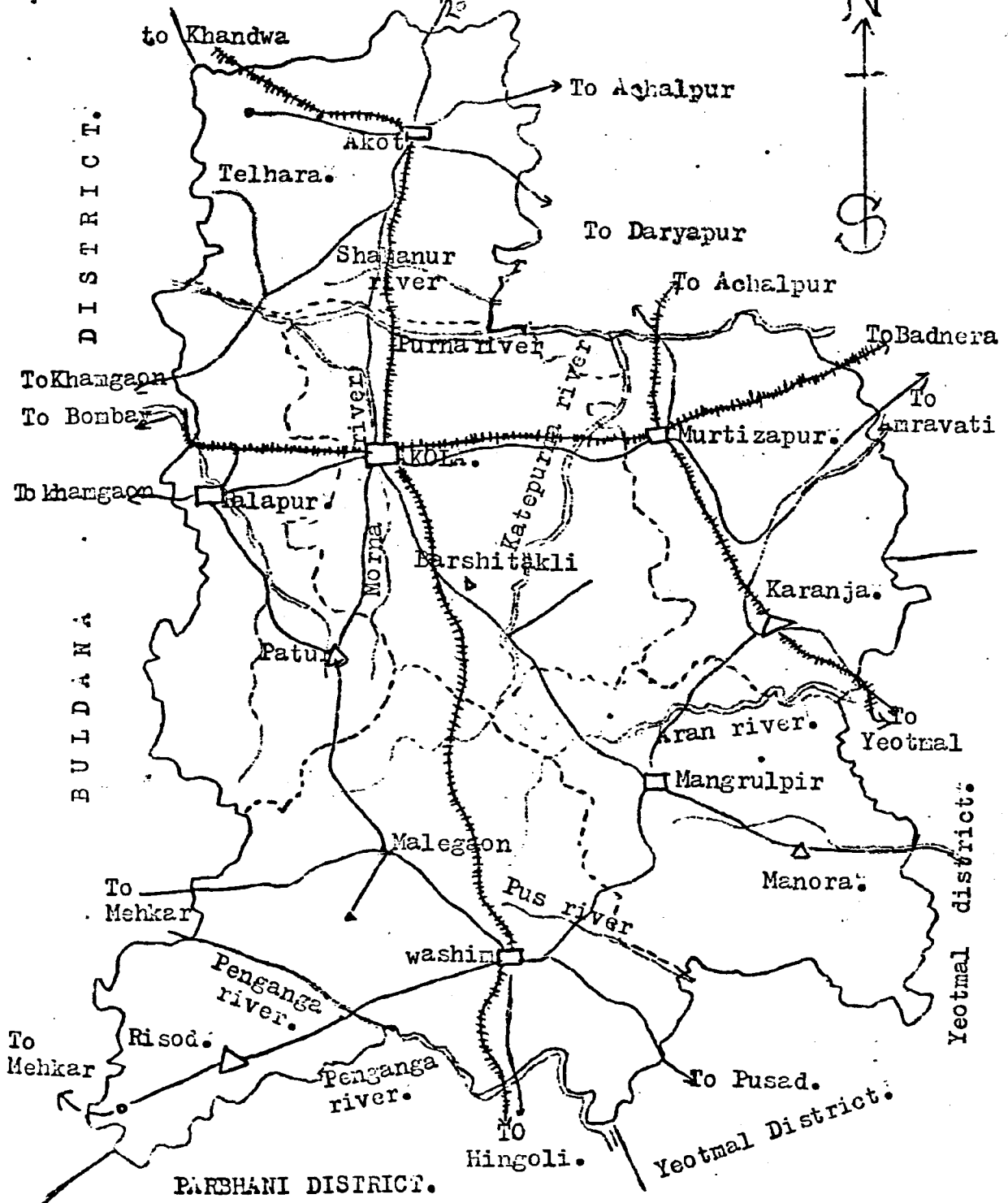

Chapter I.

Introduction.

1.1 Location

Akola district lying between 19°51 and 21°16 N latitude and 76°38 and 77°44 longitude with an area of 10595.7 km. or 4091 sq.miles is surrounded by the three districts of vidarbha and one district of Marathwada. Akola city which is the district headquarter, is situated on the bank of the Morna River.

1.2 Boundaries.

On the northern frontier of Akola district lies Melghat taluka of Amraoti district, while on the east it is bounded by Yeotmal district and a part of Amraoti district. On the south, it touches the territory of Hingoli tahsil, a taluka from Parbhani district while on the West it reaches the border of Buldana district.

1.3 Administrative set-up.

The district is divided into 6 talukas for administrative purpose, and the details about number of villages, towns, area and population covered by each taluka are given in the following table.

The Collector is in charge of the general administration, law and order, land revenue, and civil supplies. He is assisted by a few Deputy Collectors in his office and six Deputy collectors in charge of six talukas. Each Revenue division corresponds with tahsil and each Sub-Divisional officer is assisted by a few tahsildars and Naib-tahsildars.

Under the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samiti Act, 1962, a parallel set-up of Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samities came into existence with their jurisdiction over the entire district excepting the area under municipal towns. At Zilla Parishad level, the policy making body has forty seven directly elected councillors, one co-opted lady member and a few associate councillors. The panchayat Samitee also consists of elected, co-opted, and associated councillors. The administrative and developmental subjects transferred to Zilla Parishad and panchayat Samitee cover, by and large, all functions of Government administration, but, it excludes matters concerned with law and order, judicial and Semi-judicial functions etc. The Zilla Parishad works through various committees formed for different developmental activities.

1.4: Administrative History.

At the time of complete overhauling of the districts of Berar in 1905, the district in its present form came into existence and there were no major changes in the boundaries of the district since 1911 till today. Prior to the re-organisation of States, the district was a part of Madhya Pradesh and since 1st May 1960, it is a part of Maharashtra State without any change in the territorial boundaries of the district.

1.5: Area and Population.

Akola district has an area of 10595.7 km. and measures nearly 1448.10 km. length from north to south. Among the eight districts of Vidarbha, the district ranks fourth in respect of area and fifth in case of population as per 1961 census. The district accounts for 3.46 percent and 3.01 percent of the State area and population respectively, The district as per 1961 census has a population of 11.89 lakhs which is $1\frac{1}{2}$ times more than

than it was in 1911 when its population was 7.89 lakhs. There are 205 deserted villages in the district out of the total 1712 villages. The total number of deserted villages in Maharashtra is 3016. Thus 6.80 percent of the total number of deserted villages in Maharashtra is in Akola district. The urban population of the towns as distributed among the different population ranges is as below:

Thus the percentage of urban population to the total district population is 22.09 percent. Out of the total geographical area in the district 87,955 hectares is under Forests and cultivable land accounted for 8.38 lakhs hectares in 1967-68 and 8.39 lakhs hectares in 1968-69. The district is famous for its cotton trade in Maharashtra State.

1.6: Topography.

The northern part of the district lies in Purna valley which is itself a part of the Tapi river basin. The river Purna has formed a fertile basin in the talukas of Akot, Balapur, Akola and Murtizapur. This portion of the district is called Payanghat, whereas the southern part is known as Balaghat which is drained by the Penganga. The Balaghat plateau forms one of the great water sheds in the district.

1.7: Hills, Rivers and Soils:

The district has no mountains of importance but, the Satputa plateau stretches on its northern border, and range of steep hills of Ajanta mountains run across the middle of the southern tahsils forming a plateau known as the Balaghat which is a great water shed. To the southern side, ranges of hills are very distinct along the junction of Washim with Balapur and Akola tahsils and again in the middle and towards south-east of Murtizapur are hilly, light and stony. In the south-east of Mangrulpir taluka, the hills form two very abrupt ranges with the river Arunawati flowing between them.

The Purna, which is the principal river in the district rises in Betul district of Madhya Pradesh and flows due West through northern parts of Akola district. It is an important tributary of the river Tapi. The Chief tributaries of the river Purna are the Pendhi, the Lonar, the Man, the Uma, the Katepurna, the Morna and the Nirguna. The Katepurna which is the largest of all these tributaries, rises within a few miles of Washim and flows across the eastern part of Akola tahsil and north-west of Murtizapur tahsil. A project known as Katepurna project has been under taken in the district. The other important river of the district is the Penganga which flows south-east across Washim taluka. Its tributaries, the Adam, the Arunawati and Pus, rise in Washim taluka and flow through Mangrul and finally meet the Penganga. The soil is basically derived from volcanic trap rock and is quite fertile. The surface soil in most of the area of the district is rich, black soil. Most of the northern part of the district, central part of the Washim taluka ^{and} north-western part of Mangrulnath taluka have rich and black soils. On the other hand, most of the southern portion of Balapur and Akola talukas, the border of Washim tahsil, southern parts of Mangrul taluka and the east portion of Murtizapur tahsil are shallow, stony and less productive. On the eastern side of the road leading from Akola to Akot, there is saline tract on both sides of the river Purna in which formerly salt used to be manufactured.

1.8:Climate, temperature and rain-fall,

The district has a tropical monsoon climate and three main seasons as in other parts of the country. The hilly tracts of Washim and Mangrulpir talukas have slightly cooler climate than other talukas of the district. Akola city is considered to be the hottest place in summer. The hot season extends from the beginning of March to the end of June. The rainy season starts from mid June and lasts to the end of September, and the cold season extends from October to the end of February. The district has extremes of climate with too hot summer and too cold winter. But, a good breeze generally blows during hot weather making nights comparatively cooler. There are, however, great variations in temperature and in the hot weather the temperature in some places of the district rises to 42° c. and 43.1° c. recorded in 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

The average rain-fall of the district is about 800 mm. In the year 1969 the rainfall was 700.7 mm. The rainfall in the southern part of the district is more than in northern parts. During the year under review Washim got more rainfall of 1063 mm as against 569.6 in 1967.

The district has suffered from scarcity on a few occasions, and during the year 69-70, 144 villages from the Murtizapur tahsil were declared as scarcity areas, as against only 8 villages of 5 tahsils suffered scarcity in the year 1968-69.

The most interesting antiquities in the district are the hill fort at Narnala in Akot tahsil, the 'Chatri' and a fort at Balapur and two 'Viharas cut' in a rocky hill at Patur in Balapur taluka and various Hemadpanthi temples, the best of which is at Barshitakli in Akola taluka. In addition, there are a number of temples which include the famous Balajee temple at Washim and Jain Temple at Shirpur in Washim taluka where devotees from all parts of the country visit the places.

Chapter II.

Explanatory notes on the scope and limitations of
the statistical data presented in the part-II
(Statistical Abstract).

I. Purpose.

The abstract part of this publication gives exhaustive statistical data on important socio-Economic indicators of development. Tables on almost all important topics are presented in this part, so that the publication could serve as a reference book. Talukawise data have been displayed as far as possible for inter-taluka comparison. In most of the tables, data for 1969-70 have been indicated with data for 1968-69 and 1969-70 or even for earlier years. In the tables wherein data for 1968-69 and 1969-70 could not be presented, the same for the latest two years, for which they were available, have been shown. In the case of population(1961), livestock(1966) and Census of Government employees(1966), however, the data for latest Census have been presented. All the data are collected from the state and Central Government offices, local bodies and other relevant agencies. The footnotes below each table indicate the source from which the data have been collected.

II. District at a Glance:

This table presents a birds-eye-view of the Socio-Economic indicators of development in district and Nagpur division, under different heads, such as, area, population, agriculture, animal husbandry, education, transport and communication, Plan and C.D. programme, local bodies and other miscellaneous statistics. Reference year of the data is also indicated in the table.

III. Contents, scope and Limitations.

The statistical tables presented in the District Statistical Abstract are grouped into 13 parts. The contents of the tables and the scopes and limitations of the data displayed under each group are explained below:

1. Climate.

Only two tables are included under this section pertaining to rainfall and temperature at the selected centres in Akola district.

The table No.1 gives monthly rainfall and number of rainy days in each month at the selected centres for the years 1968 and 1969. The data are collected through Revenue agency. A day is treated as a 'rainy day' if during the 24 hours the rain-gauge recorded a minimum of 2.5 mm of rainfall. Annual rainfall for each centre is also indicated in the table. "Normal rainfall" is the average rainfall over a period ranging from five to eighty years.

The table No.2 gives monthwise 'mean', 'mean maximum' and 'mean minimum' and also annual temperature as recorded at the selected centres for the years 1968 and 1969. The data are supplied by the Government of India's "Regional Meteorological centre at Nagpur. The mean maximum and mean minimum temperature denotes the average of the maximum and minimum temperature recorded daily during the month. The mean (average) temperature is the simple average of the mean maximum and mean minimum temperature.

2. Area and Population:

In all 6 tables i.e. table Nos. 3 to 8 are included in this section. Data for 1961 Census are indicated in all the tables except table No.3 wherein data for both 1951 and 1961 Censuses are shown as reference period of the 1961 Census was sunrise of 1st March 1961.

The table No.3 indicates sexwise rural and urban population enumerated in 1951 and 1961 Censuses, alongwith variation in between the two censuses. The population figures for 1951 census shown in the table have been adjusted ~~for~~ to cover the boundaries or areas of the district and talukas as they existed at the time of 1961 census. According to 1961 Census, the term urban area as used in col.3 of the table ^{was} defined as under:

1. A town or an urban area is defined as a place which has
 1. A municipality, A cantonment or Civil lines or
 2. i) A population of 5,000 or over and -
 - ii) Atleast 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in non-agricultural pursuits.

Table No.4 gives talukawise classification of inhabited villages according to different population ranges. The term village(i.e. rural area) used in the table denote a statutorily

recognised village having a well defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, Wadies or Padas have, therefore, not been shown as separate villages. On the other hand, statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as Uninhabited villages. Villages also include forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families. Total population of the villages in each range is also indicated in the table.

The table No.6 gives number of workers and non-workers in each taluka of Akola district according to 1961 Census, and they are classified according to standard livelihood classes. The population according to livelihood classes is shown separately for rural and urban area and also for the district as a whole. The concept of dependency has been abandoned for economic classification at the 1961 Census. Instead, the population is classified into workers and non-workers. The emphasis is now on work and not on income or economic dependence. A person is defined as worker if (a) In case of seasonal work like cultivation, livestock, dairying household industry, etc., he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season; and -
(b) In the case of regular employment in any trade, a profession service, business or commerce, he was employed during any of the fifteen days preceding the day of the enumerator's visit to the household.

Person like beggars, pensioners, agricultural or non-agricultural royalty, rent or dividend receivers etc. who earn an income but who are not participating in any productive work in any occupation. A person who had been offered work, but, who had not actually joined has been classified as a non-worker.

The table no.7 gives distribution of population according to (A) Age group (B) Mother-tongue and (C) Religion, separately for rural and urban area and for the district as a whole. Here 'Mother-tongue' is defined as a language spoken by the persons mother to the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects have been included in the main languages on the basis of Grierson's classification.

The table No.8 gives talukawise details of scheduled caste and scheduled tribes separately for rural and urban area and also for the district as a whole. The scheduled castes notified for this district are as follows:

Scheduled tribes:

There are no scheduled tribes for which no one was returned in the district in 1961.

3. Agriculture:

In all 11 tables i.e. table Nos. 9 to 19 are included in this section.

The table No.9 indicates talukawise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of land uses for the years 1967-68 and 1968-69. Against each taluka, the break-up of the total geographical area according to different types of land uses is shown. Major constituents of the Geographical area are forests, land put to non-agricultural uses, barren and uncultivable land, cultivable wastes, permanent pastures, land under miscellaneous tree crops not included in area sown, current fallows, other fallows and lastly net area sown.

Under 'Forests' are included all actually forest areas of lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether State owned or private. If any portion of such land is not actually wooded but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land as the case may be.

'land put to non-agricultural uses' stands for all lands, occupied by buildings, roads and railways or under water e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agriculture.

'Barren and unculturable land' covers all barren and unculturable ^{land} like mountains, deserts etc. Land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost, is classed as

'barren and unculturable land' whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Culturable waste' includes all lands available for cultivation whether not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once, but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in

succession. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or not assessed and may lie in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Permanent pastures' and other

grazing lands cover all grazing lands, whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not. Villages common and grazing lands within forest areas are included under this head. 'Land under miscellaneous tree crops' etc. not included in the net area sown

are included all cultivable land, which is not included under net area sown, but is put to some agricultural use. Land under casurina tree, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other for fuel etc. which are not included under 'orchards' are classed under

the category. 'Current fallow' comprise cropped areas, which are kept fallow during the current year. 'Other fallows' land includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation, but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than

one year and more than five years. The 'net area sown' consists of net area sown with crops and orchards, area sown more than once once being counted only once. The 'gross cropped area' represent the sum total of area under all crops.

The difference between the total or gross cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once during the same year with the same or different crops.

The table No.16 gives the information on Major and Medium projects in this district. Both completed and incomplete projects have been covered in this table. Position in this table is as it was on 30th June 1970. The cost of medium irrigation project ranges between Rs.20 lakhs to Rs.5 crores, whereas that of a major irrigation project, it is Rs.5/- crores and above.

The table No.17 deals with monthly agricultural wage rates in 1968 and 1969. This data is collected fortnightly throughout the year from three selected rural centres viz. 1.Borgaon, 2.Chohatta and 3. Ansing. Only one centre is selected from Taluka.

4. Animal Husbandry and Forest.

A. Animal Husbandry.

In all 5 tables, i.e. table Nos. 20 to 24-B are included in this section.

Table No.20 gives talukawise number of various types of livestock and poultry as enumerated in the district in the livestock census, 1966. The Census is conducted throughout the country on an uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration once in 5 years. During the livestock Census operations, the livestock and poultry were enumerated by house to house enquiry. Particular care was taken to enumerate livestock in slaughter houses, stray animals and animals in transit. Sex and age group wise classification of the livestock is also indicated in the table.

B. Forest.

The table No.24(A) gives details of area in different types of forests during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70. Data regarding forests under the control of the State Government's Forest Department and those under the control of the State Governments' Revenue department are shown separately. The areas under forests are classified according to legal status into reserved forests, protected forests and unclassed forests. The legal status refers to the classification of forests under the Indian Forests Act, XVI of 1927. Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber production, wherein the rights

rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid. Right of grazing or cultivation is allowed, but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassified forest ~~ex~~ refers to the inaccessible forest or unoccupied waste. The forests which are taken by Government from local bodies or private individuals for management on lease basis are classed 'leased forests'. There is no classification of ex-proprietory forests as such but in Nagpur division, some private lands containing valuable forest are taken over by Government under section 29 of the Indian Forests Act, which are not yet classified as per tripartite classification and they are termed as ex-proprietory. The forest area shown in the table No.24(A) may not tally with the area under forest shown in table No.9. The two sets of figure differ due to the following reasons:

1. In the Indian Forest statistics Returns, the whole area including non-wooden area under the control of Forest Department is taken as area under forests, while in agricultural statistics, it is classified according to its actual utilisation
- ii) The forest Department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose and indicate the ownership of the forest areas and the actual utilisation of these areas is not so important from the point of view of Forest Department, as it is in the land utilisation statistics under agricultural statistics.
- iii) The Forest Department returns relate to financial year and agricultural statistics relates to the agricultural year.

5. Employment, Industry and Electricity.

In all 10 tables i.e. table Nos. 25 to 34 are included in this section.

The Factory statistics shown in table No.25, 26 and 27 cover following types of factories registered under the Factories Act, 1948.

1. Those employing ten or more workers working with the aid of power(section 2(i)).
2. Those employing twenty or more workers and working without the aid of power(section 2(ii) and

3. Those registered under section 85 of the Act, under which the State Government makes applicable the provisions of the Act, even though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However, statistics of the Defence factories are excluded.

The table No.29 gives occupational distribution of total registration and placement in the employment exchange for the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 according to the Standard National classification.

The table No.31 presents the results of the Census of Government employees as on 1-7-1966, conducted by the Bureau of Economics & Statistics, Bombay. The data presented in these tables are restricted to the Class I, II, III and IV employees of the State Government and do not cover any other category such as work-charged personal, Class IV employees paid from contingencies, daily rated workers, part-time workers or honorary workers. The distribution of employees according to specified basic pay/emoluments ranges is shown separately in respect of Class I, II, III and IV employees.

The distribution of the employees according to monthly pay and emoluments ranges is shown in table No.31.

6. Co-operation.

In all 8 tables i.e. table Nos. 35 to 42 are included in this section.

The table No.37 gives talukawise number of primary agricultural societies, their membership, share capital, Reserve and other funds, working capital, loans advanced and recovered, loans outstanding and overdues and percentage of recovery to total loan advanced for the years 1968-69 and 1969-70. 'Working capital' includes paid up capital deposits and borrowings. Loans outstanding include outstandings in respect of loans, cash credits and overdrafts and the amount of outstanding bills purchased or discounted. 'Overdues' refer to amount of loan or instalments which were due for collection but which were not actually collected and for the repayment of which no extension has been granted by a competent authority.

The table No.42 gives talukawise number of registered money lenders in each taluka and loans advanced by them during 1968-69 and 1969-70. Separate figures of loans advanced to traders and non-traders have been furnished in the table. The transactions of money lending in the State are regulated under the provisions of Bombay Money lenders Act, 1946. According to the Act, no money lender shall carry on the business of money lending except in the area for which he has been granted a licence, and except in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence.

7. Medical and Public health.

In all 4 tables i.e. table Nos.43 to 46 are included in this section.

The table No.43 given in this section indicates taluka-wise number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, Health centres and Primary health centres, Doctors, nurses, vaidyas, beds and total number of indoor and outdoor patients treated as well as for the years 1968 and 1969. The table covers all the State and Central Government medical institutions, and also institutions owned by municipalities and local bodies engaged in providing medical facilities. Private Clinics run by private bodies or individuals are, however, not included in the table.

The table No.44 gives vital statistics such as number of registered births and deaths in this district. Sex-wise classification births, deaths and infant deaths for 1966 is not available for each taluka and hence the total under each category is given in the table for that year.

8. Education:

In all 8 tables i.e. table nos. 47 to 54 are included in this section.

The table No.47 gives sexwise number of literates and percentage of literacy separately for rural and urban areas of each taluka according to 1961 population census. As per 1961 Census, definition, a person was classified as a literate if he was able to read or write a simple letter in any language.

The table No.50 gives information regarding number of educational institutions according to types for the years 1968-69 and 1969-70. Sex-wise enrolment and number of trained and untrained teachers in these institutions is also indicated in this table. The classification of institutions according to 'type' is slightly different from stage of education. There are at present many Secondary schools, which also impart education in primary course. Nevertheless, the entire enrollment of students is included under 'Secondary' education. Primary institutions provided education for standards I to IV or Standards I to VII/VIII or less and teaches the curriculum approved by the Education Department. The Secondary institutions coach students for standard VIII to X or XI/XII with or without lower standards. Higher education is education after passing Secondary School Certificate examination, which leads to a Degree examination.

The table No.52 presents data on the number of beneficiaries among backward classes such as scheduled caste, scheduled-tirbes and other backward classes for the years 1968-69 and 1969-70. Beneficiaries for this table are persons who are getting educational concessions of either type such as schlorships, freships etc.

The table No.54 gives number of villages without primary schools or schooling facilities according to population ranges at the end of the years 1968-69 and 1969-70. Villages with schooling facilities include smaller villages (generally below population of 300 persons), which cannot be given independent schools for economic reasons, and are, therefore, attended for school facilities to bigger villages or urban areas within 'walking distance' of one mile from them. The deserted villages as per 1961 Census are also included in the population range 0-199.

9. Transport and Communication.

In all 8 tables i.e. table Nos. 55 to ⁶¹~~63~~ are included in this section.

The table No.55 gives total railway length as at the end of 1968-69 and 1969-70 according to type of routes Broad gauge, Metre Gauge and Narrow gauge.

The railway length is measured between the first and last stations within the district boundary. The figures of length of each type of route are, therefore, approximate and not accurate.

The table No.58 deals with operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport in Akola division. For this table, the S.T.Division comprises of Akola and Buldana districts of Nagpur region.

Table No.59 presents the results of the traffic census on important roads conducted in Building and Communication Department, Government of Maharashtra. Data on the number of vehicles is according to categories and location of count-post. Type of surface and total traffic intensity in tons per 24 hours are also indicated in the table.

10. Local bodies.

In all 4 tables i.e. tables Nos.62 to 65 are included in this section. The table No.62 gives abstract of income and expenditure of local bodies such as village Panchayats, Zilla Parishad and Municipalities for the financial years 1968-69 and 1969-70. The number of village panchayats includes number of independent village panchayats as well as group village Panchayats.

11. Plan and Community Development.

In all 5 tables i.e. tables Nos.66 to 70 are included in this section.

12. Prices.

Only 2 tables i.e. tables Nos. 71 and 72 are included in this section.

The table No.71 gives monthly average retail prices of various commodities at district headquarter Akola. The average prices under each commodity are shown from the month of January to December for the years 1968 and 1969 alongwith units and varieties of commodities for which prices have been quoted. The data are regularly collected by District Statistical Officer every week on Friday by visiting the selected shops. The average price of each commodity for the year is also shown in the table.

As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too only from one shop at district headquarter, the average price for individual commodity can-not be said to be fully representative, but the data may prove useful as a broad indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time.

The table No.72 gives consumer price index numbers (revised series) for working class of Nagpur centre published by the office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay. Monthwise data for the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 commencing from April and also average for the years 1968-69 and 1969-70, have been given in this table. The base year for calculating price index (new series) is 1960. The Index numbers of wholesale prices are issued by the Economic Advisor to the Government of India. The base year for the same is 1952-53. The method of construction of the index is given in the Appendix to Index Number of wholesale prices in India revised series (1956) issued by the office of the Economic Advisor to Government of India. The equivalent of old index numbers can be obtained by multiplying the new index by 5.22 as Multiplier.

13. : Miscellaneous:

In all 12 tables i.e. table Nos. 73 to 84 are included in this section.

The table No.76 gives talukwise Cinema Statistics for the years 1968-69 and 1969-70. Number of permanent, Semi-permanent and touring theatres and their seating capacity per show has been indicated in the table.

CHAPTER-III.

In this chapter an attempt has been made to bring out the impact of general development on different sectors of economy of the district. Comparative talukawise data, wherever, possible, for 1960-61 and 68-69 or 69-70, as the case may be have also been given to bring out pace of development.

Indicator No.1 :Percentage of gross sown area to net sown area.

The following table gives percentage of gross area sown to net sown area in the district:

It will be seen from the above figures that the percentages of gross cropped area in the district had increased from 100.40 in 1960-61 to 101.23 in 68-69. Thus the increase had been accounted by a very negligible percentage. The reason for such a low percentage was due to lack of sufficient irrigation facilities in most of the talukas of the district and due to want of assured rainfall. It will also be seen from the above table that among the six talukas of the district, Washim taluka ^{was} first in having more irrigated area next followed by Akot taluka in 1960-61. It means that Washim, Akot, and Mangrulpir talukas, the percentage of double cropped area was higher than the remaining talukas of the district during the year 68-69 being 103.37, 100.98, and 100.62 respectively. Akola, Balapur and Murtizapur talukas had accounted for less percentage of area under double cropping both in 1960-61 and in 1968-69.

Indicator No.2: Productivity of important crops.

The productivity of the crops generally depends on timely rainfall, its adequacy and equitable distribution. Major food crops of the district are Jowar, Bajra, Wheat, Tur, and Gram, whereas cotton and groundnut are the major non-food crops. The following table gives the out-turn of important food and non-food crops in the district.

It is seen from the above table that production of all the crops in the district had decreased in 1968-69 as compared to 1960-61, except in case of jowar and Sugarcane. The out-turn of bajra and Tur in 68-69 fell by 76 percent and 53 percent respectively over the year 1960-61, while that of Rice fell by 20 percent and wheat by 7 percent during the same period. The production of jowar showed a considerable increase in 1968-69, over 1960-61 due to adoption of hybrid and other improved practices in its cultivation. Similarly, the production of sugarcane in 1968-69 increased by 740 percent which was significant. It was nearly eight times more as compared to the out-turn of 1960-61. The out-turn of groundnut also fell by 34 percent in 1968-69 over the year 1960-61.

Indicator No.3: Gross value of Agricultural production.

The gross value of agricultural production could not be calculated for the district as relevant price data required for the same was not available.

Indicator No.4: Percentage of irrigated area.

The following table shows the percentage of irrigated area to the net sown area and the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area.

It is seen from the above figures that percentages of net irrigated area to net area sown in the district had increased from 0.43 in 60-61 to 1.23 in 1968-69. Except in Washim taluka, the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area, more or less remains the same during 1960-61 and 1968-69. The reason for increase in the percentage by 1.50 percent in Washim taluka is due to increase in the irrigation facilities in that area due to Akburji tank etc. In the district as a whole, the area under irrigation increased from about 3492 hectares to 10,134 hectares during last ten years.

Indicator No.5: Changes in the crop pattern.

In Akola district majority of cultivable land is occupied by Kharif crops. Due to less irrigation facilities and less rainfall, rabi crops are grown to a lesser extent in the district.

It will be seen from the above table that during 1960-61 there was 51.57 percent of area under food crops to gross cropped area which rose to 54.44 percent in 1968-69. Due to this increase, the percentage of area under non-food crops was decreased from 48.13 percent in 60-61 to 45.56 in 68-69. Due to increase in facilities the percentage of irrigated area under food crops as well as non-food crops showed a significant increase, in the district. The percentage of irrigated area under food crops more or less remained unchanged in 68-69 over the year 1960-61. Similarly, the percentage of irrigated area under non-food crops to gross irrigated area slightly increased from 9.05 percent in 1960-61 to 9.13 percent in 1968-69.

Indicator No.6: Increase in Agricultural credit and out-standing dues.

The primary agricultural credit societies, which constitute the base of the cooperative credit structure in the State, numbered 835 with a membership of 71,635 in 1961-62 in the district. The number of societies and membership decreased in 1969-70 being 832 and 1,07,617 as compared to the year 1968-69 when it was 838 and 1,15,361 respectively.

The following table indicates the number of societies, loan advanced and outstanding dues in each taluka of the district for the years 1961-62 and 1969-70.

It will be seen from the above table that the number of societies slightly increased in Akola, Balapur and Murtizapur talukas in 1969-70 over the year 1961-62. But, Mangrulpir and Washim talukas recorded a decrease in the number of societies when compared to the position of 1961-62. The loans advanced amounted to about three times more in 1969-70 over the year 1961-62. The upward trend of outstanding dues noticed in the past continued in 1969-70 too. The amount of outstanding dues increased from Rs.202.06 lakhs in 1961-62 to Rs.354.37 lakhs in 1969-70. The percentage of outstanding dues was particularly, more in Washim, Akola and Mangrulpir talukas when compared to the other talukas of the district.

Indicator No.7: Livestock per Hectare of cultivable land.

According to 1966 livestock census, there were 8,59,994 heads of livestock in the district of which 5,62,982 were cattle, 90,941 were buffaloes and the remaining were other livestock. The following table indicates the livestock population (ovines and Bovines) per hectare of cultivable land in the district.

It will be seen from the above figures that livestock per hectare of cultivable land in the district remained the same in 1961 and in 1966. The livestock per hectare of cultivable land slightly increased in 1966 in all talukas of the district excepting in the talukas Balapur, Washim and Mangrulpir.

Indicator No.8: Poultry as compared to population.

Poultry includes of domestic birds like fowl, ducks, improved fowls and geese, of these fowls form the major category. Poultry in general gives an additional income as a subsidiary occupation to cultivators and food by way of eggs and meat. During 1966, the number of poultry birds decreased by about 39 thousand over the year 1961 in the district. The following table shows the number of poultry birds per person in each taluka of the district during 1961 and 1966:

It will be seen from the above table that the number of poultry birds per person in 1961 worked out to 0.14 and fell down to 0.11 in 1966. Similarly, the percentage of poultry per hundred persons decreased from 147.1 in 1961 to 114.4 in 1966. Amongst talukas, the poultry per person increased in murtizapur and Mangrulpir in 1966 over 1961 and the percentage of poultry per 100 persons also increased from 144.4 in 1961 to 160.5 in 1966 and 189.8 to 200.0 in these two talukas. Mangrulpir ranked first next followed by Murtizapur in this regard when compared with the position of other talukas. The number of poultry birds per lakh of population worked out to 11,433 in 1966 and the average number of poultry birds per hundred households worked out to 55 in the same year as against 69.03 in 1961. The percentage of improved fowls to total fowls in the district in 1966 was 7.52 as against 1.37 estimated in 1961. Similarly, the average number of eggs during 1961, per annum per hen worked out to 84 for Akola as per data collected by the Bureau of Economics and Statistics, Govt. of Maharashtra, just after the 1961 livestock census.

Indicator No.9: Per capita consumption of electricity in K.W.H.

The use of electricity in the district showed an increasing trend day by day. From the following table it is significant to note the increase in its use and the expansion of the same.

It is seen from the above figures that the per capita consumption of electricity increased from 15.48 KWH in 1960-61 to 60.57 KWH in 1969-70. The percentage of per capita consumption increased by 291.7 in 1969-70 over the year 1960-61. Due to industrial expansion and installation of electric pumps for agricultural purposes, the demand for electricity in the district is increasing rapidly.

Prior to March 1961, there were only 61 villages and towns electrified in the district and this number had increased to 471 as on 31-3-1970.

Indicator No.10: Increase in number of candidates enrolled and vacancies notified in employment exchange.

As in other districts, this district has an employment exchange office to register names of the candidates seeking ^{services}, to notify vacancies and arrange for placement of such candidates. The following table gives information regarding registrations, vacancies and placements in in the year 1969-70 and 1960-61 to compare the progress.

It will be seen from the table that registration in 1969-70 increased by about two thousand(1924), vacancies by 424 and placement by 345 over the corresponding figures in 1960-61.

Indicator No.11: Increase in in-door and out-door patients treated in hospitals.

There has been considerable improvement in the health standards of people due to expansion of institutional health services and curative facilities in the district. The following table gives the number of indoor and out-door patients treated in each taluka of the district during 1960 and 1969.

It will be seen that the number of indoor and outdoor patients treated in 1969 in the district increased by 61 percent and 30 percent respectively as compared to the corresponding figures in 1960. The district as a whole, showed significant increase in the number of indoor and outdoor patients in 1969 due to rise in the number of health centres and curative facilities made available in 1969. The number of indoor patients declined in Akot, Balapur and Washim talukas by 48 percent and 15 percent respectively over the corresponding figures in 1960, whereas it increased in other talukas. The number of indoor and outdoor patients treated in both the years i.e. 1960 and 1969 was highest in Akola tahsil due to availability of more medical facilities and the civil hospital at Akola city. The following table indicates information regarding number of hospitals and dispensaries and the number of beds per lakh of population in the district.

It is seen from the above figures that the number of hospitals in the district per lakh of population was 3 in 1960 and 12 in 1969, showing an increase of 300 percent. Similarly, the number of beds in hospitals per lakh of population in the district during 1960 and 1969 increased from 41 to 68. In the year 1962, there were 17 allopathic dispensaries, 36 Ayurvedic dispensaries and 13 primary health centres in the district, but in 1970, the the number of allopathic dispensaries rose to 43 in addition to the two hospitals already existing in the district.

Indicator No. 12: Increase in the number of students in differ-

betterment, education is the most effective weapon for progress. There was a considerable progress in the spread and dispersal of education facilities in the district, and opportunities in this sphere have been widened by providing various educational concessions. The number of primary school rose from 1230 in 1960-61 to 1490 in 1968-69. Similarly, there was significant increase in the number of secondary and higher institutions. It rose by 70 and 5 respectively over the year 60-61. The following table gives information regarding number of male and female students in primary, Secondary and higher institutions in 1960-61 and 1968-69 with percentage increase.

It will be seen from the above figures that in the year 1968-69, the number of students in the district in primary schools increased by 46 percent, in Secondary schools by 97 percent and in higher institutions by 220 percent. In case of higher institutions, the number of Girls students rose four times more in 1968-69 over the year 1960-61 and in case of boys it was nearly three times more in the same period. It is also significant to note that the number of secondary and higher institutions was doubled in 1968-69 as compared to the corresponding figures of 1960-61. There was one teacher for every 28 students at the primary stage and 25 students in Secondary stage in 1968-69. There was one secondary school in the district for every 16 inhabited villages. The number of students benefitted under concession of fees, increased from about 3000 in 1962 to 10,000 in 1970.

Indicator No.13: Increase in Road length per 100 sq.km.

Roads are of vital importance to meet the requirements of the industrial and economic developments and to increase commercial activities in the district. The road length as on 31-3-1970 recorded an increase for all types of roads in the district as can be seen from the following table.

It will be seen from the above table that road length in the district in 1969-70 per 100 km increased more or less three times over the year 1960-61. It meant that there was road length of 5.00 km. for every 100 sq.km. of area in the district as on 31-3-1961, and it rose to 16.52 km. per 100 sq.km of area on 31-3-1970. Due to this increase of road length, the district has been connected with all big cities of the State like Poona, Bombay, Nasik and the whole of the region.

Indicator No.14: Increase in Banking facilities in proportion to population.

The role of all type of banks is most important in modern economic world. The following table gives information regarding increase in Banking facilities and banking offices per lakh of population.

It will be seen that there were in all 42 (scheduled commercial and cooperative banks) banking offices in the district in 1969 as against the same as 24 in 1960, denoting thereby an increase of 75 percent in 1969 over the year 1960. On an average banking offices per lakh of population in the district increased from 2.02 in 1960 to 3.53 in 1969. Thus one banking office served a population of 49,556.41 in 1960 and a lesser population of 28,317.95 in 1969 due to expansion in banking facilities.

Indicator To 15: Offices.

Since 1962, prices of some important commodities are collected on weekly basis in the district. To compare the average prices prevailing at the district headquarter during 1963 and 1969, 18 commodities of daily consumption have been selected and are shown in the following table, with percentage of their increase or decrease.

Note: As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too only from one shop & district headquarter, the average shown above for individual commodity can not be said to be fully representative but, the data may still prove useful as broad indication of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time.)

It will be seen from the above figures that the prices of all the commodities showed an increasing trend in 1969 when compared to the average prices of 1963. The increase in the average prices of Wheat, gramdal, sugar and groundnut oil was significant in 1969 as compared to the prices of 1963. Jowar showed a rise of 50 percent in 1969 over the same period. Similarly, the prices of Pulses also shot up in 1969. Gramdal increased by 120 percent and arhardal by 62 percent in 1969 over the year 1963. The prices of Sugar in 1969 was more than double the price of it in 1963, whereas Gur showed a slight increase of only 16 percent in 1969 over the year 1963. Jowar was controlled and not available in the market in sufficient quantities, the percentage increase in its prices in 1969 was not much when compared with the price rise of other cereals.

C H A P T E R. IV.

Annual Plan Review 1968-69 and 1969-70.

4. At the close of the third five year plan in 1965-66, Annual plan 1966-67 was implemented. For the next Annual Plan for the year 1968-69, an outlay of Rs.261-256 lakh was fixed for this district. This outlay for the Annual plan 1969-70 was of Rs.184.349 lakhs. The break up of the outlay under State and local sector in 1968-69 was Rs.178.968 and Rs.82.288 lakhs respectively. Similarly, in 1969-70 it was Rs.123.625 lakhs under State sector and Rs.60.724 under local sector.

4.1 The percentage of expenditure against the total budget provision for all the district level schemes implemented in 1968-69 in the district worked out to 98 percent (92 percent under local sector and 101 percent under state sector). And the percentage of expenditure during 1969-70 was 85 percent under local sector and 82 percent under state sector. The over-all percentage of expenditure against the total budget provision for the year 1969-70 was 85 percent ~~underxxxxxxkxxxxxxkxxxxxxkxxxxxxk~~

The following table will indicate the figures of budget provision and expenditure with percentage for both the years on the plan schemes.

4.2: With a view to assure substantial increase in the production of food and raw materials, great emphasis and priority was given to the Agricultural programmes during the plan period as can be seen from the figures of outlay and expenditure incurred on this head of development.

4.3: Agriculture programme.

Under this head of plan schemes a total expenditure to the tune of Rs.91 lakhs (95%) was incurred against the budget provision of Rs.95 lakhs during the year 68-69, while the expenditure ending the financial year 1969-70 was Rs.58 lakhs (or 96%) against the budget provision of Rs.61 lakhs. There were 10 such heads under agricultural programme, out of which land development and miscellaneous agricultural programme are not

not implemented during both the years nor reviewed.

4.4: The important physical achievements under this sub-head of plan schemes was, distribution of improved seed and propagation of high yielding varieties through Zilla Parishad. During the year 1968-69 about 41 thousand acres of land was brought under Hybrid jowar, 1165 acres under hybrid bajra. The achievement in 1969-70 was 2141 acres and 211 acres respectively. In 68-69 improved seed of cotton and groundnut was distributed to the tune of 46 thousands and 23 thousands quintals respectively. In all, 16,407 compost pits were dug in 1968-69 and 15,700 tons town compost was prepared, while 17,850 tons of town compost was prepared in 1969-70.

4.5: Under soil conservation, ~~24~~ an area of 45,310 acres and 30,190 acres was bunded in 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively and the expenditure incurred on " " was Rs.50 lakhs and 27 lakhs respectively.

4.6: Minor irrigation:

An expenditure of Rs.27 lakhs was incurred on this head in 1968-69 while the same was Rs.20.38 lakhs in 1969-70. In 1968-69 602 new wells were constructed, while 96 wells were constructed in 1969-70.

4.7: Animal Husbandary.

One veterinary dispensary building was completed in 1968-69 which was started in earlier years and the number of poultry breeding farms was increased by 1 as against 13 in 1968-69. The expenditure on animal husbandary during the year 1969-70 and 1968-69 was Rs.2.35 lakhs and 2.19 lakhs respectively.

4.8: Dairy development.

The schemes are implemented by the Manager, Akola Milk scheme and the Deputy Registrar of Cooperative societies. The plan provision under this sub-head was Rs.1.46 lakhs and 66 percent of the same was expended in the year 1968-69, while an expenditure of Rs.0.34 lakhs was made in 1969-70 as against the budget provision of Rs.3.00 lakhs.

4.9: Forest.

The expenditure on forests in 1969-70 was rather more by Rs.10 thousand as against the same as Rs.24 thousands in 1968-69 or 43%.

Timber plantation was done in 25 hectares of land in 1969-70 as against 10 hectares in 1968-69 and afforestation of area was done in 30 hectares in 1968-69 and the 25 hectares in 1969-70.

4.10: ~~XXXXXX~~ Fisheries.

The percentage of expenditure on the schemes against the the budget provision of Rs.0.19 lakhs, was 75 percent in 1968-69 while the expenditure in 1969-70 was less by about 50 percent over the expenditure of the last year.

The stocking of fish was 2.78 lakhs in 1968-69 and 4.52 lakhs in 1969-70 as against the target of 3.00 lakhs and 4.50 lakhs and netting of fish was 26,413 and 63,106 kg. in 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

4.11: Co-operation and Community Development.

Under this major head of development, the total expenditure of Rs.7.13 lakhs was incurred during the year 1968-69 as against the budget provision of Rs.8.28 lakhs. The percentage of expenditure to the corresponding budget provision was 85.99. During the year 1969-70 an expenditure under this head was Rs.1.78 lakhs as against the budget provision of Rs.10.69 lakhs. The major part of expenditure was ^{made} under local sector being about 72.47 percent to the total expenditure under this head. The remaining amount of expenditure was made in the State sector. To strengthen the cooperative structure in the district, a target to enroll 3200 members was fixed for the year 1969-70 and till the end of Sept. about 580 members were enrolled. In all, 55 medium size godowns were constructed and financial assistance of Rs.1,000 to one consumer store for marketing etc. was given. On community development nearly 99 percent of expenditure was incurred during both the years as against the budget provision of Rs.3.75 lakhs and 1.32 lakhs in 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. All inhabited villages and rural population was covered under Community development programme in the district. The number of gram panchayats increased in 1969-70 was 919 while in 1968-69 it was 916.

4.12: Irrigation and Power.

Katepurna project is a spill-over project of the Second five year plan. Its estimated cost is Rs.451.39 lakhs

and it is expected to irrigate an area of 8,256 hectares on its full development.

By the end of 68-69, the M.S.E.D. had electrified 458 villages and by the end of 1969-70 the total number of villages electrified was 463. Thus during 1969-70 there was an addition of only five villages. The thermal power station owned by the above board is at Paras, a village in Balapur tahsil, of the district. The total expenditure on rural electrification scheme during the year 1968-69 was Rs.49.35 lakhs as against the budget provision of Rs.48.21 lakhs.

4.13: Industries and Mining.

Under this head of development, an expenditure of Rs.0.17 lakhs was incurred during the year 1969-70 to develop small scale and cottage industries. Out of this total expenditure nearly 70.5 percent was incurred under local sector.

During the year, 1969-70 financial assistance to 13 industrial cooperatives was given in addition to the 3 handloom industries. The share of expenditure of local sector during the year 1968-69 was also about 79 percent.

4.14: Transport and Communication:

Under this head of development an expenditure of Rs.28.79 lakhs was incurred in 1968-69 against the budget provision of Rs.29.75 lakhs. In the year 1969-70, the expenditure was Rs.31.18 lakhs against the annual plan provision of Rs.33.73 lakhs., and the percentage expenditure worked out to 92.43. The achievement under local sector, during this period was, construction of 41.80 km new district roads, and under state sector 17 miles of new construction and improvement and repairs to roads of 16 miles length. Four new bridges were constructed during this period. The work of widening of roads of economic importance was in progress during both the years.

4.15: General Education:

Under this head of development, activities, like expansion of primary education, construction of school buildings appointment of teachers and advancing of loans for their training and grant in aid and scholarships to economically backward

students in the district, were undertaken. For expansion of primary education in the district the entire budget allocation for the year 69-70 was expended, and 75 new teachers were appointed. Thus, 83.31 percent of the inhabited villages have been covered by the primary schools in the district upto 1969-70. In all 32 teachers were benefitted by getting loans for their training during the plan period. Fee concessions to 827 economically backward students was granted and 95 primary teachers were benefitted under free education to the sons and daughters of primary teachers during 1969-70. An expenditure of Rs.4.38 lakhs was made on construction of rooms and repairs to some old ^{Schools.} During the period 69-70, repairs to 118 old rooms were undertaken and 29 new rooms were constructed resulting cent-percent expenditure out of the budget provision on this item. Maintenance grant to 10 non-Govt. Secondary schools during this period was given accounting for an expenditure of 93.6 percent of the budget provision of Rs.2.50 lakhs.

The entire budget provision of Rs.0.34 lakhs was spent on eradication of illiteracy in the district during the year 1969-70 and 67,240 adults were made literate to achieve 100 percent target. During the same period, 2 secondary private schools were benefitted by getting loan under option loan scheme for construction of secondary schools of private bodies and the entire budget of Rs.0.29 lakhs, was spent for this purpose. Thus, in all 94.70 percent of the total budget provision was expended on the general education in the district, the budget provision being Rs.10.37 lakhs in 1969-70.

4.16: Medical and nursing.

About 50% of expenditure out of the budget provision was booked under this sub-head of development during the plan period of 69-70 it being Rs.0.15 lakhs. During these two plan periods, 20 nurses were trained and a 75 bedded ward was constructed. In 1969-70 some additional staff for typhoid ward at the district hospital was appointed.

4.17: Water supply, drainage and other plan schemes.

Under water supply and drainage schemes, the work of sub-regional piped water supply was in progress. Under well construction programme 115 wells against a target of 203 wells were completed in 1969-70. Under village housing project scheme, 28 villages in the district were benefitted. Under backward class welfare schemes 342 scheduled castes and 778 other backward class students were benefitted by getting tuition, examination fees and scholarships etc.

Grants to backward class hostels to the extent of Rs.48 thousand were given during the period 1969-70. Under rural broad-casting scheme, the entire budget provision of Rs.0.30 lakhs was spent in 1969-70. In 1969-70, 232 radio sets were installed in the district against the target of 136 sets to be installed.

4.18: Under applied nutrition programme, a centrally sponsored scheme, an expenditure of Rs.1.57 lakhs was incurred during the year 1969-70 against the budget provision of Rs.1.59 lakhs. The programme was undertaken in the 4 blocks of the district i.e. 1. Akot, 2. Washim, 3. Murtizapur. and 4. Barshitakli during the year 1969-70.
