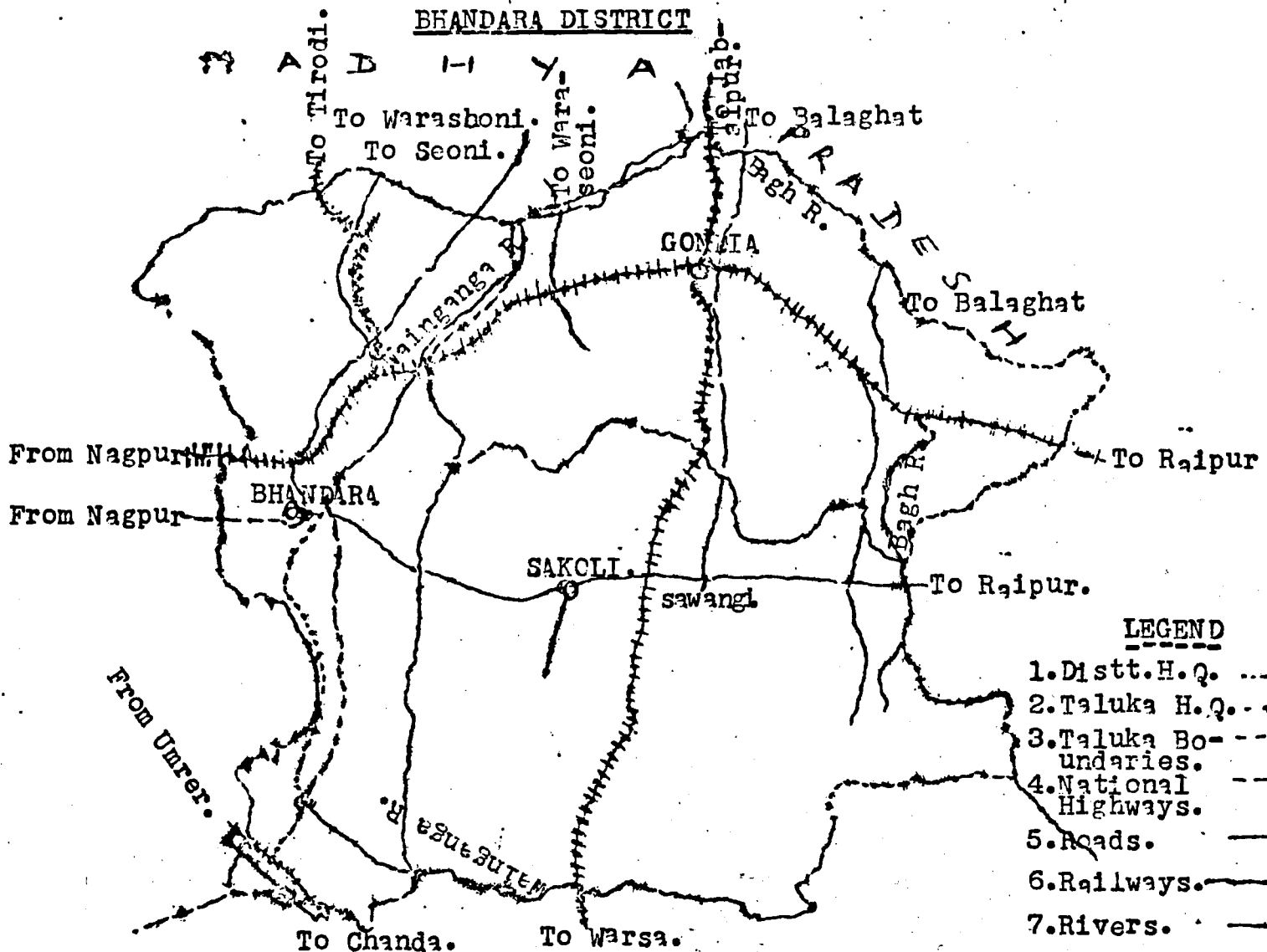

## CHAPTER NO.1.

### INTRODUCTION.

'Bhandara' has its origin in the term 'Bhanara' i.e. a place where metal utensils are manufactured. The place is famous for handmade big utensils of brass and copper of a specialised and distinguishing character. Numismatic finds near Pauni in Bhandara district date back to a period 300 B. C. and bear the name of the King Dimabhadra.

#### 1.1. Location.

Bhandara district is situated on the farthest eastern boundary of Maharashtra. The district lies between  $20^{\circ}, 39'$  and  $21^{\circ}, 38'$  N latitude and  $79^{\circ}, 27'$  and  $80^{\circ}, 42'$  E longitude on the Eastern portion of the Nagpur plains.

#### 1.2. Boundaries.

It is bounded on the north by the Balaghat and Seoni districts of Madhya Pradesh, Nagpur district on the west, Chanda district on the south and Drug district of Madhya Pradesh on the east. The area of the district is 3,623 Sq. Miles (9383.6 Sq.Km.) accounting for 9.8 percent of the area of Nagpur Division and 3.06 percent of the area of Maharashtra. The east-west length of the district is 128.748 Kms.(80 miles) and north-south length is 109.436 Kms.(68 miles). The district ranks 7th in term of area among the districts of Nagpur Division.

#### 1.3. Administrative set-up.

For administrative purposes, the district is at present divided into 3 tahsils. The Collector is the administrative head of the district. He is incharge of General Administration, Law and Order, Treasury, Land Revenue and Civil

Supplies. He is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector in his office and three Sub-Divisional Officers of the rank of Deputy Collector incharge of three Revenue Divisions and have their headquarters at respective tahsil headquarters.

Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis.

As a result of Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act, 1961, a Zilla Parishad and 13 Panchayat Samitis viz. Bhandara, Mohadi, Tumsar, Tirora, Gondia, Amgaon, Salekasa, Deori, Goregaon, Sakoli, Lakhandur, Paoni and Morgaon-Arjuni have been established in the district and they have been entrusted with the work of development activities within the frame work of the Act. The areas under the jurisdiction of the Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis correspond to the district and block boundaries except the Municipal towns which are not covered by them. The Zilla Parishad covers 99.20 % of the area and 89.26 % of the total population of the district.

The Zilla Parishad has 51 directly elected Councillors out of these 51 seats, one seat has been reserved for Scheduled Caste. In addition, at the most two women Councillors can be co-opted by the elected Councillors, if there are no women members in the 51 elected Councillors. There are five associate councillors who are Chairmen of Five federal co-operative societies conducting business in the district. The elected ~~ex~~ Chairmen of all Panchayat Samitis who are not the members of Zilla Parishad, are also ~~xxx~~ ex-officio Councillors. At the block level, the Panchayat Samiti consists of all elected and co-opted councillors from the area of the Block and a Chairman of a co-operative society conducting the business of purchase and sale of Agricul-

tural produce in the area of the Block as an associate member and the Chairman of the co-operative society conducting business in agriculture in the area of the block as a co-opted member. The Panchas elected by the members of the Village Panchayats are also elected members of the Panchayat Samiti. The number of Panchas elected is at the rate of two for each electoral division in the area of the Block.

Elections were held in the year 1967. The term of the office of the Councillors is of five years. The Zilla Parishad has elected the President and Vice-President from amongst the elected Councillors.

An Officer in the Senior scale of I.A.S. works as the Chief Executive Officer to the Zilla Parishad. The Parishad is also assisted by various departments and the heads of those departments at the district level are officers of Class I or Class II Service under the State Government. At the Block level, the Panchayat Samitis have elected Chairmen and Deputy Chairmen. The Block Development Officers work as Secretaries to the Panchayat Samitis. The executive authority for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act vests in the Chief Executive Officer and the Block Development Officers. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as a Secretary to the Zilla Parishad. The Zilla Parishad functions through a Standing Committee presided by the president and six subject committees for Finance, Works, Agriculture, Co-operation, Education and Health. Two subject committees are presided over by the Vice-President and four by two Chairmen elected by the Zilla Parishad to preside over two specified subject committees each. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as a Secretary of the Standing Commi-

tee, while the District Heads of Departments work as Secretaries to the subject Committees concerned. The Panchayat Samitis do not have Subject Committees.

#### 1.4. Area & territorial changes.

There were no major changes in the boundaries of the district or its talukas between 1911 and 1955 except that the headquarters of Tirora Tahsil were shifted to Gondia and the name of the tahsil was changed to Gondia Tahsil in the year 1914. With the Reorganisation of the States in 1956, the district was transferred from Madhya Pradesh to erstwhile bilingual Bombay State. The district forms a part of Maharashtra since 1st May, 1960. The area, number of inhabited villages, number of towns, 1961 population and the percentages of area and population of each tahsil are as follows:-

Note:- Figures in bracket against item 1 above indicate area in Sq.Km.

Sakoli Tahsil is the biggest in respect of area and occupies 42.8 % of the total area of the district. Gondia Tahsil has the largest population of the district. The urban areas forms 0.03 % of the total area of the district.

#### 1.5. Topography.

The landscape is generally open and level, being broken in a few places by isolated ranges of hills. The district lies in the Wainganga basin and the Wainganga controls its entire drainage system.

#### 1.6. Hills ranges, rivers system, soil etc.

The lowest and the most northerly hill range is the Ambagad range, an outlayer of the Satpura. It enters the district from the west and trending in the northeasterly direction cuts off the valley of the Bawanthady River from the rest of the district. Soon after entering the district the ridge is crowned by the fortress of Ambagad. In front of it, looking across the valley which here pierces the range, is remarkable balastic precipice with a sheer drop of some hundred foot. In the centre of the district, running from the east of Bhandara Town to the Railway near Gondia, is Gaikhuri range, a cluster of low peaks, surrounded by irregular forest country. The points of Khura (2009/Ft.), Lendezari (1490/Ft.) and Jamni (1712/Ft.) are the highest. The range divides the valley of the Wainganga and Bagh, just West of the Bhandara, the Bhilai Range consisting of a few sand stone hills capped with granite and overhanging the eastern road forms a prominent feature in the landscape. Lastly in the south-east lie the Nawegaon or Pratapgarh hills, the highest part of the district. Thus the four demarcated natural divisions of the district are 1). Hilly tract of Gaikhuri and Ambagad on the

north-west, 2). Valley of Wainganga River covering the Bhandara Tahsil and part of Gondia Tahsil, 3). Hilly tract of Gaikhuri and Pratapgarh ranges covering Sakoli Tahsil and 4). Valley of Bagh and Pangodi rivers in the north-east corner of the district covering the portion of Gondia Tahsil.

The Wainganga is the main river flowing through this district and all others viz. Bagh, Chulbandh, Pangodi, Chandan and Bawanthadi are its tribularies. The Wainganga enters the district from the North-East side and flows diagonally across it until it passes within a mile of Bhandara town. Then it flows to the south and forms boundary between Bhandara and Nagpur districts for a short distance. It then enters the Chanda district. The total length of the river is 576 Kms. out of which, the length of 333 kms. lies in Bhandara district. Bagh is the principal affluent of Wainganga. It joins the Wainganga near Beni, being crossed by the Jabalpur-Gondia Narrow gauge railway just before it's junction. The length of the river is 112.80 Kms. The other river called the Chulband which rises in Bhandara district and flows through Sakoli Tahsil is of 104.80 Kms. length and meets the Wainganga near Soni on the Southern border of the district.

#### TANKS.

Bhandara district, known for its thousands of tanks, is called the lake region of Nagpur Plains. There are 580 big and 13,709 small tanks in the district. It is noteworthy that this district has the maximum number of tanks in the whole of Maharashtra State. Besides serving as a source or irrigation, these tanks are also utilised for the development of fisheries which form an important aspect of economic development of the district.

The soils of this district are light in general except in Paoni and Lakhandur area, which are locally known as "Chauras" area. Most of these soils are of granite origin where as some are of laterite origin. The soils in Paoni and Lakhandur are heavy. Some of them especially in Lakhandur area can be classified as heavy clay whereas the rest as clay loam. The light soils have PH slightly less than 6.5 i.e. they are slightly acidic but the clay soils are natural with PH ranging from 6.5 to 7. There are few patches in light soil whose PH is about 5.55 i.e. they are acidic in nature.

#### 1.7. Climate, Temperature and Rainfall.

The highest maximum temperature recorded at Gondia centre during the year 1966 and 1967 was 42.3°C and 42.2°C respectively, particularly in the month of May. The lowest minimum temperature during ~~the~~ the year 1966 was recorded as 12.6°C in the month of December where as in the year 1967, it was recorded as 13.4°C in the month of January.

In the year 1966, the monsoons commenced in the right earnest at the beginning of June and lasted up to middle of September with insufficient rains where as in the year 1967 they commenced in right earnest at the beginning of June and lasted upto middle of June with sufficient rains. Because of abnormal failure of rains in the year 1966 was declared as drought year and scarcity affected villages were declared by Govt. The year 1967, the rain-fall position was quite satisfactory from Agricultural production point of view. The average rainfall of the district was 1,173.3 mms. and 1,378.9 mms. in the year 1966 and 1967 respectively. The rain-fall during the year 1967 was slightly less than the normal rainfall of the district which is 1,446.4 mms.

Scarcity.

Some parts of the district have been affected in the past due to untimely rains or local insufficiency. There is however, no sizeable area affected by deficiency of rainfall. The Fact Finding Committee appointed by the Govt. of Bombay in 1960 came, therefore, to the conclusion that the district may be generally considered as free from scarcity.

The crop condition was found satisfactory from the year 1961 to 1964 because of satisfactory rainfall during the span of four years. In the year 1965-66 and 1966-67 because of abnormal failure of rains the crops had withered and the water level had fallen. However the percentage of scarcity area was lesser in the year 1966-67 than that of the year 1965-66. The Govt. had declared 453 villages a scarcity affected villages out of the total 1,486 inhabited villages in the district in the year 1966-67 accounting for 30.48 percent of the villages affected by scarcity. The talukawise percentage of scarcity affected villages reveals that 53.64 percent villages in Bhandara Tahsil, 31.12 percent villages in Gondia Tahsil and 15.24 percent villages in Sakoli Tahsil were declared as scarcity affected villages in the year 1966-67. Necessary measures were immediately taken up by Govt. to provide a bulk of employment to the people living in the scarcity affected area.

In the year 1967 the rainfall was quite normal and crop position was satisfactory because of sufficient and timely rainfall throughout the district.



CHAPTER NO.II.  
Explanatory Notes.

The statistical data presented in different tables in this Abstract is subdivided into 13 sections. The explanatory note on each group of tables is given in the following paragraphs.

I. Climate.

The table No.1 gives monthly rainfall and number of rainy days in each month and at each rain-guage station, collected through Revenue agency. The table shows monthly and annual rainfall and the number of rainy days for the various stations in the district. A day is reckoned as a "rainy day" when atleast 2.5 mm of rain recorded on that day.

The Table No.2 gives 'mean', 'mean maximum' and 'mean minimum' annual temperature in respect of two centres viz. Bhandara and Oondia in this district. The data are supplied by the Government of India's regional meteorological centre at Nagpur. The mean maximum and mean minimum are the averages of the maximum and minimum temperatures observed daily during the year. The mean temperature is the average of the mean maximum and mean minimum temperature thus arrived at.

II. Area and Population.

Final figures of 1961 population census are presented in all tables in this section. The table No.3 gives talukawise and district total of area, rural and urban population, total males and females, population density per sq. km. of area and percentage increase in 1961 over 1951. The figures of 1951 and 1961 census are shown in this table.

The terms "rural" and "urban" under column No.3 are defined as follows according to 1961 census.

A town or an urban area is defined as a place which has-

1. A municipality, a cantonment or civil lines

or

2.(1).A population of 5,000 or over

and

(ii).Atleast 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in non-agricultural pursuits.

Rural population is a population of all villages in a revenue unit.

A "village" is a statutorily recognised village having a defined boundry and seperate land records. Hamlets, wadies or Padas have, therefore, not been shown as seperate villages. On the other hand statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown seperately as "Uninhabited" villages. Villages also include forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families with no seperate revenue record for them.

The table No.4 gives the classification of inhabited villages with their total population in each Taluka and district as a whole according to different population ranges.

The table No.5 gives the classification of towns with their total population according to different population ranges and classes. The figures are shown Talukawise and the district as a whole.

The table No.6 gives number of workers and non-workers in each taluka of Bhandara district according to 1961 census and they are classified according to their livelihood. The district total is also shown in Col.No.4. The population according to livelihood classes is shown

seperately only for rural and urban area and district as a whole. The concept of dependency followed in 1951 census has been abandoned for economic classification of population at the 1961 census. Instead, the population is classified into workers and non-workers. The emphasis is now on work and not on income or economic dependence. A person is defined as worker if (a). In case of seasonal work like cultivation, livestock, dairying, household industry, etc. he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season, and -

(b). In the case of regular employment in any trade, profession service, business or commerce, he was employed during any of the fifteen days preceeding the day of the enumerator's visit to the household.

Persons like beggars, pensioners, agricultural or non-agricultural royalty, rent or dividend receivers who earn an income but who are not participating in any productive work are not treated as workers unless they also work in cultivation, industry, trade, profession, business or commerce.

Classification of workers doing two or more different types of work, has been done on the basis of their principal work, i.e., the work which consumes major portion of their time and not necessarily the work which earns larger portion of their income.

The table No.7 gives distribution of population according to (A) Age group (B) Mother tongue and (C) Religion, seperately for Rural and Urban area and district as a whole. Here "mother tongue" is defined as a language spoken by the person's mother to the person in his childhood or mainly

spoken in the house. Dialects have been included in the main languages on the basis of Grierson's classification.

The table No.8 gives talukawise details of scheduled caste and scheduled tribes separately for Rural and Urban area and their total. The district total is also given in this table.

The various concepts adopted at the time of 1961 census concerning 'village', 'town', 'household', are explained in the publication of 'Census of India' 1961 Maharashtra State so as to facilitate comparison with earlier censuses. The population census is a mass scale operation to be completed in shortest possible time. This naturally puts limitations on the accuracy, internal consistency and coverage of the final results.

The Scheduled castes for which no one was returned in the district in 1961 are (1). Bhana and (11). Chadar.

There are no Scheduled Tribes notified for the district.

III. Agriculture.

The important statistics in this section are subdivided into (i). Land utilisation, (ii). Area under different crops, (iii). Outturn of principal crops, (iv). Area irrigated by different sources, (v). Area irrigated under different crops, (vi). No. of irrigation wells in use and not in use, (vii). Minor Irrigation Works other than wells, (viii). Major and Medium Projects, (ix). Agricultural wage rates, (x). Agricultural implements and (xi). Famine, Scarcity and akin to scarcity data.

The table No.9 gives talukawise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of utilisation. Against each taluka, the break-up of the total geographical area according to different types of land use is shown. The area according to village papers is calculated from the village returns prepared by patwaries for revenue purposes. There are differences between the figures of total area according to the Surveyor General and according to the village papers because the latter is calculated by totalling up village returns while the former is calculated in Blocks. The Survey of India calculate the area by planimetry from maps which represent the ground in horizontal plane with the help of areas of great quadrilaterals of 15 minutes latitude and longitude already worked out by them. Moreover, allowances made for areas covered by water, buildings, roads etc. are different in two cases. Under "Forests" are included all actually forested areas of lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether State-owned or private. If any portion of such land is not actually

~~wooded~~ but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land as the case may be. "Land puts to non-agricultural uses" stands for all lands, occupied by buildings, roads and railways or under water e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agriculture.". "Barren and unculturable land" covers all barren and unculturable land like mountains, deserts etc. Land which can not be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost, is classed as a "unculturable", whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. "Permanent pastures and other grazing lands" cover all grazing lands, whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not. Village common and grazing lands within forest areas are included under this head. Under "miscellaneous tree crops and groves not included in the net area sown" included all cultivable land which is not included under net area sown but is put to some agricultural use. Lands under casurina tree, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other groves for fuel etc. which are not included under 'orchards' are classed under the category. "Culturable waste" includes all lands available for cultivation whether not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in succession. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or not assessed and may lie in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. "Current fallows" comprise cropped areas which are kept fallow during the current year. If any seeding area is not cropped again the same year, it is also treated as current fallow. "Other fallow land" includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation but are temporarily out

of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and not more than five years. The "net area sown" consists of net area sown with crops and orchards, area sown more than once is counted only once. The "gross cropped area" represents the sum total of area under all crops. The difference between the total cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once on the same land during the same year with the same or different crops.

The table No.10 gives talukawise area under different crops in hectares for the year 1965-66 and 1966-67.

The table No.11 gives cropwise yield per hectare and their total outturn in district for the year 1965-66 and 1966-67. The figures for the year 1965-66 are fully revised estimates.

The table No.12 gives area irrigated by different sources in each taluka and is also based on the information collected through village papers by revenue agency.

The table No.13 gives area irrigated under different crops in each taluka for the year 1965-66 and 1966-67. In this case also the figures are based on the information collected through village papers by revenue agency.

The table No.14 gives number of irrigation wells in each taluka in the year 1965-66 and 1966-67 in use and not in use during these years. In this case also the primary source of information is village record.

The table No.15 gives Minor Irrigation works excluding wells according to taluka and also the net area irrigated under these works. It includes mainly tanks, owned by Government, Zilla Parishad and private indivi-

duals, "bodies" owned by private individuals and lift irrigation works owned by co-operative Sector or private individuals.

The table No.16 gives the information on Major and Medium Projects undertaken in this district which are either complete or incomplete.

The table No.17 gives the agricultural wage rates in every month. This data are collected fortnightly throughout the year from three selected Rural centres. Only one centre is selected from every taluka.

The table No.18 gives agricultural implements in each taluka of district. The information is based on the data collected during the Live Stock Census in the year 1965.

The table No.19 gives position of famine, scarcity and akin to scarcity affected villages in each taluka for the year 1967-68.

#### IV. Animal Husbandary, Forest and Fisheries.

##### A. Animal Husbandary.

The table no. 20 gives the number of various types of Livestock and poultry as enumerated in the district at the time of 1966 Live Stock Census. The Census is conducted throughout the country on an uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration once in 5 years. During the live stock census operation the livestock is enumerated by house to house enquiry. Particular care is taken to enumerate livestock in slaughter houses, stray animals and animals intransit.

The table No.21 gives statistics regarding number of Veterinary Hospitals, dispensaries, Aid centres,



doctors and Stockmen and number of animals treated and inseminated in these hospitals, dispensaries and Veterinary aid centres.

The table No.22 gives disease-wise livestock mortality including poultry in the district for the year 1966-67 and 1967-68. The information also includes disease-wise attacks and deaths of livestock including poultry.

The table No.23 gives taluk-wise slaughter houses functioning as on 31st March, 1967 and 31st Mar., 1968 and category-wise animals slaughtered during the years.

#### B. Forest.

Two tables are included in this section. The table No.24(A) gives details of area under different types of forests. Information regarding forests under the control of the State's Forest Department and those under the control of the State's Revenue Department is shown separately. The areas under forests are classified according to legal status into reserved forests, protected forests and unclassed forests. The legal status refers to the classification of forests under the Indian Forest Act, XVI of 1927. Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber production and in which rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid; right of grazing or cultivation is allowed but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassed forest refers to the inaccessible forests or unoccupied waste. The forests which are taken by Government from local bodies or private individuals for management on lease basis are called 'leased forests'. There is no classification of expropriatory forests as such but in

Nagpur Division, some private lands containing valuable forests are taken over by Govt. under section 29 of the Indian Forests Act and which are not yet classified as per tripartite classification are termed as expropriatory. The forest area shown in the Table No.24(A) may not tally with the area under forest shown in Table on land utilisation in Agricultural section. The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons.

- i). In the Indian Forest Statistics Returns, the whole area including non-wooden area under the control of Forest Department is taken as area under forests while in Agricultural Statistics, it is classified according to its actual utilisation.
- ii). The Forest Deptt. returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose and indicate the ownership of the forest areas, the actual utilisation of these area is not so important from their point of view as it is in the land utilisation statistics for Agricultural Statistics.
- iii). The Forest Department returns relate to financial years and Agricultural Statistics relate to the Agricultural years.

The Table No.24(B) gives production of major and minor forest produce for each year.

And

#### V. Employment, Industry, Mining/ Electricity.

There are only 10 Tables under this section.

The factory statistics shown in Table No.25, 26 & 27 cover following types of factories registered under Factories Act, 1948. 1). Those employing ten or more workers working with the aid of power (Section 2.n(i)). 2). Those

employing twenty or more workers and working without the aid of power (Section 2 n(11)) and 3). Those registered under Section 85 of the Act, under which the State Government makes applicable the provisions of the Act even though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However, the defence factories are excluded. These tables show the number of working factories and all the registered factories. The table No. 25 gives number of registered factories and persons working in them according to Industry Sub-group. The table No.26 gives the number of working factories and average daily employment therein according to major groups of industries. The table No.27 gives the distribution of factories according to number of days worked and according to major groups of industries.

The table No.28 gives important statistics relating to employment exchange. The number of registration, number of vacancies notified, number of employers using exchange, number <sup>on</sup> ~~at~~ live register at the end of each month and number of candidates placed in employment is also shown monthwise.

The table No.29 gives occupational distribution of total registration and placement in employment exchange.

The table No.30 gives volume of employment in different industries as on 31st March, 1967 and 31st March, 1968 according to description of Industry.

The table No.31 and 32 present results of the census of Government employees as on 1.7.1966, conducted by the Bureau of Economics and Statistics, Bombay. The data presented in these tables are restricted to Class I, II, III and IV employees of the State Government and do not cover any other category such as work charged personnel, Class IV

employees paid from contingencies, daily rated workers, part-time workers or honorary workers. The distribution of employees according to specified basic pay ranges is shown separately in respect of Class I, II, III and IV employees. The distribution of employees according to monthly emolument ranges is also shown in Table No.31. The table No.32 gives the State & Government Departmentwise employees.

The table No.33 gives figures of (i) installed capacity (ii). Electricity generated. (iii). Electricity purchased and (iv). consumption of Electricity during the year - 1966-67 and 1967-68. The table No.34 gives number of villages and towns electrified and total population covered as on 31.3.61 to 31.3.68.

#### VI. Co-operation.

There are in all 3 Tables in this section.

The table No. 35 gives the different types of societies in this district according to the following groups.

- (i). Agricultural credit (ii). Non-agricultural credit
- (iii). Agricultural non-credit and (iv). Non-agricultural non-credit.

The table No.36 gives important statistics relating to District Central Co-operative Bank, District Industrial co-operative Bank, District Development Bank with Taluka Branches and Urban Bank and their members, share capital, Reserve and other funds, working capital and type of loans advanced.

The table No. 37 gives the Talukawise primary agricultural societies, their membership, share capital, Reserve and other funds, working capital, loans advanced and

recovered, loans outstanding and overdues and percentage of recovery to total loan advanced.

The table No.38 gives important statistics of all Agricultural non-credit societies, non-agricultural credit societies, non-agricultural non-credit societies with the activities they have undertaken during the period under review.

The table No.39 gives important statistics of the operation of primary co-operative marketing societies in each taluka.

The table No.40 gives important achievements of the operation of the other co-operative societies such as Agricultural marketing societies, Fishery societies, Animal Husbandry societies, Farming societies, Agricultural processing, Thrift and credit societies, Handloom workers co-operative societies, consumers stores, Housing etc.

The table No.41 gives the types of commodities marketed, their total quantity and value in the regulated markets functioning in this district.

The table No.42 gives talukawise number of registered money lenders and loans advanced by them to traders and non-traders.

## VII. Medical and Public Health

The table No.43 given in this section gives information regarding number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, Health centres and Primary Health centres working and total number of doctors, nurses, vaidyas, total number of beds, total number of indoor and out-door patients treated. The table covers all State and Central

Government institutions, institutions owned by municipalities and local bodies and also private aided and un-aided institutions. Under private institutions, charitable institutions or institutions maintained by private bodies are not covered. Thus private clinics run by individuals are not included.

The table No.44 gives number of births and deaths registered in this district. The male and female classification of births, deaths and infant deaths is not available and hence the total under each category is given in each taluka.

The table No.45 gives number of deaths due to important causes in this district.

The table No.46 gives vaccination statistics and cholera inoculations in this district.

#### VIII. Education.

The final figures derived from 1961 population census are given in Table. Nos. 47, 48 & 49.

The table No.47 gives number of literates and percentage of literacy to total population in each taluka as per 1961 population census.

The table Nos. 48 & 49 give total population, total number of illiterates, total number of literates and education levels of literates, as per 1961 population census in each taluka separately for Rural and Urban areas respectively.

The table No.50 gives information regarding number of educational institutions according to types, enrolment therein and number of teachers trained and untrained in these institutions.

The table No.51 gives information of number of beneficiaries among backward classes such as Scheduled cas-

te, Scheduled tribes and other backward classes. Here beneficiaries are treated as those who are recipients of educational concessions such as scholarships, freeships etc.

The table No.52 gives the information of economically backward class concession of free education in various types of educational institutions. The total number of beneficiaries and total amount of concessions granted is also given in this table.

The table No.53 gives the expenditure incurred on primary education separately by different local bodies.

The table No.54 gives the information of villages having no primary schools or schooling facilities according to population ranges. The deserted villages as per 1961 census are also included in the population range 0-199.

#### IX. Transport and Communications.

In this section, statistical information relating to various modes of transport is given.

The table No.55 gives total railway length according to railway route. The information is compiled from the railway time table. The railway length is measured between the first and last stations within the district boundary.

The table No.56 gives the figures of road length as at the end of each year. The figures relate to extra municipal roads maintained by the State's Building and Communication Department and local bodies such as Zilla Parishad and are shown from Col. No. 3 to 11 where as Municipal roads are shown from Col.No.12 to 14 ~~xxx~~ separately. The surface classification is also given in the same table.

The table No.57 gives various motor vehicles in operation in Nagpur region as on 31st Mar., 1967 and 1968. The districtwise break-up is not available with the Regional Transport Officer and hence the total figures of motor vehicles in operation at the year ending March, 1967 and 1968 are given.

The table No.58 relates to operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport in Nagpur division. State Transport is the only nationalised Road Transport in this division. In this table the information as on 31st March is given for the first two items while the average for the whole year is worked out in respect of the rest of the items excluding item No.6 as given in the foot-note. For this table the division comprises of Nagpur, Bhandara, Chanda and Warha districts of Vidarbha division.

The table No.59 relates to traffic census on important roads which was conducted in November, 1966 by Building and Communication Department, Government of Maharashtra.

The table No.60 gives some important statistics regarding post and telegraph offices, number of letter boxes, number of postmen, number of telephones and number of radio licences issued and renewed together. Information in this table is collected from postal authority.

The table No.61 gives information regarding villages having rural radio(receiver) sets installed by the Rural Broadcasting department under the Director of Publicity, Govt. of Maharashtra. The information relates to number of villages having Rural radio sets installed, population covered and total number of radio form forums organised in these villages.



X. Local Bodies.

Statistics regarding Village Panchayats, Municipalities and Zilla Parishad are shown in this section.

The table No.62 gives the income and expenditure of local bodies such as Village Panchayats, Zilla Parishad and Municipalities for the financial years.

The table No.63 gives Panchayat Samitiwise figures of (i). number of village Panchayats (ii) their total income and (iii) their total expenditure. Under income, information is separately shown under grants from Government and others, contributions, donations, taxes, fees and others. The Panchayat Samitiwise figures for the year 1966-67 and 1967-68 are shown and for district as a whole. The expenditure incurred under various heads is also shown in the same table for corresponding years.

The table No.64 is divided into two parts (A) and (B). The table No.64(A) gives the total income of Zilla Parishad derived from self raised resources, Govt. grants, debt section and remittances. The table No.64(B) gives the total expenditure incurred by Zilla Parishad. The expenditure is divided into <sup>three</sup> parts viz. (i). Revenue expenditure (ii). debt section and (iii). Remittances. The information is given for the years 1965-66, 1966-67 and 1967-68.

The table No.65 gives the income and expenditure of all municipalities separately and district as a whole for the years 1966-67 and 1967-68. Under income the information is separately divided into (i) Grants & contributions (ii) Municipal rates and taxes (iii) Revenue derived from municipal properties and others. The sub-heads such as Grants & contributions and Municipal rates and taxes are further divided into different categories. Under expenditure the information

nation is separately divided into (i). General administration (ii). cost of collection of taxes (iii) Public safety (iv). Public Health and conveniences (v). Public works and others.

### XI. Plan & Community Development.

The table No.66 gives details of expenditure under each major head of development separately under local sector and state sector schemes, during the Annual Plan 1967-68.

The table No.67 gives details of Physical targets and achievements under each major head of development during the Annual Plan year 1967-68.

The table No.68 gives details of Community Development Blocks under Stage-I, Stage-II and Stage-III, their total area in sq. Kms., their total no. of inhabited and deserted villages, their population as per 1961 census separately according to different stages.

The table No.69 gives the total expenditure incurred in different stages of blocks upto end of the year 1967-68 since their inception.

The table No.70 gives blockwise figures of achievements under selected items under C. D. Programme during the year 1965-67 and 1967-68.

### XII. Prices.

The table No.71 gives average retail prices of various commodities ruling at district headquarter in every month.

The average prices under each commodity are shown from the month of January to December for the year 1966 and 1967 separately. These data are regularly collected by District Statistical Office on every Friday in the week from the selected shops. The average price of each commodity at the calendar

year is also shown in the table. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted only to one quotation and that too only from one shop at District Head quarter, the average shown for individual commodity cannot be said to be fully representative but the data may prove useful as a broad indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time.

The table No.72 gives consumer price index numbers (revised series) for working class of Nagpur centre published by the office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay as the same is not worked out separately for Bhandara. The data for the year 1966-67, monthwise data from April, 1967 to March, 1968 and average for the year 1967-68 are given in this table. The base year for calculation of price index is 1960.

### XIII. Miscellaneous.

The table No.73 gives the information regarding cost and the strength of Police Organisation in this district. The Permanent and Temporary strength is shown separately. In this table the information of the number of Police Stations, number of out-posts, number of sub-post and number of look-ups is also given in this table.

The table No.74 gives information about crime statistics in this district. The information mainly relates to cognizable and non-cognizable crimes. The table gives the information about number of offences recorded, number of persons tried, convicted and acquitted under each type of offence separately under the categories viz. cognizable crimes and non-cognizable crimes for the year 1966 and 1967. The statistics regarding non-cognizable crimes could not be made available and hence has not been shown in the table.

The table No.73 gives the work disposed off by Civil and Criminal Courts of Bhandara district separately during the years 1966 and 1967.

The table No.76 gives the information of Cinema Statistics for the years 1966-67 and 1967-68. The information relates to number of permanent, semi-movement and touring theatres and their seating capacity per show in each taluka and district as a whole separately.

The table No.77 gives the number of Banking Offices in Bhandara district in the beginning of 1968. The information relates to number of towns and villages having banks, population covered and number of Scheduled Banks, Co-operative Banks and Other Banks with total Banks in the district.

The table No.78 gives the statistics of Joint-stock companies in Bhandara district as on 31st March for the years 1966, 1967 and 1968. The Joint-stock companies limited by shares under public and private sectors and companies limited by guarantees and associations not for profit under public and private sectors is shown separately.

The table No.79 gives the number of insurance policies issued and amount insured for the years 1966-67 and 1967-68 in this district.

The table No.80 relates to Small Savings statistics of Bhandara district for the years 1966-67 and 1967-68. The table No.81 gives the information of targets fixed, total gross collections, total withdrawals and total net collection for the corresponding years.

The table No.81 relates to Land Revenue collections in each taluka and district as a whole for the years 1966-67 and 1967-68. The table No.81 gives the information of previous arrears at the beginning of the year, total demand (in-

(including previous arrears) during the year, total collection during the year and total arrears at the end of the year separately for each taluka and district as a whole.

The table No.82 gives the information of printing presses in each taluka, the number of newspapers, periodicals printed and published in various languages.

The table No.83 gives the information of General Elections held in Bhandara district in the year 1967 separately for Parliamentary and Assembly constituencies. The information relates to total number of electorates, total number of electors who vote<sup>d</sup>, percentage of votes polled to total electorates and partywise number of votes polled in each constituency separately for Parliament and Assembly.

The table No.84 gives trends in selected indicators from the year 1950-51 to 1967-68.

CHAPTER-III.

In this chapter the progress of development and the impact of Third Five Year Plan, the Annual Plan 1966-67 and 1967-68, on the different sectors of the economy of the district is reviewed by presenting talukawise sectorial trends based on certain indicators of development. Comparative talukawise data for 1960-61, 1966-67 and 1967-68 or for the latest available years, as the case may be, are also given under the following relevant indicators to focuss the pace of development.

Indicator No.1:- Percentage of gross sown area.

Since 1960-61 the net area sown in the district increased from 3.81 Lakh hectares to 3.87 Lakh hectares in 1966-67 or by 1.57 percent, but at the same time the gross cropped area sown decreased from 5.16 Lakh hectares in the year 1960-61 to 4.89 Lakh hectares in 1966-67 or by 5.23 percent. The decrease in gross cropped area in the year 1966-67 was due to decrease in area sown more than once. Because of failure of rains in the year 1966-67 the second crops of linseed, lakh etc. could not be sown for want of moisture in the soil. The following table indicates the percentage of gross cropped area during 1960-61 and 1966-67.

In the year 1966-67, the percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown had decreased in all talukas as compared with corresponding figures in the year 1960-61. It was highest in Gondia taluka and lowest in Bhandara taluka both in 1960-61 as well as 1966-67. In this district Lakh, Lakhori, Urid, Linseed and Wheat are sown generally as second crop after paddy. A major area under double cropping comprise un-irrigated crops such as Lakh, Lakhori and Linseed which are sown by broadcasting method and locally called as "Utera". Now there is a increasing trend amongst the cultivators to take to paddy varieties like "Luchai" even in the soil which is less suitable for "Luchai" because it gives good economic returns. If this variety is taken in such type of soils, the second crop of Lakh, Lakhori or Linseed is not possible, hence the percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown got reduced to a great extent. Besides this, sowing of Lakh or Lakhori is being discouraged as they are not good for human consumption from health point of view.

Indicator No.2 : Productivity of Important Crops.

This programmes of Agricultural development have all along received a high priority. The average annual food grains production in the district rose from 2.542 Lakh metric tonnes at the end of the First Five Year Plan to 3.139 Lakh metric tonnes at the end of the Second Five Year Plan. The average annual food grains production however, declined to 2.903 Lakh metric tonnes due to insufficient rainfall from the end of September in the year 1962-63, affecting the paddy crop and also due to scarcity conditions arising out of inadequate rainfall in the year 1965-66. Secondly, the year 1960-61 which happened to be the base year for planning additional potential to be created in the Third Five ....

Year Plan was an exceptionally good year. In the year 1966-67 the total food grains production was 2.07 Lakh metric tonnes which was 43.13 %<sup>less</sup> than the total corresponding food production during the year 1960-61. The following table indicates the major cropwise production and yield rates during the year 1960-61 and 1966-67.

It is seen from the above table that the total food grains production had declined by 43.13 percent in the year 1966-67 over the year 1960-61. A major reduction was found in the production of rice which had declined by 48.02 percent in the year 1966-67 over the year 1960-61. Except in case of Jowar and Gram, the yield rates per hectare and their total outturn has declined in respect of all the remaining crops. This was due to scarcity conditions prevalent in the year 1966-67 because of insufficient rains



Indicator No.3 : Gross Value of Agricultural Production.

As relevant price data required are not available, the gross value of agricultural production could not be calculated.

Indicator No.4 : Percentage of Irrigated area

In every taluka the proportion of irrigated area was about four times the state average. Tanks are the major source of irrigation, irrigating about 81.54 percent of the total net irrigated area in the year 1966-67. The second major source of irrigation is the canals, irrigating 12.30 percent of the total net irrigated area. Area irrigated by canals was found to be highest in Gondia taluka whereas the highest area irrigated by tanks was found in Sakoli taluka. The following table indicates the talukawise percentage of irrigated area to net area sown.

The gross irrigated area to net irrigated area had decreased in the year 1966-67 over the year 1960-61, partly because of the failure of rains in the year 1966-67. The percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown had decreased only in Bhandara taluka because this taluka was badly affect-

ed due to failure of rains in the year 1966-67. However in Gondia and Sakoli talukas there was an increase in the percentage of irrigated area to net area sown mainly due to increase in irrigated area under tanks.

(Indicator No.5; Changes in the Crop Pattern(Total and Irrigated)

Bhandara district is a mono-cropped area and paddy is the main crop of this district. Lakhori and Linseed are also the major crops of this district which are reaped after paddy and locally called as "Utera". During the span of six years from 1960-61 to 1965-67 there were no major changes in the cropping pattern except a very few minor changes and isolated areas. The following table indicates the total area under various crops and areas under irrigated food and non-food crops in the year 1960-61 and 1966-67 in Bhandara district.

The total food and non-food crop areas in the district had decreased by 2,444 Hectares and 25,127 hectares respectively in the year 1966-67 over the year 1960-61. The irrigated area under food crops and non-food crops had also decreased by 788 and 10 hectares, respectively.

In Bhandara taluka the total food crop area had decreased by 6,609 hectares whereas the total non-food crop area has increased by 110 hectares in the year 1966-67 over the year 1960-61. The decrease in total food crop area was mainly due to decrease in area under pulses viz. Black Gram and Lakh. The increase in food crops area was mainly ~~mainly~~ observed in case of Paddy, Wheat, Rabi Jowar, Gram, Condiments and spices, and Fruits and Vegetables. The increase in non-food crop area was mainly observed in case of fibres, Groundnut, castor and linseed. The decrease in irrigated area was mainly observed in case of Paddy & Sugarcane whereas the increase in irrigated area was mainly observed in case of Wheat. The decrease in irrigated area under Paddy was mainly due to failure of monsoons in the year 1966-67 and the tanks which were the main source of protected irrigation to paddy crops had no sufficient water.

In Gondia taluka the total food crop areas had increased by 2,460 hectares whereas the non-food crop area had decreased by 23,380 hectares in the year 1966-67 over the year 1960-61. The increase in total food crop area was main-

ly observed in case of Wheat, Jowar, Gram, Tur, Lakh, Fruits and Vegetables and condiments & spices where as the decrease was mainly in the case of Paddy, Udid & Kodra. The decrease in non-food crop area was mainly due to decrease in area under linseed. The decrease in irrigated area was mainly observed in case of Paddy.

In Sakoli taluka, the total food crop area had increased by 1,508 hectares where as non-food crop area had decreased by 1,857 hectares in the year 1965-67 over the year 1960-61. The increase in total food crop area was mainly observed in case of Paddy, Rabi, Jowar, Wheat, Tur, Kodo & Condiments & spices whereas it was found to have decreased in case of Kharif Jowar, Gram, Urid, Lakh, Kulthi and Sugarcane. The decrease in non-food crop area was found mainly in case of linseed.

The irrigated area under food crops had increased in case of Paddy, Wheat, Chillies, Onions & Other Vegetables whereas it had decreased in case of Sugarcane.

While summarising the change in cropping pattern of the district it was observed that double cropped area had considerably decreased in case of Linseed, Lakh, Urid and Sugarcane. The decrease in area under these crops was due to increasing trend amongst cultivators to take to paddy varieties like "Luchai" even in the soil which are not very fit for "Luchai" because of good economic returns. Because of this variety, the <sup>sowing</sup> of a second crop of ~~Lax~~ Lakh, Lakhori, Lakhori, Linseed and Urid is not possible.

Indicator No.6: Increase in Agricultural Credit, outstanding dues and gross value of Agricultural Produce.

Even though the coverage of the co-operative movement is being enlarged from agriculture to industry, trade

etc. agricultural credit societies continue to constitute the largest group of co-operatives. There were 789 primary agricultural credit societies functioning at the end of the year 1967-68 as against 790 societies in the year 1961-62.

The following table shows the talukawise number of primary agricultural societies, Loans advanced and loans outstanding in 1961-62 and 1967-68 respectively.

The primary agricultural credit societies had advanced loan to their members to the tune of Rs. 184.67 Lakhs, in the year 1967-68 showing an increase of 37.42 per cent over the year 1961-62, where as the amount of loans outstanding in the year 1967-68 was to the tune of Rs. 232.07 Lakhs, showing an increase of 50.67 percent over the year 1961-62. As the years 1965-66 and 1966-67 were drought years the amount of loans advanced and loan outstanding were much higher than in the previous years. The amount of loan outstanding showed an increase of 23.04 % in Bhandara taluka, 105.68 % in Gondia taluka and 36.49 % in Sakoli taluka in the years 1967-68 over the year 1961-62.

There were in all 14 primary agricultural marketing societies at the block level and one marketing society at the district level handling agricultural produce in the year 1967-68. The turn over of these primary agricultural marketing societies, however, rapidly increased during the year 1967-68 as against the corresponding turn over in the year 1961-62. In Bhandara taluka the achievement was rather remarkable in the year 1967-68 in comparison other two talukas.

#### Indicator No.7: Agricultural Wage Rates.

Because of an upward trend in price line, agricultural wage rates have also increased since 1961. The work of collecting agricultural wage rates was started from July, 1963 at three selected centres in the district, one each from every taluka. Though the selected centre from each taluka cannot be treated as a representative of the level of prevailing agricultural wage rates in the taluka, the date of wage rates collected there can still be used

as a broad indicator of talukawise variations in wage rates of different categories of skilled and unskilled workers. The following table indicates the average agricultural wage rates during the years 1964 and 1967 at Lakhni in Sakoli taluka, Adyal in Bhandara taluka and Mundikota in Gondia taluka

The wage rates of skilled labourers were highest in all talukas than those of unskilled labourers. They were found highest at Lakhni and lowest at Adyal centre. The wage rates under all categories showed an increase at all the three centres because of increase in prices of essential commodities.

Among the skilled labourers the wages of carpenters were highest where as among field labourers the wage rates of males were more than those of female labourers. The wage rates of the field labourers during transplanting and harvesting season were found highest than those of agricultural labourers during the remaining season at all the centres.

Indicator No.8: Live Stock per hectare of Land.

Bovine ~~xxxxx~~ population comprises population of buffaloes and cattle where as ovine population includes the population of sheep and goats. The following table indicates the bovine and ovine population per hectare of cultivable land in each taluka.

The Livestock per hectare of cultivable land was highest in Gondia whereas it was lowest in Sakoli taluka during both the years 1961 & 1967. A remarkable decrease in livestock per hectare of cultivable land was observed in Gondia taluka in the year 1967 over the year 1961 where as an almost equal proportion of increase in livestock per hectare of cultivable land was observed in Sakoli taluka. The proportion of livestock per hectare of cultivable land remained constant in Bhandara taluka and in the district as a whole both in the year 1961 & 1967.

Indicator No.9: Poultry as compared to Population.

Development of poultry is essentially a cottage industry without being linked up with commercial hatcheries, commercial feed, industry and organised marketing of poultry



products. The following table gives the proportion of poultry population per 100 persons in the year 1961 and 1966.

The proportion of poultry for every hundred persons was largest in Sakoli taluka where as it was lowest in Gondia taluka both in 1961 as well as 1966. The poultry population as compared to human population decreased in all the three talukas during 1961 & 1966 perhaps because there was no nearby market so as to promote this cottage industry.

According to 1961 livestock census it was estimated that there were 139.67 poultry birds (136.17 fowls and 0.3 ducks) in the district as compared to 129.01 poultry birds (127.61 fowls and 0.22 ducks) in Vidarbha. Similarly only 0.24 percent fowls were of the improved variety in the district as against 1.07 percent in Vidarbha and 1.69 in Maharashtra. It was also estimated that each hen in 1961 produced 55 eggs per year in the district as against 61 in Vidarbha and 84 in Maharashtra.

Indicator No. 10: Per Capita consumption of Electricity.

The demand for electricity in Bhandara is growing rapidly due to industrialisation, installation of pumps

for irrigation and rising standards of living. The supply of energy to this district is made from the thermal stations, located at Khaperkheda and B. Narshah. In the year 1960-61, only 37 villages and 5 towns were electrified whereas in the year 1967-68 their corresponding number increased to 362 villages and 5 towns. The ~~text~~ following table indicates the per capita consumption of energy in the district during 1960-61 and 1967-68.

Because of the remarkable achievement in the field of electrification of villages, the per capita consumption of electricity had increased from 3.11 K.W.H. in 1960-61 to 91.99 K.W.H. in the year 1967-68. The increase during the last seven years was mainly due to more use of energy for electric pumps, domestic consumption, industrial power and public lighting. The large difference in consumption per capita (in the figures in Col.6 & 7 in the above table) during the year 1967-68 over 1960-61 is not factual but is solely due to non-inclusion of data of H.T. units for industrial power during the year 1960-61.

Indicator No.11: Increase in No. of candidates enrolled in Employment Exchanges and Vacancies notified.

Employment Exchange was established in Bhandara

town on 13.3.1958 to register the unemployed persons and to guide them in seeking suitable employment.

Because of an increase in population the number on live register had increased from 2,636 as on 31.3.61 to 11,421 on 31.3.68. The following table indicates the number of persons enrolled with Employment Exchange and the vacancies notified in the year 1960-61 and 1967-68.

The number of registration during the year 1967-68 had increased by more than double the corresponding registration in 1960-61 where as number of vacancies notified in the year 1967-68 had decreased by 25.09 % as compared to the corresponding number of vacancies notified in the year 1960-61.

Because of an increase in population and growing educational facilities in the district, the number of unemployed persons had increased during the last seven years and hence there was a heavy rush for registration of candidates with the Employment Exchange whereas the total number of vacancies notified during 1967-68 showed considerable decrease over the year 1960-61.

Indicator No.12: Increase in In-door and Out-door patients treated in Hospital and Dispensaries.

During the Third Five Year Plan a substantial progress had been made in various health programmes. The num-

ber of hospitals and dispensaries had increased from 94 in 1961 to 113 in the year 1966 and the number of beds increased from 444 to 515. The following table indicate the number of hospitals and dispensaries and number of patients treated.

The number of out-door patients treated per hospital and dispensary increased in all the talukas in 1966 as against the corresponding number in 1961. The increase in out-door patients was due to some extent the increase in the number of dispensaries in the year 1966 over the year 1961. The increase in the number of out-door patients in 1966 to 7,332 was merely apparent and not real to that extent since this figure was inclusive of out-door patients treated in Ayurvedic dispensaries where as the corresponding figure for 1961 excludes figures of out-door patients treated in Ayurvedic dispensaries.

A general increase in In-door patients treated per hospital and dispensary was found in the year 1966 over 1961 in all talukas except Sakoli. A remarkable rise was found in Gondia taluka where the increase in In-door patients was

mainly due to increase in the number of Primary Health Centres in the year 1966 as compared to those in the year 1961. The decrease in number of In-door patients per hospital was found in Sakoli taluka due to increase in the number of dispensaries where there were no arrangements to treat In-door patients.

Indicator No.13: Increase in the number of Students in different categories.

Education is the most important single factor in achieving rapid economic development for creating a social order founded on the values of freedom, social justice and equal opportunity. It was one of the major aims of the Third Five Year Plan to expand and intensify educational activities and to bring every home within its fold, so that from now on, in all branches of national life, education becomes the focal point of planned development. The following table indicates the growth of educational institutions in the district from the years 1960-61 to 1967-68.

It is seen from the above table that the number of primary schools increased by 30.50 percent in the year 1967-68 over the year 1960-61, where as the number of boys and girls enrolled, increased by 32.32 percent and 82.36 percent respectively in the year 1967-68 over the year 1960-61. The increase in the number of girl students in primary schools was mainly due to opening of primary schools in rural areas to a large extent. Secondary education had also made a rapid progress during the last seven years. The number of Secondary Schools increased by 115 percent, where as the strength of boys and girls enrolled, increased by 65.62 percent and 210.73 percent respectively in the year 1967-68 over the year 1960-61. The increase in the number of girl students was mainly due to expansion of secondary school education in rural areas and also because of change in the traditional outlook of the villagers who were not very much keen in the past to send their wards to schools.

Because of increase in Primary and Secondary schools and the growing need of the local people, some new colleges had been established in the district to provide facilities for higher education. The number of higher institutions in-

increased from 2 in the year 1960-61 to 8 in the year 1967-68, which had eventually increased in strength of students by 1125.7 percent during this period.

A few more special schools comprising agricultural school, Technical Schools and Industrial Training Institution had been started in the district during the Third Five Year Plan period. The number of such special schools increased from 3 to 14 from 1960-61 to 1967-68 and the strength of boys and girls eventually increased from 304 boys and 5 girls to 723 boys and 104 girls respectively in the year 1967-68 over the year 1960-61.

Indicator No. 14: Increase in Road Length per 100 Sq. Kms.

The road development programmes implemented during the Third Five Year Plan had been formulated in accordance with the broad objectives laid down in the Twenty Year Road Development Plan for the period 1961-81, which had been drawn up by the Chief Engineers of the State and the Central Government. The broad objective of this plan was that no village in a developed and agricultural area should remain more than four miles from a metalled road and more than one and half miles from any type of road. The following table indicates the total road length in Bhandara district as on 31.3.1961 and 31.3.68.

During the Third-Five Year Plan Period new schemes such as Rural Road Works Programme and Rural Manpower Programme had been implemented under which rural roads had been constructed by the Zilla Parishad to link different villages with the Block headquarters. These schemes had been continued during the Annual Plan 1967-68. The road length which was 7.15 Kms. per 100 Sq.Kms. of area on 31st March, 1961 had increased to 13.00 Kms. per 100 Sq. Kms. of area as on 31st March, 1968. This remarkable increase was mainly due to increase in length of rural roads of lower type and other district roads.

Indicator No.15: Increasing Banking facilities in proportion to population.

There were 7 Scheduled Banks and 9 Co-operative Banks functioning in this district during the year 1960-61. In the year 1965-66 one Scheduled Bank has been established at Bhandara town and 7 more Co-operative Banks have been established at various block headquarters during 1961-62. During the year 1967-68 one more Scheduled Bank has been established at Sakoli, raising the total number of Scheduled Banks to 9.

Large number of banks were located in Gondia taluka in both the year 1960-61 and 1967-68. Because of formation of Zilla Parishad a larger number of Co-operative Banks were opened in each block headquarter and at some important marketing centres, after the year 1960-61 and hence there was a substantial increase in the number of banks in the year 1967-68. Because of increase in number of banks, the population served per bank had decreased from 79,268 persons in 1960-61 to 50,731 persons in the year 1967-68. As Gondia town is the biggest urban and industrially developed centre, the more banks are located in Gondia town.

Indicator No.16 : Prices.

Since the declaration of emergency in the country, price quotations for some important commodities from 25 district headquarters are obtained on weekly basis. The following table indicates the average prices of some important commodities collected at Bhandara town for the years 1962 and 1967 respectively.

According to Maharashtra Scheduled food grains (Stock declaration and procurement and disposal, acquisition, Transport and price control) order 1967 published in the Extra-ordinary Gazettee of Maharashtra State on 25 th November, 1967, enforced till 30th November, 1968, the prices of Rice and Jowar were fixed by Govt. according to their varieties and according to act these commodities were treated as non-saleable in the open market. The prices of Jowar were taken as the prices fixed by Government where as the prices of Rice were obtained from retail shop-keepers.

The prices of almost all commodities except Salt had shown a sharp rise during the year 1967 over those prevailing in the year 1962. An abnormal increase in prices was observed in case of all types of food grains, Gur, Ground nut oil, Vanaspati Ghee, Fresh fish, Potatoes, Charcoal, Firewood, Brass(Gund), Pan(Kapuri) and Tobacco. The price of Sugar did not show much rise in the year 1967 as it was controlled by Government and was sold only through fair price shops. Because of the restrictions on the export of groundnut oil to Maharashtra, imposed by Gujrat Government, the prices of Groundnut oil had shown a sharp rise in the year 1967. Due to increase in the prices of edible commodities, the prices of other non-edible commodities also increased mostly in the same proportion in the year 1967 over those prevailing in the year 1962. The highest price rise of 175.34 percent was observed in the case of Udid-dal and the lowest price rise of 4.80 percent in case of blouse piece in 1967 over their corresponding prices in 1962.

CHAPTER-IV.

The Annual Plan 1967-68. was formulated without prejudice to the magnitude and dimensions of the Fourth Five Year Plan of the State. While drawing up the programme under each sector, highest priority was given to agricultural production, particularly to schemes which are in nature of quick-yielding results to help augment production in the shortest possible time.

During the course of first two Plans, comparatively smaller amounts were spent for the development programmes in Vidharbha and therefore, additional allocations were made for the third plan programme in the Division in order to make good the shortfall in developmental expenditure. These additional allotments made during the Third Five Year Plan period, were used for accelerating and intensifying the programmes under Irrigation, Primary education and Roads. During the Annual Plan 1966-67 and 1967-68 an additional stress was given on Agricultural Production and Minor Irrigation and most of the allocations under these programmes were completely utilized.

The outlay for the district level programmes of this district was of the order of Rs. 160.95 Lakhs, against which the total expenditure incurred amounted to Rs. 160.24 Lakhs. Agricultural Programmes were given the highest priority in this district. About 49 percent of the total Annual Plan outlay was earmarked for various agricultural programmes. The important feature of the agricultural programmes was the implementation of different schemes for intensive Agricultural Development for which this district was particularly selected. The pro-

grammes for co-operation and Community Development shared 8 percent of the total outlay, while schemes under Social Services accounted for a total outlay of about 29 percent of the total Plan outlay for the district. Transport and Communications were allotted 7 percent of the total Plan outlay, where as Industries and Mining and Irrigation and Power were allotted the remaining 7 percent of the total Plan Outlay.

The overall performance of the Plan programmes was upto the mark. The total expenditure during the year 1967-68 amounted to Rs. 160.24 Lakhs against the total Plan outlay of Rs. 160.95 Lakhs.

#### AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMMES.

The various schemes under Agricultural Programmes were specially aimed at improvement of agricultural productivity. The district was covered under Package Programme, because of its maximum irrigation potential for increasing the production, particularly of paddy crop, through Intensive Agricultural Methods. Soil Conservation measures, Minor Irrigation Works, development of forest and fisheries were the other programmes, that were implemented in the district. The following table indicates the allotments and expenditure on these various programmes.

### AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION.

The Package Programme implemented in the district was a major activity under agricultural production. The total expenditure on this programme was Rs. 1.64 Lakhs covering an area of about 1,84,326 acres under various crops such as Paddy, Wheat, Rabi, Jowar and Gram which also includes 5,012 acres of area under "Taichung Native-1" and I.R.8, the new high yielding varieties of Paddy. Other usual programmes such as those relating to agricultural campaigns and development of crops etc. were also implemented in this district. The details of achievements under various activities were as follows:-

#### SOIL CONSERVATION.

Terracing works in the paddy fields were completed covering an area of 9,652 acres and the total expenditure on these works was of Rs. 24.50 Lakhs.

#### MINOR IRRIGATION.

Minor Irrigation works play an important role in the agricultural economy of the district. There are a large number of Ex-malguzari Tanks in the district. The programme of renovation of these tanks for providing quick irrigation facilities was launched on a large scale. The work of construction of new irrigation wells and repairs to old wells was also taken up. The total expenditure on these minor irrigation works was of Rs. 23.64 Lakhs. In all 851 new irrigation wells have been constructed and 104 old irrigation wells ~~have been~~ were repaired during the Plan period. In all 205 pum sets and oil engines were installed during the year 1957-68.

#### ANIMAL HUSBANDRY.

Amongst the programme of Animal Husbandry the main emphasis was focussed on the improvement and development of cattle breeds. The total expenditure on the programme in the district was Rs. 0.13 Lakhs as against the budget provision of Rs. 0.29 Lakhs. In all 20 premium bulls were distributed during the period.

Nearly 27.47-percent of the total area of the district is under forest. The development programme of forest was, therefore, quite important. In all Rs. 9.26 Lakhs have been expended on the various developmental schemes in the district against a total allocation of Rs. 9.29 Lakhs. The plantation of valuable trees such as teak, ~~XXXX~~ eucalyptus etc. was done on 1940 acres. The plantation of general utility timber & bamboos was done on 560 acres and 360 acres respectively. The achievement in plantation was, however, cent percent. In addition to these achievements forest road of 6.5 Kms. in length were constructed during the plan year.

#### FISHERIES.

The aim of the programme was to increase the production of fish and to improve the Socio-Economics Conditions of the fishermen working in the field. There is large scope for development of fisheries in this district because of larger facilities of water reservoirs. An expenditure of Rs. 0.28 Lakh was incurred on various schemes, against the Plan provision of Rs. 0.31 Lakh under this sub-head. It was proposed to establish one more fish seed production farm near the Itiadh Project but only selection of site could be done during the year. Subsidies were granted to fishermen for purchase of fishery requisites. The fishery co-operatives were granted loan for productive purposes.

#### CO-OPERATION AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

##### CO-OPERATION.

Co-operative movement has taken tremendous strides in Maharashtra. The State Five Year Plans had sought the promotion of co-operative organisations through financial supports for undertaking different economic activities in



the form of subsidies, share capital investments and ~~xxxx~~ loans according to needs. The programme during the Third ~~ix~~ Plan was however continued during the Plan year under review and was concerned mainly with the development of co-operative marketing. Credit facilities were taken to the doors of the agriculturist and facilities for co-operative farming were also extended.

An outlay of Rs. 0.95 Lakh was fixed for various programmes under Co-operation. The total expenditure during the Plan year was to the tune of Rs. 1.55 Lakhs, exceeding the financial targets. Under the scheme of development of Co-operative marketing subsidy was granted to the Co-operative marketing Societies. One Co-operative farming society has been registered during the Plan period under review.

#### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT.

Community Development was described as a method of rural extension and as agency through which the transformation of the social and economical ~~ix~~ life of villages was to be initiated. The concept of rural extension has broadened into that of Panchayat Raj. One of the principal tasks in the Third Five Year Plan was to ensure the growth and working of Panchayat institutions so as to enable each area to realise its maximum development potential on the basis of local man\_p<sub>o</sub>wer and other resources, co-operative self help and community efforts and effective use of the available resources and man-power.

During the Third Five Year Plan period the remaining five new blocks of Pre-extension stage were converted into Stage I and the entire rural area was covered

under this programme.

During the Plan year under review the provision made for the programme was to the tune of Rs. 11.94 Lakhs whereas the expenditure incurred was of Rs. 10.06 Lakhs.

#### IRRIGATION AND POWER.

Under this head, there was a programme of Rural electrification. The plan provision of Rs. 7.00 Lakhs was made under the scheme whereas the expenditure incurred was of Rs. 25.00 Lakhs. During the plan period under review 67 villages were electrified under this programme.

#### SMALL SCALE AND COTTAGE INDUSTRY.

For rural industrialisation there was a programme of financial assistance to the artisans, craftsmen etc. for forming co-operatives. The total plan provision of Rs. 1.05 Lakhs was made under these programme, out of which an amount of Rs. 0.57 Lakh were expended during the plan period under review. Under this programme subsidy was granted to 3 Co-operative Societies and loans were granted to 70 members for development of handloom industries.

#### TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS.

Transport by road has much significance in this district, as it is ill-equipped with railway lines. At the end of the Second Five Year Plan, the total road length in the district was 661 Kms., which in other words meant 7 Kms. of road per 100 Sq. Kms. of area. New roads of about 50 Kms. and 136 Kms. length were constructed during the Third Five Year Plan period and Annual Plan Period 1966-67 respectively in this district. During the Plan year under review new roads of 58 Kms. length were constructed. The total expenditure on the roads worked out to Rs. 12.49 Lakhs as

against the provision of Rs. 13.92 Lakhs.

SOCIAL SERVICES.

The Programme of general education was emphasised as an important aspect of development. The total amount spent on this programme was Rs. 16.44 Lakhs as against the provision of Rs. 16.68 Lakhs. At the end of Plan period under review there were in all 554 villages having no schools or schooling facilities. In all 21 new primary schools were started during this plan period, raising the total number of primary schools to 1,215. Three Secondary Schools were also started during this plan period.

Under the programme of Health and Family Planning a provision of Rs. 16.68 Lakhs was made and an amount of Rs. 15.24 Lakhs was expended. The National malaria eradication unit which was already in existence had done the work as per schedule programme during the Plan period. Under the scheme for strengthening of the establishment against small pox, 78 thousand persons were vaccinated and revaccinated. Under the Family Planning Programme the targets for vasectomy and tubectomy operations and loop insertions were fixed as 10,514 persons and 2,253 loops respectively. The achievement in this direction was far above the mark. In all 11,755 operations were performed and 369 loops were inserted during the Plan period under review.

Under the housing programme, the scheme for village housing was implemented and 223 tenements were constructed till the end of the year 1966-67. During the Plan year under review not a single tenement was constructed.
