## CHAPTER . I

### I. Introduction.

#### 1.1 Brief history & Location.

Chandrapur district forming part of the kingdom of Raghuji Bhonsle was finally brought to an end by the East India Company in 1854. The Bhonsle dynasty had gained the district from the Gond Kings and ruled the territory from 1751 to 1853 when Raghuji Bhonsle died heirless in 1853 and Nagpur district was created for administrative purposes by the Company. Prior to the reign of Bhonsle dynasty the district was under the rule of Gond Kings from about 1240 to 1751. The Gond King Ballarshah founded the Chanda fort. The early history of Chandrapur district, previous to the rule of the Gond Kings, has to be pieced together from different inscriptions belonging to the district. The Gond Kings occupied this territory from Mana Kings of Wairagarh. Earlier to Manas the Buddhist Kings known as Kosala Kings were ruling over this part whose capital according to one source was Chandrapur and from the other sources was at Bhadrawati and Wairagarh. However it is in connection with Kosalas that we arrive at the first authentic historical record in the history of the district. Hsiun Tsiang, the Chinese Pilgrim, records that he visited the capital of Kosalas in 639 A.D. It is also conjectured that a strong Kingdom ruled in the early days at Bhadrawati with flourishing civilisation existing there.

The Chandrapur district lies in the Godawari Basin and was formed as an independent district in 1854. Upto 1874 the district comprised of only three thasils of Mul, Warora, and Bramhapuri. In 1874 upper Godawari district of "adras was abolished and four talukas were adjoined to Chandrapur district to form one thasil with Sironcha as its headquarters. The Zamindari estates from Bramhapuri and Chandrapur were merged into a new thasil with headquarters at Pachiroli. In 1907 three thasils of Cherla, Albaka and Nagur were transferred to "adras state.

In 1956 with the reorganisation of States it was transferred from former Madhya Pradesh to Bilingual Bombay State.

Rajura tahsil of Nanded district was transferred to Chandrapur District in March 1959 and was notified as an independent district and division under the Collector Chandrapur and the Commissioner Nagpur respectively.

The District with a population comprising the Marathas, Teluges and Gonds is of peculiar interest from a linguistic and ethnological point of view. It has also many other claims to distinction. In mineral wealth it is remarkably rich: it possesses vast forests and its area under Government forests is bigger than the entire area of a few other districts in Maharashtra.

Its systems of agriculture are unusually varied and in some respects unique in the Division. The system of irrigation is very extensive and its sporting possibilities, though no longer what they were in the past are still unsurpassed in few parts of the country.

The district lies between 18° 41' and 20° 50' north latitude and 78° 48' and 80° 55' east longitude.

### 1.2 Boundaries.

Chandrapur district is bounded by Wardha, Nagpur and Bhandara districts on the north, Madhya Pradesh on the east, Andhra Pradesh on the south and the south west, Yeotmal and Wardha districts towards the west and north west. The whole of the western & southern border is uninterruptedly bounded by the Wardha, the pranhita and the Godavari rivers. The Indravati flows along south east boundary of the district.

### 1.3 Administrative set up.

The Wainganga river cuts the district into two halves. The eastern portion comprises Sironcha and Gadchiroli Talukas, which are in the terms of area, two largest talukas in the state, occupying together 59.1 % the total area of the district. The western portion consists of four talukas of Bramhapuri, Chanda, Rajura, and Warora and accounts for the remaining 40.9 % of the area of the district. Administratively the district is presently divided into the six talukas of Revenue Divisions. The area, number of towns, 1961 population and the percentages of area and population of each taluka are shown in the table on the next page.

The district forms part of the Nagpur Division and the Collector is its administrative head. He is incharge of general administration, law and order, land revenue, food and civil supplies. He is assisted by a **Resident Deputy** Collector in his office and six Deputy Collectors known as Sub-Divisional Officers who hold the charge of six revenue divisions and have their headquarters at each of the six Taluka headquarters. The Sub-divisional Officer is assisted by one Thasildar and a few Naib-thasildars depending upon the size of the Thasil and volume of work. The Thasil is divided into Revenue circles, further sub-divided into patwari **halqa** comprising 4 or 5 Revenue Villages in each.

Zilla Parishad set up

With a view to promote democratic decentralisation and to secure active participation by the people in development plans and local government affairs the Government of Maharashtra enacted the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samiti Act of 1962 to establish in each district an autonomous institution of Zilla Parishad at the district level and Panchayat Samiti's at the taluka or Block level. Accordingly a Zilla **P**arishad and 18 Panchayat Samities were established. The Zilla Parishad covers entire district except Municipal towns. Sasti town which does not have a municipal Council is however included under the jurisdiction of Zilla Parishad and the Panchayat Samiti concerned.

The Zilla Parishad covers 99.79 percent of area of the district, and 92.70 percent of its total population.

The Zilla Parishad consists of 51~~4~~ elected councillors & out of them 2 seats are reserved for scheduled castes and 7 for scheduled tribes. ~~In~~ <sup>has been coopted by the elected council</sup> ~~addition~~ a woman councillor. There are five associate councillors who are chairmen of the five federal Cooperative societies conducting business in the district. The elected chairmen of Panchayat Samitis are also ex-officio councillors.

The Panchayat Samiti at the block level consist of all elected and coopted councillors from the area of the block and a chairman of a cooperative society conducting the business of purchase or sale of agricultural produce in the area of the Block, as an associate member and a chairman of a cooperative society conducting business in agriculture in the area of the Block as a coopted member. The Sarpanchas elected by members of Village Panchayats are also elected members of Panchayat Samiti. Two Sarpanchas ~~from~~ <sup>from</sup> each electorals-1 division in the area of the Block are ~~thus~~ <sup>thus</sup> returned to each Panchayat Samiti.

The first election of the Zilla Parishad was held in 1962 and after the term of five years, second elections were held in 1967. The President and Vice President have been elected by the elected councillors.

A senior Officer of I.A.S. scale works as Chief Executive Officer to execute ~~the~~ powers and functions of the Zilla Parishad. The Block Development Officers act as Secretaries to the Panchayat Samities. The Zilla Parishad functions through a standing committee presided over by the President and six Subject Committees for Finance, Works, Agriculture, Cooperation, Education, and Health. Two subject committees are presided over by the Vice President and four by the two chairmen elected by the Zilla Parishad. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as secretary of the standing committee and District Heads of Departments as Secretaries to the subject committees concerned.

#### 1.4 Area.

Chandrapur district has a total area of ~~32,128.7~~ 26,128.7 square kilo metres (10088.3), square miles. the length at the norther extremity from east to west is about 192 kilo metre while the length from Southern point to the northern base is about 240 kilo metres. In terms of area the district is the biggest district in the whole of Maharashtra.

### 1.5 Topography.

The district is broader on the north and gradually tapers down towards the south. Topographically the district can be divided into the following four zones :-

1) The plain fertile region in the west in the Wardha valley with its rich black soil and moderate rainfall with Cotton, Jowar and Wheat as the main crops. This zone includes Western half of Warora and Chandrapur talukas and the whole of Rajura taluka and accounts for about one-sixth of the total area of the distt.

2) The western upland hilly region between Wardha and Weinganga basins. It comprises parts of Warora and Chandrapur talukas and a major part of Bramhapuri taluka. It has sandy soil and sufficient rainfall. Rice, Jowar and irrigated sugarcane are the main crops. Numerous hills have facilitated the construction of tanks for irrigation purposes. This zone makes about one-sixth of the area of the district.

3) The Wainganga basin. This zone comprises the eastern parts of Bramhapuri and Chandrapur talukas and western part of Gadchiroli taluka. It has the fertile black soil, sufficient rainfall rice being the main crops.

4.) The eastern uplands. This region comprises major part of Gadchiroli Taluka and the whole of Sironcha taluka. It is hilly and has thick forests, heavy rainfall, and large tribal population. Rice is the main crop. It makes nearly half of the total area of the district.

### 1.6 Hills, River system, Soil etc.

The soil of the district falls into clearly defined tracts and each of these tracts displays cropping pattern of a wholly different kind. The most fertile tracts are found in the Wardha and in the Weinganga valleys. The varieties of soil in the district are numerous, and are known by many local names but they could be grouped under the following representative classes, namely:- Kali, Kanher, Bersi kanher, Morand, Khurdi, Wardi, Reteri or Berdi, Pendhari and Nachhar which is found in Sironcha taluka along the banks of the Godawari.

On the extreme west, on the left bank of the Wardha and subsequently the Godawari, there is a broad strip of black soil, known as kali, retentive of moisture and suitable for cotton, Wheat, Gram, Jowar and linseed. Further in the interior, but immediately adjoining this open tract there is a range of small

This soil is of little use without irrigation. With irrigation, it is an ideal soil for rice and sugarcane. Further eastward again, on either banks of the Wainganga, the black loam reappears and is accompanied by a few rice-growing villages.

Towards the east of Wainganga valley, the soil becomes poor and hills are abundant. Rice is the staple crop of this tract.

The main rivers of the district are the Wardha, the Wainganga, the Pranhita, the Indrawati and the Godawari. The whole of the western border is uninterruptedly bounded by the Wardha, the Pranhita and the Godawari rivers. During its course in the south-easterly direction the Wardha river receives the Wainganga at village Seoni of the right bank and the Prani on the left. After its confluence with the Wainganga the combined stream is known as Pranhita. The Pranhita joins the Godawari near Pironcha. Further south at the southern corner of Sironcha taluka, the Indrawati flows in to the Godawari along the south-east boundary of the district.

The Wainganga enters the district near the centre of the northern boundary and slices it into two unequal parts, the western part containing Warora, Chanda, Brahmapuri, and Rajura talukas and the eastern part comprises Gadchiroli and Pironcha talukas.

Save in the extreme south, the Wainganga is the recipient of numerous tributaries on either banks and ultimately receives the drainage of the entire central portion of the district. The chief rivers flow from north to south, the Kathani & the Potphodi meeting from the West and the Andhari on the right.

The Wardha, the Wainganga, the Pranhita and the Godawari are the perennial rivers of the district.

The whole of eastern portion of the district and the southern portion, all along the eastern border is hilly and forms part of the eastern upland natural zone. The important hill ranges lie in the south. They are mainly the Tipagarh Range, the Sirkonda near Pironcha, the Gadulgutta hills which are a continuation of the eastern Ghats and the Surajgadh hills. To the south-west of Surajgadh hills, beyond Indrawati river, lies the famous Bhamragadh hill which overlooks the confluence of three mountain rivers and is noted as an unrivalled beauty spot in the district.

The Tipagarh range rises to an elevation of 609 metres and Sirkonda range is 548 metres above sea-level. The other ranges in Pironcha taluka attain a height of 809 to 914 metres. The highest peak in the district is in the Gadulgutta range of 967 metres.

The western upperland comprises the main ranges of Chimur and Mul hills. They are of little height and serve as waterheds between the numerous Valleys formed by the tributaries of the Wardha and the Wainganga. The Chimur hills commence east of Chimur in the north of Warora Tahsil and stretch south-wards with breaks from north to south with an average elevation of 137 metres above the surrounding plain. The range is 32 km. in length and 9.6 km. in breadth. The highest peak is 409 metres.

The Mul hills lie further to the south passing 4.8 kms. west of Mul Village. It is 28.8 kms. from east to west with a height of 122 metres above the plain. At the foot of these hills lies the famous Tadoba lake.

Parasgarh hills run east and parallel to Chimur hills and form a boundary between Warora and Bramhapuri Tahsils.

The general height of the plain country is about 274 metres above sea level in the north of the district, falling to 200 metres at Chanda and 649.6 at Sironcha.

#### 1.7 Climate, Temperature and Rainfall.

Chandrapur district is considered to be one of the hottest districts of Maharashtra. Chandrapur town the district head quarter is slightly hotter than Nagpur city. The nights remain cool upto end of April and become uncomfortable in the months of May and June which are considered to be the hottest months of the year. The immense heat combined with high percentage of humidity due to the large forests in the distt., makes the climate uncomfortable. Winter is equally severe. The highest temperature on record is 48.4 degrees centigrade on 10th January 1899.

May is the hottest month of the year. The temperature recording is done at Chanda, Bramhapuri and Sironcha. During the year 1966 the highest temperature recorded at these centres was 41.9, 41.9, 43.1 centigrade respectively. The minimum temperature was 13.0, 12.9, & 14.2 degrees centigrade. Winter is more severe in December.

The South western Monsoons are the chief source of rain in the district which is divided into three rainfall zones viz. (1) the eastern zone comprising Gadchiroli, Sironcha and Bramhapuri talukas having heavy and assured rainfall the mean rainfall being about 1524 m.m. or 60 inches; (2) the central zone comprising Chanda and Rajura talukas with sufficient rains the normal rainfall being 1302 m.m. or 50 inches; and (3) the western zone comprising Warora taluka having moderate rainfall normal rainfall being 1147 m.m. or 45 inches.

CHAPTER II

Explanatory Notes.

1. Population.

Table No: 3. The population statistics presented in table 3 is based on the figures as published in 1951 and 1961 population census publications. The area and population of Rajura tsuka which did not form part of the District in 1951 has been accounted for to make the figures comparable.

The terms " Rural " and "Urban " under col.3 are defined as follows according to 1961 census.

A town or an urban area is defined as a place which has

1. A municipality, a cantonment or Civil lines.

or

2.(i) A population of 5000 or over

and

(ii) At least 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in non-agricultural persiuts.

Rural population is a population of all Villages in a revenue unit.

A " Village " is a statutory recognised Village having a defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, Tadies or Padas, have not therefore been shown as separate Villages. On the other hand statutory recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as " un-inhabitated " Villages. Villages also include Forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families.

As a result of change in the definition of urban population adopted in 1961 census, four urban areas are declassified as villages. Hence the Urban population shown for 1951 census is therefore adjusted to population of urban units 1961 census.

Tables Nos. 4 & 5 The definitions of village and town as per 1961 census are given in the explanatory note for the preceeding table. In table no: 5 four towns having municipalities are included besides the Urban area of Sasti which does not have a Municipality and is under the Jurisdiction of Gram panchayat.

Table No: 6. A person is classified as a worker if-

- a) In case of seasonal worklike cultivation, livestock dairying, household industry etc, he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season; and



(b) In the case of regular employment in any trade, profession, Service, business or commerce, he was employed during any of the 15 days preceding the day of enumerators visit to the household.

Workers are classified into the following nine categories of economic activity:-

1. As cultivators.
2. As Agricultural labourer.
3. In Mining, Quarrying, Livestock, Forestry, Fishing, Hunting and plantations, Orchards and allied activities.
4. At household industry.
5. In manufacturing other than household industry.
6. In construction.
7. In Trade & ~~Commerce~~ *Commerce*
8. In Transport, Storage and Communications.
9. In other Services.

Table No: 7. " Mother tongue " is defined as language spoken by the persons mother to the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects have been included in the main languages on the basis of Griersons' classification.

According to 1961 census the population of the district is 12.38 lakhs constituting 3.12 percent of the total population of Maharashtra. It has nearly doubled during the last sixty years and the net percentage increase over 1901-1961 is found to be 115.57. The population increase in 1950-1961 decade was 17.58 percent. During this decade the highest percentage increase was in Chandrapur Taluk (20.1 %)

Owing to the large area under forests, the district has the lowest density of population 13.47 persons per square kilometre as against 109 persons per square kilometre for the State. Sironcha and Gadchiroli Talukas, being hilly and forest areas, have lowest densities of 14 and 37 persons per square K.M. respectively while Bramhapuri and Chanda Talukas have the highest densities of 97 and 98 persons per square K.M. respectively.

Chandrapur District is less urbanised and the Rural Urban population ratio in 1961 was 12.1 and the percentage of Urban population to total population in 1961 was only 7.73 as compared to state percentage of 28.22. The average population per village in Chandrapur District is 415 as compared to 792 for Maharashtra.

The sex ratio of the district as per 1961 census was found to be 985 as against 936 for the State. The sex ratio of the district gradually decreased from 1023 in 1901 to 989 in 1941, and it improved in the decade 1941-51 to 996 and again fell to 965 in 1961. However at each census the district sex ratio was found to be higher than the state sex ratio.

The number of workers as per 1961 census accounted for 57.77 percent of the total population while non-workers are 42.23 %. Out of total workers 82.08 % were engaged in Agriculture ( 57.02 % as cultivators and 25.06 % as Agricultural labour.)

The District according to 1961 census accounted for a literacy percentage of 17.7 ( 28.58 % for males and 5.79 % for females) against the corresponding percentage of 27.88 for Nagpur Division and 29.82 in the case of Maharashtra.

The scheduled castes population constituted 3.44 % of the total population. This percentage was 17.89 in 1951 and the reduction was due to a large conversion of Mahar community to Budha or New Budha. The scheduled tribes population in the district formed 14.82 % of the total population. The scheduled tribes have been notified only in Talukas of Sironcha, Gadchiroli and Rajura where they form 54.26, 33.94, and 27.43 percent respectively of the total population of the taluka.

## 2. Agriculture

Table No: 9 The land utilisation presented in table No: 9 indicates standard classification of land according to its use. The total geographical area as given in col 4 is the total area as per the village papers plus area of the non-reported portion which is not included in the village papers and comprise mostly the area with the Forest Department. The definition of terms used in cols. 5 to 18 are as follows :-

Forests - All actually forested areas of lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests, whether state owned or private.

Land put to non-agricultural uses:- All lands occupied by buildings, roads, and railways or under water (e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to use other than agriculture.

Barren and unculturable land:- All barren and unculturable land like mountains, deserts, etc; (land which can not be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost) is classed as unculturable whether such land is in an isolated block or within cultivated holdings.

Culturable wastes:- All lands available for cultivation, whether or not taken up for cultivation or ~~not taken up for cultivation~~ taken up for cultivation once but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in succession.

Permanent Pastures :- All grazing lands whether permanent pastures and meadows or otherwise.

Land under Miscellaneous tree crops and groves not-  
included in the net area sown :- All cultivable land which is not included under net area sown but is put to some agricultural use.

Lands under casurin trees, thatching grass, bamboo bushes, and other grows used for fuel etc; which are not included under " Orchards " ' will be classed under this sub-head.

Current Fallows :- This class comprises cropped area which are kept fallow during the current year. If any seedling area is not cropped again the same year, it is also treated as current fallow.

Other Fallows :- All lands which were taken up for cultivation but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and not more than five years.

Net area sown :- Net area sown represents the area sown to crops, counting area sown more than once in the same year only once.

Area sown more than once :- Area sown with two or more than two crops and counted more than once in the same year.

Total cropped area :- This is the total of net area sown and area sown more than once.

Table No. 10 :- Cropwise area shown in this table relates to important crops while unimportant crops are combined and shown under others.

Table No. 11 :- Yield per hectare in K.G. and ~~cut~~ turn of principal crops are given in this table.

Table Nos. 12 & 13 :- Net area irrigated by different sources is given in table 12 while distribution of net area irrigated under different crops is shown in table 13. The gross irrigated area is not available.

Table No. 14 :- The table gives the number of irrigation wells with distribution of wells in use and wells not in use. The total no. of wells decreased in 1965-66 as compared to 1964-65. Decrease is found to be more in Warora and to some extent in Bramhapuri and Gadchiroli talukas.

Table No. 15 :- The table gives the number of ~~minor~~ <sup>minor</sup> irrigation ~~works~~ under state and Zilla Parishad sectors. However the figures of minor irrigation under private agency are not available as the figures of Tanks collected for season & crop report are inclusive of small bodies treated as wells for irrigation purposes. The cost of minor irrigation works is upto a maximum of Rs. 20 lakhs.

Table No. 16 :- The cost of a medium irrigation project ranges between Rs. 20 lakhs to Rs. 5 crores where as that of a Major irrigation project is Rs. 5 crores and above.

Table No. 17 :- The data on agricultural wage rates are collected from three selected centres in the District by the Statistical Assistants of panchayat samities concerned every fortnight.

Table no. 18 :- Data of agricultural implements as collected in the livestock census 1966, is given in this table.

Table No. 19 :- Famine & Scarcity conditions are declared by the Collectors & Chief Executive Officers. The information is obtained from them and presented in this table.

Agriculture is the predominant economic activity being followed by 82 percent of the total working population, as cultivators or as agricultural labour.

The district, as in other parts of the state, has only two agricultural seasons viz. Kharif & Rabi. The Talukas of Sironcha, Gadchiroli, and Bramhapuri, comprising the rice tract have more proportions of cropped area under Kharif crops while Rabi crops have some remarkable proportion in the remaining three talukas. The Principal Kharif crops are paddy, Kharif Jowar and gram are the important Rabi crops.

Land utilisation statistics if studied over a period of last ten years show that there is no marked trend of change in the pattern. The district has a large area under Forests, i. e. 56.28 percent of the total geographical area. The talukas of Gadchiroli & Sironcha have the highest proportion of the area under Forests.

The district mainly produces food crops and about 81.61 percent of the total gross cropped area was under food crops during 65-66. The talukas of Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli & Sironcha had highest percentage of area under Food crops i. e. 97.63, 96.83 and 94.77 percent respectively in 65-66 while Rajura had the lowest i. e. 67.57 % followed by Warora (74.23%) and Chanda (88.36 %). Thus the cropping pattern differs considerably from talukas in the west and South west than the talukas in South, East and North. Rice & Jowar are the main crops forming 72.8 % of the total area under food crops and 62.3 % of the total gross cropped area during the year 1965-66. Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli, & Sironcha form the rice tract of the district. Jowar is predominantly grown in Rajura, Chanda, & Warora talukas.

The area under pulses constituted 17.4 % of the total area under food crops during 1965-66. Among non-food crops, cotton & oil seeds together constituted 98.5 % of the total area under non-food crops. Cotton is mainly grown in Warora & Rajura talukas where its area formed 56.6 & 41.2 percent respectively of the total area under cotton in the district during 1965-66.

The percentage of double cropped area to the gross cropped area is 6.5 % and is fairly high because of second crop taken after paddy.

The district, by virtue of its crop pattern has a fair proportion of area under irrigation as compared to state average. During 1965-66 the net irrigated area formed 14.70 % of the gross cropped area. Bramhapuri taluka had the highest proportion i.e. 33.0 % of the gross cropped area is irrigated. It was lowest in Rajura being 0.27 %.

### 3. Animal Husbandry, Forests and Fisheries:-

Tables 20 to 23 give data about livestock population & allied information of veterinary aid facility, animals mortality and animals slaughtered.

Livestock raising is closely connected with agriculture. The Quinquennial livestock census held in 1966 showed that the livestock population registered an increase of 4.86 % over 1961. The population of cattles & buffaloes formed 78.47 % of the total livestock population. The total male bovine population over 3 years had increased from 4.44 lakhs in 1961 to 4.53 lakhs in 1966. The area cultivated per pair of male bovine in 1966 was 3.00 hectares. The no. of female cattles & buffaloes over years in milk per 1000 population in 1961 worked out to 256 in this district. The number of sheep & goat had increased by 34.47 % and 9.02 % respectively in 1966 over 1961.

The poultry population had decreased by 49.96 % in 1966 over 1961 population.

There is one veterinary Hospital in Chandrapur and Veterinary dispensary facility is extended to each one of the Block headquarter. There are six artificial insemination centres in the district.

The other contagious and parasitic disease among animals and the Ranikhed disease among the poultry had the highest percentage of incidence while Anthrax disease had the highest percentage of mortality i.e. 77.6 % of animals attacked.

Forests : -

The area under forest under the Forest Department is 1869,277 hectares in 66-67 and forms 72.3 % of the total geographical area. The figures of area under Forests as reported by the Department and that released under season and crop report do not agree. Of the total area under Forest Department 39.5 % is Reserved Forest while protected forest representing the erstwhile proprietary forests constituted 57.5 %. The protected forests taken over from ex-malguzars was not in good state of preservation and is being brought under planned management. Six territorial Divisions look after the effective management of the Forests in the district and work ~~at~~ under the conservator of Forests for Chanda circle.

Chandrapur district is famous for its ~~lake~~ ~~tank~~. The total value of Forest produce in 66-67 amounted to Rs. 183.38 lakhs.

Fisheries.

Chandrapur district is endowed with more than 12000 tanks with a total water spread area of approximately 40,000 acres and ranks second in Maharashtra in this regard. Out of these tanks 8000 are seasonal and 4000 are found to be suitable for fishculture.

There are five deep reservoirs in the district of which four viz. Ghorezari tank, Asola mendha tank, Baleshwar tank, Nava tank are suitable for fish farming. The fifth tank at Tadoba, belonging to the Forest Department is not useful for fishery purpose due to no. of crocodiles in it.

3. Industry, Employment and Power.

Tables Nos. 26, 27, & 28.

These tables give statistics of Factories registered under the Factories Act. They are compiled from the data obtained from the ~~the~~ Chief Inspector of Factories & Boilers. They give distribution of factories according to average daily employment, working strength and no. of days worked.

Chandrapur district is not much industrialised. Judged from the number of industrial workers per lakh population, the district stood twenty second in Maharashtra in 1961 with an average no. of 206 workers per lakh of population. The total number of Factories Registered under the Factories Act went up from 46 in 1964 to 54 in 1966. Out of these 54 Factories 12 were large scale factories having an average daily employment of more than 50 workers.

The few industries worth mentioning are, the Ballarpur Paper and Straw Board mills Ltd; the Swastik glass works Chada, the Bashir oil mill, Warora and the D. Ashby Potteries, Ballarpur. The Ballarpur Paper mill alone employ on an average more than 1000 workers per day while 4 factories employ on an average 100 to 499 workers per day and 7 factories employ 50 to 99 workers per day. Out of 35 factories which had submitted to the annual returns to the Chief-inspector of factories & Boilers only 19 or 54 percent were working for more than 240 days in a year and were classified as working throughout the year.

Employment Exchange statistics is given in tables 29, 30 & 31. The medium of employment exchange is day by day becoming more effective in helping the employment seekers and employers. The registration with employment exchange increased by 13.6 percent in 1966-67 over 1965-66 while the increase was 80.3 % over 61-62 level. The percentage increase in Vacancies notified in 1966-67 over 1961-62 was 210.2. However the period following the close of III Plan had less employment <sup>opportunities</sup> as only 823 Candidates were placed in employment during 1966-67 as against 1233 in 1965-66.

The electricity consumption during 66-67 increased by 5.5% as compared to consumption in 1965-66. Bulk of the electricity <sup>consumption</sup> is for industrial purposes which constituted 93.8 % of the total electric consumption in 1966-67. The percentage of domestic consumption in 1966-67 was as low as 2.2.

Electricity had not reached a majority of the Villages as by end of March 67 only 88 Villages out of 2755 populated Villages had been electrified. Eighteen Villages were electrified during 1966-67.

#### 5. Cooperation.

Tables 36 to 42 give information of Cooperative societies while table 43 gives information about no. of registered money lenders and loans advanced by them in the district. The total no. of Cooperative societies had increased from 1619 by the end of 1965-66 to 1653 by the end of 1966-67 because of 34 new societies organised during the year, the percentage increase being 2.1. The membership share capital and working capital of all types of societies increased by 10.15, 10.67 and 8.36 percent respectively.



The object of providing easy credit facilities is accomplished by (1) District Central Cooperative Bank (2) Land Development Bank and (3) Primary agricultural credit societies. The primary agricultural credit societies numbered 1204 by end of 1966-67 of which 28 were large size multipurpose societies, 177 were primary agricultural credit societies & 999 were service societies. Even though the share capital and working capital increased by 10.2 & 2.6 % respectively by end of 1966-67 as compared to 1965-66 the amount of loans advanced during 1966-67 decreased by 3.9 % over loans advanced during 65-66. Apart from these agricultural credit societies there were 28 grain banks which also come under the category of Agricultural credit societies.

There were 119 agricultural non-credit societies of which 20 agricultural marketing societies, 35 farming societies and 18 processing societies were ~~of state~~ <sup>in state</sup>. All the Block H.Q. except Dhamara have agriculture marketing societies.

Among non agricultural societies 27 were credit societies and 273 were non-credit societies during 1966-67.

Out of nine regulated markets registered only 4 regulated markets viz. markets at Mul, Chartrapur, warora etc. and Armeri were functioning while the rest have not yet started functioning.

#### 6. Medical and Public Health.

Tables 44 to 47 give information about medical facilities available in the district. Vital statistics of births and deaths, number of deaths due to important causes & Vaccination programmes carried out. Table 48 gives information about ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup> genic water supply available in rural areas based on one survey done in the year 1964.

The district by the end of 1966 was served with 6 hospitals 34 allopathic dispensaries, 58 Ayurvedic dispensaries, 18 primary health centres and 6 maternity homes. The number of beds per lakh of population in the district worked out to 28.6 by end of 66. The number of indoor and outdoor patients treated in 1966 as shown in table 44 was 850895, which does not include information of ~~the~~ patients treated for 25 medical institutes as it was not available.

The total number of births registered in 1966 were more by ~~10%~~ while the death were more by 37.5 % in 1966 over 1965.

Deaths due to Small pox increased considerably in 1966 as the number of deaths increased from 98 in 65 to 1363 in 66

According to Survey of Drinking water supply works out of total number of Villages in the district 26.44 % were still without any hygienic drinking water supply source, while 36.12 % had inadequate water supply.

#### 7. Education.

Table 49 to 56 gives information about education statistics. Tables 49, 50 & 51 are based on the education and literacy data collected in 1961 population census. Table no. 52 gives information about educational institutions, pupils and teachers as collected from the Director of education, Poona. Talukawise information about educational institutes and enrolment is not available for the talukas separately.

The literacy percentage in 1961 census rose to 17.27 from 10.90 % found in 1951 census. The literacy percentage among males in 1961 was 28.58 while for females it was only 5.70. This literacy percentage for urban areas was 43.24 where as for rural areas it was only 15.10 %. Sironcha Tahsil had the lowest literacy percentage of 7.78 due to its scheduled tribe population.

With the adoption of compulsory primary education in Third-Five Year Plan, considerable increase in primary schools was noticed during the last 3 years. During 1966-67 the number of primary schools increased by 2.9 % over 1965-66 while the increase in the number of primary students in 1966-67 was 8.5 over 1965-66. During 1966-67 though the number of Secondary schools increased by 2 only but the enrolment in Secondary schools in 1966-67 increased by 10.5 % while percentage increase in number of teachers was 7.4 %.

The district had 4 higher institutions (Colleges) with 2349 students and 104 teachers. Besides there were 12 special schools with an enrolment of 711.

The total expenditure on primary schools included by Zilla Parishad and Municipalities was Rs. 61.73 lakhs during 1966-67 and showed an increase of 9.6 % over 1965-66.

The total no. of Villages having no primary schools decreased from 989 in 65-66 to 941 in 1966-67.

#### 8. Transport and Communication.

The District is very much backward so far as communications are concerned. The total Railway length is 296 K.M. in the district while road length as on 31-3-67 is only 1903.29 K.M. and has increased by 0.9 % over road length as on 31-3-66. No National Highway passes through the district. The road length comprises 35.22 % of State Highways, 11.96 % of Major District Roads, 14.18 % of other District Roads and 7.88 % of Village Roads and 30.76 % of other roads.

According to road surface classification 10.46 % of total road length is Black topped and 31.07 % of W.B.M. roads. The roads of lower type formed 58.47 % of the total length of roads. The road length per 100 sq. k.m. is 7.2.

The information about Motor Vehicles in operation and Nationalised Road Transport is not available for the District separately hence Divisional figures are given in tables 59 & 60.

The total number of Post offices during 66-67 decreased to 254 as four post offices were closed during that year. The rural broadcasting programme, covered 447 Villages and 4.30 lakhs rural population during 66-67.

#### 9. Local Bodies.

Table Nos. 64 to 67 give information about income and expenditure of local bodies. The Zilla Parishad, Panchayat Samities and the Village Panchayats form part of the three tier system of local Government established under the Democratic Decentralisation.

Village Panchayats form the lowest administrative unit. There were 1173 Village Panchayats by the end of the year 66-67 covering almost all the villages in the district. The income and expenditure of the Village Panchayats for the year 1966-67 was Rs. 69,98,088 and Rs. 69,52,052 respectively. As such the income & expenditure of Village Panchayat for the year 66-67 worked out to 5,965.97 and 5926.72 respectively. The income by way of grants from Government and Zilla Parishad was 53.1 % of the total income while 22.4 % of the total income was derived from taxes and fees. Of the total expenditure during 66-67 about 61.8 % was spent on public works while expenditure of items of welfare formed 14.6 %.

The total revenue receipts of the Zilla Parishad 1966-67 were Rs. 249.47 lakhs of which Government grants constituted 95.3 %, while 4.7 % of the total income was derived by way of self raised resources. The revenue receipt of Zilla Parishad formed 50.4 % of the total income while the percentage of income from debt section, remittances and opening balance to total income during 66-67 was 7.4, 36.8, and 5.4 respectively. The analysis of expenditure of Zilla Parishad for the year 66-67 showed that 51.6 % of the total expenditure including closing balance was revenue expenditure while expenditure on debt section formed 5.6 %. Remittances and closing balance formed 37.4 and 5.4 % respectively. Of the total expenditure 42.3 % was on education, 12.0 % General Administration, 8.4 % on Building & Communications, 10.8 % on Community Development and 3.8 % on Agriculture.

There are Five Municipalities in the district. The income and expenditure of all the municipalities during 1966-67 amounted to Rs. 25.47 lakhs and 28.35 lakhs respectively. Major source of income of municipalities is by way of taxes as it formed 62.7 % of the total expenditure during 66-67. Among taxes octroi yielded highest income being 72.2 % of the total income by way of taxes. Government grants constituted 21.3 % of the total income. The Municipalities spent 41.2 % on public health and conveniences and 24.8 % on public instructions during 66-67.

10. Annual Plan 1966-67.

The Annual Plan 1966-67 envisaged to cover ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup> majority of schemes taken up in the Third Five year plan with a few new schemes, and earmarked a total outlay of Rs. 636.91 lakhs for the district level plan schemes. Against this outlay an expenditure Rs. 610.05 lakhs had been incurred.

Of the total expenditure, 57.4 % had been spent on " Agricultural Programmes ". Under this programme " ~~Soil~~ <sup>Soil</sup> Conservation " " Minor irrigation works " and " Forests " were given more attention by providing sufficient allotment. Expenditure during 1966-67 ~~was~~ under these sub-heads formed 23.2 %, 41.1 % and 28.8 % respectively of the total expenditure on " Agricultural Programmes ".

The total expenditure under, " Cooperation and community Development " was 12.4 % of the total expenditure under plan. The expenditure on community Development worked out to 79.2 % of the expenditure ~~under~~ on heads of Development cooperation and C.D.

Road Development programmes were also given due momentum as during 1966-67 the expenditure incurred on road Development was Rs. 12.79 lakhs being 40.3 % of total expenditure on road Development in the Third Plan.

Under " Development <sup>of</sup> Social Services " the highest percentage of expenditure was on " Public health " & in total expenditure <sup>the</sup> ~~of total expenditure~~ under Social Service under that head formed 53% <sup>of total expenditure</sup> ✓ The expenditure on education was 24.8 % of the total expenditure of the head of Development Social Service.

11. Community Development .

The District comprises 20 Blocks of 21.50 CPA size <sup>comprises</sup> ~~comprising~~ all Villages except 5 towns. There are five T.D. Blocks and one Multipurpose Development project. Four Blocks are in stage I and 5 in state II while 4 Blocks were in post stage II.

12 Prices:- Since the declaration of emergency in the country Prices of some essential commodities from the district headquarter are regularly collected every week. The retail prices of 72 commodities are collected on every Friday from the selected Shops at the district headquarter. Under the cereals group the commodities Rice & Jowar are covered under Monopoly purchase scheme and open market prices of these two commodities are not collected. The prices of wheat showed an upward trend. The average prices of wheat fine & coarse during 1966-67 rose by 3.3 and 8.2 % respectively over 65-66.

Under pulses group the average of gram dal prices more or less remained constant while downward trend in prices of Arhar dal, Moong dal and Masur dal was found in 1966-67. The prices of Udid dal were high in 1966-67 as compared to 65-66.

Sugar was costlier by 5 paise per kilo on an average in 1966-67 while gur prices moved slightly upward in 66-67.

Considerable increase in the average prices of groundnut oil was found in 66-67. The average prices of groundnut oil went up by 5.00 % in 1966-67 as compared to the previous year. Same is the case of average prices of Vanaspati (dalda) and the average prices went up by 4.0 % in 1966-67 over 65-66 prices.

Abnormal increase was observed in the average prices of Chillies in 1966-67. During 66-67 the prices of Chilly were as high as Rs. 7.50 per kilo while in April 66 the average prices were Rs. 2.50 per k.g. percentage increase in the prices of Chilly prices was 7.0 %.

The average clothing prices were also found to be moving upward.

The average prices of soap went up due to increase in edible oil. The average Supari prices went up by 1.6 % in 66-67 as compared to 1965-66.

### 13. Miscellaneous

i) Police Force & Crimes:- The data on Police force & Crimes are given in table 74 & 75. The total police strength increased from 1106 in 1965 to 1124 in 1966. The percentage increase in cognisable and non-cognisable crimes during 66-67 as against 65 was of 13.3 and 11.8 respectively.

ii) Civil & Criminal cases.

The total Civil and Criminal cases decided in the district courts were 2965 and 7023 during 1966 respectively. The total no. of Civil cases decided in 1966 were less by 14.8 % as compared to 1965 while the no. of Criminal cases decided in 1966 were more by 1.9%.

iii). Banks:- During 1966-67 there were 8 scheduled Banks in the district and 23 cooperative Banks. During this year one scheduled Bank and 2 Cooperative Banks were added.

Insurances.

The total no. of insurance policies issued during 1966-67 were 3076 as compared to 3241 in 1965-66 and the amount insured was Rs. 114.76 lakhs which was more by 33 thousand as compared to 1965-66.

Small Savings.

The target for small savings collection for the year 1966-67 was Rs. 12.00 lakhs against which the net collection was of Rs. 24.11 lakhs. The net collection during 1966-67 was more by 45.8 % as compared to 1965-66.

Land Revenue.

The percentage of Land Revenue collection against the demand for 1966-67 was 59.3 and was less as compared to 1965-66 when the percentage collection was 61.5

Elections.

The general elections were held in the year 1967. There was one parliamentary constituency named Chanda parliamentary constituency and 9 state legislature constituencies. Percentage of votes polled for parliamentary and state assembly seats was 62. Highest percentage of votes polled was in the assembly constituencies of Saoli, Bramhapuri, and Bhadrawati.

Chapter - III

Important Indicators.

In order to assess the impact of development during the plan period certain indicators sectorial trends, position of district in the division disparity between taluqas etc., have been worked out as follows :-

Indicator No(1) Percentage of gross sown area.

Because of the cropping pattern of the district, it had fair percentage of double cropping as can be seen from the following percentages of gross cropped area to net cropped area for each of the taluka of the district.

Double cropping mainly depends on the sufficient rains received during the Kharif season to provide sufficient moisture for the second crop after Kharif, in such parts where no irrigation facility to take a second crop is available. There has not been little change since 1960-61 in area under double cropping and thus the percentage of gross cropped area to the net cropped area remained more or less unchanged. However the reduction in the percentage of gross cropped area to the net area sown in 1965-66 over 1960-61 is due to the percentage increase in net area sown in 1965-66 over 1960-61 <sup>is the fact</sup> due to that percentage increase in net area sown in 65-66 over 60-61 is more than percentage increase in gross cropped area in 65-66 over 60-61.

Among the Tahsils Bramhapuri and Gadchiroli Tahsils have got the highest percentage of gross cropped area to the net cropped area i.e. 124.75 and 111.32 of respectively because of the fact that these two tahsils are predominantly paddy growing areas where second crop of Kultha, or other pulse is taken after paddy crop. Rajura tahsil has got no double cropped area while in Sironcha tahsil the practice of taking a second crop is very negligible as percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown is only 100.77 %.

Indicator of productivity of important crops.

Production of crops in a district over a period of time depends upon the adequate & timely rains and absence of crop diseases. In adequacy of rains or excessive rains usually damage the crops and affect production. The production of a particular crop is also affected by the change in area under it. The year 1965-66 was not favourable for agriculture and there were semi draught conditions in the State during this period. Shortage of rains affected the growth of the crops and thus the production of different crops stood at a low level. The table below gives area and outturn of important crops in the years 1960-61 and 1965-66, alongwith percentage increase & decrease in area and outturn during 1965-66 over 1960-61.

Excepting for other cereals, gram, sugarcane, and cotton the level of production of other crops decreased in 1965-1966 and in most of the cases has exceeded the corresponding percentage decrease in the crop area during 1965-1966 over 1960-1961. The production of rice, jowar, tur & "total pulses" in 1965-66 was lesser than in 1960-61 even though there is increase in areas under those crops during 65-66. The worst affected crop was tur where the area during 1965-66 increased by 65.3 % over 1960-61 while its production decreased by 20.3 % over 1960-61.

Indicator No. 3. Gross value of Agriculture production.

In absence of the price data; this indicator could not be worked out.

Indicator No. 4. Percentage of irrigated area.

Chanda District, due to its high average rainfall and its crop pattern with predominant area under rice has greater percentage of area under irrigation and during 1960-61 the district ranked second in the Division, and the State on the basis of percentage of gross & irrigated area to net area sown. Paddy is the main food crop grown in this district occupying 32.2 percentage of total cropped area during 1965-66. It requires sufficient irrigation and thus the percentage of irrigated area under paddy to the total net irrigated area was 95.72 in 1965-66.

The practice of taking two successive irrigated crops is not in vogue in this district. The gross area irrigated under different crops is not available for the year 1965-66 & hence percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area could not be worked out. However the table below indicates the percentage of irrigated area to net cultivated area in each taluka.

The table above indicates that Bramhapuri taluka had the highest percentage of area under irrigation in 1965-66 (41.22 %) while Rajura taluka had the lowest percentage area under irrigation (0.17) in last year.

Indicator No. 5. Changes in crop pattern.

Since 1960-61 the pattern has remained unchanged. The district is mainly a foodgrain producing area & the total area under food crops during 1965-66 was 85.62 % of the total cropped area in 1965-66. Among food crops paddy and Jowar area the main crops occupying 62.32 % of the total gross cropped area. Among non-food crops oilseeds crop is the worth mentioning having 9.68 % of the gross cropped area and followed by cotton having 4.49 % of the gross cropped area in 1965-66. The table below gives the taluka-wise percentages of areas under important crops to the total gross cropped area.

The above table shows that there has been a little increase uniformly in the area under food crops & proportionately a little decrease in the area under non food crops in all the talukas in 1965-66 over 1960-61.

The cropping pattern in the district is some what different in its eastern and southern portion than that in the Western portion. Warora tahsil, western part of Chandra tahsil and Rajura tahsil have more or less similar crop pattern, having about 1/4 to 1/3 rd of their gross cropped area under non-food crops, mostly comprising oil seeds and cotton. Talukas of Bramhapuri, Gachiroli and Sironcha had 97.63%, 96.84% and 94.71% area under food crops during 1965-66. This is a rice growing tract where paddy occupies 50 to 60 % of the gross cropped area.

As regards the cropping pattern adopted for irrigated crop it can be seen from the table below that only food crops were irrigated in 1965-66 & there was no area under irrigated non-food crop.

Indicator No. 6: Increase in Agricultural credit and outstanding due.

The primary agricultural credit societies are providing easy credit facilities to the cultivators. Taking the amount of loans advanced by all Agricultural credit societies as 100 during 1960-61, the Index of loan advanced during the six years is as follows:-

The Index of loan advanced by Agricultural credit societies showed a continuous downward trend since 1963-64. The probable reason for this may be due to the high percentage of overdues against the outstanding loans with the primary Agricultural credit societies. This percentage has increased from 23.57 in 1963-64 to 51.96 in 1966-67.

Indicator No. 7. Agricultural wage Rate.

Agricultural wage rates are collected every fortnight from three selected Rural centres viz. Ghugus, Mul and Sindewahi to assess the changes in Agricultural wages over a period of time. The Agricultural wages are collected for field labour and for other Agricultural labours with details of wages for males as well as females. The average monthly wages paid to Agricultural workers in these centres in 1965-66 & 1966-67 are given in the table below:-

The wage rates for Ghugus centre is given for 1965-66 only as the selected cultivator refused to give wage rates during 1966-67. The wage rates more or less remained constant in 1966-67 as compared to 1965-66 except for reduction in wages for males in Sindewahi centre during the period August 1966 to November 1966.

8. Livestock per hectare of land.

Bovine population per hectare of cultivable land is found to be more in Tahsils of Sironcha, Gadchiroli, and Bramhapuri, which form the rice tract of the district and draught power is required more in rice tract alone than in other tracts.

Indicator No. 9. Poultry as compared to population.

Poultry keeping was much flourishing in 1961 in Chanda district when the District stood second in the state with 319.13 average number of birds per 100 households & the per capita poultry during 1961 worked out to 0.66. However the total poultry population in the district as per 1966 Livestock census decreased considerably. The per capita poultry in 1966 as per projected population (worked out as 1309,000 according to 1961 census handbook) was 0.20 only. The table below gives talukewise position of poultry per 100 households in 1961 and 1966. The number of households enumerated in 1961 census has been adopted for working out poultry bird kept per 100 households for 1966 also.

Indicator No. 10. Per capita consumption of Electricity.

The electricity facility is not yet made available to a large number of Villages and thus the total towns and Villages electrified by end of March 1967 was only 93. The result is that the per capita electric consumption is very low in the district. The comparative figures for 1960-61 & 1966-67 are as follows :-

It can be seen from the table that number of indoor patients treated has increased in all the six talukas. Increase in ~~outdoor~~ patients treated is found in Warora and Chandrapur Talukas. The decrease in other talukas may not be actual decrease but it may be due to less coverage.

Indicator No. 13. Number of Students in Different categories.

Expanding educational facilities in the plan periods and a general awakening after independence has resulted in tremendous increase in the number of Students in primary and Secondary schools. The universal principle of free and compulsory education to the children of the age group 6-11 has been adopted in the Third Five year plan. The table below indicates the percentage increase in number of students in primary schools and secondary schools in 1966-67 over 1960-61.

The number of students enrolled in 1966-67 was nearly double the enrollment in 1960-61 both for primary and secondary schools. The girls education, neglected in preindependence days, was given good momentum and the percentage increase in 1966-67 was 174.84 and 180.14 for primary, high schools respectively over 1960-61.

Indicator No. 14. Increase in road mileage per 100 square kilometres.

The District lacks very much a good communication system of roads, and has only 7.28 K.m. of roads per 100 square kilometres. The table below indicates the length of roads of different types per 100 square k.m. in the district.

Increase in Banking Offices in proportion to population.

Practically there is no change in the Banking offices since 1960-61 except that one Bank each in 1965-66 & 1966-67 was opened as scheduled Bank and one Cooperative Bank in each year was established.

Indicator No. 16. Prices.

Price structure in an economy is related to various economic factors such as Government policy, supply position, inflationary conditions etc. The price structure also assumes greater importance in the context of development planning. With the declaration of emergency in 62, the price fluctuations of important and essential commodities are being watched at the district by collecting price from the district headquarter since November 1962 for certain important commodities. The prices since November 1962 are continuously moving upwards due to inflationary conditions prevailing and due to failure of crops successively for 2 years in 1964-65 and 1965-66. The average prices in 1966 are higher as compared to 1962 level, and slightly above in respect of some commodities than prices prevailing in 1965. The average prices of wheat, Arhar dal, Masur dal & Masur dal decreased while prices of Lakh dal, Ud dal, Sugar, Gur, Groundnut oil, Mutton, Washing soap and Supari have increased. Taking the average prices of November 1962 as 100 index of prices of important commodities in December 1966 was as follows :-

CHAPTER IV

Plan Development.

During the first two plan periods comparatively smaller amounts were expended on the development programme in Vidharbha as compared to the western parts of Maharashtra. As such additional allocations were made available during III<sup>rd</sup> Five year's plan to Vidharbha Region to make good the shortfalls in the past.

The basic objectives adopted in the long term development programme are :-

- 1) to lay sound foundations for self-sustained economic growth.
- 2) to provide opportunities of employment to all those who seek it, and
- 3) to ensure minimum level of living to every family.

Adopting these objectives, the states Third five year plan, which was by far the first phased development of the composite State of Maharashtra, sought to transform radically the economy of the State over the next three or four plan periods, to build an agro-industrial society and to remove imbalance and disparities in the under-developed areas of the State.

The states third plan, implemented through state level, Divisional level and District level plan schemes, set apart an outlay of Rs. 6.47 crores for this district. The district plan stressed, in conformity with the National Policy, on agriculture development, providing 40% of the total outlay for the schemes under agricultural programmes. By the end of the Third Plan, the total expenditure on all the district level plan schemes was of the order of Rs. 6.10 crores accounting for 95% of the total plan outlay for the district. The expenditure as per the major heads of development during the Third plan in the district is as follows :-

Annual Plan 66-67.

The Third Five year plan ended on 31 st March 1966 and ought to have been followed by the Fourth Five year Plan immediately as was contemplated. But the finalisation of the country's Fourth Five year Plan had been delayed due to various unforeseen circumstances. The National Development Council also decided to make the Fourth plan defence oriented and considered of essential to remodel the draft Fourth Plans both at central and state level. In the meantime, it was decided to continue the process of planning by formulating ... Annual plans during interim period till the Fourth Plan is finally put in operation.

The Annual plan for 66-67 has been formulated without prejudice to the magnitude and dimensions of the Fourth Five year plan of the State. The Annual plan kept in view the need to give highest priority to agriculture production, particularly to schemes which are quick yielding in nature and which help augment production in the shortest possible time. The Annual plan continues some of the schemes of the Third plan with such inevitable expansions as are essential to maintain the flow of services and goods and also such of the new schemes on which advance action was initiated in the Third Plan.

The Annual plan for 1966-67 envisaged an outlay of 5.29 lakhs for the district level schemes of this district. Of this outlay, the provision on Agriculture and allied programmes is Rs. 105.35 lakhs being 56.9 percent. <sup>budget provision</sup> of the total / the programmes of Minor Irrigation, Soil conservation and forest development has been stressed very much by providing on these sub-heads of development 86.8 percentage of total outlay under Agriculture programmes.

1) Agricultural Production.

The need to feed a growing population and to support the industries based on agricultural raw materials without undue reliance on imports has highlighted in recent years the necessity of enhancing agricultural production. This is done through a variety of programmes like propagation improved practices, better input factors like improved seeds, fertilizers, compost, green manuring, double cropping, improved implements and crop production from pests and diseases. Thus during the year 1966-67 supplies of improved seed and fertilisers is intensified and 13379 quintals of improved seeds and 4868 tons of fertilisers are distributed. The schemes undertaken during the year 66-67 are spill-over from the third plan. Under the programme of horticulture development loans had been given to cultivators for raising fruit trees. About 9.50 acres were brought under horticulture plantation during this year. The distribution of sansed and Dhaincha seed on subsidised rates has been continued by distributing 903 Quintals of Sansed and 290 Quintals of Dhaincha seed. The programme of town compost production, however suffered a setback due to insufficient attention on the part of Municipalities and the production of town compost was only 4980 tons as against a target of 20 thousand tons. In rural areas 2906 compost pits are dug and 7501 tons of compost is produced. Plant protection plays an important role in protecting crops from damages of pests and insects and thus achieving additional production.

The cultivators are given plant protection appliances on subsidised rates besides free seed treatment. About 471 sprayers and 513 dusters have been distributed on subsidised rates. The scheme of Intensive cultivation of food crops further expanded the area under intensive food cultivation during the year 1966-67. Area brought under intensive cultivation under different crops was as follows :-

In order to boost up agricultural production Kharif and Rabi campaigns have been undertaken to ensure additional production by adopting improved agricultural practices.

#### Minor Irrigation.

The district possessed a good irrigation system having 14 % of its gross cropped area under irrigation. The major source of irrigation is by way of small tanks. Some of such tanks under the ex-malguzars were under deterioration and required repairs and renovation. This work was taken up on an intensive scale in the Third Five year plan incurring an expenditure of Rs. 113.86 lakhs. During 1966-67 the repair works to these tanks which was in progress by end of the Third plan were continued and against a provision of Rs. 41.75 lakhs an expenditure of Rs. 35.43 lakhs has been incurred. The programme of construction of irrigation wells and installation of pumping sets is continued by providing loans through Land Development Bank while subsidy of Rs. 1.71 lakhs has been given for this purpose of wells constructed and pump sets installed in earlier years. In order to increase the irrigation potential of existing wells where there is insufficient water, the programme of deepening of wells by way of boring and blasting was undertaken and boring of about 236 feet had been done besides 4640 shot holes. The total expenditure on all the schemes of minor irrigation during Annual Plan 1966-67 was Rs. 38.15 lakhs against the provision of Rs. 44.75 lakhs.

#### Soil Conservation.

The programme of contour bunding and graded bunding under the soil conservation measures was started at the last year of the Third plan and about 1607 acres were covered by this Programme during the year 1966-67, under concentrated efforts and an expenditure of Rs. 21.50 lakhs was incurred, against a Budget provision of Rs. 24.53 lakhs.

### Animal Husbandry.

No new programme had been taken under this sub-head during 66-67. Fencing programme of Veterinary dispensaries constructed during Third plan is completed while 3 old cattle breeding centres started in Third plan were maintained and 2 new centres were established. Programme of location of premium bulls was also continued and 18 bulls were located at key centres. The total expenditure incurred under this sub-head was Rs. 0.79 lakhs against a provision of Rs. 1.04 lakhs.

### Forests.

Considering the vast forest area lying in the district, heavy programme of forest development was undertaken in Third Plan incurring an expenditure of Rs. 66.24 lakhs. This program was continued in the Annual Plan 1966-67 and an expenditure of Rs. 26.75 lakhs had been incurred against provision of Rs. 26.75 lakhs. Under the programme of plantation of general utility timber plantation was carried out in 975 hectares during 1966-67 while Bamboo plantation had been undertaken in 184 hectares under the programme of plantation for industrial & Commercial uses.

### Fisheries.

For the purpose of development of inland fisheries an expenditure of Rs. 0.60 lakhs had been incurred in 1966-67 Annual plan against a provision of Rs. 2.63 lakhs. A provision of Rs. 1.98 lakhs was made for establishing one ice factory under the scheme of preservation, transport and marketing of fish but it could not be utilised during the year. About 24.13 lakhs of carp fry were stocked in the impounded waters i.e. tanks and 3281 Quintals of fish was netted. Fisheries requisites like nylon & Cotton twine etc. worth Rs. 4 thousand were supplied while loans and subsidies worth Rs. 20 thousands were distributed.

### Warehousing and Marketing.

A total expenditure of Rs. 0.31 lakhs had been incurred under this sub-head for providing loans and subsidies to market committees for undertaking developmental activities in the market committee areas.

### Cooperation and Community Development.

Planning for democratic socialism has necessarily thrown an increasing weight on Cooperative Organisation of the various branches of economic life. Rural credit and supply to the cultivator at reasonable rates, marketing and organisation of farming activities needed for agriculture constituted major and service cooperatives for the the manifold.



The total outlay under this head under the Annual plan 1966-67 for the district was Rs. 4.95 lakhs against which an expenditure of Rs. 4.18 lakhs has been incurred.

The central financing agency i.e. District Cooperative Bank and the primary Agriculture credit societies provided easy credit facilities to the agriculturists. During 1966-67 term loans to the tune of Rs. 1.37 lakhs were issued by primary agriculture credit societies. Membership of the primary agricultural credit societies was increased by 5610. In order to develop Cooperative marketing loan & subsidy worth Rs. 3.66 lakhs was distributed during 1966-67. Two multipurpose societies at Ttapalli and Kyrkheda were converted into marketing societies. Loan and subsidy was also given for construction of six small size godowns and five medium size godowns. The existing farming societies were given managerial subsidy and loan for land development and construction of godowns. Four cooperative consumer store was also established.

#### Community Development.

The community Development programme aims at the betterment of socio-economic conditions of the rural population with active participation of the people and seeks to evolve methods for the best utilisation of local resources. For the community Development and other allied programmes the Annual plan 1966-67 provided an amount of Rs. 17.01. The expenditure against this provision was of Rs. 15.82 lakhs. Twenty one community development blocks covering the entire districts were continued in 1966-67 for carrying out the development programme. The programme of well construction was continued under the scheme of Financial assistance for local development works programme and about 105 drinking water wells were completed during 1966-67. Applied Nutrition programme has been taken up in Bramhapuri Block.

#### Small Scale and Cottage Industries.

The Programme under this sub-head included development of handloom industry one of the important industries in the rural areas by way of assisting the cooperative societies of weavers for purchase of tools and equipment, share capital-contribution construction of works hods and sales depots and rebate on sale of cloth. Beside's financial assistance was also provided to the Industrial cooperatives of handicraft workers. As against a provision of Rs. 1.24 lakhs an expenditure of Rs. 0.57 lakhs was incurred on these two schemes.

### Transport and Communications.

The district lacks a good communication system and the existing roads are inadequate to connect the far off rural areas with the marketing centres. The road development programme undertaken in the Third plan was continued and a provision of Rs. 16.70 lakhs was provided during 1966-67 against which the expenditure by end of the year was Rs. 12.79 lakhs. Work on about 20 k.m. of road length was in progress. Fourteen rural roads were also in progress by the end of the year.

A provision of Rs. 0.60 lakhs was also made under tourism for parks and gardens around Gadobe and an expenditure of Rs. 0.35 lakhs was incurred.

### Social Services.

#### Education.

The programmes included under general education aim at providing adequate educational facilities so as to ensure minimum standards of knowledge and opportunities for developing skills to the entire population and for reforms in the system and methods of education having regard to the requirements of economic development and social order. With these objectives, the Third five year plan sought to provide for essential needs of free universal and compulsory education in the primary stage of standards I-IV and to reorient the pattern of secondary education. The programmes taken up in the Third plan were continued in the Annual plan 1966-67. Rapid expansion of primary education necessitated the opening of new primary schools and appointment of additional primary teachers. An expenditure of Rs. 2.67 lakhs has been incurred during 66-67, and about 320 teachers have been appointed while 55 new primary schools were opened. For providing trained teachers at primary schools, the programme of training primary teachers needed expansion. About 596 primary teachers were provided training facilities incurring an expenditure of Rs. 1.93 lakhs during 66-67. The local bodies were also given grants worth Rs. 1.49 lakhs for construction of primary school buildings and 29 primary school rooms were constructed.

In spite of introduction of compulsory primary education, experience shows that the parents in rural areas are reluctant to send girls to schools as they do not find it economically feasible.

In order that the ~~parents~~ should not feel hesitant to send their daughters to schools special financial assistance at the rate of Rs. 15/- per annum per girl student is being offered to girls attending schools in scheduled areas which could help them in providing proper clothing etc. An expenditure of Rs. 5 thousand had been incurred towards this scheme and about 1157 girl students were benefited.

Under the programme of development of Secondary education 13 non-Government secondary schools were given grants during 66-67 besides maintenance grants to Government Secondary Schools. The total expenditure towards this scheme during 66-67 was Rs. 1.71 lakhs. The overall expenditure under this sub-head during 66-67 was Rs. 8.64 lakhs against a provision of Rs. 7.48 lakhs.

#### Medical and Nursing.

Under this sub-head the programmes of construction of Main-hospital Building and construction of T.B. hospital taken up in Third plan were continued. Both the buildings were nearly completed. Besides new scheme for expansion of facilities in civil Hospital was taken to open a ~~vacuciation~~ centre. The total expenditure for all the schemes was Rs. 1.12 lakhs during 66-67.

#### Public Health.

Preventive measures for communicable diseases like malaria, filaria and small pox were undertaken under the programmes of Public Health during 66-67 besides Family planning programme and programme of providing medical facilities to rural areas through health centres. In all 10 primary health centres in each one of the C.D. Block are functioning. The Malaria eradication units undertook attack programme by undertaking D.D.T. spraying. Vaccination programme against small pox was continued and by end of 66-67, 97 % of the population was Vaccinated. The family planning programme was also carried out intensively and 8933 operations were performed. The total expenditure under this sub-head was Rs. 20.32 lakhs against a total provision of Rs. 22.03 lakhs.

#### Water supply.

The programme under this sub-head included Municipal-water supply schemes and piped water supply schemes in rural areas. The former scheme undertook expansion of water supply system in Warora and Trade waste disposal for Ballarpur paper mill

While Markhanda Deo water supply scheme/ The total expenditure was Rs. 1.77 lakhs on these schemes during 66-67.

#### Housing.

The schemes of Village housing project and extension of Village Gaothans were continued in 66-67 incurring an expenditure of Rs. 0.77 lakhs.

#### Urban Development.

Two schemes of financial assistance to local bodies for provision of basic amenities and financial assistance to Municipalities for implementation of development plans were undertaken in this sub-head. The former scheme provided for loans worth Rs. 0.65 lakhs to Municipal Council Warora which did not incur any expenditure. For the latter scheme no expenditure was incurred as development plans of Municipal Councils of the district are yet to be finalised.

#### Welfare of Backward classes.

For the betterment of backward classes various schemes of grants to Backward class hostels, scholarships to Backward Classes students, construction of irrigation wells, financial assistance for housing and share capital contribution of Backward class Cooperatives were undertaken. A total expenditure of Rs. 0.77 lakhs had been incurred during 66-67.

#### Social Welfare.

A social welfare extension project was functioning under Maharashtra state social welfare Board which was running 25 Balwadis, 14 Libraries, 8 Maternity centres, and 18 arts and crafts centres. Expenditure of Rs. 0.20 lakhs was incurred during 66-67.

#### Labour & Labour welfare.

Under the scheme of Technical and Vocational training an expenditure of Rs. 0.82 lakhs was incurred towards expansion of I.T.I. At Chanda.
