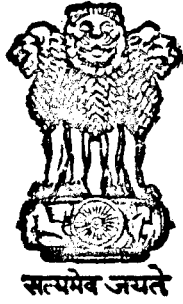

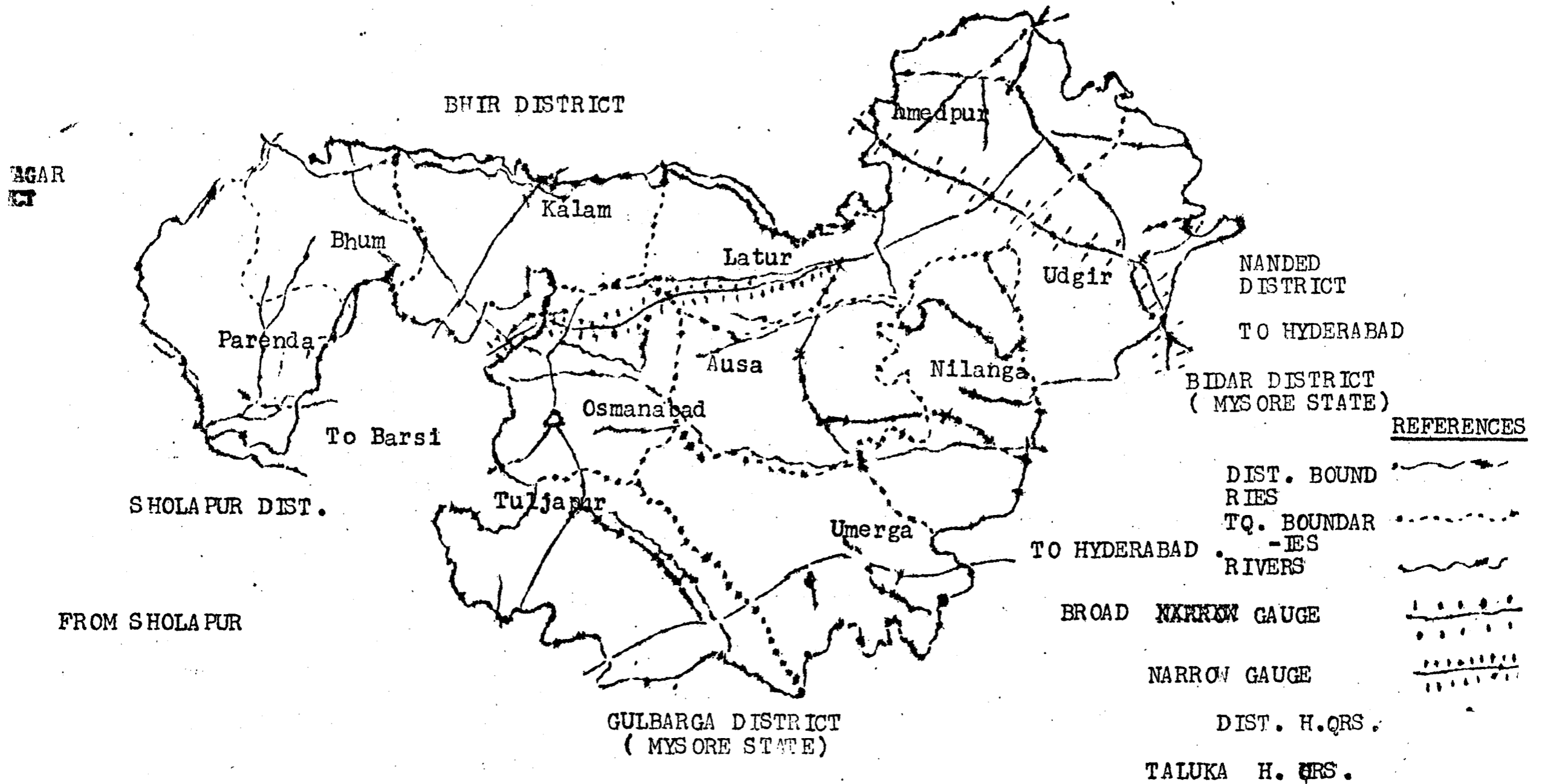

C H A P T E R - 1

INTRODUCTION CHAPTER

1.1 :- Introduction and Location

The age long famous temple at Tuljapur town of this district enshrines the Goddess Bhavani, the popular deity of Maharashtra. The cult of Goddess is very ancient one and finds mention even in 'Vedas' where she is called "Aditi". The earliest inscriptional evidence regarding its antiquity cannot go beyond 1398 A.D. The Goddess was the principal deity of Chhatrapati Shivaji, Chhatrapatis and Peshwas who donated quite generously to the temple. The village Ter in the district is also an ancient place and was known as Tagara. It also finds mention by Ptolemy in his work .. "Periplus of Eura-threan sea" (1st cent^h A.D.). Here an ancient Buddhist daitya has been converted in later period into a Brahmanical shrine by installing the image of God Vishnu and is at present known as "T^rivikrama" temple. Ter is also the native place of poor saint Gora Kumbhar. The Rashtrakutas who succeeded Chalukyas of Badami in 753 A.D. has their epithet "LATTALURAPURAVARADHISA" suggesting that they were the inhabitants of Latur.

1.2 :- Boundaries :

To the extreme south of Marathwada Osmanabad district lies between 17° 35' and 18° 40' north latitude and 75° 16' and 76° 40' east longitude. Osmanabad district is bounded by part of Sholapur district on the south, Bhir district on its north, Nanded district and Bidar district (Mysore State) on its east and Ahmednagar and part of Sholapur districts on its west. Sholapur city is the nearest town and it has therefore close commercial and social ties with it. Barsi taluka in sholapur district is almost surrounded by Osmanabad district. Nanded and Bhir/^{towns} are about 136 miles (217.6 k.m.) and 80 miles

(128.0 km respectively away from and are directly connected by State Transport bus service .

The Sholapur - Aurangabad road passes through the district. The Latur - Miraj railway line and the Parli - Hyderabad railway line (now included in the South Central Railway Zone) line/ passes through this district.

Latur is the biggest railway station in this district.

1.3 :- Administrative set up :-

Osmanabad town is the headquarter of Osmanabad district which was named after Meer Osman Ali Khan, the Nizam of Ex-Hyderabad State on the occasion of his coronation in 1910. The original name of Osmanabad town was 'Dharashiv'. Naldurg was the headquarter of this district before 1861. This district was included in the Ex-Hyderabad State in 1953, and formed its part and parcel upto 1956. During States Reorganisation in 1956 this district was merged in bilingual Bombay State on 1st November 1956 and was subsequently included in Maharashtra State on 1st May 1960. This district formerly consisted of 1) Osmanabad 2) Tuljapur 3) Parendā 4) Bhum 5) Kalam 6) Latur 7) AUSA and 8) Umerga in the erstwhile Hyderabad State, to which Nilanga, Udgir and Ahmedpur talukas of former Bidar district were added after reorganization. Now consisting of 11 talukas the district is presently in Aurangabad Division called as Marathwada comprising five district viz. 1) Aurangabad, 2) Parbhani, 3) Nanded, 4) Bhir and 5) Osmanabad. Almost all district offices of Osmanabad district are located at Osmanabad town which is situated on the bank of the river 'Bhogawati'. Yedshi is the nearest railway station about 13 miles away from Osmanabad town. Among the districts of Marathwada, Osmanabad had the biggest area under the Nizam's own crown Estate called 'Sarfe-khas'. The Sarfe-khas

was merged with the Govt. area under the Sarf-e-khas (merger) regulation in 1949. All 5 Jagir areas were also abolished and taken over under direct government administration in the same year.

In 1951 census, there were 19 towns, but as the definition of town was changed in 1961 census, only 13 of them were classified as towns. Amongst them included all taluka headquarters and Murum in Merga tahsil and Naldurg in Tuljapur tahsil. Latur, Osmanabad and Udgir towns have city municipalities and the rest have town municipalities.

There are in all 1,423 revenue villages in this district of which 12 villages are merged in urban areas and 23 villages are uninhabited.

The Collector is incharge of general administration, law and order, land revenue and civil supplies. He is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector in his office and three Deputy Collectors who hold the charge of the three revenue divisions and have their headquarters at Osmanabad, Latur and Udgir respectively. Tahsildars are incharge of taluka offices. ~~where~~

Zilla Parishad Pattern.

The Zilla Parishad, Osmanabad came into existence on 1st May 1962. The Parishad consists of 58 members out of which 52 are elected, 4 are associated and 2 are lady co-opted members.

The four associated members of the Parishad are 1) Chairman, District Marketing Society Ltd. Latur, 2) Chairman, District Industrial Co-operative Association Ltd. Latur and 3) Chairman District Co-operative Board, Osmanabad. ~~Chairman~~ and 4) Chairman District Central Co-operative bank, Latur. The President, Vice-President and two chairmen incharge of different committees are amongst the elected members. The president is

~~Incharge~~ of the Zilla Parishad meetings and standing committees. The Vice-President is the Chairman of health and works departments committees. There are two other chairmen one incharge of Education and Finance departments committees and the other incharge of Agriculture, Animal Husbandry, Co-operation and industries Departments committees. For administrative purpose, the Chief Executive Officer is the head of the Zilla Parishad. The Zilla Parishad consists of 11 branches. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer assists the Chief Executive Officer in the overall administration.

1.4 Area :

The area of Osmanabad district is 14,271.7 sq. kms. according to the figures furnished by the Surveyor General of India which is 22.08% of the area of Marathwada and 4.69% of the area of Maharashtra State. The rural area of this district is 13,845 sq. km. and the urban area is about 426.7 sq. km. The area reported by the Director of Land Records, Maharashtra State for Osmanabad district is 14,256 sq. km., In Marathwada region, this district is next to the Aurangabad district in size. In terms of area Osmanabad district ranks seventh among the 26 districts of Maharashtra State. The average area of a district of Marathwada, works out to 13299.60 sq. kms. and average area per district in Maharashtra State is 11,799.90 sq. km.

1.5 :- Topography

A major portion of this district is a laterite plateau with an average height of 2,000 feet above sea level. This district is covered with small hills and offshoots of ^{the} Balaghat. Parts of Bhum, AUSA, Kalam, Osmanabad and Tuljapur talukas are situated on Balaghat ranges and the rest on table land.

The district lies partly in the upper Godavari basin and partly in the Bhima basin. Ahmedpur, Udgir, Kallam, AUSA, Latir and Nilanga talukas are situated on the plateau of the Balaghat and lie in the valley of the Manjra which is an important ^{irrigated} tributary of the Godavari. Osmanabad and Umerga talukas are by the Terna, an important feeder of the Manjra. Parenda taluka and parts of Bhum, Tuljapur and Umerga talukas are in the basin of the Sina river which is a tributary of the Bhima.

Of all the towns in the district Bhum commands the highest elevation of 2,500 feet from sea level whereas Parenda has the lowest height of 1,735 feet from sea level. The average height of the plateau is 2,000 feet above sea level. The low land portion to the south of the plateau lies in the Bhima basin.

1.6 :- Hills, River System, Soils :

The main system of hills is the Balaghat and its offshoots from the north-west corner from Ahmednagar and stretches to the south-east. It divides the district into two portions, plateau to the north-east and east and low lands to the west, south-west and south. The general slope of the plateau is from south-west to north-east.

There are two broad natural zones in the district viz.

1) The Balaghat plateau drained by the Manjra and the Terna rivers and their tributaries and 2) The southern low land plain which is in the Bhima basin. The river Manjra flows on the northern border and demarcates this district from Bhir district. In addition to hill ranges the district abounds in a net work of rivulets running from all sides.

The Manjra which rises in Patoda taluka of Bhir district runs towards east along with the northern boundary as far as the

north-eastern corner of Latur taluka where it takes a southerly direction before entering Bidar district of the Mysore State. Its length in the district is about 65 miles.

The Terna flows from west to east in Osmanabad, AUSA, Umerga and Nilanga talukas and meets the Manjra river near the eastern boundary of the district. The Manyad is also a tributary of the Manjra. It flows towards north-east through Ahmedpur taluka and enters Nanded district to meet the Manjra on the eastern boundary of the district. The Tawarja which drains Latur taluka joins the Manjra at Siwani village. On the western border of Parenda taluka the Sina flows from north to south. The Bori flows through Tuljapur and joins the Sina river lower down in Sholapur district. Even though there are a number of small rivers and rivulets streaming in the district like the Bori in Tuljapur taluka or the Manyad in Ahmedpur taluka or the Bennitara in Umerga taluka or the Banganga in Bhum taluka, they are practically dry for most part of the year as the water from them drains out of this district from the high plateau resulting into considerable shortage of water in the district.

The soil can be divided into 3 zones viz., 1) The eastern part consisting of Ahmedpur, Udgir and parts of Latur and AUSA talukas, 2) Osmanabad, Kalam talukas and parts of Latur, AUSA and Umerga talukas, 3) Tuljapur, Parenda and Bhum talukas.

The first zone consists in general of light and light medium soils. They are of inferior type, not retentive of moisture and are, therefore, suitable only for cultivation of Kharif crops. The soils in some parts of Nilanga are of laterite type.

The second zone consists of heavy soils which are more retentive of moisture. Hence rabi crops are the major crops in this area. The mountainous ranges in this zone have formed typical strips suitable for paddy cultivation. This is a peculiarity of this zone. Even though the types of soil are classified above on a broad basis, varieties in soils however are found within the talukas and more within the zones categorised above.

The forests dotted all over the district are some what dense in Tuljapur, Kalam and Udgir talukas. They occupy too little a portion of the total land in this district which has ^{definitely} resulted in soil erosion to a large extent.

1.7:- Climate, Temperature and rainfall.

As the district forms part of the Deccan plateau, its climate is dry and is subject to extremes. The year can be divided into rainy season from middle of June to the end of September, a sultry period from about the end of ^{September} to the middle of November, winter from the middle of November to the end of January, a dry period during February and March and summer during April, May and the middle of June. Summer is in general full of gales and gusty winds. Even though the variations in temperature is large in general and the weather is subject to extremes of heat and cold, the summer season in the district is more cooler than in any other districts of Marathwada region being at a higher altitude. In general the climate of Osmanabad district is considered to be bracing and salubrious.

Osmanabad district gets rains from south-west monsoon like other districts of Deccan plateau and the rains start in the middle of June, become intense in July and cease by the end of September. The normal rainfall of Osmanabad district is about

31" (787mm.) Tuljapur and Osmanabad talukas on the west usually get about 1,123 mm. or 45" of rainfall. AUSA, Umerga and Nilanga talukas usually get 1,346.20 to 1,016 mm. or 53" to 40" of rainfall, while Parenda and Bhum talukas get near about 762 to 800 mm. or 30" to 35" of rainfall. This part comes in the shadow of western Ghat and is therefore, called "rain shadow" area. Because of the low rainfall in Parenda and Bhum talukas, there is always a fear of scarcity and shortage of water. It may be noted that these talukas are adjacent to Ahmednagar district, which is frequently hit by scarcity. These talukas are backward as compared to the other talukas in Osmanabad district. The northern part of Ahmedpur taluka is also some-times affected by scarcity of water. But in general, Osmanabad district is not considered as scarcity area.

The Fact Finding Committee appointed by the former Government of Bombay in 1960 has reported that rainfall is not dependable in the following areas and they are likely to be affected by scarcity conditions as shown below.

EXPLANATORY NOTES ON SCOPE AND LIMITATIONS OF STATISTICS
PRESENTED IN STATISTICAL ABSTRACT

PURPOSE :-

In this publication every attempt is made to include the Statistical material on different aspects of economy. As far as possible talukawise information is furnished wherever necessary so as to enable the reader to have a clear picture of the achievements in different talukas of the district. The data given in most of the tables pertains to the year 1967-68. In case, however, where the data for 1967-68 is not available, it is given for the latest available year. For the sake of comparison similar data for one of the earlier years has also been given.

The Statistical material presented here is mainly collected from various State as well as Central Govt. Offices, local bodies and other agencies. An attempt has been made to present finalised figures. At the end of each table foot notes are given which show the source from which the data is collected.

DISTRICT AT A GLANCE

In this table some broad & important particulars of the district under various heads like population, agriculture, Co-operation, medical and public health, education etc. are presented to bring forth the salient features of this district. Along with the figures for this district, corresponding figures for Aurangabad division have also been given which will nevertheless enable to pinpoint the place of the district in the division. The reference period for the figures concerning this district and Aurangabad division are mentioned against each item, as in/cases this period is not identical.

The scope and limitations of the tables in this abstract is discussed in the following paragraphs.

I) CLIMATE AND RAINFALL

The table No.1 gives monthwise information regarding rainy days and actual rainfall relating to various tahsils in this district. Normal rainfall recorded in each tahsil is the average rainfall over a long period.

II) AREA AND POPULATION

The data of 1951 population census and 1961 population census is presented in tables nos. from 3 to 8. The above tables are prepared on the basis of material published by Govt. of India in "Census of India 1961, Maharashtra, vol.X part II-A and District Census Hand Book 1961" of Osmanabad district.

Talukawise figures of area, rural and urban population, density and variations with 1951 census are given in table no.3. While classification of villages according to population ranges as per 1961 census in Osmanabad district is indicated in table no.4 & 5. In the above two tables the figures of rural and urban are shown separately.

The table no. 6 deals with the number of workers in each taluka. The table no. 7 gives population of the district as per 1961 census according to age groups, mother tongue and religion. The talukawise scheduled caste and scheduled tribe population is shown in table number 8.

III) AGRICULTURE

The tables from no. 9 to 19 give details about different aspects of agriculture such as land utilization, area under principal crops, area irrigated under different crops and by

different

/sources, production and yield rates of principal crops, minor irrigation works, major and medium irrigation projects and agricultural wage ^{rates} etc. The data regarding famine, scarcity and agricultural implements is also given.

The table no. 9 gives utilization of land according to standard heads of utilization for the years 1965-66 and 1966-67. The table no. 10 gives figures of area under different crops while table no. 11 deals with the production and yield rates of principal crops. The production of cotton is in terms of bales whereas that of sugarcane is in terms of gur. The table no. 12 shows the distribution of net irrigated area as per the source of irrigation. The table no. 13 deals with talukawise area irrigated under different crops. Talukawise number of wells in use ^{wells} and not in use for irrigation purposes is given in table no. 14. The table no. 15 deals with the data relating to minor irrigation works while table no. 16 gives the data of major and medium irrigation works. Table no. 17 gives the agricultural wage rates for skilled and unskilled labourers in the three selected centres of Osmanabad district viz. Killari (Ausa ^{tahsil}), Manakeshwar (Parenda ^{Tahsil}) and Kingaon (Ahmedpur tahsil).

The tahsilwise number of agricultural implements as enumerated at the time of 1966 Livestock Census is given in table no. 18. The information on famine and scarcity conditions in each taluka is given in table no. 19.

IV. ANIMALS HUSBANDRY

The table no. 20 presents talukawise data relating to Livestock population as enumerated at the time of quinquennial Livestock Census, 1966. Talukawise veterinary facilities such as number of veterinary hospitals, dispensaries, aid

centres etc. are given in table no. 21 . While the table no. 22 shows the diseasewise livestock mortality in Osmanabad district, table no. 23 gives information relating to recognised slaughter houses and number of animals slaughtered in them.

V. FOREST

The table no. 24(a) and 24(b) included in this section give details of area under different types of forests and quantity and value of the forest produce .

VI. INDUSTRIES & EMPLOYMENT

In this section the factory statistics presented in ~~cols~~ table nos 26, 27, 28 covers the following types of factories registered under Factory Act of 1948. 1) Those using power and employing 10 or more workers. 2) Those not using power but employing 20 or more workers. 3) Those factories not covered by 1 and 2 above but notified by the Govt. as covered by the Factories Act.

The table no. 25 shows for each industry, the total number of working factories, the number of mandays for which they worked during the year. The data presented in cols 6 to 7 of this table ~~relates~~ ~~only~~ only to factories submitting returns. The table no. 26 gives industrywise distribution of working factories according to working strength while table no. 27 gives distribution of factories according to number of days worked . It may be noted that the number of workers. shown in these table are the average number of workers working daily through-out the year and not the total number of workers on the register of factories. The table no 28, 29 & 30 give employment exchange statistics. In the table no. 28 the registration of the candidates, vacancies notified, number of candidates placed in employment etc. is given where-as in table

no.29 occupational distribution of total registration and placement of employment exchange is detailed out. Changes in the volume of employment in different industries as on 31st March 1967 and 1968 are indicated in table no. 30. The table no. 31 gives the Census of employees in Osmanabad district as enumerated in 1966 according to basic pay or emolument range. While table no. 32 shows departmentwise and classwise break-up of number of employees .

VII) ELECTRICITY :

In this section two tables are included which give the information relating to generation and consumption of electricity and number of villages and towns electrified in this district as on 31/3/1961 , 31/3/1967 and 31/3/1968.

VIII) CO-OPERATION :

In this section as many as 7 tables are included , under which statistics relating to various activities of Co-operative movement is shown. The table no. 36 deals with different types of Co-operative societies functioning in Osmanabad district . The table no. 37 shows the figures of co-operative bank while table no. 38 indicates the operation of primary agricultural credit societies. While a description of the operation of different types of co-operative societies is given in table no. 39, table no. 40 shows the operation of primary co-operative marketing societies. In table no. 41 the statistics relating to other types of co-operative societies is presented while table no. 42 deals with the operation of regulated markets only. The table no. 43 shows the number of registered money lenders in the different talukas of this district and the loans advanced by them to traders and

non-traders.

IX) MEDICAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH :

In this section 4 tables are included which give the statistics relating to medical facilities, number of births and deaths registered with number of deaths classified by different diseases and vaccinations. In table no. 44 medical facilities available in different talukas of this district are detailed. The table no. 45 indicates births and deaths registered in different talukas. Table no. 46 gives the number of deaths caused due to important diseases such as malarial, cholera, small pox, T.B. etc. In table no. 47 vaccination figures and cholera inoculations in different talukas are given.

X) EDUCATION :

This section consists of 8 tables from 48 to 55. The table no. 48 indicates literacy in each taluka according to 1961 Census. Percentages of literacy are shown separately for both the sexes as well as for rural and urban areas. As the literate is defined as a person who can read and write simple letter, persons having higher education are also included in this category. Table no 49 and 50 deals with the rural and urban literacy according to educational levels. The number of institutions according to the types, enrolment and the teachers employed in them is given in table no. 51. The table no. 52 deals with benefits granted to backward class students of different categories in Osmanabad district. The table no. 53 gives the concessions granted to economically backward class students in Osmanabad district where-as table No 54 indicates the expenditure incurred on primary education by way of grants. In table no. 55 the classification of villages without primary

schools or schooling facilities by population ranges are given.

XI) TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS.

In this section the statistics relating to transport is presented. The table no. 56 gives the total length of railway route in this district ~~according~~ according to different types of rail guages. The surfacewise and ^{categorywise} road length of extra municipal roads is presented in table 57 as it was on 31-3-1967, 31-3-1967 and 31-3-1968. While the operation of motor vehicles in Aurangabad region as on 31st March 1967 and 1968 is indicated in table no. 58. Table no. 59 shows the operational statistics of nationalised road transport in Aurangabad division. The table no.60 gives the traffic census on important roads in Osmanabad district as on May 1966 while the table no. 61 presents the postal, telegraph and telephone statistics for the years 1961-62, 1964-65, 1965-66, 1966-67 and 1967-68. In table no. 62 the statistics relating to rural broadcasting is shown.

XII) LOCAL BODIES :

The statistics about local bodies such as village panchayats, municipalities and Zilla Parishads ^{is} presented in this section. The section consists of 4 tables. The table no. 63 deals with the income and expenditure of local bodies viz. village panchayats, Zilla Parishad and municipalities for the years ^{from} 1965-66 to 1967-68. While table no. 64 shows panchayat samitiwise income and expenditure. ~~next~~ two tables 65(a) and (b) deals with the headwise receipt and expenditure of Zilla Parishad, Osmanabad for ^{from} the years/1965-66 to 1967-68, In table no. 66 the income and expenditure of municipal councils is indicated.

XIII) PLAN & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

In this section 5 tables are included. The table no. 67 and 68 give plan expenditure under different development sub-heads and important physical achievements during 1966-67 and 1967-68. Community Development programme is shown in table no. 69 as it was on 31-3-68. The table no. 70 shows the figures relating to expenditure incurred in different stages of blocks while table no. 71 gives physical achievements on selected items in all the blocks in Osmanabad district.

XIV) PRICES :

The table no. 72 deals with the monthly average retail prices of important commodities at the district head quarters for the years 1966 and 1967. In the table no. 73 the consumer price index number of Aurangabad and Nanded centres are given.

XV) JUDICIAL AND ADMINISTRATION

The statistics relating to police department and judicial courts is included in this section. The table no. 74 gives strength of police force while in table no. 75 the crime statistics is dealt with. The work disposed of in civil and criminal courts is indicated in table no. 76.

XVI) MISCELLANEOUS

This section includes 9 tables. In these tables statistical material on various topics like cinema, banking offices, joint stock banks, insurance, small savings, land revenue, printing presses and general elections etc. is included. The table no. 77 deals with the talukawise cinema statistics while in table no. 78 the number of banking offices is given.

The number of joint stock banks and the number of insurance policies issued and amount insured are given in the table no. 79 & 80. The table no. 81 deals with the collection of small saving in Osmanabad district, while in the table no. 82 the land revenue collections in each taluka of this district is dealt with. The number of printing presses, news papers and periodicals printed in each taluka of this district is given in table no. 83. Statistics relating to general elections held in 1967 is shown in table no. 84. The table no. 85 is a summary of all the information contained in the District Statistical Abstract, 1967-68.

CHAPTER - III

ANALYTICAL REVIEW OF IMPORTANT INDICATORS

INDICATOR NO. 1

3.1 : 1. Percentage of gross area sown :

Percentage of gross area sown to net area sown spotlights on the extent of double cropping in the district. During the period from 1960-61 to 1966-67, there seemed to be negligible increase in the percentage of double cropping. Lack of adequate irrigational facilities might have been the reason for such a low proportion of double cropped area in the district. Also, the district had low percentage of the same as compared to the rest of the districts in the Maharashtra State. It was 19th in the State and 4th in Aurangabad division.

3.1 :- 2. The percentage of gross area sown to the net area sown was 103.29 in the district during the year 1960-61. It increased slightly to 104.18 in 1966-67. Within the district it is observed that only Nilanga taluka had rather both more irrigational facilities and relatively significant proportion of gross ~~of~~ cropped area to net cropped area (111.13%) in 1966-67. In the rest of the talukas/ ^{viz.} Bhum, Ausa & Udgir/ ^{the} proportion was even below the par for the district as a whole. This could be seen from the table placed below wherein talukawise position is indicated.

1. In the table placed below statistics regarding the production and yield per hectare of important crops for the years 1960-61 and 1966-67 in Osmanabad district is given. This will enable to judge the productivity of different crops in comparison with one another.

2. It could be seen from the table above that productivity of rice, wheat, Jowar, groundnut went down. Whereas a simultaneous increase was noticed in the productivity of tur, sesamum and sugarcane over the corresponding figures for 1960-61.

INDICATOR NO. 3 :- Gross value of Agricultural Production .

1. In 1961-62, the value of agricultural production was only Rs. 19.68 crores. However, it went up to Rs. 34.58 crores in 1966-67. This enormous increase in the value could be attributable rather to a special increase in the prices of agricultural produce than to an increase in agricultural production.
2. Figures of value of important crops for the years 1961-62 and 1966-67 are given in the below placed table for study and comparison

3. With the exception of groundnut, the increase could be observed in almost all the crops given in the table. The increase is of a more pronounced nature in jowar, wheat in the category of food-grains, and in gur and tur under cash crops and pulses respectively.

INDICATOR NO. 4 :- Percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area .

3.4 :- 1. Percentage of gross area irrigated to net area irrigated denotes the extent of the area irrigated more than once. As per the available statistics of 1964-65, Osmanabad district ranked second

in Aurangabad division in this respect . The tahsilwise percentages

of gross area irrigated to net irrigated area is given in the following table.

It could be seen from the aforementioned table that the percentage for the district as a whole is found to have been slightly decreased over the years from 113.97 in 1960-61 to 113.52 in 1966-67. The switch-over to perennial crops may be cited as one of the reasons for the decrease. At the same time the table shows large variations in Osmanabad , Latur, Umerga, & Parenda/tahsils while the position in Bhum, Tuljapur Udgir, & Ausa tahsils seems to be more or less the same from 1960-61 to 1966-67.

INDICATOR NO. 5 :- Changes in the cropping pattern .

3.5 :1 . Cropping pattern is the backbone of the soundness of agro-economy. Since more than half of the national income is contributed by agriculture, the fluctuations in the cropping pattern play

a vital role in determining dimensions of growth in different aspects of economy.

The food crops enjoy dominant position since approximately 70% of the area under cultivation is devoted to their cultivation. The area under food crops was 73.55% in 1960-61 and went up to 74.00% in 1966-67. While non-fooder crops occupied 26.42% in 1960-61 and was 20.50% in 1966-67 recording a decrease of about 5.92%. However, there has been a definite change in cropping pattern since the area under cash crops like groundnut, safflower showed formidable increase which could be seen in the table given below.

While the area under groundnut, safflower, rice tur, wheat increased considerably, cotton and sugarcane recorded a decrease. In case of the former the decrease was abnormal while in the later it was just a passing phase.

INDICATOR NO. 6 :- Increase in agricultural credit, outstanding dues and gross value of agricultural produce marketed

3.6:- 1 Agricultural credit societies and co-operative marketing societies have lion's share in financing different operations of agriculture such as purchase of seeds, chemical fertilizers, implements, marketing of agricultural produce etc. Agricultural credit is continuously increasing in the district due to the active efforts of co-operative societies in financing rural credit needs and the response given by cultivators by investing more funds in agriculture.

3.6:- 2. The main agencies engaged in advancing loans were the District Central Co-operative Bank, the Land Development Bank and number of primary agricultural credit societies. The details of agricultural credit, outstanding dues and gross value of agricultural production in the district during 1961-62 and 1966-67 are shown in the following table.

During 1967-68, the agricultural credit increased by more than the four times and outstanding dues by more than five times over/corresponding figures of 1961-62. The gross value of agricultural production also showed an increase of 75-65% during 1967-68 over the figure of 1961-62.

INDICATOR NO. 7 : Agricultural Wage Rates.

In the district agricultural wage rates are collected from three centres located in three different tahsils. These throw a great deal of light on the conditions of labour who are heavily dependent on agriculture as their principal means of livelihood. Since many of the agricultural operations as ploughing, sowing, weeding, threshing and the like, in the absence of mechanised farming, are still done by men and the wages they get have an important bearing on their wear and tear.

The centrewise description of wage rates is given in the paras to follow.

KINGAON CENTRE :

The average wage rates for carpenters, black smiths & cobblers who are generally treated as skilled workers were Rs.3.50, Rs.3.50 and Rs. 3.42 respectively in 1966. The wage rates of carpenters and blacksmiths however increased to Rs. 4.00 and Rs. 4.00 respectively during 1967 whereas that of cobbler's decreased to Rs. 2.08.

:KILLARI CENTRE :

The average wage rates of carpenters, black smiths and cobblers were Rs. 2.00, each in 1966. The same, however increased to ^{Rs} 2.13 each in 1967. The average wage rates for unskilled field labourers were Rs. 1.93 for males and Rs. 0.89 for females during 1966 and the same however decreased to Rs. 1.50 and Rs. 0.81 respectively in 1967.

:MANKESHWAR CENTRE :

As far as Mankeshwar centre is concerned the average wage rates in respect of carpenters, blacksmiths and cobblers remained more or less steady in both the years i.e. 1966 and 1967. The

The average wage rates in respect of unskilled field males labourers males showed a slight decline from Rs. 1.50 in 1966 in Rs. 1.38 and that of females increased from Rs. 1.25 to Rs. 1.28 during the years under references .

INDICATOR NO. 8. Livestock per hectare of cultivable area.

3.8 : 1. Livestock plays a very important role in Indian agriculture in the absence of mechanization. The bullock is the only motive power conducting various agricultural operations.

3.3 : 2. Osmanabad district has already established its name in the field of livestock. Udgir and Ahmedpur tahsils of the district are famous for "Deoni" breed of bullocks which have won number of prizes in the all India agricultural cattle shows. Besides, "Red Khandari" and "Khillari" are the other well known breeds of cattle in this district.

The following table indicates the tahsilwise position of livestock per hectare of cultivable area in Osmanabad district during the years 1960-61 and 1965-66.

During the year 1960-61 Udgir, Latur, Nilanga and Umerga tahsils accounted for comparatively higher livestock per hectare of cultivable land i.e. 1.17, 1.10, 1.07 and 1.00 respectively.

During 1965-66, the position in different tahsils changed slightly Udgir, Ahmedpur and Osmanabad tahsils came in prominence instead. Their respective percentages were 1.03, 0.95 and 0.98. The district average came down from 0.97 in 1961 to 0.85 in 1966.

INDICATOR NO. 9 : Poultry as compared to population

3.9: 1. The agriculture is a seasonal industry which keeps the farmers idle after harvesting. Poultry gives them not only employment throughout the year but also serves as subsidiary source of income. More over, poultry products are the best nutritious food. Hence its importance.

2. According to 1961 Livestock Census, for a population of every ¹⁸⁶ thousand persons there were/poultry birds ^{as} against 102 during 1966, which showed remarkable decrease to the extent of about 45.32%. The 1966 Livestock Census placed Osmanabad district at the third rank in respect of poultry population in Aurangabad division. The talukawise position is summarised in the table below with comparative data for 1961 and 1966.

From the above table it can be observed that in almost all the talukas the poultry population showed a decline. Kalam, ranked first in 1961, had been replaced by Parenda, the proportion of which was 200 birds to per 1000 human population. Udgir taluka kept its lowest rank in both the years in this respect. The abnormal decrease occurred in the poultry population in 1966 might be due to the fact that Ranikhed disease took a heavy toll of them.

INDICATOR NO. 10:- Per capita consumption of electricity .

3.10: 1. Use of electricity on a large scale is one of the prerequisites for rapid economic development. It also points at the pace of development in a particular region. Hence it assumes overwhelming importance.

3.10:2. The per capita consumption of electricity in 1961-62 worked out to only 0.65 k.w.h. when only 3 of the towns were electrified. It however increased to 6.7 k.w.h. during 1967-68 with the electrification of the rest of the towns and some villages. The above increase was due to the implementation of urban and rural electrification in the district during Third Five Year Plan period and Annual Plans thereafter.

The following table gives the purposewise consumption of electricity during the period from 1961-62 to 1967-68

The data displayed in the table given above reveals the progressive increase in the use of electricity in almost all fields, over a period between 1961-62 and 1967-68. The consumption of electricity in industrial sphere overwhelmingly increased by as many as eight times than what it was in 1961-62. So also domestic consumption which showed an increase more than six times.

INDICATOR NO. 11: Increase in the candidates enrolled and vacancies notified.

3.11: 1. Employment exchanges play a vital role in raising the national income of the country. As such provision of employment opportunities is one of the important objectives of the five year plans. Employment exchanges seek the most economic utilization of manpower available in the country by providing suitable jobs to suitable persons.

3.11: 2. It was only in January 1961 that the Employment Exchange was set up at Osmanabad, the district headquarters. Since then it made remarkable progress in the enrolment of candidates. The number of candidates enrolled, which had shown constant increase before 1965-66, showed constant decrease till 1967-68. In 1966-67 it decreased by 14.16% and by 28.27% in 1967-68 over the corresponding figures of 1965-66 and 1966-67 respectively. The number of vacancies notified, however witnessed wide variations showing alternately decrease/increase. It was declined in 1965-66 by 20-38%

while in 1966-67 and 1967-68 it showed increased and decrease respectively over the corresponding figures for 1965-66 and 1966-67 respectively.

INDICATOR NO. 12 : Increase in the indoor and outdoor patients treated in hospitals/dispensaries/Primary health centres etc.

3.12:- 1. Public health provides one of the basic amenities i.e. medical help to the general public. The indicator in question serves as a pointer towards the efforts made by the Government in the development of public health services.

3.12: 2. There are two hospitals in the district located one each at Osmanabad and Latur respectively which are well equipped. The civil hospital at Latur has a pathological laboratory and radiology unit and also has T.B. clinic. Besides, rest of the taluka places have civil dispensaries. There are 15 public health centres located at 14 villages and one at town. The following table gives the talukawise number of indoor and outdoor patients treated in Osmanabad district in 1961 and 1967.

Simultaneous increase could be observed in the number of patients treated indoor and outdoor. The increase seems to have been more remarkable at Latur centre where maximum medical facilities exist, it being the biggest place in the district. The increase is observed to be more than three times in the number of both outdoor and indoor patients over the corresponding figures of 1961.

INDICATOR NO. 13 :- Increase in the number of students in different categories (Boys and girls separately)

3.13: 1. Education plays vital role in the socialization of individuals by raising their intellectual standards and ultimately makes them responsible citizens. Hence, it is essential that every person irrespective of his social and economic status has to be educated. As a step towards the achievement of this goal, the programme of education was chalked out and was successively implemented during five year plans and continued thereafter in the Annual plans with the result that the number of students and educational institutions increased remarkably in the district during the period between 1961-62 and 1967-68. This is visible in the following table.

3.13: 2. From the abovementioned table the following facts are noticed. Educational institutions in all categories viz. primary, secondary and higher as well, showed an increase in 1967-68 over the corresponding figures of 1961-62. Along with the increase in institutions, the number of students, boys as well as girls rose to a new height in 1967-68.

3.13:3. The highest percentage increase in the number of boys was observed in the higher education i.e. 371.83 during 1967-68. In primary and secondary education the percentage increase in the number of girls was 82.97 and 270.74 during the year 1967-68 which was considerably higher than the percentage increase in the number of boys in the respective categories during 1967-68.

INDICATOR NO. 14 :- Increase in road length per 100 square kilometre

3.14 :-1. The indicator of increase in the road length per 100 square kilometre is important as it helps to chalkout the programme of road development in the areas where the transport facilities are inadequate.

2. The latest data (1965-66) available for the five districts of Marathwada region reveals that Osmanabad district has comparatively lower road mileage.

3. In recent years, however, systematic efforts were made to remove the inadequacy of roads. Accordingly Works Department of the Zilla Parishad and Buildings and Communications Department took up the construction of new roads and repairs to old ones on a large scale. Consequently the road mileage in the district increased from 528.99 Kms in 1960-61 to 1274.00 kms. in 1967-68.

The percentage of roads to the total mileage (both road ways and railway.) was 81.73% during 1960-61 and increased to 91.52% in 1967-68. Road mileage per 100 sq. kms. was 3.71 kms. during 1960-61. It increased to 6.51 kms. during 1965-66, 6.80 kms. during 1966-67 and 8.93 kms. during 1967-68.

INDICATOR NO. 15 :- Increase in the Banking facilities in proportion to population :

3.15: 1. Banks play a vital role in the country's economic affairs. The role of banks in meeting the credit requirements of the different sectors of economy needs hardly to be exaggerated.

3.15: 2. The district is ill served as far as the banking facilities are concerned. This could be revealed by the comparative study of the population served by banks in different districts of Aurangabad division. The average population served by a bank in Osmanabad district is 59106 the figure being higher than Bhir (58910), Parbhani (50259), Aurangabad (46435) and Nanded (44986), (reference year 1964-65).

3.15: 3. In the district there exists scheduled as also Co-operative banks. The former covers mostly urban areas while the latter caters mainly to rural needs. There were 17 banks in the district during 1961-62 and the average population covered by each bank was 86,920. The condition was really unsatisfactory and the facilities provided by them were too inadequate in spite of the fact that their number increased to 34 and the population covered by each bank reduced to 43,460 during 1965-66.

13 1.15: 4 . The number of banks increased to 53 in 1967-68 with the result that the population served by each bank came down to 27880 and the number of banks per lakh of population rose to 2.79, as against the corresponding figures of 86920 and 1.15 respectively in 1961-62.

INDICATOR NO. 16:- Prices

3.16 :-1. In a developing country like ours prices assumes overwhelming importance since it is on them the success or failure of plan rests greatly. Too low a price causes depression while spiral rise in it will bring an era of inflation resulting into disturbances in the smooth working of the economy.

3.16:- 2. The period from 1960-61 to 1967-68 was the period of strains and stresses on our economy due to food shortages, war with China and Pakistan in 1962 and 1965 respectively. Country-wide strikes and lockouts in different ~~and~~ industrial units and the other like disturbances affected the production of different commodities. This also helped in a large measure to create scarcity of articles of daily consumption. All these facts together made deep impact on the prices and consequently the prices of almost all commodities rose spirally.

The table below gives average prices of important commodities in 1962 and 1967 and the percentage increase or decrease as the case may be.

It is evident from the above table that prices of pulses, vanaspati, chillies, groundnut oil etc. were increase. The sale of the food articles like rice, jowar brought under control by starting rationing and private dealings in them were banned.

CHAPTER NO. IV. PLANNING

The Fourth Five Year Plan was still in the offing even after the Annual Plan for 1966-67 came to an end. Consequently during the year 1967-68 also, the implementation of the Annual Plans was decided to be continued further. This nevertheless helped, in no small measure, to keep up the tempo of economic development generated by successive implementation of the five year plans during the period under reference.

As elsewhere in the State of Maharashtra, the Annual Plan for the year 1967-68 to be implemented in Osmanabad district was formulated with priorities fixed and budget provisions made for the schemes included in the plan. Almost all schemes included and implemented during 1966-67 Annual Plan were continued further in the 1967-68 Annual Plan. For the Annual Plan 1967-68, the budget provision of Rs. 254.62 lakhs was made of which Rs. 247.82 were actually spent.

In the Table to follow different heads of development, actual expenditure on each head and the percentage of expenditure to the total expenditure are shown.

As it was in the earlier Annual Plan, the agricultural programme received the highest priority, the expenditure incurred on it being 61.24% of the total expenditure. Social services with 23.60% of the total expenditure, was next to follow. The respective percentages of expenditure on Co-operation and Community Development, Industry and Mining and Transport and Communication were 7.65, 0.78 and 6.73.

AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMME

For the smooth working of planned economic development it is overwhelmingly important to be self-sufficient in food grains. In the context of present food shortage and the immense necessity of removing them the highest priority given to the agriculture in the Third Five Year Plan was further continued in the Annual Plan of the district for 1966-67 and 1967-68. The agricultural programme was embarked upon with a view to tackle the agricultural problems on a rational basis.

The sub-headwise development programmes included under the major head "Agricultural Programme" are discussed in the following paras and an attempt is made to show the progress made under them.

AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION

The total expenditure on this sub-head was Rs. 3.709 lakhs of which 43.14% and 56.86% was incurred in the state and local sectors respectively. The expenditure on this sub-head formed about 2.44% of the total expenditure on the major head "Agricultural Programme". The major achievements under 'Agricultural production' were as follows. Intensive cultivation was

Contd....

practised in 2,45,702 acres. Dusting and spraying operations were undertaken in 74,588 acres as also 65 dusters and 76 sprayers were distributed amongst the farmers. In addition, 359.19 quintals of sunseed for green manuring was also distributed.

SOIL CONSERVATION

For preventing the soil erosion and increasing the retentiv-
moisture
ity of the soil, the programme of soil conservation, initially taken up in the Third Plan and continued in the Annual Plan of the district for 1966-67, was further continued in the Annual Plan, 1967-68. Under the programme an expenditure of Rs. 77.690 lakhs, which was about 51.18% of the total expenditure on the major head, was incurred and the area bunded was 12,22,000 acres during the year 1967-68.

MINOR IRRIGATION

For increasing agricultural production an assured water supply is a necessity. With this object in view, the programme of minor irrigation was taken up in the Annual Plan of the district. An overall expenditure of Rs. 66.53 lakhs accounting for about 43,83% of the total expenditure on major head, was incurred under it. As many as 2,293 wells were constructed and 1,114 pumping sets were installed.

ANIMAL HUSBANDRY

In the absence of mechanised cultivation of land, the livestock assumes overwhelming importance. This is especially true in a country like ours where the cultivation of land is carried on, on a very small scale. This has nonetheless stressed the need to have healthy livestock to carry on the day to day operations in the field. Realising the dominant role that the livestock plays in agriculture, Government have implemented different schemes in the district for an overall improvement in the quality of livestock.

For this an expenditure of Rs. 63,800 was incurred during the Annual Plan 1967-68. The building works of veterinary dispensary, which remained incomplete during 1966-67, were nearly completed. Some amount of the expenditure was also incurred on the maintenance of two supplementary cattle breeding centres established earlier. As many as three cattle shows were held during 1967-68.

DAIRY DEVELOPMENT

As many as Rs. 51,800 were spent on the development of dairies in the district during the Annual Plan for 1967-68. Under the scheme loans were distributed to as many as 20 dairy societies. The per day production of cream in the creamery project, Udgir, which was set at 30 Kg. also went up to 48 Kg. during the year under reference.

FOREST

To retain the fertility of the land prevention of the soil erosion is a must. Afforestation is one of the methods by which soil erosion could be stopped. Hence the importance of forest. Moreover, forest is also a source of raw material for a number of industries, such as bidi-making, saw mills, honey making etc. Keeping this in view, Govt. has been attempting at the systematic development of forests.

In Osmanabad district too, an expenditure of Rs. 40,600 was made for the development of forests. During the year under reference afforestation was done in 80 hectares and grass tufts were planted in 40 acres.

FISHERIES

The expenditure on this sub-head was to the tune of Rs. 14,900 constituting a very negligible portion of the total expenditure.

The achievements under this were as under. As many as 3,90,000 fish were stocked and 11,168,435 kg. of fish was netted out during the year under reference. In addition one fisheries co-operative society was organised, contribution to the share capital of two co-operative societies was made and a managerial subsidy was granted to one society.

WAREHOUSING AND MARKETING

The development of warehousing and marketing has not only increased the profits of the agriculturists but also proved an indirect stimulus to the agricultural production. The linkage of credit with marketing and warehousing facilities to a farmer has reduced the role of middle men to a considerable extent and ensured steady supply of money to agriculturists throughout the year which they are badly in need of.

The total expenditure on this item was Rs. 26,100 with the help of which assistance was given to one market committee, subsidy was granted to three market committees for initial expenses. ~~For~~ For propaganda and publication, assistance was given to three market committees and another two committees were assisted financially for the purchase of land and construction of buildings.

CO-OPERATION AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Since more than 80 percent of the total population of Indian union dwells in rural areas, their development along with the development of other aspects of economy is indispensable. With the help of co-operation and community development programme, the rural reconstruction has to be brought about. Co-operation provides an organisational set-up through which economic lot of the rural folk would be improved while community development programme helps to bring about a change in the outlook of and social development in rural folk as also take the message of planning at the door of villagers.

=====

CO-OPERATION

The expenditure on this sub-head was Rs. 5.98 lakhs as against the budget provision of Rs. 3.48. The whole amount was spent on the schemes implemented in the state sector. With a view to strengthen the credit structure, co-operative agencies from district down to a village the central financing agency granted short-term as also medium term loans to the extent of Rs. 128.12 and Rs. 20.10 lakhs respectively during 1967-68. As many as four new branches were opened and the membership of agricultural credit societies increased by 2,009.

Alongwith the strengthening of credit organisation from top to the bottom, its linking with that of marketing organization was also attempted keeping in view the Govt's policy to have joint structure of credit and marketing. Accordingly, management subsidy to 12 small godowns and loans to 12 big godowns were given. In addition, three consumer co-operatives were given subsidy, loans were granted to five labour contract societies and one central consumer's store was financially assisted.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

As many as Rs. 12.98 lakhs were spent on this sub-head as against the budget provision of Rs. 12.19 lakhs. Since the set target was achieved during the Third Plan period i.e. opening of new blocks, the aforementioned expenditure was incurred on their continuation.

INDUSTRY AND MINING

With few exceptions like sugar factory at Dhoki and the co-operative oil industry at Latur, Osmanabad district hardly has any big industry. The economy of the district being predominantly agricultural, favours the development of agro-industries and the

beginning in this direction has already been made with the establishment of the aforementioned two industries. Small industries, however, with active assistance from state govt. are coming up in the district. The programme of their development is described below.

The total expenditure on this sub-head was Rs. 1.93 lakhs as against the budget provision of Rs. 1.94 lakhs. As many as 13 industrial co-operatives were given financial assistance by way of subsidy, loans and contribution to their share capital.

TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS

Being the prima-facie requirement for speeding up the process of economic development, the means of communications, particularly roads, have an important role to play. Accordingly, the priority it received in the earlier plans was also continued in the Annual Plan 1967-68. The programme of road development as it was undertaken in the district during 1967-68 was given below.

The budget provision for the year under report was Rs. 27.27 lakhs out of which Rs. 16.68 lakhs were actually spent. The length of the roads constructed during the year was 89.24 miles of which 68.24 miles were district roads.

SOCIAL SERVICES.

In a welfare state like ours, Govt. has to make efforts for the upliftment of the common mass by making provision for such aspects of their ordinary life as education, public health, housing, water supply and the like activities which will go a long way in improving their general living standards. Though a sort of overhead expenditure, it is a must since it boosts up the morale of the general public which is indispensable especially where a planned economic development is contemplated on. In the

Paragraphs that follow : a description of expenditure incurred on the different social service schemes implemented in the district during 1967-68 is given.

EDUCATION

More than 50% of the total expenditure on the major head social services, was incurred merely on education. Here education also includes technical education. The actual expenditure was Rs. 29.97 lakhs of which Rs. 5.97^{lakhs} was on technical and the rest on general education.

Basic training was given to as many as 874 teachers and new appointments of 297 teachers were made. The equipments were supplied to seven schools and 57 additional classes were constructed. Under the scheme " concessions to economically backward class " 826 pupils took the benefit and about 200 pupils were given scholarships. The stipend was also granted to 874 teachers' trainees. The construction work of hostel for boys and workshop of the school at Latur was in progress.

PUBLIC HEALTH

The expenditure on this item was Rs. 18.39 lakhs as against the budget provision of Rs. 15.88 lakhs. Of this Rs. 4.89 lakhs were spent in the State Sector. As many as 2,710 I.U.C.D. cases were done and sterilization operations were carried on as^{many as} 12,800 males during 1967-68.

URBAN DEVELOPMENT

Though there was a provision/Rs. 0.23 lakh for this item practically no amount was spent. Applications for grants and loans were sent to Govt. from Latur and Tuljapur municipal councils for the development of their respective municipal areas.

WATER SUPPLY

The total expenditure on this item during the Annual Plan 1967-68, was Rs. 3.69 lakhs. Under the well construction programme, as many as 92 wells were constructed. So also piped water supply was started in two villages.

HOUSING
~~HOUSING~~

The expenditure on this scheme amounted to Rs. 2.15 lakhs . Under the " Village housing scheme " the construction of remaining 3 houses was completed during the Annual Plan 1967-68. So also under the scheme of "extension of village gaothans" the gaothan area was extended in as many as 54 villages covering an area about 257.37 acres.

WELFARE OF BACKWARD CLASSES

As against the budget provision of Rs. 0.16 lakh for this sub-head, the actual expenditure was of the order of/0.11 lakh. The expenditure was incurred on granting scholarship to 203 students and rendering assistance to two hostels in the form of grant-in-aid.

LABOUR AND LABOUR WELFARE

The expenditure on this sub-head was of the order of Rs. 3.26 lakhs with the help of which the construction of the building of Industrial Training Institute was completed.
