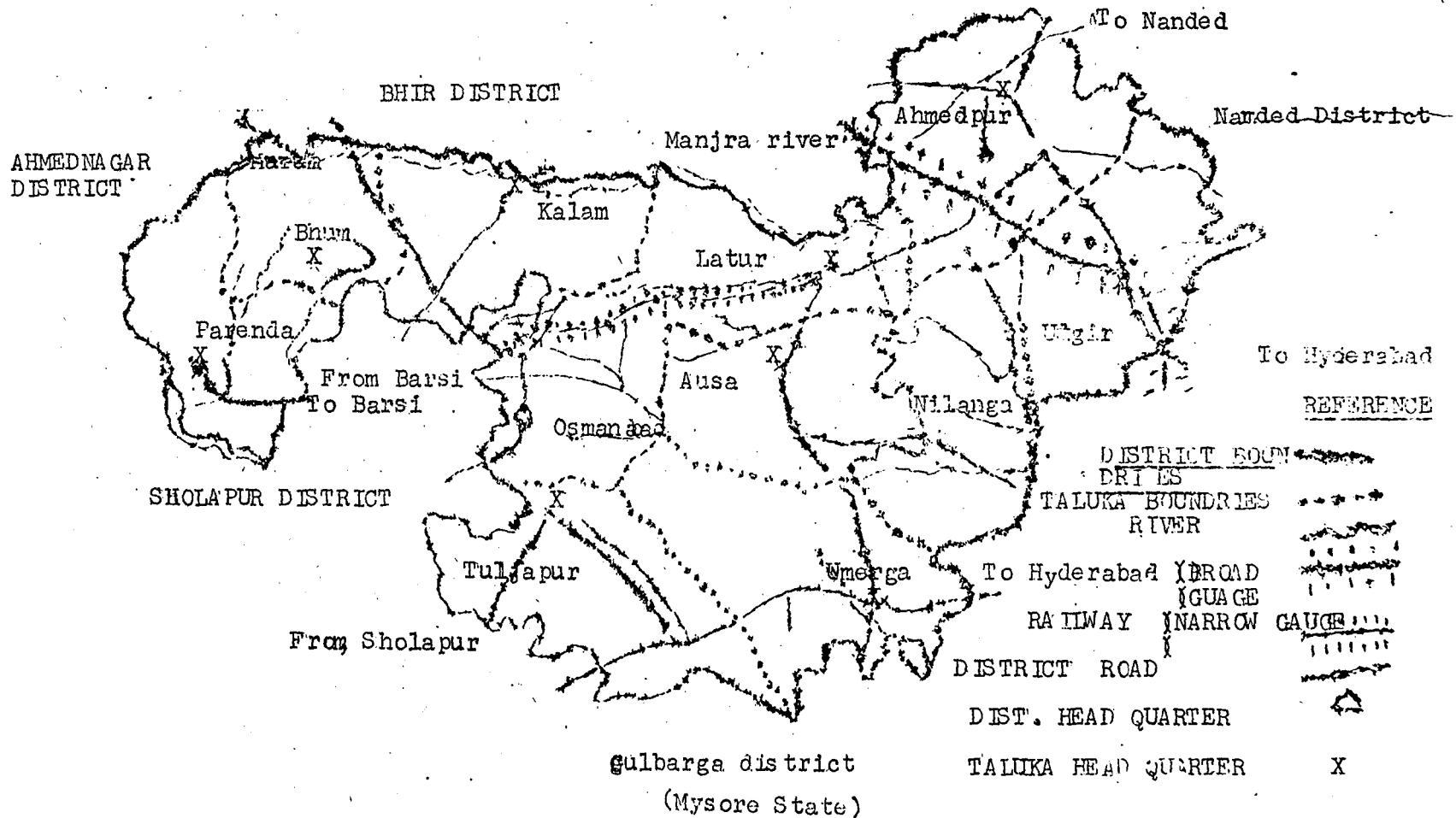

CHAPTER NO. 1.  
INTRODUCTION

1.1 :- Introduction and Location.

The age long famous temple at Tuljapur town of this district enshrines Bhavani, the popular deity of Maharashtra. The cult of Goddess is very ancient one and finds mention even in Vedas where she is called "Aditi". The earliest inscriptional evidence regarding its antiquity can not go beyond 1398 A.D. The Goddess was the Principal deity of Chhatrapati Shivaji and the Chhatrapatis and Peshwas donated quite generously to the temple. Tagara, modern Ter of this district is also an ancient place. It finds mention by Ptolemy in his work "Periplus of Euxathrean sea" (1st Century A.D.). Here an ancient Buddhist daiitya has been converted in later period into a Brahmanical shrine by installing the image of God Vishnu and is at present known as Trivikrama temple. Ter is also the native place of poor saint Gera Kumbhar. The Rashtrakutas who succeeded Chalukyas of Badami in 753 A.D. had their epithet "LATTALURAPUAVARADHISA" suggested that they were the inhabitants of Latur.

Osmabad district is to the extreme south of Mahathwada and lies between  $17^{\circ} 35'$  and  $18^{\circ} 40'$  North latitude and  $75^{\circ} 15'$  and  $76^{\circ} 40'$  East longitude. The Shelapur-Aurangabad road passes through the district and its two towns of Osmabad & Tuljapur. The Latur-Miraj railway line and the Parli-Hyderabad railway line (both of the Central Railway) pass through this district. Latur is the biggest railway station in this district. But Shelapur which is located on Bombay-Madras main line is the more convenient railway station for the inhabitants of this district.

1.2 :- Boundaries :

Osmanabad district is bounded by part of Sholapur district on the south, Bhir district on its north. Nanded district and Bidar district (Mysore State) on its east and Ahmednagar & part of Sholapur district to its west. Sholapur city is the nearest district headquarter about 43 miles (68.8 Kms.) from Osmanabad town and it has therefore close commercial and social ties with Sholapur city. Barsi taluka in Sholapur district is almost surrounded by Osmanabad district. Next to Sholapur Bhir town is about 80 miles (128.0 kms.) from Osmanabad town and is nearly half way on the road connecting Aurangabad with Osmanabad town. Nanded town is about 136 miles (217.6 kms.) and directly connected with Osmanabad town by the State Transport Bus service between Nanded and Sholapur.

1.3 :- Administrative set up

Osmanabad town is the headquarter of <sup>Osmanabad</sup> district which was named after Meer Osman Ali Khan the Nizam of Ex-Hyderabad State on the occasion of his coronation in 1910. The original name of Osmanabad town was 'Dharashiv'. Naldurg was the headquarter of this district before 1861. This district was included in the Hyderabad State in 1853, and formed its part and parcel upto <sup>1956</sup> During states reorganisation in 1956 this district was merged in <sup>bilingual</sup> Bombay State on 1st November 1956; and was subsequently included in Maharashtra on 1st May 1960. This district formerly consisted of eight talukas viz. 1. Osmanabad 2) Tuljapur 3) Parenda 4) Bhum 5) Kalam 6) Latur 7) Ausa & 8) Umerga in the erstwhile Hyderabad State. After the reorganisation of States, three talukas viz. 1) Nilanga 2) Udgir & 3) Ahmedpur of the former Bidar district of the Hyderabad State (Now merged in Mysore State) having an area of 4,603.2 sq. kms.

were transferred to this district under the States Reorganisation Act. 1956. This district consisting of 11 talukas is presently in Aurangabad Division, called as Marathwada comprising five districts viz. 1) Aurangabad, 2) Parbhani, 3) Nanded, 4) Bhair & 5) Osmanabad. Almost all district offices of Osmanabad district are located at Osmanabad town which is situated on the bank of river 'Bhogawati'. Yedshi is the nearest railway station about 13 miles from the Osmanabad town. Among the districts of Marathwada, Osmanabad had the biggest area under the Nizam's own crown Estate called 'Sarf-e-khas'. The 'Sarf-e-khas' was merged with the Govt. area under the sarfe-e-khas (merger) Regulation in the year 1949. All the Jagirdar areas were abolished and taken over under direct Government administration in the same year. There are 13 towns having municipalities and 1,388 inhabited villages in this district.

In 1951 census there were 19 towns, but as the definition of town was changed in 1961 census, only 13 of them were classified as towns. Out of 13 towns, Latur, Osmanabad, and Udgir have got city municipalities and all other remaining 10 towns have town municipalities.

All the 11 talukas places are taluka headquarter towns in addition to Murum (in Umerga taluka) and Naldurg (in Tuljapur taluka) towns.

There are in all 1,423 revenue villages in this district of which 12 villages are merged in urban areas and 23 villages are uninhabited villages.

The Collector is incharge of general administration, law and order, treasury, land revenue and civil supplies. He is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector in his office and three Deputy Collectors who hold the charge of the three revenue divisions and have their headquarters at Osmanabad Latur and Udgir



respectively. Tahsildars are incharge of taluka offices

Zilla Parishad Pattern.

The Zilla Parishad, Osmanabad came into existence on 1st May 1962 . The Parishad consists of 58 members out of which 52 are elected, 4 are associated members and 2 are lady co-opera members. The talukawise distribution of elected members is as under.

The four associated members of the Parishad are 1) Chairman, District Central Co-operative Bank, Latur. 2) Chairman District Marketing Society Ltd., Latur. 3) Chairman, District Industrial Co-operative Association, Ltd. Latur. 4) Chairman District Co-operative Board, Osmanabad. The president, Vice-President and two chairman incharge of different committees are amongst the elected members. The President is incharge of the Zilla Parishad meetings and standing committees. The Vice-President is the Chairman of Health and Works Department

and Finance Department committees and the other-incharge of Agriculture Animal Husbandry, Co-operative and Industries Departments, committees. For administrative purpose, the Chief Executive Officer, is the head of the Zilla Parishad. The Zilla Parishad consists of 21 branches. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer assists the Chief Executive Officer in the overall administration.

1.4 Area :-

14,271.7

The area of Osmanabad district is 14,271.7 sq.kms.

according to the figures furnished by the Surveyor General of India which is 22.05% of the area of Marathwada and 4.68% of the area of Maharashtra State. The rural area of this district is 13,845.0 sq. kms. and the urban area is 426.7 sq.kms. The area reported by the Director of Land Records, Maharashtra State, for Osmanabad district is (14256 Sq. Kms.) . In Marathwada Region this district <sup>is</sup> next to the Aurangabad district in size. In terms of area Osmanabad district ranks seventh among the 26 districts of Maharashtra State. The average area of a district of Marathwada works out to and (13299.60 sq. Kms) the average area per district in Maharashtra State is ( 11799.992 Sq.Kms.)

1.5 :- Topography :-

A major portion of this district is a laterite plateau with an average height of 2,000 feet above sea level. This district is covered with small hills and off shoots of Balaghat . Parts of Bhim, Ausa, Kham, Osmanabad & Tuljapur talukas are situated on Balaghat ranges and the rest are situated on table land.

The district lies partly in the upper Godavari basin and partly in the Phima basin. Ahmedpur , Udgir, Kal Ausa Latur and Nilanga talukas are situated on the plateau

of the Balaghat and lie in the valley of the Manjra which is an important tributary of the Godavari. Osmanabad and Umerga talukas are drained by the Terna, an important feeder of the Manjra. Parenda taluka and parts of Bhum, Tuljapur and Umerga talukas are in the basin of the Sina river which is a tributary of the Bhima.

Bhum town commands the highest elevation of 2,500 feet from sea level whereas Parenda town has the lowest height of 1,735 feet from sea level amongst the towns of the district.

The average height of the plateau is 2,000 feet above sea level. The low land portion to the south of the plateau lies in the Bhima basin.

#### 1.6 :- Hills, River system, Soils.

The main system of hills is the Balaghat and its offshoots. A branch of the Balaghat enters the district from the north west corner from Ahmednagar and stretches to the south east. It divides the district into two portions, a plateau to the north-east and east and low lands to the west, south-west and south. The general slope of the plateau is from south-west to north-east.

There are two broad natural zones in the district viz. 1) The Balaghat plateau drained by the Manjra and the Terna rivers and their tributaries, and 2) The southern low land plain which is in the Bhima basin. The river Manjra flows on the northern border and demarcates this district from the Bhir district. In addition to hill ranges the district abounds in a net work of rivulets running from all sides.

The Manjra which rises in Patoda taluka of Bhir district runs towards the east along with the northern boundary as far as the north eastern corner of Latur taluka where it takes a southerly direction before entering Bidar district of the Mysore State. Its length in the district is about 65 miles.

The Terna flows from west to east in Osmanabad, AUSA, Umerga and Nilanga talukas and meets the Manjra river near the eastern boundary of the district. The Manyad is also a tributary of the Manjra. It flows towards north-east through Ahmedpur taluka and enters Wanded district to meet the Manjra on the eastern boundary of the district. The Tawarja which drains Latur taluka joins the Manjra at Siwani village. The Sina flows on the western border of Parenda taluka from north to south. The Bori flows through Tuljapur and joins the Sina river lower down in Sholapur district. Even though there are a number of small rivers and rivulets streaming in the district like the Bori in Tuljapur taluka or the Manyad in Ahmedpur taluka or the Bannura in Umerga taluka or the Bananga in Bhim taluka, they are practically dry for most part of the year as the water from them drains out of this district from the high plateau. This leads to considerable shortage of water in the district.

There are small tanks like Balubhai and Ramdhara in Tuljapur taluka, and Kala and Lal lakes in Nilanga taluka. The water is used for drinking purpose as well as for irrigation.

The soil can be divided into 3 zones viz. 1) The eastern part consisting of Ahmedpur, Udgir talukas and part of Latur and AUSA talukas, 2) Osmanabad, Kalam talukas and part of Latur, AUSA and Umerga talukas 3) Tuljapur, Parenda & Bhim talukas .

The first zone consists in general of light and light medium soils. They are of inferior type, not retentive of moisture and are therefore, suitable only for cultivation of kharif crops. The soils in some parts of Nilanga are of laterite type.

The second zone consists of changing types of soils, Heavy, deep black cotton soils as against shallow light soils are found in this zone. Due to this peculiarity of the soil, both kharif and rabi crops are grown in this area. Broadly it can be said that eastern parts of Osmanabad, Latur, AUSA and Kalam talukas grow more kharif crops than of rabi crops, while the western parts of these talukas predominantly grow rabi crops.

The third zone consists of heavy soils which are more retentive of moisture. Hence rabi crops are the major crops in this area. The mountainous ranges in this zone have formed typical strips suitable for paddy cultivation. This is a peculiarity of this zone. Even though the soil types classified above on are

a broad basis, varieties in types of soils are found within the talukas and more within the zones categorised above.

The forests in this district are scattered but are somewhat dense in Tuljapur, Kalam and Udgir talukas. But comparatively there are less forests in this district. This has resulted in soil erosion to a large extent.

1.7:- Climate, Temperature and rainfall.

As the district forms part of the Deccan plateau, its climate is dry and is subject to extremes. The year can be divided into rainy season from middle of June to the end of September, a sultry period from about the end of September to the middle of November, winter from the middle of November to the end of January, a dry period during February and March & Summer during April, May and the middle of June. Summer is in general full of gales and gusty winds. Even though the variations in temperature is large in general and the weather is subject to extremes of heat or cold, to a <sup>small</sup> extent, the summer season in the district is cooler than in the other districts of Marathwada region. This is due to the fact that the district is situated at a higher altitude. In general the climate of Osmanabad district is considered to be bracing and salubrious.

Osmanabad district gets rains from south-west monsoon like other districts of Deccan plateau and the rains start in the middle of June, become intense in July and cease by the end of September. The normal rainfall of Osmanabad district is about 31" (784 mms.) But it is observed that it has increased during the last few years. Tuljapur and Osmanabad talukas on the west usually get about 1,123.00mm. or 45" of rainfall. Ausa, Umarga and Nilanga talukas usually get 1,346.20 to 1,016.00 mm. or 53" to 40" of rainfall, while Parenda and Bhum talukas get near about 762.00 to 888mm. or 30" to 35" of rainfall. This part comes in the shadow of Western Ghat and is therefore, called "rain shadow" area. Because of the low rainfall

in Parenda and Bhum talukas there is always a fear of scarcity and shortage of water. It may be noted that these talukas are adjacent to the Ahmednagar district, which is frequently hit by scarcity. These talukas are hilly and are <sup>backward</sup> as compared to the other talukas in Osmanabad district. The northern part of Ahmedpur taluka is also some times affected by scarcity of water. But in general Osmanabad district is not considered as scarcity area.

The Fact-Finding Committee appointed by the former Govt. of Bombay in 1960 has reported that rainfall is not dependable in the following areas and they are likely to be affected by scarcity conditions as shown below.

The highest rainfall recorded at Ahmedpur was 647.60 mms. and the lowest recorded at Nilanga was 348.33 mms. during the year 1965. In 1966 the highest rainfall was recorded at Osmanabad i.e. 914.20 mms. and the lowest was recorded at Ausa i.e. 622.70 mms. The average rainfall of Osmanabad district increased considerably from 505.05 mms. in 1965 to 722.39 mms. in 1966.

1. CLIMATE

Table No. 1 :- This table gives the data/ <sup>regarding</sup> : number of rainy

days and the total rainfall data at selected centres in Osmanabad  
district in 1965 and 1966. From the above table it could be seen  
that in 1965 Ahmedpur tahsil had received the highest rainfall  
which was 647.60 mm. In 1966, however, Osmanabad tahsil took the  
lead by receiving 914.20 mm. rainfall and the lowest was recorded  
in Tuljapur tahsil the rainfall being 556.17 . The average rainfall  
of the district as whole for the year 1966 was 756.20 mms. which  
was 503.73 Mms. in 1965.

Table No. 3 :- This table indicates talukawise rural and urban population and density of population according to 1961 census together with variation in population during last 50 years. Percentage increase in population was 9.85 in 1951 over 1941 population and 22.12 in 1961 over 1951 population. The percentage variation in district population during 1901 to 1961 was 85.90. The rate of increase in the population appears to be high during the last decade. The general density of population in the district was 84 persons per square kilometre in 1961. It is a very significant fact that density per Sq. kilometre in rural areas in Osmanabad district, is more than in any other district in Aurangabad division and even slightly more than that of Maharashtra State, due to perhaps the absence of any urbanisation worth the name. Villages in Osmanabad district on an average are more thickly populated than those in any other district in Aurangabad Division and Maharashtra State. The density per square kilometre in urban areas in Osmanabad district is very low when compared to urban density in any other district in Aurangabad Division. Latur taluka is the most thickly populated where as Tuljapur taluka is the most sparsely populated. The obvious reason for <sup>the</sup> highest density of Latur taluka is due to Latur town being a commercial and an industrial centre in the district.

Table No. 4 :- This table indicates classification of villages according to population ranges <sup>as per</sup> according to 1961 census in Osmanabad district. Out of 1388 inhabited as many as 933 villages or 67% of the total number of villages have population of less than 1000 each showing that the district comprises an overwhelming majority of small villages. Average population per village in Osmanabad district works out to 950. One of the reasons for this is that the district is mainly dependent on agriculture.

Table No. 5 :- This table gives talukawise classification of towns according to population ranges in 1961 census. Out of 13 towns 7 towns fall in population range of 5000 to 9999 and 4 towns in the range of 10,000 to 19,999. Latur alone has a population of more than Forty thousand and this is obviously because of its commercial and industrial importance. Osmanabad and Udgir towns are the other two big towns. The slow growth in population of Osmanabad town though a district head quarter, is on account of keen commercial and industrial competition it faces from Sholapur city and Barsi and Latur towns. Osmanabad town also suffers from stunted growth due to absence of railway.

Table No. 6 :- This table gives data on number of workers in each taluka of Osmanabad district. As much as 83.5% of the population in the district is dependent on agriculture and the remaining 16.5% of it is dependent on non-agricultural occupations. The district ranks 3rd amongst the 26 districts of Maharashtra in so far the number of workers engaged in agriculture including labourers are concerned.

Table No. 7:- This table gives statistics of population of the district as per 1961 census according to age groups, mother tongue and religion. From the table it could be seen that population in the age group of 5 to 9 accounted for the highest percentage which was put at 15.42%. Next in descending order was the population in the age group between 0 to 4, 10 to 14, 35 to 44 their respective percentages being 15.35, 12.13 and 10.45 respectively. The lowest percentage of population was to be found in the age group of 60 and above. As to population according to mother tongue, it is to be observed that marathi speaking people accounted for 83.96% of the total population. Then comes the urdu speaking population of which percentage to the total population was 9.91. Lowest

percentage was observed in respect of Gujarathi speaking population. Religion-wise distribution of population, as is observed in the table could be cited as follows. Hindus were great in number the percentage of which was 83.16 to the total population and the lowest being sikhs whose percentage was 0.02.

Table No. 8 :- This table gives scheduled castes and scheduled tribes population in Osmanabad district. Scheduled castes and scheduled tribes population in the district form 13.39% and 0.03% respectively to the total population of the district. Out of them 1,85,779 persons belonging to scheduled castes are in rural areas and 12,093 in urban areas. None of the persons belonging to scheduled tribes reside in urban areas. The population of scheduled castes appears to be almost uniformly distributed in all the talukas. However, it is comparatively more in Udgir, Ahmedpur, Nilanga, and Osmanabad talukas. The population of scheduled tribes appear to be concentrated in Kallam, Osmanabad Nilanga and Parendia talukas.

3) AGRICULTURE

Table No. 9 :- This table deals with land utilization statistics during 1964-65 and 1965-66. It could be seen from the table that major portion of the land was available for cultivation the percentage of which to the total geographical area was 94.33 during 1965-66. Next in order was the fallow land percentage of which was 14.55. Barren and unculturable land and land put to non agricultural use together accounted for 27.96%. The proportion of cultivable waste that of permanent pastures was 1.54% and 2.78% respectively. Forest and in the district occupied a fraction of the total geographical area. The net area sown was 77.71% showing a slight increase over the corresponding figure of 1964-65. However, area sown more than once showed sizeable increase of 6.25% over 1964-65 position. Of the total area sown more than once, Nilanga tahsil had the highest percentage which was 28.60. It could, however, be seen that the position of land utilization as obtained during 1965-66 was with few modifications, more or less the same as previous year.

Table No. 10 - This table deals with the area under different crops in each taluka of Osmanabad district during the years 1964-65 and 1965-66. The area under food crops decreased during 1965-66 and was 74.82%. Of the net area sown which was 0.31% less than in 1964-65. In the total area under food crops jowar both kharif and Rabi, alone accounted for 53.76%. Cereals covered about 52.32%. Of the total net area sown 69.93% was under food crops.

The area under non-food crops however, increased to the extent of 1.98% over and above the corresponding figure of 1964-65. Though under are a/cotton and groundnut decreased, area under total fibres and total oilseeds increased by 1.12% and 2.37% respectively. Of the net area sown area under total fibres and oil seeds accounted for 7.00% and 22.00% respectively. During 1965-66. The net area

sown as also gross cropped area increased by 0.05% and 0.63 % over ~~above the corresponding figures~~ for the year 1964-65.

Table No. 11 :- The table gives <sup>their</sup> yield per hectare of different crops and ~~their~~ total out-turn during 1964-65 and 1965-66. Unlike the previous year, out-turn of rice declined considerably during 1965-66 recording a decrease of 37.79% . Wheat, jowar and ba<sup>ra</sup> as in the last year ~~declined continuously~~. Yield per hectare of the total cereals as a whole showed <sup>a</sup> decrease of 20.74 % during 1965-66 over the figure of 1964-65. Consequently, the out-turn of cereals also decreased by about 8.27 % during 1965-66. Though the yield per hectare of all the pulses with the exception of gram, showed an upward trend, the out-turn went down by 40.64 % 1965-66 ~~than~~ <sup>in</sup> what was in 1964-65. The yield as well as the out-turn of groundnut also declined by 42.50% and 4.24% respectively. Whereas, that of sesamum increased slightly. <sup>W</sup>Sugarcane and cotton showed remarkable increase in respect of yield per hectare and out-turn . The increase in yield per hectare and out-turn in respect of sugarcane was 19.80% and 123.160% respectively and that of cotton was 36.36% and 13.56% respectively over and above the corresponding figures of 1964-65.

Table No. 12 :- This table gives the information regarding the area irrigated by different sources in each tahsil of Osmanabad district during 1964-65 and 1965-66. It could be seen from the table that the net irrigated area showed an upward trend by recording 2.61 % increase over the corresponding figure for the year 1964-65 . These being preponderance of well irrigation, it accounted for 89.62% of the net area irrigated and formed the ~~the~~ <sup>prime</sup> source. There were very few tanks hence accounted for ~~av~~ <sup>under</sup> meagre percentage i.e. 0.11% only. Kallam tahsil had largest acreage ~~and~~ irrigation and formed 19.04 % of the net area irrigated whereas ~~Udigr~~ <sup>tahsil</sup> accounted for only 2.04 % during 1965-66.

Table No. 13 :- This table gives area irrigated/ crops in each taluka of Osmanabad district during 1964-65 and 1965-66. The total area under irrigation was 5.49% during 1964-65 and increased to 5.57% during 1965-66 of the total area under cultivation. Of the total area under irrigation the percentage of food and non-food crops were 96.87 %, and 3.13 % respectively during 1965-66 as against 96.14% and 3.86% of the same during 1964-65. Area under cereals alone accounted for 64.42% of the total area under irrigation. Irrigated area under pulses however decreased by 2.65 % during 1965-66. Irrigated area under sugarcane was increasing constantly. It increased to 10.46% during 1965-66 as against 10.37% during 1964-65 recording 0.87% increase. Amongst different talukas Kalam had maximum area under irrigation i.e. 17.95% of the total irrigated area. Udgir tahsil had lowest irrigated area forming only 1.81 % of the total area under irrigation.

Table No. 14 :- This table gives the number of irrigation wells in each taluka of Osmanabad district/1964-65 and 1965-66. The total number of wells increased by about 9.19 % during 1965-66 over and above the corresponding figure of 1964-65. There was also a gradual increase in the number of wells in use showing 8.96 % rise over the position during 1964-65. The number of wells not in use remained more or less the same during 1965-66 with a slight decrease too negligible to be taken notice of. Umerga tahsil had the highest number of wells in use the percentage of which to the total wells in use was 15.12 during 1965-66. Bhim tahsil seemed to have the lowest percentage of well in use with having only 4.19% wells in use of the total wells in use.

Table No. 15 :- This table gives the information regarding the minor irrigation works and area irrigated by them in Osmanabad district during 1965-66. Of the total area irrigated (excluding those by wells) minor irrigation works owned by state government alone accounted for 82.36%. Zilla Parishad, with its minor irrigation works, irrigated 6.85% of the total irrigated area and the rest was irrigated with the help of private canals such as owned and operated by co-operatives.

Table No. 16 :- This table shows the major and medium irrigation projects in Osmanabad district as on 30-6-67. Khasapur project, Harni project, Chandani project, Thirna Project, etc. were some of the projects existed in the district during the period under reference. Khasapur project irrigated an area of 1964 hectares which was the highest. Thirna project was next to follow in this regard with its irrigated area of 1,065 hectares. The total area irrigated by four projects namely Khasapur, Chandani, Thirna and Harni was 5,869 hectares as on 30-6-67.

Table No. 17. This table gives the statistics of agricultural wage rates prevailing in the district during 1966-67. For the collection of the said data three different rural places viz. Kingaon (Ahmedpur tahsil), Killari (Ausa tahsil), and Mankeshwar (Parenda tahsil), were selected. The workers were divided into two categories viz. skilled and unskilled. In the former included carpenters, blacksmith and cobbler and the like and in the latter other, field workers. The average wage rates, <sup>at</sup> Kingaon centre, of the skilled workers ranged between Rs. 3 and Rs. 3.50 and those of unskilled workers from Rs. 1.50 and Rs. 2.00. Female workers who were generally categorised <sup>as</sup> unskilled ones, used to get between Rs. 0.62 and Rs. 1.12. The average wage rate of herdsman was Rs. 1.00 during the period under reference. At Killari centre the average <sup>wage</sup>/rate of skilled workers was Rs. 2.00. unskilled workers were getting between Rs. 1.50 to Rs. 2.00. The average wages rate of a female workers ranged between Rs. 0.75 to Rs. 1.12 during 1966-67. <sup>At</sup> Mankeshwar centre the average wage rate of carpenters and blacksmiths were Rs. 2.00 and that of a cobbler ranged between Rs. 1.75 to Rs. 2.00. The wage rates of male unskilled workers moved between Rs. 1.50 and Rs. 2.00 and that of female workers between Rs. 0.79 and Rs. 0.89.

Table No. 18. The table gives the talukawise statistics of agricultural implements in the district in the year 1966. There were 42,000 ploughs of which 51.05% were iron ploughs. Udgir and Ahmedpur talukas had the largest percentage of wooden ploughs whereas Kallam and Udgir had maximum number of iron ploughs. Of the total sugarcane crushers 42.26% were worked on power and the rest by bullocks. Osmanabad and Umerga had both types of crushers great in number. Of the total Oil pumps Umerga, Osmanabad, Ausa and Nilanga accounted for the larger percent age



of oil pumps their percentage to the total being 20.23, 11.34, 10.83 and 9.82 in 1966 respectively. The number of electric pumps was significantly more in Umerga, Osmanabad, Latur and Tuljapur respectively.

Table No. 19 :- This table deals with famine, scarcity and akin to scarcity data in Osmanabad district during 1966-67. Neither famine nor scarcity or akin to scarcity condition was prevailed in the district, during the year under reference.

②) ANIMAL HUSBANDRY, FOREST, & FISHERIES

Table No. 20 :- This table gives category wise livestock population of important animals in each taluka of Osmanabad district as per 1966 livestock census. Of all the talukas, Udgir had the highest number of livestock population/the percentage to the total livestock population/which was 12.73 in the district. In respect of cattle, buffaloes, sheep and goats which are the constituents of the livestock the following proportions/observed in the district in 1966. Even in respect of cattle buffaloes, if Udgir had kept its lead. The percentage to the total No. of cattles and buffaloes being 12.91 and 16.85 respectively. It had the maximum number of both. Udgir also had the highest number/cows and buffaloes in milk. Bhoom and Pafenda accounted for the lowest number of cattle and buffaloes respectively. Pafenda and Nilanga claimed maximum number of goats and sheep respectively. The percentage of which to the total number of goats and sheep was 17.65 and 16.46 respectively. The proportion of poultry population was high in Osmanabad. Umerga and Pafenda, their percentage to the total poultry being 14.32, 12.19 and 11.91 respectively.

Table No. 21 :- This table gives the statistics regarding veterinary district aid facilities available in each taluka of Osmanabad district during 1966-67. There was only one fullfledge veterinary hospital located at Osmanabad. In addition there were 51 dispensaries located at Ahmedpur, Latur, Kallam, Udgir and AUSA, and 43 aid centres scattered all over the district. The number of animals treated in all these veterinary treatment centres was 2,32,124 in 1966-67. Also, there were 14 insemination centres and the number of animals inseminated was 1398 during 1966-67.

Table No. 22 :- This table deals with the disease wise mortality of livestock in Osmanabad district during the years 1965-66 and 1966-67. During the year 1965-66 the percentage of deaths to number of attacks was 6.16. It increased to 7.21 during 1966-67. Though there was an increase in the percentage of deaths, number of attacks actually showed a remarkable decrease of about 32.29%. The previous years unusual increase in the number of attacks might be due to out-break of foot and mouth diseases. Haemorrhage septicaemia took a heavy toll of cattle during 1966-67. The poultry also suffered as a great set back during 1966-67. There were as many as 863 attacks during 1966-67 as against 167 during 1965-66. Of all Ranikhed disease caused considerable number of poultry death as it did in the previous year 100.

Table No. 23 :- This table gives the number of slaughter houses and animals slaughtered in each of them during 1965-66 and 1966-67. The number of slaughter houses increased from 6 during 1965-66 to 11 during 1966-67. The number of animals slaughtered also increased considerably during 1966-67 recording an increase of about 206.63% over and above the corresponding figure of 1965-66.

Table No. 24 (A):- This table gives the area under forest in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 and 1966-67. During 1965-66. The total area under forest was 1522 hectares the whole of which was unclassified. In 1966-67 forests covered an area of about 1743 hectares indicating an increase of about 14.52% over the corresponding figure of 1965-66.

Table No. 24(B):- This table shows forest products and their value during 1965-66 and 1966-67. The forest area being too insignificant, its yield were also negligible in the period under question. In fact, the value during 1966-67 decreased to Rs. 1425 from Rs 1525 during 1965-66.

## 5. EMPLOYMENT, INDUSTRY, MINING & ELECTRICITY

Table No. 26:- This table gives statistics regarding the number of working factories and average daily number of workers employed in them in 1966. There were only 30 registered factories in the district of which only 21 were working, in the year 1966 with 824 workers employed in them. Lack of adequate transport facilities, particularly of railways, non-availability of mineral wealth and shyness of capital account for, to a great extent, this general backwardness of <sup>the</sup> district in the field of Industry. The economy of the district being agricultural one, there is every possibility of agro oriented industry being developed in this part. The notable beginning has already been made with the establishment of Sugar factory at Dhoki.

Table No. 27 :- This table gives the information regarding the number of factories according to the category of industry and number of workers therein <sup>in</sup> 1966. As has already been stated, of the existing industries majority of them are agro-oriented such as ginning factories, oil mills, dal mills etc. No heavy and medium size industry manufacturing equipments were to be found in the district during the year under reference.

Table No. 28 : This table indicates the distribution of factories according to number of days worked in Osmanabad district. Many of the industries, being dependent on the agricultural raw-material were seasonal in nature. There were very few units which ran quite a good number of days in a year. These included food processing and the like

Table No. 29 :- This table gives monthwise information regarding number of registration made, number of vacancies notified and numbers/placements made during 1965-66 and 1966-67. The number of registration for employment found to be increased in the months of July and August and January and February during both the years under question following the results of different examinations. The total number of registrations made during 1966-67 decreased by 1.42% as compared to the position during 1965-66. However, the number of vacancies notified showed considerable increase of about 45.80% resulting in about 45.80% increase in placement over and above the figure of 1965-66. All the placements but one were in the public sector as it was during 1965-66 too. This might be due to inadequate and insignificant industrial and commercial activities in the district.

Table No. 30 :- This table deals with the occupational distribution of registrations and placements according to national classification of occupations. As in the past majority of the placements were in professional, technical and clerical categories during 1966-67. As between the professional and clerical, the former consumed away major share. The percentage of placements in the rest of the categories was too insignificant to be mentioned here which can be seen from the following statement which gives occupationwise percentage of placements during 1966-67.

Table No. 31 :- Of the total employees reported in 1966, majority of them were absorbed in construction, services, Trade and commerce, manufacturing and agriculture and their respective percentages to the total employees reported were 11.09, 5.27, 2.12 and 1.25 in 1966. In 1967, however, there were changes in the volume of employment.

The volume of employment showed an increase of about 19.02% in manufacturing, 35.57% in construction, 2.56% in trade, commerce & miscellaneous and 1.84% in services. It also decreased in case of agriculture by about 32.01% over the corresponding figure of 1966.

Table No. 32 (a):- This table gives the information about the number of Government servants employed <sup>-in</sup> different departments and their categories along with pay ranges. It could be seen from the above table that majority of the servants employed in different departments were in class III and class IV categories.

The percentages of class III & class IV servants to the total number of employees was 56.10 and 42.06 respectively. Considerable number of class III Government servants were within the pay range of Rs. 100 to 149 and that the pay range wherein majority of class IV Government servants were employed was Rs 25.00 to 49.00. Class II and Class I Govt. servants accounted for only a fraction of the total employees their percentages being 0.31 and 1.53 respectively.

Table No. 32 (b) :- This table gives the statistics of government employees according to the Class and department they belonged to as it was on 1st July 1966. Of the total number of government employees 56.12% and 42.06% were class II and class IV. The class I & class II categories formed too small a portion their percentage being 0.31 and 1.53 respectively. Majority of the government servants were employed in Revenue and Forest, home department and Agriculture and Co-operation departments. Their percentages to the total employees were 42.53, 19.81 and 18.30 respectively.

Table No. 33 :- This table gives the information regarding Industries in Osmanabad district, their productive capital, employment, gross output and value added for the year 1961. There were only 23 registered factories in Osmanabad district in the year 1961. Of the total factories 78.20% were manufacturing food preparations and 21.79% belonged to other types. Food preparation factories accounted for

26.83% and all others accounted 73.17% of the total productive capital. Miscellaneous food preparation factories employed 33.80% and other easily types of factories employed 66.20% of the total workers. The gross available output of miscellaneous food preparation factories was 84.84% and that of other types was 15.16. Of the value added by factories, miscellaneous food preparation factories accounted for 45.28% and that of other types accounted for 54.72%. It can be seen from the above table that major factories belonged to food preparation as the raw material of the

Table No. 34 :- This table gives statistics relating to generation

consumptions of electricity in Osmanabad district, during 1965-66 and 1966-67. The generation of electricity during 1966-67 decreased by about 68.00% than the corresponding figure of 1965-66. This might be due to increase supply of electricity from Koyana hydro electric project and electricity purchased increased considerably as much as <sup>by</sup> 149.06% over and above the corresponding figure of 1965-66. With the availability of cheap supply of electricity use of it also showed enormous increase. The increase in the electricity <sup>sold</sup> was about 59.91% during 1966-67 over and above the corresponding figure of 1965-66. Of the total electricity consumed, industrial accounted for as much as 28.43% during 1966-67. This was nevertheless, remarkable increase in the use of electricity by industrial sector as compared to previous year i.e. 1965-66. Domestic consumption commercial lighting and public lighting consumed away 13.01%, 10.50% and 5.97% respectively of the total supply of electricity during 1966-67.

Table No. 35 :- This table shows the number of towns and villages electrified and population covered by these towns and villages, by the end of March 1961, 1966 and 1967. By March end 1961, not a single village had electricity. Only 4 towns covering about 88,624 of the total population were electrified. In 1967, however all the 13 towns and in addition 183 villages were electrified which covered a population of about 5,31,036. Only 13.18% of the total villages and 25.79% of the total population of the district had the benefit of electricity by the end of March 1967.

6) COOPERATION

Table No. 36 :- This table deals with different types of co-operative societies working in Osmanabad district. From the table it can be observed that during the year 1966-67, 1006 agricultural credit societies were functioning in this district. The number of agricultural non-credit societies was 149 and that of non-agricultural non-credit societies was 188. Of the total number of co-operative societies the percentage of different types of co-operative societies was as follows. Agricultural credit societies formed 72.67%, non-agricultural credit societies 2.24%, agricultural non-credit societies were 11.09% and non-agricultural non-credit societies were 14.00%.

Table No. 37:- This table gives details regarding the District Central Co-operative Bank, the District Industrial Co-operative Bank, the District Land Development Bank and the Urban Bank during 1965-66 and 1966-67. The number of branches of the District Central Co-operative Bank increased from 35 during 1965-66 to 40 during 1966-67. Share Capital, Reserve and other funds, working capital and loans advanced increased by 14.21%, 40.10%, 13.78% and 67.35% respectively over the corresponding figures of 1965-66. This remarkable increase in the number of branches as also in the share capital, loan advanced might be due to the fact that the D.C.C. bank has been financing almost all the operations of agriculture in order to render the agriculture, a lucrative industry. Along with the D.C.C. bank, the Urban Bank has also been playing its role satisfactorily with its limited means.



Table No. 38 :- This table gives information regarding agricultural primary credit societies in respect of their number, share capital, working capital etc. The number <sup>of</sup> primary agricultural societies remained unchanged. However, increase was observed in the number of individual <sup>members</sup> ~~unit~~, share capital, reserve funds, their percentage increase being 3.25, 21.71 and 17.92 respectively over and above the corresponding figures of 1965-66. Loans recovered, outstandings, and overdues also showed an upward trend. The working capital and loans advanced, however, <sup>by 2.53% and 1.67%</sup> declined/declined respectively during 1966-67 than what it was during 1965-66.

Table No. 39 :- This table gives information about ~~the~~ different types of co-operative societies functioning in the district during 1965-66 and 1966-67. Of all the co-operative societies, agricultural non-credit societies formed 40.82%. Non agricultural non-credit societies accounted for 51.51% which was the highest. There were only few non agricultural credit societies during 1966-67.

Table No. 40 :- This table deals ~~in-the~~ with the ~~map~~ tahsilwise number of agricultural marketing societies in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 and 1966-67. There was one apex institution viz. District Central Co-operative marketing society alongwith 13 such primary societies located at different tahsil places in the district. Tuljapur and Parendra tahsils had two each and the rest of them had <sup>one</sup> each. The purchase and sale by the apex institutions as well as by the primary societies was increased by about ~~118.14% & 14.61%~~ 118.14% & 14.61% respectively during 1966-67 over the corresponding figures of 1965-66. While the sale of agricultural produce decreased, the sale of agricultural requisite registered a remarkable rise both by the apex institution as also by the primary ~~sche~~ societies during 1966-67.

Table No. 41 :- This table indicates the operations of co-operative societies of different types during 1965-66 and 1966-67. Unlike the last year's position the achievements during 1966-67 in the field of agricultural marketing showed considerable decrease of about 66.44%. Milk and Milk products societies, e. consumers stores and Housing societies increased their operations considerably. The percentage increase in the aforementioned heads was 63.82%, 25.39% and 57.01% respectively during 1966-67 over the corresponding figures of 1965-66.

Table No. 42 :- This table deals with the operation of regulated markets in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 and 1966-67. Ahmedpur, Latur, Osmanabad, <sup>Mirum,</sup> Nilanga, Udgir, Kalam are the places where there exists regulated markets. It is seen from the table that arrivals <sup>in</sup> the regulated markets together decreased by 7.46% during 1966-67 than what it was during 1965-66. On the contrary, the value however, of all these commodities increased considerably to the extent of about 20.45%, might be it was due to an overall increase in the price of all the commodities. With the exception of Osmanabad market arrivals in all markets decrease, significantly. The arrivals and the value of the commodities in Osmanabad market increased by 46.66% & 69.29% respectively during 1966-67 over the corresponding figures of 1965-66. It is also to be noted that shortfall in the value of <sup>Fall in the arrivals</sup> the commodities was not proportionate to the fall in the arrivals of commodities was more where as fall in the value was only nominal. There were also cases where the arrivals went down considerably but there was simultaneous increase in the value. For example, in Latur market during 1966-67 the arrivals decreased by 8.38% while the value increased by 23.99%. This could be attributed to the <sup>Prices</sup> enormous rise in the

Table No. 43 :- This table indicates tahsil wise information regarding the number of registered money lenders and loans advanced by them during 1965-66 & 1966-67. The number of money lenders increased from 21 in 1965-66 to 50 during 1966-67. The loans advanced by them also showed a rise of about 29.02% during 1966-67 over and above the corresponding figure of 1965-66. The loans advanced to traders and non-traders increased by 28.10% and 9.98% respectively during 1966-67. The percentage of loans advanced to traders and non-traders during 1966-67 were 44.90 and 55.10 respectively.

7) MEDICAL & PUBLIC HEALTH

medical facilities available.

Table No. 44 :- This table deals with the public as well as private aided bodies in each tahsil of Osmanabad district in 1965 and 1966. There was no addition to the number of hospitals. There were 34 which were fully equipped with medical amenities. In addition, there were 34 dispensaries in 1966 which showed an increase of about 9.38% over the corresponding figure of 1965. There were located at taluka headquarters and important towns and villages. The number of doctors and nurses increased by 23.26% and 10.39% respectively over the corresponding figures of 1965. Remarkable increase was observed in the number of indoor and outdoor patients treated. The increase in both was 83.41% & 6.58% respectively over and above the corresponding figures of 1965.

Table No. 45 :- This table gives the number of births and deaths of males, females and also of infants registered in 1965 and 1966. From the table it can be seen that the birth rate increased by 22.18 in 1966 over the corresponding figure of 1965. The death rate, however seemed to have not kept up pace with the birth rate though increase slightly. The percentage increase in the death rate showed gradual down fall since the 1960. The number of infant deaths increased by 38.43% over the corresponding figure of 1965.

Table No. 46 :- This table gives the information about the number of deaths and diseases due to which they occurred in 1965 and 1966. Considerable number of deaths caused, due to, in order of priority, respiratory diseases, diarrhoea and T.B. However, deaths due to epidemics like malaria were lessened to a great extent. This might be due to nation-wide programme undertaken by the Govt. to eradicate them.

Table No.47:- This table gives the statistics about the cholera inoculations and vaccination made in the district during 1965-66 and 1966-67. The number of revaccinations and cholera inoculations fell by 8.47 % & 2.34 % during 1966-67. Might be, it was because of the government's strenuous efforts to eradicate such epidemics as mentioned above. The primary vaccination below one year however, increased by 1.36% . This might be due to disproportionate increase in the number of births.

Table No. 48:- This table indicates the hygienic drinking water supply sources available in the rural areas of Osmanabad district. Out of the total number of 1388 inhabited villages 15.41 % of the villages have no hygienic drinking water supply and 30.03 % of them have inadequate water supply. Out of the total number of 112 inhabited villages in Umerga taluka 53 villages or 51.78% of the villages have inadequate water supply and out of 180 inhabited villages in Nilanga taluka, 46 villages or 25.55% villages have without drinking water supply facilities.

#### 8) EDUCATION

Table No. 49 :- This table indicates the number of literates and the percentage of literacy in each taluka of Osmanabad district according to 1961 census. The percentage of literacy in the district rose from 10.06% in 1951 to 17.05% in 1961. Male literacy was 27.52% and among the females it was 6.02% in 1961.

According to the literacy of male and female the district ranked 26 district in 1961 of Maharashtra 23rd and 22nd among the State in 1961. The highest literacy of 20.96% during 1961 was found in Latur taluka and lowest literacy of 12.87% was found in Parenda taluka of this district. The percentage of literacy in urban areas is highest in Osmanabad taluka being 42.24% where as it is lowest in Bhamburda taluka being 26.92%. In rural area, Umerga taluka registered highest literacy percentage of 16.98% and lowest literacy percentage is found in Parenda taluka being 11.43%. Osmanabad district stands second in Aurangabad Division in respect of literacy according to 1961 census. In rural literacy the district however stands first in Aurangabad Division.

Table No. 50 :- This table indicates the number of literacy and educated persons in rural areas in each taluka of this district according to 1961 census. In all 85.11% of the rural population was illiterate. Among the literates areas 73.79% were mere literates without any educational standards and remaining 26.21% were having different educational standards. A negligible percent of the rural population i.e. 0.29% completed matriculation standard of education. This indicates that the rural population in the district is far behind in educational field as compared to the urban population of the district.

Table No. 51 :- This table indicates the educational attainments in urban areas in Osmanabad district as per 1961 population census. In all 64.63% of the urban population was illiterate. The literate without any educational level formed 52.31% and persons having education upto primary and matriculation standard formed 38.73% and 6.84% respectively of the total urban population of the district. Matriculates formed 2.42% of urban population in the district.

The technical and non-technical diploma holders formed 0.83%

whereas graduates and post-graduates other than technical formed 0.30%. Technical graduates and post-graduates formed 0.05% of the urban population. All this indicates that a very negligible percentage of even urban population had successfully completed university education. This was due to lack of higher educational facilities in the district particularly for technical diploma, technical degree, and post-graduations. In so far as provision of number of seats for technical training upto diploma level is concerned, Osmanabad district ranked 14th in the 26 districts of Maharashtra state.

Table No. 52 :- This table gives statistics regarding educational institutions, pupils, and teachers in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 and 1966-67. From the table given, it could be seen that at all level from pre-primary to higher education, there had been a spectacular increase in the number of institutions, in the number of students as also in the number of teachers, from the period between 1965-66 to 1966-67. The increase seemed to have been more significant in respect of primary and secondary education. However, institutions imparting special education declined slightly by 8.33% during 1966-67.

Table No. 53 :- This table gives the statistics regarding the educational concessions given to the backward class students in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 and 1966-67. The relative percentages of scheduled caste, scheduled tribe and other backward classes in the total enrolment were 36.95, 4.40 and 58.65 respectively during 1966-67 as against 39.15, 3.68 and 57.17 respectively during 1965-66. Of all the categories, of education, primary and secondary education were benefited most. Their respective percentages to the total enrolment were 72.58% and 24.49 respectively during 1966-67/as against 76.10 and 21.75 during 1965-66 showing 3.52% decrease in case of former and 2.74% increase in case of latter.

Pre-primary, Higher and special education accounted for comparatively negligible percentages in this regard.

Table No. 54 :- This table gives information regarding concessions to economically backward class students of free educations granted / students during 1965-66 and 1966-67. From the table, it could be seen that the school students in the secondary were benefited most. Their percentage to total number of beneficiaries was 95.53 during 1966-67. Which was above the corresponding percentage for the year 1965-66. Of the total amount of concession about 65.94% was for the secondary school students. The beneficiaries of arts, science and other courses accounted for about 3.36% and 0.13% respectively and the concessions granted to them worked out to 25.65% and 73% of the total concessions during 1966-67

Table No. 55:- This table gives information regarding the expenditure on primary education by way of grants-in-aid to local bodies in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 and 1966-67. The overall expenditure on primary education increased by about 13.18% during 1966-67 over and above the corresponding figure of 1965-66. Grants were given to Z.P. only which was solely entrusted with the expansion programme of primary education. The percentages of normal and plan expenditure to the total expenditure were 95.50 and 4.50 respectively as against the corresponding percentages / 71.56 and 28.44 of during 1965-66 respectively.

Table No. 56:- This table gives the number of villages and towns without primary schools in different population ranges in the district in 1966 and 1967. Remarkable progress was achieved in this field. In 1966, there were such 52 villages where no primary schools existed. The number, however, came down to 6 villages. These villages were such that their population was below 200 persons. Nilanga, Ahmedpur and Bhoom tahsils

~~had two, three and one village~~ respectively where no primary school existed.

TRANSPORT & COMMUNICATION

9) Table No. 57 :- This table gives the information regarding length of railways in Osmanabad district for the years 1966 and 1967. There was no addition in the mileage of railways in 1966 and 1967. The total length was 118 Kms. as it was during 1965-66. Consequently the length of railways to 100 sq. Kms. in respect of this district remained the same i.e. 0.83 Kms. in 1966-67 as it was in the last year.

Table No. 58 :- This table shows the extra municipal road length according to category and surface in Osmanabad district as on 31st of March 1961, 1966 and 1967. In the absence of network of railways, roads form the primary means of communications in the district. The Hyderabad-Sholapur national Highway which connects Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra and Mysore States passes through Osmanabad district covering a distance of about 78.83 Kms. Osmanabad is 54 Kms. away from the National highway. There was no change in the length of the highway in 1967. Besides, there were 11 State highways with total length of 503.10 Kms. showing no change over the corresponding figure of 1966. Major District roads and village roads which are under the jurisdiction of Taluka Parishad, showed an increase of 15.55% and 5.37% respectively over the corresponding figures of 1966. Of the total road length water Bond Macadam accounted for 54.16% black topped 32.98% in 1967 as against 52.47% and 34.80% respectively in 1966. The percentages of national highways, state highways and major districts roads to the total road mileage were 6.96, 49.41 and 24.56 respectively in 1967.



Table No. 59 :- This table shows the motor vehicles in operation in Aurangabad division as they were on 31st March 1966 and 31st March 1967. It is not possible here to present the picture of the district in this respect as the district-wise break-up is not available. The total number of vehicles increased by about 28.10% over the corresponding figure of 1965-66. The increase was mostly observed in cars, motor cycles, public carriages. The increase in the public carriages might be due to growing expansion of the State Transport activities.

Table No. 60:- This table gives the information on operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport in Aurangabad region as on 31st March 1966 and 31st March 1967. The district wise break-up was not available with the Road Transport Office at Aurangabad.

Table No. 61 :- This table shows the traffic census on National and State highways in Osmanabad district as on 7th November 1965. It could be seen from the above table that the highest traffic intensity (i.e. 4338 vehicles per day) was observed on the Yedsi-Yerna portion of the Malkapur-Jalna-Osmanabad-sholapur state highway. The percentages of traffic intensity of light motor vehicles, medium heavy vehicles and slow moving vehicles to the total number of vehicles per day were 8.42, 57.62 and 33.96 respectively. It was medium heavy motor vehicles whose traffic intensity was the highest.

Table No. 62 :- This table gives statistics of postal telegraphic and telephone facilities in Osmanabad district from 1961-62 to 1966-67. It could be seen from the table that number of telegraph offices and number of telephones increased by 114.29% and 23.33% during 1966-67 over the corresponding figures of 1965-66. Increase in the number of telephones might be due to an increase in the number of Govt. offices and also in the commercial.

activities. There was a slight decrease in the number of post offices and of letter boxes during 1966-67. Remarkable progress seemed to have been achieved in the number of radio licences issued and renewed. It increased by 133.59% during 1966-67 over and above the corresponding figure of 1965-66.

Table No. 63 :- The table gives the statistics regarding rural broad-casting as it was on 31st March 1966 and 1967. The number of villages which had received radio sets increased from 292 in 1966/802 in 1967 recording a remarkable increase of 174.66% <sup>sets</sup>. The rural population having receiving ~~sets~~ also increased by 18.96% over the corresponding figure of 1966.

\*) 10) LOCAL BODIES

Table No. 64 :- This table deals with income and expenditure of local bodies in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 & 1966-67. The number of village panchayats increased from 997 during 1965-66 to 1010 during 1966-67 covering 1411 villages. The income of village panchayats, however, declined considerably by about 20.93% with the simultaneous decrease to the extent of 18.52% in the overall income ~~of~~ expenditure during 1966-67 than what it was during 1965-66. On the contrary, the income and expenditure of the Zilla Parishad, Osmanabad dis showed rise to the extent of about 4.50% in the case of former and 3.37% in the case of later during 1966-67 over and above the corresponding figures of 1965-66. The income of municipalities, however, slightly decreased by about 2.86% with the simultaneous decrease of 6.04% in the expenditure during 1966-67 than during 1965-66.

Table No. 65 :- This table deals with the panchayat Samiti-wise income and expenditure for the year 1965-66 & 1966-67. It could be seen from the table that the total income of panchayat samities showed considerable decline to the extent of about 20.23% during 1966-67 as against the total income during 1965-66.

It could also be seen that the income of all the panchayat samitis excepting Tuljapur & Osmanabad declined. The decline was most significant in Nilaga Panchayat Samiti. There was simultaneous decrease in an overall expenditure of panchayat samitis during 1966-67. Decrease in the expenditure was about 18.52% during 1966-67. Expenditure of all the Panchayat Samitis with the exception of Parenda, Tuljapur and Omerga declined during 1966-67. Of all, Omerga panchayat samiti incurred the highest expenditure.

Table No. 66 (A) :- This table gives head-wise receipts of Zilla Parishad Osmanabad during 1964-65, 1965-66 and 1966-67.

It could be seen from the following table that the self raised resources of Zilla Parishad increased considerably by 245.10% during 1966-67 over the corresponding figure of 1965-66. At the same time the total Govt. grants however, fell by 16.39% during 1966-67. The total revenue receipt also, including all aforementioned items, fell short to the extent of 12.32% during 1966-67 than what it was during 1965-66.

Table No. 66(B) :- This table indicates the head wise expenditure of Zilla Parishad, Osmanabad for the years 1964-65, 1965-66 and 1966-67. It could be seen that the revenue expenditure during 1966-67 decreased by about 10.63% than what it was during 1965-66. Amongst different heads expenditure on Education showed continuous rising trend since 1964-65. During 1966-67. It increased by about 5.86% over the corresponding figure of 1965-66. This might be due to more emphasis given on expansion of education by the Zilla Parishad. Also expenditure on Irrigation increased by 147.95% during 1966-67 over and above the previous year's expenditure. The expenditure on Animal husbandry also increased during 1966-67. Expenditure on Agriculture, Social welfare and Buildings and communications however, decreased.

Table No. 67 :- This table shows income and expenditure of municipalities in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 and 1966-67. The income of municipalities fell by 2.86% during 1966-67. Along with the fall in the income, expenditure of all the municipalities also showed down ward trend and decreased by 6.04% during 1966-67 than in 1965-66.

PLAN & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Table No. 68 :- This table gives information regarding the expenditure incurred on different plan schemes implemented in Osmanabad district during 1966-67. It could be seen from the table that agricultural programme received the top priority and accordingly consumed away major portion of the total expenditure on different schemes. Its percentage to the total plan expenditure was 61.14. Within this sub-head state sector schemes accounted for 93.31% of the expenditure incurred and the rest on local sector, schemes. The percentage of expenditure incurred on Co-operation and Community Development, Social services, Transport and Communications were 17.96, 13.03 and 7.76 respectively co-operation and community Development was the next in order to receive priority followed by social services. A very little amount was spent on Industry and mining. There were 33 state sector and 32 local sector scheme, implemented in the district during 1966-67.

Table No. 69 :- This table gives physical achievements under different plan schemes implemented in the district during 1966-67. Achievements in the distribution <sup>of</sup> seeds, soil conservation, preparation of compost construction of wells and installation of pumping sets were remarkable. It could also be seen that construction of roads was also carried on a large scale.

Table No. 70 :- This table shows the position of Community Development programme as it was on 31st March 1967 in Osmanabad district. The number of blocks by March 1967 was 17.50, as it was in the last year, as per C.P.A. pattern. Of the total area of the district, all the blocks together covered by about 97.61%. The respective percentages of stage I, Stage II, and stage III blocks were 26.48%, 63.37 and 10.15 in this respect. The proportion of villages covered by stage I, stage II, and Stage III were 23.32%, 68.74% and 7.94% respectively of the total number of villages. The population covered by all these blocks together was 89.42% of the total population of the district.

Table No. 71 :- This table shows the expenditure incurred in different community development blocks under different stages of development in Osmanabad district. It could be seen from the above table that Nilanga part I, II, III, accounted for the highest expenditure. Next in order was Udgir which also spent comparatively higher expenditure during 1966-67. It was Bhum in which negligible amount as compared to other blocks, was spent during the year under reference.

Table No. 72 :- This table gives the data regarding physical achievements of selected items in different development blocks in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 and 1966-67. It could be seen from the table that quantity of fertilizers distributed was the highest in Osmanabad block. Maximum area was bunded in Latur block. In Udgir block the number of improved agricultural implements supplied was the largest of all the block. In Tuljapur block the largest number of animals were inseminated as well as the highest number of family planning operation were done. In Omerga block was the highest in the construction of drinking water wells. In AUSA block people's contribution towards the development activities was the largest amongst all the contributions in different blocks. The largest number of houses was built in Ahmedpur block.

## 12) P R I C E S

Table No. 73 :- This table gives prices of important commodities at the district headquarter in the <sup>year</sup> 1965 and 1966. This was the period in which our economy had found it very difficult to pass through. Due to inadequate rains, 1965-66 was a bad agricultural year, resulting in food shortage. The war with the Pakistan was just over casting the shadow of all its ill effects on our economy. Inflationary trends were <sup>visible</sup> on the horizons and as a necessary consequences prices of all the ~~common~~ commodities shot up spirally. Commodities of daily consumption were already brought under rationing. However, the prices <sup>of</sup> other commodities which were available in the market over were on the constant size with no symptoms of decline. This could be seen from the following table wherein rise in prices of pulses, sugar, oils, condiments and spices are found to have risen than its counterpart in the previous year. Few examples could cited in substantiation. The price of sugar rose from Rs, 1.29 per kg. in 1965 to Rs. 1.38 per kg. in 1966. The prices of oil and <sup>per litre kg.</sup> dāda shot up fabulously from Rs, 2.34/in 1965 to Rs, 5.32 per litre/in 1966 and Rs. 4.00 per kg to Rs. 6.00 per <sup>kg</sup> respectively. in 1966

Table No. 74 :- This table gives the consumer price index numbers for working class at Aurangabad & Nanded. However, as there are no industrial units at Osmanabad district similar price index numbers are not worked out for the district.

## 13) MISCELLANEOUS

Table No. 75 :- This table gives the information about the strength of police force in Osmanabad district in 1965 and 1966. The total strength of police force remained the same in 1966, as it was in 1965. However, the amount spent on it decreased by about 4.09 % in 1966.

Table No. 76 :- This table gives the information about the crimes that were committed in the district in 1965 and 1966. The total number of crimes in 1966 actually went down than what it was in 1965. The percent ages of cognizable and non-cognizable offences in 1966 were 27.47 and 72.53 as against 29.79 and 70.21 in 1965. It could be seen from the table that the percentages of cognizable crimes increased by about 77.31% over and above the corresponding figure for the year 1965. Whereas the percentage of non-cognizable crimes decreased considerably i.e 3.84 in 1966 over the corresponding figures of 1965.

Table no. 77:- This table gives information regarding the work disposed of in civil and criminal courts in Osmanabad district in 1965 and 1966. The number of criminal cases decided was significantly more than the civil cases in 1966 as it was in 1965. In civil cases on original side both regular and miscellaneous increased over and above the figures of 1965. On the contrary decrease was observed on appellate side in both branches. On the whole there was a slight increase in civil cases in 1966. In criminal cases on original side number of regular cases decreased considerably while miscellaneous cases increased in 1966. On appellate side cases both regular and miscellaneous increased slightly in 1966 over and above the corresponding figures of 1965.

Table No. 78 :- This table gives the information on Cinema Statistics in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 & 1966-67. Neither the increase nor was the decrease observed in the number of cinema theatres from 1965-66 to 1966-67. The seating capacity per show too under went no change during that period. The position remained the same as it was during 1965-66.

Table No. 79 :- This table gives the information regarding the number of banking offices and the total number of towns having banking offices and the population covered. The number of banks increased from 34 in 1965-66 to 40 at the beginning of 1967.

These banking offices covered about 14.44% of the district population.

Table No. 80 :- This table indicates the number of joint stock companies in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 and 1966-67. The number of joint stock companies was only five during 1961-62 and 1965-66. The number neither increased nor decreased during 1966-67.

Table No. 81 :- This table gives the information regarding number of policies issued and the amount insured in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 and 1966-67. It could be seen from the table that the number of policies issued/ <sup>increased</sup> by 1.50 % in 1966-67 over the figure of 1965-66. Amount insured <sup>during</sup> decreased by 0.45% in 1966-67 than what it was/1965-66.

Table No. 82 :- This table gives information regarding the collection of small savings in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 and 1966-67. There had been significant increase in the collection of small saving during 1966-67. The gross collection increased by 26.75% over and above the corresponding figures for 1965-66 with a simultaneous increase in withdrawals and net collection to the extent of 20.12 % and 80.00% respectively.

Table No. 83 :- This table deals with the <sup>information of land revenue</sup> collections in Osmanabad district during 1965-66 & 1966-67. There was a considerable fall in the demand to the extent of about 0.48 % during 1966-67 than the one during 1965-66. Consequently, collection of <sup>land</sup> revenue also fell by about 1.38 % leaving about Rs. 25,634 as arrears to be recovered.



Table No. 84 :- This table gives the number of printing presses and news papers periodicals printed and published in the district. There were only twenty printing presses located at different tahsil places, Latur and Udgir/alone accounted for majority of the total printing presses. However, there were no news papers not even periodicals printed and published in the district,

Table No. 85 :- This table deals with the statistics regarding general elections held in 1967 in Osmanabad district. To the district were allotted two parliamentary and 10 assembly seats. Of the total electorate of parliamentary seats only 55.85% exercised their franchise. Whereas 56.59% of the total electorate of assembly voted in the general elections held in 1967.

Table No. 86 :- This table gives an account of the progress made in different aspect of economy over a period of 16 years/ beginning from 1950-51 till 1966-67, the after thrid five year plan. The year 1950-51 gives the preplan position whereas the years from 1955-56 to 1966-67 indicates the picture of the district after the implementation of First Second and Third five year plans respectively. The position for the year 1966-67 has already been dealt with in the expalnatory notes of each table. The population, of the district increased by 14,73,656 in 1961 showing an increase of 22.12% over a period of decade beginning from 1950-51, The density of population also increased from 220 during 1950-51 to 268 during 1960-61. Cultivable area also increased by about 1.10 over a period of 16 years. Net cropped area also increased from 8 lakhs/hectares during 1950-51 to 10 lakhs hectares during 1966-67. So also net irrigated area by about 126.06%. Area under food grains also increased overwhelmingly by about 39.06% over a period of 16 years. Area irrigated under food grains also showed an

increase from 1454 during 1950-51 to 41776 hectares during 1965-66. Livestock, however, though increased in 1961 over the corresponding figures in 1956, actually decreased by 11.20 % in 1966 than what it was in 1961 same was the case with poultry. It declined to 45.32% in 1966 as against the corresponding figures for the <sup>year</sup> 1961. The statistics in respect of number of factories and employment therein could be obtained only upto 1961. In 1961 number of factories increased by 25.00% with a simultaneous decrease to the extent of 11.25 % in the number of workers employed in them than the position as obtained in 1960. Number of persons employed in registered factories per lakh of population also decreased from 80 in 1960 to 71 in 1961. Electricity was the field in which considerable progress was made over a period of 16 years ending 1966-67. At the beginning of the First plan, not a single town nor any village was electrified. By 1966-67, however, all the towns and in addition 183 villages were electrified. In the field of co-operation progress made was very poor. In the last phase of the Third plan, the progress was actually retarded and there were signs of declining trend. Magnificent progress was achieved in the educational field. The number of institutions as also students and teachers are on the constant increase since 1950-51. The number of institutions in the primary and secondary education increased by 1.14 % and 5.81 % respectively during 1966-67 over the corresponding figures for the year 1965-66. Progress made in medical and public Health was also noteworthy. At the beginning of the plan period, there were only 13 dispensaries and two hospitals with only 89 beds. By the end of 1966-67, there were 32 dispensaries and two hospitals alongwith 291 beds. The number of indoor and outdoor patients treated increased considerably from 0.12 lakhs in 1961 to 0.37 lakhs in 1966 and from 4 lakhs to 11 lakhs respectively.

The progress made in the field of transport and communication was as under. The road length increased 231 km. during 1950-51 to 471 km during 1960-61 and 970.65 Km. during 1966-67. The length of rail route however remained unchanged throughout the period under reference. Post offices and telegraph offices were 282 and 3 respectively during 1950-51 and increased to 392 and 13 respectively during 1966-67. Remarkable progress was achieved in the field of community development. The number of C.P.A. blocks which was 1 during 1950-51 increased to 17.50 during 1966-67. They covered about 89.42% of the total population and 1411 villages out of 1411. Progress in the local self government was also noteworthy. At the beginning of Third Plan there were 978 village panchayats. The number went up to 1010 during 1966-67. Almost all the towns had municipalities by the end of 1966-67. The number of banking offices also showed sizeable increase from 7 in 1950-51 to 40 during 1966-67.

CHAPTER III  
NOTES ON SELECTED INDICATORS

This chapter is devoted to the description of important selected indicators providing comparative study of the percentage achievement in some important selected fields viz. agriculture, animal husbandry, education, public health, road development etc. between the years 1960-61 and 1966-67. The respective indicators serve as a pointer towards the extent of progress made in concerned fields of developmental activity.

Indicator No. 1 :- Percentage of gross area sown to net area sown :-

1. The percentage of gross area sown to the net area sown was 103.29 in the district during the year 1960-61. It increased slightly to 103.78 during 1964-65 and 104.02 in 1965-66. This indicates that the proportion of double cropped area to net area sown is quite insignificant in Osmanabad district. Lack of adequate irrigational facilities accounts for such a low proportion of double cropped area in the district. Osmanabad district was very low i.e. 19th in Maharashtra State in regard to proportion of double cropped area. Within the district it is observed that only Nilanga taluka had rather both more irrigational facilities and relatively significant proportion of gross cropped area to net cropped area (110.98%) in 1965-66. In the rest of the talukas this proportion was even below the par for the district as whole.

1. The gross value of agricultural production in 1964-65, showed a tremendous increase than in 1961-62. It increased

from Rs. 19.68 crores in 1961-62 to Rs. 30.59 crores in 1964-65.

2. This enormous increase however, was more<sup>a</sup> result of spiral increase in prices of all the commodities than an increase in the agricultural production. During the year 1965-66, however, it decreased to 28.94 crores. The above decrease was due to decrease in agricultural production than due to any other cause.

2. Osmanabad and Umarga talukas accounted for the higher percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area in both the years. Udgir and Ausa were at the lowest rang of the ladder respectively.

3. Major changes are witnessed in talukawise percentage of

It is seen that there was an increase in respect of Umerga, Parenda and Nilanga talukas respectively from 159.83%, 109.20% & 105.85% in 1960-61 to 174.15%, 113.8%, and 112.95% respectively. Where as it decreased in respect of Osmanabad, Latur, Ahmedpur & Kalam talukas from 153.82%, 115.07%, 110.27%, and 106.26% respectively in 1960-61 to 145.76, 100.00, 106.39 and 100.00 respectively in 1965-66. During the year 1965-66 Osmanabad, Ahmedpur and Kalam talukas registered a slight increase respectively from 145.76, 106.39 and 100.00 in 1964-65 to 153.31, 109.60 and 106.21. Umerga, Parenda and Nilanga talukas registered a slight decrease from 174.15, 113.80 and 112.95 respectively in 1965-66. Irrespective of whether there was a decrease or increase, as the case may be, in taluka wise percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area for the district as a whole remained more or less unaffected.

Indicator No. 5 :- Changes in the cropping pattern.

1. During the period between 1960-61 and 1965-66 the cropping pattern of the district underwent a change. Of the total cropped area in 1960-61 food crops occupied 73.58% and non-food crops accounted for 26.42%. During 1964-65, however, there was a slight decline in the percentage of food crops to 72.40 and increase in non-food crops to 27.50. This indicates a change in cropping pattern recording an increase of 27.60% in favour of food crops. The percentage of food crops and non-food crops remained unchanged during the year 1965-66.

2. The following table shows the area under food crops and non-food crops during 1960-61, 1964-65 and 1965-66 and the percentage change recorded during 1965-66 over the figure of 1960-61

Indicator No. 6 : Increase in Agricultural credit and gross value of agricultural produce

1. Consequent upon the growing participation of Co-operative sector in financing different operations of agriculture such as purchase of seeds, chemical fertilizers, implements, marketing of agricultural produce etc. there has been an enormous increase in agricultural credit, dues outstanding. The value of agricultural produce also increased due to rise in prices. This can be substantiated from the following table.

\* It includes the value of agricultural produce sold by regulated market. It is observed that the number of societies increased by 3.20% followed by a similar increase in the working capital, share capital, reserve and other funds and loans over due by 283.87%, 235.44%, 39.34% and 201.63% respectively in 1965-66 over the corresponding figures of 1961-62. The gross value of agricultural produce also showed an increase of about 20.50% during the period under reference. During the year 1966-67 the share capital, reserve and other funds, loans outstanding and overdues increased by about 2.11%, 1.80%, 18.16% and 2.83% respectively, whereas the working capital and loans advanced decreased by 2.53% and 1.61% respectively.

Indicator No. 7 :- Agricultural wage rates

1. Even today mechanised farming is a rare scene to look at Indian agriculture is still heavily dependent on human factor. Many operations like sowing, weeding harvesting, winnowing are done by hired labourers in the field. They are paid daily wages.

2. Kingaon (Ahmedpur taluka), Killari (Ausa taluka) and Mankeshwar (Parenda taluka) are the three selected rural centres from where the wage rate data has been collected.

Kingaon Centre

3. The average wage rate for carpenters, blacksmiths & cobblers who are generally treated as skilled workers were Rs. 3.21, Rs. 3.00 and Rs. 2.67 respectively in 1965. The same, however, increased to Rs. 3.50, Rs. 3.50 and Rs. 3.42 respectively in 1966. The wage rate of herdsmen was Rs. 1.25 in 1965 and increased to Rs. 1.50 in 1966.

Killari Centre

4. There was no change in the wage rate of carpenters, blacksmiths and cobblers, which was Rs. 2.00 for both the years i.e. 1965 and 1966. The wage rates for unskilled males and females were Rs. 1.00 and Rs. 0.85 in 1965 and increased to Rs. 1.93 and Rs. 0.89 in 1966, respectively. The other agricultural male labourers were getting

4. Thus it is observed from above table that Udgir, Osmanabad and Ahmedpur talukas accounted for the highest livestock per hectare of land i.e. 1.03, 0.98 and 0.95 respectively. Tuljapur had about 0.62 % and was the last in this respect.

Indicator No. 9 Poultry as compared to population

1. The population of the district was 14.77 lakhs and the poultry population was 2.74 lakhs as per the 1961 census. Accordingly the proportion of the poultry to per 1000 human population was 190. Kalam and Udgir have the highest and the lowest poultry population respectively and the proportion thereof to per 1000 human population was 253 and 120 respectively.

2. In 1966 however the poultry population of the district showed remarkable decrease to the extent of about 45.32%. This could be seen from the following table.

Indicator No. 8 :- Livestock per hectare of land

1. Livestock is the part and parcel of Indian agriculture and plays very important role in the cultivation of land. The bullock is the only motive power conducting various agricultural operations

2. Osmanabad district has already established its name in the field of livestock. Udgir and Ahmedpur talukas of the district are famous for Deoni breed of bullocks which have won number of prizes in the all India agricultural cattle shows. Besides, "Red Khandari" and "Khillari" are the other well known breeds of cattle in this district.

3. The following table shows bovine and ovine livestock population, their ratio to cultivable land .

3. The decrease in the poultry population had affected the proportion. Taking human population of 1961, the proportion of the poultry to per 1000 human population worked out to only 102 which was much below the figures of 1961. Kalam, ranked first in 1961 had been replaced by Parenda, the proportion of which was 200 to per 1000 human population. Udgir taluka kept its lowest rank in both the years in this respect.

Indicator No. 10 :- Per capita consumption of electricity.

1. The per capita consumption of electricity in 1961-62 worked out to only 0.65 K.W.H. when only 8 of the towns were electrified. It, however, increased to 3.22 K.W.H. during 1965-66 with the electrification of rest of the towns and some villages. During the year 1966-67 the per capita consumption of electricity increased to 5.04 K.W.H.

2 It could be seen from the above table that domestic as well as industrial consumption of electricity increased by about three times during 1965-66. The total consumption also increased from 964 KWH. during 1961-62 to 4,754 KWH. in 1965-66. During the year 1966-67 too there was an increase in the consumption of electricity in almost all fields from 964 KWH. during 1961-62 to 7,600 KWH. during 1966-67. Domestic, industrial consumptions increased by about 19.85% and 65.70% respectively over and above the corresponding figures of 1961-62.

Indicator No. 11 :- Increase in the candidates enrolled and vacancies notified.

1. It was only in January 1961 that the Employment Exchange was set up at Osmanabad, the district head-quarters. Since then it made remarkable progress in the enrolment of candidates. The number of candidates enrolled showed an increase of 36.15% in 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62. The number of vacancies notified, however, declined by 20.33% during 1965-66. During the year 1965-66. During the year 1966-67 the number of candidates enrolled showed a decrease of 14.16% over the corresponding figure of 1965-66. The number of vacancies notified, however, increased by 45.80% over the corresponding figure of 1965-66 in the same year.

Indicator No. 12 :- Increase in the number of indoor and out-door patients

1. There are two hospitals in the district located <sup>one</sup> each at Osmanabad and Latur, which are well equipped. The Civil hospital at Latur has a pathological laboratory and radiology unit and also has T.B. clinic. Besides, rest of the taluka places have civil dispensaries.

2. The following table gives the talukawise number of indoor patients treated in the aforementioned hospitals and civil dispensaries.

4. The number of outdoor patients & increased tremendously during 1961-66. The number was more than five lakhs in 1961 & rose to <sup>11</sup> lakhs in 1966 indicating an overall increase of about 102.72%. Of all the highest increase was registered in Ausa taluka during 1965.

2. From the above mentioned table the following facts are noticed. Educational institutions in all categories viz. Primary secondary higher as well, showed an increase in 1966-67 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62. Along with the increase in institutions, the number of students, boys as well as girls also rose to a new height in 1966-67.

3. The highest percentage increase in the number of boys was observed in the higher education i.e. 272.27. In Primary and secondary education the percentage increase in the number of girls was 44.78 and 100.39 more than the percentage increase in the number of boys in the respective categories, during 1966-67.

Indicator No. 14 :- Increase in road mileage per 100 square kilometre.

1. With the implementation of Five year Plans, the mileage of roads has been constantly increasing at a faster rate. During 1960-61 the total road mileage was 528.99 Kms. and the same increased to 929.03 Kms. in 1965-66 and 973.65 Kms. during 1966-67. The percentage of roads to the total mileage was 81.73% during 1960-61 and increased to 88.73% during 1965-66 and 89.16% during 1966-67. The ratio of road mileage to the total geographical area of the district was 3.71 Kms. during 1960-61. It increased to 6.51 Kms. during 1965-66 and 6.80 Kms. during 1966-67.

Indicator No. 15 :- Increase in Banking facilities in proportion to population

4. There were 17 banks in the district during 1961-62 and the average population covered by each bank was 86,920. The condition was really unsatisfactory and the facilities provided by them were too inadequate, inspite of the fact the number of banks increased to 34 and the population covered by each bank reduced to 43,460 during 1965-66. The number of banks per lakh of population worked out to 1.15 during 1961-62 and 2.30 during

1965-66. During ~~out-~~ the year 1966-67 the number of banks increased to 40 and the population covered by each bank reduced to 36,941. The number of banks per lakh of population worked out to 2.71 during 1966-67. It is seen from the above facts that the district is still in need of more banking offices to meet expanding business in the district.

Indicator No. 16 :- Prices  
=====

1. The period from 1960-61 to 1966-67 was the period strains and stresses on our economy due to food shortages, war with the China and Pakistan in 1962 and 1965 respectively. Country wide strikes and lockouts in different industrial units and the other like disturbances affected the production of different commodities. This also helped in a large measure to create ~~scarie-~~ scarcity of articles of daily consumption. All these facts together made deep impact on the prices and consequently the prices of almost all commodities rose spirally. This could be clearly seen from the following table which shows the prices of different commodities in 1962, 1965 and 1966.

CHAPTER IV  
PLANNING - PART I - (EXPENDITURE)

GENERAL

In the district the Third Five Year Plan was implemented from April 1961 to the end of March 1966. As the Fourth Five Year Plan was still to be formulated by then, it was decided to implement annual plans to keep the tempo of development works. Accordingly Annual plan for the Year 1966-67 was implemented in the district. The aim of this chapter is to discuss the details of Schemes, local as well as state sectors, included in the plan and progress made there under and to present the picture of the district before and after the implementation of the annual plan.

In this annual plan, 32 local sector and 33 state sector district level schemes were implemented and the total budgetary provision made for the district was to the tune of Rs. 253.41 lakhs. The total expenditure in the annual plan period, however, amounted to Rs. 241.54 lakhs, the percentage thereof to the total plan provision being 95.00.

The total expenditure on different heads of development, in the state and local sectors, belonging to district level schemes during the annual plan period was as under ..

Of the total expenditure in the annual plan, the expenditure incurred on the state and local sectors was 68.37% and 31.63% respectively. The percentage of the total expenditure to the budget provision for 1966-67 was about 94.99. The headwise expenditure given in the above table denotes that the agricultural programmes shared the largest percentage of 61.8%. Next in order of priority were - Co-operation and community Development, Social Services, Transport and Communications and Industry and Mining/which consumed away 12.09%, 7.82% and 0.11% respectively.

I. Agricultural Programme.

With a view to tackle the problems that the agricultural industry was facing on account of scanty rains, unhealthy livestock, soil erosion, provision was made in the plan for 1966-67, as overhead of the total expenditure /has been noted earlier, agricultural programme, /the highest percentage of expenditure incurred on different schemes /e implemented which are detailed in the below table.

State sector and local sector shared 93.29% and 6.71% of the expenditure incurred on agricultural programme. Among the schemes included in the agricultural programmes, soil conservation accounted for major portion of the expenditure.

The main aim of the schemes included under the sub-head agricultural production is to popularise the improved agricultural practices such as use of improved seeds, use of chemical fertilizers, insecticides and pesticides, use of modern agricultural implements and intensive methods of cultivation. Which will go a long way

The programme of Soil Conservation was initially taken up in the District during the Third Five Year Plan period. It was continued in the Annual plan 1966-67. For, its utility in the stoppage of erosion of the soil, and increasing the retentivity of moisture in the land was proved in the previous plan period. An expenditure of about Rs. 39.42 lakhs as against the budget provision of Rs. 98.48 lakhs was incurred on it. The percentage of to the budget provision was 90.80%.

The minor irrigation programme was taken up in this district during the Third Five Year Plan period and was also continued in the Annual Plan 1966-67 with a view to provide quick irrigation facilities to cultivators. The schemes included in the programme were assigned to both the state as well local sectors.

The following table gives the schemes implemented and the expenditure made thereon under the sub-head 'Minor Irrigation Programme.

It could be seen that comparatively more expenditure seemed to have been incurred on the schemes in the State Sector.

The schemes under the sub-head Animal Husbandry were implemented with the object of preserving the livestock and improvement of the breeds of animals in the district. The schemes implemented in the Third Plan period were continued further in the Annual-Plan 1966-67. In the district, however, only three schemes viz. 1) Construction of buildings for veterinary dispensaries with an expenditure of Rs. 0.05 lakh; 2) supplementary cattle breeding centres with an expenditure of Rs. 0.18 lakh and 3) District Premium Bulls scheme with an expenditure of Rs. 0.28 lakh. All these schemes belonged to local sector.

Only two schemes under the sub-head 'Dairy Development' were implemented in the district i.e. incentive to milk production in selected areas and subsidy to co-operative societies. No. expenditure was made on the former. However, an overall expenditure of Rs. 0.23 lakh was incurred on the latter by which subsidy to the Co-operative societies was granted. The aforementioned schemes were implemented by the local sector.

With a view to increase plantation of valuable trees, afforestation for soil conservation and development of pastures some of the schemes were implemented in the district under the sub-head 'Forest'. The total expenditure made on them amounted to Rs. 1.25 lakhs. All the schemes were state sector schemes.

Under the sub-head 'Fisheries' Fish farming in impounded waters and Development of Co-operative fisheries with an expenditure of Rs. 0.105 lakh were implemented in the district. Both the schemes were state sector schemes. The other three state sector schemes viz. assistance for intensification of fish farming and increase in the fish production; assistance for the purchase of fishery requisites; and grant/loan to fishermen could



The object of all these schemes was to increase fish production to encourage such activities by granting generous loans to fishermen.

The Programme under the sub-head/and marketing<sup>warehousing</sup> was undertaken as elsewhere with a view to provide financial assistance to a regulated markets committees for developing necessary facilities such as market yards, Office buildings etc. Only one scheme, however under this sub-head was implemented. That was development of agricultural marketing<sup>culture marketing</sup>. under which development of agricultural marketing was contemplated and the expenditure incurred was Rs. 0.393 Lakh.

## II. Co-operation & Community Development

Under this development head schemes under co-operation and community development were included with the implementations of which development of Co-operation especially in the field of agriculture and social development of rural folk was contemplated upon. Of the total expenditure made in the Annual Plan period 1966-67. This head accounted for approximately 18.11%. It is to be noted here that the expenditure made on this major head exceeded the budget provision by Rs. 3.860 lakhs.

### Co-operation

Development of Co-operation especially in the field of agriculture, is a sine-qua non for an overall economic development of our country being predominantly agricultural. The agricultural industry is eclipsed with many ills such as ancestral indebtedness<sup>ness</sup> of the farmers, lack of initiative, want of capital illiteracy of agriculturists which prevent them from embarking on new techniques of cultivation. It is the co-operation which has to be a panacea for all these ills.

Accordingly such schemes as establishment of co-operative credit societies through which loan at cheap interest rates could be granted to the farmers; development of marketing societies, co-operative farming societies and organization of consumer's co-operatives were implemented in the five year plan and were continued in the Annual plan 1966-67 successfully. Of the total budget provision of Rs. 39.729 lakhs for the major head co-operation and community development, Co-operation consumed away Rs. 11.065 lakhs.

#### Community Development :

This sub-head alone accounted for Rs. 32.530 lakhs of the total budget provision of Rs. 39.729 lakhs. The schemes implemented under this sub-head in the Annual plan 1966-67 were community development projects, L.D. works programme, financial assistance to local bodies for L.D. works programme and utilization of local man-power all of which were in the local sector.

#### III. Industry & Mining

During the Annual Plan period 1966-67, the main emphasis was on an all-round development of agriculture. This aspect of economy i.e. Industry & mining received less importance. Consequently a meagre sum of Rs. 0.39 lakh was allotted and the per-centage of expenditure incurred on it to the total expenditure was only 0.11. Only two schemes under the sub-head 'small scale industries' were implemented in the district viz.

Industrial co-operative, and Development of handloom industry. The expenditure incurred on both the schemes was only Rs. 0.265 lakh.

IV Transport & Communications

Under this head only two schemes were implemented in this district the sub-heading of which was ' Road Development ' during the annual plan 1966-67 the details of which are given in the following table. This programme of road development was embarked upon with a view to construct major district roads and village roads so as to provide cheap, and quick transport facilities to the people.

It could be seen that the expenditure incurred on these scheme exceeded the amount of budget provision for the major head Transport & Communication. All the Schemes implemented under this sub-head were in the local sector.

V. Social Services

Development of Social Services is one of the pre requisites to achieve an all round upliftment of the common people. This will not only enhance <sup>their</sup> social status but also help to improve their economic lot and educate them in the programme of economic development to be achieved through democratic ways of life. With this object in view, due attention was given to the development of social services in the earlier five year plans and provision of

Rs. 35.704 lakhs was made in the annual plan of the district for 1966-67.

The following table shows the sub-heads under the head social services and expenditure made on them during 1966-67

It could be seen that the total provision for the head as a whole was Rs. 35.704 lakhs of which Rs. 29.103 lakhs were spent during the Annual plan period, the percentage of expenditure to the provision being 81.51. The percentage to the provision- expenditure on this head to the total expenditure was 12.09. It is also observed that the state and the local sector shared more or less equal expenditure.

Schemes included in the sub-head 'General education' and expenditure incurred on them are given in the following table. The aim of all these schemes was to increase school buildings, number of teachers including trained also and to expand the educational facilities.

It is to be noted here that all the schemes under the sub-head " General education were implemented by the local sector i.e. Zilla Parishad.

The scheme viz. development of existing polytechnics & start-up of polytechnics under the sub-head provided for the establishment of polytechnics with a view to train the students for diploma courses in the field of engineering. The expenditure incurred on the scheme amounted to Rs. 6.224 lakhs.

Primary health centres, National Malaria eradication programme, National Small pox eradication programme and family planning were the schemes implemented in the district under the sub-head 'Public Health' during the Annual Plan 1966-67. An overall expenditure of Rs. 11.594 lakhs was incurred of which the local sectors alone accounted for Rs. 7.224 lakhs.

Under the sub-head 'Medical & Nursing' only one scheme viz. opening of new resuscitation centre and to train the students in nurse-midwife course was implemented in the district during the annual plan 1966-67. Under the scheme one resuscitation centre in the civil hospital, Osmanabad was opened. Auxiliary Nurse-Midwife course was also started on which an expenditure of Rs. 0.36 lakh was incurred.

Schemes included in the Annual plan 1966-67 under the sub-head 'Housing' were the spill-over schemes of the Third Five Year Plan. Three schemes, viz., by which low income group housing facilities, village housing and extension of gaathan and provision of housing sites/ were implemented in the district. An expenditure of Rs. 1.407 lakhs was incurred on all these schemes during the Annual Plan 1966-67, much of which was by state sector.

Under the sub-head " Social welfare" only one scheme viz. Welfare Extension project was implemented in the district with an expenditure of Rs. 0.29 lakh. It was the state sector scheme.

The sub-head 'Labour and Labour Welfare' consisted of two schemes. They were Technical and Vocational training & Extension of employment Services. Of them, however, only former was implemented and expenditure incurred on it amounted to Rs. 1.988 lakhs. It was a state sector scheme.

CHAPTER NO.4  
( PLANNING -PART-II- ( PHYSICAL ACHIEVEMENTS )

The main object of planning in the process of economic development is to arrange available resources in such a manner as to achieve predetermined targets in a prescribed time limit. In the earlier part of this chapter budget provision for the scheme and actual expenditure incurred during the plan period under reference have been discussed. In this part ; however, physical achievements of various developmental schemes implemented in different sectors during the annual plan 1966-67 are pinpointed.

I : Agricultural Programme :

As has already been stated that agriculture was given top priority in the Annual Plan. Accordingly Rs. 153.797 lakhs were set aside of which Rs. 143.942 lakhs were spent. As much as 61.87 % of the total expenditure was incurred on this head

Agricultural production :-

The work of construction of the agricultural school at <sup>the</sup> ~~later~~ which was taken up in <sup>the</sup> ~~third~~ five year plan, was completed. The school conducts 2 year course in agriculture and about 50 candidates <sup>are</sup> ~~are~~ trained every year. <sup>under</sup> ~~ab~~ the scheme of propagation of improved implements, 141 ~~imple~~ improved implements were given to the cultivators. To improve the quality and per acre yield of cotton, the scheme of raising transplanted cotton on well irrigated was implemented under which seedlings were raised in <sup>a</sup> ~~in~~ plot of 10 acres. Under the scheme of General Horticulture Development, 55.30 acres of land was brought under the plantation of ~~2~~ fruit trees and rejuvenation was done in 769 acres. The scheme of local manurial resources was also implemented in the district. During the Annual Plan period, 200 quintals of sann seed was distributed among farmers. Under the programme of plant protection 379 dusters and 149 sprayers were supplied to the cultivators. In



and wheat crops was dusted. As many as 143465 acres of land was brought under intensive cultivation under the scheme of intensive cultivation of food crops. The scheme of granting subsidy to co-operative societies and gram panchayat for distribution of improved seeds was implemented in the district and improved seed to the extent of 1944 was distributed amongst cultivators. The scheme of establishment of tanka seed farms started in the Third Five Year Plan was also continued in the Annual Plan 1966-67. Under Kharif and Rabi crop campaign, an area of 1,59,798 acres covering jowar, paddy maize crops was brought under seed treatment.

#### Soil Conservation :

Under this programme, bunding was done in an area of 1,63,916 acres during 1966-67.

#### Minor Irrigation

Under this programme, loans were advanced to the cultivators for construction of irrigation wells and installation of pumping sets to the extent of Rs. 4.08 lakhs and Rs. 8.16 lakhs respectively. Besides, the minor irrigation works were also taken up in the district. The irrigation works with irrigation potential below 250 acres were taken up by the Zilla Parishad, Osmanabad and those with more irrigation potential than 250 acres were taken up by the Irrigation Division, Osmanabad. Dewargarwadi, Sonari, Eharati and Malegan tanks and Bhatsirpur and Mhanora bandharas which were taken up in the Third Five Year Plan, were completed in the Annual Plan 1966-67. An irrigation potential of 5680 acres was created by the aforementioned works. The work of Tungi, Chirkholi Tapse, Kasarbalkunda Apchunda, Gandegaon, Kolegaon and Dapthanora tanks and Deoni, Gunoti bandharas was in progress in the Annual Plan 1966-67.

was taken up in the Annual Plan and was in progress. Besides, special repairs to eight tanks and construction of 10 out vasant bandharas taken up by the Zilla Parishad, Osmanabad were completed.

An irrigation potential of 1950 acres was created due to the work of the Zilla Parishad, Osmanabad.

#### Animal Husbandry

The work of constructing Veterinary dispensary buildings at Parenda, Anala, Chakur, Udgir & Latur, started in the Third Five Year Plan, was completed during the Annual Plan 1966-67. Under the supplementary Cattle breeding Centre schemes one such centre was started in the district during 1966-67. As many as 16 premium bulls under the premium bull <sup>scheme</sup> were given to selected villages. Three cattle shows were also held in the district during 1966-67.

#### Dairy Development :

The creamery project, Udgir, started in the Third Five Year Plan, was continued further. The production of ghee was 35 kg. per day, during 1966-67. Loans were advanced to seven dairy co-operative societies under 'subsidy dairy co-operative society scheme.

#### Forest

During the Annual Plan 1966-67, afforestation was done in 80 hectares of land and plantation of valuable trees was increased by 40 acres. Under the scheme of development of pastures and fodder resources, plantation was done in 150 acres and as much as 12 miles of area was fenced.

Fisheries :

Under fish farming in <sup>improved</sup> water scheme, 165800 <sup>netted</sup> carp fry were stocked in tanks and 7044 kg. fish was <sup>netted</sup> out. For preparing fishing nets, 1589 kg. nylon twine was supplied to fishermen under the scheme assistance to purchase fishery requisites. One fishery society was also organised/during 1966-67. The societies assisted with managerial subsidies and share capital contribution were one and two respectively.

Ware housing & Marketing :

Number of market committees assisted with subsidy for <sup>propaganda</sup> initial expenses included supervisory staff, and publication, purchase of land and construction of buildings were 2, 4, and 1 respectively.

Co-operation & Community Development

Co-operation

Short-terms loans of Rs. 198.57 lakhs and long term loans of Rs. 40.45 lakhs were advanced to the agriculturists during 1966-67. Membership was also increased by 27516. Under the scheme, Development of Marketing subsidy and loans were advanced to construct 7 large size godowns and 14 medium size godowns to increase storage capacity. Though implemented during 1966-67, there were no physical achievements, under the schemes 'Co-operative farming & organisation of consumers co-operatives.

Community Development

The target of opening new blocks in the district was completed in the Third Five Year Plan only under the L.D. works programme, 56 wells were completed during 1966-67 which were taken up during Third Plan period.

Industry & Mining :

The only schemes implemented during 1966-67 under this sub-head were " industrial co-operatives and development of hand loom industry. Assistance by way of subsidy to three industrial co-operatives including handicraft workers was rendered and two others were assisted in the form/contribution to share <sup>of</sup> capital. Subsidy towards a rebate on sale of handloom cloth <sup>was</sup> given to two societies.

Transport and Communications :

The work of 94 miles was completed during 1966-67 out of the length of 99 miles which was spilled over from the Third Five Year Plan under the scheme District Roads. In addition, road length of 7 miles under the new district road scheme was taken up and completed during 1966-67. The work of rural roads was in progress.

Social services.

General Education

Under this programme, as many as 464 primary teachers were given basic training. Appointment of 361 teachers were made in primary schools and 15 new posts of A.D.E.I. were created. Equipments to five primary-cum-middle schools and grants to six private secondary schools/Scholarships, under the scheme educational concessions to E.B.C. students, were awarded to 80 pupils and appointments of 91 teachers in the Government secondary schools were made by opening additional classes.

Technical Education :

The work of construction of main building, hostel and work shop of the Govt. polytechnic at Latur started in the Third Plan, was in progress in the Annual Plan 1966-67. In this Institute, diploma courses in civil, mechanical and electric engineering are conducted .

### Public Health

Spraying of D.D.T. powder was undertaken under the national Malaria eradication scheme. Under the programme of family planning 1640 cases of sterilizations and 14803 cases of insertion of loops were done during the Annual Plan 1966-67. Programme of Vaccination and revaccination was undertaken vigorously.

### Medical & Nursing

One resuscitation centre in the civil hospital, Osmanabad was opened. Auxillary training centre for nurses and midwives was also started, at Osmanabad during 1966-67.

### Urban Development :

Though, two schemes were implemented under this sub-head there were no physical achievements due to poor response from the municipal councils.

### Housing

No. loans were advanced to any persons under the scheme low income group housing. To convert selected villages into model villages- villages, the scheme of extension of village gaothans implemented under which 56 villages were covered and an arwa of 135.6 acres was acquired. Under the same scheme, additional five villages with an <sup>acquired</sup> area of 20 acres were covered for the settlement of nomadic tribes.

### Social Welfare

Under the welfare extension project, five balwadis, three literacy classes and six arts crafts classes were started during the Annual Plan 1966-67.

Labour and Labour Welfare : 2

Industrial Training Institute at Latur was functioning since the construction of the building work of which was completed during 1966-67. The Institute was started under the scheme of 'Technical and Vocational training.

Information and Publicity :-

Under the expansion of rural broadcasting 144 radio were installed in different villages during the Annual plan 1966
