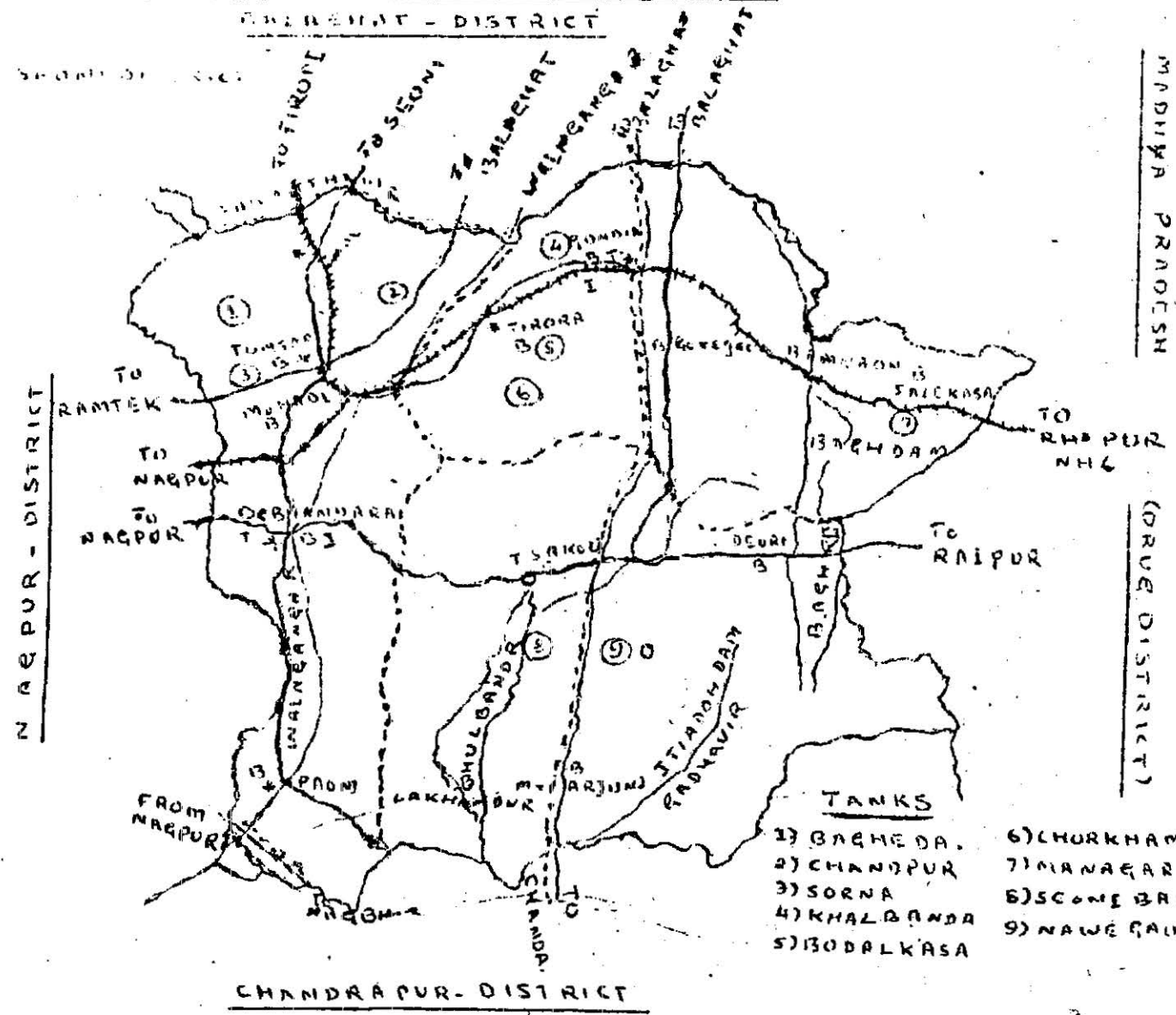
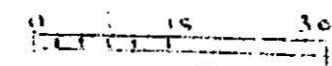

CHAPTER - II N T R O D U C T I O NPHYSICAL FEATURES1.1 LOCATION :

Bhandara district derives its name from the town Bhandara which has its origin in the term 'Bhanara' a place where metal utensils are manufactured on large scale. The district was under regency administration from 1818 to 1830 and the area became British territory in 1853. The head quarters of the district were brought from Lanji to Bhandara in 1820-21. The district is situated in the Wainganga basin. It lies between $20^{\circ}39'$ and $21^{\circ}27'$ North latitude and between $79^{\circ}27'$ and $80^{\circ}42'$ East longitude.

1.2 BOUNDARIES :

In the north, the district is surrounded by Balaghat and Chindwada district of Madhya Pradesh and in the east, Drug district of Madhya Pradesh. Chanda district is in the south and Nagpur district in the west. The Wainganga and Bawanthadi rivers, provide natural boundaries for the district in its major northern part. The Wainganga serves as a natural boundary between Bhandara and Nagpur district in south west and Chanda district in south.

1.3 ADMINISTRATIVE SET-UP :

The district is administratively divided into three Revenue sub-divisions named Bhandara, Gondia and

and Sakoli each comprising of taluka. The talukas are further subdivided in to 15 Revenue Inspector circles which in turn are divided in-to groups of villages called 'Patwari Halka'. As such, village is the lowest unit in the administrative set up. The district forms part of the Nagpur Division and is administered by the Collector. The Collector is in-charge of General Administration, law and order, Land Revenue and Civil Supplies besides being the head of the office in the district for the Revenue department. He is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector and other functional Deputy Collectors in his office and three Deputy Collectors to work as sub-Divisional officers in-charge of three revenue sub-divisions. He is also the District Magistrate and District Registrar. The Revenue circle and patwari Halka are in the charge of Revenue Inspector and Patwari respectively.

ZILLA PARISHAD SET -UP

With a view to promote development of democratic institutions and to secure greater measure of participation by the people in Development plan and in local and Governmental offices by democratic decentralisation of powers and functions, autonomous body of Zilla Parishad at district level and thirteen panchayat Samities at Block level, have been established on the 1st May, 1962 under the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samities Act of 1962. The Zilla Parishad covered 99.3 percent of entire rural area of the district.

An elected president is the Head of the Zilla Parishad comprising of elected members. The Parishad forms six subject committees to deal with the

subjects viz. Finance, works, Agriculture & Co-operation, Education, health and Social welfare.

The chief Executive officer in the Zilla Parishad is the Executive Head. He is assisted by various departmental officers of class I and class-II services under State Govt. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as a Secretary of the Zilla Parishad.

At the Block Level the Panchayat Samities have elected Chairman and Deputy Chairman. The Block Development Officers work as Secretaries of the Panchayat Samities. The Panchayat samiti consists of all elected and co-opted councillors from the areas of block and the chairmen of a cooperative societies in the block area co-opted members. Sarpanchas elected by members of village panchayats, are also elected members of panchayat samities.

The executive authority for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samities Act is vested in the chief Executive Officer and the Block Development Officers.

1.4-AREA

Bhandara district stretches over area of 9280 sq. K.Ms. and its population according to 1971 census is 15,85,530. In terms of area and population, it constitutes 3.01 and 3.14 percent of area and population of Maharashtra excluding of course Greater Bombay. Length of the district in East-west extension is 129 Kms. and its breadth in north-south extension is 109 Kms. There were no major changes in the boundaries of the district and its talukas or its administrative divisions since 1911. In 1971, 11 villages of Nagpur district were

transferred to Bhandara district. Due to administrative re-
-sation since 1st May, 1960 the district forms part of
Maharashtra.

1.5 - TOPOGRAPHY

According to topography, the district can
be conveniently divided in to 4 natural divisions as
under:-

i) The hilly region of Chimukh and Ambajhad hills:- This
region located in the central part of the district to
northern side up to district boundary consists of about
1/3 area of Bhandara tahsil. It has comparatively lower
density of population.

ii) The Hilly region of Sakhuri and Pratapgad hills:-
This region comprises of eastern portion
of Gondia tahsil and major portion of Sakoli tahsil. This
region is hilly and has extensive forests.

iii) The basin of the Wainanga river:-
This region consists of western portion
of Gondia tahsil, Southern portion of Bhandara tahsil and
western portion of Sakoli tahsil. Soils in this area are
very fertile.

iv) The basin of the Bagh and Pangoli rivers:-
This portion consists of the eastern
portion of Gondia tahsil. Rainfall in this part is
comparatively very heavy.

1.6 HILLS, RIVER SYSTEM AND SOIL

(1) Hills :- There are only a few isolated
hill ranges in the district. In the extreme north of the
district there is 'Ambagad' hill range which is an

offshoot of the Satpuras. It enters the district from the west and after winding up its course in the north-easterly direction cuts up the Bawanthadi valley from the rest of the district. In front of it, looking across the valley which pierces the range is the remarkable balastic precipice with a sheer drop of the some hundred feet. In the centre of the district running from the east of Bhandara town to Gonlia town is the Gaikhuri range, a cluster of low peaks, surrounded by irregular forest country. The points of khura (2009'), Lendezari (1490') and Jamni (1712) are mentionable peaks for their elevation. The range divides the valley of the Wainganga and Bagh rivers. Just west of Bhandara is the Ballahi range consisting of a few sand stone hills capped with granite and overhanging the eastern road forms a prominent feature in the landscape. Lastly in the Southeast lie the Nawegaon or Pratapgarh hills, the highest part of the district.

(2) Rivers:- a) As already stated the district falls in the Wainganga basin. The Wainganga river which is an important tributary of the Godawari and the biggest river of the district controls entirely its drainage system. The wainganga enters the district from the north-east corner and flows diagonally across it until it passes within a mile of Bhandara town on the west. Then it winds its course in the south and forms natural boundary for a short distance between Nagpur and Bhandara district. Out of her total length of 576 Kms., it covers 208 Kms. of its length through Bhandara district. It then changes its course and flows to south-east direction to enter Chandrapur district.

(b) The Bagh is another important river of the district and is a main tributary of the Wainganga. The whole of its 130 Kms. length right from its origin in Chichgad hills to the village Kati where it joins the Wainganga falls in Bhandara district only.

(c) Another important river next to the Bagh is the Chulband which rise in the Gaikhuri range in Gondia tahsil. It flows through Sakoli tahsil and Joins the Wainganga falls in Bhandara district only.

(d) Besides the above, the other tributaries of the Wainganga flowing through Bhandara district are the Pangoli, the Chandan, the Bawanthadi, the Gadhavi and Sir rivers all of which except Bawanthadi drain the area of the district to convert it in to a fertile tract.

(3) Soils :-

(a) Types- The main types of soils found in Bhandara district are Kali Kanhar, Sihar, Morand, Khamdi and Bhardi. The area under Kali is not very extensive. The Kanhar is a very rich alluvial soil. Khardi differs from Kanhar by the presence of limestone nodules. Sihar is a redish-yellow soil formed mainly of the detritus of the crystalline rock. It cracks very little in hot weather. Khardi is the name given to very inferior or Sihar.

(b) The Kanhar and the first class morand soils are mainly found in the plains in the South of Bhandara and Sakoli tahsils and especially along the Wainganga river. The soil is very deep sticky, retentive of moisture and bears double crops. In the valleys of

the Wainganga, the soil consists of sandy loam of varying quality but it is very suitable for the cultivation of rice. The soil generally found in the district are Morand class II and sihar which cover altogether 71 percent of the total cultivable area. These soils are both utilised for cultivation of rice, but the sihar is perhaps prominently the rich soil while the Morand, especially where it is the purest, grows Jowar, wheat and Linseed. The remaining Bardi and Khardi etc. are very inferior types of sihar-Morand and are used for the cultivation of inferior rice and minor millets.

1.7 - CLIMATE, TEMPERATURE AND RAINFALL :-

(1) Climate:- Since the district is away from seashore, the climate of the district is uneven and as such there is large variation in the temperatures in hot and cold seasons of the year. It may, however, be mentioned that Bhandara district is not as hot as Nagpur district. The heat during the day-time is considerable high, while the nights are generally cool. Normally January is the coldest month in the year. Whereas May is the hottest. The climate in brief is healthy in all parts of the district except in some parts of Sakoli and Gondia tahsils wherein due to dampness resulting from heavy rainfall combined with dense forests, the atmosphere is favourable to out-break of diseases like malaria and filaria.

(2) Temperature :- i) Temperature data for Bhandara district is available for one centre viz. Gondia. The mean maximum temperature was highest in

the month of May in 1973 44.2 centigrade as against lowest viz. 13.3 centigrade in December at Gondia centre. In general, it can be said that in Bhandara district the temperature starts increasing from February and reaches a peak level in May. Thereafter it starts decreasing from June until it reaches the lowest level in the peak of winter in December or January.

(3) Rainfall:- The rains start in the district from first week of June and last till second week of October. The intensity of rainfall is generally experienced in the month of July, August and September. The rainfall is not also uniform in all parts of the district. It is greater in Sakoli and Gondia tahsils than in Bhandara tahsil for the obvious reason that there are dense forests in Sakoli and Gondia tahsils. The rainfall during the year 1973 for Bhandara, Gondia and Sakoli centre is 1140.9 mm. , 1376.2 mm. and 1478 mm. respectively which shows that the rainfall increased from West to East.

1.8 - POPULATION

The 1971 population of the district showed an increase of 24.59 percent over the year 1961 as against 27.45 percent for Maharashtra. The urban and rural population forms 11.38 percent and 88.62 percent as against 10.74 percent and 89.26 percent respectively in the year 1961. The density of population is 172 per Sq. Km. as compared to 164 for Maharashtra and 178 for India as per 1971 census. The sex ratio i.e. females per 1000 males is 987 for the district as against 930

for Maharashtra in 1971. The literacy rate for the district is of 35.40 percent in 1971 as against the rate of 24.07 in 1961. The literacy rate of Maharashtra is 39.13 in 1971.

The percentage of Schedule caste in the district is 5.23 percent in 1971 as against 2.45 in 1961. Out of the total population in Bhandara district 46.82 percent are workers of which 45.42 percent, 25.13 percent and 14.61 percent are reported as cultivators, agricultural labourers and in household industry respectively in the year 1971. The persons engaged in remaining services are 14.84 percent of the total workers in 1971.

CHAPTER- II

EXPLANATORY NOTES ON THE SCOPE AND LIMITATIONS OF THE STATISTICAL DATA PRESENTED IN THE PART-II (STATISTICAL ABSTRACT).

I. PURPOSE :-

The abstract part of this publication gives exhaustive statistical data on important Socio-Economic indicators of development. Data on almost all important topics are presented in this part, so that the publication could serve as a reference book. Talukawise data has been displayed as far as possible for inter taluka comparison. In most of the tables, data for 1973-74 have been indicated. In the tables wherein data for 1973-74 could not be presented, the same for the latest two years, for which they were available, have been shown. All the data are collected from the State and Central Government Offices, local bodies and other relevant agencies. The foot-notes below each table indicate the source from which the data have been collected.

II- DISTRICT AT A GLANCE

This table presents a birds eye-view of the Socio-Economic indicators of development in Bhandara district and Maharashtra State under different heads, such as area, population, agriculture, animal husbandary education, transport and communication, Plan and C.D. Programme, Local bodies and other miscellaneous Statistics. Reference year of the data is also indicated in the table.

III- CONTENTS SCOPE AND LIMITATION :-

The statistical tables presented in the District Statistical Abstract are grouped in to 13 parts.

The contents of the tables and the scopes and limitations of the data displayed under each group are explained below.

1. AREA AND POPULATION :-

In all 7 tables i.e. table Nos. 1 to 7 are included in this section. Data for 1971 census are included in all the tables except table No. 6. The table No. 1 indicates area, houses and population according to 1971 census. The term rural and urban area as used in cols. 3 and 4 respectively of the table was defined as under :-

A town or an urban area is defined as a place which has -

1. A Municipality, Cantonment or a civil Lincas or
2. (i) A Population of 5,000 or over and
(ii) At least 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in Non-Agricultural pursuits.

The term village (or rural area) used in the table denotes a statutorily recognised village having a well defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, wadis or padas have, therefore, not been shown as separate villages. On the other hand, statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as 'Un-inhabited' villages. Villages also include forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families.

Table No. 2 indicates decadal variation in population since 1951 to 1971. Table No. 3 gives classification of inhabited villages according to different population ranges. Total population of the villages in each range is also indicated in the table. The table No. 4

gives population of urban area according to 1971 census.

The table No. 5 gives number of workers and non-workers in Bhandara district according to 1971 census, and they are classified according to standard livelihood classes. The population according to livelihood classes is also shown separately for rural and urban area and also for the district as a whole. The concept of dependency has been abandoned for economic classification at the 1971 census. Instead, the population is classified into workers and non-workers. The emphasis is now on work and not on income or economic dependence. A person is defined as worker if. (a) In case of, seasonal work like cultivation, livestock, dairying household industry etc. he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season and (b) In the case of regular employment in any trade, profession, service, business or commerce, he was employed during any of the fifteen days preceeding the day of the enumerator's visit to the household.

Persons like beggars, pensioners, agricultural or non-agricultural royalty, rent or dividend receivers etc. who earn an income but who are not participating in any productive work in any occupation, a person who had been offered work but who had not actually joined, have been classified as a non-worker.

The table No. 6 gives distribution of population according to (A) age-group and (B) Religion separately for Rural and Urban area and for the district as a whole as per 1971 census.

The table No. 7 gives population of scheduled caste and scheduled tribes separately for rural and urban area and also for the district as a whole.

The scheduled castes notified for this district are as follows :-

SCHEDULED TRIBES :-

There are no scheduled areas in Bhandara district as such no person was reported as a scheduled tribe person.

2. CLIMATE :-

Only two tables are included under this section, pertaining to rainfall and temperature at the selected centres in Bhandara district.

The table No. 8 gives monthly rainfall and number of rainy days in each month at the selected centres for the year 1973. The data are collected through the Agriculture Deptt. A day is treated as a 'rainy day' if during the 24 hours the rain gauge recorded a minimum of 2.55 M.M. of rainfall. Annual rainfall for each centre is also indicated in the table. "Normal rainfall" is the average rainfall over a period ranging from fifty to eighty years.

The table No. 9 gives monthwise 'Maximum' and 'minimum' and also annual temperature is recorded at selected centre for the year 1973. The data are supplied

by the Department of Agriculture, Bhandara District.

by the Government of India's Regional Meteorological centre at Nagpur. The mean maximum and mean minimum temperature denotes the average of the maximum and minimum temperature recorded daily during the month. The mean (average) temperature is the simple average of the mean maximum and mean minimum temperature.

3. AGRICULTURE :-

In all 12 tables i.e. table No. 10 to 21 are included in this section.

The table No. 10 indicates talukawise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of land uses for the year 1972-73 against each taluka, the break up for the total geographical area according to different types of land uses is shown. Major constituents of the Geographical area are forests, land put to non-agricultural uses, barren and uncultivable land, cultivable waste, permanent pastures, land under miscellaneous tree crops not included in area shown, current fallows, other fallows and lastly net area sown. Under 'Forests' are included all actually forest area or lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether state owned or private. If any portion of such land is not actually wooded but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land as the case may be. 'Land put to non-agricultural uses' stands for all lands, occupied by buildings, roads, and railways or under water e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agriculture. 'Barren and uncultivable land' covers all barren and uncultivable

land like mountains, deserts etc. Land which can not be brought under cultivation unless at high cost is classes as 'barren and un-culturable land' whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Culturable waste' includes all lands available for cultivation whether not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once but not cultivated during the current year and last five years, or more in succession. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or not assessed and may lie in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Permanent pastures' and other grazing lands cover all grazing lands whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not, village common and grazing lands within forest area are included under this head. Land under miscellaneous tree crops etc. not included in the net area sown' includes all cultivatable land, which is not included under net area sown, but is put to some agricultural use. Land under casurina tree, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other for fuel etc. which are not included under 'orchards' are classed under the category. 'Current fallows' comprise of cropped areas, which are kept fallow during the current year. 'Other fallow' land includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation, but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and more than five years. The 'net area sown' consists of net area sown with crops and orchards, area sown more than once being counted only once. The 'Gross cropped area' represents the sum total of area under all crops. The difference between the

total or gross cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once during the same year with the same or different crops.

The table No. 17 gives the information on Major and Medium irrigation projects in this district. Both complete and incomplete projects have been covered in this table. The cost of Medium irrigation project ranges between Rs. 20 lakhs to Rs. 5 crores whereas that of a Major irrigation project, it is Rs. 5/- crores and above.

Table No. 18 deals with Monthly agricultural wage rates during 1973. This data is collected fortnightly throughout the year from three selected Rural centres viz. 1) Mundikota 2) Lakhani and 3) Adyar. Only one centre is selected from a taluka. The table Nos 20 and 21 deals with famine scarcity, akin to scarcity data in the district for the year 1973-74.

4. ANIMAL HUSBANDRY AND FOREST

In all 5 tables i.e. table Nos. 22 to 26 are included in this section.

Table No. 22 gives talukawise number of various types of livestock and poultry as enumerated in the district in the livestock census, 1972. The census is conducted throughout the country on an uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration once in 5 years. During the Livestock census operations, the livestock and poultry were enumerated by house to house enquiry. Particular care was taken to enumerate livestock in slaughter houses, stray animals and animal in transit. Sex and age-groupwise classification of the livestock is also indicated

in the table.

B.-FOREST :-

The table No. 26 (A) gives details of area in different types of forests during the year 1973-74. Data regarding forests under the control of the State Government's Forest Department and those under the control of the state Govt's Revenue Department are shown separately. The areas under forests are classified according to legal status into reserved forests, protected forests and unclassed forests.

The legal status refers to the classification of forests under the Indian Forests Act, XVI of 1927. Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber production wherein the rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid. Right of grazing or cultivation is allowed, but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassed forest refers to the inaccessible forest of unoccupied waste. The forests which are taken over by Government from local bodies or private individuals for management on lease basis are called 'leased forests'. There is no classification of expropriatory forests as such but in Nagpur Division, some private lands containing valuable forest are taken over by Govt. under section 29 of the Indian Forests Act, which are not yet classified as per tripartite classification and they are termed as ex-properietory. The forest area shown in the Table No. 26 (A) may not tally with the area under forest shown in Table No. 10. The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons.

(i) In the Indian Forest Statistics Returns, the whole area including non-wooden area under the control of Forest Department is taken as area under the forest, while in Agricultural statistics, it is classified according to its actual utilisation (ii) The Forest Department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose and indicate the ownership of the forest areas and the actual utilisation of these areas is not so important from the point of view of Forest Department, as it is in the land utilisation statistics under Agricultural statistics. (iii) The Forest Department returns relates to financial year and Agricultural statistics relate to the Agricultural year.

5. EMPLOYMENT, INDUSTRY AND ELECTRICITY :-

In all 9 tables i.e. table No. 27 to 35 are included in this section.

The factory statistics shown in table No. 27, 28, and 29 cover following types of factories registered under the Factories Act, 1948 :-

1) Those employing 10 or more workers and working with the aid of power (section 2(i))

2) Those employing 20 or more workers and working without the aid of power (section 2(ii)).

and (3) Those registered under section 85 of the Act, under which the State Government makes applicable the provisions of the Act, even though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However, statistics of the Defence Factories are excluded.

The table No. 31 gives occupational distribution of total registrations and placements in the

Employment Exchange for the year 1973-74 according to standard National classification.

The table No.34 gives the consumption of electricity during the year 1973-74 where as table No. 35 indicates the town & villages electrified as on 31-3-74 in the district.

6. CO-OPERATION :-

In all 8 tables i.e. table No. 36 to 43 are included in this section.

The table No. 38 gives talukawise number of primary agricultural credit societies, their membership, share capital, Reserve and other funds, working capital, loans advanced and recovered, loans outstanding and overdues and percentage of recovery to total loan advanced for the year 1973-74 'Working capital' includes paid-up capital, deposits and borrowings. Loans outstanding include out-standings in respect of loans, cash credits and overdrafts and the amount of outstanding bills purchased or discounted. 'Overdues' refer to amount of loan or instalments which were due for collection but which were not actually repaid and for the repayment of which no extension has been granted by a competent authority.

The table No. 43 gives talukawise number of registered money lenders in each taluka and loans advanced by them during 1973-74. Separate figures of loans advanced to traders and non-traders have been furnished in the table. The transactions of money lending in the state are regulated under the provision of Bombay money lenders Act, 1946. According to the Act, no money lender shall carry on the business of money lending except in the area for which he has been granted a

licence and except in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence.

7. MEDICAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH :-

In all 5 tables i.e. tables Nos. 44 to 48 are included in this section.

The table No. 44 given in this section indicates talukawise number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, health centres and primary health centres, doctors, nurses, vaidyas, beds and total number of in-door and out-door patients treated for the year 1973. The table covers all the State and Central Government Medical Institutions, and also institutions owned by Municipalities, private clinics run by private bodies or individuals are, however, not included in the table.

The table No. 45 gives vital statistics such as number of registered births and deaths in this district. Sexwise classification of births, deaths and infant deaths for 1973 is also mentioned. The table 48 deals with the number of Family planning centres operating in the district.

8. EDUCATION :-

In all 7 tables i.e. Table Nos. 49 to 55 are included in this section, (Except Tab. No. 50 & 51).

The table No. 49 gives sexwise number of literates and percentage of literacy separately for rural and urban areas of each taluka according to 1971 population census. As per 1971 census definition, a person was classified as a literate if he was able to read or write a simple letter in any language.

The table No. 52 gives information regarding number of educational Institutions according to type for

the 1971-72 and 1972-73. Sexwise enrolment and number of trained and untrained teachers in these institutions is also indicated in this table. The classification of institutions according to 'type' is slightly different from that of education. There are at present many secondary schools, which also impart education in primary course. Nevertheless, the entire enrolment of students is included under 'Secondary education'. Primary institutions provide education for standards I to IV or standards I to VII/VIII or less and teaches the curriculum approved by the Education Department. The Secondary institutions teach students for standard VIII to X or XI/XII with or without lower standards. Higher education is education after passing Secondary school Certificate Examination, which leads to a Degree examination.

The table No. 53 presents data on the number of beneficiaries among backward classes such as scheduled caste, scheduled Tribes and other backward classes for the year 1971-72 and 1972-73. Beneficiaries for the table are persons who are getting educational concessions of either type such as scholarships etc.

9. TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS :-

In all 7 tables i.e. table No. 56 to 62 are included in this section.

The table No. 56 gives total railway length as at the end of 1973-74 according to types of routes, broad gauge, metre gauge and narrow gauge. The information is compiled from the railway time table. The railway length is measured between the first and last stations within the district boundary. The figures of length of

each type of route, are therefore, approximate and not accurate.

The table No. 59 deals with operational statistics on Nationalised Road Transport in Nagpur division. For this table the S.T. Division comprises (1) Nagpur (2) Bhandara and (3) Chanda districts of Nagpur Region.

The table No. 60 presents the results of the traffic census on important roads conducted by Building and communication Department, Government of Maharashtra. Data on the number of vehicles is according to categories and location of countpost. Type of surface and total traffic intensity in tons per 24 hours are also indicated in the table.

10. LOCAL BODIES :-

In all 4 tables i.e. table Nos. 63 to 66 are included in this section.

The table No. 63 gives abstract of income and expenditure of local bodies such as village Panchayats, Zilla Parishad and Municipalities for the financial year 1973-74. The number of village Panchayats includes number of independent village panchayats as well as group village panchayats.

11. PLAN AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

In all 5 tables i.e. tables Nos. 67 to 71 are included in this section.

12. PRICES :-

Only 3 tables i.e. table Nos. 72 to 74 are included in this section. The table No. 72 shows the wholesale prices of certain agricultural commodities of

selected centres in the district.

The table No. 73 gives monthly average retail prices of various commodities at district headquarter, Bhandara. The average prices under each commodity are shown from the month of January to December for the year 1973 alongwith units and varieties of commodities for which prices have been quoted. The data are regularly collected by District Statistical Officer every week on Friday by visiting the selected shops. The average price of each commodity for the year is also shown in the table. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too only from one shop at District headquarter, the average price for individual commodity cannot be said to be fully representative, but the data may prove useful as a broad indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time.

The table No. 74 gives consumer price index number (revised series) for working class of Nagpur centre published by the office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay. Monthwise data for the year 1973-74 commencing from April, and also average for the year 1973-74 have been given in this table. The base year for calculating price are issued by Economic Adviser to the Government of India. The base year for the same is 1960.

13. MISCELLANEOUS :-

In all 11 tables i.e. table Nos. 75 to 85 are included in this section.

The table No. 78 gives talukawise cinema statistics for the year 1973-74. Number of permanent,

Semi-permanent and touring theatres and their seating capacity per show has been indicated. The table No. 85 indicates the important indicators of development.

CHAPTER No. III

In this chapter the progress of development covering the period of Third Five year plan and the last year of the Forth Five year plan has been reviewed by presenting talukwise trends based on certain important indicators of development with available talukwise figures to bring out pace of development,

INDICATOR NO. 1PERCENTAGE OF GROSS SOWN AREA TO NET SOWN AREA:-

Agriculture has been the mainstay of the district economy, in as much as 70.55 percent of its population is dependant on it for its livelihood. At the end of the year 1972-73 gross sown area in the district was 52-94 percent of the total geographical area. The district accounted for 27.07 percent of area sown more than once to net sown area. Following table gives the percentage of gross sown area to net sown area .

It is evident from the above table that the percentage of gross sown area to net sown area has been decreased to 127.05 percent in the year 1972-73 from 135.37 percent in the year 1960-61. The percentage decrease was highest in Gondia tahsil whereas it was lowest in Sakoli tahsil.

INDICATOR NO.2PERCENTAGE OF PRODUCTIVITY OF IMPORTANT CROPS

Productivity of land in the district is however low due to various factors such as meagre irrigation facilities, inadequate and uneven rainfall large scale soil erosion and uneconomic size of the average holding. In the past productivity of important crops had been assigned highest priority under agricultural production programme.

Following table gives the productivity of important crops in the district for the year 1972-73 as compared to the corresponding position in the year 1960-61, which was supposed to be an exceptionally good year.

It will be observed from the above table that the productivity of all crops has been decreased in 1972-73 as compared to the year 1960-61. The productivity of rice is decreased by 59.44 percent, highest among all crops while the productivity of gram is decreased least i.e. by 4.23

percent. The decrease in productivity of most of the crops is due to less rainfall during 1972-73 in the District.

It is clear from the above table that the area under food crops to gross cropped area had increased to 92.54 percent in the year 1972-73 from 87.83 percent in 1960-61 for the district. It will be seen from the above table that the percentage increase in average wages of carpenter was highest in Mundikota centre and lowest at Adyar centre in 1973. As regards blacksmiths the percentage increase was highest at Adyar centre whereas it was minus at Mundikota centre. The percentage increase in average wages of Unskilled labourers observed highest at Mundikota centre for both man and women. It will be seen from the above table that the road length in the district increased by 323.69 percent as on 31-3-74 as compared to the position on 31-3-61. The percentage increase in length of village roads was observed

The banking facilities were available at 20 places in various parts of the district covering a population of 2,51,890 in 1972-73 which formed 15.89 percent of the total population of the district. It will be seen from the above table that the number of banking offices per lakh of population increased from 1.26 in 1960-61 to 2.96 in 1972-73. It will be seen from the above table that there is an upward trend in the prices of all commodities in the year 1973. The prices of rice, wheat and Jowar had increased by 288.33 percent, 255.35 percent and 331.91 percent

respectively over corresponding prices of the year 1962. The percentage increase in average prices of Tur-Dal and Gram dal was 207.50 and 291.07 respectively over the year 1962.

The average prices of sugar and Gur had increased by 210.40 and 194.66 percent respectively over the year 1962. The average prices of Ground-nut oil, Dalda, Dry chillies, Turmeric had increased by 267.45 percent, 246.78 percent, 41.14 percent and 91.33 percent respectively over the year 1962.

The average prices of Dhoti, Sari and Shirting cloth had increased by 125.40 percent, 62.53 percent and 81.62 percent respectively over the year 1962.

It will also be seen from the above table that the average prices of Aerosene, Charcoal, Fire-wood, Washing soap, Bidi, Tea-leaf, Brass, Supari, Cigarettes had increased by 75.00, 160.00, 75.20, 45.51, 92.30, 79.30, 181.75, 3.87 and 174.19 percent respectively over the year 1962.

CHAPTER - IVANNUAL PLAN 1973-74

The Annual plan 1973-74 is the last annual plan of the Fourth Five year plan. During the year 1973-74 an amount of Rs. 31,627 thousands was spent forming 104.37 percent against the budget provision of Rs. 30,303 thousands on district level plan schemes. An amount of Rs. 23,229 thousands and Rs. 8,398 thousands was incurred forming 73 percent and 27 percent in the state and local sector respectively. The outlay and expenditure on plan schemes under different heads of developments during the year 1973-74 with the percentage of expenditure as compared to total budget provision are given below :-

The above table indicates that the highest percentage of 130.87 was under the head irrigation and power followed by social services 101.27 percent, Transport & communication, 100.20 percent Agricultural programmes 92.97 percent, Co-operation and community development 89.63 percent, Miscellaneous 75.00 percent and Industry and mining 66.20 percent.

The performance under different heads of development are given below.

1) Agricultural programme

The programmes of agricultural development have aimed at increasing the area under improved cultivation and agricultural productivity through various schemes. Besides the above development programmes, Animal Husbandry, Forest, Fishery and warehousing & Marketing were also

included as other agricultural programmes under the new Agricultural programme, an expenditure of 32.01 percent of the total expenditure for the district was incurred during the year 1973-74. Out of the total expenditure incurred under this programme, 33.46 percent and 39.90 percent was incurred in the state and local sector respectively.

4. Animal Husbandry

Under the scheme veterinary aid centres,
 one building was constructed at the cost of Rs. 8 thousands.

5. Forest

Under this sub head of development 97.25 percent of expenditure was incurred against the budget provision of Rs. 764 thousands. Plantation of valuable trees on 133 hectares and Fodder plantation on 43 hectares was completed during the year 1973-74. About 17 K.M.S. of forest roads were also constructed.

6. Fisheries

During the year 1973-74 an expenditure of Rs. 180 thousands was incurred against an outlay of Rs. 218 thousands. During the year under report 4,610 thousands spawn were produced, 6,652 thousand fingerlings were stocked, and 5,90,000 Kgs. fish were netted. Nylon twine of 916.65 Kgs was supplied to fishermen and their co-operatives and 31 co-operative societies of fishermen were assisted by share capital contribution.

7. Dairy

During the year 1973-74, 16 new milk producers Co-operative societies were organised under this sub head of development.

8. Ware housing and Marketing

Under this subhead of development subsidy to eight Agricultural Marketing societies in the district was granted for which an expenditure of Rs. 53 thousands was incurred during the year 1973-74.

II- Co-Operation and Community DevelopmentI- Co-Operation

During the year 1973-74 an expenditure of Rs. 116 thousands was incurred forming 95.08 percent of the

Outlay of Rs. 122 thousands under the subhead Co-operation for various programmes. Share capital contribution of Rs. 75 thousands was granted to two sale purchase societies and financial assistance for share capital ~~downs~~ and equipments was granted. Subsidy of Rs. 30 thousands was granted for staff work to 25 forest labour contract societies and 2 labour contract societies during the year 1973-74.

II- Community Development

During the year 1973-74, an amount of Rs. 667 thousands was spent on different activities of development in all the 13 community development blocks in the district.

Also Rs. 24 thousands were spent for the activities of Applied Nutrition programme in 4 development blocks.

III- Irrigation and Power

Under the sub head of development of power, 29 villages were electrified and ⁴⁸³ pumping sets were energised during the year 1973-74 for which an expenditure of Rs. 1,235 thousands was incurred.

IV- Industry and Mining

An expenditure of Rs. 237 thousands was incurred against the budget provision of Rs. 358 thousands on small scale Industries. Major expenditure of Rs. 173 thousands was granted as financial assistance to Balutedar Co-operative societies at block level and remaining amount was spent for granting financial assistance to handloom co-operative societies in the district.

V- Transport and Communications

Under this major head of development and

expenditure of 2,446 thousands was incurred against budget provision of Rs. 2,441 thousands. The percentage of Rs. 2,441 expenditure was 100.28 percent and 100.00 percent in the state and local sector respectively. During the year 1973-74 new roads of 15 K.M.S, rural roads of 5 Kms. and 44 C.D. works were constructed.

VI- Social services

During the year 1973-74 an expenditure of Rs. 8,640 thousands was incurred under this major head of development forming 101.27 percent against an outlay of Rs. 8,532 thousands. Out of the total expenditure 113.2 percent and 88.79 percent was spent in state and local sector respectively.

Under the sub head General Education an expenditure of Rs. 2,356 thousands was incurred. During the year 1973-74, 99 primary teachers were appointed, stipend to 250 primary teachers and loan scholarship to 13 primary teachers were granted. The number of rooms constructed were 32 for primary schools. The grants of Rs. 2,075 thousands were released for expansion and development of Non-Govt. Secondary schools and additional 102 sets of scholarships in secondary schools were provided. During the year 1973-74 an amount of Rs. 205 thousands was spent for educational concessions to 5,053 economically backward class students and 25 sons and daughters of primary schools teachers were benefited by Educational concessions for which an expenditure of Rs. 7 thousands were incurred.

Under public health Rs. 193 thousands were spent for alteration and repairs of two hospitals buildings

at Bhandara and Gondia and construction of two staff quarters of primary health centre was in progress.

Under this sub head of development water supply and drainage an expenditure of Rs. 58,747^{thousands} was incurred. Improvement of two urban water supply schemes at Bhandara and Gondia and the work of Pauni water supply scheme was in progress. During the year 1973-74, five rural water supply schemes were completed and nineteen were under execution. During the year 139 drinking water wells were also constructed.

The expenditure on housing, welfare of backward classes, social welfare and Labour and labour welfare schemes was Rs. 148, thousands, 152 thousands, 20 thousands and 64 thousands respectively during the year 1973-74.

VII- Miscellaneous.

Under this major head, only one scheme named Rural Broadcasting was implemented in the district for which an expenditure of 39 thousands was incurred for providing Radio listening sets to 8 villages during the year 1973-74.
