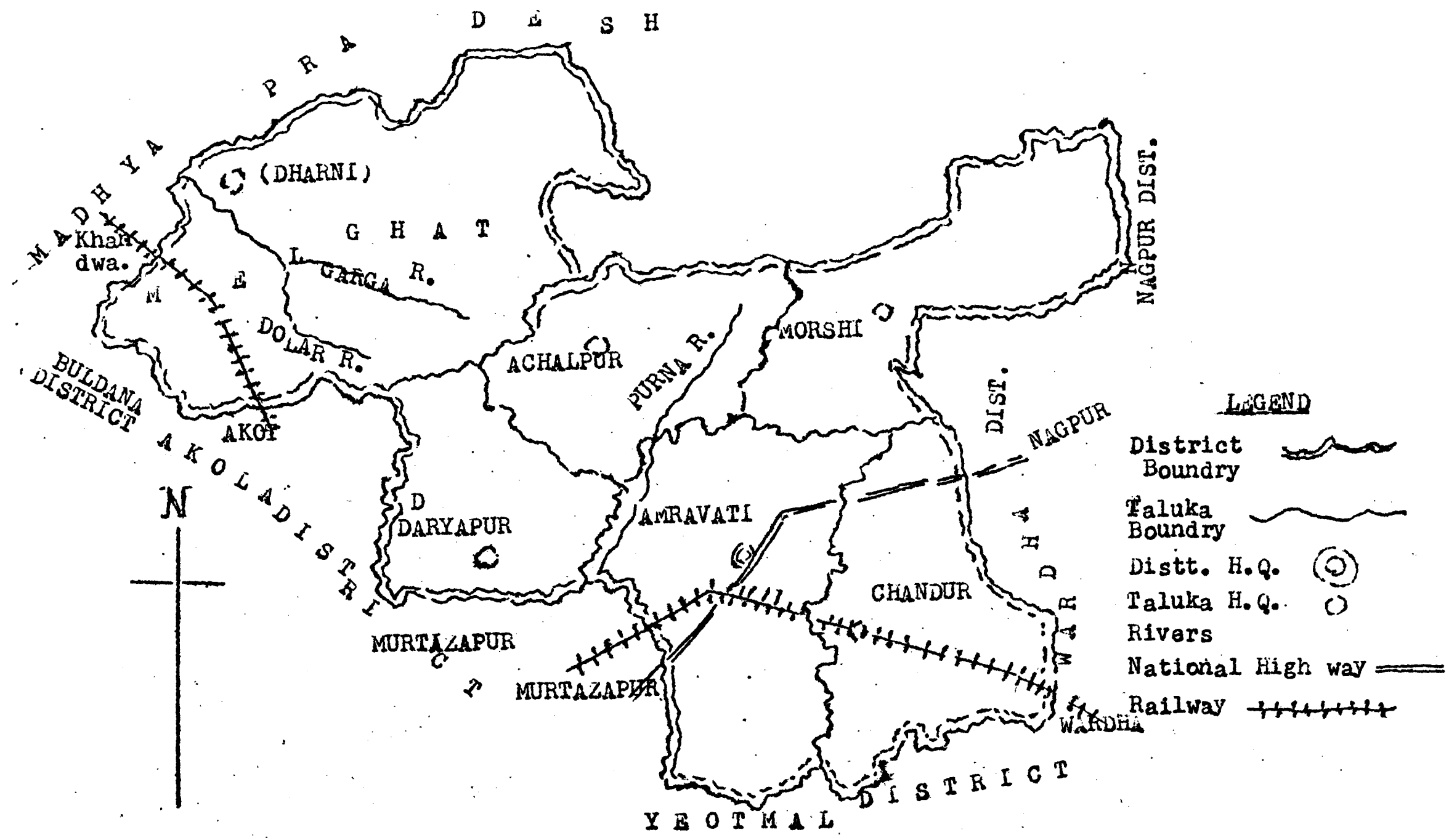

## Socio Economics Review

### Amravati District

1967-68

#### Chapter - 1

##### 1.1 Introduction and location:-

Amravati is an important district of vidarbha division. It is named after the name of its head-quarter town which is said to have been derived from the temple of Ambadevi, situated there. The name Amravati meaning the abode of immortals, may also be traced from its association with Lord Krishna. Several great Sanskrit and Marathi poets from Kalidas onwards have drawn the themes of their works from the romantic life of Krishna. He is said to have abducted Rukhmini from the temple of Indra where she had gone for worshipping Indrani. This temple is popularly identified with the temple of Amba in the town of Amravati.

The district of Amravati lies between 21° 45' and 20° 32' North latitude and 75° 38' and 78° 27' East longitude.

##### 1.2 Boundary:-

The District is bounded on the north by Madhya Pradesh for the greater part by Betul district, Nimar and Chindwada on the North-West and North-East and having common boundaries with the district. It is bounded on the east by the Nagpur and Wardha districts and in the south and south

West by the districts of Yeotmal, Akola and Buldhana.

The district boundry runs along the Tapi river on the north-west from point 1.6 k.m. north west of Bhokarbardi village as far as the village Kund and to a distance beyond it, and then deviates to the south of the river and after a general easterly course among the Satpuda upto the Kharsi river, follows a course close to the vally of that river upto point 3 k.m. east of the village Katkumbh. After a tortous course along the Satpuda it reaches the southern most slopes and there after has a general north-easterly course following in the beginning the southern most crests and then close to the base of the hills. The river Wardha forms the entire eastern boundry of the district. The boundary on the south is mostly one of admistrative convenience except for the western part where it runs along the course of Purna rivers. The boundary on the west also is mostly administrative except for an east-to west stretch along the foot of the satpudas.

### 1.3 District administration:-

Amravati district with the rest of the Berar was assigned to the East India company by the Nizam following the treaty of 1853. After the province was assigned to the company, it was divided into two districts, South Berar with its headquarter at Hingoli and north Berar with headquarters at Buldhana.

Later on Hingoli with the neighbouring region was restored to the Nizam and North Berar was reconstituted into East Berar with Headquarters at Akola.

In 1864 the district of Yeotmal was separated from Amravati. In 1867 the district of Ellichpur, which at first included the tahasil of Morshi, subsequently restored to Amravati, was formed.

In 1903 the treaties of Assignment were superseded by an agreement under which Nizam leased Berar to the government of India in perpetuity. Berar was joined to the central provinces in 1903 to form the enlarged province of the central provinces and Berar.

With the reorganisation of states in 1956, Amravati district, along with the other districts of the Vidarbha region, was included in the then by-lingual Bombay state. Since the bifurcation of the bylingual Bombay state into Maharashtra and Gujrat in 1960, Amravati along with other districts of Vidharbha, is an intergal part of Maharashtra.

Amravati city is the headquarters of the Amravati district, as also of the tahasil of same name. It is also the headquarter of some divisional departments of state governments.

The Collector is the head of the district administration . He also acts as District Magistrate. There are twelve Deputy Collectors, working in the district, and one of them is posted at district headquarter as Resident Deputy Collector who has magisterial powers. Each taluka in this district forms one division except Achalpur and Melghat talukas. These two, together, form one division thus making five sub-divisions of the district. For each sub-division there is one Deputy Collector, designated as Su-divisional Officer. The remaining six Deputy Collectors work at the headquarters. Each sub division is further sub-divided into Revenue Circles- each under the control of separate Revenue Inspector. There are 26 Revenue Circles in the district . The Talathis or the Patwaris are below the Revenue Inspector who are incharge of a village or a group villages.

Police:-

Prevention, detection and investigation of crimes and preservation of law and order are the functions of the police . The Superintendent of police, who is the district authority, is assisted by Deputy Superintendents of police who have territorial jurisdiction . The suprintendant is also assisted by Home Inspector and a small ministerial establishment. To each of .....

the sub-divisions one Police Inspector, called the Circle Police Inspector is attached. He is employed almost entirely on work relating to the detection and eradication of crime with the co-ordination of the police stations under him and investigation of important and organised crimes.

The sub-inspector of Police is ordinarily the officer incharge of a police station. He is responsible for the prevention and detection of crimes in his charge and for carrying out the orders and instructions issued by superior officers and for maintaining the discipline of the police under him. To conduct the court proceedings and to give legal advice in the investigation of crimes, legal practitioners are employed as Police Prosecutors or special Police Prosecutors.

#### Judiciary:-

For the purpose of administration of civil and criminal laws, every district is constituted as a judicial district. The District Judge heads the district court. He is also sessions judge and he tries criminal cases which are committed to him by Judicial Magistrates. There is an Assistant Judge under the district Judge who is also the Additional Judge. As Additional Session Judge, he tries criminal cases which are entrusted to him by the Session Judge. Below the courts of the district Judge and Assistant Judge there are the courts of Civil Judges (Senior Division) and civil Judges (Junior Division)

The Collector also acts as District Magistrate for performing the duties under Criminal procedure code. Under section 17 of the Bombay Police Act, the District Magistrate has full control over the district police force. He has no judicial functions but only a few quasi-judicial functions mainly concerned with preservation of peace <sup>/continue to rest with</sup> him. The resident Deputy Collector is usually empowered as an Additional District Magistrate. The Sub-Divisional Officers function as sub-Divisional Magistrate for their respective sub-divisions. The Tahsildars also are empowered as Taluka Magistrates for their respective charges.

Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis:-

The Zilla Parishad Amravati, which came into existence on 1-5-1962, has 47 members elected from 47 electoral divisions. In addition to these, there are 13 ex-officio and 5 Associate members. The Chief Executive Officer and the Deputy Chief Executive Officer of the Zilla Parishad are appointed by the state government. The Zilla Parishad is entrusted with the developmental activities in the district with jurisdiction over the entire district excluding the Municipal areas.

There are 13 Panchayat Samitis in the district under the Zilla Parishad, each covering a community development block except Amravati and Daryapur blocks which cover two blocks each. The Panchayat Samiti has the jurisdiction over the entire block excluding

, Municipal areas there under. The Block Development Officer is the executive Officer. All the members who are already elected to the Zilla Parishad automatically become the members of the respective Panchayat Samiti of that electoral division. In addition, two members are from each electoral division within the block from among the Sarpanchas of the village Panchayats.

The following statement gives the details about the membership of the Panchayat Samitis in Amravati district.

The Chairman of the Panchayat Samiti is called Sabhapati. The Block Development Officer is assisted by several.

Extention Officers in carrying out different developmental activities.

The village Panchayats are the last but not the least in importance, in the ladder<sup>of</sup> government machinery and administration. The members of Village Panchayat are directly elected, who, inturn, elect the Sarpancha of the Village Panchayat. Generally, there is one Panchayat for one village. However there are some group Gram Panchayats each covering a group of small villages. On 31st March 1968 there were 736 Panchayats and group Gram Panchayats in the district.

#### 1.4 Area Villages and Towns:-

The district covers, an area of 12149.7 Sq. Kilometers ( or 4691.0 Sq.Miles). There are, according to 1961 census, 1968 villages, 1609 being inhabited and 359 being uninhabited. There are 12 Municipal towns in addition to Amravati city. The talukawise number of villages and towns and area are given below:-

The total number of forest villages in Maharashtra is 597. Out of the total number of 1968 villages in Amravati district, 166 are forest villages. Thus 28 percent of the total number of forest villages of Maharashtra, are in Amravati district.

In respect of an area, the district ranks twelfth in the State and third in Nagpur division, next only to Chandrapur and Yeotmal districts. According to 1961 census, the population of Amravati district is 12,32,780 (6,37,861 males and 5,94,919 females) out of which the rural population is 9,10,586, the urban population being 3,22,194.

#### 1.5 Hill ranges:-

With an exception of Melghat taluka the major part of the district is plain region. In Melghat



some hills of Satpuda ranges are extended and are known as Melghat. The Gawilgad hills, a part of the Satpudas, begin near the confluence of the Purna and the Tapi rivers in the Nimar district of Madhya Pradesh and pass through the Melghat tahasil of Amravati district to Baitul district of Madhya Pradesh. In the Melghat, the crests of the range attain an average elevation of 1,000 metres, the highest point being Vairat at a height of 1,177.75 metres above sea level, the Chikhaldara and the Gawilgad plateaus being only slightly lower. The foot hills bordering the Tapi have a mean height of 500 metres. The hills are composed of the Deccan trap except that in the south-easterly section along the scarp north and north-east of Achalpur, a line of fault has been responsible for exposing the sedimentary beds from beneath the Deccan trap, the northern being the up throw side of the fault.

The only other range, is a low line of trap hills, lateritised to some extent rising in the vicinity of Amravati city and extending eastwards for some distance beyond Chandur Rly with a general average height of 50 to 100 metres above the surrounding country or about 500 metres above sea level. Spurs from these hills extend northwards for some distance, and the barrenness of the land around them is in sharp contrast to the general fertility.

#### Important rivers:-

The Purna is the largest of the rivers in the district which rises near Bhainsani in Betul district

of Madhya Pradesh at a height of just over 760 metres in the Satpudas and after flowing for some 50 Kilometres in a general southerly and south-easterly direction through the hills, enters the district emerging into the plains, as the district boundary here lies along the base of the hills. It traverses across the plains of the district in a south westerly direction dividing it into two halves. First it flows through Achalpur tahsil and then along the boundary between the Amravati and Daryapur tahasils. Then it turns due west-wards to join the Tapi in Jalgaon district.

The only important left bank tributary of the Purna is the Pedhi. It rises in the low hills near Ritpur and flows in a general south-easterly course passing by Walgaon and Bhatkuli. After crossing the district boundary it turns and flows westwards and north-westwards to join the Purna at the point where the latter makes a very short so-journ outside the Amravati district, into Akola .

The other tributaries of the Purna are the Chandra bhaga, the Shahanur and the Nordi. The Chandra bhaga rises just below the Vairat ~~plateau~~ and after receiving a number of small streams flows in an easterly direction. The principal right bank affluent of the Chandrabhaga is the Bhuleshwari which passes by Shindi Bz. and Kokarda and meets the Chandrabhaga near Daryapur, east of Babhli.

The Shahanur river rises in the Gawilgad hills near Jhireghat and after a fairly long and widening

course enters the plains near Malakapur and flows southwards passing by Anjangaon and continues in this direction to join the Purna beyond the border of the district.

Other important rivers of the District are the Wardha and the Tapi. The Wardha flows along the eastern border of the district for over 80 km. The tributaries of the Wardha are the Chudamani, the Belmund and Mula which drain Morshi tahsil. The Tapi flows along the north-west boundary of the district for about 48km. and receives through its tributaries, the Kamda, the Kapra, the Sipna and the Garga, a large share of the rainfall from the Gawilgad hills.

#### Soils:-

Decomposition of Deccan traps, has given rise to either deep brown to rich red or black cotton soil (regur) and is wide spread in the district. The regur is rich in plant nutrients such as lime, magnesia and low in nitrogen and phosphorus. Thus Amravati district is rich in fertile black cotton and alluvial soils. The richest tracks are found in the vilies of the Purna, the Wan and the Wardha rivers. This soil is porous and swells considerably on addition of water and dries up with distinct cracks on loosing the moisture. The whole of Melghat tahasil is a hilly part and contains very dense forest. The soil is generally of the poorest description with some small pockets of good soil found in parts of the vallies where mostly Kharif crops are grown.

1.6 Climate, Temperature etc. :-

As Amravati is in the interior, far away from both the eastern as well as the western coast, its climate is dry and extreme, yet healthy. The winters are quite cold whereas the summers are extremely hot. Temperature records are available for Amravati Station. The mean maximum temperature during the year 1967 was 42.6 degrees centigrade in the month of May while mean minimum temperature during that year was 15.7 degrees centigrade in the month of January. The district receives a moderate amount of rainfall and comes under the assumed rainfall zone, The rainfall is more or less uniform all around except in Melghat tahasil which receives a higher amount of rainfall. The rainfall recorded at Amravati station during the year 1967 was 753.4 millimetres.

## Chapter II

The statistical data presented in this Abstract has been classified in 13 sections. The following paragraphs give explanatory notes on each of them.

### I. Climate and rainfall:-

The table No. 1 gives monthly "normal rainfall" and the number of rainy days in each month in the district. Records of rainfall are available for thirteen Stations. "Normal rainfall" in col. No.3 denotes the average of rainfall during the year which has been worked out by India Meteorological Department on the basis of actual rainfall for 50 years. A day is treated as a "rainy" day if during the twenty four hours the rain gauge recorded a minimum of 2.5 mm. of rainfall. Table No.2 given "mean maximum and mean minimum" monthly temperatures in respect of selected centres. The mean maximum and mean minimum are the averages of maximum and minimum temperatures observed daily during the year.

### II. Area and population:-

The figures of 1961 population census have been given in this section. Table No.3 <sup>gives</sup> talukwise rural and urban population according to 1961 population census and its variation with 1951 population census. The terms "rural" and "urban" under col.3 are defined as under according to 1961 population census.

A town or an urban area is a place which has  
1. a municipality, a Cantonment, or civil lines.

OR

2. (1) A population of 5,000 or over

and

(ii) At least 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in non-agricultural pursuits.

Rural population is a population of all villages in a revenue unit.

A "village" is statutorily recognised village having a defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, Wadies or Padas have, therefore, not been shown as separate villages. On the other hand statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as "uninhabited" villages. Villages also include forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families.

The area figures in this table have been given in square kilometers . 1 Sq.Km. is equal to 0.386 square miles.

The table No.4 gives the classification of inhabited villages in each taluka according to different population ranges. The table no.5 gives similar break-up of towns or urban areas according to population ranges. The table No.6 gives the number of workers in each taluka, based on 1961 population census.

A person is classified as a worker if -

- (a) in cases of seasonal work like cultivation, livestock, dairying, household industry, etc., he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of working season; and

(b) in the case of regular employment in any trade, profession, service, business or commerce, he was employed during any of the 15 days preceding the day of enumerator's visit to the household.

Workers are classified into the following nine categories of economic activity:-

1. As cultivator,
2. As agricultural labourer,
3. In Mining, Quarrying, Livestock, Forestry Fishing, Hunting and Plantations, Orchards and allied activities.
4. At household Industry
5. In Manufacturing other than Household Industry
6. In construction
7. In Trade and Commerce
8. In Transport, Storage and Communications
9. In other services

In the 1951 population census reports, the population was classified into 8 livelihood-classes and each class was further divided with reference to economic status into:-

- a) Self supporting persons
- b) Earning dependants.
- c) Non earning dependents

The concept of dependancy followed during the 1951 population census had been abandoned for economic classification of population at the 1961 population census. Instead the population was classified into workers and non workers. The emphasis was on work and not on income or economic dependance.

The table No.7 gives distribution of population according to age group, mother tongue and religion " Mother tongue" is defined as a. language spoken by the person's mother to the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects have been included in the main languages on the basis of Grierson's Classification.

The table No.8 gives the taluka wise break up of schedule castes and scheduled tribes population in the district.

Actually 19 castes are notified as scheduled castes in the district but only 15 are reported in 1961 census. Also 10 scheduled tribes out of 32 notified tribes of the district are reported.



III. Agriculture:-

The tables Nos 9 to 19 give the important Statistics regarding agriculture pertaining to land utilisation, Irrigation, Area and out turn of individual crops.

The table No. 9 gives talukawise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of utilisation. Against each taluka the break up of the total geographical area according land use is shown.

The area according to village papers is calculated from the village returns prepared by the village officials for revenue purposes. There are differences between the figures of total area according to the Surveyor General and according to the village papers because the latter are calculated by totalling up village returns while the former calculates the area by plainmetering from maps which represent the ground in horizontal plane with the help of areas of quadrilaterals of 15 minutes latitude and longitude already worked out by them. Moreover allowances are made for areas covered by water, building, roads etc. Under "forests" in col. 5 are included all actually forested areas of lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether stateowned or private. Land put, to non agricultural uses (col.6) stands for all lands occupied by buildings, roads and railways or under water and other lands put to uses other than agriculture. barren and unculturable land ( Col.7) covers all barren and unculturable land like mountains deserts etc. Land which can not be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost, is

classed as unculturable, whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. Permanent Pastures and other grazing lands cover all grazing lands, whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not. Under miscellaneous tree crops and groves, not included in the net area sown, is included all cultivable land which is not included under net area sown but is put to some agricultural use. Culturable waste includes all lands available for cultivation whether not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in succession. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. Current fallows comprise cropped areas which are kept fallow during the current year. If any seedling area is not cropped again the same year, it is also treated as current fallow. Other fallow land includes all lands which are taken up for cultivation but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and not more than five years. The reason for keeping such lands fallow may be one of the following. Poverty of cultivators. (2) inadequate supply of water. (3) malarial climate (4) silting of canals and rivers (5) Soil erosion (6) un-remunerative nature of farming and (7) legal litigations.

The net area sown consists of net area sown with crops and orchards, area sown more than once being counted only once. The gross cropped area represents the sum total of area under all crops. The difference between the total cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once

on the same land during the same year with the same or different crops.

The table No.10 shows the area under different crops in each taluka. It gives break up of the total gross cropped area according to five major groups of food crops and major five groups of non food crops. The table No.11 gives yield per hectare and out turn of principal crops in the district. The table No.12 gives talukawise area irrigated by different sources under different crops in each taluka. The table No.13 shows an area irrigated. A quinquennial census of irrigation wells takes place after every five years. For any intermediate years the village Officers are instructed to note the number of new irrigation wells constructed or old wells which have gone out of use and thus bring upto date the earlier census figures of number of wells. In table No.16 Major and medium projects in Amravati district are shown. On the basis of capital cost irrigation works are classified into a) Major (b) Medium and (c) minor irrigation works. For schemes included in the Third Five Year Plan, the following cost limits had been laid down.

- a) Major : above Rs 5 crores
- b) Medium Rs. 10 lakhs or more but less than Rs.5 crores.
- c) Minor upto Rs. 10 lakhs.

The daily average agricultural wage rates at the three centres for the category of skilled and un-skilled labour are shown in the table No.17.

The Bureau of Economics and Statistics, Collects agricultural daily wage rates at three selected centres in Amravati district.

Talukawise data are however not available for comparison, as these wage rates are collected <sup>at</sup> selected centres. They do not represent the actual wages level in the district. However at least they show the general trend of agricultural wage rates in the district.

During the year 1967-68 the skilled labours such as Carpenter, black Smith etc. were not employed on the daily wage basis by the cultivators at any of the three centres, therefore their wage rates for the year are not available.

The table No.18 gives data on different types of agricultural machinery and implements as enumerated in 1966 live stock census. At these censuses, only those implements which were in use for agricultural purposes were enumerated. The table No. 19 gives the Famine, Scarcity and akin to scarcity data based on the recommendations of the fact finding committee. In this district no area has been declared as famine and chronic scarcity area by this committee.

#### IV Animal Husbandry and forests.

The table No.20 gives the number of various types of live stock and poultry as enumerated in the district at the time of 1966 live stock census. At these censuses all the live stock is enumerated on an uniform bases <sup>of</sup> concepts and methods by house to house enquiry particular care is taken to enumerate livestock in slaughter house stray animals and animals in transit. The table No.21 gives the number of different types of veterinary dispensaries functioning in

the District as on 31st March 1968. Where as the table No.22 gives disease-wise mortality. In all these tables the term "Bovine" includes cattle and buffalows and "Ovine" includes sheeps and goats. The number of recognised slaughter houses and animals slaughtered in them is given in the table No.23 Two tables i.e. 24 A and 24 B give details of area under different types of forest and important forest products.

The areas under forest are classified according to legal status into reserved forests, protected forests. (Indian Forest Act XVI of 1987) Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber production and in which rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid; right of grazing or cultivation is allowed but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. Unclassed forest refers to the in-accessible forests or un-occupied waste. In the reserved forests broadly speaking everything is an offence that is not permitted while in the protected forest nothing is an offence that is prohibited.

#### V. Employment, Industry, mining and electricity:-

Under this head in all 10 tables have been included. The table No.26 gives the average daily employment of workers in factories. The table No.27 gives the distribution of working factories according to the size of factory in terms of average daily employment of workers. Where as the table No.28 gives the distribution of factories according to Number of days worked in a year. The table Nos 29 and 30 give the important statistics relating to employment exchanges. The table No.31 gives changes

in the volume of employment in different industries within a period of one year. The table Nos. 32 A & 32 B present results of census of state government employee as on 1-7-1966 conducted by the Bureau of Economics & Statistics, Bombay. The data presented in these tables are restricted to class I, II, III & IV employees of the state government and do not cover any other category such as work-a-charged personnel, class IV employees paid from contingencies, daily rated workers, part time workers or honorary workers. The distribution of employed according to specified basis pay ranges is shown in respect of class I, II, III, and IV employees. The table No. 33 gives figures of (1) Installed capacity (2) out put and (3) consumption of electricity during 1965-66 and 1966-67. The table No.34 gives progress of electrification under Maharashtra state electricity Board and other private companies.

#### VI. Co-operation:-

In all 8 tables on co-operation have been included in this abstract . The table No.35 gives the number of different types of cocprative societies working in the district. Statistics relating to co-operative banks is given in the table No.36 . All societies including central institutions and land mortgage banks are divided into four different classes viz (1) Agricultural credit ( Table No.37 (2) agricultural non-credit in(3) Non agricultural credit and (4) Non agricultural non credit societies . The later three are shown in tables No.38 . In case of the agricultural credit societies whose main function is to advance credit to the people, information

regarding their Working capital, advances recovered etc. is shown in detail. The table No.39 shows the operations of primary cooperative marketing societies <sup>in each</sup> taluka of the district and the table No. 40 gives the operations of other cooperative societies. The table No. 41 gives information regarding the regulated markets and their operations. Number of registered money lenders and loans advanced by them is shown in the table No.42 .

#### VII. Medical and public Health:-

The table No.43 gives information regarding number of hospitals and dispensaries working and total number of beds in each taluka of the district. Number of births and deaths registered in Amravati District during the year 1966 and 1967 are given in table No. 44 and the table No. 45 shows the number of deaths due to important causes. Vaccination statistics and cholera statistics is given in table No. 46 .

#### VIII. Education:-

This section presents the salient features of progress of education in various parts of the state. In table No.47 literacy in each taluka according to 1961 census is given. A "literate" is a person who can both read and write a simple letter. Educational level in rural areas is shown in the table No. 48 . Similarly education levels in urban areas are shown in table No. 49. The number of institutions, pupils and teachers according to various stages of education is shown in table No.50 for district as a whole. Table No.51 gives the number of beneficiaries from the backward classes. Whereas as the table No.52

shows the number of students enjoying free education as economically backward class. Expenditure on primary education is shown in table No. 53. Classification of towns and villages according to the availability of primary education facility is given in table No. 54.

IX. Transport and communication :-

In this section, statistical information regarding to various modes of transport is given. The table No.55 gives categorywise railway length in the district. The length of the railway line as shown relates to the distance up to the last railway station near the border of the district <sup>and</sup> not beyond. The table No. 56 gives the figures of road length according to surface classification and categorywise classification. With the inception of Zilla Parishad in 1962-63 The National High ways and state high ways continued to be under the control of the Building and Communication Department ~~is~~ in the past and other types of roads such as District roads, village roads etc. were transferred to Zilla Parishad . The table No. 57 gives the figures relating to different types of motor vehicles in operation as on 31st March 1968 in Amravati region. The table No. 58 gives important operational statistics relating to Maharashtra state road transport corporation. Particulars of traffic census conducted by B & C. Department in november 1964 in respect of eastern express High way No. 6 . The table No. 60 gives the information of postal and telephone facilities available in the district and the table No.61 gives Rural Broad casting statistics in Amravati district.



X. Local bodies :-

Statistics relating village panchayats, municipalities and Zilla Parishad are shown in this section. The table No.62 gives figures of (1) Number of village panchayats (2) Their coverage in terms of villages (3) Their total income and (4) Their total expenditure. The table No. 63 gives Panchayat Samithi wise income and expenditure for village panchayats. Under income, information is separately shown under grants (which are mainly from government) taxes and other income. Income from taxes is further sub divided in-to (1) Taxes on houses and building (2) Octroi and (3) others . The table Nos. 64 and 65 give the similar statistics regarding Zilla Parishad and Municipalities.

XI. Plan and Community Development :-

The table No. 66 shows the expenditure during first annual plan on different development subheads and table No.67 shows the important physical achievements under plan. The number of community development blocks and allied information is given in the table No. 68. The table No. 69 gives the expenditure incurred in different stages of blocks and table No. 70 gives physical achievements on selected items in all the blocks.

XII. Prices :-

The Bureau of Economics and Statistics collects weekly retails prices at each district headquarters Although these prices do not represent the actual price level prevailing in district, the price data are helpful to judge the general

price movement trends. The prices given in the table are the averages of prices and not the actual prices. As the information collected for the given commodity is restricted only to one quotation and that too only from one shop at the district headquarter the averages shown above for individual commodities can not be said to be fully representative but data may prove use-ful as broad indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time". The table No. 72 gives the revised series of consumer price index number for working class for the Nagpur centre which can be taken as representative of Amravati town. The base year for Nagpur centre is 1960.

#### XIII. Miscellaneous:-

Remaining 12 tables have been included in this section . The table Nos. 73, 74 gives the strength of police force and crime statistics where as the table No. 75 presents the work disposed of civil and criminal courts of Amravati district. Cinema statistics is given in the table No.76. The table No. 77 presents the number of banking offices in Amravati district. Similarly table No. 78 gives the number of joint stock companies in Amravati district. Data on business done by the life Insurance corporation is given in table No. 79 . In the table No. 80 the collection of small savings are shown . The table No. 81 gives the land revenue collection in each taluka of the district. The number of presses and the ~~para~~ periodicals published in the district are shown in the table No.82 . The statistics relating to the general elections held in 1967 is given in the table No.83. The table No.84 shows the trends in selected indicators.

### CHAPTER III

In this chapter an attempt has been made to review the progress of development during the period 1960-61 to 1967-68 with the help of certain taluka wise sectoral trends, based on certain important indicators of development.

Indicator No.1:- Percentage of gross sown area to net sown area.

This district is very poor in irrigation facilities and as a result the area sown more than once was very negligible, during the year 1966-67. The gross sown area is derived received by adding the area sown more than once to the net area sown.

The following table shows the taluka wise percentages of gross sown area to net sown area in 1960-61 & 1966-67.

During the year 1966-67 the total net cropped area was 7,10,120 hectares of which an area of 4131 hectares was sown more than once.

It will be seen from the table, above that percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area has fallen for the district as a whole as well as in. Melghat, Amravati, tahasils

where as it has shown an increase in Achalpur, Morshi, Daryapur, and slightly in Chandur talukas.

Indicator No.2:- Productivity of important crops

Irrigation primarily aims at making good the deficiencies of rainfall, bringing more land under plough, which remained uncultivated for want of water and increasing the double cropped area. In brief the chief object of irrigation is to augment farm produce. The agriculture in the western four districts viz. 1) Akola 2) Washdha 3) Yeotmal and 4) Amravati in Nagpur division is handicapped in irrigation facilities. As a result, the agricultural production in these four districts depends on the vagaries of the rain. The preceeding two years were consecutively very bad, so far as the rains are concerned. The year under review was much better than those which passed. Hence there was a considerable rise in the agricultural produce as compared with the agriculture produce of the last year. In comparision with 1960-61, the year 1966-67 was not better in respect of each crop.

The following table shows the out turn of important crops, during the years 1960-61 and 1966-67 in Amravati district.

It is seen from the above table that the production of Rice, wheat, Kh. Jowar and Chillies has increased. The increase in the production of chillies is more significant i.e. 215.63 percent. The production of Rice, Tur, Kh. Jowar, ground nut and cotton has shown a fall over the production of 1960-61.

Indicator No.3 Gross value of Agricultural production.

As relevant price data are not available, the gross value of agricultural production could not be calculated.

Indicator No.4:- Percentage of irrigated area

In 1960-61 hardly one percent of the total sown area was being irrigated. In the year under review also the picture was not much encouraging as no medium or major irrigation project could be taken up in the district due to absence of Perrenial water resources and the natural sites. There is no double irrigation in the district and hence the gross irrigated area has remained the same in all the tahasils as well as the district. In Nagpur division, Bhandara district ranks first and Amravati sixth so far as the irrigation is concerned.

The following table shows the percentage of net irrigated area to net sown area during the years 1960-61 and 1966-67

From the above table it is observed that the percentage of irrigated area has increased from 1.03 1960-61 to 4.30 in 1966-67 for the district as a whole. It is in Morshi taluka where the percentage of the irrigated area is significant. In other talukas no doubt, the percentage of irrigated area has increased though not very significantly.

Indicator No. 5:- Changes in cropping pattern

In Nagpur division, Amravati district has particularly a higher percentage of the area under non food crops to the total cropped area. It is due the fact that Amravati district is an important cotton growing district. In the year 1966-67 only cotton covered (48.72) percent of the total gross cropped area of the district. The following table gives the talukawise percentage of area under crops and non food crops to the gross cropped area during 1960.61 and 1966-67.

It can be inferred from the table above that the percentage of the area under non food crops to gross cropped area was greater for the district as a whole during the agricultural year 1966-67. So far as talukas are concerned Melghat has an exception to this. This is due to the fact that Melghat tahasil is a forest area where very small area is cultivated out of the total geographical area. Main objective of the cultivation there is to produce only food grains for the subsistence of the local population. And as a result of this, the percentage of the area under food crops is higher in this tahasil. In rest of the tahasils the same trend as in the case of district as a whole is reflected. During the year 1966-67 Daryapur taluka had the highest percentage of non food crops.

Also it will be seen from the table that the area under nonfood crops has decreased in Achalpur and Morshi tahsils over the period from 1960-61 to 1966-67. On the other hand the area under food crops has increased in those tahasils.

Indicator No.6:- Increase in agricultural credit and out standing dues.

The cooperative movement has its origin in the long felt need of the agriculturists for cheap and adequate credit facilities. Now this movement is well developed and has proved a boon to the agrarian population. A large net work of primary co-operative agricultural Societies, covering all the rural population of the district has spread up. In the year 1960-61 the total loans advanced amounted to Rs. 145.16 lakhs where as in the year 1967-68 the corresponding figure was Rs. 219.29 lakhs. During the same year total dues outstanding were Rs. 318.46 Lakhs.

Talukawise percentage of the amount of loans advanced and the dues out standing during the year 1960-61 and 1967-68 are given in the table below:-

It will be seen from the above table that the percentage of loans advanced was highest in Achalpur taluka in both the years 1960-61 and 1967-68, followed by Chandur in 1960-61 and Morshi in 1967-68. In Melghat however the percentage of loans



advanced as well as loans outstanding was lowest during both the years. This is because in Melghat taluka the number of revenue villages is very small where the lands is owned by the cultivators. In forest villages the land is owned by the forest department and it is given temporarily for tilling. As such the farmers who are landless do not get the loan facilities.

Figures of loans out standing during the year 1960-61 are not available and hence the talukawise percentages could not be calculated. In 1967-68 the highest percentage of loans outstanding was in Chandur taluka, followed by Achalpur taluka. It was once again lowest in Melghat taluka evidently because very little amount was advanced in that taluka.

Indicator No.7:-

The Bureau of Economics and Statistics, collects agricultural wage rates at three selected centres viz. Bhatkuli, Bhandaraj and Dharni in the district from 1963. Therefore talukawise data for this indicators is not available for comparison. The wage rates do not represent the actual wage level in the district, because they are collected at selected centres. Still they can help us to know the general trend of the agricultural wage rates in this district.

In the table below. The average daily average agricultural wage rates at the three centres for the category of skilled and unskilled labour are shown..

From the above table it will be seen that the average wage rates at all the three centres have increased and this change at Bhatkuli centre is more conspicuous. Further more the wage rates for the females have increased at Bhatkuli and Dharni while they have fallen at Bhatdaraj centre. The wage rates for other agricultural labours also have shown an increase both for males and females at the same time at all the three centres.

During the year 1967 no. skilled labour, such as carpenter, cobbler, were employed on daily wage basis by the cultivators at any of the three centres, therefore the wage rates for them are not available.

Indicator No. 8:- Net cultivated area in hectares per head of live stock (Bovines and Ovines.)

This indicator is based on the population of total bovines (Cattle and Buffaloes) and ovines (sheep and goats). The following table shows the total live stock enumerated during last two live stock census.

The population of Bovines and Ovings in the district as per 1966 live stock census was 7,41,413 and the total net area sown in the district during the year 1966-67 was 7,10,120 hectares this meant that the net cultivated area per head of live stock (Bovines and ovines) was 0.95 hectares in the district.

The net area cultivated per head of live stock for each taluka is given below for the year 1966-67 based on 1966 live stock census.

It will be seen from the above table that net cultivated area per head of livestock was the lowest in Melghat taluka whereas it was the highest in Daryapur taluka. In other way, we can say that the live stock population was highest in proportion to the cultivated area in Melghat taluka while it was the lowest in Daryapur taluka.

Indicator No.9:- Poultry compared to population

Recently efforts on large scale are being made to develop the poultry. Poultry Development centres are opened and the people are encouraged to start poultry farms, by giving them loans and subsidies. This is due to the fact that poultry provides subsidiary food in the form of eggs and meat. As per 1966 live stock census the total poultry population of Amravati district was 1,50,833. If compared with human population there was one poultry bird for every 8 persons in the district.

At the time of 1961 live stock population there were 75.67 birds in the district for every 100 house holds in Nagpur division as a whole and 107.40 birds in Maharashtra. The percentage of improved breed of fowls to total no of fowls is the highest in this district among all the districts of Nagpur division. In all 3.31 percent of the total number of fowls were of improved type as compared to 1.07 percent for Nagpur division and 1.69 percent for the state as a whole. The number of eggs produced per hen per annum was estimated to be 71 in Amravati district as compared to 61 for Nagpur division and 84 for Maharashtra.

Indicator No.10:- Per capita consumption of electricity.

During the year 1967-68 the district was fed from Paras and Khaparkheda power stations of Maharashtra Electricity Board,

except village Dharni in Melghat tahasil where a disel power station was run as it was found difficult to erect a supply line from Amravati through the hilly region.

The following table shows the electric consumption on different purposes for the year 1960-61 and 1966-67.

The figures of electric consumption are available for the district as whole.

The per capita consumption of electricity rose from 21.25 kwh. in 1960-61 to 35 kwh. in 1965-66 but had fallen to 22.9 kwh. in the year 1966-67 due to short supply from the power stations. In the year under review it has again shown the increase and it has come to 32.25 kwh.

There was an overall increase in consumption of electricity of 51.76 percent in 1967-68 over the consumption of during the year 1960-61. The increase in consumption was more significant in case of "other purposes" which was 166.99 percent comprising mainly power used by pumping sets for agricultural purposes. This shows the popularity of pumping sets for irrigation.

Indicator No. 13 Increase in the number of students in different Catoraries

Amravati is the 2nd biggest centre in Vidarba next to Nagpur so far as the educational facilities are concerned. Late Dr. Panjabrao Debbmukh was the pioneer in the sphere of education in the district. The percentage of literacy is 33.68 which is second highest in Nagpur Division. The first rank is occupied by Nagpur district being 35.15. But if the percentage of rural literacy is considered, Amravati District, stands first by having rural literacy percentage of 29 .47 percent. Also it has been noticed that the percentage increase in the number of girl students is higher than that of the boys studentans during the period from 1960-61 to 1969 at all the levels of education .

a) Primary education:-

The following table shows the increase in number of the institutions, pupils and the teachers in primary schools over the period from 1960-61 to 1967-68 .

It will be seen from the table above that there is an over all increase the number of institutions, pupils and teachers but the increase in the number of girl students <sup>is</sup> greater than that of the boys . Secondary education:-

Higher education:-

Increase of higher education, the number of institutions imparting higher education increased by 133.33 percent. So also the number of students studying in colleges increased by 98.70 percent. All the taluka places except Morshi and Chandur have the collages. There is no college in the rural area. Most of the educational institutions are located in Amravati city.

The number of teachers in colleges increased by 163.14 percent.

In this table also it is seen that the number of girls students has increased considerable. There is also a significant increase in the number of student and teachers showing the growing popularity of technical education other than degree colleges.

Indicator No. 14:- Increase in road length

Amravati district, like Nagpur, enjoys a some-what favourable position in respect of railway communication. There are three railway routes traversing the fertile black alluvial soil and the flourishing agricultural land, which immensely adds to the importance of the district.

National highways are the main truck roads of national importance. They connect major cities, Capitals of states, major ports and other high ways. State highway are arterial roads of a stage connecting other highways, head quarters of districts and cities. They serve as main routes of traffic to and from major roads.

If the progress of the road construction is considered there is not much progress over the position of 1960-61.

There are, one national highway, Six state highways, 12 major district roads and some more other district roads. If the increase in the road length is considered surface wise, the length of the cement concrete road under B & C Deptt. has remained the same. There is an increase only in other types of roads which is also not much satisfactory.

The following table shows the length of the roads according to the types made as on 31st March 1961 and 1968.

In the above table the length of the black topped road has increased by 39.63 percent while that of the water bound macadam type has decreased by 3.73 percent. This decrease in length is due to change of the category of surface and its reclassification. There is a considerable increase in the length of lower types of roads in the district.

There is not much significant change in the length of the roads if taken categorywise. The length of the National highway passing through the district has remained the same. There is slight change in length in other types of roads. The table below shows the position as on 31-3-61 and 31-3-68.

From the table above it will be seen that the total length of roads of all the categories taken together has increased only by 38.83 percent. There is only internal change due to reclassification of the category .

As compared to the year 1961 slightly more area was served by the roads during 1967-68. The length of road per 100 Sq. kilometers during the year 1960-61 was 9.92 km. where as during the 1967-68 the same was 12.5 k.ms.

Indicator No.15:- Increase in banking facilities in proportion to the population.

The banking facilities have increased considerably during last eight years i.e. from 1960-61 to 1967-68 .Specially the co-operative banking has been spread in the rural area of the district. The scheduled banks were limited to the urban area only.

The Bureau of Economics and Statistics collects weekly retail prices at each district headquarter. In Amravati district, the weekly prices are collected at Amravati city. Though these prices do not represent the actual price level in the district, still they are helpful to study the trend of prices.

The retail prices of the various commodities have shown a rise over the period from 1960-61 to 1967-68.

Gram dal, Turdal, Gur, Groundnut oil and plantains is too high. The average price of gram dal showed the percentage increase of 258.0 where as the percentage increase was lowest in the case of tea being only 3.2. In the beginning of the year 1967 the rice was not available in the market. It was available from the month of June. Further the Jowar was not available in the open market through out the year due to the procurement scheme of the Maharashtra government.

## Chapter IV

### Annual Plan 1967-68

This was the second Annual Plan. As it was not possible to formulate the Fourth Five Year Plan, in time the first Annual Plan was adopted for the year 1966-67. As the same position prevailed, further the government had to continue with the Annual Plan for this year also.

The total budget provision for the development programmes both in public sector and local sector, under Annual plan 1967-68 for Amravati district was Rs. 180.22 lakhs. As agriculture still continued to have the priority, a major portion of the budget was assigned to it. Out of Rs. 180.22 lakhs, 45.27 percent i.e. Rs. 81.69 were allotted for the agricultural programme. The programmes under social services such as General Education, Public Health etc. together had a share of Rs. 70.12 lakhs or 38.90 percent of the total budget provision for the district.

Many schemes were implemented within the budget provision but certain schemes pertaining warehousing and marketing Co-operation and community development, transport and communication, welfare of Backward classes, had crossed the budget provision and more amount was spent. The total expenditure on plan schemes in the district was Rs. 172.76 lakhs which worked out to be 95.86 percent of the total budget provision.

Agricultural programme:-

As the state had pledged to achieve the self sufficiency in food, increase in the agricultural production.

production was the aim before the agricultural sector. An all out effort was made to increase food production. All the agricultural schemes were production oriented. The schemes included soil conservation schemes, minor irrigation, propagation of improved implements, development of crops etc. The schemes for development of forests, fisheries animal husbandary formed the other agricultural programme.

The table below shows the allotments and the total expenditure incurred on various programmes.

Agricultural Production:-

In all more than 10 lakhs of rupees were spent during the year under review on the different schemes

related to the agricultural production. All the schemes specially use of Hybrid Jowar seed had received full response from the cultivators. Under the intensive cultivation programme, special campaigns were organised to propagate the use of improved agricultural practices. Improved seeds were used extensively. The table below shows the actual achievement made under various plan programmes.

#### Soil Conservation:-

This district is devoid of irrigation facilities. So far there are no medium or major projects in the district. Only some parts of Morshi, Achalpur and Daryapur tahasils have the well irrigation.

Also there is a problem of soil erosion. Therefore the programme of soil conservation is of much more importance for preservation of soil moisture during the year. This programme covered an area of 6813 hectares and the total expenditure on this sub head amounted to Rs. 28.34 lakhs which was 97.89 percent of the total budget provision of Rs. 28.95 lakhs.

Minor irrigation:-

In this district multipurpose big projects are not possible due to absence of perennial water resources and natural sites. Hence the district has only minor irrigation projects. During the year 161 new wells were constructed and old were deepened by boring. The work of seven old Bandhara works were already in progress. The total expenditure on minor irrigation works was Rs. 20.12 lakhs out of the budget provision of Rs. 22.18 lakhs.

Animal Husbandry:-

The policy of developing the cattle breed, which was followed during the Third Five Year Plan, was still continued further during this Annual Plan also, Provisions were made for Veterinary aid centres and Veterinary dispensaries. New cattle breeding centres were started and improved bulls were provided for serving purposes. No new Buildings were constructed for the veterinary dispensaries. The total expenditure on this scheme was Rs. 0.27 lakhs.

Forest:-

The area under forests in this district is 27 percent of the total geographical area of the district. The Schemes under this sub head included plantation of valuable trees as teak wood etc. Out of the budget provision of Rs. 12.93 lakhs, Rs. 0.78 were spent on plantation of general utility timber as it was given much more importance. The amount spent on the construction of forests roads and bridges was Rs. 1.94. The total expenditure on this subhead was Rs. 11.93 lakhs against the budget provision of Rs. 12.93 lakhs.

Fisheries:-

There are no big tanks where the fish farming can be adopted on large scale and therefore there is no sizable development of the fisheries. Efforts were however made to popularise the scheme by giving aid for forming Co-operative fisheries societies and supplying nylon thread at subsidised rate to the fishermen for making fishing nets. The programme under this sub head included assistance for supply of fishing requisites, assistance for intensifying fish farming and increasing fish production in addition to the fishfarming in impounded waters. The total expenditure on these programme was Rs. 0.06 lakhs.

Co-operation and Community development:-

Schemes for subsidies, share capital investment and loans as per the needs were implemented. The Co-operative marketing continued to have same

importance which it had during the Third Five Year Plan, It was realised that the main obstacle in the way of the agriculturists was the non availability of the credit facilities from commercial banks. This lacuna was removed by the co-operative banking and an amount of Rs. 0.50 lakhs was spent on strengthening of co-operative credit structure at all levels during the year under review. Development of co-operative marketing also had much importance in this Annual Plan and Rs. 1.61 lakhs were spent on it . There were other schemes also such as development of Co-operative farming inside and out side pilot areas, development of co-operative consumer stores and providing grain depots for the backward classes. The total expenditure of Rs. 12.51 lakhs was booked as against the budget provision of 11.14 lakhs.

Community Development:-

The policy of implementing the community development programme through the Panchayat Samitis was continued during the present annual plan. In all Rs. 7.52 lakhs were expended out of the budget provision forming 107.74 % of the Budget. For the financial assistance to the village Panchayats in backward and Advyasi area, an amount of Rs. 0.40 was spent. The total amount spent on Applied Nutrition programme was Rs. 0.41 . In the district there are eleven community development blocks and two Tribal Development Blocks which cover the whole of the

rural population of the district excluding the Municipal areas.

Small Scale and cottage industries:-

The development of hand-loom industry, Financial assistance to the industrial co-operatives, and their organisations were the main schemes under this head. The total expenditure booked on these schemes was Rs. 1.08 lakhs out of the budget provision of Rs.1.24 lakhs.

Transport and Communication:-

As the district is not sufficiently equipped with the railway facilities, the transport in the district is mainly dependant on roads. During the year under review a sum of Rs. 4.68 lakh was spent on development of district roads by the state and local sector. On the rural roads under Public partition programme Rs. 2.05 lakhs were spent during the year. The total expenditure on these programme was Rs.13.60 out of the budget provision of Rs. 13.39 forming 101.57 percent of the budget provision.

Social Services:-

In the different developmental schemes under this sub head, social education had much importance which is revealed by the provision for the same. Out of the total budget, provision of Rs. 70.12 lakhs for this sub head, Rs. 21.49 were earmarked for the general education and against this Rs. 29.50 lakhs



were spent during the year. General education included elementary Education and Secondary Education. Under the schemes of expansion and compulsion of primary education 284 new teachers were appointed. The outlay on this schemes during the year was of Rs. 7.57 lakhs; An amount of Rupees 1.62 lakhs was spent on the Basic training of the primary school teachers under local and state sector, in all seven hundred and eighty one girls were benefited under the scheme. Special facilities to girls of primary schools and Rupees 0.02 lakh were spent on this scheme.

In all an expenditure of Rs. 11.25 was made on different schemes for secondary schools out of which Rs. 11.14 were spent on the development of non Govt. Secondary schools.

An amount of Rs. 0.36 lakh was spent out of the budget provision of Rs. 2.53 lakh on schemes under Technical education.

The different schemes under the Public Health programme comprised opening of Primary Health Centres, National Small pox programme and family planning schemes. The total budget provision for these schemes was Rs. 6.39 lakh against which the total expenditure amounted to Rs. 7.81 lakh. The target for the sterilisations was fixed at 5147 where as actually 10,052 operations were made. Similarly the number of the loop insertions had crossed the target. In all 410 loops were inserted.
