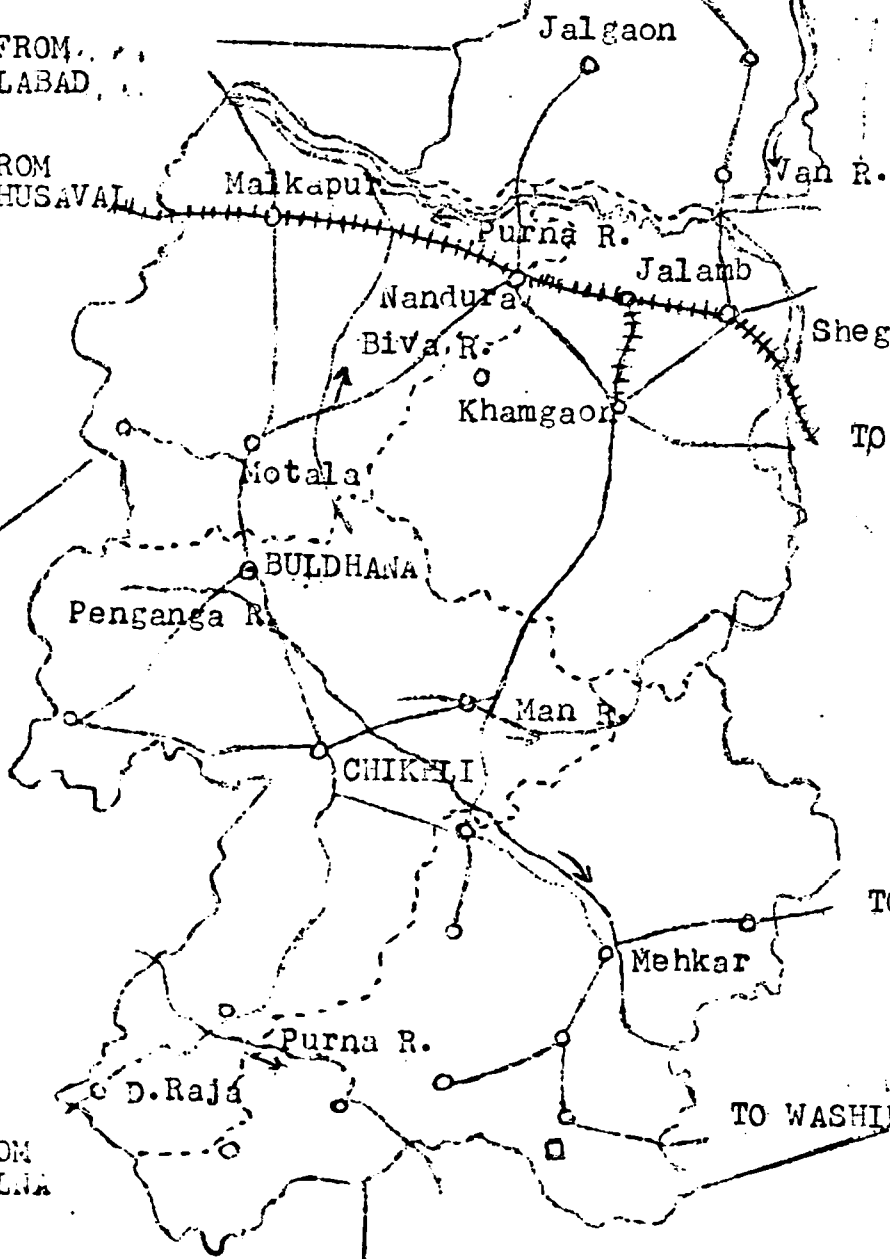

Introduction

Physical features

1.1 Location

Buldhana district has been named after Buldhana town which was selected as the district head quarters in the year 1367. It is partly in the Tapi basin and partly in the Godavari basin. The northern half broadly called Payanghat is drained by the Purna which is a tributary of the Tapi. The southern half known as the Balaghat is drained by the Penganga and the Kagepurna rivers which are tributaries of the Godavari.

1.2 Boundaries

The district lies between 19°51' and 21° 17' North latitude and 75° 57' and 76°49' East longitude. It is bounded on the north by the Nimar district of Madhya Pradesh on the east by Akola district, on the south by Parbhani districts on the west by Aurgangabad and Jalgaon district. The district covers an area of 9754 square kilometers.

1.3 History and Administrative set up

The history of Buldhana district is obscure and devoid of interest until the arrival of Mohamedana in the deccan in 1294. The greater part of southern India was included in the empire of the Maunyan and on its disruption, the north western tract of the deccan (including Buldhana district) fell into the possession of the Shakas the Pallavas, the Yawanas the Andhras, the Yadavas and local dynasty of the Vakatakas.

The fifth king of this dynasty Mahadeo Ugrasavabhuma, who reigned from 1260 to 1271 has a Brahmin minister named Hemadri whose name is of much local importance as the Hindu temples of Chalukyan style, the finest of which is at Lonar the old town of Berar in the district, are attributed to him and are popularly known as the 'Hemadpanthi Temples'.

With the arrival of Allauddin Khilji in 1294, the Mo-hammedans first appeared in the Deccan. In 1312, Malik Kafur marched through the district to Devgiri and having salined Shankardeo, the Devgiri prince, annexed his dominions.

In 1758 the Balajirao attacked Sindkhed (birth place of Jijabai -mother of Shri Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj) and Nizam Ali hastened to rescue that place. He was compelled to fight on his way from Aurangabad to Sindkhed, but succeeded in relieving the place. Daulatrao Scindia and Raghuji Bhonsale had encamped at Malkapur, when in August 1803, they allowed the British envoy to depart and received General Wellasley's declaration of war. A month or two later, General Wellasley traversed the district, while pursuing them from Assaye to Argeon.

In 1853, Berar (Vidarbha) and other districts of the Nizam's dominions were assigned to the East India company in liquidation of a large debt due on account of the arrears of pay of the Hyderabad contingent and as a security for the further payment of these forces. At the assignment, Berar (Balaghat) with its headquarters at Hingoli and North Berar with its headquarters at Buldhana were established.

After the war of Independence in 1857, the province was reconstituted into the East and West Berar with the headquarters at Amravati and Akola respectively, the present Buldhana district being included in the latter.

Till 1st November 1956, Buldhana was one of the districts of the erstwhile Madhya Pradesh. However consequent upon the reorganisation of states it formed part of the princely Bombay State till 1st May 1960, when it became a part of Maharashtra. However, these changes involved no changes in the geographical boundaries of the district.

The district comprises five sub-divisions or talukas viz. Jalgaon-Jamod, Malkapur, Khamgaon, Chikhli and Mehkar. The Collector as the head, is in charge of General Administration, Law and order, Land Revenue and Civil Supplies. He is also a District Magistrate and District Registrar. He is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector in his office and other Deputy Collectors who look after different branches. A Sub-Divisional Officer of the rank of a Deputy Collector has been put in charge of the administration of each of the five talukas. He is assisted by a Tahsildar and Naib-Tahsildars. The taluka has further been divided into revenue circles each in charge of a Revenue Inspector, assisted by a number of Patwaris, whose number in each circle is determined by the size and volume of work therein.

There are many other offices of the Government and quasi-Government institutions at the district headquarters for facilitating the smooth and co-ordinated working of the Government machinery.

Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis

Under the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act, 1961 a three tier structure was established embodying the Zilla Parishad at the apex, the Village Panchayat at the base and the Panchayat Samiti at the intermediate level. The Zilla Parishad and Village Panchayats are both local bodies directly elected by universal suffrage at the district and village levels.

The Panchayat Samiti, however is a body at the block level constituted by indirect elections. Each of these bodies has been given a clearly defined sphere of activities with major part of the funds transferred to it with the executive staff required for implementing its responsibilities.

The formation of the Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis has been a land mark in the history of the local Self Government, which revolutionised the existing administrative set up at the district and block levels.

The anticipated catalytic role of community development funds in mobilising rural savings for the provision of civic amenities in the rural areas had fallen short of expectations to emerge to the extent necessary. To develop this local leadership, it was necessary to give it a positive and effective part to play in the Local Self Government.

This consideration led to the establishment of the Zilla Parishad with vast powers of administrative sanction in relation to development schemes of local interest.

The existing administrative machinery, which otherwise would have been responsible for executing the schemes, has been placed under the Zilla Parishad. However, while the Zilla Parishad and its subordinate bodies have powers to determine the form and direction in which the development schemes are implemented, these powers are circumscribed within the existing frame work of five year plans. The administration headed by the Chief Executive Officer is statutorily responsible for executing the decisions of non official bodies at various levels. This administration being independent and yet responsible to the Government, ensures that the decisions are executed within the frame-work. The local leadership can determine priorities within the over all frame work of Government rules and development policies.

The Zilla Parishad, Buldhana comprises 59 members, of which 47 are elected from the constituencies with an average electorate of 35,000, while the remaining 12 members are co-opted representatives of various institutions such as co-operative Societies, Banks, Ladies representatives, Panchayat Samitis etc. From among these members, the Zilla Parishad elects a president, a Vice President and two Chairmen of standing committees, all of whom have certain executive functions and are the chairmen of subject committees with supervisory powers in relation to certain subjects.

The spheres of development of district importance relating to agriculture, Animal Husbandry, Minor Irrigation, Unit Development, Public Health, Public Work, Co-Operation and Industries, Education etc. have been transferred to the Zilla Parishad.

Thirteen panchayat samitis have been established each having a chairman with certain statutory functions, with a budget normally varying according to the stage of the Block Panchayat Samiti. These bodies ^{have} limited powers of administrative sanction pertaining to the existing schemes implemented within their jurisdiction. The panchayat samiti is essentially responsible for granting the financial aid to the village Panchayats, which in turn provide basic amenities at the village level. The Panchayat Samiti is also responsible for providing technical guidance to the village level staff in educating the village in modern methods of agriculture, animal husbandry etc. Finally it is responsible for supervising the over all administration of the village panchayats in the district.

The co-ordination with this elaborate three tier structure is essential in two ways. The Panchayat Samiti consists of the persons elected by members of the village panchayat and also of Zilla Parishad members elected from within its jurisdiction. The Chairmen of the Panchayat Samitis are also co-opted members of the Zilla Parishad.

1.4 Area

Out of a total population of 10,59,698 for the district in 1961, 8,34,260 persons or 33.45 percent and 1,75,438 persons or 16.55 percent reside in the rural and urban areas respectively. The area of the district is 9754 square kilometers (3766 Sq.miles) which accounts for 9.98 percent & 3.13 percent of the total area of - Vidarbha and Maharashtra respectively. The district accounts for 11.47 percent of the population of Vidarbha and 2.68 percent of the population of Maharashtra.

1.5 Topography

Out of the five talukas now forming the district, the talukas of Chikhli and Mehkar lie on the Balaghat plateau, while the rest of the three talukas of Malkapur, Khamgaon and Jalgaon are in the great plain below known as the Paygan-ghat. There are, these two natural sub-divisions, which correspond closely to the administrative sub-divisions of the district. The edge of the plateau where it falls abruptly into the valley is intersected by numerous deep ravines.

The land scape is of varied character, fertile villages alternating with barren hill sides and deep ravines. Below the ghats, the where it is broken by spurs of hills putting out into a plain. The general slope of the district above the ghat is from north to south.

1.6 Hills, Rivers System, Soils etc. (3)

The main system of hills is the Ajanta range which has formed a plateau called the Balghat. It covers the southern portion of the district, comprising Chikhli and Mehkar talukas. A ridge of low hills running from north-west to south east through the Balaghat forms the watershed between the valleys of the Penganga and the Kate Purna. The main Ajanta range forms the northern wall of the Deccan table - land and the watershed between the Godavari and Tapi valleys.

There is also a branch of the Satpura range in the north of Jalgaon taluka, which separates the district from the state of Madhya Pradesh.

The general slope of the country above the ghats is from north to south.

The elevation of the three phain talukas of - Malkapur, Khangaon and Jalgaon varies from 264 to 278 meters above sealevel. The elevation of Chikhli and Mehkar table land varies from 529 to 737 meters above sea level. Buldhana town the district head quarter, is situated at an elevation of 668 meters.

The principal river in the district is the Penganga. The other important rivers are the Purna, the Kate-Purna, the Nalganga, the Vishwaganga, the Gyanganga and the Ranganga.

The Penganga rises in the hills near Deulghat, runs in a south easterly direction past Mehkar, and then enters the Akola district. The portion of the river which lies in this district is almost dry in the hot weather.

The Kate or Lower Purna rises in the Ajanta hills to the west of the district, which enters a little to the north of Deulgaon-Raja and traverses the taluka of Mohkar in a south easterly direction for a distance of about 48 kilometers, its course running parallel to, and south of that of the Penganga. It is dry in summer. Both the Penganga and Kate Purna are important rivers of the Godavari basin but they do not acquire their importance till they come out the sloped district.

The Purna rises in the lower slopes of the Gawilgad hills in the Amravati district and runs west ward until it leaves the district at the northern most corner of Malkapur tahsil. Its principal tributories within the district are the Nalganga, the Vishwaganga and the Gyanganga from the south, and the Ranganga from the north. The Nalganga rising in the hills near Daulghat runs due north and joins the purna near Javel. An irrigation project on the river Nalganga has been completed in 1966. The Vishwaganga rises at Buldhana itself. The Gyanganga rises in the table lands north of the valley of the Penganga and runs past Mandura before joining the Purna. The Ranganga rises in the Melghat to the north of the Bulgaon tahsil and flows south wards to meet the Purna.

The soils are derived from trap rock of volcanic origin. There are three main categories of soils in the district viz. (i) Bharkali, which is deep black soil of very fine texture and very receptive of moisture (ii) Morand, which is black cotton soil containing lime and is less fertile than pure black cotton soil, and (iii) Barad, which is the shallow soil of the higher lands of the plateau and of black, brown or reddish colour.

The soils in the other three tahsils viz. Jalgaon, Malkapur and Khambha are generally deep black, formed by transported material washed from the higher lands. Cotton and kharif jowar are the main crops. The largest stretches of such heavy soils are formed in strips of about thirteen kilometers on either side of the Purna river.

The belts lying between the railway main line and the Purna river comprises some of the most fertile land in Vidarbha.

Towards the south, the soil is light and stony, but pockets and belts of rich soil are found right upto the hills, particularly in Malkapur tahsil.

On the plateau, i.e. in Chikhli and Mehkar tahsils there are considerable areas of medium black soil interspersed amidst the light and shallow soils which grow cotton, jowar, pulses and bajari. The Chikhli and Mehkar tahsils are well known for their wheat which is grown in the low lands between the plateau. These soils have a muram sub-stratum and are, therefore, well drained. The existence of rock sub-soil is also not uncommon and the soils formed on such rocky beds suffer both, during scanty and heavy rains.

The district is not known to have any mineral of outstanding importance, except some saline deposits and lead in the lake of Lonar. These saline deposits were exploited for some time past, but subsequently found unprofitable and hence further exploitation of these deposits was abandoned.

However, the agates, cornelians and calcite formed in the trap in southern part of the district have some utility, the first two for aamental purposes and the last for optical purposes.

1.7 Climate, Temperature and Rainfall

The climate of the district is dry and hot in general and considered to be generally healthy. The mean maximum temperature at Buldhana in summer ^{was} 39.3 centigrades and the minimum 15.4 centigrade in winter season in 1969. After may, the temperature rapidly falls down. Then after June with the arrivals of mansoons, starts the rainy season and lasts upto the end of September. It is fallowed by winter season, which is quite pleasant.

The above temperature figures are typical of the Balaghat plateau (i.e. Chikhli and Mehkar tahsil) where the hot season sets in late and the heat is not intense. The rainy season is pleasant and the winter is invigouriting. Buldhana town itself is the coolest and the most pleasant district of headquarters in Vidaroha. The climate of the Panyaghat (i.e. Malkapur, Jalgaon & Khamgaon tahsils) affords a great contrast. There the heat is intense and specially in the months of March to May, it is perhaps as intense as in the hottest part of the country. The strong Western winds, which then prevail become intensely heated and exercise their influence.

The rain fall is not uniform in all parts of the district. It is highest at Buldhana with an average of about 975 m.m. as against the average of 715 m.m at Malkapur. If rains come in time and are equitably spread over the entire season period properly the average rainfall in the district proves to be adequate for good crops. The district gets rain from the south west mansoons during the period from June to September.

Explanatory notes on the scope and limitations of the statistical data presented in the Part-II (Statistical Abstract)

I. Purpose

The abstract part of this publication gives exhaustive statistical data on important Socio Economic indicators of development. Tables on almost all important topics are presented in this part, so that the publication could serve as a reference book. Talukawise data have been displayed as far as possible for inter taluka comparison. In most of the tables, data for 1969-70 have been indicated with data for 1968-69 or even for earlier years. In the tables wherein data for 1968-69 and 1969-70 could not be presented, the same for the latest two years, for which they were available, have been shown. In case of population (1961), Livestock (1966) and Census of Government employees (1966), however the data for latest Census have been presented. All the data are collected from the State and Central Government offices local bodies and other relevant agencies. The footnotes below each table indicate the source from which the data have been collected.

II. District at a Glance

This table presents a birds-eye-view of the Socio Economic indicators of development in district and Nagpur division under different heads, such as, area, population, agriculture, animal husbandry, education, transport and communication, Plan and C.D. programme, local bodies and other miscellaneous statistics.

Reference year of the data is also indicated in the table.

III. Contents. Scope & Limitation

The statistical tables presented in the District Statistical Abstract are grouped into 13 parts. The contents of the tables and the scopes and limitations of the data displayed under each group are explained below.

1. Climate

Only two tables are included under this section pertaining to rainfall and temperature at the selected centres in Buldhana district.

The table No.1 gives monthly rainfall and number of rainy days in each month at the selected centres for the year 1968 & 1969. The data are collected through Revenue agency. A day is treated as a "rainy day" if during the 24 hours the rain gauge recorded a minimum of 2.5 m.m. of rainfall. Annual rainfall for each centre is also indicated in the table. "Normal rainfall" is the average rainfall over a period ranging from five to eighty years.

The table No.2 gives monthwise 'mean', 'mean maximum' and 'mean minimum' and also annual temperature as recorded at selected centres for the year 1968 & 1969. The data are supplied by the Government of India's Regional Meteorological Centre at Nagpur. The mean maximum and mean minimum temperature denotes the average of the maximum and minimum temperature recorded daily during the month. The mean (average) temperature is the simple average of the mean maximum and mean minimum temperature.

In all 6 tables i.e. tables Nos. 3 to 8 are included in this section. Data for 1961 Census are indicated in all the tables except table No.3 wherein data for both 1951 and 1961 Censuses are shown as reference period of the 1961 Census was sunrise of 1st March 1961.

Table No. 3 indicates sexwise rural and urban population enumerated in 1951 and 1961 Censuses, along with variation in between the two Censuses. The population figures for 1951 Census shown in the table have been adjusted to cover the boundaries or areas of the district and talukas as they existed at the time of 1961 Census. According to 1961 Census, the term urban area as used in col.3 of the table here defined as under:-

A town or an urban area is defined as a place which has-

1. A municipality, a Cantonment or Civil lines or
2. i. A population of 5,000 or over and -
 - ii. Atleast 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in non-agricultural pursuits.

Table No. 4 gives talukawise classification of inhabited villages according to different population ranges. The term village (i.e. rural area) used in the table denotes a statutorily recognised village having a well defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, wadies or padas have, therefore, not been shown as separate villages. on the other hand, statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as 'Uninhabited' villages.

Villages also include forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families. Total population of the villages in each range is also indicated in the table.

The table No.6 gives number of workers and non-workers in each taluka of Buldhana district according to 1961 Census, and they are classified according to standard livelihood classes. The population according to livelihood classes is shown separately for rural and urban area and also for the district as a whole. The concept of dependency has been abandoned for economic classification at the 1961 Census. Instead, the population is classified into workers and non-workers. The emphasis is now on work and not on income or economic dependence. A person is defined as worker if (a). In ^{the} case of seasonal work like cultivation, livestock, dairying household industry, etc., he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season, and -

(b) In case of regular employment in any trade, a profession service, business or commerce, he was employed during any of the fifteen days preceding the day of the enumerator's visit to the household.

Persons like beggars, pensioners, agricultural or non-agricultural royalty, rent or dividend receivers etc. who earn an income but who are not participating in any productive work in any occupation. A person who had been offered work, but who had not actually joined has been classified as a non-worker.

The table No.7 gives distribution of population according to (A) Age group (B) Mother tongue and (C) Religion, separately for Rural and Urban area and for the district as a whole. Here 'Mother tongue' is defined as a language spoken by the persons mother to the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects have been included in the main languages on the basis of Grierson's classification.

The table No.8 gives talukawisedetails of scheduled caste and scheduled tribes separately for rural and urban area and also for the district as a whole.

Scheduled Tribes

There are no Scheduled tribes notified for this district in 1961.

3. Agriculture

In all 11 tables i.e. table nos. 9 to 19 are included in this section.

The table No.9 indicates talukawise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of land uses for the years 1967-68 and 1968-69.

Against each taluka, the break-up of the total geographical area according to different types of land uses is shown. Major constituents of the Geographical area are forests, land put to non-agricultural uses, barren and uncultivable land, cultivable wastes, permanent pastures, land under miscellaneous tree crops not included in area sown, current fallows, other fallows and lastly net area sown. Under 'Forests' are included all actually forest areas of lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether State owned or private. If any portion of such land is not actually wooded but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land as the case may be. 'Land put to non-agricultural uses' stands for all lands, occupied by buildings, roads and railway or under water e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agriculture. 'Barren and unculturable land' covers all barren and unculturable land like mountains, deserts etc. Land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost, is classed as 'barren and unculturable land' whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Culturable waste' includes all lands available for cultivation whether not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once, but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in succession. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or not assessed and may lie in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Permanent pastures' and other grazing lands cover all grazing lands, whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not.

Village common and grazing lands within forest areas are included under this head. 'Land under miscellaneous tree & crops etc. not included in the net area sown' are included all cultivable land, which is not included under net area sown, but is put to some agricultural use. Land under casurina tree, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other for fuel etc. which are not included under 'orchards' are classed under the category. 'Current fallows' comprise cropped areas which are kept fallow during the current year. 'Other fallow' land includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation, but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and more than five years. The 'net area sown' consists of net area sown with crops and orchards, area sown more than once being counted only once. The 'gross cropped area' represents the sum total of area under all crops. The difference between the total or gross cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once during the same year with the same or different crops.

The table No.16 gives the information on Major and Medium projects in this district. Both completed and incomplete projects have been covered in this table. Position in this table is as it was on 30th June 1970. The cost of Medium irrigation project ranges between Rs.20 lakhs to Rs.5 crores, whereas that of a Major irrigation project, it is Rs. 5/- crores and above.

Table No.17 deals with monthly agricultural wage rates in 1968 and 1969. This data is collected fortnightly throughout the year from three selected rural centres viz. 1) Asalgan 2) Deulghat and 3) Dangan. Only one centre is selected from a taluka.

4) Animal Husbandry and Forest

A- Animal Husbandry :In all 5 tables i.e. table Nos.20 to 24 B are included in this section .

Table No.20 gives talukawise number of various types of livestock and poultry as enumerated in the district in the Livestock Census 1966. The Census is conducted throughout the country on an uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration once in 5 years. During the Livestock Census operations, the livestock and poultry were enumerated by house to house enquiry. Particular care was taken to enumerate livestock in slaughter houses, stray animals and animals in transit. Sex and age-groupwise classification of the livestock is also indicated in the table.

B. Forest

The table No.24 (A) gives details of area in different types of forests during the years 1968-69 & 1969-70. Data regarding forests under the control of the State Government's Forest Department and those under the control of the State Government's Revenue Department are shown separately. The areas under forests are classified according to legal status into reserved forests, protected forests and unclassed forests. The legal status refers to the ex classification of forests under the Indian Forests Act, XVI of 1927.

Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber production, wherein the rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid. Right of grazing or cultivation is allowed, but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassed forest refers to the inaccessible forest or unoccupied waste. The forests which are taken by Government from local bodies or private individuals for management on lease basis are called 'leased forests'. There is no classification of ex-proprietary forests as such but in Nagpur division, some private lands containing valuable forest are taken over by Government under section 29 of the Indian Forests Act, which are not yet classified as per tripartite classification and they are termed as ex-proprietary. The forest area shown in the Table No.24(A) may not tally with the area under forest shown in Table N.9. The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons.

- 1) In the Indian Forest Statistics Returns, the whole area including non-wooden area under the control of Forest Department is taken as area under forests, while in agricultural statistics, it is classified according to its actual utilisation (ii). The Forest Department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose and indicate the ownership of the forest area and the actual utilisation of these areas is not so important from the point of view of forest department, as it is in the land utilisation statistics under Agricultural statistics.

(iii) The Forest Department returns relate to financial year and agricultural statistics relate to the agricultural year.

5. Employment, Industry and Electricity -

In all 9 tables i.e. table No.25 to 32 are included in this section.

The factory statistics shown in Table Nos.25,26 & 27 cover following types of factories registered under the Factories Act, 1948:-

- 1) Those employing ten or more workers working with the aid of power (Section 2 (i) -
- 2) Those employing twenty or more workers and working without the aid of power (Section 2 (ii) and
- 3) Those registered under Section 35 of the act, under which the State Government makes applicable the provisions of the act, even though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However, statistics of the Defence factories are excluded.

Table No. 29 gives occupational distribution of total registration and placement in the employment exchange for the years 1963-69 and 1969-70 according to Standard International Classification.

The tables No.31 present the results of the census of Government employees as on 1.7.1966, conducted by the Bureau of Economics & Statistics, Bombay. The data presented in these tables are restricted to Class-I,II,III & IV employees of the State Government and do not cover any other category such as work-charged personal, Class IV employees paid from contingencies, daily rated workers, part-time workers or honorary workers. The distribution of employees according to specified basic pay/employments ranges is shown separately in respect of Class I,II,III & IV employees.

The distribution of the employees according to monthly or annual emolument ranges is shown in table No.31.

6. Co-operation

In all 8 tables i.e. table Nos. 35 to 42 are -
included in this section.

The table No.37 gives talukawise number of primary agricultural societies, their membership, share capital, Reserve and other funds, working capital, loans advanced and recovered, loans outstanding and overdues and percentage of recovery to total loan advanced for the year - 1968-69 and 1969-70. 'Working capital' includes paid up capital deposits and borrowings. Loans outstanding include outstanding in respect of loans, cash credits and overdrafts and the amount of outstanding bills purchased or discounted. 'Overdues' refer to amount of loan or instalments which were due for collection but which were not actually collected and for the repayment of which no extension has been granted by a competent authority.

The table No.42 gives talukawise number of registered money lenders in each taluka and loans advanced by them during 1968-69 and 1969-70. Separate figures of loans advanced to traders and non-traders have been furnished in the table. The transactions of money lending in the state are regulated under the provisions of Bombay Money Lenders Act, 1946. According to the Act, no money lender shall carry on the business of money lending except in the area for which he has been granted a licence, and except in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence.

7. Medical and Public Health

In all 4 tables i.e. tables Nos.43 to 46 are
included in this section.

The table No.43 given in this section indicates talukawise number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, Health centres and Primary Health centres, doctors, nurses, viadyas, beds and total number of indoor and outdoor patients treated as well for the years 1968-69 and 1969. The table covers all the State and Central Government medical institutions, and also institutions owned by municipalities and local bodies - engaged in providing medical facilities. Private clinics run by private bodies or individuals are, however, not included in the table.

The table No.44 gives vital statistics such as number of registered births and deaths in this district. Sexwise classification births, deaths and infant deaths for 1963 is not available for each taluka and hence the total under each category is given in the table for that year.

3. Education

In all 8 tables i.e. Table Nos.47 to 54 are included in this section.

The table No.47 gives sexwise number of literates and percentage of literacy separately for rural and urban areas of each taluka according to 1961 population census. As per 1961 Census definition, a person was classified as a literate if he was able to read or write a simple letter in any language .

The table No.50 gives information regarding number of educational institutions according to types for the years 1967-68 and 1968-69. Sexwise enrolment and number of trained and untrained teachers in these institutions is also indicated in this table.

The classification of institutions according to 'type' is slightly different from stage of education. There are at present many Secondary Schools, which also impart education, ^{as well as} So in primary courses. Nevertheless, the entire enrollment of students is included under (Secondary education. Primary institutions provided education for standards I to IV or standards I to VII/VIII or less and teachers the curriculum approved by the Education Department. The Secondary institutions coach students for Standard VIII to IX to XI ^{X or} with or without lower standards. Higher education is education after passing Secondary School Certificate Examination, which reads to a Degree examination.

The table No.51 presents data on the number of beneficiaries among backward classes such as scheduled caste, Scheduled-Tribes and other backward classes for the years 1967-68 & 1968-69. Beneficiaries for this table are persons who are getting educational concessions of either type such as scholarships, free ships etc.

Table No.54 gives number of villages without primary schools or schooling facilities according to population ranges at the end of the years 1968-69 and 1969-70. Villages with schooling facilities include smaller villages (generally below population of 300 persons), which cannot be given independent schools for economic reasons, and are, therefore attended for school facilities to bigger villages or urban areas within 'walking distance' of one mile from them. The deserted villages as per 1961 Census are also included in the population range 0-199.

9. Transport and Communications

In all 7 tables i.e. table nos. 55 to 61 are included in this Section.

The Table No.55 gives total railway length as at the end of 1968-69 and 1969-70 according to type of routes Broad Gauge, Meter Gauge and Narrow Gauge. The railway length is measured between the first and last stations within the district boundary. The figures of length of each type of route are, therefore, approximate and not accurate.

The table No.58 deals with operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport in Akola division. For this table the S.T. Division comprises Akola & Buldhana districts of Nagpur region.

The table no.59 presents the results of the traffic census on important roads conducted in Building and Communication Department, Government of Maharashtra. Data on the number of vehicles is according to categories and location of count-post. Type of surface and total traffic intensity in tons per 24 hours are also indicated in the table.

10. Local Bodies

In all 4 tables i.e. tables Nos.62 to 65 are included in this Section.

The table No.62 gives Abstract of income and expenditure of local bodies such as Village Panchayats Zilla Parishad and Municipalities for the financial years 1968-69 and 1969-70. The number of Village Panchayats includes number of independent village panchayats as well as group Village Panchayats.

11. Plan and Community Development

In all 5 tables i.e. tables Nos. 66 to 70 are included in this section.

12. Prices

Only 2 tables i.e. tables Nos.71 and 72 are included in this section.

The Table No.71 gives monthly average retail prices of various commodities at district headquarter Buldhara. The average prices under each commodity are shown from the month of January to December for the years 1968 and 1969 along with units and varieties of commodities for which prices have been quoted. The data are regularly collected by District Statistical Officer every week on Friday by visiting the selected shops. The average price of each commodity for the year is also shown in the table. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too only from one shop at District Headquarter, the average price for individual commodity cannot be said to be fully representative, but the data may prove useful as a broad indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time.

The table No.72 gives consumer price index numbers (revised series) for working class of Nagpur centre published by the office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay. Monthwise data for the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 commencing from April and also averages for the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 have been given in this table. The base year for calculating price index (new services) is 1960.

The Index Numbers of wholesale prices are issued by the Economic Advisor to the Government of India. The base year for the same is 1952-53. The method of construction of the index is given in the Appendix to Index Numbers of wholesale prices in India revised series (1956) issued by the office of the economic advisor to Government of India. The equivalent of old Index Numbers can be obtained by multiplying the new index by 5.22 as multiplier.

13. Miscellaneous

In all 12 tables i.e. Table Nos. 73 to 84 are included in this section.

The table No.76 gives talukawise Cinema Statistics for the years 1968-69 and 1969-70. Number of permanent, semi-permanent and touring theatres and their seating capacity per show has been indicated in the table.

Indicators of Development

In this chapter the progress of development covering the period of Third Five Year Plan and the Annual Plans - 1968-69 and 1969-70 has been reviewed by presenting tahsil-wise sectorial trends based on certain important indicators of development. Comparative tahsilwise figures, wherever available for 1960-61 and 1968-69 and 1969-70 as the case may be have also been presented to bring out the pace of development.

Indicator NO.1 : Percentage of gross sown area

The district accounted for a very low percentage of area sown more than once to the net area sown in Nagpur division as well as in Maharashtra during 1961-62, when it stood 22nd in Maharashtra and 7th in Nagpur division.

The following table shows the percentge of gross sown area to net ~~gross~~ sown areaⁱⁿ 1960-61 and 1968-69 in each taluka.

It is seen from the above table that the percentage of gross cropped area had increased from 102.57 in 1960-61 to 102.86 in 1968-69. The percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area in 1967-68 was however 104.00 percent. The percentage of double cropped area was highest in Chikhli taluka followed by Mehkar taluka. In other talukas the proportion was less than the district average. The proportion of double crops in Chikhli and Mehkar is higher as most of the cultivators grow mung, groundnut, hybrid jowar etc. in kharif season and then in rabi season crops like, wheat, safflower, vegetables etc. are grown. In Malkapur taluka though there are good facilities of irrigation crops like bananas, cotton etc. are grown in that tract and these crops cannot give the facility of double cropping. In Jalgaon and Khambhat talukas the proportion was less due to lack of irrigation facilities.

Indicator No.2 : Productivity of Important Crops

The productivity of crops depends upon equitable distribution of rains in the absence of adequate irrigation facilities concerned attempts have been made in the district to stimulate agricultural production during past and the agricultural production in the year 1968-69 has exceeded the production in 1960-61.

The following table gives the figures of out turn of important crops in the year 1960-61 & 1968-69.

It is seen from the above table that the out turn of all the Food crops except wheat and gram had increased in 1968-69 as compared to 1960-61. The increase in out turn was mainly due to the evenly distributed rains use of high yielding varieties pesticides etc. However the crops of wheat & gram were damaged due to unseasonal rains in the middle of december and beginning of January. The outturn of cotton and ground-nut had however decreased in 1968-69 as compared to 1960-61. The outturn of groundnut as the area under that fell - crop had considerably decreased in 1968-69 as compared to 1960-61.

Indicator No.3: Gross value of Agricultural production

As relevant price data required are not available, gross value of agricultural production could not be calculated.

Indicator No.4: Percentage of Irrigated Area

As far as the irrigation facilities are concerned the district is mainly dependent on well irrigation except the Nalganga project located in Malkapur tahsil. The project has about 8700 hectares area under command mainly in Malkapur tahsil. The district ranked 4th in 1964-65 in Vidarbha Region on the basis of the percentage of net irrigated area to net sown area.

The following table shows the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area sown in 1960-61 and 1968-69.

From the above table it is seen that the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area in 1960-61 was 101.15 whereas it fell to 100.00 as most of the area irrigated is under perennial crops or under rabi crops. The distribution of rain-fall in kharif season is generally suitable for the kharif crops and needs no irrigation and hence the proportion of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area remained unchanged.

From the above table it is seen that in all the tahsils except Mehkar the percentage of net irrigated area to net sown area had increased in 1968-69 as compared to the year 1960-61. The percentage of area irrigated was highest in Chikhli tahsil followed by Malkapur tahsil in 1968-69. The percentage of area irrigated was however below the district average in remaining tahsils.

Indicator No.5 : Changes in the Crop Pattern (Total & Irrigated)

The major crops in the district are jowar, cotton, & pulses in kharif season and wheat safflower and to some extent rabi jowar in rabi season. Cotton is the main non-food cash crop in the district which account nearly 34.5 percent. of the gross cropped area. The district had about 59.88 percent of its gross cropped area under food crops in 1968-69 which showed slight ^{/a increase of gives} 2.37 percent over 1960-61. It will be seen from the above table that area under food crops had increased from 57.51 in 1960-61 to 59.88 % in 1968-69.

The increase was observed in Jalgaon, Malkapur & Khangaon tahsils while this percentage decreased in ghat tahsils of Chikhli and Mehkar. The proportionate decrease or increase is observed in non-food crops also. The decrease in food crops in Chikhli & Mehkar tahsils is mainly due to increase in area under cotton and oil seeds.

From the above table it is seen that the percentage of area under irrigated food crops had fallen down from 92.1 in 1960.61 to 86-7 in 1968-69 and proportionately the area under non-food crops increased during the period under review. The percentage of irrigated area under food crops to total irrigated area had decreased mainly in Malkapur, Khangaon and Chikhli and the same had increased in Jalgaon and to some extent in Mehkar tahsil.

The increased area irrigated under non-food crops was mainly due to increase in area under cotton in most of the tahsils.

Indicator No.6: Increase in agricultural credit and outstanding dues

The co-operatives are becoming a major source of agricultural finance to meet the needs of short and long term credit of agriculturists. The following table shows tahsilwise number of primary agricultural societies and amount of loan advanced and loan outstanding in 1963-64 and 1969-70 respectively. Tahsilwise break-up of the data for 1960-61 and to 1962-63 are not however available.

From the above table it is seen that the total number of societies in 1969-70 had decreased by 7.2% as compared to the number of societies in 1963-64.

The total amount of loans advanced however increased by 36.4 percent in 1969-70 over the corresponding figure in 1963-64. The amount of loans outstanding had increased by 89.6 percent in 1969-70 as compared with the loans outstanding in 1963-64.

Indicator No.7: Agricultural Wage Rates

The agricultural wage rates are collected from selected cultivators from selected centres. viz. Dongaon, Deulghat and Asalgaon in Mehkar, Chikhli and Jalgaon - tahsils respectively. Generally the skilled workers like carpenters, black-smiths, cobblers etc. are not employed on daily wages and hence wage rates for these categories are not available. These wage rates are collected fortnightly. As these centres do not represent the district position very correctly these wage rates may be taken as a broad indicator of wage level in the district. The following table gives average wage rates at above selected centres for the year 1963-64 and 1968-69 as the work of collection of these wage rates was started from June 1963.

Indicator No.8: Live stock per hectare of cultivable land

The live stock per hectare of land decreased in all the tahsils in 1963-69 as compared to livestock per hectare of cultivable land in 1960-61.

Indicator No.9: Poultry as compared to population

in the Nagpur division in 1965-66. In all 277 villages &

It is seen that the per capita consumption of electricity in 1969-70 increased by 210.1 % over the corresponding consumption in 1961-62. The percapita consumption had increased mainly due increase in number of villages electrified upto 1969-70 over the year 1961-62. The per capita consumption had repidly increased in the consumption classified under 'other purposes' due to the increase in electrical pumps sets for agriculture. Industrial and domestic consumption had also shown ~~increase~~ remarkable ~~increase~~ ~~strixxx~~ as compared to other categories of consumption.

Indicator NO.11: Increase in the number of candidates ~~xxx~~ enrolled in Employment Exchange and vacancies notified.

Raising the level of per capita income is, no doubt, the basic abjective of economic development but not the only one. Among' other improtant goals the creation of adequate jobs to absorb existing unemployement and prospective additions to the labour force commanded a high priority in First Five Year Plan. The district has its Employment Exchange located at the district head quarter Buldana under the District Employment Officer.

It is seen from the above table that the registrations in 1969-70 increased by 30.4 percent while the vacancies notified have decreased by 32.0 percent. Indicator No.12: Increase in indoor and out-door patients treated in hospitals

The general aim of the health programme is to expand the existing health services to bring them within the reach of the people and to promote a progressive improvement in the level of natural health. The provision of adequate institutional facilities for organising health services, control of communicable diseases, family planning improvement of environmental hygiene comprising better sanitation and protected water supply, training facilities for medical and health personnel were some of the main health programmes implemented during the Annual Plan 1968-69 & 1969-70, taken up for improving the health standard.

The district ranked 5th in the division on the basis of the number of hospital beds per lakh of population in the year 1965. The following table gives number of indoor and out-door patients treated in each taluka of the district during 1960 and 1969 in the institutional facilities available there.

It is seen from the above table that the indoor patients treated in various public institutions had increased nearly 10 times in 1969 as compared to the year 1960. This is mainly due to the increased facilities for indoor patients in rural areas through primary health centres. Remarkable increase had also been observed in the number of indoor patients treated in T.B. sanatorium at Buldhana and Government Hospitals located at various tahsil places. However, there was a decrease of 4.6 percent in out-door patients treated during the year 1969 as compared to the year 1960.

Indicator No.13: Increase in the number of students in different categories

According to 1961 census 26.90% (Males 41.15%) and females 12.22% of the population of this district was literate as against 29.82% in Maharashtra and 27.38% in Vidarbha. In the district the compulsory primary education was governed by Primary Education Act. of 1950 and amended Act of 1956 of the Ex. M.P. Government. In 1965 compulsion was introduced in Vidarbha for age group under the Education Act of the Region. Due to this compulsion the number of schools and enrolment rose very rapidly in all tahsils. At the end of the year 1969-70 every village in the district was within the vicinity of a primary school or had a primary school in it. The following table gives the number of primary school going children during 1960-61 and 1968-69 in the district.

From the above table it is seen that the enrolment in secondary institutions had increased by 82.7 percent while that in higher institutions it had increased by 261.6 percent during the year 1968-69 as compared to the year 1960-61.

The increase of enrolment in case of girls was remarkable & higher as compared to the enrolment of boys which was mainly due to the expansion of facilities in rural areas as also due to change in out look in favour of female education.

Indicator No.14 : Increase in Road length per 100 square. Kilometre Kilometers

The Road Development Programme for the third Five year and the Annual Plans 1966-67 to 1969-70 has been formulated in accordance with the broad objectives laid down in the Nagpur Road Development plan 1961-81. The broad objectives of this plan were that no village in a developed and agricultural area should remain more than four miles away from a metalled road and more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from any type of road. The following table indicates road length per 100 sq.kms and per lakh of population in the district during 1960-61 and 1969-70.

Indicator No.15: Increase in Banking facilities in proportion to population

Since the nationalisation of the Banking Business the various banking companies had entered in the field of agricultural & Industrial development and are advancing loans to the agriculturists and small units of industries. The co-operative banks also had made a remarkable progress in expansion of their business in rural areas. There were 10 scheduled banks and 12 co-operative banks functioning in this district in 1960-61. At the end of the year 1968-69 the number of scheduled banks rose to 12 while there were 35 co-operative banks on 30.6.68 in the district. The following table gives the number of banks and population per banking office during the year 1960-61 and 1968-69.

The population covered by these places formed 24.5 percent of the district population.

Indicator No.16 - Prices

Since the declaration of the emergency in the country, price quotations for some important commodities from all district head quarters are collected on weekly basis. The price collection work was started since November 1962. The prices of different commodities are collected from selected shops and for selected varieties on each Friday and therefore do not fully represent the district position but data may still prove useful as a broad indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time in the district. From the above table it will be seen that prices of all the commodities except 'gur' had increased upto 1969 as compared to the prices in 1963.

The increase was remarkable in almost all the commodities and particularly in case of all food grains, edible oil, sugar, turmeric etc. The increase was highest in case of turmeric followed by sugar, rice etc. The price of sugar increased mainly due to decontrolling of the commodity in 1967. The same price trend was also observed in rural areas of the district during the reference period.

C H A P T E R - I VAnnual Plan 1968-70

The year 1969-70 marks the commencement of the fourth five year plan. The preceding year viz. 1968-69 was therefore the last year of intervening period started from the year 1966-67 onward when Annual Plans were implemented.

The programme included in Annual Plan 1968-69 keeps in view the need of lacking certain preliminary measures for the fourth Plan besides continuing the activities taken up in the two preceding Annual Plans. whereas the Annual Plan 1969-70 has been drawn-up keeping in view the broad policies and programmes contemplated for the fourth plan.

During the year 1969-70 an amount of Rs.178.01 lakhs was provided for this district out of which Rs.155.59 lakhs were utilised under different heads of development as against a provision of Rs.209.66 lakhs and an expenditure of Rs.218.26 lakhs incurred during the year 1968-69. The percentage of expenditure to the corresponding budget provision for the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 worked out to 104.10 and 37.40 respectively.

The table below gives the budget provisions and expenditures on district level plan schemes during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70.

It will be seen from the above table that during the Annual Plan 1969-70 as much as 40.35 percent of budget provision was allocated to Agricultural Programmes followed by 32.55 percent for Irrigation and Power, (Rural Electrification Programme), 13.96 percent for Transport and Communication 3.94 percent for social services, 4.02 percent for co-operation and C.D. programmes and remaining 0.18 percent on Rural Broad casting and Small Scale Industries. During the Annual Plan 1968-69 52.28 percent of budget provision was allocated to Agricultural Programme, followed by 19.46 percent for social services 11.31 percent for Transport and Communication, 8.11 percent for Irrigation and Power, 7.30 percent for co-operation and C.D. programmes and remaining 1.04 percent on Industries and Rural Broad casting .

An expenditure of Rs.155.59 lakhs was incurred during the years 1969-70 (Rs.100.45 lakhs incurred in state sector and Rs.55.14 lakhs expended in local sector) as against Rs.218.26 lakhs incurred in the year 1968-69 (Rs.135.78 lakhs expended in state sector and Rs.82.48 lakh incurred in local sector). The percentage of expenditure incurred against plan provision worked out to 64.56 for state sector and 35.44 for local sector in 1969-70 as against 62.21 percent for state sector and 37.71 percent for local sector in the year 1968-69.

I- Agricultural Programme

The accent on increasing agricultural production and strategy of enlarging the coverage under hybrid and high yielding varieties for increasing food production was also continued during the years under review.

The details of sub-headwise expenditure are given in table No.67.

1) Agricultural Production

During the year 1969-70 there were 7 schemes under implementation providing multiplication of improved seed, seed processing plant, development of manural resources, Horticultural development cotton development, training in agriculture and intensive cultivation programmes. Accordingly in all Rs.3.32 lakhs were expended during 1969-70 on these schemes and Rs.6.09 lakhs were expended on 15 various schemes under the sub-head during 1968-69.

2. Minor Irrigation

(52)

The programme formulated under this head comprised construction of new wells, installation of pumping sets, boring and blasting mainly of un-used wells and surface water flow irrigation schemes covered under minor irrigation works. Accordingly 193 wells, 32 pump sets were subsidised and construction of about 14 bundharas and tanks was taken up. Besides 7 boring and 10 blasting machines were functioning in this district in the year 1969-70. Similarly 481 wells and 611 pump sets were sanctioned. Work of 12 bundharas and renovation of 5 tanks was completed and 7 boring and 10 blasting machines were functioning in 1968-69.

3. Soil Conservation

An area of 24700 acres (9931 hectares) and 62242 acres (25152 hectares) was bunded in the district during 1969-70 and 1968-69 for which the total cost amounted to Rs.32.19 lakhs and Rs.25.05 lakhs respectively.

4. Ayacut Development Programme

To expedite utilisation of irrigation potential of Walganga project, one irrigation unit and trial cum-demonstration farm have been established in this district - besides the activities of land development such as levelling etc. for which an expenditure of Rs.1.87 lakhs and Rs.1.03 lakhs was incurred during the year 1969-70 and 1968-69 respectively.

5. Annual Husbandry

An emphasis on productive schemes rather than on curative and preventive services was laid & an amount of Rs.0.19 lakhs was expended on establishment of veterinary aid centres and for breeding centres and bull depots in 1969-70 & another amount of Rs.0.27 was provided in the year 1968-69.

6. Dairy Development

Only a small amount Rs.0.04 lakhs was provided for this purpose in the year 1968-69 and no amount was provided in the year 1968-70.

7- Forests

For ensuring optimum supply of forest produce, schemes of plantation of general utility timber, plantation of quick growing species, farm forestry and extension forestry and development of minor forest produce were taken up in the district. An amount of Rs.0.71 lakhs and Rs.0.39 lakhs was expended during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

8. Fisheries

The programme aimed at enlargement of the areas for inland fishing by systematic rearing of carp fry and fish breeding in tanks, reservoirs etc. Accordingly in all 302500 carp fry and 257500 carp fry were stocked in the year 1969-70 and 1968-69 respectively and the total fish catch amounting to 77331 kgs and is 30133 kg. during the year 1969-70 and 1968-69 respectively at a cost of Rs.0.04 and Rs.0.03 lakhs respectively in this regard.

9- Were housing and Marketing

For rendering financial assistance for existing agricultural marketing committees an amount of Rs.1.34 and Rs.0.51 lakhs was expended during the year 1969-70 and 1968-69 respectively.

II. Co-operation and Community Development

1) Co-operation

An amount of Rs.2.91 and Rs.1.96 lakhs was utilised mainly for releasing managerial subsidy, contribution towards share capital etc. So as to strengthen co-operative fold to shoulder more responsibilities.

2. Community Development

The programme aims at an intergrated advance in all spheres of village life. An amount of Rs.3.61 lakhs and Rs.5.89 lakhs was expended on C.D. projects during the year 1969-70 and 1968-69. So also Rs.2.83 lakhs and Rs.4.66 lakhs were spent on construction of drinking water wells under local Development Works Programme during the year under review. Further the programme of Applied Nutrition on which an amount of Rs.0.03 lakhs was spent in 1968-69 which was partially centrally sponsored programme till the end of 1968-69 and in the year 1969-70, this programme was fully centrally sponsored. In addition the rural works programme on which Rs.0.40 lakhs were expended during 1968-69, was included in additional state plan only and was then discontinued from 1969-70 on-wards.

III. Irrigation and Power

During the year 1969-70 and 1968-69 451 pump sets and 782 pump sets respectively have been energised & 6 villages & 51 villages respectively were electrified with a total expenditure of Rs.25.00 lakhs and Rs.20.77 lakhs.

IV. Industry and Mining- Small Scale Industries

The programme aimed at promoting the handicaps in the district. An amount of Rs.0.06 lakhs and Rs.0.69 lakhs was expended during the year 1969-70 and 1968-69 for this purpose.

V. Transport and CommunicationRoad Development

It is recognised that the road system should be well knitted in the context of the needs of rural as well as urban areas. In the year 1969-70 an amount of Rs.4.74 lakhs in state sector and Rs.17.71 lakhs in local sector respectively was expended on district roads. Similar amount Rs.1.17 lakhs and Rs.3.07 lakhs was expended in local sector on village roads and roads in hilly areas where as an amount Rs.5.42 lakhs in state sector and Rs.17.02 lakhs in local sector was expended on district roads in the year 1968-69 in addition to an expenditure of Rs.2.52 lakhs on village roads.

VI. Social Services

The various programmes included under major head of social services are mainly directed towards consolidation improvement and efficient maintenance of facilities already created.

1) General Education

(56)

Apart from expansion of educational facilities as a prerequisite for equality of opportunity, it is recognised to re-orient the present system of education so as to relate it to the life, needs and aspirations of the people. An amount of Rs.19.30 lakhs and Rs.4.66 lakhs was spent - during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively on various schemes of general education implemented mainly in local sector .

2) Technical Education

An amount of Rs.1.13 lakhs and Rs.4.91 lakhs was incurred on development of existing polytechnic at Khamgaon during the year 1969-70 and 1968-69 respectively.

3) Health and family Planning

The programme aimed at improvement of curative facilities, preventive measures and measures to control population growth. In the year 1968-69 an amount of Rs.1.49 lakhs was spent for small pox eradication, Rs.2.78 lakhs for malaria eradication, and Rs.1.49 lakhs for family planning besides an expenditure of Rs.0.01 lakhs for expanding facilities in Civil Hospital. This programme was fully centrally sponsored in the year 1969-70.

4) Water Supply and Drainage

Apart from the municipal water supply schemes at Deulgaon-Raja and Malkapur one scheme at Warwant Khanderao was in progress during both the years under report. Further the water supply schemes by way of simple and special measures were also under taken to provide protected water in rural areas.

For this an amount of Rs.3.60 lakhs and Rs.6.80 lakhs was utilised during the year 1969-70 and 1968-69 respectively.

H- Housing

Housing being one of the essential requirements of life, 30 houses were constructed during the year 1968-69 under village housing project scheme. Further an area of ~~Rx~~ 97.16 acres in 21 villages and 55 acres in 14 villages was made available for expansion of gaathan during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

6. Back ward Class welfare

Considering the weaknesses of backward classes, special provisions are made in the plan in addition to the general provisions for accelerating betterment of their social, educational and economic standards. Accordingly Rs.0.26 lakhs and Rs.0.86 lakhs have been expended on various schemes for attainment of above objects in the year 1969-70 and 1968-69 respectively.

7) Labour and Labour Welfare

For craftsmen training and apprenticeship scheme an amount of Rs.2.69 lakhs was expended during the year 1968-69. The entire provision of Rs.0.04 lakhs was reported to be unutilised during the year 1969-70.

3. Miscellaneous

An amount of Rs.0.21 lakhs and Rs.0.09 lakhs was expended on Rural Broad Casting scheme under which 81 and 170 radio sets were provided in villages during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.
