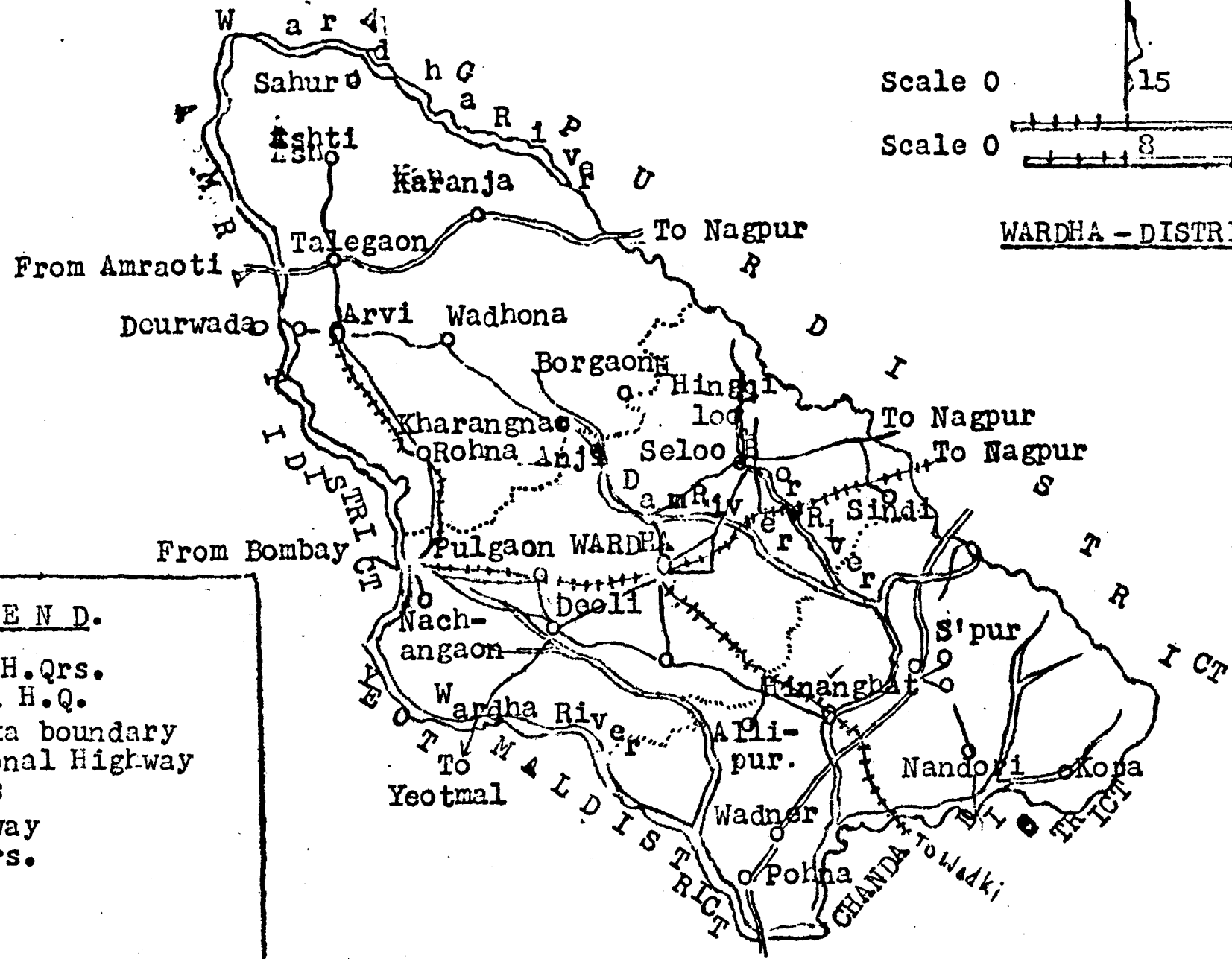

CHAPTER - I.  
INTRODUCTION.

PHYSICAL FEATURES :

1.1 LOCATION :-

Wardha district derives its name after the Wardha river which flows all along the western border of the district. Due to bifurcation of Nagpur district in the year 1862, the district was formed. The Wardha vally forms western Portion of the district consisting of a long strip of land, running from North-West to South-East of the district, occupies the Western portion of Nagpur plain and lies at the foot/satpura hills adjoining Amraoti district. It lies between 20°18' and 21°21' north latitude and 78°30' and 79°15' east longitude and is very narrow at the northern extremity and gradually enlarge its width towards South.

1.2 BOUNDARIES :-

The District is surrounded by four districts of Vidarbha with Nagpur district on the east, Chandda district on the South, Yeotmal district on the South-West and Amraoti district on the West, North-West and the North. The Wardha river seperates the district all along the Western border from Amraoti and Yeotmal districts.

1.3 ADMINISTRATIVE SET UP :-

The District is administratively divided into three Revenue Sub-divisions named Arvi, Wardha and Hinganghat each comprising of a taluka. The talukas are further sub-divided into 14 Revenue circles in the district which in turn area divided into groups of villages called 'Patwari Halka.' As such, village is the lowest unit in the administrative set up.

The district forms part of the Nagpur Division and is administered by the Collector. The Collector is in charge of general administration, law and order, treasury, Land revenue and civil supplies besides being the head of the office for the Revenue.

department. He is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector and other Deputy Collector in his office and three sub-divisional Officers of the rank of Dy. Collectors in charge of three revenue sub-divisions. He is also the District Magistrate and District Registrar. The Revenue circle and Patwari Halka, are in charge of Revenue Inspector and Patwari respectively.

ZILLA PARISHAD SET UP :-

With a view to promote development of democratic institutions and to secure greater measure of participation by the people in Development plans and in local and Governmental offices by democratic decentralisation of powers and functions, an autonomous body of Zilla Parishad at district level and seven Panchayat Samities at Block level, have been established on the 1st May, 1962 under the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samities Act of 1962. The Zilla Parishad covered 99.2 percent of entire rural area of the district and 76.3 percent of the total population of the district. Many statutory powers are vested in it and various functions of the State Government and those earlier performed by District Local Boards, Janpada Subhas, District Development sphere, have been transferred to the Zilla Parishad.

An elected president is the head of the Zilla Parishad comprising elected members. The elected Parishad forms six subject committees to deal with Finance, works, Agriculture, Cooperation, Education and Health.

An I.A.S. Officer works as the Chief Executive Officer in the Zilla Parishad. The Parishad is also assisted by various departmental officers of class I and Class II services under State Govt. They are heads of those departments at the district level. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as a Secretary of the Zilla Parishad.

At the Block level the Panchayat Samitis have selected Chairman and Deputy Chariman. The Block

Development Officers work as Secretaries of the Panchayat Samitis. The Panchayat Samiti consists of all elected and Coopted councillors from the areas of block and the chairmen of a Cooperative societies in the block area coopted members. Sarpanchas elected by members of Village Panchayats, are also elected members of Panchayat Samitis.

The executive authority for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act is vested in the Chief Executive Officer and the Block Development Officers.

At the village level, the Gram Panchayat is the elected body responsible for the developmental activities of the village. The Gram Panchayat elect Sarpancha and Deputy Sarpancha. The Gram Sewak, Assistant Gram Sahayak works as Secretary to the Gram Panchayat.

Besides, the Revenue Department and Zilla Parishad, the major departments of Government functioning in the district are cooperation, Buildings and Communications, Judiciary and Forest ect.

#### 1.4 A R E A :-

The area of the district is 2434 square miles (6304.1 K.Ms.) and its population according to 1961 census is 6,34,277. In terms of area and Population it constitutes 1.06 percent and 1.59 percent of area and population of Maharashtra excluding, of course greater Bombay. Its head quarters were first located at Kaottha a village near Pulgaon, but it was subsequently changed to the present site, at Palakwadi village subsequently named as Wardha after the name of the river 'the Wardha'. The maximum length of the district is about eighty miles. and its breadth at the Southern extrimity about 36 miles. There were no major changes in the boundaries of the district, on it's administrative divisions since 1911, though it formed a part of erstwhile states of Madhya Pradesh and bilingual state of Bombay. Due to states

Reorganisation since 1st May 1960, the district forms a part of Maharashtra.

#### 1.5 TOPOGRAPHY :-

Wardha district naturally divides itself into two parts. The northern part comprises hilly parts due to underlying spur of Satpura and covers a major portion of Arvi tahsil while on the South, lies undulating plain intersected by stream and broken here and there by isolated hills rising abruptly from its surface. It covers most of Wardha tahsil and the entire Hinganghat tahsil. No peak in the range exceeds 2,000 feet and the average height of their summits is not more than 1,300 to 1,400 feet above the level of the plain. The length of the hilly tract from North-West to South-East is 50 miles and its greatest width is less than 20 miles. It occupies about one fourth of the whole area of the district. The elevation of the plain country is between 700 and 950 feet. The slope of the district is from north-west to South-East.

#### 1.6 HILLS, RIVER SYSTEM AND SOIL :-

There is only one main system of hills, which is the offshoots of the Satpura ranges. The length of the hill from North-West to South-East is about 50 miles and its maximum width is 20 miles. The highest points in the district are the peaks of a Garansur (1976 feet.), Nandgaon (1760 feet) and Malegaon (1615 feet) in the hills of Arvi Tahsil. The trigonometrical survey stations is near Nachangaon (1227 feet) and that near Kelzar is 1132 feet.

#### RIVERS :-

The Wardha is the only important river of the district which rises from the Multai Plateau of the Satpura range and flows all along the northern and Western borders dividing the district from former Berar. The main tributaries of the Wardha are the Yashoda, the Wana and the Bankali. The other notable



rivers in the district are the Bhadadi, the Dham, the Bor and the Bothara. Although those rivers pose great threat and danger to the villages situated on their banks when they are in spate only in monsoon season, there is hardly any water in them in summer. Secondly the beds of these rivers are too deep to make them fit for canal irrigation. The river Bor is harnessed for irrigation purposes by construction a dam named 'Yeshwant Dharan.'

S O I L :-

To the South of a large number of villages around Anji and Hingani and slightly to the north of Nagar-Bombay Road, the country is hilly and the remaining parts of Wardha and Hinganghat tahsils are fertile plains with the exception of some low foot hills running along the northern boundary of Wardha tahsil and of few small hills in the South-East of Hinganghat tahsil. The level portion of the Arvi tahsil in the north, is the most fertile part of the district and consists of a strip of land lying between the hills and the Wardha river. The soil here is formed of the detritus brought down from the hills and is highly productive growing a singularly fine crop of cotton. The plains of Wardha and Hinganghat tahsils, are not so renewed for fertility but they are covered over most of the surface with a coating of fertile black or brown soil of varying depth above the basaltic rock. The black soil which covers the trap is believed to be formed by the denudation of basalt combined with the deposit of vegetable matters. The thickness of the soil in the district varies from 10 feet to a few inches, the average thickness being about 2 feet. The soil is generally found intermingled with calcareous tufa of 'Kankari'. The types of soil that are met with in the district are Kali I, Kali II, Morand and Khardi-Bhardi. The black soil occupies nearly 84 percent of the area of the district. The soils are mostly originated from Deccan trap. The Black soil contracts in summer and becomes fissure with rocks.

1.7 CLIMATE, TEMPERATURE AND RAINFALL:-

C L I M A T E:- The climate of the district is hot and dry and somewhat cooler than Nagpur. The days are hot and nights are cool. Both Summer and winter seasons are severe. The heat of the midday in summer is a little lesser than the hottest parts in India. The maximum temperature was 42.6 and 43.7 centigrade in the month of May , while the minimum temperature was 12.7 and 12.2 centigrade in Dec., during the year 1969 and 1970 respectively. The summer sets in roughly from the middle of February and continues up to the middle June or till Mansoon sets in. The winter usually starts from the middle of October and ends by middle of February though the nights in February continues to be quite cold.

An observatory was started in the month of June, 1966 at Wardha. The temperature record shows that the month of May is the hottest while January is considered to be the coldest month of the year.

Over the whole district the major supply of rain is from the South-West monsoon, which sets in about the middle of June, and lasts till the end of October. The rainfall data are recorded at the taluka head quarters of Wardha, Arvi and Hinganghat. During the wet season, the month of August usually has the greatest intensity of rains followed by July. During the year 1970 at all three centres of the district, named Arvi, Wardha and Hinganghat the rainfall was 1288.7, 1598.3 and 1393.4 M.Ms. respectively against moving normal rainfall of 1149.0, 1050.3, and 1152.7 M.Ms. respectively. From Taluka to taluka the average rainfall is more or less the same but is decreased as one proceeds from north to South.

EXPLANATORY NOTES ON THE SCOPE AND LIMITATIONS OF THE STATISTICAL DATA PRESENTED IN THE PART-II (STATISTICAL ABSTRACT.).

I. PURPOSE :- The abstract part of this publication gives exhaustive Statistical data on important Socio-Economic indicators of development Tables on almost all important topics are presented in this part, so that the publication could serve as a reference book. Taluka-wise data has been displayed as far as possible for inter taluka comparison. In most of the tables, data for 1970-71 have been indicated with data for 1969-70 or even for earlier years. In the tables wherein data for 1970-71 and 1969-70 could not be presented, the same for the latest two years, for which they were available, have been shown. In case of population(1961),

(1961) Livestock(1966) and Census of Government employees(1966), however, the data for latest census have been presented. All the data are collected from the state and central Government Offices, local bodies and other relevant agencies. The footnotes below each table indicate the source from which the data have been collected.

II. DISTRICT AT A GLANCE :-

This table presents a birds eye-view of the Socio-Economic indicators of development in Wardha district and Nagpur Division, under different heads, such as, area, population, agriculture, animal husbandry, education, transport and communication, plan and C.D. Programme, Local Bodies and other miscellaneous statistics. Reference year of the data is also indicated in the table.

III. COMMENTS SCOPE & LIMITATION :-

The Statistical tables presented in the District Statistical Abstract are grouped into 13 parts. The contents of the tables and the scopes and limitations of the data displayed under each group are explained below.

1. CLIMATE :-

Only two tables are included under this section pertaining to rainfall and temperature at the selected centres in Wardha district.

The table No.1 gives monthly rainfall and number of rainy days in each month at the selected centres for the year 1970. The data are collected through Revenue agency. A day is treated as a 'rainy day' during the 24 hours the rain gauge recorded a minimum of 2.55 M.M. of rainfall. Annual rainfall for each centre is also indicated in the table. "Normal rainfall" is the average rainfall over a period ranging from five to eighty years.

The table No.2 gives monthwise 'mean', 'mean maximum and 'mean minimum' and also annual temperature as recorded at selected centres for the year 1970. The data are supplied by the Government of India's Regional Meteorological centre at Nagpur. The mean maximum and mean minimum temperature denotes the average of the maximum and minimum temperature recorded daily during the month. The mean (average) temperature is the simple average of the mean maximum and mean minimum temperature.

2. AREA AND POPULATION :-

In all 6 tables i.e. tables Nos.3 to 8 are included in this section. Data for 1961 census are indicated in all the tables except table No.3 wherein data for both 1951 and 1961 census are shown as reference period of the 1961 census was sunrise of 1st March, 1961.

The table No.3 indicates sexwise rural and urban population enumerated in 1951 and 1961 census, along with variation in between the two census. The population figures for 1951 census shown in the table have been adjusted to cover the boundaries or areas of the district and talukas as they existed at the time of 1961 census. According to 1961 census, the term urban area as used in col.3 of the table was defined as under:--

A town or an urban area is defined as a place which has --

1. A municipality, a Cantonment or Civil lines or
2. (i) A population of 5,000 or over and  
(ii) At least 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in non-agricultural pursuits.

Table 3-4 indicates provisional, sexwise rural and urban population, literates and workers enumerated in the year 1971 census.

Table No. 4 gives talukawise classification of inhabited villages according to different population ranges. The term village (i.e. rural area) used in the table denotes a statutorily recognised village have a well defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, wadies or padas have, therefore, not been shown as separate villages. On the other hand, Statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as 'Uninhabited' villages. Villages also include forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families. Total population of the villages in each range is also indicated in the table.

The table No. 6 gives number of workers and non-workers in each taluka of Wardha district according to 1961 census, and they are classified according to standard livelihood classes. The population according to livelihood classes is also shown separately for rural and urban area and also for the district as a whole. The concept of dependency has been abandoned for economic classification at the 1961 census. Instead, the population is classified into workers and non-workers. The emphasis is now on work and not on income or economic dependence. A person is defined as worker if (a). In case of seasonal work like cultivation, livestock, dairying, household industry, etc., he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season and - (b) In the case of regular employment in any trade, a profession service, business or commerce, he was employed during any of the fifteen days preceeding the day of the enumerator's visit to the household.

Persons like beggars, pensioners, agricultural or non-agricultural royalty, rent or dividend receivers etc. who earn an income out who are not participating in any productive work, but who had not actually joined has been classified as a non-workers.

The table No.7 gives distribution of population according to (A) Age group (B) Mother tongue and (C) Religion, separately for Rural and Urban area and for the district as a whole. Here 'Mother tongue' is defined as a language spoken by the person's mother, to the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects have been included in the main languages on the basis of Grierson's classification.

The table No.8 gives talukawise details of scheduled caste and scheduled tribes separately for rural and urban area and also for the district as a whole.

The scheduled castes notified for this district are as follows :-

(1) Balani (2) Basar (3) Bhangi (4) Chamar (5) Dhor (6) Dom (7) Ganda (8) Kaikadi (9) Katia (10) Khatik (11) Madgi (12) Mahar and. (13) Mang (Mang Garudi)

The scheduled castes for which no one was returned in the district in 1961 are (1) Bahua, (ii) Ghasi and (3) Sansi.

Scheduled Tribes:- There are no scheduled Tribes for which any one was returned in the district in 1961.

### 3. AGRICULTURE :-

In all 11 tables i.e. table No.9 to 19 are included in this section.

The table No.9 indicates talukawise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of land uses for the year 1969-70. Against each taluka, the break-up for the total geographical area according to different types of land uses is shown. Major constituents of the Geographical area are forests, land put to non-agricultural uses, barren and uncultivable land, cultivable waste, permanent pastures, land under miscellaneous tree crops not included in area sown, current fallows, other fallows and lastly net area sown. Under 'Forests' are included

all actually forest areas of lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether state owned or private. If any portion of such land is not actually wooded but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land as the case may be. 'Land put to non-agricultural uses' stands for all lands, occupied by buildings, roads and railways or under water e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agriculture. 'Barren and unculturable land' covers all barren and unculturable land like mountains, deserts etc. Land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost, is classed as 'barren and un-culturable land' whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Culturable waste' includes all lands available for cultivation whether not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once but not cultivated during the current year and last five years, or more in succession. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or not assessed and may lie in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Permanent pastures' and other grazing lands cover all grazing lands, whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not. Village common and grazing lands within forest areas are included under this head 'Land under miscellaneous tree crops etc. not included in the net area sown' are included all cultivable land, which is not included under net area sown, but is put to some agricultural use. Land under casurina tree, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other for fuel etc. which are not included under 'orchards' are classed under the category. 'Current fallows' comprise cropped areas, which are kept fallow during the current year. 'Other fallow' land includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation, but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and more than five years. The 'Net area sown' consists of net area sown with crops and orchards, area sown more than once being counted only

of area under all crops. The difference between the total or gross cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once during the same year with the same or different crops.

The table No.16 gives the information on Major and Medium Projects in this district. Both complete projects have been covered in this table. Position in this table is as it was on 30th June 1971. The cost of Medium irrigation project ranges between Rs.20 lakhs to Rs.5 crores whereas that of a Major irrigation project, it is Rs.5/- crores and above.

Table No.17 deals with monthly agricultural wage rates in 1969 and 1970. This data is collected fortnightly throughout the year from three selected Rural centres viz. 1)Seloo, 2)Karanja, and 3)Samudrapur. Only one centre is selected from a taluka.

#### 4. ANIMAL HUSBANDRY AND FOREST :-

A.-ANIMAL HUSBANDRY:- In all 5 tables i.e. table Nos.20 to 24-B are included in this section.

Table No.20 gives talukawise number of various types of livestock and poultry as enumerated in the district in the Livestock Census, 1966. The Census is conducted throughout the country on an uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration once in 5 years. During the Livestock census operations, the livestock and poultry were enumerated by house to house enquiry. Particular care was taken to enumerate livestock in slaughter houses stray animals and animals in transit. Sex and age-groupwise classification of the livestock is also indicated in the table.

B.- FOREST:- The table No.24(A) gives details of area in different types of forests during the year 1970-71. Data regarding forests under the control of the state Government's Forest Department and those under the control of the State Government's Revenue Department are shown separately. The areas under forests are classified according to legal stauts into reserved forests, protected forests and unclassed forests.



The legal status refers to the classification of forests under the Indian Forests Act, XVI of 1927. Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber production wherein the rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid. Right of grazing or cultivation is allowed, but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassed forest refers to the inaccessible forest or unoccupied waste. The forests which are taken by Government from local bodies or private individuals for management on lease basis are called 'leased forests'. There is no classification of expropriatory forests as such but in Nagpur Division, some private lands containing valuable forest are taken over by Government under section 29 of the Indian forests Act, which are not yet classified as per tripartite classification and they are termed as expropriatory. The forest area shown in the Table No. 24(A) may not tally with the area under forest shown in table No. 9. The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons.

- (i) In the Indian Forest Statistics Returns, the whole area including non-wooden area under the control of Forest Department is taken as area under forests, while in Agricultural statistics, It is classified according to its actual utilisation
- (ii) The forest Department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose and indicate the ownership of the forest areas and the actual utilisation of these areas is not so important from the point of view of Forest Department, as it is in the land utilisation statistics under Agricultural statistics.
- (iii) The Forest Department returns relates to financial year and Agricultural Statistics relate to the Agricultural year.

5. EMPLOYMENT, INDUSTRY AND ELECTRICITY:-

In all 10 tables i.e. table No. 25 to 33 are included in this section.

The factory statistics shown in table No. 25, 26, 27 cover following types of factories registered under the Factories Act, 1948 :-

1) Those employing 10 or more workers working with the aid of power (Section 2 (i) ).

2) Those employing 20 or more workers and working without the aid of power (Section 2(ii)).

and (3) Those registered under section 85 of the Act, under which the state Government makes applicable the previous of the Act, even though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However, statistics of the Defence Factories are excluded.

The table No. 29 gives occupational distribution of total registration and placement in the employment exchange for the year 1970-71 according to standard National classification.

The table Nos. 31 present the results of the census Government employees as on 1-7-1966, conducted by the Bureau of Economics and Statistics, Bombay. The data presented in these tables are restricted to Class I, II, III, and IV employees of the State Government and do not cover any other category such as work-charged personal, Class IV employees paid from contingencies, daily rated workers, part-time workers or honorary workers. The distribution of employees according to specified basic pay/emoluments ranges is shown separately in respect of class I, II, III and IV employees.

The distribution of the employees according to monthly pay and emolument ranges is shown in table No. 31

#### 6. CO-OPERATION :-

In all 8 tables i.e. table No. 36 to 43 are included in this section.

The table No. 38 gives talukawise number of primary agricultural societies, their membership, share capital, Reserve and other funds, working capital, loans advanced and recovered, loans outstanding and overdues and percentage of recovery to total loan advanced for the year 1970-71. 'Working capital' includes paid up capital, deposits and borrowings. Loans outstanding include outstandings in respect of loans, cash credits and overdrafts and the amount of outstanding bills purchased or discounted. 'Overdues' refer to amount of loan or instalments which were due for collection

but which were not actually collected and for the repayment of which no extension has been granted by a competent authority.

The table No.43 gives talukawise number of registered money lenders in each taluka and loans advanced by them during 1970-71. Separately figures of loans advanced to traders and non-Traders have been furnished in the table. The transactions of money lending in the state are regulated under the provisions of Bombay Money Lenders Act, 1946. According to the Act, no money lender shall carry on the business of money lending except in the area for which he has been granted a licence, and except in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence.

#### 7. MEDICAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH :-

In all 4 tables i.e. tables Nos.44 to 47/<sup>are</sup> included in this section.

The table No.44 given in this section indicates talukawise number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, Health centres and Primary Health centres, doctors, nurses, vaidyas, beds and total number of indoor and outdoor patients treated as well/<sup>as</sup> for the year 1970. The table covers all the State and Central Government medical institutions, and also institutions owned by municipalities and local bodies engaged in providing medical facilities. Private clinics run by private bodies or individuals are, however, not included in the table.

The table No.45 gives vital statistics such as number of registered births and deaths in this district. Sexwise classification births, deaths and infant deaths for 1970 is not completely available, for each taluka and hence the total under each category is given in the table for that year.

#### 8. E D U C A T I O N :-

In all 8 tables i.e. Table Nos.48 to 55 are included in this section.

The table No.48 gives sexwise number of literates and percentage of literacy separately for rural

and urban areas of each taluka according to 1961 population census. As per 1961 census definition, a person was classified as a literate if he was able to read or write a simple letter in any language.

The table No.51 gives information regarding number of education institutions according to types for the 1970-71. Sexwise enrolment and number of trained and untrained teachers in these institutions is also indicated in this table. The classification of institutions according to 'type' is slightly different from stage of education. There are at present many Secondary schools, which also impart education in primary course. Nevertheless, the entire enrollment of students is included under 'Secondary education. Primary institutions provided education for standards I to IV or standards I to VII/VIII or less and teaches the curriculum approved by the Education Department. The Secondary institutions coach students for standard VIII, to X or XI/XII with or without lower standards. Higher education is education after passing Secondary school Certificate Examination, which leads to a Degree examination.

The table No.52 presents data on the number of beneficiaries among backward classes such as Scheduled caste, Scheduled Tribes and other backward classes for the year 1970-71. Beneficiaries for this table are persons who are getting educational concessions of either type such as scholarships, freeships etc.

The No.55 gives number of villages without primary school or schooling facilities according to population ranges at the end of the year 1970-71. Villages with schooling facilities include smaller villages (generally below population of 300 persons), which cannot be given independent school for economic reasons, and are, therefore, attended for school facilities to bigger villages or Urban areas within 'walking distance' of one mile from them. The deserted villages as per 1961 census are also included in the population ranges 0-199.

9. TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS:-

In all 7 tables i.e. table No.56 to 62 are included in this section.

The table No.56 gives total railway length as at the end of 1970-71 according to type of routes Broad Gauge, Metre Gauge and Narrow Gauge. The information is compiled from the railway time table. The railway length is measured between the first and last stations within the district boundary. The figures of length of each type of route, are therefore, approximate and not accurate.

The table No.59 deals with operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport in Nagpur division. For this table the S.T. Division comprises (1) Nagpur (2) Bhandara (3) Wardha and (4) Chanda districts of Nagpur Region.

The table No.60 presents the results of the traffic census on important roads conducted in Building and communication Department, Government of Maharashtra. Data on the number of vehicles is according to categories and location of count post. Type of surface and total traffic intensity in tons per 24 hours are also indicated in the table.

10. LOCAL BODIES :-

In all 4 tables i.e. tables Nos.63 to 66 are included in this section.

The table No.63 gives abstract of income and expenditure of local bodies such as village Panchayats Zilla Parishad and Municipalities for the financial year 1970-71. The number of village Panchayats includes number of independent village panchayats as well as group village Panchayats.

11. PLAN AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT:-

In all 5 tables i.e. tables Nos.67 to 71 are included in this section.

12. P R I C E S:-

Only 2 tables i.e. tables No.72 to 73 are included in this section.

The table No.72 gives monthly average retail prices of various commodities at district headquarter Wardha. The average prices under each commodity are shown from the month of January to December for the year 1970 along with units and varieties of commodities for which prices have been quoted. The data are regularly collected by District Statistical Officer every week on Friday by visiting the selected shops. The average price of each commodity for the years is also shown in the table. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too only from one shop at District Headquarter, the average price for individual commodity cannot be said to be fully representative, but the data may prove useful as a broad indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time.

The table No.73 gives consumer price index numbers(revised series) for working class of Nagpur centre published by the office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay. Monthwise data for the year 1970-71 commencing from April and also average for the year 1970-71 have been given in this table. The base year for calculating price index(new series) is 1960. The Index Number of wholesale prices are issued by the Economic Adviser to the Government of India. The base year for the same is 1952-53. The method of construction of the index is given in the Appendix to Index Numbers of wholesale prices in India Revised series(1956) issued by the Office of the Economic Advisor to Government of India. The equivalent of old Index Numbers can be obtained by multiplying the new index by 5.22 as Multiplier.

### 13. MISCELLANEOUS :-

In all 12 tables i.e. Table Nos.74 to 85 are included in this section:

The table No.77 gives talukawise Cinema statistics for the year 1971 number of permanent, semi-permanent and touring theatres and their seating capacity per show has been indicated in the table No.85 indicates the important indicators of Government.

CHAPTER-III.

In this chapter the progress of development covering the period of third five year plan and fifth year of annual plan has been reviewed by presenting/ talukawise trends based on certain important indicators of development with available talukawise figures to bring out pace of development.

INDICATOR NO. 1:-

PERCENTAGE OF GROSS SOWN AREA:-

Agriculture has been the mainstay of district economy in-as-much as 72 percent of its population is dependant on it for its livelihood. At the end of the year 1969-70 gross sown area in the district was 19.35 percent of the total geographical area. The district accounted for 1.51 percentage of area sown more than once to net area sown. Following table gives the percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area.

The above table indicates that during the year 1969-70 the percentage of gross sown area to net sown area in the district had increased to 101.51 percent from 100.84 percent in 1960-61. Similar trends of percentage increase of gross sown area to net sown area is seen in all the tahsils and proportion of double cropped area was lowest in Hinganghat and highest in Arvi Tahsil in 1969-70.

INDICATOR NO.2 :-

PERCENTAGE OF PRODUCTIVITY OF IMPORTANT CROPS:-

The productivity of land in the district is however, low due to various factors such as meagre irrigation facilities, inadequate and uneven rainfall, large scale soil erosion and uneconomic size of the average holding. As in the past, productivity of important crops had been assigned highest priority under the programmes of agricultural production. Accordingly, the programmes for the multiplication of improved seed, use of fertilizers, irrigation, soil conservation etc. were implemented to yield the utmost benefits within a shortest time. Following table gives the productivity of important crops in the district for the year 1969-70 as compared with the corresponding position in the year 1960-61 which was supposed to be an exceptionally good year.

The above table shows that over all productivity of food grains had decreased by 22.35 percent in 1969-70 as compared to the year 1960-61 mainly due to sizable decrease in the production of pulses by 61.24 percent during that period.

Among non food crops, the productivity of ground nut, Linseed and Cotton had decreased by 0.62 percent, 1.98 percent and 18.62 percent respectively in the year 1969-1970 in comparison with the year 1960-61.

INDICATOR NO.3:-

GROSS VALUE OF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION :-

As relevant price data required are not available, the gross value of agricultural production could not be calculated.

INDICATOR NO.4:-

(a) PERCENTAGE OF IRRIGATED AREA :-

Wells are the major source of irrigation in the district. Following table shows the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area for the year 1969-70 as compared with the corresponding position in the year 1960-61 of the district.

The above table indicates that the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area for the district had decreased to 100.00 percent in the year 1969-70 from 114.75 percent in the year 1960-61 since no double irrigation was done in the year 1969-70.

(b) PERCENTAGE OF NET IRRIGATED AREA TO NET SOWN AREA:-

Since there are no perennial rivers in the district, the irrigation facilities in rabi season mainly depend upon the availability of water in the wells. The following tables shows the percentage of net irrigated area to net sown area.

The above table indicates that the percentage of net irrigated area to net sown area had increased from 1.22 percent in the year 1960-61 to 2.12 percent in the year 69-70. Arvi tahsil had the highest percentage of the net irrigated area to net sown area in 1969-70 where as it was lowest in Hinganghat tahsil in that year as compared to the year 1960-61.

INDICATOR NO.5:-

There had been no changes in the cropping pattern of the district except shifting of acreage in area under some crop due to rotation of crops. Following table shows the percentage of area under food and non-food crops to gross cropped area in each tahsil of the district during the year 60-61 and 1969-70.

The above table indicates that during the period of ten years, the percentage of area under food crops to gross cropped area had decreased from 58.43 in 1960-61 to 54.18 percent in the year 1969-70. Whereas the percentage of area under non-food crops to gross cropped area had increased to 45.82 in the year 1969-70 from 41.57 in 1960-61 due to growing tendency of agriculturists to grow more and more cash crops since cotton is the important cash crop in the district.

During the year 1969-70, the percentage of irrigated area by wells to the total gross area irrigated in the district was 92.22 percent. The following table shows the percentages of irrigated area under food and non-food crops to gross irrigated area of the district for the year 1960-61 and 1969-70

Total above table indicates that the percentage of irrigated area of food crops to gross irrigated area of the district had decreased from 94.02 in 1960-61 to 89.64 in the year 1969-70. Similar decreasing trend was observed in all the tahsils in the district. Whereas the percentage of area irrigated under non-food crops had increased from 5.98 in 1960-61 to 10.36 in the year 1969-70. The percentage of irrigated area under food crops was lowest in Wardha tahsil and it was lowest in Arvi tahsil in 1969-70 in so far as the percentage of non-food crops in concerned.

INDICATOR NO. 6:-

INCREASE IN AGRICULTURE CREDIT OUTSTANDING DUES AND GROSS VALUE OF AGRICULTURE PRODUCT.

Agricultural credit is the most crucial input which enables the farmer to go in for other important inputs like fertilisers, high quality of improved variety of seed and improved implements and help him to raise higher yields from his land. Following table gives percentage increase in agriculture credit and outstanding dues during the year 1963-64 as base year since data for the year 1960-61 is not available and for the year 1970-71.

The above table indicates that the amount of loan advanced had increased by 157.84 percent for the district during the year 1970-71 over the year 1963-64 and this percentage was highest in Hinganghat tahsil and lowest in Wardha tahsil. Similarly the percentage increase in outstanding dues increased by 244.30 for the district in the year 1970-71 over the year 1963-64. This percentage was highest in Hinganghat Tahsil and lowest in Wardha tahsil.

It is seen that the number of poultry birds per persons in 1961 worked out to 0.22 and it is decreased to 0.18 in 1966. This decrease was highest in Hinganghat tahsil in 1966 over 1961 whereas it was lowest in Arvi tahsil. According to 1961 livestock data, it was estimated that the number of poultry birds per hundred households was 97.94 (96.74 fowls and 0.13 ducks) as against 129.01 (137.61 fowls and 0.22 ducks) per hundred household in Vidarbha and 137.40 (136.47 fowls and 0.35 ducks) per hundred household in Maharashtra.

Similarly it was estimated that during 1961 census there were 0.75 percent of improved fowls to total number of fowls in the district as against 1.07 percent in Vidarbha and 1.69 percent in Maharashtra. It was estimated that during 1961 each hen fetched 71 eggs per year in the district as against 61 in Vidarbha and 84 in Maharashtra.

PER CAPITA CONSUMPTION OF ELECTRICITY:-

A high priority is given to the power development programme in view of the importance of power in the economic development in the State. It will be seen from the above that the road length in the district increased by 109.43 percent in the year 1970-71 as compared to the position in 1960-61. The percentage increase in road length relating to National Highway and State Highway and Major District roads was of 47.68, 52.04 and 126.28 respectively in the year 1970-71 over the year 1960-61. However percentage increase in road length of other District Roads and village Roads in 1970-71 was of 107.61 and 440.09 over the year 1960-61.

It will be seen that there were in all 15 (9 scheduled banks and 6 cooperative banks) banking offices in the district in 1961 and during 1970 the number of banking offices increased to 25 (14 scheduled banks and 11 cooperative banks) offices denoting thereby an increase of 66.66 percent in 1970 over 1961. This percentage increase was highest in Wardha tahsil, and lowest in Arvi tahsil.

INDICATOR NO.16:-

Since the declaration of emergency in the country, price quotations for some important commodities from district headquarters, are collected on every Thursday since November 1962. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too from only one shop in the district headquarter, the average of monthly prices for individual Commodities cannot be said to be fully representative but the data may still prove useful as a broad indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time in the district.

It will be seen from the above table that there is an upward trend in the prices of all commodities in the year 1970 in comparison with the prices in 1962. The prices of wheat medium and Coarse had increased by 98.21 percent and 98.11 percent respectively over the corresponding prices of the year 1962. The percentage increase in average prices of Bajara and Gram(Whole) was 75.00 and 122.44 respectively over the year 1962. Similarly the prices of Gram Dal and Arhar Dal had increased by 122.41 percent and 119.74 percent respectively in the year 1970 as compared to the year 1962.

The average prices of sugar sold at fair price shops had increased by 39.17 percent in the year 1970 over the year 1962. Gur being substitute of Sugar its price had also increased by 36.36 percent. The average prices of Groundnut oil, Dalda (Vanaspati), Turmeric, Dry chillies and Tea leaf had increased by 109.31 percent, 69.90 percent, 134.00 percent, 134.00 percent and 17.19 percent respectively during the year 1970 over the corresponding prices prevailing in the year 1962.

The average prices of Dhoti, Sari and Shirting cloth, had increased by 55.78 percent, 24.32 percent and 138.52 percent respectively at the end of the year 1970 over the year 1962 mostly due to substitute varieties selected sometimes for price collection as original varieties gone out of market become unpopular, therefore, not marketed.



It will also be seen from the above table that the average prices of Brass, Washing Soap, Supari and Cigarettes had increased by 139.94 percent, 80.00 percent 35.45 percent 90.32 percent respectively in the year 1970 over the corresponding prices of the year 1962.

CHAPTER IV,  
ANNUAL PLAN.

The State Annual Plan was formulated as an integral part of National Plan keeping in view the main objections of the long term plan and the limited resources that would be available for that year. During Annual Plan 1970-71, the total expenditure on the district level plan schemes implemented in the district amounted to Rs.7,949 thousands being 89.29 percent of the outlay of Rs.8,902 thousands. Out of the total expenditure incurred during Annual Plan 1970-71, 53.79 percent and 46.21 percent of expenditure was incurred in State and Local sector respectively.

The Outlay and expenditure under different heads of development during 1970-71 in State and Local Sector are given below:-

I-AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMME:-

The programmes of agricultural development have aimed at increasing the area under cultivation and improving agricultural productivity through variety of ....

schemes. Besides the above, the development programme, animal husbandry, dairy, forests, fisheries, warehousing and marketing and ayacut development were also included as other agricultural programmes, under the head agricultural programme an expenditure of 45.47 percent of the total expenditure was incurred during the year 1970-71. Out of the total expenditure under this programme 63.47 percent and 36.53 percent was incurred in State and Local sector respectively.

The allocation and expenditure under different sub-heads of developments during the year 1970-71 under State and Local Sector are enumerated below.

1. AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION:-

Out of the outlay of Rs. 256 thousands, expenditure of Rs. 201 thousands was incurred forming 78.52 percent of the outlay including both sectors during the year 1970-71 under schemes of improved seed expenditure of Rs. 35 thousands was incurred against an outlay of

Rs.51 thousands. Under the schemes of manures and fertilizers, 15539 tonnes town compost prepared, 515 compost pits dug, 29 quintals sann seed distributed and 45 demonstration plots were laid, during the year 1970-71. The additional area covered by fruits was 1528 acres during the year 1970-71 for which loans of Rs.128 thousands were distributed. The remaining work of Agriculture school Selseora was completed during the year 1970-71 by incurring an expenditure of Rs.19 thousands.

## 2. LAND DEVELOPMENT :-

Under the sub-head land development on the scheme of workshop for maintenance and distribution of improved implements an expenditure of Rs.75 thousands forming 100 percent of the provision of Rs.75 thousand has been incurred. During the year 1970-71 new schemes named scheme for small holders was introduced in the district. Under this scheme expenditure of Rs.470 thousands was incurred against the provision of Rs.700 thousands.

## 3. SOIL CONSERVATION:-

During the year 1970-71, Soil and moisture conservation by contour bunding was done in the district by construction of bunds on cultivators land in an area of 13991 acres at a cost of Rs.750 thousands. During the year 1970-71 an expenditure of Rs.39-thousands was also incurred on afforestation for soil conservation on 55 hectares of land.

## 4. MINOR IRRIGATION :-

The programme for construction of new wells was closely linked with the programme for soil and water conservation through contour bunding. Both these programmes as also the programmes for installation of pumping sets and erection of minor irrigation works were stopped up. During the year 1970-71, subsidy for 100 new wells constructed for irrigation purposes was adjusted and 41 wells equipped with pumping sets. Out of the expenditure of Rs.1234 thousands incurred under this sub-head of development, 50.17 percent and 49.83 percent of expenditure

was under state and local sector respectively.

5. ANIMAL HUSBANDRY:-

Only one scheme named grant of poultry loans for poultry industry was implemented under this sub-head of development. Under this scheme loan of Rs. 13 thousand was distributed to 8 landless labourers for poultry development.

6. DAIRY DEVELOPMENT:-

Under this sub-head of development financial assistance of Rs. one thousand only was given to one cooperative milk union and federation.

7. FORESTS :-

Out of the total allotment of Rs. 99 thousand an expenditure of Rs. 92 thousands was incurred under this sub-head which formed 92.93 percent of the outlay with in the year 1970-71. Plantations on 56 hectares of land was completed, forest road of one K.M. was constructed and 4 wells were completed under the scheme forest Labourers welfare during the year 1970-71.

8. FISHERIES :-

During the year 1970-71, an expenditure of Rs. 9 thousands was incurred against an outlay of Rs. 5 thousands. During the year 1970-71, 708 thousands of fingerlings were stocked and 863 quintals of fish were netted and loan of Rs. one thousand was granted to fishermen.

9. WARE HOUSING AND MARKETING :-

Out of total outlay of Rs. 34 thousands, no expenditure was incurred under this sub-head since no society was eligible for assistance.

10. AYACUT DEVELOPMENT :-

Ayacut Development programme was specially given to this district. Two staff schemes of the third five year plan have been continued during the year 1970-71, viz continuance of irrigation unit and sub-divisional offices for Bor Project, and establishment of trial-cum-demonstration farm of Seloo. During the year 1970-71,

an expenditure of Rs.728 thousands, forming 99.32 per- cent of the outlay of Rs.733 thousands was incurred. During the year 1970-71, 1201 hectares of land was brought under irrigation under this programme.

## II. COOPERATION AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT:-

### 1. COOPERATION:-

During the year 1970-71, an expenditure of Rs.41 thousands was incurred forming 23.43 percent of the outlay of Rs.175 thousands under the sub-head Cooperation for various programmes. Subsidy of Rs.three thousands to two new branches of central Financing Ag- encies was granted and Rs.29 thousands were contributed to marketing societies during the year 1970-71. Share capital contribution to Cooperative farming societies subsidy to consumers stores and financial assistance to one labour contract society was granted during the year 1970-71.

### 2. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT:-

Community Development programme was conce- ived as an effective machinery for an all out rural recon- struction with a view to promote better living for all sections of the country. During the year 1970-71 an expenditure of Rs.439 thousands forming 105.02 percent of the outlay of Rs.418 thousands under this sub head was incurred in all the seven post stage II blocks of 8.5 C.P.A. pattern in the district.

## III.- INDUSTRY AND MINING :-

Under this head of development, an expen- diture of Rs.58 thousands, was incurred forming 69.73 percent of the outlay of Rs.83 thousands during the year 1970-71. During the year under report spare capital contributions, to two cooperatives of handicraft workers, of Rs.29 thousands was granted. For the development of handloom industry, rebate to five handloom societies, subsidy and loans for tools and equipments to two soci- eties and interest subsidy to two cooperative societies was paid for which an expenditure of Rs.26 thousands was incurred.

IV- TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS:-

Since Wardha district was specially selected for integrated planning, the road programme was taken up on high priority basis. During the year 1970-71 an expenditure of Rs.1718 thousands was incurred forming 89.66 percent against an outlay of Rs.1916 thousands. The percent of expenditure under state and local sector was 55.35 percent and 44.65 percent respectively. During the year 1970-71, new roads of 26 Kilometers were constructed and roads of 8 Kilometers were modernised.

V- SOCIAL SERVICES :-

During the year 1970-71, an expenditure of Rs.1989 thousands forming 89.91 percent of the outlay of Rs.22 thousands under this head of development was incurred. Out of the total expenditure, Rs.785 thousands in State sector and Rs.1204 thousands in Local sector was incurred which works out to 39.47 percent and 60.53 percent respectively.

Under the sub head general education an expenditure of Rs.824 thousands was incurred. During the year 1970-71, 28 schools were aided, scholarships to 47 students in secondary schools were granted, and educational concessions to 7460 students of economically backward class were paid the expenditure incurred, on water supply, housing, backward class welfare, social welfare, and labour welfare schemes was of Rs.912 thousands, Rs.108 thousands, Rs.53 thousands, Rs.64 thousands and Rs.28 thousand respectively.

The works of Hinganghat, Wardha and Deoli water supply schemes were nearly completed. During the year 1970-71, 109 new drinking water wells were constructed and two villages were benefited under the rural pipe water supply scheme. Three houses were built under the scheme of village housing project.

VI.- OTHER PROGRAMMES :-

Under this head of development an expenditure of Rs.90 thousands was incurred and radio listening sets to 50 villages were provided, during the year 1970-71.
