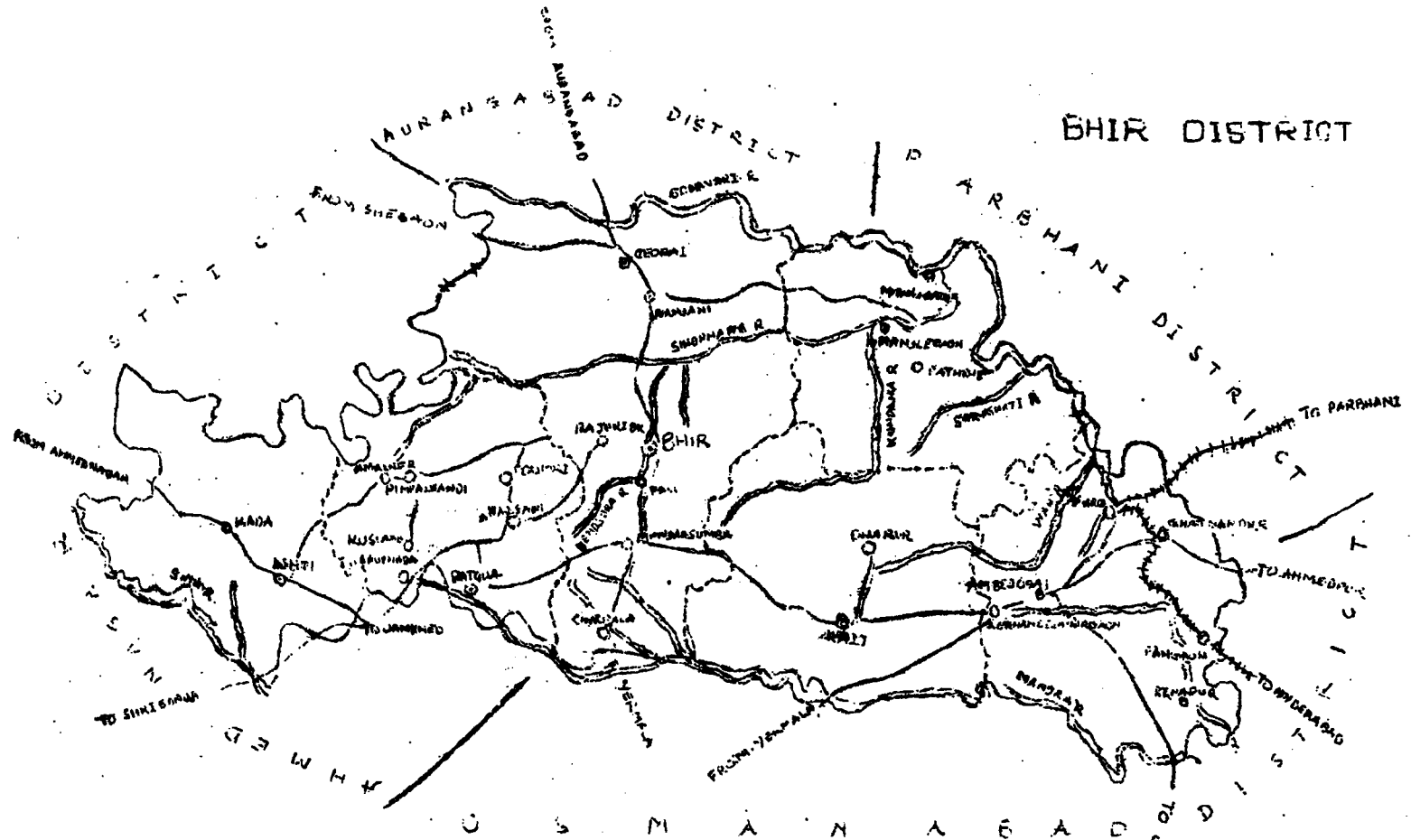

: INTRODUCTION :

1.1: Location:

Bhir district is situated more or less in the central part of the Maharashtra State. It lies between 18.3° to 19.3° North latitude and 74.3° to 76.5° East longitude, with a total geographical area of 4,216.9 sq. miles.

1.2: Boundaries:

The district has got common boundary with Parbhani and Osmanabad districts to the North, East & South east respectively. Aurangabad district has on the North and Ahmednagar district has to the West. The Godavari separates the district from Aurangabad district and the Manjra separates it from Osmanabad district.

1.3: Administrative set up:

The district has been divided into 6 talukas and 1 Mahal and they are put under two sub-divisions as detailed below:

The above table shows the district comprises 7 Towns and 1031 villages which are inhabited by population of 10,01,466 persons as per 1961 Census. There are 12 deserted villages in the district.

At the end of 31-3-1965 there were 7 Panchayat Samities functioning in the district under Bhir Zilla Parishad. Bhir town which had a population of 33,066 was left out of the Zilla Parishad and Community Development blocks while all other towns, although outside the jurisdiction of Zilla Parishad were considered for fixing size of block and their budget. At the end of 31-3-1965 there were 705 Gram Panchayats including group gram panchayats in the district. The Zilla Parishad has started functioning from 1st May 1962 with 7 Panchayat Samities and 161 members. Out of this 141 elected, 10 are associate members and 10 are co-opted members. The Chairmen of the Panchayat Samities are ex-officio members of the Zilla Parishad. President and Vice president of the Zilla Parishad are elected by the parishad from all its elected members.

Every Panchayat Samiti has a chairman and Deputy Chairman. The Zilla Parishad has got 12 sections for administration purposes and each section is looked after by Class-I or Class-II Officers. More details about Zilla Parishad are given in the Chapter on Local Bodies.

1.4: Area:

According to 1961 Census the district had an area of 4216.9 sq. miles. Out of the rural area was 4092.3 sq. miles. In terms of area the district ranks 13th in the state and lowest in the region. Since a decade there were no territorial changes in the district. Area of urban part of the district was 124.6 sq. miles because there were only 7 Towns but in 1951 it was somewhat more when there were 8 towns in the district. Within the district, Kaij taluka with an area of 691.84 sq. miles ranked first, followed next by Ambejogai and Georai with 638.72 and 618.24 sq. miles respectively. Patoda (Mahal) having an area of 510.08 sq. miles is the smallest taluka (Mahal).

1.5: Topography:

The ranges of Balaghat lie on west to east side and most part of the district on north and south side is plain. The hilly tracts are spread over the parts of Ashti, Patoda, Bhir, Kaij and Ambejogai talukas, with a few forests areas. Due to the ranges of Balaghat the district is divided into high and low tracts. The district is broken with elevation between 300 and 900 meters.

1.6: Hills, Rivers & Soils:

The central part of the district is covered by Balaghat and its ranges and having stony soil. Due to these hills the part of Bhir taluka is not so fertile and the soil is of medium type. Major part of Patoda (Mahal) and Ashti taluka is covered by the hills and it is deserted when compared with Kaij and Ambejogai talukas. The main rivers of the district are Godavari, Manjra, Kundka, Sindphana, Bindsura, Van and Sina. Sindphana, Kundka, Van and Manjra rise from the Balaghat hills and the river Manjra rises from Patoda (Mahal). There are few small rivers in the district namely, Kampli, Mehkari, Talwad and Kada.

The soil of the district besides the hilly tracts is fertile and black and suitable for crops like, Jowar, Groundnut, Bajra and Moong. The type of soils found in the district, are black, laterite, barad and white soil. Barad and white soil at Patoda is poor in fertility. The soils along the banks of Sindphana, Godavari and Manjra are deep black and rich in fertility. The elevated plateaux of Georai and Manjlegaon taluka has light to medium black soil. In few parts of the district brown soil is also found where the fertility of land is of medium type.

1.7: Climate:

The climate of the district is moderate. In general it is pleasant during most part of the year though summer is rather hot. Patoda Mahal and Kaij taluka are having cool climate even in summer. The location of some of the places from the sea level is high and hence the climate at these places is agreeable in all seasons. The height of Bhir, Ambejogai and Patoda from the sea level is 1766 feet, 2099 and 2450 feet respectively. A village namely Chincholi, in Patoda Mahal is having highest location from the sea level where summer is less felt by the people. The climate of Bhir, Manjlegaon and Georai on the low lands is warm and humid.

1.8: Temperature:

An annual maximum temperature in 1963 was 33.2 and 34.2 in 1964, and the minimum was 19.3 in 1963 and 18.8 in 1964. In the months of April and May the maximum temperature was 41.5 and 41.9 during the year 1964, and the minimum during the same year in the months of November and December was 19.4 and 18.8 respectively.

1.9: Rainfall:

Distribution of rainfall in the district is very uneven. On an average the annual rainfall was 750 mm; Patoda (Mahal) and Ashti taluka were known for chronic scarcity. The rainfall is mostly received from June to September. A detailed statement of rainfall is given in the 2nd part of the Abstract.

CHAPTER - II.

Explanatory notes on the tables included in the District Statistical Abstract 1964-65.

1. Climate:

Table No. 1.1:- This table shows figures of monthly rainfall and number of rainy days during 1963 and 1964 at selected centres. The average rainfall of the district is 750 mm. Ambejogai & Kaij are the only two talukas in the district with assured rainfall and the remaining talukas are in the low rainfall zone. It will be seen that during 1963 Manjlegaon taluka stood first, followed by Georai in sharing maximum amount of rains. Whereas in 1964 Patoda Mahal got the highest amount of rain followed by Ambejogai taluka. Rains start with June and last upto October. The maximum rainfall during July and September,

was according to the Fact Finding Committee appointed by the Government of Bombay in 1960 the talukas of (1) Ashti (2) Manjlegaon (3) Bhir & its Pimpalner Circle and (4) Patoda Mahal are likely to be affected by scarcity once in ten years.

Table No. 1.2:- This table indicates data relating to temperature at the district head quarter. Minimum temperature prevailed during December & January whereas it was maximum in April & May in general. Rainfall & Climatic conditions play an important part in the district where agriculture is the main stay of the people. The climate of the district is pleasant and agreeable during the major part of the year. Kaij taluka & Patoda Mahal have cool climate even in hot season.

2. AREA & POPULATION:

Table No. 2.1:- This table presents area, population and density of population per Sq. Km. in each taluka and the district as a whole. Area figures are as supplied by the Revenue and the Municipal Officers. Rural area is the difference between the total and the urban areas of the district. The area figures of the district are as supplied by the Director, of Land Records. Ambejogai taluka ranks first in respect of density of population as per 1961 Census which works out 312 per Sq. mile or 121 per Sq. Km. Patoda Mahal has the lowest density of 178 per Sq. mile or 69 per Km. Bhir district as a whole ranks 24th in Maharashtra in respect of density of population which worked out to 237 per Sq. mile or 92 per Sq. Km. The district population increased by 21.24 per cent over 1951 Census.

Table No. 2.2:- This table gives talukawise classification of villages according to the population ranges in 1961 Census. It is seen that 71 percent of the villages have population less than 1000 in each of them indicating that the district comprises a majority of small villages.

Table No. 2.3:- This table gives talukawise classification of towns according to population ranges in 1961 Census. Bhir town has a population of 33066 and there is no other bigger town in the district, Patoda Mahal has no town in it.

Table No. 2.4:- This table indicates the number of workers in each taluka according to 1961 Census. A bulk of the population in the district is engaged in agriculture forming 82.89% of the total workers, whereas 17.11% of them are engaged in non-agricultural activities.

Table No. 2.5:- This table indicates the number of non-workers in each taluka according to 1961 Census. Workers form 54.13% and non-workers constitute 45.87% of the total population of the district. Non-workers includes persons like beggars, pensioners, rentiers, childrens, house-wives infirms, aged etc.

Table No. 2.6:- This table shows talukawise and sexwise population of scheduled caste & scheduled tribes in the district. Population of scheduled castes in the district, formed 13.5% of the total district population whereas Scheduled tribes formed 0.2% of the total district population. The scheduled Castes population increased by 2.3% and that of scheduled tribes by 59.7% over the corresponding 1951 population. A majority of scheduled castes and scheduled tribes population is found in rural areas and is almost evenly scattered over all the talukas. The Chambhars, Dhors, Mahars and Mangs are amongst the more prominent scheduled castes and form 1.44%, 0.21%, 7.24% and 4.51% respectively of the district population.

The Bhils formed 0.24% of district population amongst scheduled tribes.

Table No. 2.7:- This table gives population of each of the seven towns in the district. Bhir town stands first accounting for highest population followed by Parli-Vaijnath and Ambejogai towns. All the remaining four towns have a population below ten thousand.

The urban population of the district has increased by 14.04% over the population as per 1951 Census.

3. AGRICULTURE:

Table No. 3.1:- This table gives figures of land utilisation for the year 1962-63 and 1963-64. The district accounts for 3.57 % of the area of the state. Out of the total area 55.6 % and 62.7% area was under cultivation during 1962-63 and 1963-64 respectively. Area under forest formed 1.2 % of the total area of the district during 1963-64 and it covered parts of Patoda mahal, Ambejogal, Kaij, Ashti and Bhir talukas. During 1963-64, Land put to non agricultural uses and uncultivable land formed 3.8 % and uncultivated land including cultivable waste, whereas permanent pasture formed 5.5% of the total geographical area. Current and other fallows during 1963-64 accounted for 26.7 % of the geographical area showing the extent to which more land could be brought under the plough, if fallows and cultivable waste are brought under the plough. Area sown more than once during 1963-64, formed 3.0 % of the total area. Area under cultivation increased by 12.8 % during 1963-64, over the corresponding figure in 1962-63.

Table No. 3.2:- The table shows data relating to area under different crops grown in each taluka of this district. The main crops grown in the district are Jowar, Moong, Bajra, Wheat, Groundnut and cotton. In the year 1963-64 the area under Jowar was quite large in Georal and Manjlegaon and Ashti talukas and the first two of them are famous for Jowar production when compared with the other talukas of the district. Acreage under Bajra in 1963-64 was more in Bhir taluka than all other talukas of the district. In respect of acreage under Wheat Kaij taluka stood first. Major part of the net area sown in the district is occupied by Jowar, pulses and oilseeds forming 41%, 16% and 17% respectively under these crops during the year 1963-64. Out of total gross cropped area in 1962-63 and 1963-64, 72.0 % and 75.1 % respectively was under food crops and during those two years 28.0% and 24.9 % of gross cropped area was likewise under non-food crops.

Table No. 3.3:- This table gives yield rate per hectre for all the important crops grown in the district. The yield rate per hectre in 1963-64 of all the crops excepting in case of rice, Jowar Kharif, Mung, Sugarcane and groundnut decreased over their corresponding yield rate in 1962-63 due to inadequate and untimely rain which affected the crops to certain extent.

Table No. 3.4:- This table shows the area under irrigation in the district by different sources. Ashti taluka, accounted for about 1/3 of total gross irrigated area in the district in 1962-63 and 1963-64. Area under irrigation increased by 9.79 % in 1963-64, over the corresponding figures in 1962-63 perhaps due to increase in the number of irrigation wells in 1963-64. Well irrigation 1963-64 accounted for 39.74 % of the net area irrigated. The percentage of gross irrigated area to the total cropped area worked out to 7.1 % in 1963-64.

Table No. 3.5:- This table indicates irrigated area under different crops in each taluka of the district. Irrigated area under rabi Jowar, which was found to be more than the irrigated area under any other crop in the district. Total irrigated area increased by 9.79 % in 1963-64 over the previous year. Ashti taluka tops the list in this respect when compared to other talukas of the district.

Table No. 3.6(a):- This table gives the information regarding total number of irrigation wells in use and those out of use. The total number of irrigation wells in the district during 1963-64 has increased by 3.4 % over the corresponding figure in 1962-63. In 1963-64, 93.4 % wells were in use and 6.6 % were not in use. Kaij taluka had the highest number of wells in 1963-64 due to non existence of irrigation projects there. The lowest number of irrigation wells is found in Manjlegaon during 1963-64. Approximately 1/3 of the wells were not in use in Manjlegaon taluka during 1963-64 and also to a similar extent even in preceding year.

Table No. 3.6(b):- This table represents the particulars of minor irrigation works completed in the district upto 31st March 1965, nine minor irrigation works were completed in local sector as against three in the State sector.

Table No. 3.6(c):- This table gives particulars of Nine medium irrigation projects in the district. The perennial irrigable area in hectares under these nine projects during 1964-65 was 366.22 whereas the seasonal irrigated area was 11153.17 hectares.

Table No. 3.7:- This table indicates the distribution of households engaged in cultivation classified by interest in land and size of land cultivated based on 20% sample of households. It is seen that roughly 58 % of them are cultivating households while the remaining 42 % of them are non-cultivating households. The percentage distribution of ownership households and cultivating households was as follows:

The average size of cultivating holdings in the district in 1960-61 was 22 acres or about 8.80 hectares and the average size of ownership holdings was 20 acres or about 8 hectares in 1952-53 against the average of 12 acres or 4.80 hectares in the state.

Table No. 3.8:- This table gives the agricultural wage rates in the district. Owing to absence of data for carpenter, blacksmith and Cobbler at Kada centre during 1964 and 1965, it was not possible to compare the average wage rates prevailing in three selected centres i.e. Umapur, Kada and Renapur as they were engaged only once or twice in a year. Broadly the wage rates during the year 1965 were Rs. 4 to 5 for Carpenter Rs. 3 to 4 for blacksmith and for Cobbler Rs. 2.50 to 3.50.

The average wage rates were highest amongst the three centre at Umapur. At Renapur centre the average rate were lowest for (1) Field male labour (2) Field female labour (3) herdsman (4) Other male agriculture labour and (5) other female agriculture labour. The peak period for all these labour class is from June to February in a year.

Table No. 3.9:- This table gives the number of different agricultural implements in the district. The tendency to use improved implements in the district is on the increase. The number of iron ploughs formed 91.82 % of the total number of ploughs (iron and wood). The highest number of iron ploughs is found in Kaij taluka and the lowest is found in Patoda mahal. Ashti and Ambejogai claim 25.52 % and 31.10 of the total number of pumps respectively. Cultivable area for the whole district per pair of working bulls worked out to 15 acres and it was approximately 2.02 hectare per agriculture worker.

Table No. 3.10:- This table is meant for indicating famine and scarcity condition in the district during the year 1964-65. There was no scarcity in the district during 1964-65.

Table No. 3.11:- This table gives the progress of the soil conservation in the district. Bunded area in 1963-64 formed 2.04 % of the total net area sown.

4. ANIMAL HUSBANDRY, FORESTS & FISHERIES:-

Table No. 4.1:- This table deals with the summary figures of live-stock Census in Bhir district for 1956 and 1961 Census. The number of cattle increased during the period of five years from 1956 to 1961 by 14.03 %. Cattles and sheep are more numerous in Ambejogai and Kaij talukas, perhaps due to clametic conditions, good grazing lands and other facilities required for the growth of cattle found in these two talukas. The number of male cattles used for breeding went down by 62.92 % where the number of cows in milk went down by 1.26 % in 1961 over the corresponding figure of 1956. As regards buffaloes their population had increased by 18.72 % over the last Census of 1956, as buffaloes breeding has become a source of income to the rural masses in the district. (Contd. 9)

Poultry has been rapidly increasing in the district; due to its importance as subsidiary occupation to agriculturist. It has registered an increase of 72.07 % in 1961 Live-stock Census over 1956 Census.

Table No. 4.2:- This table indicates talukawise population of livestock. Young stock of cattle formed roughly 1/3 of the total cattle population in the district. Highest number of cattle is found in Kaij taluka accounting for 17.17 % of the total cattle population. Whereas Patoda mahal accounted for only 12.15 % of the total cattle population, being the lowest. The highest number of buffaloes is once again found in Ambejogai taluka forming 21.0 % of the total number of buffaloes in the district whereas Ashti taluka accounted for 8.11 % of the total buffaloes population being the lowest. Kaij taluka has also the distinction of accounting for the highest number² livestock, whereas Patoda mahal accounts for the lowest livestock population in the district.

Table No. 4.3:- This table indicates the Veterinary facilities available in the district. It will be seen that there was no change in the number of hospitals and dispensaries in 1964-65 over the last year. The total number of animals treated during the year 1964-65 was lower than in the previous year. Out of seven talukas only Ashti, Bhir and Patoda talukas had insemination centres. The number of animals inseminated at Ashti and Patoda talukas was however less in the year 1964-65.

Table No. 4.4:- This table gives diseasewise livestock mortality in Bhir district in 1962-63 and 1963-64. It may be said that livestock mortality in a majority of cases had gone down in 1964-65 when compared with the previous year. The diseases of (1) foot & mouth (2) other contagious and parasitic disease of cattle and bovine and sheep and goats were more prominent during 1964-65 and deaths due to (1) Hemorrhagic septicemia and (2) other contagious parasitic diseases of sheep and goats were more prominent in 1964-65.

Table No. 4.5:- This table gives the number of recognised slaughter houses in the district. The number of animals slaughtered in these houses during the year 1964-65 fell by 12.19 % over the previous year perhaps because the price of mutton and beef shot up and consequently there was lesser demand for the same. The other reason for it was that poultry was in greater use for consumption purposes.

Table No. 4.6:- This table indicates the total area under forests in the district. It will be seen that during 1963-64 and 1964-65 there is almost no change in the area under forests. Forests accounted for 1.2% of the total geographical area of the district, whereas reserved, protected and unclassified forests formed 73.75 %, 24.21 % and 2.04 % respectively of the total forests area of the district.

Table No. 4.7:- This table shows the value of major and minor forests produce during the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. It is seen that the value of minor forests produce accounted for 84.71 % and 15.29 % of the value of total forests produce during 1963-64. Similarly during 1964-65 it accounted for 82.42 % and 17.58 % of the value of the total forests produce.

Table No. 4.8:- This table gives the information about fisheries in the district. Due to construction of a few projects in the district there was some scope for extension fisheries. In all there were about 2315 fishermen in the district during 1964-65. The total catch of fish in 1963-64 was 400, m.tons valued at Rs. 88,160 approximately.

5. EMPLOYMENT, INDUSTRIES, MINING AND ELECTRICITY:-

Table No. 5.1:- This table indicates employment in factories in the district during the years 1963 and 1964. Out of the total number of working factories only 1/3 of the total number of factories were "not submitting" returns in 1963 whereas in 1964 2/3 of the total number of factories did not submit the returns. It will be seen that more than fifty per-cent of the factories were engaged in the manufacturing edible oils.

Table No. 5.2 :- This table gives the distribution of working factories according to the working strength. It will be seen that there was near about one factory worker per 1000 of the total population of the district as against 23 workers per 1000 of the total population of the state. This district had lowest number of workers in the registered factories. Out of total number of factories in 1964, the number of workers engaged ranged between 50-99 was 307 in 1964. From this it will be seen that there are no large scale industries in the district.

Table No. 5.3:- This table shows distribution of factories according to number of days worked in the district. On an average the seven units engaged in manufacture of edible oils employed 139 workers per day and their working days ranged between 181 to 240.

Table No. 5.4:- This table indicates important industrial and mineral production in the district. Since no deposits of any minerals are found in the district, mining activity is therefore confined to quarrying of stones, clay and sand etc. only.

Table No. 5.5:- This table gives data relating to handloom and powerloom industry in the district. It will be seen from the figures that the number of hand operated handlooms in both the years, 1963-64 and 1964-65 remained unchanged. Their production and average daily employment position however had fallen by 26.7% and 23.5% respectively in 1964-65.

(Contd., 11.)

There were no powerlooms in the district. Kaij taluka accounted for more than 50% of looms followed by Ambejogai taluka.

Table No. 5.6:- This table gives monthwise registration of candidates, vacancies and the replacements. It will be seen from the figures that during the month/June 1964, of more candidates were registered at the employment exchange than in all other remaining month in the year 1964-65, forming 11% of the total registration in that period. Whereas it was 20.5% in July 1963. The number of vacancies notified was more in May of both the years, whereas placement was more in August 1963 as compared with the other months of both the years.

Table No. 5.7:- This table presents occupational distribution of total registration of employment, vacancies notified and placements in 1963-64 and 1964-65. It will be seen that more persons got employment in 1964-65 as against 1963-64. The percentage of placements to the total registration works out to 20.5%, 49.9% respectively in 1964-65 and 1963-64. During the year 1963-64 it will be seen that 36.4% were registered for clerical jobs, whereas in 1964-65, 73.1 were registered for other categories. The total number of vacancies notified was more in 1964-65 by 230 over the previous year.

Table No. 5.8:- This table shows the number of employees both under Private and Public sector for the industries having only 25 and more employees. It will be seen that the number of reporting establishments are more under "services" forming 59.1% of the total number of the reporting establishments.

Table No. 5.9:- This table gives combined information regarding annual survey of Industries in Bhir and Osmanabad districts, during the year 1961. Cotton ginning & Pressing and oil mills are the only industries run in the district showing the backwardness of these two districts in the sphere of industrialisation.

Table No. 5.10:- This table indicates generation and consumption of electricity during the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. It will be seen from the figures that total K.W. hours generated increased in 1964-65 by 12.4% over the last year. Similarly the figures of total electricity sold during the year 1964-65 was more by 19.9% over the corresponding year of 1963-64. It can be seen that more power was consumed under commercial and small powers during both the years.

Table No. 5.11:- This table gives number of villages and towns electrified with coverage of population in the district. It will be seen that there is no change in the number of towns electrified during both the years.

The plan for electrifying Dharur town has been finalised during the year under report. Out of the total number of villages & Towns (including in deserted villages) in the district, only 2.8 % villages were electrified, and the percentage of population covered under those villages and towns increased by 5 % in 1965 over the previous year. Out of the total population of the district, only 17.3% population was covered under this activity.

Table No. 5.12:- This table presents the instal capacity and electricity generated in thousand K.H.H. It will be seen from the figures that during 1964-65 the instal capacity increased by 12.4 over the previous year.

6. COOPERATION:-

Table No. 6.1:- This table indicates the position about the District Central Cooperative bank and other cooperative banks in the district. The number of branches of District Central Cooperative bank increased by 1 or 5 % over the previous year 1963-64. Similarly the number of members also increased in 1964-65 with the increase of share capital by Rs. 3 lakhs or 7.9 %. It will be seen that the working capital of the cooperative bank decreased in 1964-65 by Rs. 58 lakhs. There was no industrial cooperative bank in the district. Although there was no change in the number of branches under district Development bank, their share capital and the working capital had increased in 1964-65 by 4 lakhs and 139 lakhs respectively. Significant increase in the working capital was due to aids and loans given for the development of agriculture purposes.

Table No. 6.2:- This table indicates type of cooperative societies in the district existing during the year 1963-64. It will be seen from the figures that number of societies increased by 2.2 % over the previous year 1963-64. Similarly the number of members had gone up by 14.2 % over the corresponding year of 1963-64. Amongst the number of all type of societies, the number of service resource societies was found to be more forming 53.3 and 57.7 % of the total number of societies in both the years i.e. 1963-64 and 1964-65.

Table No. 6.3:- This table gives information about all type of agriculture credit cooperative societies in the district during the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. The number of societies did not show any change in any taluka except Bhir taluka, wherein it increased only by 6 societies over the previous year. Although there was no change in the number of societies, the share capital, working capital and the number of members during 1964-65 showed a significant increase by 13.8 %, 16.6 %, 16.6 % respectively over the last year. Bhir taluka tops the list in having the largest majority number of societies when compared to other talukas of the district.

Table No. 6.4:- This table indicates the position regarding agricultural marketing societies. There was no change in the number of such societies during 1964-65 over the last year. Every taluka was having a primary agricultural marketing society excepting Bhir taluka where the district cooperative marketing society is functioning. The business of these societies was more in Bhir taluka when compared with the other talukas of the district.

Table No. 6.5:- This table indicates the number of registered money lenders advancing loans to needy persons. The number of money lenders was more in 1963-64 than it was in 1964-65, Manjlegaon and Bhir talukas was having more money lenders in 1964-65 than by any other taluka of the district. But in Georal, although the number of money lenders was less the amount of loans advanced by them during 1964-65 was more when compared with the other talukas of the district. Due to the existence of cooperative agencies advancing loans, the number of individual money lenders is decreasing in the district. The percentage of loans advanced to traders and non-traders to the total loans advanced formed 24.2 % and 75.8 in 1963-64 and whereas the same worked out 9.7 % and 90.3 % in 1964-65.

7. MEDICAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH:

Table No. 7.1:- This table presents figures regarding the number of persons engaged in medical and public health profession according 1961 Census. It is seen that 55.5 % of the persons engaged in medical profession are in rural areas and the remaining 44.5 % are in urban areas. Out of total number, males and females, more than 50 % are engaged in the rural areas of the district.

Table No. 7.2:- This table indicates medical facilities available in the district. It will be seen that there is no change in the number of hospitals and dispensaries existing in the district during the year 1963 and 1964. But the number of doctors and nurses showed an increase of 4 and 5 respectively in the year 1964 over the previous year. Perhaps due to the increase in the number of primary health centres by 2 in 1964. Similarly the number of vaidyas had also increased by 175 % in 1964 over the previous year which provided more medical facilities to the rural masses. Ambejogai taluka was having more medical facilities than all other talukas of the district, as can be seen from the number of indoor and outdoor patients treated in that taluka which formed 32.2 % of the total indoor and outdoor patients in the district.

Table No. 7.3:- This table indicates diseasewise number of patients (indoor and outdoor) treated in the district. It will be seen from the figures that number of deaths in 1964 increased by 73.3 % over the previous year.

The percentage of deaths to the total number of indoor and outdoor persons treated was however 0.15 during the year 1964. Diseases such as dysentery, diarrhoea, pneumonia, tuberculosis, phrexia of uncertain origin, diseases of nervous system, injuries, diseases of the respiratory system etc. were amongst the common ailments in the district both in 1963 and 1964.

Table No. 7.4:- This table denotes the number of births and deaths together with the number of infant deaths in 1963 and 1964 registered in all talukas of the district. From the figures it will be seen that the number of births registered in all talukas of the district was more in 1963 than in 1964. The number of deaths registered in all talukas was more in 1963 excepting Bhir taluka. In 1964 Ambejogai taluka registered more deaths forming 19.8 % to the total number of deaths registered in the district, and lowest deaths were registered in Manjlegaon taluka forming of 10.7 % of total registration of deaths. Registration of infant mortality in the district was less in 1964 than the previous year. The percentage of this mortality to the total deaths in 1963 was 13.78 % whereas it was 12.21 % in 1964.

Table No. 7.5:- This table shows the number of deaths caused by epidemic diseases in the district during the year 1963 and 1964.

The number of deaths caused due to fever as a cause excluding "Other causes" were conspicuously high in both the years.

Table No. 7.6:- This table gives vaccination, Cholera, inoculation statistics in the district for the years 1963 and 1964. Out of the total population of the district 13.6 % and 15.2 % people were given cholera inoculations during the years 1963 and 1964 respectively. Manjlegaon taluka tops the list in claiming the highest number of cholera inoculations in both the years perhaps due to river side villages on the Sindhaphana river and its tributories, whereas Ashti taluka it was the lowest.

Table No. 7.7:- This table presents data regarding B.C.G. Vaccination in the district for 1963 and 1964. Statistics of B.C.G. Vaccination during 1964 was not taken in the district. Out of the total number of people tasted for this purpose, only 35.4 % were vaccinated during 1963.

Table No. 7.8:- This table indicates sources of hygienic drinking water supply available in the rural areas as on 1st June 1964. It can be seen from the figures that the number of villages without drinking water sources was more in Georai, Bhir and Manjlegaon talukas, when compared with those in other talukas of the district forming 25 %, 25% and 23% respectively of the total number of villages in the district without this facility.

Kaij, Manjlegaon, Ambejogai and Ashthi talukas were having more hygienic drinking water sources. About 59% of the villages had drinking water wells in the district to the total no. of such villages in the district.

8. EDUCATION:-

Table No. 8.1:- This table denotes the number of literates in urban and rural areas of the district. The percentage of literacy in the district has increased from 8.60 in 1951 to 15.09 in 1961. Although the performance appears to be progressive relatively the absolute percentage of 15.09 is hardly impressive. In urban areas the percentage was 34.75 as against the percentage of 12.94 in rural areas which was very poor. The percentage of literates was found to be highest in Bhir taluka next followed by Ambejogai taluka when compared with the other talukas of the district. In the case of female literacy it is highest in Bhir taluka followed by Ambejogai taluka.

Table No. 8.2:- This table furnishes data relating to education in rural areas of the district according 1961 census. In all 12.94% of the rural population of the district is literate. Amongst the literates 9.00% are mere literates without any educational standard. Only 0.2% of rural population had education upto matriculation and above. Ambejogai and Kaij talukas claimed 19.4 and 17.8% respectively of the total number of literates in the district from rural areas. This is because the number of schools were more in these talukas than in other talukas. Among female literates in rural areas only 0.5% had their education upto matric and above to the total no. of female literates in the district. Considering the percentage of literacy in rural areas of the district Patoda mahal stands first accounting for 14.11% of the total population of that taluka as literates.

Table No. 8.3:- This table deals with education in urban areas of the district. According to 1961 Census, it is seen that the number of both males as well as females having their educational level upto matric was more in urban areas than the rural area of the district. The number of males and females who had completed degree courses other than technical formed 0.3% of the total urban population of the district. Thus there were about 3 graduates other than technical degree holders per 1000 of urban population. Technical graduates and diploma holders formed 0.2% of urban population. In so far as provision for number of seats for technical education is concerned the district ranked 23rd & 21st for technical training craftsman and diploma level respectively in the districts of Maharashtra in 1963-64.

Table No. 8.4:- This table indicates the number of institutions, pupils and teachers in the district during 1964-65. The percentage of male and female students in the primary schools worked out to 75.25 % and 24.75 % respectively considering the number of pupils and teachers there were about 33 boys per teacher in primary schools. Taking the number of girl students at all levels of education there would be three girls per 1000 population of boys.

In case of secondary schools, it will be seen that 84.5 % boys and 15.5 % girls were studying in these schools in 1964-65. The ratio of boys to girls in secondary schools was broadly 18 : 6 and in higher institutions it was 16 : 1. The percentage of trained teachers in primary schools was 48.4 whereas it was 41.7 in secondary schools.

Table No. 8.5:- This table furnishes data regarding beneficiaries under educational concession to backward classes in 1964-65.

It will be seen from the figures that out of the total enrolment from the Backward class students about 25 % were from scheduled castes. Only 7.3 % of the amount given as concession was distributed amongst girl students. From the total amount of educational concession given to all backward class students in the district only 7.4 % was received by girl students.

Table No. 8.6:- This table indicates the number of economically backward students, who were granted concession of free education. Every economically backward student was Rs. 67.2 paid on an average. The number of beneficiaries was more from secondary schools forming 90.5 % over all the beneficiaries.

Table No. 8.7:- This table gives information regarding expenditure on primary education by way of grants to local bodies. It will be seen from the figures that Zilla Parishad has spent about 8.3 % under normal expenditure and 91.7 % under plan schemes. Considering the total strength of students in primary schools and the total expenditure made by Zilla Parishad, it may be said that Rs. 4.5 were spent for each primary student in the district.

Table No. 8.8:- This table indicates the number of villages with and without schools in each taluka of the district. It will be seen that out of total number of inhabited villages only 4.6 % of villages were not having any schools in 1964-65 as against the same as 8.8 % during 1963-64. Ashti and Kaij are the only two talukas where not a single village remained without schools during 1965. Bhir, Patoda and Ambejogal talukas had more number of villages without schools as on 31st March 1964 when compared with other talukas of the district.

9. TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION:

Table No. 9.1:- This table gives length of railway mileage to the extent of railway stations located in the district. Parli town is the only railway station falling under meter guage and Pangaon, Ghatnandur and Parli vaingath are on the broad guage line. The average railway length per 100 Sq. Km. works out to 0.4 Km. and average railway line per lakh of population works out to 4.8 Km. Only one taluka namely Ambejogai out of seven talukas has railway passing through it.

Table No. 9.2(a):- This table gives the information about the length under each type of roads excluding Municipal limits. It will be seen from the figures that the length of roads increased by 144.46 Km or 16.8 % in 1964-65 over the previous year. It will also be seen that an extension in road length accrued under all type of roads excepting other district roads over the last year. From the classification of surface, it was found that the water bound macadam road length was more in the district than other type of roads, accounted for 77.9 % over the total length of all type of roads in the district during 1965. During 1965 state high ways accounted for 49.2 % of the total road length whereas major district roads and village roads formed 32.7% and 1.8 % respectively of the total road length.

Table No. 9.2(b):- This table presents the length of municipal roads during the years 1963-64 and 1964-65 under each municipality. The length of roads increased in 1964-65 by 27.5 % over the last year. Bhir municipal council accounted for 32.3 % of the total municipal length in the district in 1965. The lowest municipal road length was in Dharur municipal council, accounting for 4 % during the year 1964-65. The municipal councils of Georai, Manjlegaon, Ashti, and Dharur did not undertake any road construction activity during 1964-65.

Table No. 9.3:- This table indicates motor vehicles in operations in the Marathwada region as on 31-3-1964 and 31-3-1965. It will be seen that amongst all vehicles the number of motor cars was more in both the years in the region forming a percentage 23.7 % of total number of vehicles in 1965.

Table No. 9.4:- This table indicates operational statistics of nationalised Road Transport in the Marathwada Region as on March 1964 and 1965. It will be seen from the figures that number of routes increased by 11.8 % over the previous year. Due to increase in the number of routes, the average number of vehicles in operation per day had also increased by 8 % over the previous year. Naturally this had led to the increase of average earning per vehicle per day and also in the average number of passengers travelling daily.

Table No. 9.5:- This table indicates statistics of traffic census on state highways conducted by the Building and Communication Dept., in November 1964. It will be seen from the figures that out of the total vehicles plying on the roads, per day more vehicles 46.1 % were found plying on Chousala and Shahagad. Lowest number of vehicles per day ran on Parli-Ambejogai road, forming 2.8 % to the total number of vehicles plying per day.

Table NO. 9.6:- This table gives information regarding Post and Telegraph offices in the district. It will be seen from the figures that only one Post Office was opened in 1964-65. Similarly the number of telegraph offices and telephones increased by 3 and 1 in 1964-65 in the district. On an average there was one post office for every three villages in the district. The number of postmen rose by 9.1 % in 1964-65 over the last year. Considering the number of letter boxes in the year 1964-65, on an average there were 14 boxes for every postman. The number of radio licenses issued during the year 1964 rose by 7.8 % over the previous year.

Table No. 9.7:- This table gives information regarding postal facilities available in the district in 1960. It will be seen from the figures that the number of villages in each taluka of the district where the post offices existed within the villages vary from 25 to 37. Only 20.6 % of the villages had postal facilities within them. Similarly the number of villages having postal facilities within three kilometres formed 32 % to the total number of inhabited villages in the district.

Table No. 9.8:- This table shows rural broad casting sets installed in each taluka of the district. The figures show that only 20.6 % of villages had these sets. The number of sets increased by 14 % in 1964-65 over the last year. It will be seen that 27.8 % to the total number of sets in the district were installed in Bhiri taluka, which topped the list. Ashti taluka was the last in this regard with only one set both in 1964 and 1965. Considering the number of villages in Patoda mahal, it had more such sets covering 27.6 % of population in 1964-65 when compared with the other talukas of the district. Only 24.8 % of the rural population was covered on 31-3-1965 by receiving sets and 20.6 % of inhabited villages had receiving sets in them on the same date.

10. LOCAL BODIES:-

Table No. 10.1:- This table furnishes the data relating to the number of village Panchayats and other local bodies during the years 1962-63 to 1964-65. During the year 1964-65, the number of village panchayats increased by 4.4 % over the previous year. Out of the total number of villages in the district 99.2 % villages were covered by village panchayats during 1962-63, 1963-64 and 1964-65.

The population covered under each village panchayats was more than 1000 during 1964-65 and the per capita income and expenditure in 1964-65 was Rs. 21.44 and Rs. 1.98 respectively. The income of other local bodies Zilla Parishad and municipalities rose in 1964-65 by 45.8% and 11.0% respectively over the previous year. Similarly their expenditure also increased in 1964-65 by 35.4% and 37.7% respectively over the last year.

Table No. 10.2: This table indicates income and expenditure of village panchayats in each Panchayat Samiti for the year 1962-63 and 1963-64. It will be seen that number of village panchayats were more in Kaij taluka during 1962-63 and 1963-64 accounting for 18% to the total number of village panchayats in the district. Patoda mahal which is having lowest number of villages, had only 9.8% of village panchayats in the district during 1962-63 and 1963-64. It will be seen from the figures of income of village Panchayat that Ambejogai Panchayat Samiti ranked first by accounting for 20.9% of the total income of village panchayats in 1963-64. In this respect village panchayats in Bhir Panchayat Samiti was the last accounting for 11.3% of the total income of village panchayats in 1963-64. As regards expenditure figures village panchayats in Ambejogai topped the list having incurred an expenditure of 21.7% to the total expenditure of all the Panchayat Samities in the district during 1963-64, whereas those in Ashti Panchayat Samiti was the lowest in this regard forming a percentage of 8.9% of total expenditure of village panchayats in 1963-64.

Table No. 10.3(a): This table gives information regarding headwise receipts of Zilla Parishad during the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. The total revenue receipts including grants increased by 45.8% in 1964-65 over the previous year. During the year 1964-65 the amount under loan and advances decreased by 28.8% over the previous year. Per capita income of Zilla Parishad in 1964-65 was Rs. 19.06 as against Rs. 13.07 in 1963-64.

Table No. 10.3(b): This table presents figures of headwise expenditure of Zilla Parishad in 1963-64 and 1964-65. It will be seen that total revenue expenditure increased in 1964-65 by 35.4% over the year 1963-64. The amount under loans and advances decreased by 31.2% over the previous year. Revenue expenditure was more by 49.2% and 65.6% in 1963-64 and 1964-65 respectively to the total expenditure under all heads during the same period. Per capita expenditure in 1964-65 and in 1963-64 was Rs. 17.61 and Rs. 13.01 respectively.

Table No. 10.4: This table presents constitution of municipalities in the district. The district consists of 7 municipalities covering nearly 1/10 th. population of the district. Each municipality is being administered by a municipal council which consists of a president, Vice-president and members. The number of members whose number varies from 12 to 17, according to the sizes of the municipality.

They are elected for a period of five years. The population covered by the Municipality of Bhir, Parli and Ambejogai was 33.5 %, 20.0 % and 18.00 % respectively of the total urban population of the district.

Table No. 10.5:- This table gives figures of income and expenditure of the municipalities in the district during the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. It will be seen that income of Bhir municipality was more followed by Parli-Vaijnath forming 36.8 % and 20.8 % respectively of the total income of all municipalities during the year 1964-65. The lowest income in the year 1964-65 was of Ashti municipality forming a percentage 1.4 % of total municipal income of all the municipalities. It may be said that due to introduction of Octroi duty in the district since 1963-64, their income and expenditure has increased to a considerable extent. Per capita municipal income and expenditure according to urban population of the district was Rs. 16.47 and Rs. 15.24 in 1964-65. There is no town in the district without municipal council.

11. PLAN AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT:

Table No. 11.1:- This table indicates an expenditure in 3rd Five Year plan implemented at the district level. During the year 64-65, after mid term appraisal of the plan, the original total outlay of Rs. 383.98 lakhs was subsequently raised to Rs. 407.99 lakhs. The expenditure incurred on all the schemes upto 64-65 was Rs. 266.186 formin 65.2 % of the total plan provision.

The phase of development expenditure during the first four years of the plan together with its percentage to the total plan outlay at the end of every year was as follows:-

It will be seen from the above figures that expenditure during the first 2 years of the plan was much lower when compared with later years. The rate of expenditure at the end of 64-65 was nearly eight times more than it was during the first year of the plan.

The following figures will give major head wise percentage of expenditure up to the end of 64-65.

It will be seen from the above figures that the expenditure on Co. operation and Community Development and Agricultural programme was somewhat satisfactory compared to the remaining heads of the Development pertaining to Industries and mining and on transport and communication. The expenditure on sub-heads of General Education, Dairy Development, Forests, Agricultural Production, Road Development and Small scale Industries, was less than 50% of the corresponding plan provision. The percentage of expenditure to the total plan provision on different major heads upto 64-65 was below:-

It will be seen from the above percentages that although the head of "Agricultural Programme" had more plan share, the percentage of expenditure was found to be less than it was on co. operation and Community Development.

Table No. 11.2:- This table gives information about the target fixed for the plan period with the achievements upto the end of 64-65 i.e., for the first four years of the plan, few achievements which were more than cent percent or near about to the fixed target till the end of the 64-65 are given below: An achievement under AGR-24 was nearly 82.5 percent to the total target of the plan. Similarly under the scheme AGR-32 the percentage of achievement was 132% to the total target of the entire plan period. Achievement under the scheme AGR-34, CONS-1, MIN-1, MIN-2, & FSH-7 was sufficiently more than cent percent. Likewise the schemes WM-1, COP-11, and CD-1 indicate cent percent achievement till the end of 1964-65.

Table No. 11.3:- This table indicates the number of blocks area, population and villages covered by the C.D. blocks as on 31st March 1965 in the district. At the end of the year 31st March 1965 there were 12.5 blocks of C.P.A. pattern in Bhir district, of which nearly 50 % were in stage-I and the remaining 50 % were in stage-II etc. All the villages in the district were covered by all these blocks, out of which 46.8 % were covered under stage-I blocks. The population covered by stage-I blocks was 46.5 % to the total rural population of the district.

Table No. 11.4:- This table deals with the expenditure incurred at different stages of each blocks. Till 31-3-1965 63.4 % of the block provision since in-anguration of the blocks was booked. Ambejogai new block stood first for booking an expenditure of 24.1 % to the total expenditure upto 31-3-1965 of the district, whereas Ambejogai old block was the lowest in this regard having booked 2.4 % of the district expenditure upto 31-3-1965.

Table No. 11.5:- This table gives information about physical achievements of the selected items during the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. The participation of the villages in the various development activities was satisfactory as can be seen from their own contribution to the programmes given in the table. From the figures of achievements regarding the number of houses built, this activity was undertaken only by four blocks of (1) Georai (2) Ashti (3) Ambejogai (old & New) in 1963-64 whereas the same was undertaken by only two blocks (1) Ashti and (2) Patoda. Public response to family planning was more in 1964-65 when compared with that of the previous year. Thus the number of operation was more by 63.4 % over the previous years. In both the years 1963-64 and 1964-65 Georai Panchayat Samiti ranked first in respect of pedigree animals than all other blocks in the district. Similarly Ashti Panchayat Samiti stood first in 1964-65 in respect of ~~pedigree~~ birds whereas Kaij Panchayat Samiti had this credit in the previous year 1963-64.

In respect of drinking water wells Kaij, Panchayat Samiti has constructed more wells in 1964-65, than all other blocks. Last year Manjlegaon was first for this activity.

Table No. 11.6:- This table indicates the index number of physical achievement and expenditure in 1963-64 and 1964-65. The classification of the blocks shown in the table was on the basis of level of expenditure incurred in these blocks. Whenever expenditure exceeded 75 % to the exposed expenditure for the period, the block was classified as 'A' when the percentage of expenditure was between 50 % to 75 % the block was classified as 'B' and for less than 50% it was classified as 'C'.

Majority of blocks in the district during 1963-65 were in 'A' class by expenditure.

According to physical achievements the blocks were classified as special A, A, B & C according to level of achievements as a percentage to the norms of achievements fixed for Blocks in different stages. Whenever the percentage of achievements was more than 150% the Block was classified as special 'A', when it was 100% to 150% it was classified as A, and when it was between 50% to 100% it was regarded as B Class Block. The Blocks with 50% achievements was classified as C Class Block. In 1963-64 majority of blocks were in 'A' class whereas in 1964-65 majority of them were in 'A' Class.

12. PRICES:-

Table No. 12.1:- This table indicates the average of retail prices important commodities at district Head quarter for the year 1964. It will be seen from the figures that prices of cereals had in general disclose an increasing trend. During December, 1964 prices of most of the cereals had fallen, The prices of pulses gradually increased from June, onwards and in a few cases they rose by more about 150% till December, 64. Amongst pulses price of gram dal fluctuated which from Rs. 0.80 to Rs. 1.68 per killo. The prices of Sugar and Gar during the year under report remained almost unchanged as also the prices of meat, Salt, Kerosene oil. The price of ground-nut oil was increasing from month to month and in the month of September, 64 it was Rs 3.08 per killo price of tea and coffee powder with slight fluctuation by certain month remained the same through out the year.

The prices of articles under clothing had not ~~fluctuated~~ fluctuated through-out the year. The price of Brass increased from February, 1964 till June, 1964 and then had a slight declining trend during the rest of the year.

The prices of all other miscellaneous articles were more or less steady excepting the price of Supari which shot up to Rs. 8.00 per killo gram in December, 1964.

Table No. 12.2: This table indicates the operations of regulated markets in different talukas. The main food crops of the district are Jowar, Moong, Wheat, Bajra and Pulses. There are six regulated markets in the district. Parli Market committee stood first according for 31.3 % and 32.3% of the total annual arrivals and their value respectively in 1964-65. Similarly Dharur market committee accounted for 4.0 % and 3.6 % of the total annual arrivals and their value respectively in 1964-65 being the lowest.

Table No. 12.31: This table present the data on consumer price Index number for working classes in Aurangabad division, for Aurangabad and Nanded centres. It can be seen from the figures that the general consumer price Index, was highest in October '64 in Aurangabad where as the same was lowest in 1956. As regards Nanded Centre, the general consumer price index was highest in the month of October '64. where as the lowest average was in 1951 for that centre.

13. MISCELLANEOUS:-

Table No. 13.1: This table presents data regarding strength of Police force and crimes statistics during the year 1963 and 1964. The strength of Police in the district did not show any change in the 1964 over the previous year. However, the number of crimes reported during the year under review had shown a decrease of 19.3 % over the previous year. There was no change in the number of Police stations, outposts and lock-ups during the year under report over the previous years. On an average each police station had 35 constables and 9 headconstable under it, covering about a population of about 48000. There was one police station for every 49 inhabited village and one police for every 1.37 thousand population in the district. Every taluka headquarter had a police station in the district. The cost of police forces in the district increased in 1964 by 4.3 % over the last year.

Table No. 13.2: The table gives information regarding number of Civil and Criminal cases decided in the various taluka Courts in the district. The percentages of distribution of cases decided in all courts of the district during 1964 were as follows:

Table No. 13.3:- This table indicates Cinema statistics in Bhir District. It will be seen from the figures that there were out of the total number of cinema houses in the district nearly 50 % cinema houses in Ambejogai taluka followed by Bhir taluka accounting for 33 % of them. All cinema theatres in the district were located at the urban places of the district in majority of cases.

Table No. 13.4:- This table gives information on number of Gazetted and non-gazetted Government employees and their emoluments according to 1961 Census. It will be seen that employees drawing emoluments between the range of 75 to 100 formed 44.5 % of the total number of employees whereas the amount of total emoluments drawn by employees between the range of 101 - 150 was more than it was drawn under any other ranges and it formed 33.2 % of the total emoluments. Out of total number of employees in the district 80.1 % were class-III and only 1.8 % were Class-I and Class-II.

Table No. 13.5:- This table gives the number of banking offices in the district as on 31-3-1965. It will be seen that the number of scheduled banks was nearly 1/3 to the total number of banks whereas cooperative banks formed about 65 % of the total number of banks. The population covered by each bank was 6635.

Table No. 13.6:- This table indicates information regarding joint stock companies in 1963-64 and 1964-65. No such institutions exist in the district.

Table No. 13.7:- This table gives insurance statistics in the district for the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. It will be seen that the number of policies issued in 1964-65 was less by 16.8 % over the previous year. But the amount insured was more in 1964-65 by 14.2 % over the previous year 1963-64.

Table No. 13.8:- This table gives information regarding small saving statistics in 1963-64 and 1964-65. It will be seen from the figures that out of total target of Rs. 8 lakhs fixed for the district the total gross collection decreased by 3.7 % over the previous year 1963-64, the amount of withdrawal in 1964-65 also decreased by 25.86 % over 1963-64.

Table No. 13.9:- This table presents talukawise revenue collection in the district during the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. It will be seen from the figures that amount of land revenue collected during 1964-65 showed a decreasing trend. The percentage of collection to demand was 99.9 in 1963-64 and 96.1 in 1964-65. Similarly arrears of land revenue were considerably high in 1964-65 over those in previous year.

Table No. 13.10:- This table denotes the collection of excise revenue, sales tax and entertainment tax in the district for 1963-64 and 1964-65.

It will be seen that an amount of excise revenue increased by 9.1% in 1964-65 over the previous year. Sales-tax collections increased by 36.1% in 1964-65 over the last year. Thus the increase during the year 1964-65 was nearly more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ times over the last year. Since sales tax is connected with prices it can serve as an indicator of the extent of price rise in general terms. Entertainment tax collection increased over the previous year by about 15.9%.

Table No. 13.11:- This table gives talukawise information regarding the number of documents registered and income and expenditure realised from properties in 1963 and 1964. It will be seen from the figures that the registration was more by 69.2% in 1963 than it was in 1964. Georai, Ashti, and Manjlegaon had registered more documents in 1964 than in 1963. For the district as a whole although the number of documents registered in 1964 was less than it was in 1963, the income realised there-by was 36.1% more in 1964 over the previous year. It will be seen that highest income was realised in Kaij and Ambejogai talukas in both the years, whereas the lowest was Ashti.

Table No. 13.12:- This table gives information relating to general elections in the district in 1962. The highest per centre 49% was polled in Renapur Constituency and the lowest 39% was in Manjlegaon constituency.

Female voters formed 41.8% of the total number of votes polled in Constituency Bhir.

Table No. 13.13:- This table gives talukawise percentage, distribution of households according to number of rooms occupied and percentage distribution of the households to the total population according to 1961 Census.

It will be seen from the figures that the number of households living in one room formed 71.5% to the total number of households in the district. The number of households living in five rooms was lowest in the district being only 0.8% of the total number of households in the district. Ambejogai taluka stands first where households with one room, two rooms and three rooms, were more than any other taluka of the district.

III. A note on Annual Plan Review for the year 1964-65.

3.1 The various schemes in Third Plan of different sectors have been classified into three categories viz. (1) District level (2) Divisional level and (3) State level. This classification is made on the basis of the areas which derive benefits from a particular scheme. Thus, all schemes benefits of which accrue to District are considered as District level schemes. The Collector who is coordinating authority watches the progress of District level schemes while as the Commissioner looks after, Divisional level schemes. As per the allocation shown in Blue Book, an amount of Rs. 407.99 lakhs has been provided for the district level schemes of Bhir district.

3.2 Progress made during the year 1964-65 under each scheme for different heads of development of district level schemes is discussed in the ensuing paragraphs with the object of each scheme in brief in 2 parts.

:PART-I:

(1) AGR:27:(S):- The object of the scheme is to improve the quality and per acre yields of oil seeds, particularly groundnut, and strengthening of organisation which is concerned with production, procurement and distribution of improved seeds, arranging for timely supply of manures and fertilisers, providing suitable plant protection facilities and arranging crop competitions.

The progress under this scheme is very satisfactory which has recorded 240.00 % expenditure to the plan provision during the year under consideration and 790.00 % upto the end of the year under review.

(2) AGR:31:(L):- The object of the scheme is to encourage horticultural development with a view to making better use of land and improving incomes of agriculturists.

The target is to bring 1000 acres each under plantation and rejuvenation for the plan period.

This scheme has progressed as per schedule achieving 35.62 % of expenditure against the plan provision.

(3) AGR:34:(L):- The object of the scheme is to help the cultivators in irrigated areas and areas with assured rainfall to utilise full potentialities of production, through special staff units which will help the cultivators to understand about the better methods, improved seeds, supply of fertilisers, supply of credits, plant protection facilities etc.

The physical targets set for the plan period is 1.07 lakhs acres of area under cultivation for the whole plan period.

The scheme is satisfactorily functioning.

(4) CONS:1:(S):- The object of the scheme is to arrest erosion of land due to flow of rain water and to see that rain water is absorbed in the soil rather than flowing away. This also ensures that wells have more water.

(28)

Under this scheme the targets set to be achieved is 1.50 lakhs for the plan period. 5 Sub-Divisions are working for the whole district during the year under review under the control of one Division Office for proper implementation of the scheme.

By the end of 64-65, 65.19 % of expenditure is booked.

(5)MIN:2:(S):- The object of the scheme is to advance loans to the cultivators through Land Development Banks for purchase of oil engines or electric motors for irrigation purposes. The Collector is also to advance the loans to those cultivators who were partially assisted during the 2nd Plan period with its instalment of loan. The 2nd instalments are now paid by the Collector for such cases only.

The targets fixed for this scheme 800 pumping sets for the plan period.

Initially the progress of the scheme was poor as some of the cultivators did not full fill the conditions and some of them have never applied for 2nd instalment. However the scheme has shown satisfactory progress upto the end of year 1964-65 achieving 52.34 % of expenditure to plan provisions.

(6)MIN:7:(S+L):- The scheme provides for completion of the small over minor irrigation works from the 2nd plan and for taking new works and land drainage schemes.

The targets under the scheme for the (a) works in progress and (b) new works is to bring 2900 and 1331 acres of irrigation potential respectively.

Under this scheme 64.68% of expenditure is booked upto the end of March 1965.

(7)AH:2:(L):- This scheme provides for the maintenance of veterinary dispensaries and Veterinary aid centres established in stage-I Development Blocks and taken over by the Animal Husbandary Dept. The scheme also provides for the completion of the construction of dispensary buildings.

The scheme contemplates to complete 3 buildings during the plan period.

The scheme is progressing very satisfactorily booking 228.40% of expenditure against plan provisions upto March 1965.

(8)AH:7:(L):- The scheme aims at supplementing the work of Departmental cattle Breeding Farms, by giving financial assistance to the cultivators in the selected areas to undertake breeding and rearing of pure bred animals.

The targets to be achieved during the plan period under this scheme is 1 centre and 1 society.

This scheme has shown very good progress by achieving 212.22 % of expenditure against the plan provision upto the March 1965.

(9) AM:3:(L):- This scheme aims at improving the quality of village cattle by providing the district with pure-bred bulls for rendering services to village cows.

The targets to be achieved is of 94 district premium bulls for the plan period.

The progress made under this scheme is satisfactory in the sense that 114.58 % of expenditure is booked upto the close of financial year ending with March 1965.

(10) WM:1:(S):- The scheme provides for opening of new 24 regulated markets and also to give financial assistance to market committees of regulated markets in order to carry out their works smoothly.

The physical targets set to be achieved are as follows:

- (i) 2 Regulation of markets.
- (ii) Loans to 8 markets committees.
- (iii) Subsidies to 13 market committees.

The scheme has registered very satisfactory progress by booking 120.65 % of expenditure upto 31st March 1965.

(11) COP:1:(S):- The scheme aims at strengthening the cooperative structure at the district and primary level by (1) supplementing the owned capital of the institutions with share capital contributions by the Government, (2) encouraging by means of subsidies the opening of more branches by the Land Development Banks and the Central Cooperative Banks and (3) encouraging by means of outright grants, the central cooperative banks and service cooperatives to admit the membership and to provide production finance to the agriculturists.

Under the scheme following targets are fixed for achievements for the plan period.

The progress under this scheme is quite satisfactory. It has booked 123.12 % of expenditure against plan provision the last four year of plan.

(12) COP:3:(S):- The scheme consists in strengthening of the cooperative marketing structure at the district and primary levels. This scheme also intends to provide godown facilities to the selected primary credit societies so that such societies can serve as primary collection centres for the agricultural produce to be marketed. In addition to this, the scheme also provides financial assistance to marketing societies for undertaking grading of agricultural produce.

The scheme provides the targets to the district as under:

- (i) 2 New marketing societies.
- (ii) 60 Rural Godowns.
- (iii) 1 Large Godowns.
- (iv) 3 Medium Godowns.

The scheme has registered very satisfactory progress by incurring 134.75 % of expenditure upto the March 1965.

(13) COP:11:(S):- The scheme aims at helping the small group of farmers with uneconomic holding under cooperative farms so that the cultivators can be assisted financially and technically to derive the maximum benefit from the land.

The target set to be achieved during the plan period is 10 cooperative societies.

The scheme shows satisfactory progress by achieving 91.36 % expenditure during the 1st four years of 3rd plan.

(14) COP:12:(S):- The object of the scheme is to organise and assist cooperative farming societies of small holders and landless agricultural labourers outside the pilot areas.

The scheme proposes to establish 21 cooperative societies during the plan period.

Under this scheme 116.00 % expenditure has been booked in 1st four year of plan.

(15) CD:1:(L):- This scheme involves very big out lay for the plan period. The community projects Administration intends to cover all Rural population.

The target is to open 4 new C.D. blocks.

This scheme has already incurred 97.77 % of expenditure upto March 1965.

(16) T&C:10:(L):- The scheme provides for construction of District Road (major roads and other roads), modernising of surface, provision of community Development works and construction of bridges wherever necessary.

The percentage expenditure to plan provision comes out to be 57.86 % for the 1st four-years of 3rd plan.

(17)GE:6:(L):- The scheme provides for construction of class-rooms for the Govt. primary schools in Marathwada. Some provision is also made for non-Govt. primary schools.

The total provision under this scheme would result in construction of 227 Class-room during the 3rd plan period.

The scheme has registered 76.91 % of expenditure against the plan provision.

(18)MED:1:(S):- The scheme provides for the completion of Buildings for District and Cottage Hospitals.

The scheme aims at completing 1 Civil Hospital buildings.

The scheme practically could not be taken up for implementation during the first 2 years of the plan as the proceedings to take over the possession of the land from Police Dept. took considerable time.

However during 3rd and 4th years of plan, the construction activities were geared up which has registered 77.02 % of expenditure during the first four years of plan.

(19)PH:2:(S):- The scheme which is continuing one, aims at eradicating malaria from the state and in addition to this the scheme provides for the maintenance of D.D.T. units and surveillance units.

The scheme is progressing satisfactorily achieving 74.19 % of expenditure against plan provision.

(20)PH:7:(L):- The scheme proposes to eradicate small pox from the state by appointing additional vaccinators who will be in charge of 30,000 population for intensive measures.

The scheme is progressing as per time schedule and this can be seen from 108.84 % of expenditure which is booked in the first four years of plan.

(21)PH:8:(L):- This is centrally sponsored scheme. The scheme consists in intensifying the family planning campaign by encouraging sterilisation as a positive measures for population control.

The target for the plan period is one mobile Vasectomy unit for this districts.

The vasectomy unit has started functioning late in the year 1963-64. Even then the scheme has registered good progress.

(22)WS:5:(L):- The object of the scheme is to complete the works pertaining to drinking water wells taken up during the 2nd plan period under various schemes. New-works will be taken up through local development works programme. Total cost of the new works will be shared partly by central assistance and partly by Rural local authorities by way of popular contribution, or from their own resources.

The scheme has not at all registered expenditure during the year 1964-65. However the scheme has achieved 678.32 % of expenditure against plan provision upto 31st March 1965.

(23) HSG:2:(S):- The object of the scheme is to provide housing facilities to the individuals of Low Income groups (i.e. whose income does not exceed Rs. 6000/- per annum), institutions, designated agencies of state Govt. for construction of houses to be sold or to let out to eligible persons by granting financial assistance equivalent to 80 % of the cost subject to maximum of Rs. 8000/- per tenement.

Under this scheme works of 5 tenements are in progress.

This scheme could not be implemented so far during first year of plan for want of Funds. The funds allotted during 1962-63 were surrendered due to National Emergency as per Govt. orders. However the scheme has booked expenditure to the tune of Rs. 35,000/- during the year 1964-65 against plan provision of Rs. 47,000/- achieving there by 74.46 % of expenditure.

(24) HSG:4:(L):- The object of the scheme is to develop selected villages into model villages on an "aided self help" basis. The scheme envisages grant of loans to bonafide villagers from the selected villages for construction of new houses or for carrying out substantial improvements of specified nature. The scheme also provides for grant of loans to village panchayats for acquisition and development of lands for housing purposes.

This scheme intends to cover 33 villages from the district for this purpose.

This scheme has quite satisfactory progress, on which 81.81 % of expenditure is already incurred upto the 31st March 1965.

(25) HSG:5:(S):- The object of the scheme is to extend village Gaothans to provide for increasing requirements of housing space in village. Secondly to settle persons belonging to Nomadic Tribes and Backward classes communities and Ex-criminals. Thirdly re-settlement of persons affected or threatened by floods.

Under the scheme targets fixed are as below:

- (i) 100 villages to be covered.
- (ii) 800 acres of area to be covered.

The scheme is progressing very satisfactorily by registering 189.09 % of expenditure against plan provision upto March 1965.

(26) LAB:1:(S):- The scheme aims at opening of new Industrial training institutes and development of existing Industrial Training institutes to provide training facilities.

The scheme intends to achieve additional intake capacity for 256 students by the end of plan.

In the initial period of plan, the progress of the scheme was very slow, but now the scheme has registered 92.74 % expenditure against the plan provision.

PART - II.

(27) AGR:21:(L):- The scheme helps to start agricultural schools, in order to provide facilities for agricultural training. This scheme provides two years diploma course for the students.

166 acres of land is to be acquired.

The scheme is mainly lagging because there is difference of opinion among the Director of Agricultural and the Superintending Engineer, B.&C. as to who should give sanction of sanitary fittings first. The Director desires technical sanction first and the Superintending Engineer desires advance approval first.

(28) AGR:24:(L):- This scheme aims at propagating the use of improved agricultural implements by substituting iron ploughs in place of wooden ploughs and supplying dry farm sets in the Rabi tract. The scheme also offers subsidies to the cultivators for purchasing improved implements. This facility is open to the cultivators with holdings of 20 acres and below.

Under the scheme 388 iron ploughs and 2900 dry farming sets are to be distributed.

The scheme envisages the distribution of improved implements on 12.5 % and 25 % subsidy. This was not attractive and as such subsidy to be granted is raised from 12.5 to 50 % and 25 % to 30 %. The provision of subsidy was made from the own resources. This has helped in keeping the flow of expenditure.

(29) AGR:25:(S):- The object of the scheme is to improve the quality and per acre yield of cotton grown. The scheme also includes the establishment of check nakas for control on the movements of cotton. The scheme also provides to the cotton grower their requirements such as the know how of better agronomic practices, manuring, supply of fertilisers, plant protection measures and availability of credits.

The scheme aims at distributing 24120 Mds. of cotton seed No. 1422.

The scheme has registered very slow progress during the first four years of plan as it can be seen from the expenditure it has booked i.e. 0.630 lakhs as against plan provision of Rs. 4.34 lakhs.

(30) AGR:26:(S):- The object of the scheme is to improve the quality and yield per acre of sugarcane by providing the facilities such as (i) supply of disease free sets of improved varieties through well-planned nurseries (ii) giving assistance for construction of wells and for installation of pumping sets, (iii) the optimum use of manures and fertilisers, (iv) adopting plant protection measures, (v) Organising cane crop competitions and (vi) demonstrations, trails and other propoganda measures.

This scheme was not originally included in the district plan and no plan provision was made for Bhir district. It is, however, sanctioned late in the year 1962-63 but started functioning in the year 1963-64 for want of technical persons. The plan provision is not known and naturally the progress is slow.

(31) AGR:32:(S+L):- The object of the scheme is to conserve and develop local manual resources including rural compost, town compost, and green manuring by assisting Municipalities and Gram Panchayats in undertaking production of the compost to their full capacities and in facilitating its off take by agriculturists in near by area.

Under the scheme the targets set for achievement are 43000 tons of compost and 1000 acres of Greenmanure.

The scheme has registered slow progress mainly because of the following reasons:

(i) Non-availability of trenching grounds, (ii) for want of suitable land for digging pits in the municipal area, (iii) special trained staff was not appointed by the Municipality and (iv) due to non-availability of equipment. Due to pauidty of Sun-seed for developing green manuring, target under this item is lagging behind.

(32) AGR:35:(L):- This scheme is not implemented.

(33) AGR:36:(S):- This scheme aims at establishing the departmental seed-farms throughout the state to serve as central-point for distribution production and multiplication of pure improved seed of principal food-crops.

Under this scheme one taluka seed farm is provided for each taluka of the district.

For the establishment of taluka-seed farms land acquisition is to be made. But as regards seed-farm at Patoda, no suitable land is made available as such seed-farm at Patoda could not be established and hence the pace of the scheme is very slow.

(34) LAND:1:(S):- This scheme is not functioning for the district Bhir as the work of consolidation is suspended since 1962 for want completion of rights vide D. L. L. R. Poona's letter No. Con./Inspection/Bhir/62/dated 7.7.1962.

(35) COMS:A:(L):- The object of the scheme is provide dry farming sets.

Originally this scheme was not included in the district plan for Bhir district. It is, however, sanctioned at the tag end of December 1964 and naturally the scheme is not still functioning.

(36) MIN:1:(S):- The object of the scheme is to afford financial assistance to cultivators for construction of and repairs to irrigation wells. Under this scheme loans are advanced by the Land Development Banks. The Collector is also to advance the loans to those cultivators who were partially assisted during the 2nd plan period with 1st instalment of loan. The 2nd instalments are now to be paid by the Collectors and which are paid in cases falling under this category.

Under this scheme 2300 new-wells are provided for the district Bhir.

The slow progress is mainly because some cultivators did not fulfil the conditions and some have never applied for 2nd instalment.

(37) MIN:6:- The object of the scheme is to complete the remaining works taken up during the 2nd plan period which will help to create more irrigation potential.

The district plan of the Bhir district does not include this scheme. It is sanctioned late in December 1964 and as such it remained to be implemented.

(38) MLK:3'A:(S):- In order to encourage dairy development, under this scheme loans are advanced to purchase pure breed cattles.

The Dairy Development Dept. has sanctioned and disbursed the loans for Aurangabad district (milk producers cooperative unions only) and as such, no separate expenditure is incurred under this scheme for Bhir district. The scheme is sanctioned very late, i.e. at the end of year 1964. This is the main reason as to why the scheme has not functioned for the district Bhir.

(39) MLK:11:(S):- The object of the scheme to develop milk production as a subsidiary means of livelihood among persons producers into cooperatives which will collect milk from their members and supply it to the Government's collection centres.

The scheme is sanctioned late in the year 1964 and hence the scheme has not yet implemented by the cooperative Dept.

(40)FOR:1:(L):- This scheme provides encouragement to the village communities to build up remunerative and economic assets. The scheme provides technical guidance and financial assistance to the village Panchayats in the form of loans and grants to enable them to develop wood land forests and grazing pastures.

This is the only district level scheme under sub-head "Forest" which has not so far taken up for implementation during the 1st four years of plan. At the end of December 1964, this scheme was transferred to Zilla Parishad, Bhir. Even then the scheme remained to be implemented.

(41)FSH:2:(S):- The object of the scheme is to encourage fishermen to equip themselves with essential fishing accessories, like nylon, hemp twine, cotton twine, fish hooks and sail cloth, so as to increase their output of fish.

Following are the targets set for achievement

- (i) 2520 Kgs. nylon (ii) 4200 Kgs. of cotton twine, (iii) 24000 fish hooks (iv) 5000 Yds. sail cloth (v)Hemp twine.

So far under this scheme the expenditure of Rs.48.20 could only be booked as the application are not forth coming for subsidy from Fisherman even after persuasion and as such the progress of the scheme is very slow. They are economically very backward to purchase the costly requisites.

(42)FSH:7:(S):- To increase the yields of fish of inland fisheries, baby fish (carp fry of select quick growing varieties) will be imparted from west Bengal for stocking in Govt. owned tanks and for sale to local authorities for stocking in the tanks owned by them. The scheme also provides collection of local fry to supplement the imparted supplied. In order to rear up the baby fish upto the fingerling stage, nursery tanks are also to be established under this scheme.

Under this scheme 2 nursery units, 2.50 lakhs of stocking of fry and 1.50 lakhs Kgs of netting of fish are the targets set for achievement.

As the suitable sites under low lying area of channel near the project not available, hence the progress is slow.

(43)FSH:10:(S):- The object of this scheme is to assist the fisherman in realising the full value of the production by providing them with facilities for preservation, transport and marketing of fish from landing sites to fish markets.

Under this scheme one truck is to be provided during the plan period.

So far no grants are sanctioned for this scheme and as it has not at all registered any progress during the year in question.

(44) FSH:23:(S):- In order to improve their productive capacity and to make them less dependent on middlemen for marketing this scheme helps to encourage the fisherman to organise themselves into cooperatives.

During the plan period 3 units are to be assisted under the scheme.

Only one cooperative society is registered in the district. Efforts are being made to make fisherman realise to form the society. Generally the response from them is poor and as such this scheme is lagging behind.

(45) FSH:24:(S):- Under this scheme loans are to be advanced to fishermen & fisherman's cooperatives of both medium term & long term duration for productive purposes.

The scheme is not functioning mainly there is no response from the fishermen for taking loans from Govt. as the rate of interest is high.

(46) WM:5:(S):- This scheme provides for the expansion of present grading organisation by establishing new grading centres and for fruits, for eggs, & for gur, ghee & oil grading laboratories and ghee refineries.

Establishment of 3 grading units is the target for the plan period.

No provision is made for this scheme by the Govt. & hence it could not be implemented in the district.

(47) COP:9:(S):- This is a continuing scheme the object of which is to encourage opening and running of grain depots by well managed service cooperatives agricultural credit and multipurpose societies for providing grain loans to backward class families for their maintenance during the preharvest season.

4 grain depots are to be established in the district during the plan period.

This scheme is not taken up for implementation by the Dept. as no grants for this scheme are sanctioned so far.

(48) COP:10:(S):- There are a number of self-employed or hired transport workers (like cycle riksha some cities, & bullocks cart operators in sugar factory areas) who could be organised on cooperative basis so as to enable them to improve their productivity and income by way of more technically advanced vehicles (authorikshas, carts with pneumatic wheels etc.).

Under this scheme target set for achievement is for 1 society.

This scheme is not taken up for implementation by the Dept. in this district so far.

(49) CD:2:(L):- This is centrally sponsored scheme. The scheme mainly provides facilities for drinking water supply.

The expenditure booked under this scheme upto 1964-65 amount to Rs. 5.899 lakhs.

(50) CD:3:(L):- Under this scheme financial assistance is to be provided to rural local authorities to supplement their resources for undertaking works under the local development works programme.

The block Ashti, Patoda, Manjlegaon and some part of Bhir have been declared scarcity areas and the expenditure on the work in this area is being charged to CD:2 being scarcity area. The expenditure on works in respect of non-scarcity area of remaining blocks is only charged to CD:3. Recently two piped water supply schemes have been sanctioned under this scheme.

(51) CD:9:(S):- Under this scheme financial assistance is offered to village Panchayats so as to enable them to discharge their function under the village Panchayat Act. In addition to this, scheme provides payment of land revenue grants to village Panchayats and special assistance to village panchayats in Backward and Adivasi areas.

This scheme envisages distribution of Land Revenue grants to the new panchayats which are established during the 3rd plan period. Since no such panchayats are so far established in the district, the expenditure is nil upto the end of March 1965.

(52) SSI:11:(S+L):- The object of the scheme is to help to artisans, craftsmen, persons engaged in traditional and Cottage industries and handicrafts to organise themselves on cooperative basis and to assist their cooperatives.

Under this scheme four societies are to be established during the plan period.

The progress of the scheme seems to be slow as there are no societies in the district which are eligible for grant of financial assistance under this scheme.

(53) SSI:12:(S):- The object of the scheme is to improve the economic condition of handloom weavers by encouraging them to organise themselves into cooperatives and by offering them financial assistance for variety of purposes.

The artisans are less interested in the job. Secondly the position of the existing societies are not so stable. Thirdly they are not applying for any loans etc. These are the reasons which can be attributed for slow progress of the scheme.

(54) T&C:12:(L):- The object of the scheme is to continue during the 1st year of 3rd plan, assistance to district local Boards, District Boards and Janapada Sabhas for the construction of village approach roads to link them with major and other district roads.

Main reasons for slow progress are as follows:

(1) Shortage of technical hands for survey of Road works due to which plans and estimates could not be prepared.

(ii) All Roads works except T&C:10: requires public contribution which is to be collected from the villagers requires much time.

(55) GE:1:&:2:(L):- The scheme provides for the normal increase in the teaching and inspectorial staff in primary schools at the rate of 2 % per year as regards scheme No. GE:2 it aims at the extension of free and compulsory primary education to the children of age group 6-11. This scheme consists mainly in bringing Vidarbha and Mahathwada regions to the level already reached in west Maharashtra District.

Under this scheme 1107 teachers are to be appointed for 55350 students.

So far 892 teachers are appointed to cover 39,445 students under this scheme.

(56) GE:4:(L):- Under this scheme training facilities are provided to the untrained teachers to receive training. This scheme also provides training to 5624 primary teachers from Marathwada through refresher courses as means of orienting primary schools in Marathwada to the basic pattern.

Though the Zilla Parishad has booked expenditure to the tune of Rs. 4.892 lakhs against plan provision of Rs. 18.22 lakhs, the authorities are confident of utilising the whole plan provision till the March 1966.

(57) GE:13:(L):- The scheme provides for opening of 820 classes in the Government schools in Nagpur and Aurangabad division.

Under this scheme 110 classes and 165 teachers is the target set for achievement.

So far the target of 60 classes and 70 teachers is achieved upto 1964-65.

(58) GE:18:(L):- Under this scheme open merit scholarships are to be granted to 1200 students.

This scheme is not functioning in the district.

(59)GE:21:(S):- The object of the scheme is to provide teaching facilities in technical subjects at secondary level. The scheme also proposes to establish new Technical High school with additional staff, equipment and building.

Establishment of one Technical High school for this district is the target set for this district.

The scheme during the 1st two years of the plan could not be implemented. If started functioning in the year 1963-64 and hence the expenditure is very low i.e. 27.87% against plan provision.

(60)MED:5:(S):- This scheme aims at establishing one Blood Bank for the district at Ambejogai.

This scheme is not functioning since beginning.

(61)PH:1:(L):- The scheme provides for the maintenance of primary Health Centres established in the Stage-I, C.D. Blocks and taken over by public Health Dept. after the stage-I period is over; and also to construct buildings for such centres and staff quarters where the buildings have not been unstructed.

As the funds have not been released by the Government during the 1st four years of plan, the progress of the scheme is very slow. Zilla Parishad is also surrendering Rs. 1.00 lakhs against plan provision of Rs. 1.75 lakhs.

(62)PH:4:(S):- This is continuing scheme, the object of which is to provide protective measures against tuberculosis to the entire population of state.

The expenditure under this scheme is very slow.

(63)S7:11:(S):- Welfare Extension project.

This scheme is not taken up for implementation for this district.

(64)LAB:5:(S):- This is centrally sponsored scheme. This scheme aims at establishing a link between the employers and employment-seekers by bringing them together.

The centre is opened at Ambejogai on 24-6-64 and as such the scheme has registered very slow progress. For this scheme no plan provision is given by the Government.

(65)LAB:6:(S):- This scheme is not taken up for implementation for this district.

The two Five Year Plans have helped to strengthen the foundations of economic and social life and stimulated industrial and economic growth and technological advance in this country. More or less the Third Five Year Plan seeks to carry these processes further. This process of planned development during the preceding decade had laid the foundations for rapid economic growth.

2. While studying the impact made by different schemes one will have to admit that even though the advances made under several sub-heads or heads of development are substantial, the first half of the Third plan has been, for variety of reasons, a period of slow economic growth. The head-wise figures of expenditure and physical achievements under relevant schemes are detailed below:

I. Agricultural programmes:

The different schemes functioning under the Head Agricultural programme are implemented to achieve definite increase in Agricultural production. In order to speed up the proper functioning of these schemes, this Head is sub-divided in 9 different sub-heads. Under Agricultural production, the total expenditure made upto 1964-65 was to the tune of Rs. 10.736 lakhs as against the plan provision of Rs. 29.88 lakhs. However some of the schemes under this sub-head have shown good progress e.g. AGR:36. The targeted area of taluka seed-Farm for Bhir district based on the crop-wise acreage of food crops is 721.29 acres in which all the talukas have got their own farm except Patoda Mahal. The proposal to acquire 67 acres of land for taluka Seed-Farm Patoda has been accepted by the Collector, Bhir and as such target will be full-filled during the 3rd plan. The talukawise particulars of these seed farms is as follows:

AGR:31: The targets set for the plan period are 1000 acres for plantation and Rejuvenation each 14 out of which 848 and 47 acres have been achieved upto 1964-65 by booking an expenditure amounting to Rs. 2.985 lakhs as against plan provision of Rs. 3.50 lakhs.

AGR:34:- This scheme has registered an area of 0.758 lakhs of acres under intensive cultivation against a target of 1.07 lakhs acres. This has helped the cultivators to realise the importance of improved practices and techniques adopted while bringing area under this scheme which will ultimately help to increase agriculture production. Under scheme AGR:26 all efforts are being made to popularise this scheme as seen from the following table:

One of the strongest link in the chain of successful crop production is the efficient use of fertilisers. But it is necessary to provide technical guidance and economic assistance if this link is to be strong. A glance at the use of fertilisers will reveal that slowly but steadily this item is achieving importance. Consumption of fertilisers has increased from 99 M. Tons in 1961-62, to 1329 M. Tons in 1964-65 in this district. (Contd..43..)

The schemes under sub-head soil conservation are provided with ample provision in the 3rd plan. Under this scheme only two sub-divisions were working for the whole district upto 1962-63 and naturally the expenditure could not be booked as per expectations. With the establishment of new sub-divisions the progress under this scheme is geared up. Under this scheme 1.106 lakhs. of acres of land is bunded as against the target of 1.50 lakhs acres. 65.19 % of expenditure is also booked as against plan provision of Rs. 81.19 lakhs.

Under the sub-head Minor Irrigation the physical progress by way of number of wells constructed is not been commensurate with the outlay sanctioned for the programme. This calls for more careful scrutiny into applications for funds from irrigators and supervision over construction activities.

This district has made considerable progress in utilising electric power for irrigation purposes. Even though it can not be denied that there is considerable time lag between availability of electricity and its utilisation. Many cultivators found it difficult to take advantage of the connections sanctioned owing either these inability to raise the necessary finances for purchasing pumps or difficulties involved in the disposal of Diesel sets already available with them. Considering the above points the no. of pumps connected increased from 31 in 1960-61 to 275 in 1964-65. This indicates that people are realising the utility and reliability of electric pumps in Agricultural sector.

Animal Husbandry is the only sub-head which has a booked 202.56% of expenditure against plan provision of Rs. 1.17 lakhs. Idea of its achievement can be had from the table given below:

The scheme under sub-head "Diary Development" & Forest are not taken up for implementation. Due to non-response from the Fishermen the schemes under sub-head of "Fisheries" show very unsatisfactory progress.

II. Cooperative & Community Development.

The total No. of regulated markets functioning in the district in March 1961 were 6 in number. Regulation of marketing activities is necessary for effective enforcement of floor prices & for ensuring that cultivator has a fair return for his produce. Marketing and storage through cooperative organisation must progress side by side. However the progress under sub-head "Warehousing & Marketing" is satisfactory as 102.52% of expenditure is booked against the plan provision of Rs. 2.53 lakhs.

4. "The aim of the plan schemes under cooperation has been to cover every village with cooperatives and within village to cover 100% cultivators with allied facilities such as Marketing societies and storage etc. The No. of Agricultural credit societies increased from 705 in 1960-61 to 752 in 1964-65, similarly Rural godowns increased from 27 in 1960-61 to 67 in 1964-65. Medium Godowns, farming societies in pilot areas and farming societies outside the pilot areas increased from 1, 1 & 6 in 1960-61 to 2, 10 & 23 respectively in 1964-65. The growth of cooperative movement in the district is as follows:-

The community Development programme which aims at transformation of social and economic life of the rural population was launched in the district on 31st March 54. By the end of 1963 the whole of the district is covered by the intensive phase of the Community Development programme. The district had been allotted 6½ C.P.A. pattern blocks at the beginning of Third Plan i.e. at the end of 31-3-1961. As a result of Community Development programme undertaken during the 1st four years of 3rd plan, the no. of C.P.A. pattern blocks has increased from 6½ to 12½ by 1964-65.

Over the period of 12 years, the Community Development programme has made an appreciable impact on the economy in the rural areas. The fact can be seen from the table given below which covers the selected items under C.D. programme.

III. Industry & Mining:

In spite of efforts made by Zilla Parishad and Cooperative Dept. the progress under sub-head "Industries & Mining" is very poor. Two schemes namely (1) Industrial Cooperatives including cooperatives of handicrafts workers, (2) Development of hand looms were taken & no concrete achievements were booked during the year. The no. of villages and towns electrified upto 1961 in the district were 6 as against 73 from 1-4-61 to 31-3-1965.

It is well said that commerce follows the transport and naturally brings prosperity to that area. With this view in mind two schemes are functioning for this district. Even though the progress registered by these scheme is not satisfactory, an all out attempt is being made by Zilla Parishad Bhir to utilise full plan provision.

The rate of achievement under this sub-head is slow which can be seen from the table below:
