CHAPTER I.

INTRODUCTION.

GENERAL.

1.1. With an area of 74705 sq.km.s and a population of ¹³⁰ 4.20 lakhs (1971) Poona Division is roughly one-fourth in size and population of the State of Maharashtra.

1.2. This division covers six districts, which are :

1. Ahmednagar,
2. P o o n a,
3. Satara,
4. Sangli,
5. Sholapur, and
6. Kolhapur

1.3. Since 1961, the boundaries of these districts have not undergone any change.

PHYSICAL FEATURES.

1.4. Geographically, Poona Division forms part of Western/^{India.} The Sahyadri Ghats and beyond them an undulating plateau make this Region.

1.5. Geologically, the basal complex of Western India consists of igneous rocks upon which rests a metamorphic series. This igneous complex has given rise to terraced hill and broad valleys.

1.6. The Sahyadri mountain which is the principal relief of this division starts from the western shoulder of the division and traverses in the south-west direction upto Shor Ghat and/^{then} goes almost straight in the southern direction. The crestline is highest at Mahabaleshwar. There is a contrast between the western and eastern flanks. The western flank of the Ghats is a fractural edge of the plateau, marked by a series of terraces, so typical of the Deccan Lava landscape. The eastern flank, on the other hand, consists of plateaus, which have fairly broad basins drained by the major plateau rivers and their tributaries.

1.7. Poona Division forms almost the beginning of the Godavari and Krishna systems, which cover about one-third portion of the Peninsular Table land. The Bhira river cuts right across the division. The rivers Shina

and Krishna have almost an equal drainage, whereas, comparatively the Godavari has a very small drainage in the Division. The Mahadev ranges separate the upper Krishna drainage from the Bhima basin. The Balaghat range distinguishes the Bhima basin from that of the Godavari,

1.8. This division has no important minerals excepting building stones, clay and limestone, which are common to all the districts. ^{Laterite} is widely formed in the western part of Satara district. Twenty villages in Jaoli and thirty villages in Patan taluka of Satara district contain iron ore in the murum below the ^{Laterite}. The ore is of low grade and unsuitable as yet for commercial exploitation. In Kolhapur district there are very large areas containing deposits of exceptionally high grade bauxite in sufficient quantities. The quality of the material is very good and is suitable for the manufacture of aluminium.

ADMINISTRATIVE PATTERN :

1.9. For purposes of administration, Poona division is divided into six districts, each district being under the control of a Collector, who is in charge of General Administration, Law and Order, Elections, Treasury, Land Revenue and Civil Supplies. The Collector of each district is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector in his office. The revenue sub-divisions of the district are in the charge of Prant Officers/Deputy Collectors. The Tahasils which are the sub-divisions of the district are under the control of Tahasildars. The powers in respect of the overall control of division are vested in the Divisional Commissioner, Poona.

1.10. Zilla Parishads were set up in the State on 1st MAY, 1962, replacing District Local Boards etc. and have been assigned local Government functions and the execution of certain works and development schemes in the Five Year Plans. The jurisdiction of a zilla parishad is a revenue district excluding therefrom the areas under Municipal Corporations, Municipal councils and Cantonnments.

SCARCITY SOLUTIONS.

1.11. The major part of the Poona division lies in the rain shadow of the Ghats with the rainfall average around

60 to 75 cm.s and in some areas even less than 50 cm.s
 Out of the eight districts in the State which are in the
 rain shadow area, five of them fall within the Poona
 division. Due to scanty rainfall, the division is
 prone to scarcity conditions.

1.12A Fact Finding Committee was appointed by the
 Government of Bombay in 1960 and it has reported that
 the rainfall is not dependable in the following areas
 and they are likely to be affected by scarcity conditions.

1.13. During the year 1969-70, the total number of vil-
 lages affected by famine, chronic scarcity and akin to
 scarcity was 393 while in 1970-71 the number was 2,469.

During the year 1969-70, there was famine and chronic scarcity in Poona district only, while in 1970-71 it affected all the districts in the division except Kolhapur.

1.14. Due to relief of land and the direction of rain-bearing winds, the distribution of rainfall varies from place to place. There are three distinct rainfall zones in the Poona Division, viz.,

- i. The Mawal tract receiving a normal rainfall of about 4,500 m.m.,
- ii. The Central zone with normal rainfall of about 900 m.m. and
- iii. The Eastern scarcity tract receiving normal rainfall of about 500 mm.

1.15. In the table given below, the deviations from normal rainfall in these three zones in 1969 & 1970 are worked out.:

1.16. It is observed from the details worked out in the table no.2 that in all the tracts except the Central Tract (and that too for only one year viz.,1969) the average rainfall was less than the normal rainfall. The deviation was quite substantial in the case of Mawal Tract.

DEMOGRAPHY :

During the decade of 1961-1971 the population of the Poona division increased from 84 lakhs to 130 lakhs giving a decadal growth rate of 25.39 per cent as against 27.26 for the State of Maharashtra. In this division the districts of Ahmednagar, Poona and Kolhapur have registered a higher percentage of population growth compared to the State average (27.6 per cent, 28.6 per cent and 28.1 per cent respectively).

1.18. In the table given on the following page the salient demographic features pertaining to the six districts in the Division of the division as a whole and of Maharashtra State are presented.

1.19. The data shows that the percentage of workers to total population has declined in all the districts. This is due to the changed concept of worker adopted at the time of 1971 Census.

1.20. The indicator of density per sq.km. of population is significant in the context of provision of civic amenities. In this division, the density in all the districts excepting Ahmednagar district is higher than that for the division as a whole and the State.

1.21. As regards literacy, the progress in Satara district is found to be unsatisfactory. In all the other five districts the increase in the percentage favourably compares with that of the State. However, the absolute percentage of literacy is higher than that of the State in only Poona district.

1.22. The ratio between dependents (age groups 0-14 and 60+) and 100 of supporting (age-group 15-59) population has an economic significance. The dependency ratios as per 1961 Population (data regarding 1971 Census is yet to be published) in all the six districts of the

this division are higher than that for Maharashtra, Poona district stands at one end with the dependency ratio of 83.6 and Satara at the other end with the ratio of 101.6 ^{as} compared to the ratio of 84.9 for the State and 93.2 for the Division. The high dependency ratios may be due to migration to urban places outside the district.

C H A P T E R- II.

EXPLANATORY NOTE.

2.1. In part II of this Abstract comprehensive data on a wide range of topics such as climate, Area and Population, Agriculture, Animal Husbandry & Forest, Industry, Employment, Electricity, Co-operation, Medical and Public Health, Education, Transport & Communication, Local Bodies, Plan and Community Development, Prices, etc., are presented. This chapter is meant to explain the various terms used in the Abstract and to give the scope and limitations of the statistical data.

2.2. The information published in this Statistical Abstract covers the six districts in the Poona division, viz., Ahmednagar, Poona, Satara, Sangli, Sholapur and Kolhapur and is given districtwise, wherever feasible for inter-district comparison.

2.3. Most of the data pertains to two years, namely 1969-70 and 1970-71 or calendar year 1969 and 1970. In the case of some subjects, however, data for 1968-69 and 1969-70 are given as data for 1970-71 are not available. The reference years in respect of each table are mentioned in the table itself. The sources for the Divisional Statistical Abstract are the District Statistical Abstracts of the division, which in turn are compiled from various agencies, which are indicated at the bottom of each table.

2.4. Poona Division at a glance : In this table comparative statistics on important indicators like population, Agriculture, Industry etc., are presented with a view to showing where Poona division stands in relation to the Maharashtra State. Against each item, the period to which the figures concerning Poona division and Maharashtra relate is given.

The figure against cultivable area in the Poona division and the State includes net area sown, current fallows, other fallows, land under miscellaneous trees and groves not included in net area sown and cultivable waste land.

2.5. C l i m a t e :- Two tables cover the data on this subject : one pertains to rainfall and the other to temperature. The terms 'mean maximum,' and 'mean minimum' used in the table on temperature data denote the averages of

maximum and minimum temperatures observed daily during the year. The mean temperature is the average of the mean maximum and mean minimum temperature thus arrived at.

2.6. As regards rainfall data, it may be stated that the figures of normal rainfall are worked out on the basis of actual rainfall for the periods ranging from a minimum of five years to a maximum of eighty years. Regarding rainy days, a day is treated as a rainy day, if during the twenty-four hours the rain gauge records a minimum of 2.5 m.m. of rainfall.

2.7. Area and Population.

Under this head six tables based on the final figures of 1961 Census data and one table on the provisional data of 1971 Census are prepared. Data on urban and rural population, number of workers and non-workers etc., are presented in these tables.

2.8. Regarding urban and rural areas, it may be noted that an urban area is a place which has a municipality, a cantonment or a civil line or a population of 5,000 or over with at least $\frac{3}{4}$ th of male population dependent on ^{non-agricultural} pursuits. The term village denotes a statutorily recognised village having a defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, wadies are not treated as separate villages. Forest villages make an exception. They are population centres situated within reserved forest areas. Their population consists mainly of forest labourers and their families. Such forest villages are also treated as villages. As regards 'workers' and 'non-workers', the former includes all those who are mainly occupied in some economically productive work. The concept of workers has, however, undergone a slight change at the time of enumeration for 1971 census. According to the 1961 definition, all those seasonal workers who had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the season were treated as workers. In 1971, the persons who had worked in the current or last working season for the greater part of the season were treated as workers. Thus the 1971 instructions stipulated that a person primarily engaged in household duties or those who were students and helped in the family economic activity, but not on a full-time scale, should be treated as 'non-workers' in respect of their main activity

economic
and the/own activity in which they were marginally engaged might be considered as their secondary work.

2.9. Agriculture :

Under this head ten tables are presented and they cover various aspects of development on the agricultural front, such as the yield rates and outturn of principal crops, area irrigated by different sources, famine scarcity and akin to scarcity data etc.

2.10 In the table on 'land utilisation' various terms are used, the meaning of which is given below :-

2.11 Under 'Forest' are included all actually forested areas or lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether State-owned or private. If any portion of such land is not actually/wooded but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land. Land put to non-agricultural uses stands for all lands occupied by buildings, roads and railways or under water, e.g., rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agricultural, barren and unculturable lands cover all barren and unculturable lands, like mountains, deserts, etc. Land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost, is classed as unculturable, whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. Culturable waste includes all lands available for cultivation whether not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in succession. Permanent pastures and other grazing lands cover all grazing lands, whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not. Under 'miscellaneous tree crops and groves not included in the net area sown' is included all cultivable land which is not included under net area sown but put to some agricultural use. Lands under casurina trees, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other groves for fuel etc., which are not included under orchards are classed under this category. Current fallows comprises cropped areas which are kept fallow during the current year. Other fallow land includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and not more than five years.

2.12.2.11. The data on yield rates and outturn of principal crops are given in table no.11. The figures of out-turn are based on estimates worked out on the results of crop-cutting surveys and partly on 'Annewari' method.

2.13.2.2. Animal Husbandry & Forest.

Information on livestock, slaughter houses, forest products and area under forests etc., are incorporated in this section. The livestock data are based on quinquennial censuses conducted throughout the country on uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration. At these censuses, all the livestock is enumerated by house to house inquiry. Particular care is taken to enumerate livestock in slaughter houses, stray animals in transit.

2.14.2.13. The data regarding area under forests is shown separately for the forests under the control of the States Forest Department and those under the control of the State's Revenue Department. The areas are classified according to legal status into reserved, protected and unclassed forests. Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber/^{production} and in which rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid; rights of grazing or cultivation is allowed but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassed forest refers to the inaccessible forest or unoccupied waste.

2.15.2.14. The forest area shown in table no.24 does not tally with the area under forest shown in the table on land utilisation (table no.9). The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons :-

- i. In the forest statistics, the whole area including non-wooded area under the control of Forest Department is taken as area under forests while in Agriculture statistics, it is classified according to its actual utilisation.
- ii. The forest Department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose and indicate the ownership of the forest areas. The actual utilisation of these areas is not so important from their point of view.
- iii. The Forest Department returns relate to financial years while Agriculture statistics relate to the

2.15. Employment, Industry & Electricity.

2.15. This section covers factory statistics, data furnished by Employment Exchange, Census of Govt. employees, generation and consumption of electricity and number of towns and villages electrified along with population covered.

2.17. Factory statistics cover the following types of factories registered under the Factories' Act : 1948.-

- i. Those employing ten or more workers, working with the aid of power,
- ii. Those employing twenty or more workers and working without the aid of power, and,
- iii. Those registered under section 85 of the Act under which the State Government makes applicable the provisions of the Act even though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However, defence factories are excluded.

2.18. The results of the Annual Survey of Industries, 1966 are given in table no.33. The term productive capital used in the table consists of fixed and working capital. Gross output represents value of products and by-products manufactured for sale, work done for customers and sale value of goods sold in the same condition as purchased and is adjusted for the difference in stocks of semi-finished goods at the beginning and at the end of the survey year. Value added by manufacture is computed by deducting from the gross ex-factory value of output, the gross value of input. Value added is net of depreciation. Under the Census sector, factories employing 50 or more workers with aid of power or those employing 100 or more workers without the aid of power are completely enumerated. The sample part generally comprised all factories employing less than 50 workers with the aid of power and less than 100 workers without the aid of power and factories under section 85 of the Factories' Act. The figures given in the table are based on actuals of the reporting census sector factories and estimates of sample sector factories.

2.19. Co-operation :

Statistical information showing the development of the co-operative movement in its various aspects such as number of different types of co-operative societies working in Poona division, operation of primary co-operative marketing societies and of

other societies, statistics pertaining to co-operative banks, etc. is given in table no.s from 36 to 43.

2.20. The co-operative year starts in July and ends in June.

2.21. Medical and Public Health :

Four tables covering data on vital statistics, vaccination and medical facilities are prepared and incorporated in this section. The data on vital statistics was collected through revenue agency in rural areas and for urban areas it is a statutory function of municipalities and municipal corporations.

2.22. Education :

Salient features of progress of education in the Poona Division are presented in this section. Three tables giving literacy data are based on the 1961 Census. The classification of institutions (table no.51) according to type is different from stages of education. There are at present many secondary schools which also impart education in primary courses. Nevertheless the entire enrolment of students ^{is} included under secondary education. In table no.55 classification of towns and villages without primary schools or schooling facilities is given. Villages with schooling facilities include smaller villages (generally below 300 population) which cannot be ^{given} independent school or economic reasons and are, therefore, attached for schooling facility to bigger villages or to urban areas within a walking distance of one mile from them.

2.23. Transport & Communication :

Statistical information on various modes of transport, information on Postal, Telegraph and Telephone statistics, Rural Broadcasting statistics are incorporated in this section. The statistics relating to railway length in the country are initially compiled by Railway ^{authorities.} But these statistics are according to railway zones and the districtwise break-up is not available. The districtwise figures had, therefore, to be compiled by referring to railway timetables and the railway map. The length within the district was, therefore, considered to the limit of railway station.

2.24. Local Bodies : One table giving the information regarding the income and expenditure of local bodies, i.e., village panchayats, zilla parishad, municipal councils, municipal corporations and cantonment boards is included under this head.

2.25. Plan and Community Development :

Under this section four tables are prepared. The first two (no.s 67 and 68) tables give important plan statistics, viz., Plan expenditure under different head/sub-heads of development and important physical achievements. The other two tables give data regarding the Community Development programme and expenditure incurred in different stages of blocks.

2.26: P r i c e s :

Two tables giving the average retail prices of important commodities and consumer price index numbers comprise this section. Regarding the table giving average retail prices of important commodities, it may be noted that the prices are the averages of those given in the District Statistical Abstracts of this division. Moreover, the prices are restricted to only one quotation obtained from only one shop at the district head-quarter and as such they are just indicative of the trend in prices and are not fully representative.

2.27. Miscellaneous :

Data on some subjects like cinema statistics, collection of small savings, land revenue^{etc.} which could not be incorporated under any of the twelve major heads noted above are presented in this section. Trends in some selected indicators of development are given in the last table.

CHAPTER III.

AN ANALYTICAL REVIEW OF SECTORIAL ABSTRACTS :1970-71.

3.1. The data presented in part II of this Abstract are analytically examined in this chapter with a view to ascertaining the trend in the various sectors of the divisional economy. Inter-district comparison as well as the position of the Poona Division vis-a-vis the State of Maharashtra is given, wherever possible.

AGRICULTURE :

3.2. In Maharashtra, as in India, agriculture is the most important activity and among the least productive. Though about seventy per cent of the State's population depends on agriculture and allied activities as its main source of livelihood the contribution of that sector to the State's domestic product is limited only to 34%.

3.3. Since land is a factor of production which cannot be augmented to any considerable extent, how the available land is utilized assumes economic importance. During 1969-70 out of the total geographical area of 75025 hundred hectares of the division, the net area sown was 51276 hundred hectares, i.e., about 68 per cent of it. Barren and unculturable land claimed about 8 per cent of the total geographical area, while the share of cultivable waste, current fallows and other fallows was 2%, 4% and 5% respectively, i.e., together these four items constituted as much as 19 per cent of the geographical area.

3.4. Since agricultural production is a function both of area sown and yield rate, it is necessary to ascertain the trends in these fields.

The table given on next page brings out the picture in respect of double cropping.

3.5. The above data show that the extent of double cropping is very small in the division as well as in the State. Not only the percentage in the division is small, there has not been any progress at all; in fact the percentage gross cropped area declined by 0.86 points in 1968-69, and by 0.57 points in 1969-70 as compared to 1960-61. The districtwise position indicates that barring Poona and Satara districts, all the remaining districts had the percentage less than that of the division in all the three years under reference. However, in these two districts also, the percentage gross cropped area declined in 1969-70 as compared to that in 1960-61. Only Sholapur district is an exception, where the percentage increased from 103.05 in 1960-61 to 103.57 in 1968-69 and to 104.10 in 1969-70. The overall picture is thus one of stagnation and in some cases deterioration.

3.6. The above indicator of percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown, however, gives only a partial picture. Because it shows gross cropped area as a percentage of net cropped area, which is not constant. It thus only indicates whether the change in the gross cropped area was commensurate with the change in the net area sown or not. A comparative position for the three years, showing the absolute figures of net area sown and area sown more than once will complete the picture. The relevant data bring out the very disturbing fact that in this division the net area sown declined by as much as 58200 hectares in 1968-70 as compared to 1960-61 (net area sown in 1960-61 was 51,85,800 hectares and in 1968-70 51,27,600 hectares) and the area sown more than once by 33,000 hectares (area sown more than once in 1960-61 was 3,00,600 hectares and in 1968-70, 2,67,600 hectares). Thus, the gross cropped area had a fall of about 91,000 hectares. The position in 1968-69 was, however, better as compared to 1960-61 (the gross cropped area in 1968-69 was higher than that of 1960-61 by 71,000 hectares.) There is thus no consistent and sustained progress in this respect indicating that agricultural operations are still at the mercy of the monsoon and the vagaries of nature.

3.7. The National Council of Applied Economic Research, New Delhi, has pointed out in the ' Techno-Economic Survey of Maharashtra ' that

" While inadequacy of data makes it impossible to hazard any firm estimates, it is fairly clear that excluding double cropping on rain fed lands which in many cases will yield only fodder; the potential additions to crop area compared to the area already under cultivation will be small for increasing the output of food-grains and raw materials Maharashtra,

like other States will have to rely mostly on improving the productivity of existing cultivated areas through irrigation, conservation and better techniques ".

IRRIGATION :

3.8. The net area irrigated from all sources in the division increased from 5100 hundred hectares in 1960-61 to 5577 hundred hectares in 1969-70, i.e., by 9.35 per cent. The gross irrigated area increased by 10.7 per cent during the same period.

3.9. If the data for 1969-70 are considered and the districts are ranked on the basis of the above indices, the order would be Kolhapur, Sangli, Ahmednagar,

Satara, Sholapur and Poona. In fact the progress was very poor in the last three districts. The overall position of the division vis-a-vis the State is also not satisfactory. The only redeeming feature is that the position of Kolhapur and Sangli districts in 1969-70 was rather very good, with the indices higher than even those for the State as a whole.

3.10. The above information gives only the extent of absolute increase in irrigation facilities. It is necessary, therefore, to ascertain the percentage of irrigated area. In the following table the relevant data are presented.

3.11. It is observed from the information given in the table that the position of the districts

as well as the division was quite satisfactory. as compared to the State percentages. Inter-district comparison shows that in all the three reference years the percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown was higher than that of the division in the case of Ahmednagar and Satara districts; while in Kolhapur district it was less only in 1960-61. In the remaining districts it was low in comparison with the division but higher than the State.

3.12. In columns 6 to 8 another type of data are presented. That data indicate the extent of the area which was irrigated twice or in other words the area which had assured irrigation during the whole year. Here also, the position of the division vis-a-vis the State was comfortable.

3.13. Availability of irrigation facilities has a bearing on the crop pattern, the data in respect of which are presented in the following tables-

3.14. The cropping pattern shows a distinct shift from cultivation of cereals and

pulses, i.e., foodgrains to non-food crops. In 1960-61, the net area sown was 51858 hundred hectares, which declined to 51276 hundred hectares in 1969-70. The area sown more than once also had a fall from 3006 hundred hectares to 2676 hundred hectares. There has, however, been an increase in both net irrigated and gross irrigated areas. The area under sugarcane increased from 1112 hundred hectares in 1960-61 to 1622 hundred hectares in 1969-70. It is thus evident that increased facilities of irrigation were mainly utilized not for growing a second crop where only one crop was grown before but for the cultivation of perennial crops (sugarcane). It had also no positive effect on the net area sown (which, in fact, declined). This analysis corroborates the earlier quote from N.C.A.E.R. Study that the potential additions to crop area, compared to the area already under cultivation will be small.

3.15. Maharashtra has a deficit in foodgrain production. As already pointed out in chapter no. 2, scarcity conditions are not infrequent in the Poona division. Before ascertaining the extent of deficit in the Poona division, it would be pertinent to find out the trend in the yield rates of the principal crops. The Data are given below :-

3.16. The trend does not indicate any break-through on the agricultural front. On the contrary, excepting Wheat, all other crops have registered a decline in the yield rates as compared to those in the base year (1962-63).

of the districts published in the Annual Public Health Report, 1968 by the Public Health Department.

3.18. A yearly deficit of about three and half lakh tonnes underlines the gravity of the problem and gives an idea about the Herculean efforts required to be made to wipe out the deficit.

3.19. Since animal power is predominantly used for carrying out various agricultural operations, gross cropped area per pair of working bullocks would give an indication about the improvement or otherwise in this direction. The relevant statistics shows that in 1961, the gross cropped area per pair of working bullocks was 7.93 hectares as against 7.89 hectares in 1966 indicating insignificant improvement.

CO-OPERATION :

3.20. Since the average agriculturist has not sufficient economic resources, institutional credit plays a very important role. In Maharashtra, the Co-operative movement has made considerable strides. In the sphere of agriculture, short-term and medium term loans are advanced by the Primary Agricultural Credit Societies. The relevant data for assessing the trend in credit facilities made available by the Primary Agril. Credit Societies are given on the following page.

3.21. The review (on following page) highlights the unsound and deteriorating financial health of the Societies. The quantum of loans advanced nearly doubled in 1970-71 as compared to the year 1961-62. However, the loans outstanding increased more than fourfold and stood at the ^{staggering} level of Rs.58 crores in 1970-71. ^{Overdues} also increased and were more than two times (Rs. 17 crores) the 1961-62 level. The recovery percentage in the Food Division

during the years 1969-70 and 1970-71 was about 70 percent only. The position is indeed alarming.

CONSUMPTION OF ELECTRICITY.

3.22. Electricity is one of the most important items in the infra-structure of an economy with its varied uses. The trend in the availability of electric power can be assessed by working out the per capita consumption of electricity.

3.23. The districtwise trend in this respect can be gauged from the table given on the following page.

3.24. The data on the following page (on table no.8) indicate that the per capita consumption of electricity increased by leaps and bounds during the period under review. If the divisional per-capita consumption is taken into consideration, it is observed that the same ^{is} increased more than five-fold from 1961-62 to 1970-71. The districtwise position

shows all round progress. The increase in consumption was very spectacular in Kolhapur district where it increased from 13.27 Kwh to 225.24 Kwh.

3.25. As on 31/3/1971, the number of villages and towns electrified stood at 2,728 and 63 respectively, i.e., about 58 per cent of the villages were yet to be electrified.

3.26. The per capita consumption of electricity gives an indication about the overall use of electric power. Since industrial activity depends to a very great extent on the availability of electric power the percentage of consumption of electric power by industries would be a good indicator to gauge the same.

3.27. If the districts are ranked according to the percentages in 1961-62; 1. Sholapur, 2. Sangli, 3. Poona, (4) Ahmednagar, 5. Kolhapur ^{and} Satara would be the sequence. In 1969-70 a very different picture is obtained. Poona district made tremendous progress in this respect and it occupied the number 1 position in the division by displacing Sholapur district which ranked second. Satara district moved up, while Sangli and Ahmednagar districts moved down.

UNEMPLOYMENT.

3.28. It is a known fact that the number of unemployed and under-employed persons is quite alarming and every year the number goes on swelling. However, comprehensive statistics on this most vital subject are still lacking. Only Employment Exchange data are available and it only reveals the top of the ^{ice-berg.} ~~ice-berg.~~

3.29. The figures in table no.10 bring out the gravity of the unemployment problem. The percentage of placement to total registration which during the year 1961-62 was 10.45 (and this percentage itself was very small) declined to 7.83 in 1969-70 and still further down to 7.15 in 1970-71.

PUBLIC HEALTH.

3.30. The general aim of public health programme is to expand existing health services, to bring them increasingly within the reach of all the people and to promote a progressive improvement in the level of national health. Provision of adequate institutional facilities is one of the programmes.

3.31. From the above information it is clear that availability of medical facility in terms of hospitals, doctors and beds has declined. Only in the case of nurses the position has improved. It is obvious that increase in the facilities has not been able to keep pace with the increase in population.

3.32. Though the above data does not include medical facilities available through the private sector it is felt that the above results will not be much vitiated because private medical practitioners and hospitals are not evenly spread over the division; but are concentrated in major cities and urban areas only.

3.33. The general health standards of the people can be broadly assessed from the birth rate, death rate and infant mortality rate.

3.34. It is seen that birth rate, death rate as well as infant mortality rate declined in 1969 and 1970 as compared to the rates in 1961. For the

Maharashtra State, the respective rates in 1970 were 28.1, 10.3 and 70. The divisional figures compare favourably with those for Maharashtra.

EDUCATION.

3.35. For increasing the productive capacity of the economy, education is a must. It helps to make people aware of the need for development and equip them with specific skills to participate in the development process.

3.36. In the Poona division, educational facilities ^{have} spread rapidly. As on 31st MARCH, 1971, there were only 134 villages without primary schools or schooling facilities. Sexwise increase in the number of pupils is given below :-

3.37. As compared to 1968-69, in 1969-70 there was an increase in the number of pupils both in Secondary and Higher Education Institutions. In respect of Primary education, however, there was only marginal increase in the case of boys; while in respect of girls, there was quite a fall in the enrolment.

3.38. In 1968-69 the number of students per teacher in Primary and Secondary institutions was 40 and 26 respectively, while the corresponding figures for 1969-70 were 38 and 26.

TRANSPORT.

3.39. The role of transport in a planned economy hardly needs any emphasis. Provisions of adequate

transport facilities is an essential pre-requisite to the development of backward areas.

3.40. The total railway length in the Poona Division as on 31/3/1971 was 1,282 km., out of which the broad gauge length was 602 km., i.e., 47 per cent of the total length.

3.41. As regards road length, the following table gives the districtwise position :-

3.42. If the above achievements are compared with the original Nagpur Plan target of 16 km. road length per 100 sq.km.area, all the districts in this division have exceeded the planned road length. The road length in Kolhapur district is a little more than double the targeted length; in Poona and Satara, it is about two and half times and in Sangli district about three times.

BANKING.

3.43. The banking system constitutes the nerve centre of the economy. In a developing country like India, banking facilities are not spread over the entire area. Branch expansion has, therefore, become

3.44. It is observed that the progress in Satara and Sholapur districts is rather poor as compared to that in the other districts.

PRICES.

3.45. In the Poona division, Sholapur and Poona centres are selected for working out Consumer Price Index numbers. The base period for Sholapur centre is 1960 and for Poona 1961. The average general index for Sholapur centre was 176 in 1969-70. The index rose to ¹⁸⁵ in 1970-71. For Poona centre the corresponding indices were 163 and 170 respectively.

CHAPTER No. IV.

ANNUAL PLAN : 1970-1971.

4.1. The year 1970-71 was the second year of the Fourth Five Year Plan. However, in the absence of the finalisation of the draft of the Fourth Five Year Plan of India, the State Plan could not be finalised and it was, therefore, implemented on annual basis only, keeping in view the plan perspective.

4.2. The total plan expenditure of the State during the year 1970-71 was to the tune of Rs. 139 crores as against Rs. 137 crores in the year 1969-70. The corresponding expenditure in the Poona division under both the State and Local sector schemes was Rs. 26 crores and Rs. 23 crores respectively.

4.3. The ^{major} headwise expenditure in the Poona division during the years 1969-70 and 1970-71 is given on the following page.

4.4. The Plan provision for the year 1970-71 was Rs. 26.92 crores as against which the actual expenditure was Rs. 25.58 crores, i.e., about 95 per cent of the budgetted amount was expended. The corresponding figures for the previous year were Rs. 21.92 crores and Rs. 22.56 crores, i.e., in the year 1969-70, the actual expenditure was more than the budget provision. During the year 1970-71 out of the total expenditure of Rs. 25.58 crores, sixty per cent amount was spent on district level schemes and the remaining amount on divisional level schemes. During the year 1969-70, the district level schemes claimed a higher share (65 per cent) of the total expenditure.

4.5. Looking at the allocation on the major heads ^{of} development, it is observed that there was a significant fall in the percentage share of Agriculture and allied programmes while that of Irrigation and Power increased.

AGRICULTURE & ALLIED PROGRAMMES.					

4.6. Emphasis on agricultural programmes is on measures to improve the productivity of land by adoption of new technology. Maharashtra is not endowed with natural advantages. Low fertility of soil, undulating topography, scanty and erratic rainfall in large areas make the task of increasing the agricultural productivity a challeng-ing task.

4.7. The Plan efforts made in this respect in the Poona division can be seen from the following table, which gives the expenditure made on various sub-heads of development under Agricultural Programmes.

4.8. - In the year 1969-70, 95 per cent and in the year 1970-71 93 per cent budget grants were actually utilized under the major head of Development, Agricultural Programmes. In the year 1970-71 actual expenditure exceeded the budget provision in the case of Soil Conservation and Warehousing and Marketing. In the case of Fisheries all grants were exhausted. In that year, financial achievement was rather good in respect of all other minor heads of development excepting Animal Husbandry and Dairy Development.

4.9. Out of the nine minor heads of development, divisional level schemes were implemented in respect of only Animal Husbandry. (Total expenditure Rs.6.72 lakh in the year 1970-71). The rest of the schemes were district level ones.

Minor Head : Agricultural Production.

4.10. The strategy of increasing agricultural production mainly hinges on the use of improved seeds, chemical fertilisers and irrigation. This scheme was implemented at district level only with a total expenditure of Rs.40.45 lakhs in the year 1970-71 as against Rs.39.48 lakhs in the year 1969-70. The percentage of expenditure to the budget provision was 92 and 97 respectively, indicating a shortfall in financial achievements.

The physical achievements show that the quantity of improved foodgrain seeds (Jowar, Wheat, Bajra, Paddy, Maize and Gram) distributed during the year 1970-71 was less than half of that in the year 1969-70 (19,757 quintals and 40,593 quintals respectively). The quantity of chemical fertilisers distributed during the year 1970-71 was, however, quite appreciable as compared to the distribution in the previous year (90,310 tonnes and 64,428 tonnes respectively). The total compost prepared under the scheme of Development of Local Manurial Resources (Town compost) was 2.54 lakh tonnes in the year 1970-71, (target 2.60 lakh tonnes) as against 2.44 lakh tonnes in the year 1969-70. The central scheme for maximising production of cotton was implemented in Ahmednagar and Satara

districts of this division and the total area covered in the year 1970-71 was 21,619 hectares as against the target of about 18,000 hectares. In Poona and Satara districts the scheme of Intensive cultivation of food crops was put through with a total coverage of 1.47 lakh hectares which fell short of the targetted area by about 19,000 hectares.

Minor Head : . Minor Irrigation.

4.11. By spending an amount of Rs.283.62 lakhs in the year 1970-71, 2,731 new wells were constructed, 844 old wells were repaired, 3,332 pump sets were installed, 32 percolation tanks and bandharas were constructed and 7 bandharas were repaired. The additional irrigation potential created by these measures was 12,061 hectares as against 9,700 hectares in the preceding year.

Minor Head : . Soil Conservation.

4.12. On this minor head of development maximum amount of Rs.343.24 lakhs was spent in the year 1970-71. Contour bunding, terracing, land development-cum-horticulture, reclamation of non-coastal alkaline and saline land and water logged lands, afforestation for soil conservation are the five district level schemes covered under this head. The total area banded in the division during the year 1970-71 was 1.08 lakh hectares, while the area terraced was 4,100 hectares. The corresponding figures for the year 1969-70 are 1.69 lakh hectares and 3,273 hectares respectively. Under the scheme of 'land development-cum-horticulture' cashew plantation was done in 250 hectares in Kolhapur district as against the target of 292 hectares.

Minor head : 4. Ayacut Development.

4.13. By incurring an expenditure of Rs.15.25 lakhs in the year 1970-71, 1,271 hectares of land in A'nagar district and 2,829 hectares in Poona district were brought under tractor ploughing and land development was done in ^{1886 hect} in A'nagar dist. 333 hect. in Poona district and 401 hectares in Sholapur district. The physical achievements under both the schemes were below the target.

Minor head : F. Animal Husbandry :

4.14. This scheme was implemented both at the divisional

and district level. The divisional level schemes pertain to provision of veterinary aid (Polyclinics), establishment and expansion of cattle breeding farms and bull depots, establishment of sheep farms, poultry breeding farms and intensive poultry development blocks. The total divisional level expenditure on all these schemes was to the tune of Rs.6.72 lakhs in the year 1970-71. During the year the work of cattle breeding farm and bull depot at Jath in Sangli district was nearly completed, the polyclinic at Sholapur was continued and at Kirkee in Poona district the work of godown for poultry breeding farm was in progress.

4.15. Provision of veterinary dispensaries and aid centres are the two district level schemes.

4.16. During the year 1970-71, eight veterinary dispensaries and aid centres were started, while the number of artificial insemination centres started was 20.

Minor head: 6. Dairy Development.

4.17. Town milk supply, loans for purchase of cattle, and assistance to milk unions and federations, are the three schemes implemented under this head. The expenditure incurred in the year 1969-70 was Rs.24.86 lakhs, which increased to Rs.35.02 lakhs in the year 1970-71. Under the Town Milk Supply scheme, 1,08,999 litres of milk were handled per day in the division during the year 1970-71 as against the target of 1,25,500 litres. During that year 33 Milk Sanghs were given loans for purchase of cattle. The no. of co-operative societies and milk federations assisted was 61 in the year 1970-71; while the corresponding number was 172 in the year 1969-70.

Minor head : 7. Forests.

4.18. In the year 1969-70, 815 hectares of area was afforested and in 280 hectares valuable trees were planted. The corresponding areas in the year 1970-71 were 1,421 and 332 hectares respectively. The total expenditure in the year 1969-70 was Rs.5.46 lakhs and Rs.7.80 lakhs in the year 1970-71.

Minor head : 8. Fisheries.

4.19. The expenditure on this head was very small.

Rs.61,000 in the year 1969-70 and Rs.77,000 in the year 1970-71. During the year 1969-70, about 22 lakh fingerlings were stocked, which increased to 39 lakhs in the year 1970-71. The weight of fish netted stood at the same level of ^{about} 2 lakh kg., in the years 1969-70 & 1970-71.

Minor head : 9. Warehousing and Marketing.

4.20. Under the district level scheme of development of agricultural marketing, an expenditure of Rs.4.57 lakhs was made during the year 1970-71 for giving loans to ten Agricultural Produce Market Committees for purchase of land and development of market yard and subsidies to 34 Agricultural Produce Market Committees, for propoganda and publicity.

Head of Development : 10. CO-OPERATION & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT.

4.21. Co-operatives play an important role in the transformation of the economy and the uplift of the weaker section of the community. The schemes under this major head of development are implemented both at district and division level.

4.22. The financial achievements in both the years 1969-70 and 1970-71 were very satisfactory. In the former year as against the budget provision of Rs.52.29 lakhs, the actual expenditure was Rs.116.26 lakhs and in the year under review the actual expenditure was Rs.111.68 lakhs as against the budget provision of Rs.86.79 lakhs.

4.23. During the year 1970-71, out of the total expenditure of Rs.111.68 lakhs, Rs.97 lakhs were spent on division level schemes and Rs.14.68 lakhs on district level schemes. The expenditure in the year 1969-70 was slightly higher : Rs.100.65 lakhs on divisional level schemes and Rs.15.61 lakh on district level schemes.

4.24. All the expenditure incurred in the year 1970-71 at the division level was for assisting eight co-operative sugar factories in the division as against the target of only four factories.

At the district level, schemes like 'strengthening of co-operative credit structure', 'development of co-operative

marketing, co-operative farming, etc., were implemented. During the year 1969-70 13 Agricultural Credit Societies, 12 farming societies, one processing society, 27 lift irrigation societies, 103 industrial co-operative societies and 15 handloom weavers' societies were formed. The corresponding number in the year 1970-71 was 5, 7, 10, 10, 23 and 38 respectively.

4.25. In the year 1970-71, under the scheme of 'strengthening of co-operative credit structure, two branches of C.F.A.s were opened in A'nagar district and seven in Kolhapur district. The number of branches assisted was 2 each in A'nagar, Satara and Kolhapur districts. Under the scheme of 'Development of co-operative marketing, subsidies for godowns were given to 54 societies, as against the target of 27 and while share capital contribution was made to 17 societies as against the target of eight societies.

4.26. Under the Community Development programme, which was launched in the year 1952 as a method for organising the rural community for undertaking numerous activities for the benefit of the local area with the active participation of the people are now covered all the blocks in this division. The schemes under this head are obviously implemented at district level only.

4.27. In the year 1970-71 under this head a total expenditure of Rs.55.81 lakhs was incurred which was more than that of the preceding year by Rs.11.17 lakhs. The budget provision in the year 1969-70 was Rs.47.58 lakhs and in the year 1970-71 Rs.59.35 lakhs. Composite programme for women and children, applied nutrition programme are some of the important schemes implemented under this programme. Under the first scheme, seven blocks were covered in this division, (two in A'nagar district and one each in the remaining five districts.). The applied nutrition of programme was continued in 12 blocks in the division.

Head of Development : : IRRIGATION & POWER.

4.28. One of the basic determinants of agricultural productivity is the availability of water in adequate quantities and at the right time. There has been a steady expansion of irrigation facilities ever since the inception of

Planning.

4.29. The programme of major and medium irrigation projects was implemented at division level at a cost of Rs.708.41 lakhs in the year 1970-71 as against Rs.548.36 lakhs in the year 1969-70. In both the years budget grants were not fully utilised.

4.30. Availability of power accelerated the pace of industrial and agricultural development. Maharashtra has made very impressive progress in power development.

4.31. In the Poona division, the programme of electrification was implemented at both district and division level in the year 1970-71. The financial side shows that during that year Rs.67.48 lakhs were utilised for implementing district level schemes and Rs.78.10 lakhs on divisional level schemes. In the year 1969-70, there was no expenditure at divisional level and the whole amount of Rs.116.81 lakhs was utilised for district level schemes only. Under this programme, two district level schemes viz., 'Rural Electrification and Normal development (rural)' and 'Normal Development (^{urban})' were implemented. During the year 1969-70, 2 109 villages were electrified and 11,363 pumps were connected. The corresponding figures for the year 1970-71 were 282 and 12,874 respectively. In the year 1970-71, the divisional level expenditure of Rs.78.10 lakhs was made on 33 Kv. lines and sub-stations. There was, however, slow progress due to shortage of materials.

Head of Development : 4. INDUSTRY & MINING.

4.32. The role of the State Government in the sphere of industrial development is confined to the provision of essential infra-structure viz., land, water supply, power, communication, finance, raw materials, etc., and measures to promote dispersal of industries. The overall policies and programmes are evolved by the Central Government.

4.33. The programmes under this sector were implemented both at divisional and district levels.

4.34. The total expenditure on this head of development was Rs.121.91 lakhs in the year 1969-70 as against the budget provision of Rs.89.07 lakhs. In the year 1970-71 also the actual expenditure (Rs.100.13 lakhs) was more than the budgetted

amount (Rs.84.99 lakhs).

4.35. The divisional level schemes pertained to large and medium industries as well as small scale industries. Under the scheme of ' Organisation of co-operative processing industries five spinning mills, as against the target of 2, were granted Govt. share capital in the year 1970-71. Under the scheme of ' Industrial Estate, 'provision was made in the year 1970-71 for share capital contribution to four co-operative industrial estates for land acquisition of at A'nekar and Vita (dist. Sangli) for the development of handicraft industry/one show case was installed, one emporium was assisted and one exhibition was organised.

4.36. Under the district level schemes, which related to the small scale industries only 201 societies of handloom industry were assisted, 814 artisans were given financial assistance under S.A.I. Rules, 165 industrial co-operative societies including handicraft societies were given monetary help (including share capital/contribution).

Head of Development : . TRANSPORT & COMMUNICATIONS.

4.37. Transport and Communications play a very crucial role in economic development. The expenditure on this head was to the tune of Rs.140.44 lakhs in the year 1969-70 and Rs.187.97 lakhs in the year 1970-71. In the former year grants of about Rs.16 lakhs remained unutilised, while in the year 1970-71, the expenditure was more than the budget grants by about 6 lakhs rupees.

4.38. At the divisional level development of 'State Highways' (work of minor bridges and cross drainage works) was undertaken at a cost of Rs.57.49 lakhs in the year 1970-71.

4.39. At the district level in the year 1970-71, 184 km.s of new roads were constructed, about 9 km.s of roads were modernised and 35 kms of roads were provided with community development works. In the previous year, the corresponding physical achievements were 174 km.s, 100 km.s and 17 kms respectively. There was, however, negligible achievement in the construction of roads in hilly areas. (In the year 1969-70, no new roads were constructed in hilly areas, while in the year 1970-71, only 5 km.s of roads were constructed). Rural roads constructed in the year 1969-70 were of the length of

about 172 km. and in the year 1970-71 202 km.s.

4. Head of Development : SOCIAL SERVICES.

- 4.40. (1). General (2). Technical Education,
(3). Health and Family Planning,
(4). Water supply and drainage,
(5). Housing and urban development,
(6). Welfare of backward classes,
(7). Social welfare, and
(8). Labour and labour welfare,

are the eight minor heads of development which come under the purview of the major head of development, 'Social Services.'

Minor Head : General Education.

4.41. In the year 1969-70, an amount of Rs.81.25 lakhs and in the year 1970-71, Rs.183-02 lakhs were sanctioned in the budget for General Education, while the actual expenditure in these two years was Rs.93 lakhs and Rs.180.07 lakhs respectively. Under the divisional level schemes, research grants were given to seven college teachers against the target of ten, loans were given to five voluntary institutions for construction of hostels in rural areas (target 3 institutions) and as against the target of 517 freeships, 481 open merit freeships were given to non-B.C. students in non-Govt. colleges.

4.42. Under the district level schemes, some of the important achievements were :-

starting of primary schools : (30 in 1969-70
and 25 in
1970-71)

starting of secondary schools : (37 in 1969-70
and 44 in
1970-71)

training given to the teachers. : (1,379 teachers
in 1969-70 and
975 teachers
in 1970-71)

Minor head : Technical Education.

4.43. The actual expenditure under this head was Rs.22.02 lakhs in the year 1969-70 and Rs.25.71 lakhs in the year 1970-71 as against the budget grants of Rs.24.69 lakhs and Rs.28.30 lakhs respectively. Under the divisional

level scheme of 'Consolidation of Govt. Engineering Colleges, ' some equipment and machinery was purchased for the colleges at Poona and Karad. Open-merit and loan scholarships were given to five degree and diploma students.

Minor head : . Health & Family Planning.

4.44. The budgetted amount for this programme was Rs.135.91 lakhs in the year 1969-70 and Rs.139.19 lakhs in the year 1970-71. The expenditure incurred was Rs.124.76 lakhs in the year 1969-70 and Rs.112.04 in the year 1970-71.

4.45. Out of the six works pertaining to the construction at Miraj Medical College, one was completed and others were in progress. The work of construction of huts under the 'Leprosy control scheme ' was also in progress. In the year 1970-71, two buildings for hospitals and dispensaries were constructed, 65 additional beds were provided (1969-70 : 70 additional beds), one public health centre was started (1969-70 : two P.H.C.s). Under the rural water supply scheme, 379 villages benefited in the year 1969-70 and 333 in the year 1970-71. In the field of family planning, as against the target of 77,041 sterilisation operations, the achievement was 65,920 sterilisations.

Minor Head : . Water supply and Drainage :

4.46. As against the sanction of Rs.135.17 lakhs in 1969-70, the actual expenditure in that year was Rs.136.58 lakhs. In the year 1970-71, the corresponding amounts were Rs.147.17 lakhs and Rs.137.39 lakhs. In the year 1970-71, the works under Piped/^{water}supply, municipal water supply and drainage were in progress. In the year 1970-71, 626 drinking water wells were constructed as against 950 in the year 1969-70.

Minor head : 5. Housing & Urban Development.

4.47. The expenditure in the year 1969-70 (Rs.33.66 lakhs) exceeded the budget grants (Rs.25.65 lakhs). In the year 1970-71, however, it was less than the sanctioned amount (Budget Rs.28.39 lakhs, expenditure Rs.22.43 lakhs). Under the scheme of Urban Development, preparation of/^{regional} plan for Kolhapur-Miraj-Sangli

Region was in progress. Under the district level scheme housing for low income group (economically weaker section), 296 tenements were constructed in the year 1970-71 as against 184 in the year 1969-70 and under the village housing project scheme 108 tenements were constructed in the year 1970-71 as against none in the year 1969-70.

Minor head : C. Welfare of Backward classes.

4.48. In the year 1970-71, the expenditure was Rs.9.03 lakhs as against the budget provision of Rs.10.98 lakhs. In the year 1969-70, the corresponding amounts were Rs.11.79 lakhs and Rs.12.55 lakhs respectively.

Some of the notable achievements were :-

1. Grants of scholarship, tuition fees and examination fees to 7,577 students as against the target of 2,230 students,
2. Grants to 49 backward class hostels as against the target of 45 hostels.

Minor Head : . Social Welfare.

4.49. The budget provision in the year 1969-70 and 1970-71 was Rs.6.32 lakhs and Rs.5.05 lakhs respectively. The actual expenditure in these two years was, however, Rs.3.32 lakhs in the year 1969-70 and Rs.4.57 lakhs in the year 1970-71. Construction works under the Prevention of Begging Act were in progress. Grants were also given to remand homes.

Minor Head : . Labour & Labour Welfare.

4.50. The actual expenditure in the year 1969-70 and 1970-71 was Rs.17.74 lakhs and Rs.20.56 lakhs respectively, as against the budget grants of Rs.14.58 lakhs and Rs.17.81 lakhs. One new institution for vocational and technical training was started in each of the two years 1969-70 and 1970-71.

M i s c e l l a n e o u s :-

4.51. Only one scheme of Rural Broadcasting is covered under this head and implemented at division level with an expenditure of Rs.62,000 in the year 1969-70 and Rs.2.95 lakhs in 1970-71. As against the target of 550 Community radio sets, 372 were installed.
