summer classes were conducted by 308 teachers. In these summer classes, 9477 pupils were beneficiaries.

During the year 14,992 students (in Middle Schools and High Schools) were appeared in Govt. Merit Scholarship Examination. 6 students of Middle School Examination. and 7 students of High School Examination have got Government Merit Scholarship.

Preliminary Workshop for all languages was arranged by each Deputy Education Officer. A test was also arranged for preparing pupils for Government Scholarship Examination. During the year books and Educational material were also supplied to each class.

Handwriting Competition :

Handwriting Competition was held for std. II and IV. Prizes and Certificates is given to one student of each division of std. II to IVth.

Competition of Children's Magazine :

Pupils handwriting Manuscript Competitions was organised for the students studying in std. Vth to VIIth in all Media during the year 1992-93.

Science Exhibition :

Education department has started the competition in Science exhibitis with objective to develop the concept of Science in school children and to develop ability of creativity and analysing object and preparation of Science exhibition in term of educational out-put for competition.

About 180 primary Municipal Schools of Mumbai Municipal Corporation took part in the central level Science exhibits were displayed properly in two groups.

Inservice Training Centre :

During the academic year 1992-93 Inservice Training was given to teachers. Dy. Head teachers, Head teachers, Beat Officers, A. Os. and Supdt., of Education department, to develop their professional efficiency and to acquaint them with the Modern trends and techniques in education.

FOOD SANITATION AND PREVENTION OF FOOD ADULTERATION

Food sanitation comprises of Control and Supervision over the Road Premises, where articles of food are manufactured stored and kept for sale. The food Establishment are also controlled from the point of view of the Prevention of adulteration of food. In order to improve the standard of Food, Sanitation, eating houses and bakeries are classified as Grade-I,II, and III depending upon the comliance with the conditions of the licence and other measures taken to maintain cleanliness and sanitation in the various trade operations and in the trade premises.

There is also system of medical examination of food handlers (cook and cookmates) in eating houses so as to prevent the spread of various diseases through articles of food.

DESTRUCTION OF UNWHOLESOME FOOD :

The work of destruction of unwholesome and unfit for human consumption food articles exposed for sale by hawkers and shopkeepers including those near the schools and markets etc. done by special squad appointed for the purpose.

REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS :

Under Births & Death Registration Act, 1969, it is compulsory to register the births and deaths. The information of live births, still-births and deaths is required to be given in prescribed forms to the Registrar within 21 days from the date of occurrance of the events. The name of the newly born child can be registered free of charge within 12 months from the date of registration of births and thereafter on payment of prescribed late fee and compounding charges.

The Medical practioners and Heads of the Medical Institutions are required to issue medical certificate of cause of death in from No. 8. These forms are supplied by the Medical Officers of Health in the respective ward offices.

VITAL STATISTICS & CONTROL OF COMMUNICABLE DISEASES :

The statistics regarding Births and Birth rates, Deaths and Death Rates, infant mortality, infectious and communicable diseases, immunization, etc. are shown in the table No. 2 to 5.

Rats Control Work :

Integrated rat control with the employment of combinations of different measures was planned • and executed. Total number of rats caught and destroyed was 521687. No rat was found plague infacted.

Other anti-plague measures viz., flea destruction, especially through cynogassing of rat hole and cleating of areas was carried out.

CHOLERA : There was no case of cholera, Preventive measures such as anti-cholera inoculations, disinfection of well water, distruction of over ripe and rooten fruits, were continued as routine measures. 8631 persons were inoculated against cholera.

TUBERCULOSIS : T. B. control unit continued its activities during the year. Majority of hidden cases have been brought on the register. During the year 19007 T. B. cases were notified and deaths numbered 9871.

B.C.G. VACCINATION : In view of the new policy for B.C.G. vaccination in National T. B. Control Programme, all the new born Bables in Municipal and Private Maternity Homes are being given Neonatal B. C. G. Vaccination. The drop-outs and the children upto the age of 2 years, who are born outside Bornbay and living in Bornbay are also being immunized with B. C. G. Vaccination at the Maternity Homes or in the field.

Under the programme of B. C. G. training, more nurses and Jr. Health Visitors are being trained in B. C. G. vaccination at the B. C. G. Training Centre, Rajawadi Hospital Bombay.

B. C. G. CAMPS : To achieve more B. C. G. Vaccination coverage among the children, B. C. G. Camps are being held in slums and such areas where there is no facility for B. C. G. vaccination.

SEXUALTY TRANSMITTED DISEASES (V.D.):

At the Municipal Anti-S.T.D. Clinic at Kamathipura, S.T.D. cases are treated confidentially with the latest methods of treatment after proper clinical diagnosis, confirmed by modren laboratory tests carried out at the clinic's laboratory. In addition, a Medico-Social Department comprising of one Male Medico-Social worker and one Female Medico-Social and supplemented by Health Visitor (Auxiliary Nurse) render necessary medico social services to the patient attending the clinic. This clinic is presently participating in AIDS screening programme.

S.T.D. Reference laboratory situated at Kamathipura Maternity Home premises, undertakes, Blood, V. D. R. L. and certification tests. Dark Ground, illunitation for Treponema Pallidum and extends facilities to patients referred by general medical practioners and medical institutions free of charges.

LEPROSY :

Acworth Municipal Hospital for Leprosy and its four G. B. L. C. Scheme affiliated to dermetology department of K. E. M., Nair and Sion Hospitals and at Square Garden Municipal Dispensary Mazgaon, carry out leprosy control work in Greater Bombay. Form 1st April, 1992 the Hospital with its peripheral clinics is fully municipalised.

The hospital provides inpatient and rehabilitation services. The O. P. D. Services include diagnostic and treatment facilities, social service, physiotherapy, reconstructive surgery and laboratory facilities. Hospital also extends training to medical and paramedical under graduates and health education to various strats of the community. Hospital also participate activity in the National Programme based on Survey. Education and M.D.T., in its project area i.e., Wards, E, F/S and F/N covering 12.5 lakhs population.

Besides, this 6 other voluntary organisation and 4 Supervisory Leprosy Units of Government of Maharashtra, also carry out leprosy control work in different parts of Greater Bombay through Municipal Dispensaries, health posts and municipal schools.

MOBILE HEALTH UNIT :

The Mobile Health Unit performed the following activities in the community during the year 1992-93.

1) Disease Survey of various Infectious Diseases like Infective Hepatitis, Enteric Fever, Malaria, Cholera, Polio, Measles, Mumps, D/V, Gastroentereitis, Meningococal Meningitis, Chicken pox, T. B.

A total of 37,207 families houses were surveyed from April, 1992 to March, 1993 covering total population of 2,26,226 This number of population was surveyed for 573 number of various aboved mentioned diseases.

2) Health Drives and Immunization camps :

168 number of Health drives/camps were conducted in various areas mainly in slums and remote areas which were otherwise unreachable. A total number of 58,893 persons were immunized with injection T. A. B. C. 3,084 number of patients were examined and given medicines by Mobile Health Teams. Besides Health Camps were conducted where drugs were distributed.

3) U.J.P. (Universal Immunization Programme) :

Special Immunization programme was conducted during riots and Bob-Blasts as per the figures given below :--

4) Other Cases Surveillance :

The Community Development Officer carried out Survey on Maternal Mortality, time Infant Mortality and Neonatal and infantile Tetanus and this reports are published Civic Journal from to time. All the Infectious diseases are reported in Public Health Department from various hospitals etc., and M.O.H. of the Ward takes further action.

5) Immunization against Rabies :

50 staff members of our Dog Squad were given Rabipur which included 12 lst doses, 12 ll doses, 8 lllrd doses and 18 Booster Doses in the year 1992-93.

General Health Education is imparted through this department with the help of posters, health talks, community meeting in the slums.

VECTOR CONTROL:

Potential breeding places such as wells, cisterns, over head tanks, mill-tanks, storm water entrances and drains were checked periodically for detection and destruction of mosquitors. Necessary anti-mosquito treatments were rendered wherever required to abate the prevelance of Malaria.

Mosquito Nuisance : For controlling mosquitoes causing nuisance by breeding in large numbers, regular round of applications of insecticides were continued. Insecticidal fogging operations were also resorted to serve a dual purpose of anti-malaria and anti-mosquito operations.

Precautions against Yellow Fever : Campaigns against Acdes Egypha the vector for Yellow fever and dengue diseases was continued throughout the year.

House Fly Control : For abatement of fly nuisance and to check fly borne diseases regular antifly measures were continued throughout the year and were intensified during monsoon months.

Entomological Survey : Entomological Survey to assess and delimit the transmission of Filariasis by mosquitoes was continued during the year.

Malaria : Under the National Malaria Eradication Programme, Malaria Surveillance Scheme is divided into two parts, (1) Active Surveillance and (2) Passive Surveillance. In passive surveillance blood smears are collected from the patients suffering from tever and attending the Municipal Dispensarues, Municipal and Government Hospitals and other Charitable Institutions and from those treated by private Medical Practitioners wherever possible. In active surveillance Malaria Investigator visits house and collects blood smear from fever cases.

In the case of Indigenous cases, mass survey is carried out and if necessary, mass treatment is arranged to control transmission.

Filaria Control Programme : Fileria night control clinic is functioning at Khar Danda Village at night for collecting blood smears and for giving treatment to positive cases.

Vector density rate and infectivity rate are monitered by collecting and dissecting mosquitores at various parts of suburban Wards.

Intensive Larviciding and thermal fogging are carried out when there is increase in the density rate as well as when infective mosquitoes are detected to prevent filarial transmission.

CEMETERIES:

There are in all 185 cemeteries in use in Greater Bombay, out of which 31 are municipal and remaining are of provate bodies.

ELECTRIC CREMATORIUM :

There are four electric crematorium -- (i) Chandanwadi, (2) Sion, (3) Oshiwara, Andheri (West) and (4) Shivaji Park. They are opened round the clock for cremation on payment of necessary charges.

Permission for removal of dead body out-side Greater Bombay is issued at the Office of Executive Health Officer during office hours and thereafter at the residence of Zonal Dy. Executive Health Officers, Zonal Asstt. Health Officers and Medical Officers of Health of the Wards. Permission are also given by Heads of the all Municipal General Hospitals when dead body is to be removed by motor to places which can be reached within 24 hours after death.

MUNICIPAL LABORATORY :

To safeguard public health, samples of various food stuffs and samples of water from different parts of Greater Bombay were examined at the Municipal Laboratory.

The water sampling programme continued as usual and the sampling was done both in the morning and evening so as to collect samples from all the wards of the city.

Apert from the examination of samples of water, food, stuffs collected by Sanitary Inspectors and Food Inspectors, samples collected by the Food & Drug Administration and the B. P. T. authorities and samples of stores from Controller of Stores and samples from different department of the Corporation of the Corporation were examined. 21-17 chemical exam. and 33279 Bacteriological exam. was done.

- MAHALAXMI DHOBIGHAT :

At Maha axmi Dhobighat in all 709 wash stones are provided to Dhobies for washing linen. Facilities such as water supply, electricity, land for drying clothes and Sanitary accommodation have also been provided. The stones are given on monthly rental basis to Dhobies for washing clothes.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES :

Children attending Primary and Secondary Municipal Schools are examined at regular intervals by the Medical staff under Medical Officer (Schools) and ailing students are referred to various Hospitals and Dispensaries for diagnosis and treatment. The rectification of defects and Special appliances such as calipers, hearing aid and spectacles, etc. if needed are given free of charge or at nominal cost to the students of Municipal schools. Milk is also given to the ailing school children at School Clinics attached to the K. E. M. Hospital, Nair Hospital, Sion Hospital, Cooper Hospital, Juhu, Seth V. C. Gandhi & Seth M. A. Vora Municipal General Hospital, Rajawadi Ghatkopar and Harilal Bhagwati Municipal General Hospital at Borivali.

Health Education Scheme is implemented in all the Municipal School by giving talks, showing slides, etc., on the various Health subjects.

Impounding of stray cattles :

Stray cattles are seized and impounded in the Municipal Cattle Pound at Malad (West).

3294 cattle were impounded and 1739 prosecutions were launched. Rs. 15,32,149.00 were recovered by way of pound fees, transport charges and feeding charges while Rs. 1,69,105.00 realised by way of fines, by the Court.

MATERNITY & CHILD WELFARE SERVICES :

The Maternity and Child Welfare Services were rendered through 25 Municipal Maternity Homes, 11 Mat. wards attached to 11 Municipal General Hospitals and 39 Maternity & Child Welfare Centres. The scheduled strength of Maternity Beds was 1888. The number of deliveries conducted was 66873.

Milk was given free to the poor and needy expectant and nursing mothers, 3 months before and 3 months after delivery at the Maternity Homes. Poor mothers who delivered at their were also given help in the shape of milk.

Paediatric Centres were conducted at 8 Maternity Homes with a view (i) to providing a services to the community in which efficient effective and comprehensive Paediatric care can be given out-side the hospital, by promoting good growth and development, providing immunization facilities, teaching family and community health as also nutrition. (ii) to reduce the load of the hospital out-patients department by referring cases for different medical care and (ii) to provide a teaching field and education experience in urban centre to doctors nurse and allied workers.

FAMILY WELFARE PLANNING :

With a view to promote the small family norms, the instructions and guidance in spacing of births is given to married men and women and operation of male and female sterilization and loop insertion distribution of condoms and oral pills are done free of charge. Medical Termination of Pregnancy services are also available, free of charge in all Municipal Maternity Homes and General Hospital.

HEALTH POSTS :

With a view to render basic integrated health and family welfare services to the urban poor at a place within walking distance from the slums and other slum like areas where they live, the Bombay Municipal Corporation has located 124 health posts in existing Family Welfare Centres and Health Workers render service to pupulation through regular visits & follow up.

Welfare Sector Agreement of understanding have been signed with four Private Voluntary Organisations and more are going to be signed shortly. The four P. V. Os. are (1) Streehikarni (2) Bombay Mothers and Children Welfare Society (3) Nagpada Neighbourhood and (4) Worli Temple Trust.

We envisaged collaboration with P.P.A.I., I.M.A. S.P.A.R.C., Rotary Club, L & T etc.

A decision is also being taken to give some space to P.V. Os., to allow them to function better.

Kasturba Hospital for Infectious Diseases :

Admission and expenditure in Kasturba Hospital is as follow :--

Admission : 18128

Expenditure : Rs. 3,78,495,31

PHARMACY DEPARTMENT :

The Pharmacy Department at this hospital is under expansion to raise the production of I. V. Fluids, from 600 bottles to 1000 bottles per day to meet the requirement of I. P. Fluids of all other hospitals and maternity homes under Bombay Municipal Corporation.

IMMUNIZATION CENTRE:

334 persons were immunized against Diptheria, 1261 against Enteric Fever, 1261 against Cholera, 19 against Meningoccoccal Meningitis.

WARD LABORATORIES :

As required by the Bombay University, the Ward Laboratories have been started for recognition of House posts for post graduate studies.

INTESNIVE CARE UNIT :

To render prompt medical treatment, cases in acute condition requiring very prompt and Intensive care are admitted in Ward No. 11 of the Hospital. The total No. of patients admitted are 480 as against 580 during the previous year.

PAYING BEDS :

The paying bed facility is provided to those desiring the same voluntarily.

TEACHING:

Lectures in Infectious Diseases were given to 700 students including under-graduates of Allopathic, Ayurvedic and Homeopathic, Student Nurses, Nurses, Health Visitors etc. from various institutions in Greater Bombay. There were also given instructions in Nursing Management of Infectious Diseases.

MEDICAL RELIEF :

MUNICIPAL GENERAL HOSPITALS :

The Public Health Department is running thirteen General Hospitals in the Suburbs and extended Suburbs. Details of the work done thereat is shown in Table No. 13.

DISPENSARIES :

New cases treated at the 159 dispensaries, and the total attendance was 45, 48, 974.

IMMUNIZATION:

B. C. G.-Vaccination, Polio, Triple, and measles to the infants and children are given free of charge at the Municipal Maternity Homes, General Hospitals and Dispensaries.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE CLINIC :

2, 19: 176 new cases were treated at the 39 Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics & Total attendance was 5,72,611 during the year 1992.

Municipal Eye Hospital, Kamathipura :

The total number of new cases and the total attendance at the out-patient department of this hospital was 53460. About 7958 persons were treated as inpatients in hospital and 1126 patients admitted, total 2227 operated, 1224 were operated in O. P. D. 946 major and 57 minor operations.

Ambulance and Hearse services :

Municipal Ambulance service is available at all Municipal General Hospitals in City and Suburbs. The services are available round the clock at the major hospitals. In other, cases, it is in two shifts from morning to evening. Ambulance services, are also available in Maternity Homes situated at Mahim, Deonar, Bhandup, Malad and Tagore Nagar, Vikhroli. Ambulance under the control of Fire Brigade is available for removal of cases of maternity and street accident (free) and non-infectious medical cases on payment within the limits of Greater Bombay.

Ambulance service at Sane Guruji Marg is available for removal of infectious disease cases free and hearse for removal of dead bodies on payment within Greater Bombay.

The services of hearse are also available on payment of prescribed charges at Juhu Hospital, Rajawadi Hospital, Mulund (W) Hospital, Borivali Hospital round the clock and at Maa Hospital, Chembur and K. B. Bhabha Hospital Bandra from morning to evening for removal of dead bodies in Greater Bombay.

Upgrades Dispensaries :

With a view relieving the general hospitals of the heavy load of patients and to provide better medical facilities 65 Municipal General dispensaries were upgraded.

Integrated Child Development Service Scheme :

In pursuance of the National Policy for Children, the Government of India have sanctioned the Integrated Child Development Scheme, integrating various services for the development of a child. The scheme is in operation in the slums of 'P' and 'R' wards, Dharavi and has been extended to Andheri slums recently.

The main aspect of the scheme is to deliver basic health services such as Immunizations, Health Check-up of children upto the age of 6 years and expectant and nursing mothers, health education, referred services etc. The entire expenditure on the scheme is borne by the Government of India.

EPI PROGRAMME :

Activities :--

The main activity is to cover all children for vaccination specially against Polio, Tetanus, Diptheria, Pertusis, Measles and childhood Tuberculosis.

The Department also vaccinate the persons against Typhoid and Cholera in epidemics and also give Anti Rabies vaccine and on demand Meningococal Vaccine.

In Office :--

Vaccine is precured from Government of Maharashtra and also from outside. The said vaccines are stored in deep freesers and walk in cooler (cold room) and then supplied to local M.Os.H. by van under cold chain.

Department also prepares the reports of performance by all wards and same is compiled and report is given to Director of Health Services. Pune and also to Commissioner of Immunization, Delhi.

At Ward Level :--

The vaccine received from S. V. office is stored in I.L.R. and supplied to Municipa! Dispensaries Hosp. Maternity Homes, Health Posts and Private as well as Government Hospitals and Organizations. Medical Personnel attend to field services and conduct immunization and nealy all children under one year are covered.

When a cases of VPDS occurs, the residential area of the case is traced and survey is conducted in nearby area add the area is anain covered by immunizing all children under 3 years are given 2 extra doses of Polio: A H.O.'s and M.O.'. (EPI) visit various wards and hospital and dispensaties and supervise and check the Immunization Sessions, Cold chain maintenance and Registers.

They also train the concerned staff regarding immunization and given refresher course on update of immunization and given refresher course on update of immunization.

Department also conducts a coverage Evaluation Survey for counter checking the performance, update report of Polio cases.

Anti - Rabic Treatment :

Anti-Rabic Treatment is given at 14 Municipal Hospitals, private hospital, 1 Government Hospital and 17 Municipal Dispensaries. The Stray dogs are seized and destroyed by electrocution method if not retrieved within three days. Pet dogs are licensed by the dog licensing establishment of the Corporation. During the year 35,142 gaps were caught and 31609 dogs were destroyed.

Control on certain trades and Cinema & Drama Theatre :

Certain trades like hair dressing saloons, Panshops Laundries, etc., are controlled from Public Health point of view by imposing a licence under Section 394 of the B. M. C. Act.

Similarly cinema theatres, drama Halls, etc. are inspected to control them from public Health point of view under the "prevention of" Maharashtra Cinema (Rules) Regulation 1953 and Rules for Licensing and Controlling places for public Amusement' respectively.

Health Education :

The citizens are educated in health education through put health film, posters, and other publicity media in matters of environmental sanitation, good habits for healthy living immunization etc. Special educational compaigns are arranged on various Health subject from time to time in slums.

REGISTRATION OF NUESING HOMES :

Nursing Homes require registration under the Bombay Nursing Homes Registration is issued on payment of the prescribed fees of Rs. 50/- (less than 10 beds) and Rs. 100/- (more than 10 beds) at the office of the Medical Officer of Health at each of the wards. Renewal of registration is done annually on payment of equal amount payable for the first registration.

LICENSING OF NURSES ESTABLISHMENT :

Nurses Establishment require licence under the provisions of the Bombay Nurses, Midwives and Health Visitors Act, 1954 and the Rules and Bye-laws passed thereunder. The licence is issued on payment of Prescribed fees of Rs. 100/- by the Medical Officer of Health of the Ward and is renewable every year in April. Failure to take licence is punishable with fine which extends to Rs. 250/- for the first offence and for any subsequent offence with fine which may extend to Rs. 500/- or with simple imprisonment which may extend to six months or with both.

INTERNATIONAL HEALTH CERTIFICATE :

Inoculation against cholera is done and duly authenticated certificates in approved form are issued at certain Municipal Institutions on payment of Rs. 25/- each.

Every traveller must produce his passport at the time of immunization and authentication. The Medical Officer may however, inoculate a traveller in the absence of a passport and keep the certificate with him by giving him an understanding that the certificate would be cancelled if he would not turn up within fifteen days of the inoculation.

Inoculation against yellow fever are given at the seamen's Medical Examination Organisation Nav Bhavan, Nicol Road, Karwar Street, Bombay - 1 and at Sahar Air Port.

PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT

INDIA POPULATION PROJECT -V

ADMINISTRATION REPORT OF I.P.P.V. FOR YEAR 1992-93

Indian Population Project-V has been implemented by the Public Health Department with the financial assistance from the world Bank since October 1988. The project period will be over March 1995. The project aims at the strengthening and expansion of preventive and promotive health care services with special emphasis on Family Welfare and Maternal & Child Health with effective Out Reach Service to the door steps of urban slums and shanties through scientific organisational systems. The project also aims at (1) bringing down the mortality rates amongst children and mothers, (2) Promotion of Family Welfare services to accelerate decline in fertility and restricting population in growth rate.

The goal is revamping the organisation, service delivery and out reach systems for Family Welfare in urban slums and congested areas & the objectives are --

1. Expansion of Family Welfare Services with emphasis on Maternal & Child Health through various methods,

2. Improving the quality of Services,

3. Strengthening the capacity to plan, manage and implement Family Welfare Programme in urban areas.

4. Increasing the participation of Private Voluntary Organisation and Private Medical Practitioners • in the programme.

This will achieved by establishing 124 Health Posts under the project in addition to the existing 56
Health Posts under out reach system. Thus bringing the total number of Health Posts to 180, 30P. P. Cs.
will also be established under the project. Till date, 174 Health Posts, *i.e.*, 118 under I. P. P. V. + 56 under O.R.S. have been established. During the year under report i.e., 1992-93 42 Health Posts were started.

Similarly during the year, **11** P. P. Cs. were started bringing the total number of P. P. Cs. to 22. Out of 42 Health Posts commissioned during the year 1992-93 12 are in new construction. The total number of Health posts started in new construction is 30.

Table No. 15 shows the target & achievements of 18 indicators during the year 1992-93.

The other features of the project are management, information system cell, Information, Education and Communication Cell and Training Cell. Performance of these Cells during the year 1992 are given in Table Nos. 15, 16, 17 & 18.

During the year under report, Shri A. B. Maduskar, Dy. Municipal Commissioner and Dr. (Smt.) V. P. Desai Executive Health Officer continued to be the Project Co-ordinator and Project Director respectively.

Both the Institutions are managed by the Dean with assistance of Medical Personnel of high reputs and numerous para-medical and other staff well trained in the line.

Weaving, Winding, printing, carpentary, tailoring work & other activities were given to the patients as a part of their physical & mental restoration programme. Some of the needy patients were aslo paid for the work as a part of their Prevocational rehabilitation.

Weaving Activities : Weaving & winding work was given to the patients. Patients produced bandloom products like bed-sheets, towels, hankees, rung mats etc. This year the sale money amount to Rs. 15,333/- was credited to P.B.C. Fund of the K. E. M. Hospital.

Printing Activities : During the year Rs. 3,66,326/- worth printing work was done and amount collected Rs. 4,21,207.55/- (including last years due) was credited to P. B. C. Fund of K. E. M. Hospital.

Splints : Total 1499 splints were prepared and recovered for these were Rs. 43,333/- which was credited to the P. B. C Fund of the K. E. M. Hospital. In this year 60 orthoplast splints were prepared. The amount collected Rs. 41,820/- was credited to the P. B. C. Fund of the K. E. M. Hospital.

PHYSIOTHERAPY SCHOOL & CENTRE :

Physiotherapy School & Centre was started as a joint venture of Government of Maharashtra in the Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay. For the last several years, the entire cost is borne by the Corporation. Seth G. S. Medical College has been granted extension of affiliation by the University of Bombay for conducting courses leading to B. Sc. degree in Physical Therapy from 1967 and M. Sc. degree in Physical Therapy from June 1978. Forty (40) students were admitted in August 1992. 176 Students are undergoing undergraduate studies at present. 28 students appeared for the final examination during the year. Ten students appeared for M. Sc. Physical Therapy during the year.

Several research projects are being continued at the E. C. I. Institute of Electrophysiology. Research papers dealing with clinical problems and of fundamental nature, were presented at the various conferences.

DEPARTMENT OF SURGERY :

The Department of Surgery consist of Six Surgical units, of them are headed by full time surgeons.

Clinical Services : The department manages the major emergency surgical admissions. It has an emergency ward which is situated next to casualty department. All serious pts. are treated here initially before shifted to other wards. This year there were total 10199 admission (697 deaths). This department also runs General Surgery OPD on every day.

This year a total No. 30262 patients were seen in OPD. In addition to these, department has division of Gastrointestinal Surgery which runs its OPD on Monday at 2.00 p.m. A total of 567 patients were seen in OPD this year.

The department has well equipped Operation theatres and various operations were carried out. In addition to routine operations, Laparoscopic surgeries were carried out by various surgeons.

Teaching : The department takes a majorload in training of undergraduate students in surgery and allied subjects. No. of lectures and clinics were conducted by all teachers during last year. The department also has 50 postgraduate students.

MEDICAL RECORD DEPARTMENT :

The Schedule bed strength during the year was 1800. there was constant overcrowding in the hospital, particularly in children wards, and in the female surgical and Medical wards and Orthopaedic Wards, even after strict scrutiny and restrictions on routine admissions.

Death Classified : Out of 4914 deaths 1005 died within 24 hours of admissions, 870 after 24 hours but within 72 hours of admission and 3039 after 3 days or more from the date of admission. The fugures are exclusive of 150 still births prematurity and Neonatal deaths. Deaths rate was 7.82% as against 7.46% during the last year.

Confinement and Abortions : Total no. of confinements was 4586 and that Abortion was 850 (Including M.T.P. also).

Teaching : Teaching the nurses, Physiotherapy and occupational therapy students, undergraduate and post-graduate students of department of medicine.

Clinical : The department has six independant units which conduct putpatient days and have indoor beds for management of the full spectrum of diseses in internal medicine. In addition, specialised sections include weekly Theumatology and Geriateic Clinics, Specialised indoor facilities include a tetanus ward and a six beded intensive medical care unit which is manned round the clock. In addition, the department has fullflegged Radio-isotope laboratory which carried out different diagnostic work up for indoor as well as outdoor patients of entire hospital.

MICU:

During 1992, 708 patients are admitted to the MICU including 159 tetanus patients and 549 non tetanus patients. New equipment obtained included one volume cycled respirator and one ultrasonic nabuliser. Ongoing trials include use of Ceforperasone in serious hospitalised acquired infections.

The department of Hematology runs an outpatients clinic twice a week on Monday and Thursday from 9.30 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. During this, new patients are examined and investigated as well as follow up of old patients and their necessary investigations are done. Patients are also hospitilized when necessary.

The laboratory attached to this department carried out various tests required. Besides the hemogram, other tests done are bone marrow aspirations and biopsied, Hemolytic workup, Hemostatic workup, hemostatic work up and iron studies.

The Department was recognised as an independent postgraduate department for D.M. Course in Nephrology and since then a total of 6 students have completed and 5 students have been registered for D.M. Course in Nephrology. The training programme for nurses, technicians and students of Nephrology biotechnology from other Institutions is being conducted as usual.

Clinical:

The Department carried out its O.P.D. services in the following 4 out patients that it runs.

- 1. The Renal Clinic an important compnent which looks after the preventive aspects of renal diseases and renal failure continues to run by appointments on Monday.
- 2. The Special Renal Diabetic Clinic continues to be run once a week on Thursday afternoon and has been proved very useful in provention and early detection of diabetic renal diseases. In addition two more out patient sections have started functioning in the department.
- 3. The Nephrology OPD is run on Tuesday morning between 9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m.
- 4. The Renal transplant Clinic is run on Thursday morning between 9.30 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. In these clinics bacteriology of urine, diet advise, certain immunological investigations are being done on the spot. The biochemical profile of these patients is obtained on regular basis for renal package studies being carried out by Lab No. 44 as in the previous study year.

The Indoor patients of the Department have a total of 34 beds. Besides this, there are 2 dialysis theatres with 10 dialysis tables.

DEPARTMENT OF UROLOGY

During the year 1992 there were 2242 patients treated as out patients and 974 were admitted for Indoor management. The total No. of 2132 operations were performed during the year 1992. 1768 Endoscopic procedures including 1347 Diagnostic Cysttscopy were performed. Kidney Transplant procedure were 22 and PCNL & PCN (95). The teaching programme included regular Undergraduate lectures for all the 3 terms. Post-graduate teaching was in the form of clinical case presentation, bed side discussions, ward rounds, inter departmental meetings with Radiology & Nephrology, Journal reviews were conducted for Postgraduate student. Acquiring a new T. V. monitor video has helped to screen various surgical and radiological techniques from video casetes obtained from time to time.

The participation of various members of department in Academic conferences, workshops and meetings included nine presentation of papers in Zonal and Inational Urology conference in January and December 1992. Kidney Transplant operations was video recorded by a tech from BBC. A team from Jaipur consisting of Urologists, Anaesthetists and Nephrologists visited the department for learning renal transplant surgery.

The Andrology and Urology Laboratory attached to the department has carried out large number of investigations and helped in patients care. New Technique of detection of sperms antibody will be started soon. An Ayurvedic drug trial for male infertility is being evaluated.

Under centre of Excellence the training of trainers in standards of male and female sterlization, 3 workshops were conducted. One hand on training in Microsurgery was also conducted in January 1992.

"Completion of 200 numbers of Live Related Donor Transplantation of Kidney (LRDT)" was important landmark.



Paying Bed Scheme :--

The Paying Bed Scheme exists in this hospital since 1977. 652 patients had taken the advantage of the scheme.

Intensive Paediatric Care Unit :--

As Intensive Paediatric Care Unit started functioning from 1st August 1977 in a special and separate section of the Paediatric Ward. This year 322 children were admitted in the unit.

Medical Acute Care Unit :--

The department of Medicine established a separate Medical Acute Care Unit with 12 beds and required equipments which started functioning from march 1978 onwards. 680 patients were treated in this section.

B.Y.L. NAIR CHARITABLE HOSPITAL

AND

TOPIWALA NATIONAL MEDICAL COLLEGE.

ORIGIN:

The twin spirit of charitty and nationalism was responsible for the founding and growth of this hospital and college. The National Medical College was founded in the 1921. In the year 1946 the Silver Jubilee year of the Institution, the college was taken over by the Bombay Municipal Corporation and was affiliated to University of Mumbai for the degree course. The college received a magnificient donation from the Topiwala desai family and the well known philianthropist Dr. Anandrao L. Nair and hence the name given as Topiwala National Modical College and Bai Yamunabai L. Nair Charitable Hospital.

Today the twin institutions are one of the leading institution in the country.

SCOPE OF ACTIVITIES :--

This hospital has been progressively expanding to include various new specialities. Apart from the well established departments of General Medicine, General Surgery, Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Psychiatry, Paediatrics, Anaesthesiology, E. N. T., Orthopaedic, Radiology, Tuberculosis, Ophthalmology, Dermatology and Venereology, there are also specialised departments of Cardiology, Cardio-Thoracic Surgery, Nerology, Neurosurgery, Plastic Surgery, Genito Urinary Surgery, Nephrology, Gastroenterology (Medical and Surgical), Haematology, Endocrinology, Rheumatology and Collegen Diseases, Neonatology, Paediatric Surgery, Head & Neck Surgery, Forensic Medicine Department and the department of Neuroscience as approved by the W. H. O., for research and training in stroke and tropical diseases. Besides this, there are special out-patient clinics in the hospital *viz.*, Thyroid, Renal, Diabetes, Premature and New Born Care, Hypertension, Rheumatology, Asthma, Abortion, High Risk Pregnancy, Sterility, Glaucoma and Squints, Anaesthesia Assessment, Epilepsy Clinic, Childhood Bronchial Asthama,School Clinic, Infertility and Tropical Medicine.

Special units have been developed viz., Intensive Care Units (Medical and Surgical for Cardiac patients), Medical Acute Care Unit and well equipped Trauma Ward with Operation Theatre. There is also an Intensive Paediatric Care Unit (I. P. C. U.). There is a Special Family Planning Centre and a most modern Speech Therapy and Audiology Clinic and a training school affiliated to the University of Mumbai and probably it is the only one of its kind in India. There are also well established departments of Pharmacy, Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, Social Service and Medical Records.

The hospital has an Immunisation Centre, Growth and Development Clinic established by the Department of Preventive and Social Medicine and has carried out several health educational programme in the community and also have developed several audio-visual and sound slides shown on various aspects, on health which are regularly screened in the slum areas. This hospital has an Eye Bank and fully equiped Blood Bank which functions on voluntary donations of blood by relatives of patients and

OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT :

members of the public.

Each unit has one regular and one follow-up Out-patient Department and one emergency admission day. For several years, various speciality Out-patient Departments like Asthma, Hypertension, Rheumatology, Nephrology etc. are being conducted. This year this department has started 3 new Out-patient Departments HIV OPD, Geriatric O.P.D. & Tropical Medicine O. P. D.

MEDICAL ACUTE CARE UNIT:

The Medical Acute Care unit has 12 beds. Currently this department has trained all staff members upto lecturer level in ventilatory care under the guidance of Respiratory Physician. The Medical Acute Care Unit is well equipped with ventillators monitors etc.

MEDICINE RESERCH LABORATORY :

Various investigations are carried out for patients attending Hypertension, Diabetes and Rheumatology, Nephrology, Asthma & other speciality OPDs of Medicine Department.

TEACHING :

The undergraduate teaching programme includes about 80 lectures and 70 tutorials. In additions they have ward clinics and table work sessions. Postgraduate clinics, journal reading, seminers, topic discussion, gest lectures, quisetc., have also been started in addition to clinical meeting. Apart from medical students, the staff members also teach BDS, Nursing, A.S.T., O.T. & P.T. (U.G. & P.G.) students.

'RESEARCH PROJECTS :

Several projects are being carried out by various staff members particularly on speciality topics, involving residents actively.

DEPARTMENTAL LIBRARY:

The department has excellent department library including books purchased through grants every year as well as books donated by various authors.

Departmental displays of X-rays, E.C. Gs. etc. on notice board are popular with U.G. & P.G. students. The department also has an excellent slide collection & MCQ bank.

(2) DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL SURGERY :

The department of general Surgery is one of the major department in the hospital catering to patients with various types of surgical ailments.

During the academic year 1992-93, Mumbai city witnessed the worst form of civil violence in its history followed by a series of bomb blasts. Over 400 patients were treated during the above three episodes.

(3) DEPARTMENT OF GYNACE. & OBSTETRIC :

Department of Gynaec. & Obstetric consists of 3 units, one full-time and two units. Each unit functions twice a week.

- 5. Graduate Training: 2 candidates are appearing for M. Ch. Cardio Thoracic Surgery examination.
- 6. **Conference :** This year this department has attended ``Indian Association of Cardio Vascular & Thoracic Surgeon, conference at Hyderabad". We have also presented the papers. We have also presented 7 papers in the conference and chaired the sessions.
- 7. Donors : From the donation received this year we could buy 3 L & T monitors, which are necessary.
- 8. Undergraduate training : Lectures for the undergraduates and physiotherapists were conducted. (11) DEPARTMENT OF PLASTIC SURGERY :
- Plastic Surgery O. P. D. was conducted every Wednesday and Friday and a total of 505 new cases were seen.
- A total of 354 cases were admitted for surgery of which 282 were elective and the rest were emergency cases mainly involving the hand and face.
- All the members of the department attended 27th National Conference of Plastic Surgeons at Mumbai in September 1992.

(12) HYPERTENSION CLINIC :

Hypertension Clinic is held every Tuesday at 11.00 a.m. in R. No. 26. On an average about 60 old follow-up patients attend O. P. D. every Tuesday and about 4-5 new patients are seen.

(15) DIABETIC CLINIC :

i) The Diabetic Clinic runs O. P. D.'s for new patients on Monday from 9.00 a.m. onwards.

ii) Follow up patients are seen every Monday and Thursday from 1.30 p.m. onwards.

iii) 3 monthly blood sugars, lipidogram, glycosylated haemoglobins, renal & liver function tests are carried out initially.

The Diabetes Unit also runs Diabetes—T.B. Clinic in association with Department of T.B. and Chest Diseases. This clinic is held on Wednesday from 9.00 a.m. onwards.

INTERNS : Graduates from University other than Bombay University are allowed to undergo internship training at the attached L. T. M. G. Hospital to the extent of 10 interns. B. Pharm, D. Pharm students are given training of 750 hours in Pharmacy to a maximum capacity of six students at a time. Students from S. N. D. T. University and other teachnical institutions are allowed to work for practical training in Pathology. Necessary charges as per rules are recovered for imparting training as above.

We are conducting Competitive examinations in the subject of Anatomy, Physiology, for 1st M. B. B. S., Pharmacology, Pathology for IInd M. B. B. S. and Medicine, Surgery, Obst. & Gyn., P. S. M., E. N. T. Paediatrics, Dermatology, Psychiatry for IIIrd M. B. B. S. students every year. The winner of the examinations are given Merit certificate and cash prizes from the interest of the donation received from the Silver Jubilee Fund of the institution. A Competitive examination in Ophthalmology (only Practical exam.) for regular batch and casual batch Interns is started from August 1983, as Dr. Sathe's Prize (cash) in Ophthalmology is given to Interns judged as first. Cash Prizes are given to the students who stood first and second in the Competitive examination.

Since November 1982, term Dr. Hemant Kelkar Prize is awarded for the P. G. students who stood # first in M. S. (General Surgery) of Bombay University examination in the regular batch of L. T. M. G. Hospital # It is given from the donation received from relatives in the memory of Late Dr. Hemant Kelkar in 1981.

A separate committee of students manages the students Cultural and sports activities.

Boys and Girls are given accommodation in the hostel building newly constructed with capacity of 150 students.

LIBRARY :—The new library has identified separate areas for the undergraduate, post graduate reading areas, current journals Display, Home lending, under graduate and post graduate counter.

During the year 404 books have been added to the collection of totalling to 18,448 books.

ANNUAL COST AND REVENUE : Total expenditure of College amounted to Rs. 23,03,339.00 excluding establishment Cost against total incurred Rs. 3,64,01,328.00 during the year. Revenue is collected by way of tution fees from students, hostel rent. etc.

DEPARTMENT OF MEDICINE : Department of Medicine has 6 Medical units of which four are full time and two are part time.

The departments has subspecialities like MICO, RICU, haematology, Endocrine, Diabetes, Nephrology and Rheumatology. Long awaited Neurology Services has been started in year 1992. Respiratory diseases department is inspected for D. N. B. of National Board and for M. D. degree (Chest and tuberculosis).

1) M. I. C. U. (MEDICAL INTENSIVE CARE UNIT : Medical Intensive Care unit (MICU), has continued to provide intensive care facilities to critically ill patients.

A total of nearly 2,500 patients were referred to the MICU of which nearly 1,250 was admitted and cared for in MICU in 1992.

MICU has also managed around 50 critically ill, surgical post-operative riot victims as part of its conprehensive care services.

2. DIABETES & ENDOCRINOLOGY : Diabetes services started in 1970 and Endocrine service atarted in 1980.

The total number of out-patients for diabetes in 1634 and for Endocrine is 650.

3. ARTIFICIAL KIDNEY DIVISION (A.K.D.): A.K.D. services of department of medicine is started in 1978 and 700 patients and 429 Indoor patient were treats with dialysis etc.

4. RHEUMATOLOGY SERVICES : 30 patients were referred form Medical units, peripheral hospital, and other departments as Orthopaedics, plastic surgry, Dermatology.

DEPARTMENT OF GASTROENTEROLOGY : The department set up 3 unique services for benefit of seriously ill patients whose lives have been saved or major surgery avoided.

A) Heater probe coagulation of bleeding ulcers-5 patients treated successfully

- B) Injection of fundic varices by bucrylate -- 6 patients treated successfully.
- C) Dilation of oesophageal strictures (acid ingestion, dyskeratosis) using duodenal balloons., 3 children treated successfully.

DEPARTMENT OF RESPORATORY DISEASES :

SERVICES :1) Pulmonary function tests were carried out in 480 patients, refered by other Municipal Medical Institutions etc.

2) Total admissions were 399 mortality was 31.25% 125 patients died.

3) Bronchoscopy was carried out for diagnosis and therapeutics in 800 children.

4) Allergy Clinic : Allergy tests were perfered in 15 patients.

DEPARTMENT OF ORTHOPAEDIC : Services made available :

Routine : Planned (Major and Minor) operations are done in Routine operation theatre.

Emergency : 24 hours round the clock Emergency management service for Accident and Trauma victims is run with approximately 10-11 Emergency operations done per day.

Speciality Clinics : For providing speciality treatment for complex cases, to improve patient care, disease understanding, research and academic activities and follow-up work.

DEPARTMENT OF SURGERY : Specialised services.

1) Endoscopy services – Routine as well as emergency oesophage gastroduodenoscopy, colonoscopy are conducted for diagnostic as well as therepeutic purposes.

2) Cancer Registry and Chemotherapy clinic.

3) Venous Doppler studies are carried out.

4) Burns unit -- The first of its kind to be started in the Municipal Corporation.

5) Research activities.

DEPARTMENT OF PAEDIATRICS : Special activities.

 Diarrhoea Treatment -- Training Unit (DTTU) : Our Diarrhoea Treatment Unit (DTTU) was established in 1992 in paediatric ward side room, with 6 beds for treating patients with diarrhoeal dehydration.

2) Division of Neonatology : --

a) Establishment of Fetal Medicine clinic at LTMG Hospital on 21st April 1992.

b) Organized celebrations of World Breastfeeding week from 1-8-1992 to 8-8-1992 at LTMG ` Hospital.

c) As part of Lactation management programme Div. of Neonatology prepared :--

i) Breastfeeding policy &

ii) Bookleton Breastfeeding (in Marathi) for health workers.

to promote breastfeeding practises in the community.

d) Organization of in service training programme for Medical officers, nurses and health post workers of BMC in collaboration with IPP V cell of BMC every month.

3) Division of Hematology -- Onecology :--

a) Hematology -- Oncology OPD is conducted on Tuesday and Friday from 9.00 a.m. to 12.00 noon.

b) Regular outdoor thalassemia transfusion services conducted thrice a week.

c) Out-door chemotherapy services provided once a week to pediatric oncology patinets.

Fetal medicine clinic was established and the Hematology-Oncology division forms a part of the multi-disciplinary approach required in fetal medicine.

4) INTENSIVE PEDIATRIC CARE UNIT (IPCU) :--

a) Provision of isolation and procedure rooms for exchange transfusions, immune comprised patients and patients on ventilators has been made.

b) Infection control measure and protocols have been laid down and implemented.

c) Cardioscope for bed-side cardiac monitoring, non invasive blood pressue monitoring and nebulizer for nebulized medication were introduced.

5) CHILDHOOD ASTHMA CLINIC : Patients were evaluated and graded for Asthma and medication and physiotherapy as well as Health education and self-management skills is imparted to the patients. Peak expiratory flow rate and growith monitoring is done for all patients, Pulmonary function tests are carried out when the diagnosis is uncertain.

Nebulizers have been made available in the Pediatric wards.

OPD and IPCU for better and prompt control of Acute Asthma.

The number of emergency visit and school abscentacism have reduced significantly in children who attend the Asthma Clinic regularly.

6) **PAEDIATRIC NEUROLOGY CLINIC**: 125 children were treated in paediatric neurology clinic.

WORKLOAD

THE SURGICAL NEONATAL INTENSIVE SECTION: (SNICU) A Section attached to the ward has been identified and isolated for the purpose of managing surgical neonates.

THE NICU & IPCU (MEDICAL) SECTION: Some neonates and children not requiring surgical but maintly medical management are kept in the medical neonatal intensive care unit (NICU)/Intensive Paediatric Care Unit (IPCU) and are looked after jointly by Pediatricians and Pediatric surgeons.

SPECIALISED O.P.Ds.

- 1) On every Tusday morning a Paediatric Urology is held.
- 2) A Pediatric Oncology Clinic is held jointly with the Pediatric Haematology department and the Chemotherapy department of the Tata Memorial hospital.
- 3) A Spinal Pysraphism' has been started in co-ordination with orthopaedicians. Several cases of spinal Dysraphism are being referred to the Clinic.

MEDICAL RECORD DEPARTMENT :---

IN-PATIENTS :—The Schedule bad strength of this hospital is 1345. The distribution of beds according to the departments is shown in Appendix III. 54,366 patients were admitted for Indoor treatment during the year as against 54,858 and 54,570 and 50,488 during the proceeding three years respectively.

OUT-PATIENTS :—The Out-patient department has attended to 3,08,223 new patients and 4,65,799 repeat patients and Out-patients attendance (only New attendance) on a single day was 229 and 1,187 respectively.

MEDICO-LEGAL CASES :—Casualty Department, 26,127 accidental and other emergency cases were treated in this department and 1,645 injury certificates were issued to police and 55 court calls were attended by the Resident Medical Doctors during the year under report.

FEES COLLECTED :-- An amount of Rs. 4,40,943.00 on account of sale of OPD and Indoor forms, bed charges from patients over stayed in Genral Wards and Maternity charges for fourth delivery during the year.

PATHOLOGY DEPARTMENT :— 6,72,301 investigations were carried out and 1,739 autopsied were performed during the year (Medico-legal P. M. 974 and Medical P. M. 765) A special laboratory has been set up to work round the clock for the traumatic Emergency Service. The department has also extading service of pathology and pheripheral Hospital and Maternity Homes.

ANAESTHESIA DEPARTMENT :—During the year 30,358 patients have received anaesthesia in various theatres and minor surgery department. 13,915 patients were kept in recovery room and out of these 541 patient were required to be treated with respirators. 7,217 patients were examined in OPD for fitness for surgery.

Home visits and institutional visits were made by M.S.Ws. as and when required.

- B) **GROUP WORK :** Group work as method has been found as one of the most effective one and the work done is as follows :--
- I) Therapeutic Group Work :--
 - a) The Deaf Youth group continued its activities once a week basis between 1.30 p.m. to 4.30 p.m. every Saturdays. About 35 to 40 students attended it per session.
 - b) Group of deaf children of our own school i.e., Deaf School of Wadala were conducted on an on-going basis, once a week.
 - c) Group of 30, 40 parents of the deaf were conducted regularly to solve their difficulties and queries and to learn from each other to cope with the needs of the deaf child once a month.
 - d) Group of parents of the mentally retarded children were also conducted and helped to understand their retarded child better.
 - e) Family Therapy groups were conducted for marital disharmony and emotiona disturbances.
 - f) Groups of 15-20 of alcoholics are conducted with the help of the members, groups of the relatioves of alcoholics were also conducted to help them cope with the stress and with regards the addiction as an illness. The wives of the alcoholics are seen in group to help them to understand the addiction as an illness and work with the strees of the family.
 - g) Group of 8-10 patients of orthopaedically handicapped is conducted to discuss their problems and rehabilitation plan once a week.
- II) Educationa a Group Work : These are conducted to educate the patients of drug and their relatives on the nature of the illness and the care that needs to be taken during the period of treatment. Patient of the epileptic children were also seen to disseminate information about epilepsy.

III) Recreational Group work :

Patinets from wards are kept occupied in recreational activities. Children are given toys or story books.N. S. S. volunteers go to the wards to play some games and entertain the bedidden children.

C) **PROJECTS**:

Out-Door patients :

- (i) **Grain-distribution :** For families going through a crisis situation is helped with the help of the Vishwa Hindu Parishad, at the rate of 5 kg. rice and 5kg. wheat per month. Fifty such families are getting benefit of project.
- (ii) Indoor Patinets :
- a) Toy Bank is conducted for children admitted in the ward also come and play. A volunteer to manage this activity is given andhonorarium by the All India Womens Conference.
- b) **Circulating Library** for the wards usually adult patients are kept for longer time. Old magaziness and books are given for reading. Every day in the afternoon, patients from different wards (ward 12, 14, 15, 16, 29 and 30)are given books and magazines by a worker (old patients of the department). This activity is conducted by paying honorarium to the attendant through sponsorship and donation of old books and magazines.
- c) **Picture-poster library :** by which posters are circulated in the wards which helps to create pleasant atmosphere there.

III) SPECIAL PROJECTS :

a) Sheltered workshop : It is conducted for the physically, mentally and emetionally handicapped cases. Especially, Training in tailoring is given to such patients.

Production : Patients with different handicap's, relatives of needy patients are given some monay for plece work basis.

- i) **Tailoring**: Making baby clothes, hospital mending, stitching order, 6-8 persons work here.
- ii) **Paper bags :** They are made by 10 to 12 patients and supplied to dispensary for packing purposes.
- iii) Chair caning * On an average 2 to 3 persons are working here. Canning of hospital chairs is done.
- iv) **Sale counter :** Sanitary pads and baby clothes, made by the patients in the workshop, are sold at the sale counter. by handicapped persons.
- b) Developmental Clinic : In this clinic the M. S.W. works with the parents and children for the best possible development and rehabilitation of the children. A team of paediatrician occupational therapist and social worker attend this clinic, once a week.
- c) Hospital Extension Projects :
- i) King George Infirmary: Patients mainly from orthopaedic units are transferred to K.G. I. 10 beds have been provided for such mainly for O.T., P.T., treatment and psychosocial rehabilitation.
- L. T. M. G. Hospital School : The School for the deaf is conducted in the Municipal School Wadala were there are 120 children. This school conducts various activities for children, staff, outside organization.
- iii) M. P. S. W. department with collaboration of Paraplegic Foundation started ward for paraplegics in the premises after the active treatment was over in the hospital. 15 to 20 patients were transferred from Sion Hospital to this ward in 1992.

M. P. S. W. department continued co-ordinating activities of sheltered workshop for severely handicapped work and partly earn their living.

iv) SPECIAL ON GOING PROJECTS :

i) Atithigriha : Relatives of patients who come out of Bombay are given admission to atithigriha. They are given free meals and tea from atithigriha. On an average 60 to 80 relatives per day take advantage of the same.

ii) A project of the repairs of 50 chairs & 8 tables of the hospital was undertaken with co-operation of deaf school students. They earned valuable practical experience and confidence and some money.

iii) Drinking water project : Service of clean and cool drinking water for OPD patients and visitors was provided near OPD building with the help of donations. One attendant is provided by the donor to keep the premises clean.

II) TEACHING, TRANING AND SUPERVISION :

- i) 12 students social workers came from training schools of social work for their field works experience and they were given necessary training to social work dealing with patients.
- ii) N.S.S. Projects : This year N.S.S. volunteers total 300 were sent to M.S.W. department from Khalsa, Gurunank, Ruia, S. I. E. S., S. I. W. S. Colleges to get exposure to hospital patients and projects. They were involved various projects of the Hospital as well as they were trained in maintenance of records.

iii) DONATIONS COLLECTED :

Rs. 15.00,000.00 (approx) were collected by M.S.W. department for major surgery like heart operations, equipments, hearing aids, costly medicines, orthopaedic appliances, implants, wheel chairs, tricycles etc. in cash and kind.

PREVENTIVE & SOCIAL MEDICINE DEPARTMENT :

Regular training is arranged for 1st, IInd and IIIrd MBBS students as well as interns post graduate students & nurses.

Transit Camp school is included under school health programme. Medical check-up and immunisation are carried out in both the schools. 4,000 children have received supplementary feeding. As a part of child to child programme child volunteers are trained in various health aspects of Transit Camp school and at Cross Road Schools.

VIII. A PROPHYLAXIS PROGRAMME : Oral Vit. A was given to 80 cases in Dharavi Community by making home visits as well as at the clinic.

UNDER FIVE CLINIC: Under Five clinics are conducted at Urban Health Centre Dharavi. Minor ailments of these children are treated, and referred to specialists as per requirements. Malnourished children are given Nutritional aid, Health education on the common problems is

given

to mothers.

CHILD WELFARE CENTRE : The child welfare centre is conducted by the department of P. S. M. at L. T. M. M. College and Hospital compound and children are enrolled from 3 months onwards and are followed upto the age of five years.

MEDICAL RELIEF : Adult patients and children were examined and treated at Dharavi Urban Health Centre.

OPD were organised, over 6,000 tripal people were benefied by there camps. Medicines were dispensed, with the help of public health department, Thane. Opportunity was taken to impart health education to them. These camps were coordinated by Neelam Gorhe, Stree Adhar Kendra.

- I T. B. CLINIC: T. B. Clinic is conducted at U. H. C. where 2520 suspected T. B. cases were referred to L. T. M. G. Hospital. 1,250 children were treated at T. B. Clinic at Urban Health Centre, Dharavi.
- LEPROSY CLINIC : This is conducted at Urban Health Centre, Dharavi, thrice a week with the help of Bombay Leprosy Project. About 71 cases of Leprosy are under treatment.
- REHABILITATION OF PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED: The programme was started in June 1987, with the help of I.S.R.R. The physically handicapped children who were school drop cuts were included under this programme. The aid of this programme is to preven juvenile deligency and train every physically handicapped in some vocation through which he can earn and maintain himself. THE NAIR HOSPITAL DENTAL COLLEGE ADMINISTRATION REPORT -- 1992-93

Dr. D. R. Shahani held the post of Dean, Professor & Head of the Department of Conservative Dentistry during the year 1992-93.

Various national conference and refresher course were organised in Nair Hospital Dental College during the year and the participation of the staff and students of Nair Hospital Dental College brought great honour to the institution.

Being a leading Dental Institution in the country many staff members of Nair Hospital dental College were invited as Inspectors of Dental Council of India to inspect different Dental Colleges in the Country and advised the council and colleges in promoting Dental Education, Research and Patient Care.

The College and Hospital has been progressively expanding to include various specialities. Scientific papers were published and Research works carried out during the year by all departments of Nair Hospitals Dental College.

Several Community Dental Health Education Programmes were organised through the Department of Periodontics, Pedodontics in the slums of the city where, regular Dental Care facilities do not reach.

A mobile dental van for rendering dental health services in the most remote areas in the city continued its work during the year under report. 99 Dental camps were organised during the year under report through voluntary organisations like Lion's Club, Rotary Club etc.

PATIENTS TREATED : 2,31,916 patients were treated in different departments of this institution during 1992-93 and the daily average was 805 patients.

There are 30 beds in the indoor ward.

Out of 2,31,916 patients, 3,626 patients were treated by the staff attached to the Community Mobile Dental Service.

HOSTEL : Approximately 73 students were accommodated in College Hostel which is located at building No. 6 at Haji Ali, Mahalaxmi, Bombay.

Pre-clinical laboratories are also equipped with modern dental Lab. equipment. There is porcelain unit and induction casting machine available in prosthetic Lab. for latest technology in Dentistry.

There are 2 Operation Theatres equipped with all essential, emergency equipment such as Cardioscope Cryosurgery unit and Micro Electric System etc.

X-ray department is having latest X-ray equipment such as Orthopantomograph, panoramic x-ray unit, cephalometric unit etc.

The staff engaged for different services in this college are (1) Dental teaching staff-106 (2) + Para-Medical Staff-52 (3) Medical teaching staff-30 (4) Administrative and labour staff-211.

The college conducts four years course in Dentistry leading to the Degree of bachelor of Dental Surgery and also Post-graduate course in 8 dental subjects leading to the Degree of Master of Dental Surgery of the University of Bombay.

13 dessertation work on various topics were conducted during the year 1992-93 by M. D. S. students.

The work done by the various departments is given below in brief :

1) DEPARTMENT OF ORAL DIAGNOSIS & RADIOLOGY :

Dr. S. A. Jakhi is the Professor & Head of the department.

In this department, routine check-up of all the patients attending O. P. D., is carried out. Patients are screene for infective diseases especially syphillis, T. B., Aids, Precancerous and cancerous lesions, biopsies are also taken in the said department and management of soft tissues lesions are routinely carried out. In the department of radiology all routine x-rays, intra-oral and extra-oral radiographs are taken.

During the year under report 56,230 patients have been treated.

2) DEPARTMENT OF MAXILLOFACIAL & ORAL SURGERY :

Dr. J. N. Khanna is the Prof. & Head of the Department. This is the only Oral Surgery Department in the country, which has fullifiedged Indoor Ward facilities. The Indoor Ward has all together 30 beds for both male and female patients.

Following cases are regularly attended to by the department Staff and post-graduate (M.D.S.) students --

1) Trauma cases with Fractures of the Facial bones (Pan Facial Injuries)

2) Cases for surgical correction of Denta Facial deformities.

3) Oral Cancer & Precancorous Lesions.

4) Benign tumours and cysts of the Jaws.

5) Tempero-Mandibular J. T. ankylosis and other related problems.

6) Infections of the Maxillofacial region.

7) Minor Surgical procedure such as-Surgical extractions of teeth, Biopsy, Abecess drainage etc.

8) Surgical treatment of Oral Submucus fibrosis.

3) DEPARTMENT OF PEDODONTIA :

Dr. S. G. Damle, is the Professor & Head of this department.

This department deals with complete oral rehabilitation for child patients upto the age of 12 years. The treatment modalities like resteration of the decayed teeth, pulp therapy, root-canal treatment, management of traumatic injuries, minor surgeries and preventive dentistry are being carried out under Local and general anasthesia. There is a separate room for treatment of handicapped children, which is a major part of our daily routine work. During the year, in this department, total 23,395 patients (with school clinic patients) were treated.

4) DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATIVE DENTISTRY :

Dr. D. R. Shahani is the Professor & Head of this department. This department deals with restoration of teeth damaged due to dental caries/fracture etc. The work comprises of fillings/Root canal therapy/ Cosmetic correction of teeth using materials like composites, glass ionomers. Surgical procedures like apisectomy, replantation etc.

Scientific papers are read by staff members and post-graduate students at National and International conferences and published in nation and inter-national journals.

During the year under report, 32,590 patients have been treated by the under-graduate, post-graduate students and other teaching staff members.

5) DEPARTMENT OF PERIODONTOLOGY :

Dr. I. R. D'Silva is the Professor & Head pf Periodontology and Incharge of Community Dentistry Section.

There is a high prevalence of Periodontal disease in our country and children too are affected. Periodontoal disease is curable, if the patient seeks treatment in the initial stage.

This department not only treats periodontal disease but also educates the patients on prevention of occurance of the disease. They are made aware of the facture which initiate the disease. Poor oralhygine is the main cause of the disease and hence patients are taught correct oralhygine measures. Besides after treatment they are colled at regular intervals for checkup. During the year 28,202 patients were treated in the department.

(6) COMMUNITY DENTISTRY SECTION :

The college has a mobile dental van which goes to Malvani, Cheeta Camp and Shivaji Nagar on Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays. On the other days of the week the staff work in the college premises. Regular talks and demonstrations on how to prevent periodontal disease are given to the patients who visit the camps. These dental camps are held in collaboration with the Preventive and Social Medicine department of Nair Hospital and KEM Hospital.

During the year 3626 patients were treated at the 99 camps that were held during the period under this report.

(7) DEPARTMENT OF PROSTHETIC, CROWN & BRIDGE :

Dr. (Smt.) Shirley W. Mhatre is the Professor & Head of the department.

This department deals with loss of teeth inorder to restore oral functions, cosmetics, speech and general comfort of patients so as to rehabilitate them and make life more fruitful and healthy.

All edentulous/partial edentulous cases are treated with complete/partial fixed presthesia. The treatment is also carried out for patients having congential or acquired maxillofacial defects with the help of obturators and speech appliances.

During the year under report 16,186 patients were treated in the department.

(8) DEPARTMENT OF ORTHODONTICS :

Dr. (Smt.) T. M. Bhagtani is the Professor & Head of this department.

50% of the total population in this country are suffering from malocclusion. This department deals with prevention and correction and management of patients with malocclusion (crooked teeth). 286 Preventive treatment includes oral habit breaking appliances, space regainer, space maintainers and minor tooth movement during abnormal erupation of teeth. Under corrective treatment patients with 288 removable appliances, 58 myo-functional appliances and 226 fixed appliances are treated. The treatment is 50 non-surgical patients with cleft lip and palate and also treated with a suitable appliances.

During this year 18,967 patients have been treated in the department.

(9) DEPARTMENT OF ORAL PATHOLOGY & MICROBIOLOGY :

Dr. (Smt.) V. R. Brave is the Professor and head of this department.

The department of Oral Pathology has been seeing an upward trend in the attendance of patients.

Diseases of the mouth like soft and hard tissue lesions, Oral precancers and cancers, systemic diseases with Oral manifestations and immunologic disorders are examined in this department. when pertinent laboratory tests (blood, urine) and procedure deemed relevant (biopsy cytology) to establish diagnosis are done. The department is well equipped to carry out clinical pathology investigations. Very special investigations are carried out with the assistance of B. Y. L. Nair Hospital. The department maintains a Cancer Registry, a cross reference file of cases and a collection of hard and soft tissue specimens. During the year 600 cases were investigated.

During the year under report 3889 patients were treated in the department.

1. To ensure proper and effective control over the working of the various anti-TB activities conducted by the serveral agencies in Brihanmumbai Mahanagar Palika limits to bring Tuberculosis reasonably under control.

2. To give concentrated attention to the management and the implementation of the measures on the guidelines of the policies adopted on the National policies for TB Control I.e., by the State and the Central Government Health authorities.

3. To Co-ordinate and manage the whole TB Programme by associating agencies including the voluntary and private charitable organisations.

4. To remove short-falls which are in existance in the present TB Control Programme.

Achievements :

The domiciliary treatment has been upgraded by 27 Area Tuberculosis Centres in different areas of the City and the Suburbs for implementation of the City Tuberculosis Programme in collaboration with the State Government, Municipal Institutions and several Voluntary Organisations.

Besides these Area Tuberculosis Centres, 62 UP-graded Dispensaries have been adopted as the Treatment Centres, where anti-TB Drugs including Inj. Streptomycin and other drugs are given free to the patients residing in their vicinity.

City Tuberculosis Programme :

· . The Brihanmumbai Mahanagar Palika have established the City Tuberculosis Programme (CTP) in the Mumbai City on behalf of the State Government with the free assistance from Central Government in the form of Anti-TB Drugs and MMR X-ray rolls. 31 Centres alongwith several others run by the Teaching Medical Institutions and Peripheral Hospitals in addition to 62 Centrs have been entrusted with the drug distribution consisting of the most modren and effective drugs like Rifampicin.

HISTORY :

LOCATION : This hospital is located in the Ghatkopar suburb on the Eastern side of the Genral Railway line.

In the year 1957, the Ghatkopar area was merged into the Bombay Municipal Corporation. The S. V. Khimji Maternity home of 20 beds of the then local Ghatkopar Municipal bureo was merged with the dispensary.

Since the number of patients increased considerably which give birth to a 50 beded general hospital in the year 1958. In provided Indoor treatment with facilities like Operation THeatre Xray & Laboratory etc. It was then named as ``SETH V. C. GANDHI & M. A. VORA MUNICIPAL GENERAL HOSPITAL" as both of them donated Lakh of Rupees each construction of hospital.

The bed strength rose to 160 with the introduction of Paediatric and Gynaec wards.

In the year 1972 specialised department E. N. T. Ophthalmology, Orthopaedic, Pathology etc. were introduced by which the bed strength rose 200.

In the 1973, Casualty Department was introduced alongwith mobile dispensary, ambulance hearse and Blood Bank.

In 1979 further upgradation earned recognition as a teaching institution by Bombay University under graduate students from L. T. M. G. College, Sion & T. N. M. College of B. Y. L. Nair Hospital attended hospital for their clinical training upto the end of the year 1986.

I. C. C. U. and M. I. C. U. with total 11 beds were started from 1981.

Form 1988 the Additional Coroner's Court Rajawadi has started functioning in the campus of Hospital.

Drug addicitioncentre started from 27-11-1989.

Food handlers scheme started from 16-12-1989.

Eyebank started from 1-6-1990 and ultrasonography department started from 1990.

The units in Medicine Surgery, Gynaec & Obstetric were increased from 2 to 3 & in Ophthalmic, Paediatric from 1 to 2 each. The beds of Surgery Department were increased from 72 to 1990. The total bedstrength rose to 570.

1. DEPARTMENT OF MEDICINE :

The department of Medicine consists of 3 Units. Each Unit is looked by Honorary Medical Officer (Medicine) Honorary Assistant Medical Officer (Medicine), Lecturer, Registrar, Houseman & A. M. O. Each Unit conducts out patient Department and emergency Services twice a week by rotation.

The Gastroenterology Department is looked after by Honorary Medical Officer (Medicine) and a Honorary Medical Officer (Surgery) Jointly.

MEDICAL INTENSIVE CARE UNIT & CARDIAC CARE UNIT :

These units were started at this hospital from May 1979. Serious cases are admitted directly to these units. Cases transferred from other units are also treated. Only trained staff and doctors are posted for work in these units. This department is managed by all 3 Medical Units by rotation. (Statistical information in appendix 3, 4).

2. DEPARTMENT OF SURGERY :

The department of Surgery consists of 3 units. Each unit is looked after by a Honorary Medical Officer (Surgery) & Honorary Assistant Medical Officer (Surgery) Lecturer, Registrar, Houseman & A. M. O. Each Unit conducts their O. P. D. & Emergency Services twice a week by rotation (statistical information in Appendix 3 & 4).

3. DEPARTMENT OF PAEDIATRIC :

- The Paediatric Department consists of two units consisting 2 Honorary Medical Officers, 2 Lecturers, 2 registrars & 4 House Physicians.

The department conducts daily O. P. D. and emergency services.

For benefit of school children in Municipal schools a school clinic O. P. D. is run daily in the afternoon by Assistant Honorary (School Clinic) and Registrars.

4. DEPARTMENT OF GYNAEC AND OBSTETRICS :

This department consists of 3 units. Each units is looked after by a Honorary, Medical Officer (Obstetrician & Gynaecologist) and Lecturer, Registrar, Houseman & A. M. O. Each unit conducts its O. P. D. & emergency services twice a week by rotation.

Ultra Sonography started from 1991.

Each Antenatal Patient is examined for blood analysis, regular weight, urine examination, besides general and abdominal examinations. (Statistical information in Appendix 3, 4 & 9).

5. DEPARTMENT OF ORTHOPAEDICS :

The Orthopaedic department in Rajawadi Hospital, exists from the year 1972. It now Function with two units each unit consists of Honorary, Asstt., Honorary, Lecturer, A. M. O., or Registrar and two House Surgeons. O. P. D., is conducted daily except Sunday. (Statistical information in Appendix No. 3, 4, & 9).

6. DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHIATRY 1992:

The department of Psychiatry was established in October 1978, Initially only out-door facilities and subsequently with Indoor Psychiatric facilities from November 1989 for males and from July 1990 for Females.

7168 old cases were treated and followed up.

Dr. Manilal Gada Prof. of Psychiatric Department of this hospital was awarded by American Biographical Institute Inc. U. S. A. "Most Admired Man and Women of the year 1992-93 as well as he was selected as "WORLD INTELECTUAL OF 1993" by International Biographic Centre, Cemgridge, England. This being an unique honour. He has also acquired many such honours.

7. DEPARTMENT OF TUBERCULOSIS :

This department consists only one unit. It is looked after by one Asstt. Honorary Medical Officer. (T. B. Specialist) and A.M.O. This unit functions on all days of the week except Sundays. This department renders treatment to the old and new patients referred by Dispensary as well as private doctors etc. suffering from pulmanary Tuberculosis.

8. DEPARTMENT OF INTERNATIONAL HEALTH CERTIFICATE :

This department functions all days of the week except Saturday, Sunday & Holiday. People desiring Health certificates for going abroad or piligrames attend this counter between 11 AM to 12.30.

8(A) AYURVEDIC & HOMEOPATHIC :

This department was functioning only one day in a week i.e., on Mcnday 1 PM to 3 PM However now this department functions twice a week. (Monday-Thursday) (Statistical Information in Appendix 3).

9. DEPARTMENT OF EAR. NOSE, THROAT :

This department consists of one unit. This unit is looked after by Honorary Medical Officer (Ear. Nose. Throat) Asstt. Honorary E. N. T. Surgeon, Registrar, House Surgeon. This unit conducts O.P.D. & Emergency Services Thrice a week.

6 Articles concerning subject written of E. N. T., were sent by E. N. T. department of Rajawadi Hospital 1992-93 for publication in India and Abroad & 4 name pulished. Five papers concerning subject & were also presented in Seminar & conference in abroad.

10. DEPARTMENT OF SKIN & V. D. :

This department consists of one unit it is looked after by one Honorary Medical Officer (Dermatology) Lecturer, Registrar & House Physician. This department functions on all days of the weel except Sunday (Statistical Information in appendix No. 3, 4).

This department consists of one unit which is looked after by a Honerary Assistant Medical Officer (Dental Surgeon) and a Lecturer. This unit functions on all days of the week except Sunday. (Statistical information in Appendix No. 3)

13. OCCUPATIONAL THEREPY DEPARTMENT:

Dy. C. E. (Slum Improvement)

Since the Establishment of the Slum Improvement Cell in 1969, the work of providing Civic Amenities in different hutment colonies has been continued under the pro-gramme for Environmental Improvement of Slums.

During the year 1992-93 the amenities serving beneficial population of about 98,188 were provided in Slum Colonies under the Slum Improvement Programme, during the year, 382 numbers of W. C. / A. P. seats, 1,58,363 sq. mtrs. passages 3,60,79 R. M. Drains and 31 Nos. of water taps in various slums have been provided.

Environmental Sanitation and Projects Department.

This department is headed by the Dy. City Engineer (Civil) Environmental Sanitation and Projects and deals with air, water and noise pollution control matters and related projects.

The major activities of this department are as follows :---

(1) Enforcement of Air, Water, Noise and Vibration Pollution Control Measures :----

The enforcement Section of this department deals with proposals relating to industries, factories and various trades, establishments, expansion, change of fuel, change in manufacturing activity, increase in power and water quota, etc., installation of steam boilers, D. G. Sets, electric furnaces and ovens, oil fired furnaces, petty trade furnaces, thermic fluid heaters, chimneys etc., from pollution point of view, suggesting and scrutinising control measures including provision of effluent treatment plants, etc. Fees are levied on all industries on the basis of connected load as per permit and the average annual collection of such fees amount to Rs. 150/- lakhs or so.

850 complaints regarding pollution were attended and the authorities of the factories are suggested to take measures during the year.

(2) Ambient Air Quality Monitoring & Research Laboratory, Khar.

Air Quality Monitoring & Research Laboratory of Environmental Sanitation and Projects Daprtment exists. There are 22 ambient air sampling stations located on terraces of Municipal Buildings spread over area of Greater Bombay. Air samples are analysed form Health Survey point of view.

(3) Preparation of Comprehensive emission inventory of Pollution sources :---

The Emission Inventory Group has been specifically set up for preparation of comprehensive emission inventory of all pollution sources in the City *viz*. : i) Industrial, ii) Automobile, iii) Commercial, iv) Domestic and v) Power Plants.

40 numbers of sound/vibration level measurements including surveys on noise and vibration nuisance were carried out during this year.

Special instruments and equipments are available to carry out the above work.

This department takes the samples from chimneys atteched to boilers, thermopacks, D. G. Sets and process vessels etc. and 28 stack analysis were carried out.

(4) Association with the International Committees and the World Bank.

The Brihanmumbai Mahanagarpalika is a Member of Econocical and Social Commission for Asia and Pacific (ESCAP) which is an International Organisation, for studying the environmental problems Mumbai is one of the cities selected for the purpose.

World Bank have launched Metropolitan Environment Improvement Programme (MEIP) recently. and Mumbai including Bombay Metropolitan Region is selected under the programme for consultancy works for improvement in Solid Waste Disposal System in Brihanmumbai, overall improvement of environment of Chembur Industrial Area and experimental use of compressed natural gas (CNG).

Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay in collaboration with All India Institute of Local Self Govt., Andheri, have joined an International Mega City Project to study innovations in different Municipal Operations like Solid Waste Management, Water supply, Slums Improvement, etc.

M. C. G. B., is host Third Congress of CITYNET (association of local authorities of cities in Asia and Pacific Region) in Bombay in the period 20-24 November 1993. Delegates from about 60 member cities in Asia and Pacific Region attended the Congress.

The work of maintenance is classified under the major heads :---

- (i) Normal repairs.
- (ii) Special repairs.
- (iii) New Works.

Mansoon repairs are also included in the normal repairs, special repairs over the works are likely to increase the life of buildings and structures. New works cover the works of additions and alterations to the buildings as also those of providing additional amenities.

This year the repairs and maintenance of the Municipal properties were carriedout either departmentally or through petty Work Contractors.

The total expenditure incurred on the maintenance of Municipal properties was 1250.19 lakhs (City Rs. 728.51 lakhs and suburbs Rs. 521.68 lakhs).

Out of this an amount of 511.09 lakhs was spent on normal maintenance and amount of Rs. 739.10 lakhs was spent on new and special repairs. Works costing Rs.841.50 lakhs (City Rs. 342.88 and Subs. Rs. 498.62) were executed through the petty Works Contractors. Total Nos. of Works carried out through P. W. C. was 1243 and Total No. of works carriedout departmentally was 16579 and expenditure incurred was 556.46 lakhs and 841.50 lakhs on department and P. W. C. works respectively.

STATEMENT SHOWING THE WORKS COMPLETED DURING THE YEAR 1-4-1992 to 31-3-1993

CHIEF ENGINEER (DEVELOPMENT PLAN) :

,

The Development plan Wing of the Chief Engineer is also connected with formulating the various policies required for implementation of the Development Control Rules and Development Plan, etc., and to have uniform policy. After finalisation of the Development Plan by Corporation, the State Government have now sanctioned the revised Development Plan of all the wards in Island City and Suburbs.

As a result of the sanction of the Development Control Regulations, 1991, it has been possible to grant transferable development rights in the form of Development Right Certificate, and M.C.G.B., will be in a position to provide amenities/facilities in the area for the benefit of members of public as well as to grant permission for development of the sites reserved for reservations like Municipal Retail Market, Welfare Centre, Library, Maternity Home, Dispensary, Municipal Chowky, etc. The policy guide-lines in respect of D. P. have been finalized and the State Government have also given concurrence to the said policy guide-lines as well as to levy a scrutiny fee. The details regarding scrutiny fee, so recovered are given in the attached statement.

The policy guide-lines in respect of Slum development have been approved by the State Government and a Notification to that effect has been issued.

Bombay is endowed with quite a good number of historical buildings, areas (precincts), etc. Some of them are as old as 900 years or more (Banganga Tank and Temple Complex). There is a demand from the public to conserve this rich stock of old and monumental historic buildings, buildings with beautiful architecture, areas (percincts) with scenic beauty, etc. The State Government have also published a Notification in respect of the draft D. C. Regulation No. 67 regarding conservation of areas, artefacts, structures, precincts of historical and heritage significance. A separate list of these buildings of historical monuments and architectural has also been published by the State Government alongwith the said Notification of the draft D. C. Regulation No. 67. The State Government have also notified the draft D. C. Regulation No. 68 dealing with the development of lands in Municipal possession, but reserved/ designated for Recreation Grounds, Play Grounds, Parks, etc., permitting underground shopping users, etc. Necessary action by B. M. C. has been taken in this respect.

As per the directive of the State Government, the Municipal Corporation have constituted an Adhoc Committee under the Chairmanship of Shri J. G. Kanga, Retired I. A. S., Ex. M. C., and member, Maharashtra Public Service Commission with some other members of public, who are eminant persons and Architects for dealing with the applications received by the Municipal Corporation for development/ re-development permission in case of the listed structures under category of Grade-II & III of the Notification in respect of the draft D. C. Regulation No. 67 for regulating the development of buildings of historical monuments, precincts, etc.

The coastal areas are being attracted for development due to the healthy atmosphere and the natural scenic beauty available at all the time. Since there were no regulatory controls over the developments along the coastal area, the Government of India have declared the coastal stretches as Coastal Regulation Zones, vide their Notification under No. SO/114(E), dated the 19th February, 1991. The said Notification is in force and has imposed certain restrictions on the development of these coastal stretches (CRZ). The State Government have advised the Corporation to prepare the Coastal Regulation Zone Map for Greater Bombay as required under the said Regulations for Greater Bombay and the same has been submitted to State Government.

ACQUISITION:

In view of the Development Control Regulations for Greater Bombay, 1991, the Municipal Corporation has been in a position to take over possession of large number of lands reserved for the various public purposes in respect of grant of transferable development rights (T.D.R.) Accordingly, 31 cases of acquisition proceedings have been initiated, in 4 cases, the possessions of the lands have been taken over by the Municipal Corporation through the Special Land Acquisition Officer. The Standard rent for 24 Municipal properties have been also fixed. The Municipal Corporation has taken over possession of 3 plots from the State Government for public purposes. In case of D. P. Roads, the Municipal Corporation has taken over possession of the lands under the D. P. Road lands in 63 cases, free of cost and free of encumbrances. In 18 cases, the valuation of tenanted premises utilized for school, which are required to be returned to the original owner have been worked out.

TOWN PLANNING SCHEMES IN GREATER BOMBAY :

. .

There are in all 33 T. P. Schemes in Greater Bombay of which 4 T. P. Schemes in City Area, 25 in Suburbs and 4 in Extended Suburbs. The variation of 24 T. P. Schemes will be submitted to the State Government for final sanction.

THE ZONAL SET UP OF BUILDING PROPOSALS SECTION :

Greater Bombay area has been divided into three zones viz., City zone, Western Suburbs Zone and Eastern Subrubs Zone under the control of the Chief Engineer (Development Plan)'s department and activities of Buildings of Proposals section in these zones are now in full swing. The zonal Dy. Chief Engineers, are Co-ordinating the Building Proposal with the help of Executive Engineer and the Ward Officer.

In order to streamline the procedure in the Building Proposals section & to avoid delay in approving the plans, a manual has been prepared specifying the definate procedure.

TRAFFIC AMENITIES

The work of construction of traffic islands channelisers central dividers, parabolic dividers etc. was carried on certain roads and intersections in order to ensure safety of both the pedestrians as well as vehicular traffic within Greater Bombay.

SIGNAL INSTALLATIO: PROGRAMME

28 additional read traffic signals and one additional flashing beacon have been installed.

The maintenance of 308 road traffic signals and 44 flashing beacc: is undertaken by this office. 352 nos of signals/flashing beacons are in operation.

PAY & PARK SCHEME IN GREATER BOMBAY

Municipal Corporation has reintroduced Pay and Park Scheme in Brihan Mumbai and presently there are 76 nos of schemes in operation. The implementation of the scheme is also being extended further progressively in the entire Greater Bombay Limit.

INTER UTILITY CO-ORDINATION CELL

The Inter utility Co-Ordination Cell was established to regulate and co-ordinate on the extensive excavations on roads and footpaths undertaken by various utility concerns on major rc-ds as per the guide lines given by Central Committee appointed for the purpose.

The department has also initiated project of providing Computerised Infrastructure with Geographical information System to chart all the surface and underground utilities which is being finalised.

The work of naming and renaming of streets and chowks is looked after by this department.

CEMENT CONCRETE

Concreting of road programme for the season of 1992-93 has been formulated into 74 works at the estimated cost of Rs. 69.08 crores consisting of 28 works in City, 23 works in W.S. and 23, works in E.S.

(SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT)

Administration Report of Solid Waste Management Department for the year 1992-93 (City Suburbs & Ext. Suburbs).

The Department of Solid Waste Management comprises of Conservancy and Transport department. The Transport department provide vehicles for transportation of refuse and cesspool contents from unsewered area, whereas conservancy Department provides the services, consists of collection, removal and disposal of garbage and sweepings from public roads, streets, foot-paths & by lanes and maintenance of dumping grounds. The work of removal of night Soil and Cellpool from unsewered area, maintenance of public sanitary conveniences is also undertaken.

Collection Refuse, Debris etc :

The quantity of refuse and other waste material collected in street cleansing operation as well as from residential premises was approximately 10.84 lakhs tonnes in City and 5.80 lakhs in Subs., average per day, being 2951.14 & 1590.71 tonnes in City and Suburbs respectively. The quantity of bebris collected in City and Suburbs was 11.84 lakhs tonne.

Transport of refuse :--

Transportation of refuse as collected above, was carried out by engaging mechanical traction. Total vehicles trips employed for removal of refuse during the year are as under :--

The final disposal of refuse was done by reclaiming lowlying land at Chincholi, Gorai in the Western Subrubs & Deonar and Mulund in the Eastern Suburbs. Total disposal of waste during the year 1992-93 at Dumping grounds was 16,57,775.20 tonnes.

Public & Private Laterines and Urinals :--

Sulabh International has been entrusted with the work of construction and maintenance of 125 P.S. cs. in Bombay, and they have been satisfactorily maintaining 65 P.S. Cs. at present.

Sulabh Infernational has also constructed P.S.Cs. through donors at 9 places i.e., at Mussum, through Inner Wheel Club of Bombay and opp. Metro Cinema, M. G. Road, Tata Service Ltd. etc.

3182 cases in the City and 3846 cases in Suburbs and Extended Suburbs were loged by 116 Nuisance Detectors for offences such as urinating defecating and throwing refuse on public roads under section 115 of the Bombay Police Act and Rs. 1,64,565/- and Rs. 89,655/- were recovered as fine in City & Suburbs respectively under report. During the year 1074 cases in the City and 1453 cases in suburbs and Ext. Suburbs were loged under section 372(E) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act, and Rs. 75,506.00 and Rs. 1,21,326.00 were levied as fine respectively in the City & Subs.

Conservancy Services :--

An amount of Rs. 19,62,473.00 was received for rendering Conservancy services to Private agencies, exhibitions etc.

Expenditure on Conservancy services for the year 1991-92 :

The total expenditure for Div.-I, II & III during the year was Rs. 113, 02,37,029.45 Out of which Rs. 101,26,03,211.96 was for clearance, transportation and disposal of refuse of 16.58 lakhs tonnes.

The cost of removal per tonne of garbage comes to Rs. 610.78 and per capital Rs. 114.05.

The Corporation have to pay interest and sinking fund charges at the rate of 4.61 per cent per annum on the capital expenditure prior to 1919-20 and 6.35 per cent. per annum on the capital expenditure incurred in subsequent years and 4.24 per cent in respect of those chawls constructed_after 1950.

(b) **Semi Permanent Sheds** :-- The demand in respect of Semi Permanent sheds including Labour Camps for the year is Rs. 46,65,729.71, recovery for Rs. 40,75,792.82 and arrears of Rs. 5,90,028.89.

Revenue collected from tenements constructed for Slum Clearance was Rs. 32,20,506.29 against the demand of Rs. 31,86,382.80 inclusive of arrears.

Acquired properties :--At the commencement of the year, there were 449 acquired or surrendered buildings in charge of this department containing 6479 tenancies. At the close of the year, corresponding figures were 449 building and 6479 tenements.

The gross demand of 3369 tenements in the acquired and re-entered building was Rs. 19,53,283.52. After excluding the amount for concession in rent and vacancies the net demand for the year was Rs. 19,54,071.52.

The revenue collected amount to Rs. 45,76,188.67 which was equal to 73 per cent of the total recoverable amount including arrears of Rs. 17,69,904.52 for the previous year.

Requisitioned Buildings :-- The management and collection of rent in respect of 45 properties having 462 tenancies requisitioned from private landlords for A.R.P. Purposes were continued to be locked after by this department. The demand inclusive of arrears in respect of these tenancies for the year was Rs. 2,56,577.98 and the recovery was Rs. 99,208.38.

The highlights of the administrative events for the year under report are as under :---

(1) Income and Expenditure :

The annual receipts by way of fire tax and other receipts aggregated to Rs. 6,90,82,000/-.

The total expenditure including Revenue Expenditure and Debt charges towards Capital Expenditure amounted to Rs. 1,83,47,730.00.

(2) Premises :

There are 20 Fire Stations in Greater Bombay.

(11) Other Activities :

- (A) Annual Fire Drill Competition was held on 15th May 1993 at Byculla Fire Station. All Fire stations participated in the Drill Competition.
- (B) Annual Sports:

Annual Sports were held on 16th February 1993 at Purandare Stadium, Dadar. All fire stations participated in the sports.

(C) Observance of Fire Service Day :

Fire Prevention Week from 14th to 20th April, 1992 and Fire Service Day i.e., 14th April, 1992 were observed by Brigade in co-ordination with the other fire service in Greater Bombay. Fire fighting demonstration were arranged in difference localities and also a documentary film on fire prevention screened for a period of three consequtive days at the same area. Similarly displaying and screening of documentary films on Fire Prevention was arranged at Memonwada and Dadar fire stations and at these stations Exhibition & film show were open for public. During the week lectures on fire prevention for various groups of people were delivered. Posters and Pamhlets were distributed freely and slides were exhibited on television. Discussion and talks were broad casted through . All India Radio and organised and telecaste on Television. Interview of Chief Fire Officer was arranged on television for creating awareness about the hire hazards and to promote knowledge of fire prevention amongst the citizen. An Exhibition was also organised on the premises of V. T. Railway Station.

(D) Republic Day and Maharashtra Day :

The Brigade had participated in the ceremonial parade organised on Republic Day and Maharashtra Day alongwith the Defence Service, Police, Home Guards and Civil Defence Department etc.

14) Awards:

President Fire Service Medal for distinguished services is awarded to Chief Fire Officer, Shri D. J. Kulkarni of Bombay Fire Brigade for the year 1992-93, for his outstanding services for managing and administoring the fire service and for his positive contribution in fire protection and fire prevention education.

15) 8 Hours Shift Duty System :

In consonance with the Industrial Tribunal Award in case of I. T. 44 of 1981-gazetted in 1987, eight . hours Shift Duty system phasewise has been introduced in the department on 1-4-1991 and completed at all fire stations by 1-1-1993.

RIOTS AND BOMB BLASTS :

The city of Bombay witnessed unprecendent situation in the form of communal riots in December 1992 and January 1993. This was followed by series of Bomb blast within a span of 2 hours 40 minutes which rocked the city.

The Bombay Fire Brigade during all the three occassions rose to the call of duty and rendered valuable services in combating the situation. In December 1992 Within a period of one week, Brigade had attegded more than 250 fire calls due to arson. Whereas in the month of January 1993 in the same period Brigade has attended about 750 fire calls out of which more than 50 were of serious nature. The services rendered during all these situations were well appreciated by Govt. Authorities, Eminant Personalities in City and cross section of people in society. In recognition of services rendered following awards were declared to Fire Brigade personnel.

L. capacity built in pump, sophisticated power take off and also water monitor fitted on the deck of the water tanker. This has afforded adequate water supply at critical times.

DEONAR ABATTOIR

Administration report for the year 1992-93

All the Units functioned smoothly, during the year under report.

During the year under report, there is decrease in arrival of horned cattle, sheep and goats as compared to the arrival of last year. As regards slaughter of animals, there is decrease in slaughter of horned cattle whereas there is slight increase in slaughter of sheep and goats and pigs as compared to last year.

As usual special arrangements were made during the 'Bakri Idd' festivall for "Sacrificial Slaughter" of horned cattle in C-2 cattle holding shed. Municipal meat vans were also made available for transportation of sacrificial meat.

Certain Mechanical and Civil works have been carried out at Deonar Abattoir with the financial assistance of the Agricultural & Processed Food Products Exports Development Authority (APEDA), Ministry of Commerce, Govt., of India, for up-gradation of deonar Abattoir.

Pharmaceuticals concerns like M/s. Griffon Laboratories, M/s. Raptakos, Brett & Co., M/s. Cachet Pharmaceuticals, M/s. Emcure Pharmaceuticals, Haffikine Institute and many other technical and research Institutes continued to take benefit of the facilities for collection of various glands, blood, tissues etc., at Deonar Abattoir for pharmaceutical use and research purpose.

Educational Institution like Bombay Veterinary College of Kokan Krishi Vidyapeeth, Trainees from Marketing and Inspection Department, Government of India, Local Self Government Institution, Bombay and many other Educational Institutions availed of the facility for demonstration, training etc., at Deonar Abattoir during the year under report.

EVOLUTION:

The Licence Department fulfill the obligatory duties of the Corporation under Section 61(J) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act, which provides for the regulation of offensive and dangerous trades, etc.

In order to fulfill the above duties and safeguard the life, health & property of the citizen, various trades & storages (of the commodities) enlisted in Schedule 'M', vide section 394 of the B.M.C. Act, are regulated by granting licences.

In the absence of any provisions under the existing B.M.C. Act, to confiscate without notice highly intlammable chemicals carrying fire risks & explosion hazard, A Flying Squad has been created to seize goods with the help of police authority. The goods so seized are redeemed as per the court orders after recovering the warehousing charges.

In addition to above, the following activities are also being carried out by the Licence Department.

- (a) Granting of permission for advertisements under Section 328/328A of the B.M.C. Act, as per the guidelines prescribed from time to time,
- (b) Granting of licence for projections such as Weather frame, Stall Board, Rolling Shutters, Show-cases, etc. under Section 313(1)
- (c) Hawkers licence under Section 313(A)(B) :— At present, however, barring cobblers, pitches & telephone booths for physically handicapped, no other licences are issued to any individual.
 - However due to various restraints in taking removal action against the unauthorised hawkers, a scheme of recovering wrongful occupation-cu-refuse removal charges at the rate of Rs. 5/- to Rs. 30/- per day is introduced and is in vogue.
- (d) For removal of unauthorised encroachment under Section 314(c), each Municipal ward is normally provided with one Lorry Inspector, six labourers and a Municipal vehicle in morning & evening shift.

For taking surprise rounds, two additional vehicles, one for City and one for Suburbs alongwith necessary labourers and Sr. Inspectors are also provided.

During the year under report, the following projects have been completed :--

- a) Redesigning of Monkey Cage to provide maximum space, the work has been completed and the new enclosure has been inaugurated by releasing the monkeys at the hands of the Mayor of Mumbai.
- b) Redesigning of Aquatic Birds Enclosure The work has been completed. The New constructed enclosure is spacious, huge and a unique structure and is focal attraction to the visitors. This cage also has been inaugurated and open to the visitors by releasing the birds thereat the hands of Mayor of Mumbai, Municipal Commissioner, Chairman of Markets and Gardens Committee.
- c) Redesigning and reconstruction of Zoo Hospital Dispensary.
 - The following works are yet under process :--
 - i) Expansion of Bear cage with dry moat.
 - ii) Construction of spacious enclosure for small carnivorous animals.

PROCUREMENT OF ANIMALS/BIRDS :

- 1) 10 pairs of Love birds, one pair of Wild Board, 2 Hyenas, 2 Leopards were added to the V. J. B. Udvan-Zoo.
- 2) By way of exchange of animals with Zoo to Zoo, we have completed the exchange deals with Delhi Zoo, wherein we have collected a pair of Himalayan Black Bear for our Zoo. Further, exchange deal with Trivendrum Zoo is completed in which we have collected three Hog Deers and one Lion Tailed Monkey on exchange basis.

Recreation Activities :

During the year under report, 2 gardens, 11 play grounds, 12 traffic islands are added. The existing gardens and playgrounds in the City, Eastern and Western Suburbs having beautiful tress, shrubs, green lawn and flower beds were maintained properly.

75 fountains were run through Greater Mumbai during the year under report. The fountains with multi-coloured lights provided at Madhu Park, Nandadeep Garden, Kasturba Chowk, Horniman Circle, Acharya, Udyan, Dr. Ambedkar Udyan, Subhash Chandra Bose Udyan are other attraction of Mumbai City.

During the year 1992-93, 22,816 trees were planted in Mumbai by this department. As a part of "grow more trees" compaign, 35,786 plants were distributed during the monsoon season to the public at the nominal rate at Re. 1/- per plant. At present, approximately, 1,50,831/- trees are existing in City of Mumbai.

DR. BHAU DAJI LAD MUSEUM

ADMINISTRATION REPORT 1992-1993

The Museum founded in 1855 and known as the Victoria and Albert Museum, was handed over to the Corporation by the Bombay Government in 1985. On 1st November 1975 it was renamed as Dr. Bhau Daji Lad Museum.

The exhibits in the Museum are classified into different sections such as Agriculture and village life, Arms, Cottage Industries, Ethnology, Fine Arts, Numismatics, Geology and Old Bombay Histoty. The Reference Library of the Museum contains books on Art, Archaelogy, History, Old Bombay etc. and most importantly eighteen volumes of specimens of old, Indian Textiles that are available for reference on request.

Paintings on Old Bombay have been purchased during the year, from Shri Anil Naik and Shri Chandrakant Chavan, for exhibiting in the painting section of the Museum.

It was decided to print a set of post cards, and greeting cards, having coloured photographs of master pieces in the museum. Accordingly, 1 Lakh post cards and 80,000/- greeting cards have been got printed.

Dr. Bhau Daji Lad Museum is being developed on the lines of the `City Museum ' and hence, in order to encourage the artistic sense in the children of Bombay, it is decided to establish the Child Art Gallary in Dr. Bhau Daji Lad Museum. Accordingly, the material and equipments required for establishing the Child Art Gallary has been purchased in the month of March-1993 and actual work of establishing the gallery has been started.

The reference library of the museum has been centralised and shifted on the first floor of the museum. Efforts were also made to enrich the reference library of the museum by purchasing books on various subjects. special efforts have been made to provide required information and reference books efficiently to visitors, scholars, & students, visiting the library for reference work.

Water proofing work of the terrace of museum building was completed during the year 1992-1993.

During the year under reference approx. 4,38,309 visitors have visited the museum. The revenue of Rs. 3,59,378/- was earned by way of sale of tickets, museum guides, and fees for taking photographs etc. The expenditure incurred during the year 1992-1993 was approx. Rs. 11,89,700/-.
